#### **POWER SOURCE**

When the bars in the battery indicator (in the display) become low (see figure 1), you can recharge the battery as described on the next page or use the Battery Backup unit, but first install a battery as follows:

Slide the Battery Backup's battery compartment as shown. When using the Battery Backup, make sure to set the Power Input setting to Backup (see page 24).



Insert one (1) "AAA" battery as shown. An alkaline battery is recommended for the longest playing time. Slide the battery compartment back on.

#### BATTERY PRECAUTIONS

Follow these precautions when using a battery in this device:

- 1. Use only the size and type of battery specified.
- Be sure to follow the correct polarity when installing the battery as indicated. Reversed batteries may cause damage to the device.

- If the device is not to be used for a long period of time, remove the battery to prevent damage or injury from possible battery leakage.
- Do not try to recharge batteries not intended to be recharged; they can overheat and rupture. (Follow battery manufacturer's directions.)

## POWER SOURCE (CONTINUED)

#### **USING THE BATTERY BACKUP**



When the main unit's rechargeable battery power has been used up, you can use the battery backup to continue to play your music. After inserting the battery, insert the battery backup's DC plug into the DC 1.5V IN jack on the bottom of the main unit.

#### Follow the instructions below to charge the internal Lithium battery:



With the power on or off, connect the USB cable to the unit and then to the computer; charging will automatically begin.

#### NOTES:

- When charging for the first time, charge overnight for a full charge.
- After the first charge, the battery should fully charge in two to three hours.

## DOWNLOADING AND TRANSFERRING FILES

#### TO INSTALL THE "DIGITAL AUDIO PLAYER" CD SOFTWARE

#### For Windows ME, Windows 2000 or Windows XP:

Windows will automatically detect the audio player without installing the CD software when the USB cable is connected.

## For Macintosh OSX:

Macintosh OSX 10.3 will automatically detect the audio player without installing the CD software. Do not install the software when using a Macintosh.

#### For Windows98SE:

The USB mass storage function will not be activated without driver installation. To activate the USB mass storage function, please use the installation CD-Rom to install the driver.

For Windows 98SE, if you are connecting your player to your computer for the first time, please follow these instructions:

#### **Procedure to Install Player Driver**

 Insert the Installation CD-Rom into the CD Drive, then double click SETUP.EXE to start the installation process.

2. At the Welcome screen, click NEXT.

Read the License Agreement, then click YES.







 At the Setup screen, click NEXT. It is recommended to leave the destination Folder as it is.



At the Program Folder screen, click NEXT. It is recommended to leave the Program Folder as it is.



 The computer will check for previous installations, then install the software. When finished, the InstallShield Wizard Complete screen will appear. Click FINISH to exit the Install program.



When the installation has completed, the new program, "SigmaTel MSCNMMC Audio Player", will be added to the PROGRAM menu on your computer.

#### TRANSFERRING FILES

You can download digital music files from the Internet or use encoding software to convert music that you have on an audio CD into MP3 or WMA format. Once these files are stored on your computer you can easily copy them to your player.

Connect the computer to your player using the supplied USB cable; the READY screen will appear.



Two "Removable Disk" windows will appear in your My

Computer folder. The first is the player's internal memory. The second is the external memory card (if inserted).

To add more files and songs to your player simply drag and drop MP3 or WMA files from anywhere on your computer into one of the "Removable Disk" windows. If there is not a card installed in the player, you cannot add files to the second removable disk.

When you are finished, see the Safely Remove Hardware procedure on the next page before disconnecting the player.



#### SAFELY REMOVING YOUR PLAYER FROM THE COMPUTER

**NOTE:** To avoid damage to your player or data loss, always follow the procedure listed below before disconnecting the USB cable from your computer or disconnecting the player from the USB cable.

Using your mouse, double click the "Safely Remove Hardware"

From the "Safely Remove Hardware" window, select "USB Mass Storage Device" and click the "Stop" button. The "Stop a Hardware Device" window will pop up. Click "OK". When the "Safe to Remove Hardware" window is displayed, you may remove the player from the USB cable or remove the USB cable from the computer. **NOTE:** If the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon is not displayed on the task bar, please

double click on My Computer. Right click on "Removable Disk" and left click on "Eject". Then it is safe to remove the player from the computer.

**IMPORTANT:** If the player's screen is blinking, then data is being transferred. Wait until transfer is complete before removing the player.





With the unit off, insert a SD/MMC memory card (not included) up to 512MB, facing up as shown.



Connect the USB cable. Drag MP3 and WMA files into the SD/MMC memory card's "Removable Disk" window.




To remove the SD/MMC memory card, pull the edge of the card. Carefully remove the card.

**NOTE:** If the external memory card is inserted and the player is in the Music Player mode, the memory card indicator will appear at the top, next to the Battery indicator.

#### **OPERATION**

#### TURNING THE POWER ON/OFF



Turn the unit on by pressing the Play/Pause/Stop button; the MP3 start screen will appear in the display temporarily. To turn the unit off, press and hold the Play/Pause/Stop button; "Continue Holding To Power Off" will appear in the display. When the bars fill up the screen, then the unit turns off, release the Play/Pause/Stop button.


#### **CONNECTING THE REMOTE**



To use the external remote, plug the remote's plug into the Headphone jack on the main unit. Then, plug the headphone's plug into the Headphone jack.


The remote's buttons operate just as the main unit's do, with the exception of the Power on and the buttons/controls on the next page.

#### MUTE BUTTON




To mute the sound when using the remote, press the Mute button once. To restore sound, press the Mute button again.

#### **VOLUME CONTROL**




Rotate the volume control as desired. This is used in conjunction with the main unit's volume buttons.

#### HOLD SWITCH




Slide the HOLD switch to the HOLD position and no buttons will be able to be pressed. This is useful when you do not want the station/track changed by accidentally pressing a button. Slide the HOLD switch to the Unlock (opposite) position to cancel the Hold function.

#### **EQUALIZER**




Press the Menu button ● once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search № ② or № ③ button, then press the Menu button ● again. Select EQ using the Skip/Search № ② or № ③ button, then press the Menu button ● again. Select the desired EQ mode (Normal, Rock, Jazz, Classic or Pop), using the Skip/Search № ② or № ⑤ button, then press the Menu button ● again. When finished, press and hold the Menu button ● for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu.

#### **AUTO POWER OFF**




This setting is used to preset the amount of time the unit will wait before turning off if no buttons are pressed to save the battery. Press the Menu button ● once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search № ② or № ③ button, then press the Menu button ● again. Select AutoPowerOff using the Skip/Search № ② or № ⑤ button, then press the Menu button ● again. Select the desired Auto Power Off time (X {never}, 1, 2, 5 or 10 minutes, using the Skip/Search № ② or № ⑥ button, then press the Menu button ● again. When finished, press and hold the Menu button ● for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu.

#### **POWER INPUT**




This setting is used to select the power input being used (internal Lithium battery or External Battery Backup). Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search  $\mbox{M} @$  or  $\mbox{M} @$  button, then press the Menu button  $\mbox{Q}$  again. Select Power Input using the Skip/Search  $\mbox{M} @$  or  $\mbox{M} @$  button, then press the Menu button  $\mbox{Q}$  again. Select the desired Power Input mode, using the Skip/Search  $\mbox{M} @$  or  $\mbox{M} @$  button, then press the Menu button  $\mbox{Q}$  again. The left LiLon icon is for the internal Lithium battery and the right icon is for the Battery Backup. When finished, press and hold the Menu button  $\mbox{Q}$  for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu.

#### SCREEN SAVE



This setting is used to preset the amount of time the unit will wait before the screen saver will appear. Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search (\*\* ② or \*\*) ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Screen Save using the Skip/Search (\*\* ② or \*\*) ⑤ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select the desired Screen Save time (X {never}, 5, 10, 30 or 60 seconds using the Skip/Search (\*\* ② or \*\*) ⑥ button, then press the Menu button ① again. When finished, press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu.

#### **ABOUT**




This icon is used to view the information regarding the player's internal and external memory. Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select About icon (see left) using the Skip/Search (4 ② or )4 ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. The display will show the Internal memory's total and remaining memory and the External card's total and remaining memory. When finished, press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu.

#### TO LISTEN TO THE RADIO




Plug the headphones into the Headphones jack. With the power on, press the Menu button; the Main menu will appear.




Press the Menu button **①** until Search appears in the display. Select a station by pressing and releasing the Skip/Search ₩ ② or № ③ button to increase/decrease the frequency by 0.1MHZ.




Select the FM Tuner icon (see above) using the Skip/Search ₩ ◑ or ➤ ૭ button, then press the Menu button ☻ again.



Press and **hold** the Skip/Search  $\bowtie$  0 or  $\bowtie$  2 button and the unit will search and stop at the next strong broadcasting station.



When an FM stereo station is tuned, the Stereo indicator (two speaker) will appear in the display. When a Mono station or a weak FM Stereo station is tuned, the Mono indicator (one speaker) will appear in the display. Turn off Stereo by pressing the Play/Pause/Stop button and turn it back on by pressing the Play/Pause/Stop button again. Noise present in FM Stereo broadcasts may be reduced by listening in Mono.




Adjust the volume by pressing the VOLUME +  $\P$  or  $- \$ 0 button. To turn the unit off, press and hold the Play/Pause/Stop button  $\P$ ; "Continue Holding To Power Off" will appear in the display. When the bars fill up the screen, then the unit turns off, release the Play/Pause/Stop button  $\P$ .

#### **ANTENNA**

**FM**-The headphones act as an antenna for FM. Extend the headphone wire for best FM reception.

#### TO AUTOMATICALLY SET STATIONS INTO MEMORY



Press the VOLUME + ① and the Record ② buttons simultaneously and the unit will automatically scan and memorize the first 20 strong FM stations. If there are not 20 strong stations, the ones not used will keep the default frequency of 87.5MHz.

To stop auto searching, press the Record button ②.

#### TO MANUALLY SET AND TUNE STATIONS IN MEMORY



SETTING PRESETS: Tune a station as described on page 26. Repeatedly press the Menu button ❶ until Save appears in the display. Select a preset (up to 20) using the Skip/Search № ④ or № ⑤ button, then press the Record button ④



SELECTING PRESETS: Repeatedly press the Menu button ● until Radio appears in the display. Select the desired preset using the Skip/Search (※ ② or >>> ⊕ button and the station will automatically be tuned in.

#### TO LISTEN TO MP3s/WMAs



Plug the headphones into the Headphones jack. With the power on, press the Menu button; the Main menu will appear.



Press the Play/Pause/Stop button to start playback. The MP3 information will appear on the display.



Select the Music icon (see above) using the Skip/Search № ① or № ② button, then press the Menu button ③ again.



Adjust the volume by pressing the VOLUME +  $\bullet$  or -  $\bullet$  button. To turn the unit off, see page 21.

#### TO PAUSE PLAYBACK



During playback, press the Play/Pause/Stop button to temporarily pause playback; the timer will stop counting. Press again to resume playback.

#### FORWARD/REVERSE SKIP



During playback, press the Skip/Search ₩ button to advance the player to the beginning of the next file. Press the Skip/Search ₩ button repeatedly to advance the player to highernumbered files.




During playback, press the Skip/Search ₩ button to move the player back to the beginning of the currently playing file. Press the Skip/Search ₩ button repeatedly to move the player back to lower-numbered files.

#### HIGH-SPEED MUSIC SEARCH



During playback, press and hold the Skip/Search ₩ ① or ▶ ② button to move the player forward or backward within a file to locate a specific musical passage. The player will move forward or backward at high speed as long as the button is held. When you release the button, normal playback will resume.

#### REPEAT PLAYBACK OF A SINGLE FILE





#### REPEAT PLAYBACK OF ALL FILES



Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search 🕊 ② or 🕦 ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Play Sequence using the Skip/Search 🕊 ② or 🕦 ④ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Repeat All using the Skip/Search 🕊 ② or ) 🕦 ④ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu; the Repeat All indicator will appear in the display. Press the Play/Pause/Stop button ④; all tracks on the player will be repeated continuously.

#### TO RANDOMLY PLAY ALL THE FILES AND THEN STOP



Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search [4] ② or [3] ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Play Sequence using the Skip/Search [4] ② or [3] ⑥ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Shuffle the using the Skip/Search [4] ② or [3] ⑥ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu; the Shuffle indicator will appear in the display. Press the Play/Pause/Stop button ④; the unit will play all the tracks in random order once and then stop.

#### TO RANDOMLY PLAY ALL THE FILES CONTINUOUSLY



Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search ( or ) obtton, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Play Sequence using the Skip/Search ( or ) or ) obtton, then press the Menu button ② again. Select Shuffle ALL the using the Skip/Search ( or ) or ) obtton, then press the Menu button ① again. Press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu; the Shuffle ALL indicator will appear in the display. Press the Play/Pause/Stop button ③; the unit will play all the tracks in random order continuously.

#### TO CANCEL THE PLAY MODE AND CONTINUE WITH NORMAL PLAYBACK



Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Settings icon (see left) using the Skip/Search IM ② or IM ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Play Sequence using the Skip/Search IM ② or IM ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Normal using the Skip/Search IM ② or IM ⑤ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu; the Play Mode indicator will disappear from the display.

#### REPEAT A-B PLAYBACK



While playing back a file, press the Record button once at the beginning of the section you want to repeat; A+ will appear in the display. Press the record button again at the end of the section you want to repeat; A+B will appear in the display. The selected section will then repeat continuously. To cancel Repeat A-B playback, press the Record button again; the Repeat indicator will disappear from the display.


## RECORDING A VOICE MESSAGE (QUICK)



To quickly record a voice message in ADPCM 8KHz format, press and hold the Record button for one second. Speak into the microphone at a normal tone of voice. When finished, press the Record button again. The recorded voice file will be saved as a WAV file (for example "V001.WAV") in the voice folder.

#### RECORDING A VOICE MESSAGE/FM BROADCAST OR EXTERNAL UNIT



WHILE IN MUSIC MODE: Press the Menu button ● once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Record icon (see left) using the Skip/Search № ② or № ③ button, then press the Menu button ● again.

WHILE IN FM MODE: Press and hold the Record button for one second

Select the desired settings as described below using the Skip/Search  $\bowtie \Theta$  or  $\bowtie \Theta$  button, then press the Menu button  $\bullet$  to change.

**Source:** Select MIC to record from microphone.

Select Line In to record from an external unit connected to the LINE IN jack (see figure

on the next page).

Select FM to record the internal FM station being broadcast.

Mo/St: Select Stereo or Mono.


Encoding: Select the desired type of encoding (IM ADPCM, MS ADPCM, PCM or MP3.

S-Rate: Select the desired sampling rate (32KHz, 44KHz, 48KHz). The higher the KHz, the

better the quality of the recording, but the larger the file.

**Bit Rate:** Select the Bit Rate for MP3 only. It is suggested to use 128Kbps.

When finished with the record settings, select Record to start recording or Cancel to cancel the recording using the Skip/Search 

★ ● or ▶ ● button, then press the Menu button ●.

NOTES:

- The recorded voice file will be saved as a WAV file (for example "V001.WAV") in the voice folder.
- The recording is not affected by the Volume setting as the volume is set automatically.
- The recorded FM or Line In file will be saved as an MP3 file (for example "M001.MP3") in the MP3s folder.


#### **PLAYING RECORDINGS**



Press the Menu button ❶ once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select Voice icon (see left) using the Skip/Search № 0 or № 0 button, then press the Menu button ❶ again. Select the desired voice message using the Skip/Search № 0 or № 0 button, then press the Play/Pause/Stop button ④ to start playback. The unit will then playback that file and all of the files after that file, then stop.

**NOTE:** To listen to the FM or Line In recordings, simply listen as you would a regular MP3 file.

#### DELETING A FILE



Press the Menu button ① once; the Main Menu will appear in the display. Select the Erase Files icon (see left) using the Skip/Search 🕊 ② or 🕪 ③ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Select Music or Voice icon using the Skip/Search 🕊 ② or 🕪 ⑥ button to select the type of file to delete, then press the Menu button ① again. The unit will then display the first recording and ask if you want to delete the file. Select Yes or No using the Skip/Search 🕊 ② or 🕪 ⑥ button, then press the Menu button ① again. Repeat until all of the files in the selected folder have been saved or deleted. Press and hold the Menu button ① for approximately one second to exit the Setting and Main Menu.

### **FORMATTING THE UNIT**

Formatting the unit will completely erase all files, so only format when there is no other option.

1. Connect the computer to your player using the supplied USB cable; the READY screen

- will appear.
- 2. Press the Menu button and a Removable disk will appear on the computer's screen.
- Right-click the Removable Disk folder on your computer, then choose format from the menu.
- Click Start in the format window, then click OK in the pop-up window to start formatting the unit.
- 5. When finished, click OK.

### UNINSTALLING THE DRIVERS

**NOTE:** If you want to format the unit (all files will be erased), then choose FORMAT DATA AREA at the firmware Download application screen.

5. Click Start to begin upgrading the firmware. After upgrading, click Close.
