Telegraphic Money Order Fees.

These fees are the same as the fees for ordinary Money Orders plus a telegraph charge calculated at the rates for Inland telegrams for the actual number of words used in the telegram advising the remittance according as the telegram is to be sent as an "Express" or as an "Ordinary" message.

Value Payable Fees.

These fees are calculated on the amount specified for remittance to the sender, and are the same as the fees for ordinary Money Orders.

Insurance Fees.

For every Rs. 50 of insured value, 1 anna.

Acknowledgment Fee.

For each article registered, 1 anna.

Parcels may also be sent by post to most British Possessions and to most foreign countries and their possessions, at the rates of postage and under the conditions shown in Section IV. of the *Post Office Guide*.

Prepayment of parcel postage is compulsory in all cases.

The value of a single Money Order drawn on the United Kingdom may not exceed £40.

Money Orders expressed in Indian currency may be drawn—at Inland rates and under Inland rules—on Indian Native States, the British Possessions, and the foreign countries and possessions named in Section V. of the *Post Office Guide*, under the head "Foreign Money Orders."

INDO - CEYLON TELEGRAPHIC MONEY ORDERS expressed in Indian currency may also be drawn on Ceylon. The limit of value is Rs. 600. For the rates of commission applicable to such orders, see Clause 310 of the *Post Office Guide*.

INDO-SEYCHELLES TELEGRAPHIC MONEY ORDERS are issued in India (including Burma) and in Aden for Payment in the Seychelles, and in the Seychelles for payment in India (including Burma) and Aden. Limit, Rs. 600. Fees: (1) Money Order Commission; (2) a telegraph charge of Re. 1 11 0 per word from India, and Re. 1 8 0 per word from Aden. No private communication is allowed in telegram advising remittance.

British Postal Orders

of the denominations of 6d., 1s., 1s. 6d., 2s., and so on increasing by 6d. at each step, up to 20s., and also of the denomination of 21s., are sold at Post Offices for their denominated value (at Rs. 15 to the £) plus a small commission. The amount of commission is $\frac{1}{4}$ anna in the case of an order for a sum not exceeding 2s. 6d., 1 anna for an order for any sum from 3s. up to 15s. inclusive, and $1\frac{1}{4}$ annas for an order for any sum exceeding 15s.

British Postal Orders are payable in the United Kingdom and in the Colonies and British Post Office agencies shown in Section V. of the *Post Office Guide*. They are also payable in India.
