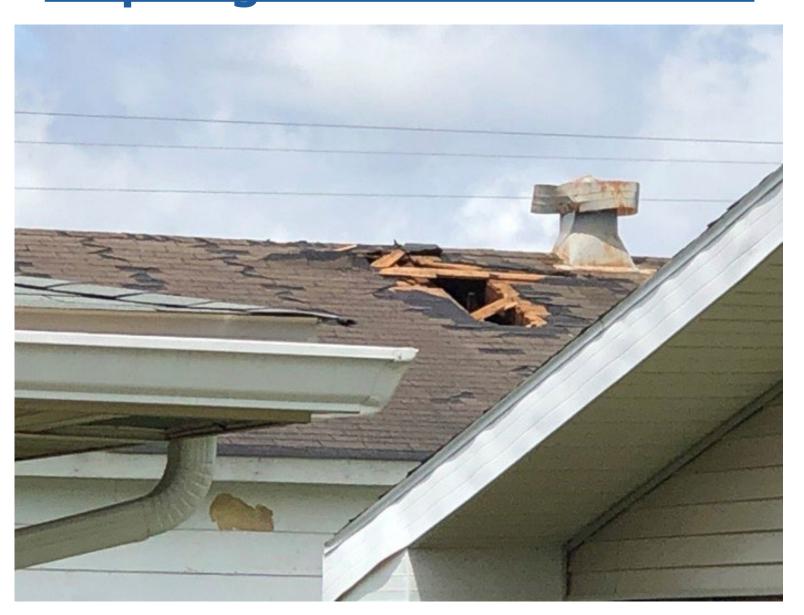

# **Live Steam Railroading**

oes "LSR" really stand for Live Steam Railroading? Or does it stand for Lone Star Region? I think it may be both!

Have you ever experienced operations on a live steam railroad? Let me tell you a little about this aspect of model railroading and, through a series of articles, take you on a tour of some in the railroads in Texas and Oklahoma.

As the name implies, many involved in live steam railroading operate steam locomotives. Some are coal-fired, some oil-fired, and others use natural gas as fuel. Prior to operating, the engineer must take on fuel and water, steam up the locomotive, lubricate moving parts, and check that the pressure relief valves will open and reseat at the appropriate pressure setting.

Of course, not all the motive power is steam. Many people operate gasoline engines with

hydraulic transmissions and others operate battery powered electric locomotives.

Many of us operate in a variety of scales, from Z up to G. However, not everyone knows about the world of "live steam" modeling railroading in 1/8 scale. This equipment is large enough to ride on and provides a very different operating experience as you travel on your train. No more relying on a locomotive cab camera to give you the feel of being an engineer!

At this scale, when simulating operations, it usually takes more than just an engineer to crew a train. A conductor, and is some cases, one or two brakemen will round out the crew. And the best part is, you do not need to own any equipment to come join the fun.

Let's look at some of the information available about this area of model railroading.

One of the most comprehensive resources is the website for the International Brotherhood of Live Steamers (IBLS), which was founded in 1932 by the late Charles Purinton (Carl) in Marblehead, Massachusetts.

IBLS membership is free and provides several benefits:

The IBLS maintains critical standards for the hobby, including wheel standards, track standards, coupler and safety chain standards, and boiler safety information.

- The IBLS continuously records the history of the live steam hobby. The IBLS also harvests live steam related web pages and keeps an archive of defunct websites.
- Hundreds of articles can be found on the IBLS Website. These articles provide standards, definitions, building tips and more from dozens of authors.

Even if you are not a member, the IBLS web site provides information about live steam clubs and tracks. By visiting or joining a club you can learn more about aspects of model railroading unique to this size. As with the IBLS webpage, some of the SWLS web site is accessible to the public, including the timetable that shows the time and general location for the meets. Meets are generally in the Spring (February through May) and Fall (late September to early December) to avoid some of the more extreme weather conditions. SWLS meets are for members and invited guests. If you would like to attend an SWLS meet, please contact the Secretary/Treasurer (secretary@ southwesternlivesteamers.org) and ask for an invitation.

Visiting one of the meets is a great way to see and learn more about this aspect of model railroading. A list of railroads that are used for SWLS meets are listed below. Membership information is also available on the SWLS web site.

One of the SWLS tracks, the Cypress Creek & Southern RR is the home of the Houston Area Live Steamers (HALS) which jointly hosts several annual meets with SWLS. HALS also has public run days when anyone can visit and go for a ride. For schedule information, and any last-minute changes, visit the HALS website at https://www.hals.org.

That will do it for this brief introduction but stay tuned. In the next article, I will cover some of the railroads visited in the spring of 2023. ML

# A Visit to the 2023 **Amherst Railroad Hobby Show**

ince we lived in Boston for more than ten years, I thought I knew everything about the Springfield, Massachusetts (or Big "E") Train Show, and that was mostly because I helped bring NTRAK modules to the show as part of the Northeast NTRAK's Winterfest every year. The place is simply too big to walk around and talk to people - you need to focus on the 350 show booths and about 50 railroads in four buildings with stuff in to see, buy and go run on your club's layout at the show - or so I thought!

at the show hanging out in the City Classics booth in honor of Jim Sacco who passed away in March of 2022. Chris Atkins and I decided that we should not make decisions on where a Podcast crew hangs out for a weekend, but throw in an ice hockey game and the deal is done. So now we've started attending the show again more often. 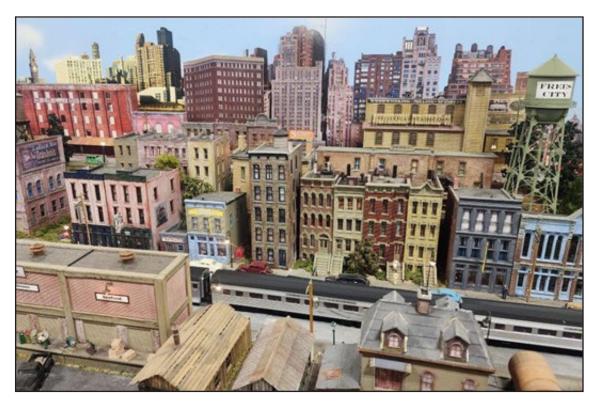

meeting at the show as well, and the department heads are expected to be present! So, most of Friday is spent in meetings and the rest of the weekend we rotate through the NMRA booth to talk to people interested in joining the NMRA and showing that we just like to run trains too.

You can imagine that the time spent to collect business cards is now more than just a race. We want to get to know the manufacturers and everyone else who can make the hobby better for all of us. With so little time (two days is not much for covering half a million square feet) you only get small glimpses of the "waau" things in the show, and the layout to the right caught my eyes.

course, they wanted to put their best foot forward, so they reset the system right before we started and something did not agree, so here is a photo with the typical question, who many engineers does it take?



Six Engineers, you say? No! There is one more on the floor calling out which throttle needs to be reset next!



Trains with up to five or six engines ran by while refrigeration cars had to go back to the main building at the Coca-Cola plant.

The problem was quickly corrected while we were distracted with pizza and then the work started. Amazing when you can operate on a big layout while there are long trains running by in both directions! We spent 90 minutes swapping the cars out at the Coca-Cola plant, and it was fun.

Not sure why a hump yard always grabs my attention, but this one had a feature I have never seen before. When you slow a car down with paint brush bristles, not all cars take the friction the same. An N-scale car, for example, usually derails or just stops. But what if your bristle height can be adjusted depending on the speed of the car? So what they do is select which of the "sets" of four tracks the

car needs to roll down and then which track in the "set", which in turn tells a specific Tortoise machine to bring the bristles up. And when the car uncouples and goes across a sensor, they apply only 6 volts to the Tortoise and then start moving the bristles down. So how does this help? Well, if the car runs fast down the hump, the bristles will still be high when the car hits it and if the car is medium speed, the bristles are lower. If the car is a real drag down the hump, then the bristles are completely gone and the car is not retarded at all. Simply brilliant, can't even beat that with an Arduino!

We also went to <u>operate on</u> Chris Adam's <u>Valley Local layout</u> in Old Saybrook, CT. Shown in the photo below is the beautiful rendition of Old Saybrook getting serviced by PDX-2, Haddam Local

under control of Amanda and Jordan Kramer. (Yes, that is the guy that started the whole <u>NMRA Interchange</u>, I finally tracked him down!)

# **Building a 4x6 Raffle Layout**

Fun, Volunteerism, Learning, and an Electric Fly Swatter by Cliff Scherer

here are lots of "how to build a layout" websites, YouTube videos, articles, and so on out there, but this one is different. It applies to the experienced and inexperienced hobbyist equally, but differently. (And if you're only reading because of the electric fly swatter, then please follow along for a bit!)

We built this layout for the Austin Model Railway Society (AMRS). A major portion of this non-profit club's funding comes from the Austin Train Show, which the club sponsors each year. At the show a small layout, built by club members, is raffled in support of the club. This year's show will be May 6 and 7 at the Palmer Event Center in Austin, Texas. Check it out here: https://austintrainshow.org/.

Those of us who have joined model railroad clubs know the benefits: networking with like-minded people, gaining access to a complete layout where you get to run your own trains or the club's trains, gaining experience helping on the layout, inspiration for your own layout and many other reasons.

The building of the AMRS raffle layout is an example of another reason to get involved in this club. The 2023 layout was built by volunteer AMRS members over the course of several Thursday meetings at one of the team member's homes. The experienced got to show their knowledge and

the less experienced got to learn something hands-on – as in: "Take this TiteBond and this wet water and glue down that talus".

But something even better came together – impromptu clinics where the experienced could see other ways to do it and the less experienced could see lots of ways to do it. One of these pop-up clinics occurred when Jerry Wilson showed us several ways of putting down static grass ground cover. He used small screen sifters, commercial contraptions like the Noch and, yes, he used the battery powered end of an electric fly swatter along with other parts he fashioned together. Tim Giraud also stepped up with sessions on scenery methods and Mike Barrett gave great info on installing Caboose Industries ground throws in tight spaces. Even these experienced modelers benefited from seeing "the other way to do it".

The team got a great deal of satisfaction from completing the 4x6 layout together, having fun along the way, and knowing the end result will ultimately benefit the AMRS.

Enough chatter, let's get to the layout build. This is presented as a photo journal of the build from start to finish roughly in chronological order. Enjoy! ML



#### **Constructing the Layout Base**

The layout base was constructed of ½" plywood for the frame and 1/4" plywood for the layout surface. To stiffen the layout a grid pattern was used and holes pre-drilled for electrical bus lines. The thinner plywood was selected for portability. All fastening was done with a brad nailer and wood glue. Not shown are the "legs" which were 2 plastic sawhorses. These allowed for easy portability and storage. Notches were cut as needed in the cross frames to accept the top edges of the saw horses.

#### Borrowing from the Old to Make the New

Since this layout is intended to be raffled as a fund raiser, cost control was important. This meant using items that the AMRS had on-hand where possible. A recently donated, partially completed layout formed the foundation for this effort. Ultimately, it was decided the donated layout would not work because of size and weight. But there was a complete lake scene on one end that was cut from the donated layout and incorporated into the raffle layout. Here, several of the volunteers are disassembling the donated layout.



#### **Cutting Out a Lake**

Here is the lake scene successfully removed from the donated 3'x8' layout by Jerry Wilson. The scene had structures and details which have been set aside for the removal; these would eventually be re-used on the raffle layout.



#### Nestling the Lake into the Layout

The raffle layout is 4'x6' and the lake scene fits nicely into it. This image shows where it will go. Making the cuts to nestle it into the layout surface was a tedious job and Tim Giraud did it perfectly using an oscillating multi-tool.

#### Mapping Out the Track Plan

The track plan was drawn to scale and then full-size on the layout by Tim Giraud with input from the other volunteers. The curves were drawn by actually placing Atlas Snap track in the appropriate radius directly on the layout surface.





**Installing Roadbed** 

The cork roadbed was put down using Titebond and push pins.



#### **Laying Track**

Next came putting down the track. The layout utilized Code 100 Atlas Snap track and flex track from a stash that the AMRS had on-hand, and Atlas Snap Switches were donated. Here, Tim fits a turnout in place. The track was glued down with Titebond.

> Starting to look like a real layout! All track is in place and the lake scene can be seen embedded into its new home.







#### **Turnout Throw Clinic**

One of the real advantages in volunteering on this project was for the less experienced modelers. Here, we get an impromptu mini-clinic from Mike Barrett on installing turnout throws. Some of these had to be positioned one or more tracks away from the turnout that they controlled. In this image, the wire in Mike's left hand will terminate at a Caboose Industries turnout throw on the edge of the layout. This will allow controlling the turnout without having to reach across multiple tracks.

**Install Turnout Throws** 

A completed turnout throw with the throw-bar (wire) running under the adjacent track. A small block of wood supports the turnout throw to match the height of the cork roadbed.



#### **Solder Track Joints**

All track joints were soldered and two tracks are isolated: the main going through town and the passing siding.



#### **Install Wire Bus and Feeders**

Tim Giraud works on the wiring bus and feeders under the layout. The track bus was 22 AWG solid strand wire, and the track feeders were 26 AWG solid strand. Scotchlok connectors were used. Note the gussets that were installed to stiffen the layout. These were put in place with thickened epoxy. They added about 15 pounds to the layout but made it much more rigid.



#### **Install Lighting Bus for Buildings**

The two red arrows indicate two of the many lighting feeders. These were located by drawing the locations for buildings on the layout surface and then drilling through for the feeders. The lighting bus will be installed to connect each of these feeders to power. The lighting bus is wired with 26 AWG solid strand.



#### **Tunnel Liner Clinic**

Another clinic for the newer modelers covered the construction of the tunnel liner. Tim showed us how to do it using Woodland Scenics molds and plaster of Paris for the castings. He used a foam template to determine how to cut the tunnel sections where they join to create a curving tunnel.



#### **Install Pre-Cast Tunnel**

Tim shows us how to install the completed tunnel liner on the layout, ballasting the track that will be in the tunnel first.

#### **Create Land Forms**

The mountain was constructed using pink insulation foam glued with Titebond Original and held by toothpicks until the glue set. Here, Lisa Cobb has a hand in mountain building.



The completed mountain base. Tim did most of the foam shaping by using a utility razor knife to precut the rough shape for each layer of foam. Since rock molds would be added later, it was not necessary to do further shaping on the foam – quick and easy if you can envision the resulting shapes when cutting.



#### **Installing the Mine Shaft**

The layout uses four distinct scenes to give it interest and the feel that it's larger than it is. The mine scene is one of these. Here, our group of miners are proud of themselves after digging the shaft. You can see it in the side of the mountain on the left with the mine tipple sitting in front of it.

#### **Rock Castings**

The rock castings were custom made by Tim Giraud using molds he created from actual rocks with Woodland Scenics latex rubber and cheesecloth. Tim used plaster of paris to create the castings.

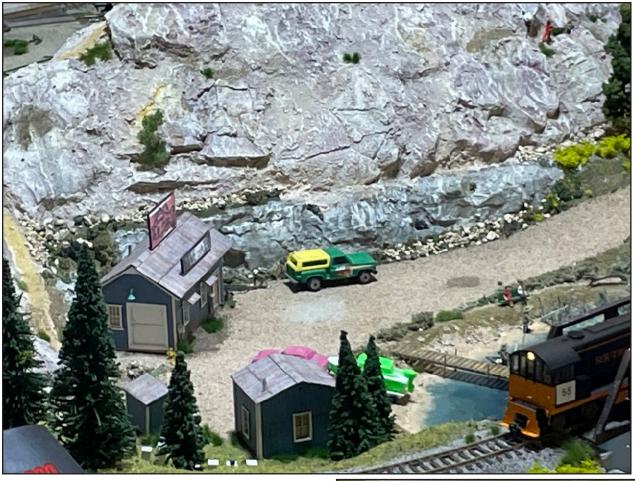


#### Paint and Weather the Mountain

The mountains were painted with a mix of acrylics and water with a drop of dish detergent. This was mixed to a thin wash. The colors were yellow ochre, burnt amber, and burnt sienna. The wash was applied dabbing randomly using a ½" sponge brush. After this dried, the mountains were misted using a spray bottle filled with 1 pint of rubbing alcohol and 3 teaspoons of india ink.



A tan latex paint was used to paint paths on the mountain and areas of the layout top that would receive ground cover.



In this image, the mountain has been painted and weathered. It's nearly impossible to see the integration between the existing lake scene and the newly created mountain.

#### **Selecting Buildings**

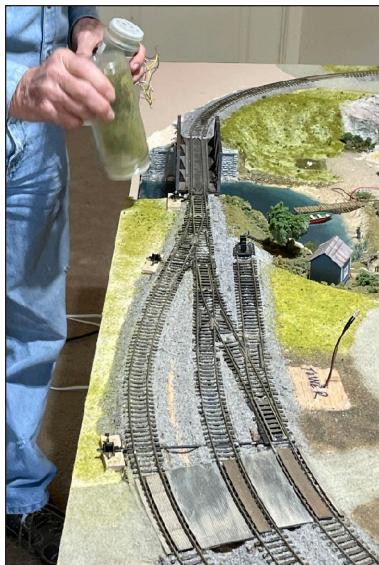
The AMRS had several buildings available to include on the layout and the team had to select among them to fit the available space and the scenes. Some of them were kits needing to be built, others were completed kits. The volunteers took buildings home to make repairs on some and complete those that were in kit form.

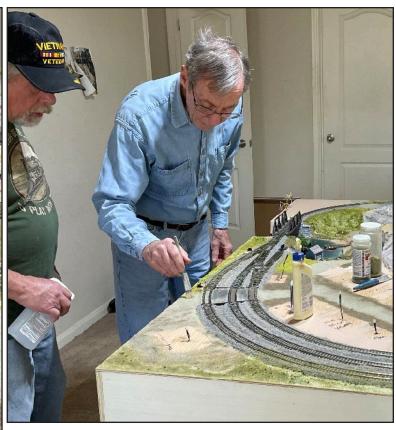




#### **Building Layout**

The buildings were placed on the layout in their correct locations and their outlines marked. This allowed the team to put down ground cover around the buildings and drill holes for building lighting. It also gave a final check of clearances and overall appearance.





#### **Ground Cover and Gravel Roads**

Areas to be covered by ground cover were painted with a tan latex paint, then Titebond was painted onto the areas and ground foam, or static grass was added. The road surfaces were gravel put down by painting on Titebond, sprinkling the gravel (fine scale ballast) and spraying with wet water.

# **Wood Grade** Crossings

Grade crossings were cut from scale scribed wood planking and fixed in place with CA glue. Here Cliff Scherer fits a curved double-track grade crossing.



#### Ballast

Before ballasting, the track ties were weathered with Woodland Scenics paint pens. The ballast was fixed by spraying with wet water and then drizzling Elmer's white glue diluted 1 part glue to 3 parts water.



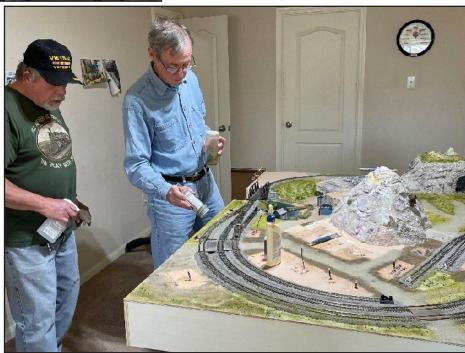


#### **Ground Cover Clinic**

When it came to static grass, Jerry Wilson stepped in with a clinic. He showed the team several ways of adding static grass including a DIY applicator made from the handle of an electric fly swatter and the commercially available NOCH applicator. We also experimented with different combinations of straight and diluted glue.

#### **Putting Down Ground Cover**

Here, George Zapalac and Joe are putting down ground cover. Note the LED's sticking up through holes in the layout where buildings will be placed.





#### **Adding Shrubs**

Tim adds shrubs to the mountain while Joe looks on.



A drone's-eye view of the layout with ground cover installed but still needing trees.



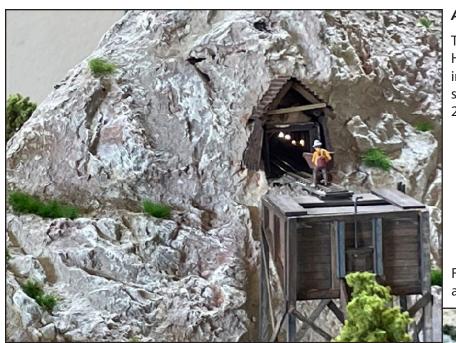
#### **Building Lighting**

Most buildings have LED lighting as shown here with the resort cabin scene.

#### Talus for a Realistic Mountain

Tim places talus (rock rubble) around the base of the mountains simulating fallen rock. The talus was glued in place with diluted Titebond and wet water.





#### **Adding People and Vehicles**

There are people and vehicles all over the layout. Here, the miner and his mine car have been glued in place. Note that the use of a mirror makes mine shaft appear to go deep into the mountain; it's only 2" deep.

Fishermen and a couple of folks on a bench were added to enjoy the lake.



#### **Adding Trees**

Finally, trees were added. The layout surface is plywood so small holes were drilled and trees placed with either Titebond or CA glue depending on what worked best for each tree.

A layout turned out very nice, and you can tell by the smiles that it was fun to build!

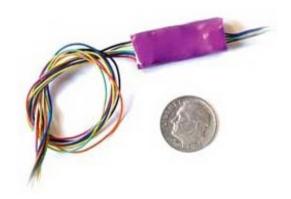

## Introduction to DCC

ello! My name is Tom Pearson, and I volunteered to share some of my accumulated DCC knowledge via the Marker Lamp. I am a long-time model railroader and a 51-year member of the NMRA. I lived in central Texas from 1986 until 2014 and then moved to Benbrook (southwest of Fort Worth). I'm embarrassed to say I haven't completed the paperwork for anything in the Achievement program yet, but that will change soon.

I purchased my first DCC system in the late 1990's because I was building a walk around layout and a using a centralized DC control panel just wasn't going to work. As the saying goes, I wanted to operate trains instead of operating the layout. Over the years, I've helped several modelers convert their layouts to DCC. I also prepared several DCC clinics with the most recent ones covering the basics of DecoderPro. I am not a bits and bytes guy just an experienced user who likes to explain things in ways everyone can understand.

Choosing a DCC system depends on several things, but I believe it is important to try different systems and find a group of local friends/modelers using the same brand. I happen to own Digitrax, but I have worked on layouts with NCE and EasyDCC systems.

Some of the key terms associated with DCC are as follows:

- Command Station a device which converts user input from a throttle into a signal a decoder equipped locomotive interpret and use
- Throttle a user interface device which sends the operator's desired movement, lighting and sound information to the command station.
- Booster a device which provides a fixed voltage to the track with the included DCC information. Boosters are rated based on the amperage they can supply
- **Decoder** a small device installed in a locomotive which is connected between the track and the motor, lights, speaker, etc. It decodes the DCC signal from the track and uses it to operate the functions of the locomotive.
- **Function** one or more visible or audible responses from a decoder (such as the headlight turning on)

The best thing about DCC is that the NMRA used information shared by Lenz to create a standard protocol for the communications between the track and the decoders so that all decoders can run on any DCC system. The communication between the throttles and the command station are proprietary so throttles from vendor A won't work with a command station from vendor B. However, throttles connected via WIFi are bridging that gap.

Regardless of Davy's motives, I'm actually sure that you will be as enthusiastic about the next installment of our annual NMRA national convention, the supercharged, highspeed Texas Express to be held August 20-26th in DFW! There is a great venue, lots of nearby prototype action and tours, and of course tons of clinics, layouts, operating sessions, and general interest tours to inform and to entertain for the entire convention week culminating with the banquet and National Train Show.

To make it as convenient and comfortable as possible, the Texas Express will be held smack dab between Dallas and Fort Worth at the Gaylord Texan Resort and Convention Center in Grapevine, Texas. The Gaylord is located a

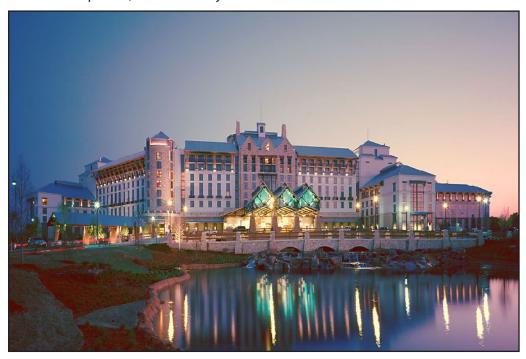
short 6 miles from DFW International Airport on majestic Lake Grapevine and about 5 minutes away from historic downtown Grapevine. The resort itself is a fantastic venue and value.

All of the clinics, the banquet, Celebration of Models, Photos & Crafts, SIGs, Operations Roadshow, tour departures, and National Train Show will be held at the Gaylord Resort, which has many desirable amenities to make your stay comfortable and enjoyable. There are four and a half acres of indoor gardens, luxurious day spa, seasonal waterpark and two pools. You definitely won't go hungry with 10 restaurants and bars including a sports bar and grill with a 52-foot screen; Italian-American cuisine including freshly made pasta, specialty dishes, brick-oven pizzas and homemade charcuterie in a villa-style courtyard setting; fresh Tex-Mex by the indoor river; a surf and turf steakhouse in a wine-cellar atmosphere; and casual guick-grab places for coffee, salads, and sandwiches. While food is always important, that will certainly not be the only satisfying part of your week.

The backbone of this convention is the clinics – there

are dozens and dozens of clinics and counting being scheduled for all scales throughout the week. Every aspect of model railroading is covered: prototype signaling, easy trees, DCC wiring, Arduinos, dead rail, track warrants, model photography, and so much more. The clinicians are notable modelers both local and many coming from out of the LSR region as well as many Master Model Railroaders®.

Speaking of MMRs®, eight Modeling with the Masters® make-and-take clinics are also on tap, so plan to bring your own tools and take a special learning moment home with you. There will also be craft clinics and the traditional Linus Project room for making quilts to donate to children in need of a warm blanket. When you are not in a clinic room making quilts or learning the latest

modeling techniques, there are a host of tours that get you out and about in the railroad towns of Dallas and Fort Worth.

The prototype tours take advantage of the rich and continuing railroad heritage of the DFW Metroplex. From historic station tours of the T&P, ATSF, and Dallas Union stations led by Elliot Wright, a practicing and certified Secretary of the Interior historic architectural preservation specialist who happens to love railroads, too. He will take you on a tour of three historic and very different stations by Trinity Railway Express commuter train to Dallas, Fort Worth, and back to the Gaylord. If prototype trains are your thing, there are several other tours that you will also find fascinating.

For public transit lovers, there is a tour of the McKinney Avenue Transit Authority trolley barn and a private trolley ride. Take a behind-the-scenes peek into their backshop

barn to learn how trollies from all over the world are being restored to active service on a line that runs from the unique McKinney Avenue across the highway to downtown Dallas. Meanwhile up the tracks in Frisco, spend a morning at the Museum of the American Railroad for indoor museum exhibits, G-scale TrainTopia layout, and a varied roster of prototype locomotives. In the yard, you will find UP's No. 4018 Big Boy, ATSF Brill Motorcar, and FM H12-44, BNSF SDFP-45, CN F-7AU, FNdM Alco PA, ex PRR GG1, 4-8-4 Northern, and many more. There's also freight and passenger cars and a relocated depot as well as an interlocking tower.

For more historic railroading, there is the Texas State Railroad one-and-ahalf-hour excursion starting in their backshop, followed by a provided lunch, and then a journey by steam or

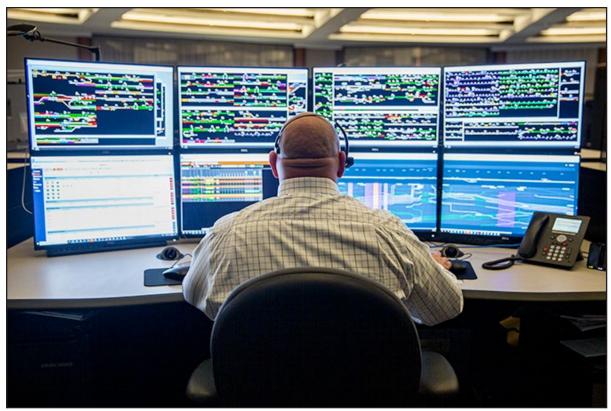
vintage diesel locomotive out of the depot in Rusk through the scenic Piney Woods and 135 years of history. First class cars provide comfort with beverage and snack service and are ADA accessible. More historic railroading is available back close to the Gaylord.

The Grapevine Vintage Railroad departs from a Cotton Belt Route station near the heart of picturesque Main Street for a ride through six different cities ending up at the historic Fort Worth Stockyards and a tour of their rail shops and historic equipment. Explore the Stockyards for shopping and the history of the cattle drives and the cowboys who drove them before returning to the Gaylord. If contemporary prototypes are your thing, we've got a couple of special treats for you.

The first is a railfan experience down to the many industries in train-watching hotbed Saginaw, Texas.



Tour the McKinney Avenue Transit Authority trolley barn

Anchored by the grain elevators, this hassle-free railfanning location offers a chance to see the intersection of three lines of the BNSF and Union Pacific. BNSF's Fort Worth Subdivision (former Santa Fe) from Gainesville to Temple, Texas runs through Saginaw from north to south, and Union Pacific's Duncan Subdivision (the former Rock Island line from Wichita, Kansas) approaches town from the northwest running parallel to the BNSF Wichita Falls Subdivision for several miles south from Hicks Airport. At Saginaw Interlocking, the UP line curves to the south to parallel the BNSF Ft. Worth Sub toward downtown Ft. Worth. In addition to the mainline traffic, there is industry switcher action and work at the UP Saginaw Yard to watch. For a look inside railroading, the highlight tour of the week is the BNSF Headquarters.

How does the BNSF keep its long trains moving across the country 24/7? It all happens at the huge BNSF train dispatching center in the Network Operations Center (NOC) at their Fort Worth headquarters. Originally opened in 1995 and renovated in 2017, the NOC boasts an operating floor the size of a football field and the largest single-span projector ever manufactured with displays of weather and trains on the system. This vast area and cutting-edge technology allow the 100-plus dispatchers and support staff during each of the three shifts to efficiently perform their duties. Also on this tour will be a rare opportunity to see the BNSF collection of Western Art including the desk of the "Empire Builder", Mr. James J. Hill. Lunch will be

provided followed by a driving tour of the nearby BNSF Alliance yard.

The DFW area is also home to many world-class museums. General interest tours will take advantage of the central Grapevine location to offer trips to both Dallas and Fort Worth. For the art lovers, there's the architecturally significant Kimball, Fort Worth Modern, and Sid Richardson art museums plus for all the acclaimed Fort Worth Zoo and a trip to enjoy dinner and an evening at the world famous Billy Bob's Texas Honky Tonk.

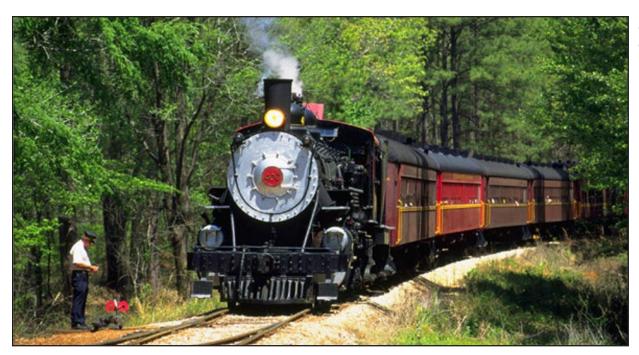
On the other side of the Metroplex are the JFK Sixth Floor

Museum, North Park Mall, a Grapevine Wine Tour, a tour of AT&T Stadium (Dallas Cowboys) and Globe Life Field (Texas Rangers). Rounding out a very full week of Dallas offerings are trips to the George W Bush Presidential Center and the Perot Museum of Science. Mix up your clinic time with a couple of these tours for a complete experience of DFW.

Another highlight of any convention are the layout visits. Both bus and self-guided tours will be offered of some of the finest layouts in the country. The many home layouts of great modelers are grouped by geographic proximity. There are also opportunities to operate on many of these layouts

as well as a Free-moN layout at the convention site with modules from far and wide run by the Operations Roadshow crew. They will present a primer clinic so anyone with or without prior operating experience can enjoy a session right there at the convention.

Remember to also bring your models to the convention's Celebration of Models, Photos, & Crafts room with both contest and non-competitive appreciation displays of excellent modelling from around the country. You can also check out the special interest group (SIG) room and maybe even join one! Be sure to enter your creation in the just-for-the-fun-of-it Mini Diorama contest that is right for all ages and abilities to enjoy.

The busy week wraps up with the National Train Show weekend held at the Gaylord. Attendees of the convention will get priority

## The 1957 National NMRA Convention

his August the Dallas and Fort Worth Divisions will host the NMRA National Convention in Grapevine. It is the first NMRA Convention hosted in D-FW and the third hosted in Texas. But, did you know there was almost an NMRA National held in Dallas in the early 1950's? The Lone Star Region was formed in 1951 and got off to a great start recruiting new members all over Texas. The

enthusiasm was high. Herb Schultz, the then president of the NMRA suggested that Texas would be a great place to have an NMRA convention in the near future. So, the group of modelers in Dallas that had originally pushed the petition to the NMRA to create the region went into high gear and put together a bid to host the NMRA National in 1953 or 1954.

The bid was carried to the National, but the membership



voted to accept the bid from another city and the almost-tobe Dallas NMRA convention faded to history.

But the LSR bounced back and submitted a bid for the 1957 NMRA National to be held in Houston, and that bid was accepted. The non-acceptance of the "other bid" for the earlier convention should not be interpreted as a snub of Dallas as several Dallas modelers were well known around the region and becoming known nationally. Bobby and Buddy Hall owned one of the best known hobby shops in the south and Bill McClanahan was a familiar author in the hobby press and on his way to becoming the scenery expert for model railroading.

In retrospect it is amazing that the LSR, then only a year or two old, would have the fortitude to undertake a national convention. But their second time at bat worked and the LSR found itself hosting the 1957 NMRA National. I will share more detail on that in future articles, but for now, here are some pages from the 1957 Convention Guide. Till next time.

Some things I would like to talk about, as the membership may or may not know there will be no LSR annual Convention for 2023 only the NMRA National Convention in the Dallas / Fort Worth area in the summer of 2023. The next time the LSR will be holding its Annual Convention will be in 2024. So, if you use the LSR convention to have your models judged for your AP Points, please contact your local Division Director to get some assistance in getting your models judged. There are some local train shows coming up at the beginning of the new year that offer NMRA AP judging that can help. Or if a Division Director would like to host an AP Judging event, please contact the LSR AP Chairman for a list of approved LSR Judges for your division who can help. Or contact myself to see if I can help.

Since the next LSR Convention is not until 2024, I am hoping one of the Divisions will step up and host the 2024 convention. Please remember that a Division or Host Group may think that they do not have the manpower to do an convention. But a lot of the jobs can be done remotely by other people around the LSR Family. A host group needs a small local group to find a convention site and/or Hotels for the convention, and find local events or layouts for people to do visit at the convention. Remember it is time to think outside of the box and try something new and fun for a convention and bring the family fun back to an LSR Convention.

#### **Secretary Jeff Palmer**

Since our May 05, 2022 BOD meeting, the LSR Secretary worked with the Nomination Chair, Pete Leach, to get candidates for the 2023 LSR Officers election in March. The first phase of the process is to identify the candidates, and obtain their profile. This phase was closed on December 1, 2022. The second phase was to turn all of the profiles over to the web chair and the building of the election website - https://geekwithtrains.com. The last phase is to report back to the Nomination Chair with the online results to be merged with the snail mail results. This has been done and the results are in – see Nomination Chair Report.

In each of the months since the BOD meeting, the secretary posted the NMRA Roster Reports.

After the NMRA National Convention in St. Louis, we had the unprecedented event of having an LSR Officer elected to a NMRA national office. Shortly after this event, the NMRA contacted the LSR President to discuss how to proceed. At this time, a poll was sent out to each LSR Board Member presenting the issue along with the CPPM page (page 98) which stated the potential conflict of interest between the LSR Region position and the NMRA's position. The poll returned a 14 out of a possible 15 "yes" votes, that is, the NMRA rule should be applied as stated. That Poll was followed by a LSR Motion to Update the LSR By-Laws to add greater clarification for future elected LSR Officers seeking elected NMRA National Offices. This clarification does not apply to appointed positions, as appointed positions do not vote on policy changes that could conflict with Regional functions. The Motion passed 13 votes for the change, 1 vote against the change, and 1 abstaining vote.

Currently the secretary is trying to pull together the various reports from the other LSR Officers and Chairs in preparation of the Mid-Year 2023 BOD meeting. The cooperation of the officers and chairs is greatly appreciated.

Looking forward to the 2023 NMRA National Convention in Grapevine, TX.

As covered in the Web chair Report, the LSR Website continues to be stable. I would also like to thank Chris Atkins for allowing the LSR to use the https:// geekwithtrains.com website to hold our elections.

One last note, please remember in your reporting that education is our prime directive and to hi-lite it where possible in your reporting.

#### Treasurer Gert "Speed" Muller

Still solvent, no money lost! We applied for a credit card to ease the paying for recurring costs like the website hosting and security services. This will reduce the delays waiting for refund checks in the mail.

We are looking into putting some of the money in the bank account into something interest bearing like a 12 month CD. Make sure all your purchases are making use of the 501(c)(3) sales tax exemption. We still have money in the Delattre Fund for new members who are and were serving in our defense forces.

#### **Director and Department Reports**

#### **Old Business**

**Donna Orr** opened old business welcoming everyone to the meeting, and re-introduced the tabled topic about LSR Conventions; more specifically, about the membership meeting. The issue is, the LSR Constitution requires a membership meeting once a year as does our 501(c)(3) status with the IRS. Normally, the membership meeting is held as part of the LSR Convention for that year. In recent years, there were two conventions held in the same fiscal year (May 1 to April 30) and none in the next. This year, the LSR suspended the annual convention to support the NMRA National Convention. The discussion covered these two different variations and concluded that a Zoom meeting could be used by inviting the LSR membership to a meeting discussing the state of the LSR; i.e. LSR BOD meeting.

#### **New Business**

**Donna Orr** turned her attention to how each LSR Division is defined. The issue prompting the discussion has to do with LSR members attending meeting in an LSR Division other than where they are assigned by the NMRA. Just about every division could identify members who were attending divisional meeting who live in another division. While each member of the LSR can attend any meeting anywhere in the region, many members want to be able to designate which LSR Division that want to be affiliated. This discussion was lengthy and often heated. The facts is, each member's membership record carries the LSR Division they are assigned too. There are members who want to be associated with a different division, usually the one they attend. Currently, the NMRA assigns Division via zip code. There isn't an issue with the initial assignment, but if the member wants to change their division affiliation to the one they attend, currently there is no method to so. Unlike email address, physical address or other membership information, the division information cannot be changed. In an effort to get better clarification on the issue, Gert Muller has been assigned the task of taking the problem back to the NMRA for better clarification or resolution.

**Donna Orr** turned our attention to LSR Officer term limits. Currently, only the LSR President has a term limit. In todays climate, it is difficult to get people to step up to service the LSR community as an officer or chairperson. This discussion was quickly shut down.

**Donna** introduced **John Lowrance**, **Bob Barnett**, **Chuck Lind**, and **Peter Kazmir** (absent), and their project to create a virtual LSR Museum. The concept is to identify the history of the LSR and those who contributed to its history. Names like **Jim Packer**, **Gil and Gus Freitag**, **Virginia Freitag**, **Eunice Linda**, **Bobbye Hall**, **Cliff Robinson**, **Bill McClanahan**, and many others will all have "rooms" in the museum, telling their story and what they did for the LSR.

**Donna** introduced **Chuck Lind**, the Youth Award Chair. Chuck informed us that he did not have any youth to give an award to. He admonished each of us to do a better job of identifying the youth in each of our divisions and bring them forward to the BOD for the Youth Award. **Bob Thiele** identified a youth he had in his division and would submit his name and information. It remains that each division needs to do a better job in this area.

**Donna** motioned for the conclusion of the BOD meeting. 2nd by **Don Winn**. No discussion. Motion passed and the meeting concluded at 4:34 PM,

As previously reported, the LSR bylaws require a very detailed report to both the LSR Board and to the NMRA National Education Department. When I contacted Michael Hohn, MMR (educate@nmra.org), the National NMRA Education chairman, for reporting instructions I was told not to send any actual reports and that he got his information via the RAC directors. As a result I removed the requirement to list each individual clinic presentation and to list the name of the presenter because that information is already public record published in LSR Convention timetables and other show publicity and could be retrieved in the event of an audit by the IRS of our educational activities. Hopefully the shortened version will be faster to complete and encourage better participation. Waiting until the directors turn in their reports requires waiting until the last moment and there is no standardization of the data which increases the difficulty or preparing the Education Chairman's report. Thus at the next review of the bylaws we might consider removing the "numbers" from the education report or requiring the directors to submit the numbers so there is standardization for the Education chairman to compile a combined report.

Recently, The LSR President reported that she has located some software that might allow us to resurrect the "Virtual Museum" concept for LSR historical information rather than a virtual museum of Model railroad equipment.

LSR membership for the year 2022 increased from 888 to 909 for a gain of 21 members due largely to the recruitment of 50 new members.

We are still doing an excellent job of recruiting new members, but if we are going to survive as a Region, we need to plug the leak of members not renewing their memberships.

To reduce membership losses each Division should conduct monthly meetings for members who reside in their divisional area and are within a driving distance of the meeting place.

- 1. If possible, conduct Zoom meetings so that members who live at distances which makes diving inaccessible able to attend the meeting.
- 2. Contact members to determine what they would like on the agenda and provide it.
- 3. If members routinely miss meetings, Give them a call.
- 4. Make sure you have a designated member attempt to contact members on the 30-day delinquency list by email, text and telephone call. You may hear things you would rather not hear, but you cannot fix a problem unless you know why members chose not to renew. Region sends a written letter to members on the 60-day list.
- 5. Don't assume new members will show up at the meeting. Call them and advise them that you will have a member there to meet them at the door and discuss their reasons for joining the NMRA.
- 6. Assign a mentor, for at least 90 days to assist them in becoming a better model railroader. That would be a great assignment for MMRs.

I'd like to start by thanking Donna and Riley for this opportunity, and by apologizing for how long it took to get my first issue of the Marker Lamp completed. Because of the delay there will be an accelerated schedule for the next few issues (every two months, instead of every three). However, now that I have the process down, all the templates set up properly, and so on, I'm confident I will remain on schedule going forward.

The next issue is planned to be published in mid-February (that will be the "Winter 2022" issue on the old schedule). That will be followed by an issue in April and June, at which point the ML will be back on schedule. (That means that we'll have five issues published during the 2023 calendar year to make up for having only three in 2022.)

Speaking of the schedule, in trying to better synchronize the ML with our fiscal calendar, BOD meetings, conventions and other dates of interest, the ML schedule has changed going forward. The new schedule will be Spring published in March, Summer published in June, Fall published in September, and WInter published in December. The submission deadlines are the end of the month prior (i.e. Spring will be the end of February).

I am also going to be working with Speed on some updates to the Ad policy for the upcoming new year. I'd like to put into writing the informal policy for free ads/content for LSR divisions and 100% NMRA clubs and I'd like to update the price list for paid ads to include additional ad types and sizes beyond the eighth-page pike ads and half-page business ads.

There will be some other changes coming to the ML as well. Beyond an upcoming update to the look and feel, I am working on some regular articles that will touch on topics including DCC, a Historian's Corner, Getting Started with MRR, and more. I also hope to include more layout photography, articles on prototypes we can model, and more. But it all depends on folks across the LSR contributing to a Marker Lamp we will all look forward to via content and feedback.

I am also working with the national NMRA organization to investigate the possibility of publishing the Marker Lamp digitally via the Zinio app/website (alongside the NMRA

Magazine). This would be at no cost to the LSR and would not replace the current methods of publication (email to our list and publication on our web site via archive.org). I will share more news about that as I learn more.

Finally, I've also been working behind the scenes to make publishing the Marker Lamp go a little more smoothly. We now have a shared Google Drive for the LSR, on which I've moved all of the files needed to publish the ML along with some saved files from previous issues. Moving these files to a shared drive makes it easier to share and receive files for the ML and also ensures that if something happens to my computer those files won't be lost. I'll work with Donna and others to make that Drive available to others in the LSR as she sees appropriate.

Thanks for everyone's patience as I got spun up. Here's to the future!

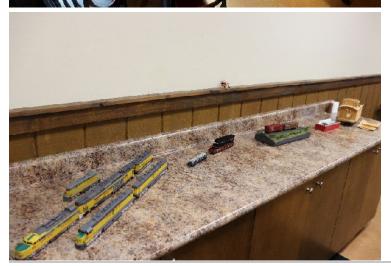

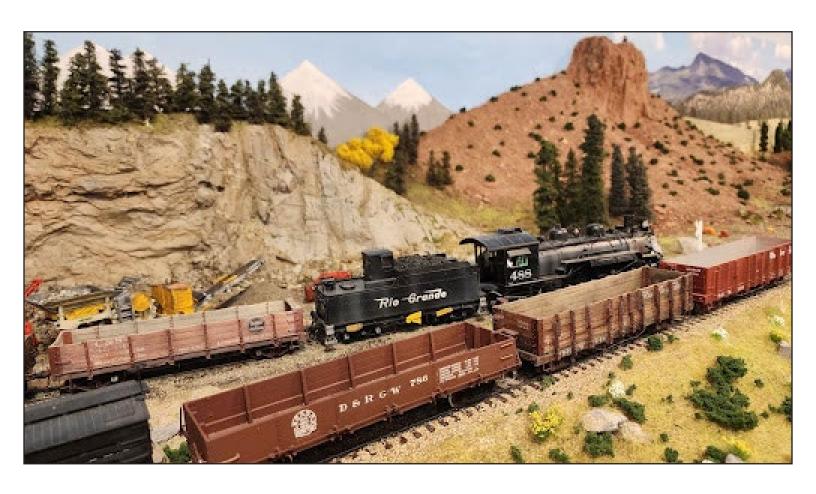


The Waterfront Scene in Wiscasset, Maine constructed using drawings from the late Peter Barney

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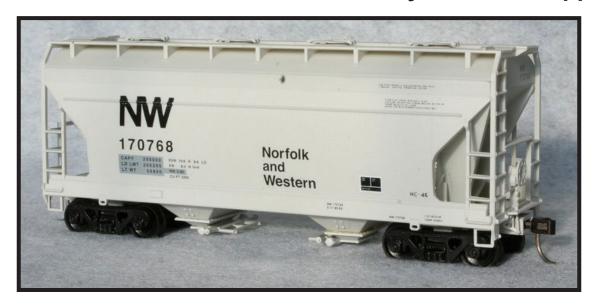

Norfolk and Western HC-46 ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper



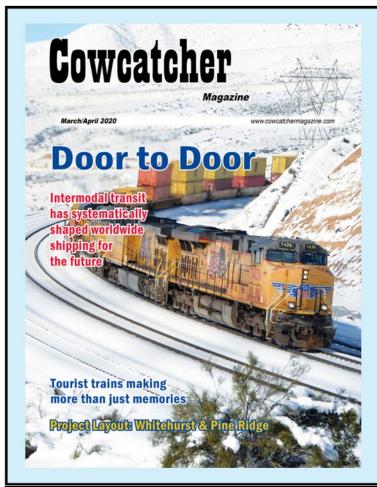
Using Accurail's 2200 Series ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper as the basis, we are offering it in a Norfolk & Western repaint scheme. These cars are N&W class HC-46 and are from an original batch of fifty built by in 1966 by ACF with the Round Herald paint scheme. Subsequently some cars went through a general maintenance program and were repainted in the block N&W livery. Photos were found showing at least three of these cars (road numbers 170753, 170768 and 170794) were reweighed at some later date because that area is "patched out" on the car with the new data displayed. Those same photos place these three cars as being in service in 1992 and 2004. It is these three, highly unique, road numbers that Cincinnati Division 7 is now offering for sale as limited edition kits.

Pricing is \$25 per car, or a 3-car set at \$70. Shipping (via USPS Priority) is \$9.45 for one car and \$17.10 for two to three cars. 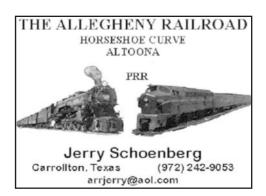
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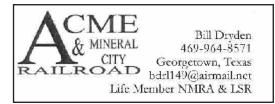
