## English Department

Ta accomplish its gaals for the Sharon students, the English Department uses a carefully develaped sequential curriculum. In terms of literary creation, emphasis is placed in the first years on the form of expression, then in the junior and seniar years, on the use of this form as a vehicle far expression of idea. Weekly themes and the senior thematic reading units implement these objectives. In literary reception, as a basis for creation, the curriculum praceeds on four yearly units: general literature, American literature, English literature, and a senior four part study af drama, poetry, the short stary and the essay.


To develop this curriculum the English Department emplays many distinctive methods. The Sharon Plan group lectures ta Freshmen, the Professor Peterson films, the televisian humanities series, group attendance of local appearances of famous poets, all serve to enrich and supplement the English program. This year has seen the first use af the overhead projector as a significant teaching device, and the intraduction of a different appraach ta English grammar-"transformational grammar," which studies the living language scientifically on the basis of the classification of sentences according to ten fundamental types.

## LATIN

Enrolment in Latin has increased in recent years proportionately even more rapidly than the school enrolment. This year there are five classes in Latin I, four in Latin II, and the largest class in Latin III-IV in the history of the school.

No longer do assignments consist merely of routine grammar, vacabulary drill, and translation but readings in related fields, projects of various types, and individual reports are suggested and required. Latin is one of the great languages of the world, possessing an important literature, and the reading program is planned to give an acquaintance with authors other than Caesar, Cicero, and Vergil. The influence of Roman civilization upon modern life is constantly stressed, especially in the areas of government and language.

Miss Chase and Mr. Foley share the responsibility for keeping Latin a vital, absorbing subject.

## MATH DEPARTMENT

The Sharon High School Mathematics Department teaches the best of traditional and modern mathematical concepts in order, generally, to enrich the background of the student and, in the case of the college preparatory student, to prepare him for future courses on a post high school level. The program is constructed with many sources from the field of mathematical education as bases. The courses range from Business Mathematics through Elementary and Advanced Algebra, to Calculus and Analytical Geometry - a fifth course in the college preparatory program offered for the first time this year.

It can certainly be said that Sharon provides a more than adequate mathematics program which allows both the terminating and preparatory student every opportunity to develop his capacity and interest to the utmost.

## SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The Science Deportment of Sharon High School offers o diversified progrom designed to meet the varied interests of oll the students.

The physical sciences include Science I ond II, o two-yeor unified college-preporotory physics and chemistry course, Chemistry, Physical Science, and General Science.

Those interested in the notural sciences have o choice of Biology, Generol Biology, and General Physiology ond Hygiene.

For those who wont odvonced studies, the department offers Science III, on odvanced physics course, offered for the first time this year, and Advanced Biology, o course only two yeors old.

It is hoped that the focts ond concepts learned in eoch ond every science progrom will leod the participant to some understonding of the "what's" "how's" ond "why's" of our universe. Beyond this, it is hoped thot he will goin the initiotive to inquire more deeply into whot he does know ond beyond to that which he does not yet know, either along the lines of the program he has been pursuing or in some adjocent field of science.

The purpose of the entire science curriculum, then, is to give the student a greoter oppreciotion and understanding of himself ond of the physical world around him.

## PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The Girls' and Boys' Physical Education programs offer active participation and instruction in a well-rounded program of physical development and recreational activities. Emphasis is placed on physical fitness, fundamentals and rules of sports, teamwork, proper attitudes, and respect for others. The class program, then, includes: the development of skills; a physical fitness program; individual development.

The program aims to develop an interest in activities which will provide leisure time pursuits for girls and boys now, as well as after graduation from high school. It also aims to provide the less highly-skilled performer with the opportunity to experience some of the satisfactions which too frequently are known only to those who participate in interscholastic sports.

Intramural sports constitute an extension of the physical education program and opportunity is provided for voluntary participation in individual and team activities.
