PREFACE

While writing the Revision of the Tinkey Book of 1922 and searching the Leedy Record for data, came in contact with members of the Martin Family that are connected with the Leedy and Tinkey Families. Several of these Families requested or suggested a record of the Martin Family. First started the record by writing a condensed copy of the Isaac Leedy Family that Alva Leedy of Fredericktown had written, showing a large Family and that His Daughter Elizabeth had Married Clay Dean Martin who had four Daughters and a Foster Son.

Having knowledge that my Mother Margaret Martin had a Sister Elizabeth that married Simon B. Leedy and had six sons, all of whom moved to Missouri while the writer was a young lad, gave me encouragement to write the Martin Genealogy. Seeing that considerable of the type used in the Tinkey Family could be used in the Martin Family gave me further incentive to print what Data could be secured and with some little changes from Alva Leedy's method by not giving the dates of Marriages, nor the Months and days of Births and Deaths, neither the ages of the deceased, my method could be used and be made uniform throughout the Genealogy.

Printing enough of the Progenitors even though they are not of the blood for you to see the line of ancestry and not going beyond the blood kin of the Martin Family and using the same plan as the Tinkey Family by stopping with the naming of the step children and not following them further unless they are of the blood relationship. A Cousin is a Cousin still even if they are of the second to ninth generation as shown in this work. There is no such person as a 42nd Cousin to me, at least I never saw one.

The Martin Family compiled in the year 1944 in perpetuation of the facts of our History, Descent and Kinship. Knowing that the Tinkey, Leedy and Martin Families ties are closely allied I dedicate this work for the posterity of all the Families and hoping many will receive copies of this work and read every word and keep it for future reference. What is remembered, dies. What is written, lives.

INTRODUCTORY

The Tinkey Family History that was compiled from many sources and printed in 1922 was not a complete work for the reason the necessary data could not be secured on account of the families being scattered over many parts of Ohio, Indiana, Pennsylvania and elsewhere. As was stated then, the work would be continued in the gathering of the data and at some future time it would be revised. We made progress with the work and in 1940 decided to print a supplement to the book of 1922. Sixty questionnaires were distributed to the heads of families with instructions to answer the questions and mail it to N. E. Tinkey of Mt. Vernon, Ohio, as he was and still is the recording secretary to keep a record of all births, marriages and deaths, etc.

Since 1940 special effort has been made to get the necessary information needed to complete the work of revising the genealogy of the Tinkey Family and to this date, July 1944, only 30 of the questionnaires have been received. This matter having been placed before the reunions of the Tinkey Families at Mansfield, Ohio, and at Jones Mills, Pennsylvania, where it was unanimously approved and many agreed to cooperate in the completion of the revision and the writer having agreed with the cooperation asked for to pay all expenses that the sale of what few 1922 books would not meet. Many trips have been made by automobile within the last four years to secure the data direct from the relatives at their homes, but with gas, tire and other restrictions on account of the World War No. II it became impossible to continue farther along this plan. Decided to proceed with the printing of what has been gathered at this time and leave the further revision to some more talented person and be satisfied to do this much for the posterity of the Tinkey Family during my lifetime as my years are fast passing away.

Have ordered 300 copies of this revision and there are still about 30 copies of the 1922 book to be sold of the 220 that were printed and it is recommended that a small charge of 50 cents be made for this revision and the book with the revision be sold for \$2.00 to help pay the expenses of printing and mailing. Orders sent to N. E. Tinkey, 503 E. Ohio Ave., Mt. Vernon, Ohio, will receive prompt attention. They will make a nice Christmas present to your family.

Have included in this revision a report of all births, marriages and deaths that have been sent to the recording secretary, no doubt there are many more that should have been reported. Would that a report of all our kinsfolk that are serving in the War for the preserving of our country could have been listed, but do not have the data, but the best we can do is to Pray Daily for them and all others for a victory if it be GOD'S will and a lasting peace so that we will have a glorious country in which to live.

You will note that this Genealogy is of the children of Frederick and Mary M. Tinkey of the 17th century. Frederick Tinkey's father was George Tinkey and his grandfather was Thomas Tinkey. Frederick Tinkey's children, John, George and Mary were listed quite well in the book of 1922 and this revision includes Jacob, Noah, Elizabeth and Susan but not complete and it is to be hoped that a more complete list can be made in the future. George and Mary lived near Bellville, Ohio, John near Ashland, Ohio, Jacob near Jones Mills, Pa., in the Laurel Mountains, Noah near Warsaw, Ind., and Elizabeth and Susan in Missouri and can not be located at this time.

FOREWORD

The Tinkey Family should have the book of 1922 and this supplement distributed among the membership until the supply is exhausted, in order to fortify yourselves with the necessary knowledge to help you with your daily problems of life and to keep informed of your kinship and know how to answer questions, should some of your family be unfortunate and enter a hospital or meet up with the undertaker, or be asked to prove your birth and parenthood in applying for insurance, annuity or a pension as many are doing these days.

Many are paying more than the price of this Genealogy, which will answer most of the questions asked, some are paying excessive prices to prove their birth to persons that are preying upon the ignorance of the people. A few of the ways to prove your birth that is satisfactory to the authorities are as follows: Certificate of Birth, Affidavit from Doctor or Midwife, Affidavit from Parents, Relatives or some older person than yourself, Public School Record or Teachers of Schools or Sunday Schools, Record of insurance company when young, Family Bible Record, Family Genealogy Record, Vaccination, Hospitalization or Operation Record, or Record of Baptismal or Church Membership, and old Marriage certificate or photographs.

Secure this Family Record while the supply lasts and write down each and every event coming to your knowledge in the space provided just as I have done since the book was first published in 1922. I could tell you the name and date of every birth, marriage or death since July 1922 to July 1944 coming to my attention and even the place of residence, but of course they have not all been reported to me but all should be reported to my brother, N. E. Tinkey, Mt. Vernon, Ohio, the recording secretary. It will take too much time, space and expense to place it all in this revision, however will give you the figures; births 77, marriages 87 and deaths 113. You will note we are losing membership.

You can secure a lot of valuable information by studying the list carefully and know where you fit into the Genealogy by following the "Legend" as follows: BOLD FACE TYPE denotes Heads of Families or Marriages and "small type" denote the children if any. Starting with the 4th generation denoted by one "Asterisk" before the name, therefore three should be added to the number of asterisks before your name to inform you of the number of your generation, VIZ, should you have three asterisks before your name, it denotes you are of the 6th generation. The first figures given following your name denotes your year of BIRTH and the second is the year of DEATH when given like sample, 1860- or 1860-1938. Then you can easily figure the age of the person, which in this case would be 78. The Marriage is first recorded, then all the children from the eldest to the youngest by their given names, then the eldest to the youngest with their entire family is recorded in the order of their ages when known, for example see my father, JAMES TINKEY being the youngest child of GEORGE and ELIZABETH TINKEY, comes last on the list. Some families did not send the dates of birth and death and could not be correctly listed and the only thing now to do is to write in the dates or names when received until such time as it can again be revised. You will note there are several names alike, such as JOHN, GEORGE, ANNA, ETC. and without the correct data could not be placed so as to be understood, but where the asterisks and dates are provided you can readily place them where they belong. Also the.....denotes the end of that branch of the family.

HISTORY OF THE MARTIN FAMILY

Starting with JOHN MARTIN 1804-1867 of the fourth Generation, we have learned that His Grandparents came to the United States from Scotland in about 1790 with their several children, and some located in Pennsylvania on the eastern slope of the Allegheny Mountains; two locating near Wooster, Ohio and the rest around Hollowell and Columbus, Kansas and we have been unable to trace any of them definitely at this writing but still hope to receive more information before this work is completed. We have learned that John Martin, the progenitor of this Genealogy, was born in Kansas, was married and had three children as recorded in this work. but we are unable to learn his first wife's name.

John Martin returned to Ohio in about 1830 and married Charity () Martin, to whom Five Children were born, (See Record). The writer has heard the maiden name of our Grandmother but can not recall it, however she was born and raised near Wooster, Ohio, of Scotch Parentage and both of them being Scotch, naturally they lived a typical Scotch life. Their home was in Butler, Ohio for many years and both are buried in the Butler cemetery. Grandfather passed away three years before the writer was born but having made my home from 1889 to 1891 with Grandmother, Aunt Jane and Clair Dysert I can truthfully say that there was never a better soul that ever lived than Grandmother Charity Martin, always the same jovial spirit no matter what happened and she loved everybody and had many friends, she was happy and contented to the very last day of her life and the same can be said of Aunt Jane.

The old home of about two acres is still in the possession of Claire Dysert Martin but the old house has been torn down and the old spring is still there but not used like it was in the old days where many a bucket of water was carried over the village of Butler as it was specially good water. The Martin Family is nearly extinct, there being only two left, Claire Dysert and William, but not sure about William and are leaving no Sons. It requires the men folks to raise Sons in order to keep up the Family name The Leedy and Tinkey Families are doing a little better to keep up their family names but that does not help the Martin name.

The Tinkey-Leedy Families are very much inclined to be religious, more so than some of the Martin Families, especially with the men folks, some people try to carry their religion in their wives name as the old saying goes, but let us hope and pray that they will be found in the glory world. Another matter of interest discovered by the writer is the comparison of the average span of life of these various families to the Bible which says that Three Score and Ten is the time of mans life, when you do this it will be found from 40 to 70 with the Martin family with the 70. After all it is not so important how long you live but how well you live and be prepared to go when the LORD calls you, to live in the mansions that JESUS has gone to prepare, for all that are found worthy.

The Tinkey's and Martin's of the John and Charity Martin Family and including the Clay Dean Martin Family of John Martin's first Marriage have kept in the knowledge of each others whereabouts for many years, many have visited in each others homes very often around Butler, Bellville, Ankenytown, Lucerne, Fredericktown, Newark and Columbus, Ohio, with the exception of Doc Martin of the first marriage of Hollowell, Kansas, who the writer remembers seeing and more especially the Simon B. and Elizabeth (Martin) Leedy Family, who the writer faintly remembers with the exception of Alpha who visited at our home south of Bellville in the winter of about 1885. Annt Lib, as we called her and her Husband, Simon B. Leedy and family moved from their home near Ankenytown, Ohio, to Montevallo, Missouri, in about 1880 and we lost track of them after Alpha's visit in 1885.

Special effort has been made at various times by the writer and others to contact the Family but to no avail until 1944 when desiring the Genealogy of Aunt Lib's Family to complete the record, the thought came to write the Postmasters of Wise and Montevallo, Missouri, and to Jacksonville, Illinois, where the Leedy Chronicle that was printed at Ashland, Ohio, stated the Leedy family might be located. This effort succeeded in making contact with Mrs. A. G. Leedy of Jacksonville, Illinois, Ira C. Leedy of Boise City, Oklahoma, L. G. Leedy of Eldorado Springs, Missouri and others. Mrs. A. G. Leedy sent her letter to Aquilla Franklin Leedy, the eldest son of Ira C. Leedy, who lives in Cincinnati, Ohio, and by special appointment he came to my home in Mt. Vernon, Ohio, on September 16, 1944 and we met for the first time and it seemed like in our two days visit together that we lived over again more than 40 years of our lives and that we had found lost relatives.

We made a pilgrimage to the old Leedy Homestead near Ankenytown where Aunt Lib and family had left 64 years ago and then to the old Church and Cemetery where the old progenitors of the Leedy family rest, Abraham, Samuel, Daniel, Isaac, Aaron A., Aaron B., and many others; also Clay Dean Martin and wife Elizabeth (Leedy) Martin have been lain to rest not so many years ago. Then on Sunday, September 17, 1944 with our new Cousin A. F. Leedy of Cincinnati, Ohio, as our honored guest and whom none had ever seen before nor even knew about met at my home for a days visit with my Brothers and Sisters with their families who had been invited to come and we would break bread together and all came except Brother Elmer, Sister Otta and Husband and there were 18 in the party. Mrs. Minerva Martin of Fredericktown, Clay Dean Martin's second wife met with us and it cheered our hearts to meet all the kinship and all present were happy in the thought that we had found new friends. We expect to meet again. The writer hopes this will be the means of a continued contact and friendship of the Martin, Leedy and Tinkey Families. This is as it should be, for we only pass through this life once and we are higher than the animals and a little lower than the angels, we should profit by their example of the way to live. Animals cling to their kind and angels appear as messengers of God. Revealed to us as beings, such as man might be and will be when the power of sin and death is removed, partaking in their measure of the attributes of God, truth, purity and love, because always beholding his face, and therefore being made like Him We can have the visit with the angels if we so will it. Just as we should have a visit with our relatives and quite often for it will do us good. The latch string always hangs out on my door and the angels, relatives and friends are welcome to enter at any time.

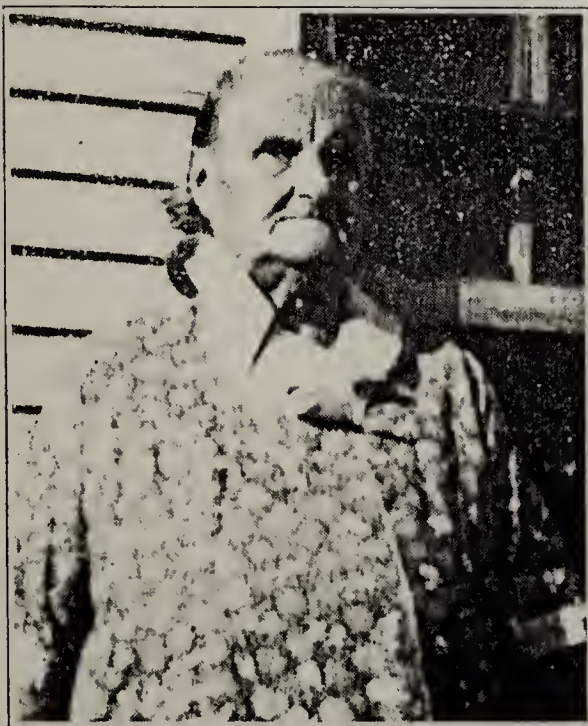

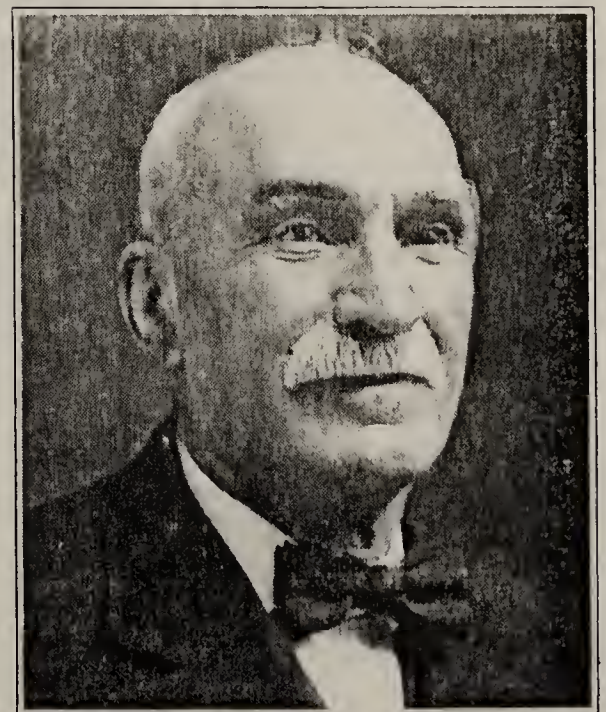

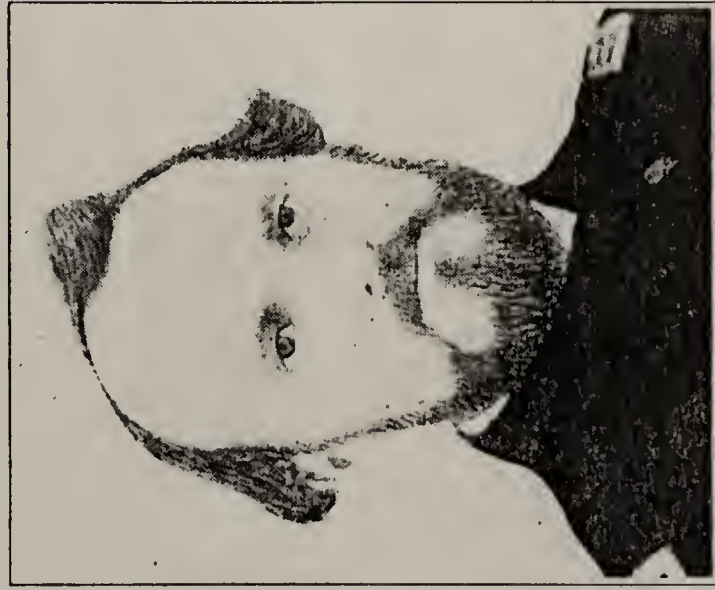

REPORT OF AN INTERESTING LETTER

In 1851 Adam and Elizabeth Harter wrote a letter from Grindstone Point, Dekalb County, Missouri, to Mrs. Harter's father, Frederick Tinkey, a pioneer resident of two miles east of Bellville, O., telling of their six children, naming each of them. Special effort has been made for several years to make contact with the Harter and Snyder families, with but little being accomplished.

The writer has read this most interesting letter which is now in the possession of Mr. Bernard Tinkey of Ashland, Ohio, but not having the letter before me I am telling some of its contents from a newspaper clipping that is in my possession and that is the way I listed the names of the children of Adam and Elizabeth Harter. The letter consists of a single sheet, folded and sealed with wax, there were no envelopes in those days and the recipient (Frederick Tinkey) was required to pay the postage of 12½ cents or more depending upon the distance traveled.

The Harters lived southwest of Perrysville, Ohio, before going west and the letter urged Father Tinkey to come to Missouri and make a big speculation by entering land before it was all taken. Said work cattle was 40 to 50 dollars, cows 10 dollars, pork \$3.00 per hundred, corn 75, potatoes 50, oats 25 cents a bushel. He built a Horse Mill on his 160 acres and that he paid \$600.00 for it and holds it now for \$10.00 an acre.

There is quite a difference between nearly 100 years ago and 1944, then in the horse and buggy days with a terrific speed of 10 miles per hour and a \$200,000,000 dollar National debt and a man worked from sun up to sun set for \$1.00 per day compared with now a speed of 90 miles per hour by Automobile but restricted to 35 by orders of the war board to conserve gas and tires or 200 miles per hour by airplane and a \$200,000,000,000 dollar National debt with wages at 8 to 15 dollars per day of 8 hours with time and one-half for overtime and double pay for Sunday and holidays. Work cattle or (oxen) are not quoted on the market as there are only a very few in existence. Cows \$80, pork today \$12 per hundred, corn \$1.20, wheat \$1.58, potatoes \$3.00 per cwt., oats 75, rye \$1.09, barley \$1.00, eggs 35 to 45 and butter 47 cents per pound. Then there was no war but now nearly the whole world is at war against the Axis which consists mostly of Germany, Italy, Japan pitted against Russia, Britain, China and the United States and the smaller countries. At first Germany took a lot of territory from Russia, France, Poland, etc, and Japan took a lot from Britain and the United States but as the matter stands at this writing the most of it has been won back with Italy out of the war. Rome has fallen and the Germans are being driven out of Italy, they are now about 90 miles north of Rome which was saved from bombardment and ruin. Russia is coming through Poland with a vast army and now close to Warsaw. Britain and the United States have crossed the channel with a huge army and are now firmly established on French soil and on their way to Berlin. Germany is being bombed night and day with thousands of bombs dropped from bombing planes causing much destruction and Germany is sending robot planes over London causing considerable damage but they are being destroyed by secret processes and the prediction is, that the war will end this fall with Germany and Japan losing the war. Then it will be an enormous plan to secure a lasting peace. Many people believe that this may be the war of Armageddon, if that is true, then it will end all wars, but if not true, then we may look for another war in 20 years. Let us hope and pray that there will be no more WAR. The most sad part of it is our ancestry was traced to Essen Germany which means the Tinkey's are compelled to fight their own relation.

Going back again to our Great-Great-Grandfather Frederick Tinkey, it does not appear from any record in our possession that he took the advice of the Harters, to go to Missouri and take up land and we judge that he was one of the Tinkeys that used his own mind and judgment in deciding such matters and that he believed in the motto "that a rolling stone does not gather any moss," or that, "better leave well enough alone" and stayed upon his farm along the Clearfork river. His farm join-

ed my father's farm to the east where all of us children were born and the old cemetery lay between the two farms. (See record) and picture in book.

Since writing the above there has been two political conventions held in Chicago. The Republicans nominating for president Thomas L. Dewey, governor of New York and for vice-president, our own governor of Ohio, John W. Bricker. The Democrats nominated for his fourth term of four years each for our president, Franklin D. Roosevelt. A precedent that has never been done in the history of our country, two terms previously being the limit. Now there will be a contest till election day in November. Senator Truman of Missouri has been nominated for Vice President. Whether by the old tried and experienced men or the new inexperienced men at the helm. Germany is having internal trouble with the fuhrer Adolph Hitler, threatened with assassination and ready to flee the country by airplane after killing some of his military officer enemies and leaving the country in revolt. Tojo of Japan has been removed from office and General McArthur is fast approaching Japan with his huge navy, General Eisenhower is making Germany retreat from France and Stalin from Russia and Poland. I am joining in the prediction that the main fighting will end before another Christmas.

A very interesting letter, written by Elizabeth (Martin) Leedy to her Brother Stephen Alexander Martin, (Uncle Alex as we called him) of Fredericktown and Lucerne, Ohio. Aunt Lib was 81 years old when she wrote this letter and only two years before she passed away. The writer has had it in his possession since 1921 and only recently located it among some old papers. It was very dim but have deciphered it as near correct as possible. Placing it in this work along with the letter of the Tinkey Family in order to show the younger generation how well such things are appreciated and treasured in our memory as we grow older.

Boise City, Oklahoma, February 25, 1917

Dear Brother and Sister:

I received your letter and was truly glad to hear from you. I am at Alpha's now in Oklahoma. Louie forwarded the letter to me. My health is not very good, thought I would come here a while to see if the change of climate would do me good, I came the 17th of November with Ira's, they moved here and they put up a two-roomed house and they are living in it a quarter of a mile from Alpha, he bought school land, 320 acres, will give some to the children Ira has his second wife, she was a widow with three children and he had three, they are all big but one girl, Ira's oldest son and her oldest daughter are married.

It will be 11 years next fall since Alpha came here, he entered 160 acres and bought 840. he makes money raising broom corn, maize and kaffir corn and some other corn when it is not too dry, he has such a good well of water, in 170 feet, can have the tank full all the time, a wind pump. We had no zero weather, had three or four little snows, had no rain, they want rain and snow now to get good crops, it is warm today, wind is blowing some.

Write again, I am so glad to hear from you, how is Henry getting along. I feel so lonely since Simon is gone, if he could only have stayed with me. They have to go 50 miles to get poles to make fence posts, have to pay for them and 50 and 60 to get lumber and coal, takes about four days to go and come, camp out when it is warm, sometimes get in a house when it is cold. What would Ohio people do if they had to do that? Some talk of railroad, if they get that they will be alright.

Alpha has about 50 head of cattle and 11 head of horses, he helps build houses for people, he has lots of work to do. They will have 10 miles to go to town, he has an auto to go in. This is a sandy country.

Louie's first wife is dead and they have one daughter 15 years old. He is married again, has a little boy, will be three years old next September. Aquilla. Louie's twin brother lives in Jacksonville, ILLINOIS, they have two daughters, Mary and Irma, they go to school all the time, Mary will be through her studies in about a year. Alpha has two girls, Alta and Dolly, such good girls, with them yet, I don't think they will be with them long.

Ira has a son and daughter by his first wife, Charley and Roselene. I wish I could see you and your wife, I was well acquainted with her mother. Betsy Lenley, she was such a good girl. I wish I could see all of Margaret's children. Write Again,

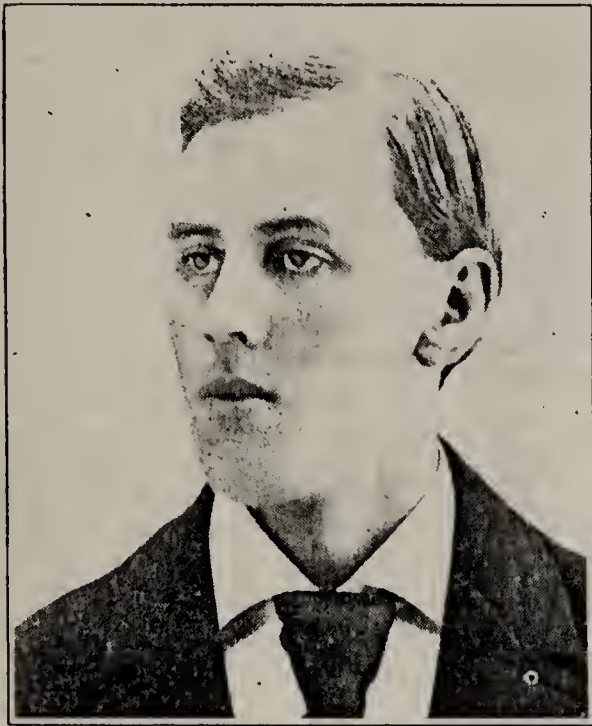

The prayer of infancy, of childhood, of youth, it with you yet, and wherever you may go, whatever fate may befall you, the mother love is as fervent as in the long, long ago. Thought several times of giving up the work, in fact offered it to others but none wanted the JOB . . . was very anxious in ending the work before passing over the river Jordan and very thankful to the Good LORD for sparing my life and giving me strength to finish the task. Hope it will be appreciated and that we will all meet in the sweet bye and bye.

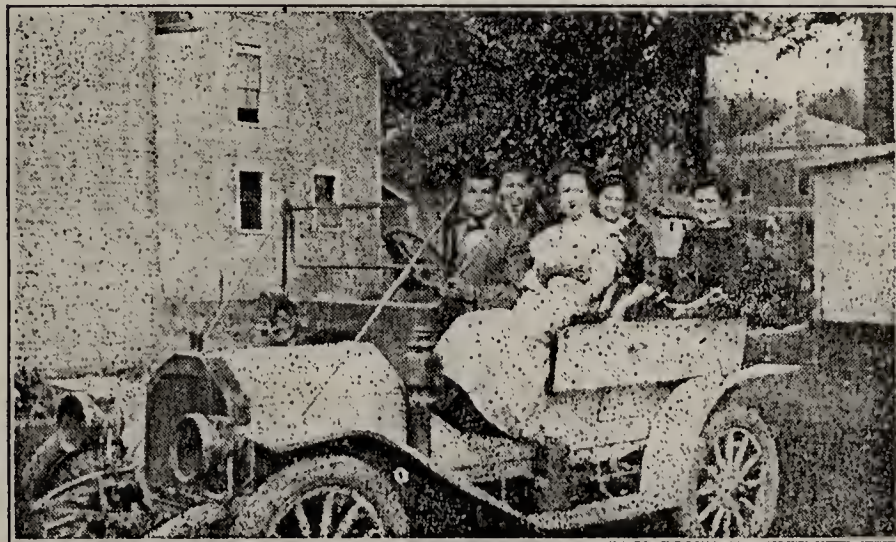

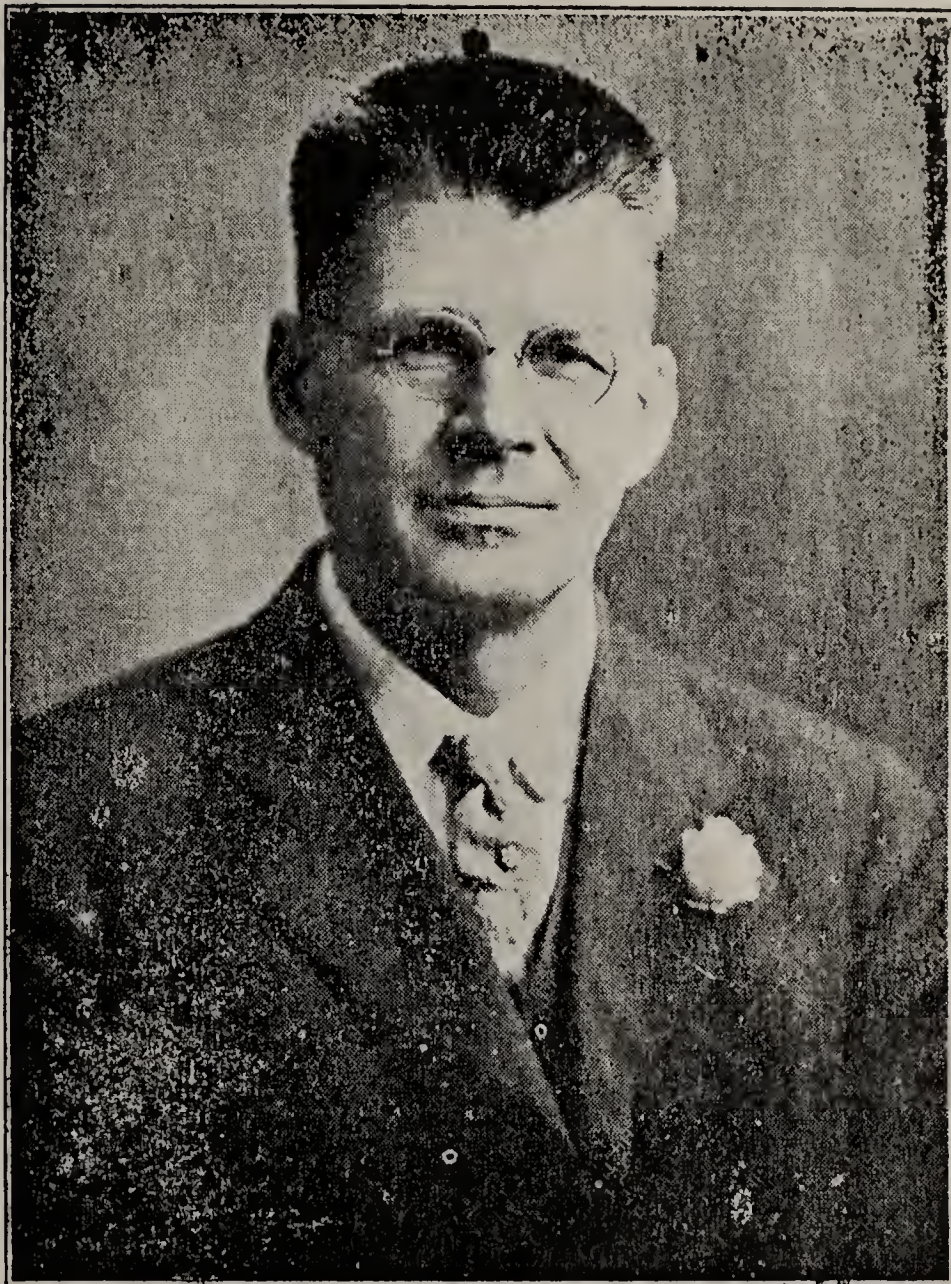

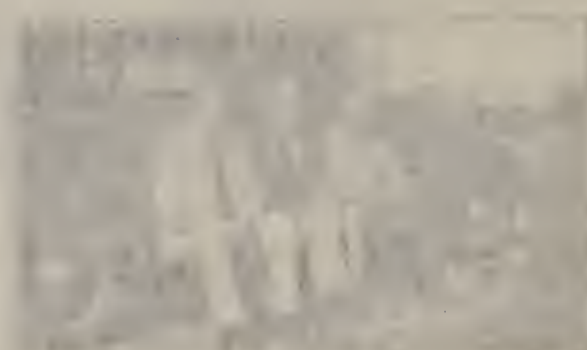

Some persons are not disposing of their assignment of books in both families and are returning them to me and others are disposing of their allotment and sending for more which shows a fine spirit of cooperation. As I look at the proposition, the books were requested by members of both families and even voted for at three of the Tinkey reunions, it now seems to me that after I have done about my share or even more in paying all expenses of composition, paper, printing, postage, making of the engravings, which was a large item of expense and many miles traveling by automobile, gathering data, doing the compiling and proof-reading and donating many books as shown by the report, and even if all the rest of the books are sold and the engravings bought as outlined, I will have to stand a further loss or expense than already shown in the report. The books really should have been priced above the actual cost. perhaps twice the price quoted, then if all were not sold, it would have nearly paid the first cost that I have paid out of my own pocket.

I know of children that want the books for they have told me so, even saying that when they got the money they would buy a book, their parents could do no finer thing than to make a Christmas present of the books, I know of parents buying bric-a-brac and other dirt catchers and giving to their children for Christmas to hang upon the wall, when with that should go a Tinkey or Martin book that they will appreciate more and more as the years come and go and they will help to mold the family ties.

Four persons, after having seen the amount of work required and the expense involved, have made donations to the book fund in addition to books bought, saying for me to give them to libraries or to any person saying, "They desire a book but unable to pay at this time." REPORT OF THE OLD TINKEY CEMETERY

A suggestion was made in the Tinkey supplement on page 22 to have a committee investigate the old Tinkey cemetery one-half way between Butler and Bellville, Ohio. About June, 1945, Mr. Ed Tinkey, president of the Tinkey reunion, appointed J. C. Tinkey, Frank Baughman and Nettie Sheets on said committee, and as chairman I am reporting for the committee as follows: After due consideration, we decided, because of some legal matters not to recommend the abandonment of the cemetery but to cooperate with the Jefferson Township trustees whose legal duty it is to take care of the cemetery in a proper manner, as it is upon the county auditor's record at Mansfield, Ohio, as being transferred to the Richland county, Jefferson township trustees. The cemetery has not been upon the county engineers or recorders map all these years and the engineer is placing it upon the new map now being made. We did find a plat of a Frederick Tinkey cemetery among the plats of county cemeteries, which records it contains 48-100 of an acre in Jefferson township but no deed or other paper could be found establishing this cemetery and it has been legally decided that none was necessary, however a record of deed was found conveying a portion of this cemetery from Frederick Tinkey to the Mohican or Lutheran church and the foundation marks 20x36 ft. can be seen to this day where the church once stood more than 70 years ago. There is no legal doubt but that the membership has disbanded and the land reverted back to the cemetery by right of the lapse of years. Therefore your committee is now working upon a plan to reduce the size of the cemetery from about 100x200 ft. to about 30x70 ft., just large enough to include the 15 graves now there and to revert the rest back to farm land, then have the trustees whose right is established, to erect a fence and keep the cemetery in a respectable condition as required by sections 3465 to 67 of the General Code of Ohio. The Tinkey descendants should cooperate with the trustees in seeing this was done as an endowment forever.

Whereas, the Tinkey cemetery, located one-half way between Bellville and Butler, Richland county, Jefferson township, Ohio, is in need of perpetual care and it is the lawful duty of the trustees of said township to keep it in a respectable condition, and whereas, the Tinkey annual reunion assembled at Johns Park, Mansfield, Ohio, agrees to assist with this work by authorizing the said trustees to reduce the size of the cemetery by disposing of the surplus land and only keep enough to enclose the 15 graves now there. As none have been buried there for more than 70 years and not likely ever will be again. The proceeds of the surplus land to be used to provide a walk and steps from the road to the graves and the upkeep of the small cemetery.

Therefore be it resolved, by the members of the 26th annual reunion of the Tinkey family at Johns Park, Mansfield, Ohio, this 25th day of August, 1946, that this resolution be adopted, and copies signed by the president and secretary shall be mailed to the said trustees, secretary, Marie Horn, Bellville, Ohio; the county commissioners, Mansfield, Ohio, and entered upon the records of this reunion.
