

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GENERAL STATEMENT

The College grounds consist of sixty-five acres—and for beautiful scenery are not surpassed by any in the country. They are elevated and undulating, covered with a beautiful growth of evergreens, and command a splendid view of the Cumberland Mountain on the North, and of the Smcky Mountains on the South.

On these grounds have recently been erected three new buildings at a cost of fifty thousand dollars.

The location is as remarkable for its healthfulness as it is for its beauty.

The Central Building is adapted to and used exclusively for College purposes, and in honor of the Founder of the Institution is called ANDERSON HALL.

The North Dormitory, in honor of the late John C. Baldwin, of New Jersey, is called BALDWIN HALL, and is occupied by the young ladies. In this hall ample and pleasant accommodations for board are provided for all the members of the Institution who may choose to board there.

The South Dormitory, called MEMORIAL HALL, is occupied by the young men.

In the basement of Baldwin Hall are five, and in that of Memorial Hall are ten kitchens, for the benefit of Students who may prefer to board themselves.

These halls are large and convenient, well lighted and ventilated—in every way attractive—and will accommodate one hundred and thirty students.

All the rooms, in both buildings, are furnished only with stoves, bedsteads and tables. Students must furnish their own bedding.

MARYVILLE COLLEGE is situated in Maryville, on the Knoxville and Charleston Railroad, sixteen miles south of Knoxville.

The grand motive of the founder may be stated best in his own words: "Let the Directors and Managers of this sacred institution propose the glory of God and the advancement of that kingdom purchased by the blood of His only begotten Son as their sole object."

Inspired by such a motive, he gathered a class of five in the Fall of 1819, and in prayer and faith began and prosecuted the work of his life.

The College was in continuous operation from its beginning up to the Spring of 1861, when its work was suspended by the war, but resumed again in the Fall of 1866.

During its time it has educated and sent forth, in the single profession of the ministry, more than one hundred and twenty men, nearly all of whom are natives of East Tennessee.

Its work thus far has been accomplished with very limited means.

Its principle and almost only endowment have been the prayers, the faith, the self-denial and the indefatigable labors of its founder and professors associated with him.

The friends of the institution are resolved to sustain it, and are making every effort to secure for it such an endowment as will enable it to do well the great work for which it was founded,

Young ladies qualified to join any of the classes in the College, are allowed to avail themselves of its advantages

The privileges of the Institution are open alike to all donominations of .Christians. No particular religious belief is demanded of any one.

ENGLISH DEPARTMENT.

This Department is designed to occupy an intermediate place between the ordinary Academy or High School and the scientific departments of Colleges, and to impart a thorough knowledge of the common and higher branches of an English education, and thus fit young men for any position in practical life.

Applicants for admission are required to pass a satisfactory examination in reading, writing, spelling, rnd the fundamental principles of Arithmetic, Grammar and Geography.

Students who complete the course of Study honorably, receive a certificate of graduation.

Scholars who do not wish to take a full course can enter any of the classes which they are qualified to join. In this department the method of instruction will be with a special view of training and qualifying teachers for the common free schools.

Good and convenient kitchens, furnished with cooking stoves and tables, are provided for such students as may prefer to board themselves. The College does not furnish cooking vessels with the stoves. A charge of \$1.00 a session for each occupant will be made for the use of these kitchens; and students whose circumstances require it may unite in clubs of two or more, and board themselves at \$1.00 per week.

The entire expenses of the students for board, tuition, room rent, fuel, lights and washing for the Collegiate year, will be from \$90.00 to \$150.00.

The above estimate of expenses is made on the supposition that two students occupy one room.

The occupants of each room in the young men's Hall are required to deposit with the College Treasurer \$3.00, as security against damage to room and furniture. This amount will be refunded when the key is returned with room and furniture uninjured.

Room rent and incidental tax mnst be paid invaribly in advance; and tuition must either be paid in advance, or approved security must be given that it will be paid by the middle of each session.

Until these conditions are complied with no one can have a room in the College buildings, or become a member of the College classes.

CHEMICAL AND PHILOSOPHICAL APPARATUS.

The most valuable and complete Apparatus ever brought to East Tennessee has been purchased. Many of the instruments are costly and superior. Among these are, an expensive *Barometer* made by James Green, New York; a powerful Compound Microscope made in France; a Telescope and a Superior Spectroscope made by H. G. Fitz, New York; a large Air Pump, and Hydraulic Press of great power; a large Holtz Electrical Machine, made by E. S. Ritchie & Sons, Boston; Ruhmkorff's Induction Coil, with Foucault's contact breaker, imported from France.

A number of specimens has been purchased to illustrate facts in Archæology, Minerology, Geology, Conchology, Ornithology, Botany &c, and a Society connected with the College has been organized during the present session, which has for its object the mutual improvement of its members in the Natural Sciences, and the collection of specimens for the College Museum. Already over one thousand specimenn have been obtained; and the friends of the College are earnestly requested to make further contributions

DISCIPLINE.

The use of tobacco in and about the College Buildings is forbidden, and no student addicted to its use will be allowed to room upon the College premises unless he signs a pledge not to use it anywhere while connected with the institution.

Every pupil is required to be in his place at all stated exercises, from the beginning to the close of the session.

All unexcused delinquencies are registered; and when the number amounts to five, or any number more than five and less than ten, notice thereof is given to the student, and to his parent or guardian.

When the number of unexcused delinquencies amounts to *ten*, the student ceases to be a member of the College.

Students are also dismissed, whenever, in the opinion of the Faculty, they are pursuing a course of conduct detrimental to themselves and to the College.

Students are not allowed to absent themselves from the College without permission from the Faculty.

Prayers are attended in the College Chapel every morning, with the reading of the Scriptures, and all the students are required to be present.

All students are required to attend public worship on the Sabbath, and to connect themselves with Bible Classes in some of the Churches in town.
