



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
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

# SARAH WINSLOW'S THREE HUSBANDS MYLES<sup>2</sup> STANDISH, TOBIAS PAYNE AND RICHARD MIDDLECOTT WITH THE FOUR ESTATES

SARAH WINSLOW<sup>3</sup>, daughter of John and Mary (Chilton) Winslow, was born at Plymouth, about 1638, and accompanied her parents when they removed to Boston. She was married three times and survived her third husband.

Sarah Winslow<sup>8</sup> (Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>) was married first, at Boston, on 19 July, 1660, to Myles<sup>2</sup> Standish (Capt. Myles<sup>1</sup>), who sailed for England a few months later and was not heard of again. There were no children by this marriage.

A few years later, in November, 1666 or 1667, Widow Sarah (Winslow) Standish was married to Tobias Payne, of Boston, by whom she had one child, William Payne, born at Boston, on Friday, 22 January, 1668/9. Tobias Payne, the second husband, died at Boston, 12 September, 1669.

In 1672, Widow Sarah (Winslow) (Standish) Payne married, for her third husband, Richard Middlecott of Boston, by whom she had four children: Mary, who married Henry Gibbs and Othniel Hagget; Sarah, who married Louis Boucher; Edward, who married and had at least one child, a son; Jane, who married Elisha Cooke...

Richard Middlecott, the third husband, died 13 June, 1704. leaving Sarah a widow for the third time. She did not marry again, and died in Boston, 9 April, 1726.

# MAYELOWER DESCENDANT

No settlement of the estate of Sarah Winslow's first husband. Myles<sup>2</sup> Standish (Capt. Myles<sup>1</sup>) has been found on the probate records of Plymouth Colony or of Suffolk County, Mass., but two depositions and a deed, all in the Plymouth Colony Records of Deeds [3:22 and 23], show that, before sailing, he gave Edward Gray\* of Plymouth power of attorney to sell his land in Dartmouth. The depositions were printed, by the Editor, in "Pilgrim" Notes and Queries", Volume IV, page 6, and an exhaustive abstract of the deed is included in the present article.

Tobias Payne, the second husband, made his will on 11 September, 1669, and died the next day. Apparently it was a nuncupative will, and the record states that only a part of it was recorded. An exhaustive abstract of everything found in the Suffolk County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the estate, is here presented. The only original document now in the files is the inventory, which bears the autograph signatures of John J

Winslow and Richard Middlecott.

Richard Middlecott, the third husband, made his will on 22 June, 1700, and it was probated 20 June, 1704. The original will is still on file in the Suffolk County, Mass., Registry of Probate. Attached to it is a petition bearing the autograph signature of his widow, "Sarah middlecott". The will mentions the four Middlecott children: Edward; Mary, wife of "my son in Law Henry Gibbs"; Sarah, unmarried; Jane, unmarried; also "my son in Law William Payne".

For many years, both before and after the date of this will, the term "son-in-law" meant either the son of a former husband or wife, or the husband of a daughter. In Richard Middlecott's will the term was used twice, and was equivalent to the modern "step-son" when applied to William Payne. When applied to Henry Gibbs it had the meaning now given to it, as Gibbs had married Middlecott's daughter Mary.

Exhaustive abstracts of all original documents and records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Suffolk

County, Mass., Registry of Probate, are here presented.

Widow Sarah (Winslow) (Standish) (Payne) Middlecott died 9 April, 1726, aged 88, according to an entry in Jeremiah Bumstead's Diary†. She died intestate, and administration was granted, on 12 May, 1726, to her second daughter, Sarah Boucher, widow, and to Elisha Cooke and his wife Jane, the third daughter.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents still in the files, relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Suffells County, March 1971.

found in the Suffolk County, Mass., Registry of Probate.

In the accompanying illustration we reproduce the signatures of John Winslow and Richard Middlecott, found on the original inventory of Tobias Payne's estate, dated 26 January, 1669/70; another signature of Richard Middlecott, found on his will, dated 22 June, 1700; and the signature of the widow Sarah Middlecott, found on the petition, dated 20 June, 1704, attached to her husband's will.

This article and the illustration are printed at the expense of Miss Marion DeCourcy Ward and her sister, Miss Anna Saltonstall Ward, of Boston, who are descendants of Elisha and Jane (Middlecott) Cooke, and members of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

The various abstracts referred to are here given, the proper reference, to the original record, or document on file, being noted in each case.

# [Myles<sup>2</sup> Standish, by attorney, to John Russell]

[Plym. Col. Deeds, 3:23] "Edward Gray of New Plymouth . . . . yeoman . . . as Attorney unto Myles Standish of Boston" having sold to "John Russell then of Marshfeild one whole share of land lying in Ponagansett in Plymouth Pattent belonging unto the said Myles Standish", for £42, "as by a writing under the said Edward Grayes hand now extant Doth appear Dated" 20 March, 1661, "and for the further confirmation of the said lands unto the said Russell Know yea: that the said Edward Gray for . . . the aforsaid sum . . . as Attorney unto the said Myles Standish . . . . Doe . . . . Confeirme unto the said John Russell . . . . the aforsaid one whole share of land . . . in the said Ponagansett or now the Towne called Dartmouth . . . . (viz) uplands and meddow lands"

The deed was dated 9 March, 1664, and was signed by a mark. The witnesses were, John Miller, Nathaniel Morton and

William Crow.

"I ame Contented with and Doe give my free consent to the sale of the land mensioned in this Deed as witnes my hand Sarah Standish

"This underwritten by Sarah Standish was acknowlidged before mee Thomas Southworth; Plymouth the third of Aprill 1668; Alsoe Edward Gray owned this Deed before mee Thomas Southworth the Day and yeare next above written;"

# [Tobias Payne's Will]

[Suffolk Co. Prob. Reds., 6:28\*] "No:4: What I have heere in money or Goods, what shall come in from any other place as debts & Adventures, what is due from mee being first made good & moderate funerall Expences discharged, I doe hereby fully & freely Give & bequeath unto youre daughter my wife & to Our little sonn, to whose Care Charge & Education I leave him, Enjoyning her in Case shee marries againe that hee may not bee abused or wronged, but duly taken Care for which I hope also you will mind if it happens during youre life"

"Att a meeting of the Gov<sup>r</sup> m<sup>r</sup> Tyng & Reccord<sup>r</sup>: 21: Sept: 1669 m<sup>r</sup> John Winslow deposed, that hee heard his late sonn in Lawe m<sup>r</sup> Tobias Paine on the 11<sup>th</sup> instant to declare it to bee his mind & last will & that hee was of a sound disposing mind, hee

departed this life the: 12: instant."

"This is a true Copie of the late Tobias Payne, his 24<sup>th</sup>†: instruction to which m<sup>r</sup> John Winslow deposed as is above & Annext to his Administration & this left instead of the Originall:"

"Att.a meeting of the Gov<sup>r</sup>: Richard Bellingham Esq<sup>r</sup> Edward Tyng Esq<sup>r</sup> & Reccord<sup>r</sup>: 21: Sept: 1669 Power of Administration to the Estate of the late m<sup>r</sup> Tobias Paine deceased is Granted to Sarah Paine his relict in behalfe of her selfe, & the sonn of the said Tobias & Sarah, (William Paine) to performe the imperfect will of the said Tobias as it is truly transcribed out of the Originall & Annext out of the Originall wherein hee left instructions for his father in Law & that shee give security to Administer thereupon according to Law bringing in a true Inventory of that Estate into the Court:"

[From original inventory] "An Inventory of the Estate of mr Tobias Paine Deceased . . . . taken  $y^e$  26th of January 16  $^6_{70}$ ". The total was £1675, 8s., 8½d. The debts amounted to £589, 6s., 5d. Some of the items were located in "the Garrett", "the Greatt chamber", "the two little Chambers" and "In  $y^e$  hall". The only mention of real estate is in the items: "a parcell of salt In A ware house" £140, and "a peece of a frame of a house and land" £60.

Other interesting items are: "a voyollin" ‡ £1; "A clock" £3. 10s.; "An Indian Boy Called william Brandy" £10; "2 Gould hatt bands, a Gould tobacco stopper a sett of shirtt Buttons of

Robert Munden; "mr John Winsley"; "mr Edmund Downes"; "mr Joseph Rock"; "mr william Darnall"; "mr Robert Gibbs"; "mrs pearson"; "Deacon parks"; "mr Beniamin Gibbs"; Joh Winslow; John Drury; William Crow; "Goodwife Blake"; Francis Combes; Edward Gray; Nathaniel Whitemore; John Leonard; "Isaac Harrice"; Edward Doty; "Henery hoges of London"; "Due from Thomas payne of Breeman 650 Rich dollers" £162, 10s.

"Sworne by ye widdow Paine yt this is a true Inventory & when she Knowes more to discover itt 28th: 11 mo 1669 as Attests Free Grace Bendall Clerke."

The inventory was recorded, 2 June, 1670, in Book 7, pages 14–18.

## [RICHARD MIDDLECOTT'S WILL]

[Suffolk Co. Probate. From original will] On 22 June, 1700, "Richard Middlecot of Boston . . . Merchant" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

"Imprimis my will is that all my just debts and funerall

charges be paid by my Executrix."

To "my son Edward Middlecot" £20, "besides Such Estate in Lands which I have formerly Settled upon him in Old England."

To "my daughter Mary Gibbs" £20, "besides what Estate I formerly gave with her in Marriage to my son in Law Henry Gibbs."

To "my Daughter Sarah Middlecot" £500, in money. To "my daughter Jane Middlecot" £500, in money. To "my son in Law William Payne" £10, in money.

To "my dearly beloved Wife Sarah Midlecot the Sole use and improvement of all and Singuler my Houseing and lands in Boston by her to be improved and Enjoyed dureing her naturall

The state of the s The same of the sa life unto whom also I give free and full liberty and power to give and dispose thereof by her Last will . . . . to all or any one or more of my children and their heires and assignes forever in Such Proportion as She Shall thinck meet, hereby allowing & holding the Same firm and Stable. But in case my Said wife Shall not See cause to dispose thereof by will, Or otherwise that She die Intestate, Then my will is that my aforesaid houseing and Lands in Boston be Equally divided between my four children afores<sup>d</sup> viz<sup>t</sup>: Edward Middlecot, Mary Gibbs, Sarah Middlecot & Jane Middlecot"

To "my Said Wife Sarah Midlecot all and Singuler the Residue of all my personall Estate for her comfortable Subsistance,

and to be disposed of as She Shall See cause."

"my Said Wife Sarah Middlecot to be the Sole Executrix.... and do hereby nominate and request my my Loveing friends Coll: Elisha Hutchenson and Majr John Walley to be as Over seers to Assist Assist and advise my Said Executrix, unto each of whom I do hereby give.... Twenty Shillings to buy each a ring."

The will was signed "Richard Middlecot". The witnesses

were: "John Indecott", Joseph Hiller and Joseph Prout.

Attached to the original will, by sealing wax, is the following original petition, addressed to the Judge of Probate: "Sr: Mr Middlecott having left me Executrix to his Will, & being uncapable to wait on you, by reason of my lameness: I do desire & request to take the testimony of those Gentlemen that were witnesses to my husbands Will, & to direct me to such further Stepps as may be requisite, for me to comply with the same & you will there by oblige Your humble Servant. (Boston June 20th: 1704 Sarah middlecott"

The signature on this petition is, of course, an autograph.

The petition is in a different hand.

[Endorsed on the original will] "The within written Will being presented for Probate . . . . John Indecott & Joseph Hiller", two of the witnesses, made oath to it, at Boston, on 20 June, 1704. [The will was also recorded, 15:300.]

[15:299] On 20 June, 1704, at Boston, the will was probated, and administration granted to "Sarah Middlecot Relict Widow".

[From original inventory] At "Boston in New England, August . 23<sup>d</sup> 1704" the inventory was taken by Joseph Hiller and "John Indecott". The total amount was £2084, 10s. The real estate was: "His Dwelling house & Ground belonging" £250; "A dwelling house Ware house & Wharfe" £600; "A dwelling house in Wings lane" £100; "A Pasture in Boston" £150.

Interesting items were: 232 ounces of plate, at 6s., 6d., per ounce, £75, 8s.; "Gold Rings & Buttons" £5; "A Negro Man & Girl" £40; "In English goods" £513, 15.

"Sarah Middlecot Exeerx" made oath to the inventory, at Boston, 23 April, 1705. [The inventory was also recorded,

# [SARAH (WINSLOW) (STANDISH) (PAYNE) MIDDLECOTT'S ESTATE]

[24:482] On 12 May, 1726, administration was granted "To Sarah Baucher Widow, Elisha Cooke Esq and Jane his Wife all of Boston" on the estate of "Your Mother Sarah Middlecott late

of Boston aforesaid Widow . . . . lately Dyed Intestate".

[From original bond] On .12 May, 1726, Sarah Boucher, widow, Elisha Cooke, Esq., and Jane Cooke, his wife, all three as administrators, with John Benning and Nathaniel Cunningham, both merchants of Boston, as sureties, gave a bond for £2000. The witnesses were Benjamin "Daulinge" and John Boydell. The name Sarah Boucher appears five times on this bond, in addition to her own signature, which is unmistakably "Boucher". [Also recorded, Red ink No. 13: 347.]

[From original document] "Objections against Mr Cookes accott". "That Mr Wm Coddintons money is not entred" £450; "Mr Henry Gibbes' money not entred" £10; "Mr Coppins dept for rent" £20; "Mr Elisha Cookes money Interest &c" £250; "the pew at the North Church" £30; "the house at land formerly my fathers" £600. The document was signed "Wm Payne" and endorsed "Mr Pains objections filed March 18th 1727". [Also recorded, Red ink No. 13:349.]

[From original document] "Answers to Mr Paynes Objec-

tions." "The House & Land which he calls, formerly his Fathers, he long Since for very valuable Considerations Released all Right or Title thereto as he well knows: But if any Right in him he may

[From original bond] On 4 June, 1728, "William Paine Esq as Principall Peter Barbour Andrew Lane his Suretys" gave a bond of "Ten Pounds Each" to "Prosecute his Appeal" from the decree of the Probate Court. The bond was signed "Wm Payne". [Also recorded, Red Ink No. 13:350.]

[From certified copy] "At a Council held at the Council Chamber in Boston of Thursday the 6th of June 1728., Sitting

the General Assembly

"An Appeal of William Paine Esqr from a Judgment . . . . of Sam<sup>II</sup> Sewall Esq Judge of the Probate . . . . Pronounced Aprill 15 . . . . Ordered that a hearing be had of this appeal on

Fryday" 14 June, 1728, at three o'clock in the afternoon.

"In Council Aug<sup>t</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> 1728. A Hearing being had the 5<sup>th</sup> Instant on this appeal.... Resolved that the Following Articles ought to be inserted in the Inventory of the Estate of Sarah Middlecott Deces<sup>d</sup>: viz<sup>t</sup>. M<sup>r</sup> Coppins Debt of £20. M<sup>r</sup> Gibbs Debt of £10. M<sup>r</sup> Nath<sup>II</sup> Coddingtons Bond For £200 Silver Money the arrears of Rent Due from M<sup>r</sup> Arnoo to the s<sup>d</sup> Estate, and the Debt of Elisha Cook Esq One of the administr<sup>rs</sup> Due to the s<sup>d</sup> Estate.

"And It is Ordered . . . . that the Judge of Probates . . . . take Care that the Several Articles afores be accordingly Added to the sd Inventory.

"A True Copy Examined & J Willard Secry." "filed Decr 24th 1728" is endorsed on the back. [Also recorded, Red ink

No. 13:351.]

[From original inventory] On 23 January, 1728, "Mrs Sarah Boucher Elisha Cooke Esq and Jane his wife Admints on the Estate of their Mother Mrs Sarah Medlicot" made oath to the inventory, which was not dated, but bears the signatures of the three administrators, who apparently acted as appraisers. No real estate was included.

Interesting items are: "A Looking Glass old fashion" £3; "a negro woman named Sue" £75; "Five Gold Rings . 14 dwt, 7 Gras" £7, 17s.

Payments had been received from: Benjamin Mason; William Lee, for rent; Thomas Plaisted; John White; John Weymouth;

John Rachel; "Neale"; William Twing.

Debts were due the estate from: William Twing; Ebenezer Newal; "Thomas & Joshua Stedman"; Ezekiel Needham; Jeremiah Osborne; William Coddington; Henry Gibbs; "Mrs Coppin"; Elisha Cooke; "Mr William Payne"; "Mr Middlecott". The total amount of the inventory was £1725, 11s., 1d. [Also recorded, 27:33.]

[From original account] On 19 May, 1729, the three administrators filed an account, which was sworn to by all three, and approved by the Judge of Probate, on 21 May, 1729. Payments had been made to: "John Arno for Repairs"; Benjamin Swain; Dr. Williams; John Alden; "Mrs Pollard"; "John Blake Coach hire" £1, 10s.; "Mr Burrel"; "Coach hire for Mrs Cole" 10s.

[Also recorded, 27:176.]

[27:179] "To Mrs Sarah Boucher Elisha Cooke Esq & Jane his wife adminrs of Mrs Sarah Middlecott widow . . . . Whereas it appears . . . That the . . . . Residuary Part of her Personal Estate . . . amounts to" £1712, 18s., 10d. "wch Ought by Law to be Divided among the Children of the said deced & their Legal Representatives. I Do therefore . . . . assign to you the said Sarah Boucher and Elisha Cooke (in Right of your wife Jane)" £293, 16s., 5d., "apiece And I also order you . . . . as Adminrs aforesaid to pay to the Rest of the Children of the said deced Namely to William Payne Esq as his Double share and Portion" £587, 12s., 10d., "after the deduction of" £194, 6s., 10d., "already received"; "To the Heirs and Representatives of Mary Hagget

The second secon  deced" £293, 16s., 5d., "after the Deduction of fifteen pounds & Ten shillings already received in plate"; "To the Heirs & Representatives of Edward Middlicott deceased" £293, 16s., 5d., "after the deduction of" £226, 7s., "already received in plate &c." "being their full shares and proportions of and in their Mothers Estate at present saving to Each Child a share or proportion of what further Estate may appear Each party to whom a share is allotted Giving Bond with suretys . . . . in case Debts be afterwards made to appear to Refund & pay back . . . . their ratable parts of all such Debts & of their Charges."

The decree was made, 26 May, 1729, by Josiah Willard, Judge

of Probate.

### CAPT. OLIVER SOPER'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

OLIVER SOPER of Taunton, Mass., married Ruth Staples<sup>5</sup> (Hannah<sup>4</sup> Standish, Ebenezer<sup>3</sup>, Alexander<sup>2</sup>, Myles<sup>1</sup>), and had six children: Susanna, Sally, Ruth, Betsy, Oliver and Fanny. The record from his family bible, printed in "Pilgrim Notes and Queries", Volume 2, page 77, shows that he died 8 August, 1821, and his wife, Ruth, died 26 June, 1832.

Oliver Soper, Esq., made his will on 9 August, 1815, and it was probated 7 September, 1821. An endorsement on the original

## [CAPT. OLIVER SOPER'S WILL]

[From original will] On 9 August, 1815, "Oliver Soper of Taunton.... Esq" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "my wife Ruth the use and improvement of One half of

my Indoor moveables and household furniture, And One Cow, And the use and improvement of One half of all my lands and Buildings where I now live with one half of the previleges thereto belonging, for her to use and improve so long as she shall live single and unmarried after my decease. All which is to be considered instead of her right of Dower in my Estate."

To "the heirs of my Daughter Susanna the wife of George

Macomber, deceased five dollars."

To "my Daughter Sally Dean five dollars." To "my Daughter Betsey Porter Ten dollars." To "my Daughter Fanny Presbrey five dollars."

To "my Daughter Ruth Soper, One half of all my Indoor moveables, and household furniture, And I give her to use and improve, while she shall live single and not married, One half part of my homestead land & Buildings with the previleges thereto belonging, the other half of which I have herein given for my wife to improve as abovesaid, I Also give to my said Daughter Ruth the other half of my indoor moveables & household furniture after the death or marriage of her mother, and also the improvement of the other half of my lands & buildings as abovesaid, during the time she shall remain single & not married."

To "my son Oliver Soper, All the lands & buildings that I have heretofore conveyed to him by deed, I Also give him . . . . (on condition he shall pay and perform as herein directed) all the remainder of my Estate not herein particularly disposed of, both Real and personal, with the land and buildings herein given to my said wife and Daughter Ruth after their improvement as aforesaid, he to pay the several sums herein mentioned, to be paid to each of my four Daughters or their heirs, pay all my debts and charges Including funeral expences."

"Son Oliver" was appointed sole executor.

The witnesses were James Williams, Deborah Williams and Alfred Williams.

The will is endorsed "The Will of Capt Oliver Soper." [The

will was also recorded, 58:329.]

[From original letter] On 7 September, 1821, at Dighton, James Williams and Alfred Williams made oath that they, "with Deborah Williams who is out of the Government", witnessed the will of "Oliver Soper . . . . Gentleman" and administration was granted to Oliver Soper, the executor. [The letter was also recorded, 58:330.]

[From unrecorded bond] On 7 September, 1821, Oliver Soper, yeoman, as executor, with James Williams, Esq., and Alfred

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Williams, Esq., as sureties, all of Taunton, gave a bond for \$10,000. The witnesses were I. W. Baylies and D. G. W. Cobb.

[111:123] On 7 September, 1821, Oliver Soper, the executor, was ordered to post notices of his appointment, in Taunton and Raynham. The notices were posted the same day, and on 5 March, 1822, Oliver Soper made oath that he had complied with the order of the Court.

#### COL. SILVESTER RICHMOND'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

SILVESTER RICHMOND of Little Compton (which was in Massachusetts until 1747, when it became a part of Rhode Island) married, first, Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Rogers (John<sup>3-2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>), who was the mother of all his children. His second wife, who survived him, was Deborah (Cushing) Loring.

Silvester and Elizabeth (Rogers) Richmond had eleven children: William, Elizabeth, Silvester, Peleg, Perez, Ichabod, Ruth,

Hannah, Sarah, Mary, Rogers.

The daughter Hannah is not mentioned in her father's will, and probably died, without issue, before it was made.

The daughter Sarah died before her father, and one of her children was mentioned in the will.

All the other children survived their father and were mentioned in his will.

Before 1752, Col. Silvester Richmond removed from Little Compton to Dartmouth, Mass., where he died; but he and both his wives were buried at Little Compton.

In his will, made 29 December, 1752, and when the will was probated, 3 December, 1754, he was called of Dartmouth, Mass.

To "Deborah my Dearly beloved wife" £13, 6s., 8d., "to be paid her Immediately after my Decease . . . . & the same to be at her Dispose for Ever, also I give her my Riding Chare with the Harness & tackling belonging to It & . . . my Easy Chare so called and these to be at her Dispose for Ever Also I give her my silver Tankard to use During her natural life & then It to be disposed of as I shall in this my will order; also I order my Executor to Deliver to her what things She brought to me at the time of our Inter marriage agreeable to a Covenant made between my self & her & Caleb Loring before marriag" dated 7 February, 1727, "also my will is that my sd wife Deborah be mainted by my son Peres out of the Estate I Shall give him in this my will In all Respects sutable to her Condition & Quality both in sickness & health During her being my widow agreeable to the Covenant above mentioned made before marriage reference thereunto being had for Direction about the same & In Case of his Death before her then by his Heirs She to be supported as abovesd"

"To my son William . . . . all the Land I have Joyning his Homesteed being the westerly End of that Lot I bought of Samuel Crandel In Little Compton . . . . which land I give him upon Condition that he or his Heirs pay . . . . unto my Grandson Gamaliel Richmond son of my son Peleg Richmond" £13, 6s., 8d. "and also that he pay To my Grandaughter Mary Pain who was the Daughter of my Daughter Sarah Deceased the like sum of" £13, 6s., 8d., "within one year after my Decease which land with what I have before given him Is his full portion of my Estate"

Three acres of Sedg flat or marsh Joyning to the Crick which runs out of Quicksand Pond In Little Compton . . . . also . . . . the use of one Room at the west End of my Dwelling house to live in himself so long as he Shall remain single but not to have power to hire it out to any others also I give to my s<sup>d</sup> son Ichabod one bed & beding there to belonging now standing in the Chamber bed Room & that to be his portion of my Estate with what I have already given him"

To "my son Rogers.... Two Hundred Spanish silver milled Dollers to be paid him or his Heirs within Four years after my Decease one Half in live stock at the Judgment of men mutually chosen between them & the other half in Dollers, & that with what I have already Given him to be his part & portion of my

Estate"

To "my Daughter Elizabeth" £40 "Lawfull money to be paid by my Executor one Half there of within Two years after my Decease & the other half within Three years after my Decease also . . . . my silver tankard after my wives Decease and in case my Daughter Dies before my wife then It to be to my Grand son & Grandaughter Fishers the children of my Daughter Elizabeth."

To "my Daughter Ruth" 440 "Lawfull money one Half to be paid within Two years after my Decease and the other Half within

"I hereby order that my Negro man named Natt Shall be set free at my Decease & be at his own liberty as to his time & service Provided he procure sufficient security to Save my son Peres from all Cost & charge in case he Shall not be able to support himself whose time I give to s<sup>d</sup> Peres & his Heirs in Case he fail of securing as above said but when Ever he shall procure such security to be free, also In like manner I give my Negro woman Named Cate her time as I do Natts provided She get security to Peres to free him and his Estate from Cost She being also Given to s<sup>d</sup> Peres & Heirs if she fail of security & both Natt & Cate being thus Disposed of my son Peres is to Save all my other Heirs from any Cost about them"

"I Do . . . . appoint my sd son Peres sole Executor"

"my will is that my son Peres give to his Brother Peleg one suit of my waring appariel also to my son Ichabod one suit of my

waring appariel"

"In as much as there are many sums of money for my son Peres To Pay as Legacyes It is my will.... that if he see cause to suspend the payment of any of the sd Legacyes for one year after the times for Payment of any of the sd Legacyes are Expired he shall have liberty so to Do paying lawfull Interest for the same at the End of sd year with the Principle"

The witnesses were Simon Davenport, Elihu Woodworth,

Ichabod Stoddard, Aaron Wilbur and Timothy Ruggles.

The will was presented for probate, at Rehoboth, 3 December, 1754, by Perez Richmond, the executor, and sworn to by Simon Davenport and Aaron Wilbur, two of the witnesses. [The will was also recorded, 14:236.]

[14:241] On 3 December, 1754, administration was committed "unto his son Peres Richmond of sd Dartmouth sole Executor"

[From unrecorded bond] On 4 February, 1755, Perez Richmond of Dartmouth, gentleman, as executor, with George Morey of Norton, gentleman, and Joseph Trip of Dartmouth, husbandman, as sureties, gave a bond for £10,000. The witnesses were Joseph Palmer and Benjamin Copeland.

[16:337] On 5 March, 1755, Sylvester Richmond, Jr., receipted to Perez Richmond, executor, for "a Silver Sword which

my Hond Grand Father gave me."

[16:338] On 5 March, 1755, Nathaniel Fisher and Elizabeth Fisher receipted for "a Silver Tankard given us by our Hond Father Sylvester Richmond Esqr late of Dartmouth deceased after ye Decease of our Hond Mother—We say received sd Tankard of our sd Hond Mother Richmond"

[16:338] On 26 May, 1755, at Dartmouth, Nicholas Loring receipted to "Capt. Peres Richmond Executor" for "One Bed & Furniture & two Silver Spoons together with Sundry other Houshold Goods being in full of All the Indoor houshold Goods that is given to Mary My Wife Daughter of the deceased" The receipt was witnessed by Nathaniel Sears and Jeremiah Fisher.

[16:337] On 27 May, 1755, at Dartmouth, Nicholas Loring receipted to "Capt Peres Richmond Executor" for "twenty mill Dollars being in full for what was given to my son Richmond Loring by his Grand Father Sylvester Richmond Esqr in his Last Will" The receipt was witnessed by Samuel Shaw and Jeremiah Fisher.

[16:337] On 11 June, 1755, at Dartmouth, Sylvester Richmond receipted to Capt. Perez Richmond, "sole Executor... of my Hond Father Sylvester Richmond late of Dartmouth Esqr deceased" for £236, 7d., "in full of All Accounts between the deceased & myself"; also for £206, 13s., 4d. "in full of the sum ordered by sd Sylvester deceased in his sd Will to be paid to me by his sd Executor" The witnesses were Stephen West and Humphrey Smith.

[16:339] On 9 March, 1756, "Rogers Richmond of Bristol" R. I., "One of the Heirs of the late Silvester Richmond of Dartmouth" receipted to Perez Richmond of Dartmouth, executor, for "Two Hundred Spanish Silver Mill<sup>d</sup> Dollars . . . . in full of all Legacies . . . . out of the s<sup>d</sup> Estate". The witnesses were Edward Wheaten and Isaac Wheaten.

David Walker, Jr., and Perez Richmond, Jr., witnessed the receipt.

# THE WILLS OF LIEUT. NATHANIEL SOUTHWORTH AND HIS SON CONSTANT

BY THE EDITOR

NATHANIEL SOUTHWORTH, of Plymouth, married Desire Gray' (Mary Winslow<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>), on 10 January, 1671, in Plymouth. She was born there, 6 November, 1651, and died there, 4 December, 1690. They had six children, recorded at Plymouth: Constant, born 12 August, 1674; Mary, born 3 April, 1676; Ichabod, "born Aboute the midle of march 1678"; Nathaniel, born 18 May, 1684, and baptized in 1685; Elizabeth, baptized in 1687; Edward, baptized in 1690.

The birth dates of the first four children are from the town records, printed in our first volume. The baptisms of the last three children are from the church records, which do not give

the month and day, in either case.

On 5 June, 1678\*, Nathaniel Southworth was elected constable of Plymouth, for the ensuing year, and he did not remove to Middleborough, Mass., until some years after the births of all his children. It is evident, therefore, that the Southworth Genealogy is in error in stating that the son Ichabod was born in Middleborough.

The same genealogy again errs, on page 86, in saying that the daughter Elizabeth was born in 1682, and married, "about 1700", James Sprout. The marriage did not take place until 5 June, 1712, as shown by the record printed in our ninth volume, page 87.

The son Constant settled in Tiverton, at that time in Massachusetts, now in Rhode Island, and his will, probated in Bristol County, Mass., shows that he left neither wife nor children, as he gave his entire property to his brothers and a cousin.

The daughter Mary married Joseph Rider and left four chil-

dren.

The son Ichabod married Esther Hodges and had six children. The son Nathaniel married Jael<sup>3</sup> Howland (*Isaac*<sup>2</sup>, *John*<sup>1</sup>) and had six children.

The son Edward married Bridget Bosworth and had nine children.

Nathaniel Southworth, Sr., of Middleborough, made his will, 18 September, 1708, and it was probated, in Plymouth County,

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Mass., 8 March, 1710/11. He was called Lieutenant in the probate records and on his gravestone, at Middleborough. The stone

records that he died 14 January, 1710, in his 62d year.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of the wills of Lientenant Nathaniel Southworth and his son, Constant Southworth, and of all other probate records relating to the two estates found in the Plymouth County and Bristol County, Mass., Registries of Probate, the reference, to the original document, or to the record, being noted with each abstract.

[Bristol Co. Probate, 2:147] "Constant Southworth of Tiverton . . . . being bound on a Voyage to Sea" made his will on

14 January, 1702. Bequests were as follows:

To "my loveing Brothers Nathaniel Southworth & Edward Southworth all my Right & Title I have in Pocasset lands from the Thirteenth lott Northward to be Equally Divided between them"

To "my Cozen Edward Grey Junr: of Tiverton the son of my Unkle Edward Grey of said Town all my Right & Title in all the lands from ye thirteenth lott which lott is the last lott in Pocassett Purchass. I say all the land to the southworth\* thereof that I have any Right and Title to both upland and meadows... which lands lyes in Pounkatest Outletts"

To "my Loveing Brother Ichabod Southworth of Plimouth as a Token of my Love and Remembrance I give him six shillings"

"my loveing Brothers Nathaniel & Edward Southworth" were appointed executors.

The witnesses were Edward Gray, Nathaniel Coddington and

William Coddington.

On 5 February, 1705, "Nathal Coddington Esqr & will Coddington both of newport & Edward Gray of Tiverton", the three witnesses, made oath to the will, at Bristol, before Nathaniel Byfield, Judge of Probate.

The three items following "came by ye Right of his mother"; "sixscores acres of land" £40, and "40 acres at wattuppa" £18,

and "25 acres of land at Freetown" £5.

The personal estate was inventoried, at Tiverton, 20 August, 1706, by David Little and Constant Church.

The total of the real estate was £344, and of the personal, £5,

3s., 6d.

"Natha! Southward of middburrough . . . . Executor of . . . . Constant Southward late of Tiverton . . . . deceased" made oath to the inventory, at Bristol, on 23 September, 1706. [The inventory was also recorded, 2:166.]

[Plym. Co., Prob., from original will] On 18 September, 1708, "Nathanel Southworth Senior of . . . . middleborough" made his

will. Bequests were as follows:

"I give and bequeath unto my Son Ichabod Southworth: a certain part of my great lot or homestead in midleborrough aforesaid: which Said part thereof is bounded on the northeast by the little lot mens purchase: and on the South East it is bounded by the meadow upon the River from the aforesaid purchase: upstream until it come up against a great white oak marked on four Sides: and is hollow at the bottom: Standing on a high Ridge near the said meadow: and on the Southwest: it is bounded from Said white oak on a Straight line to a great Stooping black oak marked on four Sides: and from thence North west and by north about Sixteen pole to a Small red oak marked on two Sides by the Swamp Side and from thence north west and by north unto the head of my Said land:"

"my meadow upon the river at the foot of the afore Said land: and my meadow at rooty brook: Shall each percel thereof be Equally divided among my aforesaid three Sons for Quantity according to the Quality : and that when Said meadows are divided: Each of them Shall have the liberty of a way through barrs: to their meadows meadows: cross the others land where there is nessessity for it: so as may be most beneficial and least

prejudicial:"

To "Son Ichabod: the lot in the first division in the Sixteen Shilling purchase which was formerly the lot of John Winslow Senior: being in number the ninth lot: and also my lot in assawamset neck in the Right of Said John Winslow Senior being in number the Sixty fourth lot:"

To "Son Nathanel: the one half of my lot in the first division in the Sixteen Shilling purchase in my own right: being in number

To "my Daughter Elizabeth Southworth the bed : and Bedding whereon Shee usually Lodgeth and all my household Stuff of all

Sorts"

To "my Daughter Mary Rider: and my Daughter Elizabeth Southworth: all the mony which shall at the time of my decease: remain due to me in the hands of mr Nathanel Thomas and John Holmes both of plimouth and and also all the mony which I shall then have in my own custody: together with all debts due to me from any other persons: that is to say one third part thereof unto my said daughter mary: and the other two thirds unto my said daughter Elizabeth: my Just debts and funeral charges being first paid out of the same:"

"Sons Ichabod and Nathanel: to be executors"

The will was signed "Nathaniel Southworth". The witnesses

were Henry Wood, Ephraim Wood and Jacob Tomson.

On 8 March, 1710/11, the will "of Left Nathaniel Southworth" was probated, on the testimony of "Capt Jacob Tomson Henery wood & Ephraim wood the witnesses" and administration granted to "Ichabod Southworth and Nathaniel Southworth sons to ye sd Deceased and Executors in ye same will named" [The

will and letter were also recorded, 2: 147.]

[From original inventory] An inventory of "the Moveable Estate & Credits of Leiut Nathaniel Southworth of Middle-borough deceased" was taken, at Middleborough, by John Morton and Elkanah Leonard, 24 February, 1710/11, "at the Request of his sons vizt Ichabod Southworth & Nathaniel Southworth". No real estate is mentioned. John Holmes, "Mr Nathaniel Thomas of Plymouth", and "the Iron Workes In Middleborough" were indebted to the estate. The two executors made oath to the inventory, 8 March, 1710/11. [The inventory was also recorded, 2:150.]

## THE ESTATES OF JOHN TISDALL OF TAUNTON AND HIS SON JOHN

BY THE EDITOR

JOHN TISDALL, SR., of Taunton, was killed by the Indians, on 27 June, 1675, and his widow, Sarah, died at Taunton, in December, 1676. The settlement of the estate shows that there were four sons and four daughters, three of the daughters being married.

John Tisdall, Jr., also of Taunton, married Anna<sup>3</sup> Rogers (John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>), of Duxbury, on 23 November, 1664, and had four children: Abigail Tisdall<sup>4</sup>; John Tisdall<sup>4</sup>; Ann Tisdall<sup>4</sup>; Remember Tisdall<sup>4</sup>.

John Tisdall, Jr., died "about the last of December", 1677, and his widow, Anna, married Thomas Terry, and, surviving him, married, for her third husband, Samuel Williams.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all entries on the original Plymouth Colony Court Orders and Plymouth Colony Wills and Inventories, relating to the settlement of the estates of John Tisdall, Sr., and John Tisdall, Jr. These abstracts have been made at the expense of Miss Gertrude I. Lake, a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and a descendant of John and Anna<sup>3</sup> (Rogers) Tisdall.

### [THE ESTATE OF JOHN TISDALL, SR.]

[Plym. Col. Court Orders, 5:146] At a court at Plymouth, I November, 1676, "Lres of Adminnestration are Graunted Joyntly unto John Tisdall James Tisdall Joshua Tisdall and Joseph Tisdall to Adminnester on the estate of John Tisdall senir Deceased;"

[Plym. Col. Wills, 3:2:24] The will of "John Tisdall senir of Taunton" was not signed or dated; but it was probated, at Plymouth, 2 November, 1676, on the oath of "Mr James Walker senir". Bequests were as follows:

To "my eldest son John Tisdall all that my tract of land on the east syde of Taunton River which is bounded by apes meddow brooke on the south; and by the stone bridge brooke on the north; and on the west bounded prely by the Great River, and

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prtely by the highway, and by the Comon, on the east; be it six

score acrees, more or lesse; with the housing that is on it"

To "my son James Tisdall the land upon which his house standeth and about five acrees of land; lying on the east syde of the Great River over against his house; and four acrees more lying by the stone [bridge\*] brooke, and also the land Called the New lott on the west syde of the Great River being about six acrees . . . onely the mowing meddow that is in it his mother shall Injoy whiles shee liveth, and also my lott att Swansey and my meddow att Sakegegansett and my share in the Iron workes, after the Death of his mother"

"the Remainder of my estate I leave wholly to my wife as my sole executrix:"

"James Tisdall the second son shall have . . . . first an acree and an halfe wher his now Dwelling house standeth; and five acrees of land . . . . on the east syde of the Great River, over against his house and foure acrees lying by the stony bridge; and the land Called the New Lott; six acrees . . . . and a lott att Swansey, and a presell of meddow att Sakegegansett; with a share in the Iron workes;"

"Joshua the third son shall have . . . . all and every pre of one of the Freemens lotts; it being the 23 lott with two acrees of Meddow in Assonett; on a Cove neare the land of John Hath-

wey;"

"Joseph Tisdall the fourth son shall have . . . . all the land and meddow that is scittuate and lying together att the place where the Dwelling house was of John Tisdall Deceased, and the old orchyard with two acrees of land adjoyning to it, and three acrees of swamp lying neare the land of James Burt; and a purchase Right in the Towne, and a preel of Meddow Called Apes meddow with two acrees of upland on the west syde of the said Meddow; and twelve acrees of upland be it more or less, that is to be understood, that a line from the Northeast Corner of the Meddow, to the Now standing barrs or Cartway; and soe on a straight line to the highway, and ten acrees on the east syde of this said line adjoyning to the said line"

"These four sonnes being made adminnestrators, by the honored Court... and haveing agreed with theire three brothers in law John Smith James Dean and Nathaniel French; and payed them their full ptes, of the aforsaid estate; as may appear by acquittances under theire hands; and haveing also agreed with Mr James Browne as Gaurdian to the younger sister; this the Admininestrators Judgeth theire Duty to present to the honored

Court;"

This agreement was dated 4 June, 1677, and signed by the four sons.

[p. 92] "Wheras there hath bin a Controversye betwixt John Smith and James Deane both of Taunton and the adminnestrators of the estate of John Tisdall late Deceased, and after severall assayes to Compose the Differences; This fourteenth of Aprill in the year 1677; the aforsaid John Smith and James Dean have Come to a full and finall Determination, with Joshua Tisdall and Joseph Tisdall, upon the Receipt; of the Cattle and Goods heerin specifyed; for all the Remainder of the Right and Interest that

the aforsaid John Smith or James Dean hath or might have to the aforsaid estate, The Cattle and Goods which the said John Smith hath Now Received . . . . with what hee hath formerly Received . . . . is and shalbe his full portion of the aforsaid estate". The personal estate received by John Smith was valued at £19, 18s., including "a Gun and halfe our fathers wearing apparrell" at £2, 8s.

"The Cattle and Goods that James Dean hath Received . . . . with what hee hath formerly Received . . . . is and shalbe his full

portion" valued at £18, 10s.

"The aforsaid John Smith and James Dean Doth for themselves and for theire wives . . . Discharge . . . . the adminnestrators . . . . from all Dues Debts or Demaunds . . . . Due to them or either of them from the aforsaid estate".

The receipt was signed by John Smith and James Dean, and witnessed by John Richmond and Abigail Richmond, Abigail

signing by a mark.

[p. 93] "James Browne of Swansey as Guardian to Abigaile Tisdall Daughter to John Tisdall of Taunton late Deceased" receipted to the administrators for "a share of land in the purchase that lyeth on the Great River and southerly from Taunton three mile River, and twenty pound sterling", and discharged them "from all Dues and Debts . . . . from the aforsaid estate".

The receipt was dated 4 June, 1677, and witnessed by John Richmond and John Rogers.

On 4 June, 1677, "Nathaniel: French of Taunton" discharged the administrators from all demands on the estate "That I the aforsaid Nathaniel: French or Mary my wife might have" and "acknowlidge to have Received, in hand a purchase Right in the North purchase, and a lott att a place Called Romford and twelve pound sterling in Mony".

The receipt was witnessed by John Richmond and Thomas

Richmond.

#### [ESTATE OF JOHN TISDALL, JR.]

[Plym. Col. Court Orders, 5:174] At a court at Plymouth, 5 March, 1677,\* "Anna Tisdall widdow of the Towne of Taunton.... and John Richmond and Samuell Smith of the Towne afor-

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yeoman" gave a bond of £150, as "Anna Tisdall hath obtained letters of Adminnestration . . . on the estate of John Tisdall Junit: late of Taunton aforsaid Deceased"

"Letters of Adminnestration is Graunted unto Anna Tisdall widdow to adminnester on the estate of John Tisdall late. Deceased; And John Richmond and John Rogers and Samuell Smith of Taunton are appointed to be overseers for the Desposall of the said estate"

[Plym. Col. Wills, 3:2:99] "An Inventory of the estate of John Tisdall Deceased whoe ended his life about the last of December in the yeer one Thousand six hundred seaventy and seaven and exhibited to the Court held att Plymouth the fift of March 1677\* on the oath of Anna Tisdall widdow;"

The inventory was taken, 5 February, 1677†, by John Richmond, William Witherell and Samuel Smith.

The real estate was: "16 acrees on the west of the high way, with the house and barne & orchyard" £100; "6 acrees of Improved land on the east syde of the high way" £10; "a proved land on the east syde of the high way" £10; "a proved land Called the Great meddow" £20; "about 100 acrees of Dormont land" £50; "and another purchas of land" £10; "22 acrees of land Called the 22 acree Devision" £8; "a purchase Right in the Townes Comons" £10. The total value was £208.

The whole estate, less debts, amounted to £368, 178.

"It is ordered by the Court that the woman shall have her thirds of the lands in the Lands where the house barne and orchyard is with soe much land as Comes to her thirds which is" 196, 6s., 8d., "and the thirds of the prsonall estate is" £59, 19s., 10d., "and the Court hath Graunted her 40ll towards the bringing up of the Children which makes her prte of the prsonall estate" 199. "The Court hath alsoe Graunted that if the widdow shalbe in Nessesitie of more for bringing up of the Children; then shee shall have more; and that the Remainder of the Lands which is" 1198, 13s., 4d., "which being Devided into five prtes each fift prte is" 127, 14s., 8d., "and a fift pte of the prsonall estate is" 116, "and the son shall have a Double prte of all the estate both prsonall and Reall; and that the heire shall have libertie to pay all or any of his sisters theire portions; and keep theire prte of the Lands".

#### LATHAM—WASHBURN

BY THE EDITOR

In the History of Bridgewater, by Nahum Mitchell, published in 1840, it is stated, on page 222, that Hannah Latham, daughter of Robert Latham, by his wife Susanna Winslow<sup>3</sup> (Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>), married "Joseph Washburn Jr." The addition of the "Jr." was an error, as the Joseph who married Hannah Latham was the son of John and Elizabeth (Mitchell) Washburn, and the grandson of John Washburn; and there was no other Joseph Washburn, in Bridgewater, until the births of sons of that name to Joseph and Hannah (Latham) Washburn and to Joseph's brother John.

Mitchell also states, on page 323, that the Joseph Washburn who married Hannah Latham lived in Bridgewater, and that "It appears he was afterwards in Plymouth and Plympton by deeds he gave in 1707, 1714, and 1720, in which his father Latham is mentioned:"

A careful search of the records in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Deeds has failed to disclose a single record to indicate that Joseph Washburn, Sr., at any time lived in Plymoutn; and only two deeds, dated 1706/7 and 1714, were found, in which Joseph Washburn mentioned Robert Latham, his father-in-law.

There are other deeds on record, made by Joseph Washburn, Sr., in the year 1720, but they do not contain any reference to Robert Latham.

On 17 April, 1717, Joseph Washburn, blacksmith, of Bridgewater, sold his home in that place (to Isaac Lazell), his wife Hannah releasing her dower rights. [Plym. Co. Deeds, 12:153.]

### CHELLIST MARTINA

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On 14 June, 1720, Joseph Washburn, blacksmith, of Plympton, formerly of Bridgewater, confirmed the deed of 17 April, 1717, wife Hannah again releasing her dower rights. Both Joseph and Hannah acknowledged the deed, on 1 July, 1725. [Plym. Co. Deeds, 19:98.]

On 12 August, 1721, Joseph Washburn, blacksmith, of Plympton, wife Hannah releasing dower rights, conveyed land to son Jonathan Washburn of Bridgewater. [Plym. Co. Deeds, 15:204.]

Exhaustive abstracts of the deeds of 1706/7 and 1714, in which Robert Latham is mentioned, are here given.

### [JOSEPH WASHBURN TO SON JONATHAN-1706/7]

[Plym. Co. Deeds, 10:1:528] On 13 January, 1706/7, "Joseph Washburn of ye Town of Bridgewater . . . out of a tender Love and fatherly affection towards my natural Son Jonathan Washburn of ye Same Town . . . . Make over and Confirm unto the sd Jonathan Washburn . . . . a certain Tract or Parcell of Land . . . . in the Township of Bridgewater on the Easterly Side of Setucket River butting upon sd River and bounded on the Northerly Side by Whitmans Land and Running for breadth Southerly till it meets with Matfield River & so running Easterly upon a Strait Line to a white oak Stump which was an Ancient Bounds between Father Lathams Lot & Deacon Willis's Lot & from thence upon a Strait Line up to ye head of the Lots . . . . memorandm there is above omitted a Reserve which is The Use of all the Land between ye ash Swamp & the River during my Life time"

The deed was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Ebenezer Leach and Benjamin Leach. It was acknowledged, by the grantor, on 24 January, 1706/7, before Elihu Brett, Justice of the Peace, and was recorded 12 February, 1713, by Josiah Cotton, Register.

#### [JOSEPH WASHBURN, SR. TO SON JOSEPH-1714]

Deeds, 11:40] On 3 August, 1714, "Joseph Washborn Sen<sup>r</sup> of ye Town of Bridgwater . . . . for ye Love Good will & fatherly affection which I bear towards my Son Joseph Washborn of ye Same Town . . . . make over & Confirm unto & upon ye sd Joseph Washburn jur . . . . my whole Right . . . . in a Certain Tract of Land Lying within ye ye Township of Bridg-

The deed was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Edward Fobes and Thomas Hayward. It was acknowledged by Joseph Washburn, on the day of its date, before Josiah Edson, Justice of the Peace, and was recorded 9 November, 1714, by William Little, Register.

#### JACOB' COOKE'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

JACOB³ COOKE (Jacob², Francis¹) of Plymouth and Kingston, Mass., married Lydia Miller, 29 December, 1681, and had eight children, all of whom were recorded, at Plymouth, as "The Children of Jacob Cook and Lydia Cooke his Wife". The complete record of the births of these children was printed in our second volume, they were: William⁴, born 5 October, 1683; Lydia⁴, born 18 May, 1685; Rebecca⁴, born 19 November, 1688; Jacob⁴, born 16 June, 1691; Margaret⁴, born 3 November, 1695; Josiah⁴, born 14 May, 1699; John⁴ and Damaris⁴, twins, born 23 May, 1703.

Lydia (Miller) Cooke died at Kingston, I March, 1727/8, in her 67th year, and Jacob<sup>3</sup> Cooke, her husband, died at Kingston,

24 April, 1747, in his 95th year.

Jacob³ Cooke was almost seventy-five years old when Lydia died, and nothing has been found on the original records to indicate that he had a second wife. His will was made less than eight months after Lydia's death, and it mentions all of the children whose births are on the Plymouth records. No second wife and no other children are indicated in the will or in the probate proceedings.

Especial attention is called to the fact that Jacob<sup>3</sup> Cooke had only one wife, because of the erroneous statement in "The Genealogical Advertiser", Volume I, page 126, that he had a second wife, Phebe. This error, apparently, was the result of confusing

Jacob<sup>3</sup> Cooke and his son Jacob<sup>4</sup> Cooke.

### Lang Statuto Stocks

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Jacob Cooke, the son, married Phebe Hall, at Yarmouth, Mass., 3 April, 1716, nearly twelve years before the death of his mother, Lydia (Miller) Cooke.

Another son, John<sup>4</sup> Cooke, married Phebe Crosman, of Taunton, who survived him and became the second wife of

Samuel Kent, whom she also survived.

John and Phebe (Crosman) Cooke were ancestors of Mr. Frank E. Woodward, of Wellesley Hills, Mass., a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and this article

has been prepared at his expense.

Exhaustive abstracts of the will of Jacob<sup>3</sup>. Cooke (Jacob<sup>2</sup>, Francis<sup>1</sup>) and all other records, relating to the settlement of his estate, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, are here presented.

### [JACOB<sup>3</sup> COOKE'S WILL]

[Plym. Co. Prob., 10:419] "Jacob Cooke of Kingston . . . . yeoman" made his will 16 October, 1728. Bequests were as follows:

"Imprimis having Given to my Three Sons William Jacob and Josiah By Deed of Gift what I Designed Them as Their full parts and Portions of my Estate, I Give and Bequeath unto my Son John over and above what I Have already Given him By Deed of gift Which I Do Hereby Confirm, a Bed and Beding."

To "my Daughter Damaris one of my Best Beds With all The Furniture Belonging To it allso Two Cows or the Value of Them In money allso The Liberty To use and Improve one Room In my Dwelling House So long as She Shall Remain unmarried."

To "my Four Daughters Lydia Rebeckah margaret and Damaris Their Heirs and assigns forever To Be Equally Divided Between Them my lott of Land which I Bought of Joseph King lying Near agawam In the Township of Plimouth Together with all the Remainder of my moveable Estate after my Just Debts and Funerall Charges are first paid"

"I . . . . appoint my Son John Cooke Sole Executor of This

my last Will"

The witnesses were: Thomas Croade, John Washburne and Rachel Croade.

On 21 May, 1747, "Thomas Croade Esqr and John Washburne" made oath to the will, and it was probated.

[From original letter] "To Benjamin Samson of Kingston .... Gent Greeting Whereas Jacob Cooke late of Kingston . . . .

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The last to the same

yeoman Deceased" made his will, on 16 October, 1728, and "appointed his son John Cooke of sd Kingston yeoman Executor of said will, But it so hapned that the said John Cook dyed Before the said Jaco[b] Cooke the Testator administration is therefore hereby Committed un[to] the said Benjamin Samson". The letter was dated I June, 1747. [The letter was also recorded, 10:420.]

[From unrecorded bond] On I June, 1747, Benjamin Samson, gentleman, of Kingston, as administrator, with Charles Dyre and Abner Holmes, both mariners of Plymouth, as sureties, gave a bond of £500. The bond was signed by "Benj Samson", Abner Holmes and "Cha<sup>s</sup> Dyre", and witnessed by Edward Winslow

and Hannah Winslow.

[10:437] "An Inventory of the Estate of Mr Jacob Cooke late of Kingston Dec<sup>d</sup>" was taken, 13 June, 1747, in old tenor, by Samuel Foster, Joseph Mitchell and Robert Bradford. The total was £341, 3s. The real estate was: "a Lot of land near Agawam as by Information Supposed to be" £34.

The administrator and the three appraisers made oath to the

inventory, 14 July, 1747.

## THE WILL OF SAMUEL RICHMOND<sup>4</sup> OF TAUNTON, MASS.

BY THE EDITOR

Samuel Richmond<sup>4</sup> (Abigail<sup>3</sup> Rogers, John<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>) was born at Taunton, 23 September, 1668, and died in that place, between 11 June and 20 July, 1736. He married, first, Mehitable Andrews, daughter of Henry Andrews of Taunton. His second wife was the widow Elizabeth (King) Hall, who survived him.

[From original will] On 11 June, 1736, "Samuel Richmond of Taunton" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "wife Elizebth Richmond I Give one third of my moveable Estate and the third of the In Come of my Real Estate according to the Law of this provine as heir full Right of Dower In my s<sup>d</sup> Estate over and above what movables my s<sup>d</sup> wife brought with heir unto me"

"To my son Thomas Richmond . . . . one Cow namly my old Cow"

"To my son Silas Richmond . . . . my Gun and accuterments

theirto belongin"

"To my four sons namly Saml Richmond oliver Richmond Thomas Richmond and Silas Richmond (aughter\* my wivs thirds, and thomas Cow, and Silas Gun being ferst taken out) . . . . all my waring appeirll, and out dore movabls and farming utencals, and Stock to be Equaly Divided unto and amonge my s<sup>d</sup> four sons"

"To my three Daughters namly Hannah Booth Lidya Thomas, and mehitable horton I Give all my Indore myables and houshold Goods (Excepting what Is afore s<sup>d</sup> bequethed): to be Equaly Divided unto and amonge my s<sup>d</sup> 3 Daughrs or Shuch as Shall Leguly Represent them"

"To my three sons, namly Samuel Richmond Thomas Richmond and Silas Richmond.... all my Lands both In Taunton and middlebroh, or Else whar, that aughter\* all my Just Debts and charges being first payd (which I would have my Lands sold for and payd out of) and the Remainder to be Equaly Divided unto and amonge my sd three sons: but my son oliver not to have aney Shear In my Lands, by Reson I have Confirmed som Lands to him sd oliver before; which I allso hearby Retifye and Confeirm: and allso what Lands I have heartofore Given aney of my sons, or movabls to my Daughters I hear by Retifye and Confeirm"

"my sd son Thomas Richmond to be sole Exectr . . . . and Desiar that my Cozen Joseph Richmond woold be ading advising and assisting my sd Executor In all his Consarns, and that he act not with out his helpe and advise (if he sd Joseph will accept of ye trust put In him)"

The witnesses were Henry Caswell, Nathaniel Caswell and John Godfrey, all of whom made oath to the will on 20 July, 1736.

The will is endorsed "mr Saml Richmds will" [The will was also recorded, 8:375.]

<sup>\*</sup> After my wife's thirds, etc.

[From unrecorded certificate] On 30 June, 1736, "mr: John Mason, mr: Joseph Richmond & mr: John Godfrey" made oath, before Seth Williams, Justice of the Peace, that they would make a just appraisal of the estate.

[8:375] On 20 July, 1736, administration was granted to "mr Thomas Richmond Son and Sole Executor . . . . of his father

Samuel Richmond Late of Taunton . . . Deceased."

[From unrecorded account] An account of Thomas Richmond, executor, made in July, 1736, shows payments made to Justice Williams, John Godfrey, Ebenezer Smith, Joseph Richmond, "Jeams Williams", Benjamin Eliot, Dr. Ezra Dean, Dr. Thomas Macomber, John Smith, Jonathan Paddleford, John Andrews, Samuel Briggs, Henry Richmond, Henry Caswell, Dr. Ichabod Richmond, Seth Caswell. The account is not signed, and the endorsement on the back reads "Thomas Richmond accompt to be Drawn over"

[From original inventory] On 12 August, 1736, at Taunton, the inventory was taken by John Mason, Joseph Richmond and John Godfrey. The only real estate was "his homstid farme About 60. Acrs with the hous and barn their on" £300.

"Goods In ye hands of ye widdow at John Hall" were valued

at £25, 9s.

The total amount of the inventory was £428, 16s., 6d. Thomas Richmond, the executor, made oath to the inventory on 21 June, 1737. [The inventory was also recorded, 8:488.]


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



# ISAAC WRIGHT'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

ISAAC WRIGHT<sup>4</sup> (Adam<sup>3</sup>, Hester<sup>2</sup> Cooke, Francis<sup>1</sup>) of Plympton, Mass., was a son of Adam Wright<sup>3</sup> by his first wife, Sarah<sup>3</sup> Soule (John<sup>2</sup>, George<sup>1</sup>), and thus had two lines of Mayflower descent.

Isaac Wright<sup>4</sup> married Mary, the daughter of John and Susanna (Gray) Cole. Mary Wright died at Plympton, 20 July, 1759, in her 63d year. Isaac Wright made his will 2 July, 1760, and died at Plympton, 11 January, 1766, aged 80 years, "wanting 8 days". He was born, therefore, in January, 1685/6.

We here present an exhaustive abstract of all records, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of Isaac Wright's estate. There are no original papers,

relating to this estate, preserved in the probate files.

[Plym. Co. Prob., 19:345] "Isaac Wright of Plimton . . . . Yeoman" made his will on 2 July, 1760. Bequests were as follows:

To "son Joseph Wright . . . . the westerly end of the dwelling house wherein he now liveth in consideration for his labour with me after he was of age. Also the one half of all my other real estate (excepting the easterly end of my dwelling house,) wherein I dwell"

To "son Isaac Wright . . . . the easterly end of my dwelling house wherein I now dwell. Also the one half of all my other real estate to be equally divided between my son Joseph & him. Excepting the westerly end of my dwelling house which is above given to Joseph."

To "daughter Mary Thomson" £6, 13s., 4d., "to be paid by my Excr out of my personal estate. Besides what I have already

given her."

To "daughter Rachel Wright" L13, 6s., 8d., "to be pd by my

The witnesses were Benjamin Weston, Hannah Weston and Job Weston.

[19:346] On 7 April, 1766, the will was presented for probate by Joseph Wright, the executor, and allowed, on the oaths of Benjamin Weston and Job Weston, two of the witnesses, and

administration was granted to Joseph Wright.

[19:346] An inventory of the estate was taken on 4 April, 1766, by Gideon Bradford, Benjamin Weston and Jabez Newland. A "pew in Meetinghouse" was valued at £1, 6s., 8d.; "the homestead farm with the buildings & fence thereon, & Cedar swamp, & Iron Ore" £480. The total amount of the inventory was £544, 12s., 1d. Joseph Wright, the executor, and the three appraisers, made oath to the inventory, 7 April, 1766, before John Cushing, Judge of Probate.

In our January, 1919, issue we printed, at the expense of Rev. Rufus B. Tobey and Rev. Frederick B. Allen, exhaustive abstracts of the will and all probate records relating to the estate of Col. Silvester Richmond, of Little Compton and Dartmouth, Mass., who married, first, Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Rogers (John<sup>3-2</sup>, Thomas).

We now present, at the expense of the same gentlemen, exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Bristol County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of the estate of their ancestor, Col. Silvester Richmond<sup>5</sup> (Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Rogers, John<sup>3-2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>) of Little Compton and Dighton, Mass.

Col. Silvester Richmond<sup>5</sup> died 14 January, 1783, and his wife, Elizabeth (Talbut) Richmond died 23 June, 1772, and both are

buried at Dighton.

Esqr", with Thomas Baylies Richmond, gentleman, and William Paul, Jr., yeoman, as sureties, all of Dighton, gave a bond for £1000. The witnesses were Isaac Tubbs, and Benjamin Williams, Jr. The bond was endorsed "Col. Richmond's Bond Administration".

### THE WILL OF JOHN GRAY OF KINGSTON, MASS.

BY THE EDITOR

John Gray<sup>4</sup>, son of Edward Gray, of Plymouth, and his first wife, Mary Winslow<sup>3</sup> (Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>), was born at Plymouth, I October, 1661. He married Joanna Morton, 9 December, 1686, at Plymouth, by whom he had seven children: Edward, died young; Mary, died young; Anne, married John Tinkham; Desire, died young; Joanna, married Ebenezer Fuller; Samuel, married Patience Wadsworth; Mercy, married Jabez Fuller.

John Gray<sup>4</sup> made his will, 23 September, 1728, and died at Kingston, Mass., formerly a part of Plymouth, 29 May, 1732. His will was probated, at Marshfield, 21 July, 1732.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of the will and all other records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the

Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate.

These abstracts are printed at the expense of Mrs. Frederic A. Turner and her son, Mr. Frederic A. Turner, Jr., of Boston, members of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and descendants of John and Joanna (Morton) Gray, through the daughter Joanna Gray, who married Ebenezer Fuller.

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#### [JOHN GRAY'S WILL]

[From original will] On 23 September, 1728, "John Gray of

Kingston" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "wife Johannah Gray during her natural life the use Improvement & Income of all my Lands whatsoever which I have not already disposed of by deed of Gift with So much of my buildings thereon as she Shall have ocation to make use of for her Comfortable accomodation" also "my best Bed & furniture Suitable for it."

To "my Son Samuel Gray over and above what I have already given him by deed of Gift (which I do hereby Confirm to him) all my Lands meadows & buildings & all & singuler my real estate .... not heretofore disposed of by deed of Gift; To him the sd Samuel Gray . . . . after the decease of my wife Johannah Gray" also "all my wearing Clothes my Gun & Sword, a Silver spoon, a bed & Furniture, (which he hath already in possession) Together with what is due to me by bond from my Son in Law John Tincom Hereby ordering him to pay to my daughter Marcy the Sum of Thirty pounds in mony or bills of Credit. & further it is my will that my Said Son Samuel allow to my daughters Johanah Fuller & marcy Gray . . . . the Privilidge of Passing over the Land which I have given him to and from the Land which I have given them Respectively where it Shall be most Convenient through Gates or Barrs which privilidge I have given to my Said daughters by deed."

To "my abovesaid wife during her natural Life One quarter part of the Hay which Shall be Cutt by my Son Samuel on the Salt meadow & Sedge ground I have given him Lying on Smelt

River"

To "my daughter Marcy Gray over and above what I have already given her by Deed (which I do hereby Confirm) a Bed Bolster bedstead; a Suit of Curtains, Two pair of sheets a pair of Blankits Blankits Two Curtains Two Pillows & Curtain Rods; Also Two Cows a Chest of Draws Two Black Chairs, Six Common Chairs a pair of Tongs & fire slice, a Spit, a Transmel, a Small Iron kettle, an Iron Skillit & a Silver spoon."

"I give and bequeath all the Remainder of my personal Estate as followeth viz One Third part thereof to my afores<sup>d</sup> wife for ever One Third part thereof to be equally divided among my three daughters viz Anne Tincom Johanah Fuller & Marcy Gray . . . . and all the Remainder thereof . . . . to my Son Samuel Gray

LOW COLUMN

Together with my Pew below in the meeting house in Kingston. & . . . . my Pew in the Gallery in Said meeting house Shall be Improved by the Children of my three daughters viz Such of them as shall Live in this Town from Time to time"

"Son Samuel Gray" was appointed sole executor, and required to pay the debts and funeral charges out of the part of the estate

left to him.

The witnesses were Thomas Croade, David Sturtevant and Jonathan Sturtevant. Thomas Croade and David Sturtevant made oath to the will, on 4 July, 1732, and Jonathan Sturtevant on 21 July, 1732, all before Isaac Winslow, Judge of Probate.

The will was probated, at Marshfield, 21 July, 1732, and administration granted to "Samuell Gray the onely son of the sd deceased and sole Executor in the same Will named" [The will

and letter were also recorded, 6:191]

[From original warrant] On 4 July, 1732, "mr Samuell Foster mr Josepth Mitchell & mr Seth Chipman all of Kingston" were appointed to appraise the estate. [The warrant was also recorded, 6:215.]

The personal estate was valued at £211, 1s., 4d. Samuel Gray, the executor, and the three appraisers, made oath to the inventory, 8 August, 1732. [The inventory was also recorded, 6:215.]

[7:427] On 23 August, 1738, "We Joanna Gray (Widow of mr John Gray late of Kingston . . . . Deceasd) Ebenezer Fuller & Joanna Fuller his Wife, Jabez Fuller & Mercy Fuller his Wife all of Kingston . . . . The sd Joanna & Mercy Fuller being also Daughters of ye sd John Gray deceasd . . . . Discharge & acquit Samuel Gray of Kingston afores<sup>d</sup> only Son of the s<sup>d</sup> John Gray, & sole Executor to his last Will & Testament of all Dues Claims or Demands whatsoever on account of any Legacies, Bequests Houshold Stuff or Goods whatsoever (Saving ye Priviledges & Improvemts of Land or Buildings granted to ye sd Widow & ye sd two Daughters in & by ye sd Last Will . . . . Hereby acknowledging .... the Receipt of ye personal Estate granted Severally to us in ye sd Will". The witnesses were John Cole, Jr., and Rebecca Drew. The discharge was signed by Joanna Gray (by a mark), Ebenezer Fuller, Joanna Fuller (by a mark), Jabez Fuller and Mercy Fuller, and was acknowledged by all, on the day of its date, before Josiah Cotton, Justice of the Peace.

FROM THE SECRETARY'S TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

#### THE WILLS OF DAVID STANDISH AND HIS WIDOW HANNAH

BY THE EDITOR

David Standish (Thomas3, Alexander2, Myles1) married Hannah Magoon<sup>5</sup> (Rachel<sup>4</sup> Soule, Auron<sup>3</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, George<sup>1</sup>). His will was dated at Pembroke, Mass., 26 October, 1793; but when it was probated, 6 July, 1795, he was called "late of Hanover". He died 4 June, 1795, in his 70th year, and was buried in the cemetery at Centre Hanover, Mass.

Hannah (Magoon) Standish made her will 19 October, 1801. and called herself "of Hanover". She died 23 August, 1803, in

her 75th year, and was buried at Centre Hanover.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original papers on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of the estates of David<sup>4</sup> Standish and his widow Hannah.

This article has been prepared at the expense of Myles Standish, M.D., of Boston, who is a descendant of David<sup>4</sup> and Hannah (Magoon) Standish, through their son Lemuel, and is a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

The proper reference, to the record or the original in the files,

is noted with each of the following abstracts.

#### [THE WILL OF DAVID STANDISH]

[From original will] "Pembroke Oct" 26th 1793 In this my last Will . . . . I David Standish, give & bequeathe" as follows:

To "Wife Hannah Standish all my household furnature to-

gether with one Cow"

To "my four Daughters, Viz, Olive Josselyn, Hannah Standish, Priscilla Josselyn, & Mary Standish five Shillings Each"

To "my Son Lemuel Standish" £8. To "my son James Standish" £9.

To "my Son David Standish the whole of my real & personal Estate, of whatever nature & wherever to be found, Except, whatever has been given as above expresd"

"I appoind my Son David Standish Sole Eecutor"

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The witnesses were Andrew Bradford, Cynthia Bradford and Polley Bradford. [The will was also recorded, 35:285.]

[From original probate] On 6 July, 1795, the will of "David Standish late of Hanover . . . . yeoman deceased" was presented for probate by David Standish, the executor, and allowed, on the oaths of Andrew Bradford and Cynthia Bradford, two of the witnesses, and administration was granted to David Standish. [The letter was also recorded, 35:285.]

[From original bond] On 6 July, 1795, "David Standish of Hanover yeoman", as executor, with "Andrew Bradford of Pembroke Gentleman, & Hezekiah Ripley of Kingston Gentleman", as sureties, gave a bond for £200. The witnesses were John Adams, Jr., and Jonathan Copeland, Jr. [The bond was also re-

corded, 35:286.]

#### [THE WILL OF WIDOW HANNAH STANDISH]

[From original will] On 19 October, 1801, "Hannah Standish of Hanover . . . . widow" made her will. Bequests were as follows:

To "daughters, Hannah Standish, and Polly Standish, equally, all my estate real, or personal, wherever it may be found: subject however, to the following conditions. (viz) That they the said Hannah and Polly, pay to my two sons Lemuel Standish and James Standish, thirty dollars to each, to be paid within three years of my decease without interest. And further, that they the said Hannah and Polly, pay to my daughter Olive Josselyn, wife of Stockbridge Josselyn, one dollar, within three months after my decease, and that they shall allow my said daughter Olive, to use and improve her dwelling house on the land on which it now stands, with a priviledge of laying firewood at the door of said house, so long as she the said Olive, shall live separate from her husband, and shall improve said house herself; but she shall not be permitted to put any other family in said house, where it now stands, but she, the said Olive shall have liberty to remove, and dispose of, said house whenever she pleases.

"And that they the said Hannah and Polly, pay to Priscilla Josselyn, my daughter, the wife of Seth Josselyn sixty dollars

within three years after my decease.

"And that they the said Hannah and Polly pay my son David Standish one dollar, if by him demanded in three months after my decease."

"my said daughters Hannah and Polly" were appointed joint

executors.

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The witnesses were Reuben Curtis, Consider Curtis and Wil-

liam Torrey. [The will also recorded, 38:391.]

[From original letter] On 5 September, 1803, the will was presented for probate by Hannah Standish and Polly Standish, the executrixes, and was allowed, on the oaths of Consider Curtis and William Torrey, two of the witnesses. [The letter also re-

corded, 38:392.]

[From original bond] On 5 September, 1803, Hannah Standish and Polly Standish, spinsters, both of Hanover, as executrixes, with William Torrey, gentleman, of Pembroke, and Consider Curtis of Hanover, yeoman, as sureties, gave a bond for \$1000. The witnesses were Benjamin Whitman and Isaac Lothrop. [The bond was also recorded, 38:393.]

#### CAPT. ICHABOD SOUTHWORTH'S ESTATE AND THE WILL OF HIS WIDOW ESTHER

BY THE EDITOR

CAPT. ICHABOD SOUTHWORTH (Desire Gray4, Mary Winslow8, Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>) was born at Plymouth,\* "Aboute the midle of march 1678", and died at Middleborough, Mass., 20 September, 1757. He married Esther Hodges, daughter of Henry Hodges,† of Taunton, and had six children, all recorded at Middleborough: Desire, born 23 November, 1707; Priscilla, born 11 February, 1709/10; Nathaniel, born 23 January, 1711/12, died 23 August, 1731; Mary, born 30 November, 1713; Abigail, born 6 July, 1716; William, born 30 November, 1719, died 2 April, 1750. [Mayflower Descendant, 3:84 and 8:28, also 15:7.]

Desire Southworth married Samuel Shaw.

Priscilla Southworth<sup>6</sup> married Nathaniel Macomber.

Nathaniel Southworth6 died 23 August, 1731, in his twentieth year, as shown by his gravestone record.

Mary Southworth married Rowland Hammond.

Abigail Southwortho did not die unmarried, as stated in the Southworth Genealogy, page 87. She married Benjamin Sawdey, of Tiverton, R. I., as shown by her mother's will.

William Southworth married Bathsheba Smith, 21 December,

1749, and died 2 April, 1750.

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Capt. Ichabod Southworth, of Middleborough, died intestate and his estate was settled by the Plymouth County Probate Court,

as Middleborough is in that county.

Widow "Esther Southerd" was called "of Taunton" in her will, and in the letter of administration she was called "Esther Southward late of Taunton". Her will, therefore, was proved by the Bristol County, Mass., Probate Court, and the original is at Taunton.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original papers in the files, of the Plymouth and Bristol County Registries of Probate, relating to the settlements of the two estates.

#### [CAPT. ICHABOD SOUTHWORTH'S ESTATE]

[Plym. Co. Prob. Rcds., 14:460] On 29 September, 1757, Rowland Hammond and Samuel Shaw, both yeomen, of Plympton, were appointed administrators on the estate of "Ichabod Southworth late of Middleborough . . . . Gent deced"

[From unrecorded bond] On 29 September, 1757, Rowland Hammond and Samuel Shaw, as administrators, with George Barrow, Jr., and Jonathan Tillson, as sureties, all being yeomen, of Plympton, gave a bond of £2000. The witnesses were Peleg

Ford and John Lothrop.

[15:255] On 17 October, 1757, Joseph Tinkham, Thomas Nelson and Jacob Bennett took an inventory of the Estate of "Capt Ichabod Southworth late of Midleborough Deceasd". The total was £752, 8s., 1od. The real estate was: "his home farme with buldings & fences on the Same Now Standing" £466, 14s.; "his out Lot of lands & Cedar Swamp" £134, 13s.

The three appraisers made oath to the inventory, at Middle-borough, 11 September, 1758, and the two administrators made

oath to it, on 26 April, 1759.

[15:387] On 9 November, 1759, "Rowland Hammond of Plimton & Samuel Shaw of Middlebro admrs" on the estate of

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"Capt Ichabod Southworth" presented an account, which was allowed by the probate court. Payments had been made to: Peter Oliver, Esq.; Capt. Nathaniel Smith; Dr. Ichabod Richmond; James Winslow; Dr. Polycarpus Loring; Dr. Micah Pratt, Jr.; Dr. "Wm Makinsy"; Dr. William Thomas; Jonathan Tillson; Dr. Samuel Clark; Barnabas Shurtleff, Esq.; David Miller; William Perkins; Robert Richmond; Dr. Lazarus Lebaron; Elias Miller; "Jo Harris"; Nathaniel Samson; Edward Washburn; Shadrach Peirce; Dr. David Jones; Capt. Ebenezer Sprout; Widow Catharine Lunt; William Reed; Nathaniel Southworth; Dr. White; Thomas Nelson; Uriah Samson; "Jo Bates"; Robert Sprout; Samuel Shaw, Jr.; Dr. Harlow; George Hammond.

To "my Grand Son Ichabod maccomber Son of Decon Nath" maccomber one Cow being the Same Cow that I brought with me when I Came to Live with my Son in Law Nath! maccomber"

To "my Son In Law Nath" maccomber all and Everything belonging to me Exclusive of what I have in this my Last will & Testament Given as afore Said to my Daughter Sawdey and Grandson Ichabod maccomber: that is to Say one ox Iron Dogs and a note of hand for four pound and Every thing Now belonging to me in an Inventory Now in s<sup>d</sup> Nath" maccombers Keeping Except as afore Said: and the reson I Doth not Give my Daughter mary Hammond wife of Rowland Hammond\* and my Daughter Desier Shaw wife of Sam! Shaw Nothing in this my Last Will is Because I have allredy Given them what I Desired to Do:"

The will was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Benjamin

Williams, Bethiah Godfrey and George Godfrey.

"Proved July 1st 1760"\*

The will was probated "July ye 1st 1760" on the oaths of Benjamin Williams and George Godfrey, but the date was recorded as "July ye 2d". [The will was also recorded, 17:57.]

[From original letter] On I July, 1760, the will of "Esther Southward late of Taunton" was approved and administration granted to Nathaniel Macomber, sole executor. [The letter was

recorded, 17:58.]

#### RICHARD<sup>8</sup> WARREN'S WIFE AND CHILDREN

BY THE EDITOR

RICHARD<sup>3</sup> WARREN (Nathaniel<sup>2</sup>, Richard<sup>1</sup>) lived at Plymouth, and later at Middleborough; but his death, on 23 January, 1696/7, was entered on the Plymouth town records, not at Middleborough, and he probably died at Plymouth. [Mayflower Descendant, 16: 63.]

He married Sarah ——, whose maiden name is unknown. She survived her husband, and was married, at Barnstable, on 18 September, 1712, to Thomas Ewer. [Mayflower Descendant,

14:226.]

The only known birth records of Richard<sup>3</sup> Warren's children are found in the Plymouth Colony "Marriages Births and Burials", as follows:

[p. 76] "James Warren the son of Richard Warren was Borne

the 13th of January Anno:1679"

[p. 81] "James the son of Richard Warren was born in January 1682

"Samuell Warren the son of Richard Warren was borne the

seaventh of March 1683"

In the first volume of the Plymouth Town Records of births, etc., we find, on page 204: "James Warren ye Son of Richard warren Deceased Deceased on the 25<sup>th</sup> of Desember 1709 being in the 30<sup>th</sup> year of his age" [Mayflower Descendant, 16:6.4.]

STREAMS WAXEDON THE COLUMN

As the Plymouth Colony records were, with rare exceptions, in Old Style dating, we must assume, in the absence of evidence to the contrary, that the three birth records are all in Old Style. Transposing to New Style dating we have: James Warren born 23 January, 1680; James Warren born in January, 1683; Samuel Warren born 17 March, 1683.

It is evident that the second and third records cannot both be correct, and the indefiniteness of the record "in January 1682" (or 1683, New Style) seems to indicate that the birth date of

James is the erroneous one.

The death record of James<sup>4</sup> Warren shows that when he died he was supposed to be "in the 30<sup>th</sup> year of his age", which corresponds with the birth date of 13 January, 1679 (or 23 January, 1680, in New Style); and the deed here printed, by which, on 4 March, 1701 (1702, in New Style), James<sup>4</sup> Warren sold his rights in his father's real estate, seems to indicate that hewas of age when the sale was made. If he had been born in January, 1682 (1683, New Style), he would not have been of age until January, 1703/4, nearly two years after the date of the deed.

It seems probable, therefore, that there was only one son named James, that the correct date of his birth was 13 January, 1679, Old Style, and that the second record of a son James was merely an error in recording the eldest son a second time, after the birth

of Samuel.

James<sup>4</sup> Warren appears to have died unmarried. His inventory was taken 4 March, 1709, and his uncle James<sup>3</sup> Warren, Esq., of Plymouth, was appointed administrator of his estate, on 10\* March, 1709/10.

Other children of Richard<sup>3</sup> Warren, as shown by deeds recorded at Plymouth, were: Hope, Anne, John and Joanna, but

their birth records have not been found.

Five children of Richard<sup>3</sup> Warren married, as follows:

Samuel<sup>4</sup> Warren married Eleanor<sup>4</sup> Billington (Isaac<sup>3</sup>, Francis<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>1</sup>), on 26 January, 1703/4, at Middleborough.

Hope4 Warren married David Torrey, on 12 June, 1710, at

Scituate, both being called of Scituate.

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Joanna<sup>4</sup> Warren married Samuel Bumpas, on 1 August, 1717, at Barnstable.

These six marriage records have all been printed in the literal transcripts of Barnstable, Middleborough, Plymouth and Scituate Vital Records, in our second, eighth, ninth, thirteenth and fourteenth volumes.

The deed which proves that Joanna the wife of Samuel Bumpas of Barnstable was a daughter of Richard<sup>3</sup> Warren was

printed on page 256 of our fourteenth volume.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of the estates of Richard³ Warren and his son James⁴ Warren, and exhaustive abstracts of the three deeds which prove that John Warren of Scituate, Hope (Warren) Torrey of Scituate and Anne (Warren) May of Plymouth were children of Richard³ Warren.

These abstracts are printed at the expense of Mrs. Charles W. Pursell of Boise, Ida., a descendant of Richard<sup>3</sup> Warren, through his son Samuel, and a member of the Massachusetts

Society of Mayflower Descendants.

The proper reference, to the record, or to the original document in the files, is noted with each of the following abstracts.

#### [RICHARD<sup>3</sup> WARREN'S ESTATE]

[From original inventory] On 19 February, 1696/7, John Bennet, Sr., and John "Howard",\* of Middleborough, took the inventory. The real estate was: "Fiftie acres of land and the houseing and orchard on it" £30. The total was £40, 5s., 6d., and "the bed is left unprized". Sarah Warren, administratrix, made oath to the inventory, at Plymouth, 17 March, 1696/7, before William Bradford, Judge of Probate. [The inventory was also recorded, 1:259½.]

[Plym. Co. Prob., 1:259] On 10 March, 1696/7, "Sarah Warren Relict and Widdow of Richard Warren late of Middleborough . . . . deceased Intestate" was appointed administratrix on her

husband's estate, by William Bradford, Judge of Probate.

[From unrecorded bond] On 10 March, 1696/7, Sarah Warren, as administratrix, with John Hayward as surety, both of Middleborough, gave a bond for £80. Both signed by marks. The witnesses were John Wadsworth and Joseph Ford.

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#### [JAMES WARREN TO SAMUEL WARREN]

[Plym. Co. Deeds, 9:271] On 4 March, 1701, "Annoq . . . . Gulielmi 3<sup>tii</sup> 12", "James Warren of Plym[th] . . . . heir of Richard Warren deceased late of Middleboro", for £4, sold to "Samuel Warren of Middleboro . . . . my whole right . . . in the Lands of Richard Warren aforsd deceased in the Township of Middleboro aforsd as well the house lott on weh he lived, lying & being In Pachaoge Neck, as all other out lands divided & undivided, that did formerly belonge to Richard Warren deceased & now falling to me Sd James Warren by vertue of heirship"

The deed was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Samuel Eygheon and Samuel Charde. It was acknowledged, 22 January,

1705, and was recorded, 27 March, 1712.

#### [JAMES WARREN'S ESTATE]

[Plym. Co. Prob. From original inventory] On 4 March, 1709, Benjamin Warren and Benajah Pratt took an "Envotary of the small Estat of James Warren late of Plimoth desesed". Payments had been made to: James Barnebe; "Mr John Mordow"; Dr. Thomas Little; John Clark; William Green; William Harlow; James Warren; Benajah Pratt; Joseph Morton; Manasseh Morton; Eleazar Donham; Jabez Donham; Benjamin Warren; Elder Thomas Faunce. The total payments amounted to £19, 2s., 7d, and the balance of 8s., 9d. was "allowed the Adminstrator for his servise". [The account was also recorded, 3:71.]

[Plym. Co. Deeds, 10:2:258] On 7 April, 1711, "John Warren of the Town of Situate . . . . Son of Richard Warren Deceased of Middleborough", for £2, sold to "Samuel Warren of the Town

The deed was witnessed by John Bennett, Sr., Jonathan Morss and Samuel Bennett. It was acknowledged, by John Warren, at Scituate, 12 December, 1712, and was recorded, 2 April, 1714.

## [DAVID AND HOPE TORREY TO SAMUEL WARREN]

[Plym. Co. Deeds, 10:2:261] On 22 June, 1711, "David Torrey and Hope Torrey his Wife of the Town of Situate" for £2, sold to "Sam! Warren of [p. 262] of the Town of Middleborough . . . . All our Right . . . . of & into all the Lands both Uplands Meadows & Swamps weh did formerly Belong unto our Hond Father Richard Warren Deceased & weh He dyed Seized of lying & being within the Township of Middleborough aforesd"

The deed was signed by David Torrey and Hope Torrey, the latter making a mark. The witnesses were John Warren and Joseph Torrey.

David and Hope Torrey acknowledged the deed, at Scituate, 4 December, 1712, and it was recorded 2 April, 1714.

## [JOHN AND ANNE MAY TO SAMUEL WARREN]

[Plym. Co. Deeds, 11:240] On 17 November, 1714, "John May & Anne May his Wife of the Town of Plymouth" for £8, sold to "Samuel Warren of the Town of middleborough . . . . All our Right Title & Intrest of & into all ye Lands both Uplands meadows & Swamps which did formerly Belong unto our Honoured Father Richard Warren Deceased and which he dyed Seized of lying & being within ye Township of middleborough aforesd"

The deed was signed by John May and Anne May. The witnesses were Susanna Cornish (by a mark) and Abigail Cornish.

John and Anne May acknowledged the deed, 29 March, 1716, and it was recorded the same day.

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## THE WILL OF ABRAHAM GUSHEE OF RAYNHAM AND HIS SON ABRAHAM'S ESTATE

ABRAHAM GUSHEE\* married Hannah Staple, daughter of Deacon Seth Staple of Taunton, Mass., by his wife Hannah<sup>4</sup> Standish (Ebenezer3, Alexander2, Myles1). He settled in Raynham, Mass., and there made his will, 5 April, 1782, and it was probated

2 September, 1783.

Abraham Gushee, Jr., of Raynham, son of Abraham and Hannah (Standish) Gushee, married Sylvia Fobes, and died before his father, leaving one son, Almond; and a posthumous son was named Abraham. These two sons, Almond and Abraham, were mentioned in the will of their grandfather, Abraham Gushee, Sr.

On 20 November, 1775, the widow Sylvia Gushee was appointed administratrix of her deceased husband's intestate estate, and guardian of her two sons. In 1784 she was married again, to Eleazer Clap, of Norton, Mass., and a short time before this marriage she petitioned the probate court to appoint Lieut. Solomon Snow, of Raynham, as guardian of her two sons.

[From unrecorded petition] On 2 July, 1784, "Silvea Gushe", "Guardian to Almond & Abraham Gushee the Children of Abraham Gushee junr late of Raynham . . . . [From unrecorded bond] On 6 July, 1784, Solomon Snow, of Raynham, gentleman, as guardian of Almond and Abraham Gushee, with Josiah Fobes and James Leach, both of Bridgewater, yeomen, as sureties, gave a bond for £1000. The witnesses were William Baylies and Joshua Wilbore.

## [THE WILL OF ABRAHAM GUSHEE, SR.]

[From original will] "Abraham Gushee of Raynham", Mass.,

made his will 5 April, 1782. Bequests were as follows.

To "wife Hannah The Improvment of Such a part In my Dwelling House as She Shall find Needfull & also ye Improvment of one third part of my Lands as Long as She Remains my widow. & likwise The Use of Two of my best Cows ye Same period"

Mercy Deceas'd I Give The Sum of Ten Shillings"

"To my Grandson Seth Gushee ye Son of Seth Gushee Deceased I Give & bequeath Twenty acres of Land lying on ye westerly Side of my Homstead bounded partly by the Bay Road thence Runing Northerly by ye Road that Leads to Titicut Swamp and So home to my most northerly bounds by Sd Road untill it Contains ye Twenty acres . and also a Yoak of oxen & a Cow when he Comes of age . & if ye Said Grandson Seth Gushee Should be Taken away by Death before he Comes of age ye Land above mention'd Is to be the Estate of my Two Sons Viz. "I Do Constitute . . . . wife Hannah Gushee Sole Executrix" The will was signed "Abraham gushe" The witnesses were Timothy Jones, Israel Washburn and Abigail Jones.

The state of the s The will was probated 2 September, 1783, at Taunton, on the testimony of Timothy Jones and Israel Washburn, and administration granted "unto his widow Hannah Gushee" [The will was also recorded, 27:528.]

[From unrecorded bond] On 2 September, 1783, "Hannah Gushee Widow" as executrix, with "Timothy Jones Yeoman, Elijah Gushee Yeoman" as sureties, all of Raynham, gave a bond of £1000.

THOMAS GRAY, son of Edward Gray of Plymouth (by his second wife, Dorothy Lettice), married, first, Anna Little<sup>4</sup> (*Ephraim*<sup>3</sup>, *Anna*<sup>2</sup> *Warren*, *Richard*<sup>1</sup>) of Marshfield, who was the mother of all his children. He married, second, Phebe, the widow of Nathaniel<sup>3</sup> Warren (*Nathaniel*<sup>2</sup>, *Richard*<sup>1</sup>) of Plymouth. Phebe survived her second husband also.

Thomas Gray settled in Little Compton, then in Massachusetts, but now in Rhode Island, and had five children recorded there: Thomas Gray<sup>5</sup>, who died unmarried; Edward Gray<sup>5</sup>, who married Elizabeth Pabodie<sup>4</sup> (William<sup>3</sup>, Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Alden, John<sup>1</sup>); Anna Gray<sup>5</sup>, who married William Richmond<sup>5</sup> (Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Rogers, John<sup>3-2</sup>, Thomas<sup>1</sup>); Rebecca Gray<sup>5</sup>, who married John Pabodie<sup>4</sup> (William<sup>3</sup>, Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Alden, John<sup>1</sup>); Mary Gray<sup>5</sup>, died young.

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To "Wife Pheby Gray my great lucking glace: and my great brass cittell: my new bible: and a plate cup: two silver spuns a warming pan: a brass scimer, and a brass candell box, and my negrow maide called pegg: and the choice of two fether beads with bolsters and pillows and the choice of one set of curtens for one of the beads; with bedsteeds to both of them; and one halfe of the sheets in the house; and one halfe of all the housall stuff that I shall not in this my will other ways dispose of: and also two ceverleds and fouer blankets for the two a fore said beds: or if she see cause she may have a rudg and one Ceverled . . . . and my will further is that my wife shall have the great rume and bed rume and chese rume with ye seller under the great rume in that house called woodworths house during her widdow hud: and also that my executors hereafter mentined shall finde and provide for her . . . . so long as she shall remain my widdow ten cord of wood a year, and ten bushell of Indgan corn, and fouer bushells of messling wheat and barly: Eight score wait of porke, and as much beaf yearly, and twenty five pound of wooll, and ten pound of flax: and to keep her two cows winter and sumer during her widdowhud she to take her choice of all my cows: which two cows I give to her to dispose of as she shall see cause and also I give her my new garden with what is in it during her widdow hud and . . . . my Executors shall pay her eight pound a year: year by year so long as she shall remain my widdow: to be paid in money"

To "Son Thomas Gray whom I likewise Constitute . . . . one of my Executors: my now dwelling houses and that fifty acer lott the houses Stands on with all the buldings and fences upon the same and also that peice of meddow that lyeth to the west of the high way, commonly caled the orched meddow, and contains a bout five or six acers: and also one halfe of one fifty acer lot

caled peckcoms lott:"

To "Son Edward Gray whome I Likewise Constitute.... one of my Executors: that dwelling house he now liveth in and That fifty acer lott the house standeth upon, and all the buldings & fences upon the same and also my fifty acer lott that lyeth to the west of the orched meddow: and so runs down to the sea or sound: and lyeth betwene the lands of John baily and Thomas burggs:"

To "daughter Anna Richmond with what I have allready given her my Molattow garle caled almey . . . . also one gold ring and

one silver Spune and one bibell worth twenty Shilings:"

To "daughter Rebeccah Gray two fether beds with the furniture belonging to them: she to have the next choice of the beads after her mother hath taken hers: and the other halfe of ye housell stuf, except what I shall further dispose of: and one gold ring, one silver spune, and a bible worth twenty shilings: and also fifty pounds in mony to be paid her by my Executors when She combs to the adge of twenty fouer years: and also three cows to be deliverd her after my decease"

"my two Sons Thomas and Edward gray shall each of them have a featherbead with furniture to them and that Thomas gray shall have my clock: and my gun a silver spune and a gold ring: and my negro woman caled sarah with the bead she lodgeth on and the bedding belonging to it and my Melattow boy caled Sollomon with the bead and bedding he lodgith on and also five

Cowes"

"my son Edward Gray shall furthe have my book caled Josephus a gold ring and silver spone and my negro man caled will with his bead and beading that he lodgeth on: only he shall be obliged to let him have one day in every month in ye year to him selfe during his life: and my melattow boy caled Jefery and also them five cows that he hath now in his one possisson:"

"my three grandchildren viz Barzeller Richmond Mary Gray and Anstes gray shall have each of them one cow after my de-

cease"

"my executors shall give to my daughter Rebeccah a very good Sute of apparrell for all parts of her body to be deliverd to her when demanded by her after my decease: and that they shall not charge her any thing for house rume or dyate but shall

give it her freely untell she can be beter provided for"

"my three eighten acer lots in soconet neck: lyeng betwene the land of Thomas baily, and wards lott, with the salt marsh at the east end of them: and also my peace of upland meddow lyeng at the east of Thomas bailys land: and the beach with the salt meddow att the east end of ye sd upland: and all my broken marshes and sedge flats home to the first great krick: and also one quarter of the fift twenty four acer lott: and three eights of the sixt twenty four acer lot: and one quarter of the fourteen twenty four acer lott: and three eights in the ninth fifteen acer lot: and three eights in the twenty sixt lot in that fifty acer lott mr Joseph Church thru up for a high way: and all my Lands in Tiverton: and two house lots lying in plymouth towne: and all the rest of my muefabell estate with my farming Tackling (except three sheep and three lambs which I give to my kinsman

-0 - 10 to 1 the same of the sa Nathaneil Gibes son to warren gibs to be deliverd him after my decease) all the above said lands and mufabell estate I give to my two sons Thomas Gray & Edward Gray to be eaquelly devided between them"

"my son Thomas shall keep that part of ye hous in repare that I have given my wife: and if she shall se cause to leave it in her widdow hud that he shall pay her so much a year for it as shall be Judged by two Indefrent men: and also that my executors shall suply her with a gentell beast to ride on whensoever that she shall have a causion to go on any busness: and also give her a pare of wosted coms:"

The witnesses were John Palmer, William Simons and Nathaniel Searls. "Captt" John Palmer and "mr" Nathaniel Searls made oath to the will of "Captt" Thomas Gray, 23 November, 1721.

The will is endorsed "Capt Grays will", also "Capt Thomas Grays will"

[From original codicil] On 21 October, 1721, a codicil was added, ordering "that my Executors do provide for and alow unto my Beloved Wife Pheby Gray one Barrell of sider and ten gallons of Melassus a year . . . . So long as She Shall remain my widdow my son Thomas gray to provid the sider and my son Edward Gray to provide the Melassus yearly". The witnesses were Silvester Richmond, Jonathan Davenport, Jr., and Nathaniel Searls. Jonathan Davenport, Jr., and Nathaniel Searls made oath to the codicil, 23 November, 1721. [The will and codicil were also recorded, 4:19.]

[3:732] On 23 November, 1721, "The will of Capt Thomas Grey Late of Little Compton . . . . bearing Date ye" 25 September, 1721, was probated, and administration granted to Thomas Gray and Edward Gray, the executors named therein.

[From unrecorded bond] On 23 November, 1721, Thomas Gray and Edward Gray of Little Compton, yeomen, as executors, with John Palmer and George Peirce of Little Compton, yeomen, as sureties, gave bond for £1000. George Peirce signed by a mark. The witnesses were Nathaniel Searls and Edward Richmond, Ir.

[From original inventory] An inventory of the estate of "Capt Thos Gray" was taken 7 November, 1721, by Thomas Church, William Pabodie and John Wood. The real estate was: "the Dwelling houses barne & 50 Acres of Land where on thay stand" £800; "the Dwelling house & barne where Edward Gray his son Lives & 50. Acres of Land whereon they stand" £800;

 "the 50. Acres of Land on the wist side the way" \$\mathcal{L}\_{500}\$; "the half of 50. Have by these pr[e]sents . . . . Released and utterly Quitte Claime unto the sd Thomas Gray and Edwd Gray . . . . all my estate claime Right Dower or Intrest of Thirds . . . . or Remaineing Estate Either Real or personnal!"

The release was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Nathaniel Searls and John Palmer. It was acknowledged 23 November, 1721, before Nathaniel Paine, Judge of Probate.

[From original account] On 20 April, 1728, the account of "Edward Gray ye only Surviveing Executor" was allowed. Payments had been made to "mr Varnon for Rings" £6; "Docter Norbert Vegneron" £15; William Richmond; Samuel Crandel; "John Peabody as & will" £50; Thomas Brownel; Thomas Burgis; Samuel Wilbour; Deborah Bennit; "the Trustees for Littlecompton"; William Simmons; Jonas Land; William Bailey; Robert Dennis; Job Almey; Aaron Davis; Edward Gray; Elizabeth Head. [The account also recorded, 6:139.]

## DEACON JOHN WADSWORTH'S ESTATE

BY THE EDITOR

John Wadsworth of Duxbury, son of John and Abigail (Andrews) Wadsworth, was born in that town, 12 March, 1671/2, and died there, 3 May, 1750. He married, first, on 25 January, 1704/5, at Duxbury, Mercy Wiswall\* (*Priscilla Pabodie*³, *Elizabeth*² Alden, John¹), who was born at Duxbury, 4 October, 1680, and died there, 12 November, 1716.

John and Mercy Wadsworth had five children: John, Uriah,

Dorothy, Ichabod and Peleg.

John Wadsworth married, second, at Boston, on 4 April, 1718, widow Mary Verdie, who died at Duxbury, 22 July, 1742, aged 58 years.

John and Mary Wadsworth had one child, a daughter Mary.

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John Wadsworth was called "Deacon" in the town record of his death, and in the probate records.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry

of Probate, relating to the settlement of his estate.

These abstracts have been made, and are printed, at the expense of a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, who has requested us not to print her name. She is a descendant of Deacon John Wadsworth and his wife Mercy Wiswall, through their son Peleg.

## [DEACON JOHN WADSWORTH'S ESTATE]

[11:422] On 7 May, 1750, "John Wadsworth Practitioner of Physick & Peleg Wadsworth Coaster both of Duxboro" were appointed administrators on the estate of "yor Father John Wadsworth late of Duxboro.... yeoman Deceased"

[From unrecorded original] On 7 May, 1750, "John Wadsworth Practitioner of Physick" and "Peleg Wadsworth Coaster", as administrators, with "Joshua Soule & Samuel Seabury Yeomen", as sureties, all four being of Duxbury, gave a bond of £500. The witnesses were Edward Winslow and Robert Samson.

[12:66] On 4 June, 1750, the inventory of "Doon John Wadsworth Late of Duxborough" was taken by Samuel Seabury, George Partridge and Jonathan Peterson. The real estate was: "ye Dwelling house and ye Lot on Which it Stands" £186, 138, 4d.; "a Comon Lot Northeast from ye hous Lot" £73, 6s., 8d.; "Seder Swamp Caled bordman Swamp" £21, 6s., 8d.; "Ceader Swamp Near philip Chandlor" £9, 6s., 8d.; "a Small peace of Wodland near ye house" £14; "a Lot of Land Near Phillip Chandlers" £40; "a peace of wood Land Near miles Samsons" £6, 13s., 4d.; "a Shair In Spragues Swamp" £1, 4s.; "Ninteen acres of Ceder Swamp in ye grate Ceador Swomp" £20, 5s., 4d.; "fourteen acres of Cedor Swamp Lying in Ditto" £14, 18s., 8d.; "two forty acres Lots of Land Lying in pembrook" £50, 13s., 4d.; "the hom place Whair Doct Wadsworth Lived on" £40; "a Lot of Land Given to Ichabod: wadsworth Lyg Near phillip Chandlers" £23, 10s.

The administrators and the appraisers made oath to the inventory, 4 June, 1750.

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[13:275] On 3 May, 1754, "John Wadsworth, Uriah Wadsworth, Ichabod Wadsworth, Peleg Wadsworth, and Mary Wadsworth, all of Duxborough . . . . Yeomen . . . all of us being the heirs and Legall Representatives to or of the Estate that Our Honrd Father Dea John Wadsworth Late of Duxborough aforesaid Decd Dyed Seiz'd off . . . . have Agreed to Divide the said Estate Amongst Our selves, that is all the said Estate, Excepting what . . . . is allready sold for to pay the Debts Due from the sd Estate, and we Doe hereby Oblige Our selves for to pay sd Debts so far as the said Estate is worth Or so far as it the said Estate Goes, that is if so much is Due, Or if in case . . . . there should be more Estate sold already then will pay the Just Debts Due from sd Estate, that then we are to have the Over plus and Divide it According to Law amongst Ourselves; And there is Originally seven shares in said Estate, but Inasmuch as that Dorithy Bartlett is an heir to the said Estate we have Some Time Before Bought her share Out Equally between us and said Dorithy Bartletts share is Divided into five parts or shares and Each, have it in this said Division Each of us has Our part in it with the Other Estate

"And now the said John Wsworth being the Eldest son . . . . we Doe agree that he shall have a Double share . . . in sd Estate .... with One fifth part of the said Dorithy Bartletts share that he bought; and we Do aGree that the rest of the aforesaid heirs shall Each of them have One single share in said Estate as their Rights, and Likewise to have Each One of them, One Fifth part as their Rights in said Dorithy Bartletts share, and Our Agreement in sd Division is as Follows, Vizt, That the said John Wadsworth shall have for his Two shares . . . . the whole of the Fifth Lott of upland in the second Division of the Commons of the upland which belong'd to the Township of Duxboro and Pembroke, and Like wise One single share in Spragues Ceder swamp with the Addition of ten shillings and Eight pence in Lawfull money, because said share was a poorer share then the Rest of said shares in sd Swamp, . . . . Togather with One Quarter part of the First Division which was One share and One halfe in the [p. 276] First Division of the Fifth Great Lott in the Great Ceder Swam Called the Majors, Purchas Ceder Swamp; And Likewise One half of the Forty third Lott in number in the Firsd Divisions of the Commons which belonged to the Township of Duxborough and Pembroke . . . with One fifth part of the said Dorithy Bartletts share which is Included in these two aforesaid shares"

 "And the said Uriah Wadsworth shall have for the whole of his single share or portion in said Estate, and it is to be taken out or Discounted Out of the Housing & Lands that the said Uriah Wadsworth has bought Out of the said Estate, with One Fifth part of the said Dorithy Bartletts share which is to be Included in and with his share"

"And the said Ichabod Wadsworth is to have for his single share . . . . the Forty second Lott in Number, and One Quarter part of the Forty third lott in number, and the whole lott which was Given to the said . . . . Ichabod in the Lifetime of his Father and all these aforesaid parcels of Land of the said Ichabods Are of the First Division of the Commons which belong'd To the Township of Duxborough and Pembroke Togather with a fifth part of Dority Bartletts share which is Included within these aforesaid parcels of Land"

"And the said Peleg Wadsworth is to have for his single Share... the One halfe of the Fifty Eighth Lott in number in the First Division of the Commons; and the One half of a ten Acre peice of Ground Lying near Miles Samsons, which is apart of the Fifty Fourth Lott in the said first Division; and likewise One half part of a small Ceder Swam Lying near Phillip Chandlers, Called the Tarkiln Ceder swamp, and Like wise One Quarter part of the First Division which was One share and One half in the first Division of the Fifth Great Lott in the Great Ceder swamp, Called the Majors purchas Ceder swamp, And Likewise One half of the Four Acres and One Quarter in the second lott in the second Division, and Likewise the Fourth Division of the First Great Lott in the majors purchase Ceder Swamp with One fifth part of the s<sup>d</sup> Dorithy Bartletts share which is Included

[p. 277] "And the said Mary Wadsworth is to have for her Single share . . . . the One half of the Fifty Eighth Lott in the First Division, and the One half of the ten Acres by Miles Samsons which is apart of the Fifty fourth Lott in the First Division, and One half of the four Acres and One Quarter of Land in the second lott in the second Division, and One half of a Small Ceder Swam lying near Phillip Chandlers, Called the Tarkilla Ceder swam, and One Quarter of the Forty third lott in the First Division, with One Fifth part of Dorithy Bartletts share which

is Included within the said Marys part"

within the sd Pelegs part"

"and we have Agreed to Divide the said Estate by Or According to the Inventory that was taken of the said Estate . . . . and We Doe agree that them of us that have Got more then Our

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shares for to pay so much to them that have not Got their shares as to make Our shares all Equall amongst us, and Likewise Our agreement is that for all of us that are the aforesaid heirs Doe Oblige Our selves for to pay the Just Debts that are Due from the said Estate"

The division was witnessed by Joshua Jacobs and John Lothrop. It was confirmed, on 6 May, 1754, by John Cushing, Judge of Probate.

## A PILGRIM TERCENTENARY MEDAL

THE interesting Pilgrim Tercentenary Medal which has been produced by Reed and Barton, the well-known gold and silversmiths of Taunton, Mass., is shown in the illustration facing page 49.

The medal is of bronze, two and three-fourths inches in diameter, and bears on its obverse a reproduction of Marshall Johnson's painting\*, "The Mayflower Approaching The Land", with the legend: "The Mayflower In Whose Cabin Was Signed The Compact In Cape Cod Harbor 21 Nov 1620".

On the reverse of the medal is a representation of the landing of the third exploring party, from the shallop†, on Forefathers' Day, 1620, with the legend: "1620–1920 Landing Of The Pilgrims At Plymouth 21 December 1620".

Mr. William B. H. Dowse, the president of the Reed and Barton company, is the Governor of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and he has taken a great personal interest in the preparation of this medal. He has donated specimens for our cabinet, and has offered a liberal commission on all medals sold through the Massachusetts Society, such commissions to be added to the Society's Building Fund.

The medals can be supplied, in bronze, for \$4.00 each, and gilded, for \$5.00 each. They will be sent postage prepaid.

We here print the inscriptions on the gravestones of Deacon Seth Staple's widow Hannah, who was the daughter of Ebenezer<sup>3</sup> Standish (*Alexander*<sup>2</sup>, *Myles*<sup>1</sup>). She was buried in the old cemetery on Summer St., in Taunton, Mass. The inscriptions on the headstone and the footstone were copied by the Editor in June, 1918. Literal copies of the two inscriptions follow:

"In Memory of M[rs] Hannah Staple, th[e] wife of Deach

Seth Staple; she Died April ye 5th 1774. Aged 70 Years"

"Mrs Hannah Staple."

## THE WILL OF HENRY HODGES

The original will of "Henry Hodges Sen<sup>r</sup> of Taunton" is still in the Bristol County, Mass., Probate Files. It was dated 17 September, 1717, and probated 4 November, 1717. The original inventory "of Elder Henry Hodges Esq<sup>r</sup> of Taunton", taken 15 October, 1717, is also in the files. The will mentions his wife Esther Hodges; his sons William Hodges, John Hodges, Joseph Hodges, Henry Hodges, Benjamin Hodges, Ephraim Hodges; and his daughters, "Mary Keith, Esther Southworth, Charity Leonard, Elisabeth Hodges Abigail Hodges".

The daughter Esther Southworth was the wife of Capt. Ichabod Southworth of Middleborough. Her will and the settlement

of her husband's estate are printed in this issue.

#### HANNAH HATCH'S THREE HUSBANDS JAPHET TURNER, EBENEZER TINKHAM AND CAPT, ICHABOD TUPPER

By THE EDITOR

HANNAH HATCH<sup>3</sup>, daughter of Samuel Hatch of Scituate, by his wife Mary? Doty (Edward1), was born on 15 or 16\* February, 1681/2, and was married three times.

She married, first, Japhet Turner, of Scituate, but the date of the marriage has not been found. Japhet Turner died before 23 January, 1710/11, when his inventory was taken, and left four children: Hannah, who married William Thomas; Japhet, who married Elizabeth Morse; Israel, who married Abigail Holmes; Elizabeth, who married John Pratt.

Hannah (Hatch<sup>8</sup>) Turner married, second, on 9 July, 1719, Ebenezer Tinkham4 (Ebenezer3, Mary2 Brown, Peter1), of Middleborough, Mass., as his second wife. Ebenezer Tinkham4 died before 7 November, 1726, when Shubael Tinkham4, his brother, was appointed administrator.

Hannah (Hatch3) (Turner) Tinkham married, third, on 23 December, 1729, Capt. Ichabod Tupper, of Middleborough,

who died in 1748, leaving children by a former wife.

Hannah (Hatch<sup>3</sup>) (Turner) (Tinkham) Tupper, widow of Capt. Ichabod Tupper, died 13 April, 1771, in her 91st year, according to the record on her gravestone in the Nemasket Cemetery, at Middleborough.

# SHISARCH DULKT SHOTAH HARRAN

No record of the marriage of Hannah Hatch<sup>3</sup> to Japhet Turner has been found, and she was called Hannah Tinkham, in her father's will, made 13 June, 1728; but the widow Hannah Tupper, in her own will, dated 26 August, 1766, mentions "my daughter Elizabeth Pratt", also "my ten grandsons" and "my fifteen grandaughters", naming each of them. As these twenty-five grandchildren of widow Hannah Tupper can be proved to have been the children of Japhet and Hannah Turner's four children, Hannah Thomas, Japhet Turner, Israel Turner and Elizabeth Pratt, it is evident that the first Japhet Turner's widow was the Hannah Turner who married Ebenezer Tinkham and Capt. Ichabod Tupper.

Ebenezer Tinkham<sup>4</sup> (Ebenezer<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Brown, Peter<sup>1</sup>) was the only Tinkham who had a wife Hannah in 1728, when Samuel Hatch mentioned a daughter Hannah Tinkham in his will, and we have shown that Ebenezer married, for his second wife, Japhet Turner's widow Hannah. Moreover the widow Hannah Tupper's age at death agrees closely with the birth date of Hannah Hatch<sup>3</sup>. It is evident, therefore, that Samuel Hatch's daughter Hannah and the widow Hannah Tupper were one and the same person.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents in the files, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the estates of Japhet Turner, Ichabod Tupper and widow Hannah Tupper.

These abstracts have been made at the expense of Mrs. A. V. Heely, of Plainfield, N. J., who is a descendant of Hannah Turner<sup>5</sup> (*Japhet*<sup>4</sup>, *Hannah Hatch*<sup>3</sup>, *Mary*<sup>2</sup> *Doty*, *Edward*<sup>1</sup>), who married James Le Baron.

The proper reference, to the record, or the original document in the files, is noted with each abstract.

#### [JAPHET TURNER'S ESTATE]

[From original inventory] On [\*] January, 1710/11,\* Francis Barker and Samuel Stetson took the inventory. The real estate was: "Six accres of swamp medow" £24; "one small house and bricks" £3. John Holmes and John Barker, Jr., were indebted to the estate. "Hannah Turner Relict Widdow" made oath to the inventory, 2 February, 1710. [The inventory was also recorded, 3:39.]

<sup>\*</sup>The day was written "20" with "3d" interlined above. The year was written "17019"; but it was some distance from the month and was not recorded by the Register of Probate. The day was recorded "20".

To "wife Hannah the use of my Household Stuff while She remains my Widdow" also "all the Household Stuff She brot with her to me, and . . . . the use of the best room in my House with any other Accomadations in the House that may be necessary for her, and . . . . the Income of my Drowned meadow while She Shall be my widdow"

To "my beloved Daughters all my moveable Estate that is not above disposed off to be Equally Divided between them, and .... the Six Sheep & the Household Stuff which my wife is to have the use of dureing her Widdow hood to be in the same manner

Divided among them"

"To my Grandson Jabez I Give twenty pounds old tenour to be paid by my son Thomas within Six years after my decease, and also . . . . the Income of my Drowned meadow after my wifes

decease dureing his life."

"It is also my Will That my son Thomas pay Ministerial rates for the Estate which by these presents is Conveyed to him towards supporting the publick worship in the Old Meeting house, and by this my last Will I bind my Estate to pay thereinto whosesoever hands it Shall fall"

Josiah Cushman<sup>4</sup> (Elkanah<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Allerton, Isaac<sup>1</sup>) was born in Plymouth, 21 March, 1687/8, and died at Plympton, Mass., 13 April, 1750. He was married, at Plympton, 29 December, 1689, to Susanna Shurtleff, who died at Plympton, 27 July, 1763, in her seventy-third year.

Josiah and Susanna Cushman had nine children: Susanna (died young), Martha, Susanna (second of the name), Anna, Josiah, Elkanah, William, Elizabeth, Isaiah; and all but the first

Susanna were mentioned in their father's will.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of Lieut. Josiah Cushman's will and all other records, relating to the settlement of his estate, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate.

There are no original papers in the files.

These abstracts are printed at the expense of Mr. Henry Southworth Shaw, of Milton, Mass., a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, who is a descendant of Lieut. Josiah Cushman, through his daughter Susanna, who married Benjamin Shurtleff.

The total amount was £207, 19s., 6d. The only real estate was: "Part of Two Lots of Land at South medowes" £6, 13s., 4d.; "one Silver Tankerd & one Silver Spoone" were valued at £11; "three Negrows" were valued at £76, 13s., 4d.

Susanna Cushman, executrix, made oath to the inventory,

12 July, 1750.

[12:17] On 12 July, 1750, Susanna Cushman, executrix, presented and swore to an account, which was allowed. She had "Pd My foure Sons as ordered In ye abovesd Will" £5, 6s., 8d., and "Pd my foure Daughters as Pr their Receipts" £134, 2s., 4d.

#### SAMUEL' WARREN'S ESTATE

Samuel.<sup>4</sup> Warren (*Richard*<sup>3</sup>, *Nathaniel*<sup>2</sup>, *Richard*<sup>1</sup>), of Middleborough, Mass., was born in Plymouth, 7 March, 1682/3, and married, 26 January, 1703/4, Eleanor<sup>4</sup> Billington (*Isaac*<sup>3</sup>, *Francis*<sup>2</sup>, *John*<sup>1</sup>), of Middleborough. They had eleven children: Priscilla, Jabez, Samuel, Cornelius, James, Nathan, Joseph, Joanna, Benjamin, Sarah, Josiah. These children were all recorded in the Middleborough records, printed in our second, third, fourth and sixth volumes.

Two of the children, Jabez and Joseph, died young. The widow and the other nine children were mentioned in the settlement of Samuel<sup>4</sup> Warren's estate. The record of the settlement states that Samuel<sup>4</sup> Warren "dyed Intestate Leaving Eight Children", but it names nine children. One of these children, Cornelius<sup>5</sup> Warren, died before the settlement, which was dated 3 August, 1752, and he may have died before his father. As

### CAPT. NATHANIEL GILBERT'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

NATHANIEL GILBERT of Taunton, Mass., married, 16 June, 1709, Hannah<sup>4</sup> Bradford (*Samuel*<sup>3</sup>, *William*<sup>2-1</sup>), of Duxbury. When he made his will, 2 June, 1757, he called himself Gentleman, and when the will was probated, 11 September, 1765, he was called Captain.

We here present an exhaustive abstract of the will and of all records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Bristol County Registry of Probate, at Taunton, Mass. The will is the only original document remaining in the files.

This will is printed at the expense of Mrs. Irving A. Dean, of Grand Rapids, Mich., a descendant of Capt. Nathaniel and Hannah (Bradford) Gilbert, through their eldest son, Thomas Gilbert<sup>5</sup>, and a life member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

### [CAPT. NATHANIEL GILBERT'S WILL]

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# THE WILLS OF JOHN TAYLOR OF BOSTON AND REV. JOHN TAYLOR OF MILTON

John Taylor and Ann Winslow<sup>4</sup> (Edward<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>), both of Boston, were married 5 November, 1702, and their son John was born there, Thursday, 30 August, 1704.\* Four other children, Elizabeth, William, Rebecca and Ann, were born at Jamaica, W. I., but were recorded at Marshfield, Mass.,† after their mother's second marriage, to Kenelm Winslow, of Marshfield. The birth of the son John Taylor<sup>5</sup> was recorded at Boston and also at Marshfield.

John Taylor, cooper, made his will at Boston, 9 April, 1703. He died at Jamaica, West Indies, and the will was probated, at Boston, 4 April, 1720, on the petition of his widow, dated at

Jamaica, 29 January, 1719/20.

His oldest son, Rev. John Taylor<sup>5</sup> (Ann Winslow<sup>4</sup>, Edward<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>), of Milton, Mass., made his will, 11 October, 1748, and it was probated 23 February, 1749,‡ at Boston. He had married, first, Elizabeth, daughter of Rev. Nathaniel Rogers, of Portsmouth, N. H., who was not a descendant of Thomas Rogers, the Mayflower Passenger.

Rev. John Taylor<sup>5</sup> married, second, Dorothy Rogers, the widow of his first wife's brother. After Rev. John Taylor's death,

Dorothy married Peter Gilman, of Exeter, N. H.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of the wills of the two John Taylors (father and son) and of all other records, and original documents on file, relating to the settlement of their estates, found in the Suffolk County Registry of Probate, in Boston, Mass.

These abstracts have been prepared at the expense of a descendant of Rev. John Taylor<sup>5</sup>, Mr. Willard A. Nichols, of Redlands, Cal., who is a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

Wife Ann Taylor for and during the Term of her Natural Life . and after her decease to her heires by me lawfully begotten & assignes for ever."

"my sd loving Wife Ann Taylor to be full and sole Executrix".

The will was signed "Ino. Taylor"

The witnesses were Nicholas Buttolph, Eleazer Phillips, Jr., and Edward Weaver.

"At the desire of Ann Taylor Executrix in this will named by a letter bearing date at Jamaica" 29 January, 1719/20, "Edward Winslow Esqr presented the same for Probate", and the will was probated at Boston, 4 April, 1720, on the oaths of Nicholas Buttolph and Eleazer Phillips, Jr., who stated that they signed as witnesses, with "Edward Weaver Since Deceased". [The will

was also recorded, 21:687.]

[From original will] On 11 October, 1748, "John Taylor of .... Milton .... Clerk" made his will. Bequests were as follows: To "Wife Dorothy the Improvement of my House & all my Land during Her Life. I also give Her for Her own proper Use & as Her absolute Property, so much of my Personal Estate as

She shall think to be an Equivalent for all the Money & Moveables which I have receiv'd of Her. And if my Personal Estate should be insufficient for this Purpose, I give to my Dear Wife free Liberty to take any Part of my Personal Estate which She shall chuse, & also full Liberty to sell my Real Estate or any Part of It, & so to do Her self Justice."

"After my Wife has taken out of my Estate so much as She according to Her best Judgment shall think to be her just due, My will is that whatsoever remains of my Estate whether real or personal be equally divided between my five Children, vizt John,

Ann, Nathaniel, William & Dorothy Taylor".

"Wife Dorothy Taylor" was appointed sole executrix.

The witnesses were Joseph Hunt, Jonathan Vose and Brinsmead Hunt.

The will of "the Rev<sup>d</sup> M<sup>r</sup> John Taylor" was presented for probate, at Boston, 23 February, 1749, "by the Executrix therein named", and was sworn to by the three witnesses.

The will was endorsed "The Revd Mr John Taylor's Will

Provd Feby 23d 1749". [Also recorded, 43:365.]

[43:364] On 23 February, 1749, the will was proved and administration granted to "his Widow Dorothy Taylor sole Executrix".

[From original inventory] On 21 May, 1750, at Milton, an "Inventory of the Estate of the Rev<sup>nd</sup> John Taylor late deceased" was taken by Samuel Miller, Joseph Gooch and Samuel Tucker. The real estate was "his Mansion house twenty one acres and a quarter of land with the other buildings theron in Milton" £516, 13s., 4d. A "negro man named King & ditto boy named Quomino" were valued at £60. "Books & a silver watch" were valued at £42, 13s., 4d. The total amount of the inventory was £928, 19s., 5d. The executrix and the appraisers made oath to the inventory, 8 June, 1750. [The inventory was also recorded, 44:83.]

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### ANNA (ALDEN) LORING'S WILL

Anna<sup>4</sup> Alden, daughter of Col. John<sup>3</sup> Alden (*Jonathan*<sup>2</sup>, *John*<sup>1</sup>) of Duxbury, Mass., married Benjamin Loring. They settled in Duxbury and had ten children, of whom five died in infancy, and a sixth died unmarried, before his father.

Benjamin Loring died I March, 1781, in his 73d year, and his widow Anna died I July, 1804, in her 89th year, according to the records on their gravestones in the old cemetery at South

Duxbury.

Benjamin Loring died intestate and there is no settlement of

his estate in the probate records.

Anna<sup>4</sup> (Alden) Loring made a will 20 July, 1787; and in 1797 a codicil was drawn up and attached to the will, but it was not signed. The will mentions: sons Samuel Loring, Judah Loring and Daniel Loring; a daughter, Lucy Fuller; and a grand-daughter, Hannah Loring. The codicil mentions a daughter-in-law, Prudence Loring.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents in the files, relating to the estate of Anna (Alden) Loring, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry

of Probate.

Brown Late of Attleborough deceased . . . . Intestate"

[From unrecorded bond] On 6 May, 1776, Noah Brown, yeoman, as administrator, with Moses Willmarth, gentleman, and John Foster, yeoman, as sureties, all three of Attleborough, gave a bond for £1000. The witnesses were Elkanah Willmarth and George Leonard, Jr.

[From unrecorded warrant] On 6 May, 1776, Moses Willmarth, Elkanah Willmarth and John Foster were appointed to

appraise the estate.

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken 25 May, 1776. The real estate was: "The homested Farm Containing 31½ acers and Buildings There on" £114, 19s., 6d.; "Ten acers and Twenty Three Rods of Wood Land in Rehoboth" £30, 8s.; "one acer & halfe & 23 Rods of Wood Land Near John Willmarth" £1, 19s. The total amount of the inventory was £214, 11s., 8d. Noah Brown, the administrator, made oath to the inventory on 28 October, 1776. [The inventory also recorded, 24:274.]

[129:246-251] On 28 April, 1777, "Noah Brown of Attleborough . . . . yeoman" was appointed guardian of Stephen, Rebecca, Hannah, James, John and Bethiah, children of "Noah Brown Late of sd Attleborough dec", all being under fourteen

years of age.

[From unrecorded bonds] On 28 April, 1777, Noah Brown, as guardian, gave six bonds, of £1000 each, with Thomas French and Elisha Willmarth as sureties. George Leonard, Jr., and

Experience Leonard witnessed the bonds.

[From unrecorded warrant] On 15 November, 1783, John Daggett, Esq., Moses Willmarth and Zephaniah Bishop were appointed to appraise the real estate, and set off to the widow "one full third part thereof if she is not other waise Indowed before marriage".

#### THE ESTATE OF JAMES BARTLETT<sup>5</sup>

JAMES BARTLETT<sup>5</sup> (Robert<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Warren, Richard<sup>1</sup>), of Plymouth, was born there, 7 August, 1701, and died 13 January, 1722/3. The settlement of his estate proves that he left neither wife nor children, and he probably did not marry.

[From original warrant] On 3 August, 1724, "mr James Barnabey mr Stephen Churchell and mr Francis Addams all of Plimoth", were appointed to appraise the "Estate both Reall and personall". [The warrant was also recorded, 5:83.]

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken, 10 February, 1724/5, by "James Barnebe", "Stephen Churchell" and "Francis Adams". The appraisers and the administrator made oath to the inventory, 5 March, 1724/5. The real estate was "a parcel of Land att Elerever", £65; "a piece of Land att Well-

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ingsley and a barn", £60. [The inventory was also recorded,

[5:173] "The Settlement of ye Estate of James Bartlet[t] late of Plymouth . . . . deceased Intestate" was made by Isaac Winslow, Esq., Judge of Probate, on 16 January, 1726. "The whole of ye Estate . . . . being Prised at £153:11s:10d: The Reall Estate being Prised at £125:0s:0d The Personal Estate being Prised at £28:11s:10d: Debts due from ye Estate & Charge of administration amounting to ye Sum of £9:16s:0. There then Remains to be divided to ye mothe[r] & amongst ye Brothers & Sisters of ye Sd James Bartlett deceasd (viz) To mrs Sarah Bartlett ye mother of ye sd decd and to Thomas Bartlett, Jno Bartlett, Joseph Bartlett, Ebenezer Bartlett, Robert Bartlett, Lemuel Bartlett; Hannah Churche[1] wife to Eleazer Churchel; Sarah Finney ye wife of John Finney & Elisabeth Bartlett all of Plymouth aforesd . Brethren & Sisters of ye deceased: ye Sum of £143: 15s:10d. which to Each of them, to ye mother ye Sum of £14: 6s:7d. and to Each of ye Brothers & Sisters aforesd ye Sum of £14:6:7. a Share . And after due Hearing & Consideration thereof and It being Represented . . . . yt ye Lands of ye sd decd Could not be divided to ye mother & amongst all ye Brethren & Sisters of ye deceased without great Prejudice to & Spoiling of ye same: I have therefore Settled ye whole of ye sd Estate both Reall & Personall upon Thomas Bartlett & Jnº Bartlett ye two Eldest Brothers of ye sd decd. The Reall Estate in manner following (viz) To Thomas Bartlett a Parcell of Land at Eel: River in Plymouth afores<sup>d</sup> Prized at Sixty five Pounds with ye Priviledge[s] & appurtenances thereunto belonging . . . . To ye sd Inº Bartlett a Peice of Land at wellingsley with a Barn thereon lying & being in Plymouth aforesd. Prized at Sixty Pounds with ye Priviledges & appurtenances thereunto belonging . . . . The Personal Estate of ye sd decd is hereby Settled on ye Said Thomas Bartlett & Ino Bartlett in Equal Parts they Having Payed & given good Security to Pay to their mother mrs Sarah Bartlett & to ye Brothers & Sisters above mentioned ye Sum of £14:6s:7d. to Each of them: which is ye full of their Part of ye whole Estate both Reall & Personall".

#### UNRECORDED BARNSTABLE COUNTY DEEDS

ABSTRACTS BY THE EDITOR

The abstracts printed in this issue were made, in 1908, from original deeds then in the possession of Mrs. Susan J. Dyer, of Provincetown, Mass. None of these deeds had been recorded.

#### [Joseph Mayo, Guardian, and Samuel Bangs to Benjamin Collins]

On 19 June, 1744, "Joseph mayo of Harwich . . . . yeoman as guardian to Elisha Bangs of sd Harwich and Samuel Bangs of of sd Harwich yeoman", for £3, "money of the old Tenor", sold to "Benjamin Collings of Truro . . . . yeoman . . . . one sixth part of a lot of Land Laying in Truro afore said on the west side of Stouts creek meadow so called said Lot of Land being Laid out to Cap<sup>tn</sup> Jonathan Bangs and to Edward Bangs his son—and also one sixth part of a lot of meadow by said Stouts creek Laid out to the said Cap<sup>tn</sup> Jonathan Bangs & Edward his son".

The deed was signed by Joseph Mayo and Samuel Bangs, and was witnessed by Joseph Freeman and [worn off] acher Freeman.

It was acknowledged, 19 June, 1744, by Joseph Mayo and Samuel Bangs, before Joseph Freeman, Justice of the Peace, and was not recorded.

## [Joshua and Thomas Hinckley to Benjamin Collins]

On 11 November, 1757, "Joshua Hinkley of a Place Called & known by ye Name of Oblong in ye Government of New York Yeoman & Thomas Hinkley of Harwich in ye County of Barnstable... Yeoman", for 12s., "Lawfull Money paid us by Benjamin Collins of Truro", sold to said Benjamin Collins "all That our parcel of woodland Lying in Truro being our Right and Intrest in ye Third Lot Lying on ye South Side of Pamet River So Called".

The deed was signed by Thomas Hinkley, only, and was witnessed by Solomon Pepper and Nathaniel Stone. It was acknowledged by Thomas Hinkley, 11 November, 1757, before Nathaniel Stone, Justice of the Peace, and was not recorded.

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## [NICKERSON TO COLLINS]

On 28 August, 1760, "Nathanal Nickerson of chatham . . . . yeoman & Thankfull Nickerson his wife", for £1, 10s., "Lawfull money", sold to "Benjamin Collings Jonathan collings jr yeomen & Ruth collings Relict widow of Silvanus collings Late of Truroe Deceased all of Truroe . . . . all that our Right and titles of lands and meadow grownds in Truroe aforesd Divided or undivided which came unto us in Right of our Honrd Deceasd mother mary Nickerson Daughter of Capt Jonathan Bangs of Harwich Deceasd".

Nathaniel Nickerson did not sign the deed. Thankful Nickerson signed it by a mark, and acknowledged it, at Truro, 28 August, 1760, before Barnabas Paine, Justice of the Peace.

The deed was witnessed by Barnabas Paine and Benjamin

Collins, Ir., and was not recorded.

## AUTOGRAPHS OF RICHARD MORE OF SALEM AND HIS SONS RICHARD AND CALEB

BY THE EDITOR

In the illustration facing page 97, we reproduce a portion of an old document bearing the autograph signatures of Richard More, Sr., the Mayflower Passenger, and his sons Richard More, Jr., and Caleb More, all of Salem, Mass.

These signatures are on "The Petition of Severall the Inhabitants of Salem" against imposts, presented to the General Court at Boston, in October, 1668. The original document is preserved in the archives\* of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts,

at the State House, in Boston.

The section of the petition reproduced shows autographs as follows: "John Rucke": "Rich: More Seneir": "Richard More Junior"; "Manaseth Marston"; "John marston Juner"; "John King"; "ioseph williames"; "Samuell Williams"; "Rich: Oliver"; "Caleb More"; "Isaac Hide"; "Jonathan Pickring".

This petition was printed in the New England Historical and Genealogical Register, in 1855 [Vol. IX, pp. 83-86]; but the person who made the copy there printed, overlooked and omitted the name "Samuell Williams", and he assigned the "Seneir" to John Rucke, instead of to Richard More.

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The only John Rucke of Salem, in 1668, had a son John, who was born in August, 1657; but the father would not have added Senior to his name when his son was only eleven years old.

As Richard More, father and son, signed the petition together, it would have been natural for the father to add Senior to his name. Furthermore, the present writer has found several other autograph signatures of Richard More, Senior, in each of which he wrote "Ser" at the right and above the line, as he wrote "Seneir" in the signature here reproduced. In no case did he write it on the line.

In our third volume,\* the present writer published the proof that Capt. Richard More of Salem was the Richard More who came in The Mayflower, to Plymouth, in 1620. In the illustrations accompanying that article, were shown the gravestones of: Capt. Richard More; his two wives, Christian and Jane; his son Caleb; his daughter Christian (More) Conant; and two of his grand-children, namely, Samuel son of Richard and Sarah More, and Barbara daughter of Samuel and Susanna Dutch.

## THE WILL OF WILLIAM MAKEPEACE OF TAUNTON AND THE ESTATE OF HIS SON-IN-LAW EMANUEL WILLIAMS OF TAUNTON

BY THE EDITOR

WILLIAM MAKEPEACE, of Taunton, Mass., married Abigail Tisdale<sup>4</sup>, daughter of John Tisdale and Abigail Rogers (*John*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>) of Taunton. In his will, dated 16 November, 1736, he mentioned sons: Seth, William and Thomas; the six children of his deceased daughter Abigail; and seven living daughters, Anna, Mary, Susanna, Lydia, Deborah, Remember and Priscilla.

The daughter Abigail Makepeace<sup>5</sup> married Emanuel Williams, of Taunton, and survived him, but died before her father. The settlement of Emanuel Williams' estate shows that he left three sons, Gershom, John and Simeon, and three daughters, Ann (the wife of William Barney), Lydia and Phebe.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Bristol County Registry of Probate, at Taunton, Mass., relating to the estates of William Makepeace and Emanuel Williams.

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These abstracts have been prepared at the expense of Miss Gertrude I. Lake, of Holliston, Mass., a descendant of Emanuel Williams, through his son Gershom, and a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

The proper reference, to the record, or the original document

on file, is noted with each of the following abstracts.

## [ESTATE OF EMANUEL WILLIAMS]

[Bristol Co. Prob. From original inventory] "An Inventory of ye Estate of Emanuell Wiliams late of Taunton deceased" was taken on 2 November, 1719, by John Thrasher, John Mason and Ebenezer Williams. Thrasher signed by a mark. The real estate was "The dwelling house and homestead being one hundred and sixtean accres of Lande and half a saw mill" £580; "fiftean accres more of Land sens\* Laid out" £11; "half a Right in Midelborrah sixtean shiling purches" £4; "twenty acres of land by deade not acknoledg" £10.

On 4 July, 1720, "Abigell Williams Administratrix to ye Estate of her Husband Emanuell Williams late of Taunton Intestate Decaced" made oath to the inventory. [The inventory

was also recorded, 3:647.]

[From unrecorded bond] On 4 July, 1720, "Abigail Williams widow & Relect of Emanuel williams late of Taunton deceased intestate", as administratrix, with William Makepeace and John Mason, both of Taunton, as sureties, gave a bond for £500. Abigail Williams and William Makepeace signed by marks. The

witnesses were John Cary and John Cary, Jr.

[From original inventory] On 8 and 9 February, 1724/5, an inventory of the estate was taken by Samuel Williams, John Staple and Benjamin Wilbore. The real estate was: "The dwelling house and barn and homestcad Containing sixty five acres" £260; "fifty acres of land in the southeasterly end of Cottley so Called that was formerly Thomas Joslins to gather with sixteen acres more that was granted partly on the northwest side of s<sup>d</sup> fifty acres and partly on the southeast side of s<sup>d</sup> fifty acres" £180; "half an old sawmill that is with John macomber and Samuel macomber in partnership" £5. William Makepeace, administrator de bonis non, made oath to the inventory on 30 March, 1730. [The inventory was also recorded, 7:8.]

[5:17] On 17 February, 1724/5, William Makepeace was

appointed administrator de bonis non.

[From unrecorded bond] On 17 February, 1725/6,\* William Makepeace of Taunton, as administrator de bonis non, with John Tisdale and Thomas Macomber, yeomen, both of Taunton, as sureties, gave a bond for £300. William Makepeace signed by a mark. The witnesses were Stephen Paine and Gershom Crane.

[From unrecorded petition] "The Petition of Gersham Williams Son of Emanuel Williams Late of Taunton Deceased Intestate Whereas my Father Dyed Seized of a considerable Estate .... and since his Decease there has been but very little care taken concerning the said Estate so that the moveables are most of them destroyed as to the Real Estate John Williams my Eldest Brother does make great havock of the Timber both on the Homestead and Cedar-Swamp and when he has cut Down all the Cedar in the Cedar Swamp the Land will then be of but Little value. And so the rest of the Children will be much Wronged of their Rights. And I being now . 21, years of age and having a desire (and also in great necessity) of receiving my part of my Fathers Estate . . . . Therefore, I would Humbly beseech that your Honour would appoint" John Mason, John Macomber, William Haskins, Henry Haskins and Abraham Waldron, "to make a Division and Distribution of the Estate . . . . to and amongst his Children"

The petition was dated at Dighton, 2 February, 1729/30.

[From unrecorded petition] "Lydia Williams of Taunton Being abought Eighteen years of age & Daughter of Emanuell williams of sd Taunton Decsed Do here By mak Choice of william Barney of sd taunton as my Guardin". The petition was signed by a mark, and was "Dated Freetown march The 27<sup>d</sup> 1730"

[From unrecorded petition] "Phebe Williams . . . . have chosen my brother John Williams of said Taunton to be my Guardian". The petition was signed by a mark, and was "Dated

at Taunton March ye 30th 1730"

[6:387 & 388] On 30 March, 1730, William Barney, of Taunton, was appointed guardian of Lydia Williams; and John Williams, yeoman, of Taunton, was appointed guardian of Phebe Williams, above fourteen years of age, and of Simeon Williams, under fourteen years, children of Emanuel Williams, deceased.

[From unrecorded bonds] On 30 March, 1730, William Barney, blacksmith, as guardian of Lydia Williams, with William Makepeace and John Williams, yeomen, as sureties, all three of

Taunton, gave a bond of £500.

The same day, John Williams, as guardian of Phebe Williams and Simeon Williams, with William Makepeace and William Barney as sureties, gave two bonds, of £500 each.

William Makepeace signed the three bonds by marks, and they all were witnessed by Stephen Paine and Nehemiah Campbell.

[From original account] The account of William Makepeace, administrator de bonis non, was sworn to and approved, 30 March, 1730. Payments had been made to Josiah Winslow, Jr.; "Isaac Perce"; "mr:" Samuel Danforth; Malachi Holloway; Seth Makepeace; Samuel Williams; "Nicholas Moorey"; John Staple; Benjamin Wilbore; "Docter Winslow"; William Hoskins; John Tisdale; Elizabeth French; Henry Haskins; Benjamin Terry; John Macomber; Joseph Trovan; Ebenezer Hathway; John Rasher; Ebenezer Cobb; Henry Tisdale; Samuel Hoar; Samuel Richmond, Jr.; Benjamin Eliot; Thomas Terry, Esq.; Josiah Hoskins. [The account was also recorded, 7:6.]

[From unrecorded warrant] On 22 April, 1730, Seth Williams, Esq., Capt. Samuel Williams, John Mason, John Godfree and Abraham Waldron were appointed to divide the real and personal estate of Emanuel Williams, deceased, among his children.

[From unrecorded division] The division was made, 28 October, 1730, by Samuel Williams, John Mason and Abraham

Waldron, as follows:

[The inventory was also recorded, 8:481.]

#### FALSE AND FAKED MAYFLOWER CLAIMS

As stated in the introduction to the first article of this series, it makes no difference whether an erroneous claim of Mayflower descent is deliberately faked, or is merely a careless error, the result is the same, many persons are misled, and a large proportion of them never discover that they have been deceived.

### MERCY SIMMONS WIFE OF BENJAMIN CHASE WAS NOT A DAUGHTER OF JOHN AND MERCY (PABODIE) SIMMONS

In "The Chase Chronicle" for January, 1919, on page 6, we find an erroneous statement, of which the following is an exact

copy:

"(3). Benjamin Chase, the eldest son of Benjamin Chase (2), was born in 1682, in Freetown, and he married June 23, 1703 in Taunton Mercy Simmons, daughter of John and Mary\* (Peabody\*) Simmons, and a great grand-daughter of John and Priscilla Alden of the Mayflower, as appears below."

What "appears below" does not offer any evidence of any kind to prove the claim concerning the parentage of Mercy (Simmons) Chase; and it need not be considered at this time, as we are interested only in the erroneous claim that she was a great-granddaughter of John Alden.

The present writer knows nothing of the ancestry of Mercy (Simmons) Chase, and has made no attempt to determine the names of her parents, because there is ample proof that she was

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neither a daughter, nor a granddaughter, of John and Mercy (Pabodie) Simmons.

John Simmons and Mercy Pabodie<sup>3</sup> (Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Alden, John<sup>1</sup>) were married, at Duxbury, 16 November, 1669, and their first child, John, who was born 22 February, 1670/1, was only thirty-two years old in 1703, when Benjamin Chase was married. Moreover, John Simmons, Jr., did not marry until 1715, and the settlement of his intestate estate shows that he had no children by any earlier marriage.

As William, the second son of John and Mercy (Pabodie) Simmons was born 24 February, 1672/3, and did not marry until about 1696, and had a daughter Mercy born in 1697, it is evident that he was not the father of Benjamin Chase's wife.

The third son, Isaac Simmons, born 28 January, 1674/5, could not have been the father of a woman married in June, 1703. It is certain, therefore, that Mercy Simmons, wife of Benjamin Chase, was not a granddaughter of John and Mercy (Pabodie) Simmons.

The proof that Benjamin Chase did not marry a daughter of John and Mercy (Pabodie) Simmons is direct and conclusive, and was published, in full, in the January, 1917, issue of "The Mayflower Descendant" (Vol. XIX, pp. 51–54), by the present writer.

John Simmons died without making a will, therefore all his children, or their heirs if any were deceased, must have been mentioned in the settlement of his estate, on 11 February, 1715/16. If there had been a daughter Mercy then living, or if such a daughter had married and died leaving issue, that daughter or her heirs would have been considered in the settlement. No settlement without reference to all of the children would have been approved by the probate court.

No daughter Mercy is mentioned in any way in this settlement, which, by its terms, plainly shows that there was no Mercy. "The Settlemt of the estate both real & personal of John Simmons . . . . decd to and amongst his widdow & Childrean by mutuall agreement amongst themselves" mentions, and was signed by, the widow Mercy Simmons, the seven sons, John, William, Isaac, Benjamin, Joseph, Joshua and Moses, and by the daughters, Martha (Simmons) West and Rebecca (Simmons) Southworth, also by Constant Southworth, husband of the daughter Rebecca.

Further evidence that there was no daughter Mercy is found in the will of Mercy (Pabodie) Simmons, which provides legacies for all of the children mentioned in the settlement of her husband's estate, but makes no reference to any other living or deceased children, or to any living or deceased grandchildren. and the second second second second second

The Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants has recently been obliged to reject an application for membership, presented in good faith by a gentleman who had been misled by this serious error of "The Chase Chronicle".


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

#### JABEZ<sup>8</sup> HOWLAND'S ESTATE

By THE EDITOR

JABEZ<sup>3</sup> HOWLAND (Jabez<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>1</sup>) was born at Plymouth, 15 November, 1669, but his parents removed to Bristol (then in Massachusetts, now in Rhode Island) and he lived and died in Bristol. He was buried in the cemetery near St. Michael's Episcopal Church, but this cemetery was discontinued, and the old gravestones were removed to the Juniper Hill Cemetery.

The inscription on his stone, copied from the original, by the Editor, reads as follows: "Here lyes Interr'd ye Body of Jabez Howland who dyed Oct<sup>br</sup> ye 17<sup>th</sup> 1732 in ye 64<sup>th</sup> year of His age"

The record of his burial, copied by the Editor, from page 13 of the oldest book of the church records, reads as follows: "1732 8br ye 19 Jabez Howland"

It should be noted that October was the eighth month, in Old Style dating. The burial, therefore, was on 19 October, 1732, two days after his death.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original papers on file, in the Bristol County Registry of Probate, at Taunton, Mass., relating to the settlement of Jabez<sup>3</sup> Howland's estate.

These abstracts have been made at the expense of a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, who is descended from Jabez<sup>3</sup> Howland, but this member has declined to allow us to use his name.

The proper reference, to the record, or the original document on file, is noted with each of the following abstracts.

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#### [JABEZ<sup>3</sup> HOWLAND'S ESTATE]

[From unrecorded petition] On 28\* November, 1732, Elizabeth Howland, spinster, of Bristol, petitioned that she be appointed administratrix, "with her Sister Bethia Bragg of Bristoll Widdow

& Eldest Daughter to ye Deceased"

[Bristol Co. Prob., 7:466] On 27 November, 1732, "ms Bethia Bragg Widdow Elezebeth Howland Spinster both of Bristoll Daughters & Administratrixes To the Estate of their father ms Jabiz Howland Late of Bristoll . . . . Blacksmith Deceased" were appointed to administer the estate.

[From unrecorded bond] On 27† November, 1732, Bethiah Bragg, widow, and Elizabeth Howland, spinster, as administratrixes, with Thomas Lawton, gentleman, and Samuel Howland, cooper, as sureties, all of Bristol, gave a bond for £2000. The

witnesses were Stephen Paine and Mary Chandler.

[7:526] The inventory was taken, 6 December, 1732, by Simon Davis, Jonathan Woodbury and Samuel Royall. The real estate was: "homesteed house and Lott with all the out housing on Said Lott of Land" £750; "house and Land and barn Where Sam<sup>II</sup> Linzey now Dwels" £380; "Dweling house and Land where Amos Baker Lives" £250; "Ten accre Lott near Benj<sup>IM</sup> Gorhams Tanyard" £250; "a Lott of Land Joyning to m<sup>I</sup> fales & Sampsons" £250; "four and half Sixteenth of the Land and warehouses Taken by Execution from mr Cary marchant" £40; "a Lott of Land bought of mr Samuel Howland" £12; "Land bought of Torrance Dunnely" £20; "Aboute 17 accres of Land by Crooked Lane Joyning to Land of Edward Little" £140; "Common Lott of Land at ye North End ye town" £45; "Corn Lott near the mount farm" £160. The total amount of the inventory was £3087, 4s., 3d.

Interesting items are: "Eighty Nine ounces of plate" £82, 25.; two negro men at £100 each; a negro woman, £100; a gold ring,

I4S.

On 20 March, 1732/3, Bethiah Bragg and Elizabeth Howland,

administratrixes, made oath to the inventory.

[From unrecorded petition] On 11 December, 1732, "Jabiz Howland Son of mr Jabiz Howland Late of Bristoll Decased being above the age of Ninteen years" requested the appointment of "Capt Samuel Little of Bristoll To be my Guardian". The witnesses were Stephen Paine and Isaac Lawton.

[7:472] On 19 December, 1732, "Samuel Little of Bristoll . . . . Genteman" was appointed guardian of "Jabiz Howland above the age of fourteen years Son of m<sup>r</sup> Jabiz Howland Late of Bristol . . . . Deceased"

[From unrecorded bond] On 19 December, 1732, Samuel Little, gentleman, as guardian, with William Walker, tanner, & Joseph Howland, joiner, all of Bristol, as sureties, gave a bond for £2000. The witnesses were Peleg Heath and Stephen Paine.

[From unrecorded petition] On 23 February, 1732/3, Patience Howland, "Daughter of Jabiz Howland Late of Bristol Deceased .... Being Above the age of fourteen years .... made Choice of mr William Munroe of Bristol To be my Guardian" The petition was witnessed by Aaron Bourne and Nathaniel Lindall.

[7:506] On 23 February, 1732/3, "Mr William Munroe of Bristol . . . . Yeoman" was appointed guardian of "Patiance Howland above the age of fourteen years Daughter of mr Jabiz

Howland Late of Bristol Deceased"

[7:506] On 23 February, 1732/3, "William Munroe of Bristol.... Yeoman" was appointed guardian of "Thomas Howland a minor under the age of fourteen years Son of mr Jabiz Howland Late of Bristol Deceased"

[From unrecorded petition] On 27 December, 1733, "Isaac martindale of Newport and Isaac Lawton of Bristol afores<sup>d</sup> In behalf of them selves and their Wives (Two of the Daughters of Jabez Howland Late of Bristol afores<sup>d</sup> Dec<sup>d</sup> Intestate" petitioned that "Whereas Letters of administration on the estate of the said Jabez Howland was Granted to Bethiah Bragg (now Bethiah Davis) and Elisabeth Howland (now Elisabeth Little) Two of the Daughters of the said Jabez Howland and it is more than one year since s<sup>d</sup> Letters... were granted and they... have neglected to render their accompt.... Therefore we... pray they may be Cited.... to give the Reason... why they delay"

[From unrecorded citation] On 13 February, 1733/4, "mrs Bethia Davis late Bethia Bragg & mrs Elizabeth Little late Elizabeth Howland Administrxs on the estate of the late Jabez Howland late of Bristol decesd" were cited, on petition of "Cap" Isaac Martindale & Mr Isaac Lawton", to appear "at ye Court of Probate to be held at ye House of Mrs Yetmercey Howland", in Bristol, on 19 February, 1733/4, at eleven o'clock, to render an

account of their administration.

[From unrecorded petition] On 19 February, 1733/4, Bethiah Davis petitioned the Court for more time in which to administer the estate, one reason being that the other administratrix, being

"now at a Considerable Distance Could not Reasonably be Ex-

pected to appear", "Considering ye season of ye year".

[From unrecorded petition] On 2 April, 1734, Samuel Little & William Munro, both of Bristol, "Guardians unto Jabez Howland Thomas Howland & Patiance Howland Children of Jabez Howland Late of Bristoll aforsaid Deceased Intestate" petitioned that "whereas Severall of the Children of the aforsaid Jabiz Howland... were marryed in his Life time and they having had Considerable of househoold Goods Given to them by their Father att their marrage... which according to Law is part of their Portion)... Pray that the minors which we are Guardians for ... may be made Equall with the others as to what they had at their marrage when the Estate is Devided"

[From unrecorded agreement] On 2 April, 1734, Isaac Martindale agreed to allow £45, Bethiah Davis £45, Elizabeth Little £18, and Isaac Lawton £12, "all these for allowance for what they have received from their father Jabez Howland Estate Deceaced in his life time . . . . which is to be a Charge and brought in to an Equal Division among all the Children which have a rite to Said Estate". The agreement was signed by Samuel Little as guardian of Jabez Howland; William Munro, as guardian of Patience Howland and Thomas Howland; Isaac Martindale; Isaac Lawton; Bethiah Davis; Elizabeth Little. The subscribers also agreed

"to Devide all the persenal Estate".

[From original account] "The Accompt of Bethia Davis Late Bethia Bragg and Elezebeth Little Late Elezebeth Howland Administratrixes" was sworn to and allowed, 2 April, 1734. The estate had received payments from: Capt. The total personal estate was £1364, 18s.; "advanced to four of ye daughters in ye fathers lifetime" £120; debts paid, £717, 13s., 9d., leaving £767, 4s., 3d. "to be devided into eight parts"; "ye eldest Son his double part" was £191, 16s. [The account was

also recorded, 8: 106.]

[From unrecorded warrant] On 15 April, 1734, "Messrs Thomas Throop, Robert Jolls, Samil Ryal, John Bosworth and Jonathan Peck" were appointed to divide the real estate of Jabez Howland among his children "and Such as Shall Legally Represent them if any of them be Dead"

[8:100] On 16 April, 1734, "Samuel Little of Bristoll . . . . Gentleman Chosen by Thomas Howland above the age of fourteen years to be his Guardian" was appointed by the probate court, said Thomas being "Son of Jabiz Howland Late of Bristoll

Deceased"

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[From original] On 16 April, 1734, Samuel Little, gentleman, as guardian, with William Walker, gentleman, and John Bosworth, yeoman, as sureties, gave a bond of £600. The witnesses were Stephen Paine and Morgan Cobb, 2d. The bond was endorsed: "Capt Samuel Little Bond Guardianship"

[From original division] On 18 April, 1734, Thomas Throope, Robert Jolls, Samuel Royall, John Bosworth and Jonathan Peck, made "an Equall Division of the Reall Eastate in Brist<sup>11</sup>" as

follows:

#### DR. THOMAS GRAY'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

DR. THOMAS GRAY<sup>5</sup> of Little Compton,\* son of Capt. Thomas Gray by his wife Anna Little<sup>4</sup> (*Ephraim*<sup>8</sup>, *Anna*<sup>2</sup> Warren, Richard<sup>1</sup>), made his will, 8 July, 1723, and his inventory was dated 17 July, 1723.

As he mentions his "Mother in law mrs Phoebe Gray" in the will, it is necessary to call especial attention to the fact that the term "mother-in-law" frequently had the meaning of the modern term "step-mother". Mrs. Phebe Gray was the second wife of Dr. Thomas Gray's father, and the will clearly shows that Dr. Gray left neither wife nor children.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original papers on file, in the Bristol County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the estate of Dr. Thomas Gray.

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#### [Dr. THOMAS GRAY'S WILL]

[From original will] "Thomas Gray of Little Compton . . . . Doctor" made his will, 8 July, 1723. Bequests were as follows:

To "my Honoured Mother in law mrs Phoebe Gray my three

year Old mare called my pacing mare."

To "Brother Edward Gray, my negro boy Solomon, my Clock, all my Stock of Creatures, not otherwise disposed of in this Will,

and my Gun that was formerly Mr Billings's."

To "Nephew Thomas gray the Son of my s<sup>d</sup> brother Edward, three Several parcels of land, Viz, my home Lot on which my buildings Stands, with all y<sup>e</sup> buildings &c thereon, and my Meadow Opposite thereunto, on the West side of y<sup>e</sup> highway, and my Fifty acree Lot formerly Peckoms lying between my Brother Edward<sup>s</sup> and Tho<sup>s</sup> Woods, Each of which S<sup>d</sup> parcels of land I give to my s<sup>d</sup> Kinsman Tho<sup>s</sup> Gray . . . . When he comes to Twenty one years of age, But all the improvments and proffits of it untill then, I give to my Brother Edward. And . . . . if my s<sup>d</sup> Nephew Tho<sup>s</sup> Gray dye before he arive to the age of Twenty one that then the s<sup>d</sup> land Shall go to the next male Heir of my s<sup>d</sup> Brother Edward y<sup>t</sup> Shall arive to y<sup>e</sup> Age of Twenty one years, but if he have no male Heir y<sup>t</sup> lives to the age of Twenty one years, That then the s<sup>d</sup> three parcels of land shall Remain with My s<sup>d</sup> Brother"

To "my beloved Brother in Law Wilm Richmond the Gun which my father gave me, and my Pistol And to my Dear Sister Anna his wife I give two Cows, and the feather bed which I lye on with the bedcloathes belonging thereunto."

To "my Dear Sister Rebecca ye wife of John Pabodie My Negro woman Sarah . and all the feathers that I have in my

house."

"I also give all my houshold Stuff not all ready disposed of in this Will to be Equally divided between my s<sup>d</sup> Two Sisters Anna & Rebecca."

"all the Rest of my Estate not disposed in this my last Will .... Shall be at the disposal of my Brother Edw<sup>d</sup> Gray (w<sup>m</sup> I Constitute and Ordain the Sole Executor ....) But if this be not sufficient to pay my debts & funeral charges he may Sell as much of y<sup>e</sup> land I leave for his son as will answer them."

The witnesses were John Church, John Tomlin and Richard Billings, all of whom made oath to the will in August,\* 1723.

"a negro boy Called sollomon" was valued at £60, and "a negro woman Called Sarah" at £30. The total amount of the inventory was £2231, 13s., 8d. "Edward Gray Jun executor of . . . his Brother Docter Thomas Gray" made oath to the inventory, 5 August, 1723. [The inventory also recorded, 4:107.]

[4:195] On [\*] August, 1723, "mr Edward Gray of Little Compton...yeoman" was appointed administrator on the estate

of "Docter Thomas Gray Late of Little Compton".

[From unrecorded bond] On 5 August, 1723, Edward Gray of Little Compton, "Executor to the Last will . . . . of his Brother Thomas Gray Late of Little Compton Deceased", with John Church of Little Compton, and Charles Church of Bristol, as sureties, gave bond for £3000. The witnesses were William Anthony and Hezekiah Luther.

## AUTOGRAPHS OF MAJOR JOHN FREEMAN JOSIAH COOKE, THOMAS PAINE AND RICHARD HIGGINS

BY THE EDITOR

In the illustration facing page 145 of this issue we have reproduced a deed, dated 27 April, 1659, bearing the autograph signatures of Richard Higgins, Josiah Cooke, Thomas Paine and John Freeman, all of Eastham. This reproduction was made from a photostat copy (of the original deed) presented to the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants by Mr. Stanley W. Smith, of Boston, a member of the Society and a descendant of Josiah Cooke and Thomas Paine, the two witnesses.

Richard Higgins, the grantor, was the immigrant ancestor of the Higgins family, and it should be noted that, in signing the deed, he wrote his name "Richard Higgins", although the person who drew up the deed, for his signature, spelled the name

"Higgens".

Josiah Cooke, the first witness, was probably Josiah¹ Cooke, of Eastham, rather than the son, Josiah² Cooke, also of Eastham. Josiah² Cooke married Deborah³ Hopkins (Gyles², Stephen¹), in 1668, nine years after the date of this deed. Josiah¹ Cooke, of Eastham, was not a son of Francis¹ Cooke, the Mayflower Passenger, as shown by the Editor, in our third volume.\*

Thomas Paine, the second witness, married Mary Snow<sup>3</sup>

(Constance<sup>2</sup> Hopkins, Stephen<sup>1</sup>), of Eastham.

John<sup>2</sup> Freeman (Edmund<sup>1</sup>), who took the acknowledgment of the grantor, was then a Governor's Assistant, as shown by his signature. At this date he was a Lieutenant, later became a Captain, and on 2 June, 1685, was chosen Major. The last title is used in the caption of this article, as the one by which he is best known. John Freeman's wife was Mercy Prence, daughter of Governor Thomas Prence and Patience<sup>2</sup> Brewster (Elder William<sup>1</sup>).

The deed was dated 27 April, 1659, but was not acknowledged until 20 February, 1667/8, and was not recorded until after 2 June, 1685, the date when Plymouth Colony was divided into the three Counties of Barnstable, Bristol and Plymouth. As it

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was recorded "In page the 12th of the Book of Records of Lands", it must have been entered very soon after the Barnstable County Registry was started.

#### [RICHARD HIGGINS TO JONATHAN SPARROW]

To all people to whom these preents shall come. Know that I Richard Higgens of Easham in the Government of New Plimourth in New England in America Taylor doe by these preents Covenant bargaine and exchange a parcell of upland containing twenty acres be it more or lesse scituate and lying upon poche as the records testyfyeth: upon the Southwest side of a place commonly called youngs cove: ten acres bounded with marked trees at each corner: and upon the South side with mr. John Mayos land: dated Aprill 27th 1659 other ten acres of upland lying adiacent to the former ten acres it being two graunts: bounded a marke tree neere the head of the marsh next to Steven Snow at the head of youngs cove: from thence to the northermost bound tree of the former ten acres: and So to the Easterly bound tree of the land that was formerly Thomas Roberts: from thence downe to youngs cove as the said Thomas Roberts range runnes these bounds in both prcells containing twenty acrs be it more or lesse unto the said Jonathan Sparrow of the Towne of Easham in the Government of New Plimouth in New England Husbandman: for and in Consideration hereof the said Richard [Higg\*] Higgens doth acknowledge himselfe fully satisfyed and payd by way of exchange of other twenty acres of upland delivered unto the sayd Richard Higgens by Jonathan Sparrow and thereof and of every pte and parcell thereof for himself his heires and assignes and every of them doth fully and clearely acquitt exonerate and discharge him the said Jonathan Sparrow his heires executors and administrators and every of them for ever: Hath freely absolutely given graunted bargained exchanged enfeofed and confirmed: And by these preents doth fully clearely and absolutely give grant bargaine sell alianate enfeoffe and confirme unto the said Jonathan Sparrow and to his heires and assignes for ever: all the abovesaid mentioned lands of Richard Higgens and all the estate right title interest claime and demaund whatsoever which the said Richard Higgens hath of in and to the Same lands or any the prmisses or any pte of them with there or

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or any there appurtenances: To have and to hold al the Said lands by these presents mentioned bargained and sold and every prte and parcell of them with there and every of there appurtenances unto the Said Jonathan Sparrow his heires and assignes: To the only proper use and behooffe of the said Jonathan Sparrow and of his heires and assignes for ever: To be holden of his Maiesty as of his Mannor of East Greenewich in the County of Kent in the Realme of England in free and common Soccage and not in Capite nor by Knights Service thereof due and of Right accustomed and with warrants against all people whatsoever from by or under him the said Richard Higgens or any of his heires executors or assignes claiming any right title interest of and into the Said bargained prmisses or any pte or parcell of them and there appurtenances whatsoever and the said Richard Higgens doth further Covenant and graunt that the said Richard Higgens at the time of bargaine and saile making of the abovesaid prmisses was the right and lawfull owner of the abovesaid bargained prmisses and doth covenant and graunt by these prsents that it shall and may be lawfull to and for the Sayd Jonathan Sparrow eyther by himselfe or his Attorneys to Record and Inroule or cause to be Recorded or Inrouled the title and tenour of these preents in his Sayd Maiestyes court at Plimouth aforesaid before the Governour of the time being according to the usuall manner and Customes of Recording and Inrouling deeds and Evidences in Such case made and provided In Witnesse whereof I the Said Richard Higgens hath to these prsents sett to my hand and Seale:

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#### THE WILL OF THOMAS BARTLETT<sup>6</sup>

BY THE EDITOR

THOMAS BARTLETT<sup>5</sup> (Robert<sup>4</sup>, Joseph<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Warren, Richard<sup>1</sup>), of Plymouth, was born there, 9 February, 1693/4, and died 28 September, 1764. He married, 10 January, 1716/17, Abigail Finney, but died without issue. Abigail died at Plymouth, 13 March, 1765, in her 68th year.

Thomas Bartlett's will, dated 1 April, 1758, and probated 4 November, 1764, is exceptionally interesting and valuable, because it contains the names of numerous relatives to whom

bequests were made.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of the will, and all records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records.

#### [THOMAS BARTLETT'S WILL]

[Plym. Co. Prob. 19:131] "Thomas Bartlett of Plimouth .... yeoman" made his will 1 April, 1758. Bequests were as follows:

To "my Dear and Loveing\* Abigail Bartlett one half of the Income of my Farm whereon I now dwell viz, One half of the Proffits of the whole, so that if my Executor Leasses out the place, the Tennant to have One half as is Customary and the . . . . Other half to be to my said wife to and for her support . . . . while she Continues my widdow. Likewise the improvement of the best room in my House and as much of the Other part of the House & buildings as makes up the One half Dureing her remaining my widdow, Also . . . . the use of One half my Pew in the meeting house, Dureing her life . also liberty of Cutting Eight Cords of wood of my wood Lotts pr year, for her Own fireing, the whole to be cutt and Carted for her yearly by my said Executor without any Cost to my said wife, so long as She Continues to dwell in my said House, as my widdow" also "my Indian servant Girl Sarah Cunnet . . . . Also . . . . the whole use and improvement of all my Household Stuff & Books Dureing her being my widdow, but if she Shall marry again, then I hereby

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Give her One third part of my said Household Goods & Books . . . . Except Such Books as I have Given [p. 132] . . . in this my will, also my will is that my Executor always find & provide at his Cost as Executor a good Beast for her use & improvement to Ride on, also two Cavees\* such as she shall chuse & Six of the best Sheep & one swine for each & every year dureing her remaining my widdow . . . . if my said wife Should marry again that my said Executor shall then pay her" £26, 13s., 4d. "at the

time of her mariage"

To "my Brother Ebenezer Bartlett my twenty acres of land (be it more or less) formerly laid out to James Barnaby and by Capt James Warren Conveyed to my Honrd father Robert Bartlett deceasd is part of my Homestead, whereon I now dwell, and Bounded Begining at a Stone set in the Ground on the Southerly side of the Roade above my House and from said stone about South East by a Maple tree (Standing in the fence) marked and thence in the same range to a small Beach tree marked on four Sides standing also in the fence and thence on the same range to the Brook and for the Other Boundaries Reference is had to the Deed of said twenty acres from said Warren to my said father, Togather with all the Buildings fences and trees . . . . on said land all hereby given to him for and dureing his Natural life and half my Right & intrest in South meadow Cedar Swamp also my wood Lot I bought of William Clark, and at said Ebenezers Death, the whole of the above premisses to Descend . . . . to my said Brother Ebenezers son, Thomas Bartlett . . . . and also half my Pew in the meeting House"

To "my Nephew Thomas Bartlett son of my brother Joseph Bartlett . . . . all the Residue and remainder of my Homestead On which I now dwell Containing by Estimation forty acres . . . . Togather with my peice of meadow adjoyning to Eell river at Mortons Landing so called contains about two Acres, and all that my one Sixteenth part of plimouth Beach, and my half of the wood Lott Joseph Warren & I bought of Samuel Bartlett Esqr also one half of my Right & Interest in South Meadow Cedar Swamp, and also my Share or Lott of mean land that fell to my father mr Robert Bartlett in the last Division of the Comon lands of the Proprietors of Plimouth and Plimton and half my Pew in

the meeting House after my wifes decease."

To "the Children of my Brother John Bartlett to be paid as hereafter mentiond" £13, 6s., 8d., "to be Equally divided among the Children of my said Brother."

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To "the Children of my Brother Robert Bartlett the like sum of" £13, 6s., 8d., "to be paid as hereafter mentiond to be equally divided to and among them."

divided to and among them"

[p. 133] To "Thomas Sears and Willard Sears sons of my sister Elizabeth Sears the sum of" £8, "to each of them and one Cow & Calf and ten sheep to each of them when and as they arrive to the age of twenty One years"

To "Abigail Bartlett wife of Ebenezer Bartlett my Brother" £6, 13s., 4d., "& Sarah Faunce wife of Thomas Faunce of plimouth" £6, 13s., 4d., "And to Chloe Sears daughter of my sister Elizabeth Sears" £6, 13s., 4d., "to be paid . . . . as hereafter

Ordered"

To "each of the Children of my Brothers & sisters That is to say, to so many of them as shall be alive at my Death a Handsom English Bible with Phsalms & Clasps and each & every of them a Catechism within Six months after my decease"

To "the First Church of Christ in Plimouth" £6, 13s., 4d., "within One year after my decease viz four pounds to purchase a piece of plate for said Church, and the remainder to be laid Out in Catechisms & Distributed to & among the Children of the said Church."

To "my five Brothers, John, Joseph, Ebenezer, Robert & Lemuel Bartlett, all my wearing apparell to be Equally Divided among them."

To "my Brother Robert Bartlett my Great Bible and to my Brother Ebenezer Bartletts son Ebenezer my Second Volume of mr Flavells workes, and to Thomas Bartlett son of my Brother Joseph Bartlett my Book is mr Robert Trails sermons and Doctr Watts sermons, is viz first Volumn to John Bartlett son of Brother John Bartlett and the Second Vollumn to Lemuel Bartlett the son of Lemuel Bartlett . And all the Remainder of my Books I Give to my aboves five Brothers John, Joseph Ebenezer, Robert & Lemuel Bartletts to be Equally divided to and among them, after my wifes decease."

"all the remainder . . . . of my Estate whatsoever and wheresoever I Give to my Beloved Brother Joseph Bartlett and he to pay all my Just Debts and Legacies beforementioned and my funeral Charges, togather with all the profits he may make of my farm, in Plimouth after my wife receives the whole of One half as Before [p. 134] Beforementioned of the profits and if and the second of the second o and the property of the last terms of the last t the second of District the Residue Given to my said Brother togather with the profits he may make of the farm be not sufficient to pay all my Just Debts funeral Charges and Legacies, then the said Legacies and Charges, Shall be paid out of that part of my Real Estate which I have . . . . Given to his son Thomas Bartlett . . . . and further my will is that the Legacies Given Excepting those the time of payment of which is herein before Expressed be paid . . . . as follows, . . . what I have . . . . to my Brother Johns Children and to Abigail Bartlett Given to be paid in Cash Shall be paid them . . . . within One year after my said wifes decease or Second marriage and what I have given . . . . To my Brother Roberts Children and to Sarah Faunce Shall be paid them within two years after my wifes Decease or Second marriage, and what I have Given to my Brother Lemuel Bartletts Children, and to Chloe Sears . . . . Shall be paid them within three years after my said wifes decease or Second Marriage."

"my said Brother Joseph Bartlett" was appointed sole

executor.

The witnesses were Samuel Bartlett, Nathaniel Shurtleff and

Ephraim Spooner.

On 5 November, 1764, the will of "Thomas Bartlett late of plimouth . . . . yeoman deceasd" was probated, on the oath of Nathaniel Shurtleff and Ephraim Spooner, and administration

granted to Joseph Bartlett.

[19:268] "An Inventory of the estate of Mr Thomas Bartlet late of Plimouth deceas'd" was taken by Silvanus Bartlett, Jeremiah Howes and Joshua Swift, on 15 January, 1765. The real estate was: "½. lot cedar swamp in Plimton (by information)" £5, 6s., 8d.; "8o. acres pine Land at halfway pond (by information)" 10s., 8d.; "Wood lot 27½. acres at head Eel-river" £5, 6s., 8d.; "Wood lot 3o. acres at head Eel-river (adjoining)" £7, 10s.; "Piece meadow lying on side Eel-river about two acres" £26, 13s., 4d.; "39. acres land adjoining forge at Eel-river" £130, 3s., 4d.; "Homestead & Buildings standing thereon" £300. The total amount of the inventory was £655, 11s., 7½d. The "Pew in the meeting house (first precinct)" was valued at £16; "Indian Girl" £8; "Indian boy" £4.

On 14 October, 1765, the three appraisers made oath to the inventory, before Edward Winslow, Justice of the Peace. On the same day "Io Bartlet adm" on sd estate" made oath to the

inventory.

## AND THE ESTATE OF HIS WIFE PRISCILLA

BY THE EDITOR

Peter Bennett of Middleborough, Mass., married Priscilla's Howland (Isaac², John¹), of that town, 30 October, 1700, and had eleven children: Elizabeth, married John Darling; Isaac, married Mary Drew; Joseph, married Thankful Sprout; Susanna, married John Drew; Peter, married Sarah Stephens; Priscilla, married John Miller; Anna, died in infancy; Jedediah, died without issue; Jael, married Abiezer Edson; Nathan, married Jemima Samson; Deborah, married Samuel Thacher.

Priscilla (Howland) Bennett died at Middleborough, 3 March, 1746, and Capt. Peter Bennett died there, 22 October, 1749. Both

were buried in the old cemetery at The Green.

Priscilla's brother, Seth<sup>3</sup> Howland (*Isaac*<sup>2</sup>, *John*<sup>1</sup>) died without issue, in 1729, and she received certain real estate as her share in his property. It is probable that this was the real estate mentioned in her inventory.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of Capt. Peter Bennett's will and of all records and original documents on file, relating

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to the settlement of his and his wife's estates, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records.

In another article in this issue will be found the settlement of

Seth<sup>3</sup> Howland's estate.

Both of these articles are printed at the expense of Mrs. John M. Rice, of Waltham, Mass., who is a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and is descended from three sisters of Seth<sup>3</sup> Howland (*Isaac*<sup>2</sup>, *John*<sup>1</sup>), as follows:

[Plym. Co. Prob. 11: 382] Peter Bennett, of Middleborough, made his will on 5 October, 1749. Bequests were as follows:

To "my son Isaac Bennet (Besides what I have heretofore given him by Deed of Gift) a Certain parcel of my Homestead land & meadow which lyeth there adjoyning together whereon I now dwell lying in the . . . . twelve Mens purchase in Middlebro afores<sup>d</sup> which land is bounded as followeth beginning at a long Stone set into the Ground and other Stones laid about it Standing in the middle of the breadth of the twelfth lot in Number in the first allotment of Hundred Acre lots in said Twelve mens purchase it being the South East Corner bound of that parcel of my Homestead which I have lately given unto my said son Isaac Bennet by Deed of Gift: and from thence ranging North Eighty Eight degrees & a half Easterly Cross my land unto the range of the Easterly side of said twelfth lot: and from thence to include all my Land & meadow which lyeth their adjoyning together home to the brook Called the fall brook, Together with the dwelling house Barne & Fences on sd land, also I give unto my sd son Isaac Bennet my Sawmill & three quarters of my Gristmill Standing on the brook called fall brook, and also my One Seventh & a quarter of a Seventh part of that two hundred acres of land which was formerly laid out to Gov<sup>r</sup> Prence lying butting on the northerly side of the fall brook in Middlebro; being that which I formerly bought of Collo Shubal Gorham Deceasd", also "the One half for quantity & quality of that my land & meadow which I formerly bought of Nathan Howland lying in the purchase Called the Six & twenty mens purchase in Middlebro aforesd &

Peter Bennet Dec<sup>d</sup> One Share thereof, and unto the Children of my son Nathan Bennet Deceasd One Share thereof, and unto my Daughter Elizabeth Darling One Share thereof, and unto my Daughter Susana Drew one Share thereof, and unto my daughter Priscilla Miller One share thereof and Unto my Grandson Abiezer Edson (the son of my daughter Jael Edson Deceasd) One Share thereof and unto my Daughter Deborah Thacher One Share thereof, and my Will is that all the lands & Real Estate which I have herein given to my Children or Grand Children Shall belong unto them . . . in Manner as I have given the same to them & their respective heirs . . . . forever"

"my son Isaac Bennet" was made executor.

The witnesses were Jacob Tomson, Gershom Cobb and Thomas Paddock.

The will was probated on 6 November, 1749, on the oaths of the three witnesses, and administration granted to "Isaac Bennet of s<sup>d</sup> Middlebro Husbandman Executor in the same will named"

[11:316] "A true Inventory on the Estate Both Real & Personal of Cap<sup>t</sup> Peter Bennett late of Middleborough . . . . Deceasd" was taken on 20 November, 1749, by Nehemiah Bennet, Seth Tinkham and Gershom Cobb. The real estate, not described, was valued at £5085, and the personal estate at £1013, 17s.

The three appraisers made oath to the inventory, 27 December, 1749, and the executor made oath to it, 1 January, 1749.\*

#### [Mrs. Priscilla Bennett's Estate]

[Plym. Co. Prob. II: 318] On 27 December, 1749, an inventory "of the Estate being all Real of mrs Priscilla Bennett late wife of Capt Peter Bennet, late of Middlebro.... Deceasd" was taken by Nehemiah Bennett, Seth Tinkham and Gershom Cobb. The real estate, not described, was valued at £650. The three appraisers made oath to the inventory, 27 December, 1749, and Isaac Bennet, administrator, made oath to it, I January, 1749.\*

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#### SETH3 HOWLAND'S ESTATE

BY THE EDITOR

Seth<sup>3</sup> Howland (*Isaac*<sup>2</sup>, *John*<sup>1</sup>) was born 28 November, 1677, and died at Middleborough, Mass., 26 October, 1729. He married Elizabeth Delano, of Middleborough, on 24 May, 1728, and died intestate, leaving no issue.

The widow sold to the heirs her rights in the real estate, and by decree of the probate court it was divided into six equal shares, one each for the surviving brother and the three surviving sisters, one for the heirs of the deceased brother and one for the heirs of the deceased sister.

The will of Capt. Peter Bennett, who married Seth<sup>8</sup> Howland's sister Priscilla, and the estate of Priscilla, are printed in another article in this issue.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records, relating to the settlement of Seth<sup>3</sup> Howland's estate.

Both of these articles are printed at the expense of Mrs. John M. Rice of Waltham, Mass., a descendant of Capt. Peter and Priscilla (Howland) Bennett, in three lines, and a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

#### [Seth<sup>3</sup> Howland's Estate]

[Plym. Co. Prob., 5: 603] On 15 November, 1729, "Elizabeth Howland Relict widow of Seth Howland Late of Middleboro.... & m<sup>r</sup> Nath<sup>ll</sup> Southworth of middleborough" were appointed administrators of the estate of "Seth Howland of s<sup>d</sup> middleboro.... Lately Dved Intestate"

[From unrecorded bond] On 15 November, 1729, Elizabeth Howland, widow, and "Nath" Southworth Gent", as administrators, with Samuel Barrows and "William Thomas the Third", yeomen, as sureties, all being of Middleborough, gave bond for £1000. The bond was signed by Elizabeth Howland (by a mark), "Nath" Southworth, "Samuel barrws" and William Thomas. The witnesses were John Winslow and "Eliza" Winslow.

[From original document] The inventory was taken, 19 February, 1729/30, by Samuel Barrows, William Thomas and Jacob Tomson. The total amount was £1772, 18s., 2d., less debts of £47, 3s., 10d. The real estate was as follows:

One watch was sold for £3, 15s.

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### JACOB MITCHELL'S ESTATE

JACOB MITCHELL<sup>3</sup>, son of Experience Mitchell, by his first wife, Jane<sup>2</sup> Cooke (*Francis*<sup>1</sup>), was married at Plymouth, on 7 November, 1666, to Susanna<sup>2</sup> Pope (*Thomas*<sup>1</sup>). They settled at Dartmouth, and both were killed there, by the Indians, in 1675.

They left three children: Jacob Mitchell<sup>4</sup>, who married, 1st, Deliverance Kingman, and, 2d, Rebecca Cushman<sup>4</sup> (*Isaac*<sup>3</sup>, *Mary*<sup>2</sup> *Allerton, Isaac*<sup>1</sup>); Thomas Mitchell<sup>4</sup>, who married Elizabeth Kingman; Mary Mitchell<sup>4</sup>, who married Samuel Kingman.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records in the Plymouth Colony Court Orders and the Plymouth County Pro-

bate Records, relating to the settlement of the estate.

## [THE ESTATE OF JACOB MITCHELL<sup>3</sup>]

[Court Orders, 5:131] At a court held 7 March, 1675.\* "Experience Michell and Edward Michell appointed by the Court to use the best Care to enquire after and take into theire Costody the estate of Jacob Michell Deceased, and to make Report thereof to the Court that soe it may be prefered to the best that may be for the Good of the Children;"

[Court Orders, 5: 174] At a court held 5 March, 1677. "Experience Michell Edward Michell and Joseph Bartlett are allowed and appointed by to be Gaurdians to the Children of Jacob Michell Deceased to Call in the Debts Due unto the said estate and to Gather the same together and to Improve the same for the future Good of the said Children when they Come to be of age;"

[Plym. Co. Prob. Rcds., 1:92] An "Inventory of the Estate of Jacob Mitchel Late of Dartmouth who deceased in the year 1675" was exhibited to the Court, at Plymouth, on 17 March, 1690/1. The real estate was not appraised. The only personal

estate was: "money" £27, 15s., and "Pewter" £1.

"Thomas Michel Son of Sd Deceased" made oath to the inventory, and administration was granted to "Edward Mitchell

of Bridgwater and to Thomas Mitchell Son of Jacob mitchell deceased"

[From unrecorded bond] On 17 March, 1690/1, "Edward michell" and "Thomas michell" as administrators, with Edward Fobes, of Bridgewater, as surety, gave a bond for £30 sterling. The witnesses were "John Haward", John Kingman and Samuel Sprague.

#### EBENEZER RICHMOND'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

EBENEZER RICHMOND<sup>4</sup>, son of John Richmond and his second wife, Abigail<sup>3</sup> Rogers (*John*<sup>2</sup>, *Thomas*<sup>1</sup>), was born at Newport, R. I., 12 May, 1676, and married, about 1700 or 1701, Anna Sprout<sup>3</sup>, daughter of Robert Sprout and Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Samson (*Henry*<sup>1</sup>), of Scituate, Mass.

Ebenezer and Anna (Sprout) Richmond had six children, recorded at Middleborough, Mass.: Ebenezer, Robert, Anna,

Rachel, Elizabeth, Silvester.

Ebenezer Richmond<sup>4</sup> made his will, 7 April, 1729, and an agreement of his heirs was dated 12 May, 1729, consequently he died between those two dates.

In the original will the wife's name was first written "hannah", but the initial letter was crossed out, apparently in the ink used in the rest of the word. Unfortunately, the wife's name was recorded as "Hannah" on the Plymouth County Probate Records; but there is conclusive evidence that her name was Anna.

Robert Sprout's daughter "Anna" was born in March, 1671/2, and in his will,\* dated 23 November, 1712, "my daughter Mercy oldham" and "my daughter Anna Richmond" and "my daughter

Hannah Cane" received legacies.

Thomas Oldham and Mercy Sprout were married, at Scituate, 27 June, 1683, and Ephraim Keen and Hannah Sprout were married, at Scituate, 1 April, 1703; but the marriage record of Ebenezer Richmond and Anna Sprout has not been found.

On 6 June, 1712, Robert Sprout, then of Middleborough, Mass., sold land in that town to "Mercy oldham ye wife of Thomas oldham & anna† Richmond The wife of Ebenezar Richmond & Hannah Keen the wife of Ephraim". [Plym. Co. Deeds, 10:2:28.]

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On 16 June, 1713, "Thomas Oldham & Mercy his Wife . . . . and Eph<sup>m</sup> Kean & Hannah his Wife . . . . & Eben<sup>r</sup> Richmond & anna his Wife" sold land which "did formerly Belong unto our Hond Father Robt Sprout Deceased". [Plym. Co. Deeds, 12:32.]

Other quotations from the original records could be given, but enough have been presented to show that Ebenezer Richmond married Anna Sprout, and that Hannah Sprout, her sister, married

Ephraim Keen.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of Ebenezer Sprout's will and all other records, or documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of the estate.

## [EBENEZER RICHMOND'S WILL]

[From original will] On 7 April, 1729, Ebenezer Richmond, of Middleborough, made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "wife annah\* richmond all and whol and soul improvement of my whole estate reale and Parsonel during her life"

To "my eldest Son ebenezer richmon all that my lot of land lying on assawampset neck which I have heretofore given to him by a deed of gift"

To "my Son roberd richmond the one half of the farm I now live on with the howsing and fenceing on it that is to Say the

Sowest end:"

To "my Son Silvester richmond the other half of my Said

farm begining at the norwest end"

To "my dafter annah richmond one feather bed and beding and ten pound to be paid by my Son roberd richmond at my wifes deces and ten pound to be paid by my Son Silvester richmond at my wifes deces:"

'To "my dafter rachel richmond one fether bed and beding and five pound to be payd by my Son roberd richmond at my

"my wife" and "my Son ebenezer richmond" were appointed executors.

The will was signed by a mark. The witnesses were James Sprout and Benjamin Spooner. On 8 July, 1729, Benjamin Spooner made oath that he wrote the will and witnessed it. James Sprout made oath to the will on 6 October, 1729. [The will also recorded, 7:419.]

[From original agreement] On 12 May, 1729, "Ebenezer Richmond and Robart Richmond of . . . middleborough . . . . sons of Ebenezer Richmond Late of . . . middleborough aforesd now decsed & aner Richmond and Rachel Richmond Both of midleboro . . . . daughters of sd decesed and Elizabeth washpond another of ye daughters of sd decesed & Edward washpond Her Husband Both of Bridgwater" agreed "that this our fathers Last will shall Stand and Remain In full fors according to to the true Intent and meening of the same" The agreement was signed by Ebenezer Richmond, Robert Richmond, Anna Richmond (by a mark), Rachel Richmond, Elizabeth Washburn (by a mark), Edward Washburn and Silvester Richmond. The witnesses were Benjamin Spooner and Nathaniel Southworth, for all but Silvester Richmond, whose signature was witnessed by Edward Winslow and Mary Winslow.

Ebenezer Richmond, Anna Richmond and Rachel Richmond made oath to the agreement, 29 June, 1730; Robert Richmond made oath to it 13 September, 1731; Edward Washburn, of Bridgewater, and Elizabeth Washburn, his wife, made oath to it, 24 November, 1733; and Silvester Richmond made oath to it, 6 September, 1737, all before Isaac Winslow, Judge of Probate. [The agreement was also recorded, 7:419.]

[From unrecorded warrant] On 6 October, 1729, "Capt Ichabod Southworth Mr Nathli Southworth & Mr Ebenez Hambling", all of Middleborough, were appointed to appraise the estate.

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken 28 December, 1729, by Ichabod Southworth, Ebenezer Hamlin and Nathaniel Southworth. The real estate was: "His hoome Steed

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with ye Hous and fenceing" £350; "his fouer Lots In asawamset neck with ye fencing & hous" £180. Ebenezer Hamlin and Nathaniel Southworth made oath to the inventory, 5 March,

1729/30. [The inventory also recorded, 7:420.]

[From unrecorded petition.] "Hond: Sir I have been for some time kept out of my Wives Portion and can not hear that any of her Brothers Richmonds will administer I would pray your Honour To send a Citation to the Widow Anne Richmond and Ebenezer Richmond the Eldest son & to Robert & Silvester Richmonds That if they or Either of them will administer on the Estate of our Hond Father Ebenezer Richmond, Deceased if they see cause & if they will not I pray that I may have Liberty to administer my self & I pray your Hon To send me word whether you will admit me to administer or no & when

Roch\* 17 April 1738: Caleb Cowing"

[Addressed on the back] "To The Hond Isaac Winslow Esqr

#### LIEUT. EPHRAIM<sup>3</sup> BRADFORD'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

EPHRAIM<sup>3</sup> BRADFORD (William<sup>2-1</sup>), of Plymouth and Kingston, Mass., married Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Brewster (Wrestling<sup>3</sup>, Love<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>), on 13 February, 1709/10, and had ten children recorded at Plymouth: Deborah, died in 1732, unmarried; An unnamed son; Anna; An unnamed daughter; Elizabeth; Ephraim, died before December, 1741; Abigail; Lusanna; Elijah, died young; An unnamed son.

The settlement of the father's estate shows that there were four other children, whose births are not on the records of Plymouth or Kingston. They were: Ruth, Ezekiel, Simeon and Wait.

Ephraim<sup>3</sup> Bradford made his will 16 December, 1741, and it was probated 6 October, 1746. In the inventory, taken 20 February, 1746/7, he was called Lieutenant.

The will mentions "my three Sons" and "my daughters", but

does not give their names.

The guardianship proceedings show that the three surviving sons were: Ezekiel<sup>4</sup>, Simeon<sup>4</sup> and Wait<sup>4</sup>.

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## ALBERT DEVINENT AND ADDRESS OF THE PARTY OF

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The account of the executor, presented 6 August, 1753, shows that the personal property, in accordance with the will, had been divided between five daughters: Ruth<sup>4</sup>, wife of Nathan Chandler; Anna<sup>4</sup>, wife of Ebenezer Chandler; Abigail<sup>4</sup>, wife of Peleg Holmes; Elizabeth<sup>4</sup> Bradford; and Lucy<sup>4</sup> Bradford.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of the will and of all other records, or documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of Lieut. Ephraim<sup>3</sup>

Bradford's estate.

## [Lieut. Ephraim Bradford's Will]

[Plymouth Co. Prob. Reds., 10: 343] "Ephraim Bradford of Kingston . . . . yeoman" made his will on 16 December, 1741.

Bequests were as follows:

"all my Real Estate whatsoever and wheresoever it is or May be found Shall be Equally divided between my three Sons & if any or Either of them Shall Decease before they arrive to the age of twenty One the Surviveor or Surviveors Shall have it by Surviveorship. My Mind is that the Debts aforesaid shall be paid One third part out of the Personal Estate and two thirds out of the Real — My Mind is that my Real Estate be not Divided between my sons till ye yonguest arrive to age or Decease. Morever my Mind is that my Estate Real & personal Shall come under no Division untill ten years from the day of the Date herof Notwithstanding the Division of my Real Estate Shall be as Aforesaid Onely not Subject to any Division till the ten years are Expired and at the End of ten years my mind is that the personal Estate Shall be Divided between my daughters or Such as legally Represent them if any Should decease"

"My Trusty Frind Joseph Holmes of Kingston to be my

Execr"

The witnesses were Eleazer Harlow, Abner Bradford and Francis Adams.

The will of "Ephraim Bradford late of Plimouth"\* was presented for probate, by the executor, on 6 October, 1746, and was probated on the testimony of Abner Bradford, one of the witnesses, and administration was granted to Joseph Holmes, yeoman, of Kingston, the executor named.

\*"Plimouth" is plainly an error of the recording clerk. In every other record relating to the estate, he is called "of Kingston".

[10:374] "An Inventory of the Estate of Leiut Ephraim Bradford of Kingston Deceasd" was taken, 20 February, 1746/7, by Wrestling Brewster, Judah Hall and Philip Chandler. The total amount was £1625, 6s. "The Real Estate", which was not described, was valued at £1338; "a Pew in the Meeting house" at £15. Joseph Holmes, the executor, made oath to it, 4 March, 1746.

[From original petitions and bonds] On 3 February, 1747, Ezekiel Bradford and Simeon Bradford, both "above 14", minor sons "of Ephraim Bradford late of Kingston", deceased, chose Wrestling Brewster, yeoman, of Kingston, as their guardian. Each petition bears the autograph signature of the minor and is witnessed by Ebenezer Cobb, Jr., and Benjamin Chipman. On the same day Wrestling Brewster was appointed guardian of Wait Bradford, a minor son "under 14". The three bonds of the guardian were signed by Wrestling Brewster, also by John Brewster, innholder, of Kingston, as surety, and were witnessed by Joseph Holmes and Job Hall. [The petitions of Ezekiel and Simeon are also recorded, 11:76, 77. The letter of guardianship for Wait is also recorded, 10:523.]

[13:75] On 6 August, 1753, Joseph Holmes,\* the executor of "Ephraim Bradford late of said Kingston", presented an account, which was allowed.

A payment had been received from William Churchell.

Payments had been made to: Dr. Stockbridge; Ichabod Bradford, constable; Richard Adams; Dr. Loring; Judah Hall; James Cobb; Gershom Cobb; Samuel Bryant; Ebenezer Chandler; Dr. Harlow; Joshua Chandler; Samuel Foster; Dr. Wadsworth; Abner Bradford; Philip Chandler; John Adams; Robert Cook, constable; Dr. Le Baron; Deacon Wrestling Brewster; Benjamin Samson.

"To Sundreys to Ruth Chandler the Wife of Nathan Chandler" £20, 8s., 2d.

THE unequalled, and rapidly increasing, collection of data for "The Mayflower Genealogies", owned by the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, could not be replaced, if destroyed, without the expenditure of many thousands of dollars.

By vote of the Board of Assistants, any United States bonds will be accepted in payment of Life or Minor Life Membership Fees. One \$100.00 bond or two \$50.00 bonds will pay either fee.

Cash gifts and gifts of Liberty Bonds, or any other bonds, are desired.

#### ANOTHER BREWSTER IMPRINT IDENTIFIED WITH A BREWSTER AUTOGRAPH ON ITS TITLE PAGE

By George Ernest Bowman

It is especially pleasing to me, as a descendant of Elder William Brewster, to announce that I have identified "A Christian Plea Conteyning three Treatises" etc., printed in 1617, as a product of his press at Leyden, Holland, and, at the same time, to present, in the accompanying illustration, an autograph signature of the Elder, inscribed on the title-page of a copy of this book.

My list of the books said to have been printed by Brewster, at Leyden, now includes nineteen different titles, besides a number of duplicate copies; but in no other instance have I found a Brewster imprint bearing an autograph signature of the Elder himself.

This autograph was called to my attention by a descendant of the Elder, Prof. Richard T. Ely, of the University of Wisconsin, who wrote me that the book is owned by the State Historical Society of Wisconsin; but who did not know where it was printed.

This Brewster autograph, on the title-page of a book without name of printer or place of printing, at once aroused my interest, and I soon found a copy of the book, in the Prince Collection, at the Boston Public Library.

On turning over the pages, I immediately recognized distinctive ornaments, etc., characteristic of known Brewster imprints; and a critical comparison of this book with known Brewster imprints owned by the Boston Public Library, and with the three

specimens owned by the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, finally convinced me that Rev. Francis Johnson's "A Christian Plea Conteyning three Treatises", published in 1617, is a hitherto unnoted product of the Brewster press at Leyden, Holland.

With the assistance of Prof. Ely, arrangements were made to secure a photograph of the title-page of the Wisconsin Historical Society's copy of this book, and the photograph has been reproduced in the accompanying half-tone illustration, which is about

two-thirds the size of the original page.

Only eight autograph signatures of Elder Brewster are known to me. Six of them, including the one here reproduced, are in books once owned by him. A seventh, written in 1631, is on the original Plymouth Colony Records, at Plymouth; and the eighth is signed to a letter, written in 1639, now owned by the Boston Public Library.

Five of the six autographs in books, including the one here shown, are accompanied by the motto "Hebel est omnis Adam".

# THE WILLS OF GEORGE CADMAN AND HIS WIDOW HANNAH

BY THE EDITOR

GEORGE CADMAN married Hannah Hathaway<sup>4</sup>, daughter of Arthur Hathaway and Sarah<sup>3</sup> Cooke (*John*<sup>2</sup>, *Francis*<sup>1</sup>), and settled in Dartmouth, Mass. He made his will, 24 November,

1718, and it was probated, 6 January, 1718/19.

The inventory was dated "the third of the tenth month called November", 1718, and was sworn to, 6 January, 1718/19; but it is certain that "December" should have been written on the inventory, instead of "November"; first, because, in Old Style dating, the tenth month, as shown by its name, was December (not November, which was the ninth month); secondly, because the will was not made until 24 November, 1718, and the inventory, of course, could not have been taken three weeks before that date. George Cadman, therefore, died between 24 November and 3 December, 1718.

The original will is still in the files, but it is badly worn, and is now in three pieces, which probably will become four very soon. It has been necessary, therefore, to supply some parts of the text from the record in the third volume of the Bristol County Probate

Records.

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# NAMED OF TAXABLE PARTY AND ADDRESS OF TAXABLE PARTY.

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Widow Hannah (Hathaway) Cadman, of Dartmouth, made her will, 13 February, 1748/9, and it was probated, 2 May, 1749. The inventory was dated 14 March, 1749, but this must have been in New Style dating, as it was sworn to on 2 May, 1749. Hannah Cadman, therefore, died between 13 February and 14 March, 1748/9.

The original will, signed by a mark, is still in the files, and is

in good condition.

These two wills mention the only child of George and Hannah Cadman, namely, Elizabeth, wife of William White of Dartmouth, also many grandchildren and greatgrandchildren. This William White was not the William White born in 1690, son of Samuel<sup>3</sup> White (Resolved<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>) of Rochester, Mass., as was shown in my article in Volume XII, page 117, of this magazine.

The ancestry of William White of Dartmouth, who married

Elizabeth Cadman, has not been discovered.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of the wills, and of all other probate records and files relating to the settlement of the estates, of George and Hannah (Hathaway) Cadman, found in

the Bristol County, Mass., probate records.

This article is printed at the expense of Miss Mary E. Potter, of Boston, Mass., Mrs. Daniel B. Spalding, of Stonington, Conn., and Miss Ella H. Read, of New Bedford, Mass., descendants of George and Hannah Cadman, through William and Elizabeth (Cadman) White, and members of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

These ladies have also contributed the expense of printing, in another article in this issue, the will of William White who married Elizabeth Cadman and the will of their son William White.

### [GEORGE CADMAN'S WILL]

[From original will] George Cadman, of Dartmouth, Mass., made his will, 24 November, 1718. Bequests were as follows:

To "Hannah my . . . . wife all my homested farm that is laid out in the Eight hundred acre Devtion\* with all the Houseing orchads & fences in or upon the Sd Land with all [the salt] meadow Joyning to the above Sd land [allso two acres of Salt meadow Joyning to Joseph Tripps meadow all the abovesaid] premises to be & remain to my Sd wife untill my Granson George White [Come] to the age of twenty one years & when my sd

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Granson George White shall Arive to the age of twentyone years my Will is that he shall have & Immeadiately posses the one ha[1]f of all the above S<sup>d</sup> Land & meadow & to take his half on the north Side of both upland & meadow by measure: & the South Side of the above S<sup>d</sup> Land & meadow with all the Housing orchards fences & apurtenances thereon or ther unto belonging.... my S<sup>d</sup> Loveing wife Hannah Shall have & quietly posses dureing the time of her natural Life & Immeadiately after my wives Deceas all the above S<sup>d</sup> Land & meadow I Give to my S<sup>d</sup> Granson George White"

To "my loveing daughter Elizabeth White & to her Husband William White all the upland & meadow that is laid out where they now live with two acres & fifty Rods of Sedg flat Lying in acoxset river at the Shiprock flat & one hundred & five acres of land in the four hundred acre devition as it is laid out & quallified & one quarter of an acre of Seder Swomp all the ab[oves<sup>d</sup>] land meadow & Ceder Swomp is . . . within the Township of [Dart]mouth afore S<sup>d</sup> [Farther I Give . . . . to] my S<sup>d</sup> daughter Elisabeth & her Husband William White the one half of my last dev[i]tion of land the above S<sup>d</sup> land meadow & Ceder Swomp given to my Sd daughter Elisabeth White & her Husband William White to be & remain to them dureing . . . . their naturall Lives and after their deceas the Homested farm where the Sd William White now liveth I Give to my Granson William White"

"the one hundr[ed] & five acres of upland above given to my Daughter Elisabeth White & her Husband William White after their Dec[ea]s I Give to my Granson Roger White"

"the remaing part of my four hundred acre devitio being ninty five acres . . . . I Give to my Granson Christopher White"

"all my meadow or Sedg flat lying on the Ship flat & allso all my Last devition of land I Give to my two gransons viz: Roger White & Christopher White & to be Equally devided between my Sd two Granson"

"to my four Gran Sons William George Roger & Christopher one half Share of Ceder Swomp . . . . that is to say one quarter of a Share att my Deceas & the other quar of a share after their father & Mothers Deceas"

To "my Grandaughter Sarah White" £20, ["to be paid by Grandson George White one yeare after the sd Lands given to him Come into his hands"]

To "Alice Anthony Daughter of John Anthony of Rhoad Island" £5, "in money & one good Bed & Beding therunto belonging"

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To "my negro man James his freedom after . . . . three years & three quarters from the Date of these presents"

To "my Daughter Elisabeth White" £30.

"all the rest & residue of my personall estate I give . . . . to my . . . . wife Hannah whom I Constitute . . . . Soule Executrix of this my Last Will"

The witnesses were William Cadman, Robert Tripp and Joseph Tripp, all of whom made oath to the will on 6 January, 1718/19.

[The will was also recorded, 3: 500.]

[From original inventory] The inventory of George Cadman "yeoman" was taken, at Dartmouth, on "the third of the tenth month called November\*" 1718, by Thomas Hathaway, George Lawton and Thomas Taber, Jr., all of Dartmouth. The only real estate was: "his housing and lands" £1700. The total amount of the inventory was £2282, 5s., 4d. It was sworn to, 6 January, 1718/19, by "mrs Hannah Cadman" executrix of "mr George Cadman . . . . Deceased". [The inventory was also recorded, 3:502.]

[From unrecorded bond] On 6 January, 1718/19, Hannah Cadman, widow, as executrix, with James Tripp and William Cadman, both of Dartmouth, as sureties, gave bond for £4000. Hannah Cadman and James Tripp signed by marks. The wit-

nesses were John Cary and Abigail Cary.

[3:534] On 25 February, 1718/19, William White and Elizabeth White, of Dartmouth, acknowledged the receipt, from "our Mother Hannah Cadman widow Executrix . . . . of our father George Cadman of Dartmouth", of the legacy of £30 given to the said Elizabeth White by the will. The witnesses were Alice Anthony, who signed by a mark, and Philip Taber.

[3:534] On 21 February, 1718/19, Alice Anthony, of Dartmouth, receipted to Hannah Cadman, the executrix, for £5 and a feather bed and bedding, given her in the will. The receipt was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Robert Tripp and Thomas

Taber, Jr.

[From unrecorded receipt] On 29 June, 1736, Elizabeth White, of Little Compton, acknowledged the receipt, from Hannah Cadman, executrix, of the legacy of £20, given her by George Cadman in his will. The receipt was signed by a mark. The witnesses were John Brown and William White.

### [WIDOW HANNAH CADMAN'S WILL]

[From original will] "Hannah Cadman of Dartmouth . . . . widow" made her will, 13 February, 1748/9. Bequests were as follows:

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To "my Daughter Elizabeth White Wife to William of sd Dartmouth all my Wearing apparril also my Silver tankard and Smalest Silver Spoon"

To "my Grandson William White my Great Bible my Bigest Silver Cup and my silver Spoon marked with the Letters WC

and fifty pounds in mony or Bills of Credit old teanor"

To "my son\* George white one silver Spoon and my Gun which was his Grandfather Cadmans togather with my Cubbord that stands in the Chamber I also give unto him my sd Grandson George white all my farming tools as Cart yoaks Chains axes hoes and other tools"

To "my Grand daughter Sarah Brown Wife of John Brown of Tivertown my small silver Cup and one Silver Spoon and"

£20, "in mony or Bills of Credit old teanor"

To "my Grand daughter Hannah Taber Wife of William Taber of Dartmouth" £25, "in mony or Bills of Credit old teanor"

"To my two Great Granddaughters hannah Slocum and Mary Slocum Daughters to my Grand Daughter Elizabeth Slocum deceased" £30, "in Mony or Bills of Credit old teanor . . . . that is to say to Each of them fiften pounds as they Shall Come to the age of Eighteen years but If Either of them Shall die Before they Receive their portion . . . . the next surviveing sister Shall have it"

To "five of my other Grand Children Beside Beside who are above named (viz) Roger white Christopher White oliver White Thomas and Susanna White to Each of them one Silver Spoon to Be delivered to Each of them by my Executor . . . . when they severaly shall be Capable to Receive them Either by age or

Gurdains"

"all the Remainder of my Estate . . . . Shall Be Equaly Divided (Except what I shall hear after Give to Grand daughter Susanna White) Which I Equaly so Give to My Daughter Elizabeth White and my Six Grand Children namely William White Roger White Christopher White oliver White Abner White Thomas White and Susanna White But . . . my Grand daughter Susanna White Shall have my Best feather Bed and Bolster in part of her Equal Shear of the Whole so Give to My Daughter and Grand Children"

"Grandson William White" was appointed sole executor.

The will was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Benjamin Tripp, Joseph Tripp and Beriah Goddard. Benjamin Tripp and Joseph Tripp made oath to the will, at Freetown, 2 May, 1749. [The will was also recorded, 11:700.]

[11:702] The will was probated, at Freetown, on 2 May, 1749,

and administration granted to William White of Dartmouth, veoman, the executor named in the will.

[From unrecorded document] On 14 March, 1749, at Dartmouth, Joseph Brownell, Richard Cornell and Timothy Tripp, all of Dartmouth, were sworn as appraisers, before Silvester Richmond, Justice of the Peace.

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken, at Dartmouth, 14 March, 1749; "money and Bonds" amounted to £649, 12s., 6d.; "Rent" £25, 19s., 6d.; "a Quarter of an old Stable" £2.

The total was £1717, 19s., old tenor.

William White, the executor, and the three appraisers made oath to the inventory, at Freetown, 2 May, 1749. [The inventory was also recorded, 11:705.]

### THE WILLS OF WILLIAM WHITE OF DARTMOUTH AND HIS SON WILLIAM

By GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN

WILLIAM WHITE, SR., of Dartmouth, Mass., whose ancestry is unknown, must have become a legal resident of that town at some time before 5 July, 1705, when he was elected a petit juror.

As he was elected to public office on 5 July, 1705, he must have been born before 5 July, 1684. He could not, therefore, have been the William White, born at Rochester, Mass., 6 June, 1690, son of Samuel<sup>3</sup> White (Resolved<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>), although other writers have frequently confused these two Williams.

Important data relating to these two William Whites, of Dartmouth and Rochester, will be found in two articles, by the present

writer, in our twelfth volume.\*

William White of Dartmouth married Elizabeth Cadman<sup>5</sup> (Hannah Hathaway<sup>4</sup>, Sarah<sup>3</sup> Cooke, John<sup>2</sup>, Francis<sup>1</sup>), and his will, made 6 January, 1768, mentions his wife, eleven children and eighteen grandchildren, eleven of the grandchildren being mentioned by name.

It is very fortunate that the original will is still preserved in the files of the Bristol County, Mass., Registry of Probate, as a serious error was made in recording it, after it was probated, in 1780. As recorded, the first bequest, which contains the only mention of the son William White, Jr., was accidentally omitted. The short omitted clause is here printed in full.

### [WILL OF WILLIAM WHITE, SR.]

[From original will] William White of Dartmouth "Gentleman" made his will 6 January, 1768. Bequests were as follows:

"Imprimis I Give and bequeath unto my Well beloved Son William White my Gun Which he hath now In his possession &

Improvement"

To "my teen Well beloved Granchildren namely Israel Peleg William Silvenus Obed Ruth Sarah Hannah Mary & Unice all Children to my Son George White Deceased the Sum of one Spanish Silver mill'd Doller to be paid unto them by my Executors hereinafter Named and to be Equally Divided to & amongst them my sd ten Granchildren"

To "my Well beloved Daughter Sarah Brown my Bead that Standeth in the South east Corner of my Great Chamber together

with all the furnature belonging to it"

To "my Well beloved Daughter Hannah Taber . . . . twelve Spanish Silver mill'd Dollers to be paid unto her . . . . Within

one year after my Deceas"

To "son Roger White all my Wareing apparel . . . . and my Gun which I now have In my house & also my Case of Reazers & my hone"

To "son Christopher White . . . . five Spanish Silver Mill'd Dollers"

To "son Thomas White my silver Tankard"

To "my three Well beloved Sons namely Roger White Christopher White & Thomas White that note of hand which is now Due unto me from Henry Soule of Newport" dated 9 September, 1765, with "all the principle & Intrest Due unto me upon sd note of hand In the old tenner. & to be Devided to & amongst them . . . . as followeth Roger is to have" £200 "old tenner out of sd note and Christopher is to have" £200 "old tenner . . . . And Thomas to have all the Rest . . . . of the sd old tenner money Which is Due unto me upon the sd note of hand both principal & Intrest It is to be understood If they my three sd sons Can Recover the Sd not[e] or at Least the old tenner money Due upon the sd note then it shall be Divided to & amongst them as above set forth but If other Wise by any ways or means Means that note of hand Should fail & they . . . . Could not Recover or Get the sd money thereon due that then the Gifts to them in this parragraf shall be null & void & not be paid or Discharged with any other part of my Estate"

"I give . . . . four Spanish Silver Mill'd Dollers to be Equally Divided amongst all my survi\* Granchildren that are Children

to my Daughter Elizabeth Slowcum Deceased"

To "son Oliver White . . . . the bed & bedding And the Smithing tools he hath already In his possession"

To "Son Abner White my Gun Which he now hath In his

Possession"

To "Grandaughter Phebe smith . . . . Nine Spanish silver mill'd Dollers"

To "Daughter Susannah White all the Rest & Residue of my Estate . . . . She my Said Daughter providing procuring & Decently maintaining . . . . my . . . . wife In her aged week & Low Condition . . . . During the term of the natural Life of my Said wife Elizabeth White her mother and with ye use & Improvement of the farm & houseing together with the profits thereof Whereon I now Live to maintain her sd mother with all sorts of nessasaries of Life Decently During the term of my sd Wifes Natural Life If my sd Daughter Lives So Long but If she my sd Daughter should not Live so Long as her mother then so much of that Estate which I have herein given her my said Daughter to Enable her to maintain her mother shall Return and pay all the Charges that shall a Rise for Looking after my sd wife after the Death of my sd Daughter Susannah"

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"I do hereby order my sd Daughter Susannah White to pay all my Just Debts funeral Charges And I do Likewise nominate my sd Daughter Susannah White & my well beloved Granson Peleg White Son to my son George White Deceased . . . . to be Joynt Executors"

The witnesses were William Gifford, Daniel "Hathway" and

Restcome Sanford.

On 3 October, 1780, William Gifford, one of the witnesses, testified "that he with Daniel Hathway & Restcome Sanford both Decd" witnessed the will, and it was probated, and administration granted to Susanna White and Peleg White, the executors named in the will.

### [WILL OF WILLIAM WHITE, JR.]

[From original will] "William White Son of William White of Dartmouth . . . . Blacksmith" made his will 17 February, 1777. Bequests were as follows:

To "my Son Jonathan White all my wareing appariel"

To "my Son Jonathan White . . . . all my homestead farm with my now Dwelling house with all the buildings there on Standing & other Priviledges there unto belonging; also . . . . all that my farm which my Honoured Grand father George Cadman gave me after the Decease of my honoured father & mother; with all the Housing & building thereon Standing" also "all the Rest . . . . of my Rearl Estate which I have not here in before given him" also "all my Live Stock Except what I Shall herein after Give to my Three Daughters also I Give him my sd son all my Farming Utencels als[o] all my Blacksmith Tools also all my Carpenders Tools"

To "my Eldest Daughter Hannah Kirby" £115, "in Silver or Gould"; also £25 "in Paper Currency also one Cow & one more neat kind Two year old . . . . to be her full Part & Portion in my Estate with what she hath all ready had and the one Third Part of all my houshold goods which I do hereby give her"

To "my second Daughter Elisabeth Peckham" £115 "in Silver or Gould"; also £25 "in Paper Currency also . . . . one Cow & one more neet kind Two years old also the one third Part of all my house hold goods & these gifts with what she hath all ready had

to be her full Part & Portion in my Estate"

To "my youngest Daughter Abigail White" £115 "in Silver or Gould"; also £25 "in Paper Corrency also . . . . one Cow & one more neet kind Two years old also . . . . the one third Part of all my household goods & these Gifts with what she hath allready had to be her full Part & Portion in my Estate"

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"debts funeral Charges & Just Expences of all Sorts together with the Settleing of my Estate" are to be paid "by my Executor herein after named out of that Part of my Parsonal Estate . . . . given him"

"all the Rest & Reasudue of my Estate . . . . I give the same to my son Jonathan the better to Enable him Pay Legacies & to

discharge debts & Charges"

"my son Jonathan White" was appointed sole executor.

The witnesses were Joseph Tripp, Philip Tripp and Justus

Kirby.

The will was probated, 3 October, 1780, on the oath of Philip Tripp and Justus Kirby, two of the witnesses, and administration granted to Jonathan White, the executor named in the will. [The

will was also recorded, 26: 282.]

[From unrecorded warrant] On 30 September, 1780, Peleg White, Benjamin Brownell and Thomas Shearman, all of Dartmouth, freeholders, were appointed to appraise the personal estate of William White, late of Dartmouth, yeoman. The three appraisers were sworn the same day.

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken, 30 September, 1780, and was appraised "in Lawfull Silver Money at the Rate of Six Shillings & Eight Pence Per Troy Ounce".

"Hard Cash" on hand amounted to £377, os., 83d.

Promissory notes "for hard cash" were owed the estate by David Stafford, for £16, 14s., 4d.; by Nathaniel Potter, for £10, 10s.; and by Christopher White, for 7s., 10d. Blacksmith tools were valued at £16, 4s. "Paper Money in Continental Bills" £10, 16s.; "in Sword in Hand Bills" £29, 8s. The total amount was £793, 4s., 4\frac{3}{4}d.

Jonathan White, the executor, made oath to the inventory, 3 October, 1780. [The inventory was also recorded, 26: 293.]

### THE MAYFLOWER MARRIAGE RECORDS AT LEYDEN AND AMSTERDAM

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN

In February, 1905, at my request, the late Rev. Morton Dexter, who was then in Holland, arranged for the photographing of all the known records of marriages of Mayflower Passengers, found at Leyden and Amsterdam; and, in the July, 1905, issue of "The Mayflower Descendant", I began a series of illustrated articles, giving half-tone reproductions of the original records, with literal transcripts of the Dutch entries, each with an English translation.

These articles were published in our seventh, eighth and ninth volumes, and, as far as I am aware, neither facsimile reproductions nor literal copies of these important marriage records had ever before been published, although abstracts of most of them had been printed as early as 1859, more than sixty years ago.

Eight records were photographed, and were reproduced in the issues noted, as follows: Degory Priest and Isaac Allerton, in July, 1905; William White, in October, 1905; Francis Cooke, in January, 1906; Edward Winslow, in April, 1906; Dr. Samuel Fuller's second and third marriages (two illustrations) in July, 1906; William Bradford, the two "intentions", at Leyden and at Amsterdam, and the marriage record (three illustrations), in April, 1907.

Mr. Dexter also had photographed, at my request, the marriage record of Edward Southworth and Alice Carpenter, and that of Jan Tellij and Prijntgen Van den Velde, and these were

printed in our January and April, 1908, issues.

Especial attention should be called to the Tellij marriage, because many persons have been misled by the erroneous claim that "Jan Tellij" of Leyden and John Tilley, the Mayflower Passenger, were the same person. The article, by the present writer, accompanying the reproduction of the Tellij marriage record, in our April, 1908, issue, presents conclusive evidence that they were not identical.

In the present article we reprint, without the half-tone illustrations, the literal transcripts, in Dutch, of the marriage records of Francis Cooke, Degory Priest, Isaac Allerton and William White, with the English translations.

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The Bradford, Fuller and Winslow marriages will be re-

printed in our next issue.

Especial attention should be called to the fact that Holland corrected its calendar and adopted New Style dating in 1583. All of these marriage records, therefore, are in New Style.

### FRANCIS COOKE'S MARRIAGE\*

The marriage of Francis Cooke, at Leyden, in 1603, is recorded in the "Kerkelijke Houwelijke," Liber E, Folio 69, verso. The date is not given as a part of the marriage record; but at the top of folio 69 is written: "Aengeteyckent den lesten Junij xvio drie," which may be translated, "Entered the last of June, 1603." Below this entry are written the records of four marriages, and on 69, verso, are four more, that of Francis Cooke and Hester Mahieu being the third. At the top of folio 70 is the record of another marriage, then comes the entry, "Aenget. den xion July xvio drie," or, "Entered the 11th of July, 1603," followed by other marriages. It is probable, therefore, that the date of Francis Cooke's marriage was 30 June, 1603.

The Dutch record and its English translation are as follows:

Francis Cooke, wool comber, unmarried, from England, accompanied by Philip De Veau and Raphael Roelandt, his acquaintances, with

Hester Mahieu, unmarried, from Canterbury in England, accompanied by Jennie Mahieu, her mother, and Jennie Mahieu, her sister.

As the terms "Jongman" and "Jonge Dochter" were applied only to those who had never before been married, it is clear that this was the first, and subsequent records show that it was the only, marriage of either of the contracting parties. The fact that the bride, Hester Mahieu, was from Canterbury, England, while

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seemingly in conflict with Governor Edward Winslow's statement —"also the wife of Francis Cooke being a Walloone, holds communion with the Church at Plymouth, as she came from the French,"\* really confirms it, as there was, at the time of this marriage, a large Walloon church at Canterbury, and the records of that church, as printed in the fifth volume of the Publications of the Huguenot Society of London, show a large number of baptisms, marriages and deaths of persons bearing the name Mahieu, and numerous other references to persons of the name. These records, however, do not contain any reference which has yet been connected with Francis Cooke's bride; but it should be noted that the record does not state that she was born at Canterbury, merely that she was "from Canterbury," and her parents may not have moved to that place until after her birth.

As it was, at that time, very common for a young man to be married before he was twenty years old, the marriage of Francis Cooke in June, 1603, does not conflict with the evidence, given in my article in the third volume of this magazine [p. 95], indi-

cating that he was born after August, 1583.

The credit for the discovery of the record of Francis Cooke's marriage belongs to Mr. George H. Smith, of New York City, according to a communication in the "Boston Evening Transcript" of 28 November, 1904. Unfortunately the so-called "direct copy" of the marriage record there printed contains a number of errors, some of which are due to the fact that the clerk in the record office at Leyden did not give Mr. Smith a literal copy of the original record, but entered the facts on one of the modern, printed, blank forms used in furnishing copies of recent marriage records. Two of these errors are so misleading that it seems advisable to call particular attention to them at this time. A portion of the "direct copy," as it appeared in the "Transcript," reads as follows: "Jongman (printed) Uijt Engelant Weduwnaar van (pen and ink)." Reference to our literal copy of the record will show that the words "Weduwnaar van" do not appear anywhere in the record of this marriage. As these words mean "widower of," the seriousness of this error is at once apparent, for the original record, as already shown, plainly states that Francis Cooke had not before been married.

Another, and much less important, error is the printing of the word "bekenden" (meaning "friends" or "acquaintances"), which follows the names of the witnesses on behalf of the groom, as "C Nender," thus making it appear that there was a third witness, named "C Nender."

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## THE MARRIAGES OF DEGORY PRIEST AND ISAAC ALLERTON\*

An especially interesting record is that of the double wedding, at Leyden, of Degory Priest to the widow Sarah (Allerton) Vincent, and of Isaac Allerton to Mary Norris.†

The banns of these two couples were published on the same days, Saturday, 8, 15 and 22 October, 1611, and they were married

on Friday, 4 November, 1611.

Sarah (Allerton) Vincent was Isaac Allerton's sister. After the death of Degory Priest she married, for her third husband, Godbert Godbertson, whose first marriage was recorded on the same page with Dr. Samuel Fuller's third marriage.

The entries "t je de 8. 10. 1611", etc., give the first, second

and third dates of publication of the banns.

## THE WILLS OF WILLIAM AND PRISCILLA CLAPP OF SCITUATE, MASS.

BY THE EDITOR

WILLIAM CLAPP of Scituate, Mass., married Priscilla Otise (Ephraim<sup>5</sup>, Mercy Little<sup>4</sup>, Ephraim<sup>3</sup>, Anna<sup>2</sup> Warren, Richard<sup>1</sup>) and had nine children, eight of whom were named in his will, dated 23 October, 1804, and probated 14 January, 1805.

Widow Priscilla (Otis) Clapp made her will, 14 June, 1833, and added a codicil, 9 December, 1834. It was probated 4 Octo-

ber, 1836.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of both of these wills and of all other records, relating to the two estates, found in the

Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate.

These abstracts are printed at the expense of Mr. Robert L. Weis, of Lincoln, R. I., who is a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and is a descendant of William and Priscilla (Otis) Clapp, through their daughter, Polly, who married Thomas Lewis.

### [WILLIAM CLAPP'S WILL]

[From original will] William Clap of Scituate, yeoman, made his will on 23 October, 1804. Bequests were as follows:

To "wife Prissalla Clap the one half of my In Dore and out Dore moveable Estate my money and Wearing Aparal Excepted"

To "my son Willm Clap one Dollar"

To "my Son Otis Clap five Hundred Dollars"

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To "my Son Martin Clap a Note of hand he gave me in

March 13th 1802" for \$1170.00.

To "Son Allin Clap the one half of my out and In Dore moveable Estate and my wearing Aparal my money Excepted and three Acers of Ceder Somp . . . . Lying in Hanover . . . . Ajoining Lemuel Curtis Snow Curtis and Calvin Curtis Lands"

To "my Daufter Fany Clap five Hundred Dollars"

To "my beloved wife Prissalla Clap and my Son Otis Clap and Allin Clap Nancy Clap Prissalla Jacobs Polly Clap and Fanny Clap the Remainder of my money to be Equily Devided betwen them after Paying my Just Dets and funaral Charges and I apoint my Son Allin Clap to be my Excutor"

The will was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Joseph Curtis, Nathaniel Pratt and Calvin Curtis. [The will was also

recorded, 40: 159.]

[From original letter] The will was probated, on 14 January, 1805, on the oaths of Joseph Curtis and Calvin Curtis, and administration granted to Allen Clap, the executor. [Also recorded, 40:160.]

[From unrecorded bond] On 14 January, 1805, Allen Clap, yeoman, of Scituate, as executor, with Joseph Curtis of Scituate, yeoman, and Calvin Curtis of Hanover, gentleman, as sureties, gave a bond for \$3,000.00. The witnesses were Edward Curtis and Isaac Lothrop.

[From original order] On 14 January, 1805, the executor was ordered to post a notice of his appointment, in Scituate, and publish it in "the New England Palladium Printed at Boston", and on 4 March, 1805, he took oath that he had complied with the order. [The notice was also recorded, 40: 162.]

[From original warrant] On 14 January, 1805, "Calvin Curtis & Israel Perrey both of Hanover, Gentlemen & Joseph Curtis of Scituate yeoman" were appointed to appraise the estate.

warrant was also recorded, 40: 160.]

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken, at Scituate, 4 March, 1805, by the three appraisers. The real estate was "about three acres of Cedar swamp" \$67.00. "Notes of hand and Intert to Decr 22 1804" were held against "William Allen of Braintree", Martin Clapp, Seth Gannett, Jacob Ford, William Delano, "Marlbry Turner", Joseph N. Bates, Calvin Curtis, "Caleb Howard & Hobart", Isaac Hobart, Daniel Forbes, John Cutler, "Aaron and Daniel Forbes", John Winsor, John Gilbert, David Holbrook, Elijah Whitman, "Cutler & Bannister"; "one fourth Part of a Pew in mr Barns meeting house" was valued

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at \$8.00, and "one Pew in Scituate west meeting house" at \$20.00. The total amount was \$6589.49.

The executor and the appraisers made oath to the inventory, 4 March, 1805. [The inventory was also recorded, 40: 160.]

[From original account] The account of Allen Clapp, the executor, was dated, at Scituate, 5 March, 1810, and allowed 3 September, 1810. The estate had received payments from John Gilbert, "Abijah Shamaway by the hand of Robert Cutler", Solomon Lincoln, Thomas Hill, Hon. Joshua Thomas, Esq., and from "Jotham Cushman Being a Debt Due from Calvin & David Keth".

Payments had been made to: Elijah Whitman, Joseph Neal Bates, Dr. Ephraim Otis, Lemuel Turner, Elisha Foster, "Israel Perry on Barker Curtis' order", Charles Turner, Jr., Seth Gannett, James Sperrell, "David Jacob for Land to Erect a Tomb", Micah White, George Bailey, Lemuel Curtis, Jr., Amos Hatch, Jotham Jacob, Anson Robbins, Moses Whiting, Daniel Forbes, "Molbury Turner", Dr. Daniel Shute, Edward Foster Jacob, William Allen, Laben Hearsey, Aaron Forbes, John Windsor, Calvin Curtis, Samuel Waterman, Elisha Simmons, Charles W. Cushing, Lemuel Dwelley, Dr. Thomas Thaxter, Barnabas Perry, Hawkes Ferring, Benjamin Stetson, Jr., Otis Clapp, Fanny Clapp, Martin Clapp, Stephen Damon.

Expenses for trips to Plymouth, Pembroke, Bridgewater, Brookfield, Duxbury, Boston and Charlestown, in settling the

estate, were included.

A note on the bottom of the account reads "To be notified-W<sup>m</sup> G. Wheeler\* & Nancy his wife of Worcester, Otis Clap & Fanny Clap Scituate Polly Clap Boston". [The account was also

recorded, 43:274.]

[43: 278] On 14 September, 1810, Allen Clapp, the executor, was ordered to distribute among the legatees the balance of the estate, amounting to \$5976.60, as follows: "To Priscilla Clap the Widow" \$853.80; "to Otis Clap, Nancy Wheeler Wife of Daniel Wheeler, Priscilla Jacobs Wife of Edward Foster Jacobs, to Polly Clap & Nancy† Clap" \$853.80 each, "retaining also in your own hands the like sum".

Jacobs and Otis Clap, one sixth part of all my debts due, securities, Bank Stock and Cash on hand, (after the payment of my just debts and charges) in trust for my son Martin Clap, they the said trustees to appropriate the income of the said sixth part of my estate aforesaid and the principal if necessary toward the comfortable support of my said son Martin Clap, and if any of said sixth part aforesaid should remain after the decease of my said son Martin Clapp . . . . the remainder, if any) should be equally divided between my five children, Otis Clap, Nancy Wheeler, Priscilla Jacob, Polly Lewis and Fanny Clap, and in case either or both said trustees should die or decline before the expiration of said trust it is my wish that the Judge of Probate for the County of Plymouth for the time being should appoint other suitable persons in their stead, the above legacy to be paid in six months after my decease"

To "my daughter Nancy Wheeler, one sixth part of all my debts due, securities, Bank Stock and Cash on hand (after the payment of my just debts and charges) provided however that two notes of hand I now hold, one signed by Daniel G. Wheeler and Nancy Wheeler and the other signed by Nancy Wheeler alone are paid the principal and interest, and if said notes should not be paid, it is my will that the principal & interest . . . should first be deducted from the sixth part of my estate as aforesaid, and that then the said Nancy Wheeler should take the balance in full satisfaction of this bequest, the above legacy to be paid in six

months after my decease"

To "my four children, Otis Clap, Priscilla Jacob, Polly Lewis and Fanny Clap, the remaining four sixth parts of my debts due, securities, Bank Stock, and Cash on hand, after the paying of my just debts and charges, to be equally divided between them, and

to be paid them in six months after my decease"

To "my daughters, Nancy Wheeler, Priscilla Jacob, Polly Lewis, and Fanny Clap all my household furniture wearing apparel and all my other estate, not herein otherwise disposed of . . . . to be equally divided between them"

THE RESERVE TO SHARE SHOWING

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"Ebenezer T. Fogg, Esqr", of Scituate, was appointed executor. The witnesses were Nathaniel Clapp, Elijah Clapp, 2d, and

Jane Corlew.

On 9 December, 1834, a codicil was added, as follows: "Whereas my late daughter Nancy Wheeler has deceased, since the making of my said last Will. I hereby give . . . . to the children of my said daughter . . . . the legacies given to her. They are to take by right of representation in the same manner and under the same restrictions and limitations as the said Nancy Wheeler would have taken by said Will had she have lived"

The witnesses to the codicil were John Clapp, Elijah Clapp

and Mary Clapp.

The will was probated, at East Bridgewater, 4 October, 1836, on the oaths of Nathaniel Clapp and Elijah Clapp, 2d, two of the witnesses to the will, and John Clapp and Elijah Clapp, two of the witnesses to the codicil, and administration granted to Ebenezer T. Fogg.

A note on the back of the will reads: "Plym ss. Aug 30. 1836 Notice ordered 3 weeks in Centinel & Hingham Gazette returnable 1st Tues Oct at E. Bridgewr". [The will was also recorded,

78:384.]

[From original bond] On 4 October, 1836, Ebenezer T. Fogg, as executor, with Nathaniel Clapp and John Clapp as sureties, all of Scituate, gave a bond for \$10,000. The witness was J. H. Loud. [The bond was also recorded, G1:13.]

[From original document] On 4 October, 1836, Ebenezer T. Fogg, executor, was ordered to post a notice of his appointment in the town of Scituate and advertise it in the Hingham Gazette. The notice was posted the same day, and sworn to on 6 June, 1837.

[The order was also recorded, 75:421.]

[From unrecorded warrant] On 30 August, 1836, Ichabod R. Jacob, Nathaniel Clapp and John Clapp, all of Scituate, were appointed to appraise the estate, and they were sworn, on I Sep-

tember, 1836.

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken, at Scituate, I September, 1836. No real estate was mentioned. Edward F. Jacobs, Otis Clapp, Nancy Wheeler, Daniel G. Wheeler and Henry B. Smith were indebted to the estate. The inventory also mentions stock in the Bunker Hill Bank and the State Bank. The total amount of the inventory was \$7,650.57. Ebenezer T. Fogg, the executor, made oath to the inventory, at East Bridgewater, on 4 October, 1836. [The inventory was also recorded. 78:387.]

Annual Control of the [From original account] The account of Ebenezer T. Fogg, executor, was presented and allowed, on 6 June, 1837. The estate had received payments from O. Clapp, N. Wheeler, E. F. Jacobs, Frances Clapp, "C. Clapp rent of thirds", and H. B. Smith. Payments had been made to Edward F. Jacobs, Homer & Palmer, A. Robbins, David Bailey, J. Farmer, P. Lewis, O. Clapp, J. H. Loud, F. Clapp, L. Stoddard, J. Clapp, "E. F. Jacobs & Allen Clapp's heirs", "Nancy Wheeler's heirs", Polly Lewis, Otis Clapp, Frances Clapp. [The account was also recorded, 79:233.]

[From original account] "The Account of Edward F Jacobs & Otis Clapp Trustees of Martin Clapp, deceased" was sworn to by the Trustees on 4 February, 1842, and allowed on 1 March, 1842. "The said Accountants charge themselves with the amount received of the Exr of the will of Priscilla Clapp, deceased, July 1. 1837" and "ask allowance for . . . . bill of board" to Otis Clapp, as of January, 1838, 1839, 1840, 1841. [The account was also

recorded, 84:119.]

# THE WILL OF JOSEPH CHURCH3

BY THE EDITOR

JOSEPH CHURCH<sup>3</sup>, son of Richard Church and Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Warren (*Richard*<sup>1</sup>), married Mary, daughter of John Tucker of Hingham, Mass., and had ten children, six of whom were mentioned in his will, made at Little Compton,\* 15 February, 1710/11, and proved 12 March, 1710/11.

In the inventory it is stated that "Mr Joseph Church Esqr.... Deceased the 5<sup>th</sup> day of march Anno Domini 1711". This year was recorded in New Style dating. If it were in Old Style, the actual date of death would have been 5 March, 1711/12, or nearly a year after the will was probated and the inventory

sworn to.

The will mentions: eldest son Joseph Church; son John Church; daughter Elizabeth, wife of Joseph Blackman; daughter Mary, wife of John Wood; daughter Deborah, wife of Samuel Gray; daughter Abigail, wife of William Simmons.

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# [THE WILL OF JOSEPH CHURCH8]

[3:21] "Joseph Churc[h of] Little Compton . . . . Esqr" made his will 15 February, 1710/11. Bequests were as follows:

"That my smale farm or tract of land . . . in L[ittle Comp]ton aforesd Containing Thirty five acres more or less . . . . bounded Easterly by the high way westerly partly on the la[nd given] by Deeds to my son John Church South ward by land of Joh [worn] & Northward by the land of Joseph wilbor with the Dwelli[ng house] that I now live in, & the other houseing & Eddifices the[reto] belonging Allsoe Two Twenty four acre lotts & three [worn] George Pearces being the ninth Tenth & Eleventh lotts [worn] and two fifteen acre lotts & guarter at Coakset Near w[worn] with all my lands Purchased & unpurchase in Little Com[pton afore]said, that have not allready & now in this my last will Dis[posed of] and allso all my personall Estate of Every kind . . . . what so Ever, and in all parts that may be due to me [at my De] cease, And that all my Real & personal Estate above [sd be sold] or Disposed of by my Executors and Overseers for the be[st advan]tage: And it is my will that out of the abovesd premises [worn] Daughters Vizt Elizabeth Blackman Mary wood Debo[rah Gray] and Abigail Simons in land which I have allready bef[ore] given them, be made Equal alike for Value as my [executor] & some other person or persons may Judge by Veiwin[g] and Valueing Each Daughters land, given them by me afor [worn accord]ing to the Nature & Circumstances of Each Childs land and [worn] made up in land or money Equal alike and the Rema[inder to be] Divided into seven shares as followeth"

To "my Eldest Son Joseph Church . . . . two shares, Except w[hat I may] other wayes Dispose of (out of) the above said

premis[es]"

To "my Son John Church . . . . as an [\*] [p. 22] Except a strip of four Rod wide from the north East Corner to the brow of the hill below william Simons houses which I have give to my Daughter Abigail Simons And allso a Tract of land lying to the Eastward of Colebrook which land was allowed me to make up what was wanting of a sixteen acre lott layd out to me in s<sup>d</sup> Little Compton, and allso one share as aforesaid"

To "my Daughter Elizabeth Blackman the wife of Joseph

Blackman . . . . One share as aforesaid"

To "my Daughter Mary wood, the wife of [L]eiut John wood one whole share"

To "my Daughter Deborah Grey . the wife [o]f Samuel Gray one whole share"

To "my Daugh Abigail Simons the wif [of] william Simons one whole share . . . Allso a smale strip of land of four Rode wide at the North East Corner of my sd Tract of land at Tionsunk to the brow of the hill below sd william Simons house being part of the North side at my said Tract of land: given to my son John Church"

To "mary Tocockonoe that now lives [with] me for her former kindneses to my wife & since to my [s]elf the bed which she lyes upon and the bed Cloathes thereto belonging Provided she

still Continues with me upon Reasonable wages"

To "my Indian boy Amos . the halfe of a fifteen [a]cre lott at Cockset Lyeing in Govern winslows share of sd lott Provided he serve out his full time with any one of my Children other wayes to be sold and Equally to be divided amongst my Children"

"it is my will that all my Just Debts be here inserted which is due to me for my Children as shall be hereafter named that it might be payd in and Divided as afores<sup>d</sup>: It being part of my personall Estate as afores<sup>d</sup>. on the other side viz<sup>t</sup> my son Joseph. Church at sundry times haveing borrowed and Received of me" £10, 7s., 6d., "To my son John Church" £16, 2s., "Allso to my son in Law william Simons" £14, 16s., "that Every Child afore named on the other s[ide] may have their Equal share thereof"

Capt. John Palmer and Thomas Church were appointed overseers of the will, and "sons Joseph Church and John Church" were appointed executors.

The witnesses were John Palmer and Jonathan Davenport, and Edward Thurston who signed by a mark.

"The above named m<sup>r</sup> Joseph Church Esq<sup>r</sup>" acknowledged the will before Thomas Church, Justice of the Peace.

On 12 March, 1710/11, "Capt John Palmer," one of the witnesses, made oath to the will, and on 13 March, 1710/11, the other two witnesses made oath to it, at Bristol, before Nathaniel Paine, Judge of Probate.

[From unrecorded bond] On 12 March, 1710/11, Joseph Church and John Church, as executors, with Thomas Church of Little Compton, and Constant Church of Tiverton, as sureties, gave a bond for £1000. The witness was Jonathan Davenport.

[From original inventory] An inventory of the real and personal estate of "M<sup>r</sup> Joseph Church Esq<sup>r</sup> of Little Compton who Deseased the 5<sup>th</sup> day of march Anno Domini 1711" was taken on 12 March, 1711, by Thomas Church, John Palmer, Joseph Wilbore

and the figure of the property of the the second of the second of the second of A laboration of the state of the same of (who signed by a mark) and Edward Richmond. The real estate was: "35 acer of Land mor or lese" £175; "a dwelling house ther upon with bords Laths Lime" £70; "a smaull stable" £3; "two 24 acer Lotts & 3 qrts" £4; "two 15 acer Lotts & 3 qrts" £41. Money was due the estate: "from my son Joseph Church" £10, 7s., 6d.; "from my son John Church" £16, 2s.; "from my son in Law william Simons" £14, 16s.; "from my son Joseph for Rent" £16, 13s.; "from Thomas Brownell son of William"; "Jon Eirles of Tiverton"; "from mr mortemer of Boston"; "from John Cook of Tiverton". "one negroman named hecter with his bed & beding & all his Clothing" was valued at £18. The total amount of the inventory was £669, 14s., 10d.

Joseph and John Church, the executors, made oath to the inventory, at Bristol, on 12 March, 1710/11. [The inventory was

also recorded, 3:24.]

[From unrecorded summons] "John Church of Little Compton . . . . yeoman onely Surviveing Executor of the Last will . . . . of Joseph Church Late of Little Compton aforsaid Esqr Deceased" was summoned to appear before the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, "on the second Tuesday of aprill next" to answer to John Peckham of Little Compton, yeoman, "In a plea of Covenant that he hold Covenant to him maide betwen the Sd Joseph Church in his Life time and the aforsaid John Peckham according to the force form and Effect of a certaine Deed poll theruppon betwen them maide" dated 15 June, 1708, "for . . . . Sixteen Pounds in Good Siliver money of New England by him the said Joseph Church received" sold to John Peckham "a certaine tract or percill of Land . . . . in Little Compton . . . . Containing aboute Eaight acres more or Less it being Part of a sixten acre Lott of Land the twenty furth Lott in number amongst the Sixteen acre Lotts in sd Little Compton and is bounded as followeth Esterly by a high & westerly by a high way Notherly by the Land of John Peckham Southerly by a high way which Sd Eaight acres of Land . . . . the said Joseph Church had . . . . Confirmed unto the said John Peckham"

The summons was not dated.

Arthur Lord, a member of the Pilgrim Tercentenary Commission, and President of the Pilgrim Society of Plymouth; Mr. Worthington C. Ford, Editor of Publications of the Massachusetts Historical Society.

Secretary George Ernest Bowman read The Compact, as usual, and explained the significance of the illustration on the menu card.

One hundred and seventy-nine members and guests were present, in spite of a stormy evening.

To "my Grand Son Jeddediah Eames Twenty pounds in Bills of Credite of the Old Tener to be paid by my Excer within Two

years after my Deaceas"

To "my Six Daughters Faith Foster Eliza Ford Sarah Randall Susannah Collamer Mary Shairman and marcy Hamilton . . . . all the rest of my Estate both reail and personal . . . . to be Equaly Divided betweet them my Just Debts funaral Charges and Legeses afores being first paid out of the Same"

"my sd Son Edward" was appointed sole executor.

The will was signed by a mark, and was witnessed by William Cushing, Mary Cushing, Hannah Phillips and Mary Cushing, Jr.

It was probated, at Plymouth, 26 July, 1750, on the oaths of William Cushing, Mary Cushing and Mary Cushing, Jr., and administration granted to "Edward Oakman of Marchfeild aforesaid Yeoman Executor".

[12:91] On 29 June, 1750, Thomas Macumber, Anthony Winslow and Joshua Tilden, all of Marshfield, yeomen, were appointed appraisers, and they took the inventory, at Marshfield, 2 July, 1750. The only real estate was "one Lott", £2, 13s., 4d. Samuel Tilden, Nathaniel Emes, Robert Sherman, D. Harlow, Samuel Clift, and John Stephens were indebted to the estate. The total amount of the inventory was £103, 7s.

Edward Oakman, administrator, and the three appraisers

made oath to the inventory, 5 July, 1750.

WILLIAM RING<sup>8</sup>, son of Andrew Ring and Deborah<sup>2</sup> Hopkins (Stephen1), of Plymouth, married, on 13 July, 1693, Hannah Sherman<sup>8</sup>, daughter of William Sherman and Desire<sup>2</sup> Doty  $(Edward^1).$ 

Hannah Sherman<sup>8</sup> was born at Marshfield, 21 February, 1668,

and her father was buried there, 17 November, 1680.

Desire<sup>2</sup> (Doty) Sherman married, second, Israel Holmes, and, third, Alexander<sup>2</sup> Standish (Myles<sup>1</sup>). She was the second wife of her third husband, and left children by all three husbands.

William and Hannah (Sherman) Ring had six children recorded at Plymouth: Deborah, died in infancy; Hannah, died without issue; William, died without issue; Elizabeth, married Joseph Pearce; Eleazer, died without issue; Deborah, married Caleb Sherman, but died shortly after the birth of her first child,

who survived the mother only one week.

# NATHANIEL<sup>8</sup> WARREN'S WILL AND THE AGREEMENT OF THE HEIRS

NATHANIEL<sup>3</sup> WARREN (Nathaniel<sup>2</sup>, Richard<sup>1</sup>), of Plymouth, died there, 29 October, 1707, the day after making his will. He left no issue, and his will is of great value in identifying descendants of Richard Warren.

The will was probated, 3 February, 1707/8, and an agreement of the heirs, dated 14 February, 1707/8, was signed by Phebe Warren, the widow, the eight other legatees and the husbands of the four women; but Charles Little<sup>4</sup> (Isaac³, Anna² Warren, Richard¹) did not marry Sarah⁴ Warren (James³, Nathaniel², Richard¹) until 9 October, 1712, therefore they did not sign the agreement until after that date. And the legatee James⁴ Warren, born 14 April, 1700, did not acknowledge the deed until 17 February, 1726/7, twelve years after his father's death.

The widow, Phebe, married Capt. Thomas Gray of Little

Compton, and survived him.\*

"wife phebe Warren" was appointed sole executrix.

The will was signed "Nathanell warren".

The witnesses were Thomas Little, Elisha Wadsworth, and Ephraim Little, Jr. Thomas Little and Ephraim Little made oath to the will "on the 3d day of January\* 1707" before Nathaniel Thomas, Judge of Probate. [The will was also recorded, 2: 140.]

"a negro girl" is valued at £20, and "some time in an Indian servant" at £14.

On 24 June, 1709, "Mrs Phebee Gray late Relict widdow of Mr Nathaniel Warren late of Plimouth deceased Executrix of his last Will" made oath to the inventory, before Nathaniel Thomas, Judge of Probate. [The inventory was also recorded,

# THE ESTATE OF WILLIAM SNOW3

WILLIAM SNOW<sup>3</sup>, of Bridgewater, Mass., son of William Snow and Rebecca<sup>2</sup> Brown (*Peter*<sup>1</sup>), married Naomi Whitman, the "last of" November, 1686, and had six children recorded at Bridgewater, all of whom were mentioned in the settlement of his estate.

The date of his death is not known, but his son James was

appointed administrator, 7 November, 1726.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records, relating to the settlement of the estate.

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# [THE ESTATE OF WILLIAM SNOW<sup>3</sup>]

[Plym. Co. Prob. 5: 160] On 7 November, 1726, "James Snow of Bridgewater" was appointed administrator of the estate of "your father William Snow late of Bridgewater . . . . lately dyed Intestate".

[From unrecorded bond] On 7 November, 1726, James Snow of Bridgewater, yeoman, as administrator, with George Packard of Bridgewater, yeoman, and Jabez Eddy of Plympton, yeoman, as sureties, gave bond for £200. Jabez Eddy signed by a mark. The

witnesses were Nathaniel Thomas and John Pratt.

[From original inventory] The inventory of "Mr William Snow Late of Bridgwater . . . . Deceased" was taken, 11 November, 1726, by Jonathan "haward",\* "john Ames" and Edward "Haward".\* The real estate was: "one Third part of a purchas Right in the undivided Lands in Bridgwater within ye Eight mile Square" £3; "1 Third part of a twenty acre Lot of land" £7; "1 Shear of upland in the meadows" £15; "halfe a Shear in the old Seder swamp" £3; "one hole purchas Right in Cuting Cove Seder Swamp" £20. The three appraisers, "all of Bridgewater", and James Snow, the administrator, made oath to the inventory, 23 November, 1726. [The inventory was also recorded, 5:181.]

[5: 182] On 22 November, 1726, "James Snow and William Snow and Eleazer Snow and John Snow all of Bridgewater . . . . Sons to William Snow late of Bridgewater . . . . deceased .... Having bought of their two Sisters (viz) Bethiah ye wife of Elisha Howard and Susannah ye wife of Israel Alger both of Bridgewater afores<sup>d</sup> all their Right . . . . in and unto ye Estate of their Father William Snow late of Bridgewater aforesd deceased. Do mutually agree as followeth upon a division of all ye Estate both Real & Personal which ye abovesd William Snow dyed seised of . (viz) wee agree that all ye Cedar Swamps be Equally divided Between us . and wee agree that ye Share of upland at Bassetts Plain be to Eleazer, and ye third Part of ye twenty acre Lott of Land that lyeth att Buck-hill plain be to William: and that ye third Part of ye Purchase Right in all ye undivided Lands within ye Eight mile Square of Land in Bridgewater be to William: and that ye whole of ye moveable Estate be divided Equal between us"

The agreement was signed by James Snow, William Snow, Eleazer Snow and John Snow, and witnessed by Ephraim Fobes and Edward Howard. It was acknowledged, 23 November, 1726, before Isaac Winslow, Judge of Probate, and allowed by him.


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

# CAPTAIN RICHARD MORE OF SALEM, MASS., CAN NOW BE ADDED TO THE LIST OF PROVED MAYFLOWER ANCESTORS

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN

THE title of this article, "Captain Richard More Of Salem, Mass., Can Now Be Added To The List of Proved Mayflower Ancestors", announces the most important discovery I have made in nearly a quarter of a century devoted to the study of the Mayflower Passengers and their descendants.

In an illustrated article entitled "The Only Mayflower Gravestone", printed in the October, 1901, issue of The Mayflower Descendant [Volume III, pages 193–201], I proved that the boy Richard More, who was brought over in The Mayflower by Elder William Brewster, did not change his name to "Man", as claimed by certain earlier writers, but removed to Salem, Mass., and was the "Capt Richard More Aged 84 Years" who lies buried in the Charter Street Cemetery in Salem.

Richard More's gravestone is the only known gravestone of a Mayflower Passenger, erected at the time of his death. This stone, as shown by the illustrations in the article referred to, is one of a remarkable group of six stones, as follows: Richard¹ More; his first wife, Christian (Hunt) More; his second wife, Jane (Hollingsworth) More; a son, Caleb² More; a daughter, Christian² (More) Conant; and a double stone for two infant grandchildren, Samuel³ More, son of Richard² and Sarah (——) More, and Barbara³ Dutch, daughter of Samuel and Susanna² (More) Dutch.

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# MAYELOWER DESCENDANT

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An important article on the recent desecration of Capt. Richard More's gravestone at Salem will be found on pages 74-85 of this issue.

When I published the article identifying Capt. Richard More of Salem, I had on file data which led me to believe that he would eventually be added to the list of proved Mayflower Ancestors; but it did not seem advisable to print an announcement to this effect, until I had secured additional evidence.

Unfortunately, the very limited income of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants prevented continuous effort to trace Richard More's descendants; and the greater part of the data, so far collected, has been secured, a little at a time, when

other investigations have taken me to Salem.

As a result of this gradual accumulation of data, however, I can now make the first public announcement that Richard More will, in future, be included in the list of Mayflower Ancestors from whom descent can be proved. This will increase the number of proved Mayflower Ancestors to fifty, leaving fifty-four Mayflower Passengers from whom we cannot now prove descent. [See "The Mayflower Passengers", on another page of this issue.]

It is especially pleasing to me that, as a result of my researches, I have added to the list of proved Mayflower Ancestors the boy, Richard More, who was brought to this country in The Mayflower, by my own ancestor, Elder William Brewster.

A few brief notes about descendants of Richard<sup>1</sup> More are here given, to indicate some of the lines through which descent

from him may be traced.

Richard<sup>1</sup> More of Salem had seven children, at least three of whom, Richard<sup>2</sup> More, Christian<sup>2</sup> More and Susanna<sup>2</sup> More, married and had children.

Richard<sup>2</sup> More (*Richard*<sup>1</sup>) married Sarah ——, and had several children.

Christian<sup>2</sup> More (*Richard*<sup>1</sup>) married Joshua Conant, and had a son.

Susanna<sup>2</sup> More (*Richard*<sup>1</sup>) married, first, Samuel Dutch of Salem, who died before March, 1693/4. She married, second, in 1694, Richard Hutton of Wenham, Mass.; and in 1714, at the age of sixty-four, she married for her third husband, John Knowlton, Sr., of Ipswich, Mass., whom she also survived. By her first husband she had four daughters, three of whom died young. Her daughter Susanna Dutch<sup>3</sup> married Benjamin Knowlton of Ipswich.

the transport of the second se 4 miles and a set of the set Susanna<sup>2</sup> (More) (Dutch) (Hutton) Knowlton was living, at Ipswich, as late as 30 October, 1728, when she signed a receipt to the executor of her third husband's estate.

Susanna Dutch<sup>3</sup> (Susanna<sup>2</sup> More, Richard<sup>1</sup>) married Benjamin Knowlton, of Ipswich, Mass., who died in 1764. They had three children: Elizabeth Knowlton<sup>4</sup>, who married Nathan Brown; Benjamin Knowlton<sup>4</sup>, who married Susanna Potter and Abigail Dane; Susanna Knowlton<sup>4</sup>, who married Josiah Dodge.

Benjamin Knowlton<sup>4</sup> (Susanna Dutch<sup>3</sup>, Susanna<sup>2</sup> More, Richard<sup>1</sup>), of Ipswich, married, first, Susanna Potter, and second, Abigail Dane. He died at Ipswich, in 1781; and in 1786, as shown by the probate records, his heirs were his widow, Abigail (Dane) Knowlton, thirteen surviving children, and four children of a

deceased daughter.

The surviving children were: Ezra Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Ephraim Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Moses Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Malachi Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Nehemiah Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Abigail Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Benjamin Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Hepzibah Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Hannah Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Esther Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Edmund Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Annis Knowlton<sup>5</sup>, Betty Knowlton<sup>5</sup>.

The grandchildren were: Nehemiah Poland<sup>6</sup>, Susanna Poland<sup>6</sup>, Benjamin Poland<sup>6</sup>, and Esther Poland<sup>6</sup>, the children of a deceased daughter, Susanna (Knowlton<sup>5</sup>) Poland, wife of Nathaniel Poland.

When Abigail (Dane) Knowlton, widow of Benjamin Knowlton<sup>4</sup>, died in 1790, the thirteen children and four grandchildren were living, and the probate records show that Hepzibah Knowlton<sup>5</sup> had married a Cummings. The Ipswich records show that she had married Jonas Cummings.

I have the names of many other descendants of Benjamin Knowlton<sup>4</sup> and his two sisters, but cannot devote more time or space to this family at present.

# THE MAYFLOWER COMPACT AND ITS SIGNERS

BY GEORGE ERNEST BOWMAN

Where is the original Mayflower Compact, with its forty-one autograph signatures?

How has the text of The Compact been preserved to the

present day?

How have the names of the Signers of The Compact been

handed down to us?

The first of these questions cannot be answered, as I have not found, either in print or in unpublished records, any statement which indicated a knowledge of the location of the original manuscript of The Compact, after April, 1621, or even proved its existence after that date.

The only later entry I have found, which might possibly refer to the original Compact, is in the Plymouth Colony Records, under date of 15 November, 1636. In the record of a meeting of the Governor, Assistants and others, as a committee to prepare a revision of the laws of the colony, we read: "Now being assembled . . . and having read the Combinacon made at [Cape] Cod the 11<sup>th</sup> of Novbr 1620"; but there is nothing in this record to indicate that, when they "read the Combinacon", they had before them the original document. They may have had only an official copy of it.

According to the Old Style calendar, then used by the English, the Mayflower reached Cape Cod Harbor, now Provincetown, Mass., on Saturday, 11 November, 1620, which was the same day as Saturday, 21 November, 1620, according to the New Style calendar, with which the Pilgrims had become familiar in Holland, and which the English government finally adopted in 1752. It is incorrect, therefore, to claim that the Three Hundredth Anniversary of the Signing of The Compact will fall on Thursday, 11 November, 1920, as three full centuries from the date of the Signing will not be completed until Sunday, 21 November, 1920.

As the Mayflower Passengers had been forced by circumstances to settle outside of their original grant from the Virginia Company, they drew up and signed, before they landed at Cape Cod, according to Governor Bradford's History, "a combination" which was "ye first foundation of their governmente in this place".

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This "combination", which was called "The Compact" as early as 1793, was signed on the Mayflower, Saturday, 21 November, 1620, New Style, by the forty-one passengers\* who were then of age and were free agents, and the original document, of course, remained on the ship until carried ashore at Plymouth.

The Third Exploring Party, composed entirely of men, set out from the Mayslower, on Wednesday, 16 December, 1620, New Style, in the shallop, and on Friday evening, 18 December, they were driven into Plymouth harbor in a storm, landing on Clark's Island; on Saturday, "this being the last day of ye weeke, they prepared ther to keepe ye Sabath"; and on Monday, 21 December, long celebrated as "Forefathers' Day", they landed and explored the coast.

It should be especially noted that the Mayflower itself did not reach Plymouth until Saturday, 26 December, 1620, New Style. She left Cape Cod Harbor, for Plymouth, on Friday, 25 December, 1620, New Style, but was driven back by a storm. The next day, Saturday, 26 December, she started again and reached Plymouth the same day, just five weeks after she had sailed into Cape Cod Harbor. She remained at Plymouth through the winter, and in April, 1621, started on her return voyage to England, arriving there in May. When she left Plymouth, she must have had on board either the original Compact or an officially attested copy of it, but nothing has been found to determine which she carried.

In brief, the original Compact was on the Mayflower, at Cape Cod Harbor, from 21 November to 26 December, 1620; then was at Plymouth until sometime in April, 1621; then for about a month was either at Plymouth or again on the Mayflower, on its return voyage to England. From this point the history of the original document is entirely unknown, and we cannot say with certainty that any particular person has seen it, since the departure

of the Mayflower from Plymouth.

The oldest copy of the text of The Compact, known at the present time, is that printed in "Mourt's Relation", in 1622.

The oldest manuscript copy of the text in existence, as far as known, is in Bradford's History, written between 1630 and 1646.

The oldest known list of the forty-one Signers of The Compact is found in "New-Englands Memoriall", printed in 1669.

William Bradford and Edward Winslow are the only Signers of The Compact who are known to have left any written or printed statement about it.

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# [Mourt's Relaticn]

The Fortune arrived at Plymouth, New England, in November, 1621, and began her return voyage in December. She carried back to England an account of the colony, written by William Bradford and Edward Winslow, which was printed in London, in 1622, with the title: "A Relation or Journal of the beginning and proceedings of the English Plantation settled at Plimoth in New England".

This book, which is commonly called "Mourt's Relation", contains the oldest known copy of The Compact, but it does not give

the names of the forty-one Signers.

Bradford was Governor of the Colony when the Fortune was at Plymouth, and probably all the official records, including either the original Compact or an attested copy, were in his care, consequently he and Winslow, both of whom had signed The Compact, were in a position to secure a careful transcript of it, to include in their "Relation"; but, unfortunately, there is nothing in this book to show whether the original Compact had been sent to England in the Mayflower, was in Plymouth when the Fortune sailed, or was taken to England by the Fortune.

I have not attempted to make a list of early printed copies of The Compact, my efforts having been devoted entirely to finding some reference to the existence of the original document; but it may be of interest to note that Samuel Purchas reprinted part of "Mourt's Relation", including The Compact, in "Purchas His Pil-

grimes", published at London, in 1625.

# [Bradford's History]

The oldest known manuscript copy of The Compact is found in Gov. William Bradford's History of Plymouth Plantation, the original manuscript of which is in the State Library, in Boston.

This History was first put into print in the year 1856.

In Bradford's handwriting, facing original page 4, of this manuscript History, is a note, dated "Anno Dom: 1646", stating that he "first begane these scribled writings . . . aboute ye yeare . 1630"; and on page 57 is a statement that the peace with Massasoit, which had been made in the year 1621, "hath now continued this . 24 . years", that is, until 1645 or 1646.

As Bradford's copy of the "combination", as he called The Compact, is found on page 54 of his History, it is evident that he wrote that page between 1630 and 1646, and probably it was much

nearer to the latter date than to the former.

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It is not possible to determine, at the present time, whether the copy of The Compact in Bradford's History was made from the original document, from an official copy of the original, from Mourt's Relation, or from some unknown source. Bradford of course had access to all official records of Plymouth Colony, as already stated, but apparently it did not occur to him that the names of the Signers of The Compact would interest those who might read his History.

### [THE SIGNERS OF THE COMPACT]

The oldest known list of the forty-one Signers of The Compact is found in Nathaniel Morton's "New-Englands Memoriall", first

printed at Cambridge, Mass., in 1669.

Morton had been one of the 156 inhabitants of Plymouth, on I June, 1627, New Style, as shown by the Division of Cattle on that date, and he must have been personally acquainted with the sixteen Signers then living at Plymouth, as follows: John Alden, Isaac Allerton, John Billington, William Bradford, William Brewster, Peter Brown, Francis Cooke, Edward Doty, Francis Eaton, Samuel Fuller, Stephen Hopkins, John Howland, George Soule, Myles Standish, Richard Warren, Edward Winslow.

Three of these sixteen, John Alden, John Howland and George Soule, were living in 1669, Alden and Soule at Duxbury, and Howland at Plymouth; and Alden, at least, was present, as an Assistant, when Plymouth Colony voted a contribution towards the

expense of printing the "Memoriall".

Morton had also been Secretary (at first called Clerk) of Plymouth Colony for more than twenty years, when his book was printed, and he presumably had in his care either the original Compact, with its autograph signatures, or an official copy; and in "The Epistle Dedicatory" of his "Memoriall", he wrote: "the greatest part of my intelligence hath been borrowed from my much honoured Uncle, Mr. William Bradford, and such Manuscripts as he left in his Study, from the year 1620, unto 1646", and "Certain Diurnals of the honoured Mr. Edward Winslow, have also afforded me good light and help".

It is certain, therefore, that Morton had ample opportunity to obtain an accurate list of the Signers, and it is unfortunate that he did not make any reference to the existence or the location of

the original Compact.

I have found no manuscript or printed reference to any list of the Signers antedating that given by Morton, and the fact that

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his "Memoriall" is our sole authority for the names of the Signers should be emphasized, because he does not state the order in which the names were affixed to the original document, and does not number the Signers.

In the first edition of the "Memoriall", The Compact is found on page 15, with the names of twenty-one Signers at the bottom of that page, in three columns, and the remaining twenty names, also in three columns, at the top of page 16. In the following copy the names are arranged as printed in the "Memoriall".

The first person to number the Signers seems to have been Rev. Thomas Prince, of Boston, in 1736, in "A Chronological History of New-England"; but he distinctly stated that his list of the names was taken from Morton's "Memoriall". Prince arranged the names in two columns, the first containing the twenty-one names at the bottom of page 15 of the "Memoriall", the second containing the names at the top of page 16. In each case Prince took first the seven names in the left-hand column, then those in the central column, then the right-hand column. The names in his own first column he numbered from one to twenty-one, and those in his own second column from twenty-two to forty-one.

As we do not know either the shape or the size of the paper, or parchment, on which the original Compact was written, it is

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impossible to determine whether the forty-one signatures were arranged in two, three or four columns. Even if we had the original Compact before us, and found that there were only two columns of signatures, it would still be impossible to determine the exact order of signing; and it is also doubtful if we should be able to determine whether the first signature was at the top of the right-hand column or at the top of the left-hand column.

Nathaniel Morton himself probably did not know the exact order of signing, and it is unfortunate that Prince, writing sixtyseven years later, put numbers before the names of the Signers. because subsequent writers, supposing that he knew the actual order of signing, have followed his numbering, with the result that many persons believe they are descended from "the fourth Signer", or from "the seventeenth Signer", or from "the thirtyfifth Signer", etc., accepting as correct the numbers assigned by Prince one hundred and sixteen years after The Compact was drawn up.

# WHY DID ONLY FORTY-ONE PASSENGERS SIGN THE COMPACT?

Some years ago a speaker at one of the meetings of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants said that it was very singular that only forty-one of the Mayflower Passengers signed "The Compact," and stated that no explanation had been found for this apparent discrimination. As others have labored under the same impression, it has seemed advisable to state the

facts very concisely.

The voyage of the Mayflower ended at Plymouth, New England, and her passenger list contained one hundred and four (104) names in all; but William Butten died before Provincetown was reached, and Peregrine<sup>2</sup> White (William<sup>1</sup>) was not born until about the second week in December.\* On 21 November, 1620, therefore, the number of passengers on board the Mayflower, at what is now Provincetown, was one hundred and two (102). Of this number, twenty-nine (29) were females, as follows: eighteen married women accompanying their husbands; seven

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unmarried daughters with their parents; three young unmarried women; one little girl with Edward Winslow's family.

Of the seventy-three (73) males on the Mayflower 21 November, 1620, but forty-one (41) signed "The Compact." Why do we not find the signatures of some of the other male passengers? The question is easily answered.

More than two-thirds of the thirty-two (32) who did not sign were under age, and their signatures would have had no value. There were seventeen (17) minor sons of passengers, one (1) minor nephew of a passenger, and five (5) boys who were not with their own parents. Therefore, twenty-three (23) of the males who did not sign were minors in the care of their parents

or of other persons.

Nine (9) males are still to be accounted for. In his list of the Mayflower Passengers, Gov. Bradford says: "Ther were allso other . 2. seamen hired to stay a year here in the country, William Trevore; and one Ely. But when their time was out they both returned." As Trevore and Ely were bound by a seaman's contract, which in those days was exceedingly strict, it is evident that neither of these two men was free to sign "The Compact." And it was not necessary that they should sign, as they could be controlled by their contracts, without reference to the later "Compact."

All of the other males, seven only, are distinctly called servants by Gov. Bradford, and there can be no question that the terms of their contracts with their respective masters were such that they were not free agents, even if they were twenty-one years old. Their ages have not been discovered, and possibly some of these seven were too young to sign, even if they had not been servants.

In brief, every male passenger, without a single exception, who is known to have been of legal age and also a free agent, signed "The Compact"; and every male passenger who did not sign it was either a minor or a servant under some form of contract which undoubtedly did not leave him free to sign, or which made his signature unnecessary.

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### THE ESTATE OF DEACON NATHANIEL WILLIAMS

BY THE EDITOR

NATHANIEL WILLIAMS of Taunton married, in 1668, Elizabeth³ Rogers (John², Thomas¹) of Duxbury, and died in August, 1692, according to a statement in the unrecorded inventory of his estate, taken 26 December, 1692, and sworn to by the widow Elizabeth. In this inventory, also in an undated inventory of the real estate, Nathaniel Williams is called Deacon.

The division of the estate, made 25 July, 1698, shows that the heirs then living were: the widow; John Williams, called the eldest son; Nathaniel Williams, called the second son; and Elizabeth Williams, under eighteen years of age, called the only

daughter.

Elizabeth, the daughter, later married John Macomber, of Taunton, who survived her and married, for his second wife, Lydia, the widow of Elizabeth's brother Nathaniel Williams.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, and documents on file, in the Bristol County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of the estate of Deacon Nathaniel Williams.

# [ESTATE OF DEACON NATHANIEL WILLIAMS]

The items were: "a tenn acer loot neer ye Iron works" £25; "3: acers also neer ye Iron works" £3; "the 50 acer devision" £12, 10s.; "the 30 acer devision" £7, 10s.; "3: acers of Swamp at pale brook" £3; "6: acers of plain, at ye neck plain" £1, 10s.; "the

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north purchas" £10; "the South purchas" £10; "A purchas Right in ye old tounship" £5; "a Rumford devision" £8.

"This following not so cleare."

"About on acer land, wt houseing barn & orchard" £100; "7: acers in ye great loots" £15; "about 20: acers at the neck" £30; "3: acers swamp also at pale brook" £3; "medow at litleworth" £2; "part in ye dead swamp, shuld bin above" £1, 10s.

[From unrecorded bond] On 3 August, 1693, "Elizabeth Williams of Taunton widdow & Relict of Nathaniell Williams late of taunton Dec: d together with John Williams of taunton sonne to the afforesd Nathanell Williams", as administrators, gave a bond of £500, with "Capt Leonard of said taunton and John Rogers of Bristoll as sureties", each bound for £250.

The bond was signed by: "elisabeth wiliams" and "John: Williams", and by the two sureties. The signatures of Elizabeth and John Williams were witnessed by John Thrasher (by a mark) and Joseph Willis (by a mark). John Cary witnessed the signa-

tures of Leonard and Rogers.

[1:223] On 25 July, 1698, Thomas Leonard, James Leonard, Henry Hodges, John Richmond, Sr., and Thomas Williams, having been appointed to make a "Just and Equal Divission of the lands, Goods, Chattels & Estate" between the widow and the children, "We do therefore . . . Divid the abovesd Estat both Reall & personall as followeth"

"First We Divide . . . . unto the widow of sd Dec<sup>d</sup> the westward End of the Dweling House and the westward End of the Barn, and a Third part of the Yearly incomes of the lands hereby divided . . . . unto her sons Viz. John williams and Nathaniel williams all Dureing her Natural Life & one Third of the Move-

ables for Ever: said Third being" £42.

"Secondly we Divide . . . . unto John williams the Eldest son of s<sup>d</sup> Dec<sup>d</sup> . . . . the Dwelling House & Barne & Orchard and land at Home and the Ten accree lott in the great lotts, & the seven accree lott in the Great lotts and the three accre of land Near John Threshers and the North Purchase, and the Eight accres of Land in the Little woods so called, and halfe a Purchase Right in the old Township . & the Meadow at Littleworth and three accres of land att Pale Brooke and the Share in the Dead Swamp the Rest of the land lately taken up or being yett Due to said Purchase Right in the old Town Ship to be Equally divided between said John williams and his Brother Nathaniel williams, Said Jn<sup>o</sup> williams allso to have" 156, "out of the Moveables and to pay his Grandmother williams" 6s., 8d., "pr annum Dureing her Naturall Life."

"Thirdly we Divide . . . . unto Nathaniel williams the second son of s<sup>d</sup> Dec<sup>d</sup>, his Fathers Fifty accre Divission, and his Thirty accre Divission in said Township, and Six accres of land on the Neck plain so called, and the South Purchase, and halfe a Purchase Right in the old Town Ship: and the Divission of land & meadow Called Rumford Divission and the meadow & upland at the Neck, and three accree of Swamp at Pale Brook and the part of ye Ceder Swamp bought of John Thresher Allso what is to be Divided between him & his Brother John, as abovesd. and" £7, 16s., 8d., "to be payd out of the Moveables, by the Administrators . . . . he Paying his Grandmother Williams" 3s., 4d., "P annum Dureing her Naturall Life"

"Fourthly we do hereby order that the Administrators Do pay unto Elizabeth the only Daughter of said Decd" £60, 10s., "in Money or oth pay at money prise at the time of her Marriage or when she comes to Eighteen years of age as her portion or

part of sd Estate"

The witnesses were Philip King and John Smith.

On 11 October, 1698, "Thomas Leonard Esq<sup>r</sup> one of the subscribers to this . . . instrument of Division . . . Did Present the said Instrument . . . unto the said Judge of Probates &c who . . . Did accept & allow of the same as a Settlement of sd Estate according to law and Ordered the same to be put upon Record" The division was recorded 14 October, 1698.

# THE MAYFLOWER MARRIAGE RECORDS AT LEYDEN AND AMSTERDAM

In the present article we reprint, from our eighth and ninth volumes, without the half-tone illustrations, the literal transcripts, in Dutch, of the marriage records, at Leyden and Amsterdam, Holland, of William Bradford, Dr. Samuel Fuller and Edward Winslow, with the English translations.

Attention is again called to the fact that Holland corrected its calendar, and adopted New Style dating, in 1583. All of these marriage records, therefore, are already in New Style.

# DESCRIPTION AND ADDRESS OF THE

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#### WILLIAM BRADFORD'S FIRST, MARRIAGE\*

The record of the marriage intentions of William Bradford and Dorothy May, at Amsterdam, is not dated, but it follows one dated 9 November, 1613. It was entered in the Doop, Trouw and Begrafenis Regs., 667, 52.

Their intentions were published at Leyden, the 16th, 23rd and 30th of November, 1613, and recorded in Echt Book B,

folio 25.

The marriage took place at Amsterdam, 10 December, 1613, and was recorded in the Pui Book.

Then appeared also as before William Bradford, from Austerfield, fustian weaver, 23 years old, living at Leyden, where the banns have been published, declaring that he has no parents, on the one part, and Dorothy May, 16 years old, from Wisbeach in England, at present living on the New Dyke, assisted by Henry May, on the other part, and declared that they were betrothed to one another with true covenants, requesting their three Sunday proclamations in order after the same to solemnize the aforesaid covenant and in all respects to execute it, so far as there shall be

# SAMUEL FULLER'S SECOND AND THIRD MARRIAGES\*.

Of Dr. Samuel Fuller's first marriage nothing is known except the fact shown by the Leyden records, that his first wife was Alice Glascock. The second and third marriages took place at Leyden and are recorded in Echt Book B, folio 18, verso, and Echt Book B, folio 64, respectively. The banns of the second marriage were, as usual, published three times, on 16, 23 and 30 March, 1613, as shown by the record "tje Den 16. 3. 1613" &c. and the marriage took place, 24 April, 1613.

For the third marriage the banns were published on 13, 20 and 27 May, 1617, the marriage taking place on the day of the

last publication.

# THE "MAYFLOWER", HER IDENTITY AND TONNAGE

By J. R. HUTCHINSON OF CLIFFORDS INN, LONDON, ENG.

[Through the courtesy of Mr. Henry Edwards Scott, Editor of The New England Historical and Genealogical Register, we here reprint, from the October, 1916, issue of that magazine, an important article about The Mayflower, which supplements the article by Mr. R. G. Marsden, reprinted in our January, 1916, issue.

An exact copy of Mr. Hutchinson's article, with its foot-notes, as printed in the "Register", is here given. The notes are *not* by the Editor of The Mayflower Descendant.

The first successful attempt to identify the historic Mayflower was made as recently as 1904. In the English Historical Review for October of that year, Mr. R. G. Marsden, the able editor of "Select Pleas in the High Court of Admiralty," succeeded in proving the famous Pilgrim ship to have been none other than that Mayflower which, for a then undetermined period prior to, as for some time after the year 1620, was commanded by Capt. Christopher Jones of Redriffe, otherwise Rotherhithe, Surrey.†

Satisfactory though Marsden's demonstration is as regards the identity of the commander of the *Mayflower*, it nevertheless falls short of completeness in one essential particular relating to the vessel herself. Since man first went down to the sea in ships

Mr. Dean correctly surmises that the Christopher Jones who witnesses the will "may have been the Captain of the *Mayflower*," but cites the Rev. Edward D. Neill to the contrary.

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and did business in great waters, the name of the port from which a ship hails has been universally recognized as vital to her identification. Here it is that Marsden's demonstration fails. He cannot

tell us to what port the Mayflower belonged.

He attempts, it is true, to show that both she and her master were of Harwich, and in support of this view he cites a certain schedule, filed amongst the Libels of the High Court of Admiralty, as so describing them. But he omits to mention under what circumstances that schedule was drawn—an omission, as it happens, fatal to his argument. The circumstances in question, rightly set out, are these.

In the year 1609 one Andrew Pawling, a merchant tailor of London, chartered the *Mayflower* for a trading voyage to Norway, the consideration for the round trip to be £125, payable within four days after her return. On the homeward voyage the first English port at which she touched was Harwich, and from this place her captain, Christopher Jones, wrote to Pawling, advising him of his safe arrival and of the cargo he carried.\* To be precise, he had on board 3000 Norway deals, 10 lasts of tar, and 3½ lasts of pickled herrings. A last of tar equals 14 barrels; a last of herrings, 12 barrels.

About a week before Christmas, 1609, the Mayflower dropped anchor in the River Thames, "over against Ratcliffe mill," and Pawling's agent paid to Jones a sum of £160 odd in respect of freight, demurrage, and harbor dues. He was lucky to receive it, for in his absence much of an untoward nature had happened. Pawling himself lay in the King's Bench Prison, a victim of debt. Two executions were out against him, and in order to secure himself against these he gave to one Richard Nottingham, to whom it is alleged he owed money, a bill of sale on the cargo of the Mayflower. Before Nottingham could acquaint Jones with the fact, however, the officers of the Crown, armed with the requisite warrant, had boarded the vessel and "arrested" or garnished the goods. It was a near thing. They came over the side of the Mayflower at the very moment Nottingham set foot on her ladder to assert his claim.

At this point in the proceedings the schedule was drawn up. The ownership of the cargo being in dispute, it became necessary that the nature and quantities of the various commodities composing it should be reduced to writing; and since the *Mayflower* had only just arrived from Harwich, her last point of departure,

she was naturally enough described in the document as "of" or from that port. She might with greater truth have been described as of Drammen in Norway.

The litigation resulting from the Norway trip did not end with the lawsuit occasioned by Pawling's unfortunate bill of sale. There was in the charter party a demurrage clause, which stipulated that Jones—who appears, by the way, to have been a very shrewd man of business—should have 30s. a day for every day his vessel lay in harbor while at Pawling's disposal. Under this clause he claimed a sum, over and above the demurrage included in the £160 already received, which Pawling refused to pay. Jones thereupon sued him, and it is from the depositions taken in this and the previous case\* that we obtain undeniable evidence of the ship's identity.

Among these depositions the most noteworthy are those made on oath by John Cowbridge of Wapping, boatswain of the Mayflower, and Thomas Thompson of Redriffe, one of the able seamen composing her crew.† Cowbridge had known Jones for four years; Thompson, for ten. Both had made the Norway trip with him; both repeatedly and explicitly describe the Mayflower as the "Mayflower of London." And this evidence, in itself sufficiently conclusive, is corroborated by every other deponent in a brace of lawsuits extending, successively, over some four years.

Were any further proof required to establish the identity of the Mayflower as a London vessel, it is to be found in a series of records which, at the time Marsden wrote, lay unrecognized in a remote tower of the London Record Office. Only within very recent years have these records—the Customs Books of the Exchequer, commonly called Port Books—been made available to the student. They consistently attribute the Mayflower, Christopher Jones, master, to the port of London. Whether she was built there, however, remains an open question.

It can be considered no unwarrantable digression if, at this point, we devote some little space to a summary of such facts as the present writer's investigations have brought to light concerning the man into whose hands the Pilgrim Fathers committed their lives, and to whose sterling qualities as a seaman and navigator the ultimate success of their great adventure was, under God, so largely due. Among the honored names indissolubly linked with the beginnings of the American people that of

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Christopher Jones, the unobtrusive but capable skipper of the

Mayflower, surely deserves a place.

Of his birth or parentage nothing is known with certainty. In all likelihood he was still a young man—between twenty-five and thirty years of age, let us say—when he made the Norway voyage that first brings him to our notice. In all likelihood, too, the Mayflower was his first command, for Thompson, deposing on 4 May, 1612, tells us that Jones had then "byn for the space of fower or fyve yeares" master of that ship. Without in any way overstraining the probabilities of the case we may therefore reasonably infer that he was in the prime of manhood when he set the course of the Mayflower for the shores of New England. Capt. John Mason, the founder of New Hampshire, was thirty-three when he navigated the Seahorse, in size and build the twin sister of the Mayflower, to Greenland and back in 1612.\*

In her run of sixty-six days from land to land the Mayflower encountered exceedingly tempestuous weather. It was the season of the autumnal equinox. Fierce gales caught her in mid-Atlantic, and for days she wallowed in the trough of the sea, in hourly danger of foundering. In her escape from that imminent peril her passengers saw only the hand of Providence. We may without irreverence recognize in it something more. The fine seamanship of her commander—providentially directed, if you will—stands out clear and unmistakable. Jones was no novice in the art and mystery of the sea. He had in his time weathered many a gale—notably when on his return from Norway, in the early winter of 1609, an "extraordinary great storme" drove him a hundred leagues out of his course and obliged him to jettison part of his cargo in order to "savegarde the shipp."†

For the master of the Mayflower, however, there lurked in that daring venture into the western seas dangers he was not destined to weather. The hardships of the voyage, and more especially the unaccustomed rigors of a New England winter spent in enforced idleness, wrecked his health. He died at Rotherhithe

within nine months of his return, and was there buried on 5 Mar. 1621/2.\* Were I asked to write his epitaph, I should word it: "Here Lies Christopher Jones, America's Second Columbus."

On 26 Aug. 1622 his estate was administered by his widow Joan.† She and two children mourned his loss—Christopher, baptized 13 Mar. 1613/14, and Joan, baptized 26 Dec. 1615. Of the boy we have no further record. The daughter married, 20 May, 1636, Nathaniel Newbury.‡

For some two years after her master's death the Mayflower lay in the Thames, idle and partially dismantled. Her owners in 1609 had been Christopher Jones, Richard Child, and John Moore. Changes other than her master's death had occurred in the interval. Richard Child was dead, and Robert Child, presumably his son, had succeeded him. A quarter of the vessel had been sold to some unknown buyer, and it was now, apparently, decided to sell her outright, possibly as the result of litigation, possibly with a view to a final settlement of Jones's estate. Accordingly, on 4 May 1624, Robert Child, John Moore, and Joan Jones, widow, the then owners of three quarters of the ship, obtained from the High Court of Admiralty an order for her appraisal. The appraisers were William Craford and Francis Birkes, mariners, and Robert Clay and Christopher Malyns, shipwrights, all four Rotherhithe men and doubtless all friends and neighbors of her deceased captain. They assessed her value, as she then lay at her moorings in the river, at the modest sum of £160.\ With this appraisement the Pilgrim ship passes beyond our kenthough not, let us hope, forever, since some record of her later adventures and ultimate fate may yet be found.||

With the vexed question of the tonnage of the Mayflower speculation has long been busy. Some place it as low as 120 tons, others as high as 200. Marsden infers her to have been a vessel of greater tonnage than is generally supposed from the fact that

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her shallop, a boat capable of carrying five and twenty persons under sail, was according to that mysterious authority, Mourt, stowed "betwixt her decks;" from which he argues that she must have been at least a two-decker. The real meaning of Mourt's statement is, however, not that the boat was stowed between two decks which were placed one above the other, but in the vessel's waist—that is to say, on the main deck, between the elevated poop and the elevated forecastle, where, adds the same authority, room was found for her "with difficulty." The stowing of the shallop therefore argues against rather than for a high tonnage.

"A Note of the Shipping Provided for Virginia" by the Earl of Southampton in the year 1620\* describes the Mayflower as a vessel of 120 tons. Bradford, on the other hand, writes her down at "about nine-score," or 180 tons. Of these statements Bradford's, as we shall presently see, is the more nearly correct. This is as we should expect it to be, for not only did Bradford know the ship that he described, but he could have had no motive in misrepresenting so simple a fact; whereas Southampton, hiring ships for a company that paid according to tonnage, would be more likely to underestimate than to overestimate their capacity. Instances of such commercialmindedness in noble lords are not unknown; and Bradford's figures are strongly, if not fully, borne out by the subjoined extracts from the Book of Imports into the Port of London for the year 1620:†

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To appreciate this interesting schedule at its true significance, it is necessary that we should here indulge in a little sum in weights and measures and so translate our consignments of French wines into avoirdupois. What is here, in the delightful orthography of Elizabethan days, termed a "tonne of wyne," is of course the liquid tun of 252 gallons; while every four hogsheads, each of which contained 63 gallons, are also equivalent to a tun. The liquid tun, again, is equal in weight, or very nearly equal, to a ton avoirdupois. Reducing the consignments to this basis, we obtain therefore a total of about 160 tons of cargo discharged from the hold of the *Mayflower* on the three days in question. Some doubt remains as to whether she was fully laden. Allowing for this, we may safely place her actual tonnage at something between the 160 tons of the above discharge sheet and Bradford's estimate of 180.

Away back in 1609, as we have seen, the Mayflower made a Norway voyage, laden with tar, deals, and herrings. Precisely when she entered the wine trade we are unable to determine; but she was certainly engaged in it as early as 1616, for in that year one John Cawkin boarded her in the Thames, and as a consequence of sampling her cargo too freely was prosecuted by Jones for abusing him on his own deck and inciting his crew to mutiny.

The 6 Mar. 1619/20 saw the Mayflower clear from the port of London for La Rochelle; and on 15 May, returning from that voyage, she discharged at London a further consignment of French wines amounting in all to 59 tuns, I hogshead, the bulk of her cargo having doubtless been unladen at Southampton, then the great wine port for the south of England. This is her last recorded trip before, on 5 Aug. following, she headed west for America.

In the circumstances that the Mayflower was a wine ship we have a hitherto unrecognized factor in her historic voyage. A wine ship was what is termed in sailor parlance a "sweet ship;" and to this fact her company, closely packed though they were within the narrowest limits and under conditions the most unsanitary, perhaps owed much of that immunity from disease and death which was so providential a feature in their passing beyond the seas.

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# THE RECENT DESECRATION OF THE ONLY MAYFLOWER GRAVESTONE

THE illustration facing page 49 presents two half-tone cuts of the Only Known Gravestone of a Mayflower Passenger, erected at the time of his death. This stone was erected at the grave of Captain Richard More; in the old Charter Street Burial Ground, at Salem, Mass.

It is difficult to realize that these two cuts represent the same stone, but the photographs from which they were engraved were made by the same photographer, and both were made in my presence.

The cut at the left shows the gravestone as it had stood unaltered for more than two centuries, when it was photographed, in my presence, in 1901. The original negative (made in 1901) is still in possession of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, and a fresh print from it has been used in making the half-tone plate here presented.

The cut at the right shows the same gravestone, but this cut was made from a photograph taken, in my presence, in 1919, after I discovered that the stone had been desecrated by adding to the original, contemporary, inscription the words "Died 1692 A Mayflower Pilgrim". These words were added, if I was correctly informed, in 1918.

Literal copies of the inscription, before and after the desecration of the stone, are here given.

[The Inscription in 1901]

HERE LYETH BURIED Ye BODY OF CAPT RICHARD MORE AGED 84 YEARS

HERE LYETH BURIED Ye BODY OF CAPT RICHARD MORE AGED 84 YEARS DIED 1692 A MAYFLOWER PHIGRIM

In January, 1919, I had occasion to visit the Charter Street Burial Ground, and was amazed to find that, since my last pre-

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ceding visit to that cemetery, the gravestone of Capt. Richard More had been desecrated as shown by the illustrations and the foregoing transcripts. All later inquiries, made for the sole purpose of learning if any one had discovered evidence to prove that More actually "Died 1692", were met with denials of responsibility for any part of the addition to the original inscription.

Even if the addition had been accurate, appropriate, and properly executed, it would still have been extremely poor judgment to cut, on a gravestone which had stood unaltered for more than two centuries, any addition to the original inscription.

In the present case, unfortunately, the addition was extraordinarily inaccurate, as Richard More did not die until several years after 1692.

The addition was also very inappropriate, as the term "A Mayflower Pilgrim" was not used until many years after Richard More died.

The work of cutting the addition to the inscription was improperly executed, since the addition is in letters made larger than, but in imitation of, the original inscription. It was contrary to custom to cut the date of death larger than the name of the person; furthermore, as a result of the imitative lettering, and of the fact that the letters of the original, genuine, inscription were all re-cut when the addition was made, visitors to this cemetery are seriously misled, and they believe that the entire inscription, as it now stands, was cut when the stone was erected.

As already stated, no one was found who would sponsor the statement that Richard More "Died 1692". As a result of my investigations, however, I am convinced that this date is the result of errors printed in the "Visitor's Guide to Salem"\*, published by the Essex Institute, of Salem, Mass.

On page 126 of that pamphlet reference is made to "Richard More, the boy of twelve" who came on the Mayflower.

On page 165 of the pamphlet is a half-tone cut of Richard More's gravestone, the inscription reading exactly as when I had it photographed in 1901; and on this page it is again stated that he came on the Mayflower "as a boy of twelve".

If these two statements in regard to Richard More's age in 1620 had been accurate, his birth date would have been about 1608. By adding 84 (the age on the stone) to 1608 we get 1602, the erroneous date which has been put on the desecrated stone. As no other calculation, from any statement found, will give 1602 for the year of death, it is probable that the erroneous age,

printed on pages 126 and 165 of the "Visitor's Guide to Salem", is responsible for cutting off Capt. Richard More several years before the actual date of his death.

It is true that on page 183 of the "Guide" is a paragraph, of which the following is an exact copy: "Capt. Richard More (1614-1696) was buried in the Charter street cemetery and his gravestone, still standing and in good condition, is the only contemporary gravestone of a 'Mayflower' passenger, on its voyage of 1621, known to exist." But this paragraph is buried in a list of "Prominent Citizens and Visitors", and evidently escaped the notice of those responsible for the desecration of the gravestone. Even if this paragraph had been noticed, the strange date it assigns for the voyage of the Mayflower would be sufficient reason for hesitating to accept any other date printed in the same sentence.

As Richard More was born in England, and was over twentyone years of age when Salem was first settled, we may at least
question the propriety of inserting his birth among the "Births"
of Salem, Mass. But even if it had been appropriate to print
an English birth as if it had occurred in Massachusetts, it was
an inexcusable error to give the gravestone as authority for the
birth year printed. Unless a date of death is known from other
sources, an age, given on a gravestone which has no date of
death, is useless in determining the birth date. But Richard
More's stone bore neither birth date nor death date, when this
volume of "Births" was printed, consequently it was impossible
to estimate any birth date from the inscription alone; yet this
inscription, as already noted, is given as the sole authority for
the incorrect birth date printed.

The serious inaccuracy of the claim, printed in the "Births" of Salem, that the birth date, 1612, was based on the gravestone record, is still further emphasized by the fact that the erroneous date of death which is now on the stone indicates 1608 as the birth date, instead of 1612.

My announcement that Capt. Richard More of Salem has been transferred to the list of proved Mayflower Ancestors\* will arouse greatly increased interest in his gravestone, and in all other rec-

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ords relating to him. The serious errors noted in the foregoing pages, therefore, will result in much unnecessary trouble for

many persons.

Having shown that the Essex Institute is responsible for three different birth years, 1608, 1612 and 1614, for Capt. Richard More; and that it, therefore, probably is responsible for the erroneous date of death recently cut on his gravestone, I will give a few facts, from original contemporary records, which will show that he was born about 1613 or 1614; that he was still living on 29 March, 1694, New Style; and that he died before 30 April, 1696, New Style.

In the October, 1901, issue of The Mayflower Descendant\*, I printed an illustrated article entitled "The Only Mayflower Gravestone", in which I proved that Richard More of Salem was the Mayflower Passenger of that name, and stated that, according to the data then at hand, he probably died in 1696 or later. I also noted the fact that he was still alive on 29 March, 1694, New Style, when he witnessed the bond of his daughter, Susanna<sup>2</sup> (More) Dutch, who was on that day appointed administratrix on the estate of her deceased husband, Samuel Dutch, of Salem.

Bradford's History tells us that four children named More came on the Mayflower: "Ellen", with Edward Winslow; Jasper, with John Carver; Richard, and an unnamed brother, with Elder William Brewster. Four children of Samuel and Katherine Moore were baptized at Shipton, Shropshire, England, as follows: "Ellinora", 24 May, 1612; Jasper, 8 August, 1613; Richard, 13 November, 1614; Maria, 16 April, 1616†, and there is no doubt that Ellinora, Jasper and Richard More were the three More children, on the Mayflower, whose names were preserved by Bradford.

The More children presumably were baptized in the order of their birth. It is probable, therefore, that Richard More was born in the latter part of 1613, or in 1614, before 13 November; and it should be noted that the year 1614 agrees with the age, "seaventy yeares or thereabouts", given by him in an affidavit made in September, 1684, and printed, in 1901, in my article

already referred to.

Many times, since that article was published, and especially since I discovered the desecration of Capt. Richard More's gravestone, I have studied the original records, hoping to find some item which would determine the actual date of his death.

One result of this search was the discovery of several additional autograph signatures of Richard More\*, which confirm my previous identification, in 1901, of his signature on the bond of Susanna\* (More) Dutch, and thus confirm my statement that Capt. Richard More was alive on 29 March, 1694, New Style, and did not die two years earlier, in 1692, as the desecrated gravestone now states.

Another result of this search was the discovery of a deed dated 20 April, 1696, Old Style, (that is, on 30 April, 1696, New Style), which transferred land "Bought of Richard More Sent of Salem lately Deceased". This deed, printed at the end of this article, is of especial importance, as it proves that Capt. Richard More died before 30 April, 1696, New Style; but long experience in examining transfers of land shows that the words "lately Deceased" do not necessarily mean that the person referred to actually died only a short time before the date of the deed, consequently we must not jump to the conclusion that More died in the year 1696, or even in 1695.

As already stated, the deposition made in 1684 seems to have stated his then age (seventy) with approximate accuracy. Only six years later, however, he made four depositions, between 1 April, 1690, and 25 November, 1690, in which he added eight years to his age, then giving it as seventy-eight. Such a disproportionate increase in the age claimed by persons of advanced years was not unusual; and in the present case the increase of two years seems to have been continued, and accepted by the child or heir who caused the gravestone to be erected. It seems probable, therefore, that the age on the stone should have been eighty-two, instead of eighty-four; and if we accept the age eighty-two we get 1695 or 1696 for the year of death, neither of these dates being in conflict with any known data.

As a result of my investigations, to the present writing, I can definitely state that Capt. Richard More, of Salem, Mass., died within the twenty-five months beginning 29 March, 1694, New Style, and ending 30 April, 1696, New Style. Not one item of evidence found by myself, or presented by others, casts any doubt on the first date, and the deed mentioned is, of course, conclusive evidence of the accuracy of the second date.

Attention should here be given to a communication printed in the Salem Evening News for 10 February, 1904, in which the

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erroneous claim was made that Richard More died before I June, 1600.

In that communication, "A. A. S." claimed that "in June, 1690", Richard More, Jr., sold certain land to Peter Osgood. "also the wharf, which was 'my father's, Richard More'", and further claimed that "This transaction would place the death of Richard More, Sr., before June 1, 1690, as his son, Richard More, Jr., deeded to Peter Osgood, tanner, land that 'I inherited from my father Richard More'."

It is certain that "A. A. S." knew of my article in the October, 1901, issue of The Mayflower Descendant, because he hastened to send me a signed and dated clipping from the "News", but without comment of any kind. If he had read my article with due care, he would have noticed the deposition made by "Richard More Sener of Salem aged about 78", which was sworn to "by abovesd Capt More" on 25 November, 1690. This deposition proved that More was alive nearly six months after he ought to have been dead, according to the claim made in the "News". As "A. A. S." overlooked this important deposition, we are not surprised to find that the two quotations from his communication in the "News" contain three errors, two of them seriously misrepresenting the deed on which he based his unfortunate claim about More's death.

An examination of the abstract of that deed, printed at the end of the present article, will show: First, that the deed was dated I May, 1690, not I June, 1690; secondly, that Richard More, Jr., sold to Peter Osgood "prviledges of ye Wharfe", not the wharf itself; thirdly, that the land had been "given to me by my father", and had not been "inherited from my father".

If we had no other evidence than the phraseology of the deed itself, it would be necessary to interpret the words "given to me" as meaning a deed of gift in the lifetime of the grantor. They do not in themselves imply that the land was received as a legacy, or as a share of an intestate estate. In the present case, it was known to me, in 1901, that Richard More, Jr., had received this land from his father, by deed of gift dated 10 July, 1688, and recorded, 15 August, 1688, in the Essex County Registry of Deeds. As these two deeds added nothing to the proof I printed, in 1901, it did not seem best to make that article any longer by referring to them. Unfortunately I could not then anticipate that "A. A. S." would so carelessly misquote the deed from Richard More, Jr., to Peter Osgood.

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As already noted, my statement, made in 1901, that Capt. Richard More was alive on 29 March, 1694, New Style, has not been successfully challenged; and in the present article I have proved that he died before 30 April, 1696, New Style.

If, in the future, any evidence is found which indicates that More survived the first date, or died earlier than the second date, I shall be very much pleased to print it in The Mayflower Descendant, giving the finder full credit for his, or her, discovery.

In the following pages will be found exhaustive abstracts of several deeds of land sold by Capt. Richard More; including the deed of gift to his son Richard; also the deed from Richard More, Jr., to Peter Osgood; and the deed, from John Cromwell to William and Benjamin Browne, which proves that Capt. Richard More died before 30 April, 1696, New Style.

## [RICHARD MORE, SR., TO JOHN HIGGINSON, JR.—1687]

[Essex Co. Deeds, 8:9] On 29 October, 1687, "Richard More Sen<sup>r</sup> of Salem . . . . Marriner", for £9, "in m<sup>r</sup>chantable goods", sold to "John Higginson Jun<sup>r</sup> of Salem aforesaid merchant . . . all that whole parcell of flatts and wharfe land Scituate in y<sup>e</sup> Towne of Salem afores<sup>d</sup> lying Southward of my now dwelling house and land being bounded as followeth viz: w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>e</sup> wharfe and flatts belonging to Samuel Dutch on y<sup>e</sup> westt w<sup>th</sup> y<sup>e</sup> garden Orchard and wharfe of me y<sup>e</sup> Said Rich<sup>d</sup> More Sen<sup>r</sup> On the North and Extending from the Banke all along from Samuel Dutches wharfe Under my Garden Orchard & Wharfe to low water marke in the whole breadth thereof including y<sup>e</sup> Range of Stones that Lye und<sup>r</sup> the Banke together w<sup>th</sup> a High way for Cart and foot w<sup>ch</sup> goes befor my Gate leading to the Said Bargained premises freely and att all times"

The deed was acknowledged, 28 November, 1687, and was recorded, 14 January, 1687/8.

# [Capt. Richard More, Mortgage to Philip Cromwell—1687]

[Essex Co. Deeds, 8:15] On 17 December, 1687, "Capt Richard More of Salem Marriner", for £15, 18s., 2d., mortgaged to "mr Philip Cromwell of Salem . . . . Slaughterer . . . A small peell or quantity of land . . . . in Salem Nigh unto his now dwelling house wthin Fence Including his Out Kitchen & Leantow together wth ye land itt Stands upon which Kitchen and leantow bounds ye aforesd peell of land on the North & on ye East is bounded wth a plum Tree: on ye South wth ye River to ye End

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of ye Upland downward: on the westt wth ye Primm Hedge wth all the benefitts priviledges and Appurtenances Thereunto belonging with ye priviledge & benefitt also of a high way from mr Hathornes lane formerly So Called down along Through his Orchard to ye aforesd peice of ground and From Thence downe to the Wharf wth the priviledge both of wharf & well To Have and to Hold the sd quantity of land being about Two Rodds"

Interest at eight per cent was to be paid; but no time for payment of the principal was fixed. [See the deed dated 10 May,

1690, recorded 8:150.]

Marriners . . . . for A Valuable Sume of money", sold to "Peter Osgood of Salem . . . . Tanner . . . . Sixty pole or Rodd of Ground or thereabouts . . . . lying in the Towne of Salem . . . . & is part of Our house lott there the Said ground is bounded Easterly with the Cove westerly with the land of of William Browne Esqr & mr Benjamin Browne northerly with ye land that was formerly Joshua Wards Now deceased and Southerly with ye land of us the Said Richard More Sen<sup>r</sup> & Richard More Jun<sup>r</sup> to Say from the westerly Corner post of Our Garden fence which poast Stands in the Said mr Brownes line and from thence upon A Streight line Easterly home to the Northeast Corner of the barne and Cellar as it now Standeth and So On Easterly upon the Said Streight line all ye length of the Said land to ye Cove aforesaid and also a free priviledge of the Said Richard More Sen<sup>r</sup> his wharfe upon all occasions likewise A free Egress & Regress off from ye Said land all along ye lane that Lyes on ye Northerly Side of Thomas Moulds land"

[Essex Co. Deeds, 8:95] On 10 July, 1688, "Richard More Sent of Salem.... Marrint For & in Consideration of ye Naturall afection yt I bare unto my well beloved Son Richard More Junt wth divers other Considerations" conveyed "to ye abovesd Richard More Junt .... part of my dwelling house Comonly Caled by New Room or long room wth all Chimneys Chambers Garretts or other buildings . . . . belonging to ye Sd Room or Sd End of

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my house & also ye land now Inclosed as a garden wth ye barne & Seller under itt wth all ye Treese Fencings or other prviledges .... thereunto belonging as itt is Scittuate and Lies Bounded in ye Towne of Salem aforesd Vizt Eastward to ye Cove from ye South part of Said new house on a Streight line and Westward So far as ye west part of ye old house where ye old house now Standeth on a line ye land now Inclosed as a garden westward from sd house butting On ye land of Majr William Browne & mr Benjamin Browne thier Land & Running northward to a Corner post wch post is ye northwest Corner of sd garden & from thence Eastward to ye Cove taking in ye barne which is ye North bounds and Joynes to the land of Peter Osgood wth priviledge of ye wharfe & all other priviledges of highwayes Wells Springs or any other appurtinances wtsoever belonging thereunto"

### [RICHARD MORE, IR., TO PETER OSGOOD-1690]

[Essex Co. Deeds, 9:18] On 1 May, 1690, "Richard More junr of Salem . . . . Marrinr", for "a valuable Consideration" sold to "Peter osgood of Salem . . . . (Tanner) . . . . all that pcll of land given to me by my father Richard More, wth a Dwelling house standing thereapon; also two brick Chimneys belonging to ye said house. Also a Barne and cellar undr ye same, with any other housing upon ye said land. Scituated & lying in salem aforesd: The sd land is Bounded Eastward to ye Cove; Southerly with ye backside of ye House of Major Wm Brown & mr Benja Brown upon a straite Line, Easterly according to ye Range of ye said Backside of ye said House; Westerly wth ye Land of in William Brown & mr Benja Brown, And Northerly with ye Land of ye sd Peter osgood, Also prviledges of ye Wharfe weh was my father Richard More his wharfe."

The deed was signed by "Richard More junr" and by Sarah More. The witnesses were Samuel Dutch and Thomas Mould.

"Richard More jun" & Sarah More both" acknowledged the deed, 19 June, 1691, and it was recorded, 11 September, 1691.

### [More to Cromwell—Sale of Mortgaged Land]

[Essex Co. Deeds, 8:150] "Capt Richard More his Deed of sale to mr Philip Cromwell 10th May 1690"

On 10 May, 1690. "Richard More of Salem", for £15, 18s., 2d., sold to "mr Philip Cromwell of Salem, Slaughterer . . . . all

that pcll or quantity of Land.... in Salem, Neer unto his Now dwelling house, within Fence including his Out Kitchen & Leantoo together wth the Land itt stands apon, Which Kitchin & Leantoo bounds the aforesd parcell of Land, on the North, & on ye East is bounded wth a plumtree, On the South with ye River to ye End of the upland downward, On the West wth ye priviledg\* withall all the priviledges benefits & apprenances thereunto belonging, with the benefitt & priviledg also of a highway, from mr Hathornes Lane formerly So called, down alonge through my Orchyard, that now is, or formerly was in my possession, to ye aforesd peice of ground, And from thence down to ye wharfe, with ye priviledg both of wharfe & well .... ye sd pcll of Land, being about two Rodds as itt is before bounded .... In witnesse whereunto the abovesd Capt Richard More hath hereunto sett his hand"

The deed was signed "Richd More Senr", and was acknowledged, the day of its date, by "Capt Richard More". It was "Recorded May 11th 1600".

By this deed Capt. Richard More transferred to Philip Cromwell the land he had mortgaged to Cromwell, on 17 December, 1687.

Merchts . . . . all that parcell or quantity of land which Phillip Cromwell lately Deceased Bought of Richard More Senr of Salem lately Deceased as by bill of Sale for ye Same bearing Date ye Tenth Day of May One thousand six hundred & Ninety May more at large appear & is Scituate & lying in Salem neer unto ye late dwelling house of Said Richard More within fence and is bounded on ve north With Said Dwelling house of sd Richard More within fence & is bounded on ye North wth Said dwelling house of sd Richard More And on ye East & west with ye land that was lately sd Richard Mores & on the South with ye South River . . . . the said quantity of land being about Two rodds"

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John Cromwell acknowledged the deed, at Salem, 9 September, 1696, and "Hanah Cromwell wife of ye Said John Cromwell did freely Surrender up her Right of Dower". The deed was recorded, 13 January, 1696/7.

At the close of the business meeting, our fellow member, Col. Frederic A. Washburn, M.D., late Chief Surgeon, Base Section No. 3, American Expeditionary Forces, gave a talk on "Experiences of a Medical Officer."

By special request, Col. Washburn brought to the meeting the decoration conferred on him by the English Government, and pre-

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sented to him, in New York, last November, by the Prince of Wales. After adjournment the members and their friends had the privilege of examining this interesting decoration.

### FROM THE SECRETARY'S TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

During the year two hundred and fifty-five new members were elected, and five former members were re-instated. Twenty-seven deaths were reported. There were twelve resignations, and seven were dropped for non-payment of annual dues. The net gain in membership, for the Society year, was two hundred and fourteen.

The membership record for the twenty-four years of its existence is as follows: Elected, 1895; Re-instated, 33; Dicd, 268; Resigned, 346; Dropped, 196; leaving a net membership of 1118, as com-

pared with a membership of 904, one year ago.

Sixty-five supplemental lines of descent have been filed by mem-

bers, during the year.

Ten Life Members and seven Minor Life Members have been elected since our 1919 Annual Meeting, and ten members who had been paying dues annually have made themselves Life Members. These twenty-seven members have added \$2700.00 to our Building Fund, which now amounts (including interest) to \$4,140.19. No special appeal for this fund has been sent out, but gifts to the amount of \$280.00 have been received. Additional gifts of cash, Liberty Bonds, etc., are requested.

The most important gift during the year has been a copy of "An Abridgement of that Booke which the Ministers of Lincolne Diocesse delivered to his Maiestie upon the first of December 1605." This book, printed by Elder William Brewster, at Leyden, in 1617, was presented by members of the Society, descendants of Elder Brewster. This Society now owns three books printed by Brewster, at Leyden, one in 1617, one in 1618, and one in 1619. As only seventeen or eighteen books are known to have been printed by Brewster, we are very fortunate to receive, as gifts, specimens of three of them.

The addition of this book to our valuable collection of relics of the Mayflower Passengers and the rapid growth of our library and our manuscript collection of data for "The Mayflower Genealogies" emphasize the importance of the Society's having a strictly fire-proof home of its own, as soon as possible. We do not, at present, need a large building, but provision should be made for future growth.

The illustration facing this page is a reproduction of the title-page of "An Abridgement Of That Booke Which The Ministers Of Lincolne Diocesse Delivered to his Majestic upon the first of December 1605.... Reprinted, Anno Dom. 1617."

The cut shows the exact size of the original page, and was made from the copy of this book now owned by the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants.

The name of the printer and the place at which this reprint was issued are not indicated, on the title-page or in the text, but the book has been identified as a product of the press of Elder William Brewster, at Leyden, Holland.

Early in January, 1920, a copy of "The Ministers of Lincolne" was offered to the Society, but no funds were available for its purchase, and the owner would not agree to hold it until the money needed could be raised. The Editor of this magazine, therefore, purchased this book, printed by his ancestor, and held it until the Society, by an appeal to the Brewster descendants among its members, raised the amount he had paid for it. The book was then turned over to the Society.

This is the third book printed by Elder Brewster, at Leyden, which has been secured by the Editor and turned over to the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants in this way.

The first one secured was David Calderwood's "Perth Assembly", printed by Brewster, in 1619.

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The second one was Thomas Cartwright's "Confutation of the Rhemists", printed by Brewster, in 1618. The title-page of this book was reproduced in The Mayflower Descendant, Volume XIV, page 193, and an account of its presentation to the Society, with a list of the donors, was printed in "Pilgrim Notes and Queries", Volume I, pages 13 and 14.

This Society now owns specimens of Brewster's work in each of the three years, 1617, 1618 and 1619, in which he is known to

have printed books.

The Editor has recently secured a second copy of Thomas Cartwright's "Confutation of the Rhemists", printed by Brewster in 1618. He will sell this copy and will give to the Society the entire amount received, to assist in purchasing other copies of Brewster imprints. Anyone desiring to purchase the book should address the Editor of this magazine.

The names of the Brewster descendants who contributed the amount necessary to secure the "Ministers of Lincolne", and thus became the donors of this book to the Society, are given in the following list, in the order in which their gifts were received. ### THE WILL OF BENJAMIN SNOW 3

BY THE EDITOR

Benjamin Snow<sup>3</sup>, of Bridgewater, Mass., son of William Snow and his wife Rebecca<sup>2</sup> Brown (Peter<sup>1</sup>), of that town, married, first, Elizal eth<sup>3</sup> Alden (Joseph<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>1</sup>), of Bridgewater, by whom he had five children: Rebecca, Benjamin, Solomon, Ebenezer and Elizabeth. By a second wife, Sarah (widow of Jonathan Cary of Bridgewater), he had one child: Sarah. The births of these children, all recorded at Bridgewater, were printed in our fourteenth volume.

Benjamin Snow<sup>8</sup> made his will, 12 September, 1738, and it was probated, 6 June, 1743. We here present exhaustive abstracts of the will and all other records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Plymouth County Probate Records. There are no original papers, relating to this estate, in the probate files.

This article is printed at the expense of a member of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, Mr. Waters S. Davis, a descendant of Benjamin Snow<sup>3</sup>, through the daughter Elizabeth Snow<sup>4</sup>, who married Joseph Carver.

To "Daughters Rebecca Campbell And Elizabeth Carver all my other Moveable Estate not above disposed of, after my wifes decease only it is to be understood that the Ten pounds above Given to my Grandson is to be first taken out of My Moveables."

Joseph Carver, Lieut. John Washburn, Benjamin Mehurin and William Fobes were indebted to the estate. The estate was in-

debted to Ebenezer Snow, Joseph Wedey and Dr. Lunt.

The three appraisers made oath to the inventory, 4 July, 1743, and Ebenezer Snow, the executor, made oath to it 1 August, 1743.

### ELIJAH' SAMSON'S ESTATE

BY THE EDITOR

ELIJAH SAMSON (John3, Stephen2, Henry1), of Duxbury, Mass., born 7 June, 1734, married Ruth Bradford (Gamaliel1, Samuel3, William2-1), had a large family, and died intestate. The widow declined to administer, and the son Stephen5 Sampson, of Duxbury, was appointed administrator.

Exhaustive abstracts of all records and original documents, relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Plymouth

County, Mass., Probate Registry, are here given.

### [ELIJAH4 SAMSON'S ESTATE]

[From unrecorded petition] On 8 May, 1805, "Ruth Samson" of Duxbury, "widow of Elijah Samson late of s<sup>d</sup> Duxbury. deceased" declined to administer his estate, and petitioned the Court to "appoint her son Stephen Sampson to that trust"

[39:8] On 8 May, 1805, Stephen Sampson of Duxbury, mariner, was appointed administrator of the estate of "Elijah Samp-

son late of said Duxbury yeoman deceased . . . . Intestate"

[From unrecorded bond] On 8 May, 1805, Stephen Sampson of Duxbury, mariner, as administrator, and William Lewis and Daniel Lewis, Jr., both of Marshfield, shipwrights, as sureties, gave a bond for \$1000.00. The witnesses were "Luy"\* Lothrop and Isaac Lothrop.

[From original warrant] On 8 May, 1805, "Messis Seth Sprague, Gentleman, William Freeman, Housewright & James Weston, yeoman all of Duxbury" were appointed appraisers.

[The warrant was also recorded, 40: 219.]

[From original inventory] The inventory was taken at Duxbury, 11 May, 1805, and sworn to, the same day, by the three appraisers. Stephen Sampson, the administrator, made oath to it, 14 May, 1805. No real estate was mentioned. [The inventory was also recorded, 40:219.]

[From original account] The account of "Stephen Samson", the administrator, was dated, at Plymouth, 31 March, 1806, and

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allowed the same day. William Lewis owed the estate \$10.00. Payments had been made to: Seth Sprague, Isaac Samson, Samuel Delano, William Freeman, Rufus Hathaway, Deborah Wadsworth, Cyrus Brewster, Edward Winslow, Bildad Washburn, John Patten, Wait Wadsworth, Lot Hunt, Stephen Sampson, David Cushman, John Young, Lemuel Harlow, Bradford Samson, Jesse Howard, Thomas Winsor, Sylvanus Sampson, Isaiah Alden, Peleg Weston, Benjamin Bosworth, Nathaniel Winsor, James Weston; "The widow's Board" \$45.00. [The account was also recorded, 40:410.]

### COL. JOHN THACHER'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

From the Yarmouth, Mass., records printed in the second volume of this magazine we learn that "Captaine Thatcher maryd to Lidya Goreham the first of Janury 83". After 2 April, 1705, the date of the birth of the last child, the eight children of "Col John Thacher" by his first wife, Rebecca Winslow, and the twelve children by his second wife, Lydia Gorham³ (Desire² Howland, John¹), were all recorded together, and the date of the second marriage was again entered, on the Yarmouth records, as shown by the literal transcripts in our thirteenth volume. In the latter entry the year of the second marriage is given as 1683.

The children by the second wife, Lydia Gorham, were: Lydia, Mary, Desire, Hannah, Mercy (died young), Judah, Mercy (second of the name, died young), Ann, Joseph, Benjamin, Mercy

(third of the name), Thomas.

Col. John Thacher died at Yarmouth, Mass., 8 May, 1713, and his widow, Lydia (Gorham) Thacher, died 2 August, 1744.

Both are buried in the Ancient Cemetery at Yarmouth.

We here print an exhaustive abstract of Col. Thacher's will, and of all records relating to the settlement of his estate, found in the Barnstable County, Mass., Probate Records.

[3:200] "An Inventory of the Estate of Colol John Thacher Deceased" was taken by John Goreham and Josiah Miller, on I July, 1713. The real estate was: "Meadow Given to his Son John Thacher with Comon share" £40; "To his son John Thacher his Right in Land att Plainfeild" £40; "To his son Peter Thacher Land & meadow" £1[\*]; "The farm Land and meadow housing & and shears of Comon to Judah Joseph Benjamin & Thomas" £710.

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## THE ESTATES OF JAMES LATHAM<sup>4</sup> AND HIS WIDOW DELIVERANCE

BY THE EDITOR

James Latham<sup>4</sup> (Susanna Winslow<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Chilton, James<sup>1</sup>) of Bridgewater, Mass., married Deliverance, daughter of Thomas Alger of that town, and died before 8 February, 1738/9, when his son, Joseph Latham<sup>5</sup>, was appointed administrator. The widow Deliverance (Alger) Latham died before I January, 1749\*, when her son, Joseph Latham<sup>5</sup>, was appointed administrator.

The final settlement of the estate of James Latham<sup>4</sup>, made after his widow's death, shows that he left five children, as follows: Thomas Latham<sup>5</sup>, Joseph Latham<sup>5</sup>, Anne Wade, Susanna Harden and Betty Johnson.

Thomas Latham<sup>5</sup> married Deborah Harden; Joseph Latham<sup>5</sup> married Sarah Hayward; Anne Latham<sup>5</sup> married Nicholas Wade; Susanna Latham<sup>5</sup> married Nathaniel Harden; Betty

Latham<sup>5</sup> married Daniel Johnson.

I have not been able to find any mention of a daughter Lucretia, named, as one of the children, in Mitchell's History of

Bridgewater.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of all records, and unrecorded documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement of the estates of James Latham<sup>4</sup> and his widow Deliverance (Alger) Latham.

### [JAMES LATHAM'S ESTATE]

[8:4] On 6 February, 1738, "Joseph Latham of Bridgwater . . . . yeoman" was appointed administrator on the estate of "James Latham Late of Bridgwater . . . . yeoman Deceas<sup>d</sup>"

[From unrecorded bond] On 6 February, 1738, "Joseph Latham yeoman" of Bridgewater, "who is appointed adm<sup>r</sup> on the Estate of his Father James Latham", with Ebenezer Byram and Joseph Byram, Gentlemen, both of Bridgewater, as sureties, gave a bond for £1000. The witnesses were "Peter Collamer" and "Steven Vinall".

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[8:74] On 8 February, 1738/9, Ebenezer Byram, Joseph Byram and Thomas Whitman took an inventory, at Bridgewater, of the real and personal estate of "Mr James Latham Late of Bridgwater" "and of all he Did Settle upon his Children in his Life time". Among the items are: "Due upon Bond from Thomas Latham Dated May 17th 1726" £12, 12s.; "Due upon a Note from Ebenez' Shaw Dated Nov' 10th 1738" £4, 9s.; "Item To Daniel Johnsons wife fifty Pounds in Cash". The real estate was: "Two acres of Land laid out to Nicholas Wade upon Lathams Purchase Right" £2, 10s.; "To 3 acres of Land Laid out to Colo Holman advanced by the Estate in his Life time" £3, 15s.; "To 2 acres of Land Granted & not yet Laid out" £3, 2s., 6d.; "Twenty acres of Land on the Back Side of Snells Meadow" £22, 10s.

"Meddo Land upon Setucket River to his Son Joseph Latham by Deed" £150.

"a Tract of Land by Deed to Nicholas Wade by Setucket Pond"

On 2 April, 1739, certain necessaries were "Sett of to ye widdow Deliverance Latham out of the Inventory", amounting to £37, 3s.

[10:351] On 6 October, 1746, Joseph Latham, the administrator, presented an account, which was approved. Payments had been made to: Nicholas Wade; Charles Latham; Nathaniel Hardin; Robert Latham; David Hatch; Doctor Peterson; Benja-

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min Hayward; Joseph Latham; Betty Hardin; Capt. Croade; "Cash Priz'd in the Inventory to Daniel Johnsons wife by Mistake" £50.

[11:414] On 3 September, 1750, "the Estate of James Latham" was settled by the Judge of Probate, "as follows—It appearing by the Inventory . . . . that Thomas Latham and Joseph Latham sons of ye sd Decd have had advanc'd to them by Deed of Gift from the sd James in his life time their full proportion of his Estate Therefore I do hereby Order what remains of said Estate upon the Admrs acco being 51.0.4d old tenour bills Equally to be divided To Ann Wade Susanna Harden & Betty John\* which amounts to £17.0.1\frac{1}{3} in old tennour apeice"

On 3 September, 1750, Nicholas Wade and Ann Wade receipted to Joseph Latham for £2, 6s., 8d., "Lawfull money and is in full of our part and portion of the personal Estate of our Father James Latham . . . . deceasd". Ann signed by a mark. The witnesses were John Cushing and Edward Winslow.

### [WIDOW DELIVERANCE LATHAM'S ESTATE]

[11:310] On I January, 1749, "Joseph Latham of Bridgwater... yeoman" was appointed administrator on the estate of "your Mother Deliverance Latham late of s<sup>d</sup> Bridgwater widdow Dec<sup>d</sup>"

[From unrecorded bond] On I January, 1749, Joseph Latham, as administrator, with Thomas Whitman, gentleman, and Edward Mitchell, gentleman, both of Bridgewater, as sureties, gave a bond for £300. The witnesses were Samuel Skiffe and Edward Winslow.

[12:371] On 18 January, 1749, an inventory of the estate of "Deliverance Latham Late of Bridgwater" was taken by Thomas Whitman, Seth Allen and Edward Mitchell. It was sworn to, on that date, by Allen and Mitchell and by Joseph Latham, the administrator. No real estate is mentioned.

[12:391] On I April, 1751, Josiah Edson, Esq., and Capt. Thomas Whitman, both of Bridgewater, were appointed to examine and report on the claims of the creditors "of Deliverance Latham Late of Bridgewater Widdow Deceasd".

On 30 April, 1751, the commissioners reported. Among the items were: "due to Nathanel Harden £57.5. of Which Sum" £26, 10s., "Was for Charges in Said Deliverance Lathams last

Sickness and funerail"; "Due to Nicholas Wade 37.15\*"; "Due to Joseph Latham adm<sup>r</sup> Charge and Trouble in the Last Sickness 26.11\*";

On 7 October, 1751, the account of Joseph Latham, the administrator, was allowed, and he was ordered to pay the creditors at the rate of six shillings, six pence, on the pound.

## MEMORIALS TO THE MAYFLOWER DEAD AT PROVINCETOWN AND BOSTON

THE Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, as its distinctive contribution to the Pilgrim Tercentenary Celebration, proposes to erect, at Provincetown and Boston, appropriate memorials to the five Mayflower Passengers (including one Signer of The Mayflower Compact) who died at these two places, and asks for cash gifts to cover the necessary expense.

### FOUR DEATHS AT CAPE COD HARBOR

Four Passengers died while The Mayflower lay at anchor in Cape Cod Harbor, now Provincetown (the dates are in New Style):

Edward Thomson, a servant of William White, died Monday,

14 December, 1620.

Jasper More, "a child yt was put to" Governor John Carver, died Wednesday, 16 December, 1620.

Dorothy (May) Bradford, first wife of Governor William Bradford, was accidentally drowned, Thursday, 17 December, 1620.

James Chilton, a Signer of The Mayflower Compact (the only Signer to die on Cape Cod), died Friday, 18 December, 1620.

### ONE DEATH AT BOSTON

One Passenger died at Boston:

Mary Chilton, daughter of James Chilton, came in The May-flower with her parents. She later married John Winslow, and before 1660 they removed to Boston, where John Winslow died, in 1674, and Mary (Chilton) Winslow died, late in 1678, or early in 1679.

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### THE PROPOSED MEMORIAL AT PROVINCETOWN

The fact that one Signer of The Compact, and three other Mayflower Passengers, died at Cape Cod Harbor, before The Mayflower, with the surviving ninety-nine (99) Passengers, set sail from that place for the permanent settlement at Plymouth, has not been appropriately commemorated, either at Provincetown, or elsewhere.

The Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, therefore, proposes to erect at Provincetown, in memory of the four Passengers who died there, an imposing bowlder, bearing a large bronze tablet, suitably inscribed.

### THE PROPOSED MEMORIAL IN BOSTON

.Mary (Chilton) Winslow is claimed to have been the first female Mayflower Passenger to land at Plymouth.

She certainly was the only Mayflower Passenger to become a resident of Boston, and was the only one who died in Boston.

Mary (Chilton) Winslow, as a Mayflower Passenger, came to America before any other white woman who ever resided or died in Boston, and this fact also should be commemorated.

The Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, therefore, proposes to place a handsome bronze tablet, appropriately inscribed, on the building now occupying the site of the last home of John and Mary (Chilton) Winslow, in Spring Lane, Boston.

### CASH CONTRIBUTIONS REQUESTED

Cash contributions to the amount of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00) are asked for, as the expense of transporting a suitable bowlder to Provincetown will be large.

This amount will cover the cost of the Provincetown tablet

and bowlder, and of the tablet in Boston.

As these two proposed Memorials to the Mayflower Dead at Provincetown and Boston will be the distinctive contribution of the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, in connection with the Pilgrim Tercentenary Celebration, liberal and prompt gifts are urged, so these memorials may be erected before the Society's Twenty-fifth Anniversary, on 28 March, 1921.

towards the erection of both memorials.

### A NORMAN FAMILY RECORD

The printed "Family Record" of the Norman family here reprinted was presented to the Massachusetts Society of Mayflower Descendants, by Miss Maud Elizabeth Weaver and Miss Helen Melville Weaver, through their aunt, Miss Sarah Cozzens Weaver, of Newport, R. I. The donors are granddaughters of the Elizabeth Waldron Norman whose birth and marriage are given in the record.

This "Family Record" was printed at Newport, R. I., in April, 1855, by Stephen Henry Norman, who was born 30 August, 1825. It is on the first two pages of a four page folio of old blue paper, the pages being about seven and three-fourths

by ten inches.

The statement in this record that Gov. Bradford was born "in 1588" is undoubtedly an error, as he was baptized 19 March, 1589/90, and probably was born only a short time before that date. A reproduction of the baptismal record, with notes, will be found in our seventh volume.

In the present reprint of the Norman record, the notes on each family are given after that family, just as they were arranged by Stephen Henry Norman. Each asterisk, therefore, refers to a note immediately following, not to a note at the bottom of the page, as is the custom at the present time.

In the copy here presented, no attempt has been made to follow the original by printing some but not all of the names in capitals. The spelling and punctuation, however, are exactly

reproduced.

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## ROBERT WATERMAN'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

ROBERT WATERMAN of Plymouth, Plympton and Halifax, Mass., married, 19 March, 1702, Mary Cushman<sup>4</sup> (Isaac<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>2</sup> Allerton, Isaac<sup>1</sup>), who died 13 March, 1722/3, and was buried at Plympton. He married, second, Abigail ——, who died at Halifax, Mass., 28 November, 1771.

Robert and Mary (Cushman) Waterman had eight children: Isaac, Josiah, Thomas, Rebecca, Robert, Mary, Samuel, Anna. All were recorded at Plympton and also at Halifax. The first

two had also been recorded at Plymouth.

Robert and Abigail (----) Waterman had one child, Abigail,

recorded at Halifax, who lived less than six weeks.

"Robert Waterman of Hallifax" made his will I February, 1744, added a codicil 12 January, 1749, and died 16 January, 1749/50. The will, probated 14 February, 1749/50, mentions the second wife, Abigail, and all the children by the first wife, except the daughter Anna.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records, relating to the settlement of the estate, found on the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records. No original documents are now in the

files.

The codicil was made on 12 January, 1749, and witnessed by John Cotton, John Waterman and Mary Fuller, Jr., Mary

signing by a mark.

On 14 February, 1749, the witnesses made oath as follows: John Cotton and Mary Fuller, Jr., to both will and codicil; Jonathan Sears to the will only; John Waterman to the codicil only. On the same day the will and codicil were probated, and administration granted to the sons Robert Waterman and Samuel Waterman.

[12:62] On 13\* February, 1749, Robert Waterman and Samuel Waterman, as executors, with John Waterman and Micah Leach, as sureties, all yeomen of Halifax, gave a bond for £1000. The witnesses were Jonathan Seares and Joseph Bozworth.

# THE ESTATES OF PETER TOMSON<sup>3</sup> AND HIS SON JAMES

BY THE EDITOR

PETER TOMSON<sup>8</sup> of Plymouth and Plympton, Mass., son of Lieutenant John Tomson and his wife Mary<sup>2</sup> Cook (Francis<sup>1</sup>), married Sarah —, about 1699, and they had four children, recorded at Plymouth.\* These children were: Sarah Tomson4, who married Nehemiah Bosworth (David, Hannah Howland, John1); Peter Tomson4; James Tomson4, who died unmarried: Joseph Tomson4.

The date of the death of Peter Tomson<sup>3</sup> has not been found, but he died before 29 April, 1731, when his son James was appointed administrator. The widow Sarah died 24 October, 1742, at Halifax, Mass., in her seventy-third year, according to

her gravestone.

The "Genealogy of Descendants of John Thomson",† as shown in the article on the will of John Tomson<sup>3</sup>, of Middleborough, Mass., printed in our twentieth volume, is very inaccurate, and it incorrectly states that Peter Tomson, son of Lieut. John and Mary<sup>2</sup> (Cooke) Tomson, married Rebecca Sturtevant, and that "Hannah", a daughter of this Peter, married Nehemiah Bosworth. The book also confuses Peter Tomson, son of Lieut. John Tomson, with the lieutenant's grandson, Peter Tomson, son of John and Mary (Tinkham) Tomson, and incorrectly states that "A will by Peter mentions a wife Sarah, and children: Sarah, Peter, James and Joseph". There is no such will, but this wife and these children are all mentioned in the settlement of the intestate estate of Peter Tomson<sup>3</sup> (Mary<sup>2</sup> Cooke, Francis<sup>1</sup>), here printed.

Exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the estate of Peter Tomson<sup>3</sup>, are here presented.

We print also exhaustive abstracts of all records, and original documents on file, relating to the settlement of the intestate estate of James Tomson4 (Peter3, Mary2 Cooke, Francis1), who died unmarried.

Some of these deeds had not been recorded. Others which had been recorded were not re-recorded after the fire, in 1827, which destroyed most of the records in the Barnstable County, Mass., Registry of Deeds.

The deed was signed by a mark, and was witnessed by Isaac Sparrow and Hannah Sparrow. It was acknowledged, 16 December, 1783, before Elijah Knowles, Justice of the Peace, and was recorded, 5 April, 1785, in Barnstable County Deeds, 40:6.

It was not re-recorded, after the fire.

#### [Daniel Cole's Estate to Richard Sparrow]

On 15 November, 1783, "Jonathan Linnel of Eastham . . . . Yeoman, Administrator to Daniel Cole, late of Eastham, Aforesd, Yeoman, Deceas'd", sold to "Richard Sparrow, of Eastham, Aboves'd, Joyner", for £13, 13s., "a Piece of Clear'd Land Lying in s'd Eastham at a Place Called Stage Neck Adjoining S'd Sparrow's Land; also a piece of Mud-Swamp in S'd Eastham Adjoining Isaac Sparrow's land, Each being Part of the Estate of the s'd Daniel Cole Deceased, and are sold by order of Court to Pay s'd Decaseds Debts; and Bounded as follows . . . . Beginning at S'd Sparrows South-west Corner Bound in the Range of John Doane Jur's land, Running Westerly in s'd Doane's Range about eleven Pole to a stake in s'd Doane's other Range. thence Northerly in S'd Range about fifty Six Pole to the Edge of the Bank, thence Easterly by the Bank eleven Pole and ten feet to s'd Sparrow's North-West Corner Bound, thence Southerly, in S'd Sparrows Range fifty five Pole to the first Specified Bound;—the mud Swamp is Bounded, Begining at the Northwest Corner Bound of a piece of Swamp set off to Heman Coles heirs Running Westerly in Isaac Sparrow's Range three Pole to a heap of stones in sd range, thence Southerly sixteen Pole to a heap of stones in the Edge of the Swamp, thence Easterly three Pole to a heap of stones in the Swamp Being the Southwest Corner Bound of s'd Coles heirs, thence Northerly Sixteen Pole to the first Specified Bound; with a way out Southerly by bars ten feet wide by Joseph Cole Jur's Range to the high Way"

The witnesses were Joseph Cole and Isaac Sparrow.

Jonathan Linnel acknowledged the deed, 18 November, 1783, before Solomon Freeman, Justice of the Peace, and it was recorded, 5 April, 1785, in Barnstable County Deeds, 40:6. It was not re-recorded, after the fire.

#### THE BREWSTER IMPRINT IN DUTCH

By George Ernest Bowman

In the May, 1917, issue of "Pilgrim Notes and Queries", I reprinted, from the "American Bibliopolist" for "April & May", 1870, an account of a book in Dutch, printed by Elder William Brewster, which had been bought at auction "for the inconsiderable sum of twenty-five cents". The account was signed by initials, and I have been unable to identify the fortunate purchaser of this book, although I have made many inquiries, as I wished to photograph the title-page, for reproduction in a book on Brewster Imprints and Brewster Autographs, which I am preparing.

I was, therefore, much surprised and pleased to find a copy of this book in the library of the late Hon. J. Hammond Trumbull, of Hartford, Conn., which I recently examined, through the courtesy of his daughter, Miss Annie Eliot Trumbull, of Hartford, who had given me permission to photograph the title-pages of

any Brewster Imprints in the collection.

The Trumbull copy of this book is in the original vellum covers, and is in unusually fine condition.

The title-page is shown in the accompanying illustration, and

a brief abstract of the title follows:

"Een Klare Ende Duydelicke uytlegginghe Over De Thien Gheboden Des Heeren . . . . Door . . . . Mr. Johan Dod, ende Robert Cleaver . . . . Tot Leyden, Voor Guiliaem Brewster, Boeckdrucker. Anno 1617."

The Trumbull copy is the only one I have been able to locate, and information about any other copy or copies will be gratefully

As the only known copy of the third lacks the title-page and has no ornaments in the part remaining, which begins with page 17, I hesitate to accept it as a Brewster imprint.

EZEKIEL HATCH<sup>3</sup> (Mary<sup>2</sup> Doty, Edward<sup>1</sup>) was born at Scituate, Mass., 14 May, 1695, and was there married, 25 September, 1718, to Ruth Church<sup>5</sup> (Richard<sup>4</sup>, Nathaniel<sup>3</sup>, Elizabeth<sup>2</sup> Warren, Richard<sup>1</sup>), who was born at Scituate, 8 December, 1701. They had six children, Ruth, Mary, Hannah, Isaiah, Lucy, Sarah, all recorded at Rochester, Mass.

Ezekiel Hatch<sup>3</sup> made his will 19 June, 1765, and the inventory was taken 1 July, 1768. The will was probated 14 July, 1768.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of the will and all records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records. There are no original papers remaining in the files.

#### [Ezekiel Hatch's Will]

[20: 103] "Ezekiel Hatch of Rochester . . . . yeoman" made his will 19 June, 1765. Bequests were as follows:

"Isaiah my only son" was appointed sole executor.

To "my beloved wife all my moveable estate within doors, and half my moveables without doors; also I give her the old part of my dwelling house for her & her daughters use so long as she shall live my widdow and either of her daughters live single or unmarried, and I give to my wife one third part of the use of all my real estate during her widdowhood, & my son to find her fire wood at the door, cut fit for the fire."

To "my son Isaiah all my real estate consisting of housing & lands in Rochester & elsewhere, & the other half of the moveables not given to my wife . . . . he allowing to his mother as above expressed, and paying my debts, & paying out to his sisters as followeth . . . . four pounds to his sister Ruth Hathaway, be-

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sides what she hath already had, and that to be her part of my estate, and the same to be paid her or her heirs within two years after my decease. Also to his sister Mary my daughter, four pounds besides what she hath already had, and that within two years after my decease . . . . and two pounds to his sister Hannah, my daughter, and to Lucy, six pounds, and to Sarah six pounds, besides what they have already had, and that within two years after my decease."

The witnesses were Charles Sturtevant, Stephen Perry, Rich-

ard Church, Jr., and Benjamin Hatch.

The will was probated 14 July, 1768, on the oaths of Charles Sturtevant and Benjamin Hatch, and administration granted to

Isaiah Hatch, the executor named in the will.

[20: 104] "An Inventory of the estate that mr Ezekiel Hatch late of Rochester deced died seized of as shown to us . . . by mr Isaiah Hatch executor" was taken I July, 1768, by Seth Dexter, Joel Ellis and "William Sherman 2d". THOMAS JENKINS of Barnstable, Mass., married, first, 24 August, 1687, Experience Hamlin, by whom he had eight children.\* He married, second, between 18 December, 1712, and 22 December, 1715, Mercy (Winslow) White, widow of Malatiah<sup>4</sup> White (Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Resolved<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>), of Rochester, Mass. No children by the second marriage are mentioned in the will, made 9 March, 1737, and probated 25 February, 1745.

Ebenezer Jenkins, the oldest son, married, for his first wife, his step-sister, Judith<sup>5</sup> White (Malatiah<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Resolved<sup>2</sup>,

William<sup>1</sup>).

Mercy Jenkins, the third daughter, married John<sup>5</sup> White (John<sup>4</sup>, Samuel<sup>3</sup>, Resolved<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>), and Hope Jenkins, the fourth daughter, married Thomas<sup>5</sup> White, brother of John<sup>5</sup> White.

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Josiah Jenkins, of Barnstable, the third son, married Mercy Ellis, in 1738, but apparently had no children, as his will gives all his estate to his widow, to his brothers and sisters, and to three cousins, as nephews were then called.

no original papers in the files.

#### [THE WILL OF THOMAS JENKINS]

[8:114] On 9 March, 1737, Thomas Jenkins of Barnstable made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "my Son Samuell my Land at Skonkenet which he now Improves bounded from Dexters Lot as the River runs Norwest

till it Comes to Nathaniel Crockers Lot."

To "my Son Josiah the rest of my homestead With my houses and Barn (reserving Liberty for Ebenezer to put Six Creatures in the Barn so long as his house stands where it doth and hay for them & also to Lay his Corn) and I Give him viz Josiah half my fresh meadow & Liberty of a way to it."

"my son Josiah Shall have One half of my Wood lott & the Other half to be divided Equally between Ebenezer & Samuell."

"my Will is that my Other Land at Skonkenet viz the Last Division be Equally divided between Ebenezer and Josiah."

To "my Grandson Thomas son of Ebenezer my Other half Lott at Skonkenet if he Lives to Come of age and if not I Give it to my Son Samuel"

"My Will is that my Salt meadow be Equally divided between my three Sons Ebenezer Samuell & Josiah & also my Right at Sandy Neck." 

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To "my son Josiah the bed he lyes upon and bedding belonging to it . . . . also all my husbandry tools & Utensells Excepting a Ring Yoak and a Chain Which I Give to Ebenezer."

"I Give my farming tools to Ebenezer and Josiah Equally."

To "my Daughter Thankful" £10. To "my Daughter Mercy" £10. To "my Daughter Hope" £10.

To "my Daughters Experience & Sarah Each of them" £20.

To "my Son Josiah all my Quick stock and all the Rest of my personal Estate he paying my Debts and the Legacies above mentioned only Reserving to my Wife the Improvement of my Negro woman so Long as she Dwels where she now doth"

"my Loving Wife Mercy & two sons Ebenezer & Samuell To

be Joynt Executors"

The will was signed by a mark. The witnesses were Jonathan

Russell, Joseph Jenkins, Jr., and Lewis Hamblin.

[8:115] The will was probated 25 February, 1745, all three witnesses being present, and administration was granted to

"Samuell Jenkins one of the Executors".

On the same date David Crocker, Esq., Benjamin Mastin and Joseph Blish, Jr., all of Barnstable, were appointed appraisers, and were sworn. They took the inventory, 27 February, 1745. "His Negro Woman with her beding" were valued at £100; "his buildings" £404; "his Lands" £2212; "part of a stable near ye Meeting house" was not valued. The inventory was sworn to by the executor, 14 June, 1746.

[8:401] On 6 March, 1749, Samuel Jenkins, executor, presented an account, which was approved by the court. Among the items are: "Receiv<sup>d</sup> of Josiah Jenkins ye Residuary Leagatee To pay the Debts and Leagacies with" £166, 12s., 6d.; "Due to the heirs of Experience a Legatee" £6, 13s., 4d. No other persons

are named.

#### [THE WILL OF JOSIAH JENKINS]

[8: 361] On 29 December, 1749, "Josiah Jenkins of Barnstable.... Yeoman" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "wife Mary in Lew of hir Dower While She Remains my Widdow Sufficiency of fire wood Cut at ye Door keeping for two Cows Winter and Summer and for a horse if She Sees Cause to keep one and priveledge for two Swine in the Sumer to go in pasture and the profit of ten Sheep to be kept as Usual and the produce of three acres and half of land Tilled half for Indian and half for Inglish Corn and flax the half for Indian Corn to be Cribed

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the English Winnowed the flax in Sheef fit for Breaking and also I give hir the tirm afors<sup>d</sup> the use and Improvement of my Dwelling house Said [p. 362] Said Articles to be performed by my two Bretheren Ebenezer and Samuell their heirs &c Equal and they to Improve all my Real Estate Except my house and in Case they Improve in Tillage more than Seven Acres in a Year My Said wife Shall have half the produce of what is more than Seven Acres and in Case my Said wife Shall Marry She Shall have thirds of all my Real Estate to improve hir life time and the aforsd performances Shall Cease and Determine further I give and bequeath to my Said wife at hir own Dispose my Negro Woman Peg my Dark Red Cow biggest White back Cow my Stores of Corn Meat and Other Eatables my flax and wool and Indoars household Stuf and Moveables Excepting what is given by these presents in particular and Utensill my Looms and Weaveing Tackling & horse Tackling with Liberty of the Shop to weave in while She Remains a Widdow Saveing Some Household Stuf hereafter given My Sister Sarah Nye and my wearing Appearell and also I give my Said wife two Swine"

"I Give....all and Singular my Real Estate to my two bretherin Eb<sup>r</sup> Jenkin and Sam<sup>II</sup> Jenkins (Equaly to be Devided) .... they paying my Debts funeral Charges ten pounds to my Sister Thankfil Taylor and provideing the Articles above for my wife During hir Widdowhood Saveing as above thirds for

her Life time in Case She Marry."

"I Give my Said two brothers Equally my Out Doors Utensills and Tackling and live Stock Not Otherways Disposed by these presents as also my Moneys and Credits"

To "my Sister Thankfull Taylor 10th old Tenor to be paid as

above in Six Months after my Decease"

To "my Sister mercy white my black Cow and light Colloured Heifer"

To "my Sister Hope White my white back heifer & biggest Yearling heifer"

To "my Sister Sarah Nye Six black Chairs a great Chair

table & Cupboard"

"I Give my plate buttond Coat to my brother Ebenezer"

"I Give my Light Colloured blue Coat to my brother Samuell Jenkins"

"I Give my Great Coat to my Cousen Ebenezer"

"I Give my hat and Everyday Coat and Jacket to my Coz<sup>n</sup> Nathan Jenkins"

"I Give my Armory and Ammenition to my Coz<sup>n</sup> Nath<sup>II</sup> Jenkins"

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"I Constitute my aforsd two brothers Executors".

The will was signed by a mark, and witnessed by David Crocker, Esq., Charles Conant and Meriah Ellis. It was probated 6 February, 1749,\* on the testimony of the three witnesses.

#### THE WILL OF ELEAZER RING<sup>3</sup>

ELEAZER RING<sup>3</sup> (Deborah<sup>2</sup> Hopkins, Stephen<sup>1</sup>), of Plymouth and Kingston, Mass., married Mary, daughter of Jonathan Shaw of Plymouth, and they had twelve children, as follows: Eleazer (died young), Andrew (died young), Phebe, Samuel, Andrew (second of the name), Deborah, Mary, Jonathan, Susanna, Elkanah, Lydia, Elizabeth. Mary (Shaw) Ring died, at Kingston, 28 November, 1730.

Eleazer Ring<sup>3</sup> made his will 5 June, 1738, and died, at Kingston, 21 November, 1749. The will mentions nine living children,

and a child of a deceased daughter.

The record of the will contains a serious error, but, unfortunately, no original papers relating to this case remain in the files. The name of the daughter Elizabeth was recorded as Elizabeth "Chaggon", but above the surname a cross was made, apparently in the same ink as the record. This mark I have found a number of times, in different records at Plymouth, and in each case it seems to indicate that the recorder was doubtful of the reading in the original document. This interpretation of the mark has been verified, in many cases, by comparison of the record with the original document, preserved in the probate files.

In the present case there is ample evidence to prove that the name should read "Claggon" or "Claghorn", as both the Kingston town records and the Plymouth County records give the marriage of James Claghorn to Elizabeth Ring, at Kingston, on 26 June, 1736. Two children, Elizabeth and James, were also

recorded at Kingston.

REV. JOHN AVERY of Truro, Mass., married, first, Ruth Little<sup>4</sup> (*Ephraim*<sup>3</sup>, *Anna*<sup>2</sup> *Warren*, *Richard*<sup>1</sup>), by whom he had ten children, all recorded at Truro. All but two of these children were mentioned in their father's will.

Ruth (Little) Avery died at Truro, I October, 1730, and her husband married, second, Ruth Knowles<sup>5</sup> (Mercy Freeman<sup>4</sup>, Mercy Prence<sup>3</sup>, Patience<sup>2</sup> Brewster, William<sup>1</sup>), who died I November, 1745, without issue.

Mr. Avery married, third, widow Mary Rotch of Boston, who survived him. There were no children by this marriage.

Rev. John Avery made his will 18 January, 1754\*, and it was

probated, 1 May, 1754.

We here present exhaustive abstracts of the will, and of all records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Barnstable County, Mass., Probate Records. There are no original papers in the files.

To "Daughter mary West" £40 "which she hath already

received and" £6, 13s., 4d. "out of my personal Estate"

To "Daughter Abigail Lothrop" £40 "which she hath alread

received and" £6, 13s., 4d. "out of my personal Estate"

"all the remainder of my Personal Estate . . . . to my Children abovenamed to be divided into nine shares and my Will is that my Son John Avery have two shares and that the Children of my Daughter Ruth Parker (deceased) have one share in unequal partnership among them namely that my grandson Jonathan Parker (who has an Impediment in his sight) Receive one half of said share and that my other two grandchildren namely Ruth Bishop and Avery Parker receive the other half share equally between them and my other six shares to my other Children above named in equal Division"

The witnesses were Samuel Eldredge, Moses Paine, Barzillah Smith and Nathaniel Breed.

[9:91] On 1 May, 1754, the will was probated, on the oaths of Moses Paine and Samuel Eldredge, and administration granted

to John Avery and Job Avery, the executors named in the will. Nathaniel Breed, another of the witnesses, made oath to the will on 7 May, 1754.

inventory, 7 May, 1754.

[9:503] The account of Job Avery, one of the executors, was presented and allowed, 27 July, 1756. Payments had been made for "Getting Goods on bord ye Vessell for Boston" 6s., 8d.; "frieght of horse to Boston" 5s., 7d.; to Joshua Atkens, Dr. Breed, "Coll" Bourn, "D Gorham".

#### LIEUT. JABEZ SNOW'S ESTATE

BY THE EDITOR

LIEUT. JABEZ SNOW<sup>3</sup> (Constance<sup>2</sup> Hopkins, Stephen<sup>1</sup>) of Eastham died 27 December, 1690, leaving nine children and a widow, Elizabeth, who later married William Merrick of Eastham.

Lieut. Jabez Snow's inventory\* was taken, 20 April, 1691, and the estate was settled 8 April, 1695. We here present exhaustive abstracts of all records found in the Barnstable County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to this estate. There are no original papers in the files.

#### [LIEUT. JABEZ SNOW'S INVENTORY]

[Barnstable Co. Prob. Rcds., 1:39] "an Apprisement of ye Estate which Liut Jabez Snow Left at his decease" was made, 20 April, 1691, by Daniel Cole, Samuel Smith and William Walker, and sworn to, 22 April, 1691, by "Elizabeth ye Relict of Liut Jabez Snow", before John Thacher, Assistant. Among the items are: "housing upland and meaddow Land" £100;

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"Child bed Linin and blankits for Children" £6; "half a vessel Called a sloop" £13; "Liut Snow for going a warefare to Cannada" £21, 18s.; "one whale boat" £2; "part of a sloope going to plimouth" 5s.; "ye sixt part of a whale boat and ye Rune of it" £2; "ye Lieutennant his Armes" £1, 12s.

Debts were due to the estate from "the wife of John Hord", Daniel Attwood, Stephen Attwood, Joseph Merick, Elisha Mayo, "Good wife Browne", Josiah Cooke, James Claghorne, William Walker, Jr.; also "for one Cutless Lost at Cannada as it was

prised at Eastham" 16s.

The total amount of the inventory was £322, 19s., 4d. It was

recorded, 30 April, 1691.

[p. 113] The estate of "Jabez Snow of Eastham . . . . deceased Some time Since is Setled as followeth: by Reason of ye Chang of Government and other causes ye Settlement of Said Estate was defered untill this time: and ye Administratrix [g]ives a Satisfactory account that from ye time ye Invintory was Taken to this time [t]here is Lost out of ye Estate by a great murrain amongst ye cattel by Debts paid [a]nd Extraordinary Rates by Loss in ye price of ye Land now prised on oath [e]xpended on ye daughters in Cloaths and victuels all amounting to about 90 pound that being taken out or deducted and ye widows thirds there Remaines 162 pound to be divided amongst Sd deceased Jabez Snows o Children his Eldest Son [J]abez Snow to have a doubble part that is thirty Eight pounds Eight Shillings his [S]on Edward Snow to have nineteen pound four Shillings his Son Thomas Snow to have nineteen pounds four Shillings his Six Daughters fourteen pounds four Shillings each of them"

"ye Land of ye Sd deceased Snow setled upon his thre Sons: his Eldest Son Jabez Snow to have . . . . his Fathers Dwelling house and Barne and ye home Lott containing about Seven Acres of upland and one acre of meadow with ye orchard and two thirds of three acres of meadow at ye Great meadow and one third of four acres of meadow at Litel Billinsgate all at forty five pounds Six Shillings and Eight pence and he to pay . . . . to ye Administratrix or her assignes when Called for So much as his housing and Land Coms to more then his part of ye Estate"

"Edward Snow ye Second Son to have . . . Eight acres of upland one acre and one half of meadow at ye Bass pond one acre and a half of meadow with a Small Island at Silver Spring and ten acres of upland and one third of four acres of meadow at Little Billinsgate: all at two and twenty pound ten Shillings: he paying . . . . to ye Administratrix or to her assignes when

 Called for So much as his Land Comes to more then his part of the Estate:"

"Thomas Snow ye third Son to have.... Six acres of upland at ye hering pond and one third of three acres of meadow at ye great meadow and ten acres of upland and one third of four acres of meadow att Little Billinsgate: All att fifteen pounds thirteen Shillings and fouer pence: the Remaining part of his portion as above to be paid him by ye Administratrix"

"This Estate Setled as above Said by Barnabas Lothrop

Judg of ye probat . . . . ye 8th of April 1695"

#### UNRECORDED BARNSTABLE COUNTY DEEDS

THE first three abstracts printed in this issue were made, in April, 1909, from original deeds in the possession of Mr. Oliver Doane, of East Orleans, Mass., and the others were made, in January, 1910, from original deeds owned by Mrs. Doane.

Some of these deeds had not been recorded; others were recorded, but had not been re-recorded after the fire which destroyed most of the records in the Barnstable County, Mass.,

Registry of Deeds, in 1827.

#### [SETH KNOWLES, JR., TO TIMOTHY DOANE]

On 25 February, 1788, "Seth Knowles of Eastham . . . . yeoman", for £14, 8s., sold to "Timothy Doane of Eastham . . . . yeaoman . . . . all my Rite that I owne in a peace of Land Lying in Eastham at a place Called Stage Neck which I owne in parternarship with said Timothy Doane amos Knowles and William Knowles"

The deed was signed "Seth Knowles Jr" and witnessed by "Benjamine Doane" and "Isaac Myrick". It was not acknowledged.

#### [FREEMAN HIGGINS TO TIMOTHY DOANE]

On I April, 1790, "Freeman Higgins of Eastham . . . . yeoman", for £5, 8s., sold to "Timothy Doane of Eastham . . . . yeo-

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man . . . . a peace of Land in Eastham Lying to the Eastward of the way that leads from Joseph Coles to stage mill against Slush-Bush and is Bounded on the Westerly Eand by the above said way on the southerly side by John Doanes Land on the Easterly Eand by the Bank on the Northerly side by Timothy Doanes Land"

The witnesses were Isaac Sparrow and Rebecca Smith, the latter signing by a mark.

The deed was acknowledged I April, 1790, before Isaac Sparrow, Justice of the Peace. It was not recorded.

#### [MARTHA COLE TO BERIAH DOANE]

On 25 November, 1807, "Martha Cole of Orleans . . . . Spinster", for \$88.13, sold to "Beriah Doane of Orleans . . . . yeoman . . . . a Lot of Land Lying in orleans near Timothy Doanes Dwelling House that was formerly Isaac Coles and is Bounded as follows viz: on the westerly side of said Land by Timothy Doanes Mud swamp and on the easterly side by the said Timothy Land and also bounded on the two ends by the said Timothy Doanes Land—Containing six acres be it more or less—said Lands was formerly owned by Daniel Cole of Eastham and is all the Land that the said Martha Cole possesseth in that part of the Town of Orleans"

The deed was signed by a mark, and witnessed by Benoni Baker and Timothy Doane. It was not acknowledged.

#### [JOHN AND RACHEL CROSBY TO ELKANAH SNOW]

On 29 December, 1805, "we John Crosby Jun and My wife Rachal Crosby of Bruster . . . . Yeoman", for \$160.00, sold to "Elkanah Snow of orleans . . . Carpenter . . . . our Dwelling house and the Land agoining the house which Said Land is know Inclosed being two acres be it More or less Bounded as follows begining at the South Est coner bound at grasnook So Caled runing westerly In hopkinses range to the Southwest Bound thenc runing northerly In Joshua goulds rang to the Pond caled Clift Pond thenc Southerly by the Said nook to the first Spesifide Bound"

The deed was signed by "John Crosby Jr" and "Rachal Crosby" and witnessed by John Sparrow and Timothy Bascom. It was acknowledged, 30 December, 1805, by John Crosby, Jr., only, and was recorded, 7 January, 1806, in Barnstable County Deeds, Book 62, folio 40. It was not re-recorded, after the fire.

#### [KEZIAH HARDING TO LEWIS DOANE]

On 23 August, 1813, "Keziah Harding of Boston in the County of Suffolk Gentlewoman", for \$25.00, sold to "Lewis Doane of Orleans . . . . Yeoman . . . all my part of a certain tract of land lying in Orleans . . . . containing about thirteen acres which part is about two acres and bounded as follows viz. on the north by said Lewis Doane on the east by Joshua Cole & the heirs of Joshua Crosby on the south by the field called Riches field and on the west by Josiah Sparrow"

The deed was signed "Kezia Harding", and witnessed by Merrill Butler and Jonathan Bascom. It was acknowledged,

at Boston, 23 August, 1813, but was not recorded.

#### [JOSHUA COLE TO LEWIS DOANE]

On 15 June, 1813, "Joshua Cole of Orleans . . . . yeoman", for \$16.00, sold to "Lewis Doane of Orleans . . . . yeoman . . . . one pese of land lying in Orleans bounded as follows westerly by the shore & nothely easterly and southerly by a rig. Joining Timothy Doane's land S<sup>d</sup> piese of land Contains half of an acre be it more or less & I Susanna Cole the wife of Joshua Cole Quit my Right the above bargened decribed primises to have and to hold"

The deed was signed by Joshua Cole, only, and was witnessed by Joel Cole and Jonathan Crosby. It was not acknowledged.

#### THE WILL OF SAMUEL RING 4

BY THE EDITOR

Samuel Ring<sup>4</sup> (Eleazer<sup>3</sup>, Deborah<sup>2</sup> Hopkins, Stephen<sup>1</sup>), of Plymouth and Kingston, Mass., was born at Plymouth, 12 March, 1694, and died at Kingston, 8 May, 1768. He married, at Plympton, 28 May, 1724/5, Ruth (Silvester<sup>5</sup>) Cooke, the widow of Francis<sup>4</sup> Cooke (Francis<sup>3</sup>, Jacob<sup>2</sup>, Francis<sup>1</sup>).

Ruth (Silvester<sup>5</sup>) Cooke was the daughter of Israel Silvester and Ruth (Turner<sup>4</sup>) Prince, and the granddaughter of John

Turner and Mary<sup>3</sup> Brewster (Jonathan<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>).

Samuel and Ruth Ring had eleven children, all recorded at Kingston: George, Grace (died young), Grace (second of the name), Lydia, Mary, Samuel (died young), Elizabeth, Francis, Louisa (died young), Eliphaz, Eleazer (died young).

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The daughter Mary is not mentioned in her father's will, and no record of her marriage or death has been found. Apparently

she died young, or without issue.

We here print exhaustive abstracts of Samuel Ring's will and all records relating to the settlement of his estate, found on the Plymouth County, Mass., Probate Records. There are no original papers in the files.

#### [SAMUEL RING'S WILL]

[20:79] "Samuel Ring of Kingston" made his will 3 May,

1768. Bequests were as follows:

To "wife Ruth Ring the use & improvement of one half of my house, & out-houses & Lands, so long as she shall remain my widdow. also... one half of my personal estate free, & clear"

To "my son George Ring . . . . twenty shillings in furnace

ware, together with what I have heretofore given him"

To "my three daughters namely Grace Bradford, the wife of Samuel Bradford, Lidia Ripley the wife of William Ripley Jr Elizabeth Hunt, the wife of Samuel Hunt the other half of my

personal estate equally to be divided between 'em."

To "my sons Francis Ring & Eliphaz Ring . . . . the houses & Lands whereon I now dwell together with out-Lands & meadow & cedar swamps to be equally divided between them, and furthermore my will is that my two sons pay my just debts & funeral charges out of what I have above given them."

"sons Francis Ring & Eliphaz Ring" were appointed joint

executors.

The witnesses were Ebenezer Dean, John Fuller and John Bradford.

The will "of Samuel Ring . . . . yeoman" was probated, 6 June, 1768, on the testimony of John Fuller and John Bradford, and administration was granted to Francis Ring and Eli-

phaz Ring.

[20:80] On 6 June, 1768, Francis Ring and Eliphaz Ring, of Kingston, as administrators, with John Fuller, of Kingston, and John Bradford, gentleman, of Plympton, as sureties, gave a bond for £300. The witnesses were Jonathan Tilson and Edward Winslow, Jr.

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#### STEPHEN GORHAM'S WILL

Stephen Gorham<sup>4</sup> (John<sup>3</sup>, Desire<sup>2</sup> Howland, John<sup>1</sup>) of Barnstable, Mass., married Elizabeth, daughter of James Gardner of Nantucket, and died between 27 September, 1743, the date of his will, and 15 December, 1743, when it was probated. The will mentions his wife, four sons and seven daughters. No inventory is disclosed by the probate index.

We here print an exhaustive abstract of the will, and of all records relating to the settlement of the estate, found in the Barnstable County, Mass., Registry of Probate. There are no

original documents in the files.

#### [STEPHEN GORHAM'S WILL]

[Barnstable Co. Prob. Rcds., 6:343] "Stephen Gorham of Barnstable . . . . yeoman" made his will 27 September, 1743.

Bequests were as follows:

"I Will that my Executrix pay all my Just Debts and funeral Charge out of my personal Estate and Depending on her Justice my Will further is that if she . . . . Se Cause to Sell any of my Real Estate towards paying my Said Debts She may Do it at her Discretion for her more Comfortable Subsistance not Exceeding Twenty pounds Worth but no Other person but her Self Shall have this Liberty"

To "my Loving Wife all my personal Estate & Credits to Enable her to pay my Debts & to Subsist her Self and my Yonger Children I also Give her the Use and Improvement of all my

Real Estate during her Continuing my Widdow."

To "my four Daughters viz Mary Susannah Sarah and Elisabeth Each Ten Shillings to be paid as I herein shall Order haveing already Given them What I think is their portion of my Estate."

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To "my three Daughters Eunice Lois and Lydia Each Twelve pounds & ten Shillings to be paid also as I herein Shall Order."

To "my four Sons viz Nathanael Barnabas Stephen and Josiah Equaly to be Divided between them . . . . all my Real Estate Whatsoever and Wheresoever Reserving my Wives term in the Same . . . . they my Said four Sons paying in Equal proportion the above Legacies to my Seven Daughters as followeth that is to Say Mary Susannah Sarah and Elisabeth Within Six months after my Wives Death or Marriage and to Eunice Lois and Lydia Within four Years after my Decease or at their Marriage Respectively Which Shall first happen Except my Right and Intrest in a New plantation Called San Cook Which I Give to my Son Nathaniel"

"in Case . . . . Either of my Sons decease leaving no Issue Lawfully begotten of his body then his part or portion . . . . Shall be Devided to his then Surviving breathren Equaely they paying

or fullfilling What he is to pay and fullfill as above."

"in Case either of my three Last mentioned Daughters decease before they have Receiv<sup>d</sup> their Legacy as above it shall be paid to the two then Surviving of Said three & they Shall Enjoy it between them Except Such Deces<sup>d</sup> Daughter Leave Child or Children Lawfully begotten of their body in Which Case Said Child or Children Shall have it."

"My Will is that in Case my Wife Who I hereby appoint my Executrix . . . . deceas my Debts being not all paid that What of my Personal Estate that Shall be Left Shall be Improved Towaids the paying Said Debts. viz a Sufficiency thereof."

"my Son Nathaniel as a further Condition of What I have above given him Shall make no Demand out of my Estate for any Debt Due or Owing from me to him & I Do hereby on that Condition release all such Demand upon or against him"

The witnesses were John Gorham, Bethiah Gorham and Thankfull Mathews. "John Gorham Esqr Bethiah Gorham and Thankfull Mathews" made oath to the will, 15 December, 1743,

before Silvanus Bourn, Judge of Probate.

[6: 345] On 15 December, 1743, the will of "Stephen Gorham late of Barnstable . . . . Blacksmith" was probated, and administration granted to "Elisabeth Gorham Executrix in ye Same Will named"

### [WILL OF QUONNUKQUOSH]

[p. 95] On 23 June, 1681, "quonnukquosh of Satocett" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

"all my Lands Lying on ye Southerly Side of ye Cart way unto my two Sons Conkkequid and Ercemas and my Grandchild pilat Son to wequoaktoh my Son deseased this Land to be Equally proportioned to Each of them both for quantytie and quallity . . . . not to be sold or any wayes Intangled by all or any of them from ye posterity but to Remaine to ye proper use and behoof of and to affter Generations

"The Bounds of ye a fore said Land is as followeth from ye dirty place where the Cart way did goe on ye Easterly Side of ye Great old field Lately possessed by ye purchessers and So Easterly from that plash\* to Eastham ward till you Come to a heape of Stones with a bush in ye midle of them on ye Northerly Side of the afore said Cart way these two bounds is ye bredth of ye Northerly Eand of the Land and ye Line that parts between Sachamas and this mentioned Land is a South Line and so Extends Southerly in to ye woods as appears by ye writing of ye Divition of ye Land made by Captaine Thomas Howes Senior and mr John Freeman Seniour between Sachamas and my Self"

The will was signed by a mark. The witnesses were John Wing, John Freeman, Jr., and "Captain Daniel" by a mark.

"march: 82 quannukquosh Acknowledged this above writen to be his Last Will before me John Freeman: Assist"

#### [PROBATE OF SAMUEL HALL'S WILL]

[The will was recorded on original page 91.]

Administration on "the will of Samuel Hall, Late of yarmouth Deceased" was granted, 19 February, 1693/4, to "Elizabeth Hall Relict of S<sup>d</sup> deceased".

#### [WIDOW ANNA HALLETT'S WILL]

[p. 96] On 23 June, 1684, "Anna Hallett of yarmouth widow" made her will. Bequests were as follows:

To "my youngest Daughter Mehittable Dexter my Satiniscow

gowne and my mohair petticoat"

To "John Bourne my Grand Son now Living with me my bed in the Chamber with ye Bed Stead Curtains and vallents and all there to belonging: and my Great Brass kittle or twenty and two Shillings in money which he shall Chuse"

"And for ye Rest of my Estate my will is that it be divided in to three Equall parts and to my Daughter Ruhamah Bourne I do give one third part: And to my Daughter Abigail Alden I do give a Second third third parte: and to my Daughter Mehittable Dexter I do give ye other third part:"

"if . . . . one or more of my Daughters above Named Dyi before Shee have Received hir part . . . . then her Children Shall be Joynt heirs to Such part of my Estate as by this will be longed

to their mother"

"my three Daughters above Named" were appointed executors. The will was signed by a mark and witnessed by Thomas Thornton and John Thacher. John Thacher made oath to the will, 13 April, 1694, and Thomas Thornton on 1 June, 1694, and administration was granted to "Ruhamah Bourn Abigail Alden and mehittable Dexter executrixes", on 28 June, 1694.

The inventory was taken, at Yarmouth, 12 April, 1694, by John Thacher and Thomas Lumber. No real estate was mentioned. "Cattel and Sheep in Johns Hands Valued at about" £13, 12s.; "Cash" £67, 1s., 6d.; "Sheep at John Dunhams at about" £3; "Due to ye estate from John Hall about" £1, 17s., and from "Widow Herssey" £1; "due from ye estate to Jonathan Hallets two Eldest Children two Cowes And also two cows more to John Hallets two Eldest Children"

"Ruhamah Herssey Daughter of ye above sd deceased Anna

Hallett made oath to" the inventory, 13 April, 1694.

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#### ISAAC4 ALDEN'S WILL

BY THE EDITOR

ISAAC<sup>4</sup> ALDEN (Isaac<sup>3</sup>, Joseph<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>1</sup>) of Bridgewater, Mass., died there, 11 October, 1781, in his 89th year. He left no wife or children, and I have found nothing to indicate that he ever married. His will, dated 11 May, 1773, and proved 5 November, 1781, is interesting, and valuable, because of the numerous legacies to relatives.

Exhaustive abstracts are here given of the original will and of all records, or original documents on file, in the Plymouth County, Mass., Registry of Probate, relating to the settlement

of the estate.

### [ISAAC4 ALDEN'S WILL]

[From original will] On 11 May, 1773, "Isaac Alden of Bridgwater . . . . yeoman" made his will. Bequests were as follows:

To "my Brother Ebenezer Aldin" £13, 6s., 8d., "in one year

after my Decease".

To "my Two Sisters viz Sarah Cary & Mercy Packerd . and to the Heirs of my Sister mehetable Richards Deceast : and to the Heirs of Jamima whitman my Sister Deceast . . . . the Farm with the Buildings thereon which I Bought of Isreal Bailey . Lying on the Easterly Side of Bever Brook So Call'd in the Township of Bridgwater : and also a Trackt of Lands Lying on the Easterly Side of the Lands I Sold Ezra Alden Deceast . and adjoining the Lands of Danil Kingman . also a Lott of Lands Lying on Snells plain adjoining to the above Said Farm (which I Bought of Isreal Bailey) and my will is that the above Said Farm & Buildings and Lands be Equaly Devided into four Parts as to Quontity & Quolity & that my two Sisters above Named or their Heirs To have Two parts thereof : and the Heirs of My Two Sisters above Named Deceast the other two parts . to be Equaly Devided amongst them"

To "Isaac Alden minor Son of Ezra Alden Deceast" £66, 13s., 4d. "in a Note of Hand I have against John Bisbee of that. Sum" dated 28 September, 1771, and payable 1 April, 1784, "if he

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shold Live to the age of Twenty one . if otherwise . . . . that note when pay<sup>d</sup> Shall be Equaly Devided Between My two Sisters above Named or their Heirs and the Heirs of my Two Sisters above Named Deceast"

To "the two Eldest Daughters of my Brother John Alden Deceast viz Hannah & Kezia a Lott of Lands formerly Laid out to Deacon Fobes at a place Call'd Peeked Point also a Lot of Lands I Bought of John Edson Containing about Eight acres . also a Lot of Lands I Bought of David Snow Containing about Five acres . also "£13, 6s., 8d. "To be Equaly Devided Betwen them or their Heirs . in one year after my deceass"

To "Abigail Alden Daughter to Isaac Alden Deceast & Grandaughter to my Brother John Alden Deceast" £13, 6s., 8d., "in

one year after my Decase."

To "My Nephew Jonathan Alden Son of my Brother John Alden Deceast all my Wearing apparel and my Bed & Beding

and all my Farming Tools & Indoor movables."

To "my . . . . Frind John Orcutt of Bridgwater yeoman & To my Frind David Kingman of S<sup>d</sup> Bridgwater Trader a Lot of Lands Lying in Said Bridgwater in a Swamp Call'd Black Brook Swamp viz To David Kingman afore S<sup>d</sup> Ten acres and the Remainder To the afore Said John Orcutt"

John Orcutt and David Kingman were appointed executors, "unto whom I Give & Bequeath all my Notes of Hand & Securities for money and all my Quick Stock . and all other my Estate Not heretofore mention; d they Paying all my Just . . . . Debts & Funeral Charges . & the Legacyes Before mentioned viz to my Brother Ebenezer Alden & Isaac Alden . Hannah and Kezia the Daughters of My Brother John Alden & Abigail Alden-and the overpluss . . . . to be Equaly Devided Between my Two Sisters before mentioned (or their Heirs) and the Heirs of my two Deceased Sisters Before mentioned"

The witnesses were Joshua Barrell, Joseph Beall and Azariah

Beall. [The will was also recorded, 28:214.]

[From original] On 5 November, 1781, Joshua Barrell made oath to the will, and "Simeon Brett of said Bridgwater" was appointed administrator, "David Kingman having Refused ye Excorship and John Orcutt being deceased" [The letter was also recorded, 28: 216]

[From original bond] On 5 November, 1781, Simeon Brett, as administrator, with Joseph Gannett and Daniel Hayward as sureties, all being of Bridgewater, gave bond for £200. The

and the state of t production of the second second second second witnesses were Ebenezer Lewis and William Snell. [The bond

was not recorded.]

[From original warrant] On 5 November, 1781, "Nathan Alden & Elisha Mitchell Gent<sup>m</sup> & Jossiah Richards yeoman all of Bridgwater" were appointed to appraise the estate. [Also

recorded, 28:260.]

[From unrecorded petition] Daniel Richards, Simeon Packard and Nathan Whitman "being Apoynted Agents to Mannage the Setlement of that Estate; willed To Isaac Alldens Sisters and the Heirs of his Sisters—which were Deceased when S<sup>d</sup> will was made Request your hon to apoint Simeon Brett of Bridgwater To Administer on Said Estate In Case Capt Kingman Declines To Execute Said will". Dated at Bridgewater, I January, 1782.

[From original inventory] On 18 January, 1782, the inventory was taken, at Bridgewater, by Nathan Alden, Elisha Mitchell and Josiah Richards. The real estate was: "One Lot in Said Bridgwater Lying within the Second Share (so Called) Estimated at" 180 acres, £540; "twenty Seven acres on Snells Plain" £10, 16s.; "Three Small Lots on and adjoining to Said Plain viz One of Eight acres" £12, "another D° of Ten acres" £7, 10s., "another D° of five acres" £2, 10s.; "One Lot in a Place Called"

Black Brook Swamp Estimated at" 22 acres, £30, 16s.

The personal estate included: "two Loan Office Notes Dated May 21, 1779. Principal in Both amounting to £450 & Interest" £40, 2s., 11d.; "Two Notes against this State (viz) One of January 18. 1779 for" £22, 10s., "and Interest" £3, 6s., 3d.; "The Other april 1. 1779 for" £30 "& Interest" £3, 3s., 3d. "Also Notes against Sundry Persons . . . viz": "1773 Nov. 20-Jonathan Alden" £1, 4s., "and Interest" £1, 16s., 6d.; "1779 Jan 19 Jonathan Alden" £52 and interest, £7, 19s., 3; "1774 Dec 9 Nathan Orcutt" £11, 11s., 11d. and interest, £16, 8s., 9d.; "1779 march 19 John Bisbee" £10 and interest, £1, 3s., 3d.; "1779 august 3 John Bisbee" £56 and interest, £4, 0s., 2d.; "1778 may 14 Nathan Orcutt & Jonathan Alden" for 15 bushels of Indian corn, £2, 10s.; "1771 Sept 28 John Bisbee, (Being a Legacy to Isaac Alden" £66, 13s., 4d. and interest, £106, 11s., 8d.

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to Discharge the Legacys & Debts Therefore I Cannot acceept the Trust of Executor . . . I Therefore Desier your Honor wold Excuse me" A note on the letter, in another hand, reads "One Excer John Orcut Dead & Said Kingman Refuses to Act as Exer"

[27:487] On 4 March, 1782, "Simeon Brett of Bridgwater .... yeoman" was appointed administrator "John Orcutt being Deceased and .... David Kingman having renounced the trust"

[From unrecorded document] On 2 July, 1782, Simeon Brett presented "a List of Debts Due from the Estate . . . to Sundry Persons, Including the Legacies Given by the deced in his Last will". Legacies were due to "Isaac Alden" £66, 13s., 4d.; to "Jno Aldens 2 Eldest daughters" £13, 6s., 8d.; to "Abigail Whitten" £13, 6s., 8d.; to "Jona Alden" £8, 18s., 10½d. The debts included: "Capt Kingmans demands together wth his Son Ezra's"; "Sylvanus Lazell's demand".

[From unrecorded petition] "We the Heirs of Jamima Whitman Deceased who (under her) are heirs to the Estate of Isaac Alden Deceased Beg Leave to represent . . . . that we have often Called on the Administ<sup>r</sup> Simeon Brett for our Right & Share in Said Estate But as yet he neglects to settle with us . . . . we Request your Honor to Call on Said Administ to Settle his acco's of administration"

Dated at Bridgewater, 5 April, 1785, and signed by Simeon Whitman, Peter Whitman, William Whitman, "Seth A Whitman administ" to Nathan whitman Decd", Amos Whitman.

[From unrecorded document] An "acct of Simeon Brett of Bridgwater . . . as Administrator", which was not dated or signed, but with "Augst 4th 1792 ye Admr Sworn" endorsed on the back, shows debts paid to : Abram Packard, Isaac Washburn, "Lydia Edson on a note paid by Order to Ephm Packard", Ephraim Cary, "Taxes paid To Micah White & Nathan Hudson", "Ditto paid to James Keith and Ezra Kingman", "Doctors Adams & Otis", "Collonel Cary", "Capt Keith", Silvanus Lazel, Joshua Barrell, Ephraim Packard, "Esqt Brown", Joseph Richards.
