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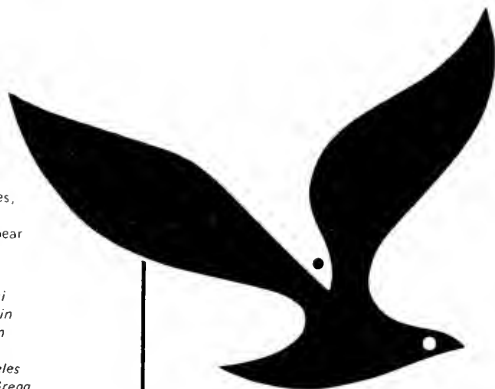

# film of the month:

## "A Very Curious Girl"

Bernadette Lafont (she was in Truffaut's *Such a Gorgeous Kid Like Me*) plays Marie, the entrancing, shrewd, insouciant, and almost feral woman who, through her understanding of the bourgeois mentality, wreaks an ingenious revenge on the French villagers who'd humiliated and tormented her and her gypsy mother.

While the story line permits of easy synopsis, there is no way of quickly defining the subtleties and complexities of the human interactions portrayed.

Directed and co-authored by Nelly Kaplan, *A Very Curious Girl* is considered one of the finest contemporary films by a woman. It has had a brief showing in Los Angeles, and came back to our attention when we joined a delighted audience (SRO) at the Berkeley Art Museum. We're sure you, too, will find it droll, outrageous, and utterly delectable for Woman's Month.

# A MONTH OF HER OWN

This May we focus on women, returning to a theme which we first aired in February 1972.

A comparison of the programming of that winter, with the concerns of this spring, reveals a subtle shift in emphasis. A significant change is our current interest in ideological aspects of feminist thinking. We appear to be much more involved in philosophical issues today; there is a genuine attempt to delve into the theoretical as well as the practical. We are not afraid of being an intellectual sisterhood.



Although the spectrum of the month is broad, it is by no means all-inclusive. Some of the programming is even whimsical: in contrast our previous fofo was determinedly serious.

The Morning Reading again features Virginia Woolfe, Maureen Mellroy, who read *Mrs. Dalloway* so beautifully that February, brings us *To the Lighthouse* this May, as well as an original documentary on the writer, *Voices that Fly Ahead*. Lou Andreas Salome is the subject of another special feature, *Frau Lou: Dare Everything, Need Nothing*, created by Barbara Kraft, who won the Ohio State Award for her study of Maude Gonne.

In addition to an investigation of women in political life, *If You Can't Stand the Kitchen, Get Out into the Heat*, you will hear a report from local women's organizations daily on Dealing at 5:45 p.m.

# The MOTHER

BERTOLT BRECHT

*The Mother* is the story of a working-class woman, Anya Olassova, in pre-revolutionary Russia. Upset that her son is doing illegal political work, she becomes involved to protect him. When a fellow worker is shot and killed on May Day, 1905, she loses faith in peaceful change. Her son is arrested and imprisoned; she continues his work. She learns to read, despite the teacher's belief that "knowledge is useless." When her son is killed in an escape attempt, her opposition to the Czar and her belief in socialism grows more determined. The play ends with Anya carrying the red flag on the eve of the 1917 revolution.

The play is one of Brecht's most committed Marxist pieces, and generally goes unmade and unperformed by academic departments and theater companies. The Mime Troupe has established a ritual of regularly performing a Brecht play, and they have been presenting this work in the parks of San Francisco and across campuses and little theaters in this country. This month, they bring the play to Southern California, and in honor of May Day, Mother's Day, and the theme of this month, to KPFK.

And, for the second consecutive year, David Cloud, KPFK's Music Director, has won an award from the Southern California Inter-Chapter Council of Sigma Alpha Iota, the international music fraternity. As a matter of fact, this year he won two awards - for the best single music program (the "Special" award) and the best music series. The winning entries were, respectively, a live-in-concert recording of Ernst Toch's comic opera *The Princess on the Pea* and the Studio A Concerts, a piano four-hands recital by Louis and Janet Keller being submitted as a representative sample. He was given a special citation at an SAI luncheon in Anaheim on March 23 for being the first person in the 12-year history of the awards to win in both radio categories in one year. The competition, incidently, is open to commercial as well as non-commercial stations.

## IMPEACHMENT DESK

(Los Angeles) - As we go to press, many Congressional and Senatorial figures have already begun predicting that the impeachment of Richard M. Nixon is a "foregone conclusion."

KPFK responds with "Impeachment Desk," Monday through Friday at 6:45 p.m., following the Evening News (with rebroadcasts after the Monotone News at midnight, and again at 9:00 a.m. the following morning, after the news summary).

The program is a comprehensive report on the day's impeachment events, in-depth background, and in-

clusive analysis on the unfolding historic drama.

Interviews with principals, reports from Washington, New York, etc., and daily assessments of the likelihood of the impeachment (and subsequent conviction) being carried to its completion. Produced by Dennis Levitt, with Features from Mike Hodel, Kate Riekman, and Riek Polkinghorne, among others.

As events in Washington become more decisive, Dennis Levitt will be KPFK's on-the-scene correspondent, and the program will continue from the nation's capital. Tune in.

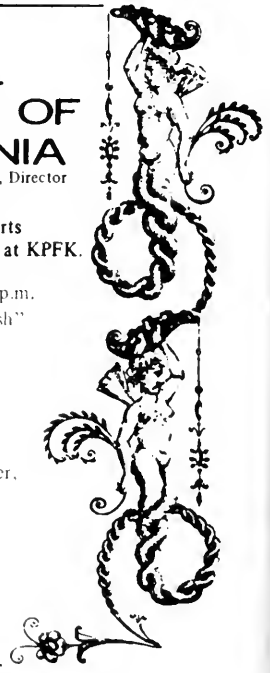

# It's Your Subscription...



## Billing

Members of the 3729 Club and those being billed monthly: the computer will bill you when you are due. Please wait for a bill. Returning the bill with your payment will insure crediting your account correctly, and save us the labor and expense of looking up your account.

Sending in a payment without a bill or renewal form costs more to process than the cost of printing and mailing the form to you. If you do not receive a bill when you think you should, drop us a card about it, and we'll check out the account. You may be paid ahead, or may not be down for periodic billing.

## Moving

If you want your Folio to follow you when you move, you've got to do it the computer way: Attach the computer-label from your last Folio at your old address to a change of address card or the coupon on page 30. Add your new address, don't forget your zip code, and mail to KPFK North Hollywood, Ca. 91608. Allow about 6 weeks for processing.

## Renewal and Mailing-Updating Procedures

With rare exceptions, we have mailed between the 20th and the 25th for the past year. If you have been on the machine-labeled mailing list, have not moved recently, and are not lapsed, you should receive the Folio before the 1st of the month. If you don't, contact your local Postmaster about delivery.

First Renewal notices are sent out with the Folio one month ahead of expiration. You will receive your last Folio with the Second Renewal notice around the beginning of the month your expiration date is up. This allows you to respond before the 2nd Wednesday of that month.

2nd Wednesdays are the key dates in subscription processing as anything processed by then is sent to the computer, and all updated bills, renewals, and the Folio mailing list for the next month are printed and returned to us the following Monday. Folios are addressed and mailed by the end of that week.

As you can see, an address change or payment received by the 2nd Wednesday will take effect the next month. One day later, the same information will appear one month later.

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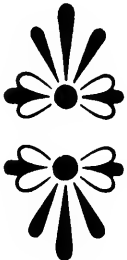
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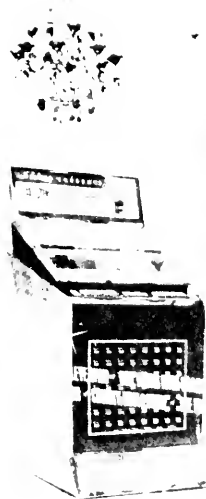
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
