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There have been so much conceit and arrogance, in respect to lineage, that even wise and good persons have been led to underrate the importance of the subject. Thus, the excellent Rev. William Jay, of Bath, in his autobiography, (vol. 1, 19th p.) says:-"I have not to trace a long and proud lineage. If any great and illustrious individuals have been found among my ancestors, they have not been ascertained in my family, in my own time. But were I mean enough, to feel any mortification here, I could not console myself. When one of Lord Thurlow's friends was endeavoring to make out his relationship to the Secretary Cromwell, whose family had been in the county adjoining Suffolk, he replied, 'Sir, there were two Cromwells in that part of the country, Thurlow the Secretary, and Thurlow the Carrier, I am descended from the latter.' We have read of a man, who in prospect of his promotion, being asked concerning his pedigree, answered 'he was not particularly sure, but had been credibly informed, that he had three brothers in the ark.' But one of our most distinguished poets surpasses this, in his epitaph:-

> 'Princes and heralds, by your leave Here lie the bones of Matthew Prior, The son of Adam and of Eve, Can Nassau or Bourbon go higher?'"

Bishop Chastel was one of the most learned divines of the 16th century, bishop of Orleans, and great almoner of France. Francis I. asked him, 'Whether he was born a gentleman?' Chastel answered, 'That he was not perfectly certain from which of Noah's three sons he was descended.' Every genealogist, in his appeal for information, has doubtless sometime met a response like the following:-"The answer which you seek of me, O illustrious friend and joy of my liver!" wrote an eastern Cadi, in reply to M. Layard's inquiries about certain antiquarian statistics, "is both difficult and useless to be given." But while there is danger of our setting too high a value upon our pedigree, yet it is well to remember our ancestry, nor is it wrong to recount and rejoice in, their achievements and worth. Inspiration recognizes the intimate connection between ourselves and our ancestry, when it asserts "children's children are the crown of old men; and the glory of children are their fathers." Parents and children, ancestors and descendants, reflect honor or dishonor upon each other. Virtuous and godly children are as gems in "the crown" of a venerable and virtuous old man, and in filial honor, they in turn, cherish him as their "glory." So too, such as have good blood in

their veins, yet have no analogous excellence in their characters, dishonor those who bore them. And this law unites successive generations in a common life and history. Clever has well stated this mutual relation. "A good root," says he, "maketh the branches to flourish, by virtue of the lively sap that it sendeth up. And flourishing branches win praise to the root, for the pleasant fruit which they bring forth." They who transmit a good name, noble examples, and a pure faith, lay their descendants under sacred and lasting obligations of gratitude for, and emulation of, ancestral faithfulness and piety.

The more one studies history, and races, and families, the more must he be convinced of the marked and permanent influence of BLOOD. Despite all the crossings by intermarriages, every genealogist has marked, and marvelled at the continuance, from generation to generation, of some particular type of character, that was visible in the earliest known ancestor. This fact has been strikingly illustrated in the descendants of many of the early Pilgrim, or Puritan colonists. To read aright the lesson of human history, to reach wise and safe generalizations, one must not forget the law of descent, and the force there is in blood or race. "Religion does not run in the blood of that family," said an aged but observing man, as a vicious youth passed him. "I have known the family for several generations, but I have never known any among them who gave evidence of piety."-The qualities and forces of the character do "run in the blood," and whether good or bad, are propagated, and pass down through successive generations. In some families, the parents, and the ancestors, back to an early period, have been marked by moral and christian excellence. The family of the elder Edwards is an illustration of this law and force of Blood. His ancestors, for many generations, were eminent for religious worth. And his numerous progeny have, with few exceptions, "flourished by reason of the lively sap sent up from the good root." Wherever they are found, they are characterized by the moral qualities, and illustrate, in no small degree, the spirit of their illustrious and godly ancestor. And this force of Blood, is just as visible in the transmission of evil qualities, giving to some families, through long periods, "a bad eminence," perpetuating a type of character, with which, religion or intelligence are rarely, if ever, united.

It is argued, by such as underrate genealogical research, that every claim upon the esteem of others, is founded upon character, and that this embodies every quality that can justly command the

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affection and reverence of men. But as character is not altogether isolated from, nor independent of ancestral fountains, from which, the native impulses, the mental and moral tendencies and forces, have come, the subject of pedigree belongs, clearly, to the history of every man's mind and life. Our ancestors live in us. Though dead, they speak. In nature, below man, the various orders of being, animate and inanimate, do little more than repeat ancestral forms and habits. Man also, is a derivation from the past, and ought to be considered and weighed in connection with it.

The study of genealogy, therefore, has important scientific and moral uses. It summons the Past, to interpret the lives of men, with respect to physical, mental and moral character. It shows how the Past has poured itself into our present life. It embalms in the memory of the living, the lessons, examples and obligations, of an honorable lineage, and as the Romans when emigrating to foreign climes, took with them the carved images of their fathers, and set them in the choicest places of their new homes, so it sets the images of our ancestors before us, to be an inspiration and benediction to our life.

MATTERS PERSONAL. ORIGIN OF THE WORK, &c .- Seven years since, in a respite from professional labor, the subscriber undertook what had been a long cherished purpose, viz., to trace his descent from James Walker, one of the first settlers of Taunton, Mass. The materials thus gleaned, respecting the ancient Walkers of T. induced him to extend his plan and compile a complete genealogy of the It was soon discovered that they were allied with the Rehoboth Walkers, and the plan was enlarged, so as to include this As the ancestor of the Eastham Family more fruitful Branch. emigrated to this country in the same ship with James of Taunton, it was supposed that they were related, and accordingly his descendants were traced. At length, in view of the fact of there being no less than 14 of the name of Walker, ancestors of distinct branches, in the country even before 1650, and the wide extent and frequency of the name at the present time, it was determined to limit the work to the Walkers of the Old Plymouth Colony and their descendants. This plan required the addition of the Families of John of Marshfield and Thomas of Bristol. The compiler has been successful in obtaining information respecting all the lineal descendants of these early settlers, with a very few exceptions, and especially those of Taunton and Rehoboth lineage. It is thought that in no similar work, equal in size, have fewer branches been left incomplete.

publication of the work has been deferred, that every measure which promised success, might be taken, to trace every male line down to the present time, and include every descendant named Walker. The fulness of these Genealogies in this respect, may be seen by reference to pages 420, 21, of the Appendix. They embrace the period between 1618 and 1860.

PREFACE.

One who has had no experience in genealogical inquiries, can form no just idea of the amount of labor required, to collect and arrange the names and materials of the biography of the widely scattered and numerous descendants of the early settlers, through a period of two centuries and a quarter, the labor of extensive correspondence, examination of town and state records, histories, ancient wills, and deeds; labor greatly increased also, by the delay, and in some cases, refusal of those from whom information was sought. His labor arising from these latter sources, delay and indifference, the compiler has reason to suppose, have not been greater, than what is usually the experience of a family historian. But no complete and accurate Genealogy can be prepared without an expenditure of time, and money, for which no adequate remuneration can be expected, save in the pleasure attending such pursuits, and the consciousness of doing something, in grateful reverence, to enshrine in a permanent Memorial, the lives and virtues of one's ancestors and kindred—a Memorial, which, while it may be no mean offering to their worth, may also be to the descendants, full of inspiration to piety and patriotism, as they trace their lineage from the self-sacrificing founders of civilization, and the brave and steadfast defenders of freedom in this New World. The compiler has spared no pains nor expense to secure thoroughness and accuracy. Records have been examined and re-examined, and all correspondence, some of it illegible and with its facts badly arranged, has been carefully compiled and copied. As the highest merit in a Genealogy is correctness, this has been sedulously labored for, and if persistent efforts to verify dates, harmonize conflicting statements, and make a Memorial complete and reliable, can accomplish the object,-this work is a success. If any do not find so full an account of themselves and families as was anticipated, it is because in most instances no more was furnished. To some extent there has been a condensation of the materials, but generally in respect to those who have evinced no interest in their publication, as justice demanded that subscribers and their families should have the largest space consistent with the plan of the book. Various tradiX PREFACE.

tions obtain in some branches of the Family respecting their ancestors, and the time of their emigration to this country. But what is stated in this work concerning their advent, is sustained by abundant and incontestable proofs. None of these traditions reach back far enough into the early history of New England.

Dates since 1800 are sometimes abbreviated thus. '29 for 1829. There are other abbreviations, of such common use, that the meaning will be obvious.

A name in parenthesis, thus, Sarah Richmond, dau. of Wm. and Anna (Gray) indicates the maiden surname of Anna, w. of Wm. Richmond. (See 34th p.) An interrogation mark (?) implies doubt, or want of absolute certainty. Sometimes two dates of the same event are given, the authority being so nearly equal, that the compiler could not determine which is the correct one. Where town and family records, as in some instances, disagree, or members of the same family have reported different dates, and insist upon their accuracy, both are given, one of them being placed in brackets. If discrepancies between the dates given here, and those of their ancient family records, are discovered by any persons, such should consider whether the difference between Old and New Style will not harmonize them. Undoubtedly in a few instances, where no family records exist, names and dates have been furnished from memory, and errors may be discovered. But these will be found only among the living or later generations, and for them, the compiler is not responsible. As the orthography of names varies in different families, the compiler has reproduced the spelling which was furnished him, except where PREFACE. XI

there were obvious errors. Birthplaces are not always stated where the dates of birth are given, but they can be ascertained by reference to the person's father, and his residence at the time of the birth.

OLD AND NEW STYLE.—In computing time, the solar year is reckoned 3654 days, but this is too much by 11 minutes and a fraction. If this excess be neglected, in the course of centuries, the 1st of January would fall back towards midsummer, and in 1582, the time of Pope Gregory XIII., it was found that the vernal equinox which in A. D. 325 happened on the 21st of March, actually occurred on the 10th of March. For the purpose of rectifying the calendar, the Pope ordered that 10 days be dropped from that year. This was called "New Style" and the former calendar, "Old Style." The new calendar was soon adopted in all Catholic countries, but in England and her colonies, it was disregarded till 1752, when the error of the old calendar amounted to 11 days, and by an Act of Parliament, they were dropped from Sept. of that year. Some persons may not understand the double dating, like Feb. 9, 1684-5, on p. 23, No. 9. The real date is Feb. 9, 1685. The civil or legal year in England, formerly commenced on the 25th of March, and was so reckoned till 1752, when the new or Gregorian calendar was adopted, which makes the year commence on the 1st of January. But before that period, as some other nations had adopted the New Style, it was usual for English and American writers to designate both years, if the event occurred before the 25th of March. If the year commenced the 25th of March, the date would be Feb. 9, 1684, if the year began the 1st of January, the date would be Feb. 9, 1685, and changed to New Style by addition of 11 days would be Feb. 16, 1685.

Arrangement or Plan of the Book.—The plan adopted, is that recommended by the Genealogical Register, and which after examination of published genealogies, appeared to the compiler, the most intelligible. Experience has confirmed his choice, and no other plan, yet devised, is so simple and so easily comprehended, by persons not familiar with genealogical works.

The numbering is enumerative, the numerals at the left of the page giving the whole number of Walkers down to any period or generation. The small figure over a name at the right, thus James, indicates the generation to which this person belongs, reckoning from his earliest ancestor in this country. A few moments attention to the directions which follow, will enable the reader to ascertain the pedigree, and find the descendants of any person whose name is given

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in Part I. of the Index. The figure at the right of a name in brackets, thus, "CHILDREN OF LIEUT. JAMES WALKER,4 [10]" on p. 30, refers backward to No. 10, 24th p., where an account of this James⁴ will be found. He is one of the "Children of James Walker,³ [5]" and by referring to No. 5, 21st p., an account of his father may be found. And James, No. 5, is one of the "CHILDREN OF JAMES WALKER,2 [2]" and referring to No. 2, 4th p., it will be seen that he is descended from the 1st James² of Taunton, son of Widow Walker1 of Rehoboth. Reversing the method, in order to trace descendants, the figure at the right of the name in parenthesis, thus, James Walker,2 (5) on 4th p., refers to what follows at No. 5, 21st p., and shows where the children of James, No. 2, may be found. In No. 5, James,³ (10) on 21st p., the 10 in parenthesis refers to No. 10, on 24th p., where the children of James, No. 5, may be found. No. 10, James,4 on 24th p., has 27 in parenthesis, thus, (27) which indicates where this James' children may be found. (See 30th p.) No. 27, James,⁵ (59) on 30th p., the 59 in parenthesis refers to No. 59, on the 37th p., where the son of James, No. 27, is found. This line terminates here, the descendants of James, No. 59, if he had any, having baffled all research, and accordingly he has no reference number. But No. 61, Eliakim, on the same page, has the reference number (121) for which see the 50th p., where Eliakim's children are found, and by observing these directions, it will be easy to trace Eliakim's grandchildren and descendants, or those of any other person. The children and descendants of the females are not carried forward to the next generation, but their names and all that pertains to them, appear in connection with their Walker mothers or ancestors, though in smaller type. In some instances, these sketches embrace several generations, as with the descendants of Mehetable, No. 15, on 25th page.

A copious Index is furnished, so that the names of all the Walkers, and of all persons who have married Walkers or their descendants, if mentioned in this Memorial, may easily be found, and whatever account is given of them, be referred to. A full and valuable Summary may be found in the Appendix, pp. 415, 16. It will be well for the reader also to examine the ADDITIONS and ERRATA, on pp. 417—420 and 451, and by some mark on the pages where they properly belong, indicate a reference to them, especially those which relate to themselves, or kindred.

Some persons bearing the name of Walker and descended from other early settlers, may imagine that this work, purporting to be a

Ge ealogy of the Walkers, contains an account of themselves and families. Such will be disappointed, as those only are included who are of Old Colony lineage. They will however find much pertaining to the History of the name, that will interest them, and possibly may find the root from which they are sprung, in the Appendix, (p. 401—407,) which contains the names of the other Walkers in New England previous to 1700.

It may perhaps seem needless for the compiler to say, that he has been gratified by the interest evinced by the members of the different branches of the Walker race, especially those of Taunton and Rehoboth origin. It is impossible for him to mention here the names of all, who by words of encouragement and by prompt and full correspondence, have done so much to bear him through an enterprise demanding such unlimited patience, and in which, completion can be achieved only by years of labor. Without forgetting his obligation to any, he cannot forbear however to publicly and gratefully acknowledge the services and hearty co-operation of George Walker and Richmond Walker of Taunton, Abel B. Walker of Andover, Rev. Horace D. Walker of East Abington, the late James O. Walker of Swanton Centre, Vt., Abel Walker of Whiting, Vt., Hon. Zuriel Walker of Ferrisburgh, Vt., Hon. John A. Walker of Pittsfield, Thomas Walker, Esq. of Utica, N.Y., Hon. Edward C. Walker of Detroit, Mich., Prof. Charles M. Walker of Indianapolis, Col. Amasa K. Walker of Hampden, Me. Joseph Brown of Seekonk, John W. Higgins of Eastham, and Miss Maria Thomas of Marshfield. He is also indebted to those who so readily responded to the request to furnish the portraits which embellish the book, and which render it far more valuable as a Memorial of the Walkers. Several were constrained to withdraw their pledges to this effect, but others and a greater number have supplied their places, so that but one of the many Family histories now published, equal in size to the Genealogies of the Taunton and Rehoboth Branches, is so abundantly illustrated with portraits.

The descendants of these Old Colony Families, have generally belonged to the agricultural and mechanical classes, and have been characterized by good sense, sound judgment and christian excellence. None have achieved celebrity in literature or statesmanship. They have mostly helped swell the ranks of the honest and pious yeomanry of New England and the West. It is interesting to trace the transmission of the Puritan faith, to see the streams, originating in the piety of the good Dea. Philip Walker of Rehoboth, and James of Taunton, the honored magistrate, coursing down the centuries

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and over the land, yet maintaining their purity, and bearing moral fertility wherever they have gone. The compiler has added a feature to this work which has not generally been introduced. He has endeavored to ascertain the religious sympathy and church relation of each person. It has seemed to him, that for the highest use of a Genealogy, it is important to know whether a person is "born of God" as well as "born of the will of man." The biography of multitudes may be summed up in the statement of the author of Euthanasy, "born upon such a day—died upon such another, with an utter blank between." But with a religious birth to fill this "blank" of some unhonored and lowly man or woman, with steady and attractive piety, the life becomes useful, even noble, answers "life's great end," and is worthy of a record here, as it has a record on high. Of such, it can never be said they were

"Fixed to one peculiar spot
To draw nutrition, propagate, and rot."

With a name on which no stain has ever rested, with an ancestry not often great, but always virtuous, filling, with fidelity and honor, the stations they were called to occupy, one may justly be proud of his lineage. It is the hope of the compiler, that all who by means of his labors, find that such are their name and ancestry, may be grateful for the "glory" they have in "their fathers," and learn from them, that "the richest bequest which any man can make, for the benefit of posterity, is that of a shining and spotless example."

INTRODUCTION.

WALKER. ORIGIN AND MEANING OF THE NAME.—Surnames have originated from various sources, such as localities, occupations, offices, social relations, and personal qualities or peculiarities, character and history. Others are Norman names, dating from the Conquest. Two other classes are derived from the Christian names of father or mother, and from the animal, mineral or vegetable kingdoms. Local English names constitute the most numerous division, and unlike those of occupation, do not indicate the condition, or social rank of those who first bore them.

The custom of assuming or applying names from the various pursuits of life obtained at a very early period. Among the Romans, many and even those of the highest rank, had such names. "These names became hereditary in England next in order, after the local names, about the 11th and 12th centuries, and form a large class. They had a prefix le, as Stephen le Spicer, le Bakere, &c. in records of 12th and two succeeding centuries." Walker, says Lower in his "Surnames," signifies either (Anglo Saxon wealcere) a fuller or an officer whose duty consisted in walking over or inspecting a certain space of forest ground. In the North of England, a fulling mill is still called a 'walk-mill,' and at Alfrich, Co. Worcester, there are some thin strata of unctuous clay of a whitish hue, still called Walker's clay. The same custom obtains in the South of Scotland, where the Walkers are numerous. There is a string of names, Lower adds, derived from occupation, which sounds right odd, when placed in juxtaposition, and which prima facie, would appear to be fully as applicable to the equine as to the human species, viz., Traveller, Walker, Ryder, Ambler, Trotter, Hopper, Skipper and Hobler. Ryder means another forest officer, a superintendent of the Walkers, a ranger who derived his name from the circumstance of being mounted, and as having a larger district to supervise. From this, it is clear that Lower leans to the opinion that Walker is a name of occupation. Arthur, in his work on the Etymology of names, gives it the same signification. The Anglo Saxon Dictionary, however, has the following definition, viz., "Wealc, a revolving, a revolution of heavenly bodies. Wealcan p. Wealc, (hence to walk.) To roll, turn, &c.; to return often. Wealere, es. m., a fuller; in Lancashire, a Walker, s." A writer in the Edinburgh Review, in an essay on

English surnames, says, "Many of these names of employment survive, and remind us of crafts which have long ceased to exist," and he gives among his illustrations, "Le Waliker, (Waliker that is Fuller.")*

It will be seen that authorities differ as to the signification of the name, and leave it difficult to determine which theory is the more correct. Probably, however, both meanings are true, and the name had a double origin; in some parts of England, being derived from the occupation of a forest officer, and in the North of England and Scotland, originating from the employment of a fuller. This seems the more rational conclusion. The change in the ancient surname of the Walkers of Manor House, Bushey, Co. Hertfordshire, from Forestier to Walker, (see few pp. onward) favors this supposition. And may not some branch of the Fullers have adopted the name of Walker, and as a fulling mill was also a walking mill, may not some have chosen the former, while others selected the latter as their surname?

ANTIQUITY OF THE NAME.—The following in respect to persons bearing the name, in England, mostly persons of distinction, is introduced as part of its history. It is with no idea that these very ancient Walkers are in any way related to the Walkers who came to New England. The English origin and pedigree of the Families included in this work are entirely unknown, and it would be sheer presumption to infer that they were descended from any whose names are given in this introduction. The name even before the year 1600, was so common and extensive, and as a name of occupation had so many independent roots, or an origin in so many different places, as to give no justification to any theory of descent and relationship. So "mighty" or numerous was the name in England 250 years ago, that the compiler came at length to entertain no hope of ascertaining the pedigree of his ancestor, or of other Walkers contemporaneous, in the Old Colony, having no other fact to guide his researches, than that James and William sailed from London in 1635. He has found no coats of arms nor tradition of any, in these Families, and if their ancestors were entitled to any, which is not probable, all memory of them is lost.

As most of the English surnames took root between the Norman Conquest of 1066 and the Revolution of 1688, the historical notices which follow, are embraced within this period. These are selected from a great number, as there is no end to the use of the name in numerous English works.

HISTORICAL NOTICES OF THE NAME.—St. Michael's Mount in Conwall, was surrendered in 1194, to Hubert Walker, Archbishop of Canterbury.—(Lyson's Brittannia, Cornwall.)

There was Walcre or Walkern, in 1215, also Willi Waliker.—

(Rotuli Litterarum, vol. I.)

Walke and Walkern, probably meant for Walker, are found in the Taxatio Ecclesiastica.

There was a William Walkere in the reign of Henry III., (1216—1272).—(Placitorum Abbreviatio.)

Nichs Walk lived in the time of Edward I., who began his reign, 1272.—(Rotuli, vol. II.)

Sir Roger Walker was parish priest of Hockwold in Suffolk, about 1349.

John Walker, L.L. B., Archdeacon of the East Riding of Yorkshire, d. about Dec. 1475.

Mr. Miles Walker was Rector of St. Lawrence Ch. in South Walsham, in 1478.

There were two chantries founded at Lewsham, about 1490, one by Richard Walker, for the priest to celebrate mass at the altar of the Trinity, for the founder's soul.

Jacobz Walker F. civis Lond, ob. 4 Nov. 1491.

John Walker was Vicar of the Ch. of Boughton Monchensie, in 1492.

Hugh Walker was Rector of Mereworth, Nov. 20, 1497.

Richard Walker, Provost and Master of Wye Coll. in 1518, d. Oct. 20, 1543.

Sir Thomas Kylson, Knt., made a lease "for terme of certeyn yers of Parcel of Premysses, in citie of London, to oon Thomas Walker." Date, 4th June, 1533.—(Rhymer's Foedera.)

William Walker of Bury fletcher, 1539, directed "all his peyntyd clothgs to be gevyn vnto fore yong copylls yt be newly maryed."—(Bury Wills and Inventories.)

Jane, dau. of Thomas Walker of London, S. P., m. as 2d wife, about 1550, the 5th son of Sir John Boys of St. Gregory's, Knt.

The following are the names of Walkers who were Vicars and Rectors in the time of Henry VIII., (1509—1547,) viz., Dr. William, John, James, George, Thomas, Hugo, David, Henry, John, Rector of Tackley, and John, Rector of Wotton.

Christopher Walker was Vicar, 1540, also Nicholaus Walker.

Edmund Walker was presented to the vicarage of Wensbury, 1550.

Peter Walker became Rector of Colcester, 1556.

Roger Walker, M. A., became Dean of Chester, 1558 or '59.

Henry Walker had a position in the Academy of Canterbury, 1564.

Queen Elizabeth granted the rectory of Collumpton to John Walker, in 1565.

There were Walkers in Exeter, Devonshire Co., from middle of 16th century. Rev. Rob't Walker, Vicar of St. Winnow in Cornwall, was the representative of the family.

William Walker, Rector of Charing, in diocese of Canterbury, resigned, 1586.

Anthony Walker of St. Andrew's Wardrobe, Lond., d. 1590.

Dr. Thomas Walker, Master of Univ. Coll., was elected 1632, dispossessed 1648, restored 1660, and d. 1665. He was related to Archbishop Laud, and was a deserving and modest man.—(Neal's Puritans.)

William Walker was one of the assistants of Burrough of St. Albans, in 1634.

Peter Walker. His father sacrificed his property in the cause of the royal house of Stuarts, and fled from Cheshire into Ireland. He m. Mary Walker, of Yorkshire Walkers.

William Walker, b. in 1650, resided in the parish of Ecclesfield, Co. York, and d. 1708. He left Joseph, who had 2 sons by 1st wife, and 3 sons by 2d wife. The last 3 were the celebrated brothers at Masborough, Samuel, Aaron, and Jonathan, called the "Great Iron Founders." Samuel was a man of remarkable ability, and excellence. For an interesting sketch, see County Hist. of York, 5th vol.

Richard Walker, was Rector of Boughton Aluph, Aug. 6. 1644.

Henry Walker was presented to be minister of Knightsbridge Chapel, 1655.

Dr. Walt. Walker, Knt. Doctor of Civil Law, formerly of Staffordshire, was one of the Judges of Court of Admiralty and Court of Prob. of Wills, 1659. He was also Advocate General to His Royal Highness, James, Duke of York.

Sir Geo. Walker, Knt. Dr. of Civil Law, d. 1679.

Henry Walker, Rector of Church of Kensington, 1677, resigned 1681. Henry Walker, Rector of Church of Willesborough, 1681, d. 1695. John Walker, Rector of Church of Kensington, 1681, till 1683.

John Walker, was Rector of Church of Halden, 1683.

The ancient surname of the Walkers of Manor House, Bushey, Co. Hertfordshire, was Forestier or De Forestier, derived, at a remote period from their occupations, in the royal forests, as forestiers, walkers, verderers, &c.; but subsequently, in order to distinguish a numerous progeny, certain branches, those of Sir Hovenden Walker, Knt., Sir Walter Walker of Bushey Hall, &c., assumed the name of Walker only.

EXTENT OF THE NAME.—From the preceding notices of persons of eminence, it may be inferred that Walker was also a common name, among the humbler ranks of society through all the periods of

English history. It is not only English, but prevails extensively in Scotland,* and to some extent in Ireland. There are many of the nam now in this country, who are of Scotch birth.

With "the list of the Pedigrees contained in Wm. Paver's consolidated Visitations of Yorkshire," being those taken in 1584, 1612 and 1665, there is also a list of allied families, with the number of times each name appears. There are 1352 names. Walker appears 11 times, and is exceeded by only 9 names in the list.

At one time, a list of 60 of the most common surnames, in England and Wales, was made, and a register was kept of the number of births, marriages and deaths, in one year, with this result: Of the strictly English family names, Smiths were most numerous, Jones next in order, and Taylors, third. Of the names derived from employments, whether official or manual, Wright, Walker, Turner, Cooper, Clark, Baker, occupy next to Smith & Taylor, the highest place. The names in this list are called "the mighty sixty." Walker is the 17th in rank, and of names of occupation holds the 4th place.

"The Encyclopedia of Heraldry" gives 52 different families of Walkers, with their arms. Of these, 5 were in Scotland, 1 in Ireland, and 1 in Barbadoes. The others were distributed in almost every county of England.

"Burke's Landed Gentry," published 1853, gives 11 families of Walkers, (with their arms,) to be found in different counties.

Seventeen persons named Walker, had been graduated at Oxford University, previous to 1828.

The London Directory for year 1855, gives 234 names of Walkers, business and professional.—(See Appendix, pp. 407, 8, for the commonness of the name in the cities of this country.†)

^{*}The original of Jeanie Deans, in the "Heart of Mid-Lothian" by Sir Walter Scott, was Helen Walker, who d. 1791. He erected a monument to her memory, in the church-yard of Irongrey, Edinburgh, inscribing it with a just and beautiful tribute to her worth. tin the year 1858, there were 55 Postmasters in the U.S., named Walker, and only 4 of them belonging to the families included in this work—a fact that shows how widely and numerously the name has spread over this country.

NOTE.—The following items have come to the compiler's notice since the Appendix was printed.

There are numerous Walkers in the Southern States, and several have risen to distinction.

1. "WIDOW WALKER," (2)

OF REHOBOTH, MASS.

SHE was one of the first purchasers and proprietors of the town of Rehoboth or Seacunk, now Seekonk, and one of the company who first settled there. Her name is in the list of those who in 1643 gave in the value of their estates, for a pro rata division of the lands. Hers was £50. In the division made June 31, 1644, she had a share, and lots were assigned her in several divisions afterward, as in drawing for the Great Plain, and on the 18th of 12 mo. (Feb.) 1646, for the new Meadow.

Her name then disappears. When and from whence she came to New England, and where she died, are not known. There is no record to tell us her age or her character. No trace of her biography is found, save the already noticed facts of her being associated with an adventurous company, most of whom went out from Weymouth into the wilderness,—a company marked for its religious character, (being a majority of the church at W.,) the highly educated and scholarly Rev. Samuel Newman being in some respects the Leader of the enterprise.—Her christian name and that of her husband, are never given. In the early records of the town, she has invariably the touching, sorrowful title of Widow, suggesting the history of blighted hopes, and a grief-stricken heart. Perhaps she had one to protect and cherish her when she left her native land,—and burying him in the sea came here alone,—or perhaps together, they had reached these shores, and were struggling in mutual help and loyalty to bear the toils, trials and perils incident to the settlement of a new country, when death snatched him from her fellowship. But the more probable supposition is, that becoming a widow in England, she emigrated, perhaps with her younger son Philip, after the coming of James and Sarah. Bereft of counsellor and helper, she would naturally follow her children, and seek the sympathy and aid of her brother, or possibly only her brother-in-law, Mr. John Browne. That

she did not come with them in 1635, and did not appear till 8 y afterward, favors this theory. James and Sarah, as favorites of fir uncle Mr. Browne, and bereft of a father's counsel and support, have been induced by his encouragements, to try their fortunes in the New World, leaving the mother behind with their younger brother, till they should learn how the experiment would issue.-Old enough to be of service, perhaps they were really indentured as "servants to Jo. Browne," and not merely, as a device to escape the pursuivants of the King in their attempt to get out of England. But these are conjectures merely. The interest of Mr. Browne in his nephew and niece, the two young emigrants of 1635, and the fact of their mother the "widow" being associated with Mr. B. in the settlement of Rehoboth, favors the belief that she was his sister, though he might have manifested the same regard, had she been only the sister of his wife. We may however see among the group of pious and brave settlers, not only the godly man who is their religious teacher, but also the form of one, whose sable garments tell us, she is a "Widow." The vision passes quickly before us, and is lost to our sight, awakening sympathy and interest for the woman, who, bereft of the companion of her youth, became a pioneer in founding the church and colony at Rehoboth. She was buried no doubt, in the ancient place of graves in Seekonk, where many of the fathers repose, but no stone marks the spot.

Philip Walker, afterward Deacon, and whose name first appears in 1653, to whom lands were assigned in 1658, and of whom the record commences, soon after her's ceases, was her son. In the description of his lands in the Proprietors' Records, 48th p., he says, "100 pound commons that was Thos. Pitts', 100 that was the Governor's, half a hundred that was my mother's." It is evident therefore that he was the son of "Widow Walker," for had his "mother" not been a widow, the lands would have been described as those of his father, and furthermore, there was no other person of the name in the Rehoboth Company, who could sustain this relation to him.

James Walker appears in the list of those in 1643 giving in the value of their estates. His name is next to that of the "Widow," and the amount is £50, but it is subjoined that his share is "now John ffitches." He however forfeited his lots to the town in 1644, in accordance with an order enacted by the proprietors in 1643, that those who did not fence their lands, or remove there with their families, should forfeit their lots. His name however, is mentioned

in one division of lands afterward, viz., that of 1645. It is probable however, that he never removed to Rehoboth, but concluded to remain in Taunton. Mr. John Browne, whose lots were forfeited at the same date with James Walker's, lived in Taunton at the time, and was his "cousin," (uncle.) Thus connected with the "Widow" and Mr. Browne, who was also one of the original Proprietors of Rehoboth, having been the agent of the company, while in Weymouth, and appointed by the Court at Plymouth, to make the purchase of Asameeum the Indian Chief, James Walker very naturally became associated with the settlement. Accordingly neither their names nor that of Mr. Browne is found in the list of the company that went from Weymouth. The strongest reason, however, for concluding he was of "Widow Walker's" family, is found in the fact that when Deacon Philip died in 1679, James was one of the appraisers of his estate. When it is remembered that there was no James Walker in R., at that time, that Rehoboth and Taunton townships were contiguous, and moreover, that James was about 60 years of age, it is beyond a reasonable doubt that he was not only nearly related to Philip, but was his brother, and accordingly was the son of "Widow Walker."

If we may judge of her worth from the virtues of her sons, and infer that they inherited the spirit and piety of their Pilgrim mother, and that her fidelity entitled her to use the language of the Roman matron respecting the Gracchi, "These are my jewels," then was she a compeer worthy to be associated with the pious and distinguished Mr. Newman and the useful Mr. Browne, leaders in the Rehoboth settlement.

And as "the glory of the fathers is their children," her name is not unhonored, and her character and worth not without their monument.

It is upon this evidence, which, though fragmentary and circumstantial, is nevertheless conclusive, that

"WIDOW WALKER"

is placed at the head of the Taunton Family, and in respect to them, as well as the more numerous and widely scattered family of Rehoboth, must be honored as

"THE MOTHER OF US ALL."

CHILDREN OF WIDOW WALKER¹ [1] of Rehoboth.

2. JAMES WALKER,² (5)

OF TAUNTON, MASS.

Son of —— Walker and his wife, —— afterward called "Widow Walker" of Rehoboth, was born in England in 1619 or '20. All efforts to discover his birthplace, and learn from which branch of the numerous race of Walkers he sprung, have proved fruitless. Nor can the time of his emigration to this country, be determined with absolute certainty. The following fact from "Gleanings for New England History by Hon. James Savage, from a Manuscript vol. at the Augmentation office," England, which are published in the Collections of the Mass. Historical Society, 8th vol., 3d series, will at least furnish ground for a conjecture, if not, in connection with contemporaneous facts, for a conclusion, which leaves no room for a reasonable doubt. The record is thus:

On a following page is added:

17th Apr. for New England in Elizabeth, Wm. Stagg, master, 28 more, among whom Jo. Browne, 40 yrs.

That this was the James Walker who settled at Taunton is confirmed by the following facts:

In all the town histories of the Plymouth and Massachusetts Colonies, and the Probate Records, which have been thoroughly examined, there is no trace of any other James Walker, previous to the year 1655.† It is the single instance of the name. And in respect to his birth and age, there is only a variation of one year, between the statement just given, and the age and date upon the grave stone still standing in the Walker Burial Place in South Taunton. And this is a slight discrepancy, and may have arisen from a mistake in the original English record, or in Mr. Savage's transcription of it, or which is more probable still, from an error in the inscription upon the grave stone, either by the failure in memory of those who reared it, (perhaps at some considerable time after his death) or by the mistake of the stone cutter in putting 73 for his age instead of 72. Grave stones are proverbially uncertain in respect to dates. It is no infrequent thing to find such variations.

Besides this, William was in Hingham in 1636, the year after their embarkation from London, and had a lot assigned him, and his name is in the list of the inhabitants and proprietors of that year. And it is a well known fact, that many of the first settlers of Taunton were from Hingham and Scituate. And it is not improbable, that the ship Elizabeth landed her passengers at H. or somewhere on the South Shore.

Richard Walker was the son of Richard of Lynn or Saugus, who came before him. His age at his death, concurs with his age given in Mr. Savage's Gleanings, and with his birth in 1611, as given by Lewis in Hist. of Lynn, published before Mr. Savage made his researches in England. But another fact, which contributes to change what otherwise might be a conjecture, into a firm conviction, is, that James Walker was the brother-in-law* of John Tisdill, and

as it is known that James Walker married Elizabeth Philips, this relationship could have been, only by John Tisdill's marriage with James Walker's sister. And as John Tisdill's wife was named Sarah, and James Walker, his brother-in-law, had a sister Sarah Walker, it is unquestionable, that Mrs. Tisdill was the "Sarra Walker 17 yrs. of the Elizabeth from London," and that we have in Mr. Savage's Gleanings an account of the Embarkation of the Taunton and Hingham (afterward Eastham) Walkers.

If it be said that there is nothing about Widow and Philip Walker in these Gleanings, it may be answered, that possibly she and the younger son, as Philip was, may have come afterward, for it was not unusual then, any more than now, for members of the same family to come at different times, and the fact of Richard of Lynn, though only a young man, coming several years after his father, corroborates the theory. The obvious conclusion then, in respect to the relationship existing between the four is, that James and Sarra were brother and sister, and that they were all near kindred; perhaps the two mentioned first, Richard and William, were cousins of the others, and also of each other. Emigrants at the same time and in the same ship, it is probable that they came from the same district in England. Richard went to Lynn where his father had settled, William to Eastham, and James and Sarra to Taunton, with Mr. John Browne, their guardian and uncle.

James first appears in Taunton in 1643; his name being included in the list of those in T. between the age of 16 and 60 able to bear arms.* He also gave in the value of his estate with the first settlers of Rehoboth in 1643, for a share in the division of lands. But the fact that the next year, his lands were forfeited to the town, together with Mr. John Browne's, then of Taunton, his cousin, (or if as used anciently his uncle,) either because he did not according to a previous order fence them, or did not remove there, (the latter probably,) will account for his early disappearance from the list of the inhabitants and proprietors of Rehoboth. Only one other notice of the said James of Rehoboth is found, viz: in the division of land, made in the year 1645. The absence of his name, therefore, is explained most naturally by the supposition, that he never became a settler there, and not that there was a different James from the one in Taunton, who may have died in 1645 or just after.

And as James Walker was one of the appraisers of the estate of Philip Walker of Rehoboth, in 1679, and there was no James at that period in R., it is reasonable to infer that James of Taunton, was the James mentioned in the first Rehoboth divisions of land, and surviving Philip, helped appraise his estate. His mother and Mr. John Browne his uncle being interested in the enterprise, he doubtless contemplated settling there, yet concluded to remain in T. where he became very useful and highly honored. (See sketch of Widow Walker.) As he was married just at this time, to Miss Philips of T., we may guess that love had stronger influence than lands, and over-ruled his purpose to settle in Rehoboth, securing his active services and wise counsels through a long life, to the town of Taunton. It deserves to be noticed in this connection, as showing the intercourse between the families of the two towns, that James Walker Jr., married Bathsheba, daughter of Gilbert Brooks of Rehoboth, a pious, worthy and somewhat prominent man.

There is also another fact to corroborate this theory. In Dec. 1644, "It was ordered (in Rehoboth) that no man's lands be recorded till he be an inhabitant among us," or receive a certificate, that lands are butted and bounded, and in the allotments ordered to be recorded in March 28, 1645, his name does not appear with Widow Walker's. Though it is true that in April following, he is mentioned as one of those who drew lots for lands on the Great Plain, there is not a single record of his lands in the Proprietors' Books, and hence it is an inevitable conclusion, that he did not become an inhabitant of Rehoboth. Had he done so, there would have been a record of the boundaries of the lands which fell to him in the division, and then the record of the transfer. There was a James Walker who drew lots in the divisions of 1643 and 5, and who yet had no lands recorded and described. There was, at that time, a James Walker in Taunton, the adjoining town, at that time, and there is no trace of another any where in New England.

It would be a remarkable coincidence, were there another James so nearly of the same age, who had a sister Sarah, a guardian or patron, John Browne, (that was his uncle also,) and until such a James has been found, with whose life these circumstances will concur, it may be claimed, that we have the record of the English origin and advent to this country, of the first male ancestor of the Taunton Walkers.*

James Walker was propounded to take up his freedom 6th June, 1649, and admitted a freeman 4th June, 1650. He married Elizabeth Philips, daughter of William Philips and wife Elizabeth (Parker,) sister of William and John Parker, ancient and leading men of Taunton. She died Aug. 14th, 1678, aged 59, (according to grave stone,) July 8th, (Prop. Rec.) and July 30th, (Plymouth Rec.)* They had five children who survived them, viz: James, Peter, Eleazer, Hester, and Deborah. Probably there were others who died early, as, in 1659, before the birth of Deborah, he had "eight heads" in his family. He married 2d, Sarah Rew, Nov. 4th, 1678, widow of Edward Rew, one of the ancient settlers and proprietors of T., who died July 16th, 1678. She was a daughter of John Richmond of Taunton. James Walker died Feb. 15th, 1691, aged 73, which date regarded as 1691-2, makes his age in 1635, 16 instead of 15, as given in Savage's Gleanings.† He and his w. Elizabeth were buried in the Walker grave yard on the bank of the Taunton River, in the South part of the town. Her grave stone has an earlier date by 8 years than any in the town. He lived near the ancient meeting house and on the "highway that goeth from James Walker Sen., to the Great Plain on the northerly end." He was an extensive landholder and a partner in the Iron Works and the Saw Mill.‡

The following are the notices of him in the ancient records. In Oct. 4th, 1648, Jas. Walker of Taunton, informing against William

[&]quot;To all Christian People, before whom these presents shall come, James Walker Senior of Taunton, sendeth Greeting. Know ye that the said James Walker for and in consideration of the lone he beareth unto his son, Petter Walker of Taunton, abouesaid, doeth by this deed of guift vnto his said son, Petter Walker, freely and fully guie, make over from me, the said James Walker, my heirs and executors and assignes, to him, my abouesaid son, Petter Walker, and to his heirs, successors and assignes for cuer, these particular parcels of Land following, lying, scittuate and being within the Townshipt of Taunton aforesaid.

Imprimis, a lott of land lying on the Westerly side of Taunton, Great River, (see called,) at a place called the pond, which was formerly Thomas Gilbert's, containing by estimation twenty acres, be it more or less, to which joins two lotts more of fourteen acres or thereabouts, all footing on the said great Riuer and headed by the highway, and bounded on the Northerly side by the land of Nathaniel French, and on the Southerly side by the land of Samuel Sheepard, alsoe more ninety and nine acres of land joyning to the Lower fales of the three mile riuer, (see called,) and see extending to the highway that lyeth on the heads of the Lott above mentioned, &c."

Hedggis for yt the ad Hedggis, knowing of one yt that had traded shote vnto the Indians, and refusing to declare who it is, by sommons sent vnto him is required to apeer at the next General Court; acordingly hee did and was cleared. (Plym. Court Orders, 2d vol. 135th p.)

In reference vnto a controuersy betwixt Willam Hailstone and James Walker, which hath bine of long standing, relateing to an award made by Mr. John Wiswall, Mr. Richard Callicott and Capt. James Johnson, concerning and for the issueing of some difference betwixt the said pties., they, the said Willam Hailstone and James Walker, referring the case for a finall issue to the determination of the Court, having heard their please on both sydes, and pused all such writings that were produced relateing thervnto, doe determine and conclude as followeth, viz.: that forasmuch as that it appears vpon examination that the said James Walker hath not pformed the latter pte of the said arbetration, viz.: to repaire the said Hailstone, his reputation in the church, and to make a returne therof vnto the said arbetrators, which hee neglected to doe, the Court doe therfore order that hee shall pay or cause to be payed vnto the said Hailstone, the sume of fiue pounds, in either good merchantable porke or good barr iron, betwixt this date and the fifteenth day of October next, att prise then current; and wheras the said James Walker did openly and vnaduisedly, on a Lord's day, accuse the said Willam Hailstone of telling seueral palpable lyes, and founded vpon a lye, whereby the said Hailstone was much scandalised. This Court doth hereby aduise the said James Walker, publickly to acknowlidge the wronge hee hath done him, in the meeting, on the Lord's day, in the congregation; and this our award and joynt determination to be a full and finall issue of all such differences and controuersyes as relate vnto the pmises. July 1st, 1672.

Homer seems to have nodded here. The good man fell into sin if we may judge from the record, and like Moses, "spake unadvisedly with his lips!"*

This "son Petter Walker," thus owned lands and lived in that section of the town lying in the angle formed by the Taunton Great and the Three Mile rivers. There his descendants have lived till the present time.

^{*}Perhaps, however, judgment was rendered against him in this instance on the principle that "the greater the truth, the greater the libel." This William Hailstone was far from blameless He was fined £15 for breach of contract with Jonathan Briggs, and 20 shillings for telling 2 lyes in a petition to General Court in 1656.

Apr. 7th, 1664. Willam Witherell acknowlidgeth to owe to our sou lord the Kinge, the sume of £20; Hezekiah Hore £10; Gyles Gilbert, £20; Gorg Watson, £10.

The cause of the bonds aboue written is, that wheras James Walker, being a p'tnor in the saw mill att Taunton, complained of great hurt done to the said saw mill, by som psons that came in the night in a fellonious manor and stole away seueral things, and did great spoile, and left a libellous paper behind them; and it being suspected that the aboue bounden Willam Witherell and Gyles Gilbert, were the psons, or some of them, that haue done the said mischiffe, they, the said Willam Witherell and Gyles Gilbert, being sumoned, appeered att Plymouth, before the Gou. and Captaine Southworth, on the day and yeare first aboue written, and being examined, it appeered that they were guilty in the aforesaid pticulars, and therfore the said majestrates saw cause to take the said bonds of them for their good behauior, &c.,, Court Orders, vol. 4th, 5, 6, & 7, pp.

May 3, 1664. Josepth Gray and Samuell Linkorn were arraigned for being ptenors in doeing great hurt to the saw mill att Taunton, &c., "and being examined about the pmises, owned that they were guilty therin" and were put under bonds, together with Gorg Watson and Thomas Leanard. Then follows this order of the Court.

Wheras, att this Court, the aboue bounden Josepth Gray and Samuell Linkorne, together with Georg Watson, complained of great wrong, sustained, not onely by them, but by the whole towne of Taunton, by James Walker, his neglecting, according to engagement, to leaue a sufficient passage for the herrings or alewiues to goe up in the river on which the saw mill standeth, the Court directeth an order to the constable of Taunton, to require him to signify vnto the said James Walker, that hee speedily take course, that a free passage bee left for the goeing up of the alewiues in the said river, whiles yett some pte of the season remaines of their goeing vpp.

8th June, 1664, Court ordered.

In reference to the complaint of sundry of the inhabitants of the towne of Taunton against James Walker and others, for the restraining of the alewiues from goeing vp according to there vsual manor, by reason of a saw mill on thire herring river, by which obstruction of the said fish, the said towne hath, and is in danger to suffer much damage, this Court hath ordered, that betwixt this date and the next season of the fishes goeing vp, they, the said owners of the mill, shall make or cause to λ made, afree, full and sufficient passage for the goe-

ing vp of the said fish, or otherwise vpon the further complaint of the towne, the Court will take an effectuall course that the same shall bee done.

Att this Court, Willam Witherell, Mr. Gyles Gilbert, Josephth Gray and Samuell Linkhorne were sentanced by the Court to pay each a fine of twenty shillings for an abuse done to a Saw Mill at Taunton, belonging to James Walker and others, by coming in the night and breaking downe some pte of the said mill, and found takeing away seuerall thinges from the same.

George Watson, Gyles Gilbert and William Witherley complained against James Walker, Robert Crossman, John Maycomber and Nicholas White, in an action of tresspass on the case, to the damage of an hundred pounds, for hindering the fish for haueing a convenient passage vp and downe the Mill River, att Taunton, by the worke about the saw mill, contrary to the inhabitants of the towne of Taunton, and contrary to the promise of the said James Walker, all of which hath bine great damage to the complainants and others.

Tried att Generall Court held att Plymouth, 31 Oct., 1666.

The jury find for the plaintiffes, that a sufficient passage be made by the defendants att the Mill River, att Taunton, for the fish where they vsually goe vp and downe, where the saw mill or dam now erected is an anoyance to the said fish, the expence of time, and the cost of the suite.*

In 1671 James Walker was fined £1 for breaking an order about a stray horse.

We pass now to more honorable notices.

In 1651, he was on the inquest respecting the death of William England, aged 10 years, seruant to Joseph Wilbor of Taunton. The next morning being the Lord's Day, hee with divers others, sought on the river for him and found him not; but James Walker and Richard Burt passing vp the river, towards meeting, found the said William floating on the water, who made it known, and caused him to be taken vp. Col. Rec. vol. 2.

In 1663, Richard Williams, Walter Dean, James Wyatt and James Walker, made over land to Rev. Geo. Shove, minister of Taunton, house and land 10 acres, bounded &c.,—which they bought of Elizabeth Philips. This was given "for the use of the ministry."

^{*}The people of Taunton have ever since been very ready to complain of any damage to "thire herring river," but in 200 years, manufacturing enterprise has conquered, and mill owners now, have less trouble than James Walker.

The Court alloweth vnto James Walker, towards his paines, the charge and trouble hee hath been att about Jonathan Briggs, in the controuersye betwixt Willam Hailstone and the said Briggs, the summe of twenty shillings, conceiueing that the said Briggs ought to satisfy the said James Walker further, what is meet in the above said respect, att least to make it vp forty shillings. March 2, 1657–8.

June 1, 1658. This is to certify all whom it may concerne, that all that was required vpon the arbetration betwixt James Walker and Willam Hailstone is pformed by the said James Walker.

"The countrye's stocke of powder and shott was distributed in different towns for safety and use." Taunton's portion.

"It. to James Walker, att Taunton, one barrell of powder and the other halfe of the cake of lead." 1658, 2 Oct. "James Walker and William Harvey, were appointed by the Court, to review, in the countrys behalf, the public whipping of William Paule, Katheren Aines and her husband." 1656–7.

The several towns were required to send each, one man as deputy to the Court, and to envest them with full power in their behalfe, to treat and conclude about leting of the trad, att Kennebecke; James Walker was chosen the deputy of Taunton, Oct. 1659.

March 4, 1661–2, James Walker was authorised by the Court to adminnister an oth, as occation shall require, att Taunton, as alsoe, to marry psons, as occation shall require, vntil the next June Court. This order was c x. att June 9th, 1662, soe that the said James Walker is to giue oath and marry, as above said. On the margin opposite the above order, it is stated. "The Court doeth order, James Walker, to sellebrate marriage in the towne of Taunton, vntell June, 1684."

Oct. 3, 1662. The oath of Jonathan Briggs, taken before this Court, is as followeth;—I, Jonathan Briggs, aged twenty-fine years, or therabouts, doe testify, that about 6 yeares agone, as I was in the house of James Walker, of Taunton, I heard James Walker aske Willam Browne, what hee would doe with his land, if hee should not returne from England againe. Willam Browne answared, that if hee did not returne againe, then hee would give all his land to his little cousen, which was Peter Walker, whoe then stood before him.

8 June, 1664. James Walker and Frances Smith were "the psons, (in Taunton,) nominated to take vp the excise—whoe are likewise to take notice of what liquors, &c., are brought into the Gou'ment."

July 2, 1667. The Court haue graunted vnto some ancient freemen liueing in Taunton, viz., James Walker, (and 7 others,) some supplyes of land, vpon the west syde of Taunton Riuer—or some other place, if it may be obtained."

1668. He was one of the six original proprietors of Assonet Neck.

- 1670. He and William Harvey were appointed to "look after the minister's rate," also, "to examine Jane Holloway, in regard to Samuel Holloway's appeal for a divorce, from his said wife, Jane."
- 1671. He was one of the Committee "to have inspection of the ordinary, or in any other places suspected; to take notice of such abuses as may arise, in reference to the pmises, or otherwise, and to make oath therof to the Court." This was an order "for prevention of great abuse by excessive drinking of liquors in ordinaries."

1671, 23 August.

- 1. The councell of warr, haueing seriously considered of the case, in reference to the Phillipe, the cheife sachem of Pacanacutt, hee having neglected, to answare his engagement, to bringe in his armes att the day appointed, and alsoe in his not coming in to give the reason thereof, being required thervnto, and his vnkind carriages towards vs, as otherwise, &c., &c., &c.
- 2. It is unanimously agreed and concluded by the said councell, that wee are nessesarily called to cause the said sachem, to make his psonall appearance, to make his purgation in reference to the pmises; &c., &c.

Accordingly pers were despatched and sent from the councell, one vnto the said Phillip, the said sachem to require his psonall appearance att Plymouth, in the 13th day of September next, in reference to the pticulares aboue mencioned against him; this letter was sent by Mr. James Walker, one of the councell, and hee was ordered to request the companie of Mr. Roger Williams and Mr. James Browne, to goe with him att the deliuery of the said letter. (Plym. Col. Rec. vol. 5th.) (See 16th p.)

1671-2, 5 March.

James Walker and John Richmond are authorised by the Court to purchase the land of the Indians, in the behalfe of the towne of Taunton, lying on the west syde of Taunton River, from the Three Mile River, downe to a place called the Store House. (vol. 5, 88th p.)

They were the Com. of town of Taunton, to settle the disputed boundary between Swansey and T.

1675-6, March 10.

Wheras, the Court for the incurragement of the souldiers, sent forth on the first expedition against the Indians, did order and engage, according to theire desire, that they should have theire pay in money or lands, and noe way att psent appearing to raise monyes, doe therfore, for theire satisfaction order, that certaine tracts of land be assigned, to the vallue of about one thousand pounds, to be deuided amongst them, for the payment of theire respective ptes due vnto them;—and for the better effecting thereof, the Treasurer, Major Cudworth, Cornett Studson and James Walker are desired and appointed to take view therof, and make reporte therof, to the Court or Councell, for the settleing of the same, at such reasonable rates, as to them shall seeme meet, to be deuided to the said souldiers, or sold for theire pay, or discharge of other nessarie dues, occationed by this warr. Col. Rec. vol. 5, 191st p.

The order and distribution of this collonies pte of the contribution, made by divers Christians, in Ireland, for the relieffe of such as are impouerished, destressed, and in nessestie by the late Indian warr, was as it respects this collonie, proportioned as followeth:

WILLAM HARVEY, JAMES WALKER, JOHN RICHMOND. appointed to distribute the portion allotted to Taunton.

March 6, 1656-7. Col. Rec. vol. 5, 222d p.

James Wilbore and
Encrease Robinson, as are brought in disorderly unto
the toune of Taunton, and to make seisure theroffe, according to order.

1678, Oct. 30. Col. Rec. vol. 5, 271st p.

James Walker was one of a Com. "to lease out some of the lands of Leiftenant Wyatt, for the relieffe of Mistris Mary Wyatt, of Taunton, his widdow, and in great necessitie." 1678, 30 Oct.

In 1683-4, James Walker and John Richmond were the Com. in behalf of inhabitants of Taunton, to purchase a tract of land of the Indians.

He served as juryman, and on the Grand Inquest repeatedly. He was constable in 1652; surveyor, 1672; one of the "Celect men," 1666, 7, 8, 9, 70, 8, 9 and 80,—8 years.

He was elected deputy to the Plymouth Court, 16 years, viz.: 1654, 7, 8, 9, 60, 1, 3, 6, 7, 8, 9, 70, 1, 6, 7, 9.

He was a member of the Com. (composed of 10 of the leading citizens in the Colony,) to take the Treasurer's account in 1664, 7, 8 and 70.

He was a Member and Chairman of the Town "Councell of Warr," 1667, 75 & 8. These Councils were elected in time of war, and the most efficient men of the towns were appointed, as in Plymouth, the Gov. Capt. Bradford, in Rehoboth, Capt. Willett. He was also one of the "Councell of Warr," for Plymouth Colony, in 1658, 61, 71, 81, and associated with its most energetic and sagacious men. In 1681, the Council consisted of Capt. Nathaniel Thomas, Capt. Josiah Standish, Capt. Jonathan Sparrow, Lieut. Joseph Laythorpe, Lieut. Eph'm Morton, Lieut. John Thacher, Ensign Mark Eames, Cornet Rob't Studson, Sec'y Nath'l Morton, Mr. James Walker.

In the division of lands in 1659, his rate is £1, 5s., 7d., and 8 heads. Ninety six acres were assigned him.

He was also one of the committee of five, to revise town records of lands.

"In 1669, 51 acres over the great river, at head of the great Meadows, also 3 acres on this side, (that is West,) of river, little beyond Edward Rew's Saw pit," were assigned him. (Prop. Rec.)

In the Proprietor's Records, there is also a record of the names of the persons who gave lands to Capt. Batholomew Tipping, as remuneration in full, for the house and land he sold to Rev. Mr. Danforth, in 1687. It is as follows:

James Walker, 10 acres.
Peter Walker, (son of James,) 10 acres.

Then follow the names of 19 others, 15 of whom gave 5 acres each, one 6 acres, one 4, and two, 10 each.

In vol. 6th, 1st series of the Collections of the Mass. Historical Society, there is allusion to a letter of James Walker, of Taunton, dated Jan. 1676, written to Gov. Winslow, (in reply to one of his,) giving an account of the suffering and the loss of life by Indian depredations, in Philip's War, and also the names of the sufferers.

This letter is lost; and it is a loss greatly to be deplored, as such a letter from an intelligent observer, would give us a vivid conception of those perilous and barbarous times, when our ancestors, few, and grouped in small and scattered settlements in the wilderness, had to struggle with the banded natives, bent on the extermination of the pale faces from the land, they thought their own heritage, guided and inspired too, by the patriotism and bravery of the able and renowned chieftain, King Philip.

Even the list of those who fell or suffered, would be invaluable now, and furnish a thrilling chapter in the domestic and social history of the early colonists—a tearful record of graves and griefs, of fortitude and faith, of terror and triumph.*

We are more fortunate however, in respect to a letter he wrote to Gov. Prince, for though the original may be lost, we have its contents published, in the 6th vol. of Mass. Hist. Col. 197th p. The letter is as follows:

Much Honored Sir:

After my humble respects presented to you, these are to acquaint you with Philip's answer to your letter. My sons being visited with the ague, forced me to procure brother Harveyt to go over to cousin James Browne with the letter, who sent for Mr. Williams to interpret. Mr. Williams, not being well, came not till afterward; yet cousin James and brother Harvey went down to Mount Hope; and the dance being broken up, Philip, and the most of his chief men, were much in drink; only Acumponin and Tom Sancsink were sober; so that Philip could not give them any answer. Only there passed some words betwixt Philip and cousin James, and Philip struck off cousin James Browne's hat. The day following, they went again to Philip, and Mr. Williams with them. The letter being read, and Philip caused fully to understand it, they could get no positive answer about Philip's coming to Plymouth, because Mr. Eliot had sent for him to Boston, and he looked for another messenger that day; which messenger they met about 2 miles from Philip's house; which messenger told them that his message was to desire Philip to be at Punkapoge, the last day of this week, and at Boston, the Tuesday following. Philip and Tom exclaimed much against Sawsiman, for reporting that any of the Narragansett sachems were there; Not further to trouble you, but rest, desiring the good Lord to be with you, and guide you, in all your weighty affairs.

^{*}King Philip's summer residence was in Taunton, (now Raynham,) near the Iron Works.

[†] Was he a "brother" by marriage, or only a "brother" in the church? Perhaps there was another and younger sister, than Sarah, who came with the "Widow" and Philip. The mention of "cousin James Browne," in connection with "brother Harvey," favors this supposition, but Mr. John Browne's remembrance of James and Sarah only, in the gift of his house in Taunton, suggests a doubt, which is strengthened by the record, "Wm. Harvey m. Joane Hucker of Taunton, April 2, 1639." May not "Hucker" be a clerical error for Walker?

"Yours to serve," the unique form with which he concludes his letter to Gov. Prince, is singularly appropriate and in keeping with his life. When a youth of 15 years, he was "servant to John Browne." In mature manhood, he was the "servant" of the Colony, employed in various civil offices and trusts, through a long series of years.

He had no military title, no hereditary arms, but the numerous services assigned him, and the positions of responsibility and confidence which he filled, justify us in awarding him the title of "servant of the church" and the State.

From the records now given, we conceive of him as a man of more than ordinary intelligence, judicious in counsel, energetic in action, steadfast in integrity, sagacious, public spirited, benevolent and alive to the secular and religious prosperity of the Colony. Surpassed by none of the town in his contributions for the ministry, and in the number and continuance of civil trusts, he needed no heraldic distinctions, and he transmitted none. Worthy of remembrance and honor by those of his name and lineage, yet he is an honor to them, only as they strive to emulate his usefulness, and reproduce his virtues and his piety.

3. SARAH WALKER,

OF TAUNTON, MASS.

Born in England in 1618, died Dec. 1676. She married John Tisdall, of Duxbury.

It is recorded that John Tisdall entered against Stephen Hopkins, Assistant of the Gov't, an action for Battery, by which he was dangerously wounded. 1636. S. H. was fined £5 and costs. Also, "John Tisdall, upon the good report of him and of his good carryage, is allowed to keepe house and plant for himself, provided he so continue his carryage still. 1638." Is it not probable that he had been recently married?

He did not altogether "continue his carryage," for Dec. 6, 1653, he was fined 20 shil., for "unfaithfulness in prizing and exchanging a cow," of Mrs. Bryant's. (Plym. Col. Rec. vol. 3, 42d p.)

He settled first in Duxbury, about 1636, and removed to Taunton, before Dec. 6, 1653. He was constable in T. 1659, one of the proprietors of Taunton No. Purchase 1668, Selectman and Deputy to Plym. Court 1774. Besides lands in Taunton, he owned a farm near Assonet. He took an active part in the affairs of the town, and was murdered by the Indians, June 27, 1675. In'y, £150. Nothing is known of his origin, nor of the date of his arrival in the Old Colony. He has not had very numerous descendants, yet all the Tisdalls, of American birth, are of his lineage. The professional men among his descendants have been Elkanah, a lawyer, and Nathan, 1732-1787, called "Old Master Tisdale," the eminent classical teacher of the time, by whom, during about 40 years, a large number of the distinguished men of the country were instructed. (See his Epitaph, Gen. Reg. 1858, 62d p.) Both of Lebanon, Ct. Dr. Tisdall, of Norwich, Ct., and Rev. James, lately of Shutesbury, (son of James, of West Taunton.) Samuel T., Esq., an intelligent and successful merchant in N. Y. City, 7th generation from John, has a genealogy of the Tisdalls in manuscript.

John Tisdall and wife Sarah Walker had 8 chil., viz.,

U. 1821, studied Theology with Rev. A. Cobb, West Taunton, ord. Sept. 29, 1830, over the churches in Guildhall and Granby, Vt., dismissed May 4, 1836, preached 4 years in Dublin and 7 years in Gilsum, N. H., and after Oct. 1851, in Shutesbury, Mass. He m. Oct. 5, 1831, Margaretta C. Tubbs of W. T.

5. I. James,³ (10) b. 1645-6, d. June 22, 1718, ae. 72 yrs.

He m. Dec. 23, 1673, Bathsheba Brooks, dau. of Gilbert, of Rehoboth. She was b. 1655, and d. Feb. 24, 1738, in 85th yr. (Ins.) Will was proved, April, 17, 1739. He was constable in T. in 1689, and admitted to freedom in 1689. He had 50 acres of land laid out for him, near Wm. Hacks' line. The lot began at So. Purchase line, and run north, 2 points. (Prop. Rec.)

In 1697, there was a graunt to him of "50 acres on the west syde of Three Mile river, below the brook that runs into it, below John Hodges' lot."

He lived at the Weir, in Taunton, where Col. Israel Dean, late of T., lived, and where the road from the Weir, to Dighton, leaves the river and turns west, towards the Presbrey brook.

It is conjectured, that the following graunt refers to this James, because the father would have been called Mr. James Walker.

"Libertie is graunted by the Court, vnto James Walker, of Taunton, to keep an ordinary att Taunton, and for that end, that hee be prouided of all necessaries for that purpose, and that he keep good order in his house, that, soe no damage may acrew vnto any, respecting the pmises." 1679, Plym. Col. Rec. vol. 6, 15th p.

In his will, proved Sept. 1, 1718, bequests are made to wife, 6 sons and 5 daus. These indicate the places where the sons lived, viz.: "To James, eldest son, 50 acres, where he lives. To 2d son, Nathan, land in Taunton, So. Purchase. To 3d son, David, 2 lower lotts, in Dighton, where he now dwells. To 4th son, Nehemiah, my new dwelling house, in T., and my home lott, and barn thereon, and my lott lying by Jas. Burt's, in T., and my land over the Creek,—and 50 acres lying on the three mile river, at a place called the narrow passage. To 5th son, Josiah, 3 upper lotts, in Dighton."

6. II. Peter,³ (21) b. 1649, d. April 4, 1711, ac. 60. (Ins.) [62?]

He m. Hannah, who d. Jan. 15, 1704, ac. 44 yrs. (Ins.) Nothing more is known of her. He was an iron dealer, in company with Hon. James Philips. He was appointed with Joseph and Samuel Richmond, to lay out "the highway from Bayting Brook, to Assonet."

His will proved July 2, 1711, gives names of 3 sons and 3 daus. He made a bequest, also, "to Thomas Elyot, who did live with me 6 yrs.," viz.: "6 acres joining the land of my brother James, where said Elyot now dwelleth," (See No. 16.) His Inventory £751, includes "homestead, with housing, orchard, with little island joining, to Nicholas Stephen's, his mill, with all the land belonging to the farm, being 400 acres." This "little island" is in the centre of No. Dighton village, and is now the site of an old foundry. There were his Iron Works, which in later years went by the name of Baylies' Forge, and were on the site of the present Paper mill. By a "deed of guift," in 1688, from James Walker, Sen., "to his son Petter Walker," and other grants, he became an extensive land holder, in the Southern part of Taunton, between and on the Taunton Great and Three Mile rivers, and especially on the latter, at what is now the North Dighton village. In the Proprietors' Rec. we find that Peter Walker had "84 acres laid out near James Walker and Wm. Hack, near the lower powers on the country road to Three Mile river." There was also a grant in 1697, to Peter, of "40 acres, in the low country, between his lands and Jas. Walker's." He also owned land near the meeting house, and on the Mill river, near where his father lived. But his homestead was in the South part of the town, and his dwelling, remodelled 60 yrs. ago, is the 1st house north of Three Mile River, on the road from Taunton to Dighton Four Corners. A portion of his estate, half a mile north has been held by him, and his descendants 175 yrs., and is now owned and occupied by Edward Walker, [See No. 233,] and there is scarcely room for a doubt, that this is a part of the grants, to James, Sen., which, in this section of the town, became almost wholly, the portion of his "son Petter." We are sure, that it was Peter's, either by grant to him, or by inheritance, and as it included when it was bequeathed to his sons, in 1711, the ancient cemetery of the Walker Family and kindred, where his mother and father were buried, in 1678 & 91, we feel confident, it was a part of the lands of James Walker, Sen., and by transmission in the name over 200 years, is the ancestral Farm of the family.

She m. Feb. 9, 1685-6, in Dighton, George Goodwin, of Somersetshire, England. He settled in Taunton, South Purchase, afterward, D. in 1677-8, and is the father of the Gooding Family. The record of his birth has been found in the Parish of North Petherton, Somersetshire, by Alanson Gooding, Esq., of New Bedford. He was 3d son of Matthew, who was yeoman, and who had 4 sons and 1 dau. viz.: Thomas, Matthew, George, Richard, and Johannah. He d. in D. 1712, ac. 79 yrs. Tradition says she was about 18 yrs. of age at her marriage, and he was over 50 yrs. Her name is not mentioned in her father's will, but the following leaves no doubt that there was such a dau. It is a copy of a note, at the foot of a very old deed in parchment, in possession of A. Gooding, Esq., of New Bedford. "This is to declare, that my father-in-law, James Walker, gave me the money, that bought the land mentioned in the deed, for which I humbly thank him," Geo. Gooding.

This gift of money will account for the omission of her name, in her father's will. Her will was proved, May 16, 1726. Tradition gives names of 4 chil., the same as those in her will, viz.:

CHILDREN OF PETER WALKER,3 [6] OF TAUNTON.

21. I. Peter, 4 (53) b. 1690, d. Jan. 7, 1770, in 81st year.

He m. Sarah* who d. Nov. 22, 1760, in 72d yr. His will, made 1767, gives names of 6 chil. He lived till 1747, at the Mansion House, called the Holloway Place afterward, the last house in Taunton, on the Bristol road, and first north of the Three Mile river, and now owned by Stephen Pierce.

II. EDWARD, 4 b. 1692, d. Dec. 9, 1752, in 60th yr. (Ins.) He m. Mercy Richmond, dau. of Edward,3 of Taunton. She d. Jan. 27, 1760, in 67yr. (Ins.) His will shows that he was childless, and its bequests are principally, "to wife Mercy, to Josiah Richmond, my kinsman, who lives with me, my homestead, farm, buildings, &c., where I now dwell, in Taunton, to possess the same after marriage or death of my wife. To my kinsman, Elisha Walker, son of my brother James, deceased, and to Eleazer Walker, grandson of my brother Peter, all the lands in Dighton, excepting 20 acres, given to Josiah Richmond,—and if either Elisha or Eleazer die, without issue, then to Nathan Walker, son of Nathan, and if he die without issue, then to the next of my kin, in the name of the Walkers, and not to go out of the name of the Walkers, to all generations. Will proved, Feb. 6, 1753. His homestead was in the South part of Taunton, East of the Bristol road, & of a mile, and near the Burial Place, which he gave for the use of his kindred, and which has the oldest inscription in the town. It long since passed from the possession of the Richmonds, by their removal to Vermont. He was one of the Select men of Dighton, in 1726. The following is his deed of land for a burial place, copied from Folio 33, 288 p. of Bristol Deeds.

"Edward Walker, of Taunton, to my kinsman, Joseph Atwood, of Dighton, land on Taunton Great river, running north in the range of Mr. Edward Blake's land, and so to said Blake's fence, and is that piece of land, and is at that place, where Joseph Atwood, and many others lie buried, it being about one acre, to have, and to hold, to Joseph Atwood and all relations, that I have, or shall have, to lye forever for a burying place, where I or any of my relations, that shall see cause, may bury their dead, with full power, leave and liberty to pass and repass through any other part of my land, to carry their

dead to said burying place, provided they go where it is most convenient, and least prejudicial to me, or my heirs or assigns, without any molestation from me or my heirs, executors, administrators, forever, reserving wood on it to my heirs, &c.

In witness whereof, I give, and bequeath, said piece of land for a burying place, April 23, 1750. Bounded W. corner, heap of stones, Easterly, to river, to a small black oak with stones about it, then, Northerly, to a white oak tree, in range of Mr. Edward Blake's land, and from W. corner, by a rock N. to said Blake's fence, a rock with stones upon it."

23. III. James, 4 (58) d. 1726.

He m. Nov. 25, 1725, Mary, dau. of David⁴ and Mary (Walker,) of Dighton, (See No. 38,) who was b. Aug. 16, 1704, and d. April 21, 1782, ac. 77 yrs. and 9 mos. In'y £537, Sept. 20, 1726. Division of his estate in 1743, was as follows: "To widow, land from Great river, up over county road, and ½ of cellar and ½ of chamber. To Elisha, only child and son of the deceased, north ½ of cellar, north ½ of chamber, and north room in house and rest of land, about 67 acres."

He was a Brewer in Boston, 1720, but d. in Taunton. His homestead is now in possession of his descendants. She m. 2dly, April 23, 1730, Eben'r Richmond, of Middleboro, afterward, of Taunton, and had large family. (See No. 38.)

24. IV. Abigail.4

25. V. CATHARINE, not of age in 1711.

She and her sister, Abigail, d. before 1753, and without heirs.

26. VI. Hannah, not of age in 1711.

She m. —— Place, and had 3 chil, viz.: Elizabeth, Hannah, and Mary.

She m. 2dly, and was 2d wife, John Atwood, son of Joseph and Esther (Walker.) (See No. 7.) He was b. Feb. 28, 1683, and d. 1764, In'y £134. Owner in Forge and Iron Works. She survived him. Res. Dighton. Chil.—

(1) John, b. May 9, 1735, d. June 27, 1755, in 21st yr. (Ins.) "John Atwood, son of John and Hannah, departed this life in a very surprising manner, being killed by a cart wheel, ac. 20 yrs. 1 mo. 18 days." He was drawing pig iron, and the wheel went over his head.

(2) Susannah, b. April 19, 1737, and d. Oct. 4, 1753, in 17th yr.

CHILDREN OF LIEUT. JAMES WALKER,4 [10] OF TAUNTON.

27. I. James,⁵ (59) b. about 1703, d. Aug. 11, 1761, in 59th yr. He m. July 21, 1761, Mary Pitts, who m. 2dly, Abner Thaver, and living, 1783. His In'y included Mansion House, &c., £2200, (it was west of Three Mile River, and where Geo T. Lee, now lives,) 1 Saw Mill, at Jos. Stephens, in Dighton, 111 little lots, in D., 4 yoke of oxen, 7 cows, and negro man, Cambridge. Amount £3517. He was a man of affluence for the time, and prominent in the affairs of the town. His death was sad and untimely. In digging a well he came to a rock. Thinking that heat would break it, he built a fire upon the rock. Leaving this to burn while he was taking dinner, he returned, and descended the well to see the condition and effect of the fire. But a little before reaching the bottom, he fell, and two others following to rescue him, fell upon him. Water was then poured into the well, and a fourth descended with a rope fastened to him. This he then fastened to the last who fell, and he was taken out, and in this way all were taken from the well. Mr. Walker being the first who fell, was the last taken out, and was then found to be dead. This occurred about a month after his marriage. After his death a son was born, who was named James, in honor of his father, and removed to New York City.

28. II. Peter,⁵ b. 1704, d. Aug. 6, 1762, in 58th yr.

He m. Helen Baylies, sister of Nicholas. Will approved, Aug. 18, 1767, indicates that he had no children. He bequeathed his farm to nephew, Peter, £3 yearly to Rev. John Lyon, for 10 yrs., if he remains minister of St. Thomas' Church,—to his wife, the negro woman Peggy, and her 2 children, and man Cambridge. In'y £300. He lived ½ a mile south of Westville, Taunton, on the road to Mt. Hope Factory, where the late Ebenezer Walker lived. The farm was north of, and adjoined that of his brother James. His widow m. 2dly, Rev. John Lyon.

29. III. ELIAKIM,⁵ (60) b. 1704 or 5, d. Feb. 21,1785, in 81st yr. He m. Mary, who d. Dec. 1785, in 79th yr. Had 6 chil. Res. Taunton. Had a farm of 300 acres, bounded W. by Rehoboth, and S. by Dighton. His valuation was £1555, and his tax on the minister's rate, 1756, was the largest in the town, excepting James Walker's. He was Ensign.

30. IV. ELNATHAN,⁵ (66) d. June 6, 1775, in 69th yr.

He m. Hannah Crossman, (dau. of Robert,) who d. April 4, 1728, in 23d yr. He m. 2dly, Bethiah Tisdale, (dau. of Joseph.) who d. May 11, 1759, in 49th yr. (Ins.) He m. 3dly, Nov. 6, 1760, Mrs. Phebe King, dau. of Dea. Sam'l Leonard, of Raynham. After his death she removed to Middleboro' and lived with her daughter, Phebe King, (who married the Rev. Caleb Turner, Feb. 11, 1763,) where she died, April 3, 1803, in 89th yr.

Col. Walker lived on a farm in the N. W. part of Dighton, adjoining his brother Elakim's, in Taunton. His will was proved, Aug. 5, 1775. In'y, £437. Had 10 chil. He was a Member and a Deacon of the 1st Cong'l Church, in Dighton, and contributed more for the building of the Meeting House, at Buck-plain, than any other person. He was one of the Com. to plan and build it, with David Walker and Geo. Ware. He was moderator of Town Meeting, 1756, '66, '69 to '75, and Selectman, 1764, 5, 6, 8, 9 to '76. He was Representative of the town of Dighton, in the General Court, in the years 1748 and 9, '69, '70, '71, '72, '73 and '74, and probably other yrs. of which there is no record of those who served as representatives, viz.: 1738, 9 '40, 2, 3, 4, and 6. He held a commission of Justice of the Peace, and was Colonel of a Regiment of Militia. He exerted a large influence in public affairs, and was distinguished for high moral worth and exemplary piety.

The following is the epitaph on his grave stone, in the Burial Place, in West Taunton.

Beneath the sacred honors of the tomb, In awful silence, and majestic gloom, The man of mercy, here conceals his head, Amidst the awful mansions of the dead; No more his liberal hand shall help the poor, Relieve the distrest, nor scatter joys no more.

But possessing great mechanical ingenuity, he made spinning wheels for both wool and flax, was an excellent rake maker, and supplied the inhabitants in the new settlements, with various useful articles, such as rakes, chests, drawers, &c. There was scarcely an article that he could not make. He was also remarkably expert with a gun, seldom missing his mark, whether the distance were long or short, and so making havoc among the bears and wolves. He was of a bold, fearless spirit, of fine physical proportions, of noble appearance, and when 87 yrs. of age, walked as erect as men usually do at 30. "I remember" says a grand son, "seeing him run to overtake a team, and with considerable rapidity in his 88th yr." He had 4 chil. His descendants inherit his ingenuity, and many of them have quite a rich vein of wit and humor. As for the morals, character, and intelligence of the members of this branch, all stand fair in the world, not one of them having Walker blood, has ever disgraced the name.

After the death of his father, Mr. W., then about 14 yrs. of age, went to Middleboro', with his mother. He was there apprenticed to a wheelwright. Pursuing this occupation a while, the War commenced, and he was drafted for military service, and went in Sullivan's expedition, to R. I. He was in Capt. Edward Blake's Co., and marched to Tiverton, R. I., Aug. 2, 1780. Returning, he attended school, and studied medicine, with Pentacost Blackington. He then bought the homestead of his father, in Dighton, and removed there, April 4, 1792. In the decease of Mrs. Eppinger, society has lost one of the brightest monitors, to an intellectual and spiritual life. Endowed with remarkable grasp of intellect, her early education was thorough in philological studies, and elegant female accomplishments, while her unceasing thirst for knowledge, added to her attainments, all modern progression in science and literature. Gifted with a retentive memory, and uncommon fluency of diction, it was ever a pleasure to her, to communicate to others, from her ample intellectual stores, in language, unstudied, elegant and appropriate.

Noble and pure minded, her thoughts dwelt only on such subjects as refined human nature. Possessed of warm social instincts, her ready sympathy extended to all with whom she held intercourse, while her society and conversation elevated all around her.

Equally remarkable with her extensive mental attainments, was the extraordinary zeal with which she performed all domestic duties. Energetic and untiring, a faithful wife, a devoted mother, a warm friend, to her servants indulgent and affectionate to an extreme degree, none save those within her immediate circle, could realize her diligence in all that could contribute to the comfort and happiness of those around her, while her unselfish nature ever led her to assume every burden, to relieve others.

Unbounded in her benevolence of heart, she ever considered herself as but a stewardess of the gifts of fortune. Self-denying, in all personal gratification, her ready aid through life was ever extended to the poor and needy. None, save the almoners and recipients of her bounty knew of the countless benefits her charity ever extended; her heart responded to the claim of those less favored to a share of all that she possessed.

Comparing her attainments with the vast field of knowledge in Science and Art, and her spiritual life with the one model, she judged herself with a humility of self appreciation, few could comprehend, who knew her many and diverse gifts.

In her intense love of Nature, her heart breathed forth a constant hymn of gratitude to the Great Author of the Universe. Her appreciation of all that was beautiful, was one of her highest sources of enjoyment, and brightened each moment of her life, departing only with her last breath.

In early life, she dedicated herself to God's service, and having thus diligently walked in His commandments, her last moments were unobscured by a single shadow; no fear, no doubt, or regret visited her beatified soul. Joy and Love and Peace ineffable, filled her heart to overflowing. In the promises of Holy Writ, in the eloquent language of all her familiar poets, and in her own flowing diction, her lips breathed unceasingly, comfort to those to be soon bereaved; and without pain or struggle, her soul passed from peace on earth, to "life in Christ unchangeable."





He enlisted in the Revolutionary struggle, at the age of 17—was in the service, from Aug. 1, to Nov. 1776; in Capt. Haskin's Co., to guard the shore of Freetown, 11 days. On the alarm, Dec. 8, 1776, he went to Slade's Ferry, and was on duty 31 days; to Providence, June 22, '78, 23ds; was on R. I., 1 mo., 13ds, from July 29, '78; to Tiverton, March, '79, 24 days, and was one of the 6 mos. men from July 25, 1780, to Jan 25, '81. He was in the service longer than any one of his company, 34 of whom were from Taunton, and was discharged 200 miles from home. Though serving at various times during the War, he was in no battle. From 1831, he received the pension of \$56,66. He was appointed 1st sergeant of Infantry, in the 5th Division, Sept 15, 1798, and received a Captain's commission, April 20, 1801, which he resigned, April 17, 1805. Having participated in the scenes of the Revolution, he was an ardent patriot, and could not brook the thought of any danger, to the liberties of his country.

Physically, he possessed a remarkable activity and power of endurance, and in youth excelled as a racer, and wrestler. He was high spirited, and had a keen sense of honor and wrong. He could never

stoop to a mean thing, nor suffer his rights to be invaded. He and his wife united with the Cong'l ch. about 1800. Few persons become so familiar with the Scriptures as he was. (The author has never known any one.) The Bible, was for years his library, his study, and the whole seemed to be treasured in his memory, so that in his old age, he was exceedingly entertaining and instructive, in his recital of the history of the Old, and his exposition of the doctrines of the New Testament. It was a beautiful sight, the venerable old man, with his long white locks, and his face glowing with the inspiration of his favorite Book and theme.

He d., not by disease, but of old age. Both he and wife are buried in the orchard, in the rear of his house, he having selected 20 yrs. ago, a family burial place on the ancestral homestead.*

His fitting epitaph is-

The hoary head is a crown of glory, When found in the way of righteousness.

She was a very domestic and amiable woman, and though of slender constitution, was patient, and resolute. Her epitaph is a just estimate of her character—

Behold the Christian's grave; she walked with God, In the same path the dear Redeemer trod; She loved the church, and prayed for its increase, Lived much beloved, and died in perfect peace.

^{*}It was not then known, that the Cemetery on the bank of the Taunton river, is the Family Burial Place of the Walkers. The compiler has since discovered, that their oldest ancestor and his wife were buried there, (1678 and 1692.) and that it is almost wholly occupied by his descendants, and was deeded for that purpose, by Edward Walker, (See Nos. 2 and 22.) Had this been known, there would, undoubtedly, have been no departure from the custom of 150 yrs., nor from the purpose of their kinsman, the grantor, "to all relations that I have, or shall have, to lye for a burying place, forever," where they "may bury their dead."

T., (Rocky Woods,) on the homestead now occupied by his grandson, Mr. Gulliver. In'y \$10,245. He was in Capt. Blake's Co., and went to Tiverton, Aug. 2, 1780, and also served in Capt. Haskin's Co., and Col. Dean's Regiment.

He was one of the petitioners to the Gen. Court, respecting the religious society, in T., in 1790. He was active in the movement in 1792, which separated the ancient church from the Town Parish, and organized a new society in the west part of the town. Their first meeting was held in Dea. Isaac Tubbs' barn. The cause of the separation was the attempt to settle Mr. John Foster, over the old Society. The love of sound doctrine lead these separatists, who comprised all the church excepting 4 persons, to make these sacrifices. Active in the movement, he was willing to devote his money to its maintenance. He is entitled to gratitude for his christian patriotism, on the principle, that "he loveth our nation, for he hath built us a synagogue."

The following is part of the sketch in the History of the Mendon Association, furnished by Rev. A. Cobb, of Taunton and Rev. S. Raymond, of Bridgwater. (See Hist., p. 282.*)

"Mr. W. was a slow, but patient and thorough scholar. In his youth, he was sedate, amiable, and beloved by all in his native place."

"It is related that several persons became at one time somewhat uneasy, under Mr. W.'s ministry, and agitated the subject of his dismission. He promptly responded to the suggestion, and a council was invited to consider the question. An anxious people assembled to await the result. The Moderator opened the Session with a prayer, of peculiar fervor and earnestness, especially praying for the movers of so responsible a step as severing the pastoral relation. The spirit of the prayer awakened new thoughts and feelings in the assembly. At its close, one of the chief agitators requested a delay of the proceedings, and moved before the church, are consideration of the matter

to be presented to the council: which motion was unanimously carried. The council, instead of dismissing the pastor, were invited to stay, and assist him in gathering in the fruits of a most extensive and precious revival, of which God's answer to that prayer was the beginning. The question of his dismission was never afterwards agitated."

In an Obituary in the "Cortland Repository," Homer, N.Y., June 9, 1820, his character, ministry and last days, received the following tribute:—

"In his removal, his bereaved family have lost an amiable and affectionate husband and father, the church and people of H. have lost a faithful and beloved pastor, and the public a real and worthy friend. Mr. W. possessed an assemblage of amiable qualities. He was a man of real politeness and good breeding, frank, mild, and hospitable. His affection for his family appeared sincere and ardent, and he participated largely in the pleasures of d. atic life. His house was a habitation of friendship and peace, open to receive his friends and acquaintances with the greatest cordiality. His mind was formed for society, and he possessed a talent for rendering himself agreeable to those who were favored with his company.

As a Christian, he was diligent and exemplary. Though he was seldom carried out in high religious transports, yet he appeared to maintain a steady and solid hope in Christ, and an habitual peace in believing. He was a "lover of good men, sober, just, holy and temperate," in such a degree as rendered him a real ornament to the religion he professed. He was of a remarkably pacific disposition and excelled in the exercise of meekness, forbearance, and good will towards those who differed from him in religious opinion. Though his own sentiments were settled and firm, he was not forward to denounce those who thought differently from him. He evidently succeeded in an eminent degree in suppressing those envious and malignant feelings which are too apt to be indulged towards other denominations.

As a Minister, he set an example of prudence, patience and fidelity. He was a firm advocate for the doctrines of grace. He preached them plainly; and cheerfully and decidedly bore testimony in their favor on his dying bed. He was a friend to revivals of religion by the efficacious influences of the Holy Spirit, and with these the people of his charge have been peculiarly blessed. No less than three general revivals were experienced in the congregation during his pastoral connection with them. The following summary will exhibit the state of the church, at the commencement and close of his ministry:

The whole number of communicants in the Ch. at the time of his settlement, was 99. He received into membership during his pastorate of 10½ yrs., 468; dismissed, 88; lost by death, 48; excommunicated, 4; and left a membership of 427. He baptized 108 adults, 563 infants—whole number, 671.

We record this to the honor of Divine Grace; and also for the purpose of illustrating the ministerial character and usefulness of the deceased. These things appear to contain a Divine testimony in his favor, as an approved herald of Redeeming grace.

He was not so much a man of display as of real good sense and merit. His discourses were plain, instructive and practical, calculated to edify the pious mind, and to alarm the sinner. The spiritual interests of his congregation, appeared to lie near his heart, and he was ready to spend and be spent in their service.

During the revival, the winter past, he was exceedingly laborious, in preaching, attending conferences, and visiting from house to house. He appeared to spare no pains by day or night which were necessary for the good of his flock. His last public performance was at a conference meeting, in the centre of the parish. At the close of this meeting he informed individuals that he was much indisposed, and expressed his belief that he was going to be sick. He was seized with a violent fever, and a local affection in the left side of the chest, attended with a rugh, which could not be removed by the most ted efforts of physicians. His case soon became dangerous, and at length extinguished all hope of his recovery. The period from the commencement of his sickness to his decease, was about 7 weeks. The first part of this time, he manifested a considerable anxiety to recover, especially for the sake of his family. But for 3 or 4 weeks before his death he became much resigned to the thought of his departure, and spoke upon the subject with great freedom and composure. He was able to resign his wife and children into the hands of God, together with his congregation and friends, and to wait with cheerfulness and submission for his Master's call. His religious views and affections, though not of so ravishing a description as are sometimes manifested, were clear, rational and soul-satisfying. It is not saying too much, to affirm that he appeared and conversed like a christian. The hope which he had indulged for many years, now increased and brightened, and the grounds of this hope appeared to be truly scriptural. He had many happy hours, so that his "sick bed," to use his own words, "was like a bed of roses." He seemed evidently to enjoy a good degree of divine consolation and support. With solemn composure he arranged his temporal concerns, and set his house in order. He appeared confident that his time to die had come, and spoke freely to the numerous and anxious visitants, as one that was just about to appear in the presence of his Judge. He expressed great affection for his people, which was reciprocated by great numbers who came to his house. He was anxious to say something, either by way of instruction, counsel or warning, to every one who came in.

He exemplified the religion of his Savior in exercising a tender and forgiving spirit, towards such as had formerly been his opposers, and in expressing an anxious desire to see every one of them, and if possible, to have everything removed out of the way, so that he could die in peace with all men. No revenge, malice or envy, seemed to have a place in his heart. But on the contrary, his bosom glowed with forgiveness, kindness and love.

Near the last stage of his sickness, he was so much afflicted with an accumulation upon his lungs, that he was obviously in danger of suffocation. At one time, a few days previous to his death, he observed to his attendants, "It is best to call the people into the room, for I am so much distressed for breath that I can not live but a short time." He was asked if he could say, "Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly," "O, yes," he replied, "Lord Jesus, come quickly, thou Savior of sinners. Thou knowest that I have been a great sinner. My hope is in Thee. Thou Savior of sinners, take me to Thyself;" and folding his arms together he said, "Fold me in Thine arms, O, Divine Savior. I am about to leave my friends in this world, O, Savior of sinners, take me to Thyself. Thou knowest that I have given myself to Thee, time after time. Have not I done it without reserve? O, Lord, Thou knowest, Thou knowest, whether I have deceived myself." He was asked if he could not put his confidence in God. "O, yes," he said, "my confidence is strong in the Lord. Oh! my friends, I am just going into Eternity, how important to be always ready. I am going my friends, to sing the song of Moses, and the Lamb forever, and ever, and ever, and ever." He afterwards revived, and said it had been his earnest desire that he might not die by suffocation, but calm, composed and calling on God, as Stephen did, to receive his spirit. He was asked if he could not say "Father, not my will but thine be done." "O, yes," said he, "Father, not my will but Thine be done. If it be for Thy glory that I should die in this manner, Thy will be done. I go at Thy bidding." He did not finally suffocate. He lived about 3 days, and while his reason continued, made many interesting remarks, and the last words which he was heard to articulate, were, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit."

In short, his whole conversation and deportment were such as to furnish the most satisfactory evidence, that he was what he professed, and that he was prepared for the exchange of wolrds. Some days previous to his decease he said that it would be very desirable to depart on the Lord's day. His desire in this respect was granted.

His funeral was attended on the 6th inst., by a concourse of more than 2000 people assembled to pay their last tribute of respect to


departed worth.

Eleven of the neighboring clergy were present to participate in the affecting solemnities of the day. An interesting and instructive discourse was delivered by Rev. Direk C. Lansing, from Heb. 11th, 27th, "For he endured as seeing Him who is invisible."

The conclusion of a sermon preached to his people in Groton, N. Y., by Rev. Joshua Dean, in reference to the death of Rev. Mr. W., his intimate friend, was published in the Cortland Repository, June 16, 1820, and contains an affectionate and deserved tribute.

The "Cortland Repository," of Dec. 4, 1821, contained an Obituary of Mrs. W., from which the following extracts are taken:—

Died, in this village on the 26th ult., after a very lingering and distressing illness, Mrs Aurelia Walker, aged 40 yrs. Mrs. W. was born and educated in Sharon, Conn. Possessing an unusual share of native politeness, a sound judgment, a mild and uniform temper, and a kind and generous disposition, accompanied with a modest and amiable deportment, excellent economy, a good

education, a knowledge of human nature, and a spirit of picty and christian benevolence, she was eminently qualified for the important and conspicuous station in which Providence had placed her. Always in possession of the ornament of a meek spirit, she exhibited an example, which not only gained the confidence and esteem of her other christian friends, but of all with whom she formed an acquaintance. Uncommon as it is in these degenerate times, we cannot learn that the tongue of slander ever assailed her. About six months after the death of Mr. W., she was attacked with hemorrhage from the lungs, and gradually declined. During the whole period, 11 mos. and a half, she had to pass through the most trying scenes of bodily pain and distress. But amidst all her sufferings and affliction, she was patient and submissive. Not a murmur escaped her lips, her soul was stayed on God. In this tranquil state of mind she continued with an unwavering faith anticipating her passport to Heaven, in the full exercise of her reason till she sunk into the arms of death. Near the closing scene, being asked the state of her mind she said, "All is well." The last words which she distinctly articulated, were, "God bless my children."

Justice of the Peace in 1840. He has been a surveyor of land more than 40 yrs., and as such, been employed in most of the towns of Bristol Co., and somewhat in Plymouth Co.

He is theoretically and practically a strong opposer to the use of intoxicating liquors. From his youth to the present time, he has labored as hard in all weathers, with axe, hoe and scythe, as any person of his acquaintance, and from his earliest childhood, never drank one drop of intoxicating liquor of any kind. In the yr. 1822, in Western, N. Y., when mowers were pouring down the whiskey, he drank his milk and water, and on no day did he find a man who could do more work than himself. He writes, "I claim to be the oldest person in the state, who has totally abstained from all intoxicating drinks." It is his firm conviction that a condition of health, never needed spirituous liquors. Res. Taunton, (Rocky Woods.) He is a man of sound judgment, great energy, fearless and faithful to his convictions. No man is more respected for sterling integrity, and he has wielded no small influence in the affairs of the town. With a retentive memory he has preserved the traditions of the family, and by his unwearied interest has done much to aid the author of this Genealogy, gathering many facts which supplement the lost records of the town. The author is indebted to no man more than to him for appreciative sympathy, and industrious gleaning.

As the War had driven the inhabitants from the country, they had to go from 24 to 36 hours without eating. In Aug. 1833, he received an appointment as United States Deputy Surveyor of the public lands. At the same time, he received a contract for running Township lines in Wisconsin, in company with Mr. M., and together, they ran all the Township lines from Range No. 3, through to Lake Michigan, and finished the contract in Dec. 1836. During this service, in 1833 and '34, there were eleven months in which he did not sleep in a house, and lived on fresh fish, there being no inhabitants in the territory.

He then contracted with the Government for a large job in Mich., and commenced in Feb. 1838. This was the hardest trip. In this expedition, he came near starving twice. Once he was caught in a snow storm, in which the snow fell 4 ft. deep, and he was 175 miles from any inhabitants.

At another time, his horses all died but one, and there was a swamp 42 miles wide, to travel through. He got his party through to the mouth of the Manistee river, where he had stored his provisions, a distance of 140 miles from where he came near starving. On the way, he found a beech ridge of timber, and gathered beech nuts, which gave him and his party strength to get through. He finished the contract in 1840, and settled in Algonquin, Ill., in July, 1841. He has had two contracts since from the Government, one in 1843 and one in 1844. Has been Surveyor of McHenry Co. 8 yrs. and Sheriff of the County 2 yrs. He commenced the world in limited circumstances, and has been successful. He and w. are both Universalists. Have 2 days.



Stricken in the prime of womanhood, "her sun went down while it was yet day." During a sickness of a year she calmly set her house in order, and then with meek, placid resignation of the hopes and loves of earth, though fraught with peculiar promise, and with a cheerful religious faith, she fell asleep in Jesus.

She was endowed with great energy, decision and fortitude of character. Her piety was unostentatious, but steadfast and fruitful, ripening into a growth of sweet submission to the will of the Father, and of undoubting, joyful trust in the Savior. She possessed an amiable and equable temper. There were blended in her nature, warm sympathies, generous impulses, moral sensitiveness, and steadfast principle, forming a character of admirable harmony and worth. And this well proportioned and graceful column which Nature reared, Religion strengthened and adorned with the "beauty of holiness." Loving peace, she was devoted to the interests of her household, and it is no extravagance to give her the eulogy—of the faithful wife and mother, "The heart of her husband doth safely trust in her," and "to know her was to love her."

Her epitaph is as follows:-

This is the sweet repose,
Where lies the slumbering saint;
When God appeared to call her home,
She uttered no complaint.

of energy and loveliness of character, serene, amiable and cheerful through all the discipline of impaired health and uncertain life. He has been a Shoe Manufacturer in T., 40 yrs. He was Representative to the Legislature, in the session of 1851 and 2, a session memorable for its enactment of the Prohibitory Liquor Law, and was "one of the two men," Hon. Mr. Keyes, of Dedham, remarked, "who pursued a straight forward, uncompromising, and perfectly consistent course," in pressing the Bill to its enactment. As a member of the Com. who reported the Bill, he offered a speech in favor of it, which was solicited for the press and published in the Boston Atlas, and several of the Temperance Journals. He has been an earnest advocate of Temperance from the inception of the Reform; united with the Cong. ch. in 1815, and was elected Deacon, in 1837, and the interests of the church have had his unceasing sympathies and efforts. Though living nearly all this period 3 miles from the place of worship, no one has been less frequently absent from the social and Sabbath services.

He was a Director of the Cohannet Bank, is now a Trustee of the Bristol Co. Saving's Bank, and one of its Com. of investments. With few opportunities for early education, spending his youth on the farm, and in the brick yard, instead of the school house, he is, however, a man of much more than ordinary intelligence. He is highly esteemed for sound judgment, clear and fearless convictions, unimpeachable business integrity, and active, consistent piety.



The following Obituary was published in the Boston Recorder, June 13, 1844:—

Rev. Rasselas L. Sears, became hopefully pious at the age of 17, at which time, he solemnly consecrated himself to the work of the Gospel ministry, if God should spare his life. After encountering various pecuniary embarrassments, in obtaining an education, in the Autumn of 1838, he was graduated at Union College with high honor. During his College course, he ever maintained a consistent christian character. Though ardent in pursuit of knowledge, he neglected not the cultivation of his heart. Upon leaving college, he engaged in teaching, at Utica, New York, where he soon secured the warm attachment of his pupils, and numerous friends, with whom he became acquainted. After pursuing with great industry and success, the prescribed course in the Theo'l Institution, at Andover, he was licensed to preach the Gospel, and soon after came to Mich., where he engaged for a year, as principal of Marshall Academy. While there, he received a pressing invitation from the churches at Lima, and Greenfield, Ind., to become their pastor, and acting upon the advice of his friends, he consented to accept the charge. His labors were highly acceptable, and abundantly blessed. Eminently qualified as he was, in mind and heart for his work, the recollection of his many virtues will live long in the hearts of his people. Of a naturally feeble constitution, and deeply devoted to his studies, the seeds of an insidious and fatal disease had taken deep root before he was aware of its approach. But so ardently desirous was he to lead sinners to the Cross, and to build up the walls of Zion, that he yielded with the greatest reluctance to the entreaties of his friends to suspend his labors in the ministry. Though the spiritual wants of this new country, his love for his people, the recollections of the years spent in preparation for the ministry, and his tender affection for his beloved companion, all contributed to render life dear to him, yet his wish to be restored to health, if such were the will of God, seemed to arise mainly from his desire to preach the Gospel. But when he became fully aware that his work on earth was done, he desired to be absent from the body, that he might be present with the Lord. Though for him to live was Christ, yet to die was evidently gain. At times, in the early part of his sickness, more particularly, he complained of a want of faith, but usually, all was bright, and cloudless, and oftentimes he was favored with enrapturing views of the Saviour. While conversing with a brother in the ministry, a few days before his death, he pleasantly remarked, "How blessed it is, that God takes his own way in removing the timbers, one after another, that sustain this frail tabernacle." When he became conscious that his last hour was come, like the great Apostle, when about to leave forever his beloved church of Ephesus, he sent for the Elders of the church, and in a most solemn and affecting manner exhorted them to discharge their duties and weigh well their responsibilities. He told them of his love for them and the church, over which they were placed, and expressed his satisfation that he had remained to die with them, instead of returning to the East. His reason continued to the last. The dying scene was bright and glorious. He gently faded away, like a summer cloud, and fell asleep in Jesus, without a struggle or a groan. As a man he was a gentleman, a Christian gentleman, and a thorough scholar. As a christian he was a humble and eminently devoted servant of the Cross and an able and faithful minister of the Gospel. The day following his death, which was the Sabbath, attended by his brethren in the ministry, slowly and sadly, his smitten flock bore the remains of their beloved pastor to the grave.



I. PHILIP WALKER,² (2) was the son of "Widow Walker," of Rehoboth, and brother of James Walker, of Taunton. (See 1st p.) The earliest record of him is a deed bearing his signature dated at Rehoboth, 1653. He was one of the Grand Jury, May 17, 1655, propounded for freedom, June 8, 1655, and took the oath of fidelity, June 1, 1658. In June 22, 1658, his name appears in the first division of Rehoboth No. Purchase, (now Attleboro',) when lots were drawn for "the meadow, on the North side of the Town," and again, May 26, 1668, in the division of lands, in the North Purchase.

His birth-place, and age, and date of his arrival in this country, are not known. He married, about 1654, Jane, dau. of —— Butterworth, of Rehoboth, or Michael Metcalf, of Dedham.*

She survived him, and afterward m. June 2, 1684, John Polley, of Roxbury, and lived there till her death, in 1702. Dea. Walker was buried Aug. 21, 1679, and his dust, reposes, no doubt, in the ancient grave yard, at Seekonk. His estate was appraised, Oct., 1679, on oaths of James Walker,† and Samuel Walker. In'y £681.

His home and farm were on Watchemoket Neck, south of the Great Plain, at what is now the Kinnicut Place, on the road from

^{*}The compiler had supposed, till lately, that Philip's wife was a Butterworth, as his son, Samuel, had an "Uncle Samuel Butterworth." It is, of course, possible, that a Butterworth married a sister of Philip, but it is not known that he had any sister, except Sarah, w. of John Tisdale. What is more probable is, that Butterworth was the uncle of Samuel's wife. Late investigation respecting "Joane Walker," dau. of Michael Metcalf, of Dedham, who, it is stated, in Metcalf's Genealogy, married Samuel (?) Walker, of Rehoboth, has led to the opinion that it was Philip, and not Samuel Walker, whom she married. For reasons, see Samuel Walker, immediately following the descendants of Philip.

[†] There is no record of any James Walker, in R., in the town register, nor in the Probate Rec. of the County, excepting as far back as 1643 and 45, which have been alluded to, in the sketch of James Walker, of Taunton. (See 6 and 7 pp.) He was about 60 yrs. of age at the time of Philip's death, and was, undoubtedly, the James, who helped appraise his estate.

Providence, R. I., to Barrington, about 1 mile from India Bridge, and in Rehoboth, now Seekonk, an attractive and fertile spot, overlooking the Providence river.*

He left a house unfinished, which the Court ordered to be completed at the expense of the estate. The estate was to be divided as follows:—

"In reference vnto the disposall of the estate of Phillip Walker, late of Rebohoth, deceased, the Court ordered, that the now house in building shall be finished out of the whole intire estate, and that those that shall injoy it, shall make some proportionable abatement, of what shall be theire pticular interest, in the said estate, and that the widdow shall have a comfortable, and convenient being therein, during her widdowhood, and that the said widdow shall have her third of the said estate, and the sume of twenty pound, for and towards the bringing vp of the youngest child, and that the remainder of the said estate be deuided into seauen equall ptes, whereof the eldest, to have a double pte, and the rest to be deuided vnto the other children, in equall and alike proportions."

She gave bond of administration, Oct. 29, 1679,

"June 7, 1681, This Court graunts libertie vnto Jane Walker, widdow of Rehoboth, to make sale of a small psell of meddow ground, with the advice and approbation of Mr. Daniell Smith and Ensigne Pecke.

Philip Walker's occupation in 1659, was that of weaver. He became at length one of the wealthiest men of Rehoboth. In the allotments in 1671, his estate was estimated at £387, and was exceeded by only two in the town, the whole number being 78. In 1678, it was exceeded by only one, in a valuation of 83 estates. He held various positions of trust and honor. He was surveyor, 1657, constable, 1658, on the Grand Inquest, 1668 and '78, one of the Select men, several yrs. between 1666 and '75, and was deputy to Plymouth, 1669. May 14, 1669, he was chosen one of a Committee, to meet a Committee of the new town of Swansey, to settle a controversy, (probably about boundaries.) He also held the office of Deacon, in the Church. Nov. 2, 1663, Goodman Walker was appointed one of a Committee, to buy or build a parsonage,

^{*} The first permanent settlement in Rehoboth, was around the "Great Plain," in that part of the township called Seekonk, meaning, "the abode of the wild goose." It is supposed that Rev. Mr. Newman, and his society, selected this spot because it was an extensive plain, already cleared of forest trees, and favorable for the cultivation of Iudian corn. It is not far from the Pawtucket and Providence rivers, and had abundant facilities for obtaining fish and fowl.

or "house for the ministry." This "Goodman,"* was undoubtedly Philip, as there is no trace of any other Walker in R. at that time. June 20, 1678, the town having unanimously called Rev. Mr. Angier, to settle amongst them, "the townsmen and Deacon Walker, were chosen to treat with Mr. A. about it." It was also agreed upon by the town, that the sums to be raised, be freely subscribed, "if it may be," but if the subscriptions fell short, "Deacon Walker, Gilbert Brooks, and 3 others, should devise the mode to raise said sums."

In one period, the towns were obliged to sustain the war against Philip. Many who served as private soldiers, advanced money. The list of those in R. is preserved, and shows that the amount furnished by Deacon Walker, was £26, the largest sum, with two exceptions, and about double what was advanced by any of the 77 others in the catalogue.

Thus, like his elder brother, James, of Taunton, he was prominent in efforts and sacrifices for the maintenance and usefulness of the ministry, and the protection of the settlement from Indian ravages; sustaining at least, one kind of relationship and resemblance to him, and one which is certainly no dishonor. While James in Taunton, was distinguished and useful as one of the Council of War, for Plymouth Colony, Philip, in Rehoboth, was among the foremost in furnishing the "sinews of war." Rehoboth, an isolated plantation, was especially exposed to the incursions of the savages. The first and last blood of that fierce struggle, in which Metacomet or Philip, the powerful and subtle Indian chieftain, fought for the destruction of all the colonists in New England, was shed in Rehoboth. Here the conflict opened in 1675, here it closed by the fall of Philip, in 1676.

Deacon Walker, it is probable, was in that gallant fight of the people of Rehoboth, with Philip, and his best warriors. Driven to desperation, and fearing if he remained at Mt. Hope, he would be taken captive, the sachem fled into the interior, about the 1st of Aug. 1675. Encouraged by the strong appeals of Mr. Newman, their minister, and though not a part of the military force of the Colony, under his leadership, they pursued Philip, with great courage and activity. So rapid was their movement, that they overtook the rear of his forces at night, and with the aid of a party of friendly Moheagan Indians, who had joined them, attacked him and killed 30 of his men, and carried away much booty, without any loss. When the minister led the way in so noble an enterprise, it is no

^{*} It was anciently the custom, to use this prefix, "Goodman," in place of Mr.

groundless conjecture, that his Deacon was with him, especially one who had advanced money so generously for the defense of the settlement.

March 28, 1776, just after "Pierce's Fight," the Indians fell upon that part of Rehoboth, called Seekonk, and burnt 40 houses and 30 barns. As Dea. Walker, at the time of his decease, 3 yrs. later, left a house unfinished, it may have been, that his was one of those burnt by the Indians. Philip designed an assault upon Taunton, but apprised of it, the town was prepared for defense, and when he approached, July 11, '76, he was met with such determined resistance, that he was compelled to fly, after burning two houses.*

Apprehensive of their destruction, the Cape towns sent a Com. to Bridgwater, Taunton, and Rehoboth, to invite the inhabitants to take up their residence with them during the war, but the invitation was declined. The answer of Rehoboth, by their Com. indicates an unflinching bravery, and a sublime, though submissive faith. The heroic independence, the undaunted fortitude of those isolated settlers, in the face of the appalling perils which threatened their extinction, prove that they were worthy to be among the founders of civilization, and the defenders of religion, in the New World, and are entitled to the grateful remembrance and honor of their descendants and beneficiaries.

"Though no tablets cast their shadows, Where they slumber from their toil, Blood of theirs is on our meadows, Dust of theirs is in our soil."

All the notices of the position and character of Dea. Philip Walker, though few in number, are highly honorable. There is not a single spot on his escutcheon. He was prosperous, accumulating a property that was large for that period. He was entrusted with the most responsible office in the church, save that of the minister. It is indeed a grateful record, his generous contribution for his country and for Christ. His office and his services are a proof of superior excellence in character and usefulness, and leave no doubt that he was eminently a Patriot and a Christian. Cut down in the vigor of his manhood, his death must have been a sore calamity to the colony and the church, "as when an armor bearer falleth."

^{* *}When Philip escaped from Mt. Hope, in '75, a part of his warriors scattered in the wilderness, about Taunton, and burnt the houses of James Walker, and John Tisdill, his brother-in-law. John Tisdill, was killed, and 2 other soldiers, who were from Eastham. Though Baylies states this as in 1675, may not the "two houses" burnt July 11th, '76, have been those of J. W. and J. T. It is known that John Tisdill was killed June 27, '76.

"Buried Aug. 21, 1679," as the brief, sad record is, it is no groundless conjecture, that the members of the church, and the inhabitants of Rehoboth, gathered on this early autumnal day, to recognize the services, and honor the memory of the departed Deacon. The thought and utterance of their hearts, interpreting their great loss, may naturally have been, "How is the strong staff broken, and the beautiful rod."

His moral worth and piety have been inherited in a remarkable degree by his numerous descendants, unto the 8th and 9th generations. They furnish proof that the meral character, is an inheritance more surely entailed than any other. They illustrate the law that, "if the root be holy, so are the branches." They teach that, if it be a great privilege, it is also a great responsibility, to "partake of the root and fatness of the olive tree," in a godly ancestry.

For their virtues and piety are to be remembered, not for the fostering of family pride, but as an example and incentive to a worthy life.

It is an idle and self condemnatory boast to say, "we have Abraham to our father," unless we "do the works of Abraham." But a multitude sleep in the old grave yard, at Seekonk, who proved their legitimacy from Deacon Philip Walker, by their christian worth, and many others have gone forth into other wildernesses, to help establish, and sustain the institutions, connected with religion and the public weal, and are now laboring, or resting from their labors, in many sections of the country. Not many illustrious names are found among his numerous, and widely scattered descendants. They have swelled the ranks of the honest, and faithful yeomanry of the land. They have cherished and transmitted the doctrinal faith, and reproduced the piety and usefulness of their ancestor. Of a great number of them it is true.

"They were never squires and teachers,
They were never wise and great,
But they listened to their preachers,
Worshipped God, and loved the State.

"They were men of humble station,
They were women pure and true,
And they served their generation,
Worked, and fought, and lived for you."

All that now remains is the chimney, still standing, (1857,) the house having been taken down in 1853. He left also, other traces of his sojourn in C. South of his dwelling on the hill are two little graves, always said by oldest inhabitants to be graves of Walker children. They are still visible, and the present owner of the farm has lately enclosed the place for a grave yard. It is a tradition there, that Mr. W. one evening saw a strange light on the hill. Losing his 2 chil. soon after, he had them buried where he saw the singular light. These two graves on the hill, alone, and yet guarded for more than half a century, and remembered as Mr. W.'s children, confirm the record in Attleboro', which gives names and births of his chil. He was living in A. in 1750, where he owned lands inherited by will, from his father's estate. It is no wonder that in view of the lands on the Otter Creek, he should abandon the rough soil of Coventry, R. I. Had 12 chil.

Walker St., in Providence, took its name from him. He built and lived in the house on the corner of Westminster and Walker streets.

Having crossed the Butten-kill river, and encamped for the night on the south bank, Mr. W. watched his opportunity, and before morning, eluded the guard, made his escape, and returned home. True to his Puritan origin, he was scrupulously exact in the performance of every duty devolving on him, and few men enjoyed in a higher degree, the confidence and esteem of the community in which he lived. He and his wife were m. of Cong. ch., in Greenwich, and although the house of worship was about 3 miles from his dwelling, for a long series of years, his seat in the sanctuary was rarely vacant on the Sabbath.

Dr. Abel Baker, of Owasco, N. Y., who lived with his grand father during his youth and early manhood, writes, "I doubt whether there has been a man, among those with whom I have since become fully acquainted, that has more uniformly exemplified the precepts of the Gospel than he did." He m. 2dly, Nov. 25, 1801, Bathsheba Read, sister of 1st wife, and b. Sept. 7, 1745.

valuable farm, but was burdened with a heavy debt. Fearing imprisonment, he fled from his home, leaving his young children, and his native State. His calamity and separation proved to be one for life. He was unable to rise above and conquer his misfortunes, wandered from place to place, engaging in any business which promised present success, and failing in all endeavors, he at length died in Chenango Co., Penn.

His wife possessed many of the qualities that distinguish the family to which she belonged, such as talent, sound judgment, kindness and piety. In her early death, her husband lost a wise counsellor and a devoted wife; her children an affectionate and faithful mother; and the world a bright christian example. Love inspired her heart, kind words were the fruit of her lips, and benevolent acts the cheerful offering of her hands.

He m. 2d, June, 1794, Mrs. Eunice (Willard,) widow of Doct. John Caryl, of Chester, Vt. He lived in Grafton till March, 1793, and then removed to Barre, Vt., where he d. Had 10 chil. He joined the army at the commencement of the Revolution, and attained the rank of Colonel. He was at the capture of Burgoyne, and commanded a company of

brave fellows of the Massachusetts Line, although he was then only 1st Lieutenant, (the Captain being sick.) He was also in the battle on Long Island, and became a pensioner under the 1st Pension Act, but his name was stricken off, because it was said he had a little property. He was a Universalist, all his descendants in B., without a single exception, hold the same religious belief.

- 232. II. Charles Philip,⁶ (575) b. March 3, 1754. He m. Elizabeth Aldrich, and had 2 chil. He removed from Smithfield, R. I., to Ballston, N. Y. One of his legs was broken by the fall of a tree upon him. He lay all day without help, and when he was found, it was set wrong, and he became a cripple for life. Not able to work, he obtained a livelihood by travelling with exhibitions. He was a Col. in the Revolution, Aid de-camp to La Fayette, and afterwards a naval commander. He was at Valley Forge all winter, and came near perishing with hunger and cold, and was saved only by the care of a farmer's daughter, for whom he searched, years after the Peace, but in vain. He was Collector of the Port of Providence many years, till removed by President Jackson. He always kept as cherished mementoes, a sash and sword given him by Gen. La Fayette. He was a splendid specimen of an old soldier, and had the gait and air of the soldier, as long as he could walk. He retained his physical and mental vigor to a great age. When at length his strength began to fail, his spirits sank at once, and mortified by his growing infirmities and stooping form, he shut himself in his room, and staid there till he was carried out.

His wife was a Friend, and her stronger intellect carried him with her. He ever afterward, worshipped "in the Meeting," and his house was the "home" for all the Ministers of the persuasion. Two only of his children continued their connection with the Friends. He labored for the education of his family, and his ambition was to train them up in honor, usefulness and piety. In 1831, most of the children being settled in life, the old homestead was deserted, and they passed the pleasant sunset of their lives in the home of their dau., Mrs. Munson. Mrs. W., was strong in character, and in person. Of inexhaustible energy and resources, the care of 13 children sat lightly upon her. She d. soon after leaving her home, at Camillus, and both are buried in C.

Says one who knew him well—"He was one of the lights of the earth. A plain, simple mechanic, he brought up 13 children in the fear of God, and in the strictest honesty, and stranger still, in the strictest temperance."

It is the family pride of his descendants, that not one has ever dishonored the life and virtues of the Father, or the sterling goodness of the Quaker Mother.

Of his 7 sons, 4 are mechanics, one a merchant, and 2 are lawyers. All but one of his 13 children are professedly religious.



She was b. in Templeton, Jan. 14, 1767, and d. Aug. 13, 1856, in 90th yr. Blind for the last 20 years of her life, gifted with invincible will and unusual abilities, she sank at last beneath the weight of years, to rest, loved and lamented by all. He was a systematic farmer, and devoted much attention to the grafting and improvement of fruit trees, and Addison Co. is greatly indebted to him. He had 10 chil. Res. Whiting, Vt.

- 257. II. RACHEL, 6 b. in Coventry, R. I., Aug. 4, 1769, (1768, Fam. Rec.) d. March 13, 1849. She m. 1783, Aaron Beach, who was b. in Va., June 10, 1761, and d. June 17, 1846. He was a farmer, settled in Whiting, Vt., rem. in 1791, to Scottsville, N.Y. In 1794, compelled by the Indian wars to return to Vt., he settled in W., and represented the town in the Assembly in 1801 and 5. He also held various town offices. In 1811, he rem. to Cambria, Niagara Co., N.Y. War with Great Britain having been declared, in 1813 the enemy crossed at Niagara, and his family were again driven in terror from their home, taking nothing with them, but a few articles, which were stolen the following night. They carried with them upon a bed, a son sick through exposure and privations. Their privations and sufferings during the War were extreme, and a vivid and sad remembrance of its scenes of terror and disaster, is preserved by their children. They returned to Vt., and again in the Fall of 1815, went to Cambria, where they lived until their death. Mrs. B. was a woman of great excellence and moral worth. Few persons are called upon to pass through the trying scenes that fell to her lot. But her fortitude and patient resignation under all her trials, her firm religious trust, through all her sufferings, taught a lesson worthy to be engraven upon every heart.

She prepared an autobiography entitled, "Vicissitudes of Life," containing about 300 pp. This was never published.

Feb. 2, 1839. She possessed a retiring disposition, yet, had qualities withal, which gained her friends wherever she was known. She will long be remembered for her amiable and excellent character, and her uniform and exemplary life. He is said to have been the first white male child born in Rutland. He was a farmer, lived in Whiting, after 1784, and had 9 chil. He was m. Bap. ch. Under Pres't Madison's Administration, he was appointed the Assessor for the towns of Whiting and Leicester, for the purpose of raising the Direct Tax. He was first Constable of W. for several years,—also,

a Selectman, a series of years. He was proverbial for his generosity and his public spirit. If there was a house of worship to be built, a minister of religion to be obtained and supported, any benevolent object to be aided, or public improvement to be accomplished, his purse and influence were generously offered, and to these, was owing the success of many a benevolent and useful enterprise. His benevolence was expended particularly in behalf of the poor. In 1812, he bequeathed to the town of Whiting, 20 acres of land at Whiting Centre, (then valued at \$500,) one acre to be used for a Cemetery, and the yearly income of 10 acres to be appropriated to the support of common schools, and the income of the remaining 9 acres, to maintain the preaching of the Gospel. The following tribute is inscribed on his grave-stone:—"The memory of his public spirit will outlast this monument, which marks the humble spot where he lies."

260. V. Amos Elmore, 6 (660) b. May 25, 1775, (1774?) in Rutland, Vt., d. Jan. 19, 1850, ac. 75. He m. May 24, 1798, Sally Miller, dau. of Timothy, of Sudbury, Vt., and d. in Hubbardton, Aug. 28, 1849. He was a farmer, lived in Whiting, and after 1838, rem. to H. where they both died. They had 6 chil. He gave the land in the centre of the town of Whiting, as a site for the church edifice.

261. VI. James Otis, 6 (667) b. Aug. 6, 1778, d. Nov. 27, 1857, ae. 79 yrs. He m. Oct. 12, 1798, Mary Olin, dau. of Justin and Sarah, of Shaftesbury, Vt., and sis. of the late Gov. Henry Olin, b. Sept. 25, 1779, and d. Feb. 28, 1806, in Whiting, ac. 26. He m. 2dly, Dec. 4, 1806, Eunice Marsh, of Clarendon, Vt., dau. of Daniel and Phebe, b. in New Milford, Ct., Dec. 25, 1779, and d. Dec. 22, 1858. His early opportunities for education were very limited. The first school in W. was one of 4 weeks, taught by a woman, in 1789, when he was 11 yrs. old. After this, he used to lie in the corner in the evenings, and read, having only pine knots for a light, occasionally going to school a few weeks. At the age of 15, he taught school in Shoreham, for \$4 per month, giving instruction only in reading and writing. In 1800, he built and opened a Public House in W., which he and his sons continued with the intermission of 3 yrs. till 1839. His house was one of great celebrity, in that region. He became a magistrate, Dec. 1809, and held the office till he rem. from W. in 1839. During this period, he transacted a large portion of the public business of the town, and often served as administrator, arbitrator, and in similar public and private trusts. As a proof of the high estimation in which he was held, it is a noteworthy fact,

that while he was an elevated member of the Masonic Fraternity, and W. was a strongly Anti-Masonic town, he held his office through the entire struggle in respect to Masonry, and such was the confidence reposed in his integrity, that none of his most bitter opponents, questioned the propriety of his retaining his office. His decisions as a Magistrate, were seldom overruled, and his honesty was never questioned by friend or foe. He was, pre-eminently, a peacemaker, and his advice was frequently sought by contending parties. He was an ardent patriot of Whig politics, and till the close of life, watched the course of public affairs with deep and intelligent interest. He represented the town in the State Legislature, 5 yrs., in 1821, '22, '23-and '26. He was the travelling Agent of the Vermont Mutual Fire Ins. Co., 8 years, and no man rendered it more important service, or was more successful in disseminating a knowledge of its principles through the State. His public spirit was proverbial. If a house of worship was to be erected or repaired, a minister to be sustained, any educational or benevolent object to be effected, his purse and his influence were liberally furnished. In 1839, he rem. to St. Albans, Vt., and thence in '47, to Swanton, the adjoining town. Says Rev. J. W. Sawyer, who knew him well,-"He was a friend to education, and gave of his means liberally, to promote it. In all his social relations, he was amiable and generous, active and ever ready to spend, and be spent in the service of his friends, meeting all who approached him, with frankness, courtesy and kindness." domestic and social virtues shone forth with increased brightness in his later years. He was beloved by all, and especially by children. He delighted more in making a sacrifice to please a child, and receive his happy look and "thank you," in return, than to gain the friendship of the great or affluent. His large and generous heart never grew old. Cheerful and lively, he never became imbittered by misfortune, age or infirmities. Affluent in humor and anecdote, as a companion, he was unusually entertaining. His mind was comprehensive and practical, rather than speculative. A sound judgment, and integrity above impeachment, secured for him confidence in the public and private relations of life. Though without early advantages, yet possessing good natural endowments, his information became extensive by reading, and a wide intercourse with men. Having a retentive memory, he became a living encyclopedia of the age in which he lived. His pen was often employed by public request, in the preparation of temperance addresses, in which reform he took a deep interest, and in poems and other contributions to the newspaper press. In manhood, he was energetic and indefatigablein old age, genial and busy, even after the 2d shock of paralysis, which rendered him almost helpless. The last two years of his life, he could not walk a step, and his hand was unnerved, yet he maintained an extensive correspondence with a wide circle of friends, and wrote his "Early Reminiscences," as a pastime. He had long been interested in the genealogy of his ancestors and kindred, but had been unable to trace his pedigree beyond his grandfather, (No. 28.) Accordingly, he entered most enthusiastically into the plan of the compiler of this work, and pledged his generous and cheerful co-operation. Becoming religious in early life, he united with the Bap. ch., and his hope in Christ enabled him, in old age, to contemplate his departure with serene and cheerful composure. His end was peace. He was buried in Whiting. The simple epitaph which he left for his tombstone, reads thus,—"He strove to be useful, and to make others happy."

262. VII. Gideon, 6 (671) b. June, 1782, in Rutland, Vt. He m. Jan. 16, 1803, Barbara Olin, of Shaftsbury, Vt., dau. of Hon. Gideon, b. 1786, d. March 7, 1859, in Ellicottville, N. Y. He was a non-commissioned officer, in Harrison's army, in the war of 1812. Dr. Lanier, a surgeon in the army, wrote to the family, that he was bayoneted by a British officer, after he had surrendered, in the Masacre at Youngstown or Fort Niagara, in 1813, in his 32d year. Res. Whiting, Vt. Had 3 chil.

263. VIII. SAMUEL BEACH, 6 (674) b. in Whiting, Vt., Dec. 17, 1784, d. Oct. 16, 1842, in Chicago, Ill., ae. 57. He m. Nov. 17, 1805, Patty Bent, of Mt. Holly, Vt., who was b. Aug. 19, 1784. They had 8 chil. He held the office of Town Clerk, and was Justice of the Peace, several years, in Hubbardton, Vt. He was a merchant, and engaged in farming, lumbering and milling.—"One of the excellent of the earth."

264. I. Philip,⁶ (684) b. in Attleboro', April 28, 1766, Fam. Rec., (Feb. 1764,?) d. March 31, 1840. He m. Jan., 1796, Hannah Field, dau. of Anthony, in Ferrisburgh, Vt., b. March 20, 1778, and d. March, 1853, ae. 75. She was m. Meth. ch. They settled in Williston, Vt. In his youth he was a fur hunter. At one time he had as companions, his younger brother Johnson, and Capt. Jas. Powers. In attempting to traverse the wilderness from Lake Champlain to the St. Lawrence river, they lost their way and were 8 days without food

or sustenance of any kind. And the preservation of the party was owing to the muscular energy, and dauntless fortitude of Philip Walker. Johnson's strength became entirely exhausted, and Philip had to make continual exertions to rouse him from stupor, and help him on the journey. Their dogs died of starvation. On the 9th day, they fell in with a party of Indians, who had just killed a bear, the intestines of which, after being slightly rinsed in a brook near by, were their first harmless repast, and relief from the pangs of starvation. Remaining a few days to recruit their exhausted strength, an Indian guide directed them to their hunting ground. He was a man of indomitable energy and perseverance, and left at his decease a large landed property.

- 265. II. Johnson, 6 (694) b, Sept. 15, 1768, d. April 17, 1826, ae. 57. He m. 1799, Elizabeth, dau. of George Gaige, of Ferrisburgh, Vt., b. Nov. 18, 1780, d. Dec. 31, 1855. Both m. Bap. ch. They removed to Panton, Vt., and had 12 chil. He was a man of good character, and had the esteem of his townsmen.
- 266. III. Obadiah,⁶ (706) b. Nov. 1770, d. Jan. 13, 1813, ae. 42. He m. Jan. 17, 1795, Betsey, dau. of Zuriel Tupper, of Ferrisburgh, Vt., b. 1778, and is a m. Meth. ch. He was a man of great industry and ability in business, and possessed high moral worth, both in the private and public relations of life. He was a zealous politician, a Democrat of the Jeffersonian school; a member of the State Legislature 8 yrs.. and enjoyed the unbounded confidence and esteem of his fellow citizens. Res. Ferrisburgh. Had 7 chil.
- 267. IV. Daniel, (713) b. 1771 or 2, d. Aug. 1851. He m. 1793, Electa Newton, dau. of Jason. He removed to Canton, St. Lawrence Co., in 1800, and was one of the pioneers in the settlement of the town. The farm he bought on going to C., distant about a mile from Canton village, he lived on till his death. He had a strong constitution, though predisposed to apoplexy and a species of paralysis, of which, combined, he died. His wife being a Universalist, he became one, and all his chil. He was a man of strong practical sense, of great moral excellence, and was honored with the most important offices of the town and county in which he resided. He was Supervisor 10 yrs. in succession. Had 6 chil.
- 268. V. WILLIAM, (719) b. Feb. 23, 1775, d. Feb. 5, 1852. ae. 77 yrs., less 18 days. He m. Oct. 10, 1798, Betsey, dau. of James Burroughs, formerly of Ct. She was b. Jan. 3, 1783, d. Oct.

- 29, 1820. He m. 2d, Dec. 1, 1821, Mrs. Fanny Shumway, who was b. April 8, 1781, d. May 3, 1852, ae. 71 yrs., 21 (25?) days. Both m. Bapt. ch. They resided in Ferrisburgh, Vt., till 1829, when he rem. to Ohio, where he d. He had 13 chil.
- 269. VI. Nathan,⁶ (732) b. 1777, d. May, 1853. He m. Wealthy Tupper, dau. of Zuriel, of Ferrisburgh, Vt., and sis. of his brother Obadiah's w. They settled in Canton, N. Y.; rem. in 1823, or 4, to Smith's Creek, Canada West, and from thence to Waupun, Fon du Lac Co., Wis., where he died. His 8 chil. were b. in Canton.
- 270. VII. Solomon,⁶ (740) b. 1779, d. Dec. 3, 1810, ae. 31. He m. Polly Tupper, dau. of Absalom, and gd. dau. of Zuriel. She was "one of the best of women," possessing a strong mind and devoted piety; m. Meth. ch., and d. March 7, 1818. He was one of the 1st settlers in Canton, N. Y., a man of fine personal appearance, affectionate as a husband and parent, and possessed of great energy and excellence of character. He had 4 chil.





melee, of G., who was ord., July 3, 1783, 1st Pastor of Cong. ch. in Lee. In person, Mr. W. was over 6 ft. in height, and well proportioned. He was member of the Congress of Deputies of the several towns of Berkshire Co., convened at Stockbridge, July 6, 1774. This County Convention or Congress so called, of the inhabitants of Berkshire, partook largely of the feelings which pervaded the country, in respect to the Revolutionary crisis. The covenant signed in Lenox, July 14, 1774, in reference to the English Gov't, not to import, purchase, &c., was signed by over 100 persons. Among the names was that of Wm. Walker, who with one other only, survived in 1828. (Barber's Hist. Coll.) He was Associate Justice of the Court of Sessions, (a County Court,) 1809, and from 1811 to 1814. The following account of Judge Walker was written by his son, Judge Wm. P. Walker, on the day of his death, Oct. 31, 1831, addressed to Rev. Dr. Shepard, his pastor.

"He was born in Rehoboth, July 3, 1751, and came to this country when about 19 yrs. of age. He joined the army in May, 1775, at Cambridge, immediately after the battle of Lexington. He did not remain in the army till the close of the War. At what time he left, I cannot ascertain. I have heard him mention being with the army in Canada, and their great sufferings, especially from the small pox, which he had the natural way at Montrose. On the retreat of the army from Canada, which I think must have been in the Fall of 1776, he joined Washington's army in N. J., and was in the battles at Trenton and Princeton. He was also in the battle at Bennington, Vt. He was a member of the Convention which framed the Constitution of this Commonwealth, and was repeatedly a member of the General Court from this town. In 1781, soon after the adoption of the Constitution, he was appointed a Justice of the Peace in this county, and was in Commission till his death. In the same yr. he was appointed by Gov. Hancock, Register of Probate, which office he soon after resigned, (1785?) In 1783, he was appointed Senator from this county, but never took his seat at the Board. In Nov., 1795, he was appointed by Gov. Adams, Judge of Probate for this county, which office he resigned in Jan., 1824. In 1807, he was appointed by Gov. Sullivan, a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in this county, which office he held till a new system for that Court was established. In 1824, he was chosen elector of President and Vice President of the U. States.

He expired this morning at 2 o'clock.

In haste yours, WM. P. WALKER."

The following tribute to Judge W.'s worth, in the Lenox newspaper, was written, it is supposed, by Jas. W. Robbins, Esq.

Died, in this town, on Monday morning last, the venerable Judge Walker, ac. 80 yrs. Gov. Lincoln says, he was the most venerable man he ever saw. All who were acquainted with him, will say the same. If locks whitened in the snows of 80 winters; if great personal dignity, connected with distinguished

excellence of character; if the practice of the social virtues, together with a long life of public service; if exemplary morals and genuine piety give one the title of venerable, he was venerable. He was an officer in the American troops at Cambridge, in 1775, and from that period for more than 1/2 a century, he was a public man. Of the Convention that formed the Constitution of Mass., he was a member. For a long time he held the office of Judge of the County Court, and still longer that of Judge of Probate. He took a deep interest in the religious and charitable institutions of the last 25 yrs., and of the Bible Society, he was a President from its organization. He was extensively known in the Commonwealth, and as extensively respected. In the Co. of Berkshire, no man was better known or commanded more respect. Of the town of Lenox he was a father, and the inhabitants looked up to him with filial affection. He was a companionable man. Persons of all ages, the young as well as the old, sought his society, and few enjoyed it without sensible benefit. From his general intelligence, they obtained valuable information; from his practical wisdom, they derived useful lessons, applicable to the various concerns of life; and by his bright example they were stimulated to improvement. In his last yrs., he partially withdrew from the bustle of politics, from the labors and honors of office, and from the attractions of the world, and looked forward as an old man should do, to another state of existence.

Faith helped his vision to reach beyond the grave, and the anchor of his hope was moored in Heaven. Towards the close of his life, his religious character brightened, and as worldly objects grew less in his esteem, the objects of faith grew more distinct and more glorious. In expectation of appearing before the Eternal, his many virtues, and the usefulness of his life vanished from his view, and for acceptance he relied entirely upon the atonement and righteousness of his Divine Master. During his last sickness, he was deprived of his speech, and the most of the time, of his reason, so that he was unable to say anything of his hopes and prospects, but he has left to his friends for their consolation and improvement, the history of his whole life.

Allen's Biographical Dictionary, has in addition to a brief outline of his public services, this tribute.

"In his politics he was a republican in the party times of 1801. He was tall, with white locks, and of great personal dignity, * * * He was, indeed, venerated by those who knew him, not only for a long life of faithful service, but for his social virtues, his pure morals, his disinterested benevolence and ardent piety. Of the church at Lenox, he was an exemplary member: of the Berkshire Bible Society, President. In one of the last yrs. of his life he travelled over the bleak hills of Berkshire, with the sole object of arousing his fellow citizens in different towns, to a sense of the value of some moral or charitable institution designed for their benefit.

His epitaph, written it is supposed by Rev. Dr. Shepard is as follows:—

THIS IS ERECTED TO THE MEMORY OF THE

HONORABLE WILLIAM WALKER.

He was born at Rehoboth, in the County of Bristol, July 3, 1751, and died Oct. 31, 1831. He removed to this town in 1773, was an officer in the army of the Revolution in 1776,

a member of the convention which formed the Constitution of this Commonwealth in 1780, a judge of the Court of Common pleas four,

and judge of probate twenty-eight years.

In all the relations of life he sustained a character of unshaken integrity:—

He lived as a follower of Christ; was an able advocate of his doctrines; and died rejoicing in a Gospel hope.

His life was eventful, and is an interesting and instructive biography, especially in regard to religious belief and experience.

The following account of his scepticism and subsequent conversion, is taken from the American Pastor's Journal and Home Missionary Magazine, vol. 5th, 201st p., 1832

Dr. W., was born in a New England village, in 1766. His parents were respectable and of reputed piety. He early gave indications of a vigorous mind, and of a susceptible heart. His religious education ended where it ought to have commenced—with a knowledge of the Shorter Catechism. At an academy, he distinguished himself as a scholar, and made considerable progress in the Latin language. At the age of 22, he commenced the practice of medicine. His profession, of necessity, brought him in contact with the world. And here commenced a series of associations, which threw a cloud over more than 40 yrs. of his life. He was first pressed with the doctrine of universal salvation. * * And as it required no sacrifices, no self denial, and no self abasement, it readily recommended itself to the unrenewed heart. He tried to believe it. But his discerning mind detected the sophistry of the system, and left him restless as the rolling billow. * * * * The next step was to destroy the veracity of the Bible. * * To aid him in this fearful work, he called in Paine, Voltaire and Rosseau. He went not to the Bible to contemplate the sublimity of its doctrines—the purity of its precepts, the harmony of the system of revealed truth, and its tendency, as illustrated by facts, to promote the happiness of man. Like other infidels, he cast off fear, and restrained prayer before the Almighty. Thus 12 yrs. passed away, all the while professedly seeking for light, and yet not once directing his eye to Heaven. Those who did pray, he thought infatuated; and though sometimes, he was compelled to think them sincere, yet in his view, they were sincere hypocrites. The next 12 yrs. he spent in the mercantile business. He read and reasoned much, but only on such subjects as were calculated to make his infidel fortress strong. At length, the embargo embarrassed his business, and he with his family removed to the State of Ohio. There he resumed his former profession, and after 12 yrs., declined practice, to spend the remainder of his days in the quiet of retirement on a farm. Three score winters had now whitened his head, and yet the old man bowed not his knee in prayer. He had been what the world would call a strict moralist. * * He gloried in his consistency, and in the pride of his heart, looked with contempt on those, whom he called inconsistent christians. Their irregularities, whether fancied or real, he readily seized, to confirm himself in infidelity. Although he was not forward to disseminate his principles, he occasionally sought an encounter, to try the temper of his weapons. Having been so long accustomed to them, he could use them with no ordinary skill. With the keenness of his satire, and the cunning of his sophistry, he almost invariably triumphed. Success inspired him with courage, and increased his intellectual pride.

In the winter of 1831, the debate between Campbell and Owen fell into his hands. His long cherished sentiments and feelings inclined him to espouse Owen's side in the argument. As he read, he was struck with the palpable weakness, and inconsistency of his reasoning. "What," said he, "if the Deist has no better arguments than these, to support his system, I am ashamed of it." For the first time in his life, he was now seriously alarmed at the thought, that possibly, he had built his house upon the sand. Thought begat feeling and deep anxiety. In this state of mind, Providentially Wilson's "Evidences of the truth of Christianity" came within his reach. As he read, day began to dawn on a night of more than 40 years. The light of the truth rendered the darkness visible, and his danger apparent. * * * * He rose from the perusal of Wilson, convinced that the Bible is what it professes to be,-a Revelation from Heaven. This truth admitted, conviction of sin rushed upon his mind, and the old man bowed down his head in agony. He attended a meeting in the neighborhood, and heard two sermons by a passing preacher, from the following texts:-" Choose ye this day whom ye will serve:" and, "Now is the accepted time, behold! now is the day of salvation." The Holy Spirit made the word quick and powerful. He went home to read, and revere that volume, which for about half a century, he had neglected and despised. The man who had never prayed before, went home to cry—"God be merciful to me a sinner." His conscience was shaken, and he trembled under the mighty hand of God. After a short season of severe conflict, between the powers of light and darkness, the star of Bethlehem arose, and led him to Jesus. It was on a Sabbath morning. The night preceding had been dark to his soul. He arose from his pillow just as the day dawned, when the following train of thought passed through his mind. "This is the resurrection morning -on this morning Christ rose from the dead! But why did he die? To save sinners. Well, I am a sinner-a great sinner-and will he not save me?-Lord Jesus, save or I perish!" The storm was over, and the calmness of Heaven came over his spirit. He walked out. The winter was so far gone, that the birds were singing their morning anthems. The eastern sky appeared glowing in new and indescribable beauty. The fields and the forest seemed dressed in unwonted loveliness. Heaven and earth looked glad. He gazed and admired, and could no longer keep silent. Although unaccustomed to sing-

His tongue broke out in unknown strains, And sung surprising grace.

The next day on meeting him, he readily gave vent to his new-born feelings and hopes. Said he, "I have lived 60 yrs. and am scarcely 2 days old. I am a miracle of the grace of God! O how could I support old age without the consolations of religion, and without the promises written in that blessed volume, which I have so long slighted and abused!" Soon after, he had the happiness to embrace a prodigal son, who had wandered in the same cheerless path of infidelity. On the same day they both entered into covenant with God, and with his people.

* * * * After a life devoted to the cause of infidelity, he testified "I am led from a review of my past experience, to declare as my belief, that with all the infidel's boasted assurance, there never was a person brought up in a christian land, who could at all times, honestly and unhesitatingly say, I feel secure in a disbelief of the Bible."





He has for several yrs. been making researches into the early and romantic history of the North-West, and especially that of Mich. Through his instrumentality, principally, the Historical Society of Mich., founded by Gen. Cass and others in 1828, was re-organized in 1857, and he is its Corresponding Secretary. He delivered an address on "The Founding of Detroit," July 24, 1858, it being the 167th anniversary of its settlement; another on the "Early History of Mich.," March, 1859, which were published, and has read quite a number of papers upon similar subjects before the Hist. 



The story of his youthful ambition and struggles for an education, and his subsequent honors and success is as follows:—

About the age of 16 years, he determined in his own mind, to obtain a liberal education; but his parents wishing to keep both their sons upon the old homestead, were much opposed to it, and would not accede to his wishes for several yrs. Unknown to his parents, he commenced the study of the Greek and Latin languages, while at the Castleton Academy, and made sufficient progress to enable him to pursue them without a teacher. On learning that he was engaged in such studies, his father took him home, and told him that he had better learn the art of farming. To this, he submitted cheerfully, and continued to labor on the farm for some time, but in the meanwhile pursued his studies. late every evening, and every rainy day. In the Winter, he taught school, and husbanded his money like a miser. In the month of Aug. 1829, the day when the having was finished, his father gave his workmen an extra treat, as was then usual on such occasions. Calling them together, for this purpose, he found that this son was absent.

As an Attorney at Law, he never advises, nor engages in a suit, unless morally certain, that the cause is a just one. He has the reputation of being an honest lawyer, and has secured a large and lucrative practice, and is an extensive landholder.

March 4, 1857, he removed to a place in the woods, in St. Clair Co., on the Port Huron & Milwaukie R. R., and laid out a town, which he named "Capac," from Manco Capac, the first of the Peruvian Incas. He is now principally employed in extensive lumbering operations, and in developing the growth of his new town.



786. I. WILLIAM PERRIN, (1508) b. Oct. 8, 1778, in Lenox, d. Nov. 11, 1858. He m. Jan. 29, 1807, Lucy Adam, dau. of John Adam, Esq., of Canaan, Ct., and had 9 chil. He was graduated at Williams Coll. in 1798, was admitted to the Bar, and began the practice of Law in 1801, (1803?). He was proposed for admission to the Supreme Court in 1804, and the usual entry was made, "and the Court will advise." He was not actually admitted till 1810. He was Representative 1 yr., 1809, and Senator 1810, '11 and '15, in the State Legislature: was a candidate of the Republican party for Representative to Congress. He was Chief Justice of the Court of Sessions of the County, from 1819 to '28, a member of the Governor's Council in 1811 and '24, and in 1824, on the resignation of his father, he was appointed Judge of Probate, which office he held 24 yrs., till his resignation in 1848, when the infirmities of age compelled him to seek seclusion from public cares. He was also nominated by the Whig party, as a candidate for Lieut. Governor, with Gov. Everett, but declined the nomination. He was one of the most prominent of the old Jeffersonian party, in the Western part of the State; but he abjured politics, in the later years of his life. Over 6 ft. in height, and well proportioned, his personal appearance and manners, were uncommonly dignified and elegant, and could always command attention and deference. He possessed an unusual sensitiveness, which lent a refinement, delicacy and courtesy, to his character and deportment, and unfitted him for the strifes of political life. Shrinking from the vices, so common among men of his profession, always temperate, honorable and true, he was distinguished by remarkable purity of morals. He was fond of reading, exceedingly well informed, of quick discernment, and penetrating judgment. Hospitality and generosity, were prominent qualities in his character. Meanness, his soul never knew. His dispatch in business was remarkable. As a citizen he was mild, candid, and free from all partizan feeling and expression. His influence in the town, was very great, and all looked up to him for counsel, and paid him the highest respect. He was also very affectionate and amiable in temper, and in the relations of domestic and private life, he was exemplary and faithful. As a Judge he was courteous, patient, dispassionate, intelligent, and impartial. Honorable sentiments, unquestioned integrity, and genial and

pleasant manners, made him a popular citizen, and a highly satisfactory Judge; and during the active years of his life, he held an enviable position in the affections, respect and confidence of the people of Berkshire County. His father, the elder Judge, could control an audience wonderfully. The son was not so popular as a speaker. The two were very different men, yet alike in integrity, and strong sense of justice, and in the situations they occupied, these traits, peculiarly qualified them, to be the protectors of the widow and fatherless, and for the long period of more than half a century, they discharged the duties of the office, with signal ability and success. They are both remembered and spoken of to this day, as men of most excellent judgment, incorruptible honor, and spotless purity.

A Discourse in memory of Judge Walker, upon the text, Job, 19th chap., 21st v., was preached, Nov. 14, 1858, by Rev. E. K. Alden, pastor of the Cong. church in L. It is published and entitled, "The Lesson of Severe, Protracted Suffering." The following is an extract:—

"If what I have looked upon, was, as I have been told, but the wreck,—that silvered head, that brow, that front, were a noble ruin—it must once have been a princely crown. * * * * * The mere cold statement that, 'he moved into his sick room in Oct. 1851, and never left it without assistance; has continued almost perfectly helpless; for nearly four years has received his food from the hands of others; and for several months has been unable, but with extreme difficulty to converse even with his own family; how little such a brief summary tells us of what have constituted so many days and nights of continuous discomfort, often associated with excruciating pain. * * * * It is a grateful record to add, that on the Sabbath, the 7th of March, 1852, in the presence of a few friends—this venerable man was received in his sick room, to the fellowship of the visible church of Christ."

The following just estimate of Mrs. O.'s life and character, appeared in the Utica Morning Herald of Sept. 6, 1859:—

For her, few words of eulogy can be necessary, for the poor knew her liberal hand, the afflicted her sympathizing word, the church her ever active, ever disinterested energy, and the thousands of children now weekly gathered into the Sabbath schools of the city, enjoy the advantages of an institution of which she may fairly be recognized as here, the originator and graceful pillar. The qualities which, in her mature years, so endeared her to all, and brought forth such abundant fruit of usefulness, were early developed. Having been brought by her parents to this city, in childhood, nearly a half century of benevolent, religious labors, unremitting and humble, and therefore more than ordinarily efficacious, have secured for her a pre-eminent place, in the history of the charities and religious labors of our city. While with many who have grown up, meeting her weekly in the Sabbath school, her labors in that institution have chiefly commended her to their esteem and affection, it is but one of the many modes in which she exerted herself to do good. In tract distribution, in personal acts of benevolence, in zeal and energy, in

all matters relative to the church, with which she was connected and the cause of religion generally, she had no peer in the system, constancy, and disinterested fidelity of her labors. Certainly not in the church of which she was a member, perhaps not in the whole community, is there a person whose religious influence has been so decided, and so pervading as hers. She had one master passion: to do good, to relieve suffering, and convert souls to Christ. Herein lay her ambition and her pleasure; the singleness of purpose with which she pursued this object, is the explanation of the degree of usefulness she achieved.

In 1816, the deceased, who had then recently (1814) made profession of religion during a revival, was one of four young ladies to originate Sabbath schools in this city, (the first West of Schenectady.)

For more than forty years Mrs. Ostrom continued her labors in the Sabbath school, and for months after she felt that the hand of death was upon her, she attended every Sunday, at a mission school, still prosecuting the self-denying labor, she had begun in the bright dawn of her maidenhood.

While Mrs. Ostrom chose the Sabbath school as the scene of active labor, she made it also the subject of careful study. As evidence of the well-digested opinions she had long ago formed concerning it, it may be mentioned that twenty years ago, or more, application having been made to her, with others, for hints towards a work on the "Sabbath School Teacher," by Rev. John Todd, she elaborated an essay on the question, "Ought unconverted persons to be employed as teachers in Sabbath Schools?" which is embodied in that work. She possessed a good degree of culture and accomplishments, which to another would have been conspicuous. With her, the depth of religious feeling, and the zeal of religious labor, rendered all other qualities subordinate.

Her practical liberality was commensurate with her theoretical benevolence, and her religion, while a light set upon a hill, yet irradiated, warmed, and blessed her home, and every private relation of life. While active beyond what is ordinary in either sex, in every good work, she never offended the nicest sense of female delicacy, never for an instant stepped beyond the strictest limits of woman's sphere.

For nearly three weeks she lay in almost hourly anticipation of death. She was peaceful, nay triumphant in her faith of a blissful immortality, and still exhibited that disinterested solicitude for the eternal welfare of her friends, which ever rested in her heart, and rose upon her lips.

A Discourse commemorative of Mrs. O., by Rev. P. H. Fowler, D. D., of Utica, upon the text, Rom. 16th chap., 3d and 4th verses, and entitled, "Woman's Sphere of Usefulness," has been published.

Mr. O. was a lawyer, and d. in Poughkeepsie, Aug. 10, 1845, ac. 51 yrs.

The following is condensed from the tributes to his memory, which appeared in the Utica papers:—

"He successively occupied the offices of Clerk, Trustee and Assessor of the then village, (Utica,) and after its incorporation as a city, those of a mem. of the Common Council and Mayor. He rose through the various Military grades, to that of Major General, and subsequently, for several yrs., discharged the duties of Chief Engineer

of the City Fire Department.

His life was one of great activity and usefulness. Often called by his fellow citizens to occupy posts of honor, he discharged their duties with promptitude and fidelity. Never has our community been called to mourn the loss of a citizen more respected and beloved. The urbanity of his manners, the strength of his friendship, the tenderness and benevolence of his heart, had endeared him to a very large circle of acquaintance. Although overtaken by death, while absent from home, it found him not unprepared. For several yrs, he had been a m. of the ch. of Christ, and in his dying hour, his will was submissive, his faith was strong, and his soul was replete with love to God and man. So triumphant was his faith, that it robbed death of its sting, and communicated to surviving friends a comfort inestimable, in the sad hour of their bereavement."

The following is compiled from the several obituaries which appeared in the Ithaca, New Bruńswick and Utica papers, after Mrs. Mann's decease:—

"She became pious, when very young, united with the Pres. ch. of Utica, and from that time evinced the genuineness of her conversion, by the interest she felt in the cause of her Redeemer. By her engaging deportment, she soon won the affection of all with whom she associated, and a very short acquaintance was sufficient to form the closest ties, and to excite the tenderest affection. Scarcely had she been united to him who had promised to nourish and protect her, and who fondly anticipated through a long series of yrs. to redeem his pledge, ere the dread foe to man, envious of mortal bliss, sent in advance his messenger of disease, and claimed her for his own. A fever of typhoid character, which baffled the skill of her physicians, and tantalized the vigilant watchings of her friends, at a period which promised recovery, proved treacherous and fatal. From the scene of nuptial festivity, from the bridal chamber to the grave, brief was the journey of this young and lovely victim.

She had before her, the fairest promise of happiness. Her intelligence, piety and gentleness of manners, admirably fitted her for the responsible station she had assumed as the wife of a clergyman; and during the few brief months of her married life, she had acquired the love and firm regard of her newly adopted friends. Death came upon her when the attachment to life is usually strongest, and the victim least prepared. But she was found confident in her faith, and resigned herself tranquilly to the summons above."

She was beautiful in person, more than ordinarily intellectual, of devoted piety, and the fragrance of her memory is still precious. The sermon preached by Rev. Dr. Bethune, in improvement of her early death, was subsequently published.







In the Metcalf Genealogy, contributed by Dr. Luther M. Harris, of Jamaica Plain, to the Genealogical Register, 1852, 172 pp., there is an abstract of the will of Michael Metcalf, of Dedham, dated 15: 9, 1664. In it, he made this bequest: "To my daughter, Joane Walker, 40s." There were other chil., sons and daus. Joane was the 10th child, b. March 24, 1632, and m., the Genealogy states, Samuel (?) Walker, of Rehoboth. The will, however, does not give Mr. W.'s christian name. There is no Samuel, of so early a date, in any Old Colony Record, either town or county, and every Walker (except one since 1800,) who is mentioned in the Records of Rehoboth, Seekonk and Attleboro', (parts of the old township of Rehoboth,) and also in Bristol Co. Rec., has a place in the Genealogy of Philip Walker and his descendants. There is strong circumstantial proof, that there was no Samuel Walker in R. so early.

May not the compiler of the Metcalf Genealogy have mistaken Samuel for Philip. Philip's wife's name was Jane. The dates also will justify this theory. Besides, Philip had a son Michael. May not his name have been derived from the grandfather Michael. This is the only instance in which the name occurs among nearly 1900 Walkers, descendants from Philip, and as he had a son Samuel, it is probable, that tradition has confounded the names, and led the compiler of the Metcalf Genealogy into error.

With no other proof of the existence of a Samuel Walker in Rehoboth, at this period, except the Metcalf Genealogy, it is very much less probable, that "he died and left no sign," and no descendant, than that there was no such Samuel Walker.

1. WILLIAM WALKER, (2)

OF EASTHAM,

AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

THE earliest notice of any William Walker in this country, is found in the Proprietors' Records of the town of Hingham. He received a grant of land in 1636, among the first settlers of H. it is highly probable, that he is the William mentioned in Savage's Gleanings, with Richard, James and Sarah embarking for New England, in the Elizabeth, in April, 1635; (see 4th p. of this Genealogy;) 1st, because several of those who received grants in Hingham at this time, afterward went to Taunton, where James and Sarah were, and several to Rehoboth, where James Walker's mother and brother Philip settled. In addition to this, the date of his grant, harmonizes with that of his leaving England. Furthermore, there is no trace of a William Walker in any other town of the Old Colony, at so early a period. And this mention of a grant of land to him in Hingham, is the only one in the records of H. concerning him. He then disappears. These circumstances favor the conjecture, that the William in H. in 1636, and the William afterward in Eastham, were the same person. Only 16 years of age when in Hingham, if we suppose him to have been the William of the Elizabeth, from London, the dates respecting William Walker of Eastham, do not make the theory at all improbable; they rather confirm it, inasmuch as these were the only William Walkers in the Old Colony, of whom there is any record.

In an article by S. G. Drake, Esq., in the N. E. Hist. & Gen. Reg., Oct. 1860, on "The Founders of New England," is the following, copied by him, from a small parchment vol. in the Rolls Office, Chancery Lane, London:—

"May the 11th, 1637. The examinaction of John Gedney of Norwich, in Norff.....to passe for New England with his wife Sarah,

ageed 25 yeares.....Lediah, Hannah and John; mo' 2 Seruants; William Walker, ageed.....Burges ageed 26 yeares are desirous to passe for Salam."*

He may have been the William, of whom the Mass. Col. Records, Vol. IV., Part II., 66 p., (1662) give the following memorial:—

"In ans' to the petition of Willjam Walker, seaman, now a prisoner for the breach of ye law abt making suite to a servant majd without the masters consent first obteyned, &c., the Court, considering he was a strainger, & not knowing the lawe, that he hath lyen in prison neere a moneth, judged meet to graunt his request & dischardg him, he paying the chardge of the prison."

As John Gedney came to Salem, his "Seruant William Walker" belonged to the Mass. Colony, and there being no trace or record of a William Walker in the Colony, except the preceding, he may have been the unfortunate person whose matrimonial aspirations received such unfriendly treatment from the master of the "servant majd," but whose ignorance of the lawe, enlisted the lenity of the Government. Whether one and the same, or not, neither of them could have been the William in Hingham, 1636, and without doubt, neither, was the William of Eastham. These, though few, are all the instances of the name in the ancient records, except such as are known to relate to William of E.†

There can be little doubt that the William emigrating in the Elizabeth, April, 1635, and 15 years of age, was the William of H., in 1636, and though there is no positive proof that he went to E., yet, as there is no trace of him in H. after 1636, it may be presumed, that he was the one who settled in E., and was the father of the Eastham Walkers. He was not related to the other Walkers of the Old Colony, or if so, only remotely, being of the same age as James of Taunton, who came in the same ship with him. As his name is associated in the certificate of conformity, with "Richard ae. 24 yrs.," who went to Lynn, it is more probable they were more or less nearly related.

WILLIAM WALKER OF EASTHAM, b. 1620, m. Jan. or Feb., (Feb. 25, Plym. Col. Rec.,) 1654, Sarah Snow, dau. of Nicholas,‡ of E., had 6 chil., and d. at an advanced age. His will was proved, 1703.

[‡]He was a man of considerable note in the Colony. He was Deputy, Select-man 7 yrs., and Town Clerk 16 yrs. He d. 1671.

His name is in the list of those able to bear arms in 1643, but the time of his settlement in E., is unknown. He was propounded June 8, 1655, and admitted to freedom, June 3, 1656. He was chosen to take up the excise, in 1664 and '67, and to take notice of what liquors were brought into the Gov., and the following is evidence, that he was not neglectful of the duties of his office, nor indifferent to the welfare of the town:—

"Trustrum Hull, of Barnstable, brought a barrell of rum to the town of E., and sold it, but gave noe account of it to either of us, and we thought it good to give the Court notice of it. June 9, 1655."

He was surveyor of highways, 1668, '69, '78 and '79, and constable in 1682.

"May 3, 1653, there were agitations about and conserning a warr with the Duch, in these ptes of America,....and messengers sent by comissioners to the Munhatoes,....and preperacön was made, viz., warrants issued for the pressing of 60 men; Eastham to furnish 3. Morouer two barkqes were alsoe pressed to attend the expedition,....the barkqe in which Richard Knowles sayleth, with him, the master thereof was pressed for the same purpose with John Younge and Willam Walker, and all things nessearie for their vse belonging to the said barkqe." Plym. Col. Rec., 3d vol., 30, 31 pp.

Ralph Smith was fined, in 1662-3, for striking and thrusting over a boat thought Willam Walker. Samuel Smith was fined, for saying he "could find in his hart to stick a pen into Willam Walker."

They may have had some provocation, for the Col. Rec. show, that as a man, he was not altogether blameless.

Plym. Col. Rec. 6th vol., 170th p., June 2, 1685. "William Walker, haueing 2 naturall sons in the training band, and 1 killed in the warrs, and some weakness and infirmitye of body, the Court orders that hee, the said William Walker, from hence forward shall be excused from training."

Grants of land were made to him, as follows, viz.:—

"A parcel of land granted to Wm. Walker, lying upon * * * * * * containing 20 acres, more or less. Lying on the southwest side of the pond; and bounded at each corner by 4 several trees marked, leaving a sufficient passage between his land and the pond, as the trees are marked, the tree upon the southwest corner being upon a * * * * *. April 27, 1659.

A parcel of meddow granted to Wm. Walker. Lying at Silver Spring meddow, and containing 3 acres and $\frac{3}{4}$, more or less, bounded by Jonathan Sparrow's bounds, at the beach by a marked tree, and by Nicholas Snow by a marked tree, and a stake in the marsh. April 27, 1659.

A parcell of upland, granted to William Walker adjoining to his house lott on the southern side, containing two acres more or less, bounded by 3 trees marked. March 6, 1663.

Granted to William Walker, Senior, for (convenience?) to sett his house where his new dwelling house now stands, a small parcell of upland and swamp, containing one acre, more or less, bounded by the swamp side, toward John Mayo's, &c., &c., &c. Feb. 23, 1683.

Granted to Wm. Walker, Senior, a small bitt of land, at the westerly end of his land next the meeting house, that is to say, so much as to make his fence straite from the corner of his land, next Samuel Freeman's, to the corner of his own fence, at the brow of the hill above said Walker's barne—this grant is allowed of by the major part of the men appointed by the Town, to have a negative note in disposing of lands, in the Town of Eastham. Recorded April 30, 1699."

Another grant of two acres is made, same date, and described in vol. 1st, 106 p., of Eastham Records of land and meadow. Tradition says he lived on the North bank of the Great Pond, about 500 yds., west of his father-in-law, Nicholas Snow. There have been houses on the place to this day, and it has been in possession of the Walkers till the purchase lately, by Philip Smith.

His descendants have not been numerous. Living on the sea shore, a considerable number have been engaged in maritime pursuits, and exposed to their perils, some died in early manhood, and others with few or no children.

1. JOHN WALKER, (2)

OF MARSHFIELD,

AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

His origin, and the date of his birth, and of his emigration to this country, are unknown. He first appears in 1643, and his name is in the list of those able to bear arms at that time. Only the scantiest details have been gleaned by the most diligent search for information respecting him. There is no indication of any relationship between him and the other Walkers of the Old Colony. He occupied no prominent position, and was entrusted with no public services. His life was brief. Dying in the prime of his manhood, there was little opportunity, even if his abilities qualified him, to participate in public affairs, so as to have his name conspicuous in the records of the town or Colony. He was on the grand inquest in 1654, and took the oath of fidelity in 1657.

He m. Oct. 20, 1654, Lydia Reed, of Marshfield, dau. of Mrs. Margaret (Reed) Howland, who m. 2d, Arthur Howland, Sen., of M. He had 1 son and 3 daus., and d. or was buried Dec. 11, 1663. In'y, £57:9:9. Mr. Howland was a zealous Quaker, and it is probable that, John Walker, his son-in-law, adopted the same religious opinions. Many of his descendants, some in every generation, to the present time, have been members of the Society of Friends. There is a burying ground of this people on the ancient Howland estate, where the early families, bearing these names, Walker and Howland, were buried. As the discipline of this Society did not until lately, allow of memorial stones, no data can be gathered respecting those whose dust is deposited there.

The descendants of John Walker have not been numerous. The family is a small one. The earlier and present generations have been characterized by industry, economy and cheerfulness, and have belonged, with scarcely an exception, to the mechanical and agricultural classes. They have been long-lived and some have reached a great age.

He had a son John, and so had John, of M., for the "gd. son John," in the will, must be his son,—Isaac, his only brother, having no son John. In the list of his 5 chil. in D. Rec., he is called John Jr. His will was proved Oct. 19, 1742. The same name, same religious faith, same occupation, with dates concurring, leave no room for doubt, that this John Jr., removed to Dartmouth. His descendants, with few exceptions, have been members of the Soc. of Friends.

He was quite a noted Tory, and piloted the British troops (who were stationed in Marshfield by Gen. Gage, prior to the Revolution,) to a place suitable for embarkation on Marshfield beach, where a vessel from Boston was in the offing waiting to receive them. This occurred when the news of the battle at Lexington reached M. He with 2 sons, Zara and Benjamin joined the Loyalists at Boston. The sons went away with the British in their evacuation of the town. The father, while fishing near Boston light, for the loyal party, was taken prisoner by a rebel craft, and carried to Springfield jail for safe keeping, he having been one of the 23 Tories who returned thanks to Gen. Gage and Admiral Graves, "for their ready and kind interposition in sending troops to protect them from the threatened insults of their neighbors," meaning the Whig or Revolutionary party. This very

party on account of his family, petitioned for his release from prison, and restoration to his family, on the usual conditions which the times demanded. His confession of past bad conduct and promise of good for the future, with that of 11 others, is entered on the books of the town, under date of July 14, 1777.

An old gentleman, Isaac Thomas, living in M., 1858, about 94 yrs. of age, who was present when the repentant Tory returned and met his family, could give quite a graphic description of the scene. It is presumed that the Messrs. Walkers proved true friends to their country, after their recantation of Tory sympathies and principles.

JOHN WALKER,

OF MARSHFIELD.

The jury appointed "to view the dead body of John Walker, seruant to Robert Latham of this towne," gave their verdict the last of Jan. 1654. This may be found in the 3d vol. of Plym. Col. Rec.

"Att the Generall Court holden att New Plymouth the sixt day of March, 1654, Robert Latham was indited for fellonious crewelty done vnto John Walker, his seruant, aged about 14 yeares, by vnreasonable conection, by withholding necessary food and clothing, and by exposing his said servant to extremitie of seasons, whereof the said John Walker languished and immediately died, the 15th day of January, anno., 1654."

"A pettye jury was impannelld and sent forth vpon the case. These found the said Robert Latham guilty of manslaughter by chaune medley. Where vpon the prisoner desired the benefitt of law, viz: a psalue of mercye, which was graunted him, and sentence was further pronownsed against him, which was, that the said Robert Latham should bee burned in the hand, and his haueing noe lands, that all his goods are confiscate vnto his highnes, the Lord Protector; and that the said sentance should bee forthwith executed, which accordingly was pformed the 4th of March, 1654."

FRANCIS WALKER,

OF MIDDLEBORO'.

He m. between 1650 and 1668, Elizabeth Soule, dau. of Geo. Soule, the 35th signer of the compact in the May Flower, and one of Richard Warren's Company in the assignments of lands. Nath'l Warren, son of Richard, m. Sarah Walker, 1645, and Nath'l her son, settled in Mid'o. It is a natural conjecture that Francis and Sarah Walker were related. Their origin is unknown. He was one of the proprietors of land in Duxbury, 1672, was living in M., in 1668, and as late as 1673. There is no evidence in the Mid'o', Duxbury, or any Old Colony Records, that he had any descendants, unless the following be such. In the 77th division of land in Mid'o', July 6, 1789, Francis Walker and John Haskell had the 4th and 5th lots. Over 100 yrs. intervene, with not even a link to establish a connection.

THOMAS WALKER,

OF BRISTOL, R. I.,

AND HIS DESCENDANTS.

THOMAS WALKER,1 (2) was one of the founders of Bristol, in 1681, with the distinguished Capt. Church. His origin is unknown. There is no proof that he was related to the other Walkers of the Old Colony. He was propounded a freeman, and took the oath of fidelity, June 6, 1682. He was a tanner, and owned a windmill or cornmill, "rate free from tax." He filled a prominent place in the affairs of the town, and was honored with various civil offices. In 1702 he was a constable, an assessor in 1682 and '94, on the jury, 1696 and 1707, and tithing-man, 1716. He held the office of Select-man, 1686-7, '92, '98, 1701, 2, 3, 4, 5, 7. He was also a member of the Com., "to agree with Mr. Woodbridge about salary." He m. Nov. 4, 1684, Elizabeth Parris, and had 2 sons and 2 daus. His will was made, 1721-2, when he was "aged and infirm," and was proved 1724. To his wife Eliz'th, who survived him, he bequeathed his "negro boy, Peleg." In'y £133. Her will was made 1735, and proved, April 8, 1743. All that is now known of his participation in public affairs, and the civil distinctions conferred upon him, is given here, and is creditable to his abilities and moral worth. He had few descendants, and his name, it is supposed early became extinct.

APPENDIX.

To show how abundantly the race of Walkers was early planted in the soil of New England, brief notices of those of the Mass. Colony, and other sections of N. E., who were here before 1700, are introduced. There were 14 of the name in the country, even before 1650, not including those of the Old Colony, nor those related to each other.

ARCHIBALD WALKER, OF PROVIDENCE, R. I.

He emigrated from Scotland, and settled in Providence. He was

tailor, and tradition reports him to have been a worthy man.

He was in P., 1700, m. Mary Gardner, and had chil.—(1) Charles, b. May 6, 1691, m. May 22, 1719, Alice Mitchell, both of P. (2) Susanna, b. 1695. (3) Abigail, b. 1699, m. Jonathan Aldrich, March 13, 1725–6. (4) Hezekiah, b. 1701. (5) Nath'l, b. 1704. (6) Anne, b. 1709. His descendants settled in Scituate, R. I., and the name is there yet.

AUGUSTIN WALKER, OF CHARLESTOWN.

He came, it is supposed, from Old Sarum, Eng. to Charlestown, about 1640. He was a shipmaster and died in Bilboa, Spain. In'y, Oct. 1653. He and his w. Hanna were m. ch. Chil.—(1) Hanna, b. Sept. 12, 1640. (2) Samuel, b. Oct. 11, [1?] 1642. (It has been thought that he m. Sarah Reed, 1662, and settled in Woburn. This is an error. It was Sam'l, Jr., b. June or Sept. 28, 1643.) BENJAMIN WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He was one of the founders of Brattle St. Church. He m. Patsey ——. The record of chil. is from an Old Testament in possession of Dr. Joshua Green, of Groton, viz.,—(1) Eliz'th, b. July 13, 1673. (2) Jane, bapt. May 8, 1676. (3) Benj. b. Dec. 28, 1677–8, all in London, Eng. (4) Benj. 2d, b. Jan. 24, 1679–80, in Boston, and living 1753. (5) Eliz'th, b. April 29, 1682. (6) John, b. DORCAS WALKER, OF ROXBURY.

She was buried April 17, 1640. "Possibly she was mother of John, (says Mr. Savage) and too wise to partake of his heresy, and too old to go to R. I., with him."

GEORGE WALKER, OF NEW HAVEN.

He was married, and in 1645 "was licensed to retail spirits."

GEORGE WALKER, OF READING.

He was one of the early settlers, and probably, says Mr. Savage, a son of an earlier one, or it may be a mistake for Walkup. If Walker, perhaps it was Geo., of Portsmouth, who m. 1689, and d. 1741, ac. 86.

GEORGE WALKER, OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

His name is in "the humble addresse of the inhabitants and train soldiers of ye Province of N. H.," to the Governor of Mass., for protection, Feb. 20, 1689. Perhaps this was the Capt. Geo. of Portsmouth.

HENRY WALKER, OF GLOUCESTER.

He was in G., 1647, m. Sept. 26, 1662, Mrs. Mary Brown, and d. 1693. He was made freeman Oct. 8, 1672. Perhaps he was the Henry of Ipswich, 1651.

HENRY WALKER, OF IPSWICH.

He was one of the first settlers, or first appeared in I., in 1651.

ISAAC WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He m. Sarah, and 2d or 3d Susan, wid. of Henry Symonds, who d. Sept. 30, 1646. He m. Susanna ——, and d. Oct. 19, 1688. He was made freeman 1646, m. Old South ch. 1674. He was a proprietor of Lancaster, but did not rem. there. He had 6 or 7 chil., who died young, except Nicholas, b. 1651, and Stephen, b. 1656, and perhaps Isaac.

ISABEL WALKER, OF LANCASTER.

She d. April 3, 1669. Nothing more is known of her.

JAMES WALKER, OF CHELMSFORD.

Perhaps he was the son of Augustin. He m. Eliz'th, and had—(1) Zechariah, b. Jan. 14, 1659. (2) Eleazer, b. Nov. 9, 1660.

JOHN WALKER, OF R. I.

He m. Hannah, dau. of Capt. Edward Hutchinson. Both m. ch. in Roxbury. He was admitted a freeman, 1634, rem. to Boston, where he was disarmed, Nov. 1637. He went with Wm. Coddington and other sympathizers of the famous Mrs. Ann Hutchinson, to Aquedneck, R. I., was in Portsmouth, R. I., 1638, and had grant of 100 acres in P. Feb. 1639. Nothing more is known of him.

JOHN WALKER, OF CHARLESTOWN.

JOHN WALKER, OF BEVERLEY.

He m. Eliz'th Woodbury, dau. of Humphrey, and had daus.— (1) Sarah. (2) Eunice.

JOHN WALKER, OF ——.

He was a soldier in Capt. Turner's Company, and killed in King Philips War, May 19, 1676, in "The Fall Fight," at what is now Turner's Falls. He had no descendants in 1731.

JOHN WALKER, OF NEW HAVEN, CT.

He was one of those who entered into and subscribed to "the fundamental agreement of the free planters," 1639; also one of those who drew lots, 1641, "on ye banke side and by ye west creeke," and became freeman 1644. He m. Grace ——, and d. early. His inv'y was taken April 22, 1652. Chil.—(1) Mary, bap. March, 1641, m. Jan. 1, 1661, John Brown. (2) Hannah, bap. 1646, m. May 6, 1668, Sam'l Hall.

JO. WALKER, OF ——.

He was one of those to be transported to Virginia, embarqued in the Eliz'th, Aug. 1, 1635, ae. 16.

JOSEPH WALKER, OF PORTSMOUTH, N. H.

He was one of many petitioners, 1655.

JOSEPH WALKER, OF BOSTON.

"Mr. J. W." was in B., 1679. See Lane Fam. Papers, (Gen. Reg. 1857, 233d p.) Was he son of Robert or had Robert's son rem. to Conn.? A Jos. W. and w. Abigail had Joseph, b. Dec. 8, 1674, Joanna, b. May 5, 1677. See 405th p., 33d line.

MATTHEW WALKER, OF ——.

"May 26,1680, M.W., aged about 63, died very suddainly, none yt time in ye room wth him. He was well a few minutes before." (Journal of Rev. Simon Bradstreet, New London, Ct.)

OBADIAH WALKER, OF READING.

He was one of the early settlers. (Eaton.) Nothing more is known of him, except that he had—(1) Sarah, in R., b. Aug. 2, 1674, d. Aug. 18, 1674.

NATHANIEL WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He obtained a grant of 240 acres in right of Morrill, of Roxbury, May 27, 1668. It was near S. W. "of Groaten towne, beyond Nashaway River."

RICHARD WALKER,1 OF LYNN.

He was b. in 1593. He came to this country in 1630, settled in Lynn, spent several yrs. in Reading, was Rep. 1650, went back to L., and was buried May 16, 1687, ac. 95 yrs. He was a captain and prominent man. He had 2 sons and 2 daus.? Chil.—

- (1) Richard,² b. 1611, came to this country 1635. (See 4th p.) He was "a man endowed with faith, and of a courageous spirit," and leader of the Band of Reading men against the Indians. He lived in Reading and was Rep. 1660 and '73.
- (2) Samuel,² removed to Reading. He d. 1684. (Wob. Rec.) The Reading Records give names of his chil., thus—

RICHARD WALKER, OF ----.

His name is in the list of such persons as shipt at town of Hampton, in the James of London, of ijic tonnes, Wm. Cooper, Master, vs.: New Eng., in and about 6 of April, 1635. The record found by Mr. Savage in Eng. is—"Richard Walker, shomaker, late of Marlborough."

RICHARD WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He was perhaps the "shoemaker" who came in the James, in 1635. He m. 1637, Anne, wid. of Robert Bolton. She was cast out of the church, because of intemperance and other misdemeanors, and sentenced to the whipping-post. He was in B., 1650. No chil.

RICHARD WALKER, OF SALEM.

He had a grant 1637. Persis, who joined the ch., in S., in 1639, may have been his dau. He may have been the Richard of Manchester, and father of Richard of Ipswich, 1671 and 1700.

RICHARD WALKER, OF IPSWICH.

He was admitted freeman, May 31, 1671.

RICHARD WALKER, OF LONG ISLAND.

He was one of the pioneer settlers and first purchasers of Middleburg or Newtown, near Flushing, L. I., about 1652.

RICHARD WALKER, OF NEW LONDON, CT. 1695.

ROBERT WALKER,1 OF BOSTON.

He was b. about 1606, and d. May 29, 1687. He was a "linen webster," came from Manchester, Eng., settled in B., and was one of the founders of the Old South Ch. Sewall says he was "a very good man." His w. d. Dec. 21, 1695. Chil.—(1) Elishua, b. 1635, m. Benj'n Thurston. (2) Zechariah, b. 1637, d. Jan. 20, 1699-1700. He m. Susanna, dau. of Dr. Bryan Rossiter, of Guilford, Ct. He was a Pres. minister at Jamaica, L. I., and then in Stratford, now Woodbury, Ct. He had 1 son, Zechariah, and 2 daus. (3) John,2 b. 1639, d. 1652. (4) Sarah, b. 1641, d. 1643. (5) Jacob, b. 1644. m. 1670, Mrs. Eliza Blackman, [Blakeman?] settled in S., and had 3 sons, Sam'l, Moses, John and 3 daus. (6) Joseph, b. 1646, m. Nov. 14, 1667, Mary, dau. of Rev. Peter Prudden, settled in Ct., and had Robert and 3 others. The sons of Robert1 settled in Conn., and their descendants lived mostly in Stratford, Woodbury and Killingworth, Ct. (7) Thomas, and (8) Mary, twins, b. 1649. (9) Eliakim, b. 1652, d. 1654. (10) Mary, b. 1654. (11) John, b. 1656, d. 1657.

SAMUEL WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He was a merchant in B. 1654, and m. Sarah, dau. of Joshua Scottow, who gave him an estate in B. 1672. Nothing more is known of him. Perhaps he was the Sam'l with w. Sarah, of Boston, who had Sarah, Dec. 10, 1679, Mercy, July 5, '81, Sam'l, April 25, '83, Wm., Dec. 8, '84, Mary, Oct. '86, Eliz'th, Nov. 16, '88.

SAMUEL WALKER, OF EXETER, N.H.

Farmer says he was in E. 1639. He took the oath of freeman in E., April 17, 1644. Perhaps this was Sam'l of Reading.

SARAH WALKER, OF ——.

She m., 2d wife, Nov. 19, 1683, Benj. Lombard, of ———, and had (1) *Bathshua*, b. May 4, 1687. (2) *Sarah*, b. Oct. 29, 1688. (3) *Mary*, b. June 17, 1688? (4) *Sam'l*, b. Sept. 15, 1691. She d. Nov. 6, 1693.

SHUBAEL WALKER, OF LYNN.

He m. May 29, 1666, at L., Patience Jewett, and was buried Jan. 24, 1689. He was a Captain, and lived at Swampscott Farms; in L. 1650, and in Haverhill, Nov. 28, 1677. He was also of Rowley, and early a Town Clerk, at one time, in Reading, living in what is now called Bradford. He was one of the select-men of B. Reading Rec. give names of his chil. (1) Richard, b. June 8, 1667. (2) Mary, b. Oct. 30, 1669. The name of his son confirms the conjecture, that he was son of Richard, of Lynn.

THOMAS WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He m. Anne, and d. July 2, 1659. He was a brick-burner. His w. survived him. Chil.—(1) *Elizabeth*, b. 1650. (2) *John*, b. 1652. (3) *Ann*, b. 1654, d. 1655. (4) *Sam'l*, b. 1656. (5) *Ann*, b. 1659. *Thomas* was perhaps oldest, and probably rem. to Sudbury. He was adm'r of his father's estate.

THOMAS WALKER, OF BOSTON.

He m. March 25, 1662, Susanna Collins, dau. of John, of B. Chil.—(1) Susanna, b. 1662. (2) Thomas, b. 1665. (3) Mary, b. 1667. (4) John, b. 1668. (5) Joseph, b. 1670. (6) Eliz'th, b. 1673. (7) Mercy, b. 1677.

THOMAS WALKER, OF SUDBURY.

He was probably son of Thomas and Ann, of Boston. He m. Mary, taught school in S. 1664, and in 1672, kept an ordinary. Will

proved, 1697. Chil.—(1) Mary, b. 1661. (2) Thomas, b. 1664, m. Martha Howe, 1687, and had 7 sons and 3 daus. Res. Sudbury. (3) William, b. 1666, m. 1686, Sarah Goodenow, and had 4 sons and 3 daus. WILLIAM WALKER, OF SALEM.

He came with John Gedney. (See 331st p.)

WILLIAM WALKER, OF ——.

He was "imprisoned for making suite to a servant majd." (See 332d p.) Perhaps these were the same persons.

WILLIAM WALKER, OF PORTSMOUTH, N. H.

He d. 1720? very old and decrepit for many yrs. He m. Alice, and was living 1685 near the Sagamore Creek. He m. 2d, 1695? Mary, wid. of Wm. Brookin. She was then 85 yrs. old. His son? Joseph, m. 1670? Hannah Philbrook, of Hampton. Res. P. (Com. by A. W. Brown, Esq., E. Rockport, O.)

The statistics of the present extent of the name in our cities, may fitly follow the list just given, of the Walkers who settled in N. Eng. before 1700. These are gleaned from the business directories of 1857, '58, '59 or '60, in most cases. The numbers do not, of course, include more than half of those bearing the name, resident there, the chil., and many single persons being omitted. Doubtless many of these are of foreign birth. The compiler found this to be the fact in Providence, R. I. A very few, only, of Old Colony descent, are included in these numbers—these are in Providence, Detroit, and Chicago. There is only one in Boston, one in Phil., and none in N. Y. City. The London Directory of 1855, had 234 of the name.

WALKERS WHO WERE TORIES IN THE REVOLUTION.

Only 5 persons of this name in Mass, were proscribed and banished in 1778, viz., Adam, of Worcester; John of Shrewsbury; and Gideon, Benjamin and Zara, of Marshfield.

WALKERS IN THE PENSION LIST OF MASS.

In the Pension list for 8 months' service in 1775, there are the names of 46 Walkers; 40 in Mass., and 6 in Maine. Six of these belonged to the Old Colony. There were nearly 100 of the name in Mass. who took part, more or less, in the Revolution.

GRADUATES OF COLLEGES NAMED WALKER.

Harv. Coll. has graduated before yr. 1858, 18; Yale Coll., before 1861, 14; Dartmouth Coll., bef. 1858, 12; Amherst Coll., bef. 1861, 7; Brown Univ., bef. 1861, 6; Williams Coll., bef. 1841, 3; Middlebury Coll., bef. 1854, 3; all of Old Colony descent. Bowdoin Coll., 1; Univ. Vt., bef. 1846, 1. Of the 65 graduates of N.E. Colleges, 12 belong to the Taunton and Rehoboth Branches. Of the 30 grad. at Colleges out of N. E., bef. 1844, 6 may be found in this Genealogy; 4 have been grad. since. About \(\frac{1}{4}\) of the whole number of graduates in the U. S. are the descendants of Widow Walker, of Rehoboth.

MINISTERS NOW LIVING IN THE U.S., (1860) BEARING THE NAME.

There are of Meth., 17; Bap., 14; Cong., 8; Epis., 6; Pres., O. S., 5; Pres., N. S., 5; Free Will Bap., 5; Cumberland Pres., 4; United Pres., 2; Ref. Synod Pres., 1; (Pres. in Nova Scotia, 1; Pres. in Canada, 3; viz: in connection with ch. of Scotland, 1; Canada, 1; United Pres., 1; not a complete list;) Unitarian, 1; Universalist, 1; Evangelical Lutheran, 1; Spiritualist, 1; Catholic, 3; making in all 78, of whom only 8 are of Old Colony descent.

AUTHORS NAMED WALKER.

These are not given with any idea that there is any connection between them and the families in this work, but as a part of the history of the name.

GEORGE WALKER, Batch. of Divinity. "This learned person was b. at Hawkeshead in Tournifalls in Lancashire, educated at St. John's Coll., in the Univ. of Cambridge where he was esteemed an excellent logician, Orientalian and Divine. He was at this time Minister in Watling St., in London, where he was ready upon all occasions, to encounter with any learned Catholic priest. On the last of May, 1623, was a set and solemn disputation between him and one that went by the name of Smith. It was published for the satisfaction of both parties, with this title, "The sum of a Disputation between Mr. Walker, Pastor of St. John the Evang., &c., and a popish priest, calling himself Mr. Smith," but indeed Norris, printed 1623. In the year following, he, the said W., had to do with the Father, John Fisher, the Jesuit, as being Dr. Dan. Featly's second, and thereupon published, "Fisher's Folly unfolded, or the vaunting Jesuit's challenge answered," Lond. 1624. Afterwards, when another Walker who was a severe Puritan, beheld the profanation of the Lord's Day as he took it, he preached against this, and other Practices and Opinions, which procured him trouble, and 2 yrs. imprisonment, as he said. After the Tory Parliament began, he preached against the King and his followers, and published several things, which before, he was not permitted to do, among which were; (1) Socinianism in the fundamental point of justification, discovered and confuted, &c., London Oct. 1641. (2) The Doctrine of the Holy weekly Sabbath, &c. Lond., 1641. In the yr. 1643 he was chosen one of the assembly of Divines, preached sometimes before the members of Parliament and had his sermons made public, one of which is entitled, "Fast sermon before the House of Commons, Jan. 29,

1644, on Ps., 58 chap., 9th v., London, 1645, qu. He hath also other things extant, as, "God made visible in all his works, &c., printed 1641, qu., &c., which for brevity's sake, I now pass by and only tell you, that he died in 1651, ae. about 70, and was buried in ch. of St. John Evang., before mentioned. In Arch. Laud's annual account of his Province, to the King, for the yr. 1635, at the end of his Troubles and Tryal, p. 535, the Reader may find him thus mentioned:"

"Mr. W., of St. John, the Evang., in London, (a Peculiar of mine,) who hath at this time been a disorderly and peevish man, and now of late, hath very forwardly preached against the Bish. of Ely's Book, concerning the Lord's Day Act, and by authority. But upon a canonical admonition given him to desist, he hath recollected himself, so also in the said history of the Troubles and Tryal of Arch. Laud, Cap. 23, p. 237, George Walker, for preaching Factious matters was imprisoned by the Council Table, and afterwards upon some carriage of his, there censured by the Court of the Star Chamber." (Wood's Fasti.)

NICHOLAS WALKER, D.D., archdeacon of Bedford, appointed 1629, d. or resigned 1631. He was author of "The Life of King Alfred the Great, in 3 books." This was translated into Latin, by the care of Obadiah Walker, Master of Univ. Coll., (see below,) who published large and learned notes thereon, and illustrated it with many cuts. Oxon, 1678, fol.

CLEMENT WALKER, b. in Cliffe, Dorsetshire, author of "The Compleat Hist. of Independency," and is said to have been educated at Christ Ch., Oxford. He was in good repute for his hatred of the Puritans, while he lived at Charterhouse. But he soon after changed his mind. Says Wood, when the Puritans or Pres. were like to carry all before them, he closed with them, and was elected member of Parliament. He was a curious observer and diligent inquirer, well read, also, and notably versed in the Liberties and Privileges of Parliament, and Statute Law of the kingdom. He became a zealous Covenanter. He was a voluminous author. His principal works were "The Mystery of two Juntos, Presbyterianism and Independency, Lond. 1647; Hist. of Independency, Lond. 1648; Appendix to do., Lond. 1648; Parallel between Argyle and Cromwell; Anarchia Anglicana, or Hist. of Independency, 2d part, Lond. 1649. The High Court of Justice, or Cromwell's Slaughter House, being 3d part of Hist. of Ind'y, 1651." When the 2d part of his Hist. of Independency was pub. in 1649, he was discovered to be the author, and imprisoned by Cromwell. He d. in the Tower, Oct. 1651.

OBADIAH WALKER, a divine, son of Wm., b. at Worsperdate in the West Riding of Yorkshire, in 1616, entered Univ. Coll., Oxford, 1631, took holy orders, and became a noted Tutor. In 1648, he was ejected, went abroad, and is supposed to have been reconciled to the ch. of Rome. He might have been elected Master of his Coll., on the death of Dr. Thos. Walker, 1665, but refused, though he accepted the headship in 167°. At Accession of James I., he avowed

himself a Cath., had mass said in the Coll., and published books against the Protestants. At the Restoration, he was deposed from his Coll., sent to the tower, and arraigned for treason, but soon after released. He d. 1699, [1698?] and was buried in Old St. Pancreas' ch. yard. He published various works, one of which was a violent pamphlet against Luther. He was a very learned and able man, and a voluminous author.

WILLIAM WALKER, grad. of Trin. Coll., Cambridge, took degree of D. D., became master of public school in ———, in Lincolnshire, then Rector of Colsternorth, and at length master of Free School at Grantham, where he d. Jan. 1684. Very useful in his day, and author of several works.

George Walker, an Irish divine, b. of Eng. parents, in Co. of Tyrone, and ed. at Glasgow. He became Rector of Donoughmore, where he raised a regiment, when King James landed in that kingdom, defended Londonderry against him with great prudence and valor, after it had been abandoned by the governor, and held out, till the siege was raised, July 30, 1689, by Major Gen. Kirk. For this bravery he received the thanks of the House of Commons, great honor at court of Wm. III., and was created Doct. of Divin. at Oxford. He was killed at the battle of the Boyne, July, 1690. He pub., (1) A true account of the siege and famous defence of Londonderry. (2) Vindication of true account.

John Walker, b. in Devonshire, ed. at Exeter Coll., Oxford, took degree of A. M., in 1699, was Rector of the parish, St. Mary's the More in E. In 1714, he pub. a folio book with the title of "An attempt Towards Recovering an Account of the Numbers and Sufferings of the Clergy of Church of Eng., who were Sequester'd, Harass'd, &c., in the late Times of the Grand Rebellion. Occasioned by the Ninth chap. of Dr. Calamy's abridgement of the Life of Baxter." Fol. Lond., 1714, pp. 220. For this performance he received the deg. of D. D., from Univ. of Oxford. He d. in 1725. He made the entire number of Epis. clergy, who were imprisoned, banished, and sent a starving, to have amounted to seven or eight thousand.

SIR EDWARD WALKER, an historian and herald of arms by the title of Chester, 2d son of Edward of Roobersin, b. at Netherstowey, in Somersetshire. He was Sec. of Earl of Arundel, Earl Marshall of Eng. in the Expedition to Scotland, in 1639, and he then became known to Charles I., followed him, 1641, into North of Eng., was with him at Edghill fight, and was made Sec. at War, and in June, 1644, clerk extraordinary of the privy council. In 1645, he received the honor of Knighthood. After the execution of his royal Master, he fled to Chas. II., whom he attended in his exile, and was appointed by him Garter at arms. He d. 1676–7. He wrote (1) Iter Carolinum or an account of the Marches, &c. of King Chas. I., from 1641 to '48. (2) The acts of the Knights of the Garters in the Civil Wars, also Military Discourses and Hist. Discourses. He is mentioned by Lord Clarendon, whom he is said to have assisted in the part of his (Lord C's) history, which relates to military transactions.

JOHN WALKER, of Christ Church, was curate for Dr. Geo.

Hooper, at Woodhay, in Hampshire, and author of "The antidote; a seasonable discourse on Rom., 13th ch., 1st v., shewing necessity and reasonableness of subjection to higher Powers; with an account of the Divine right or origin of Gov't." Lond. 1684.

Dr. Walker wrote a book on the English particles. The following pun was perpetrated: "Here lie Walker's Particles."

WILLIAM WALKER, a learned divine of the 17th century, b. in Lincolnshire, ed. at Trinity Coll., Cambridge, d. 1684. Newton was one of his scholars. He was author of several useful works on grammar, logic, &c.

Samuel Walker, a pious divine, b. in Exeter, 1714, became a travelling tutor. On entering orders, he became curate of Truro, in Cornwall, and resided there many yrs. He d. 1761. His sermons and lectures on the Catechism were published.

JOHN WALKER, a philological writer, b. at Barnet, in Middlesex, 1732, went on the stage, left it 1767, then lectured on elocution. Brought up a Pres., he became a Cath., d. Aug. 1, 1807, and was buried in St. Pancreas. He was author of a "Pronouncing Dictionary of the Eng. Language," and several other works.

GEORGE WALKER, Mathematician, F. R. S. b. about 1734, at Newcastle on Tyne, went to Univ. of Edinburgh; from E., he went to Glasgow, for study of Theology and Philosophy, and settled about 1756, at Durham as a dissenting minister, thence to Yarmouth,—in 1772 to Warrington as mathematical tutor, pub. in 1775, "Doctrine of the sphere," and d. near Liverpool, 1807. He published sermons, also the 1st part of a "Treatise of Conic Sections," which was worthy of his mathematical reputation.

On a petition for recognising Am. Independence drawn up by him, Mr. Burke declared that he would rather have been the author of that

piece, than of all his own compositions.

ADAM WALKER, philosophical lecturer, b. in Westmoreland, and brought up a weaver. While thus employed he amused himself in constructing models of mills, and devoted so much time to reading, that at the age of 15, he was qualified to be an usher in a school. He next became a writing master, and accomptant at Macclesfield, and settled in London where he met with great encouragement. He invented the transparent orrery and various useful engines. He pub. various important works, and d. 1821, in 90th yr.

"SIR HOVENDEN WALKER was the naval commander of the Great Expedition against Canada, which sailed from Boston, N. E., 1710, but which proved a complete failure, owing, it was said, to the unskilfulness of the pilots, by which eight ships and nearly a thousand men were lost in the St. Lawrence. Great blame was attached to Sir Hovenden, and he published this account in his own defence."—Nichol's Lit. Anec. vol. i. 178. It is entitled "A Journal of the Late Expedition to Canada, 8vo." London, 1720.

ROBERT WALKER, an eminent minister in Scotland, author of Practical Sermons, 3 vols.

INVENTORS.

The 1st real printing press was made by the Earl of Stanhope, Eng., assisted by a skillful mechanic named Walker. It was an improvement of Blaew's machine, invented about 1620. Instead of using the old wooden screw and wooden frame, which had been employed in all previous inventions, he made a press of iron and combined the screw with the bent lever, and also contrived a movable carriage for holding the forms of type. He also arranged the spring, so that as soon as the impression was given, it caused the platen to fly up. This press was at once adopted in Eng. and Am., and for a long time, maintained its supremacy over all others.

JOHN WALKER, in Stockton upon Tees, Eng., d. May 18, 1860, ae. 78. He was a chemist, and said to be the inventor of Lucifer Matches, in 1827.

The Marshfield Family has had the only centenarian. The Rehoboth Branch has I in the 6th generation living at the age of 98 yrs. 9 mos., and bidding fair to reach her century. (See No. 215.) She has descendants (not traced in this work) of the 5th gen., who are therefore of the 11th gen. from Wid. Walker. The whole number of Walkers who lived beyond 70 yrs., is 166. Quite a large number are now living, who have passed that age.

The earliest births and latest deaths in each Branch and in each Generation have been almost uniformly those named Walker, and not those whose mothers were Walkers. The Rehoboth Branch alone, has several of the 6th gen. living The generations of the Eastham and Marshfield Families do not correspond in time with those of the Rehoboth and Taunton Families, these having an earlier ancestress in Widow Walker. This should be kept in mind in a comparison. Accordingly the 1st gen. of E. and M. Families, are put in line with the 2d gen. of the T. and R. Families, as they were contemporaneous generations, and the same order holds with all the others. The generations of the Rehoboth Branch have been of longest duration, and it has the oldest member living.

Of the Taunton Branch the 9th gen. was b. 2 yrs. before the 5th died, and the 10th was b. 27 yrs. before the death of the 6th. Of the Rehoboth Branch the 8th gen. was b. 2 yrs. before the death of the 4th, and the 9th b. 15 yrs. before the death of the 5th. The 6th generation is living yet, once contemporaneous with the 3d, and now with the 11th, and as the earliest of the 3d was b. 1655, those of the 6th now living, stand on an eminence looking before and after, over a period of 205 yrs.

Of the Eastham family, the 6th was contemporaneous with the 3d, and some of them are now living. The 8th gen. was b. before the 4th and the 9th before the 5th.

Additions and Explanations.

TAUNTON BRANCH.

James Walker was not one of the 1st purchasers of Taunton in 1638, but of Rehoboth, and an early settler of T. 5 yrs. after its purchase.

Baylies in his Mem. of Plym. Col., Part III., p. 54th, giving a history of Philip's War, says, "Philip being driven to desperation, effected his escape from the Pocasset swamp, in the night of the last day of July (1675) and fled to the Nipmuck country. A part of his force spread themselves into the wilderness about Taunton, where they succeeded in burning the houses of John Tisdill, and James Walker. Tisdill was killed, and two other soldiers, viz: John Knolles and Samuel Atkins of Eastham." (Plym. Col. Records, give June 27, 1675, as the date of John Tisdill's death.) Their "houses in the wilderness" confirm the supposition that James Walker lived in the South part of Taunton, (3 miles from the village,) where lands were granted to him, and where his descendants have lived ever since. This was on the route of the Indians from Pocasset swamp to Taunton. Probably, after the destruction of his house, he removed to the village, and lived "near the ancient meeting house." (See 8th p. and 18th Baylies says he was re-elected deputy in 1654, but the Plym. Col. Rec. state this as his 1st election.

"The Widow Walker" is the only female signer of the "combination" or compact, "entered into by all the inhabitants of Seakunk," (Rehoboth.)

The following statement, will show the completeness of this work, as a Genealogy of the Walkers of the Old Colony, and how few families, either of the males or females, have not been included. This feature of the work, is especially observable in regard to the Taunton and Rehoboth Families, and to the males who alone perpetuate the name.

The names of chil., whose mothers were Walkers, are given therefore in all cases, with the exception of 11 Families, in the Taunton, 42 in the Rehoboth, 48 in the Eastham, and 36 in the Marshfield Branch. Undoubtedly some of these had no chil., or they would have been ascertained.

The number on the right of a name refers to the page. Two or more references to the same person, are included in a parenthesis. The figure on the left of a name, indicates the generation of the person. The letters on the left of the figures, denote the Branch of the Family to which the person belongs; thus T. is for Taunton, R. for Rehoboth, E. for Eastham, M. for Marshfield, B. for Bristol, and A. denotes the Walkers of the Mass. Colony mentioned in the Appendix.
