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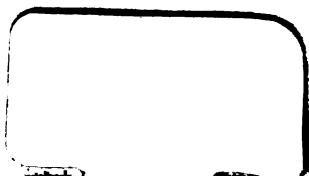
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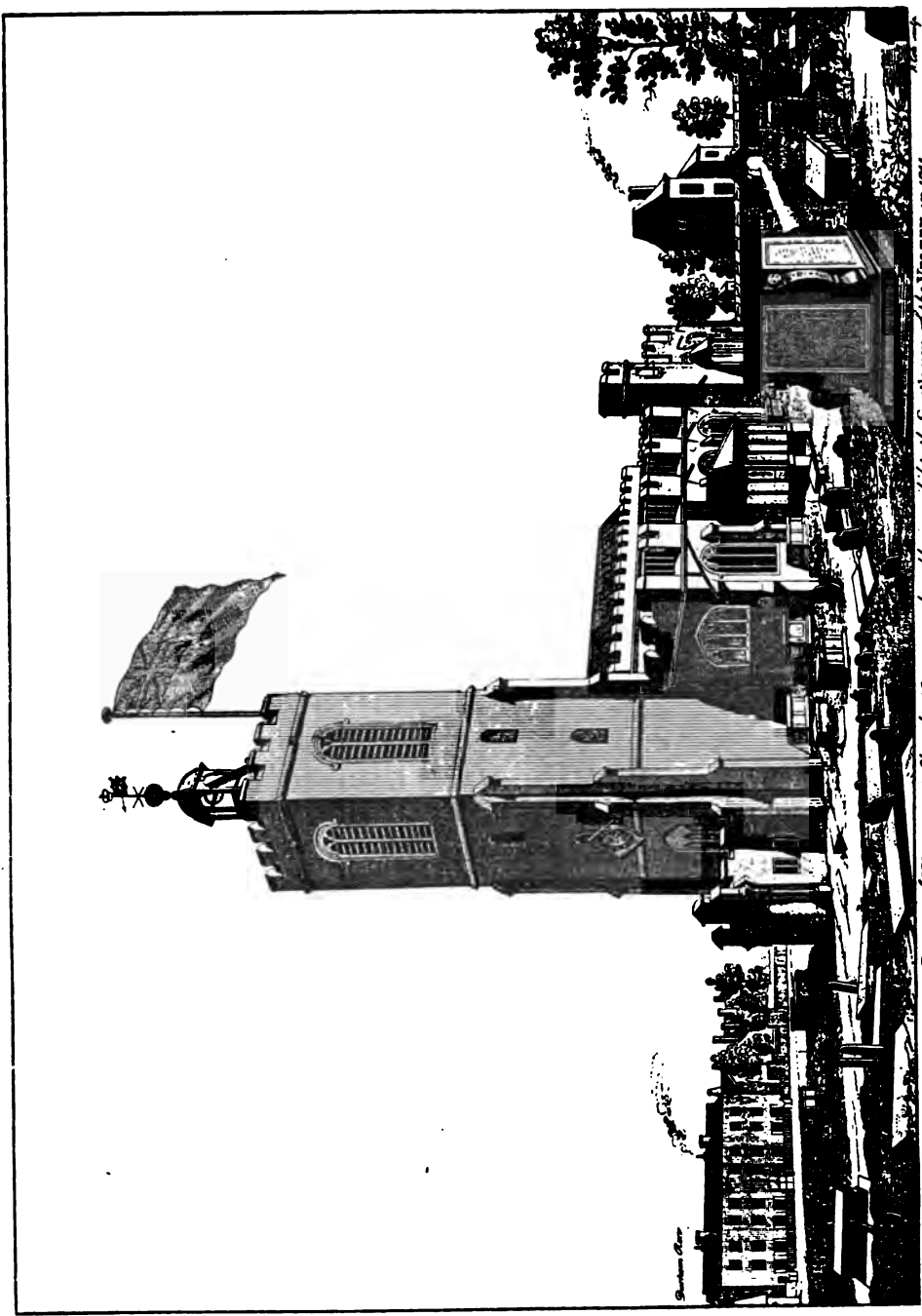
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*A sketch from a program of St. Dunstan's Church at Stepney, formerly awarded to the Gentlemen of the Vess TRY, on 1798.*

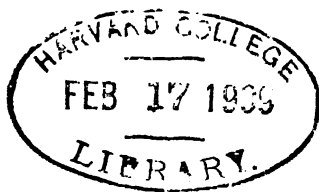

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## P R E F A C E.

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THIS book appeals to the indulgence of its readers as the fruit only of the leisure hours in two busy lives. In it the text has been printed as far as possible in every way to represent the MS. The notes have been drawn for the most part from easily accessible sources. The chief MS. authorities are the Parish Registers, which date from 1579, and are perfect, and the Manor Court Rolls, at the Manor Office, 28, Austin Friars, which date only from 1654, but are fully calendared and indexed. More attention has been paid in them to little known people than to those who are comparatively well known, and where a reference could be given to such a work as the 'Dictionary of National Biography,' the editors have been content with giving only a very slight biographical sketch besides the reference.

They have many pleasing debts of gratitude, not to discharge, but, at least, to record here: notably to F. W. Maddocks, Esq., for his gift of an original copy of Gascoyne's Map, from which the reproduction has been made; to J. Challenor Smith, Esq., and W. ## INTRODUCTION TO THE MEMORIALS OF STEPNEY PARISH.

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### § I. *Early History of the Parish.*

FOR the first beginning of Stepney history we have to go back to the other side of the Norman Conquest and to the time of the Saxons. The name appears in many older and longer forms, of which, probably, Stebonheath is the most common; this gives a wrong idea as to the origin of the name, for it is connected, not with the word 'heath,' but with the old word 'hythe' (meaning a small port or harbour), which we find also in the names Rotherhithe and Lambeth, etc. The meaning of the first part of the word can hardly be stated with any certainty.

While the name thus carries back the history of Stepney to Saxon times, traditions come in and confirm this testimony, though in themselves the traditions are somewhat hazy.

We are told that there was an old Saxon church dedicated originally to All Saints, that it was rebuilt by St. Dunstan at the end of the tenth century, and that, in gratitude for this action, when St. Dunstan was canonized, the church was put under his special patronage. Space will not allow us here to analyze this tradition; the evidence for it is small, though it is not in itself improbable. Dunstan was Bishop of London for a short time, and was probably, therefore, Lord of the Manor of Stepney, and quite possibly lived in the parish.

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At any rate, when we reach Norman times we are on surer ground. Domesday Book gives us the distinct information that at the end of the eleventh century the manor belonged to the Bishops of London; up to the beginning of the fifteenth century a succession of bishops lived in the manor-house, and one at least of these—Bishop Eustace—in 1228, was a benefactor to the church.

At about the same date we get the earliest mention of a Rector of Stepney, viz., William, who quarrelled in 1233 with the convent of the Holy Trinity at Aldgate about the tithes of a mill.

Up to the end of the thirteenth century, information about Stepney is very scanty, but from 1300 the history may be said fairly to begin.

The name Stepney then comprised one large parish, as yet entirely undivided, stretching from the City to the river Lea, and from the river Thames to Hackney. This was the ecclesiastical district, and, as far as land tenure went, the state of things was mainly the same, as the great Manor of Stepney, held by the bishop, included the greater part of that area, though there were also several smaller manors owned at the time of the Domesday Survey by the bishop or the king, which, however, later came into other hands.

The first definite mention of the church, bearing date 1302, calls it by the name of St. Dunstan; but perhaps other earlier documents may be forthcoming some day to support the contention that its original dedication was to All Saints.

It was an age of church extension. In the west of the parish, the White Chapel of St. Mary Matfellow was already lightening the burden of the mother church, and in 1311 the chapel of Stratford Bow was built close to the Bow Bridge, on a piece of the highroad, for the benefit of the easternmost parishioners of Stepney. A still greater change followed in 1338, when the Whitechapel district was cut off from Stepney—the first of a long series of subdivisions—and St. Mary's

Chapel became the Parish Church of Whitechapel under a rector appointed by the Rector of Stepney.

The mother parish was being served by two clergy, (1) the rector or parson, appointed by the bishop; (2) the vicar—a deputy whom the rector appointed; and from this time forward we have a full list of the beneficed clergy in Stepney. The two offices of rector and vicar were united in 1710, and since then there have been no more Vicars of Stepney. This full list is printed below.

Stepney at this time was essentially rustic. The bishop had a large area of wooded ground which he had tried to convert into a game preserve in 1292; but though he had gained the king's leave, the Mayoralty Court of London opposed the scheme and put an end to it. Deprived thus of their sport, the bishops amused themselves with tournaments, which were often held near the bishop's palace between the years 1305 and 1331.

The life of the village was as a whole uneventful enough, but from time to time the proximity of Stepney to London brought it face to face with the more stirring events of the time. Such an event, for example, was the rebellion of Wat Tyler in 1381, the scene of which was largely laid in Stepney Parish, at Mile End.

The rectory was valued in 1372 at 60 marks, and the vicarage at 12 marks—considerable sums in those days—and evidently the church was well supported and kept up, as it possessed in 1308 a cope of silk and gold worth £3, which the Mayor and Aldermen of London considered a fitting present for them to send as their gift to a bishop at his consecration. These few extracts must suffice to give just a glimpse into the state of the parish in the fourteenth century.

After the death of Bishop Braybrooke in 1404, the bishops seem to have deserted Stepney, but it continued to be a favourite country residence, especially for London merchants,

and an increasing number of good houses began to rise in the midst of the woods and fields ; growth and progress were slow, as the great wars of this century drained the energy and resources of the nation. Still, Stepney had been lucky in being away from the greater part of the struggles, and, as a result of this immunity, new churches replaced the old buildings at Stepney and Bow. This rebuilding was part of a regular movement which passed over this district about the middle of the fifteenth century, and has left us a number of churches of the same date and style ; but at Stepney several features of the older church were retained, notably the sedilia and the old font, though the latter has now almost entirely disappeared. Several of the rectors and vicars of this time were distinguished men, and two of them, Bishop Lumley and Dr. Burton, were sent to represent England at the Council of Basle in 1433.

When Henry VII. came to power, a new era began for England, in which Stepney, too, had its share.

Two great movements now began which profoundly influenced Stepney—namely, the religious reforms and the development of the navy. Stepney was all through in the van of the Reformation. Bishop Fox, whom Henry VII. confirmed in the vicarage in face of considerable opposition, was one of the chief patrons of the New Learning ; while Dean Colet, the son of Sir Henry Colet, of The Great Place (opposite the west end of the church), and himself for a short time vicar, was the great leader of the same movement on which the subsequent Reformation was built up. Other lesser lights were also active in the same cause. Rector Layton was busy slandering, coercing and suppressing the monasteries, while his vicar, Dr. Heynes, was away in France, charged with a mission to confer with Melancthon, the German Reformer, and, if possible, bring him to England. Heynes' successor, William Jerome, paid the penalty of being in advance of his times in his religious views, and was burnt at Smithfield in 1540 ; while four years

later the parish was put into the hands of two of the much-abused monks, who had earned this reward by being compliant with Henry and his rapacious Commissioners. Even under Queen Mary, while heretics were being burnt publicly at Bow, John Thomas (see p. 5), ejected from Prittlewell, found a home here, and Queen Mary's nominee to the rectory did not survive as rector long when Elizabeth came to the throne. Another strange actor on the scene was Edward Underhill, gentleman, of Limehouse, known as 'The Hot Gospeller,' always ready to put anyone right as to his religious beliefs and practices, and very busy on the side of the extreme Reformers. By 1579, when the minutes open, Puritanism—using the word in its Elizabethan sense—was firmly established in Stepney, though there still lay before it a gradual development into the more distinct Puritanism of the Commonwealth.

Simultaneously, the development of naval enterprise was revolutionizing the parish. The growth of shipbuilding in the Thames began with the reign of Henry VII., and mainly at three centres, Ratcliffe, Blackwall, and Deptford; it was here that the royal navy began to become England's great power, and though the honour of the earlier English private ventures and explorations belongs to Bristol, London was not far behind in point of time, and soon began to attract to itself the chief men of enterprise from other parts of England. The foundation of the Trinity House by Sir Thomas Spert, in Henry's reign, and of the Company of Merchant Adventurers by Sebastian Cabot in 1552, the three voyages of Frobisher, equipped by the Muscovy Company, 1576-80, and the incorporation of the East India Company, mark different stages in this mighty development. The direct consequence of it was a parallel development in the parish of Stepney. Surely and steadily the line of houses and shipyards began to creep eastward along the banks of the Thames, and to absorb into itself the little blocks of buildings that had before been isolated, first at Ratcliffe, then at Limehouse, and finally at Blackwall. The

main body of this book—the vestry minutes and the notes appended to them—brings out so clearly this fact, that it is not necessary to do more here than merely chronicle it. Away from the riverside the growth of the parish was still quite slow and gradual, and nothing shows so clearly as the valuations authorized by the vestry from time to time where the chief wealth and population of the parish lay. The chief men of the riverside hamlets were nearly all connected with ships; but in Mile End and Bethnal Green they were independent gentlemen, or men of mark who had a country house on Mile End Green (the modern Stepney Green), or elsewhere. Of this latter class, only one or two appear in the vestry minutes and receive any notice in this book, as the larger number of them, naturally, did not concern themselves with parochial affairs, and even Lord Morley, whose name does appear upon the lists of the vestry, does not seem to have taken any active part in its proceedings.

While the parish was thus growing and becoming divided into these two sections, a change took place in the manor. In 1551 Bishop Ridley, on the day of his enthronement (April 12), resigned the manor into the hands of King Edward VI., and the connexion of the Bishops of London with the manors of Stepney and Hackney, which had lasted at least 500 years, came abruptly to an end. Three years before, Bishop Bonner, the deposed bishop whom Ridley superseded, had granted to Sir Ralph Warren a ninety-nine years' lease of a messuage and chapel, evidently the house and chapel at Bethnal Green known by the name of Bishop Bonner's Hall or Bishopshall, which was probably the old manor-house inhabited by the bishops in past days. This old house only disappeared in 1844, to make way for Victoria Park. The manor was almost at once granted to Sir Thomas Wentworth, in whose family it remained under very varying fortunes till 1720, when it was sold to John Wicker. Wicker's son sold it again in 1754 to the Colebrooke family, the present lords of the manor.



In 1547 we get another return of the condition of the parish, in which the rectory is valued at £50, and the vicarage at £33 6s. 8d., equal in our money to £500 and £335 respectively; the number of communicants is returned at 860—a large proportion of the then population, which speaks well for the efficiency of the clergy of that day. At the same time interest was stirring in education, and the Free School at Ratcliffe, founded by Nicholas Gibson, who died in 1540, was beginning to bear fruit.

Such is a brief outline of the history of the parish up to the year 1580, gathered from scattered notices and many sources; from this point forward we have the vestry minutes as a text on which to base the continuation of this outline; but first a word must be said about the constitution and work of the vestry.

## § 2. *The Constitution and Work of the Vestry.*

In the earlier days of which we have minutes, the vestry of Stepney Parish was a General Vestry—that is to say, all the chief men of the parish were summoned to the meeting to transact the parochial business. The first few entries in the minute-book are probably copies of the older documents; mention is made of the subscription of the names of the parishioners who were present (*e.g.* pp. 3, 5), but no such subscription seems to have taken place at any rate in this book; it seems likely, therefore, that these first two or three are not the original entries, but a transcript with the signatures left out. However, from p. 6 onward the subscription of names regularly occurs. When the business was not interesting,

only one or two men signed, but when anything decisive was done, there were probably more present, and certainly more signed the book (see for example p. 12).

In 1589 the parish grew dissatisfied with the General Vestry; it was too large and cumbrous, and consequently inefficient, and it was therefore resolved to have a Select Vestry instead, consisting of thirty-two members, eight from each of the four hamlets—Ratcliffe, Limehouse, Poplar, and Mile End with Bethnal Green.

These vestrymen were apparently elected for five years. In 1594 another election took place, and in 1598-9 the main body of the parishioners again took up the question of the vestry, and, to amend the disorders, elected ten members from each hamlet to form the new Select Vestry; this body they constituted by an order largely signed by the chief men of the parish, and the order was finally confirmed by the Bishop of London's commissary, as the law required (see pp. 30-35).

This arrangement lasted till about 1645 when the vestry began to be sadly disorganized; no auditors or sidesmen were then elected, and such meetings as were held were meetings of miscellaneous people, not of duly elected vestrymen. After 1648 the meeting gave up even calling itself a vestry. But early in 1654 a general meeting of the parishioners was held to reform these abuses, and once more a Select Vestry was constituted. This constitution was never confirmed, and was, therefore, called in question at The Restoration; so the Bishop of London, on petition, appointed a new Select Vestry of forty-four persons, with power to fill up vacancies in their number, and this body from that time carried on the business of the parish (1662).

To return to the state of affairs at the first Select Vestry, 1589; churchwardens were already existing, one representing each of the four hamlets, and at first this was enough; but as the parish grew it was found advisable to increase the number either by appointing a deputy to serve conjointly, or by sub-

dividing the hamlets. As a rule, each churchwarden held office for two years, but in some cases he provided a substitute for the whole or part of his term.

Auditors, too, had already been appointed by resolutions passed in 1583 and 1584. The first list given here (of 1586) shows four names for each hamlet, but the number fell later to three, and, finally, two. In the middle of the seventeenth century, in the general decay of the vestry, auditors disappeared till they were restored in 1663, after the general reorganization above mentioned.

A similar fate befell the office of sidesman, which does not appear before 1590.

The original number of the hamlets of the parish was four, but it gradually increased. A movement which began in the appointment of a second churchwarden in Ratcliffe in 1641 (p. 171) ended in the establishment of a separate hamlet of Shadwell, which continued under the name of Lower Wapping, when Shadwell was taken out of it to be an independent parish in 1669. Similarly Spitalfields obtained an independent churchwarden in 1662, and Mile End New Town in 1691; and the parish till 1729 included eight hamlets, though the list of vestrymen was not increased beyond the number of forty-four, as appointed by the bishop's instrument of 1662. Thenceforward one hamlet after another was separated (see p. xviii.), till at present only three remain in the parish, viz., Ratcliffe and the two Mile End hamlets, and after 1735 increase was gradually made in the number of vestrymen representing the hamlets that remained.

The usual day of meeting in the earlier years of which we have record was Sunday. Of the first twenty-two meetings recorded between 1579 and 1594 only four were held on a week-day; then for a few years a change was made, and Thursday was the most usual day, and twice (1602 and 1603) the vestry met on Ascension Day. When the Canons of 1603 came into force, they affected the vestry (amongst other ways)

by fixing the date of its election-meeting to some day in Easter-week (see No. xc.), and this custom was kept up apparently, more or less, even under the Commonwealth. As regards frequency of meeting there was no constant rule. In many years only the Easter meeting is recorded; in a few, none at all; while, on the other hand, minutes are given of eight meetings in the plague-year of 1625, and of twelve meetings in 1679. In 1619 an attempt was made to establish a monthly meeting (p. 85), after evening prayer, on the first Sunday of every month; but, though ordered and decreed, it never seems to have come to much.

The business done was, as the minutes show, most miscellaneous; the vestry was *the* form of local government, and united the functions of many modern bodies. It had two means of raising money—(1) for ordinary emergencies by the annual pew-rents or 'puage'; (2) on special occasions either by demanding additional pew-rents, or by levying a 'landscot,' or rate levied upon land (see, *e.g.*, p. 136).

Its home was either the vestry of the church or else the vestry house or church house—a quite distinct building from the vestry of the church; this was situate in the churchyard (one such still exists at Hackney), and served as offices for the vestry as well as providing a home for curates, officers, and often some necessitous old women besides. The vicar or, on great occasions, the rector presided, and in their absence the curate, lecturer, or one of the chief of the parishioners. The proceedings, as a rule, seem to have been conducted with great decorum—at any rate, compared with the standard of many modern vestries. Was the actual business worse done then than by all the modern paraphernalia of these days?

### § 3. *History of the Parish, 1580-1745.*

We now take up again the thread of our story, and continue the outline of parochial history. Besides the steady growth of the parish—of which the vestry minutes give constant

evidence—the two chief things of interest in Stepney in the early part of the seventeenth century were (1) the development of the navy and shipping companies, and (2) the growth of Puritanism.

With regard to the former, we have already seen the earlier stages of this development (p. vii.). At the end of Elizabeth's reign the outburst of patriotism evoked by the dread and actual coming of the Armada gave it a still further impetus; and, while the trained bands and archers were practising on Mile End Green, the shipwrights were busy on the river building ships for the parishioners of Stepney to man and sail all over the world in search of trade and in defence of English interests. Such men as Sir Humphrey Gilbert, Wm. Borough (p. 6), and Sir H. Palmer (p. 22), were attracted to the parish as the centre of naval enterprise, and were among the earliest of a long list of Stepney naval heroes whose names often recur in the vestry minutes. Similarly in shipbuilding William Burrell (p. 25) was the precursor of the great Pett family of shipbuilders, and these and their followers and clientèle form another large element in the parish vestry.

Among the shipping companies the East India Company held the first position. From the first year of its incorporation its progress was unbroken, and its maritime service was not only the training ground of many of our best sailors, but it laid the foundation of the Empire of India; and, when its history comes to be written, the names of many Stepney people—Thomas Best (died 1639) (p. 31), John Davies (p. 60), Christopher Browne (p. 141), and others—will be far better known than they are at present.

Turning now to (2) the growth of Puritanism, we see how the early promise given by Vicar Jerome (p. vi.) and Edward Underhill (p. vii.) did not fall to the ground. The first sign of it in the minutes is given in the establishment of the afternoon lecture, and the election of so stout a convert to the Puritan cause as Stephen Gosson (p. 9) to be the lecturer.

Was it the same tendency again, or was it Gosson's preaching that made the vestry sell the organ, which, barely sixty years before, the parish and the bounty of John Forster had provided? Vicar Thomas (p. 5) had in Anderson (p. 15) a successor of a kindred spirit; but the authorities were beginning to find the extreme party of Puritan dissenters as great a nuisance as the recusant Romanists, and repressive measures, such as the injunction concerning preachers (p. 20), had to be adopted equally against them.

It would be interesting to know whether it was theological differences that caused the split between Vicar David English (p. 47) and the vestry. The cause of it is still obscure, and we only know that it called for the rector's interference, and that two men, Henry Marrot and Walter Portruff, were 'charged to conspire the stoninge to death of one Englishe, their Curate;' naturally he was glad to retire elsewhere. But the troubles were not yet over; after comparative peace under Gouldman and Douglas, the storm broke out again when Stamp (p. 175) became vicar. Puritanism was now full-grown, and aimed at nothing less than the destruction of the Church in England, and the abolition of Episcopacy and the Prayer-book. Stamp and his curate Edgeworthe vainly endeavoured to weather this storm. Stamp was imprisoned, and finally fled abroad, and the unenviable task of calming the disturbed atmosphere devolved upon Dr. Hoyle (p. 181). He was a diligent and able preacher, and was brought over by the Parliament from Dublin to Oxford as 'a noted Puritan,' and so would be thought acceptable at Stepney; but he was not advanced enough for his congregation or for the two lecturers, Greenhill and Burroughes, who 'never took notice of Dr. Josh. Hoyle.' So little did the former notice him that, in 1644, while still lecturer in the parish church, he joined the Independents, and was himself probably instrumental in starting the sect in Stepney. This action was so favourably regarded by the authorities that he was appointed vicar to succeed Hoyle; and his Independent congregation were pro-

bably in possession of the parish church till the Restoration came, when the Church and Prayer-book were restored, and Greenhill and his congregation driven out to seek a new home. They found one, for a man of the ability and sincere piety of Greenhill was able to hold a congregation together in spite of all that Acts of Parliament could do to prevent him, and after some unsettled years they found a final resting-place in the old Stepney Meeting-house (built 1674), where, under Matthew Mead, Greenhill's successor, and a long line of distinguished pastors, the congregation continued to flourish until the new meeting-house was built in 1863.<sup>1</sup> Greenhill's successor in the vicarage (Emmanuel Utye) was a Churchman of the old type, and thenceforward comparative peace reigned in ecclesiastical affairs.

A few words must be said on the history of the church, churchyard, etc.

The vestry minutes give constant evidence of work of one kind or another going on there : either more accommodation is needed or 'the ruins of the church are great,' and repairs on a large scale must be undertaken. But one reason why the subject was so constantly before the vestry was that work, though decided on, was often not done till the order had been repeated again and again ; *e.g.*, the gallery ordered in 1580 is only part begun in 1601. Mention in 1619 and 1621 (pp. 86 and 96) of 'the partition of the Chancell' seems to show that the rood-screen was not yet wholly gone, and from a minute on the former page, as to the erection of gates, one might perhaps argue that the disastrous custom of shutting up the church from Sunday to Sunday had not yet come in. As regards the furniture of the church, the bells were constantly in trouble, the organ was ejected in 1585 (p. 12), and no successor took its place till 1678 and 1679, when, under encouragement from the bishop, subscriptions were collected, and a new organ bought from the celebrated builder, Renuus

Harris. In 1622 a new pulpit was erected—probably of the ‘three-decker’ type—and forty years later the church was further beautified by the setting up of the king’s arms, Creed, Lord’s Prayer, and Ten Commandments, ‘after a handsome and beautiful maner.’ It was probably needed, as the inventory of church property given in 1659 shows how bare and desolate all must have been. Subsequently (in 1678) ‘the beautifieing and furnishing of our Church after y<sup>e</sup> manner of y<sup>e</sup> Church of All Hallows, Barkin,’ was recommended to the vestry—this probably implied a liberal use of whitewash.

The fire caused an influx of people to the church ; so great, that widow Adams could not cope with them, and a number of prudent sober men had to be appointed ‘to keep the pewes.’ At the same time we learn that the men and women were still accustomed to sit on opposite sides of the church, according to the old custom. The need of more accommodation was not merely temporary, for in 1684 it was necessary to build yet a new gallery, so that there were at least five—two on each side, and one at the west end.

The churchyard grew by degrees. The great outbreaks of plague in 1625 and 1665 each necessitated additions to the existing accommodation ; the former, though less severe, has left much more mark on the vestry minutes, perhaps because, in the latter case, a burial-ground was enclosed on Bethnal Green Common, north of Dog Row, which relieved the strain upon the churchyard, so that the new ground was not needed till 1678. Another evidence of the severity of the earlier outbreak is given in the licence granted by the bishop on January 24, 162<sup>5</sup>/<sub>6</sub>, at the request of the vicar, to empower Robinson, the parish clerk, to bury parishioners, and to church their wives (using the Prayer-book forms), because there was more than the curate could possibly do single-handed. Of the later visitation a great deal has been written by Defoe and others, much of it more graphic than true ; but the sober evidence of the registers shows the great extent of the mortality.

The church-house, to which allusion has already been made



(p. xii), was rebuilt in 1619 (p. 85), and again in 1655 and 1656, and this last change was made an opportunity for getting rid of those who lodged in the upper storey; but yet once again, in 1684, a new restoration was needed. It is doubtful whether this latter was ever accomplished, for in 1696 the old church-house was pulled down, and the parish leased the old parsonage to take its place (see the frontispiece). They sublet the greater part of it to the curate (1706), and seem to have gone on leasing it after the arrangement came into force (p. xviii.) by which it was assigned as the house of the 'portionist' of Spitalfields, and in fact up to 1737. Meanwhile they must have built a new vestry-house, and, after the portionist arrangement ceased, the rectory was no longer needed, so it was pulled down under a faculty from the bishop, dated June 28, 1763.

The last subject to be noticed is the subdivision of the parish. In 1650 a committee sat to inquire into the state of ecclesiastical benefices, and it was proposed to divide the parish into four; this was never done, but two chapels were built to relieve the parish church: (1) that at Poplar, which was already begun when the subdivision was proposed, was completed in 1654, by the gifts of the East India Company, Gilbert Dethick (p. 61), Maurice Thomson (p. 189), and others; (2) that at Shadwell was erected by Thomas Neale two years later. Attempts were at once made to separate both districts, but they were opposed, and for the time prevented; eventually in 1669 the parish of St. Paul's, Shadwell, was cut out of Stepney, and the chapel became the church of the new parish. In 1673 Poplar made another attempt at independence, which was equally unsuccessful.

At the beginning of the eighteenth century more changes came. In the first place, Brasenose College, Oxford, bought the advowson of both rectory and vicarage, and when Rector White died the benefices were united (1710), and John Wright, the then vicar, became sole rector. After his death in 1718, two co-rectors were appointed, and continued for some time

side by side under the titles of 'the portionist of Ratcliffe' and 'the portionist of Spitalfields.' The same year that saw this arrangement confirmed by Act of Parliament (1710) saw also an Act passed for building fifty new churches in the suburbs of London. On October 9, 1611, the vestry recommended to the Commissioners the separation of five new parishes, and their suggestion was mainly carried out. St. Anne's, Limehouse, was built 1712-1724, the church consecrated, and the parish cut off in 1730. Christ Church, Spitalfields, was built 1723-1729, and then consecrated and made the church of a new parish. St. George's was built 1715-1729, and then consecrated and made the church of a new parish, consisting of the old hamlet of Wapping, in Stepney parish. Poplar, in spite of its previous efforts, and though recommended by the vestry as having 'a very good Chappel y<sup>t</sup> may make a convenient Parish Church,' was not separated, and remained a hamlet of Stepney till 1820. But on the other hand Bow, without the vestry's recommendation, at last, after a very rebellious career, gained its full independence in 1730: it had been practically autonomous since 1497 (see note on p. 1). Finally, in 1740, the hamlet of Bethnal Green was made a separate parish, and the Act of Parliament provided also for the erecting of a parish church. It also brought to an end the dual control of the rectory of Stepney, as the 'portionist of Ratcliffe' was made first rector of St. Matthew's, Bethnal Green, and the other 'portionist' became the sole rector of Stepney.

Here the sketch of Stepney history ceases, for by this time the parish has become a very different thing to what it was, and its history has become much narrower and of less wide interest.

## INTRODUCTION

TO

### *Gascoyne's Map of the Parish of Stepney (1703).*

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UP till Gascoyne's time information as to the streets and courts and fields of Stepney is somewhat scanty.

Anthony van den Wyngerde's drawing of London in 1543 only gives a bird's-eye view, of which Stepney is the outskirts. Ralph Aggas, in Elizabeth's time, gives none of Stepney, so the earliest map of much value is a MS. one of the first few years of the seventeenth century, in the possession of the Worshipful Company of Mercers; but it only deals with their estates there, that is to say, with a comparatively small circle round the church as centre.

Fifty years later, besides Moor's interesting Map of Middlesex (1640-50), we have Faithorne's engraving (1658) of Newcourt's survey of London (1643-7), reproduced by George Jarman for A. E. Evans, 1857, and republished again by Stanford, 1878. This gives an excellent bird's-eye view, but not references, and it goes no further north than the church, and no further east than Limehouse.

Of the great number of maps of London that sprung up at the time of the Great Fire, few are sufficiently detailed, or sufficiently extended, to be of much local interest.

Most of them, if they include the eastern suburbs at all, draw either upon their imagination or upon Newcourt: Ogilby and Morgan's map, published in 1677, goes no further east than the Tower, and so is only valuable for a part of Spitalfields hamlet; but a subsequent map on a smaller scale, published by Morgan (before 1685), gives a great deal of most valuable information about the topography of the parish.

Like most of the maps of London it goes no further east than the Rogues Well, and northwards it takes in little more than the northern boundary of Spitalfields hamlet: but what is shown is very thorough. Many references are given, of which the greater part correspond with Gascoyne's, but the following are additional ones not shown in Gascoyne:

It also is valuable as giving the parishes of St. Paul's, Shadwell, and St. John's, Wapping, which are not in Gascoyne.

The map of Morden, Lea, and Browne, of 1700, is also of much interest, especially as it is the first that includes all the northern part of the parish, and even the south of Hackney: several other maps embody this information subsequently, as, *e.g.*, Covers and Mortier's map published at Amsterdam.

These are the chief of the predecessors of our map; those who wish to study the subject later still will find ample material in Rocque's surveys, 1745, etc.

Turning now to the map itself, the following extracts from the vestry minutes are interesting in connexion with its production:

May 4. 1702.

It was then ordered that Mr Vicar & the Churchwardens do inquire for some skillfull Geographer or Plattmaker to make a Draught of this pish & therein to describe both the Generall Bounds & also the Bounds of each Hamblett in peticular.

May 18. 1703.

It is ordered y<sup>t</sup> an Agreem<sup>t</sup> be made w<sup>th</sup> a Graver for the making a Copper Plate, for the Printing y<sup>e</sup> Map of y<sup>e</sup> Parish of Stepney, according to y<sup>e</sup> Survey made or to be made, by Mr Gascoyn. And y<sup>t</sup> the Churchwardens for y<sup>e</sup> time being do (cause) a Thousand Maps (more or less) to be Printed for y<sup>e</sup> use & benefit of y<sup>e</sup> sd Parish.

And whereas Cap<sup>t</sup> Henry Nurse is so kind as to lend y<sup>e</sup> sum of One Hundred Pounds for y<sup>e</sup> defraying y<sup>e</sup> Charge of y<sup>e</sup> said Plate and Survey, It is ordered y<sup>e</sup> Day & Year above written y<sup>t</sup> ye Church Revenues by Palls &c shalbe security for ye paym<sup>t</sup> of ye sd 100<sup>li</sup>: w<sup>th</sup> Interest for ye same.

Jan. 23. 1734.

Ord<sup>d</sup> that every Churchwarden if he pleases doe have a Parish Mapp when he has served Two year & that they shall not exceed the price of one Guinea each Mapp.

This survey formed the basis of the later parish maps, such as those published in various editions of Strype's Stow.

The scale is slightly altered in this reprint: in the original it is roughly 11 inches to the mile, but is here 12 inches to the mile.

The form of the map is also altered: the original consists of nine sheets, six of which show the larger part of the map and the main table of reference; a seventh sheet contains a picture of St. Dunstan, and records the parish authorities of that date, besides the names of the surveyor, Joel Gascoyne, and the engraver, John Harris. Two small slips complete the whole, containing (1) the table of reference for Bow, (2) the outlying northern boundary which just came outside the main sheet.

The whole map is now contained on three sheets; the seventh sheet described above is not reproduced, nor are the old tables of reference, for their place is taken by the new and more complete index, which here follows:

Also they have appointed and named certaine Auncient psons in eſy hamlet, to be assistantt to the Churchwardens as well for the collection of the saide paym<sup>t</sup> of one whole yeares rent for the pewes, as also for theyre quarteredg mony and arrerages due by diſs psons for the same And that the saide wardens and assistanttes, shalby all gentle and quiet meanes perswade eſy pson w<sup>th</sup>in theyre collection, quietly to pay all and eſy such theyre duties accordingly, And that all and eſy such pson as shall refuse any the saide somes or duties, they shall collect theyre names in wrighting and the somes so by them detayned & present the same before the parrishoners at the next vestery where order shalbee taken to force eſy such stubborne & unwilling pson to pay the saide duties by order of lawe

In the meanwhile he was restored to his old living of Prittlewell, and held it till 1569, when he resigned (Newcourt wrongly enters him as dead). He seems latterly to have had a curate to help him, for on December 18, 1576, there is an entry in the Registers of the death of 'Richd. Theola, mynister and curat of Stepney.' At first his voyages were private ventures for the purposes of trade, but later in life he entered Her Majesty's service. He made careful hydrographical investigations, especially in the North Sea and the Baltic, and on his return published some most important charts; at the same time he was busy with scientific inquiry, and published 'A Discourse of the Variation of the Compass,' and other works. He was living in Limehouse in 1579, signs the minutes 1581-85, was one of the auditors for Limehouse 1589-91, and a vestryman 1594. Meanwhile he served the Queen as 'Controller of Her Navy at Sea,' 1583; as second in command to Drake in the expedition to Cadiz, 1587. The following year he fought against the Armada, in command of the Bonavoglia, and in 1589 we find him busy at Chatham despatching Frobisher's ships to sea, and 'getting a good wife' in the person of Lady Wentworth, widow of the second lord, the last governor of Calais and lord of the manor of Stepney: she was probably living in the Manor House on the north side of the churchyard, and they were married in the church on September 9. After 1594 he seems to have retired even from parish business, and in 1599 he died at the age of 63. See Nat. Dict. Biog.; Stepney Registers.

<sup>2</sup> John Burrell of Ratcliffe, mariner and shipbuilder, was twice Master of the Trinity House. The Spaniards offered him 6,000 crowns a year for 7 years if he would act as their spy and send information as to English movements: he refused, and the refusal caused him much misfortune in Spain. On his return he reported this to the Government, and expressed his willingness to obtain information for Government about Spanish movements (1598). Later he or a namesake furnished ships for the East India Co. (1615-19). He was twice married: first to Mary Ryddam, widow, February 25, 1582-83—she was buried June 23, 1586; and on March 20 of the same year following he married Barbara Bennett, widow, who was buried October 16, 1595. 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of Christchurch, Oxford, 1572; stayed there 4 years: never finished his degree, but went to London and became noted for his 'admirable penning of Pastorals,' and as one of the chief ornaments of the rising drama. After about three years of great literary activity, Gosson's views changed; he left the dramatic world and began to write against plays. In August, 1579, he published his 'Schoole of Abuse,' an 'invective against poets, pipers, plaiers, jesters, and such like caterpillers of a Commonwealth,' dedicating it to (Sir) Philip Sidney. This work aroused much controversy, and Gosson, now tutor in a gentleman's family in the country, followed it up with 'The Ephemerides of Phialo and A short apologie of The School of Abuse' (November, 1579), and later 'Playes confuted in five actions' (1582). Probably about this time he left his tutorship, came to London again, and was ordained, and the above is the first record we have of his preferment. He was also lecturer at St. Martin's, Ludgate, and became subsequently Vicar of Sandridge, Herts, October, 1586, but he came back to Steoney to marry Elizabeth Arton on April 25, 1587. In 1591 he was appointed by the Queen Rector of Great Wigborough, Essex, and in 1600 exchanged to the cure of St. Botolph's, Bishopsgate, where he died, Febuary 17, 1623. By his will he left 25s. to the poor of Steoney, 'where I was lecturer before I was beneficed.' See Arber's reprint of 'The School of Abuse,' 1868; Stepney Registers; Nat. Dict. Biog.

the colony of Virginia, and several of his large family were men distinguished in the colonies and at home. He fitted out at his own expense two ships, *The Samuel* and *The Little Toby*, to fight the Armada, and one of them he commanded himself. He was married three times, not twice, as is stated in the Visitation of London of 1633. He appears in the Minutes as Auditor for Ratcliffe in 1589, and vestryman from 1589-1602, when he seems to have left the parish and moved away, probably to Cockseyhurst, Eastwood, Essex, where he had property. He returned, however, to Stepney, died of the plague, and was buried there September 13, 1625.—Information from Rev. William Vassall. Stepney Registers.

<sup>1</sup> Sir William Ryder, citizen and Haberdasher, subscribed £100 to the Defence Fund against the Armada: in 1591-92 he was Sheriff, and in 1601 Lord Mayor of London. His year of office was marked by the insurrection of Lord Cobham and the Earl of Essex, and Ryder was busily employed in the defence of the City from their attack, and in the crushing of the conspiracy: at the close of it he was knighted, and we subsequently find him very busy as Collector-General of Customs, Commissioner for the sale of Church property, and engaged in many other financial transactions. Meanwhile he served upon the Vestry at Stepney, and at St. Bartholomew's Exchange. He died in 1611, leaving two daughters, Lady Lake and Dame Caesar, as his coheireesses. His wife was Elizabeth, widow of Richard Stone, Esq., and on the north wall of the chancel of Leyton Church, which Ryder rebuilt in 1610, and where Edward Ryder was lord of the manor, there were dimly to be seen in Lysons' time two coats of arms, and on one of them could be deciphered the impalement of the Stone arms: Gules a chevron ermine between three pelicans, Or. and disordred people, out of the sayde Parishe : And to take such good and lawdable orders therein, as to their discrecyon shalbe thought best from tyme to tyme, As the cause or causes shall require. And all such good and holsome orders as they or any xij of them (being of every Hamlet two at the leaste, with the Churchwardens or any two of them as afore-sayde) shall agree vpon, and the same enter or cause to be entred in this Churchbooke for a Testimony of their agrement. WHERE sundrie preachers have latelie come into sundrie places of the diocesse of London, some of them not being Ministers; Others, such as have no sufficient warrant for their calling: Others, such as have byn detected in other countries, and have not notwithstanding taken vpon theym publiquelie to preache, to the infamy of their calling; Others haue in their preachinge rather stirred vp the people to Innouation, than sought the peace of the Church. These are therefore in hir Maiesties name, by vertue of her high Commission for causes Ecclesiasticall, to us and others directed, straightly to Inioyne, comāund, and charge, all Parsons, Vicars, Curates, & Churchwardens, of all Churches situate within the diocesse of London, as well in places exempt from the Bishop of London his iurisdiction, as not exempt: that they nor any of them doe suffer any to preache in their Churches or Parishes, or to reade any Lectures, (not being in their own Cures) but only such whose Licences, they shall first have seene, and read, and whome they shall finde to be licensed therto, either by the Queenes Maiestie, or by one of the Vniuersities of Cambridge, or Oxford, or by the Lo Archbishop of Canterbury, or the Lo Bishop of London for the tyme being, vnder seale, And that no private assemblies or conventicles about Ecclesiasticall exercyses by any psons whatsoever, be suffered to be held, eyther in howses or elsewhere, by knowledg of the Minister or Churchwardens: But that the pties so assembling, bee detected by them, to the Ordinarie, with the

manner of their saide assemblies, with as convenyent speede as may bee.

But in 1626 he 'took more on him than belonged to his place,' and was dismissed from their service and from his house. His relations with the company were further complicated by a lawsuit in Chancery against them, which dragged on for some time, and finally in 1629 was handed over to arbitration. Meanwhile, since 1615, he had been a Commissioner of the Royal Navy, and very busy building ships for the Navy with the title of Master Shipwright, and the pay of 1s. 8d. a day. Almost simultaneously with his quarrel with the E. I. C. his work for Government was called in question, and a commission sat on the alleged defects in his ships; the result was apparently favourable to him, as he continued in active employ till his death at the end of 1630.—State Papers, Domestic and Colonial, 1600-30; Visitation of London, 1633-35.

The next few years saw him busy with the affairs of Virginia, but in 1614 he is in the service of the East India Company. He led an expedition to Persia, and on his return was much commended for his ability and skill. A second expedition was then proposed, but Newport refused to go under £240 a year, so the Company 'let him rest awhile to advise and bethink himself,' with the result that he consented to go for £10 a month. After this he was constantly busy to and fro between England and India till his death, which occurred at Bantam in 1621. He was three times married (and had issue): to Katharine Procter, October 19, 1584; to Ellen Ade, January 29, 1590; to Elizabeth Glanfield, October 1, 1595.—State Papers, Domestic and Colonial; Winsor, Hist. of America, iii., chap. v.

<sup>1</sup> Sir Thomas Bludder was Joint Surveyor-General of Victuals to the Navy, and was knighted at Chatham July 4, 1604. He later, with Ryder (p. 17), farmed the coal tax, and was afterwards a contractor for the pre-emption of tin. He married Maria, daughter of Christopher Herris, of Shenvile, Essex, and after twenty-seven years of wedded life they died within a week of one another in 1618, and were buried in Reigate Church, where there is a marble monument with a Latin epitaph to their memory. His arms were confirmed by Camden, Clarenceux, who described him as residing on 'Mile End Green.' Arms, Gu a dexter arm couped vambraced Or, hand ppr. Crest, a lion's head erased Ar., pierced through the neck with the blade of a sword of the last, the wound gu. The crest is the same as that of the Lincolnshire family. The Dethicks were said to have been of Dutch extraction, and were granted by Henry VIII. the old manor-house with an acre of land in Poplar, where they resided for nearly two centuries. Sir William Dethick was born in 1543. After holding the offices of Rouge Croix Pursuivant and York Herald, he was appointed Garter, and on May 13, 1603, was knighted by James I. In pursuit of his dignified office he took part in several missions to foreign princes, and in numerous imposing ceremonials. He was a learned antiquary, and the author of several heraldic works; but was, however, a man of such ungovernable temper that he was most cordially detested by everyone, and was twice suspended from his duties by the Crown. He resigned his office about 1604-5, and retired on an annuity of £200 per annum. He died in 1612, and was buried in St. Paul's Cathedral. His wife Thomasine (only daughter of Robert Young, citizen and fishmonger) survived him about twenty years; her funeral took place in Stepney July 18, 1633, but her remains were 'carried to London to be buried.'—Noble's Hist. Coll. of Heralds; Nat. Dict. Biog.; Parish Registers.

A David English, most probably the same, matriculated at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford, August 24, 1582, aged 15; he is described as 'filius generosus, of Sussex.' His quarrel with the Vestry seems to have been a serious one, as it called for the intervention of the rector.—Clark's Register of Oxford University; Newcourt Repert.

And therefore haue requested that the same might be recorded in some of the Church books for the better remembrance thereof. Wherefore theis are to certify all men that the said pmisses are true and that the said mony was duly and truly paied by the said Executors to the vse of the poore as aforesaid, In Testimony wee haue subscribed our names this daie and yeare aboue written,

And it is further concluded the day and yeare abouesaid : that all & euery the said Churchwardens for the tyme beinge shall collect or at least demande all and euery such dutie, and shall further at the chardg of the pish appointe and entertayne one docto<sup>r</sup> and a procto<sup>r</sup> to sue and recouer the same by lawe of any pson or psons who shall neglect or refuse the payment thereof, And also that euery Churchwarden shall w<sup>th</sup>in their seuerall hamlets recover by lawe and make account of euery arrearage wch shalbe founde in any of their books, for any yeare or tyme past. Whereas some controuersies haue heretofore arisen betwene the vicar and the pish *namely Mr English*<sup>1</sup> and that the same controuersies haue bine thought very inconvenient, and furthermore forsomuch as Mr Gouldmā now vicar being a quiet man, the Churchwardens & vestry men being assembled in the vestry house the daie and yeare abouesaid, haue giuen their full assent & consent that Mr Gouldman aforesaid shall haue the Pence wch heretofore haue bine called by the name of Paschall Pence dureing his naturall life for the yearely rent of ffowre poundes of lawfull money of England, And the said Mr Gouldman in Liewe thereof is contented to pay vnto the Churchwardens yearely w<sup>thin</sup> one moneth next after Easter, the some of ffowre pounds of lawfull mony of England: and shall & will likewise at his owne prop chardges finde & allowe so long as he shall be vicar of Stepney as aforsayd vsed all the wyne and bread wch yearely or at any time shalbe due and necessary for the Comunions in euey yeare. Except any private psons shall request an extraordinary Comunion at an extraordinary tyme, as when they go to sea or otherwise, for wch at their owne prop chardges they are to synd bread & wyne.

Goldman Vicar, and the Vestrymen there assembled, That no Churchwarden now beinge nor hereafter to be elected for the place of Churchwarden for the tyme being shall Lay out vpon any Church busines aboute the some of Twenty shillings, without the consent and allowance of two Vestrymen of each hamlett at the least, first had and obtained in writinge vnder their hands, But yf they or any of them shall p̄sume to lay out any monyes aboute the said some of xx<sup>s</sup>, That he shall beare and pay yt out of their owne purse chardges and allowance.

It is also further ordered and agreed by and amongst the said Mr. Vicar and Vestrymen aforesaid the same 9<sup>th</sup> day of Aprill A<sup>o</sup> pred, that the Churchwardens wch now are, nor the Churchwardens wch hereafter shalbe elected for the tyme being, shall, not at any tyme hereafter in the weeke called Rogatōn weeke for the three dayes wch they walk the pambulaōn, expende vpon their dynners in those three dayes, aboute the some of fowre pounds, But if they or any of them shall dispend or lay out aboute the said some of ffowre pounds, yt shalbe at his own prop costes and chardges and out of his or their own purse

This Gilbert Dethick is credited by both Strype and Noble with having been instrumental in the building of old Poplar Chapel, in which there was formerly a Latin inscription to the same effect, but as Gilbert Dethick died in 1639, and the date of the erection of the Chapel is usually given as 1650, it is clear that there is some mistake. Possibly some other member of the family was referred to, probably his nephew, Gilbert Dethick, son of Henry Dethick (see p. 84).—Strype's Stowe; Noble's History of the College of Heralds; Stepney Registers.

An interesting letter among the State Papers, written with invisible ink, from Thomas Rogers to Secretary Walsingham, dated Paris, August 25, 1585, informs us that 'Lord Morley has been solicited by his mother to come over, either to avoid imprisonment in England for seeming a Catholic or the peril that may befall him in England if foreign princes invade it and make it a conquest. . . Whether she would make her son an agent, or whether she is moved by any of the princes on this side to call him over I know not. . . He has promised to come when she sends for him, and has certified that £6,000 is the most he can bring over in money and jewels.' His loyalty, however, seems to have revived during the Armada panic, for when called upon by the Council (June 30, 1588) to contribute towards resisting the foreign attempts against 'this realm, his natural and sweet country,' he consented to furnish twenty light horse, thirty muskets, and seventy calivers. He sat in judgement on Mary Queen of Scots, Philip, Earl of Arundel, and Robert, Earl of Essex, and was present at the execution of the last-named unfortunate nobleman. Lord Morley resided at Mile End Green, and married Elizabeth, daughter and heiress of William Stanley, Baron Monteagle; he died in 1618, and was buried in Stepney Church on April 2 of that year; his son, an avowed Roman Catholic, was summoned to Parliament in the lifetime of his father in the right of his mother as Lord Monteagle, and was the nobleman to whom the memorable anonymous letter was addressed by which the Gunpowder Plot is said to have been discovered.—Harl., 1636; State Papers, Domestic; Burke's Extinct Peerage; Lyson's Environs; Stepney Registers.

<sup>1</sup> Captain William Bushell, in 1635, commanding the *Neptune*, was employed in redeeming captives at Argier. On his way home he and another captain, Thomas Scot, of Ratcliffe, were fined £500 and £100 respectively, at Dunkirk, by Admiral the Earl of Lindsey, for 'presuming to wear their flags in full view of The Fleet.' This apparently was considered an open insult to the assembled 200 ships, and was aggravated by the culprits attempting to escape. A month later the relatives of other captives 'at Argier and Sallee' petitioned the Lords of the Admiralty to send William Bushell to redeem others after his success in bringing home thirty. He was probably sent, and next year, on the recommendation of the Trinity House, he and his ship, the *Neptune* (400 tons, 32 guns, and 160 men), were employed for the Navy. In spite of a dispute with his purser, in which he was condemned by the Officers of the Navy for making money out of his stores, he seems to have continued in the service of the Crown till his death, which is thus entered in the Registers: 'March 7, 1637. William Bushell, of Limehouse, mariner, died at Morbein, in France—a Captain.' He seems to have been unmarried, as he left most of his possessions to his father.—State Papers, Domestic; Stepney Registers; Will at Somerset House. There was another Wm. B., a rope-maker, in Shadwell (see the Map), who died in 1653.—Stepney Court Rolls, Roll C.

Also at the said vestry yt was ordered & decreed that the old gallery standing in the middle part of the church toward the North Ile shalbe taken downe by the Churchwardens betweene Easter & Whitsontide this present yeare vnto the crosse gallery at the west end, that preparation may be made for the erecting of a new gallery on the north syde vniform to that new made & on the south side. And that the Commission graunted by the Lord Bishop of London for the new building of the gallery already built, for the taking downe of the old galleryes & for the erecting of a new gallery on the North side may presently be taken out by the Church-

paid £5 per month, 'the better to encourage deserving men of his coat.' Three years later, however, praise was turned to blame, and we read that on December 22, 1626, he was 'suspended until he could clear himself of the foul imputation of a barbourous and inhuman cruelty committed by his order on two blacks in the Indies.' A month later (January 19) he was discharged from the service 'because he so confidently denied' the charges brought against him, and at the end of ten days the court declared their detestation of the 'barbourous inhumanity rumoured against him,' and resolved never to employ him again 'unless he clear himself,' and to prosecute him 'if he appear culpable'; they, however, saw no reason to detain his wages, 'he having otherwise carried himself well, and confidently denying the fact, and no man directly accusing him.' After this unjust and shabby treatment by his employers he entered the royal navy, and in 1649 held the important post of commander-in-chief of the Irish seas, probably as successor to Richard Swanley.—State Papers, Domestic.

A prominent man in local affairs, and entrusted with several difficult inquiries and commissions by the Government. In March, 1653, he made a return to the commissioners of the navy of twenty-one captains fit to be commanders at sea, which includes many of the men here described. By profession he was a timber-merchant. This John Waterton, who lived on Wapping Wall, and was buried January 26, 1659, must not be confused with a namesake, a captain, who also appears in the State Papers of this date.—State Papers, Domestic; Adv. of Money, i.

<sup>2</sup> Rear-Admiral William Wildey, an energetic and painstaking officer of the Commonwealth navy. Early in 1653 Captain Wildey was consulted by the Navy Commissioners concerning the fitness of 'forty ships' for State service, and until June he was busily engaged in finding crews and victualling the fleet at Gravesend for the war with Holland. About this time, however, he seems to have had a reprimand from headquarters, and on June 24 he wrote from Ratcliff to the Admiralty Committee: 'I must defend myself from your high displeasure of misrepresentation concerning me. I have been neither negligent nor unfaithful, and if I erred in carrying out your orders, it has been through misapprehension. I beg dismissal, as there are others better qualified.' He appears to have been most anxious that the crews should be properly fed and clothed, and addressed frequent and vigorous complaints of the badness of the victuals, 'smallness of the pork,' etc.; hence, perhaps, his offence. He was married twice (first to Margaret Hawkins, April 18, 1626, and secondly to Sarah Dover, February 13, 1633), and died August 29, 1679, his second wife having predeceased him and been buried on April 6, 1667, leaving three sons, William, Richard and Thomas. The family continued connected with Stepney until 1782, when Samuel Wildey, the last of the male line, died, and was buried in the parish churchyard.—State Papers, Domestic; Lysons' Environs; Seymour's Survey of London; Stepney Registers and Court Rolls.

<sup>3</sup> Captain John Ellison in 1635 went to the Canaries with Richard Beck as quartermaster, and 'used him tyrannically, for a cup of drink extraordinary giving him twenty-six blows.' Their wives, unable to obtain their pay from Ellison, appealed for justice to the Lords of the Admiralty. Later on Ellison appears in command of the *Persia*. Here he was not a success, as he was 'too scholastical' to please the parishioners, and too weak to keep in check the two lecturers at the church, William Greenhill and Jeremiah Burroughes—'two notorious schismatics and Independents,' as Wood calls them, or the 'Morning and Evening Star' of Stepney, as Hugh Peters nicknamed them. He does not sign the minutes after 1651, and in April, 1653, William Greenhill signs in his place, so probably he was glad to retire to the quiet of Oxford, where he died December 6, 1654, six months after Greenhill had taken his place as vicar.—Wood's Athen. As early as 1629 we find it recorded that 'Peter Pett is a skilful and well-experienced artsman in the building of ships, and of honest life and good reputation.' He was master of the Shipwrights' Company in 1634; his name is, however, best remembered as being the inventor of the ships of war called 'frigates.' He died in 1652, and was buried in the church of St. Nicholas, Deptford, in the chancel of which is a monument with a Latin inscription to his memory. By his will, which was proved August 18, 1652, he appears to have owned various properties in Ratcliffe and Wapping, and to have left three sons and three daughters: Peter, afterwards knighted, William and Phineas, Elizabeth, wife of Captain Robert Moulton, and Mary; mention is also made of a brother William and sister Anne. Lysons mentions a brother, Joseph Pett. Le Neve's pedigree is very erroneous, and makes no mention of these or of his son William. A Margaret Pett (Mary?), 'daughter of Peter Pett, of Kent,' married Francis Johnson, of Aldborough, whose son was Sir Henry Johnson (p. 204), the great shipbuilder and dockowner of Blackwall.—Will at Somerset House; Le Neve's Pedigrees of Knights; State Papers, Domestic and Colonial; Dethick's Visitation of Middlesex, 1663; Lysons' Environs.

<sup>1</sup> Maurice Thomson, a wealthy Puritan merchant, of good family, and an ardent supporter of Cromwell's Government, was the eldest of the five sons of Robert Thomson, of Watton, co. Herts. The foundation of his fortunes seems to have been laid in Virginia, for as early as 1632 the governor of that colony recommended him, with two others, for a three years' monopoly of all the tobacco grown there. Shortly after this he got into trouble for trading with Canada, and he was ordered to pay a fine of £400 to the Canadian adventurers, which, however, he obstinately refused to do; and six years later his enterprise got him into a similar scrape, this time for poaching in the preserves of the Guinea Company, at whose instance he and his colleagues in trade were for a short time put under arrest. During the next few years he was busy shipping cargoes to the Company of Providence Island, and on August 18, 1648, he was appointed a commissioner from Parliament to the States of the United Provinces to solicit contributions for the Protestants in Ireland. The year following he was called upon by the Council to bring proposals for the reducing of Virginia, and four years after he was appointed a commissioner for Somers Islands, on June 25, 1653. After the Restoration, his intimate connexion with Cromwell naturally caused him to be regarded with suspicion, and though in 1660 the King had granted him his pardon, and he had accepted it, on June 24, 1666, he and his brother Robert were charged with giving information to the Dutch of the English fleet. The charge states that 'Maurice Thompson was always violent against kingly government, he was intimate with the Protector, sat at the High Court of Justice, and sentenced some of the beheaded lords . . . he was once a poor fellow in Virginia, but got a great estate in the wars, mostly rent out of the bowels of the King's party.' Nothing appears to have come of this charge, which was probably untrue. He was one of the founders of Old Poplar Chapel in 1654, and at the 'preaching of the first sermon' he gave 'an uncommon instance of his great Humility and Piety in that he condescended to go into the clerk's desk and there name and set the first psalm.' In 1655 he purchased the manor and entire parish of Elsham, in Lincolnshire. He married Dorothy (or, according to Collins, *Ellen*) Vaux, who died about 1678; by this lady he had a son, John, afterwards Lord Haversham, and three daughters; Katherine, who married Sir John Wittewrong, at her father's house in Stepney, July 4, 1650; Elizabeth, married to Sir Joseph Alston, Bart., of Chelsea; and Mary, a member of the Dissenting congregation at Stepney, who married William Oldfield or Owfield, of Gattton, Surrey, on November 13, 1655. Maurice Thomson resided in 1650 at the mansion on Mile End Green known as Worcester House, which he sold in 1675 to the 'Church' of Stepney Meeting; in 1652 he was residing in Bishopsgate Street; in 1672 he purchased property in Stepney known as the 'Vinegar Yard, Grand Alley,' and four years later, on May 8, 1676, his death was 'presented' at the Manorial Court.—Information from Major-General W. <sup>1</sup> Richard Swanley, a general shipmaster to the East India Company, and later on admiral of the Commonwealth navy, was described as master mate in 1622, when he was appointed to the command of the *Royal Exchange*. For the next eighteen months he was busily employed both ashore and afloat in the Company's service, and on December 14, 1623, their agents at Batavia sent a strong recommendation for his promotion; a month later, however, while master of the *James*, he was reprimanded 'for not lying abroad.' His answer 'was mild and full of respect, promising to amend that fault.' Three years later, still master of the *James*, he offered to serve the Company in the East for £10 a month, but was 'wished to think himself of a less amount.' He seems to have been rather nice as to his personal comforts; in November, 1627, he requested that the greater portion of his wine might be Canary, as white wine so soon grew tart; and a few months later he 'took to himself the great cabin,' contrary to orders, and refused to sail unless the privilege was conceded. The Company, however, stood firm, and threatened to discharge him, upon which 'he confessed that he had been transported with passion, and craved pardon,' but for his oath's sake desired leave to take his passage in the great cabin, at least 'as far as the Downs.' They, however, cared nothing for his swearing, and refused to make the slightest concession, 'as the great cabin had always been reserved for the merchant.' In 1643 we find him 'Admiral of the Irish seas,' doing great damage to the Royal cause on the west coast. In March of that year he captured a Bristol ship, laden with arms and ammunition for the King; and in May, 1644, he made a descent on Carnarvon, capturing 400 prisoners, arms and much pillage. The same year he relieved Plymouth, driving the Royalists from some important works they had erected near that town, and captured many prisoners. The thanks of Parliament were voted to him on June 4, 1644, when he was called to the Bar of the House and presented with a gold chain, valued at £200. He was buried at Stepney on September 25, 1650, and his wife Elizabeth was buried at the same place on July 1, 1662. He left three children, Mary, John and Richard; the last-named is possibly the Richard Swanley who was in command of the *Eaglet* ketch at the Restoration, and later a lieutenant in the *Anne* and *Triumph*.—Stepney Registers; Will at Somerset House; Charnock's Nav. 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'Have pressed 190 men at Wisbech, Lynn, and other places . . . some vessels are fitting for Ireland, but it is perilous ; all trade should be stopped till the war is over.' <sup>8</sup> Sir Henry Johnson, shipbuilder and owner of the dockyard at Blackwall. Pepys, in his 'Memoirs,' styles him 'one of the principal private shipbuilders in the kingdom.' He belonged to the family of Johnson, of Freston Hall, co. Suffolk, and for some time represented Aldeburgh in Parliament. He was knighted on March 6, 1679-80, at his own house in Poplar, and was one of the contributors to the old chapel in that hamlet. He died in 1683, possessed of considerable wealth, leaving a rent-charge upon his estate at Blackwall for the benefit of poor ships' carpenters ; the property, however, passed into the hands of Lord Strafford's family, and from one cause and another no real benefit accrued from the charity until 1756. The Court Rolls style his residence the 'Gate House,' and mention a lease that he took from the trustees of the E. I. Att a meeting this daye of the Members of y<sup>e</sup> vestry The Churchwardens did present vnto them some papers Giueing an Accompt of the pticulars referred to their care by the vestry held y<sup>e</sup> second of July last And first presented a breuiate of the Acts & Ordinances now in force for the better observation of the lords daye which being read ouer & debated att this vestry was approved And the Churchwardens then desired to cause severall Coppys thereof to bee printed and to bee fixed in Convenient places att their discretions for publike Notice thereof to bee taken for the preventeing of the frequent disorders & prophanations of that daye w<sup>th</sup>in this Parish.

Secondly, that they had viewed & considered of the repares wanting vpon the Vestry house, and for their better informaçon of the Workes needfull to bee done and the charge thereof, they had caused a Survey to bee made by two able psons: Workmen within the City of London whoe had deliuered their opinions vnder their hands That to build that house with brick And to finde all Materialls & Workmanship for y<sup>e</sup> buildeing 50 foote in length & 20 foote in breadth betwixt the Walls will cost 260<sup>li</sup> or thereabouts besides all the Materialls of the old house.

The vestry haueing considered the said report of that worke; did vnanimously agree that the same should bee pformed & that Monies for that vse & for other occasions of the Church should bee raised in the sevall diuisions of this pish. But being not clearely satisfied with the Computed Charge for that house, desired the Churchwardens Sydemen & their respectiue assistants within each Hamblett to cause another vewe & estimate thereof to bee made by some other workmen and to giue in the same att the next vestry to bee Ordered accordingly

Itt was alsoe presented to the vestry that the Company of

Coopers did desire leaue to build vpp a Gallary in some convenient place for y<sup>e</sup> sitting of the children of the free Schoole<sup>1</sup> belonging to that Companie The consideraçon was referred to the psons appoynted att a former vestry for repares of the vestry house

The Churchwardens did alsoe present that accordeing to order the last vestry they had spoke w<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Greenehill Justice Waterton & M<sup>r</sup> Hutchinson about the Monies Giuen to the Poore of this Parish out of the Imposte vpon Seacoale from whome they receiued answere that the some of 400<sup>li</sup> had beene receiued and as to the disposing thereof some part was to bee disposed with the consent of M<sup>r</sup> Cawley<sup>2</sup> & M<sup>r</sup> Waterton & the rest w<sup>th</sup> consent of M<sup>r</sup> Hutchinson & M<sup>r</sup> Waterton & that this disposure was to bee for a stock to sett the poore on Worke or otherwise at their discretion And that some pte of y<sup>t</sup> Money was by Order Giuen to a poore widd<sup>d</sup> Alreedy.

The vestry this daye takeing the busines into their consideraçon did desire that M<sup>r</sup> Maurice Thomson, Cap<sup>t</sup> John Limbrey & Justice Hoxton would conferr w<sup>th</sup> Mr Greenehill and those other Gentlemen how y<sup>e</sup> said 400<sup>li</sup> & the proffitt of itt should bee employed either for a stock or other Aduantage for the Poore accordeing to the intent of the Act of Parliament. Itt was also desired that they would Speake with M<sup>r</sup> Greenehill about readeing the word of god in publicque before the time of sermon on y<sup>e</sup> lords daye, and alsoe concerneing Catechizeing

Coopers for the building of a Gallery in the Church for the sitting of the Children of their free Schoole the foresaid referees did take vewe & consideraçon of that proposall & how the same might bee effected if the said Company & this vestry did approve thereof & to that end gaue in their oppinion as follow<sup>th</sup>, That the place most convenient for that purpose is vpon the North Side of the Church to goe from East to west before & somewhat lower then the present Gallery there but as to the Charge of the same the referees conceive itt is fitt to bee Carried on by the Companie whoe expect the sole vse and benefitt thereof

To the fourth, concerning the Monies recd by M<sup>r</sup> Greenehill y<sup>e</sup> Vicar they haue noe accompt to giue, saue that they heare that the said 400<sup>li</sup> is disposed by M<sup>r</sup> Greenehill & two of the Justices. Concerneing the Monies of Alderman Reignoldsons ffine said to bee in M<sup>r</sup> Watertons hands, the Referees haue seene acquittances and perused some Accompts whereby itt appears the said Monies were pd in to the respectiue Churchwardens and are past vpon their Accompts.

<sup>1</sup> William Clarke, D.D., born in humble circumstances, was admitted to Christ's Hospital, May 25, 1597, by a 'bill' from the parish of All Hallows the Great, which describes him as being then two years of age, 'sonne of Thomas Clarke, deceased.' At this foundation he became a 'Grecian,' and in 1613 proceeded to Peterhouse, Cambridge. Upon the death of Emmanuel Utye he was appointed (August 31, 1661) to the vicarage of Stepney, and on February 1, 1665, was installed Dean of Winchester in succession to Alexander Hyde, who had been advanced to the See of Sarum. In 1671 he desired to be excused from accepting the Bishopric of Bristol because the least of his preferments, the deanery, the parsonage of Stepney or another that he had, was better than that Bishopric. He died at St. Giles-in-the-Fields in 1679, possessed of a considerable estate at Tillingham, in Essex, which he left for the augmentation of ten small livings. — Information from E. R. <sup>1</sup> Sir William Rider, J.P., Deputy Master of the Trinity House and Commissioner for Tangier, was knighted on March 12, 1660-1, and on June 1 of the same year he purchased the mansion on Bethnal Green, popularly known as the 'Blind Beggar's Palace,' upon the site of which is now a lunatic asylum. Pepys, who was upon very intimate terms with the knight, gives an interesting account of a visit to his residence: 'By coach to Bednall Green to Sir W. Rider's to dinner. A fine merry walk with the ladies alone after dinner in the garden; the greatest quantities of strawberries I ever saw, and good. . . . This very house was built by the Blind Beggar of Bednall Green, so much talked of in ballads' (Diary, June 26, 1663). During the Great Fire his city friends used his house as a warehouse for their goods and chattels, much to his disgust. Pepys relates that 'about four o'clock in the morning, my Lady Batten sent me a cart to carry away all my money and plate and best things, which I did, riding myself in my nightgown in the cart; and, Lord! to see how the streets and highways are crowded with people running and riding, and getting of carts at any rate to fetch away things. I find Sir W. Rider tired with being called up all night and receiving things from several friends.' From the Restoration until his death in 1669 he was a person of much importance in Naval affairs, and appears to have possessed an ample fortune. On December 6, 1666, he obtained a licence from the Lord of the Manor to drive in his coach across Mile End Common when on his way to Stepney Church. He married Priscilla, daughter and co-heiress of Captain Roger Twedy, and died at Bethnal Green on August 30, 1669 (according to Le Neve, was buried on September 9, at St. Andrew Under-shaft). By his will, which is dated June 9, 1668, it appears that he left two sons, Thomas and William Rider, and two married daughters (Elizabeth, wife of Richard Middleton, and Priscilla, wife of Richard Bayley), and three unmarried daughters (Mary, Anne, and Martha). Mention is also made of his sister, Joane Crowther, and her eight children.—Stepney Court Rolls, v. 165; iii. 178, 179; Pepys' Diary; Will at Somerset House; Le Neve's Pedigrees of Knights.

That they doe not att any time nor for any occasion presume to call before them any Minister, preacher, or Curate whoe shall be comorant within their said parish before them to their vestry or Meeteings to be questioned with at all, but shall leave them and their Causes Wholly to the Calleing, Heareing, ordereing and Censureing of the Ecclesiasticall or Temporall Magistrate, against Whome if they have any Complainte They shall informe the said Magistrate according as the Nature, and quality of the Cause shall be, and shall Minister occasion; Further that they shall not any way in their Vestry or Meeteings intermeddle with the Churchwardens & Sidemens office concerneing the making of their Bills of Presentment, which they are vpon their oathes to deliver vpp into the Ecclesiasticall Court, Nor shall in their sd vestry question with them about any thing which they are to present or shall present (Except it bee to informe them of any abuse worthy & fitt to be presented) But shall suffer the said Churchwardens and Swornemen freely without their seekeing to be made privie to any of their Presentments, to discharge their consciences and duties accordeing to their oathes. Neither shall the said vestrymen take vpon them to call before them to their said vestry any parties Whome the Churchwardens are by their oathes to present to take any Accompt of the Churchwardens or sidemen, or of the parties Whoe are to be presented of the causes & Suspitions vpon Which they may be presented. Besides they are not hereby authorized, but shall wholly forbear to call before them att their Vestry any person to heare or intermeddle with any Cause, Matter, and Cryme Presentment or offence determinable, punishable or being of Ecclēicall Cognizance, either begun to be called in Question

or presented, heard, ordered, Censured or decreed in any Ecclesiasticall Court to be heard, ordered or Censured But shall forbear at their vestry meeteings any way to intermeddle in any of the premisses, as noe waies belonging vnto them but to the Ecclesiasticall Cognizance & Court, And if they shall intermeddle att any of their vestry meeteings in any matter contrary to the Limitacons aforesaid concerning Ecclesiasticall persons Causes or Matters, Then this Allowance of their Vestry concerning Church Matters & Authority herein granted to bee meerely Voide as if itt had never beene Granted Prouided that there shall noe vestry be holden, or Meeteing for such business as afore appointed to be holden or kept, But by order & Consent of the Vicar for the time being, nor without publique warning giuen thereof in the said parish Church vpon the sunday next before the said intended Vestry as aforesaid And if they shall meete, agree, order & conclude any thing contrary to the premisses Wee will & pronounce that such their meeteings Agreements orders & conclusions shall bee (ipso facto) voyde & of none effect, as if noe Authority had been granted, nor noe consent Agreement or order beene made or noe meeteing at all bine. ## APPENDIX.

*I. ABSTRACT OF WILLS.*

P. 14.—Will of John Matthew, citizen and Merchant Tailor of London, made 25th November, 1560: My loving friends, Mr. Birch, one of the Barons of the Exchequer, Hugh Stukly, gentleman, Ipolito Lynnet, of Hackney, co. Middlesex, and Robert Hulson, citizen and Merchant Tailor, of London, appointed executors and trustees of this my last will. I will and devise to the poor people dwelling as is hereafter named, 40s. yearly: To the parish of S. Michael, Cornhill, where I am now a parishioner, 40s. ; to S. Laurence, Old Jury, where I was late a parishioner, 40s. ; and to the parishes of Stebunheath and Hackney 40s. each yearly, and to the churchwardens of each of foresaid parishes 3s. 4d. for a drinking for their taking pains to see the said sums distributed. I will that at the end of twenty-one years all my freehold and copyhold lands, etc., go to Henry Weale, a son of Walter Weale, and Katherine Weale, my daughter, and the heirs male of his body, so long as he or they do pay the said sum of £8 13s. 4d. ; but should he or they neglect to pay the said sum, or failing heirs male of his body, then I will that my will to him made shall be clearly void and of none effect, and I will and devise all my lands, etc., to the next heir male of the said Katherine, my daughter, now wife of William Crowder, citizen and Clothworker of London, upon like articles and conditions, and if the said Katherine, my daughter, die without leaving heirs male, or they her

heirs male, neglect to pay the said sum of £8 13s. 4d., then I will that all my lands, tenements, etc., etc., shall remain to the parson, vicar, and churchwardens of the said parish churches of S. Michael Cornhill, S. Laurence Old Jury, and the parish churches of Stebunheath and Hackney, for ever to be distributed among the poor in the said parishes. I give and bequeath to Elizabeth Weale, Grace Weale, Mary Weale, . . . Weale, children of my said daughter Katherine, £10 each. To my executors £10 a piece, and all my goods, implements, and household stuff in my house at Kingsland, in the parish of Hackney Should my wife Katherine and daughter fall into poverty my executors may at their discretion relieve them out of any surplus they may have in their hands. Will proved October 29, 1569.

P. 26.—The will of John Fuller, Esquire, of Bishopshall, in the parish of Stepney, in the county of Middlesex, made 29 March, 1592 : All my capital messuage, house, buildings, lands, tenements, profits, easements fishing, and commodities called Bishopshall unto Jane, my wife ; and I will that my wife and her heirs and assigns do after my decease build two Almshouses, the one in Stepney, Middlesex, for twelve poor single men of good name, of the age of fifty years or above, and the other of them in the parish of Shoreditch, Middlesex, for twelve poor widow women of good name, of the age of fifty years or above, and that she or they cause the same Almshouses to be duly incorporated, that they may have, receive, and enjoy lands, tenements, profits, rents, and hereditaments to the yearly value of £100 ; to this end I will that my wife, at or before her decease, shall devise or dispose to the said Almshouse of poor men a yearly rent charge of £50 yearly, and to the Almshouse for poor women a like sum yearly, the said rents to issue out of all those lands, etc., in the county of Lincoln, whereof before this time I have made assurance unto Sir Drew Drury, Knight, and others. I will that the



Almshouses be governed by eight of the most ancient persons of the Company of Mercers. I will all my messuages, lands, etc., in the parishes of St. Benet and St. Peter near Paul's Wharf, in the city of London, now or late in the several occupations of William Jnkens, Edward Drinkell, William Corden, Richard Askew, Mary Lorimer, widow, Peter Derrick, John Nicolls, John Collins, Richard Dawson, Elizabeth Taylor, widow, James Austen, or their assigns, Thomas Wade, John Ellis, Thomas Wrothe, Nicholas Collins, Frances Fuller, Jeffry Brock, William Dalby, Richard Burton, Richard Browne, John Humfry, Robert Glover, and Hugh Wollaston, gent., to and for the releasing and discharging of poor prisoners that now are or hereafter shall be in the Holes or Twopenny wards for the space of ten weeks in the two Compters within the city of London, so that it do not exceed the sum of £26 8s. for any one person at any one time. I will all my lands, etc., in Beach Lane and Whitecross Street, in the parish of St. Giles without Cripplegate, to Francis Fuller, gent. The residue to Jane, my wife, whom I make my sole executrix, with Frances Fuller and Jeffry Brock, overseers of this my last will. My reversion of a capital messuage, etc., in the pish of S. Benet Paul's Wharf, in the tenure of E'nego Jones, to my wife Jane, whom I require to pay yearly the sum of £5 yearly to William Fuller, son of James Fuller. CODICIL: I give to my cousin, Margaret Burton, £20, to be paid out of my second doubtful debt that my executrix shall receive. SECOND CODICIL, dated March 30, 1592: To my niece, Margaret Burton, wife of Richard Burton, £40, and do revoke the former legacy of £20.
