

Deposits for Unrefined Gold Bars will be returned in twenty-four hours. The charge will be one-quarter of one per cent. for all amounts over \$1,200, and three dollars for any smaller amount. For Silver Bars one per cent. on the value of the Silver, and one-quarter of one per cent. on the value of the Gold contained. No charge being less than three dollars.

Charges of Refining per ounce, gross weight, after melting:

For bullion under....300 parts gold....3 cts. For bullion from 501 to 750 parts gold.... 7 cts. For bullion from 301 to 500 parts gold....5 cts. For bullion over......750 parts gold....10 cts.

For Bars of our own manufacture, a deduction from the above tariff is allowed,

making the refining charge as follows:

Under 300 fine, 214 cents per ounce. 301 to 500 fine, 4 cents per ounce. 501 to 750 fine, 514 cents per ounce.

Over 750 fine, 8 cents per ounce. No charge for refining less than three dollars.

Deposits for Conage will be refined by us immediately, and deposited in the United States Brauch Mint, and returns made to Depositors on the same day the returns are made to us. The charge for coin will be one half of one per cent., being the same as charged by the United States Branch Mint.

SILVER contained in the deposit will be accounted for to the Depositor in the manner and at the rate customary at the Mint.

If required, returns will be made in Refined Bars in four days, at a charge of one-sixteenth of one per cent. on the value of all Gold Bars over \$5,000, and one-eighth of one per cent. on all under that amount, and one-half of one per cent. on the value of Silver Bars. No deposit of Gold less than twenty-five ounces, or of Silver less than two hundred ounces, will be returned in Refined Bars.



This engraving represents a perspective view of a new amalgamator recently patented by Zenas Wheeler, of this city, as it appears when at work.



## NEW PATENT CONCENTRATOR.



This machine is constructed upon the principle of a "center discharge" and vibrating disk. The pan may be made of iron, wood, or other material, and of any convenient size, say from four to six feet in diameter, having a journal under it, to hold it in position, and upon which to vibrate. This journal is hollow, and forms the discharge

pipe of the pan. The pan is so constructed that its center surface is two or three inches higher than the surface at the periphery, and as it is fed at the periphery, the saud must necessarily work its way up hill to the center to find a discharge. This the lighter portion readily does by the aid of the peculiar vibrating motion given to the pan—the heavier portion, consisting of sulphurets, amalgam, or free gold, remains near the circumference.

A represents a frame of wood upon which the pan is built and supported.

B is the pan which consists of a corrugated surface, radiating from the center, as is shown in the engraving.

C is an amalgamated disk, one half of which only is shown, with a bowl in the center, from which the water and ore is equally distributed over the disk, and passes down through the outer edge, into the corrugated pan below.

D is the outlet, or discharge for the excess of the concentrated matter, such as sulphurets, etc., while the machine is in motion. This discharge is regulated by a gate or slide, which can be adjusted to any required he ght, so as to allow the proper amount of concentrated matter to pass out from under the waste and lighter matter which finds its egress through the center discharge.

E is the hollow journal through which the waste matter is discharged.

F, the rods for supporting the pan and its contents.

G, the driving pully on the cam shaft.

H, cam for vibrating the pan. The form of this cam is an involute, whose evolute is a circle, the cam being of the proper length to give the pan a motion of about ten degrees vibration. This peculiar form gives the pan nearly an equal velocity in every part of its vibration, causing it to stop and start so suddenly as to prevent the sand from packing on the bottom of the pan.

I, a pipe for drawing off the excess of mercury as fast as it accumulates.

The working of the pan is substantially as follows: The pulp is fed, as already described, into a bowl in the center of the convex disk, C, and flows out of this, evenly, over all parts of said disk, and down through the holes in its periphery, into the corrugated pan below, where the quicksilver, amalgam and heavy matter is collected by means of inclined grooves near the outlet D; the quicksilver, as fast as it increases in excess, being constantly discharged through the bowl and pipe at L, into a dish by itself, while the sulphurets, as fast as they accumulate, are discharged into another vessel through the opening D; the waste matter passes out through the hollow journal in the center of the pan, and is discharged at E. It will thus be seen that the entire operation of this pan is automatic, both in principle and fact. Its great advantage over pans of similar construction consists in this perpetual discharge of quicksilver and amalgam into one vessel, and sulphurets into another, while the machine is in motion.

In the compilation of the work, accuracy and facts have been our aim, and to what extent our efforts have been successful, we leave the reader to determine.

Neither time, labor or expense have been spared to render the RESIDENT AND BUSINESS DIRECTORY complete and perfect. The MINING DIRECTORY required much time and labor in its production, and stands prominent among the attractive features of the work. The idea having become prevalent that we were collecting names for a "draft," caused the weak-kneed (a few of whom are to be found in every community) to refuse to give their names. To this class particular attention has been given. Their names will be found in alphabetical order.

The various corporations (with one exception) rendered every assistance and information desired. The exception above alluded to was the "Gould & Curry." One of the surplus or sub-superintendents, who has not an enviable reputation for either good sense or patriotism, threw every obstacle in the way of our obtaining the names of the workmen; but through exertion and strategy, the names were finally procured and will appear in their proper place in the work.

The inaccuracies and imperfections of previous works, claiming the name of Directories for this Territory, had created a

popular distrust and prejudice which required no small amount of exertion and argument to overcome; but with a strong belief in our humble experience and ability, and with perseverance as our motto, we proceeded with our task, and the work now presented is the result of our labors.

The general review contains brief notices of public and private enterprises, churches, schools, military, benevolent and other societies, brief notices of the different fire companies, stage lines, routes of travel, city improvements, etc.

Our aim has been to make the work a source of information for strangers and a convenient hand-book of reference for residents. The patrons of the present work are assured that no pains or expense will be spared to render the next issue of our Directory all that could be desired, and by far superior to any similar publication ever offered to the public here.

The compiler would feel derelict and ungrateful did he close these remarks without expressing his obligations for the favors extended, courtesy shown, and information obtained from the various public officers, heads of societies, the press and the "oldest inhabitant."

#### HISTORCIAL.

But little was known of this country previous to the silver excitement of the last few years, separated by the Sierras from California, and situated at such a distance from the Atlantic States, its earliest visitors were emigrants passing through here on their way to California, and they having the latter country so impressed on their mind it would have required more glittering assurances than this country at that time offered to have induced them to locate within its borders. The first white settlements of this country, claiming the protection of the American flag, were Mormons, afterwards it was selected by a class of desperadoes and horse thieves, whose nefarious pursuits could be carried on without molestation, and generally without pursuitthe various mountain fastnesses and uninhabited valleys affording them ample protection from the hands of justice. The early history of Nevada, up to within the last few years, was characterized and chequered by unfruitful attempts to form a government and have a separate Territory laid off from the ample limits of Utah, (what is now Nevada Territory,) which would place the settlers outside the limits of Mormon laws; and amongst those who were foremost in furthering this object was the late Judge Crane, who was the first delegate sent to the National Capitol for that purpose, being elected unanimously by the people of the Territory, who wished to live under the protection of the Federal Government, and governed by its appointces. At Washington he failed to carry his point of obtaining a separate Territorial Government, under the auspices of the General Government.

The people enraged at the negligence and apathy shown by the General Government in not attending to their wants, and being determined to have some system of government not connected with Mormon rule, on June 6th, 1859, a mass meeting of the residents was held, when it was resolved to call a Convention of Delegates to meet at Genoa on the 18th of July: accordingly the delegates met and framed a "Declaration," stating their grievaness, the principal points of which averred that the Mormons. who had the reins of government and the administration of the laws, had abused the powers placed in their keeping; that they had denied to the Judges of the United States the right to try eriminals, when such criminals were Mormons, with several more specifications showing Mormon injustice in the administration of the government in the Territory. The Convention, after passing a series of resolutions, stating their grievances, wound up with the following:

"Therefore, believing in the rectitude of our intentions, and believing the time has arrived, we make known and declare our entire, unconditional separation from Eastern Utah. To provide for and secure our future protection, we pledge to each other our sacred obligations to erect for ourselves a Territorial Government, founded upon the Republican principles of the Constitution of the United States, and that we will maintain and defend it to the best of our ability, and we look to the support and protection of the Federal Government and our fellow-citizens in every part of the Union."

The discovery and development of the mines, the large influx of capital and population, consequent upon their development, for a time diverted the minds of the people; the subject being again agitated, a Governor and Legislature was elected and met at Genoa in 1859. After receiving the message of the Governor, (who had just been elected,) the Legislature adjourned. In May, 1860, an event took place which marks an important epoch in our history, and for a time retarded the development of our mines, and foreboded serious injury to the country, a difficulty having arisen between a party of Indians and some settlers, at a place which was then known as William's Station, about sixty miles below Genoa, four whites got killed. This wholesale murder aroused the country to a state of maddened frenzy and revenge, and for three months the indiscriminate scalping of every Indian that could be found was carried out, and public vengeance had been fully appeased. This unfortunate affair operated with such damaging influences on the country, and created such a panic among emigrants that were preparing to visit the Territory, that

for a year following there was a perfect stagnation in all kinds of business. In 1861 Governor Nye, and other Federal appointees arrived, and took charge of the reins of government and the administration of its affairs. An attempt was made last fall to have Nevada admitted as a State, which would have succeeded had not a party of office seekers, who cared more for their own personal aggrandizement than their country's welfare, tried to force themselves upon the people for appointments. The Convention for the formation of a State Government met in Carson last fall, and, after a lengthy session, drew up a "State Constitution," with so many obnoxious and objectionable features in it that the people, by a large and overwhelming vote, rejected it, and the government again relapsed into its Territorial form; but the "outside world" must not form rash conclusions from these results, nor doubt either the loyalty or the enthusiastic patriotism that actuate the people of the Territory. She has given in her numerous munificent donations to the Sanitary Fund, and through the loyal press of the country uncontrovertible proofs of her adhesion to the Government, and her loyalty to the Union and Administration. Nevada is bound to be a State; her pride, intelligence, wealth and capacities, all point to her abilities, as well as to the necessities of a State Government. It has been claimed by parties, pretending to speak for Nevada, that the people objected to a State Government on account of the additional expense incurred. This is a base slander upon the liberality and patriotism of her citizens. There is not under the broad canopy of the American flag a more loyal, law abiding and self-reliant people; and when the country purges itself (as she is now doing) of the cankerworm of politicians that infest her, a State Constitution will be adopted, and a State Government formed, which will reflect the genius, capacity, and loyalty of Nevada. Governor Nye, under the auspices of the Administration, and a special Act of Congress admitting Territories, has issued his call for a convention of delegates to meet in Carson at an early date to form a State Constitution and have it adopted by the people. There is little doubt but that the Constitution will be ratified by the people, as they have too much pride and patriotism to remain in Territorial obscurity when the opportunity is offered them to strengthen the Government by the ad-

dition of another "Free State." If political hueksters can only be kept out of the convention, Nevada will, this fall, clothe herself in the virgin robes of State, and give another proof to the Administration and the world of her unflinehing adhesion to the Government and the "Union"

A series of attempts have been made by a hungry and unscrupulous lot of brokers, assisted by putrid copperheads and loud-mouthed Union men, to force greenbacks as the standard currency on the Territory. The advocates of this measure have labored to impugn the patriotism of the opponents of this measure. The following resolution, which speaks for itself, was introduced at a meeting (held in Virginia City a short time since) by A. B. Paul, Esq., of Gold Hill, a gentleman who has labored with more zeal for the cause of the Union, and expended more time and money in strengthening the Government, soliciting aid, and collecting funds for the benefit of the Sanitary Commission, than any other man in the Territory, and all the greenback agitators put together:

Resolved, That we, the merchants, miners, business men, and citizens generally, of Storey county, do hereby, in mass meeting assembled, declare our full adherence to the Federal Government, and our readiness to aid it as far as in our power, but as gold and silver has been for years our standard currency, we hereby declare that we will adhere to the same, and denounce any man as acting dishonorably who pays any debts with greenbacks, unless by agreement.

The resolution was adopted with unbounded enthusiasm by the largest assemblage ever collected in the Territory. There is one noticable fact to be observed in this controversy, the influential Union newspapers of the Territory, and all Union men who are not in search of office, are advocates of hard currency.

The Territory contains about 65,000 square miles, a large proportion of which is mineral fields. Prof. Silliman, a gentleman in every way competent, has been appointed by the Federal Government to make a geological survey and report on its mineral resources. His report and opinion of our resources will be anxiously looked for.

Mr. R. M. Evans, a gentleman of great research, keen observation, and an able writer, is now engaged in publishing a book which will give a succinet history of everything appertaining to this Territory, from its earliest history up to the present time. The book will be embellished with maps showing the location of

the various prominent "lodes" throughout the Territory. It will form a valuable addition to the meagre works already published on this Territory. Mr. Grafton Brown, a young gentleman who is a master spirit in his profession, will shortly issue a series of maps and views showing the location of Virginia, Gold Hill, and the various lodes that have gained for these places such an enviable name. Although scarcely five years have elapsed since the discovery and development of the minerals of this country, the silver mines of Nevada yield a greater annual product than those of any other country, Mexico excepted; and this yield is clearly not one-hundredth part of what it will be. Nevada is remarkably, and from its position and formation, necessarily healthy. It forms the western side of the great basin inclosed by the Rocky Mountains on the east, and the Sierra Nevadas on the west, the average elevation of its valleys being at least 5,000 feet above tide-water, while very little of it is as low as 4,000. Some of the peaks of the Humboldt Mountains are 11,000 feet high. The winters are of moderate length, with a temperature modified by the mild breezes that come from the Pacific. No rain falls for six or eight months in each year, and the country is entirely destitute of swamps. The rivers that runs from the Sierras, on the south, as well as the Humboldt, and those coming from that direction, lose themselves and are absorbed on the great and barren desert that stretches far castward. This desert is thinly covered with the useless shrub (to all but emigrants) known as "sage brush." The Humboldt River rises in the mountains of Western Utah, pursues a circuitous but generally southwestern course for a distance of 350 miles, losing itself in the great "Sink" soon after passing through Humboldt Lake, which is about 100 miles from the foot of the Sierra Nevadas, and 40 north of the "Sink" of Carson. The Humboldt is largest near its head, receiving on its course a few very diminutive tributaries. In summer it gets so low that it can be forded almost anywhere on its whole length, and dwindles in size as it proceeds, until finally it is entirely lost in the "Sink." It runs through a desolate valley, from ten to thirty miles wide, bounded by ranges of mountains as desolate in appearance as itself. Those mountains, known as the Humboldt, with the Reese River mountains further east, are now disclosing immense deposits of the precious metals

to the explorers' energetic endeavors. A ditch is being constructed, to tap the Humboldt River sixty miles above what is now known as Humboldt City, which, when completed, will give water privileges to sufficient mills, and other branches of industry, to develop the rich resources of the country, and build up a new empire in what was formerly a barren wilderness. The Humboldt mountains are now acknowledged to be miracles of wealth, which only requires time and the necessary machinery to develop. With the Pacific Railroad to bring them food at moderate rates, the people of this country have a future before them which shine as resplendantly as the precious metals that lay encompassed in their mountains. The day is not far distant when this country will produce enough of silver to supply the wants of the world; then greenbacks will command a premium, and greenback agitators will lose their potency for evil.

#### VIRGINIA, STOREY COUNTY.

Virginia is to "Nevada" what San Francisco is to the Pacific Coast—the reservoir that contains the nucleus and material to support and sustain the surrounding country. A stranger coming from the "States," (after passing over a series of sterile deserts and barren mountains,) arriving in the city, is at first wrapt up in wonder and amazement, and finally gives vent to his admiration of a people who have the enterprise to raise such towering proofs of their indomitable energy and perseverance. No matter in what direction the eves are turned is to be seen mammoth blocks of business houses, palatial residences, and workshops where every conceivable business and trade is represented, and from every prominence the towering steeples of religious institutions bespeak the refinement, intelligence and cultivated tastes of the residents. Situated on the eastern side of Mount Davidson, with a very limited amount of level laud on which to build the city, possessing but few of the materials necessary to assist in building it up, Virginia, like a meteor, has sprung up under the untiring energy of her citizens to the mammoth proportions of a metropolis. The city must of necessity continue to be, as she now is, the headquarters and mart of trade and commerce for this Territory. Here are located business houses, whose mammoth stocks of goods are continually kept replete with all that is necessary or demanded by the people of the Territory. A large proportion of the merchants being direct importers, or branches from large manufacturing establishments in California and the East, and selecting the most advantageous seasons for the transportation of their goods over the mountains, are thus enabled to successfully compete with and undersell (adding freight) dealers in other places. Another year's growth, similar to the past, would place her beyond the sanguinc expectations of her

most enthusiastic admirers. Her growth is unparalleled and her progress marvellous. The valleys in the immediate vicinity always raise sufficient of the necessaries of life to support a population treble the present size. Lake Tahoe, the Truckee, and Carson River and Valley give to this place a superabundance of fish and game; and the increased development and rapidly increasing wealth of the surrounding mines gives a confidence to the business man, resident, and speculator, in everything they undertake. The city has four daily and the same number of weekly newspapers, which, for size and "matter," are not surpassed on the Pacific coast. Stages radiate from here to all parts of the Territory, California, and the States. Omnibusses ply between here and Gold Hill, Silver City, and surrounding points, at all hours. Foundries, machine shops, potteries, brick-yards, and other domestic manufactures, are in abundance; and every profession has here its representatives. On the succeeding pages will be found a brief sketch of "THE CITY, AND WHAT IT CON-TAINS."

#### CITY IMPROVEMENTS.

In essaying to give a review, mark the progress, and exhibit the enterprise displayed within the past year, by both the City Authorities and private enterprise, we will curtail our remarks, and chronicle only facts of public interest. The year just past has been remarkable for the enterprise and public spirit manifested by the old City government. The present City Council deserves the thanks of the citizens for the many improvements and very necessary changes and reforms that they have projected, and are now carrying out. Virginia owes the proud position that she now occupies, more to the indefatigable go-aheaditiveness of her business men than to any natural causes (other than the mines). None but an actual observer could realize the celerity by which streets are opened and graded, and whole blocks of three and four story buildings are erected. The rapid manner by which they are tenanted, at once shows that our

growth is healthy and permanent. Such extensive improvements has had the effect of enhancing the value of property, and it is a fact worthy of note that real estate has doubled in value during the past year. There is a marked difference in the style and finish of a large proportion of the residences that are being erected. Luxuries and the comforts of a permanent home, are being observed in their construction. Louis Feusier & Co., Wholesale Grocers, and Gillig, Mott & Co., the wellknow Hardware merchants, have erected a block of four story brick buildings, corner of C and Taylor streets; the ground floors are occupied by the owners for stores; the upper stories are used for storage and manufacturing connected with their business. L. Feusier & Co., erected during the past year for Wells, Fargo & Co., the building which that Company now occupy. The lower story was laid off for the express accomodation of this Company, and we venture to say it is the most commodious, as well as the best arranged, office occupied by the Company on the Pacific coast; the second floor is occupied for offices, and the basement by the well-know firm of Wm. Shepard & Sons, Gas Fitters and Plumbers. Howell, Black & Bro., merchants, corner of C and Taylor streets, have erected a magnificent brick building with stone basement running clear through from C to D streets, which, for substantialness and perfect finish, is not surpassed on the Pacific coast. McLaughlin & Root, Hardware merchants, have put up and finished a substantial brick building, four stories high, having fronts both on B and C streets; the ground and second floors are occupied by the firm for sales-room and workshops, and the two upper stories is occupied as offices and sleeping rooms. is estimated that the residence of R. M. Stewart, cost \$80,000. The Enterprise Building, is another of the noticeable features of the city. There are numerous other buildings that deserve a passing notice, but the space allotted to this department precludes us from describing them. We have alluded to this subject more to convince parties at a distance, that the business and population of the city is not upon a mushroom or fluctuating basis, but that it is as permanent as it is substantial.

Mayor Arick, in his report for the last fiscal year, says—in reference to our finances:

"The total tax roll of the city, according to the report of the City Tax Collector, is \$90,858 75. The amount collected—\$69,779 13—with a delinquent tax of \$20,783 12;" but since the installation of the present City Tax Collector, Mr. H. R. Alexander, the city revenue is flowing more freely into the Treasury.

The finances of the city are now in a healthy condition. We make another extract from the Mayor's report, published on 6th April, 1864:

"The expenses of the City government during the past year, have been greater than anticipated, but the unprecedented growth of the city, the increased necessity for cross streets, engine houses, cisterns, hose, sewers, together with the necessary expenses incurred in providing for the sick and indigent, have added much to the ordinary current expenses." The Mayor in

closing his report winds up with the following:

"Our new Charter says that you shall have power to make by-laws and ordinances not repugnant to the Constitution and laws of the United States, or Territory of Nevada. Allow me to urge the importance of confining your legislation to the strict limits of the Charter, and always avoid the exercise of the doubtful powers. Before closing my report, I desire to return to the old Board of Aldermen and City officers, my profound and sincere thanks for the uniform kindness and courtesy extended during the past year, and to the newly elected government I pledge my hearty co-operation in all measures tending to promote the public good; with you will rest the responsibility of shaping the laws and establishing the government of a city, young but rich and flourishing, and now attracting the attention of the world. 'God made the country, man makes the town,' let us indulge the hope that its government will be a model-its existence, eternal."

#### City Police.

The newly elected officers seem to have been selected with an eye specially to their qualifications; they are all men of reputation, and the present efficient City Marshal, C. W. Cooke, is building up a lasting reputation by the efficient manner that he is discharging his official duties.

In another part of this work will be found a notice of the Fire Department, giving the names of the various companies,

with other interesting matter relating to this subject.

#### Churches.

One of the strongest proofs of the intelligence, growth and progress of Virginia, lays in the towering steeples of the many

churches that dot the city on every side. Perhaps in no city in the United States can a people, thrown together from all parts of the world, in such a short space of time, boast of so many churches and places of worship for the population.

The various denominations seem to have vied with each other in the size, architectural design, and beauty of finish of their va-

rious places of worship.

#### Roman Catholic.

THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION CHURCH—Congregation of the Passionate Fathers—Very Rev. Peter Magagnotto, Superior; (Very Revs. Father Angelo, John Phillip, John, Paul, Hycienth, and S. Wefonhus, Assistants.) This beautiful edifice is so advantageously situated that it commands a view of the city in all directions. It was opened for religious services on the 20th December, 1863. The church is 40 feet wide by 100 feet in length, and its cost in its present state is about \$15,000. When its interior decorations are completed, it will be one of the neatest and best arranged churches in the Territory. Monastery and residence of the Superior and Assistants in rear of church.

St. Mary's in the Mountains—Rev. P. Manogue, Pastor. This new church is 38 feet wide by 100 feet long. It was built in October, 1863, at a cost of about \$20,000, and can seat 600 persons. Residence and reception rooms of the Pastor in the

basement of the church.

#### Protestant-Episcopal.

St. Paul's Church—Rev. Franklin S. Rising, Rector, corner of Taylor and F. streets. This elegant structure was completed on the 22d February, 1863, and was consecrated by Bishop Talbot on the 11th October of the same year. Size, 34 feet by 60 feet, and will scat 250 persons. Services are held every Sunday at 11 o'clock, A. M., and  $7\frac{1}{2}$  P. M. Sunday School meets at 1.45 P. M.

First Methodist Episcopal Church—Rev. C. V. Anthony, Pastor. This is the *first* denomination that held religious services in the city. The old church was built in the fall of 1860; their new church was dedicated on the 14th February, 1864. This is a beautiful brick building, with a cut stone basement. Size, 42 feet by 70 feet. It will seat 400, and will cost, when completed, about \$40,000. It has a large and constantly augmenting congregation.

First Presbyterian Church—Rev. W. Palmer, Pastor—organized on 21st September, 1862, by the Rev. W. W. Bryan. Religious services are now held at the District Court Room,

South B every Sabbath, at 11 A. M. and 7 P. M. Arrangements are now being made for building a church to accommodate the constantly increasing number of members.

AFRICAN METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH—Rev. — Green, Pastor. A neat and substantial church has lately been built on F street, and religious services are held every sunday at the usual hours.

STOREY COUNTY BIBLE SOCIETY—Organized 26th October, 1863. Its officers are: David S. Turner, President; Dr. T. H. Pinkerton, Vice President; Rev. C. V. Anthony, Rev. W. W. McComber, Rev. D. W. Palmer, Rev. N. W. Winters, Rev. Thos. R. Diehl, Executive Committee. The object of this Society is to promote the circulation of the Holy Bible without note or comment. The Society has Depositories in the following places for the sale of Bibles: Virginia, Gold Hill, Dayton, Washoe City, and Austin.

#### Schools.

Public Schools.—There is, perhaps, no city in the Union (population considered) where there has been as much interest evinced, and capital expended for school purposes, as in this city. The school buildings are located on E street, between Washington and Taylor, and have a front of 60 feet on E street, and 90 on Washington. The schools are divided into the following departments: Grammar—J. G. Chesnut, Teacher; First Intermediate, Miss S. S. Mathews; Second Intermediate, Miss H. K. Phillips; Third Intermediate, Miss K. McLaughlin. First Primary, Miss S. Bisbee; Second Primary, Miss C. M. Bachelder; Third Intermediate, Miss A. Le Compt. The schools have an average attendance of 327 scholars, divided as follows: Males, 129; Females, 140. The following is the names of the newly elected School Trustees: Judge Tilford, President; John Mallon, —— Flood, A. DeLand, N. A. H. Baldwin, Judge Robinson, and —— Brown.

PRIVATE EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.—The Sisters of Mercy have just opened a school. The Misses Higgins, on North F street and Dr. H. M. Bien, corner of F and Union streets, have each got large and commodious school-rooms, and teach all the various branches. There are numerous other private schools in different parts of the city.

Sisters of Charity—Branch of Sisters of Charity, San Francisco, Sister Frances, Surperioress. Have established a branch in this city for educational purposes. The Legislature of California have shown its appreciation of their invaluable services by voting them \$10,000, at the last session. The Sisters are cosmopolitan in their charity; the only recommendation necessary to

obtain their elemency, is the knowledge that the parties claiming it are worthy of their assistance. The City government should lose no time in showing their appreciation of the services of the Sisters, by making them a liberal donation of land and money, and might rest assured that both would be properly applied. Their School will be on a lot south of Father Manogue's church; and their residence will be in a building that is being erected at the old Catholic burying-ground.

#### Cemeteries.

This city can now boast of a public burial place for the dead, the ground formerly known as the Flowery Hill Cemetery has been purchased from its owner, J. B. Wallard, by the city, at a cost of twenty-five hundred dollars. The City Council are taking the necessary steps to have the grounds laid off in a manner which, when completed, will reflect credit on the good taste of its projectors. The tract contains 27 acres. A portion of the grounds has been reserved and laid off for the exclusive use of the firemen of this city.

Mount St. Mary's Cemetery. (Catholic,) under the charge of Rev. Father Manogue, is situated one mile east of the city. A good road is now constructed, and when the grounds, which are being tastily laid off, and other improvements which are now commenced are completed, it will be one of the ornaments of the city. A cross, forty feet high, is being erected in an appropriate portion of the grounds, which, when completed, can be seen, from all parts of the city. About 100 has already been buried here. Father Manogue has laid off and presented to the firemen of Virginia a plot of ground which is being laid off into parcels for their exclusive use. They intend the present year to erect a suitable monument to mark the locality of their burying ground.

THE EUREKA (Hebrew) Society have purchased a plot of ground on Cedar Hill, to be used as a cemetery, which they have fenced in and otherwise improved. The Society have displayed a great deal of good taste, and expended a large sum of money in ornamenting their grounds.

#### County Hospital.

Is situated on the outskirts of the city, on the side of the ravine or canon that leads to the Gould and Curry mine; the location is a healthy one, and an excellent view of the city and surrounding country, can be obtained from the building. The Hospital is divided into two buildings, three stories high. The male department is 60 by 40 feet, and is capable of accommodating 60 patients. Patients can be provided with private rooms in the Hospital by paying five dollars per day.

Patients who have money are charged two dollars per day, and those that are destitute are kept at the expense of the County; the object being to make the institution as light a burthen on the county as possible. The building is well ventilated, painted and furnished throughout; an abundance of water is obtained from wells sunk in the vicinity; extensive improvements are being made; the grounds surrounding the building is being laid off into walks, and planted with trees and shrubbery; the cooking department is excellently arranged, being provided with cooking ranges capable of accomodating 200 patients. Average number of patients, 40. Dr. Thos. H. Pinkerton, is the visiting Physician, and General Superintendent.

Female department has facilities for accomodating 14 patients.

Insane department is in the basement of the building.

#### City Hospital.

The city own a very fine Hospital building, but from a mistaken policy of economy, it is not used—the City Physician visiting patients at their places of residence, and receiving a certain amount from the city for each professional visit. This is a mistaken policy of economy on the part of the city, as it really costs more than it would to keep the Hospital open, besides being a very unsatisfactory position for a City Physician to be placed in, as he is thus debarred from being able to make correct official reports. Dr. J. C. Tucker is the City Physician.

#### Masonic.

#### Odd Fellows.

Mt. Davidson No. 3. I. O. O. F. of Nevada Territory. The Lodge is in a flouri-hing condition, and is rapidly augmenting its numbers. The first meeting was held on February 14th, 1862, and the officers were installed on 2 d April of same year; it now numbers 125 members. This Lodge is under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of California. The following are the

names of its officers: John Steele, N. G.; T. B. Smith, V. G.; N. W. Winton, R. S.; W. H. Davenport, P. S.; G. W. Noyes, T. Regular meetings on Saturday evenings, in Masonic Hall.

An Odd Fellows' Hall Association has been recently organized, and the building now occupied as a Court House has been purchased by them. The Association design to add two stories to the building, the upper one to be used as a hall for meetings of the Lodge.

I. O. O. F.—Nevada Lodge No. 7, was organized January 15th, 1863, by David Kendall, Grand Master of California. Regular meetings every Friday evening are held in Odd Fellows' Hall, numbers 30 members, and is in a prosperous condition. The following is a list of its officers: D. B. Woolfe, N. G.; D. M. Love, V. G.; J. C. Swain, R. S.; A. Hirschman, P. S.; R. M. Black, Treasurer.

#### Sons of Temperance.

VIRGINIA CITY DIVISION, No. 2, S. OF T.-Number of members, 180. Sons of Temperance was organized in this city in 1860. The financial affairs of the Society are in a prosperous condition. Their influence is being felt, and importance appreciated, by the whole community. Meetings are held in the "Odd Fellows'" Hall every Monday evening, at 7½ o'clock P. M.

#### Fenian Brotherhood.

The Virginia branch of the Brotherhood was organized on the 2d April, and, although only a few weeks in existence, its prospects are very encouraging. The object of this organization has in view is one that appeals to the universal sympathies of mankind. Irishmen throughout the world, but particularly in America, are noted for their patriotism, love of liberty, and reverence for their native land. This society, which is only one of the thousand of branches that are scattered throughout the world, has for its object the liberation of Ireland from the yoke of England, believing that their native country has the ability, talent, and resources to manage her own affairs. This is the only organization that has ever been started for the liberation of Ireland that the thrown sectional dogmas aside, and takes for its basis the

broad platform of "universal liberty" as its motto. Its leaders have been proven, several of them having passed through the fiery ordeal of '48. John O'Mahony, whose name sends a thrill of pride, patriotism and confidence through the heart of every Irishman who remembers the claims of his mother country, is the head centre, with the leading minds of Ireland both here and at home as his aids. There can be none that doubt either the honest intention or the determination of this association to carry its plans into execution whenever the time and opportunity arrives. It was John Mitchell who gave expression to the following illustrious words: "He that forgets that he is an Irishman, and the claims that his mother country has upon him, is an unworthy citizen of the United States." Let Irishmen impress his memorable words on their memory, organize, and bide their time. The following is a list of its officers: P. O'Toole, T. G. Murphy, P. N. Ryan, John Cahill, Thos. Bulger, Mark Feeney and John Walsh, Committee of Safety; J. P. Gallagher, Head Centre; P. J. McKeany, Secretary; Michael McCluskey, Treasurer; P. N. Ryan, Financial Secretary—meets every week, the President being empowered to call "special meetings" when deemed necessary. One of the finest military companies in the Territory has been organized from among the members of this association, which will be found noticed under the head of "Military."

#### Eureka Society.

This is the name of a Hebrew Benevolent Society, which was organized in this city, November, 1862. It now numbers 85 members, and is in a flourishing condition, having upwards of one thousand dollars, as a surplus fund, in the treasury. The Society has purchased a plot of ground on Cedar Hill for a grave-yard, which they have fenced in and otherwise improved. The Society, since its organization, has expended upwards of four thousand dollars. Meetings of the Society are held first Sunday of each month in the Probate Court-room.

#### Typographical.

The Washoe Typographical Union was organized on the 28th of June, 1863, and has got upwards of 60 members. This

organization was formed for the purpose of mutual protection and relief. Its officers are—O. E. Jones, President; C. M. S. Millard, Vice President; Geo. C. Crowell, Secretary; Henry Trayser, Treasurer; O. G. Hicks, Sergeant-at-Arms. Board of Directors: John I. Ginn, A. J. Graham, and John Langarl. Regular meetings of the Union are held on the first Sunday of each month. Ten members constitute a quorum.

#### Military.

The Military is respected and supported to a greater extent here than in any city of double its size and age on the Pacific coast. A high toned rivalry exists between the different organizations, which is plainly discernible when. on public occasions or at popular celebrations, they turn out; their dress, drill, equipments, and everything appertaining to perfect discipline, being plainly discernible by spectators. May they always continue to evince the same spirit of honest pride in their organizations that they now display. The time may not be far distant when they will have an opportunity to illustrate by their valor the right to the confidence and esteem they now enjoy.

VIRGINIA CITY GUARDS, 72 members. Organized, 1862. Captain, Thos. Cahill; First Lieutenant, John Cahill; Second Lieutenant, Alex. Mort; Brevet Lieutenant, James Bolan.

Washoe Guards, 67 members. Organized September, 1863. Captain, Thos. G. Murphy; First Lieutenant, M. Hassett; Second Lieutenant, James Brennan; Brevet Lieutenant, Chas. Rotto.

NATIONAL GUARD has 86 members. Organized November, 1863. Captain, C. C. Warner; First Lieutenant, A. B. Elliott; Second Lieutenant, W. A. Bourne; Brevet Lieutenant, C. W. Melzner.

EMMETT GUARD, 71 members. Organized May 15, 1864.—Captain, Peter N. Ryan; First Lieutenant, P. M'Auliffe; Second Lieutenant, J. M'Kenna Dolan; Brevet Lieutenant, J. H. Hassett. This Company is composed of the nucleus of the Fenian Brotherhood. The officers are selected especially for their ability, patriotism and love of native country. Although only lately organized it has now its full quota, a fact which proves that though through the tyranny of England they have been forced to adopt other countries beside their own for a residence, the old hatred that flashed from the sword of a "Sarsfield," still survives in the hearts of his countrymen, and that time, instead of quenching their love of liberty, only adds fresh flames to the furnace of revolution. From present appearances the day is not far distant when Irishmen, collected under the Phænix wings of the "Fenians," will wrest from their oppressors their native

country and its cherished traditions. While the memory of "Lord Plunkett," and his packed jury is held in execration by posterity, let it likewise be remembered that "Emmet's" epitaph is still unwritten and his tomb "uninscribed," and that the time is fast approaching when they, by their valor, can claim the right to mark the spot where Ireland's statesman, soldier and patriot—Robert Emmet—lays entombed.

#### Gas Works.

Virginia City Gas Company was organized in November, 1863. These works have now laid down 1,200 feet of main or street pipes, and are capable of manu facturing 5,000 feet of gas per day. The gas manufactured by this company is pronounced to be a first class article, shedding a clear light. The works are rapidly gaining public favor. The following comprises its officers: C. H. Simpkins, President; W. B. Thornburgh, Secretary. The Trustees are: C. H. Simpkins, A. Pierce, W. B. Thornburgh.

#### Virginia and Gold Hill Water Co.

The following gentlemen are the Trustees: John Skae, C. G. Funk, J. W. Gashwiler, M. M. G. Ross. The officers of the company are, N. H. A. Mason, President; John Skae, Vice President; C. G. Funk, Secretary and Treasurer; J. W. Gashwiler, Superintendent. The company, during the past year, have made improvements and enlarged their facilities for supplying the city with an abundance of water; reservoirs (or tanks) have been erected at convenient distances, and easy of access, which, from the abundance of water, are always kept full.

Another company is about to be incorporated for the purpose of bringing water from Lake Tahoe. It is a great undertaking, but, when completed, will make fortunes for its projectors; and as American enterprise recognize no barriers that labor and capital can overcome, we may expect in a short time to revel in the luxuries of an abundant supply of fine water from the crystal

depths of this beautiful natural reservoir.

#### Railroads.

Perhaps next in importance to the development of our mineral resources, is the interest manifested in the various lines of railroads already commenced, and others projected; but it must be apparent to even a casual observer that a railroad running over the Sierras to, or connected with this city, would give a stimulus to mining and the general development of our mineral resources; and it is only necessary to consider the enormous amounts annually expended by the people of Nevada to have the various necessaries and luxuries of life transported here, over the mountains in wagons, to illustrate the necessity of one or more rail-

roads running through the Territory, it would be safe to say that, were there a railroad at the present time over the Sierra Nevadas, the population of Virginia would double in one year, and mills and mining machinery would treble in number. The enormous expense which attends our present means of transportation greatly retards our progress; from the rapid progress made, and the universal interest manifested in the Pacific Railroad, it is to be hoped that at no distant day we will be regaled with the delicacies of California, brought over in quick time, and in good order, by the aid of the locomotive.

#### Stage Lines.

There is perhaps no city in the United States, as there certainly is none on the Pacific coast, that can boast of as many stage lines radiating from her limits as Virginia. It would be almost an impossibility to enumerate the various stage, ombibus, and express lines that start from here at all hours of the day. We will, for the benefit of the traveling community, enumerate a few

of the leading lines:

California Stage Co.—This is one of the oldest and most reliable lines on the Pacific coast. A line of daily stages, belonging to this company, run over the Henness Pass route, between here and Marysville, Grass Valley, Nevada and Auburn, at the latter point connecting with the Central Pacific Railroad, making daily connections with the Sacramento and San Francisco steamers, thus rendering the necessity of passengers having to lay over at Sacramento or Auburn uneccessary. During the past year the business of the company has increased so rapidly that during a large portion of the present year they have been compelled to put on extras to accommodate the increased travel. L. McLane, the Superintendent, (and one of the proprietors,) is a gentleman of vast experience, of keen perception, thorough business capacities and management. This company deserves more credit than has been accorded them, for the expense incurred and energy displayed in keeping the roads open over the mountains during the heavy snow storms of the past winters. Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Express, and the United States mail, are carried by this company.

PACIFIC STAGE AND EXPRESS Co. run a daily line of six-horse Concord coaches between Virginia and Sacramento, (connecting with steamers at the latter place for San Francisco,) over the Henness Pass route, connecting at Newcastle with the Central Pacific Railroad. This line runs through Truckee Meadows, Dutch Flat and Auburn, near the latter point connecting with their lines for Nevada, Grass Valley and Marysville. This line is well stocked, is managed and conducted with ability, and is rapidly increasing in popular estimation. The route over which this line runs, is not surpassed on the Pacific coast for its magnificent and picturesque scenery. The roads in winter possesses decided advantages over any of the other traveled routes, not being liable to the heavy snow storms which at certain seasons impedes travel on most of the other roads. W. F. Wilson's Accommodation Stage Line, between Virginia City and Carson. The stages and stock on this line are kept in excellent condition. #### Review of Industrial Enterprises.

By referring to the Business Directory, a correct idea can be gained of the various mechanical and other branches carried on within our limits. It is but a short time since everything required for either the use of the city or the mines had to be shipped from San Francisco; but, thanks to the enteprise of our business men, we have now representations from almost every branch of business known and carried on in more favored cities. We will enumerate a few of the most prominent establishments and workshops:

THE FULTON FOUNDRY, situated on the Divide between Gold Hill and Virginia, was established in the spring of 1863, by Thos. Jones, a practical foundry-man, (having had charge of several large establishments,) is now prepared to take orders for castings or machinery of any size. During the past year extensive improvements have been made, thus increasing the facilities of the foundry in turning out first class work.

THE GOULD & CURRY COMPANY have fitted up a foundry and machine shop convenient to their mill, which is used exclusively for keeping in repair the mill and machinery of this company.

MECHANICS' MILLS, situated on South D street, have just received a new and improved lot of machinery, and are now prepared to do all kinds of planing and turning, likewise manufacture sash, blinds, doors, mouldings, sidings. Vanduyn & Hooley, Proprietors.

VIRGINIA PLANING MILL.—This establishment was established in November, 1863, the mills of Hughes & Co. and Hawley & Moxley consolidating, putting all of the machinery into the present building, besides additions. The mill is run by a 20-horse power steam engine. Sash moulding and turning done at this mill.

M. Delaney has a turning establishment on D street, between Union and Taylor. All kinds of billiard balls and fine turning executed at this establishment.

#### Sand Spring Salt Fields,

The most important discovery, next to the silver mines, is the Salt Fields, for without salt the silver mines could not be worked, and to work them profitably, salt, which is a very important item to quartz mills, must be obtained at reasonable rates. The amount of salt consumed, if statistics on the subject were gathered, would amount to figures that would astound any person unacquainted with the vast quantities annually consumed by each of the mills. These Salt Fields are 70 miles from Virginia, on the Reese River road, a half mile from what is known as Sand Springs. They cover an area of 1,800 acres. The advantage of

the location lavs in the fact that it can always be shipped at a nominal rate by freight teams returning either from the Humboldt or Reese River mines. As it is impossible to import salt from California, at the same figures as the company can deliver it here, the stock of the company is looked upon as one of the safest and best investments in the Territory. The supply of salt is inexhaustible, and is pronounced by the mills to be superior for their business to anything yet discovered. It is sold in Virginia at five cents per pound, and the company dispose of 200,000 pounds per month. The original owners incorporated, and have limited the shares to 2,500. The trustees and officers of the company are men of standing, enterprise and means, and are using every means to facilitate its quick and easy transportation. They are about constructing a railroad from the works to the main road. The company have a monopoly which, if properly managed, will make the Salt Fields a never-failing source of wealth. #### Breweries.

The breweries of Virginia is certainly one of the features of the city, and it speaks well for the non-intoxicating habits of our citizens the amount of patronage, and the consumption of "lager" here. Virginia likewise supplies a great many of the smaller towns in the neighborhood.

St. Louis Brewery, 132 and 134 South C street, was established on the 1st of May, 1861, by Adam Gerhauser. During the past year the proprietor has built a large substantial stone building, two stories high. The front part is used as a saloon, with large and commodious vaults in the rear. The other portions of the building are used for the various purposes necessary to brewing.

Union Brewery is located at 40 North C street, Chas. Baker, proprietor. The well known reputation of the beer made here has already procured for the proprietor a large and constantly increasing business.

Washoe Brewery.—This establishment is located on the Divide, between Virginia and Gold Hill, at the junction of B and C street. The enterprise and experience of Messrs. Eggerts & Tants is fast gaining for this brewery an enviable popularity.

NEVADA BREWERY, John Dohle, proprietor, situated on the Marysville road in the suburbs of the city. Extensive additions and improvements have been added to it the past season, thus extending the facilities of its enterprising proprietor to supply his customers with a pure, strong and healthy beverage.

Philadelphia Brewery, on D street, opposite Maguire's Opera House.

VIRGINIA BREWERY, one mile from the city, in Seven Mile

Cañon.

#### Assay Offices.

Messrs. Ruhling & Co., in connection with their banking house, have one of the most extensive assay offices in the Territory.

Office, B street, opposite Taylor.

Leopold Kuh, (formerly of the Branch Mint, in San Francisco,) has an assay office on A street, near the Ophir Mine, and the unbounded public confidence, and his vast professional experience, gives him a leading position among the assayists of the Pacific coast.

Theall & Co., corner of C and Taylor street, under Paxton & Thornburgh's Bank, do an assaying business.

#### Brick-yards.

There is a large number of brick-yards within the limits of Virginia. Excellent material for their manufacture is found in abundance.

Virginia Pottery,

Situated on H street. All kinds of stoneware is manufactured here: crucibles, furnaces, filberts, muffles, and fire-brick. The material from which the articles are made is said to be superior to anything on the Pacific coast, and it will repay a visit to the manufactory to see the various articles in their line, which the proprietors have on exhibition.

#### Places of Amusement

MAGUIRE'S OPERA HOUSE—Is situated on South D street, near Union; its size if fifty feet front by 150 in depth; it has four private boxes, a dress circle, parquet and orchestra apartments. No expense has been spared in its construction and finish. The first performance was given on the 2d July, 1863. The proprietor has kept the theatre, since its opening up to the present, occupied by the best talent to be had on the Pacific coast. "Stars," after playing engagements for the proprietors in San Francisco, are sent here. Maguire & Burns, are the proprietors.

SUTLIFF'S HALL, Henry Sutliff, proprietor, situated on C street, between Sutton Avenue and Mill street, is 70 feet front by 104 in depth; has accommodations for 900 people. It is at present occupied by a melodeon troupe. There is 15 private

boxes, and the stage is the largest in the Territory.

ATHENEUM is situated on C street nearly opposite "Sutliff's," and is at present occupied as a melodeon.

#### Newspapers.

If the number of papers published in a city is looked upon as a reflex of the intelligence and enterprise of its inhabitants, then Virginia has a right to claim for herself the title of the "Athens" of the Pacific coast. There are four newspapers published here, viz: 3 English and 1 German.

The Virginia City Daily and Weekly Territorial Enterprise; Goodman & McCarthy, Proprietors, Enterprise Building, South C street. This is the oldest newspaper in the Territory, having been first started by Jennison & James, in Carson Valley in 1858. The first number was issued in Virginia, on Saturday, Nov. 3d, 1860; at this time it was a weekly paper, but was changed to a Daily, 20th September, 1861. It has, by the energy, judgment and ability displayed in its management, risen to be the leading as well as the largest daily published in the Territory; it contains a large amount of local and miscellaneous news. The Enterprise devotes a large portion of its Sunday edition to statistics of mining news, and other matter connected with this subject, and is particularly favored by mining Secretaries as a medium for advertising their assessment sales. "Mark Twain," and "Dan De Quille," occupy a local and corresponding prominence in its columns.

Daily Union, John Church & Co., Proprietors, corner of C and Taylor streets. The first number of the Virginia Daily Union was issued on the 4th of November, 1862. The Union has the printing of the Letter List, and claims the largest circulation of any paper in the city. It is printed in agate type, and dishes up to its readers, daily, a vast amount of reading matter. The Union claims to expend more money than any other paper in the Territory, for the matter contained in its columns.

The Daily Old Piute, Lovejoy & Co., Publishers, was started in March of the present year. Messrs. Lovejoy & Gillespie fill the editorial chair, and the local department is presided over by Mr. F. C. Farrington. The Old Piute is the second largest daily in the Territory, and is issued as an evening paper. It is conducted with ability, and characterized by originality of matter and style—a qualification highly necessary to a newspaper, and one that a large number of its cotemporaries on the Pacific coast cannot boast of. It claims to be independent in politics; its columns are devoted to matter which it considers interesting to its readers, and is admirably interspersed with original "repartees," whenever occasion requires.

Nevada Pioneer (German), J. F. Hahnlen, Publisher and Proprietor; publication office, Enterprise Building, South C street. This paper is issued semi-weekly, but it is contemplated by Mr. Hahnlen to shortly change it to a Daily. The publisher has had a vast experience in the business, and displays his judgment by

issuing one of the best German papers on the Pacific coast; it is edited with ability, and its news columns is filled with interesting local, and choice miscellaneous matter; it is now the recognized organ of the Germans for Nevada. The *Pioneer* cannot fail to make itself a welcome visitor to every German in the Territory. Delivered to subscribers on the routes of the carriers for twenty-five cents per week.

#### Fire Department.

The Fire Department is composed of four engine companies and one hook and ladder, numbering a total of about 400 members. There is perhaps no other city in the Union that can boast of as efficient a fire department, for the population, as Virginia. It numbers amongst its members some of the most efficient firemen in the United States; and it is a source of just pride to the firemen of Virginia, as well as to the public spirit of the citizens, to be able to boast that the engines and their appurtenances are the private property of the members, and obtained through the individual energy of each company. It is the boast of the United States that, in all the Western and Pacific States, the fire department of each city is not paid, but relies upon the public spirit of its citizens. The Fire Department of Virginia numbers amongst its members the leading men from almost every profession and trade in the city. Board of Delegates of the Fire Department of Virginia: J. V. B. Perry, Geo. W. Birdsall, Sam E. Wetherill.

VIRGINIA ENGINE COMPANY, No. 1, was first organized in March, 1861. A number of the members, through their individual exertions, collected sufficient funds to purchase their engine. Seeing the necsssity of a hook and ladder company for the city, a part of the old company organized themselves into a hook and ladder company, which they called the "Nevada Hook and Ladder Company, No. 1." Their truck and fire apparatus is perhaps amongst the most efficient on the Pacific coast. Their truck was built by Folsom & Hiller of San Francisco, at a cost of \$2,500. Officers of Virginia Company, No. 1: Isaac E. Brokaw, Foreman; John Rodgers, 1st Assistant; John Hammerson, 2nd Assistant; Geo. H. Shaw, Treasurer; Chas. S. Champney, Secretary; and 65 active members. The company has 600 feet of hose, which is owned by the members. It is a second class engine, and was built by Button & Blake, of Waterford, N. York. It has 94-inch cylinders and 75-inch stroke, with 24-feet brakes, manned by 44 men. Stated meetings first Monday in each month. The city has just rented a commodious engine house on B street, between Fulton Avenue and Union.

NEVADA HOOK AND LADDER, No. 1—This company was organized from the members of Virginia Engine Company, No. 1,

and has continued from its organization, up to the present time, to be identified with that company, its hall being under the same roof as Virginia No. 1. It was organized in March, 1861. It numbers 63 members, and has 75 feet of extension ladder, in excellent order. The following is a list of its officers: L. P. Wardle, Foreman: Louis La Page, Assistant; Chas. Williams, President; B. F. Green, Secretary; G. A. Campbell, Steward; G. W. Downey, Side Officer.

Young America Engine, No. 2, organized on the 17th March, 1862. This company's house is situated No. 85 South C street, and is 60 by 20 feet. It has a tastefully and well arranged meeting room, being adorned with pictures illustrating the life of a fireman. There are four sleeping rooms connected with the building. The engine belongs to the company, and was built at a cost of \$6,000. It is the largest and most powerful engine in the Territory, and is really a model of beauty in all its details. It has 600 feet of hose, 300 of which belongs to the company. It has extension brakes, and has three different suction pipes, made to throw five different streams of water, if necessary. A handsome hose carriage is attached. It has a 10-inch cylinder and 9½-inch stroke. The officers of the company are: N. W. Winton, President; Theo. Hale, Secretary; —— Hintz, Financial Secretary; O. C. Steele, Chief Engineer; W. Wein, 1st Assistant; B. Y. Lackey, 2d Assistant, and 80 active members.

EAGLE ENGINE COMPANY, No. 3, was organized on 2d of August, 1863. The engine is of the Jeffrey's make, and is the property of the members. Its cost was \$3,700. The company has a large and comfortable hall on B street, a few doors south of the Post Office. This company has 600 feet of hose. Its officers are: Thos. Peasley, Foreman; Patrick Holland, 1st Asssistant; Jas. Pascoe, Secretary; J. W. Hemenway, 2d Assistant; Chas. Ramson, Treasurer, and 80 members.

Washoe Engine Company, No. 4.—This company was organized in August, 1863. The members of this company, although lately organized, have displayed more energy and as much efficiency as any company in the Department. They have paid for their engine, which was built for them by Button & Blake, of Waterford, New York, at a cost of \$2,800. The cylinder is of 9½-inch and has 7½-inch stroke. The jumper was built to order by Folsom & Hiller, 531 California street, San Francisco, and cost \$600. They have 600 feet of hose, in good condition. The names of the officers are: W. R. Warnock. Foreman; P. G. Garry, 1st Assistant; H. B. Harmance, 2d Assistant; H. McDougall, Recording Secretary; H. Ettling, Financial Secretary; E. Jacobs, Treasurer, and 80 active members. Engine house North B street.

#### Quartz Mills and Hoisting Works.

Gould & Curry Mill and Mine, situated about one and a half mile east of Virginia City. This is the most extensive mill in the Territory, or perhaps in the world. The mill, at present, runs eighty stamps. It is estimated that this company extract from their ores about a half million bullion monthly. The company employ about 800 men. The mine has three entrances—the lower, the middle, and the upper tunnels. At the mouth of the middle tunnel, which is situated on South I street, large and extensive quartz houses have been crected. A. Lawton, President; Chas. Bonner, General Superintendent.

Mexican Mine situated between Howard and A streets, was erected in 1863, has a 25-horse power engine, and the company own 100 feet on the Comstock lode. Alsopp & Co., Proprietors; E. B. Darsey, Superintendent.

Mariposa Quartz Mill, located at the foot of Cedar Hill; it has a 15-horse power engine, running 12 stamps of 600 pounds each. Knox's pans and the Hungarian bowls are used in the amalgamating department. Cost of mill about \$20,000.

HOOSIER STATE MILL, situated on Silver, between G and H streets, was erected in 1862—engire 40-horse power. The machinery was formerly used in the old Spanish Mill, runs 8 stamps, and 24 Knox's pans—was erected in 1862. Jacob Clark & Geo. Hurst, Proprietors; J. Clark, Superintendent.

CEDAR HILL MILL, located in Cedar Ravine, has a 40-horse power engine, built at the Pacific Foundry, San Francisco, three straight batteries of four stamps each; crushes 16 tons of rock per day; it has 12 6-feet ama'gamating tub-, with 8 Knox's improved pans. The mill was erected at a cost of \$35,000.

EMPIRE STATE Mull, situate at what is known as Sugar Loaf Peak, is run by both water and steam. The water wheel is 40 feet in diameter, with a 15-horse power engine; runs 10 stamps, and crushes about 12 tons of rock per day. It uses Knox's pans, with false bottoms, and Wakelee's patent flue pans; employs 10 men. Chas. Coover & L. Dunn, Proprietors. L. Dunn, Sup't.



#### GOLD HILL, STOREY COUNTY.

Previous to the year eighteen hundred and fifty-eight, but little was known of either this or any of the other cities and mining districts, which have since given to this county the prestige for precious metals that it has now acquired. The early settlers labored under every disadvantage that could possibly be connected with the development of a new and at that time almost unknown region. The topography and general appearance of the country was such as to discourage the most enthusiastic gold seeker. Separated by the Sierras from a convenient market, with almost impassable trails over the mountains, and with no facilities for correspondence or receiving assistance from their friends in California, the prospects even at this early date must have been very alluring to induce men to make their abode in what was then a very unhospitable region.

In 1858, a party of prospectors, headed by Messrs. Kerby and Finney, discovered indications of both gold and silver bearing quartz in this locality. Being practical miners, they immediately commenced prospecting, and then laid the foundation for the development of mines which are now universally acknowledged to be the richest in the world. The first company formed was then (and is now) known as the "Pioneer Quartz Company." This company located several claims, erected an arastra, and commenced working a claim called the Moselle, a short distance east of the Devil's Gate. Meeting with success, they extended their operations, making roads and other improvements to facilitate the transportation of the rock from the tunnel to the works. The prospects became so flattering that a new company was formed, machinery erected, and the mill commenced crushing in 1860. (See notice of mills Devil's Gate District.)

Gold Hill, unlike her sister cities of the Territory, relies exclusively on the development of the richness of the minerals that encompass her, to build up the city, rather than to any prospective speculations, whose riches are wrapt up in the mist of the

future. Having the richest as well as the best developed mines yet discovered, either in the territory or the world, and confident that it only requires time to make still richer "strikes," she keeps marching on in the path of sure and substantial progress. Neighboring cities that have seen the hey-day of their prosperity, have good reason to look with envy on the "solid," steady and unfluctuating growth of Gold Hill. It is a noted fact, that the mines of this District are worked at less cost and with more success, than any other District in the Territory. One of the reasons rests in the fact that the mills are more convenient to the lodes; and another may be that a large proportion of the mills are owned by residents, who are directly interested in seeing that they are conducted economically. During the past year buildings have been put up that would be an ornament to an Eastern Metropolis. A "Town Hall" is being erected, opposite the Vesey Hotel, a portion of which is to be used for a Police Court and the transaction of official business, and the rear used for a Jail. The building is now in course of completion, and its estimated cost is \$15,000. There are various other buildings, such as Maynard & Flood's fire proof block, the Odd Fellow's building, and numerous private dwellings, that relieve the eye from the bleakness of the surrounding hills, and displays the refined tastes of the citizens. A new hotel is about being erected, which promises to excel in appearance and grandeur anything of the sort yet attempted in the Territory. It is to be called the Imperial. The association for its erection numbers amongst its Trustees some of the wealthiest as well as the most enterprising and public spirited men in the Territory. The President of the "Imperial" is Almarin B. Paul, Esq. It is a fact worthy of note, that on the first day's opening of the books, \$30,000 of stock was subscribed for, and the remainder is now all taken. Work has already commenced on it, and when completed, it will be one of the "features" of the city. The city government deserves great eredit for the public spirit they have displayed in all matters ap-pertaining to the health of her citizens and in the making of necessary improvements.

#### WATER WORKS.

During the past year the facilities for obtaining a constant supply of water have been greatly increased. Additional pipes

have been laid down, and other necessary improvements made, to keep pace with the rapidly increasing population. A new reservoir has just been erected of enlarged capacities.

#### SCHOOLS.

The citizens have made excellent selections in their School Trustees. They are all men of intelligence and enterprise, and have a keen appreciation of the duties devolving on them as the guardians in whose actions rests the responsibility of providing facilities for the present and future education of the rapidly increasing youth of the City.

The Public Schools are divided into two departments, Primary and Intermediate. The Primary is under the supervision of Miss S. D. Mecham. It has fifty pupils. The building is fitted up in

the most approved style with cast-iron desks, and other modern improvements. Intermediate department is under the charge of Miss L. H. Crocker. It has forty scholars, who attend School ten months in the year.

The proficiency of the pupils and the perfect order and discipline displayed in the government of the Schools, does credit to the judgment and abilities of the ladies having charge of the respective departments. #### FOUNDRIES.

The rapid increase and continual demand for machinery, as well as the constant repair, necessary to keep the various mills in this District in working order, has given a great stimulus to this branch of trade.

PIONEER FOUNDRY.—This foundry, as its name indicates, was one of the first in the Territory. In 1863, the owner suffered a severe loss by having the whole of his foundry burned to the ground, with the loss of nearly all of the machinery. With characteristic energy he commenced and has now in full blast another foundry, which is creditable alike to himself and the Territory. The building, which is 126 by 30 feet, with a wing 40 by 50, is built of brick, with tin roof, and is now considered fire-proof. It has all the latest improvements for turning out all kinds of machinery. Attached to the foundry is a machine shop.

EMPIRE FOUNDRY.—This foundry has recently been built on the most approved plan, and has excellent facilities for the manufacture of all kinds of machinery. Situated on the Divide, between Virginia and Gold Hill, its location makes it easy of access for the surrounding mills. The proprietors, Messrs. Hubbard, McAdams & Maxon, have had a life-time experience in the business, and are all practical foundrymen and machinists.

Another foundry is being erected in Lower Gold Hill, by McCondy & Co.

The Gold Hill (evening) "News" Lynch & Mundall prop'rs, was started in 1863, by its present proprietors. The ability and judgment displayed in its management has gained for it a reputation second to none in the Territory. #### QUARTZ MILLS AND HOISTING WORKS.

The following are the names of Quartz Mills and Hoisting works, with their capacity, in this District:

PIONEER MILL—Coover & Stephenson proprietors; was erected in 1860, and claims to be the oldest Mill in the Territory, which is clearly illustrated by its present dilapidated exterior; although its machinery is not as modern as its neighbors, the experience of its proprietors more than makes up for this deficiency. Although its capacities are limited, it has rendered larger dividends to its owners than mills of much greater capacity. It is a fact worthy of note that the mill is owned and worked by its first founders; it has an eight stamp rotary battery and nine amalgamating pans.

SEALES' MILL.—This Mill is owned by Seales & Anderson. It was erected in 1862; has an engine of sixteen-horse power which runs five stamps and five amalgamating pans. The owners of this Mill, at an early date, contemplate adding five more stamps with six amalgamating pans to be driven by a new engine of fifty-horse power

EMPIRE MILL No. 2.—Owned by the Empire Mill and Mining Company, is situated in Gold Hill. It has an engine of sixty-horse power which drives sixteen stamps, two rock breakers of two thousand pounds each, with fifty-two amalgamating pans. R. N. Graves superintendent. This Company intend adding thirty more stamps, twenty "wheelers" and a new engine of one hundred and fifty-horse power, during the coming Summer. This is one of the most extensive Quartz Mills in Gold Hill.

THE IMPERIAL MILL.—The property of the Imperial Mill and Mining Company; situated in Lower Gold Hill; was erected in 1860. It has forty-four stamps, sixty-six amalgamating pans and is driven by an engine of forty-horse power. This Mill has recently had sixteen new stamps added to it, and is classed among the finest in the District. It is under the superintendence of J. C. Corey.

Petaluma Mill.—Owned by S. L. Greely; is situated in Lower Gold Hill. It runs eight stamps, and fourteen pans with an engine of twenty-horse power, built at the Pacific Foundry, San Francisco. S. L. Greeley superintendent.

SAPPHIRE MILL.—This Mill is owned by the Sapphire Mill C o It was built in 1862; has sixteen stamps and forty pans, which are driven by an engine of thirty-five-horse power. Under the superintendence of J. B. Gaznon. This Company intend adding new boilers during the Summer.

THE PACIFIC MILL.—Messrs. C. B. Land & Co., have just erected a mill below the Pioneer Foundry, to which they have given the above name. The main building is 100 feet in length by 72 in breadth. The machinery is from the Miners' Foundry, San Francisco. The engine is of 120-horse power, cylinder 16 inch, 3 feet stroke. It has two boilers, 16 feet long and 48 inches in diameter. It runs 40 stamps, and one of Blake's patent crushers, together with pans sufficient to amalgamate 40 tons per day, which is about the working capacity of the mill.

Succour Mill.—Built in 1862; is situated in Lower Gold Hill. It runs 15 stamps, 24 pans; has a 34-horse engine; owned by George Stead & Co. D. B. Hunt, superintendent.

Douglas Mill—Formerly known as the Centreville Mill, is owned by Messrs. Gilbert, Douglas & Starr; situated in Lower Gold Hill. It was erected in 1861; has 10 stamps, 24 pans, and an engine of 24-horse power. The machinery was built at the Fulton Foundry.

MARYSVILLE MILL.—Owned by Rule, O'Neil & Co.; has an engine of 25-horse power; runs 9 stamps, 30 pans, and was built in 1861.

Granite Mill.—Was built in 1861; owned by Truett, Darst & Harris. This Mill runs 16 stamps, 16 pans, and 2 separators, with an engine of 40-horse power. It is located in Gold Hill proper, and the material with which it is built is stone. It is the only Quartz Mill in the Territory which is considered to be fireproof. The building is 86 by 43 feet.

COMET MILL.—Owned by Nealand & Requa; has battery of 16 stamps; employs 8 men; superintended by Isaac Requa; is situated a short distance back of the city. For amalgamating purposes, it has 32 4-feet pans.

Crown Point Mill.—This mill is owned by the Crown Point Gold and Silver Mining Company. It was erected in 1861; situated in Crown Point Ravine. It has 8 stamps, 14 amalgamating pans, and is driven by an engine of 40-horse power. H. Woodcock, superintendent.

Union Mill.—Owned by the Union Mill and Mining Co. Is situated in Gold Hill; has 8 stamps 12 pans, and is driven by a 25-horse power engine. Was built in 1861.

Gold Hill Mill.—Owned by the Gold Hill Mining Company. Built in 1861; building 74 by 35 feet; runs 13 stamps and 24 pans, with an engine of 35-horse power, from the Pacific Foundry, San Francisco. The Mill is under the supervision of Chas. Pioda.

ECLIPSE MILL.—Owned by the Eclipse Mill and Mining Co. Built in 1860; located in Gold Hill; runs 15 stamps, 12 pans, with an engine of 40-horse power. Employs 10 men.

AMERICAN FLAT MILL.—Situated two and a half miles from Gold Hill; was built in 1861; engine 25-horse power, and built at the Union Iron Works, San Francisco.

RIGBY & Co.'s MILL.—Situated at head of American Ravine. Machinery from the Pacific Foundry, San Francisco.

St. Louis Co.'s Mill.—Is situated in Gold Cañon, a short distance above the Devil's Gate; building 60 by 50 feet; engine 40-horse power. The machinery was built at the Miner's Foundry, San Francisco.

Bowers' Mill.—Built and owned by L. S. Bowers. It is situated in Crown Point Ravine, Gold Hill; runs 20 stamps and 30 pans, with an engine of 30-horse power. Under the superintendence of James Mee.

STEWART & Co.'s MILL.—Located on Gold Cañon, a short distance below Gold Hill; was erected in the fall of 1861. This is one of the largest Mills in the Territory, and for convenience and perfection of arrangement, is not surpassed by any.

RHODE ISLAND MILL.—Is owned by G. L. Smith, T. V. Barney and H. B. Potter. This Mill is situated in Gold Hill; runs 25 stamps and 20 pans, with an engine of 40-horse power. G. L. Smith, superintendent. It is classed amongst the finest in the District.

#### HOISTING WORKS.

ALTA HOISTING WORKS.—Owned by the Imperial Company; built in 1863; situated in Upper Gold Hill; size 80 by 40.

EMPIRE HOISTING WORKS.—Owned by the Empire Mill and Mining Company; erected in 1863; has an engine of 45-horse power; employs 60 men; size of building 65 by 40; wing 40 by 41—making a front of 66 feet.

These Works have got hoisting works and machinery which is not excelled by any in the District. Engine house is 36 by 52 feet; timber house 52 by 46; the main shaft is down a distance of 300 feet. About 70 tons of ore is taken out daily. This Company have also an incline of 275 feet, through which the mine is being worked until it is struck by the main shaft. 

#### SILVER CITY, LYON COUNTY,

Is situated about half way between Virginia City and Dayton. All of the stages running between Virginia and California, over the Placerville Route, pass through here, as well as a large proportion of the travel of the Territory. Silver City relies exclusively on the mining interests of the surrounding country for support. Some of the finest mills in the Territory, as well as the richest lodes, lay encompassed within her limits. The past year has been particularly noted for the number of private residences that have been erected and are now in course of completion. The citizens display a refined taste, as well as a confidence in the resources of the country, by the numerous gardens and other external and substantial improvements that they are constantly making. Almost every private residence is adorned by numerous tree planted around their dwellings, which has the effect of making favorable impressions on every one that either passes through or takes up a residence within its limits. Silver City is fully represented by societies, organizations and social institutions; which for numbers and unity, would be creditable to the reputation of larger cities. Having an abundance of granite and other building material contiguous to the City, the citizens have erected several blocks of buildings composed of the above material, which render them fire proof, and are substantial indications to the observing traveler, of the permanent growth and prosperity of the City.

#### CHURCHES.

PPESBYTERIAN CHURCH, SILVER CITY.—Rev. W. W. Macomber pastor; services every Sabbath, at  $2\frac{1}{2}$  o'clock P. M., at the School house. This Church was organized January 1st, 1864.

The various other religious denominations are represented, and several of them contemplate erecting churches and places of worship, at an early date.

#### SCHOOLS.

Active preparations are now being made by the "City Fathers" to perfect a system of "City Schools," for the education of the numerous and constantly increasing youth of the City. There are several schools conducted and supported by private enterprise.

#### F. & A. MASONS.

SILVER CITY LODGE, No. 163, F. & A. MASONS.—Dispensation granted March 29th, 1863; organized April 4th, 1863; chartered May 15th, 1863.

#### SILVER CITY GUARD.

The Military of Silver City was organized in October, 1862. This Company had eighty-four members when first organized under Capt. Zebriskie. It at present boasts of a full complement of well drilled members.

Officers: S. Terry, Capt.; C. Garrett, 1st Lieut.; W. H.' Campbell, 2nd Lieut.; L. D. Noyes, Brevet; P. J. H. Smith Orderly.

The above Company numbers amongst its members some of the best military talent in the Territory. Should an opportunity ever be offered to test the material of which the citizen soldiery of Nevada is composed, the Silver City Guard will give an account of themselves which will reflect immortal honors on themselves, as well as the City they represent.

#### TOLL ROADS.

A new road is almost completed between this place and American City. If the mines of the latter place should realize the expectations of its friends, the vast amount of teams that will be engaged in hauling quartz over this road to the quartz mills located around Silver City, will give an impetus to business here, as well as a source of great revenue to its owners. From here the roads radiate to Carson, Dayton, Humboldt, and the Reese River Country.

#### QUARTZ MILLS.

Devils Gate Quartz Mill.—Is situated just below the Devil's Gate. This Mill was formerly known by the name of the Washoe Mill. It was erected by Almarin B. Paul & Co., and was started for the first time on the 9th August, 1860. There is a dispute and a great deal of controversy between this Mill and Coover's Pioneer Mill at Gold Hill, as to which should have the honor of having first commenced operations in crushing quartz in the Territory—both having got up steam the same day and the same hour. It is a matter open to discussion amongst the oldest inhabitants. This Mill has changed proprietors; it is now owned by Irwin & Co. The machinery is driven by a 24-horse power steam engine, working two of Howland's batteries of 8 stamps each, making in all 16 stamps with a crushing capacity of 20 tons of quartz in 24 hours. It also has 24 pans of the latest improved style. J. C. Benson, superintendent.

PIONEER QUARTZ Co.'s MILL—In Gold Cañon, near Devil's Gate; erected in 1860; started on the 15th December of the same year. It has a 40-horse power steam engine, running three 5-stamp batteries, with a crushing capacity of 20 tons per day. It works 3 of Hepburn's and 28 Knox's pans. The size of the main building is one hundred feet square. It is due to the credit of the present proprietors to state that for three years it has been the most successfully worked Mill in the Territory—not having stopped operations longer than twenty hours at any one time during that period. J. A. Toddman, Superintendent; N. P. Sheldon, Business Agent.

KNICKERBOCKER MILL.—Owned by Messrs. Sherman & Bro. is situated in Gold Cañon, near American Ravine; has 5 stamps

with 2 7-feet amalgamating pans, and is driven by a 32-feet water-wheel. Small though this Mill may appear in comparison with those surrounding it, yet owing to the advantages of water-power, and good management, it is perhaps more profitable to its-owners than Mills that boast of greater capacities.

BACON QUARTZ MILL.—Owned by the "Bacon Mill and Mining Co.;" situated at the junction of Gold Cañon and American Ravine, below Silver City. Was first built in 1862, and re-built in 1863. It runs 30 straight stamps, has 18 4-feet and 16 5-feet pans, and is driven by an engine of 45-horse power. It reduces 20 tons of ore in 24 hours. Samuel Doake, Superintendent; L. S. Phillipps, Foreman.

Sparrow, Trench & Co.'s Mill.—Is located in American Ravine, a short distance above the Sierra Nevada Hotel. Was built during the summer of 1860. Size of building 90 by 75 feet. It has 20 stamps and 16 7-feet pans; driven by an engine of 60-horse power. This Mill reduces about 20 tons of rock per day, which is taken from the Company's Claim at Gold Hill. It employs 15 hands, working day and night, and is under the superintendence of Joseph Trench.

Bartola Mill.—Is located in Gold Cañon, below Silver City. It is at present leased to John White. It has 8 stamps and 8 pans, with a crushing capacity of 10 tons of ore every 24 hours. It is propelled by a 16-horse power steam engine; employs nine men, and is under the supervision of the lessee.

Union Mill.—Owned by George A. Hudson; was built in 1861. It is situated in American Ravine, a short distance above the Bacon Mill. It has 2 5-stamp batteries, driven by an engine of 20-horse power, and is capable of crushing 15 tons of ore in 24 hours. In the amalgamating department there are 8 7-feet amalgamating wooden tubs, with one small Wakelee pan. Employs about 10 men. George A. Hudson, superintendent.

EASTERN SLOPE MILL.—Is situated one-half mile below Devil's Gate. Commenced operations in 1861. Was then owned by the Eastern Slope Mill and Mining Co., but has since changed hands, and is now in the possession of Edward McLean. It has 12 stamps of 950 pounds each, which crush 20 tons of quartz in 24 hours. It has 6 Hepburn pans, 3 separators, and has an outer

settler and flumes for catching quicksilver and amalgam. It is propelled by a steam engine of 45-horse power, from the Pacific Foundry, San Francisco. Employs 14 men. Edward McLean, superintendent.

PHENIX No. 1.—Was erected in 1860, by C. S. Kellogg. At that time it had 8 wooden stamps, which have been since replaced by 16 iron ones. It has 4 Hepburn pans and 2 settlers, driven by an engine of 24-horse power, with boiler to correspond. Employs nine men and runs day and night. Under the supervision of Charles Uznay.

Phenix No. 2.—Was constructed in 1861, and has a front of 100 by 80 feet. It has 4 batteries of 5 stamps each; runs 22 amalgamating pans of 6 feet in diameter and 12 of 5 feet. It has also a prospecting battery of 2 small stamps. The whole making a crushing capacity of 25 to 30 tons of quarts per day. It is to be propelled by a new and splendid steam engine of 70-horse power, and employs 17 men, and is also under the supervision of Mr. Charles Uznay.

There are a number of stone and frame houses adjoining these two Mills, which are used for offices, retorting rooms, boarding houses for the hands and residence of the proprietor and superintendents.

EXCELSIOR QUARTZ MILL.—Is situated in John Town, about one-quarter of a mile below the Swansea. It was built in 1861 and started in November of the same year. It has 8 stamps of 900 pounds each, which work about 12 tons of rock in 24 hours, and has also 10 amalgamating pans; is propelled by an engine of 40-horse power, built at the Vulcan Iron Works, San Francisco. Employs nine men; under the supervision of Mr. John Briggs, one of the owners.

Swansea Mill.—Owned by John Tregloan; is situated just below the Phœnix Mill, in Gold Cañon; was built in 1862 and started in June of the same year. It has 12 double-stem stamps of 800 pounds each, 18 6-feet amalgamators, 2 5-feet tubs and 3 concentrators. The capacity of the engine is 40-horse power, with a 12-inch cylinder of 3-feet stroke. This Mill is capable of reducing 18 tons of quartz in 24 hours, and is under the supervision of Mr. John Tregloan, the owner.

EAGLE MILL.—Is now being built by H. B. Jones (proprietor). It will have three straight stamps with two pans, and will be driven by water-power—the wheel of which is 24 feet in diameter. As this Mill is to be driven by the same power as the Knickerbocker, with careful management there is no doubt but it will prove a source of profit to its owner.

MERCHANT'S MILL.—Situated in Gold Cañon, below the Phœnix, at the junction of Rock Point Mill and Dayton road; was constructed in 1861; has 12 stamps, 8 wooden amalgamators and 9 iron pans. It reduces about 15 tons of quartz in 24 hours running night and day. It is propelled by an engine of 15-horse power, and employs 12 hands. Its machinery is adapted for working all the precious metals, and is under the supervision of C. A. Chapin.

SACRAMENTO QUARTZ MILL.—Owned by the Sacramento Mill Co.; located in John Town; situated one mile below Silver City; has 12 stamps, working 20 tons of quartz in 24 hours; weight of stamps, 950 pounds each. It has also 12 amalgamating pans of 7 feet in diameter, and is driven by an engine of 60-horse power; employs 11 men, working night and day. J. W. L. Hunt, superintendent.





#### AMERICAN CITY, STOREY COUNTY.

Is situated one and a half miles south-west of Gold Hill, on the main travelled road between California and Virginia. The road is in excellent order, and extensive improvements are being constantly made which gives it a prestige over any of the other roads leading through the Territory. From the point at which this road leaves the Dayton and Carson road the ascent is gradual. giving to it the exclusive travel of all heavy teams loaded for Virginia. The citizens have displayed an energy in building up this city which is not excelled by any body of people in the Territory, although but little was known of American City excepting the richness of the mines in the locality, previous to the present spring, buildings have been erected with such dispatch. (and rapidly doubling in numbers,) that the place now presents all the features of an old and well established city. Here can be found representatives from almost every trade, business or profession. The rapid growth of the city is caused by the rich developments and numerous well-defined lodes discovered in and around the city. The excitement in past years has been so great in other localities that the majority of prospectors passed through here and went to places that were heralded to them through the aid of wily runners and interested speculators. When the outside bubbles bursted this spring, and the excitements subsided, the returning emigration seeing the advantages of the place and the richness of the mines, hastened to make locations and erect suitable dwellings, the result of which is, that there has been more buildings erected, and improvements made here, during the past few months, than in any other city in the Territory. A number of quartz mills are now in course of erection, and several more have been ordered. The cite of the city has a natural location which is possessed by none of the neighboring cities. There are several springs which furnish sufficient water to supply the demands of a large city, besides several more have been struck by miners while tunnelling in the vicinity, which secure to the city an ever abundant supply of this indispensible fluid.

Reed & Wade's quartz mill, situated at American City, was built in 1861 by Smith, Wade & Co., runs four batteres of two stamps each, making eight stamps in all, which reduces about eight tons of quartz in twenty-four hours; it has six amalgamating tubs, two Hepburn pans, and one agitator. The mill is run by an engine of 20-horse power, and crush custom rock, superintended by the proprietors.

Rigby & Co.'s quartz mill, situated on American Flat, was erected in 1862, owned by Rigby Bros., Brewster & Breet; runs two batteries of five stamps each, making ten stamps, which reduces about fourteen tons of quartz in twenty-four hours; has five Varney amalgamating pans, and four settling tubs, driven by a steam engine of 30-horse power, crushes custom rock. This mill has a prospecting pan for working small lots of ore, also an assaying and smelting apparatus. The boiler is of Nevada manufacture, having been made by the Pioneer Boiler Works in Lower Gold Hill. This company were fortunate in securing such an excellent natural site for the location of their mill and works.
