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

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July 10, 1947 - Entered Mexico at Laredo. Customs  
formality thanks to letter of Sr. Zarilla. Car  
checked up, gave checker 5 pesos, - on 5-cent bill.  
Photographed picturesque whitewashed buildings in typical  
Mexican style. 5 mil further, arroyo zone features.  
I took 200 of numerous flight of small white birds  
like Kinglets - very noisy birds. California King  
Larks were also seen.

8:25 P.M.

July 11, Breakfast - 8:30 AM. Went with Mr. & Mrs. Jimenez  
de la Peña. Took taxi down over pass road, not  
too steep, with a good view. Then took local  
bus and walked to Rio Grande, and down  
Río de Matamoros, in the valley and across pass road.  
Walked to first Arroyo Chico - 1/2 mile  
rolling, short lot, rugged sandy - vegetation  
of Acacia & Cactus - good water stream. Then followed  
across bottom of valley, and across little hill.  
Crossed bottom of valley, and across stream. Second  
Arroyo Chico. Continued southward and across  
steep hill to Río Grande. Cattle along road looked  
tremendous. Opened car window to smell  
soil apparently of clay as above. None had taste  
just. Rio Grande became, stopped checkerboard plain  
and country, inadequate. Dine Hall like place  
city. Very friendly and all were offered special  
regale lunch time. Noticed the paper was very good  
for more paper to be used for breakfast.  
July 12 - 4 PM right, less paper. But outstanding

all morning, left off another plating of  
of scrambled eggs & ham. Booked gallery  
with 2 others, paid a present note. Block  
train to El Tornillo. No more sand  
country, rolling on air - imagine myself  
driven out by dryness of throat. Carts & horses  
very thin, comable looking. Sheep, clover,  
horses. Good scene now - calm, cool  
and peaceful bush - dry grass. 3 miles to El Tornillo -  
a small stream, & the road continues to Cuernavaca  
Victoria. Tourist country highway - a bit noisy but not  
busy and it gets Bush - not out growth but  
border between old houses and located around  
a bridge and difficulties. Will drive with care!!  
Plan at recommended hotel - very good.

By 3 what day just driving, having air from  
the wind, but coldly, and you will find  
Puebla Valley for lunch, car not done. If so  
will stop and at Hotel Los Grados - asked  
for night before. Not so, long necessary  
time to do, but the natural temperature  
so when you get there it will be cold. So will be  
no need to wait, just go to bed but a pleasant spot  
where, but nothing will be done. Very difficult  
to get out with a car and driver. Don't know  
if there is time. The place down again has  
not come. The sun will be gone with the sun.

July 14. Clouds over mountains, to wind down, and to the  
open plains to the right way and much better land and more  
afternoon sun. He showed me living and dead mink skins  
and a complete set of feathered wings. We found  
ourselves - on bright but uncomfortable car -  
hired highly enough to make company. Reached  
Trompetera about 2:30 AM. took a room at Hotel Turquio

and decided to stay over a day. Heavenly spot. Cool  
dry, sparsely forested. Agua del Tropico (blue &  
temperate) Province wonderful. Built them  
a house on the ridge. Only the quietude &  
old dogs up hill are with you - peaceful view.  
Breakfast plentifully prepared with eggs, all their  
manners. Took a nap from 2 to 5 walked up hill  
and down, went round & back. Good dinner  
at last, no more than a sandwich, but  
filled with potato chips, salad, mixed vegetables.  
After supper walked to the station.

15. 2nd Km = to a bonito de la aguia cabin  
in Taquilla, temp 33°C. lot of blue green &  
various algae. Land 2,000 m thick. Not  
bottom water clearly defined. Well  
by another dog for general opinion the temperature  
is about 30°. Dine in cage, capsules  
and some vegetables, right up to 2000' could  
have also eaten the fish & had a nice meal  
but I wanted to sample the country with less  
abstinent. After all the food & drink  
we have had, we are not hungry. So  
I have enjoyed the occasions of the last few  
days - the long, long, long, time and  
now I do, too - a short time without

Afternoon hardly started when finished this  
book & decided to be happy about it. Glad we got  
up & off at 6 AM.

Wrote & packed gear - got a good series of her-  
barium Oedipodina. R collected phenemog and  
I photog. Spotted some in a field all sp. but will  
not identify. Got another, we knelt down to  
get bigger ones and flopped down on him & 2 ants  
got out - one knee & thigh. Burned like fire - in  
3-4 hrs! 2 PM down road to Arroyo de Tule &  
pancho de Santiago. Good situation - a nice rocky  
backony side of a pretty hill. Not small but tree  
of late late foliage, good slope. Up will you be  
pleasant hill. Evening - water-bowls.

July 17 - Packed up. R finished cleaning off for  
Mexico City. Had been told road good  
except for 1/2 hr we didn't had down July 15  
between Tlalpuhla & Taxquilla. Palomas very com-  
mon & bad. Correct

July 18 -  
Packed down into Axtla R. valley & then up over with  
that the Moctezuma R. valley were sensible. Axtla R.  
valley tropical - orchids & Beccarias in trees. Uncom-  
mon native Indian with longest machetes I have  
ever seen. One can't ride side with a person  
be but just caught & offered for sale. Huts  
of brush, thatched, very crude. No chimneys.  
No livestock. Very scanty corn & grass  
coppitable patches.

Road up over mountains between Nellie & Nochayana was sinuous enough to break  
a mule's back & very steep grades. We  
exhausted when reached Tomayenahole.  
Tuk Panay motorcourt window gave cross  
reflection - very welcome because very hot &  
humid - but not very clean. Food passable  
Tomayenahole very uninviting. Town  
dirty, 2 lots very steep terraces, Pauay  
worst dirty - only other courts worse!

July 14 - Looked cloudy in face of wet foggy  
roads I went around to gasoline pump to  
ask first north-bound motorist. He hap-  
pened to be an attorney for A.M.A. & gave  
me assurance no fog, dry roads, splendid  
driving, a side talk for A.M.A. on branch  
of highway. All the midwoods verched  
and sandy, no bad grades. Reached Limopan  
10:30 am. Tuk Tuk took down map.

July 15 continued. Foggy and hilly from  
city at Limopan we really enjoyed driving  
on - No lunch place being recommended we stopped  
at Dolores about 12 miles outside at 10 AM for  
hot cakes & coffee, & ham sandwiches on  
poppy. Then on, just up - but by gradual  
grades, to highest point 8000 ft by alimeter  
(8200 on map) where beautiful mts.  
Tuk picked a few - collected for flowers

Approached Mexico City by early afternoon. Disappointed to find dark side of Cristobal at Ventada Caspio dry as a bone. Looked in vain for Police Inspection Station where guides are supposed to cluster, & found ourselves in city before we knew it. Traffic is awful, everyone just leans on his horn & blows like they never one another comb. So hot it seems a mad mænie. Reached Shirley courts ok, took room for week (?) days at price of \$6. Shirley courts cleaned we have seen no far. Drove to a restaurant - plain American food - probably soft. Thursday

July 18 Saturday. Bkfst, tax down town to Codo No. 2nd of main. I arrived & this evidently forwarded from house had diff handwriting possibly from Walborn & Fawcett's own. Node mas probable would inefficiency of Chestnut Hill P. O. Went at Sanborn's taxi to Instituto de Ecología met everyone - different director, now Dr Roberto Llamas - a brilliant scientist. An argument made to collect in Chapultepec Park later from other Walborn home -

July 19 Saturday. Collected lake. Some older up & walked for hours on information that I was open 7-1 on Saturday. Not so considerable day. Took boat L'Escarpe to look it over. Some places as Shirley courts, more Mexican "cheaper", not so clean, will stay where we

until we finished Manic City curiosities collecting - then to Cuernavaca - thought perhaps to scrounge for drops for trip up to Guadalajara. Asked a young man at bus stop for directions. He was most affable - conversed at great length - my poor spanish, but our profundi, a little english, very sympathetic, he paid our bus fare talk much told us where to get off, etc.

2 letters not forwarded at cooks. Left early a little by walking home. Waterchemistry R, I bought oranges, took broken road met to be avoided. Found a small repair shop with welder. Very sympathetic, very interested in my insect collecting. Not repaired at cost of 2 pesos:  $\frac{1}{2}$  his contribution! A lot of distilled water, local farmacias closed Sat. afternoon, went to the hotel Colonia - of the Ferrocarril Mex - and by going outside - and walking Tonita, I got 9 liters. Again mutual patriotic conversation is of more value than money - we were as quiet as Uncle Tom's. Good dinner at Shirley Coulter - felt good & up and decided to go to a night club. El Pato is very good - minimum charge 20 pesos is roofed over patio of fine old residence. At 9:45 very few people - mostly tourists

good dance floor, 2 orchestras on revolving circular stage, at first appearing a semi-circle extending out. About every hour revives & other orchestra plays. Floor show 11.45 by which time place was filled about  $\frac{2}{3}$  Mex tourists. Floor show = 2 top dances, very good; a boy on contralto "leading radio singer of Mexico", not so good; pair of Spanish dancers 3 & 2, very good; mind reader & gal probably good if you could follow Spanish. Dancing seemed impossible following show so we asked for bill - waiter much surprised we would leave before we had drunk up our minimum. Home - bed by 1.45A.M.

July 20 Sunday. Starting at centro, our bus is off around corner of Villalongior & Paseo. Entwain & took along an American lady. Another lady with him contacted bus while in downtown. Marqueta lost weight. Red mobile bus #50. Hired taxi. 2 policemen arrived, one commanded a car & took off after bus, this helped. my put lady again took & went to Hospital with them. R. and I taken, took bus to Zocalo, into Palacio Nacional to see Museo Nacional de Archeologie. Monoliths & codices very impressive. R. much taken by a huge frog of green stone - bought small copy. R. bought me similar copy of grasshopper of red cornotile. heavily. Wished to see Hall of Jewels - closed for alterations. Went on - a pebble

to a guide about custom caravans - he produced one  
big book - leather & copperplate cover - very ornate made  
and took us in back of junks - mostly full many  
had been scrubbed up - Mocktum's head dress  
gold & turquoise necklace, and other things [see my  
postcard] a few small pieces of beautiful old  
copper, a few unpolished beads of gold, tur-  
quoise & gold, etc. Red much struck by de-  
cadent Egyptian touch of much of the  
workmanship. Tipped him a few bahts  
but was withheld.

Looked in Cathedral - lovely gold altar  
much repair now going on. Much more ornate

Palace de los Bellas Artes - very fine concert  
Hall. Many of famous artists. Very good

Concerto in D major (cello) - Vivaldi

Foxie, Sarastro - Beethoven

Bruch's P. Concerto - Dukay

A piano & solo, mostly Debussy

3 pieces para organo - Name unknown  
conductor - José Pérez Moncayo. Excellent,  
occasionally not altogether pleasing balance of  
parts, but tempo, time, always excellent. Foxie  
less masterfully. Vivaldi light but good.  
Stravinsky (1942) much more pleasing time than  
any of his earlier stuff. Debussy a little  
unbalanced. His own (Moncayo's) composition  
very odd, syncopated, dissonant,

but very interesting. Moncayo aged 35!  
Art galleries in upper loggias of Palacio  
rather disappointing. 19<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup> century  
galleries closed for renovation. The  
Diego mural [originally designed for cathedral  
interior with hemispheres] magnificent, another  
mural by [see A. G. Bennett's book], & several  
convoys.

Dinner at Sartori's \$8<sup>50</sup> on Sunday but  
worth it. Best food & worst service I have  
experienced. Soup, buñuelos, aspic,  
filet steak, spinach, tomatoes, potato, tea,  
fruit-chamomile I wanted. Presumed  
was right. I finally got Dr. Leopoldo T  
orilla on phone & had already phoned 3-3  
(was incorrect) only to find that he was not the  
brother of Ernesto Torilla; that he was pre-  
sumably so-called confusion because of the  
similar name; that he is himself claiming  
offending Leopoldo Torilla to clean up his  
reputation, and that he will endeavor to re-  
duce it to his position in the telephone company  
soon before known the address of the right  
Leopoldo!

Spanish teacher, D. Francisco Valdes. She was  
also a good person. He was most anxious to have  
seen the arings of his darling Finland.

July 21 - To Embassy, Mr. Dorey Fisher met us. Only  
placed him invited to lunch, 1 P.M., to Cervantes

Asked policeman who said 54. Who asked a porter  
who could not understand, so went in name. Who  
admitted me was a private house. Very dingy on  
outside, however inside. Entered a small parlor &  
was addressed from upstairs by a woman  
manned by very cultured lady who spoke English & per-  
fect English with Spanish accents pronunciation of  
course. Mr. Merck & Co was #15. So they were.  
House was on floor of several occupied by dif-  
ferent Spanish don's. House wants heavily a  
little Spanish, some English & drawings! Was  
referred to Hoffmann, Pinther & Boenisch, S.A.,  
8a Venustiano Carranza 28 (antes 8a calle de Alcalá  
123, N° 128) which is an excellent, well stocked firm,

door leading into patio, rooms around, very tast-

Dr. Parker of Rockfeller. Name meant nothing to R.  
but we, and delighted. Saw Dr. Baker and Dr. Kirk  
and helpful. Much good information - invitation  
to attend forthcoming week end field trip of local  
Natural Hist Soc. Then back to Rockfeller -  
visited Dr. Parker, - Museum Park, of Univ. No. Very  
delighted reception. Dr. Parker said "We like it here!"  
Showed us Rockfeller's library - large & very nice,  
well catalogued by him. Told us many good collecting  
spots. Fine - paved Hotel Empress & hotel which  
they were out - left message. After dinner, called  
on Dr. David Crawford - learned all he might -  
more valuable information and a number of  
accidents of his experience from way back before

the revolution in Mexico. None very large,  
but well repaid by the day.

July 12 Tuesday Had left car No. 66 ~~and~~ before  
painted it would be done by evening. This morning I  
on my way ~~out~~. Received proposal I could be  
done in three days now so knew we wouldn't  
have it before noon! To Cooks, - fresh telegram  
I had obtained from Portmanteo, exploring our  
mail - Cook had re-forwarded it all back  
Cookman very embarrassed, consulted files &  
sent a forwarding order to get off! Some were  
in the mail of one client who couldn't understand  
English, - copper Portmanteo Chestnut  
Hill is meeting tall back down against house  
at Santos, Table shared by San Pedro of the  
days ahead here. I'm thinking going about food  
shopping, etc. To home expect to my wife pre-  
cise of most travellers checks. To Hoffman-  
Patterson Bowditch, Tops down and blocks off  
the way between present address on Venustiano  
Carranza should have been in one general house  
but - it had recently changed name of padel  
Calle Arriaga 123 " - Venustiano Carranza  
- kept the street number appropriate to Calle  
123, on the block which now known  
as New Carr. Finally we found it kept  
by dove, Russell for purchase long  
neglected by Hoffmann he had worked for

Very crowded in Phoenix, Ariz., & in Calif., Northern & Southern. Very intelligent, very interested in scientific work, as we explained it. Hence mine. I gave him 5 pesos for 2 hrs or more of his time & he was grateful! Gathered up bottles & took to Dept. Agri. & Barker gave R. distilled water - that which I got from Hospital not being phosphate-free, I went to explain to Dr. Barker we could not afford time for week end trip of Natl. Hist. Soc. he said he thought there was a meeting Fri. night - would we come - I said we would have to. None, then Empressio again - messages from Dr. White indicating an overcast evening. Went - Dr. MacWhite on flying trips of visiting Experimental Forests in Mexico, Guatemala, Panama etc. the best gradient from Dr. White, lots of zoogly, etc.

July 23 Wednesday To Texcoco, primarily for lake, which is dry this summer! But good collecting in drainage & irrigation ditches. Road excellent all the way. See. of brachyphyll, going across flat plain with hills all around - Ixtaccihuatl with snow peak visible under Texcoco mud at each single could not see Popo - will see it Saturday. Roads beyond the Experimental stations without bridges. It rained all thru Texcoco, washing streets, impeding, slick, bumpy. Very shallow trees - even palm trees gone. Mesceros do not seem to hold in lower parts of town, for appearance at all.

and even in cities, exterior of houses might be  
very shabby - though interiors may be luxuriant.  
Lunched on a second repeated table to  
take, under junipers 10-15 ft. in dia., per-  
haps planted by some old Indian 300-500 years ago.  
Got a good series of a small, yellow wood ch-  
ristmas tree, looked for lake another, because of his name  
- going up. Book unread, was taking a number of  
photographs, but largely enough to take & carried

the last dialogue of the centie. It was a bad  
enough village. And off tracks a few blocks  
away from P. is situated, not such clean

July 27. Thursday. When I, became up late last night  
I left off to check in with Dr. Moore around south of  
city he would trapeze, get boat & land on 1st police  
boat. He was to the next little town. He said he  
was going there & would show us. We started  
but it got so dark so, & then at that time we  
expected him to leave, but he continued as  
if the sun & the moon & all the way, pointing out  
points of interest, & getting into the most  
small enough streets - possibly side roads,  
possibly he himself lost - Bear the Peck-  
ing, which he explained well enough as  
otherwise; the round prepared by the paper  
will at \_\_\_\_\_, etc. He who used to clear  
up the traffic 2-3 hours, & make time stand  
up - now down & pulled up from the  
town of "Gardens" name & other. A Kite

July 25 Friday. Spent day writing and reading.  
Yesterdays walk in opposite direction  
had left us with all Shrike specimens and

herbarium. At 3 P.M. went down river with  
Capt. Frazee & Mr. Jones and May 1 and  
May 20th of this month specimens of various  
species were sent down to him.  
Locality, Esquimal was in camp at 10 a.m.  
We had already obtained 6 species  
at Langton's Net Bank while Campion  
was hunting around the mouth of the  
Creek near Esquimal. But he didn't  
have time to get his samples because  
of a difficult track back and  
over a great number of rocks and  
large pieces of drift wood.

111 Sunday. We found ourselves in time for 12 o'clock  
to post, we had to go pick up the mail which was  
left, only 4 of us could - Farnie, Thompson, R. C.,  
Dawson & myself - I carried all the mail and  
dropped it off at the Ketchikan Post Office.  
Then we took a walk into town - Ketchikan is  
a hunting country. There is hardly any  
land left off the coast - so there  
and that's where the bear dogs who used to  
be found here are. Castellan an American  
met a lot of them while he was here  
that it was illegal to hunt a bear and take  
it with traps, but he said you could  
not do it. Launched boat back to  
camp. R. C. had a gun and shot a deer  
which was about 200 lbs. and a small  
one like that. He went up with a  
bear dog and shot him. I had a  
strong boat so he could take his place and  
he went. We loaded the boat & started  
out and I. Farnie went up with a  
bear dog. We took him to a place where  
there was a small bear who weighed over  
100 pounds and the dog barked at him and  
ran after him but he did not catch him.

we reached the lake in time, just at sunset.  
There were 2 or 3 others. Therefore, probably  
a moderately composed species of

pleased meeting old friends from So. Lorn and  
bright, and was off soon found time had  
by all.

Jy 28 Monday We were clearing, labeling speci-  
mens with - from 8 AM, all day. A Super-

known to us.

Jy 29 Tuesday Dr. C. took us to the  
Lake in Nuevo de Tolima, about 13,500  
ft. Tolima south of Neiva. Early in the morning  
I took a walk with the City bus, on the river  
then down into Llorona river valley, then  
up out of that valley to Tolima. The  
bus went to the village on the right  
bank of the river. New J. Tolima  
was bright. Leaving the bus by a  
narrowly graded path road, you pass  
over a ridge, up which the bus had gone  
much more easily, then down through  
the river bed. It is a large, deep

forest. About 2000' up the pass with the remains  
of a beaver dam of great size - mostly cut down  
so that foundations remained. A few  
are now at the bottom of the pass. A live-  
ender is, as Fries explained, a medieval  
wooded town. The timber houses, barns,  
quarters, stables, all surrounded by a wall.  
Up at timber line the road ~~surface~~ got broken  
by big trees went no further, so did not  
the surface, and the goat became a really  
good hound - bear - wolf - going zig-zagging up  
the side of the mtn. - a stretch right across  
the mouth of a rock slide. No good road  
until - coming on the side road - cut  
right through the rock, down, through  
all the trees. Fries is an excellent driver

last 2 hours down to a plateau, where  
we had a good view back down.  
The signs were heavy, but

broke the leaf & we left it away, then had  
Hank come with the car, & down the ground  
he found my small white patches. It does

had long since left - and was still there.  
It was a poor sensation to feel you  
overtake by sleeping away the whole day  
just so. So very heavy I was when I  
passed plants & heard many birds  
of the same kind as at the road.  
Reaching as probably in the middle of the  
afternoon. I got back to the hotel at 7.30 at 7.30  
from Laramie. We had dinner at the  
Omaha - the weather off course being 70° and  
the sun like a furnace in elevation and at Wilson  
Lay 80°. The 80° was not

July 20 - Wednesday, 1860 - cloudy & cold  
most of the afternoon - all day. The  
sun will rise & then during sunset  
it will be 80°. It was very cold  
over the line by 8 o'clock - about 70° below  
the temperature outside of black houses &  
black houses. They played several games  
and at 8 pm it would be fine out  
of the house. The weather was one of  
those which I think is becoming more  
and more bad. Only so synonymous with  
heat - little shade, especially the lowest  
temperatures in the highest districts


the valley, but where added culture and




