

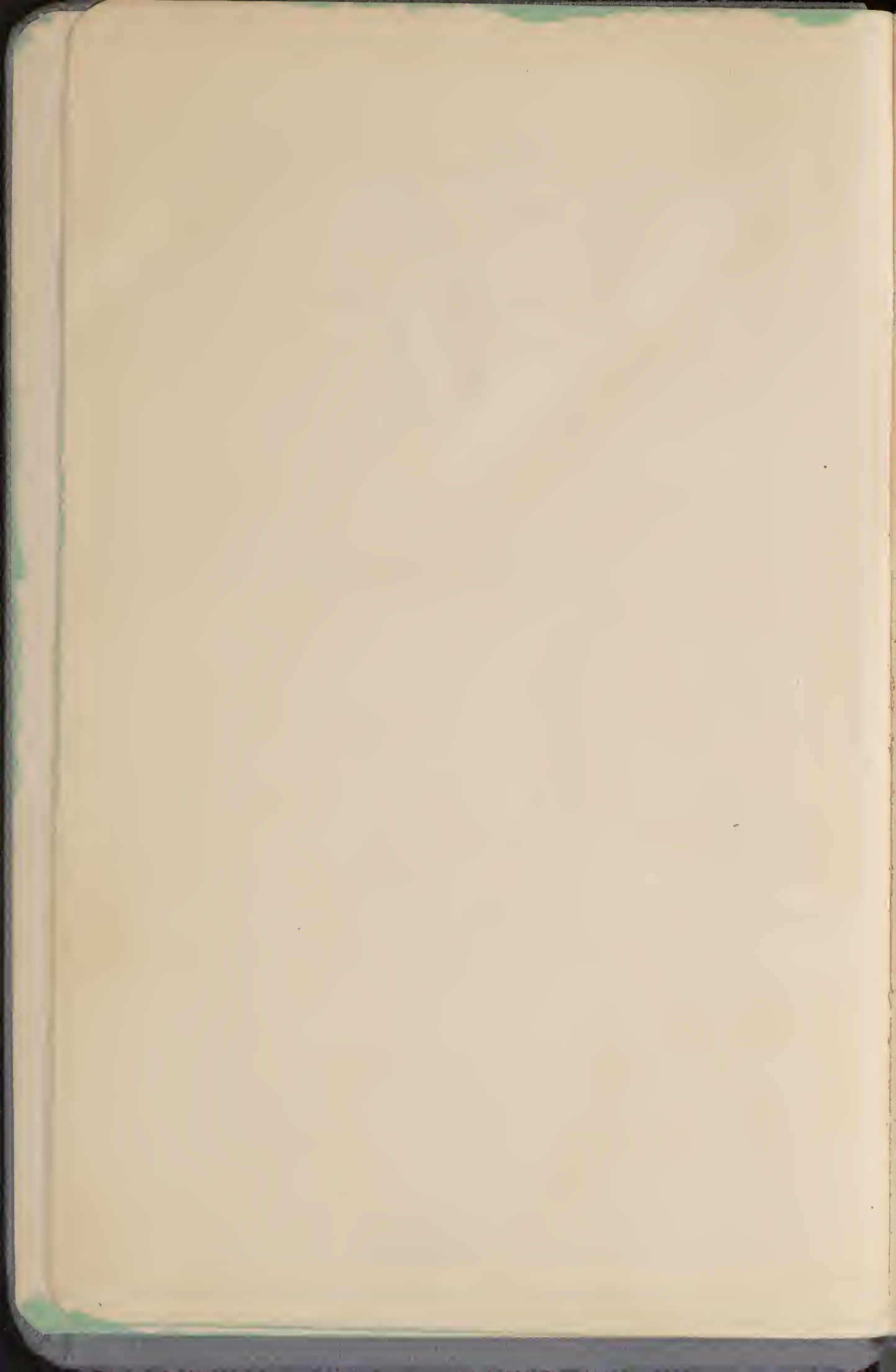

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July 10, 1947 - Entered Mexico at Laredo. Customs
formality thanks to letter of Sr. Zorrilla. Car
chopped up, gave check for 5 pesos. - on 5-10 miles,
photographed picturesque thatched hut in typical
landscape. 5 mi further, arroyo - some heathens
I took some of numerous flight of small white birds
like Montezuma - very hot, very tired. California birds
Laredo 8:30 am.

July 11, Breakfast on 8-7 am!! Went with car to Estero
de Yaqueo. Excellent silver stream, good water, not
standing water, in a good place. Some of the best
S. Wood thrushes to Rio River. Went down
River to Matamoros, lunch 11 am and very good lunch
Shook off the dust of Matamoros, changed suit - quality
rolling, almost flat, very good country - very good
at Asinga to Comarca - good silver stream. Higher hills
- picnic - sitting party of 4 in a field x 3-4 little hills
(water not sitting) to see - in a stream. Several
sitting birds. Continued south, all night in full
daylight to a large cattle along road looked
wonderful. Opuntia cacti increased in number,
Lapp apparently, by shape of stream. None had tasty
fruit. Few had lizards, stopped at Clark's Corral - plain
simple, country, not adequate. Dinner table of hotel plain
eaten. Very friendly and, all over a good to spot Spanish
cattle slowly to me. Noticed the papaya were ripe, and tried
to have some for breakfast.

July 12 - After breakfast, two papayas! ^R but not interesting

all morning, left after another plain simple lunch
of scrambled eggs & ham. Bailed a gallon of
water & stained inside of pressure cooker black.

country, wild as in six - imagine much
stock must be dying of thirst. Cattle & horses
very thin & miserable looking. Sheep not so un-
happy. Goat seen once more only - seemed
not much better - dry as. 3 mi S of El Tomasco

Every good at night Bailed in water out door the low
leaves - taken on at leaves and heated some for water

cactus hill. Evening - water chumder

July 11 - Packed up - R finished chemistry, off for
Mexico City. Had been told road good
except for 1st 15 miles which we had done July 10
between Temascal + Tezcuicte. That was very hard
& grades but not bad. Correct July 13 -

go down into Axlla R. valley + then up + over water
shed into Mochigama R. valley where variable. Axlla R.
valley tropical - orchards + Beauveria in trees. Uncom
mon we Indians with longest machetes I have
ever seen. One came to roadside with a parrot
he had just caught & offered for sale. Nuts
of hickory, thatched, very crude. No diamonds

a snake's back + very steep grades. R
exhausted when reached Tamazunchale
Took Panay motor court - winding game road
vibration - very welcome because very hot +
bored - but not too clean. Food possible
Tamazunchale very uninteresting. Town
cheap, 2 hotels very cheap tourists, Panay
court's duty - only other courts worse!

July 14 - looked cloudy in fear of wet foggy
roads I went around to gasoline pump to
ask first northbound motorist. He hap-
pened to be an attorney for AMA + gave
me assurance no fog, dry road, splendid
driving, a sales talk for AMA + a hand-
ful of maps. All the way roads verded
good road, no bad grades. Reached Zimapan
8.30 AM. Dead End. Took wrong way!

July 17 - continued. Feeling much better from
stay at Zimapan we really enjoyed driving
on - No lunch place being recommended we stopped
at Villa restaurant service station at 10 AM for
hot cakes + coffee, + ham sandwiches on

July 20 Sunday. Starting at center on a bus riding
around corner of Villalongin & Pantoja. Gutierrez & Knack

municated a car & took off after bus, other helped

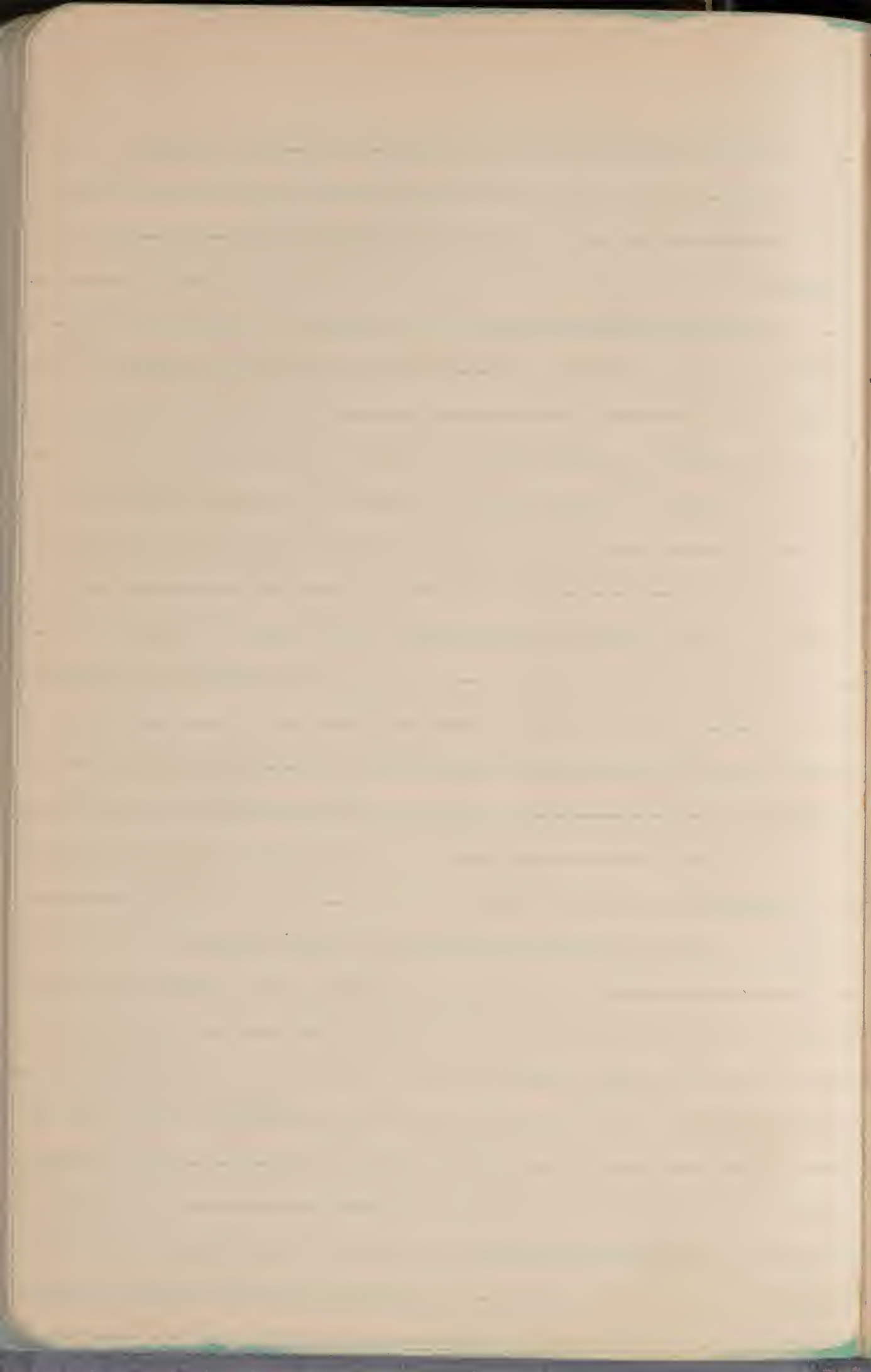
