




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PREFACE.

BOOK A. is a paper book, of which the leaves measure about 17 inches by 6 inches.

It contains 112 leaves, of which only forty-eight have been used.

The paper mark is a hand, with a six-pointed star projecting from the second finger.

The binding is of rough brown calf, probably of the last century or the century before, with a label on the back stamped:

A. I 16 HEN. 7 TO 16 HEN. 8 1500 1524

The margins are slightly worn, especially at the beginning, but this is of little consequence, as the scribe has usually left an ample margin round his entries, and the book and the writing are in very good preservation. Not a word is lost through mutilation or dirt.

The official who first began to use the book continued to write the entries until the summer of 1520 (fol. 37 of the MS., p. 61 of the printed book), when a fresh handwriting appears. Three years later the writing again changes.

It is clear that the first few pages are not contemporary, but were written up subsequently from other records or memoranda. As an instance of this, the

record of the admission of a member at the Parliament of 26 May 1508 is immediately followed, with no break, by the memorandum of payments by him to the Treasurer in 1509. Another case occurs on fol. 14 (p. 27), where the difference in time is about five years.

The majority of the entries in Book A. are in Latin; but occasionally, especially if something has to be noted which is not quite in the ordinary routine of business, the clerk uses his native language. The Latin entries have been translated *verbatim*, even to the extent of retaining the confusion of tenses and such other instances of faulty grammar as can be reproduced in another language. Care has been taken in the translation to use English words which will suggest the exact Latin word used.

For instance, the two words comitiva and societas are used apparently indiscriminately, as meaning the corporation or whole body of the Middle Temple. In the English entries the words "company" and "fellowship" are used in this sense, and therefore these words have been employed in the translation, the former word to represent comitiva, and the latter societas. This is noted the first time the words occur, on pp. 1 and 3. The English word "society" does not occur till the middle of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, and then not often. The Latin word consortium occurs once, in 1586, but no English word is used which at all corresponds to it.

An attempt has also been made to use the English entries for the selection of words and phrases for the translation of entries of a similar import in Latin, as, for instance, libitum is translated "liking"; pro eo, "in its stead"; museum, "study"; and there are many other similar words.

It is for this reason that dolium is translated "hogshead," though its usual meaning is "tun."

In the case of names, Christian names are translated

into English, while surnames are given in the exact spelling of the book; and the names of places as well, unless they are in Latin, when they are translated. The spelling of names is most careless. Sometimes the name of a person admitted differs in spelling from that of his father, which occurs in the next line, as, for instance, Elmes and Ellines; Feteplace and Phetiplace; Nyccolles, Nicholes; St. Aubyn, Seynt Taubyn. Manne is sometimes written Man, and sometimes with a contraction mark appended, so that it would naturally be read Manner. Both represent the name of Man. The Mr. Boyes and Mr. Bowyer occurring on p. 223 must be the same person. Similar variations occur in the names of places, as "Litleforde" and "Lilliforde."

Usually this is merely due to the fact that there was no fixed standard of spelling when the book was made, but sometimes the variation is clearly an error in copying, showing that the entries were not made at once, but that the book was compiled by one of the officials from memoranda, which he sometimes misread.

Book D. is a paper book, about the same size as Book A. (16 inches by $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches), but much thicker, containing 413 leaves, nearly all of which are used. The first few leaves have been somewhat injured, and the top and bottom margins have been slightly cut, probably when the present binding, which is similar to that of Book A., was put on. (a) There is, however, very little of consequence lost by mutilation. The label on the back is:

This volume does not contain the whole of Book D., as it was thought that the end of the reign of Queen Elizabeth afforded a good place for a break; but lists of chambers and kitchen utensils made in her reign and that of her predecessor, at the end of the book, are printed at the end of this volume, instead of being reserved for the next, where they would have seemed out

of place.

The paper used in these two books is of different kinds. That in Book A. carries the common mark of a gloved hand, with a six-pointed star projecting from the longest finger. This mark is common in early printed books, those of Caxton and others. The same mark occurs also in Book D., but drawn with rather more care, and in some instances there are letters which look like P. R., on the wrist of the glove. An eagle displayed is found in the same book, towards the close of the sixteenth century. Letter paper from Ghent and The Hague of the same period often bears a similar device, but not quite identical with this. However, the paper in these books is of an unusual size, longer and narrower than that used for correspondence, and it was the habit of manufacturers to use various marks for paper of different sizes and qualities. In fact, papers of certain sizes became known by the names of their marks after they had been disused, such as foolscap paper, and pot paper. The latter now bears the arms of England, but that used in Book D. still bears the original device, usually with a four-pointed star above it. A crowned shield with the letter B thereon, and below it a wreath inscribed NLEBE, has doubtless the same origin as a similar shield with the name below in full, NICOLAS LEBE, which may be seen on letter paper used in the reign of Elizabeth. The shield bearing a B. is usual on paper from Antwerp.

There is one very fine coat of arms which I have not

been able to identify—apparently, first quarter, barry; second quarter, a lion rampant; third and fourth quarters indistinct, but what looks like a tower in base; the whole surrounded by the collar of the Order of the Fleece of Gold. I have found nothing exactly to correspond with it in Maurice's "Blason des Armoiries des Chevaliers de l'Ordre de la Toison d'Or," and should rather expect it to be the coat of a town than of an individual. The two first quarters appear on the shield of Albert, Archduke of Austria, in 1610, but the remainder of the Archduke's coat is more elaborate.

Book D. has been treated differently to Book A. Instead of being translated in full, merely an abstract of the Minutes is given. The account of each Parliament is commenced with the election of Readers and other officers, and orders on various subjects, and then follow the admissions, collected together so as to save needless repetition. In the original the whole formula of admission is usually repeated in each case, and it is rather a long one; e.g. "Thomas Palmer nuper de Novo Hospicio, filius secundus Willelmi Palmer de Lemyngton in comitatu Glocestr', generosi, admissus est in Medii Templi Societatem, generaliter, vicesimo tercio die Octobris anno regni domine Regine nunc Elizabethe decimo et anno Domini 1568, ex assensu Magistrorum de Banco. Et dat de fine pro sua admissione predicta xl.s."

This may be taken as a typical instance, but at an earlier period the formula was longer, as the names of the persons who became pledges for the newly admitted fellow were added; e.g. "Jacobus Wasshyngton, filius secundus Ricardi Wasshyngton de Kyrkby in Kendall in comitatu Westmerland, armigeri, ad instanciam Ricardi Weston, armigeri, modo lectoris, admissus est specialiter, exoneratur et perdonatur de omnibus officiis et vacationibus quisbuscumque. Et dat pro premissis habendis ad usum hospicii xl.s. Ac

etiam admissus est in cameram cum Magistro Bretton. Et dat pro ingressu inde xl.s. Plegii pro gestu, fama et debitis solvendis, G. Nycolls, James Gardener."

In some cases, as above, the signatures of the pledges are appended to the entry, especially during the reign of Queen Mary; but this fashion did not continue long, and during the reign of her sister it became the habit merely to mention the fact of the obligation, as in the following instance: "Edmundus Temple, filius et heres Richardi Temple de Temple Hall in parochia de Sibson in comitatu Leycestr', generosi defuncti, admissus est in Societatem Medii Templi predicti generaliter. Et dat de fine pro admissione sua predicta liij.s. iiij.d. Et obligatur una cum Magistro Christofero George et Magistro Thoma Love de Temple Hall predicto, generoso."

Some of the Treasurers, especially Matthew Smith and Edmund Plowden, signed each admission, but the

custom ceased about 1572.

The whole of the facts are given in the abstract, but repetition has been avoided by putting the admissions together at the end of each Parliament.

The handwriting, which at the beginning is very difficult to read and careless, gives place about 1590 to a good clerk's hand, which is continued throughout. In fact the hand is better than the spelling. Besides errors in spelling names, merely due to carelessness, of which I have given a few specimens, errors in words and grammar are by no means rare; such as absentia a lectori, instead of lectura; quantas for quantos, as if members of the Inn might be of either sex; pincerni for pincerne; a banco for abaco; pater morte for patre mortuo; and many others. Similar mistakes occur in the English entries, as where libitum, which is usually translated liking, is sometimes translated liberty, which scarcely gives the correct meaning.

The dates in the text (if not in brackets) are given as

they are in the original books, that is, if the year of our Lord is mentioned, it is in accordance with the old style, the year beginning on March 25; but the dates in the top margin follow the modern usage.

An imperfect index of subjects, at the end of Book D., made in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, has been printed in the present volume; but the complete index of persons and places will be reserved until the whole of the Minutes of Parliament are printed.

It has not been thought necessary here to refer to any of the subjects mentioned in the Minutes, as "The Calendar of Middle Temple Records," recently brought out by Mr. C. H. Hopwood, K.C., will direct the attention of the reader to matters of interest.

ITS ORIGIN AND EARLY HISTORY.

ALTHOUGH the authentic history of the Inns of Court begins only with the dates of their respective existing Registers, their origin, like that of the British constitution, in the moulding of which they have had no inconsiderable share, may be said to be lost in the mists of antiquity, or, if this rhetorical expression be thought too strong, it may safely be affirmed that, with our present knowledge, it is impossible to fix any definite date for the establishment or formation of any one of them. Sir Edward Coke, whose authority of course is of the highest, places their rise in the period immediately following the making of Magna Charta (1215) and Charta de Foresta (1217), when "divers learned men in the laws . . . kept schooles of law in the city of London, and taught such as resorted to them, the laws of the realme, taking their foundation of" these enactments: and he identifies these schools with those suppressed, or prohibited by writ, in the nineteenth year of Henry III. $(1234)(\alpha)$.

Sir William Blackstone, however, whilst agreeing with Coke that this writ was directed against the teach-

ing of the Municipal Law, is of opinion that the intention of Henry in issuing it was not to prohibit the teaching of that law altogether, but simply, by forbidding it within the city, "to collect all the common lawyers into the one public university, which was newly instituted in the suburbs" (a). Other authorities, however, of equal eminence, affirm that Henry's writ was not directed against the Common Law at all. Of these Selden and, following him, Dr. Stubbs (b) maintain that the laws (leges) here forbidden were the "Canon Laws, mixed, perhaps, with the Imperials, &c., as being both, in regard of their own authority, against the supreme majesty and independency of the Crown of England" (c).

Professors Pollock and Maitland, again, in our day, are of opinion that only the Civil Law is intended (d), the object of Henry being to confine the clergy to matters strictly within their own sphere—namely, Theology and Canon Law, in accordance with the spirit of the Bull of Honorius III., published only fifteen years before (1219), prohibiting the teaching of Civil

Law in the University of Paris.

In the midst of this conflict of opinion on the part of eminent legists, one point at least seems clear—namely, that whatever the intention of Henry's proclamation, the schools referred to in it were law schools of some kind. Possibly they may have been those attached to the principal churches of London (e) as these may

have included law as part of their curriculum (a), but more probably they were separate and, perhaps, private institutions (b). But, in either case, it would be unsafe to identify these seminaries with the Inns of Court and Chancery, as Coke and Blackstone apparently do, further than to regard them as in some measure the forerunners and prototypes of those institutions, whose establishment in anything like their present form must be looked for at a later date. For those societies, however they arose, were associations of laymen, and it is certain that for some time after Henry's proclamation the professors of the law as well as its administrators continued to be largely ecclesiastics. The effect, however, of Henry's proclamation, as well as the disapprobation of the papal see (c), was no doubt gradually to diminish the number, and before the end of Henry's reign (1272) the lay element amongst the king's judges began to outweigh the ecclesiastical, and the study of English law became, as a learned modern writer observes, "a thing apart from all other studies" (d). It is at this period then—the end of the thirteenth century—that we may look for the first traces of the existence of the societies now known as the Inns of

Court, and accordingly we do not find them wanting. Twenty years after the death of Henry III., that is, in 1292, we find his successor, the "English Justinian," in view probably of the diminution in the supply of clerical practitioners, issuing a mandate to the Chief Justice, John de Metingham, and his fellow-judges, "to procure and appoint a certain number of attorneys and apprentices of the law from every county (a), of such as seemed to them the best, worthiest, and most apt to learn, so that the king's court and the people of the kingdom should be better served, and that there should be more facilities (major commodum), and that those so chosen should follow his court and be present therein to conduct affairs, and no others" (b).

The number of these Attorneys and Apprentices suggested by the king and his council as sufficient was seven score, but the judges might choose more if they saw fit. From this it clearly appears that at the time of this Order in Council there were in existence, apparently in all parts of the country, classes of students or followers of the law known as Attorneys and Apprentices respectively, from which the above select number were to be taken; but there is as yet no sign of their forming separate societies, or of their settling in separate Inns. The concentration, however, of this select number in London would naturally lead to such a result. The tendency of the time was for the followers of a common trade or calling to form themselves into guilds or fraternities for the study and advancement of their several crafts, the protection of their common interests, and the preservation especially of the monopoly they claimed for their particular trades or callings. Infected with the same spirit, it was natural that the lay professors of the law should be desirous of continuing to themselves the privi-

lege enjoyed by their ecclesiastical predecessors, to whom undoubtedly the valuable prerogative of "pleading" in the King's Courts was practically (though not theoretically) confined, and who owed that privilege doubtless to the fact of their superior training and education in conventual or collegiate seminaries (a). The establishment, therefore, of lav schools on the model in point of discipline of these seminaries where the Common Law could be methodically studied, and its practice observed, naturally followed on the act of Edward I., and that these societies should seek for themselves homes in dwellings convenient to the King's Courts was an equally natural development. In process of time the number of Inns thus established seems to have resolved themselves into two classes, the greater and lesser, the former being designated by Fortescue in his time "Inns of Court," and the latter "Inns of Chancery"; but in the beginning there was probably no such distinction (b). When the division came about it is impossible to say, but it was probably only as the natural and gradual result of the prosperity of some of the societies over the rest-the same prosperity which enabled them to acquire, as the opportunity presented itself, the more commodious and commanding homes in which they established them-

selves. Fortescue does not give the names of these four greater Inns, but there can be no reasonable doubt that they are the four Inns of Court at this moment existing-namely, Grav's Inn, Lincoln's Inn, and the two Temples (a). That the societies who first occupied these Inns were not new societies, but associations of lawyers who had previously housed elsewhere, there can be no manner of doubt; and though it is not possible either to fix their previous habitats, or, as has been before said, to determine the exact dates of their migration, there is evidence to show that the two first of these societies had removed to their present sites very early in the fourteenth century. If an entry in Vincent's Visitation of Northamptonshire is to be trusted, there must have been "Benchers" in Gray's Inn in 1311 (b), and the sister society of Lincoln's Inn are said to have obtained their famous mansion from Henry de Lacy, Earl of Lincoln, its builder, soon after that nobleman's death in 1310 (c). That the occupation of the Temple by lawyers began not long after is reasonably certain, though they did not come into complete possession and control of it till towards, or perhaps after, the middle of the century (d). The suppression of the great order of Knights Templars, and the expulsion of the English members from their home on the banks of the Thames (1312), opened out a site more suitable even than the great houses in Portpoole and Holborn for the purposes of Inns of Court, and which doubtless became an object of desire on the part of the

lawyers not so well housed. Accordingly, after the grant by the king of the New Temple, or a part of it, to the Earl of Lancaster, we learn that some of them "made a composition with that nobleman for a lodging in the Temple, and so came thither, and have continued ever since" (a). As the Earl of Lancaster held the Temple for about seven years from 1315, this would fix the first settlement of the lawyers there between that date and the year 1322, if the authority of the MS. above cited is to be relied on. But the date usually assigned to the settlement of the lawyers is somewhat later. lands of the Templars being bestowed upon the Knights Hospitalers" in pursuance of a decree of 1324, as Dugdale informs us (b), "King Edward III. granted this mansion of the Temple unto the Knights of that Order, who soon after (as the tradition is) demised the same for the rent of £10 per annum unto divers professors of the Common Law." Now, although, as Dugdale says, there is nothing but tradition to support this statement, it may not unreasonably be accepted, because it in no way conflicts with known facts; and if, as he goes on to say, these "professors of the Common Law came from Thavve's Inn in Holburne," the migration must have taken place before 1348, when that Inn had been vacated by certain "apprentices of the law" who used to reside in it (c). But there were already in the Temple besides these "professors of the Common Law from Thavye's Inn" the lawyers referred to above who "made composition" with the Earl of Lancaster. What seems, therefore, to be established by these traditions, and such evidence as there is to support them, is that there were clearly two bodies of lawyers settled in the

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Temple one before the other "soon after" its grants to the Knights Hospitallers—the compounders under the Earl of Lancaster and the "professors" from Thavye's Inn. Now, if the latter became the sole possessors of the Temple, what, it naturally occurs to ask, became of the former? Were they turned out? That is contradicted by the assertion of the MS. that they "continued there ever since" (a).

It seems more reasonable to suppose, therefore, that while the "professors from Thavye's Inn" (if that were their place of origin) had a lease granted to them of the part unoccupied by the original settlers, at an annual rent (as Dugdale says) of ten pounds, the former obtained a confirmation of their grant from the Earl of Lancaster on the part of the new owners, on similar terms, and that thus the whole of the Temple, or such part of it as the men of law required, became finally divided between two sets of tenants settled side by side (b). This theory conflicts, indeed, not only with tradition, but with the inference to be drawn from the Inner Temple MS, that the two societies never claimed by several leases, but by one entire grant. But tradition, as will be shown later, is not on this point to be relied on, and the MS. gives no authority. We have not the original lease or leases or grant before us, and can, therefore, only judge of its nature by the probabilities of the case, and these are all

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against the MS. It may be true that there were never two leases, but not so that there was only one grant, for, as Mr. Pitt-Lewis, in his reference to this, points out (a), there is evidence in the drafting of the Charter granted by James I. to the Inns to show that, if there was never but one lease, there were two separate parcels exacting two separate rents, each society paying for itself the sum of ten pounds per annum, not the joint sum of twenty. What was in James's Charter was, almost to a certainty, in the documents from which it was drawn, each of which was based upon a previous instrument back to the original conveyance.

Such inferences, therefore, as may be drawn from an examination of the grant of James I. (and it seems the only source from which inferences as to the lease may be drawn) are all against the original unity of the two societies; and so, it may be said, is the testimony of every authentic reference to the Temple as the abode of the lawyers as far back as authentic records go. "The first distinct reference to the two Inns," as the learned Editor of the Inner Temple Records truly remarks (b), "is to be found in the Paston Letters" (c), in a letter dated 1st November 1440, which brings us back to within a century of the supposed settlement under the Hospitallers; and if, as Mr. Inderwick goes on to say, there is no clear evidence of more than one society occupying the Temple during that antecedent period, neither, it should be said (and it seems more to the point to say), is there any inconsistent with that state of things. The truth is that there is no known reference to the Temple at all as the abode of lawyers earlier than that in the Paston Letters, except one—the

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passage quoted by Dugdale from the *Prologue* of Chaucer, as evidence (as he said) that the lawyers were' there in Edward III.'s time(a); and, though attempts have been made to read into this passage the existence of only one Inn, the attempts, to say the least, have been unfortunate. The salient lines of the well-known and oft-quoted passage are these:—

"A Manciple there was of the Temple, Of which all Catours might taken ensemple, For to been wise in buying of Vitaile:

"Of masters had he mo than thrice ten, That were of Law expert and curious, Of which there was a dozen in that House Worthy," &c., &c.—

and the expressions relied on in support of what may be called the Unionist theory are those in *italics*. These, it is urged, imply the existence at the time of writing (probably 1387) of but one House. But, unfortunately for this contention, the most approved texts of Chaucer (b) read not "The Temple," but "a Temple," an expression defined by Mr. Skeat (the most accepted authority on such a matter) to mean here simply "an Inn of Court" (e), in which case no more need be said; but even if the text from which Dugdale quoted be the correct one, it is difficult to see that the poet, writing simply for the purposes of his story, in introducing the "Manciple of the Temple," had anything more in his mind than an officer of one of the societies there, or, it may be, if Mr. Skeat's commentary is correct, elsewhere.

But, however this may be, and however inconclusive the foregoing anti-unionist reasoning may appear, the

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legend which attaches to the original unity of the Inns and their subsequent division seems so improbable as to be incredible. That legend, as recorded by Dugdale (a), is that "notwithstanding the spoil of the Temple by the Rebells [by Wat Tyler and his followers in 1381] the students of the Law so increased there that at length they divided themselves into two bodies, the one commonly known by the Society of the Inner Temple and the other of the Middle Temple." Now, setting aside the fact of a rapid increase of the supposed united society after their "spoil by the rebells" as one we should hardly have looked for, the statement that the result of that increase was division is not a little remarkable. Surely the course which we should have expected the Society to pursue under such circumstances would not be to divide, but, with its increasing prosperity, to extend its borders, and, whilst remaining united, provide increased accommodation for its overflowing members. Separation under such circumstances seems unnatural and impolitic, and we can hardly conceive of its taking place, unless from dissension from within, and of that there is no hint, at least in Dugdale's account (b). Sir Henry Chauncy, indeed, mentions it as a "report," which he may have heard during his residence in the Middle Temple (where he was admitted 9th Feb. 1649-50), that there was a "great dissention and quarrel" between the two Inns "touching the Houses of York and Lancaster" (c); but, as the wars of the Roses did not begin till 1455, and we have evidence (d) that the division was in being at least fifteen years before that date, the "report" can have no foundation. The fact of its existence, however, proves the necessity in men's minds

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of some better reason being given for the division of the Inns than that assigned to it in Dugdale's tradition.

But there is another difficulty attending this traditional division story which seems to discredit it. The two societies, until the acquisition of their respective freeholds under Charles II. (a), held their property by lease from the crown at a payment of ten pounds yearly from each society; and, as the crown lease was but a renewal of that from the Hospitallers, it may be assumed that under that body as their lessors the payments had been the same. But according to the Thavye's Inn tradition the Temple was leased to that body (the only society to occupy it) for one rent of ten pounds per annum (b). Now, if this were the case, whenever the division took place, one would have supposed that the apportionment of rent would have been halved, and that the share of each Inn would have been not ten pounds, but five. As it is, or was, each part, under the supposed division, paid separately as much as before they paid jointly—an arrangement very advantageous to the lessors, but eminently unlikely on the part of the lessees. But, if the difficulties attending this division theory are great, those surrounding the legend of the original identity of the two Inns, of which it is a corollary, are still more formidable. For, if this legend be true, one of the two Inns, as they at present exist, must necessarily be the stem and the other the offshoot of the original; and there is no claim that has been more strongly insisted on on both sides than that of the absolute equality of the two societies (c)—an equality which, though in theory admitted for the avoidance of contention, could not in

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the nature of things exist under such circumstances. The Inn, whichever it might be, with the better claim to antiquity would necessarily take precedence. As a matter of fact, each Inn, whilst theoretically disclaiming superiority, has made this claim in its turn, thus assuming a position at once illogical and contradictory. In his Introduction to the Inner Temple Records (a), the learned writer more than once speaks of the Inner Temple as the "old 'Inn' or 'House,'" whilst Master Worsley, an equally good authority, in his book on the Middle Temple, edited by Master Hopwood (b), as well as Sir Henry Chauncy in his Antiquities of Hertfordshire, make the same claim, and on what seem stronger grounds, for their own Inn (c). The alternative theory, advocated in these pages, of the original duality of the two societies, to whatsoever objections it may otherwise be open, has at least the merit of deciding these two conflicting claims in a manner compatible with the dignity of both claimants, and of vindicating the otherwise inconsistent claim to "equality."

It is not proposed here to go further into the details of this controversy respecting the relative antiquity of

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the sister Inns. They will be found amply set forth in the sources above indicated, and in most books dealing with the Temple and its history. It is sufficient to say that both claims are based upon what are little better than pure speculations. All that is contended for here is the greater probability of what may be called the never-one theory—a theory which has not only the merit. as just noted, of reconciling difficulties, but of harmonising more fully than any other with the few facts left for our guidance. Accepting, therefore, the theory as established-pending the discovery of fresh facts of an absolutely decisive nature (a)—the History of the Middle Temple, though dating in its most authentic form, as has been said, from the commencement of its Registers in 1501, may be traced back to a Society existing before the occupation of the Temple, which, side by side, and simultaneously with the Society now known as the Inner Temple, took up its residence there, and became a co-tenant of its grounds and buildings (b). Whether they or the Inner Templars were the first to arrive it is not easy, or, perhaps, possible to decide; but as the latter claim to be the representatives of the former occupants of Thavye's Inn, the Middle Templars must be the successors of the Duke of Lancaster's tenants, and therefore the earlier in possession. But that is a matter which in no manner affects their perfect equality, for as lessees from the same date subsequently of the

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Hospitallers, on that body coming into possession, they stand absolutely on the same footing (a).

Assuming then, as we think we have made out a just claim to do, that the origin of the Middle Temple is that here indicated, its subsequent history may be very briefly summarised. Established as a separate and independent body on the commanding and convenient site of the New Temple, it doubtless, side by side with its sister Inn there, and with the two other Inns without, received and, as we should now term it, assisted in educating for the Bar, and for the judicial service of the country, such of the youth of England as aspired to such service; and, although it is impossible to give their names, except in a very few instances, it no doubt numbered among its ancient alumni its full share of those who distinguished themselves in earlier, as well as in later, times in that way (b). As to its internal organisation in the times before the Registers, except that it was based upon the model of the ecclesiastical schools, and generally of university and collegiate institutions, to which it with the other Inns succeeded, we have no direct means of judging. We may assume, however, that it was from the first very much what Fortescue described it in the latter part of

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the fifteenth century (apud 1470) (a), and essentially very much what it remained in the beginning of the next (anno 1501), the date of the first of the existing

Registers.

That there are no similar records of an earlier date is a matter not only of regret but one of some mystery. It is hardly credible that none were kept; and even if, as is commonly reported, the records down to the date of Wat Tyler's Rebellion (1381) were destroyed by that lawyer-hating rebel and his followers, there remains a period of a hundred and twenty years still blank. It is possible, of course, that the books then kept may have been mislaid or destroyed, but it seems inconceivable that there were none. Indeed, a memorandum on the first page of the present Register precludes the idea (b). Their non-existence both in the case of the Inner as well as of the Middle Temple before about the same date seems to point to some disaster within the Temple, in the way of fire or otherwise, left unrecorded.

1501] BOOK A.

Memorandum that a Parliament was held in the week next before the Feast of the Translation of St. Thomas the Martyr (7 July), 16 Hen. VII.

John Brooke was elected Treasurer of the Middle Temple, and took upon him that office.

And afterwards in the Quinzaine of St. Michael the Archangel then next following, William Bollyng, the last Treasurer, delivered to the same John the Book of the Constitution of the same place, with the rolls.

At a Parliament holden on the Day of Commemoration,* 17 Hen. VII.

Vavesour was chosen for Reader of the same place, in the following Lent.

Feteplace was chosen to the office of Steward (senescalli) for the feast of Christmas then next following.

Barnewill was chosen to the office of Butler for the same feast then next following.

Thorns was chosen to the office of Marshal for the same feast. And because Thorns refused the said office, it was resolved† by the Company (comitiva) that he should forfeit 100s. And afterwards in his place, Hert was chosen to that office.

Gascoign was in the election of the same office, who was respited for divers considerations by the Company, and there-

fore promised to be in that office at Christmas in the following year, under the foresaid penalty.

Castell, Cave and Carmynowe were chosen to be Masters of

the Revels for the foresaid feast.

Goodrich was chosen to the office of Constable of the Tower at the same feast.

John Mervyn was admitted as member (socius), and entered as clerk, and is pardoned two Christmas vacations, so that he keep two other vacations immediately in their stead.

Voell was admitted as member and entered as clerk, on condition that if he lose any vacation, he shall keep another

in its stead immediately.

Boyfeld was admitted as member, and entered as clerk, on condition that if he miss any vacation, he shall keep another in its stead immediately, at Christmas, solemnly spent.

Item. For divers expenses incurred by the Company, at the arrival of Lady Katharine de Espanea at Westminster, to have a place to see the jousts (*le justis*), it was resolved that there should be a subsidy collected from all, to wit, from each member 12d.

At a Parliament holden 29 Jan., 17 Hen. VII.

It was resolved by the Company that Nicolls, Seynt German, Maidston, Luke, Bowryng, Rastall, and Spark should forfeit, each of them, 3s. 4d., because they were Utter Barristers and did not attend Parliament, as, etc.

At this Parliament it was resolved that there should be a subsidy: that is, on the head of each member 2s.; because John Hasell, late Steward, was indebted to divers men for victuals and other necessaries for the use of the place; and because Isyngton, late Steward for the feast of Christmas, was indebted in the same way.

Hardyng and Mervyn are assigned to the chamber, which was formerly assigned to Norton of Bristoll.

Mompesson was admitted as member, and to be out of commons at his pleasure, for a fine of 33s. 4d., which he paid to the same Treasurer.

Boteler of Coventry is discharged from every office, for a fine of 40s, which he has paid to the foresaid Treasurer.

Partriche was admitted as member, and to be out of commons, on condition that he keep all his vacations, except

one Christmas feast, and for that feast, he keep another vacation immediately.

Straunge was admitted as member, and is pardoned two Christmas vacations, so that he keep two other vacations following immediately afterwards.

Gowre was admitted as member.

Taillarde was admitted as member, generally.

Danyell was admitted as member, generally.

Sanders was admitted as member, generally, so that he begin to keep his vacations at the feast of St. Peter, which is called *ad Vincula* (Aug. 1), then next following.

At a Parliament holden 26 April, 17 Hen. VII.

Palmes, junior, was chosen to be Reader for the following vacation.

Draper was admitted as member, on condition that he pay to the Treasurer 40s., and for that he is pardoned all his vacations, etc.

Haselwode was admitted as member, and is pardoned one Christmas feast, so that he keep another vacation in its stead immediately.

At a Parliament holden 6 July, 17 Hen. VII.

The same John Brooke, at the instance and special request of the whole Company of the Middle Temple, took upon himself again to be Treasurer for the following year.

Aprise was admitted as member, generally. Sanders was admitted as member, generally.

William Gascoign is discharged from occupying or exercising any office within the Middle Temple, from the said 6th day henceforth. And by favour of the Fellowship (Societatis), let the same William have henceforth this liberty, that whenever it happens that the same William goes or comes to London, or the suburbs of the same, while his lord or lady are within that city or the suburbs of the same, the same William shall be in commons or out of commons at his liking, for a fine of 4 marks, which the same William, by the hands of William Mordaunt, afterwards paid to the hands of John Brooke, Treasurer, that is to say, on the 2nd day of November, in the

18th year of the reign of King Henry VII. Therefore let the same William be quit of that fine.

Wyndesesor, junior, was admitted with Master Pollard in place of Master Owen, at the special request of the said Master Pollard.

At a Parliament holden 10 Nov., 18 Hen. VII.

Morton is discharged from the office of Marshal, for a fine of 53s. 4d.

Heyron was chosen to the office of Marshal in place of Morton; and if Heyron refuse, then Stucley; and if Stucley refuse, then Heleryngton, junior. And afterwards Heleryngton, junior, took the said office upon him, and Stucley promised to be Marshal at the feast of Christmas then next following.

Memorandum: Pollard was chosen for Reader next Lent.

Fitz James was chosen to the office of Steward for Christmas next; and if he refuse, then Hody; and if Hody refuse, then More of H., etc.

Bukberd was chosen to the office of Butler for the foresaid feast.

Hardynge, Danyell, and Hasilwode were chosen to the office of Master of the Revels.

Taillerd was chosen to the office of the Constable of the Tower.

Husy was admitted as member, generally.

Hall was admitted as member, and is pardoned for the feast of Christmas next following, so that he keep another vacation instead, immediately.

Thomas Jubbys is dispensed from all offices; also to be in commons and out of commons at his liking, for a fine of 3l. 6s. 8d.

Entylsam was chosen to the office of Butler, because Bukberd refused the office aforesaid. And it was resolved (consideratum) that Bukberd should forfeit to the Company 40s. Afterwards it was assessed at another Parliament at 20s.

At a Parliament holden 8 Feb., 18 Hen. VII.

Petyplace is pardoned because he refused the office of Steward, for a fine of 40s. on account of illness, etc.

Chamberleyne, senior, was admitted as member to the

Masters' commons, and is discharged from all his vacations for a fine of 3l. 6s. 8d.

Chamberleyne, junior, was admitted as member generally.

Lytton, of the Exchequer, was admitted as member, and is pardoned his vacations for half a pipe of good wine, etc.

At a Parliament holden 22 May, 18 Hen. VII.

Master Elyot was chosen Reader for the coming vacation, because he was chosen Serjeant-at-law.

And it is agreed at the present Parliament that Nicholas Hughson shall not henceforth be in commons except at his pleasure, for a fine of 20s. by pledge of William Mordaunt; which the same William afterwards, viz., 28th day of May, in the said year, paid into the hands of John Brooke, Treasurer, etc. Therefore as well the foresaid Nicholas as the foresaid William are quit and discharged thereof, etc.

Feldyng was admitted as member, generally.

Davers was admitted into the chamber of Lewis Pollard.

Gerlyngston is assigned to a chamber with Sperke in place of Master Catesby, etc.

Draper is assigned to a chamber with More de H.

Marke was dismissed from the company, and is pardoned all his arrears for a fine of 13s. 4d. as poverty, etc.

Thomas Emson was admitted as member, on condition that he keep all his vacations, except Christmas vacations, and that he keep other vacations instead of them immediately; and he is discharged from every office of the place for a fine of one pipe of wine; and he was admitted into the chamber of Master Elyot, with Master Catesby, etc.

And that the said Thomas Empson shall be allowed to reside in the inn (hospicio) or house called Le Newyn (New Inn), to live* and be a fellow commoner (commensalis) there, and continue until he considers himself capable and sound in knowledge from his study of the law of the land of England; and that he meanwhile shall not be bound by the constitutions, decrees, laws or rules of this house or inn, or obliged to

submit to them or their penalties, or compelled in the least to obey them, until the same Thomas obtains possession of his admission into this inn, as fellow commoner in the same in reality, his aforesaid admission above specified in anywise notwithstanding.

At a Parliament holden 3 July, 18 Hen. VII.

The same John Brooke, at the special request of the whole company of the Middle Temple, took upon himself again to be Treasurer for the year next following.

Auditors Mordaunt.
Palmes, junior.

Hyll was admitted as member, generally.

John Mordaunt, junior, was admitted as member; and the same John is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and occupying or exercising all and all manner offices in this house. And it is granted at the present Parliament that he shall not be compelled to keep any vacations, nor be chosen to occupy any office to be occupied within this house, nor be compelled to occupy any office; and likewise that he shall not be compelled to be in commons, unless at his liking. And all these things are granted and admitted for a fine of four marks, by the surety of William Mordaunt, etc.

Lychefeld was admitted as member, and entered as clerk, on condition that if he miss any reading vacation, that then he shall keep in its stead one Christmas vacation, etc.

Dynham was admitted as member, and entered as clerk, on condition that he shall not be charged with any office at the feast of Christmas then next following after his entry, etc.

Berton was admitted as member, and entered as clerk, on condition that he shall not be compelled to keep the next vacation immediately after his entry into commons; and [if] he miss any vacation at the feast of Christmas, that then he shall keep another vacation of the same feast in its stead immediately and next following.

Afterwards, that is, on the 9th day of November in the 19th year of the reign of King Henry VII., the foresaid William Mordaunt, the surety for the said John Mordaunt, paid for the fine of the same John, the foresaid four marks into the hands of the foresaid John Broke, Treasurer, etc.

Therefore, let as well the same John Mordaunt, as the foresaid William Mordaunt, be quit and discharged thereof, etc.

John Sedley was admitted as member, and discharged and exonerated from all his vacations, and from all offices of the place whatever; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking. And he was admitted in "Le Maunse" into the chamber late John Smyth's, for a fine of 33s. 4d., which he paid to John Brooke, then Treasurer, on the last day of November, in the 19th year of King Henry VII.

At a Parliament holden 2 Nov., 19 Hen. VII.

Palmys, senior, was chosen for Reader, in the following Lent.

More was chosen to the office of Steward for the feast of Christmas then next following.

Stucley was chosen for Marshal for the foresaid feast; and if he refuse, then Heyron; and if Heyron refuse, then Paston. And afterwards Paston took upon himself the foresaid office.

Hasylwode, junior, was chosen to the office of Butler.

Hall was chosen to the office of Constable of the Tower.

Hasy, Feldyng and Apprise were chosen to the office of Masters of the Revels.

Etton was admitted as member, and entered as clerk, on condition that if he miss the next Christmas feast, then he shall keep another feast in its stead immediately.

At a Parliament holden 9 Nov., 19 Hen. VII.

For Serjeants-at-law, viz., for Elyot and Pollard. And then it was given to be understood by the Company that Palmys, junior, was to be Serjeant, by virtue of a certain warrant of our lord the King directed to the Bishop of London, then Keeper of the Great Seal of our said lord the King. And afterwards officers were chosen for the feast of the said Serjeant, viz., "marschalles, surveyers, suers, conveyers, and controllers," each one according to his rank, etc.

Memorandum: That the foresaid Serjeants were not at the aforesaid Parliament, but it was considered by the Company

that they should have among them as reward 20 marks, as

was customary, * etc.

The feast for the Serjeants-at-law was held at Lambeth, in the hostel of the Archbishop of Canterbury, on Monday next before the feast of St. Martin the Bishop, in the winter, in the

19th year of the reign of King Henry VII.

And before the foresaid feast, viz., on Friday, about the third hour after nones, there assembled in the Hall, round "le Cubbord," all the members in town, as well those who were in commons, as others who are not bound to be in commons by reason of their wives being in town, or by reason of special pardons by fine. And then four of those "aunciens" were sent to the chambers of those who were ordained to be Serjeants-at-law, to bring them up to "le Cuppeborde," where Westby, Second Baron of the Exchequer, and Bollyng, Third Baron of the Exchequer, stood with Master Empson. Also many of the seniors and almost all the members were present. And the said Wesby, giving to those who were chosen to be Serjeants praise for their good behaviour and good conduct, which were the cause of their election, desiredt them to have the Fellowship in their favour, etc., with other discourse fitting for the subject. And then the Treasurer delivered to them 20 marks in gold and silver, enclosed in a new glove, on receiving which they thanked the Fellowship not only for the money, but for other benefits, as learning in law and binding! them to study by the good rules ordained by the Company, which restrained them in youth from their dislike to study, etc. And then they drank all together, and went with them, conveying them by "la barge," as far as the hostel at Lambeth. And there they left them, etc.

Also, on the morrow, viz., Saturday, divers, that is almost all the members of the four Inns, at the desire of the said Serjeants. viz., each one desired those of his own Fellowship

to dine with him, and they did so, etc.

Also, on Sunday, all the justices were before ten o'clock in the chapel of the hostel at Lambeth aforesaid, and the new Serjeants, bending their knee before them, made declarations on the first writs delivered to them by Mordaunt and Muscott, prothonotaries of the court. These narrations being finished, the Chief Justice of the King's Bench praised them for the

declarations which they had made, and showed to them more good examples of their predecessors, and then placed "lez Coyfes" on their heads, and tied them under their chins, and clothed them one by one with hoods of scarlet ([provided] by the same Serjeants at their own costs), placing the same hoods on their shoulders like doctors; and so they were created Serjeants-at-law in the presence of the public before the whole Inn,* the folk standing round. And then all the justices entered the Hall, with the said Serjeants following them, and the justices sat in the Hall at the high table, and other great folk with them, and the Serjeants sat in the lower part of the Hall, in the south end of the same Hall.

Also, on Monday, the said Serjeants came to Westminster Hall, and before them all men of their livery and well ranked; but next before them a Serjeant-at-Arms with a great "mase," and the Warden of the Flete with his staff. And all the new Serjeants-at-law stood in the south part of the Hall, opposite the Court of Common Bench, and always the eldest of them, by his admission, from which he was chosen Serjeant, on the higher side. And then two of the old Serjeants went from the bar of the Court up to the new Serjeants, and took the senior between them, and led him to the bar, before the Chancellor of England, the Treasurer of England, with all the other justices then present there. And he made his declaration, and one of the old Serjeants made a defence, and the prothonotary read the writ. And so they did with each, etc.

And afterwards they went to their Inn, and on the same day, the King, with his whole household, breakfasted with them.

Memorandum: That for those three days no order was made for the Company in the four Inns of Court nor in the Inns of Chancery, because all breakfasted with the foresaid Serjeants, and very many others to the number of 1,000.

At a Parliament holden 12 Feb., 19 Hen. VII.

It was considered by the Company that More, Steward for the feast of Christmas last past, should be allowed by the Treasurer for the apparel for the same feast, 34s. 4d. Palmes, senior, was admitted in the chamber where Parliament was held, etc.

Rydall was admitted as member, generally. Burgeyn was admitted as member, generally.

Larder was admitted as member, generally.

Skerne was admitted as member, generally.

Knyghtley was admitted as member, generally.

The matter then moved by the Masters of the Revels for their expenses, is respited until the feast of Easter, as long as the Company thinks fit, etc.

At a Parliament holden 8 May, 19 Hen. VII.

Fitz James was chosen for Reader in the following vacation. Strange, who forfeited two vacations, is now pardoned by the Company, on account of his illness, so that he keep two other vacations in their stead.

More and Paver were admitted into the chamber late belonging to Bowryng, senior.

Jasper Fyloll was admitted into the chamber of Master

Smyth, at his special request.

Arthur Kemys was admitted as member, and is pardoned all his vacations and offices of the place; also to be in or out of commons, at his liking, for a fine of 40s. paid to Master Broke.

At a Parliament holden on Tuesday next after the Feast of All Saints (5 Nov.), 20 Hen. VII.

Pynkeney was chosen for Reader in next Lent.

Nicollys was chosen to exercise the office of Steward for the feast of Christmas next following; and if he refuse, etc., then Bowryng was chosen to exercise the same office.

Castell was chosen to exercise the office of Butler, for the said feast of Christmas; and if he refuse, etc., then Joynorr was chosen to exercise the same office.

Ruddall was chosen to the office of Constable of the Tower, at the same feast; and if he refuse, etc., then Tredennek was chosen to the same office; and if he refuse, etc., then Serjaunt was chosen to the same office, etc.

Saunders, Godericke and Etton were chosen to the office of Masters of the Revels.

It was agreed by the Company that Heyron and Stuckley, because both of them refused to undertake the office of Marshal at the feast of Christmas last past, as they were then chosen. shall pay, and each of them shall pay, to the Company for a fine, 100s., etc.

It was agreed by the Company that John Hasylwode, who was chosen to the office of Butler at the feast of Christmas last past, because he did not execute that office at the feast of All Saints last past, shall pay to the Company for his fine, 40s.

William Fetiplace was admitted as member, and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and occupying or exercising all and all manner offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking, for a fine of 40s., which he paid to John Muscote.* Treasurer, etc.

Giles Strangwis was admitted as member to the Masters' commons, and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and exercising all and all manner offices; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking, for a fine of 40s, for which Mordaunt was surety, † and afterwards he paid it to Muscote, Treasurer, etc.

Edmund Mervyn was admitted as member, generally.

More and Seynt Jermyn are appointed auditors to calculate commons unpaid and apparels.

Fitz James and William Mordaunt are appointed auditors for Master Brok, late Treasurer, to audit his account of the last three years.

It was agreed by the Company that Opy should show the record of his fine formerly made for all offices, if such there be, and how and to whom he paid that fine, etc.

At a Parliament holden on Tuesday next before the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Mary (28 Jan.), 20 Hen. VII., after the Conquest.‡

At this Parliament it was agreed by the Company that Nicollys, because he had refused the office of Steward at the feast of Christmas last past, should take upon himself the same

office at the next feast of Christmas, on pain of forfeiting double the penalty of old time imposed and accustomed for that office.

And that Langston, because he refused the office of Marshal at the feast of Christmas last past, shall pay to the Company for his fine thereof five marks; and afterwards, that is, on the 28th day of June, in the 20th year of Henry VII., the said John Muscote received from the foresaid Thomas Langston, etc.

And that Ruddall, who refused the office of Constable of the Tower at the foresaid feast of Christmas last past, shall pay to the Company for his fine thereof, 20s. And because he lost his vacation at the same feast, he shall pay another 20s. Afterwards at the next Parliament he is pardoned of 20s. thereof, and paid the other 20s. afterwards into the hands of William Mordaunt, Treasurer. Therefore let him be quit thereof.

Master Toly was admitted as member; and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and occupying or exercising all and all manner offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons at his own liking, for a fine of four marks, whereof he paid to J. Muscote, Treasurer, 40s.; 13s. 4d.

Master Throgmerton, junior, son of Robert Throgmerton, knight, was admitted as member; and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and exercising all offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking, for a fine of 40s. for which the said Robert became surety. Afterwards his father paid the said 40s. into the hands of William Mordaunt, Treasurer. Therefore let him be quit.

Benstede was admitted as member, generally.

Denham, at the instance of Master Westby and other Masters, and certain considerations being adduced, is pardoned his fine for his lost vacation assessed at the last Parliament.

Ruddall, at his special request, and certain considerations being adduced, is pardoned 20s., assessed at the last Parliament.

Master Twyneo was admitted as member, on condition that he keep all his vacations except Christmas vacation, and for these, he shall keep another vacation immediately. And let him be discharged from every office of the place for a fine of one pipe of good wine. And he is admitted into the chamber of Master Elyot with Master Thomas Empson. And the same Master Twyneo shall be allowed to reside in the inn or house called "Le Newe Inn," and to be a fellow

commoner, and continue there until he considers himself, from his study of the law of the land of England, to be capable and sound in knowledge. And that he meanwhile shall not be bound by the constitutions,* decrees, laws or rules of this House or Inn, or be in the least compelled to obey them, until the same Twyneo obtains possession of his admission into this Inn as fellow commoner in the same, in reality, his foresaid admission above specified in any wise notwithstanding.

Master Richard Druell was admitted as member, on condition that he keep all his vacations except Christmas vacations, and keep in their stead other vacations immediately. And let him be discharged from every office of the place for a fine of 20s. which he paid to John Muscote, Treasurer. Therefore let the foresaid Richard be quit thereof.

John Castell was admitted as member, and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and exercising or occupying all offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking and pleasure, for a fine of 40s. Whereof he paid to William Mordaunt on the 12th June, the 22nd year, † 6s. 8d., and afterwards to Thomas More, 6s. 8d.

Master Fitzhugh was admitted as member, generally, except that he is pardoned one Christmas vacation, etc.

William Lane was admitted as member, and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and exercising or occupying all offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking and pleasure, for a fine of 40s. Afterwards he paid the same 40s. to John Muscote, Treasurer.

Nayler was chosen to exercise the office of Marshal for the foresaid feast, etc.; and if, etc.

Joynour was chosen to exercise the office of Butler for the same feast; and if, etc., then Draper, etc.

Tredennek was chosen to exercise the office of Constable of the Tower at the said feast †; and if, etc., then Serjaunt; and if, etc., then Payn, etc.

Broun of Somerset, Aleyn of Essex and Vowell, were chosen to the office of Masters of the Revels.

Larder is pardoned the Christmas vacation next before,‡ so that he keep another of the same feast.

At a Parliament holden on Tuesday, the Feast of St. Katherine the Virgin (25 Nov.), 21 Hen. VII.

Master Clyfford was chosen to the office of Marshal for the feast of Christmas next following, in consideration of the poverty of Nayler; and if, etc., then Turges; and if, etc., then Boughton.

Denham, Lychfeld and Bray, were chosen to the office of Master of the Revels, on account of lawful excuses of the others allowed by the Company.

Leonard Morgan was admitted as member, generally, except that if he miss any vacation, he shall keep another of the same nature, then next following.

John Chainnes was admitted as member, and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and exercising or occupying all offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons at his liking and pleasure, for a fine of 26s. 8d., which he afterwards paid to John Muscote, Treasurer.

It was agreed by the Company, because the vacation at the feast of Christmas last past for divers causes was pardoned and released, so that none of the same Company were obliged or held to keep that vacation, that there shall be allowed to each servant of this Inn, for his commons of each week for the time of the said feast, 14d., and for fuel, 4s. 8d., and for a harper, 6s. 8d., etc.

Master Lentall was admitted as member, generally.

Master Fyssher was admitted as member, and is pardoned keeping all his vacations, and exercising or occupying all offices in this house; and to be in commons and out of commons, at his liking and pleasure, for one "hoggeshed" of good wine, delivered for the following vacation.

Master More, of Hampshire,* was chosen for Reader in the Lent vacation next following, and afterwards read in the same vacation.

It was agreed that allowance shall be made to the Steward for his commons, as was agreed at the last Parliament, that it should be made to each of the other six servants. And that as well his commons as the commons and all other charges considered in the last Parliament for Christmas, shall be paid out of the Treasury.

It was agreed that the Treasurer shall buy dishes necessary for the kitchen and deliver them to the cook by indenture.

At a Parliament holden on Tuesday next before the Feast of the Ascension of the Lord (11 May), 22 Hen. VII.

Bowryng was chosen as Reader for the next Autumn vacation, and read then.

The admission of John Ivys is confirmed at this Parliament. It was agreed that Richard Barwys shall be discharged of all manner arrears owed before this present Parliament for a fine of 30s. which he paid afterwards to the hands of William Mordaunt, Treasurer; and he is quit up to the same Parliament.

It was agreed that Colt shall be discharged from all arrears of payments and subsidies, and of serjeants' rolls up to this present Parliament, for a fine of 20s., which he afterwards paid to the hands of William Mordaunt, Treasurer, viz., 13s. 4d., whereof delivered to the same William by John Muscote, last Treasurer, 6s. 8d. by the hands of the same John Colt.

It was agreed also at the foresaid Parliament that there shall be paid to "le wexchaundler" 26s. 4d. of the arrears due to him out of the Treasury, if it can be paid thence. Afterwards the foresaid William Mordaunt, Treasurer, paid to the hands of John Almond, servant of the same "wexchaundeler," viz., William Grey, the foresaid 26s. 4d. Therefore let him be quit thereof.

It was agreed, further, that Walter de le Horn shall have from the Treasury for all the arrears due to him for services rendered in the Inn of the Middle Temple before the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel in the 20th year of the reign of King Henry VII., 4l. Afterwards at the mere motion of the said Walter and with his consent and desire, William Mordaunt, the Treasurer, paid to the same Walter the said 4l. in ready money out of the foresaid Treasury for the foresaid arrears, which the same Walter received. And let him be quit thereof, as appears by his bill, which is filed.

At a Parliament holden on Tuesday, the day of Souls (2 Nov.), 23 Hen. VII.

Fitz James, junior, was chosen for Reader in the time of Lent, next coming. And he read fully.

Nicols was chosen to the office of Steward, for Christmas

next coming. And he then occupied that office.

Clyfford was chosen to the office of Marshal, who occupied that office.

Jenour was chosen to the office of Butler again, but he did not occupy it then, by reason of illness, as he asserted.

Denham, Lychefeld and Bray, Masters of the Revels, who

occupied that office.

Sergeaunt was chosen to the office of Constable of the Tower; and in his default, then Broun of Somerset; and in his default, then Chaunterell. Subsequently Chaunterell, in default of the foresaid Sergeaunt and Broun, occupied the foresaid office.

Danyell was admitted as member to the Clerks' commons, on condition that if he lose one vacation, he shall keep another, the next of the same nature; and that the Autumn vacation last past, in which he was vacationer, shall stand for one of his vacations.

Maurice was admitted as member to the Clerks' commons, and at his instance it was granted that the Autumn vacation last past, in which he was vacationer, shall be allowed to him for one of his vacations.

Scalby was admitted as member, and is pardoned all the charges of the house, except pensions,* subsidies, and serjeants' rolls; and that he shall be in commons and out of commons at his liking, for one "hoggeshed" of wine, and for one buck, which he paid in the last Autumn vacation.

At the foresaid Parliament, the Fellowship of the Middle Temple exhibited in full Parliament, a certain bill, the tenor whereof follows in these words: "The holye body of the Company of the Middel Temple, praying the Masters and Rulers of the same, that the continuanz, relyeff and encrese of lernyng hereafter to be had and kept in the same place, it may plese them that certen ordinauncez may be auctorised,

establisshid and enacted after the maner and forme as here ensueth.

"First, that yerely at Hyllary terme the Reader for Somer vacacion then next following be chosyn, and that immediatly after his eleccion, he be taken and admitted for a Bencher, but his name to be called Reder shal not begynne tyll the fest of the Ascencion than next following; and that at the Lent next following his election, he be personally assistent to the Reder duryng the seid Lent vacacion, uppon payn of fyve marke. Item, that he that hath redde his fyrst redyng, shalbe personally assistaunt to the Reder in the Lent next following but oone after his seid fyrst redyng, uppon peyn of c.s. And yf it fortune that any Lent vacacion, that any person that hath red shuld be assistant in, to be hereafter adjorned because of sekenes or otherwyse, that then he that at that tyme shuld be assistent, shal be personally assistaunt at any other vacacion when he shall therto be appoynted by the Company, uppon the seyd peyn of c.s.

"Item, that the eldest Reder after the order of the Hows that is no Knyght nor Baron of the Kynges Escheker, and that is not above the age of lx. yeres, nor noo Justice of Ireland, shal by order oone after another yerely as ther course shall fall, be assistaunt personally to the Reder that shalbe in Somer vacacion, uppon peyn of x. marke. Also if it fortune any Somer vacacion hereafter to be adiorned by cause of sykenes or other wyse, or that a seriant rede for his forme in a Somer vacacion, so that ther cannot be any assistaunt growing for the Lent Twelmoneth then next following, or if it fortune any man that by the rules aforeseid* shuld at any vacacion be an assistaunt to any Reder for the tyme beyng, to dve before the vacacion that he shuld be assistaunt in; that than an assistaunt to any Reder for the tyme beyng to dye before the vacaciont shalbe elected and assigned by the Company for that vacacion that shalbe lykely so to be disapoynted, and that he so elected shalbe personally assistaunt according to the sevd eleccion, uppon peyn of x. marke."

Which petition having been often read and fully understood,

this answer was given to the same petition: "To this they are agreed, unless it be otherwise determined at the next Parliament." At which Parliament, held on the morrow of St. Andrew then next following, nothing was said against the said Act; therefore the same Act remains in force for ever, etc.

It was agreed that the Servants' commons for six weeks, viz., from Saturday next after the feast of St. Bartholomew, in the 23rd year of the reign of King Henry VII., until Sunday, the 10th day of October next following, viz., for each of the same servants for each week, in which they were staying and residing within the Inn. 14d, shall be placed among "Apparelles" in the Book of Commons, viz., for the first week, Warner, Toller, Hill, Cressy, Fauconer, Davy and Grev. For the fifth week: Toller, Hill, Cressy, Faukener, Davy and Grey. For the sixth week, for the same six; and for Warner, the same week, half commons; and for repast, 2d.; which amounts to 42s. 9d. And that those who ought to keep their vacations, should not suffer loss because they were out of commons in the weeks next after the foresaid feast of St. Bartholomew because, in consequence of the death of Roger Taillard of the plague on Thursday; after the said feast of St. Bartholomew, the whole Company withdrew separately and departed from the Inn.

At a Parliament holden on the Morrow of St. Andrew (1 Dec.), 23 Hen. VII.

Gower was chosen to the office of Butler, for the time of Christmas next coming, in default of Jenour and Draper. Afterwards the same Jenour and Draper refused that office for this time, and Gower occupied it.

Master Applyerd was admitted as member generally, at the instance of Master Thomas Empson.

Master Benstede is assigned as successor; in Master Westby's chamber, at the instance of the same Master Westby, with him.

Master Jubbes was chosen to be Assistant in next Lent, and he agreed to this, and was Assistant in the same Lent

vacation according to the form of the foresaid Act.

Toplyff, junior, was admitted as expectant on his father, in the chamber of his same father, until he is removed to the Masters' commons.

At a Parliament holden on Souls Day (2 Nov.), 24 Hen. VII.

Nicols was chosen as Reader for the vacation in Lent next to come. And he read then and not before.

Let Richard Gray have liberty to be in commons and out of commons at his liking, for a fine of 33s. 4d., which he paid into the hands of William Mordaunt, Treasurer. Therefore let the same Richard be quit thereof.

Humfrey Thorell is pardoned all offices, pensions, and all other arrears and debts up to the feast of Christmas, in the foresaid 24th year, for a fine of 4 marks paid into the hands of William Mordaunt, Treasurer.

William Cressy was chosen Steward for the year, on condition that he find security to discharge the house, as far as belongs to that office.

Roger Tusser was admitted Chief Butler.

At a Parliament holden on the day* the Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord (May), 1 Hen. VIII.

Master Portman was chosen as Reader for the Autumn vacation next coming. And he read in that vacation.

Master Smyth was named to be Assistant to the foresaid Reader in the foresaid vacation, who said that he was 64 years of age, which allegation is allowed according to the Act lately enacted thereon. Wherefore Master Broke is named Assistant for the foresaid vacation.

Jenour was chosen to the office of Butler for the foresaid feast of Christmas; and in his default, Denham; and in his default, Bray. And Jenour refused to occupy that office. Denham occupied it.

Skern, Larder and Benstede were chosen Masters of the Revels; and in their default or that of any one of them, Spencer, Lenthall and Bray, junior. Both Benstede and Bray, junior, occupied that office, and all the others refused.

Trowte was chosen Constable of the Tower; and in his default, Twysill; and in his default, Dygby. And because Trowte refused that office, Twysill occupied it.

Master Jubbes was chosen as Reader for the vacation in

next Lent. And he read then.

Bowryng was named for Assistant in the vacation in next Lent. And he occupied it according to an ordinance of the whole Company at a Parliament held on Monday next after the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Mary, in the 24th year of the reign of King Henry VII.

Bray of Cornwall, was admitted by Fitz James, then Treasurer, into the chamber late belonging to Richard Empson, knight, in consideration that he of his good will, at the cost of the Lord of Seynt Johns, repaired the conduit of water as far as "le Cloyster," which of old was used to be done at the cost of the said lord.

At a Parliament holden in the Middle Temple on the Morrow of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary (3 Feb.), 1 Hen. VIII.

Wellys was named Reader for the next Autumn vacation.

The names of those called are to be delivered by the Reader or Treasurer the said next term to the ancientest Justice of the House. If there be none such, then to the Chief Justice.
 - 3. That none be admitted to read but those who are

esteemed for their learning and credit, fit to serve in the common weal, and who have attended the reading in the exercises there two years before their call to that place; unless it is thought otherwise convenient for some reasonable cause of let to be signified to the ancientest Justices of that House, or if none such be, then to the Chief Justice.

4. That no single Reader be admitted to read in Lent, but that the same reading be always supplied by a double Reader as heretofore has been accustomed, unless upon some special occasion to be allowed by the Justices of the House, or by the

Chief Justices and Chief Baron, or two of them.

5. That before any be called to read, a note of the names of three or four next in turn to read be delivered to the Justices of the House, or to the Chief Justices and Chief Baron.

6. That the readings be held out the whole three weeks as in ancient time, and the former good orders for diet and guests

to be admitted in readings be observed.

7. That none be called to the Bar by any letters, corruption, or reward, on pain of expulsion of the Reader who calleth, and of the person called.

8. That the Readers be always moved to make their case short, not containing above two or three points at the most,

and those as much upon the Statute read on as may be.

9. That in the moots, both in the Houses of Court and Chancery, the pleadings be rehearsed and used as in former times, and thereupon to go to the case, but not without the pleadings drawn, pleaded, and recited. That no case in any Inn of Chancery contain above three points or questions at most, and that the cases be short. *English*.

The Answer of the Benchers of the Middle Temple to the Orders delivered by the Judges in Hilary Term, 36 Eliz.

- 1. This article is the ancient and still continued order and use of the House, saving that the time was not limited to three years, and that sometimes men of good discretion, being of ability in living, by office or otherwise, and of long continuance in the House, and such as were not like to use the Bars in the Courts at Westminster, have been admitted into the Society of Utter Barristers.
- 2. Of ancient time the Utter Barristers were only called by the Reader, and seldom above four at one time. But by an

Act of their Parliament, 7 Eliz., it was ordained that no Reader should call any Utter Barrister, unless it were first assented to in Parliament and appointed how many he should call. Since then, by the orders established by the Queen's command, with the advice of the Privy Council and Justices, 16 Eliz., and renewed 26 Eliz., none is to be called to the Utter Bar but by the ordinary council of the House in term time. Afterwards, 31 Eliz., it was ordained by Parliament of this House that a double Reader should call four only and a single Reader two, of such good students as they thought meet, whom the Bench might disallow. The Bench also had liberty to call such good students as were not called in due time by the Readers and yet deserved the preferment of the Utter Bar.

- 3. That by the ancient orders still continued, four of the ancient Utter Barristers are bound to keep four vacations and to stand at the Cupboard four readings next before their turn to read, and there to argue the Reader's cases and keep moots and cases of the House; out of which four the Benchers at their Parliament choose the most sufficient man for learning, discretion, ability, and other gifts to be the next Summer Reader.
- 4. The ancient order has always been to supply the reading in Lent by double Readers, which order is still continued, unless there happened to be just occasion to supply the vacation with a single Reader.
- 5. They have never used any such order, and think that they in their Parliament in conference together, of their knowledges touching any Reader to be called, may best discern touching his exercise, touching his knowledge, gifts of utterance, discretion and ability to maintain his countenance, considering they have lived many years before with him.

6. The sixth agrees with their ancient orders, and is now very necessary to be thoroughly renewed and duly observed.

- 7. By their Parliament, 22 Eliz., it is ordered that none sue by letters or otherwise directly or indirectly to be preferred to the Bar, on pain of disgrace by rejecting him.
- 8. This was the ancient order, and they intend to renew it by authority of their Parliament.
- 9. It is the ancient order of the House, and they continue it, and will see it renewed in their Inn of Chancery.

The Benchers will willingly endeavour to cause these orders to be observed for their time, and have established them at

their present Parliament. English.




