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MINUTES.

KANSAS CITY, MISSOURI, Thursday, May 16, 1889.

The General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church met, agreeably to adjournment, in the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Kansas City, Mo., on Thursday, May 16, 1889, at 11 o'clock A.M.

The opening sermon was preached by the Moderator, Rev. W. H. Black, of St. Louis Presbytery.

After the sermon, the General Assembly was constituted with prayer by the Moderator.

Recess was then taken till 3.30 o'clock P.M.

THURSDAY, May 16, 3.30 o'clock p.m. ADDRESSES OF WELCOME.

Addresses of welcome were delivered to the General Assembly by Hon. John F. Phillips, on behalf of the citizens, and Rev. J. M. Cromer, on behalf of the pastors and Churches of the city, and a response was made by the Moderator.

SYNODICAL AND PRESBYTERIAL CHANGES.

The Stated Clerk reported that, in accordance with the order of the last General Assembly at its last meeting (see Minutes, 1888, pp. 29, 30), the Synod of Ozark had united with the Synod of Missouri, the united Synod retaining the name, Synod of Missouri; also, that the Synods of Brazos, Colorado, Texas, and Trinity had united, the consolidated Synod taking the name, Synod of Texas; also, that the Synods of Columbia, East Tennessee, Middle Tennessee, and West Tennessee had been united, the consolidated Synod taking the name, Synod of Tennessee.

It was also announced by the Stated Clerk that no new Presbyteries had been organized during the year, nor had there been any changes in Presbyterial lines or relations except in the case of the Atchison Presbytery, which, by order of the last General Assembly (see Minutes, 1888, pp. 35), was transferred from the Missouri Synod to the Kansas Synod.

ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

The General Assembly then proceeded to the election of Moderator, which resulted in the choice of the Rev. J. M. Hubbert, of the Lebanon Presbytery.

HOURS OF MEETING.

It was determined that the regular sessions of the General Assembly, unless otherwise ordered, shall be held from 9 o'clock A.M. to 12 o'clock M., and from 2.30 o'clock P.M. to 5 o'clock P.M., and that the first half hour of each morning session shall be given to devotional exercises.

The General Assembly then adjourned till 9 o'clock to-morrow morning, and closed with prayer.

SECOND DAY.

FRIDAY, May 17, 9 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met and was opened with prayer. One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO PREPARE A HYMN AND TUNE
BOOK.

The following report of the Committee on Hymn and Tune Book was received:

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

The committee appointed by the General Assembly, which sat in Waco, Texas, last year, to prepare for the use of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church a Hymn and Tune Book, ask to submit to your reverend body the following:

We have met and conferred a number of times, and have corresponded and consulted much with each other, and with others, and have labored no little in preparing material for this work, according to the General Assembly's direction.

We understood that the Church wanted a new book, and a good book, and we set about the work in earnest. Our difficulties in presenting such a hymnal increased upon us until they seemed insurmountable, the chief impediments being the procuring of music and words which were protected by copyrights. We found that a very large part of the material we wanted could not be obtained except by paying exhorbitant prices, and some of it we could not buy at any price. We found that only a few dozen pieces would have cost in the neighborhood of two thousand dollars. We were advised that the General Assembly's Board of Publication would not feel itself able or justified in expending so large a sum of the Church's money for such a purpose.

Fortunately—we hope, providentially—at this juncture, one of our members, in corresponding with The Century Company, New York, in regard to Dr. Robinson's splendid hymnal, entitled "Spiritual Songs," received from that company certain favorable propositions, which we think it advisable to accept, to wit: That we adopt "Spiritual Songs," and recommend it as a book for the use of our people. It will be entitled—

"SPIRITUAL SONGS

FOR THE USE OF THE

CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH."

It will have the imprint of our Board of Publication. We are to add a Supplement of a few pages containing favorite pieces. We are at liberty to make changes, if needed, as to doctrine in any hymns.

The book is much larger than "Bible Songs," and contains many of the hymns and tunes we had selected, the copyrights of which are already paid for by the compiler, and will cost us nothing.

By adopting this plan, our Board of Publication will be enabled in a very short time to present to our people a book rich in both music and words, and well calculated to cheer and charm and comfort the children of God for years to come.

We, therefore, feel clear in submitting this report to your reverend body. We also submit a provisional contract between our Board of Publication and The Century Company, as a part of this report, that the whole matter may be fully understood.

MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT, made this, the twelfth day of April, A.D. 1889, between The Century Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of New York, party of the first part, and the Board of Publication of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of Tennessee, party of the second part:

Whereas, The party of the first part is the publisher of a hymn and tune book, edited and arranged by the Rev. Dr. Charles S. Robinson, entitled "Spiritual Songs for Church and Choir," which book in a somewhat modified form, said second party desires to supply with its own imprint to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the covenants and agreements of the respective parties, it is agreed as follows:

First. Said first party agrees to furnish to said second party the unabridged edition of "Spiritual Songs for Church and Choirs," with music, printed on the same paper as the regular edition, in sheets, flat, unbound, in lots of not less than one thousand at a time, for fifty cents a copy.

Second. Said first party agrees to make slight changes in the title page, retaining, however, the words "Spiritual Songs," as an essential portion of the title of the work, and also to insert a new preface to be prepared by the said second party, in which the Rev. Dr. Robinson, shall be properly recognized as author and compiler, and said changes in the title page and preface shall be subject to his approval.

Third. It is agreed that the index of first lines of stanzas contained in the regular edition of said book shall be omitted, and the party of the first part agrees to reset the index of first lines and put it in the same type and style as the index of first lines of the hymn book "Landes Domini." The party of the first part agrees to add to the work a Supplement of not more than eight pages of words and music, the copy of which Supplement is to be supplied by the party of the second part, and to be guaranteed by said second party to contain nothing that will involve an infringement of existing copyrights.

Fourth. The party of the first part will charge the party of the second part for making the plates for said Supplement and said change in the index only the actual cost to said first party of setting the type and making the plates, but will not make any charge for supplying the printed sheets of the Supplement and modified index, unless by reason of the changes the number of pages added to the book shall exceed four.

Fifth. The duration of this contract shall be three years from the 1st of June, A.D. 1889, and said second party agrees to take at least three thousand copies of said book within the first two years of the period covered by this contract.

Sixth. This contract is made with the expectation that the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, at its meeting in May, 1889, will adopt said book, and this contract is conditional upon said General Assembly taking such action, and is made subject to the approval of said General Assembly.

In witness whereof, the parties hereto have, on the date above written, caused their corporate names to be hereunto subscribed—that of the first party by its treasurer, and that of the second party by its president; and have caused their respective corporate seals to be hereunto affixed.

REPORT OF PERMANENT COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The following report of the Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance was read and referred to the Standing Committee on Sabbath Observance.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

DEAR BRETHREN:—Your Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance hereby present their second annual report. The year has been marked by unusual interest and activity on the part of the friends of the Sabbath, in advocating its claims before the people and in urging it upon the attention of our National Congress. In this way public attention has been called to the claims of the Christian Sabbath, both as a divine and a civil institution, involving the highest interests of people and government.

There have been various agencies, or Sabbath committees, representing communities, States, and denominations, that have been working faithfully but at great disadvantage, because without unity and co-operation. Early in the year petitions were circulated among the officers and friends of a number of Sabbath Associations in favor of a National Sabbath Committee. The General Conference of the M. E. Church was the first to act in response to the spirit of these petitions. It adopted a resolution approving the plan and inviting all other evangelical denominations to appoint

representatives to serve on the proposed National Committee, and suggested as a basis of representation for each denomination one representative for each one hundred thousand members, or major part thereof. Thus action taken about the middle of May got before a number of ecclesiastical bodies in session during that month; the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (North), the Baptist Church, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (South), the Synod of the Reformed Church, and the U. P. Church, appointed representatives who met and formed a National Association to be called

THE AMERICAN SABBATH UNION.

A constitution was adopted, which, among other sections, has the following:

II. Basis.—The basis of this Union is the divine authority and universal and perpetual obligation of the Sabbath, as manifested in the order and constitution of nature, declared in the revealed will of God, formulated in the Fourth Commandment of the moral law, interpreted and applied by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, transferred to the Christian Sabbath, or Lord's Day, by Christ and his apostles, and approved by its beneficial influence upon national life.

III. Object.—The object of this Union is to preserve the Christian Sab-

bath as a day of rest and worship.

IV. Membership.—1. Representative Members.—The representative members shall be such persons as have been, or may be, appointed by the various Christian denominations of our country-that accept our basisfour representatives from each denomination, with an extra representative for each one hundred thousand members, or major fraction thereof, in the denomination.

This American Sabbath Union asks that action be taken by all General Assemblies and other Church councils in accordance with the above sections of its Constitution. It does not propose to take the place of, or do away with, denominational committees, such as your own, but provides for their being represented in the Union by corresponding members, under Article 3, of Section 4. It is the opinion of your committee, however, that your work can be as well done by your representatives in the Union, and all necessary matters be reported to you, and perhaps more satisfactorily done than by a Standing Committee. We therefore recommend that you appoint representative members of the Union, as provided for in Article 1, Section 4 of the Constitution, and discharge your Standing Committee.

Besides this important step, the year will be memorable on account of a hearing before the Committee on Education and Labor, United States Senate, in charge of what is known as the Sunday Rest Bill. Petitions numerously signed have been presented to the United States Congress, against Sunday mails, interstate Sunday trains, and Sunday parades in military service. These petitions were signed by about one million and a half of signers, chiefly obtained through the efforts of the Sabbath Department of the W. C. T. U., Mrs. J. C. Bateham being the efficient superintendent. Besides the signers, the petitions received the indorsement of various ecclesiastical bodies, orders, etc., representing about thirteen million citizens of the United States. The hearing was lengthy, and the arguments for and against the Sabbath made up a part of the committee's report, which has been published, and has run through a number of editions. A copy of this very valuable document can be obtained by applying to your Senators.

Christian people have surrendered so much to the demands of the world by not making open protest against Sunday trains, mails, papers, base-ball, etc., that it will require united and earnest effort to regain what has been lost. There is evidence of a growing interest and of a quickened conscience upon the subject of the proper observance of the Sabbath. A number of the great railroads have given orders to have Sunday business and Sunday trains reduced to the minimum. Such a spirit and disposition to further the movement for proper Sabbath Observance and rest upon the part of these great corporations is very encouraging and gratifying. Christians ought to ask God to lead them and open the way for them, as much depends upon the results of their efforts.

Mr. John Wanamaker, Postmaster-General, has issued an order closing the department buildings at Washington on the Sabbath against all clerks and the public. This is an important step, and it is to be hoped the example will be felt and followed in other departments of government.

The Church itself needs a quickened conscience on the matter of a proper observance of the Lord's Day. This can only be gained through the power of the word of God, and that chiefly by the mouths of the living ministry. In a great measure the pulpit has been silent on this vital matter, and the watchmen need to sound the alarm more frequently and with greater force and earnestness. A chief place of weakness and danger is in the home. Parents must teach the commandment of the Lord to their children, and be an example before them in obeying it.

Praying the favor of the Lord upon his people, and upon our land, in all efforts to recover his day from the enemy, this report is submitted for your prayerful consideration.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The report of the Board of Missions was read, and Rev. J. V. Stephens, the Secretary of the Board, addressed the General Assembly.

The General Assembly then adjourned till to-morrow morning, and closed with prayer.

THIRD DAY.

SATURDAY May 18, 9 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met and was opened with prayer. One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE EVANGELICAL UNION.

A communication from the Committee on Correspondence of the Evangelical Union of Scotland was read and referred to the Committee on Correspondence.

MEMORIALS.

Memorials from Presbyteries and Synods were presented and referred to appropriate committees.

INVITATIONS FOR ENTERTAINMENT.

Several communications were received from various congregations inviting the General Assembly to hold its next session with them, and were placed on the docket.

REPORT OF THE STATED CLERK.

The report of the Stated Clerk was referred to the Committee on Finance.

ADDRESS ON CHURCH ERECTION.

The hour of 10 o'clock A.M., Monday next, was fixed as the time when Rev. F. P. Flaniken, the Agent of the Board of Church Erection shall address the General Assembly.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

The Board of Ministerial Relief presented its report, and Rev. J. H. Miller, the Secretary of the Board addressed the General Assembly.

Brief addresses were made by other members of the General Assembly, and the report was referred to the Committee on Ministerial Relief.

STATISTICAL TABLE.

A resolution relative to the preparation of a Statistical Table to be printed in the Minutes of the General Assembly was adopted and referred to a special committee consisting of Rev. H. G. King, R. O. Elmore, S. A. McPherson, and G. W. Crutcher, and Ruling Elder T. A. Jenkins.

COMMITTEE ON BOWLING GREEN SCHOOL (COLORED).

The following report of the committee appointed at the last meeting of the General Assembly to confer with the trustees of the school at Bowling Green, Ky., (colored) was concurred in, and Minister C. H. Bell and Ruling Elder J. I. D. Hinds were appointed on the committee provided for therein, who nominated Revs. J. S. Grider and J. A. McDonald to serve on the Board prescribed in the report:

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

Your committee appointed at the last meeting of the General Assembly to confer with the colored General Assembly regarding the interests of the colored school at Bowling Green, respectfully report as follows:

The opportunity has not been afforded your committee, as a committee, to confer with the colored General Assembly, the same being now in session at Bowling Green, Ky., and having met for the first time since the adoption of the resolution under which this committee was appointed.

Some of the members of your committee have individually conferred with those of the colored Church having immediate interest in, and care

of, said school, with the Rev. J. A. McDonald, resident pastor at Bowling Green, and particularly with the Rev. H. A. Gibson, who has had immediate control of the school from its beginning, and after a careful consideration of the questions involved, your committee make the following recommendations, to wit:

- 1. That a joint Board of Control, composed of two members of the colored Church and two from this Church, who shall elect a fifth member, and then the five to elect a president from their number.
- 2. That the two members from this Church shall be nominated by a special committee appointed for that purpose and elected by the General Assembly at its present session, the two members from the colored Church to be selected in such manner as they may determine.
- 3. That the term of office of said Board shall be continuous, unless otherwise determined by the General Assembly; all vacancies to be filled by the Board, subject to the approval of the General Assembly.
- 4. Said Board of Control to have the selection of a faculty for said school, and the full control and management of same, subject to the supervisory action of this General Assembly, and shall make report annually to the General Assembly.
- 5. That the colored General Assembly, now in session at Bowling Green, be communicated with immediately by telegraph, informing them of the action and recommendations of this General Assembly, and asking their concurrence.

Respectfully submitted by the members of the committee present at this General Assembly.

FREE ENTERTAINMENT.

A resolution was introduced by Rev. W. Benton Farr asking the General Assembly to cease accepting free entertainment, and requiring the Presbyteries to provide means for the payment of the board of their commissioners. Said resolution was docketed.

PROTEST FROM WHITE ROCK PRESBYTERY.

A protest from White Rock Presbytery calling in question the legality of Texas Synod being a delegated body, was referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

ADDRESS ON THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH.

A request was made by the Rev. M. B. DeWitt that the General Assembly allow one hour on the evening of May 22, at 8 o'clock, for Rev. Dr. W. F. Crafts, of New York, Field Secretary of the American Sabbath Association, to address the General Assembly on the important question of the Christian Sabbath, which was referred to the Committee on Sabbath Observance.

INVITATION TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

An invitation from the congregation at Union City, Tenn., and the citizens thereof, requesting the General Assembly to hold its next meeting at said place, was read and docketed.

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

The report of the Board of Publication was read by J. M. Gaut, the President of the Board, after which Rev. W. J. Darby, the General Manager of said Board, addressed the General Assembly. The report was then referred to the Committee on Publication.

The General Assembly then adjourned till Monday morning, 9 o'clock A.M., and closed with prayer.

FOURTH DAY.

Monday, May 20, 9 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met and was opened with prayer. One half hour was given to devotional exercises.

The Minutes of Saturday's sessions were read and approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH TITLES.

The committees appointed by the General Assembly in 1887 to investigate titles to Church property presented the following report, which was adopted:

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

The committee appointed by the General Assembly, at its stated meeting May 1887, to "ascertain the laws of the different States, and to formulate such rules and regulations as may best secure the title in perpetuity acquired, or to be hereafter acquired, for the use and benefit of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, for Church and educational purposes," and report, etc., beg leave to report:

That there is probably no one method which can be made applicable in all the States, as the laws of the States are not uniform. The nearest approach to uniformity which occurs to the committee, as the result of our investigation, is that where it can be done under the laws of the State where the property is situated, the title to all our Church and denominational school property be vested in our General Assembly's Board of Trustees, and that when this can not be done on account of said Board being a corporation foreign to the State in which the property is situated, the Board be instructed to have itself incorporated in such States where this can be done, and where the doing so will confer upon the Board the needed power.

We recommend that to facilitate the making of deeds to said Board, and ascertaining its powers in this respect, that said Board be directed to furnish for publication in the Appendix to the General Assembly Minutes a copy of its act of incorporation granted by the legislature of Kentucky.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

The Report of the Committee on Ministerial Relief was presented and adopted as follows:

Your Committee have carefully considered the eighth Annual Report of the Board of Ministerial Relief, and report the following:

Year after year since the Board was organized, it has come up to your meetings with a most gratifying report of its work. But never before, it seems to us, was there so great cause for gratitude for past blessings or encouragement for future effort as we find in the report before us.

With regret we note the fact that only ninety-eight Sunday-schools during the year past reported contributions to this cause. We must never rest content until all our schools are receiving training in this important department of work.

It really looks as if we shall soon be permitted to witness the whole Church uniting in this the tenderest, most beautiful, of all its benevolences, all but three of your one hundred and nineteen Presbyteries having during the past year contributed to the cause of Ministerial Relief. Too much can not be said in praise of the wisdom, devotion, and tact with which the Board have conducted this department of your work.

This should lead us to "undertake great things for God and expect great things from God."

We recommend:

- 1. That you approve the action of the Board in the election of Rev. A. G. Bergen, of Evansville, Ind., a member of the same.
- 2. That you approve an amendment to the By-laws providing for the office of Corresponding Secretary, and commend the wisdom of the Board in the appointment of Rev. J. H. Miller, of Evansville, Ind., to this position. To him all correspondence and remittances should hereafter be directed.
- 3. That you urge all your pastors and supplies, and all elders of vacant congregations, to afford at least one opportunity annually to each member of their several congregations for contributing to the cause of Ministerial Relief.
- 4. That you approve the envelope plan as the best yet devised for reaching all the people and securing the largest aggregate contributions.
- 5. That you insist on the appointment in each Presbytery of a Permanent Committee on Ministerial Relief, for want of which the Board is greatly hindered in its work.
- 6. We advise that, as formerly, you designate the third Sabbath in November as Sunday-school Ministerial Relief day, to be observed in exercises best adapted to training the children of the Church in loving service to the blessed Lord.
- 7. That you encourage the "box plan" and all proper methods of securing contributions to this cause, but urge that all gifts be reported to this Board, and in no case should assistance rendered to the needy at home be considered an excuse for failing to forward the regular collection to the Board

- 8. That you express your hearty approbation of the work of the Eldership. The Elders' Association held in connection with the meeting of the General Assembly is doing a good work in educating and awakening enthusiasm in this work. At the meeting on Saturday evening, May 18, Dr. J. B. Cowan was chosen President, and G. L. Gillum Secretary, and a meeting appointed for Saturday evening of the General Assembly of 1890.
- 9. We recommend that you give especial emphasis to the importance, nay, the absolute necessity for the exercise of the greatest possible care by the Presbyteries in recommending applicants for aid to this Board. This caution is all the more necessary now that the Board is able to extend help to an increased number.

Presbyteries should bear in mind that it is on the information which they furnish that the Board relies as a basis for the intelligent and just disbursement of funds, and through the Permanent Committee ascertain and communicate to the Board the exact facts as to the condition of the applicant, entering into details, and so conforming to the spirit as well as the letter of the form of application.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES.

The Committee on Overtures submitted a report, which was amended and adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Overtures respectfully report on the various subjects referred to them as follows:

- 1. We have considered an overture from Alabama Synod, asking that its boundary be so changed that the Synod shall include the whole of the State of Alabama. We recommend that this request be granted, and that the boundary of the Synod shall coincide with that of the State, so that it shall embrace the whole of the State of Alabama in its bounds, and also the Presbytery of Florida, and that this definition of the line be in force from and after the times that the Synods of Tennessee and Alabama shall plan in Presbyterial line those parts of Presbyteries cut off by this action, and that these Synods be directed to conform to the action of the General Assembly.
- 2. We have also considered the overtures from two Presbyteries in Illinois, asking that the Synod of that State be divided, and a new Synod be formed in the southern part of the State. We recommend that this request be not granted.
- 3. A memorial from Rocky Mountain Presbytery was referred to us, asking that it be transferred from the Synod of Missouri to the Synod of Kansas. We recommend that the above petition be granted, and that the transfer be hereby made as desired by the said Presbytery.

All of which is most respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was made the special order for 8 o'clock P.M. to-morrow, when the Rev. W. F. Crafts, D.D., of New York, shall be invited to address the General Assembly.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION.

The Committee on Publication submitted a report, which was amended and adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Publication would submit the following report:

We have carefully considered the questions submitted in connection with this important work. We find that your Board is making advancement, and some changes, which we trust will result in permanent good.

Rev. W. J. Darby, D.D., has resigned his position as member of the Board, and has been employed to fill the office of General Manager of your publishing interests. We recommend that you indorse this action, which we are assured, by the report of the Board, looks to economy in expenses, and to greater efficiency in work, and the circulation of all our publications.

Ruling Elder J. H. Zarecor, has been elected to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Dr. Darby. We recommend the confirmation of this appointment. We recommend also that you approve the election of Rev. M. B. DeWitt, D.D., as Superintendent and Editor in your Sunday-School Department.

We rejoice in the financial exhibit of the Board, which shows net profits of \$5,603.12, for the year just closed, and no debts to be paid. Let God be praised for such success.

A Quarterly Review in the interest of our beloved Zion, has been established. Two numbers have been issued. Its grade is high. Our Church should take hold of, and patronize liberally, this much desired and much needed magazine.

The Sunday-School Department is so interwoven with your publishing interests, that we recommend that henceforth you appoint no separate committee on Sunday-School work (or Publication,) but so combine these works (with Publication) that one committee shall be appointed to be called Committee on Publication and Sunday-School Work.

We are glad to note that the Board has made commendable progress in publishing books, and is proposing to make much greater advancement in this line. We think the plan to issue books in series, and otherwise, as proposed, a safe one, and should be encouraged.

We have a very special pleasure in reporting an abiding conviction that the plans of the Board bespeak a large and far-reaching circulation of all the excellent literature of the Church.

We have considered the memorial from Lexington Presbytery asking for the establishment of a Depository in the West, say Kansas City. We are of the opinion that the plan of the Board to appoint agents to sell our books in the different sections of the Church will meet all the demands of our people. We therefore think it better and more satisfactory to thoroughly test this plan before attempting to establish a Depository. We recommend, however, that the consideration of the matter contained in the memorial be referred to the Board and Lexington Presbytery for further consultation.

A memorial has been referred to us, asking that the Board be instructed to issue fifty-two copies of the *Cumberland Presbyterian* per annum instead of fifty. This has already been anticipated, by the decision of the Board to issue the number desired. Henceforth the Church will have the paper every week in the year.

As to the matter of a Publishing House the committee are of the opinion that prudence suggests that the Board should not now incur any very heavy liabilities in the furtherance of that enterprise, and the committee therefore recommend that during the current year, the Board go no further than to purchase a lot, if a suitable one can be obtained, at a reasonable price, utilizing in paying for the same a portion of the profits of the business, and also, if necessary, and deemed advisable, use by way of sale, any real estate owned by the Board.

In this connection, we recommend that the Communication from Evansville be referred to the Board of Publication at Nashville, with instructions to consider it in connection with all similar propositions from other cities.

Co-operation and patronage are the need of the Church. Every pastor in the bounds of the Church should be held and required to consider himself a representative of the cause of Publication and Sunday-School work, in the same sense that he is expected to represent the other general enterprises of the Church. As the Presbytery is directed to see that pastors and congregations make contributions regularly, to Missions, Education, and other enterprises, so the Presbytery should see that they co-operate with the publishing work of the Church, to the fullest possible extent in the circulation of its literature, requiring from them at each meeting a complete and detailed report on this subject.

We recommend that you urge extra and redoubled efforts to increase the circulation of the *Cumberland Presbyterian*, believing that paper to be the right arm of power, not only for the cause of publication, but for every other enterprise of the Church.

Trusting that the blessings of divine Providence may continue to rest upon this all-important interest, this report is most respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions submitted their report, which, with some amendments, was adopted, and is as follows:

Your Committee on Missions would present the following report:

The Church of Christ in its nature and aim is essentially progressive. It means conquest; the subjugation of the powers of sin and darkness, until Christ shall reign over all. It means particular and settled congregations,

as radiating centers, for the proclamation of truth, and the development of the whole man. It means that each individual member is one sent from his Master, a messenger of good news to his neighbor and to the world. The Church that loses sight of these things, and fails to emphasize them frequently and with power, has failed to eatch the spirit of the Master's commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel."

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church from the beginning has been preeminently a missionary Church. The fathers had the spirit and fire of those who walked and talked with Jesus. We, their sons, must have the same enthusiasm and progressiveness for conquest if we keep our Church full to the front in this missionary age.

Are we as a Church satisfied with the things of to-day? Nay, nay. The call that shall issue forth from this General Assembly will be the clarion call to duty and to better things, and it will be heeded as never before. Let the year before us be emphatically a missionary year throughout your bounds.

Your committee have had under serious consideration the most excellent Annual Report of the Board of Missions, together with many papers and resolutions from members of the General Assembly. Representatives from the different Boards of the Church, and from many of the missionary points in the Home department of the work have been in consultation with us. It is with gratitude to the Great Head of the Church that we recognize the progress of the work under the guidance of your Board during the past year. It is unmistakably a healthy progress; the foundations are being well laid, and the superstructure gives signs of becoming strong and permanent. In the Home work, especially, there are difficulties, obstacles, and perplexities, which require a patient waiting, a quiet endurance of misapprehension, and a skillful, judicious management, equaled by but few of the enterprises of the Church. We rejoice to know that as the Church at large is becoming enlightened upon the work of your Board, the pathway to success is the brighter, and that success is more assured

Your committee deeply regret that the receipts of the Board have not been greater during the year—only an increase of \$200 over the receipts of the year before, \$700 gain in the Home department, and \$500 loss in Foreign, while the expenditures have been much greater, thereby leaving a debt at the end of the year of over \$6,000. This necessity ought not to exist. For years the Church has been praying for God's blessing upon the labors of our missionaries. For years she has been crying to him for the former and latter rains, in order that the seed might spring up and bring forth fruit manifold. And surely now, when he is so graciously answering her prayers, the Church will not draw back and long refuse to provide the means necessary to cancel this indebtedness, and to gather the abundant harvests that whiten with promise in every direction. The debt is not an embarrassment; it should be an inspiration. The Church must sound the call here with wonderful force and clearness. The Church has the money; the Board must have it to prosecute its work.

We are gratified to be able to state that the several city missions under the care of the Board have made substantial progress during the year. By referring to the Annual Report of the Board, you will find the salient feat ures of this forward movement. It is to be regretted that the financial condition of the Board has been of such a character that more cities in the South, South-west, West, and North-west, have not been occupied. This important matter was emphasized by the last General Assembly (see page 18 of the Minutes). We desire simply to re-affirm that deliverance, and earnestly impress it upon the attention of the church, that these important centers of population and influence, must be entered by the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. The trend of the Presbyterian world is toward our system of doctrine; let us meet then where men do congregate, and stand forward in the very forefront of the battle for Christ and the world. Money and methods are but helps to courage and life.

Just here we desire to call your attention to Holton, Kansas, to Quaker City within the bounds of Muskingum Presbytery, and to the cities of the Pacific slope, as worthy of consideration and help, at as early a time as is practicable.

In reference to the Indian work, we recommend that the Mission school conducted by Rev. J. H. Dickerson, be encouraged in all legitimate undertakings; that the young men preparing for the ministry, under the care of that Presbytery are expected to attend that school in order to be taught the English language; and that Brother Dickerson prosecute his work among the Indians as vigorously as possible, and that the Board of Missions give him the aid, advice, and direction they may deem best.

That the school and Mission among the Cherokee Indians, under the guidance of Rev. N. J. Crawford, be continued, and efforts be made to overcome the difficulties with which it is surrounded, and that re-inforcements be sent at as early a period as is practicable. To more efficiently accomplish the work of said Mission, it is recommended that Hogan Institute and its appurtenances be transferred by sale to the Woman's Board of Missions, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made between all the parties concerned.

It is with pleasure we call your attention to the work in Japan and Mexico. The missionaries are at their posts of duty, comparatively strong in health, and full of courage and hope. These countries are opening up wonderfully for the spread of the gospel of Christ, and we shall lose ground terribly if we do not speedily send re-inforcements to these fields of labor. We send words of congratulation and encouragement to these our distant laborers, that they not only have our prayers and sympathy, but shall have at the earliest possible moment assistance in missionaries and money.

It is also with pleasure that we call your attention to the work of the Woman's Board of Missions during the past year. The recent Annual Meeting at Lebanon, Tenn., was the most successful in its history. We confidently expect that the year to come will see this work advancing all along the line, and that these "helpers in every good word and work, will even surpass themselves." That is the teaching of their history and of their indomitable spirit. We would most cordially commend this Board and its work to the sympathy and co-operation of all pastors and churches, and express the hope that the number of auxiliary societies may be very greatly increased.

We rejoice also that the Church-erection interest, under the fostering care of your Board, has been pushed with so much energy and success. The financial exhibit is good, and we hope that it is but the foundation of a noble work for the future in our beloved Zion. Permanent church homes are absolutely necessary for the healthy growth of our missionary efforts. Young and enterprising congregations, animated by a true spirit, and guided by lofty motives seek to settle down in a church home as quickly as possible, and often under the heaviest difficulties and severest privations a little help sets them on their feet, allies them in abiding sympathy with the whole church, and they will be enabled to become strong rallying points for the Master. Encourage the agent as he comes to you with his heart and mind full of this important subject.

The work of the whole field seems to demand the following recommendations from your committee:

- 1. We recommend that you confirm the action of the Board in the appointment of Rev. J. V. Stephens as Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Missions.
- 2. That you set apart the first Sabbath in February as a day for preaching, prayer, and giving for Home Missions, and that the first Sabbath in July be designated as the day for the same services in the behalf of Foreign Missions.
- 3. That you order that the Presbyteries be required to have the churches within their bounds, take collections during the quarter set apart for Home and Foreign Missions, and that they see that their order is enforced.
- 4. That the Sabbath-Schools of the Churches are asked to give one collection per month each to the cause of Missions, during their quarter for Home and Foreign. The pastors and superintendents are hereby requested to co-operate in the carrying out of this request.
- 5. The Stated Clerks or Presbyterial Secretaries for Missions, are expected to be in correspondence with each Church in their respective Presbyteries, to forward to the Corresponding Secretary all data concerning the work of Missions within their jurisdiction; to keep a strict account of the amount of all moneys given to Foreign, Home and local work, and forward a statement of the same to the Secretary of the Board.
- 6. That the *Missionary Record* and *Banner*, be strongly commended to the whole Church as an educating force in the work and practice of Christian Missions. One cause for the lethargy of our Church in the work of Missions, is the ignorance of many of our people on the subject. Nothing will arouse an enthusiasm for the cause more quickly than the presence of these excellent papers in the homes of the Church. We indorse the action of the Board in issuing the *Missionary Record* in pamphlet form, and hope for it a large circulation, and an increasing power for good.
- 7. That additional Missionaries be sent to Japan and Mexico as rapidly as the Board may find ways and means for sending them. Great barriers are melting away, and these countries are rapidly opening for the advance of the Christian missionary. If we are faithful as a Church to the trusts assigned us here, the result will be grand even in our time.
- 8. That, if in the judgment of the two Boards of Missions, it is deemed best, that an appropriation, at an early date, be set aside for the building

of a Ladies' Home at Osaka, Japan, this General Assembly will heartily concur in the same.

- 9. That the Board of Missions in connection with State Synods, be requested to take under advisement the propriety of appointing State Superintendents, or Secretaries; to be accountable directly to the Board, or, through the Synod to the Board. The work in the South, South-west, West, and North-west, and even in the older States demand a closer watch and work than the intelligent, vigilant officers of your Board can possibly give to them.
- 10. If the finances of the Board will admit of it, we urge the appointment of an additional Secretary, so that one of these officers can be in the field all, or, nearly all, of the time.
- 11. That the establishment of a training-school for students in Theology in Japan, be left entirely to the wisdom of your Board and to the judgment of our missionaries in that distant empire.
- 12. That Rev. E. G. McLean, of Walla Walla, W. T., be appointed to preach the Missionary sermon at the next meeting of the General Assembly, and that Rev. W. Benton Farr, of Athens, Ala., be his alternate.
- 13. That in view of the magnitude of the work, we call the attention of the men and women of means of our Church to the propriety of, and what to them, should be esteemed a most precious privilege, the giving of large individual offerings directly, or, by the way of legacies, to the cause of Missions. This is a most laudable method of wise and liberal benevolence, and we would heartily commend it as a means by which they may leave their works to follow them here when they have been called to their reward above.
- 14. Your committee would emphasize strongly the plan of giving one collection each quarter to our own Board. It is a most pleasant privilege to be able to assist the Woman's Missionary Societies in our Churches to collect money to further woman's work for women. May the God of Missions bless them! But remember the vast importance of our own work, and that every dollar we can send to the Board is needed, and will be wisely used in sustaining its interests.
- 15. That the work on the Pacific slope demands our hearty sympathies, eo-operation, and prayers. They are brave and loyal sons of the Church. They are bone of our bone, and flesh of our flesh. They must remember that, although the mountain hides them from our view, yet they are not forgotten. We commend them, through you, to all Churches.
- 16. That this General Assembly indorse the action of the Board of Missions in calling for \$50,000 for Home and Foreign Missions for the ensuing year. That the Board be directed to apportion said amount among the Presbyteries, according to the ability of the latter, and that the Permanent Committee on Missions of each Presbytery apportion their respective parts of this amount to the several congregations of their Presbyteries. Or, in the absence of such committee, that the Moderator, Stated Clerk, and Board's Corresponding Secretary of the Presbytery be regarded as a committee to make this apportionment, and see that their part thereof be raised by the congregation.

And, now, in conclusion, we would make this appeal: There are a large number of our Churches that give nothing to the cause of Missions. Some of these are very feeble, and others are practically extinct. Many of them have indeed a hard struggle to keep up services even for a part of the time. Still, of those who give nothing for Missions, many are hardly so poor as they think they are; and it is a question whether they would not be richer in every way if they remembered others, and did not spend every thing on themselves. Christ says, "If ye love me, keep my commandments." His command to his people is that they should give the gospel to those who do not have it. No one is exempted from aiding in this work because he is poor. No Church can be excused from giving anything because it is poor. Paul commends the Churches of Macedonia, because "their deep poverty abounded unto the riches of their liberality." Some of the most liberal givers to Missions are found among the converts to the gospel in heathen lands. There is no poverty in our country like the poverty of these converts. Yet they give for the spread of the gospel that has brought them so much joy. As one of them said who brought a tenth of his income to give to the Lord, "Nine rupees with God's blessing are better than ten rupees without it."

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church is gaining slowly in its missionary work. But it is wofully behind its obligation, behind its ability, behind the call of God's providence, behind the judgment of its own highest Church Court. The minds of the poor and rich must be stirred up to a larger liberality. Let this be the watchword of the ministry and of the Church papers during the coming year. The test of a willingness to give for missionary work is fast getting to be one of the foremost tests of a true conversion of the heart to God. A Christian's money, be it great or small, should be consecrated to the service of the Master. When this is truly done, then the calls of our Board for help would be fully and instantly satisfied.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance submitted a majority and a minority report, the further consideration of which was made the special order for 2.30 o'clock P.M. to-morrow.

The General Assembly then adjourned till 9 o'clock A.M. to-morrow, and closed with prayer.

SIXTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY, May 22, 9 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met, and was opened with prayer. One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

REPORT OF JOINT COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS AND EDUCATION.

The Joint Committee on Missions and Education presented the following report, which was adopted:

Moderator and Brethren:—Your Committee on Education and Missions, to whom was referred the communication of Rev. H. A. Gibson, Principal of the Bowling Green (Ky) School for colored people, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have carefully considered the contents of the paper, and believe that this General Assembly, in whose Board of Directors is vested the property rights in the School, should refund Rev. H. A. Gibson such sums of money as he has paid for the improvements on the property and on teachers' salaries, aggregating, perhaps, \$287; and that the School's needs imperatively demand that additional room should be provided for it as soon as possible.

We, therefore, recommend that this General Assembly take steps to raise at some time within its present session the amount of \$2,300 in cash and pledges, to be placed in the hands of a Board of Control of the Cumberland Presbyterian School for Colored People, at Bowling Green, Ky., and that this Board be instructed to disburse the same in the liquidation of the School's indebtedness to the Rev. H. A. Gibson, and in the erection of such additions to the building at present occupied by the School as its wants may require, and that the Rev. S. H. Buchanan be appointed to present th's matter to the General Assembly, and raise the amount recommended.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Three o'clock this P.M. was fixed as the hour for taking the collection recommended in the foregoing report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE HYMN AND TUNE BOOK.

The following report of the Hymn and Tune Book Committee was presented and unanimously adopted:

The Special Committee to whom was referred the report of the Committee to prepare a Hymn Book for the use of the Church submit the following:

Your committee appointed at the meeting of the General Assembly May, 1888, have given the work intrusted to their hands much time, labor, and careful consideration, and merit the grateful acknowledgement of the whole Church.

Prof. J. I. D. Hinds, and Revs. M. B. DeWitt and J. M. Hubbert, members of the committee on whose report we were appointed to act; Mr. J. M. Gaut, President of the Board of Publication, and W. J. Darby, D.D., Superintendent of the Publishing House, have been called before us, and after the most attentive consideration of all the facts at our command, it is recommended that the General Assembly adopt the recommendation of the committee upon whose report we are required to submit an opinion, and that the Committee to Prepare and Submit a Hymn Book be continued—required to complete its work and place the Hymn Book presented in its report in the hands of the Board of Publication, to be issued in accordance with the contract submitted to this General Assembly.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education submitted the following report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Education desire to emphasize before the General Assembly, and through its members before the whole Church, the very great importance of our educational institutions, and to urge Cumberland Presbyterians to foster and support them with their influence, their patronage, and their money. Our schools are in great need both of buildings and endowment, and we feel that the Church has not yet become fully alive to the paramount importance of education as an essential factor in its success as one of the great Christian instrumentalities in the evangelization of the world.

BOARD OF FDUCATION.

We call especial attention to the encouraging report made by this Board. We think that their zeal and activity are to be highly commended, and that their methods are admirable. Their financial exhibit is clear and satisfactory. We recommend:

1. That the action of the Board in setting apart fifty per cent. of return loans as a permanent fund be approved.

2. That marriage by a candidate or licentiate after beginning his candidacy shall operate as a bar to receiving aid from the Board.

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- 3. That the standing Educational Committee in the Presbytery be a committee appointed for the year, so that they may at all times be familiar with the work of the Board and of their candidates.
- 4. That the manner of disbursing the funds and the class of persons aided be left to the discretion of the Board.
- 5. That all moneys raised for purposes within the scope of this Board be sent to the Board, provided that the parties contributing may, if they choose, indicate the direction in which the contribution shall be applied.

CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY.

We note with peculiar pleasure the excellent report made by the Board of Trustees of Cumberland University, and we desire to heartily indorse all which has been said in regard to it in the report of the Committee on Theological Seminaries.

We further recommend that the General Assembly indorse the proposition of the Trustees to erect a new building for the use of the Literary and Theological Schools, and urge the Church to give them its hearty support in this enterprise.

We further recommend that this General Assembly now, at this sitting, raise in cash and pledges the \$2,000 needed for the erection of a building to be used as Dormitories near Divinity Hall, and that the Rev. W. J. Darby, D.D., be designated as the man to present the matter to the General Assembly and raise the money.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Recognizing the need of enlightenment upon the subject of Ministerial Education, we recommend that a sermon be preached before the next General Assembly on this subject at such time as the General Assembly may appoint. We nominate for this purpose the Rev. W. S. Danley, D.D., of Lincoln, Ill., with the Rev. J. W. Fitzgerald, of Lebanon, Tenn., as alternate.

WEDNESDAY, May 22, 2.30 o'clock P.M.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Majority and Minority reports of the Committee on Temperance were taken up, and the Minority report was adopted as follows:

We submit the following as the Minority Report on Temperance:

From the earliest history of the world intemperance has been an evil to be deplored. The Jewish Talmud teaches that the vine was watered with the blood of unclean beasts, and hence the evil in it.

The traffic in alcoholic drinks is an evil viewed from every stand-point—social, political, intellectual, moral, and religious. The Church can not sit supinely by and see it do its deadly work in all of these respects and not enter its protest. It is to-day debauching public conscience, destroying manhood and womanhood, bringing poverty, shame, degradation, and death to thousands of our race, menacing the very existence of our government and our cherished institutions, and is the great obstruction to the progress of the Church.

The question is upon us to-day whether the Lord is God, or whether Bacchus is God, whether Jesus Christ is King, or whether Gambrinus is king. The evil is increasing. There is more alcoholic liquor drunk to-day, per capita, than at any time before. In 1861 there were drunk in the United States, per capita, 6.43 gallons. In 1887 there were 12.63 gallons drunk. This increase, when we consider the increase of population, is appalling, and shows that the means that have been used have been failures as far as even diminishing the consumption of rum is concerned, and the way it is sold and drunk has increased the crime produced thereby. In view of these facts we submit the following:

Resolved, 1. That nothing short of constitutional and statutory prohibition of the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors, as beverages, by the United States and the several States will be satisfactory, and to this end we will pray and work.

- 2. That admitting that it is a crime, "it can not be legalized without sin." It can not be licensed without legalizing it, therefore to vote for license is sin.
- 3. That the manufacture of and dealing in, or in any way favoring such dealing (this includes revenue officers, such as gaugers, storekeepers, etc.), is inconsistent with the Christian character, and should receive Church discipline.
- 4. That we, as a Church, stand squarely and unequivocally in favor of Prohibition, and hereby pledge ourselves to aid in every laudable enterprise that in any way looks to the overthrow of the accursed liquor traffic, now licensed and protected by the general government and most of the States.
- 5. That we congratulate the noble women in their grand work in suppressing this evil and bid them God-speed.
- 6. That notwithstanding the fearful increase of intemperance in the land, we have reason to thank God and take courage, on account of the awakening of public conscience on the subject, and the decided action taken upon it, which we believe will finally triumph.

In conclusion, we believe the day is not far distant when, under God, the Church will demand the absolute abolition of the liquor traffic in a way that it will be heard and heeded in the halls of legislation.

This report is to be considered as advocating the principles of Prohibition, and not as an indorsement of any political party.

Your Committee on Temperance submit the following:

That the records of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church throughout its judicatories, from the Session to the General Assembly, are uniform in their condemnation of intemperance and in their encouragement of temperance. So full and so uniform has been this testimony that it is only necessary again to voice these sentiments in action by this body. The evil of intemperance is so great, and its ruinous effects are felt so far and wide, that every lover of souls and of good society is constrained, by the highest possible motives, to use every legitimate means not only to beat it back, but to destroy its power forever.

It is the opinion of your committee, however, that in our zeal for the overthrow of this foe to the purity and happiness of home, and to the peace and safety of society, we are apt to lose sight of the fact that the power which can reform individuals, and through them reform society, is the power of God's grace upon human hearts. We therefore recommend:

- 1. That you reiterate the uniform sentiment of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church as unalterably opposed to all forms of intemperance, especially that of the use of intoxicants as a beverage.
- 2. That you urge the ministers and people of your church, in their undying opposition to the accursed cup and to the infamous traffic by which it is held to the lips of the people, while they use all other legitimate means to overcome this evil, to rely not so much upon the success of secular movements as upon the power of the gospel, the only power guaranteed to the Church for the uplifting of the world, the purification of society, and the salvation of men.

TO LENGTHEN THE TIME OF THE SESSIONS.

The following resolution was presented by Rev. S. H. Braley, and adopted:

WHEREAS, The work necessary to be done by the General Assembly has become greatly enlarged, requiring much more time for the proper consideration of the interests of the Church coming before it than was necessary n former years; therefore

Resolved, That this General Assembly is of the opinion that the length of time usually occupied by its proceedings should be considerably lengthened; also, that the Presbyteries in electing Commissioners to the next General Assembly should take this deliverance into account, and only such should be sent to the General Assembly as will be willing to remain over a second Sabbath, if necessary, and until the business of the General Assembly shall be fully completed; also, that the Presbyteries be enjoined to require a strict account of Commissioners in the matter of remaining till the close of the General Assembly's proceedings.

The General Assembly took recess till 8 o'clock P.M.

Wednesday, May 22, 8 o'clock P.M.

COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was taken up, and the Rev. W. F. Crafts, D.D., of New York, addressed the General Assembly. Further consideration of the report was deferred till to-morrow morning.

The General Assembly then adjourned till 9 o'clock to-morrow morning, and closed with prayer.

SEVENTH DAY.

THURSDAY, May 23, 9 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met, and was opened with prayer. One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

ALTERNATE COMMISSIONER.

Rev. J. W. Morrow, of Lexington Presbytery, took his seat as Alternate, the Principal, Rev. Taylor Bernard, having returned home.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was taken up, and adopted as follows:

The Christian Sabbath is inseparably connected with Christian civilization, and nothing higher than semi-civilization is found outside of Christianity.

The primary idea of the Sabbath is rest.

Work is a necessity, but not work without cessation. Neither is this rest to be the luxury of a favored few, but the right and duty of all.

Much honor is due the Puritan fathers for their testimony in behalf of Sabbath observance, when royalty so recklessly attempted to make the day an occasion of revelry. Though it be said that their teachings were Pharisaical, it must be admitted that their seeming austerity gave England and Scotland such a Sabbath as is described in "Cotter's Saturday Night."

The value of the Lord's day in its secular and civil aspects, can not be duly estimated without taking into consideration that it is a special season divinely prescribed for private and public worship.

How can this necessary and divine institution be preserved?

- 1. By individually observing it according to God's word.
- 2. By persistently teaching the children and youth the claims of the Sabbath, and by bearing our testimony in its favor in the communities in which we live.
- 3. By outspoken condemnation of the selfish and avaricious uses of this day by corporations and individuals in constraining their employees to labor seven days in the week; and by stern reproof of the numerous other habits of Sabbath desecration, so much to be deplored, especially in our large cities, notably, base-ball playing, opening of saloons, beer gardens, places of amusement, and trade and distributing newspapers, and reading secular matter.

We have had under consideration the report of your Permanent Committee on Sabbath Observance, and recommend that five representatives be commissioned to the American Sabbath Union, and that they shall be selected by the Moderator and Stated Clerk at pleasure, and that your Permanent Committee be discharged.

We further recommend:

- 1. Approval of State Conventions in the interest of this cause, and that each Synod be advised to appoint a committee of two, to co-operate with committees of other religious bodies in arranging for such conventions.
- 2. Expressions of sympathy with the petition to Congress, for a law against Sabbath work, so far as the jurisdiction of the general government extends.
- 3. That the literature of the American Sabbath Union, especially its standard monthly documents, be commended.

We have learned with pleasure that Rev. Wilbur F. Crafts, Field Secretary of the American Sabbath Union, will visit the General Assembly before adjournment, and we recommend that he be invited to address us at an hour to be designated.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY.

The Committee on Judiciary presented a report, which was adopted as follows:

Your Committee on Judiciary beg leave to make the following report, to wit:

We have carefully examined all the papers and all the evidence coming before us in the matter of complaint of White Rock Presbytery. The matter of consolidation of Synods in the State of Texas into one Synod and making same a delegated body having been fully and satisfactorily settled, it is unnecessary to notice action upon these points. It remains to notice alone the action of the consolidated Synod upon the question of basis of representation. The Constitution (See Article 35), provides that "The Synod may at its own option and with the consent of a majority of its Presbyteries be composed either of all the ordained ministers and one ruling elder from each congregation within its bounds, or of equal delegations of ministers and ruling elders selected by the Presbyteries upon a basis and in a ratio determined in like manner by the Synod and its Presbyteries." The consent of a majority of the Presbyteries composing the Synod, then is necessary, in order to make the Synod a delegated body and to establish a basis of representation.

In the case before us this requirement of the Constitution has not been complied with as to basis of representations, a majority of the Presbyteries composing Texas Synod not having consented to the basis of representation as agreed upon by said Synod. It is therefore the opinion of your committee that the action of the Synod in fixing the basis of representation was illegal, and said action should be reversed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO VISIT CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY.

The Committee appointed at the last meeting of the General Assembly to visit Cumberland University, submitted the following report, which was adopted:

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

Your Committee appointed to visit Cumberland University, make the following reports:

Owing to circumstances over which the committee had no control, only two members of the committee attended, J. L. Cooper, at the close of last session, and H. D. Onyett, at the close of the present, and we make the following report with the concurrence of two other members now present, Drs. Sprowls and Green:

To any true lover of the Church, such a visit could not be less than an inspiration to future work for so noble an institution, located in the midst of so noble and generous a people. Shut in, as it is, by the beautiful Lebanon cedar groves, with the pure limestone water gushing up in its very midst, and surrounded by homes, the impersonation of hospitality, grace, beauty, and intellectuality, it can not fail to impress every true lover of education with the fact that God, by his Spirit, pointed out Lebanon as his chosen location for the school of the prophets.

The thorough organization of the schools and the harmony of their working order can not fail to strike the eye of the most casual observer; and when we look upon the faces of the noble band of men called together there, by the Great Head of the Church, we would be astonished to find it otherwise.

The bright, intelligent, faces of the young men, and their ease of delivery when called before an audience, gave evidence of earnest work during the session just closing; and the appropriate and beautifully delivered five

minute responses of the sixty-two young gentlemen who took degrees, attested mental and artistic training, worthy of such masters as there serve the Church and the State; and the social and intellectual feasts in the parlors, and the feasts of other good things in the dining-rooms of the refined and cultured citizens of Lebanon, at their evening receptions, declared, as words could not, the warm feelings that existed between the citizens and students, and showed that Cumberland University is not only a school, but that Lebanon is a suitable home for our young men and women while being educated.

A detailed statement of the entire organization of the University, we deem out of place here; but suffice it to say the organization is thorough, embracing eight schools outside of the preparatory department, each of these with a curriculum that ranks high among the great schools of the age, and each chair filled by a man worthy of the confidence of those desiring a thorough education. One could scarce fail to be delighted with the location and surroundings of Divinity Hall; and we feel assured that God will bless the noble efforts of our Presbyteries that are fitting up and furnishing rooms, and making them so cozy and comfortable for their young men in this Hall.

Every room in that consecrated building should be taken at once by the Presbyteries and made comfortable homes for their probationers; and when these are all taken another building should be erected with suitable rooms, and these furnished, until every Presbytery in the Church can have a home for its probationers while in College and Seminary.

This could be easily done by concert of action. Let us say twenty Presbyteries raise their pro rata share for constructing a house of twenty rooms, with dining room and kitchen attached; then let each furnish its own room, and their probationers could board there as cheaply as they can live at home, say for six dollars per month, as they are now doing. Many of them could then, as some are now doing, take their classical course at a nominal cost. This would bring many of our young men, who now have poor advantages, into the bosom of a refined community, and under the tuition of thoroughly competent instructors.

Our Theological School, connected, as it is, with the University, has a great advantage over one disconnected from such a system of schools. While it has its own grand old Murdock Library and its own society, its students have access to the library and literary societies of the University. And then, the large attendance of literary and law students opens up a little world for Christian work for our young men which keeps their spiritual natures alive by contact with the dying around them. Our noble Theological Faculty there evidently hold the affections of our young men, and if one would know how he has only to look upon the worn and weary expression upon every face in testimony of the arduous and constant work performed for their advancement.

The beautiful and original charts found in their class-rooms, impressed us with the idea of originality in their methods of instruction; and their carefully written lectures testified to their earnest and thorough determination to impress their own ideas, as well as those of others, upon the minds of our young men. The kind and fatherly care exercised over our young

men by Dr. Kirkpatrick particularly impressed us. While all the faculty seem all they can be to them while there, the Doctor's location near them, perhaps, causes them to look to him more; and we left there with impressions of the grandeur of his work of sympathy, council, and supervision in their dear old Hall that called to mind Elisha in his superintendence of the school of the Prophets. A man sometimes does a work almost unconsciously, while his great soul goes out after young men thrown off from home and loved ones, which costs him but little thought, and not much more labor, but which makes an impress deeper and more lasting than all the literary labors of his life. These combined in the life and labors of that good man will hand his name down to the next generation with a perfume around it sweeter than that exhaled from the beautiful cedars of Lebanon.

We can heartily say to our Presbyteries: when you put your young men preparing for the ministry under the tuition of such a Faculty, presided over by the worthy son of "The Tall Man of Winton," you are doing a noble work for yourselves and for the entire Church; and we fondly hope to live to see young men there from every Presbytery in the Church, living in their own rooms, with an endowment fund sufficient in the hands of the Board to furnish them tuition and all appliances necessary for the completion of as thorough a course of education as can be obtained on this continent. The financial statement appended, furnished by Judge E. E. Beard, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, will give all wishing to know the financial status of the University at the close of last year the desired information.

The financial affairs of the University are certainly in safe hands, as the papers of Judge Beard show all the care that can be exercised by a lawyer who knows the statutes of the State, and all the legal technicalities of binding processes. One can not fail to see from a careful examination of the papers of the Treasurer that any moneys donated to that institution will be carefully guarded, and handed down to coming generations as directed by the donors. The perishable real estate taken as security is required to be guarded by fire policy, secured to the University; and all the points of loss are kept covered as far as human foresight and ingenuity can guard them.

We respectfully ask your serious attention to the following items:

- 1. It is a gratifying fact that the attendance in the various departments of the school is greater than for many previous years, more especially so in the Theological Department.
- 2 We were pleased to observe the enthusiasm of students and professors in prosecuting their respective work and the earnest purpose of most of the probationers for the ministry to secure thorough preparation for their holy calling—their high vocation.
- 3. It is the ardent desire and almost universal voice of the Theological students that the course of study be arranged for three scholastic years of seven months each instead of two years of nine months each as at present.
- 4. We would emphasize the recommendation of the General Assembly's Committee on Theological Seminary one year ago "that the number of professors and the facilities of instruction in the Seminary be increased as soon as practicable," two additional professors being greatly needed now.
- 7. We take special pleasure in reporting to your body that the utmost harmony, good feeling, and mutual confidence seem to exist among all parties connected with the institution—between students and professors, and professors and trustees.
- 6. It is confidently believed that the institution deserves the patronage and support of the entire Church, and that the day is near when we shall turn with just pride to that school amply endowed and furnishing every facility for the culture and training of our young men.
- 7. We would call special attention to the fact that a *library fund* is needed to procure valuable new books which are being issued in such variety and abundance from the press of the present day.
- 8. We were pleased to note the interest of the theological students in the annual course of lectures delivered by your very faithful and efficient servants, Doctors Bell, Darby, and Hubbert.
- 9. It is the earnest and sincere desire of the Professors at Lebanon that you appoint a committee who shall visit the institution at intervals during the collegiate year to observe the methods of instruction and administration of the affairs in the institution.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARIES.

The following report of the Committee on Theological Seminaries, was adopted:

Your Committee on Theological Seminaries would respectfully report the following:

The relations of the only Theological Seminary of the Church—the one at Lebanon, Tenn.—are set forth in the Minutes of the General Assembly of 1852, when by an act of that General Assembly this School of Theology was created. In order to understand fully the duties of the General Assembly with reference to this school, and its obligations to the General Assembly, we quote the following from the Minutes of said General Assembly of 1852:

"Each professor before entering upon the duties of his office shall solemnly adopt, in such form as the General Assembly may prescribe, the Cumberland Presbyterian Confession of Faith and Form of Government."

"That the theology taught in the school may be subject to the judgment of the General Assembly. It shall be the duty of the Professor of Systematic Theology to write out his lectures to the classes, and when required he shall submit them to the examination of the Board, or a committee of the General Assembly."

"Professors, as other ministers, will still be amenable to the Presbytery for immorality or heresy, but for their official character they shall be amenable to the General Assembly, and upon recommendation of the Board or a committee of the General Assembly, they shall be subject to removal for incompetency, gross neglect of official duty, or such irregularity in deportment, or error in doctrine as shall render their continuance in office detrimental to the interests of the school"

Under these safeguards thrown around this school where the religious teachers of the Church are to be educated in the doctrines, which, according to the faith of the Church, are taught in the Holy Scriptures, the confidence of the whole Church is secured in patronage and money and property, and this school should be held as a sacred trust and gnarded with a jealous eye by the General Assembly, which is made the executor on behalf of the Church of this trust. To be efficient in gathering around it ample funds for its endowment and enlargement and a large patronage of the rising ministry of the Church, it needs to have the confidence of the whole Church, and therefore the necessity of adherence to the provisions of the organic law by which the school was created. The importance of this school can not be too highly estimated. The young ministers of to-day are to be, in a large measure, the leaders in the religious, the intellectual, and the social life of the age that is quickened by the mighty forces that are moving upon it. We would not be true to history if we did not claim that the Church's leaders have been foremost in the great movements of the past for the higher civilization, the better culture, the purer morality that society has attained. This is an age of quickened thought, of intellectual forces strongly combined, of increasing intelligence among the masses, and the times like these demand ministers of broader culture than any period of the past. They must not only keep abreast of those of the best thought, but they must go in advance of them. Men of every profession are now being trained—the lawyer, the doctor, the teacher—in schools adapted to these professions and furnishing them qualification in the line of their work, and it is even more important that ministers should be trained for their work. It is the duty of the Church, therefore, to furnish a well-equipped school for the training of the rising ministry of the Church. Your committee report with pleasure that the school is in a more prosperous condition than ever before. There are now thirty-six young men in the Theological Department, and a still larger number in the Literary Department. There are eighty-one young ministers in the two departments of the University—Literary and Theological.

It is encouraging also to report that two professors in the Theological Department receive a salary this year twice as large as two years ago. We are glad to learn that each professor will receive this year a salary of twelve hundred dollars. We have great reason to rejoice and to be grateful to God for the large increase through the labors of the efficient Agent, the Rev. J. S. Grider, of the endowment fund of this department. As this is the only enterprise of the kind in the Church, and as the endowment of this department is important and pressing, your committee recommend the continuance of Rev. J. S. Grider as agent, and urge upon our people in every State to invite him among them and give him a hearty co-operation in raising the necessary funds. There are those in every part of the Church who would give to this cause, and whose gifts would not probably lessen the amounts that would be given to any other enterprise of the Church, and your committee would urge upon our people everywhere in the bounds of the Church to give him without delay an opportunity to raise this fund. This endowment completed and better facilities secured for the training of a larger number of our young men, would open the way to the speedier success of other Church enterprises. Let the united prayers of the Church go up to our heavenly Father for the speedy completion of this

There is a very great demand for the services of another professor in this department, and it is hoped the means will soon be provided for this purpose.

As we learn from the report of the Board of Trustees that all the rooms in Divirity Hall are full, and as the Trustees ask for a building of eight or ten rooms, which would cost about two thousand dollars, your committee recommend that you make an earnest appeal to the friends of this Seminary to furnish the means necessary to complete the desired building.

We also recommend that an effort be made as soon as practicable to secure from fifty to seventy-five thousand dollars to erect a suitable building for the Literary and Theological Departments of Cumberland University at Lebanon, Tenn. The committee are of the opinion that the Church, so long in love with our own institution at Lebanon, Tenn., around which so many hallowed associations cluster, will take pleasure in the very dust and stones of a grand building commensurate with the wants and character of our beloved Zion. Such a building will be an enduring monument of the piety and the zeal and the intelligence of the Church that will stand in

silent, but strong, appeal to the love and pride of Cumberland Presbyterians as long as that name is dear to men. Let us erect such a building amid the cedars of our beloved Lebanon that its glory will be far greater than the first.

With the greatly increasing facilities of our Theological Seminary, we urge all our probationers to avail themselves of the opportunity afforded them to acquire theological training.

It may not be out of place to say that in Trinity University, at Tehuacana, Texas, there is a chair of Homileties known as the "Aston Chair," which, while it does not even point in the direction of the establishment of another Theological School in the Church, still affords some opportunities for young men who may attend that Institution. There are quite a number of young men preparing for the ministry who receive some special attention in Bethel College, Lincoln University, and Waynesburg, and we commend these and other institutions, which, in co-operation with our Theological School at Lebanon, are giving advantages or assistance to probationers for the ministry.

Your committee recommend that the Trustees in their Annual Report hereafter give the audited report of the financial condition of the Theological Department of the University.

FUNDS TO ERECT DORMITORIES AT LEBANON, TENNESSEE.

The special order was taken up, and Rev. W. J. Darby took the floor to raise money for a new building at Lebanon, Tennessee, to be used as dormitories by the Theological students, whereupon the amount of \$2,000.00 was secured in Presbyterial and individual pledges, for said object.

COMMITTEE ON SABBATH-SCHOOLS.

The report of the Committee on Sabbath-Schools was taken up, pending the consideration of which the General Assembly took recess till 2 o'clock P.M.

THURSDAY, May 23, 2 o'clock P.M.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH-SCHOOLS.

The General Assembly continued the discussion of the report of the Committee on Sabbath-Schools, which was amended and adopted as follows:

Your committee submit the following report:

We are pleased to report a very great increase of activity in this department of the work of the Church. Our people seem to be waking up to the importance of this work, and are manifesting a good degree of zeal and aggressiveness.

We offer a few recommendations:

I. SABBATH-SCHOOL GOVERNMENT.

We recommend that this General Assembly emphasize to the Presbyteries, and through them to the congregations, the fact that all Sabbath-Schools should be under the care of Church Sessions, and that the Sessions should assume and maintain the control of the schools.

II. SABBATII-SCHOOL BENEVOLENCE.

- (1) We recommend that you call upon all the Sabbath-Schools to contribute systematically to the general enterprises of the Church.
- (2) As to "Children's Day"—the first Sunday in June—your committee would urge its general observance, with the use of the prepared programme, and that generous offerings be made by all the people, old and young, for the Sabbath-School cause. There ought to be thousands of dollars gathered on that day, for the extension of the work in every direction. We recommend that you indorse the views of the Board of Publication as set forth in the Sabbath-School department of its report, regarding the importance of a large fund for this work, and that you approve the plans suggested for the uses to be made of said fund.
- (3) We also recommend that you insist upon it that Sabbath-Schools be taught to contribute on Bible principles, and to ignore all clap-trap methods of raising money for the Lord's treasury.

III. TEMPERANCE.

In view of the fearful havor being made by the liquor traffic, your committee would recommend that Sabbath-Schools should take high ground upon this subject. Let the children be taught that the liquor traffic is the inveterate enemy of man, that they are to hate the saloon and fight it, and that it is a disgrace for any body to make, buy, sell, or use intoxicating liquors as a beverage.

IV. LITERATURE.

Your committee would have you emphasize the oft-repeated recommendation that Sabbath-Schools use our own literature, not only that our Publishing interests may be sustained, but also that our children may be educated in our own doctrines. It is suggested that as soon as practical, one or two Child's Scripture questions be inserted in each issue of Our Lambs, and questions from the Catechism in Lesson Leaf and Rays of Light.

V. CONVENTIONS, INSTITUTES, ETC.

This is an age of conventions, conferences, and institutes. We recommend that our schools should be kept in the front rank in these matters. Let attention be given to State Conventions, let different sections of the Church arrange for District Conventions, and let the Presbyteries, at each meeting, hold wide-awake Sabbath-School institutes, thus bringing out the best methods of aggressive work.

We mention teachers' meetings as of primary importance in this connection. We ask that you urge the Presbyteries to see that the Secretaries appointed by the Sabbath-School Superintendent, be prompt and faithful in the performance of the duties required of them. Also, that all blanks for reports shall be published by the Board of Publication, under the supervision of the General Superintendent.

VI.

Inasmuch as the work of the Committee on Sabbath-Schools is so closely related to the work of the Committee on Publication, we recommend that hereafter, the General Assembly appoint for these interests but one committee, which shall be called the "Committee on Publication and Sabbath-School Work," and that this connection be maintained in all the Synodical and Presbyterial meetings.

VII.

In view of the great importance of the Sunday-School work of the Church, we recommend that at future General Assemblies, Monday at 8 P.M., during the sittings of this body, be set apart for the consideration of this subject, according to a programme to be supplied by the joint committee on Publication and Sunday-School work.

REPORT OF THE DELEGATES TO THE PAN-PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE.

The report of the delegates to the Pan-Presbyterial Alliance, which met in London, England, in 1888, was adopted as follows:

DEAR FATHERS AND BROTHERS:—We have great satisfaction to report that in the good providence of God we, according to appointment by the last General Assembly, attended as delegates, the Fourth Council of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches holding the Presbyterian system, which convened on the Third of July, 1888, in the City of London, England, and continued its sessions for ten days. The meeting was large and imposing.

The proceedings of the Council, including papers read and speeches delivered on a great variety of topics relating to Christian work, under the Presbyterian system, have been published and copies thereof can be secured at reasonable cost.

Though it was well understood that the Council was not committed to all, or even to any, of the views presented by the various speakers and writers, there was substantial unity of faith in principles and essential truths. To the delegates of each Church represented equal rights and privileges were accorded.

The members from abroad were right royally and generously welcomed by the brethren of London.

Rev. Dr. G. D. Mathews, to reside in London, was appointed General Secretary, and Rev. Dr. W. H. Roberts, of Cincinnati, Ohio, Honorary Assistant General Secretary.

It was resolved that the sum of £800 be regarded as the normal income per annum, required for the working expenses of the Alliance—the sum to be provided in equal portions by the American, or Western, and the European Section, and the Executive Committee of each Section to determine what part thereof will be expected of each Church representative in the Alliance, and on the Executive Committee of its Section.

Already has the Alliance brought the representive Churches into closer relations and sympathy with each other, and awakened the spirit of cooperation, especially in Foreign Missions, and of combination of Church energies Cumberland Presbyterians will evidently share largely the benefits yet to come from fraternizing with this powerful organization, combining so many forces for world eyangelization.

SYNODICAL RECORDS.

The Committees on the Records of the following Synods presented their reports, which were concurred in: Arkansas, Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Texas.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

The report of the Trustees of the General Assembly was presented, and adopted. (See Appendix).

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance submitted the following report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Finance would report:

- 1. That we have carefully examined the books and papers of the Stated Clerk placed in our hands. We find the books well kept, and the accounts correct. Most of the Presbyteries now pay their contingent assessments, and we take pleasure in commending the efficiency of the Stated Clerk in collecting up this fund. We find that he received from the several Presbyteries, from May 1, 1888, to May 1, 1889, \$2,266.50. He has paid out in the same time, \$2,368.60, leaving a balance of \$102.10 due the Stated Clerk.
- 2. A communication from the American Section of the Presbyterian Alliance, referred to us, sets forth the amount necessary to meet the annual expense of said Alliance, and indicates \$495 as the amount due from this Church, on the basis of representation in the Council. Whatever amount may be proper and reasonable, we think the Church should cheerfully pay. The rigid adherence, however, to the basis of representation in making assessments on the several Churches composing the Alliance, was not required by the London Council. On the contrary, it made provision for other matters to be taken into consideration. Believing there are good reasons why the assessment upon this Church should be considerably smaller, and that the American Section of the Executive Commission will

so decide, when these reasons are heard, we recommend that the representatives of this Church on said Commission, be instructed to confer with the American Section on the subject, and report to this General Assembly at its next meeting. Also, that the Treasurer be ordered to forward to the Treasurer of the American Section the sum of \$300.

The special Committee on Statistics report the following, to wit:

We live in an age of organization. In all directions there is unity of purpose and concentration of action. The Church must keep abreast of the times in order that it may be most effectual. In reporting the work of the Church, it is well, as has been the custom to show aggregates by Presbyteries; hence, we would recommend that the numerical and financial exhibit by Presbyteries be continued as heretofore.

But in the opinion of your committee the time has come when the Church needs a detailed report by congregations. The Boards feel keenly the need of such an exhibit in order that the most effective work may be done in their respective quarters. Such an exhibit would, in the judgment of your committee, be of great service to the Presbyteries and Synods in bringing the Churches in their bounds up to their full ability. The committee submits herewith the following form for such a table, and recommend that, if it is adopted, the Moderator and Stated Clerk of this General Assembly together with a representative from each Board be authorized to make any minor alteration in either of the tables that may be found necessary to fully carry out the spirit herein contemplated, also that the form adopted be printed in the Minutes of this General Assembly as information to the Church concerning the statistics to be reported a year hence.

For printing the accompanying three hundred blank reports \$4.00 has been paid by a member of your committee. We recommend that you issue an order on the Contingent Fund to replace said \$4.00.

Whereas, Rev. R. G. Pearson, a minister of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, is an Evangelist of national reputation, thoroughly orthodox and scriptural in his teaching, reliable in his methods, and a man whose labors God has greatly blessed; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That this General Assembly expresses the wish that Brother Pearson may give our denomination the fullest possible benefit of his work by holding meetings under the auspices of our Churches so far as satisfactory arrangements can be made to that end.

2. That whatever of details may be necessary to the realization of this expressed wish be intrusted, on the part of this General Assembly, to a committee to be known as General Assembly's Committee, consisting of the following persons: J. M. Hubbert, W. J. Darby, E. T. Bowers, J. L. Cooper, J. Reed Morris, S. H. Buchanan, E. D. Pearson, C. Manton.

LOCATING THE PUBLISHING HOUSE.

WHEREAS, Provision has been made by the General Assembly for the Board to receive propositions for the location of the Publishing House, and,

WHEREAS, The representatives of the Board present desire to have others associated with them to share this responsibility; therefore,

Resolved, That Messrs. J. B. Mitchell, of Missouri, W. S. Danley, of Illinois, James Best, of Ohio, B. D. Cockrill, of Kentucky, J. L. Cooper, of Mississippi, J. Reed Morris, of Pennsylvania, and Charles Manton, of Texas, be appointed a committee to advise with the Board of Publication, in considering such propositions as may come before it, it being understood that for economy the two last named be corresponding members of the committee.

DELEGATES TO THE EVANGELICAL UNION.

Whereas, Rev. Messrs. E. T. Bowers, B. T. Watson, and J. L. Good-knight will probably have an opportunity to attend the Annual Conference of the Evangelical Union of Scotland, without cost to this body; therefore,

Resolved, That they be authorized and requested to represent the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at the approaching meeting of said conference.

PROBATIONERS AND TOBACCO.

Resolved, That the Board of Education are hereby instructed to give no aid to any candidate for the ministry in securing an education who uses tobacco, and that it is the duty of the Board of Education to know before aiding any student that he does not use tobacco.

INSTRUCTIONS TO THE STATED CLERK AND TO STATED CLERKS OF PRESBYTERIES.

Whereas, It is very important that the true statistics of the Church should be obtained, and whereas this work can not be accomplished unless the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries and the Clerks of Church Sessions will do their whole duty; therefore,

Resolved, 1. That it shall be made the imperative duty of the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to report to the Presbyteries interested, those Stated Clerks who fail to do their duty, and that the Presbyteries be requested to remove these inefficient Stated Clerks, and to appoint others who will do their duty.

2. That it shall be the duty of the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries to report to the Presbyteries the names of the Clerks of Church Sessions who fail to discharge their obligations in this particular, and that the Presbyteries be directed to urge upon Church Sessions the removal of inefficient Clerks of Sessions, and the appointment of faithful ones in their stead

TERRITORY IN NEW HOPE PRESBYTERY.

WHEREAS, A small part of New Hope Presbytery is within the limits of Alabama Synod, and is cut off from said Synod by two rivers, and said territory can be better worked by the New Hope Presbytery, and

Whereas, The Churches in said territory are unwilling to sever their connection with the New Hope Presbytery, therefore

Resolved, That this territory remain in the New Hope Presbytery.

DIRECTORY OF CLERKS OF SESSIONS.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk be directed to publish in the forth-coming Minutes of the General Assembly a directory of the Clerks of Sessions of the Church, to facilitate the communications of the Boards of the Church.

THANKS FOR SERMON ON MISSIONS.

Resolved, That this General Assembly tender their thanks to Rev. Dr. M. B. DeWitt for the interesting and instructive sermon delivered before the General Assembly on the subject of Missions.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Resolved, 1. That a standing committee be created by this General Assembly to be known as the "Committee on Church Property," which committee shall be charged with the duty of gathering information and statistics throughout the bounds of the Church regarding vacant church property. That the Presbyteries be enjoined to appoint like standing committees of like character, which shall carefully investigate the condition of Churches that have not had a paster or stated supply for six months or more, and also that all other Churches find one in whom the legal title to the property is, by whom it is controlled, and the causes that prevent its successful operation; that such information in a condensed and statistical form be transmitted to the chairman of the standing committee of the General Assembly for its information and action.

2. That the Presbyteries appoint a committee to get an abstract of all Church property within their bounds, so as to be able to know and heal all defects that may be in claim of title.

CHANGE OF STANDING RULE.

- Resolved, 1. That hereafter the several Boards of the Church be limited to two hours each in which to present their respective reports, and address the General Assembly thereon, after which the reports may be discussed by members of the General Assembly, speakers being limited to five minutes each. This is not to affect the "General Rule" that delegates may offer resolutions pertaining to the Board's work, supporting them in ten minute addresses.
- 2. That the standing Rule of this General Assembly be amended by striking out that clause allowing a representative of each Board to address the General Assembly without limitation, and providing in lieu thereof the following:

THE STANDING RULE.

Resolved, That the following shall be a Standing Rule of the General Assembly:

1. The reports of the several Church Boards shall be presented as follows:

FRIDAY, 10 A.M.—EDUCATION.

FRIDAY, 3 P.M.—MISSIONS.

SATURDAY, 10 A.M. - MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

SATURDAY, 3 P.M.—PUBLICATION.

The several Boards of the Church shall be limited to two hours each in which to present their respective reports and address the General Assembly thereon; after which the reports may be discussed by members of the General Assembly, speakers being limited to five minutes each. Following such addresses, members of the General Assembly may present in writing propositions or resolutions on the subject, supporting the same in ten-minute speeches. Said propositions or resolutions shall be referred to the appropriate committee, without vote, unless a vote shall be specially demanded upon a given proposition.

2. The Committees to whom the Reports of the Boards are referred shall report as follows:

MONDAY, 3 P.M.-Missions.

TUESDAY, 10 A.M.—MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

TUESDAY, 3 P.M.—PUBLICATION.

WEDNESDAY, 10 A.M.—EDUCATION.

The discussion of any of these reports may be continued and made the special order for an evening sesson if necessary.

3. Early on the second day of each session the Stated Clerk shall have printed, for the convenience of the members of the General Assembly, this Standing Rule, together with the Roll of Members, and the committees appointed by the Moderator, also a memorandum of unfinished business, if any, from the preceding General Assembly.

RESOLUTIONS OF THANKS.

Resolved, That the thanks of this General Assembly be tendered:

- 1. To the pastor and members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Kansas City for the use of their Church for the meetings of the General Assembly, and also for the kind and careful attentions they have given to its members.
- 2. To the citizens of Kansas City who have so generously and hospitably entertained us while we have been in their midst.
- 3. To the First Congregational Church for its use for the meeting last evening.
 - 4. To Rev. W. F. Crafts for the excellent address on Sabbath Observance.
- 5. To the Railroads for the courtesies they have extended to its members.
- 6. To the Press of Kansas City for the full reports they have given of its proceedings.
- 7. To the ministers of Kansas City, Wyandotte, and Westport for invitations to occupy their pulpits on last Sunday. The Moderator and Clerks are included in this vote of thanks.

L-MISSIONS.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the General Assembly at Kansas City, Mo., May 16th, 1889:

The mission of the Church is to evangelize the world. It was for that purpose that the Lord commissioned the apostles and sent them to preach his gospel; for the same reason he commands us to carry forward the work they commenced. When a denomination fails to be evangelistic, it ceases to serve its noblest purpose. It is not the Lord's will that those who bear his name should "cumber the ground." Christians should be ready to preach the gospel anywhere, either in Jerusalem or Rome. The Master knew no difference between Jew and Gentile. The offer of life was not made to any It is not in the province of the servant to set bounds where the Master set none.

To the uttermost part of the earth the gospel must be published. The nations are now ready to receive the message of salvation through Christ as never before. The cities of our own country present a problem which can not be solved without Christianity. They must be ruled by the love of the Savior, or they will rule with a hatred for his cause. The time in which we live is crowded with possibilities. It is in the power of the Christian Church to publish salvation to every people before the dawning of the twentieth century. With this ability is committed also the responsibility, which were now Combonland Problems Problems as with all sibility, which rests upon Cumberland Presbyterians in common with all other Christian people.

To the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, to-day, the door of opportunity stands wide open. In almost every State where her membership is found, there are inviting fields to be cultivated. The cities send in their plea and the rural districts ask that they be not forgotten. In all this vast territory there is an average of but one Missionary for a whole State. The General Assembly, last year, called attention to points located in eight or ten States needing help; and in addition thereto, appeals for aid from many parts of the Church have been received. For lack of money only a few additional places have been occupied. Had the funds justified, a hundred places could have been assisted to great advantage. Notwithstanding all this need, the offerings for Home Missions are only a little over \$700 more than were reported a year ago.

The salaries of the Missionaries in the Home field, amounted to more than the sum contributed for the support of that work. This department is in debt over \$6,000. Three Synods fell behind, while four others barely held their own. In two of the Synods the offerings lack about \$900 of the amount paid on Missionary salaries in their bounds. When 29,000 members in old and established States fail to meet the expenses of the work in their own midst, the Board is brought face to face with a most se-

rious problem.

To maintain the work already undertaken in the Home field and pay the debt by the meeting of the General Assembly next year, will necessitate a large increase in the amount of receipts for that purpose. Unless as much as \$15,000 is contributed, the Home work will be seriously embarrassed.

Church Erection.

This interest has been pressed during the year as never before. Rev. F. P. Flaniken, as an agent for Church Erection, has been actively in the field, and Rev. W. G. Leonard began work in this interest in the fall and continued until the last of April. An examination of the financial exhibit given farther on will show that the Church has taken an unusual interest in this department. It is hoped that this good begun work may go on until such a fund shall be realized that it will be in the power of the Board to extend aid to scores of struggling congregations trying to build houses of worship. The last General Assembly instructed the Board to submit to this General Assembly, if in their judgment it is deemed wise, a plan for a new Board, to be known as the Board of Church Extension, to whom shall be committed the whole of the work in the Home field, including Church Erection. After due consideration it was thought best not to recommend the creation of a new Board, at least for the present. Such an action would largely increase the expense of administration; hence it was deemed better to increase the official force of the Board of Missions, and so push all departments from one office, thereby saving as much expense as possible while the aggregate offerings are no larger than they are.

Accordingly Rev. J. V. Stephens was called from the pastorate at Chat-

Accordingly Rev. J. V. Stephens was called from the pastorate at Chattanooga, to the position of Corresponding Secretary. He entered upon his duties the first of January. Mr. J. L. Secor, who has been Corresponding Secretary for five years, felt constrained to retire, in order that he might devote all his time to his professional duties. At the close of the fiscal year, April 30, his relation as Corresponding Secretary ceased. He has been a most efficient officer, and the Board herein expresses its high appreciation

of his faithful services.

The interests of Missions must be pressed all along the line. There must be more literature prepared and sent out to help the pastors inform their people on this great question. The Missionary Record has been enlarged and otherwise improved, and is now edited from the office. Much systematic work must be done to enlist a larger number of preachers and congregations in behalf of the cause of Missions to the extent of their ability. To do all of this, entails a large amount of work; so the time is near, if not already at hand, when the services of two Corresponding Secretaries will be needful and highly important as well as profitable to the cause.

JAPAN MISSION.

On every hand are signs of a substantial progress in the Japan Mission. It is a source of gratification that the health of Rev. A. D. Hail has been so restored that he and his devoted wite are again at their post at Osaka. Rev. G. W. Van Horn and his wife, under commission of the Board of Missions, and the latter supported by the Woman's Board, are now at work in this Mission. The other missionaries in Japan are Rev. J. B. Hail and wife, Rev. G. G. Hudson and wife, Miss Julia L. Leavitt, Mrs. A. M. Drennan, Miss Rena Rezner, and Miss Bettie A. Duffield. There is great need of additional laborers in this field. Two cities—one of them the capital, Tokyo—with a population of over 1,000,000, have been added to the field of the missionaries. From four different places recently came a plea to the Mission to send a missionary to live among the people. But there is not one who can be spared from the work now in hand. Will the Church hear the call and supply the demand?

After a correspondence with the missionaries, it was thought unadvisable to "take immediate steps toward establishing a Theological Training School in Japan." So the matter has been deferred for the present. In

fact, the finances would not justify such an undertaking now. The expenses of the Foreign work have been over \$700 more than the receipts, the offerings falling off some \$500 as compared with last report. Full details of this work will be found in the following:

ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE JAPAN MISSION.

To the Board of Missions of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

"Preach the Gospel to every creature."-Mark xvi. 15.

GENERAL.

Evidence is abundant to show that Christianity is gaining influence in Japan. Public journals have discussed subjects relating to our faith, and to the methods adopted in its propagation. Occasionally this has been friendly; generally it has been critical, and always without attempt to win believers. Buddhists, Shintoists, and Christians are named as constituting the religious public. It can be said with all confidence that the preaching of the gospel in this country is unrestricted. The delay of foreign powers in admitting Japan to the sisterhood of nations has made her more careful about foreigners traveling or living in the interior, and missionaries suffer some inconvenience, but the conditions upon which passports are issued are not unreasonable.

Most of the Boards working here have increased their force this year, and all the strategic points will soon be occupied, though this leaves large districts without resident missionaries. Those who take preaching tours sometimes visit places where the gospel has never been preached, but it is not usual to find a place of importance that has not one or more believers

among its citizens.

Foreign Bible and Tract Societies have issued a number of useful books this year, including commentaries, synopsis of theology, and translations of popular works. Among the latter are: "Abide in Peace," (Earl) by Miss Leavitt; "Word of Life," selections from "Imitation of Christ," and like works, by Rev. J. B. Hail. The Methodist Mission publishes a bi-weekly paper. A joint committee, representing the missionaries and native members of both the United Church of Christ in Japan (Presbyterian) and the Congregational Church, have issued a new Hymn and Tune Book, which is being generally adopted by all churches. The entire Bible in one volume, printed on excellent paper and sold at about one dollar, will be issued soon by the American Bible Society. A concordance to the Japanese Bible is being printed.

The leading topic the past year has been the proposed union between the United Church of Christ in Japan and the Congregational Church. A basis of union was agreed upon by a committee appointed by the two Churches and approved by the General Assembly of the former Church. It has not yet been approved by the Association of the latter Church.

OUR MISSION CHURCHES.

No new congregations have been organized, though a number of new preaching places have been opened in the vicinity of those already estab-

lished. One meeting-house (Wakayama) was destroyed by storm.

With one exception our theological students have spent the year in study at the American Board's College at Kyoto, and several are expected to finish next year the course they are pursuing. Others are about to begin the same preparation, and so our hope for a native ministry is strengthened.

At its last meeting the Presbytery appointed a permanent Committee on Missions, and a considerable sum was paid or pledged for that work.

Our Mission Schools.

On February 8th, 1888, our Girls' School at Osaka was entirely destroyed by fire. The insurance was collected and the school re-built with the proceeds. The new house is larger and safer, and in other ways better than the first. It was ready for use July 1st—The attendance this year has been fair, but owing to circumstances (some of which were unavoidable) it is not so large as that of last year. At present it is as follows: Average monthly attendance, 65; boarding pupils, 22; supported (wholly or partly)

by foreign funds, 10.

The English School at Wakayama, in which our Missionaries resident there are teachers, is still continued, though with reduced attendance as compared with last year. Another night school, free to those not able to pay tuition in the Government schools, has been opened through the co-operation of the native Christians and Missionaries.

OUR MISSION WORK.

We are glad to acknowledge the return (last October) of Rev and Mrs. A. D. Hail, to the work in Japan. Their return to us in renewed health and strength, and the greetings they bring from the Church at home, give us great encouragement. They were accompanied by Rev. and Mrs. G. W. Van Horn, who are most cordially welcomed as fellow-workers in preaching the gospel to this people.

Besides superintending our work in Osaka, and the adjacent villages, the Messrs. Hail have visited our Churches around the Peninsula of Kiishu. Lately the tour has been extended to Nagoya, and the capital Tokyo, where

we have a nucleus for an organization.

Mrs. Drennan has her home in Nagoya, and has organized Bible and industrial classes, with a good prospect of soon gathering a company of believers. Miss Leavitt has divided the year between the Osaka, Tanabe and Shingu Churches, being of great advantage to them in various ways.

Miss Duffield and Mrs. Van Horn have had the management of the Girls'

School the current year.

The remainder of the Mission have for regular work the study of the Japanese language, doing such special work as circumstances permit.

OUR NEEDS.

1. Our present force needs to be increased by the immediate appointment of three married couples and three single ladies. It is also desirable that at least one of the latter be qualified to teach music.

2. An early appropriation for a Ladies' Home, to be erected in Osaka,

and in reference to which a petition has already been sent.

3. Most of all, we need the faithful prayers of yourselves and of the Church you represent, that we may be guided and sustained in this work by the Spirit.

MEXICO MISSION.

Since the last report a Church has been organized at Agnascalientes, and a school has been opened. A chapel is in course of construction that will cost about \$2,500. Rev. A. H. Whatley and wife, are located in this city. Rev. F. P. Lawyer and wife, are stationed at Guanajuato, where a preaching place has been opened. The Mission in Mexico, like that in Japan, needs reinforcements.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEXICO MISSION.

To the Board of Missions of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

The Missionaries in this field have been favored with good health during the year, a blessing for which they are profoundly thankful. While the Missionaries are not satisfied with their progress the past year, yet there are signs of encouragement. The fact must be taken into consideration that this is a difficult field in which to labor. It is well known that the masses of the people are ignorant of the Christian religion, and in many instances prejudiced against it. So it is evident that the fight is to be a long one. It is but right that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church should bear her part in giving the gospel light to this benighted people.

Aguascalientes.—The work at this place has made progress during the last year. The first sermon was preached January 1, 1888. No members had been received when the last Annual Report was made. Since that time five members have been received. Great care has been exercised in admitting persons to membership—In all cases the applicant has had to furnish evidence of a changed heart. This caution on the part of the Mission has compelled it to turn many away who have applied for baptism, until the desired evidence should be shown. It is thought that the chapel in the process of construction at this point, will be under roof by the time this report comes before the General Assembly. The contributions of this little band amount to \$11.25.

A school has recently been opened under a competent teacher, a member of the Mission. This branch of the work is one of the most important. Twelve pupils have been matriculated. The school will evidently improve when an American teacher is added, and when English shall be taught in it.

Guanajuata.—Rev. F. P. Lawyer with his wife, who arrived last November, is stationed in this city, where he has been since December. The work was opened regularly on the 14th of April. There were the usual difficulties experienced in securing a house in which to preach. This city has a population of 70,000; and is one of the most liberal and progressive cities in the Republic. The Methodists have a Mission here, and have been most successful. It is hoped that at no distant day the Cumberland Presbyterian Mission in this city will be a tower of strength for the cause of the Master in Mexico.

Asientos.—This is a village of two or three thousand inhabitants, about thirteen miles from Aguascalientes. There is a candidate for baptism at this place, who offers a lot on which to build, and further proposes to do all he can to have the town furnish the funds for building a chapel. There is some opening for work at Rieon de Romos—These points and any other adjacent ones in which the way may be open will be worked by the force in Aguascalientes.

God being our helper we will let neither jeers, curses, nor stonings, all of which we have had to suffer the past year, interfere with the work of the

Lord. We feel sure that we have the prayers and sympathy of the Church at home. If the Lord lays it on the heart of some brother to "come over and help us," and the Board judges him fitted for this work, we will be glad to welcome him to a field that is "white unto the harverst."

BOWLING GREEN (KY.) COLORED SCHOOL.

The Board has been assisting the school at Bowling Green, Kentucky, for the colored Cumberland Presbyterians to the amount of \$600 per annum. The report from the Principal of the school speaks for itself of the work the school is doing and of its needs. The report is herewith submitted, and the Board asks the General Assembly to take such action as it may deem best in reference to the suggestions and requests therein contained.

FIRST ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOWLING GREEN COLORED SCHOOL.

To the Board of Missions of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

I submit to you the following report for the school year beginning October, 1888, and closing May, 1889. And in so doing I return to God thanks for the blessings which he sent us through your Board without which we could not have run the school three months in the year. In this the Lord has guided you, and I am confident that if you will only follow up the good begun work with your prayers and financial assistance, you will in the near future reap a bountiful harvest. As a Church we are making

slow progress. Our great need is an educated ministry.

You have a missionary work among us, but it is not to send men to for have a missionary work among us, but it is not to send men to preach the gospel to our people, for none can preach to the Negro so effectively as the Negro himself. Your missionary work is an educational one. In the beginning of the year we cut off the primary department of the school, which reduced our enrollment considerably. Notwithstanding this, our enrollment this year is six more than it was last, and the school the best that we have ever had. We have an excellent class of young men and women, who are destined to do much good for the school, the Church, and the race to which they belong We have enrolled this year fifty-six pupils. Of these thirty-three are Christians and belong to Churches. Thirty are preparing for teachers, fifteen of whom are now teaching in the county schools during the summer months. There are three licentiates and two aspirants, who are making rapid progress. I have heard from nine others who expect to be in school next year. Four of these and one who has been in four years, will be prepared to enter the Theological department proper. And if I were sure of an enlargement of the building, I think I could get several more. There are three in the Scientific department this year, and ten will be graduated from the Normal department, all of whom will enter the Scientific department next fall. The main building and the grounds are in very good condition. The property cost \$3,000. Since the committee wound up its business in paying for and improving the property, I have had some work done which was absolutely necessary, at a cost of \$165. This is yet to be paid for, and I must ask the Board to make me this additional appropriation. Before the school can make very much more progress we will be compelled to have more room; we ought to have an L built 50 by 70 feet, two stories high. This would give us all the room we would need for years, and the school would then receive its share of patronage from the young men and women who are seeking the best advantages for an education. The brick work of such a building would cost about \$500. The wood work would cost about twice as much. The colored Church is not able to make these improvements. We have had three teachers this year, Mr. Dodson and wife, and myself. Mr. Dodson gets \$40 and Mrs. Dodson \$20 per month. This has left for my services \$15 per-month of the amount which you have allowed

us monthly. I hope the Board will see its way to recommend to the General Assembly to take some steps to enlarge our building by fall, thereby putting us on the road to success. I think, too, that this school ought to be under a Board of Directors, a part of them from each General Assembly, and that this Board should take full control of the work. There is now too much responsibility on me. I have carried it until I have broken down under it.

Another source of annoyance and worry is the uncertainty of getting means to pay teachers and to meet the little debts that I am compelled to make sometimes in order to take care of the property, such as the \$165

spoken of in this report.

Now if the school was under a Board of Directors, as I said, I would be freed from all this and could put my whole time in the theological work and to building up the scholarship.

Permanent Committee on Missions of Pacific Synon.

During the year the Pacific Synod, with the approval of the Board, decided to retain the offerings for the home work from the Churches in its bounds to be dispensed by the Permanent Committee of the Synod in carrying on the work in that field. The report of the committee for the year just closed shows an earnest activity among the Churches and that much good is being done. The Treasurer's statement did not reach the office in time to be included in the Financial Exhibit, but is appended thereto.

Indian Missions.

Since the last report two additional missionaries have been sent to the Indians. Rev. D. L. Walker who is stationed at Oakland, and Rev. A. B. Johnson who is located at Stringtown. The Board has not yet been able to give Hogan Institute any special assistance on account of a failure to obtain legal recognition by the council of the Cherokee Nation, and a lack of funds. It is hoped that the former difficulty will be removed when the next council meets.

of Rev. J. H. Dickerson, \$500; liabilities, \$160; pupils, 56.

Cherokee.—Missionaries, 4—Rev. N. J. Crawford, Rev. R. C. Parks, Rev. David Hogan, Mrs. S. S. Phelps; 1 Presbytery, 5 ministers, 11 congregations; accessions, 57; membership, 517; value of property, \$5,087; liabilities, \$466; 10 Sabbath-schools; Hogan Institute valued at \$2,115; pupils, 40.

Abilene, Texas.—Rev. D. C. DeWitt. A church building has been completed; liabilities, \$300. The Board will lend \$200 to this Mission.

Bessemer, Alabama.—A church building has been erected, and a small

congregation is now awaiting the coming of a pastor.

value of property, \$6,000; the suit for title is still pending.

Cherrycale, Kansas.—The work has been suspended because of unfavorable conditions for prosecuting it. The title of the property is now in the Board. Liabilities, \$500, owing to the Church-erection Fund.

Colorado, Texas.—Rev. J. A. Robinson has recently tendered his resigna-

tion. Accessions, 7; membership, 65; Sabbath-school, 75; prayer-meeting,

30; value of property, \$3,500.

Danville, Ill.—Rev. A. B. Buchanan. Accessions, 80; membership, 140; Sabbath-school, 200; prayer-meeting, 60; value of property, \$5,000; liabilities \$2,949.43, of which \$1,849.43 are due the Church-erection Fund, and \$1,100 are due the Board of Ministerial Relief.

Dermot, Kansas.—Rev. P. McCluney, missionary evangelist to southwestern Kansas. Accessions, 17; membership, 30; Sabbath-school, 30; prayer-meeting, 15. The missionary serves also an organization of 35 members in Heiskill county, besides other points.

Sheffield, Ala.—Accessions, 5; membership, 532; Sabbath-school, 35; value of property, \$2,500, liabilities \$500, loaned from the Church-erection Fund. A foundation for the church building has been laid.

Springfield, Ill.—Rev. A. G. Bergen, the missionary, has resigned. A Church was organized during the year with 27 members. Sabbath-school, 100; prayer-meeting, 15; value of property \$2,500; liabilities, \$531 to the Vandalia Presbytery.

St. Joseph, Mo.—Rev. Alonzo Pearson. Accessions, 14; membership, 90:

Sabbath-school, 85; prayer-meeting 45; value of property, \$6,000.

Stockton, Cal. - Rev. T. A. Cowan. Accessions, 50; membership, 75; Sabbath-school, 50; prayer-meeting, 25; value of property, \$7,000; liabilities, \$4,000.

Texarkana, Texas.—Rev. J. R. Crawford has been appointed to this Mission, and will enter upon his work the first of June. A Church has been organized with 16 members, and a Sabbath-school of 23 members. Property worth \$1,400 is held by the Mission. Already the membership has commenced to collect materials for a church building.

Topeka, Kansas.—Rev. N. D. Johnson. Sabbath-school, 75; prayer-meeting, 10; value of property, \$3,000; liabilities, \$1,025. The missionary is

collecting funds for building purposes.

Tyler, Texas,—Rev. R. T. Phillips. Accessions, 13; membership, 41; Sabbath-school, 70; prayer-meeting, 15; value of property, \$6,000; liabilities, \$800, of which \$225 were loaned from the Church-erection Fund.

Wellington, Kansas - Rev. Thos Penick, the missionary, has recently entered upon his duties. Accessions, 3; membership, 32; Sabbath-school, 40. The Mission owns a valuable lot

About two years ago, the Church at Garden City, Kansas, decided that it could sustain itself. This decision was made with a large debt resting on the Church, which the members felt they could meet. But severe droughts disappointed their hopes, and they were not able to meet the payments of the debt. In order to save the property and help the Church over its temporary embarrassment, \$600 were loaned from the Churcherection Fund, and the title of the property was transferred to the Board. At the same time an allowance of \$25 per month on pastor's salary was made in order that the work might be more effectually advanced.

Dr. B. W. McDonnold was engaged as an evangelist for Iowa, He was unwell when he reached his field of labor, and after a few engagements was compelled to give up the undertaking. This Christian scholar, histo-

rian, and evangelist has since gone up to his reward.

One of the gratifying features of the year's work is the increase of the number of co-operating congregations, although the receipts have not greatly increased, from the fact that the offerings of a large majority of the congregations were small; and yet the record is gladly made that many of the Churches, having grasped the Scripture-taught truth that giving in proportion to ability is the true measure of Christian beneficence, now contribute several times as much as formerly. It is manifest that the greatly enlarged receipts anticipated in the future, as the missionary interest shall continually grow, will consist mainly in offerings of double, even quadruple, amounts by congregations and individuals already co-operating with the Board and with the General Assembly's plans for Church extension and world evangelization.

The yearly enlargement of the work, the constantly improving methods of work among the Churches, and the adoption by many of them of the envelope plan of gathering contributions from all members, together with the growing disposition on the part of Presbyteries to require ministers to obey the behests of the General Assembly in presenting the claims of missions to their people, and giving them an opportunity to make the two prescribed offerings annually, or other encouragements. Hence, the hope is cherished that increased fruitfulness in good works will crown the efforts

of the Lord's serving people during the coming year.

In this connection the Board would call the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that a congregational directory by Presbyterics, giving the names and addresses of Session clerks and the names of pastors, would be of great service in developing the Church along this line.

WOMAN'S BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

THE HOME DEPARTMENT.

Year after year as the workers come up to these Annual Gatherings, we seem to be telling and hearing much the same story in presenting the reports, but, as it is truly said, no one day can be a duplicate of another, so surely no twelve months' work can be the counterpart of another. The methods of work have varied but little from those of previous years, yet results show that God hath given power to the faint and increased the strength of those trusting in him.

Thorough organization and systematic giving are essential; but the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has long since learned that they can do but little by relying on these alone, but if to these we add the help that is ours for the asking, great results will follow "O woman, great is thy

faith; be it unto thee even as thou wilt!'

Advance can be read on almost every record, increased spirituality may be noted in the auxiliary meeting, and interest in the cause in many portions has grown into true Missionary zeal.

Shall I say there has been a marked development among the young people? This is true so far as it relates to the children, for they are bringing new life into many of our congregations; but is it not possible that this work is losing much of the enthusiasm and deep spirituality that young womanhood would give it? Are all the young ladies in our Churches members of ladies' societies? Would we enlist more of these young hearts and hands if we had separate organizations for them? While we may not be utilizing this power in the Home field as we ought, yet to-day, the crowning blessing is that two young ladies stand with us ready to take up this grand and joyous service.

To carry out the plans and recommendations of the last Annual meeting,

your

BOARD

has given its time, thought and careful attention at the twenty-four regular meetings and numerous committee meetings during the year now closing. Much time is always given to details which, in themselves, make but little figure, yet form an essential part of the year's history.

We record with sadness the death of one of our faithful members, Mrs. E. J. Waters, of Mt. Vernon, Mo., for six years connected with the Synodical work of that State, and we wish to bear testimony to the efficient work

done by this sister through all her years of service.

THE HOME STATISTICS

are as follows: Auxiliary societies 793, with a membership about 7,900; Young Ladies' Societies 8, with a membership of 130; Children's Bands 138, with 1,741 members, making total organizations 932, and total memberships 9,771; Number of Auxiliaries organized during the year 110; of this number, 20 were Children's Bands and 2 Young Ladies'; Life members 59; Synodical Vice-Presidents 14; Presbyterial Secretaries 56. Forty-six

Presbyterial Societies have been reported organized during the past four years, but we are sorry to say not more than twenty are in good working order and filling the place for which they were formed. In justice we would state that about ten have been organized recently, giving no time

"The Treasury, that great thermometer of Christian life and sympathy" has risen to a mark never before reached in our history. The amount contributed is \$10,614.49; amount raised last year \$7,658.44; thus showing the increase of the present year to be \$2,956.05. The earnest co-operation and self-denying effort on the part of societies to reach the amount asked of them is worthy of our highest commendation. This has been raised in the regular channels, as no special donations have been received. And here we would call attention to and emphasize the matter of legacies. To all who have incomes, be they large or small, has the thought ever come to you of setting aside a portion that shall stand and bear interest when you have no longer control of this income?

THE CHILDREN.

Let us see what they have accomplished. They never disappoint us but have worked hard and besides meeting the regular obligations, have secured the amount necessary for the purchase of the printing-press for Mexico. One of the last commands was "Feed my Lambs." Are we obeying in that we are training the children for God and his service? What shall we do for Leaders for our Bands? A number are at a stand-still because the mothers and sisters have "so much to do at home;" although the outlay for this work is small and the returns so great. Let this question be earnestly and prayerfully discussed during this convention.

THE AUXILIARY

meeting is something we have learned to look forward to with joyful

Our hopes have perhaps not all been realized nor our plans carried out

successfully, nevertheless we have great occasion for thankfulness.

Too much can not be said in favor of Thank Offering, or Praise Meetings. Many times have we heard, "these are the best meetings of the year!" The central thought in the services being thanks to God for giving the wondrous gift of his Son, for through Christ are we saved and it is Christianity that makes you and me to differ from women of heathen lands.

We are pleased to note the increased efficiency of our

SYNODICAL AND PRESBYTERIAL

officers, and glad to learn that the Synodical Vice-President's letter has been the means of a more intelligent understanding of their department. "In union there is strength," the united thought and prayer seems to emphasize the work and bind together these workers. These offices tell us of many encouraging features, even saying the time will soon come when the Presbytery, without a Presbyterial Society, and the congregation without an Auxiliary and Children's Band, will feel lonely.

All deplore lack of interest among many and urge the necessity of personal solicitation. Meetings have been held in connection with many Presbyteries and Synods, when those having the work in charge have addressed large audiences, interesting many in Mission work.

The Synodical Vice-Presidents are endeavoring to keep a careful oversight of their fields, putting forth every effort for the advancement of the cause; still there is much faithful work to be done, much ground to be occupied if we would win all the women in the C. P. Church to our standard, thus helping them that they may feel their individual responsibility for the salvation of heathen women and children. We have learned to look to the Presbyterial meetings for the key-note of the year's work; having found, by experience, that it pays well in prayers and work as well

as in dollars and cents to bestow much labor and pains in preparing for them. Every Presbytery should have a well equipped Presbyterial Society. In looking over the field occupied by more than one hundred Presbyteries, we realize how few the number of workers compared with the membership of our Churches. When shall we see this body of Christian women enlisted and eager to bear the glad tidings to the perishing, saying to the claims of the world, "we are doing a great work and can not come down!"

OUR PERIODICALS,

the Missionary Banner and Record have been "pressed down, shaken together and running over" with good things—information regarding all departments of Missionary work, letters from our Missionaries in whom we should all be deeply interested. Can any woman afford to dispense with this important aid, through carelessness, or neglect to send the price of subscription to the proper person? The subscription list for the Missionary Banner now numbers 5,513 making an increase of nearly 2,000 over last year, with quite an advance in the number taken by Sabbath-schools. Although this is a good showing, still the subscription list must be greatly enlarged if we are justified in continuing the publication of such a paper. This paper is doing a great work for the children, and we desire the cooperation of each woman in the Church that this bright little message may be placed in the hands of the children. Missionary literature is essential to Christian life as food to the body.

MISCELLANEOUS.

We have made an appropriation of five hundred dollars for work in Mexico, a portion of which was used for school purposes. Several societies have given offerings which have been used to aid the missionaries in some special work. Mrs. S. S. Phelps has labored earnestly in Hogan Institute with gratifying results.

During the year more than twelve thousand leaflets have been printed,

while hundreds have been purchased from other Boards. To the list of leaflets have been added the following:
"What the Captain wants of me"—Miss Clara McCord.
"Necessity for Foreign Missions."—Rev W. B. Farr, D.D.
"How are we Using our Talent?"—Miss Sallie Werntz.

"Help for Auxiliary Officers." "Never refuse God any thing."

"What the children thought about giving."
"The Children's Crusade."—Mrs. G. M. Parks.

"Historical Leaflet."

The plan of work was printed and mailed to each society the first of the year accompanied by a letter from the Synodical Vice-President The Praise meeting was generally observed and more than fifteen hundred envelopes were furnished free, except postage.

The two Mission Bands in Japan who send their money for Mexico, and the society recently organized at Bethlehem Church, Indian Territory, must not be overlooked in summing up the work. In many country congregations where it is difficult to maintain a society, solicitors have been

appointed who are rendering faithful service.

The conference between the Board of Missions and the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions held in Evansville, May 24, is a matter of interest we would not fail to mention, as these meetings for viewing the field are of

great benefit to the Boards and the cause.

Uniform Studies are receiving more attention and when these shall become more thoroughly systematized we predict for them general adoption. One thousand five hundred copies of the Eighth Annual Report have been scattered throughout the Church and large numbers of Records and leaflets have been distributed gratuitously, which we have reason to believe accomplish great and lasting good.

SUGGESTIONS.

Truly the nineteenth century is the century for woman. In what way can she better serve her Lord than in seeking to save the lost, even her down-trodden sisters in pagan lands. In order to do this let us carry out the plans so often emphasized, by including the youth in the home, and encouraging—by our example—a spirit of self-denial, which will enable each member of the family to give to the cause of Christ, and to cultivate that larger benevolence which will enable our people to listen to the needs of the parent Board. We would recommend not only that the auxiliary and band meetings be regularly held, but that in a town or city where we have no Church organization the women of our faith be gathered together in a missionary society in that way forming a nucleus for a Church. In some cities where we have several Churches, societies should unite in a quarterly meeting for mutual helpfulness.

We would repeat what we said in last report that we fear there is a tendency to make the monthly meeting less distinctively a prayer-meeting. "Who loves little, prays little," "who loves much, prays much." We

trust the Sabbath evening hour of prayer is observed by all.

Have we given all that God wanted us to give? Have we spoken for the

cause in public and private as opportunities have been presented?

Have we prayed "Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven?" Has our influence been felt in favor of the cause? Has our presence at the monthly meeting encouraged some one? Each woman is a part of the grand whole, and without the women gathered by two's and three's in the monthly meeting, we would have no Auxiliary, no Presbyterial Society, no Board. Shall we not take this as our motto to-day, that "Each woman, each child counts one?"

One by one we are doing our work. One by one we must render our account. One by one we will receive our reward.

Remember always that promptness in sending reports and remitting funds is necessary. Nine years have passed, and still the majority of Auxiliaries neglect to remit quarterly, but send all together at the close of the year. In order that your Board act wisely in meeting the demands or

enlarging the work, quarterly remittance is necessary.

The question is often asked: What is the General Fund, and where does the money go? We eall all money General Fund which the societies do not order sent to a special object, and is to pay the salaries of our missionaries, teachers in schools, Bible women, etc. In sending reports, Presbyterial Treasurers should be very careful to notice special objects undertaken by the society.

The record of the

NINTH YEAR

is closed; we have reached "our mark" in one sense, and should go forward, not willing to take one backward step, but determine now to increase and widen the work, hearing anew the divine mandate "Only be thou strong and very courageous." Let us claim the divine promise, "The Lord will be with thee whithersoever thou goest," responding in faith, "All that thou commandest us we will do, and whithersoever thou sendest us we will go," realizing that this is the King's business, committed to us by the King himself, and it requireth haste. May the Lord of the harvest bless the seed which has been sown to the spread of his kingdom and the increase of his glory in the heart!

Foreign Secretary's Report.

More than twenty centuries ago a voice was heard crying: "Watchman, what of the night?" and from the watch-tower the pealing answer came back: "The morning cometh"-the morning of that blessed day, when the light of the Sun of Righteousness shall illume all lands, and the earth shall be full of "the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea."

It has pleased God to place us in an era of such wonderful advancement, that as the years go by in our experience as missionary gleaners, and we assemble each year at our Annual Meeting, the "watch-tower" of our work, we come with hearts all aglow to our review, for the "watchman's" echo is ever floating in the air, "the morning dawneth." Yes, these fleeting years prove that the triumph of Christianity over all the earth is certainly

and speedily to be accomplished.

While the year just passed has been one of no striking events to mark its course, yet the work of our missionaries is going forward very encouragingly. The spirit is moving upon the waste places, and the Christian religion is held higher and stronger before the minds of "Young Japan" and the nations of the West, as the highest wisdom. There the seed is springing up anew, each year promising an abundant harvest, proving there is no time for rest or for retreat, but rather a grand rally of all our forces and for a faithful levy for recruits on the idlers without our camp. It is well said that "The missionary is the divine energy of the gospel." O that this divine energy may pervade all our churches and fill our hearts, so instead of the little we have hitherto done, we may "attempt great things for God, and expect great things of God."

"COME OVER AND HELP US!"

We are proud to see our roll-book of foreign missionaries adding new names to it pages, for it evidences carnest sympathy for the above appeal and love for those who plead. Before going to our last Annual Meeting, a union consecration service of Rev. G. W. Van Horn and wife was held in St. Louis, by the Assembly and Woman's Board of Missions, when these two lives nobly surrendered all ties of homeland and cheerfully answered

the Macedonian cry.

On the fourth Saturday of September last, one of that perfect kind of autumn days which God seems to give "to call our thoughts from earth away and woo them unto heaven;" the Pacific steamer Gaelic set sail, bearing Rev. A. D Hail and wife back to their field of earnest life-work and Rev. G. W. Van Horn and wife to new experiences, sacrifices, and struggles, landing in Osaka, Japan, October 25, 1888, with a hearty welcome. So, to-day, the Cumberland Presbyterian Mission of Japan has been strengthened to an earnest, brave-working twelve. Our Woman's Board has had the good fortune to count five faithful workers of this number as their representatives.

THE WILMINA GIRLS' SCHOOL

building, which was destroyed a year ago last February (1888) by fire, and being rebuilt at this time last year, was ready for use July 1, 1888. This shows with what energy and despatch our business managing missionaries work.

Owing to varied circumstances our school work has undergone some change. The resignation of Mrs. Drennan a year ago, who so long, faithfully, and successfully devoted herself to this branch of the work, was tendered and accepted, that she might go to other fields which seemed opening before her in a wide harvest of work to which she is especially adapted. Miss Rezner having the study of the language to prosecute at stated hours of the day, the Mission appointed Miss Duffield to take charge until the arrival of Mrs. Van Horn, who was appointed by the Woman's Board as successor to Mrs. Drennan in the school. We feel she will make a success of any work she bears a part in.

Mrs. Van Horn is a woman of strong ability and experience, a devoted Christian teacher, and we feel will carry onward to success the good work already begun. As yet she feels embarrassed with the newness of the work, but is hopefully going forward, learning the condition of the work and people, doing the English teaching in the school, and grasping every

opportunity for scattering God's seed. The enrollment of pupils for the year shows encouragingly the condition of the school, considering the changes and perplexities it has undergone.

With these figures and amounts there is little to discourage. Let us pray and work more earnestly for our school in Japan. These people are calling more eagerly every year for English teaching and teachers. We are told that in these late years, "the schools and colleges of Japan have the English language principally taught, and by and by the young men and women will be speaking that beautiful language which is destined one day to be the language of the whole world, thus bringing them into living connection with every nation of the earth." Shall we then, sisters, withhold one opportunity, one mite, one sacrifice, one effort, be it ever so small, to hinder this great demand with all its promised results. No! "a faint heart is a consequence of feeble faith." Let us arouse to pray, to send, to influence, to work, or to go, as the Spirit guides.

STATIONS HELD BY THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN MISSION

are at Osaka, Wakayama, Mitani, Hikate, Tanabe, Shingu, and Nogoya. At most of these stations, if not all, our lady missionaries have borne some experience. These stations enroll over 500 communicants, with congre-

gations at each station (except Nogoya), and two at Osaka.

Nogoya is a new field opened this last year—a city, we are told, of about 115,000. This station is of great future promise, and as the call was urgent Mrs. Drennan and Miss Rezner have taken up work at this point. Surely so large a city as this must be a broad field for Christian workers. We trust that the harvest work of our Missionaries here, as they strive to make the "rough places plain" and the "crooked places straight," may be crowned with good cheer and blessed success. These new fields opening up, calling new Missionaries, verily prove "the growth of the mustard seed and the spread of the leaven."

Miss Leavitt's work bears in the same channel as in former years—carrying on work in the interior. Her work this past year has been of invaluable service in various ways to the different Churches, especially in Osaka, Tanabe, and Shingu. With Miss Leavitt's knowledge of the language she can reach those in her journeys that might not be reached by others. She,

with her Bible woman, who travels with her, does a twofold work.

HOGAN INSTITUTE, INDIAN TERRITORY.

This school has been organized two years, and Mrs. S. S. Phelps still continues her labors in it, although under many discouragements and privations, give us pleasant glimpses occasionally into this field, as well as some quaint pieces of experience. With her school work and Bible teaching and the outlook for each new necessity in her work among this people, the year has been well spent for the Master. The enrollment for the year shows an attendance of 29 pupils. These are whites and half-breeds, and though the number may seem comparatively small, it is a progress and a nucleus around which great success may grow.

Our work among the Indians is somewhat embarrassed for the lack of legal recognition on the part of the territorial authorities, but now that the United States government has taken an advance step in the Territory, we hope it may be the means to securing more hopeful inroads to the progress

of Christian education and Missionary work.

MEXICO.

The country next to Africa in ignorance; a country where the reading of the Bible is not allowed; where priest law is absolute—demands attention and calls to Missionary people for Christian aid. Gleaning from notes from this field, all need feel that the spirit of Missionary enterprise is growing here also. The work begun here about four years ago by the General Assembly's Board, is bearing such good fruit that it bids the Woman's Board to enter too. A day school has been instituted, which holds sessions each afternoon of the week. A call having been made to the Woman's Board for this school, an appropriation of \$500 was made to the work, to be used as General Assembly's Board directed. This field has inspired in us a warm consideration, and when the demand grows for women workers, we hope to be ready to answer. Indian Territory and Mexico are fruitful fields near home and they ought not to lie waste for want of tillers.

GOOD NEWS.

No better news could we send to Japan, nor happier announcement make to the Church than this: Miss May and Agnes Morgan having accepted the call to Japan several years ago and who have been patiently and proficiently preparing themselves specially for foreign work, are among our number to-day ready to pledge their consecration and receive the charge of the Boards to that great command, "Go ye." As sisters, whose spirits are one in this great cause, we bid you God-speed, trusting the Bread of Life and cup of cold water, which you shall bring to those afar in deserts of sinful hunger and thirst, may be cheer and strength and power to you in the trials which you may meet and the sacrifices which you must make. May your sheaves for the Lord's garner be many.

The beautiful example of these two sisters should arouse all to more zealous thought of the "whitening harvest" of fields afar. Earnest, very earnest appeals roll across the ocean—"O do send us help, the work is so great and the laborers so few." Surely this is a call to the men and women

of our Church to answer.

Come labor on! The laborers are few, the fields are wide New stations must be filled and blanks supplied; From voices far or near at home. The call is, "Come."

Who will answer this invitation this year?

ENCOURAGEMENTS.

"The Lord reigneth, let all earth rejoice." This distant echo reaches us to-day and our discouragements and perplexities vanish, for what though the burden be heavy, Christ will carry it for us. We have need to take up the glad refrain to-day, as we remember that four Missionaries will be dedicated to the work this year and two so full of inspiration for its needs have returned, others applied. The health of our Missionaries has been spared—none disabled; that though the elements have visited school and Church, yet the links broken were joined and the chain extended on to strengthen other parts of the work. They tell us the new year will cover a territory four times as great as ever before.

WORK FOR ALL.

Our review is finished, but our work not done—only begun—we have reached the parting way where opportunity and responsibility meet. Increased responsibilities call for increased energy in working and giving.

The material part of our work gives, "something for each of us now to do," from the youngest to the oldest among us. A late letter from Japan suggests an American Flag for the Wilmina Girls' School. Here is a work for our boys and girls. No better way for the young to show their loyalty

to their country, nor their interests in the work of Missions, than sending them our country's ensign. As it waves over the people of Japan, it may impress them with the great tide wave of sympathy we bear in our hearts for them. It is wanted as a gift not sent out of any Missionary fund.

A piano and library are greatly needed in the school. The latter especially more needed, since a reading-room has been connected with the school. It has been suggested through our Missionary paper, that a book or books be sent to make up this library by any one wanting to do something to further the cause. This is a call that would seem to meet the desire of all who want to do an individual part. The piano could be a special object for bands or societies—these are only suggestions. It is our work; choose your part—let us grasp the opportunity and each do their share.

You have heard the call for "more workers." Each letter bears the message for continued *prayer*. Each of these calls are impressive to all who hold this work close to their hearts. One in the field says, "If there is any class of people in the world that needs the united prayers of Christendom, it is the Missionary. It is an inspiring thought to the Missionary that in every hour of the day, some one is praying the power of God upon him. The native convert needs the prayer to keep him from the influence of the many pitfalls that lie around him."

The call "to come," is for those who are possessed with rare capabilities,

eonsecration and undoubted piety, vigorous constitution—brave, cheerful souls, "meet for the Master's use."

Again, our work needs perfect oneness in spirit, at home and abroad, that the throbbings of our hearts in loving sympathy for a lost world, will quicken the pulsations in others, until more of the women of our Church will enthusiastically and conscientiously say, "I will give my heart and hand to this work."

H.—PUBLICATION.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, to convene at Kansas City, Missouri, May 16, 1889:

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN—Since our last report we have elected Rev. W. J. Darby, D.D., of Evansville, Ind., General Manager of the Publishing Work of the Church, and Rev. M. B. DeWitt, D.D., to the position prescribed by the General Assembly in its requirements concerning the Sunday-school department. The sphere of the latter's duties is indicated in the following paragraph from his contract: "Dr. DeWitt shall edit all the Sunday-school periodicals which shall be published by the Board, except the Gen and Lambs, and shall have a general advisory superintendence over them. So much of his time as may not be required for the discharge of his editorial duties shall be devoted to the office of General Sunday-school Superintendent, he aiming to give a due proportion of his

time to each department of work."

The contract with Dr. Darby sets forth that "The appointment of a General Manager is designed to secure the constant presence of one who shall speak and act with the full authority of the Board in all departments of the work," and provides that he shall be responsible, primarily, as the Board's representative, for the entire publishing work of the Church, in a like sense that the Board itself is responsible for the same. His functions and relations in all their bearings are fully set forth in the contract, and we are sure that results will abundantly prove the wisdom of the Board in the re-adjustment of its affairs implied in the creation of the office of General Manager. These brethren are too well and favorably known to your body and the entire Church to need any special commendation from us. Suffice it to say that they are in every way worthy and well qualified for their respective positions.

Rev. W. J. Darby resigned as a member of our Board when he accepted the position of General Manager, and we elected Elder J. H. Zarecor, of Nashville, to fill the place made vacant by the resignation of Dr. Darby.

We have arranged to reduce the expenses of the operating department and to increase our facilities for publishing more books and other literature. We expect to largely increase our patronage and develop our work in every respect by the employment of Dr. Darby, who we think is the right man in the right place. The details of internal arrangements are not yet complete, but will be adjusted on the most economical basis possible, consistent with efficiency in carrying out our enlarged plans of work.

The past year has been a financial success and at its close we are able to report a most gratifying result. We gladly announce that all debts are paid and there is not a single outstanding claim of consequence against the Board. We have in bank \$2,975.12. Of this amount we hold in trust \$2,242.89, as follows: for Cumberland University on the Manlove proposition \$1,416.10, on the Children's Day fund \$372.94, and as Treasurer of the General Assembly \$453.85. There are sundry small accounts, payable on demand, amounting to \$319.02. After paying these we will have on hand a cash balance of \$413.21. In addition to this we have accounts due the Board amounting to \$10,736.83, which are as solvent as the accounts of any ordinary business house, also notes owing the Board amounting to \$1,592.90, two thirds of which are certainly collectable.

THE REVIEW.

According to the oft-expressed wish of the Church the Board determined to begin the publication of a quarterly magazine and to conduct it on a high grade, trusting the Church to show its appreciation by extending it a patronage that would at least make it self-sustaining. The first issue appeared in January and the next in April, and we feel assured that any Cumberland Presbyterian, concerned for the literature of his Church, must feel proud of a publication that makes such an auspicious beginning. The subscription list is at present less than 400, and it must be largely increased during the year to enable it to pay expenses. Rev. Dr. Howard is editor in chief, and Drs. Harris, DeWitt, and Darby are associate editors.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL DEPARTMENT.

In compliance with your instructions to place the editorial management of our Sunday-school Interature and the superintendency of our Sunday-schools under the control of one person, in September last we elected Dr. DeWitt, Editor and Superintendent, he being a man of ample experience in both departments of said work. He began work in January. In preparing the matter for the periodicals he is so grading as to adapt it to the various classes in our Sunday-schools; and, as General Superintendent of our Sunday-schools, he has been corresponding with the Presbyterial Sunday-school Secretaries, and procuring suitable persons to act as such secretarics, where none had been appointed. He has so far succeeded that there are now very few Presbyteries which have no Sunday-school Secretaries at work, and he has procured and is procuring necessary statistics to aid him in advancing the Sunday-school interests of the whole Church. What Dr. DeWitt has done since his appointment is in furtherance of the excellent work inaugurated by Rev. J. H. Warren as General Superintendent.

This arrangement necessitated severing the official relations existing between this Board and Drs. Foster and Hinds as editors of the Sundayschool periodicals. These gentlemen did their work as editors with marked ability, and to the perfect satisfaction of the Board. They have merited, and we feel sure they have received, the hearty commendation of the entire Church. The term of Dr. Hinds' service was one year; that

of Dr. Foster ten years.

The development of the Sunday-school interests of the Church is second in importance to no other form of work. The employment of a General Superintendent of sunday-schools and the creation of a fund, by collections on "Children's Day," is an important step in that direction. The receipts from these collections are kept separate from the ordinary business affairs of the Board, and will be sacredly appropriated to what might be called Missionary Sunday-school Work. For such a fund there is a vast uncultivated field in our Church and we hope it will soon become large enough to justify the employment of missionaries, or colporteurs, in various parts of the Church, and the doing of benevolent work by means of publishing and distributing Sunday-school literature wherever it may be needed. Thus weak schools may be fostered, and new schools organized in important communities which may ultimately develop into Churches. In such a work a large fund may be wisely and profitably employed.

BOOKS.

The Board feels the necessity of publishing more books, and appreciates fully the wishes of the Church in this regard. We are ready at any time to publish any suitable manuscript that gives promise of a sufficient circulation to prevent loss, and of filling a worthy place in the literature of the Church.

Conditional arrangements have been made by the General Manager to issue a series of ten books, as follows:

I.—Echoes from Caruthers Hall. Being ten lectures delivered by members of the Cumberland University Faculty. Edited by Chancellor Nathan Green, LL D.

111.—Women of the Orient. An account of the Religious, Intellectual, and Social Condition of Women in Japan, China, India, Egypt, Syria, and Turkey. By Rev. R. O. Houghton, A.M. Introduction to Cumberland Presbyterian edition, by Mrs. A. D. Hail, of Japan.

IV.—Practical Ethics. By Rev. S. G. Burney, D.D., of Lebanon.

V.—Doctrines and Genius of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. By President A. B. Miller, D.D., LL.D., of Waynesburg, Pa.

If as many as five hundred subscribers for this series of books can be obtained, they will be published promptly. Unless some unexpected delay

occurs the Church can have them all during this fiscal year.

A second edition of Dr. McDonnold's Church History, with an admirable engraving of the author as a frontispiece, has been issued. This book gives eminent satisfaction wherever it is read, but its sale is far below what was anticipated and what we know to be its deserts. Assured that it is worthy of a place in every Cumberland Presbyterian home, we are determined to adopt new and vigorous methods to extend its sale. To this end we ask the hearty co-operation of every member of the Assembly and of the entire Church.

PAPERS AND PERIODICALS.

The high standard of excellence hitherto attained by the Cumberland Presbyterian has not only been preserved, but we believe the entire Church will agree with us that it has been improved. The circulation of the paper (8,600), is not at all commensurate with its merits. Its columns being open freely for all the interests and enterprises of the Church, it is evident that an increased circulation must result in greater prosperity to all our Boards and to every kind of Church work.

The circulation of the Sunday-school periodicals has increased to a gratifying extent, but the appended exhibit shows that it is far short of what the interests of Sunday-schools and Churches demand and the publications

themselves merit.

A greatly enlarged circulation of our papers and periodicals would add very little to the expense of publication, while it would very materially increase the benefits and profits, both to the Board's work and to the Church.

STATISTICS.

Thoroughness and system in the management of any department of Church work depend largely on the possession of full and accurate statistics. In common with the other Boards, as agreed upon in the recent conference of their representatives at Evansville, we recommend that you provide for the publication in your Minutes of statistics, showing, by Presbyteries, the name of every congregation, name of pastor, name and address of Clerk of Session, number of Sundays in each month that services are held, besides the usual items gathered by the Stated Clerks of Presbyteries

FINANCES.

The net profit of the year is \$5,603 12, as shown by the appended balance sheet. The actual profit from the business is \$7,229.83, from which is deducted for wear and tear on machinery, type, etc., 10 per cent. of last year's valuation of the same. The disposition of the year's profits and other financial features, are indicated in the following:

PUBLISHING HOUSE.

For more than thirty years it has been the purpose of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church to provide itself with a house in which to carry on its work of publication. Such purpose was indicated in the action of the Assembly of 1858 by which the present Board was created. It took more

definite shape however in 1870 when by order of the Assembly an agent was appointed to raise \$50,000 with which to erect such a building. wisdom of this purpose is attested by the example and experience of most of the successful publishing establishments in the United States, whether owned by a religious denomination, or by individuals. In our report to the General Assembly of 1888 we recommended that the Board be authorized to purchase a suitable lot to be paid for out of the profits of the business and to raise by donations a sum not less than \$30,000 nor more than \$50,000 for the purpose of erecting a suitable building. In response to

this recommendation the Assembly's Committee reported as follows:
6. "Finally, we recommend that you authorize the Board of Publication to purchase a suitable lot, and, as is stipulated in their report, to proceed, as soon and as rapidly as possible, to build a publishing house commensurate with the needs of the Board."

This sixth item in that report was referred to this General Assembly.

The building which we now occupy is not at all commensurate with, nor adapted to, the wants of the business. Its unfitness has been, from the beginning, a difficulty in our way. Not being on a street corner it can be lighted only from the front and rear and through the roof, necessitating an expensive use of gas. Our printing machinery which is very heavy, we are compelled to put on the second floor with extra supports, when they should not only be on the first floor but should stand on foundations resting on the earth itself. These ponderous presses, weighing many tons, shake the walls of the building so that we can not run them all at one time, and, managing as best we can, we provoke constant and serious complaint from the occupants of one of the adjoining houses. We have no place for an engine and boiler, except a dark cellar where they are separated from all the other machinery. The boiler should be in a separate fire proof structure on the same level with the press-room and the engine should be in the press-room. The employment of an engineer could thus probably be avoided, and the heat and dust arising from the boiler kept out of the house.

We should have a fire-proof vault in which to keep our stereotype plates, manuscript, etc. Our plates are now valued at about \$10,000. keep some insurance on them, but it is expensive to keep them insured

for their full value.

The business has outgrown the dimensions of the building. We have been compelled to rent, for our editors, attic rooms in an adjoining building, and connect them with the printing office by a fire-proof iron door through the dividing wall. On three floors in this building, 29 by 105 feet, we are crowding about 50 employees, and carrying on all the departments of our work. We can put no more presses in the press-room and have often during the past year declined profitable work because we had not the facilities for doing it. To find a building well located, which is a consideration of the very first importance, possessing the peculiar adaptations above referred to, is next to impossible. If one, even approximately writable goald be obtained it would be set a workely for the other works. suitable, could be obtained, it would be at a rental of not less than \$2,500, and we would again outgrow this, as we believe and hope, in ten or twelve years. The cost of moving our machinery, adjusting steam pipes for heating purpos s, water and gas pipes, engine, boiler, shafting, and other fixtures will cost a considerable sum of money. Our removal to the present building cost us \$1.165.31, and, as our establishment increases, each future removal would cost us more. Λ removal from the house we now occupy is a necessity, and each year's delay is at the expense of our income and the efficiency of the establishment.

More than all this, the Church should consider that its publishing work from 1847 to 1867 was a wanderer from city to city; first at Louisville, then at Nashville, and then at Pittsburgh, and that it made no progress till it was settled permanently at Nashville. It has been, since 1867, moving from place to place in Nashville, competing with well-equipped establishments, but crippled by its own inadequate facilities. The necessity for such a condition of things has now passed. The Church is able and owes it to itself and to the cause of Christianity to place its publishing work in a building more fitly expressing the Church's self-respect and its interest in the sacred cause for which it is laboring through its publishing department as well as all its other departments of work.

Since 1883 we have paid out for rents in our present quarters the sum of 38,350. Were we to continue paying the present rental (\$1,450) for the

next ten years, we would pay out for rent the sum of \$14,500.

Should we remove to a house costing \$2,500 per year we would pay out in ten years the sum of \$25,000, or, counting interest, the sum of \$32,500. In a new building we could rent certain apartments to the great advantage of our job work, and at the same time realize annually from the rents about \$1,000. Under the constitution and laws of Tennessee the property of all religious institutions is exempt from taxation to the amount of \$50,000, except those portions which are rented out and yield an income.

On the other hand, the insurance on the building would cost say \$300 per year, but this would be partly balanced by the diminished insurance

on stock, machinery, etc.

Counting the rent saved at \$2,500 per year, and the rents received at \$1,000, we would gain \$3,500 per annum by owning our own building. This takes no account of the other probable savings above referred to, nor of the large increase of business naturally following enlarged facilities and a business house commanding public attention.

The profits of the business for the past three years have been as follows:

The Board will be greatly disappointed if the profits of the next fiscal year shall fall below \$10,000. But it must be borne in mind that with present facilities, the more our Church work increases the less job work we are able to do, thereby diminishing our revenue from a source that has been especially profitable. This fact has already affected the profits for this year. Allowing even liberal margin for errors in judgment, it seems clear that were we provided with such a building as is in contemplation, we could continue to enlarge our business and carry it on successfully, and at the same time appropriate each year at least \$5,000 toward paying for a house and lot. The Board has available real estate, donated to it, on which it can realize at least \$10,000 and probably much more. The following plan, therefore, seems to us entirely feasible: Let us convert the real estate into money. Let us issue bonds not exceeding in amount \$50,000, at a rate not exceeding six per cent., and at a lower rate if practicable. Let these bonds have, say, ten years to run, but at least \$5,000 of them due and payable each year. Let the proceeds of the land be used in paying for the lot, and let the bonds be secured by a mortgage on the lot and the building to be erected thereon. The sayings in rent above estimated would about pay the interest on the bonds, and we are confident \$5,000 could be spared each year from the profits of the business to redeem that amount of the bonds.

If we depend on renting a house, what will be the situation at the end of ten years? We will have crippled our work and diminished our profits by poor facilities, and will have paid out \$25,000 or \$30,000, for which the Church will have nothing. On the other hand, if the scheme above suggested is successfully carried out, at the end of ten years the Church will have a building and equipments which will command its own self-respect and the respect of other people; which will enable it for many years to come to carry on its work at great advantage and make a large profit to be

used in any way the General Assembly may direct. The experience of

other denominations has proven that this can be done.

To carry out this scheme, the Board would call on the Church for nothing but patronage. Patronage would not only furnish the necessary money, but would accomplish the direct purpose for which the Board was created, viz.: the dissemination of the Church's publications among her people.

The scheme, in the opinion of the Board, is a safe one. If the institution were their individual property they would not deem it other than an entirely prudent financial undertaking. They, therefore, recommend to your reverend body that you authorize the Board to take the steps above

indicated.

We transmit, hereto annexed, the statement of the Board as Treasurer

of the General Assembly.

With this encouraging exhibit we gladly enter upon another year's work, assured of the confidence and co-operation of the Church, trusting the blessings of divine Providence may continue with this cause, and that prosperity may everywhere attend our beloved Zion.

III.—MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

The harvest is ended for the year and gathered are the sheaves of an abundant reaping for the Lord's worn-out, poor, and afflicted servants. The Board of Ministerial Relief rejoices to report this the best year's results of its existence.

More offerings have been made from more Churches to more beneficia-

ries than any year previous.

At the beginning of the year Rev. J. H. Miller was employed as Corresponding Secretary to have general supervision of the work under the direction of the Board—his duties being to conduct all correspondence, devise and carry out such measures as may be deemed by him and the Board necessary, to awaken the interest and secure the co-operation of the Church in the extension of this work, receive and disburse all funds paying over the same from time to time to the Treasurer or transmitting to the beneficiaries as the occasion may demand, and perform all other duties, necessary to its successful prosecution, not intrusted to other officers.

The results accomplished abundantly prove the wisdom of the plan adopted, the increased expense being inconsiderable compared with the

enlarged developments.

We have received offerings from 116 Presbyteries (only three, Athens, Eden, and Florida, not reporting), 1,176 Churches, 98 Sunday-schools, and 127 individuals, a gain of 5 Presbyteries, 442 Churches, and \$3,667.06 over last year.

Seventy-four applications have been approved and upon which we have disbursed aid according to the needs of those applying and our ability to

meet the demands. These homes contain about 215 persons.

There has been a gain of 15 applicants over last year. But with this increase of demand on the funds, we are glad to say the beneficence of the Church has enabled us to do better by the beneficiaries and at the same time transfer \$1,000 (a little over 10 per cent. of receipts) to the Permanent Fund, and have about \$2,000 remaining as a working balance.

We congratulate the Church on the deep hold that this cause has on the hearts of the people, and we rejoice with those whom we aid in their being so kindly remembered, and the people that they have a Christ-like heart. But above all we thank God for his abundant blessings on our work.

The Board would speak through you to the Presbyteries, calling their

attention-

1. To the importance of the Standing Committee in the Presbytery; it

being very necessary both for the Board and the Presbytery.

2. The superiority of the envelope system over any other for collections.
3. The Ministerial Relief day on the third Sabbath in November—the observance of which could be made very effectual in training the children and educating all in the Ministerial Relief work.

4. The importance of the Churches' having an opportunity given them by

their pastors to make offerings for this work.

5. The interesting of the Ruling Eldership more widely upon the subject—we acknowledge good work done by them in the past, and hope that there may still be an effort made by the Ruling Elder's Association in behalf of this work.

To the General Assembly we would ask consideration:—

1. A Pastoral and Congregational Directory to be inserted in the General Assembly's Minutes is quite desirable in our mind and we think will be productive of good results.

2. The appended Financial Exhibit together with the applications on

which we have distributed the funds of the Board.

3. You are asked to approve of an amendment to the By-Laws adopted by the Board subject to ratification by your body, providing for the position of Corresponding Secretary with duties as above indicated, this posi-

tion to be filled or made vacant at the discretion of the Board.

4. At the General Assembly in Waco, Texas, the Ruling Eldership of that body met in convention, discussed the question of Relief work, elected Hon. O. E. Hannah, President, and T. M. Hurst, Secretary of the Ruling Elder's Association, and decided on Saturday evening of this General Assembly to meet again in convention, which we hope the Ruling Eldership of this session will do.
5. The election of Rev. A. G. Bergen, of Evansville, Indiana, to a place as member of the Board subject to your approval.

6. The small number of Sunday-schools contributing to this cause.7. The Box Department which we have established, a source of great comfort both to donors and receivers, this we hope to make of considerable value in the coming year.

8. Of our applicants for relief, six have received their last earthly relief

and have entered into life.

General Statements.

The purpose for which this Corporation is formed is to receive, hold, convey, and disburse such real and personal property as may be given by will or otherwise to it, or acquired by it in any legitimate way, for the relief and support of disabled ministers and missionaries, and of the needy widows and orphans of deceased ministers and missionaries, or of such other persons as may be dependent upon said ministers and missionaries.

Appropriations from the funds of the Corporation shall be made alone; first, to such ministers as are members in good standing of some Presbytery of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, they having fully consecrated themselves, since entering said ministry, to the active duties thereof in said Church, and who are not able to support themselves by any suitable

vocation of life, and to such missionaries as have been appointed to work in Home or Foreign fields by the recognized authorities of said Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and who have faithfully discharged the duties assigned them during the time of their appointment, and who are not able to support themselves by any suitable vocation in life; and, second, that so far as may be consistent with the wants of disabled ministers and missionaries, the Board may also furnish aid to the widows and orphans of ministers and missionaries aforesaid, and to such other person or persons as may be, or may have been, dependent upon said ministers and missionaries.

Rules for Disbursing Funds.

1. All appropriations for ministers must be made on the recommendation of the Presbytery to which the applicant belongs, or of a standing committee of that Presbytery. Appropriations for the widows and orphans of deceased ministers must be made on the recommendation of the Presbytery to which said minister belonged at the time of his death or of a standing committee of that Presbytery. Appropriations for missionaries who are not ministers, or for those who are, or have been, dependent upon such missionaries, shall be made on the recommendation of the Board by which such missionaries were, or may be, employed.

2. Appropriations are made for one year or less, except when otherwise ordered; and if aid is continued, the recommendations must be renewed

from year to year.

EVANGELICAL UNION, SCOTLAND.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

Dear Fathers and Brethren-Honored and beloved as servants of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, may grace and peace abide with you. We have been appointed by the Conference of the Evangelical Union of Scotland to assure you of our interest in the progress of the work of the Lord in America, and to congratulate you on the prosperity of the Churches in your numerous Presbyteries, where zealeus ministers and members are faithful in their testimony to the love of God for all men, striving earnestly to turn men from wickedness, and to persuade them to accept of salvation through faith in Jesus—the Savior of the world.

May the Holy Spirit inspire you with courage and enterprise, equal to that displayed by those who were the pioneers and founders of your first Churches, so that now when your members and adherents are counted by tens of thousands your united action may be distinguished by evangelical zeal and self-sacrificing love for the truth! There are large territories open to you as fields of gospel labor; and great is the honor which God gives you to plant Churches in districts where the villages are small at present, which next century may be populous towns. There is no force in your great Republic which can compare with the moral force of a pure Church life for preserving, refining, and elevating all that is good in human society. Many streams of blessing will flow forth to the home, the township, and the State from every Christian Church. We have little to report concerning the Evangelical Union. Some of our Churches have been feeling the pressure of hard times, and have been struggling nobly to maintain their influence and extend the Kingdom of God. Other Churches have been prosperous, keeping their ground and adding to their members. There has been no marked revival; but quiet, faithful work in preaching the gospel and teaching the word of God has had its reward. Perhaps at no time has the Evangelical Union as a whole been more prosperous. This which next century may be populous towns. There is no force in your time has the Evangelical Union as a whole been more prosperous. This year our esteemed principal, Morison, enters on his fiftieth year of ministerial labors; and it is marvelous how men in all Churches speak in terms of the greatest respect of him who was in his youthful manhood denounced for maintaining the universality of the Atonement. The truth is sure to win. The increase of our influence in altering the opinions of men concerning theology threatens to diminish our denominational influence. For there are movements in the great Presbyterian Churches of Scotland and England for altering the Confession of Faith; and many are preaching the full and free salvation for all men, provided for all who will accept Christ. In the days of persecution and obloquy our people could tell all the junctions of thought and name all the stations on the lines of honest Calvinism. But now there are so many island platforms and different lines of theology touching the same stations that some are careless to determine whether election is unconditional or conditional. It is thus more difficult to awaken enthusiasm for the old points of controversy, for which your fathers and ours contended. Some of us think that the changes required in the Westminster Confession are too numerous to make it possible now to revise it; and we advocate a simpler creed containing as a basis the three great universalities which you and we hold in common. We wish sometimes that those who hold that John Calvin was right in his views of Reprobation would preach what they believe; for whitewashed iron is still iron though not black.

Still we rejoice that Christ is preached and sinners are converted. We admire the earnestness of some godly men, who believe that Christ died only for the elect, and we wish that all of us who believe in the desire of God to save all men had more of the spirit of Jesus and more success in

winning souls.

We are glad to observe your continued efforts against the liquor traffic, and long for the time when the curse of intemperance shall be removed. We hope to hear of your prosperity as a great Church, full of vital energy, full of faith and of the Holy Ghost. Brethren, pray for us. And this for you is our prayer: "That your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and all discernment; so that ye may prove the things that are excellent, that ye may be sincere and void of offense unto the day of Christ, being filled with the fruits of righteousness which are through Jesus Christ, unto the glory and praise of God."

PAN-PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE.

Rev. T. C. Blake, D.D., Nashville, Tenn.

Dear Brother:—The Church of which you are the Stated Clerk was represented in the London Council of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches holding the Presbyterian System, and the following resolutions among others of interest to the Church were passed by the Council—viz.:

Resilved, 1. That the sum of £800 or \$4,000 be regarded as the normal income per annum required for the working expenses of the Alli-

ance.

2. That the sum be provided in equal proportions by the American and

European Sections of the Alliance.

The Executive Commission of the Western or American Section of the Alliance, at its recent meeting in New York, decided to request the Supreme Judicatories of the Churches in the Alliance to contribute to the current expenses according to representation in the Council. The entire sum required is \$2,000 per annum for general expenses and \$500 for the expenses of the Western Section—a total of \$2,500 per annum. According to this arrangement your proportion of said expenses is \$495. It is desired that the apportionment should be paid, if feasible, out of the general treasury of the Judicatory. I inclose to you a printed document relating to the general work of the Alliance, and respectfully request that you present this subject of provision for current expenses to your Supreme Judicatory and secure action thereupon. BOWLING GREEN SCHOOL (COLORED).

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

Dear Moderator and Brethren:—While I am not a corresponding delegate to your body, nor a committeeman appointed to address you upon the subject of the school at this place for the colored branch of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, yet the position and relationship which I sustain to the school, the interest which I feel in its future welfare, and the solicitude which you have manifested in the institution, make it my duty to send to you something of a report with such remarks as I deem absolutely necessary for your proper information. When I have done this I feel that I will have discharged

a duty which I owe to the school, and to you its foster mother. With my tediousness I ask you to be patient, and with my plain speaking liberal, for you must remember that I speak from a heart of love and from a sense of the duty which I owe to God and to my race. I made a report to your Board of Missions a short time ago of this year's work and the present condition of things. Then I was trying to get the consent of my mind to sever my connection with the school and Church work here, but had not done so. You may censure me for my course and say that it is weakness both of faith and manhood. Call it what you may I must confess that I know not its proper name unless it be self-preservation. But I do know that down in my heart of hearts, in answer to earnest prayer upon this subject, I hear distinctly the Master's voice saying, "Welf done good and faithful servant." I can not turn from this work, however, without looking back upon what has been accomplished, with a great deal of humble pride, in the part that I have performed, and with gratitude to you, for the brotherly recognition, and the Christian help, which you have given me while earnestly trying to accomplish what I believe a divine mission. Without the part which you have taken in this work, it would have long ago come to a speedy end, and the threatening calamity, which still hangs like a storm cloud over our faithful little band, would have spent its force upon us and done its work. Our people would have been seeking homes in other folds best suited to their individual taste. This calamity has not yet befallen us, but it can only be averted by you. not in our power to do so. This should not seem strange to you, for the child that is not able to stand alone or to walk, can not be expected to protect itself from the dangers which surround its infancy, or to overcome the difficulties that environ its path. But if in the time of danger, want, and distress, it turns its trusting eyes and pleading voice to the parents who gave it being, it exercises its highest privilege, and performs its only duty. Parents have done the same, when with parental instinct and affection they bend over their helpless offspring and give the succor and protection which the wants of the helpless and the teaching of God demand. The application is easy. In what you have done to further this work you have been guided by the Spirit of God, and I am satisfied that if you will only follow up your good began work with your prayers and financial assistfollow up your good begun work with your prayers and financial assistance, you will in the near future reap a harvest of good fru t that will be to you a joy forever, and will bring down upon you, like sweet and gentle benedictions, the blessings of God, and the applause of all Christendom. In this good work I do not see how you can afford to halt, or to take one step backward. The spirit of your Confession of Faith, the spirit of your great commission, and the inroads which Roman Catholicism is making among my people, urge you to go forward in this good work. May the Spirit of God brood over your General Assembly, that it may make wise decisions in regard to this enterprise! There is a spirit of sympathy for this cause, abroad in the Church, that demands this at your hands, and I believe that the Church is now ready to follow in your footsteps and do what you recommend.

The school has steadily grown better each year since it started, and it is only a question of time and attention, as to when it will be one among the largest in the South. It is well located and is now bearing some precious clusters of ripening fruit which in a few years, if assisted, will be worth more to the Church than the gold and silver she has spent in bringing about the result. The work of giving to the negro of the South the gospel in its purity, is certainly a Home Missionary work, and you, it seems to me, are under strong denominational obligations to enter largely and earnestly into this field of labor. Other denominations have long ago done so, and are now reaping an abundant harvest from the seed they have sown, by having a large and intelligent following among the negroes. Every year there are large sums of money flowing into the Methodist, Baptist, Presbyterian, and other Churches, to carry on this work, from men and women, many of whom are members of different Churches, and many who

are members of no Church at all. Why are the religious and educational interests of the Colored Cumberland Presbyterian overlooked by your good men and women? Why has not the Cumberland Presbyterian Church become the repository and the dispenser of some of these large sums of money given for the negroes of the South? Is it because of her unwillingness or incapability to serve in the capacity of guardian? No. Is it because of her inactivity and delay in entering into this field, with an earnestness that will convince these philanthropists that she has a burning interest in the cause? Yes, brethren, I truly believe that this is the dif-To me it seems that no denomination ought to be so willing, so efficient for this work, as yourselves. The birthplace, both of the negro and Cumberland Presbyterianism, is the same sunny South, the same land of flowers, fruit and foliage, and of negro melody. Old Fathers McAdow, Ewing, and King, had not yet put the Medium System of theology on paper, before old Mammy Sallie, under her white turban, and Uncle Jack had immortalized it in their old plantation melody, which echoes forever in the ears of those whose privilege it was once to hear them, in their plantation simplicity. These tender relationships, these never-to-be-forgotten associations, together with your knowledge of the negro, his wants, needs, habits, and disposition, make you the best equipped of all, for this work. And should you enter heartily into the same, I believe that your superior fitness would soon be seen and acknowledged. Your Missionary work among the negroes is not to send white men among them to preach the gospel, for to the negro none can preach so effectively and acceptably, as the negro himself. But your work is an educational one. Give him educated and Christian leaders and you have not much more to do, but have gone a long way toward solving the negro problem. The only way to lift up a race, is to lift up its leaders. And no one can take this place among the negroes so conspicuously, and in such a matter-of-fact way, as their minister. Hence, the importance of an educated ministry. Our branch of the Church is making but little progress, and it is to be feared that we are losing ground, for the want of an educated ministry. We have but few men who are able to either hold or build up Churches in towns and cities, where our people are congregating for educational advantages. And until we have such men and Churches in these places, there will be no real

We have enrolled in our school this year 56 pupils, 25 males and 31 females. The majority of these are Christians, and belong to Churches, 30 of them are preparing to teach, and 20 are now teaching in the public schools of the counties. They are an excellent class of young men and women, and will soon be of great usefulness to the Church, the school, and the race to which they belong. Three of them are young ministers, and two are aspiring thereto. Three of these are in the Scientific department. Ten will graduate in the Normal department this year. I have seen and heard from nine young ministers who will enter next fall, four of whom and one of these already in, will be able to enter the Theological department proper. To one on the ground who has seen the work from the beginning, this is encouraging progress. Yet it is my honest opinion that the school will not progress one step further until you take some advanced steps in supplying the indispensible building needed, and giving to the school a stronger financial assistance. We have had young men and women to come from a distance every year, but they seldom ever return, because we have not the room and facilities to make them comfortable. This does the school positive injury, and ought to be remedied as soon as possible. We ought to have an L room added to the present building 40x70 feet, two stories high, the lower story to be a study hall and chapel, with two recitation rooms in the rear. The upper with a hall running through the center, and a room on each side for young men. The rooms

in the present building would do for girls and music.

A contractor says that the cost of the brick work of such a building will be from \$500 to \$600. Now if the other should cost twice as much the building will not be a very costly one. This property is worth more to-

day than was paid for it. Two new railroads are expected to come here shortly which will still increase its value. These facts taken into consideration, and that of the property being held in trust by your trustees, seem to me would of itself justify you in putting up this building. In order to further succeed you will have to give the school better financial support. Your Board of Missions deserve many thanks for the interest they have taken in this work and the assistance they have given me. They have never refused a request which I have made of them. But because I have always been afraid of overstraining the growing spirit of liberality and sympathy of the Board and Church, I have never asked for the real needs of the school. And from year to year there has been left over a little indebtedness, which in its increasing amount, now falls

like a dead weight upon me.

The first two years of the school's existence I paid the little balances out of my own means, amounting to \$156. Three years ago I lacked \$102, in raising the salary of the Principal. This is yet unpaid and I am held for it. In addition to this debt I have been compelled during last year and this to have some fencing done, the guttering on the house changed, a cistern prepared, some work done in the house, and a line of fence which is now under construction, which amounts to \$185 more—total, \$287. Besides this I have been on this work for a number of years, the larger portion of which time I received no salary at all, though working hard in Church and school. At no time have I received any thing like a living salary. I have held on here all these years hoping and trusting that the time would come when for my labors here I would receive enough to live on, but poverty and bad health forbid that I shall wait any longer. Still, have done what I could but hefore I leave I must get you to from me I have done what I could. But before I leave I must ask you to free me from the obligation of this \$287, \$102 of which is teacher's salary, and the other for improvement of this property. This would fall very lightly on your body but very heavy on me. I believe it will take about \$2,000 to put up the building of which I have spoken, to do the fencing which is needed, and to put all in proper order for the school. The institution ought to have an allowance of about \$1,000 a year, this is as little as it is possible tor the school to run under. A good man at its head is one of the essentials, and he will have all he can do without having charge of the Church. tials, and he will have all he can do without having charge of the Church. He ought to receive a yearly salary, and during vacation should travel in the interest of the school in securing pupils and especially in getting young ministers in the school. At the same time such a man could do great good in working up our Church in many other respects. You may think that this is asking a great deal, but if you will only look over Minutes of other Churches and see the tens, fifties, and hundreds of thousands of dollars which they are spending in such work you will find that we are in fact what our conduct has all along indicated. We ask not for the bounties but the crumbs that fall from the table. With the improvement which I have mentioned I think the school will grow and prosper and will soon be the pride of the Church. Our Church is able prosper and will soon be the pride of the Church. Our Church is able to do but little if any thing toward the school. Everywhere they are engaged in local work of some kind, either building, buying, or paying for some of these things. Besides nearly all of our Presbyteries and Synods are carrying on missions within their bounds and doing what they can to support a pastor. From their small earnings this is about all they can do for the present. May the Lord bless your body and all its deliberations. H. A. Gibson.

V.—EDUCATION.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

The Board of Education herewith submits its Eighth Annual Report:

It is with feelings of thankfulness and pride that we are at last able to say that the true mission of this Board has been seen and recognized by the Church. For the first six years of its existence, it was like a ship at sea, without rudder or compass, beating aimlessly about, of little help to the Church, and its friends beginning to despair of its real usefulness or proper sphere of action.

It has now taken its place among the institutions of the Church, and its machinery is moving in unison with other machinery of the Church, and

forming a part of one harmonious whole.

As the wide and far-reaching effect of its work and usefulness begins to open up, your Board devoutly prays for the guiding hand of Providence in its affairs. Let us think of the hundreds of young men-aye, we might say thousands, as the years roll by and its work grows—whose lives will be made glorious and bright by the aid of this Board; who will be lifted from the darkness of ignorance up into the sunlight of knowledge; whose power and influence in the Church will be increased a hundred-fold, and

their good work felt in years to come.

The fiscal year of this Board, which closed April 1st, has witnessed the awakening of the Church to the great importance of this work; a new life is astir; the importance of a universally educated ministry is being felt; the heart of the Church beats more responsively and the interest increases. While the sympathy of a few faithful ones has always been with us, the first real response from the Church at large has been made this year. The Board has been in existence for eight years, but from lack of a Quarter for collections, and other causes, the entire contribution for the first seven years was only \$688.57, while for the year just closed it amounts to \$2,030.90, and of special or reported donations, \$270, making a total of \$2,300.90, or a contribution in one year more than three times as much as in the seven preceding years. Surely we should be thankful and take fresh courage for the future. Instead of 19 contributing Presbyteries as last year, this year we have 85. Instead of only 37 Churches, we now have 323,

HOW SHALL FUNDS BE DISBURSED?

As the contributions of the Church began coming in pretty freely, the question of how they should be disbursed arose. Preliminary to a decision, we wrote letters to all the schools of the Church that were likely to have in them any candidates for the ministry, asking names and number of candidates; how many would need aid and how much. A considerable number of responses were made, and the demand for aid proved to be greater than the ability of the Board to supply. As the Church has but one Theological Seminary, and the demand for help was strong from this quarter, your Board visited it in person, with a view to investigate and to discriminate in rendering aid.

The questions to be solved were numerous. What shall be the average amount of loan? What shall be the average time of assistance? Shall the students in the Academic department be aided, or only those in Collegiate departments and in the Theological Seminary?

Shall those who have married, or may marry after entering upon their

preparation for the ministry be aided?

These were some of the questions we were required to answer.

As our means were limited, we earnestly sought to place them where they would do the most good, and bear fruit earliest, and at the same time help our struggling schools, and young men in all parts of the Church. To aid the young candidate or licentiate to finish his education and get him out into the field as a worker, is the aim of the Board.

The Theological Seminary at Lebanon, seemed to be the field most promising of the best results, and it was from here the greatest demand for

aid came, and it was here that our greatest aid was given.

CANDIDATES AIDED.

The number of candidates aided were as follows: Bethel College, 6; Waynesburg College, 3; Lincoln University, 3; Trinity University, 3; Cumberland University, 33. (Of the latter 31 were in the Theological Seminary.) Total aided by the Board, 48.

In addition thereto six other students of Cumberland University were aided by their Presbyteries and such aid reported to this Board. This method your Board would very much deprecate. If donors desire their money given to any particular person or persons, or disposed of in any particular manner, their wishes will always be respected by this Board. For Presbyteries or Churches to give directly and not through the Board tends to disorganization and chaos, and such an example is bad, and were all to do so the necessity for the existence of a Board would cease. The average amount of loans made by the Board was \$60. Only in a few instances were we able to give aid for both terms of the schools, and some young men were obliged to leave for want of assistance. Still we have the satisfaction of knowing that many came and were kept in school that could not otherwise have done so. We are gratified to say, also, that the graduating class in the Theological Seminary is larger than for many years past, and never equaled but once before. Your Board desires this question answered: Shall a student forfeit his scholarship or right to assistance by marrying after he has commenced his preparation for the ministry? An affirmative answer to the question is given by other denominations, and it is an answer which we think is founded in reason. By far the heaviest loans we have had to make during the past year have been to those students who have families. Several more could have been aided but for this fact.

RETURN LOANS.

The loans returned during the past year are three in number and amount to \$140. Your Board at its last meeting adopted a resolution to retire 50 per cent. of all return loans and make a permanent investment of same, of which only the interest shall be used. We think it advisable to build up a fund of this sort out of which Scholarships may be created. These loans will come in very slowly, and the fund will be a long time accumulating. We ask your ratification of this resolution.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

This Board has been regularly chartered, and, under the laws of Tennessee, can receive and hold real estate or other property. We very earnestly invite bequests of property from the benevolent, or gifts from those able to donate Scholarships, the minimum amount of which is \$2,000, and as much larger as the donor chooses to make it.

EDUCATIONAL COMMITTEES.

We again insist that every Presbytery shall appoint a Standing Committee on Education, the Chairman of which shall be the agent of this Board in the Presbytery. The Committee is to be charged with the duty of looking after the educational work in its Presbytery and reporting at the Spring meeting whether the candidates under its charge are in school; if not, the reason why; what progress has been made; what Churches have contributed to the work of this Board, and how much. We have received notice of the appointment of not more than a dozen of these committees pursuant to your recommendation of last year.

REPORTS FROM SCHOOLS.

Your Board was quite desirous of making an exhaustive report upon the schools of the Church, such as may belong to Synods or Presbyteries, both male and female schools, and to make a tabulated statement, giving names of schools, location, endowment, names of Presidents, number of pupils, etc., but the answers to our circular letter have been so few and meager that we fear that this branch of the Board's work will fall into innocuous desuetude. We have thought that it would be a matter of interest to the Church at large, and of considerable profit and a means of advertisement to the several schools, to have a report of the character indicated from this Board to the General Assembly each year. We give such reports as were sent.

What may be obtained from that which has been classed as Promises and Wills is extremely problematical, but in the end the Church will have to look to bequests for any very large or substantial endowment, yet the work that has been done has proved of great benefit to the Theological Seminary, and it is doing more efficient work now than at any time during its past history.

At a meeting of the representatives from the several Boards of the Church, a resolution was adopted requesting that in the publication of your Minutes a tabulated statement be made giving the names of the Churches by Presbyteries, and the names of pastors and amounts contributed to the several Boards of the Church, so that the record of each Church could be seen at a glance. This will give more work to the Stated Clerk, but the Minutes would be less expensive.

The report of Rev. Dr. J. C. Provine, as Treasurer, is herewith submitted as part of this report, marked schedule "A." By a resolution of the Board all remittances hereafter will be sent to the Secretary at Nashville. Tennessee.

We close this report with the sincere hope and earnest prayer that the utterances of this General Assembly on the subject of educational work may be such that every Presbytery, pastor, and congregation shall fixedly resolve that it shall be enlarged and carried to that point that in this Church no candidate for the ministry shall ever lack for the means to acquire an education.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY.

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To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

The Trustees of Cumberland University respectfully submit to your reverend body the following, as their Annual Report for the year ending June 6, 1889:

With great pleasure we report that the year has been one of prosperity in all the departments and in every respect. The forthcoming catalogue will show an increase of students in all departments, and the largest aggregate attendance since the beginning of the war in 1861, and the largest number preparing for the ministry, in college and in the Theological School together, ever enrolled in the history of the University—eighty-two in all.

The character of the students, together with their grade in their classes and their deportment, is all that we could ask. The moral tone of the school is excellent, and the religious and spiritual life better than usual. Complete harmony has prevailed in all departments—among the authorities,

between teachers and students, and among the students themselves.

The health of the school has been good. We mourn the death of one of our students during the year—a son of one of our citizens—but with this exception there has been very little sickness.

Altogether it has been a pleasant and properous year.

The endowment is increasing, slowly but surely, every year, and we confidently look forward to the time when it will be sufficient to fully compensate the present corps of teachers, and add to the number until every department is fully equipped.

You will receive the report of Rev. J. S. Grider, the Endowing Agent for the Theological School, through the report of the Board of Education. From his report you will see that the full endowment of the Theological

School is only a matter of a very few years more.

For several years past Divinity Hall, the home of the young preachers, has been overrun. This year it has been crowded, and many were turned away for want of room. We think the number of probationers for the ministry would have been much larger if there had been room for them in Divinity Hall, or as cheap and comfortable boarding could have been secured for them elsewhere.

Additional buildings for this purpose are very much needed. A number of Presbyteries and individuals have refitted the different rooms in Divinity Hall, until now, nearly all of them are neat, comfortable, and well furnished. We have allowed Presbyteries and friends who would refit and furnish a room the privilege of filling it with students preparing for the ministry. In this way the Presbyteries secured rooms for their young men while in school. A number of other Presbyteries have asked for rooms, and some of them have the money on hand for the purpose. If we had about two thousand dollars (\$2,000) a good building with eight or ten rooms could be put up and inclosed, and the Presbyteries would finish the rooms and furnish them. In no way could the same amount of money accomplish so much in the education of the rising ministry in our Church.

We mentioned in our report to your reverend body last year that we were looking forward with the hope that we would be able to dedicate a new and elegant college building for the uses of the Literary and Theological Schools, during our semi-centennial year. A year has passed, and with it our hopes in the accomplishment of this grand end are increased. With the year the demands for such a building have, also, increased. It is becoming a necessity. With the competition that surrounds us, the facilities of other institutions, and the inducements offered to students, by imposing buildings and beautiful grounds, make it necessary that we should erect a large building that will cost from \$60,000 to \$75,000. This we propose

to do within the next three years. We have some expectations of assistance in large sums, but we may decide to call upon the whole Church for help, and may find it necessary to make a general canvass for the purpose. In this proposition and effort we pray the approval and encouragement of your reverend body.

No vacancies or changes have occurred in the Board of Trustees or Fac-

ulty since our last report.

The Trustees and Faculty join in kindly greetings and in the prayer that your deliberations may be harmonious and profitable in the upbuilding of the Church for the glory of God.

THE CHARTER OF THE BOARD.

[Acts of Kentucky, 1853-4, Vol. 2.]

An Act to amend the charter of Cumberland College, and to incorporate the Trustees of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

WHEREAS, an act to amend an act, entitled "an act to amend the charter of Cumberland College, and for other purposes," approved February 16, 1841, was passed for the benefit of "Cumberland College Association" and the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, by which act the entire control and management of said College was given up to said General Assembly; and, whereas, by said act the Board of Trustees of said College and General Assembly were made; and, whereas, said General Assembly has dissolved its connection with said College; and, whereas, the Board of Trustees of said College and said General Assembly are two separate and distinct bodies, although acting under the same charter; and, whereas, much difficulty has been experienced by said Board of said General Assembly by reason of deficiencies in their said charter—in collecting donations, bequests, and other charities given to said Church; therefore,

Be it enacted, 1. By the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, that George D. McLean, Will. H. Meller, Silas N. Davis, T. J. Duncan, M. Dudley, Thos. Hunter, John P. Rascoe, H. W. Champion, R. H. Lander, Reuben O'Hara, Wm. H. Barnett, J. H. Miller, and their suc-Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and by that name and style shall sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, and possess all the powers and rights of a corporate body, and shall continue in office until the annual session of said General Assembly in 1856, and until their sue-

cessors are duly elected and qualified according to law.
2. That the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly of said Church shall have full power and authority to receive in trust for the said General Assembly any donation, bequest, or other charities, which may be, or have been hitherto, made to said Church, or to said General Assembly, or to said Board for the use and benefit of said Church or Assembly, for educational, religious, or charitable purposes under the direction of the said General Assembly.

3. That all moneys and other estates, of every description, which may be vested in said Board of Trustees, by virtue of their office, shall forever be held in trust for the use of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, the interest alone of which shall be devoted to religious, charitable, or educa-

tional purposes, as the said Assembly may direct.
4. That said General Assembly shall be empowered to elect her said Trustees at her regular and stated meetings, any five of whom, assembled at a regular meeting, or by a constitutional call, shall constitute a quorum to do business.

5. That said Board of Trustees may appoint an executive committee, to consist of the secretary, treasurer, and three other members to manage the fiscal concerns of said Board, any three of whom shall constitute a quorum

to do business.

6. That said Board of Trustees shall meet annually on the fourth Monday in June, in each year, at which time they shall elect a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer, who shall continue in office until their successors are elected and qualified; the said Board shall also meet semi-annually, or oftener, on its own adjournments, or by a call of the president, effect the views of said General Assembly; to manage and invest the funds collected, or any other property or estate; and said Board shall report to said Assembly of said Church at her regular meetings.

7. That the President of said Board shall preside in all the meetings of the same, call special meetings at the request of any two members, and the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, shall preside and possess similar powers; and in the absence of both President and Vice-President, then said Board may choose a President pro tem., who shall preside for the

time being.

8. That the Secretary shall keep a full and fair record of all the proceedings of said Board, and carry on all its correspondence.

9. That the Treasurer shall take charge and dispose of all funds accord-

ing to the directions of said Board, and report when called on. 10. That the Treasurer shall give bond, with approved security, in such penalty, to said Board, as the same may, from time to time direct, for the taithful performance of his duties: Provided, that none of his sureties

shall be members of said Board.

11. That all vacancies created by death, resignation, or in any other manner, shall be filled by the ensuing General Assembly of said Church, unless said Board find it absolutely necessary to do it themselves, in which case the appointment to fill any vacancy shall continue only until the vacancy shall be filled by the said Assembly.

12. That in case of the failure of any officer of said Board to serve, according to the requisitions of said Assembly, the Board shall have

power to elect a suitable person to such office, according to said requisi-

tions, and to remove delinquents in office.

13. That should the time ever come when any religious body, claiming to be the successors of the present General Assembly of said Church, and should hold and maintain doctrines and sentiments different from those now held by said Church, then the powers and privileges granted to the General Assembly of said Church, shall inure to and be vested in that body of people professing and preaching the doctrines of the said Church, as now set forth in her Confession of Faith.

14. That said Board shall have authority, by law, to collect all such sums of money, all legacies, bequests, donations, and estates, of every description, as have heretofore been or may hereafter be subscribed, devised, bequeathed, or donated by individuals, or for which any persons may have heretofore or may hereafter execute their notes or bonds, to the said

Church, Assembly, or Board. Approved March 8, 1854.

The reports from the Stated Clerks show that 144 ministers hore letters of dismissal and recommendation at the time said reports were forwarded. Only a small number of these had had time to join other Presbyteries when the reports were made out. Still, only one half of the number has been added to the list of or 'ained ministers. Several were stricken Stated Clerks of Presbyteries. It will be seen that several Presbyteries made no reports for 1888. Previous reports were substituted. Had they reported, and had the ratio of infrom the roll who did not bear letters of dismiss-1. This was caused, no doubt, from inaccuracies of Stated Clerks of Presbyteries. There are, it is confidently believed, at least 1,650 ordained ministers. The entire tabular exhibit for the year, as will be seen by comparison with previous years, gives most gratifying results. During the year 13,093 were added The sum total of membership, too, is the largest by several thousand that has ever been reported. To ascertain accurately the amounts contributed to Missions, Education, Publication, and Ministerial Relief, see the reports of those Boards respectively, for in many cases money was sent to these Boards directly, and was not reported to crease been the same with then as with the Presbyteries which did report, the sum total of the membership would have been considerably larger. Could accurate statistics be obtained, the entire membership would be at least 170,000. The total membership embraces the 600 in Japan.

Statistics of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored.

The General Assembly of 1886 directed the Stated Clerk to embody in the Minutes the statistics, in brief, of the Comberland Preshyterian Church, Colored. From the most re liable information at hand the following, it is believed, is a close approximation: Ordained ministers, 200; licentiates, 180; candidates, 200; Presbyteries, 22; Synods, 5; Genera Assembly, 1; and communicants, 15,000.
