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MINUTES.

OWENSBORO, KY., Thursday, May 21, 1891.

The General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church met, agreeable to adjournment, in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, at Owensboro, Ky., Thursday, May 21, 1891, at 11 o'clock A.M.

The opening sermon was preached by the Moderator, Rev. E. G. McLean, D.D., of Walla Walla Presbytery, upon the text, Ps. xix. 7: "The law of the Lord is perfect."

After the sermon the General Assembly was constituted with prayer by Rev. B. P. Fullerton.

The General Assembly then took recess till 3 o'clock P.M.

THURSDAY, May 21, 3 o'clock P.M.

The Stated Clerk then made the following report:

No new Synod has been organized during the year; but the boundary lines of the Missouri Synod were so changed as to place the Nebraska Presbytery in the Synod of Kansas.

PRESBYTERIAL CHANGES.

The Tennessee Presbytery was consolidated with the Elk, the consolidated Presbytery taking the name of the Elk.

CHANGE OF PRESBYTERIAL NAMES.

The Hiwassee was changed to Knoxville; the Knoxville to East Tennessee; the Ohio to Owensboro; the Bethel to Choctaw; the Kirkpatrick to Corsicana; and the White Rock to Dallas.

NEW PRESBYTERIES.

During the year the following new Presbyteries were organized: In the Synod of Texas, the Chickasaw, the East Louisiana, and the Pease River; in the Synod of Pennsylvania, the Pittsburgh—making four new Presbyteries.

ELECTION OF MODERATOR.

The General Assembly then proceeded to the election of a Moderator, which resulted in the choice of Ruling Elder E. E. Beard, of Lebanon Presbytery.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

A communication and memorial from the American Bible Society was read, and it was determined that said paper should be referred to the Committee on Overtures. The Rev. Dr. McLean, Secretary of the American Bible Society, being present, was invited to address the General Assembly, which he did.

VISIT TO THE “THORNTON HOME.”

The General Assembly received and accepted an invitation from the Board of Ministerial Relief to go on a steamboat excursion next Saturday to Evansville, Ind., to visit the “Thornton Home,” for aged ministers and orphans, which institution is under the supervision of said Board.

HOURS OF MEETING.

It was determined that the daily sessions of the General Assembly, unless otherwise ordered, shall be from 8 o'clock A.M. to 11.30 o'clock A.M., and from 2 o'clock P.M. to 5 o'clock P.M., and that the first half hour of each morning session shall be given to devotional exercises.

The report of the Board of Church Erection was read, and addresses were made by Rev. S. Finis King, Corresponding Secretary of the Board, and by Rev. B. P. Fullerton, the President. Brief addresses were also made by members of the General Assembly, and the report was referred to the Committee on Church Erection.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The report of the Board of Missions was read, and addresses were made by Rev. J. V. Stephens, Corresponding Secretary of the Board, and by Rev. C. H. Bell, D.D., President.

After brief addresses by members of the General Assembly, the report was referred to the Committee on Missions.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 1).

The Committee on Overtures submitted report No. 1, and a minority report, by three members of said Committee, was also submitted, whereupon the consideration of these reports was made the special order for 8.30 o'clock A.M., Monday next.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY (No. 1).

The Committee on Judiciary respectfully report that they have carefully considered the memorial from the Presbytery of Oxford herewith returned, requesting this General Assembly "to consider and record a deliverance on the question as to whether a woman may, under any circumstances, be ordained and installed to the office of ruling elder," and respectfully recommend that in accordance with the Constitution of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church you declare that a woman may not be ordained and installed to the office of ruling elder.

SERMON ON EDUCATION.

The General Assembly met, and a sermon on Education was preached by the Rev. J. W. Fitzgerald.

THE HOUR CHANGED.

The hour for hearing the representatives of the Woman's Board of Missions was changed from Tuesday evening next to 4.30 o'clock P.M. of Monday next.

The General Assembly then adjourned till next Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Closed with prayer.

FOURTH DAY.

MONDAY, May 25, 8 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of the sessions of Friday and Saturday were read and approved.

ADDITIONAL COMMISSIONERS.

Rev. J. P. Halsell, Commissioner from Wabash Presbytery, and Ruling Elder A. H. Miller, from Indiana Presbytery, appeared and took their seats as members of the General Assembly.

SPECIAL ORDER.

The special order was taken up, which was a consideration of the majority and minority reports of the Committee on Overtures. Pending the discussion the General Assembly took recess till 2 o'clock P.M.

MONDAY, May 25, 2 o'clock P.M.

The General Assembly resumed the business pending at recess, and the majority report of the Committee on Overtures was adopted, as follows:

COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES—REPORT NO. 1.

Your Committee on Overtures, to whom were referred memorials from the Presbyteries of Atchison, Decatur, New Lebanon, Oregon, and St. Louis, asking the submission to the Presbyteries of an amendment to the forty-seventh section of the Constitution of the Church, providing for rotation in the offices of ruling elder and deacon, respectfully report as follows:

After careful consideration of the proposed amendment, we are of the opinion that the necessity has not yet arisen for making any change in the organic law of the Church on this subject, and we deem it inadvisable to grant the prayer of the memorialists.

[The minority report, which was rejected by a vote of 60 in the affirmative against 135 in the negative, is as follows :

The undersigned, a minority of the Committee on Overtures, to whom were referred memorials from Atchison, Decatur, New Lebanon, Oregon, and St. Louis Presbyteries, asking that a certain change be made in Section 47 of the Constitution of the Church make the following report :

That you submit to the Presbyteries for their action that the said Section 47 be so changed as to read: "The offices of ruling elder and deacon are perpetual, and no one can be divested of either office, but by deposition, after regular trial, or at his own request by resignation; provided, however, that any congregation may, after due notice, by a two-thirds vote, arrange to elect such officers for a stated period, in such manner as each congregation shall decide, and that the said period shall not be less than three years," and "that elders once ordained shall not be divested of the office when they are not re-elected, but shall be entitled to represent that particular church in the highest judicatories, when appointed by the session or the Presbytery."

WOMAN'S BOARD

In accordance with the Assembly's order, the opportunity was given the representatives of the Woman's Board of Missions to present their greetings, and to report their work, whereupon addresses were made by Mrs. J. B. Fitzpatrick, Mrs. A. G. Bergen, Mrs. A. M. Castlen, and Miss Nannie Caldwell. Through these representations came the request that in future meetings of the General Assembly the Woman's Board might have this same privilege of making a report.

It was determined that 8.30 o'clock to-morrow morning be fixed as the time when the Board of Publication shall make its report.

REPORT OF THE STATED CLERK.

The Stated Clerk submitted his report, which was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The General Assembly then took recess till 8 o'clock P.M.

MONDAY, May 25, 8 o'clock P.M.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The Special Order was taken up, which was the discussion of Sunday-school interests, whereupon the Rev. M. B. De Witt, D.D., General Superintendent of Sunday-school work, presented his report, and delivered an address. And in accordance with a programme arranged by the General Superintendent, addresses were also made by Rev. J. W. Stone, and Ruling Elder A. C. Stewart.

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY'S COMMUNION.

The hour of 8 o'clock to-morrow evening was fixed as the time when the Assembly's Communion service shall be held.

The General Assembly then adjourned till 8 o'clock to-morrow morning, and closed with prayer.

FIFTH DAY.

TUESDAY, May 26, 8 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

The special order was taken up, and the report of the Board of Publication was read, and addresses were made by Rev. Ira Landrith, Acting General Manager, and J. M. Gaut, President of the Board. After which other addresses were made by members of the General Assembly, and the report was referred to the Committee on Publication.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

It was determined that 2 o'clock P.M. to-day be fixed as the time when the Board of Ministerial Relief shall make its report.

REPORT OF ENDOWING AGENT OF THEOLOGICAL SCHOOL.

The Rev. J. S. Grider, D.D., Endowing Agent for the Theological Department of Cumberland University, submitted a report, which was referred to the Committee on Theological Seminaries.

COMMUNICATION FROM F. R. EARLE, D.D.

A communication from Rev. F. R. Earle, D.D., of Boonsboro, Ark., relative to a certain bequest in his hands, belonging to the General Assembly, was read and referred to the Committee on Finance.

The General Assembly then took recess till 2 o'clock P.M.

TUESDAY, May 26, 2 o'clock P.M.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

The special order was taken up, and the report of the Board of Ministerial Relief was read, and an address was made by Rev. J. H. Miller, Corresponding Secretary of the Board; after which the report was referred to the Committee on Ministerial Relief.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES.

The following reports of the Committee on Overtures were read and adopted (Nos. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10):

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 2).

The Committee on Overtures have had under advisement the memorial from McGee Presbytery, asking the General Assembly to abrogate the deliverance of 1889 (See Minutes, p. 52), requiring the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly to report to their respective Presbyteries the names of the Stated Clerks thereof who fail to perform their duties faithfully; and a like duty on the part of Stated Clerks of Presbyteries regarding inefficient Clerks of Sessions.

We find no reason for disturbing the previous deliverance of the General Assembly upon this subject, and we recommend that the prayer of the memorial be not granted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 3).

The Committee on Overtures have had under consideration the memorial from the Synod of Illinois, in which the General Assembly is asked to interpret the meaning of section 56 of the Confession of Faith, touching the subject of Sanctification.

The question in this memorial is one which, in our opinion, more properly addresses itself to the Presbytery, which has the "power to condemn erroneous opinions which injure the purity or peace of the church; to resolve questions of doctrine and discipline seriously and reasonably proposed. (See Constitution, Sec. 31.) While we recognize the power of the General Assembly "to bear testimony against error in doctrine, and immorality in practice injuriously affecting the church; to decide all controversies respecting doctrine and discipline; to give its advice and instruction in conformity to the government of the Church in all cases submitted to it," (See Constitution, Sec. 43), we deem it improper for you to exercise that power in this case, inasmuch as the Presbyteries themselves, in the adoption of the Confession of Faith, evidently declined to make a more explicit statement of the doctrine of Sanctification. Any deliverance upon this subject should be more than an opinion. If made at all, it should involve a change of the Confession itself, which can be attained only through constitutional channels.

Your Committee, therefore, ask to be discharged from the further consideration of the subject.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 4).

The communication from Rev. William Weir on behalf of the National Reform Association, referred to us, proposes that the General Assembly approve and indorse a petition, to be presented to the Presidential Convention of each of the political parties, next year, asking that they place in their platforms "a clear and full recognition of these two great truths, namely: that our Lord Jesus Christ is the Sovereign Ruler of our nation; and that his moral law is the rule of all our conduct in civil and political affairs."

We are in full accord with the fundamental principles to which the Cumberland Presbyterian Church has so persistently held for all these years, that Church judicatories "do not possess any civil jurisdiction;" that they have no "jurisdiction in political or civil affairs;" that, according to the plain teaching of our Confession of Faith and Government, Church judicatories "are to handle and conclude nothing, except that which is ecclesiastical;" that they "are not to interfere with the affairs of the Commonwealth;" that "our Civil Constitution wisely separates Church and State," and that "it is of momentous interest to the Church to recognize practically, as well as in theory, the great truth taught by the Savior—that is, that his "kingdom is not of this world."

We are, therefore, "opposed to every movement, coming from any quarter, that looks to a union of Church and State," and "to the prostitution of the pulpit, the religious press, or our Church Courts, to the accomplishment of political purposes."

Believing that any expression of political sentiment, or the attempt to take part in any way, directly or indirectly, in the contests of political parties is "no part of the legitimate business of a Church Court," we ask to be discharged from any further consideration of said communication, and recommend that the General Assembly re-affirm the sentiments herein expressed. The Committee is unanimous in this report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 5).

We have considered a memorial of the Mississippi Presbytery asking that the following be inserted in the organic law of the Church: "No member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church shall be allowed to drink ardent spirits as a beverage, and any one guilty of this offense shall subject himself to the discipline of the Church."

Under the organic law of the Church the Church session is charged with maintaining the spiritual government of the Church, and for this purpose it is its duty to inquire into the doctrines and conduct of the Church members under its care, and to admonish, suspend, or excommunicate those found delinquent.

This memorial proposes a change in the Constitution by specifying one evil requiring Church censure and leaving unnamed all the other acts which merit condemnation.

We are of opinion that this is not necessary; that under our present rules full authority is vested in Church sessions to act in this matter, and therefore recommend that the prayer of the memorial be not granted.

The action heretofore taken by the General Assembly and the various Church Courts against the evils of intemperance and dram-drinking is so unmistakable that no repetition thereof need be made by way of amendment to our organic law.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 6).

We have considered the memorials referred to us in relation to the action of the Synod of Illinois in changing the lines of certain of the Presbyteries within its bounds, one from Vandalia Presbytery complaining of the action, and one from Decatur Presbytery asking that said action be sustained.

We deem it improper for the General Assembly to act upon the merits of questions presented by complaint or memorial in relation to the action of Synods without giving the Synod of whose action complaint is made an opportunity to be heard. Unless a *prima facie* case is made out by the complaint or memorial it should be dismissed.

In this matter we see no sufficient reason why the deliberate action of the Synod, of which complaint is made, should be disturbed, and therefore recommend that the memorial from Vandalia Presbytery be dismissed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 7).

We have had under consideration a communication from the Rev. William H. Roberts, D.D., Secretary of the Consensus Committee of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America; and in response thereto we submit the following:

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America during its sessions, May, 1890, adopted the report of a committee in these words: "The committee recommend that all overtures on a new and consensus creed shall be referred to a committee of nine, who shall invite the co-operation of the Reformed Churches throughout the world holding the Presbyterian system to prepare a short creed containing the essential articles of the Westminster Confession, to be used as the common creed of these Churches; not as a substitute for the creed of any particular denomination, but to supplement it for the common work of the

Church—especially in missionary fields—to report to the next General Assembly.”

The committee was appointed, and met in December, 1890. At this meeting, as stated in said communication, it directed its secretary to communicate the above action of the General Assembly to the several Churches connected with the “Alliance of the Reformed Churches throughout the world holding the Presbyterian system.” In compliance with the direction thus given, the secretary addressed the communication under consideration to the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and, as he says, accompanied by the respectful request that the General Assembly at its next meeting, if the way be clear, appoint a committee to enter into correspondence with the committee of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, with a view to the consideration and preparation “of a short creed containing the essential articles of the Westminster Confession, to be used as the common creed of these Churches; not as a substitute for the creed of any particular denomination, but to supplement it for the common work of the Church.”

Dr. Roberts in said communication also says: “Into the question of the advisability of a consensus creed the committee of the Presbyterian Church in the United States do not feel called upon to enter, but prefer to leave its consideration to the several Churches interested, or to the representative committees which they may respectively appoint. It is understood, however, by the committee, that the creed which may be formulated by the labors of the joint Consensus Committees will have no binding force in any of the Presbyterian or Reformed Churches, except as first submitted to and approved by the judicatory or judicatories in whom such power of approval is vested by the laws of these Churches respectively.”

Upon the subject as thus presented we recommend that the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church does now declare and resolve:

1. That, while the Cumberland Presbyterian Church holds the “Presbyterian system,” it does not accept the “Westminster Confession” as its creed.

2. That thus standing it is willing at all times to enter into correspondence with other Churches holding the “Presbyterian system” in any effort to unite upon a short creed to be used as the common creed of these Churches.

3. That a committee be appointed to enter into correspondence with the Committee of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America with a view to the consideration and preparation of a short creed to be used as the common creed of the Reformed Churches throughout the world holding the Presbyterian system, “not as a substitute for the creed of any particular denomination, but to supplement it for the common work of the Church;” provided that nothing contained in the creed to be thus prepared shall conflict with the Confession of Faith of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

4. That the action of this committee shall have no binding force or effect until the same shall be approved by the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, to which said committee shall submit a full report.

5. That said committee shall consist of: Ministers S. G. Burney, D.D., Lebanon, Tenn.; C. H. Bell, D.D., St. Louis, Mo.; A. B. Miller, D.D., Waynesburg, Pa.; J. M. Gill, D.D., Elkton, Ky.; F. R. Earle, D.D., Boonsboro, Ark.; R. M. Tinnon, D.D., Fort Worth, Texas; B. P. Fullerton, St. Louis, Mo.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 9).

We have had referred to us and have duly considered a communication from a committee appointed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States to convey to this General Assembly an overture and accompanying petition to be addressed to all the governments of Christian countries, asking that they "take measures to banish warfare as the means of settling the strifes that arise between nations, and to substitute a more rational and Christian tribunal."

We are unanimous in recommending that the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church unite with our brethren of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States in addressing to the several governments of the Christian nations of the world a petition for the purpose stated. To this end we recommend that the Stated Clerk be instructed to authenticate and forward said petition, a copy of which is filed with this report.

We do not recommend, as suggested in said communication, that you appoint a delegate to meet like delegates from other bodies sometime during the year 1891, because it occurs to us as sufficient that the petition be authenticated and forwarded as herein suggested.

A PETITION

To be addressed to the Several Governments of the Christian Nations of the World.

To.....

The Cumberland Presbyterian Church of the United States, through its General Assembly, wishes you grace, mercy, and peace.

We, in co-operation with other Christian bodies, humbly memorialize you, as the guardians of your people, in behalf of peaceful arbitration as a means of settling questions that arise between nations. The spectacle that is presented of Christian nations facing each other with heavy armaments, ready upon provocation to go to war and settle their differences by bloodshed or conquest, is, to say the least, a blot upon the fair name of Christian. We can not contemplate without the deepest sorrow the horrors of war, involving the reckless sacrifice of human life, that should be held sacred, bitter distress in many households, the destruction of valuable property, the hindering of education and religion, and the general demoralizing of the people.

Moreover, the maintaining of a heavy war force, though war be averted, withdraws multitudes from their homes and the useful pursuits of peace, and imposes a heavy tax upon the people for its support. And further, let it be borne in mind that wars do not settle causes of dispute between nations on principles of right and justice, but upon the barbaric principle of the triumph of the strongest.

We are encouraged to urge this cause upon your consideration by the fact that much has already been accomplished; as, for example, by the arbitration of Geneva in the Alabama case, and by the deliberations of the American Conference at Washington, not to mention other important cases. It will be a happy day for the world when all international disputes find peaceful solutions; and this we earnestly seek.

As to the method of accomplishing this end, we make no suggestions, but leave that to your superior intelligence and wisdom in matters of State policy.

We invoke upon rulers and people the richest blessings of the Prince of Peace.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURES (No. 10).

The following statement of facts and memorial addressed to the General Assembly by the American Bible Society was referred to this committee, to wit:

Reverend and Dear Brethren:

“Nine years ago the society entered upon a re-supply of the United States with the Scriptures, intending, as far as possible, to place at least one Bible, by sale or gift, in every home in the land. The canvass, which was completed last year, demonstrated the necessity for this special effort. Out of 6,309,628 families visited no less than 757,851, or about one family in every eight, were found without a Bible in their homes. This includes the more highly favored portions of our country, as well as the States and Territories which are regarded as home mission fields.

“The society is now attempting to provide every child who can read with a Bible of its own, especially for Sunday-school use. This is a great and important undertaking, and can only be accomplished through the hearty co-operation of all the Churches.

“It is a very general impression that this society, having the hearty support of all Protestant Churches, is supplied with abundant means for prosecuting its work. We therefore beg leave to say that while the society has a Bible House well equipped with presses and machinery sufficient for the manufacture of all the editions which it is called on to supply, it must look elsewhere for the *funds* with which to meet the expenses of manufacturing and distributing the Scriptures.

“The temporary investment of which the principal and interest can be expended has become reduced to \$106,466.84, which is considerably less than the appropriations which have already been made for the foreign work of the society for the present year. The rentals from the Bible House were last year \$43,663.91, and the income derived from trust funds (the prin-

cipal of which, owing to conditions imposed by the donors, can not be expended) amounted to \$15,692.34. It is therefore evident that the all-important work of the society can not be carried on without constant and liberal contributions.

“We therefore respectfully request this General Assembly to do what both branches of the Methodist Episcopal Church and of the Presbyterian are doing and give the American Bible Society a place among its own objects and a column in its Minutes.”

In response to the foregoing your committee reply that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church has always held itself in readiness to co-operate with those general enterprises of Christendom having for their object the welfare of mankind, and foremost among these we hold the universal distribution of the word of God. We therefore recommend:

1. That the prayer of the above memorial be granted, and that the American Bible Society be and is hereby recognized as the chosen instrumentality of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church for the circulation of the Scriptures.

2. To the end that the Church and the world may be able to see what we as a denomination are doing each year to give the word of life to the people of our land and the nations of the earth, and to encourage our Churches to that hearty and liberal support which the increasing work of this great society demands, we recommend that the Presbyteries be requested to require all Churches under their care to take an annual collection for the Bible cause, forwarding the same to the said Society, and reporting the results to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly.

3. That the Stated Clerk be, and is hereby, directed to provide a column for said reports in the blanks issued from his office to the Presbyteries and congregations, and to incorporate said reports in the annual statistics of the Church, expunging from the blanks now used the columns devoted to Sunday-school literature and Church papers.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY (No. 2).

The Committee on Judiciary presented Report No. 2, which was amended, and adopted, as follows:

The Committee on Judiciary, to whom was referred the preambles and resolutions offered by Ruling Elder George W. Rinker, with reference to the sale and disposition of the proceeds of sale of the Church property in Nevada, Missouri, conveyed to your Board of Trustees for the use of the Nevada congregation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, respectfully report that they have carefully considered the same, and recommend the adoption of the following preambles and resolutions in lieu thereof:

WHEREAS, This General Assembly has been informed that the congregation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Nevada, Missouri, has

become disorganized, and all of its members, except three or four, have either removed beyond the bounds of said congregation, or joined other churches; and

WHEREAS, The Church property formerly used by said congregation has not been used by it for several years, is very much out of repairs, and is rapidly deteriorating by reason of such lack of use, be it

Resolved, 1. That the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly is hereby directed to investigate and determine whether it has power under the terms of the conveyance of said property to it to sell and convey the same, and if, upon such investigation, it shall appear that said Board has such power, said Board is further directed to make a sale of said property, if it can be sold, and upon the best terms obtainable, first, however, obtaining the written consent of the surviving members of said congregation remaining within its bounds, who have not joined other churches, to having the sale made, and to the disposition of the proceeds of sale as hereinafter directed.

2. That if said sale is made, said Board of Trustees pay over to the Board of Trustees of Ozark College the proceeds thereof, with instructions to keep the same safely loaned at interest, and to use the interest derived therefrom for paying the faculty of said institution.

3. That in the event said Nevada congregation be re-organized, or a new Cumberland Presbyterian congregation be organized in said city, it shall be the duty of the Board of Church Erection to use the principal of said fund and all interest thereon not then otherwise expended in the erection of a new house of worship for said congregation in said city.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY (No. 3).

The following Reports of the Committee on Judiciary were read and adopted:

The Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred the complaint of Brother George O. Rike, and Sisters Mary Rike and C. A. Forney, against the Synod of Arkansas and the Educational Commission of said Synod concerning the location of Arkansas College and other matters, respectfully report that two of the complainants, to wit: Brother George O. Rike, and Sister C. A. Forney, with the representatives of the Synod and Commission, met with the committee and settled their differences in a Christian manner upon a Christian basis, and said complaint was thereupon withdrawn.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY (No. 4).

The Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred the protest of the Rev. W. H. Berry against the action of the Synod of Texas in "reseinding" the action of Guthrie Presbytery in adopting a resolution expressing disapproval of an alleged act of disobedience by the Rev. H. F. Bone of an order made by said Presbytery directing "\$100 given to church erection . . . to be paid to Brother Leonard," respectfully report that they have carefully considered the same, and find that the record discloses the following facts:

At the afternoon session, on the third day of February, 1889, meeting

of Guthrie Presbytery, the Rev. H. F. Bone resigned his offices as Stated Clerk and Treasurer of that Presbytery, which he had held for many years, and asked for, and was granted, a letter of dismissal and recommendation from the Presbytery, to take effect on its adjournment. A new Stated Clerk and new Treasurer was elected. The Presbytery adopted a resolution expressing its hearty approbation of Rev. H. F. Bone's past services, the preamble to which states that he had served the body with ability and zeal. During the same afternoon Rev. W. G. Leonard had addressed the Presbytery, as Agent of Church Election, in behalf of that subject, and the Presbytery adopted preambles and resolutions, which appear to have been offered by Brother Bone himself, commending the Church Election work represented by Brother Leonard, and instructing the "Treasurer to pay over to the Board of Missions for Church Extension one hundred dollars." The Minutes of the evening session of the same day, and which was the final session in February, 1889, first record Brother Bone's report, as Treasurer, and its adoption by the Presbytery. Said report, among other things, showing credits to the Treasurer of "one hundred dollars ordered to be paid to Trinity University building fund, one hundred dollars to the Board of Missions for Church Election, and twenty-five dollars sent to the Board at St. Louis, per order of Presbytery," and then records motions ordering "one hundred dollars given to Church Election, . . . to be paid to Brother Leonard;" "to the building fund of Trinity University one hundred dollars," and "to send twenty-five dollars to the Board of Missions." From the order in which the items are recorded it would appear that Brother Bone's report as Treasurer was made and adopted before the last three motions were made and adopted, but it is apparent that the items are not recorded in the correct order of their chronological occurrence, as the report shows compliance with the motions ordering one hundred dollars paid to Trinity University building fund, and twenty-five dollars to the Board of Missions. There is no evidence whatever as to whether the one hundred dollars for Church Election was actually paid under the resolution adopted in the afternoon and before the adoption at the evening session of the motion ordering that one hundred dollars be paid to Brother Leonard, or not, but it is clear that Brother Bone, in his report as Treasurer, reported the money as paid to the Board of Missions (presumably under the resolution adopted in the afternoon), and the Presbytery adopted his report.

At the meeting of the Presbytery, in October, 1889, a motion was adopted requiring the Stated Clerk "to address a letter to Rev. H. F. Bone, D.D., asking him why he did not comply with the order of Presbytery in regard to paying to Brother Leonard the one hundred dollars given for Church Election at last meeting."

The record does not contain his reply, but in connection with the protest it is alleged to have been as follows: "That the first order was not repealed and he did not have money enough to pay both. That the order was not passed upon Dr. Bone, but upon the Treasurer, and he was not Treasurer, having resigned. That the action of the Presbytery reflects upon one whom they highly commend in the same Minute. That it is an attempt to try one over whom they have no jurisdiction, he having joined another Presbytery."

At the meeting of the Presbytery in April, 1890, there were adopted preambles reciting that he "was ordered to pay one hundred dollars, previ-

ously donated to Church Extension Fund, to Rev. W. G. Leonard, instead of sending it direct to the Board;" that he had "disobeyed this order of the Presbytery," and a resolution that the Presbytery "does hereby disapprove of his disobedience in this matter."

At the meeting in September, 1890, of the Synod of Texas, the Committee on the Minutes of Guthrie Presbytery, reported that it had examined the Minutes of that Presbytery for February and October, 1889, and April, 1890, found them "well kept, and in accordance with the government and doctrines of our Church, except . . . a resolution involving the character of a member of another Presbytery, which is irregular and void, and against our government. Because, 1. He had, before that time, been regularly dismissed and complimented for efficiency; and was at the date of said action a member of another Presbytery, and had no notice of same. 2. . . . That he had complied with the order of said Presbytery, for which compliance he was afterward censured," and the Committee recommended "that said action of said body "be rescinded." The Synod sustained the criticism of the committee, to which action Brother Berry filed his protest, but the Synod does not appear to have put any answer thereto on its records.

As the Minutes of Guthrie Presbytery show, it approved Brother Bone's report of payment to the Board of Missions of the one hundred dollars appropriated for Church Erection purposes, the subsequent declaration by that Presbytery that he had disobeyed its order, and that it disapproved his action was incorrect and unjust, and this committee, therefore, recommend that you sustain the criticism by the Synod of Texas of the action of Guthrie Presbytery.

SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S-SUPPER.

The General Assembly met and divine service was held, celebrating the sacrament of the Lord's-supper.

The General Assembly then adjourned till 8 o'clock to-morrow morning, and closed with prayer.

SIXTH DAY.

WEDNESDAY, May 27, 8 o'clock A.M.

The General Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

SPECIAL ORDER.

The hour of 2 o'clock P.M. to-day was fixed as the time when the place for the meeting of the next General Assembly shall be selected.

PASTOR'S SUPPLY AGENCY.

A resolution touching the establishment of a "Pastor's Supply Agency" was read by Ruling Elder A. C. Stewart, and referred to a special committee consisting of Rev. J. M. Gaiser and Ruling Elders W. K. Morrow and C. J. Crockett.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE (No. 1.)

The Committee on Correspondence submitted Report No. 1, which was adopted, as follows:

The Committee on Correspondence submit the following:

We have had referred to us a communication from the chairman and secretary of the Western Division of the Executive Commission of the Alliance of the Reform Churches holding the Presbyterian system, notifying this General Assembly to appoint delegates to the Council to hold its meetings in Toronto, Canada, September, 1892.

From a statement made in the paper above referred to we find that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church is entitled to thirty-three delegates. It is recommended that these delegates be appointed, and in order that this may be carried out a committee of three shall be selected, of which committee the Stated Clerk of this General Assembly shall be chairman, and the other two selected by the Moderator of this body. It shall be the duty of this committee to appoint and commission the delegates herein referred to, and as near as can be one half shall be ministers and one half ruling elders.

We further recommend that this General Assembly concur in the request to join with other Presbyterian bodies in observing the 24th day of November, 1891, as a day of special prayer for Missions, and that the whole Church be earnestly urged to unite in this service.

We have, also, had referred to us a dispatch bearing the fraternal greetings of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (colored).

Expressing our highest appreciation of these utterances of brotherly love, it is recommended that the Stated Clerk send a dispatch reciprocating this greeting, and refer our dear brethren "in black" to Ruth ii. 12.

Again, we have had referred to us a communication from the General Manager of the Falls of Rough and Green River railroad, very generously tendering to this General Assembly a free excursion to the Worrell Mountain Springs. We wish to express through the General Manager our appreciation of the courtesy extended and say that we much regret that the pressure of business will not allow us to accept the tendered invitation, and the Stated Clerk is herein authorized to answer the communication above referred to.

NEW COMMISSIONER.

Rev. J. C. Provine, D.D., commissioner from Lebanon Presbytery, having been called home, Rev. M. B. De Witt, D.D., first alternate from said Presbytery, being present, was recognized as a member of the General Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions presented a report, which was amended and adopted, as follows :

Your Committee on Missions beg leave to submit the following report :

No subject that can possibly claim the attention of the General Assembly can equal in importance the cause of Missions. It is of paramount concern, and forms the basis of all Christian endeavor. To preach the gospel to every creature is the business of the Church of Christ ; and every other enterprise and institution, devised by the wisdom of God's people, is only of importance in so far as it ministers to this purpose. Have you a Board of Education ? Its prime work is to prepare men for this cause. Have you a Board of Church Erection ? It is to provide suitable places where your prepared ministry may preach the gospel to men. Have you a Board of Publication ? It is to disseminate Christian literature and to preach Christ from the silent yet powerful and consecrated pens of men and women. Have you a Board of Ministerial Relief ? It is to care for the aged and superannuated soldiers of the Cross, coming back to you from their fields of holy warfare, and unable longer to do battle for their Master against the hosts of sin and Satan. Your Sabbath-school enterprise—what means it but to feed the lambs of the fold upon the “sincere milk of the word, that they may grow thereby.” and become men and women rooted and grounded in the faith of the gospel of Christ ? So that it is evident that the whole machinery of the Church is organized and worked, if worked aright, for the accomplishment of the one purpose—the evangelization of the world.

We have examined the able and exhaustive report of your Board of Missions, and, while we find many things in this report to cheer the heart of every lover of his Church, yet there are revealed in it matters that disappoint and sadden us deeply. The success attending all your endeavors, both in the home and foreign field, the attachment of your missionaries to the trust committed to them, their unflagging zeal and self-sacrificing devotion to their heaven-appointed work, are, and forever will be, a source of inexpressible joy to all our people. The ability displayed by our Board, and especially by its venerable and beloved president, the Rev. C. H. Bell, D.D., and by the laborious and painstaking secretary, the Rev. J. V. Stephens, in the management of your missionary affairs, can not be too highly commended, and they deserve and should receive your sincere thanks and profound gratitude. That which gives us pain in the perusal of this report is the meager amount collected from your Churches to carry forward the great work. The Churches are not responding in their offerings as they should. Many of your congregations have failed altogether to comply with your requirements to take the quarterly collections, and many of those which have contributed have given amounts largely disproportion-

ate to their ability; so that the Board's liabilities are in excess of receipts \$7,533.55. "These things ought not so to be," and our people must be awakened to a sense of their responsibility in this matter. O that the Spirit of God would fire the heart of the Church on the subject of Missions! The thoughtful attention of every pastor in the Church is called to the Board's report, which is herewith returned with the recommendation that it be made a part of the Minutes of the General Assembly.

We have also had before us the resolutions asking that one third of home missionary money be returned to such Presbyteries as desire it; resolutions asking for the appointment of an Assembly Missionary Day; and an overture from A. Ben Oliel, Presbyterian missionary among the Spanish Jews of Jerusalem.

After considering the foregoing we offer for your adoption the following recommendations:

1. That you ratify the appointment of Rev. B. P. Fullerton as a member of the Board in place of Rev. F. Lack, deceased.

2. That you emphasize your former deliverances concerning congregational collections, urging Presbyteries to scrupulously require their Churches to take collections for both Home and Foreign Missions, in the quarters assigned, and send the same to the Board of Missions.

3. That the Board of Missions be instructed to apportion among the Presbyteries fifty thousand dollars, to be raised during the coming ecclesiastical year in such manner as the Presbyteries themselves may elect, one half thereof to be for Home and one half for Foreign Missions.

4. That the Board of Missions be instructed to return one fourth of all home missionary money collections raised in each Presbytery to such Presbyteries as may call for it. It is to be distinctly understood, however, that this does not apply to any special objects for which contributions may be asked, but only to the work regularly carried on by the Board.

5. That Friday of each session of this body be known as General Assembly Missionary Day, the afternoon session of which is to be devoted to hearing the report of the Board of Missions, addresses by its representatives and such other addresses or exercises as the Board of Missions may arrange for. If so desired, said Board shall also have the privilege of Friday night for this subject.

6. That your standing rule touching the subject of Missions be so changed as to harmonize with this arrangement.

7. That Synods and Presbyteries be urged to observe similar Missionary Days, and that the Board of Missions be instructed to furnish the proper parties in said judicatures with such suggestive programmes, tracts, and other literature as will aid in making these occasions profitable.

8. That you hereby express your warm appreciation of the admirable addresses and words of greeting from representatives of the Woman's Board to this General Assembly.

9. That the Territory of Oklahoma and the Chickasaw Nation be recommended to the attention of the Board of Missions as fine fields for missionary endeavor. Reiterating the deliverance of the last General Assembly, the special attention of the Board is called to important missionary fields of the Pacific North-west; and we recommend that arrangements be made just as soon as practicable for the establishment of our Church in the cities

of Portland, Oregon, and Spokane Falls, Washington, or at such other point in Washington as the Presbytery of Walla Walla may select. We recommend that the Board of Missions be instructed to organize a mission and plant a Church in the flourishing city of Lincoln, Neb., as soon as may seem proper to them.

10. That the missionary work among the Jews of Jerusalem, under the direction of A. Ben Oziel, be recommended to the sympathy and liberality of all our Churches, and that any contributions for said work be sent through our Board of Missions.

We have received a communication from Rev. J. W. Henderson, who last year held an appointment to Alaska under the Assembly's Board, and who now holds a commission from the United States General Agent for Public Schools in Alaska, and is anxious to proceed to that field. The financial stress of the Board makes it unsafe to take the risk without some material assurance of adequate support. We therefore present his case to this body for consideration and for such action as in its judgment may seem wise.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLICATION AND SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

The report of the Committee on Publication and Sunday-School Work was read, and 1.30 o'clock this P.M. was fixed as the time for the consideration of said report.

The General Assembly then took recess till 1.30 o'clock P.M.

WEDNESDAY, May 27, 1.30 o'clock P.M.

The special order was taken up, which was the consideration of the report of the Committee on Publication and Sunday-School Work. The report was adopted, and is as follows:

Your Committee on Publication and Sunday-schools, submit the following:

A great part of the work committed to the Christian Church is educational; and there is no more potent and permanent factor in performing such work than the publication of papers, periodicals, and books. The character of these publications will determine the character of whatever power such education confers. It, therefore, behooves the guardians of public and private morals, and the promoters of public and private virtue and Christian citizenship, to use all diligence in establishing and promoting a pure literature. The denomination that fails in this, whatever excellencies it may have, must necessarily fail to reach its highest destiny. Not every one who desires, can write either an instructive and helpful article or a readable book, and only such productions should find a place in the columns of our papers or bear the imprint of our publishing houses.

The very fact that a book bears the imprint of the publishing house of a

Christian denomination is a recommendation for it to the reading public, no matter how dangerous may be the tendencies of its teaching.

The responsibility of those who are set to guard the Christian press is tremendous. The secular press is making heroic efforts to satisfy a vitiated literary taste, and the fact that our great dailies are almost literally filled with the records of crime, debauchery, and profligacy, indicates how deeply set is such taste. The Church, therefore, is not called upon to provide for a high literary taste simply, but it must counteract the influence of impure literature and cultivate a taste for that which is pure. This will require a large outlay of both money and mind. The world looks to the Church for such a contribution, and we can not be true to our trust if we fail to do our best.

As a Christian denomination we are just beginning in some degree to meet the obligation upon us in this respect. The Cumberland Presbyterian Church is to be congratulated upon the progress that has been made in its publishing interests in the last half decade. For the first time in its history publications are sent forth from its own building, and it is now able to pay a small sum for book manuscripts. Your Board of Publication should be encouraged in all its legitimate efforts to furnish the Church with a high-grade literature. We have had referred to us the Annual Report of the Board, which we have examined, and herewith return the same for publication in the Minutes of this Assembly. We are pleased to find the affairs of the Publishing House in such a good financial condition. The net increase indicated in its financial exhibit gives us assurance that the present bonded, and other indebtedness, can be safely carried until it is fully liquidated. This, however, can not be done without the united support which your Board has a right to expect from the whole Church. Denominational loyalty compels us to furnish our private and public libraries with the books published by our own Board. It is not necessary for your committee to recite the facts connected with the erection and indebtedness of the Publishing House in Nashville, Tennessee, which are so clearly set forth in the report of the Board. We can not, however, refrain from expressing our profound sense of appreciation of the manner in which the financial interests have been managed, and at the same time urge the Church to a liberal patronage of its own Publishing House, in all its departments, it being understood that this is not done to the disparagement of any paper published by individuals in the interests of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. It is with pleasure that we may record that the General Manager, Rev. W. J. Darby, D.D., is improving in health; and hopes are now entertained that he may yet be permitted to return to the discharge of his official duties. The Board and Church are to be congratulated that this place has been so efficiently filled by the present acting manager, and we hereby express our confidence in his ability and energy. We have also noted the changes in the editorial departments, and have considered carefully the resolution referred to us touching this matter, and after full explanations made to us by representatives of the Board we recommend that the General Assembly approve these changes.

We have also considered the resolution touching the publication of a weekly Sabbath-school paper, but as the Board already furnishes a paper each week, at a less expense than a weekly issue of the same paper could

be furnished, we recommend that this matter be left to the discretion of the Board. The report of the General Superintendent of Sunday-schools shows what may be done in the way of organization in this department of our work, and we most respectfully urge hearty co-operation upon the part of the denomination.

We have also considered the memorial from Morgan Presbytery, asking that a new edition of Beard's Theology be issued in two volumes, and that the price be reduced. We recommend that this be referred to the Board, to be acted upon as in their judgment they may see best.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

The Committee on Finance presented the following report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Finance beg to submit the following:

We have examined the account and vouchers of the Stated Clerk, and find the same correct and in good condition. We commend him for the faithful manner in which he has performed the duties of his office in having so successfully collected the dues from all the Presbyteries but three during the past year. In view of the enlargement of the work and the necessity of extra help to get the Minutes out in good time, we recommend that the salary of the Stated Clerk be increased one hundred dollars.

We have had before us a communication from the Pan-Presbyterian Alliance, requesting this General Assembly to pay our proportional part of the expense of said Alliance, to which we would suggest that the matter be referred to Dr. Darby, Rev. J. M. Hubbert, and our Stated Clerk, the Rev. T. C. Blake, D.D., with authority to settle the same.

We recommend that the Stated Clerk be authorized to pay the expenses of Brothers Holtsinger and Fitzgerald to this General Assembly, who were ordered by the last General Assembly to deliver sermons before this body on the subjects of Missions and Education; also the expenses of Revs. G. T. Stainback, D.D., J. M. Gill, D.D., and A. G. Bergen.

We have had before us the report of the Trustees of the General Assembly, in which they state that they have had deeded to them two church lots in Henderson, Ky. They also report that the Doherty Fund is safely invested, and that the interest has been collected and turned over to the Board of Education as per order of last General Assembly. We recommend concurrence in their report.

We have had before us a communication from the Rev. F. R. Earle, D.D., of Boonsboro, Ark., in which he states that Mrs. G. R. Gibson has donated one hundred dollars for the establishment of an orphan asylum for the benefit of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and that the money is safely loaned at interest. He asks what shall be done with it. We recommend that said fund be transferred to the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly and held in trust for the purpose for which it was donated.

We recommend that the following committee, to wit: Hons. John Frizzell, Thos. L. Cate, and E. E. Beard, be appointed to consider the advisability of creating by the General Assembly a fund by which the traveling expenses of its Commissioners shall be paid, in order that the burden of ex-

pense shall fall equally on all the Presbyteries. We further recommend that said committee consider the advisability of this General Assembly's providing for its own entertainment at its annual meetings, said committee to report through the Stated Clerk to the next General Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

The Committee on Ministerial Relief made their report, which was adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on Ministerial Relief would respectfully state that we have considered the report of the Board on this subject, and are greatly pleased at the evidence we there find of the prosperity and success that have attended this enterprise; and it is with the profoundest gratitude to Almighty God that we note the growing interest therein throughout the Church, as is shown in both the number of contributions and in the amount given. For details you are referred to the very clear and full report of the Board. Your committee would most earnestly commend the work of this Board to all the congregations and individual members of our Church.

We do most confidently trust that the contribution to this most worthy object will be increased from year to year, and to this end we would urge on all the Presbyteries to require that all the congregations under their care raise annual collections for this purpose, and that the Presbyteries use great care in recommending persons as worthy to become beneficiaries of this Board.

We feel that the most sincere thanks of the whole Church are due to the members of the Board and to their most worthy secretary for the self-sacrificing devotion they have shown to this work.

We having, in company with you, had the privilege and pleasure of visiting the Thornton Home for disabled ministers of the gospel, missionaries, or their dependents, orphans or other persons, on last Saturday, we deem it unnecessary to attempt a description of this beautiful place so generously given by Mrs. Thornton, for which not only those who enjoy its comforts, but also the whole Church owe her a debt of lasting gratitude. We commend this Home to all those for whom it is intended as a most pleasant and comfortable abode.

We have had submitted to us by the Board an act of the legislature of Indiana (House bill No. 73, January, 1891) requiring all boards for the management of funds contributed for the relief of disabled ministers of the gospel or others to file articles of incorporation before some officer authorized to take acknowledgment of deeds, etc. This the Board has done. Under this law it becomes necessary for this General Assembly to nominate persons to constitute the Board of Trustees of Ministerial Relief for five years. Therefore,

Resolved, That this General Assembly does hereby nominate the following persons to constitute the said Board, viz.: Dr. W. G. Ralston, W. J. Darby, D.D., S. B. Sansom, W. F. Nisbet, A. G. Bergen, B. Bransford, J. S. Gridler, D.D., J. E. Williamson, and James Davidson.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education submitted its report, which was amended and adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on Education submit the following report:

The question of Christian education is not one of mere expediency, but one of pressing necessity. As a Church we are doing something in the way of Christian education. While our institutions of learning are not multiplying at a rapid rate, yet we note with pleasure that steps are being taken to more thoroughly endow and equip those already established. It is probably true that as to the number of our educational institutions we have a sufficiency. Better endowments and a fuller equipment of men and necessary apparatus are the pressing demands of the hour. These we must have; these the Church can not afford to withhold. We think the time has more than come when our educational institutions should raise the cry, and continue it, Endowment! endowment! on to endowment!

CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY.

We have had before us the report of the Board of Trustees of Cumberland University, the only institution under the immediate control of the General Assembly. This institution is doing a good work, and makes a fair showing for the year just closing. The number of probationers for the ministry in attendance is seventy-five—more than in any other institution in the Church. This, of course, includes the thirty-six that are in the Theological School. Through the efforts of the Board's endowing agent there have been added during the past year nearly five thousand dollars to the theological endowment.

We would call attention to the fact that next year (1892) will be the semi-centennial of the institution. We would recommend to the Board of Trustees that they turn this coming semi-centennial to profit by bringing it, in such way as they may elect, to the consideration of the *alumni* and friends of the institution throughout the Church, and thus provoke a desire and general movement for a thorough endowment and equipment of the institution in all of its departments. In this connection we would commend the Inter-Collegiate Association of the Cumberland Presbyterian Colleges which has been formed at the suggestion of Chancellor Green, and which holds its first meeting at the coming Commencement at Lebanon, Tenn.

OTHER SCHOOLS.

Cumberland Female College.—Attendance for the year, 117; number of pupils from abroad, 70; number of graduates, 15; teachers, 12; value of buildings, \$50,000; value of apparatus, \$1,500; value of grounds, \$5,000; total, \$56,500.

Official statements of the work done during the past year by Lincoln and

Trinity Universities and by Ozark College have been before us. These institutions are making substantial progress. Lincoln University reports an increase in the number of matriculates over that of last year. Ozark College reports 205 matriculates. Trinity University reports 285 matriculates, and a very systematic, vigorous, and satisfactory work done.

All these institutions are making commendable efforts in the matter of endowment, and are meeting with reasonable success. These institutions should have your indorsement and encouragement. While no official statement has come to us from Waynesburg College, yet from a verbal report given us by the Rev. A. W. White, financial agent, we learn that said institution is doing a good work, the number of matriculates being an increase over that of last year. We regret that the other colleges of the Church have failed to comply with your request of last year to furnish annually official statements of their work.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The report of the Board of Education shows a very large increase in the work done by it over that of last year. The money collected and distributed for the education of young preachers has been nearly double that of last year. For this the Church and the Board should be congratulated. While, as a general rule, we do not encourage helping young men who are in other Theological schools than our own, still, we think, this matter should be left to the wise discretion of our Board of Education.

The increase of the work of the Board has been such as to demand the whole time of one man. Hence the Board, at a recent meeting, secured the entire time of the Rev. J. R. Henry as Secretary. In this we think the wisdom and action of the Board should be commended and indorsed. This means more effective work on the part of the Board, and a more systematic and thorough development of the great interest of ministerial education in our beloved Church.

The Board asks, that a day be set apart for special prayer for more laborers to be called into the harvest. We recommend that the first Sunday in April be set apart as Educational Day, when the matter of the education of the rising ministry shall be brought before the Church by its pastors, and when prayers shall be offered for the God of the harvest to call more laborers into the field. The Board also asks you to approve of the election of A. M. Burney to a place on the Board, instead of Robert L. Morris, resigned.

We think you should reaffirm the instruction of former General Assemblies to the Presbyteries, that they be careful to recommend none but worthy applicants to the support of the Board.

ENDOWING AGENT.

Your committee would call especial attention to the work of Rev. J. S. Grider, D.D., endowing agent of our Theological School. While his work will receive more specific attention by your Committee on Theological Seminaries, yet we can not refrain from commending his work, and urge his continuance, at least till the full completion of the endowment. We think you should urge upon your Presbyteries the ready payment of the apportionments as made by the order of last year's General Assembly.

We recommend that your next annual sermon, on Ministerial Education,

be preached by Rev. W. H. Black, D.D., with Rev. A. B. Miller, D.D., as his alternate.

A telegraphic communication from Brothers Inman and Dodson, representing the colored school at Bowling Green, Kentucky, asking what position you will maintain toward said school, and what support you will give it, has been placed in our hands. By reference to the action of the last General Assembly (pp. 31 and 32), it will be seen that a commission of two on the part of the General Assembly was appointed to co-operate with a like commission from the Colored General Assembly, looking to the matter of selling said school, and establishing one elsewhere. Inasmuch, therefore, as this commission has not yet reported in reference to said school, we return the communication of Brothers Inman and Dodson, and recommend that it be referred to your commission as provided by the last General Assembly.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE (No. 1).

The following Report No. 1 of the Committee on Temperance was read and adopted, and is as follows :

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to present the following report :

The question of the evils of the liquor traffic, now before this Church and all Christians everywhere is so momentous that we stand appalled at the possible result. Notwithstanding all the efforts of the past to cope with this great crime, the history of the past year, proved by its statistics, shows it to be largely on the increase, and organized as never before to perpetuate itself.

It is producing crime, lawlessness, and untold misery among the people. It is debauching our politics, and by its open saloon and the money power back of it controls and prevents all legislation against it. It nullifies law, and is the real cause of discontent in the nation, robbing the rich and the poor alike. It poisons the blood as well as the heart, not alone cursing the present, but the coming generation as well. It is the Church's most formidable foe, preventing the setting up of Christ's kingdom in the hearts of men.

The liquor traffic has no inherent right to exist. It is an incubus on the body politic, an excrescence protected by law, and only exists because of the will of the people expressed at the ballot-box, and can not be outlawed except by the will of the people expressed at the polls. Therefore,

Resolved, That, as Cumberland Presbyterians, we preserve inviolate the principle of Christian citizenship by making, in *this cause*, our votes as sacred for God and humanity as are our prayers; and we hereby declare against the license system, high or low, as sinful, and that it is the duty of every Christian to take this into consideration when he comes to vote.

We recommend that there be no relaxation in this conflict which is now testing our faith, our sacrifices, and our staying qualities, and that by pen and voice we urge forward the battle of prohibition.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Committee on Sabbath Observance made its report, which was amended and adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on Sabbath Observance report as follows:

We think this is a time when all Christians should take a decided and inflexible stand in favor of the proper observance of the Holy Sabbath. Perhaps the day was never in so great peril. There is not only indifference upon the subject of Sabbath observance, but there is opposition to it—open, organized, malevolent, and persistent opposition. Liquor dealers, the enemies of law and order, the criminal classes, the low, the vicious, and the depraved, are the enemies of the Sabbath. In addition, thousands of immigrants are crowding into this country every year and bringing with them the Continental ideas of Sabbath observance—or rather of Sabbath desecration. This leaven of evil has already corrupted our civilization, in some measure, and is liable to corrupt the whole lump unless it is counteracted in some way. If the day is saved, it must be saved by the Christian people of this land. But it is a sad and unfortunate fact, that instead of resisting this influence many Church members are yielding to it, and in many instances the Sabbath is wholly or in part disregarded by those who should be the guardians and protectors of its sacred interests. If all those whose

duty it is to protect the sacredness of the day would do their duty, there would be little to fear from what our enemies could do against us; but when it is "wounded in the house of its friends" there is cause for grave and serious alarm. The laxity of views upon this subject among the irreligious is, no doubt, due in large measure to the indifference and practical opposition upon the part of Church members. The supreme need of the hour is that all Christians should be united and earnest in the proper observance of the day, and in efforts to preserve its sanctity.

We do not consider this a matter of small importance. God has instituted the day and commanded its observance. To desecrate it or oppose its proper observance, is to fight against God, and to fight against him is to invite defeat and disaster. Sabbath observance is necessary to the intellectual and moral health of the people, it is necessary to the permanency, perpetuity, and prosperity of all our social and civil institutions, and we can not afford to sacrifice these sacred interests to the erroneous ideas and unholy desires of the enemies of our God and his holy day.

We recommend that the following be adopted as expressing the sentiments of this General Assembly:

1. That it is the duty of every Christian to observe and defend the Sabbath, and to keep it holy, by spending it in a way that will honor God and nourish and strengthen his own soul.

2. That Christians should not spend the day in social visiting, and feasting.

3. That it is a sin and shame to spend the day in idleness or in frivolous pastime.

4. That parents should require their children to attend church, and not turn them loose, after Sabbath-school, to spend the remainder of the day as they please.

5. That Christians should not encourage Sunday newspapers by buying them, reading them, advertising in them, or in any other way.

6. That Sunday trains and excursions are evils that no Christian should encourage.

7. That base-ball, picnics, and all similar amusements, are gross and sinful desecrations of the Sabbath day.

8. That we deplore the fact that our Government compels Sabbath desecration by its mail service, and that we think that Church members should not go to the post-office on the Sabbath, or otherwise encourage Sunday mails.

9. That we are decidedly and unalterably opposed to the opening of any department of the Columbian Exposition on the Sabbath, and desire to put the Cumberland Presbyterian Church on record as opposing it.

The General Assembly met, and was opened with prayer.

One half hour was spent in devotional exercises.

The Minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ERECTION.

The Committee on Church Erection made its report, which was adopted, as follows:

Your Committee on Church Erection submit their report:

The recent creation of this important Board makes it necessary to have it more fully recommended, so that its utmost usefulness may be secured. It is supplementary, and to some extent complementary, to the work of the other Boards of the Church. It is clearly a work of beneficence. It is a duty to bear one another's burdens. The weak points of a great Church—of a Church born and blessed by God's revival influences—where others may be gathered, where youth need instruction, and where churches do not abound, should be aided by the strong, and so bound by gratitude to their Church, that they may be enabled ultimately to requite others in need.

Our fathers worshiped in secluded places—embarrassed for devotional

homes. The modern apiarist wisely furnishes the otherwise equipped young swarm with the most improved hive. As a result he secures honey and an enlarged family of industrious workers. When the young swarms are driven by neglect to the decaying oak for a home, they are soon plundered and decimated. It is so with the young Church that drifts to ruin because no shelter has been provided. Our people should be most willing to give their offspring a respectable "setting out" for the engagement of an earnest life.

The poor, but promising, should be aided first to a limited amount, so as to encourage their own effort. It is not provident to assist where too many churches are in each other's way. The desolate places in any part of our land should have the preference. To be represented among other leading denominations is not the best motive. The country that has supplied fruit, grain, and ministers, can honorably contribute to the building of churches, homes of instruction, so as to reach the numerous needy foreigners, and those over whom folly and hard labor have thrown a spiritual restraint. It will make no difference to the generous givers from what section the blessing returns.

Economy should be exercised in the distribution of the funds. It may discourage and arrest the inflowing stream if the expenses of management are proportionately larger than the gifts. The merit of the cause will be enhanced by the zeal and success of the officers.

It will be in the line of this Board's duty to encourage the giving and accept for their proteges the gift of any Church appliance such as a bell, pulpit, memorial window, or a Bible. Plans of architecture, with expense of construction, etc., so as to have the most economy and taste in the building of our churches, should be within the power of this Board to provide.

The value of Mary's gift was in the fact that it was an expression of her love. The Master will commend the building of a beautiful and costly church, equal in comfort to any room in the community. Children despise the pretentious spirit that lavishes expense on an improved barn or house, and is satisfied parsimoniously with a gloomy and unhealthy place for worship. Our places of worship give a definition to our character as a Church. We need to advance in all our enterprises, and any attempt at repression is an offense deserving reproach. It is a sorry sight to have so many of our people continue passively to worship in borrowed school-houses. This Board can aid all who will profit by such help and so remove such a reproach. The Board can respectfully listen to appeals, advise and aid many struggling churches and save them from the chill of phlegmatic and selfish officiousness.

This Board has become a necessity, and should be munificently sustained. The success of other denominations on this line should press and provoke us to a worthy endeavor. If the moneys given in an irregular and unsystematized manner in the past could have been reported, our record would compare grandly with the proudest.

We recommend that the months assigned for the collections of this Board be marked by the most liberal gifts of our Church. A river soon becomes a commercial power when its rills and brooks contribute their share. All the Boards of the Church, and this its youngest child, will accomplish their mission if remembered by the family.

We recommend that the Board fix permanently its location, and that the order of the present General Assembly, locating the Board at Kansas City, Kansas, be rescinded.

We recommend that their request to have their Secretary appointed as Trustee be granted.

We recommend that this Board be empowered to receive and control all notes and contributions for Church erection, and to locate all churches to be built by said funds, and that the said Board in locating church buildings consult with the Board of Missions.

We recommend that the Board of Church Erection, in locating buildings, consult with and give due weight to the voice of the Presbyteries as expressed in whose bounds the Church shall be located.

We recommend that the memorial plan as suggested by the report be approved, and that they be instructed to secure a memorial fund in honor of Rev. Richard Beard, D.D., and of any other honored Father in the Church whom they may elect.

We recommend that the notes and obligations belonging to the Board of Church Erection, and an itemized account of the indebtedness of Churches to which money has been loaned from this fund, be transferred from the Board of Missions to the Board of Church Erection.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THEOLOGICAL SEMINARIES.

The Committee on Theological Seminaries submitted their report, which was adopted, as follows :

The Committee on Theological Schools offer the following report :

He who finds his appropriate place in this world, and fills it with propriety, is the greatest man he ever could be. No important sphere in this life is properly filled without adequate preparation for filling it. This is true in all the departments of human enterprise. It is pre-eminently so in the preparation necessary to fill the high place to which the minister of the word of God is called.

The rapid advances already made in literature, in science, and in all the departments of human learning, together with the tendencies to agnosticism and the varied phases of infidelity as substitutes for the religion of the Bible, make an imperious demand upon the minister of salvation for thorough equipment for his great work.

The science of theology, the science of Christian civilization, the great advance light and guide to all true and permanent progress in the development of human possibilities, is placed in the hands of the messenger of truth, and he is to lead the van in the onward march. The world, the flesh, and the devil have their scholars. They read, they study, they collate, they expound the Scriptures, wresting them to their own destruction and that of others. Shall the minister of religion, claiming to be called of God, undertake to defend the truth with a less varied learning, with less accurate methods of reasoning or less profound modes of thinking? He who would guide to the attainment of supreme good must himself know the way. He must be trained to think correctly and reason profoundly on any

subject if he would guide the intellect; and he must be subjectively taught of God by his Spirit if he would move the heart and convert the soul.

Intelligent Christianity is the central light in the galaxy whence the world receives its onward, upward guidance. Ye are the "light of the world," who bear the tidings of salvation above the world's reproach, approved of God and acknowledged of men. If God has given the Cumberland Presbyterian Church a place among the evangelical denominations of Christians it is ours to occupy. If we would fill our place we must be able to measure with others and with the world. Therefore we emphasize the great importance of thorough literary as well as theological training.

God seems to have impressed our fathers with a sound medium theology, for which they earnestly contended, and which they impressed upon the minds and hearts of many who heard. In other words, God provided the men who should organize our Church and formulate and teach her doctrines. After the formation of the Church she is expected instrumentally to furnish the men equipped and ready to carry out the highest behests of the Church in the purity of her doctrines and in the harmony of her government. Our Theological School is the custodian and guardian of the cardinal doctrines of salvation as formulated in our Confession of Faith. Therefore we urge that Presbyteries provide for the education of all their candidates for the ministry in full accord with the doctrines of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

Your Theological School at Lebanon, Tenn., is now about closing its scholastic year with exceedingly gratifying results. For further information in reference to the school we refer you to the report of your "Board of Visitors."

We recommend that your endowing agent, Rev. J. S. Grider, D.D., be continued in his field of work, and that the apportionment plan for completing the endowment fund be steadily pushed to its consummation. The report of the said agent, which was referred to us, is herewith returned with the request that it be made a part of this report and spread upon the Minutes.

We further recommend that every Presbytery diligently push the collection of the money apportioned. This is a practical plan, and your committee feel confident that the desired end can be accomplished.

Finally your committee recommend that Rev. R. H. Caldwell, of Kentucky; Rev. F. J. Tyler, of Alabama, and Ruling Elder W. E. Settle, of Kentucky, be a committee to visit Cumberland University, as provided by order of the General Assembly.

REPORT OF ENDOWING AGENT.

Report of J. S. Grider, Agent for the Theological Seminary of Lebanon, Tennessee:

The past year has been one of great stringency in financial circles, and collections have been small and difficult. Your Agent has made his efforts largely through the "apportionment plan" adopted by the last General Assembly. The plan is so fair and feasible that it addresses itself to our common sense as well as to our sense of justice. A large majority of the Presbyteries have taken action approving the plan, and are arranging to

carry it out. In many cases the meetings of these Presbyteries have been so late in the year that they have not yet been enabled to take the necessary collections. This, no doubt, will be done in the near future. About one third of the one hundred and twenty-one Presbyteries have paid in part or in whole.

There has been collected by the Agent since the last statement made to the General Assembly, outside of pro rata in cash, \$1,060. Promises, more or less reliable, \$1,540.

One dear brother, who remembered the University in his will to the amount of two thirds of his estate, has gone to his reward. The bequest is by no means inconsiderable, but for reasons supposed to be prudential, the name of the noble donor is withheld.

The endowment of the University seems to be a slow operation, but year

by year the fund is increasing. If the Presbyteries will take up the matter and work on the plan commended by the last General Assembly, the closing of the next ecclesiastical year will witness a most wholesome advance. REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO VISIT CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY.

The committee appointed to visit Cumberland University made the following report, which was ordered to be incorporated in the Minutes of the General Assembly:

The committee appointed at your last meeting to visit Cumberland University make the following report:

In the opinion of your committee the Theological Department deserves

high commendation. Its recent growth should bring gratitude and pride to the entire Church. A short while ago its matriculates were few, and, these being taught by one professor, whose time was largely divided with the College of Arts, the work of this department was essentially minified. Now it is a well-defined work, occupying a distinctive place in the University.

The number of students has greatly increased; the course, amplified, is now comprehensive and commendable, and the enlarged work now commands the entire energies of three of our most consecrated and capable men. So far as your committee could learn, after careful effort, the work being accomplished is of the best type in quality and degree. The devotion of teacher to pupil, of pupil to professor, and their mutual endeavor for good achievements, make this school well-nigh a model of attention and attainment.

There remains no doubt that the consuming anxiety and zealous efforts of the Church and General Assembly for the enlargement and permanency of this department are amply justified and compensated in the great and good work wrought.

Your committee apprehend that there is some danger to the perfect standard which this department should attain, and the confidence it should inspire, in admitting to and graduating from it men of limited scholarship. It is not our province or desire to raise the standard of education required for ordination; but we cherish stontly the belief, and express it with warmth, that our Church should not send out with parchment certificates, as accomplished divines—certificates comprehending the wide range from simplest faith to profoundest philosophy, from the plainest fact to the highest reach of metaphysics—men who are ignorant of the elements of education, and who would be lost in the simplest algebraic equation. If it be argued that men of other professions are graduated without regard to culture, it is answered by the fact that they deal with material interests.

The lawyer's measure of success for his client soon erects his proper standard of proficiency. There is no such thermometer for the theologian. From his ignorance our seminaries must guard us, from his heresy the Church judicatures must defend us. If uneducated men insist upon entering our Theological School we would by no means deny them the privilege of so doing; but let them be admitted upon the distinct contract that they can not be graduated. With such a rule well established, its enforcement will be easy and its good results abundant. The standard of scholarship which should be erected as essential to graduation in theology is for the General Assembly to determine, but your committee believe that it should not fall below the requirements admitting students to the Junior literary class of Cumberland University.

Your committee are impressed that the class work in the Theological Department is somewhat crowded, and that more is exacted of the professors than is consistent with the best results. The cure for this embarrassment seems to lie either in the extension of the time required for the course or for an additional professor. The former seems now to be inexpedient, and the latter involves so many questions of *ability* and *feasibility* that we dare not do more than simply call the attention of the General Assembly thereto.

As will be learned from other reports, the endowment of the Theological

School is progressing with a degree of satisfaction; yet our Church seems slow in realizing the real sacrifice which is being made for it by the good, great, and scholarly men who in all departments are consecrating their lives to this University.

It is not exulting to say that scarcely a school in the nation has graduated so many men who have attained eminence in the varied professions and avenues of business. From the work-shop to the United States Senate her perfect work places Cumberland University in the front rank of the great institutions of learning in our country.

While to maintain a great school and help a great Church our professors in theology, literature and law are giving talent and life for us, what are we giving for them? May we not hope that the time is near when our men of affairs, appreciating this unparalleled influence for good, will, by devotion of heart and *purse*, place the University upon firm footing, and its professors above dependence.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON WOMAN'S BOARD.

The committee appointed to prepare a minute relative to the meeting of the woman's meeting submitted its report, which was adopted, as follows:

Your committee selected to make a minute relative to the Woman's Board of Missions of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church report that this body, through its chosen representatives, honored your reverend body and graced Monday's sittings by their gentle presence and excellent presentation of the cause in which they are so earnestly engaged.

In partial appreciation of the high character of the work and the faithful execution thereof this General Assembly hereby declares its purpose to second this Board's every effort to further the cause of the Savior. We urge our brethren of the ministry to co-operate with this Board in its plan of establishing auxiliaries; if in any event this plan is not feasible, that a vigorous effort be made through the Sunday-school, prayer-meeting, or some other congregational channel.

That the children and youth should be taught and trained on the all-absorbing subject, "The world for Christ," is one of the vital needs of the hour. Let us "help these women who labor with us in the gospel."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO VISIT COLORED SCHOOL.

The committee appointed to visit the Cumberland Presbyterian school (colored) at Bowling Green, Ky., made the following report, which was adopted:

We, the members of a commission appointed in May last by the General Assembly to act in conjunction with a like commission appointed by the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church (colored) submit:

1. That on pages 31 and 32 of the Minutes of the General Assembly of 1890 the Trustees of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian

Church were instructed to sell the school property belonging to the colored Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and located in the city of Bowling Green, Ky.; and that the proceeds of said sale be reinvested by the joint commission, in the said city of Bowling Green or elsewhere, as may best subserve the educational interest of the said Cumberland Presbyterian Church (colored).

2. That the joint commission met in the city of Bowling Green in July last, and on investigation found that the property had not been sold. Therefore no action in the premises was taken, and none can be had until the Trustees have effected a sale.

SYNODICAL RECORDS.

The committees on the following Synods reported that no Minutes had come to hand: Indiana, Iowa, Missouri, Mississippi, Ohio, and Oregon.

PASTORAL AGENCY.

The following resolution respecting the establishment of a "Pastoral Supply Agency" was adopted:

The committee to whom were referred resolutions proposing the establishment of a pastoral agency report that in view of the many ministers unemployed and congregations without preaching, and in view of the fact that an experiment can only determine the feasibility and good results of such an agency, we recommend:

1. That this General Assembly appoint Rev. M. Lowe, of Aurora, Mo., to act as such an agent until the next General Assembly, and that he report to the next General Assembly the number of applications made for ministers and congregations, and what number have formed relationships through said agency.

2. That it shall be the duty of said agent to bring together ministers and congregations, and that said efforts shall be exclusively confined to ministers unemployed and congregations without supply, and shall in no case interfere with existing relations between ministers and Churches.

3. The committee recommend further that by way of remuneration or expense for said work the agent may receive such an amount as may be voluntarily given by such ministers and congregations as said agent may be asked to serve, or as may be mutually agreed upon.

4. That this agency shall not interfere with or supersede any work of this kind in this direction by Presbyteries.

BIBLE COMMENTARY.

WHEREAS, We have for a long time felt the need of a critical commentary on the Bible, written by one of our own men; and

WHEREAS, Rev. R. V. Foster, D.D., of Cumberland University, has evinced his ability to do such work in his Commentary on Romans, and being so situated and qualified that he can continue to bring out commentaries on the various books of the Bible; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this General Assembly give its approval of his efforts and encourage him to prosecute his work. And let it also be

Resolved, That the Board of Publication be asked to publish said work as it may be able.

CONSOLIDATION OF BOARDS.

The following resolution was introduced by Rev. G. T. Stainback, D.D., and was adopted:

Be it Resolved, That the Boards of Missions and of Church Erection are hereby authorized to consolidate under such name, and in such manner, as they lawfully can, and to locate such consolidated Board pursuant to the recommendation on the subject of location contained in the report of the Committee on Church Erection already adopted.

RESOLUTION OF THANKS.

The following resolution of thanks was introduced by Rev. R. F. Powell, and was adopted by a unanimous vote:

WHEREAS, The Sixty-first General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church has been so royally entertained in the city of Owensboro, Kentucky; therefore,

Resolved, That we, its members, being endued with the spirit of gratitude, do hereby tender our heart-felt thanks to the worthy local Committee of Arrangements; to the pastor, and ex-pastor, of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church; to the citizens of Owensboro, Kentucky, for the most royal and hospitable entertainment afforded the delegates and visitors; to the ministers and Churches for the use of their churches and the privileges of occupying their pulpits; to the choir of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church for its excellent music; to the press for complete reports of the General Assembly's proceedings; to the various railroad lines for reduced rates, and other courtesies; to the projectors of, and to those who carried out, the plan and entertained this General Assembly at the Thornton Home, in Evansville, Indiana; and to the Moderator and Clerks for the faithful and impartial manner in which they have discharged the duties of their offices.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS OF THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, 1890-1891.

To the General Assembly at Owensboro, Ky., May 21, 1891:

HISTORICAL STATEMENT.

In presenting the Forty-fifth Annual Report to the General Assembly the Board of Missions thinks it not out of place to recount, briefly, the history of Missions in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

The records show that from the beginning the Church was actuated by a missionary spirit. Some four years passed after the organization of the Cumberland Presbytery, on February 4, 1810, before it was apparent that a separate denomination was to be the result. Work as a new Church dates from the organization of the first Synod rather than from 1810.

The first Synod was organized at the Beech meeting-house, in Sumner county, Tenn., on October 5, 1813. The original Presbytery had been divided into three Presbyteries, viz.: Logan, Nashville, and Elk. Dr. T. C. Blake, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, has rendered valuable assistance in collecting and verifying facts from documents in his possession, acknowledgment of which is hereby made. Dr. McDonnold's History and the Minutes of the General Assembly are other sources of information from which the following items have been gathered.

All three of the Presbyteries which composed the first Synod began at once missionary work. In 1818 societies were formed with a view of missionary effort among the Indians. It appears that the three Presbyteries entered upon this work almost simultaneously, there being but a few days' difference in the meetings of these bodies when the movement was initiated. Elk, it appears, was the first to begin. The missionary movement seems to have started with Rev. Samuel King, Rev. James Stewart, and Rev. Robert Bell. Mr. Bell drew up a constitution for a ladies' missionary society, under which the societies of all the Presbyteries worked.

In October, 1818, the Central Board of Elk Presbytery sent Rev. Samuel King and Rev. Wm. Moore to the Indians. When they returned in the spring of 1819 and made a report of their work, the Presbytery sent Mr. King back and with him Rev. Robert Bell to evangelize among the Indians. Mr. Bell opened a school for the Indians in May, 1820, which was continued until about 1832. In the meantime a Board of Missions for the entire Church had been organized; or rather "the Ladies' Missionary Society of Logan Presbytery, without ceasing to be the Presbyterial Society, was also made the General Society of the Church, and all the ministers of the Church were appointed trustees. Rev. Robert Donnell, of Elk Presbytery, became the president of the General Board at Russellville. . . . As the Society of Logan Presbytery it had the ministers of that Presbytery for one of these Boards; as the general Missionary Society of the Church it had all the preachers in the Church for the other." The work among the Indians was then called Foreign Missions; now it is known as Home Missions

EARLY HOME MISSIONARY WORK.

In 1815 Rev. Thomas Calhoun and Rev. Robert Donnell visited East Tennessee and held revival meetings, but did not undertake to organize Churches. The Presbyterian Church received the benefit of their labors. The next year Mr. Calhoun was sent for and crossed the mountains, and filled a long list of appointments in special meetings. In 1818 Rev. David Foster, by order of the Nashville Presbytery, went to a circuit in East Tennessee. In 1821 Rev. J. S. Guthrie was sent to the Hiwassee circuit. Later Rev. Robert Baker, Rev. Abner Lansden, Rev. George Donnell, and Rev. S. M. Aston were sent to that field. In 1826 the Presbytery from Middle Tennessee crossed the mountains, and held a session in a private house in East Tennessee. In 1827 the Knoxville Presbytery was organized.

The Nashville Presbytery established circuits in West Tennessee as fast as the country was opened. Rev. John L. Dillard and Rev. James McDonnold were sent thither in 1820. In 1821 Rev. Richard Beard was sent to a work in that section. Others were sent from time to time, and the work prospered. In 1824 Hopewell Presbytery was organized. In the same manner Alabama and Mississippi were visited, as the Territories were opened to white settlers.

The Logan Presbytery sent missionaries to Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, and Missouri; and besides this looked after the destitute parts nearer home. In 1811 Rev. William Harris visited Indiana. In 1817, by order of Logan Presbytery, Rev. Alexander Chapman and Rev. William Barnett made a tour of the State. A member of Rev. Finis Ewing's congregation, in Kentucky, had moved to Illinois. He wrote an urgent letter to Rev. Wm. Barnett to visit that section. Mr. Barnett journeyed at once to Illinois, and he and Rev. Green P. Rice held the first Cumberland Presbyterian camp-meeting ever held in the State. This was in 1817. In 1819 the Ladies' Missionary Society at Russellville, Ky., was instrumental in sending Rev. B. D. Morrow as a missionary to Missouri. In 1820 the Board of Missions sent Rev. Alexander Chapman on a missionary tour through Illinois. In 1819 McGee Presbytery was organized in Missouri, and in 1822 Illinois Presbytery was formed in Illinois.

In the same manner the home missionary effort of early Cumberland Presbyterians can be traced in planting Churches in Arkansas, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. In those early years the missionary spirit of the denomination was its very life; and but for the self-sacrificing spirit of those consecrated men and women, Cumberland Presbyterianism would to-day be very much circumscribed. In 1829 the General Assembly was organized; and in 1831 it directed that "all the Presbyteries form home missionary societies, and that each congregation be an auxiliary society to raise funds for the support of missionaries." In 1836 the General Assembly resolved itself into a Missionary Board and urged all the Presbyteries to become auxiliaries. This was for Home and Foreign Missions.

BOARD OF MISSIONS ORGANIZED.

The General Assembly of 1845 organized a "Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions," and located it in Lebanon, Tennessee. The members of this Board were Rev. F. R. Cossitt, D.D., President; Rev. T. C. Anderson, Rev. David Lowry, Rev. S. M. Aston, Rev. C. P. Reed, Rev. G. Mansfield, Rev. A. M. Bryan, and Messrs. Andrew Allison, J. S. McClain, Isaac Golliday, R. L. Caruthers, and M. McCorkle. The first Secretary was Rev. Isaac Shook, who was employed in 1851. He was succeeded by Rev. T. P. Calhoun, who was followed by Rev. T. C. Blake, in 1857. Through the energy and able management of Mr. Blake the cause was wonderfully advanced. He did away with agents, the method up to that time for raising money, and relied on the preachers, as is now done, to collect funds. The Board was getting into fine working order when the Civil War opened. That, of course, demoralized the work. It was impossible for the Board to do any thing during the war. It could not even make a report to the General Assembly. In this emergency the General Assembly at Alton, in 1863, ap-

pointed a Committee on Missions, which was instructed to organize and govern itself "according to the constitution and by-laws adopted by the General Assembly for the government of the Board of Missions as far as applicable." This committee grew into what was afterward known as the Board located at Alton, Illinois. Notwithstanding the ravages of war the missionary spirit was not dead in the Southern part of the Church. On account of military movements it was next to impossible to get a meeting of the Church representatives. In 1863 a convention of over sixty members met in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Of the three important things that was done, one was to appoint a missionary committee located in the army. General A. P. Stewart was made chairman of this committee. As soon as the war was over the Board at Lebanon, Tennessee, resumed its work.

A Board of Home Missions had been organized in the Pacific Synod. By action of the General Assembly, in 1866, the Pacific Synod concurring therein, this Board passed under the control of the General Assembly, just as the Lebanon and Alton Boards.

In 1869 the General Assembly consolidated all three of these Boards. The new Board consisted of eleven members. It was chartered in Illinois, but held all save its annual meetings in the city of St. Louis. According to the instructions of the General Assembly, in 1878, the Board was re-organized and chartered in Missouri. The membership was reduced to five.

Dr. McDonnold makes the following observation concerning the work of the Board in later years: "At the beginning of this period the work was under the immediate supervision of the Rev. R. S. Reed, Secretary. He died early in the summer of 1871, and was succeeded by the Rev. J. B. Logan, D.D., who was for two years General Superintendent and Corresponding Secretary. After this, beginning May 1, 1874, the Rev. E. B. Crisman, D.D., became Superintendent and Corresponding Secretary, and the almost seven years, during which he held this office, were a period of increasing success in every department of mission work." When Dr. Crisman retired from the work, Dr. Bell, who had for some time been President of the Board, became also the Superintendent of Missions. During that time Messrs. George E. Patton and J. L. Secor served in turn as Corresponding Secretary, Rev. J. V. Stephens, the present incumbent, entering upon his duties in January, 1889.

HOME MISSIONS UNDER THE BOARD.

Space will not permit a full review of this department of the work. Suffice it to say that that which can be named does not represent all that has been done; for besides what the Board has done directly, it has been of service in doing a great deal indirectly. The following self-supporting Churches at one time received aid from the Board: Alabama, Birmingham; Arkansas, Little Rock; California, Hanford; Illinois: Alton, Atlanta, Mattoon, Wenona, Macomb; Indiana: Evansville (First), Logansport; Iowa, Waukon; Kentucky, Bowling Green; Mississippi, Corinth; Missouri: Kansas City, Macon City, Pierce City, Sedalia, St. Louis; Oregon, McMinnville; Tennessee: Chattanooga, Clarksville, Jackson, Knoxville, Nashville (First), Shelbyville, Murfreesboro; Texas: Austin, Jefferson, McKinney, Waco; Washington, Walla Walla. Besides these Churches that are now self-supporting the Board has under its care the following towns and cities: Alabama: Bessemer, Sheffield; Arkansas, Fort Smith; California: San Diego, Stockton; Colorado, Pueblo; Illinois: Danville, Springfield; Kansas: Cherry Vale, Fort Scott, Garden City, Leoti, Scott City, Topeka, Wellington; Kentucky, Louisville; Mississippi, Meridian; Missouri, St. Joseph; Ohio, Beverly; Oregon, Eugene City; Texas: Abilene, Colorado, San Antonio, Texarkana, Tyler. A number of missionaries have been maintained among the Indians, and something has been done for the colored people.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

In 1852 Rev. Edmond Weir, who had been manumitted to enable him to carry out his desire of going to Liberia, Africa, as a missionary, reached that country. While a slave he had secured a good education. He was

ordained by Anderson Presbytery in Kentucky. In 1857 he visited America and raised funds for his church building. Whatever might have come of this work, the war coming on of necessity caused it to be abandoned. In 1860 Rev. J. C. Armstrong was consecrated as a missionary to Turkey. The war had the same effect on the mission to Turkey that it had on the Liberia mission. In 1873 Rev. S. T. Anderson, D. D., was appointed a missionary to the Island of Trinidad. The original plan was to reinforce him with two or three men. This could not be done because the necessary funds were not secured; and after more than two years Dr. Anderson, on his own request, was permitted to return to the United States.

THE JAPAN MISSION.

In the fifties "Dr. Cossitt, while saying nothing against other fields, kept pleading the cause of Japan." When, in 1872, the Board was looking for the best field in which to plant a foreign mission it sought the advice of Dr. Ireneus Prime, of New York. He replied that Japan was most accessible and least occupied by Christian Churches, and but for the strange and seemingly paradoxical position of the Japan government against Christianity the people throughout the empire were eager to learn Christianity. Subsequent events have shown that Dr. Prime was right; and that Dr. Cossitt, the wise President of the Board, twenty years earlier was not mistaken in his reasons for holding a preference for Japan.

The Board of Missions reported to the General Assembly, in 1876, that "two most excellent brethren, Rev. J. B. Hail and Rev. A. D. Hail, have been accepted by the Board as candidates for the foreign field, and are now preparing for the work." At the next meeting of the General Assembly the Board reported that Rev. J. B. Hail and wife had been sent to Japan (they arrived there in January, 1877), and that Rev. A. D. Hail and wife were awaiting the bidding of the Church. Mr. Hail was consecrated to this work at the General Assembly in session at Lebanon, Tennessee, in 1878, and reached Japan in October of the same year.

In 1880 the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions was organized, and in November of the next year Miss Alice M. Orr, and Miss Julia L. Leavitt, supported by the Woman's Board, arrived in Japan. Miss Orr has since returned to the United States, and is now the accomplished wife of Rev. J. W. Laughlin, of Springfield, Missouri.

Mrs. A. M. Drennan joined the Mission in May, 1884, and Miss Bettie A. Duffield in April, 1885; Rev. G. G. Hudson and wife, and Miss Rena Rezner, reached Japan in December, 1886, and Rev. G. W. Van Horn and wife arrived in that land in October, 1888. In December, 1889, Miss May Morgan and her sister, Miss Agnes Morgan, reinforced the Mission. Dr. Mary A. Gault has been appointed to that Mission, and will sail in a short time.

On the eighth day of January, 1885, the Wilmina Girls' School was opened, on the property purchased for that purpose on the Foreign Concession in the city of Osaka, where the first and principal station of the Japan Mission is located. Mrs. Drennan for the first several years had charge of the school. The building was destroyed by fire in February, 1888, but was replaced immediately with a better building. The Mission has not confined its educational work to the Wilmina School, but has done much in other directions.

The first Church was organized in February, 1884; soon after a Church was organized in Hikati. The same year the Shingu Church was organized. There are now ten churches, with a membership of 623, and ten Sunday-schools, with a membership of 437.

THE MEXICO MISSION.

The Mexico Mission was opened in 1887. Rev. A. H. Whatley and his wife, and Rev. F. P. Lawyer and his wife, are the missionaries. Mr. Whatley has built a chapel at Aguascalientes, and has organized a small congregation. Mr. Lawyer superintends two flourishing schools (one for boys and one for girls) at San Pedro, and does evangelistic work.

CONTRIBUTIONS FOR MISSIONS.

There is no way of knowing how much was contributed for missionary purposes prior to the organization of the Board in 1845. After the organization of the Board two difficulties are encountered in reckoning the amount of money raised. One is found in the fact that many Presbyteries for years preferred to work independently of the Board, so that much that was done for Home Missions was never reported through the proper channels; and for a number of years the offerings for Foreign Missions were sent to the American Board. Of that amount we have no record. The following tables contain the amounts raised respectively for Home and Foreign Missions, from the organization of the Board down to and including 1891. In each table "contributions previous to 1880" are based on reliable data, with one or two exceptions that had to be estimated. The figures may be accepted as being substantially correct:

LAST YEAR'S WORK.

JAPAN.

In estimating the condition of things in the Japanese Empire, it should be remembered that old Japan has given place to new Japan. The old has vanished as mist before the morning sun. "The Japanese boast that they have done in twenty years what it took Europe half as many centuries to accomplish." The report from our Mission says that neither the new nor the old can be entirely understood by the most intelligent and indefatigable foreign observer. If "it is difficult for those on the ground to form correct conceptions of the times and the people, it must be much more difficult for those who receive their knowledge of things transpiring in this land as it filters down through Associated Press dispatches and hastily edited paragraphs."

On February 11, 1889, the new Constitution of the empire was promulgated amid the rejoicings of the nation. "The constitution proper consists of sixty-six articles, treating of the Emperor, the rights and duties of subjects, the Imperial Diet, the Ministers of State and the Privy Council, the judiciary and finance, with supplementary rules." Under the constitution the people have the right of freedom of religious belief. This places Christianity on the same basis before the government as the old religions.

The Emperor has divided his authority with the people. "Nineteen twentieths of the inhabitants of Japan have been simply burden bearers

and tax payers; now they are becoming 'the people.' Japan, having cast off dualism, feudalism, and other divisive elements, has entered upon a higher process of unity. The people are now learning who and what they are."

Under the new Constitution there are the Upper House (House of Peers) and the House of Representatives. The former consists of three classes of members, viz.: hereditary, elected, and nominated. Members of the Imperial family, princes, and marquises hold their position for life. A number of counts, viscounts, and barons, elected by their respective orders, serve for a term of seven years. Men of ability and learning nominated by the Emperor, sit for life. The House of Representatives consists of about three hundred members. These are elected by the people.

In July, 1890, the election of members of the Imperial Diet passed off quietly, though not without much interest through the empire.

The political inequality of men must of necessity form a conspicuous part of the constitution. It declares that "priests and teachers of religions of all kinds shall be ineligible for election to both Houses, and disqualified as electors for the House of Peers." This disqualifies 14,849 Shinto priests, 56,266 Buddhists, and 400 Christian preachers.

On November 29th last the Imperial Diet was duly opened by the Emperor. It will go down in history that the opening of the first national parliament was the most significant event in Japan of the year 1890. Nearly one half of the members of the Lower House belong to some branch of the Liberals, about forty are Progressives, forty Conservatives, and the remainder Neutrals.

About twelve members (or one out of twenty-five) of the Lower House are Christians, and some of these are counted among the ablest political leaders in the empire. The law of election requires representatives to elect three candidates, one of whom the Emperor appoints to the presidency. Nakashima Nobuyuki, a member of the Presbyterian Church in Tokio, was the one to receive the majority of votes, and the Emperor honored the choice of the House with the imperial appointment. The first president of the first National Assembly in Japan is a Christian. The chairman of the most important committee of the first Diet is Shimada Saburo, another Christian. Men have been arrested, and one died in prison, for Christianity's sake only sixteen years ago; but now Christians are among the legislators of Japan.

A solid hope for Japan's future is found in its Christian community, now constantly increasing. The total number of Protestant Church members in 1890, according to the report of Rev. H. Loomis, Bible agent at Yokohama, was 32,380—a gain over 1889 of 1,199. There are twenty-one theological schools with three hundred and fifty students. This is an increase of four schools and seventy-five students. The number of unordained preachers and helpers is placed at four hundred and fifty-five—an increase of forty-six. The contributions of native Christians was 69,325 yen, against 53,503 yen for 1889. The value of a yen is about eighty-three cents in gold. Christian men are leaders in thought and letters as well as politics. This gain has been made in one of the most exciting years in Japan's history. It has been made in spite of the reaction caused over treaty revision.

Under the treaties the foreign powers reserve the right to have their citizens tried before their own courts, and all questions in which foreigners were interested were to be submitted to trial before foreign courts. The Japanese think it is derogatory to their character as a great and independent nation to be forced to submit to the provisions of the treaties. This treaty agitation has raised up an anti-foreign party, who want the Christian missions conducted only by native Christians. They want the natives to formulate Christian creeds for themselves. They do not want Christian creeds formulated for them by the foreign nations. The Mission, in its report to the Board, says: "The nationalistic feeling aroused by the failure of treaty revision last year caused by too great concession to foreign powers on the part of the cabinet officer who negotiated it, has had no time to slumber. As it is an intelligent newspaper reading people, the excitement has reached to every nook and corner of the land. Its effects upon relig-

ious movements have not been wholly unlike that which the same state of things would produce in our own country."

The people virtually say: "Whenever revision takes place, let it be done in such a way as to restore to Japan full authority over every inch of her soil. Wipe out the whole ex-territorial business at once, and bring foreigners under our laws as we are brought under theirs when we go abroad. Until Western nations are willing to do that, retain the present treaties. To be sure they are a disgrace to us; but the whole world knows we went into them ignorant of the national humiliation in which they placed us. But now that we are awake, let us never willingly consent to a humiliating revision. Meantime, bind the foreigners as closely as possible to the half dozen open ports, and reduce passport privileges to a minimum."

The report of the Mission continues: "The country is just as open now to the gospel as it has ever been. The missionary can go anywhere so far as the government is concerned, and be not only unmolested but protected in his work. All religions are now on the same basis of toleration. Take this into consideration with the fact that Japan has appropriated the fruits of a Christian civilization, schools, hospitals, reformatories, such things as have grown up in the west largely under the inspiration of ages of Christian ideas, and so it becomes easy to infer that the work of her Christianization is almost completed. But there is a vast difference between being open to the gospel and being 'gospelized.' It is confounding these two things that serves more than aught else to cut the nerve of missionary effort in behalf of Japan. While it is undeniable that there has been a reaction in Japan, yet there are many reasons for believing that it has been clothed in too pessimistic colors, and been greatly misunderstood. It is on the whole a healthy reaction."

Just before the close of the Diet a resolution was brought before the House for discussion looking to a more vigorous enforcement of the present treaties until a satisfactory revision shall be agreed upon. This resolution was accompanied by a memorandum of reasons for the proposed action. Among other statements in the reasons assigned is this significant declaration, which may be accepted as the feeling of the Japanese government toward Christianity:

"No question is raised about the residences of foreign representatives, missionaries, foreigners in Japanese employ, or about churches, but with regard to the rest accurate investigations should be undertaken. This is the cardinal point advocated by the resolution."

Other causes have operated against Christianity in the past year. Cholera and la grippe materially affected the work. Some of the churches lost some of their best workers. The Wilmina School lost one of its teachers. The sequel to the floods of two years ago, and the failure of the rice crops last year, worked a hardship on many, and necessarily retarded the work.

But notwithstanding all these things, the Mission not only held its own, but made substantial advancement. The report of the Council of Missions of the "Church of Christ in Japan" in speaking of the Cumberland Presbyterian Mission says: "The Churches have gotten into better working order than ever. Two have installed pastors, and one has employed a lay evangelist who gives his whole time to his work. The contributions are larger than ever before." Four out of the ten congregations now have houses of worship. The school work of the year has been of a substantial character. All in all the Japan Mission has never been in so prosperous a condition as now.

CHURCH OF CHRIST.

On this point the Mission says: "As reported last year the Churches with which your mission co-operates agreed to a basis of union with the other Presbyterian bodies in accordance with the platform recommended by the General Assembly at Waco, Texas, in 1888. This union has now become a consummated fact. Our delegates from the various Churches in the bounds of Naniwa Presbytery appeared at its spring meeting and were duly enrolled, while the representative of the Tokyo Church was enrolled in the

Tokyo Second Presbytery at its April sitting. From that time the work has gone harmoniously forward in united effort in behalf of one Church of the Presbyterian bodies in Japan. The home missionary work of this united body has its head-center in a missionary board located at Tokyo, but each Presbytery has its Committee on Missions, which superintends the work within its own bounds. Aside from this general work each Mission is perfectly free to conduct as much mission work in connection with its own Churches and fields of labor as may seem best."

THE WORD "UNITED" DROPPED.

Rev. George W. Knox says that "the name of the Church, Nippon Kirisuto Itchi Kyo-Kwai (The United Church of Christ in Japan), has never been quite satisfactory, the word 'Itchi' being disliked by men who do not object to the English 'United.' And the men of the original Churches have not given up their fondness for the first name, Nippon Kirisuto Kyo-Kwai (The Church of Christ in Japan). And finally they had their way. After repeated discussion and reconsideration the old name was revived, and it is now the official designation. It is not so exclusive in its Japanese as in its English dress, partly because there is no particle, and partly because this oriental language permits a dozen combinations expressive of the same thought. Thus the Episcopalians are the Holy Church of Japan; and the Russians, The Orthodox Church; and the Roman Catholics, The Church of God. The Synod did not wish to embody in the permanent name of the Church the fact that several foreign missions had 'united' in its establishment."

When our Mission united with the other five Presbyterian Missions the union was effected on the basis of "The Declaratory Act" of the United Presbyterian Church of Scotland, which was printed in the last Annual Report. The native Church felt the need of a creed, concise, and framed according to the needs of Japan, and not in the light of the past theological discussions of Europe and America. In December the Synod of the Church of Christ in Japan met, and after several days' discussion, agreed on the following

CONFESSION OF FAITH.

"The Lord Jesus Christ, whom we adore as God, the only begotten Son of God, for us men and for our salvation was made man and suffered. He offered up a perfect sacrifice for sin; and all who are one with him by faith are pardoned and accounted righteous; and faith in him working by love purifies the heart.

"The Holy Ghost, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, reveals Jesus Christ to the soul; and without his grace man being dead in sin can not enter the kingdom of God. By him the prophets and apostles and holy men of old were inspired; and he speaking in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament, is the supreme and infallible judge in all things pertaining to faith and living.

"From these Holy Scriptures the ancient Church of Christ drew its confession; and we, holding the faith once delivered to the saints, join in that confession with praise and thanksgiving:

"I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Ghost, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, dead, and buried; he descended into Hades; the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and sitteth at the right hand of God, the Father Almighty; from thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead. I believe in the Holy Ghost, the Holy Catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen."

The New York *Independent* has this to say of the new creed: "It will be seen that the essential doctrines of Christian faith which are not emphasized

in the Apostles' Creed are, with much skill, put into this preamble. No one can question that the one who holds this, though he may not hold all truth, yet holds all the essential Christian faith. The substance of the Nicene Creed on the Trinity is here. Here also is the sacrifice of Christ, the necessity of faith in him, the influence of the Holy Ghost, and the authority of the Holy Scriptures. Japan here shows what is the trend of our Christian Churches toward simple creeds which will express, rather in language of religions experience than of theology, their faith in God and his Son."

One of the most encouraging signs in the mission work in this Empire is the vigor of the native Church. It does not propose to be weighed down by dogmas that can have no meaning in that land, except as they exhibit relics from the theological battle fields of other countries and times. There is a disposition to independence, which, if properly guided, means much for the future of Christianity among this people.

The action of the General Assembly at Waco, Texas, in 1888, in approving the union of our own Mission with those of the other Presbyterian Missions was wise. While these six Presbyterian Missions render mutual aid to one another, and so present a solid front to the enemy, each is at the same time made stronger in its own work. Our own Mission, which did not have a native pastor before the union, has by this means located two pastors. Our Mission has lost nothing but gained much by this union. Two young men will finish their studies in the Doshisha Training College in June and be ready for work. Other young men are preparing for work. The past year has been one of marked advancement. Yet there is great need of reinforcements. The few missionaries cover a territory larger than all the Southern States of our own country occupied by our own denomination. When the time for learning the language is taken into account the urgency for additional missionaries becomes greater. In addition to this, according to good authority, the average time of service before the first furlough is rendered necessary in order to preserve good health is about seven years. One of our missionaries has been there twice that length of time without a furlough. Miss Bettie Duffield has recently reached America on a furlough. Rev. J. B. Hail expects to arrive in the home land early next year for a rest.

These things show all the more the immediate need of additional missionaries. The report says, "We have almost reached the point where we feel the full force of the fact 'that despair of an object is speechless.'" One of the most alarming features of our foreign work is that so few in our Church seem to be moved to go to the foreign field. This is a question which the Church should make a special subject of prayer. It is with pleasure that the fact is noted that Dr. Mary A. Gault, of Cleveland, Ohio, is now under appointment to Japan. She will sail soon, under the auspices of the Woman's Board.

THE OSAKA SCHOOL.

In the report a year ago the needs of such a school as was proposed were fully set forth. It was the hope that the school might be opened last September. But all the Churches co-operating in the movement were hampered for lack of funds. The reaction in the Empire, to which reference has already been made, may make some changes necessary in the plans originally contemplated. Less than one third of the amount called for as our part for the establishment of this school has been collected.

The following tables show the present missionary force, and the strength and working force of the various congregations of the Mission:

MEXICO.

The work in this Mission has been seriously crippled on account of the sickness of little Archie Whatley. His parents were compelled to bring him to the States. This kept Rev. A. H. Whatley out of his work for several months. He returned as soon as it was thought that his little son had sufficiently recovered, leaving Mrs. Whatley and the child at her parents' home in Danville, Ind. But he had hardly started in his work when he was summoned to the bedside of his wife, who was dangerously sick. It now seems doubtful whether the peculiar malady of little Archie will admit of his being taken back for a considerable time. In this sad affliction which has come into the family of one of the missionaries, he and his wife will have the prayers and sympathy of the whole Church.

The chapel at Aguascalientes was dedicated last June. The work there was in a promising condition when the missionary was forced to leave it. The native helper has kept up the services. Asientos has had to be temporarily abandoned in the absence of Brother Whatley.

Rev. F. P. Lawyer and his wife have been located at Guanajuato during the year. Evangelistic services are held regularly. Brother Lawyer's class in English has increased from eight to twenty. He is studying the Bible with them. He has translated the Gospel of St. John and a part of the Acts of the Apostles. Thus those from whom the Bible has been studiously concealed or prohibited are receiving the leaven which will ultimately work to everlasting life.

Those who have not made a special study of the religious condition of Mexico can not appreciate the difficulties with which missionaries of the Protestant faith have to contend. Great care has to be exercised about receiving persons into the Church, even when they are apparently ready to confess Christ. Our missionaries are exceedingly cautious along this line. Brother Lawyer holds services also at La Luz. After the laying of a firm foundation the results will be much larger than is possible in the incipiency.

The hope for large results in Mexico is from the children. The boys and girls must be trained in Christian schools. Brother Lawyer has under his management two schools at San Pedro—one for boys, sustained by the Board of Missions, and one for girls, supported by the Woman's Board.

In the boys' school there are 117 enrolled, and in the girls' school there are 61. The civil authorities furnish protection and the children, while the Mission furnishes the teaching force and supplies and manages the schools. The same chance is now open to establish schools at La Luz. The missionaries think that the Church can not afford to let this opening pass unimproved. Yet, unless the Church is more liberal in its offering for the foreign work the funds will not permit such an enlargement. The Mission has also opened a school in connection with the work at Aguascalientes.

The same thing may be said in reference to reinforcements for Mexico as about Japan.

INDIAN MISSIONS.

The force of missionaries in the Indian Territory has remained the same as it was one year ago, viz. : Rev. N. J. Crawford, Rev. David Hogan, Rev. R. C. Parks, Rev. Calvin Robinson, Rev. D. L. Walker, Rev. A. B. Johnson, and Mrs. S. S. Phelps. Earnest work has been done during the year, and much of the time at a great disadvantage.

Rev. Calvin Robinson is kept busy in assisting in various ways the Indian preachers. They rely on him for translations and explanations in doctrine and points of government. Besides this, he does full work as a preacher in the pulpit.

Rev. R. C. Parks has given three fourths of his time to the Wagoner Church. He has also looked after Charemore and West Point. He reports that his school has been doing very good work.

Rev. A. B. Johnson reports about one hundred conversions in his field. These were mostly among white people. He says that the white population is constantly changing, so that it is difficult to organize and hold the converts. Brother Johnson has traveled thousands of miles and been exposed to all kinds of weather, often sleeping on the ground at night.

Mrs. Phelps has done a good year's work in Hogan Institute. Besides her regular school work during the week, a Sunday-school is maintained in the school building. The Woman's Board furnish the money to pay the salary of Mrs. Phelps. By this means the women of the church have conferred a lasting benefit upon the Indians.

All the missionaries agree that there is great need of additional laborers in that Territory. At least two white men and two more Indians should be commissioned for this work, say those on the ground. In the depleted condition of the treasury it has not been possible for the Board to materially increase the outlay of money for this mission. It has been determined that it would be an advantage to commission an Indian preacher, paying him the salary now paid to Rev. D. L. Walker, as Brother Walker's work is chiefly among the whites. Brother Walker expressed himself as being perfectly willing to whatever the Board thought best to do in the

premises. So, after a careful consideration of the matter, it has been determined to dispense with the services of Brother Walker, and Rev. Martin Charlton has been appointed a missionary.

Rev. N. J. Crawford sums up the results of our work among the Indians in past years as follows :

1. The conversion of about eight hundred and fifty souls and the accession of about seven hundred of these to the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.
2. The acquiring of a Church property worth between five and six thousand dollars.
3. The permanent establishment of a mission school and management of the same for five years, with an average attendance of about thirty-five pupils.
4. The management of a missionary Sunday-school in connection with the literary, in which the prayerful and painstaking work of teaching God's word has developed into much *visible good*, and evinces the fact that this work is destined to become the great lever for good in the future.
5. The establishment of an individual school by the Rev. R. C. Parks, conducted in the interest of religion and having special reference to our own work in both the Creek and Cherokee Nations (it being near the line between the two), and which has been successfully conducted for two years with good attendance.
6. As bespeaking the gathered, and the gathering influences of the Church, we have had before us, and acted upon, a subscription paper amounting to one thousand dollars, tendered to the Presbytery, with request to erect a school and church building at Chelsea, a point on the Frisco railroad, and west and north of the field we are now occupying. We are preparing to utilize this sum in the near future.

CITY MISSIONS.

The table which follows shows the progress of the city mission work and the present condition of missions under the direction of the Board as far as mere figures can give the facts. Besides what is in the table, it should be stated that no reports were received from Cherryvale, Kan., Pueblo, Col., and Sheffield, Ala.

Rev. J. C. Arnett, although serving the Bessemer mission for several months, has just been appointed a missionary at that place. The title of the property at Beverly, Ohio, has just been decided in favor of the Cumberland Presbyterians. The property is valued at five thousand dollars. Rev. R. J. Beard has done a great deal of patient, hard work in this field; his perseverance and tact in this case can not be too highly commended. Rev. W. H. Brown has served the Colorado mission nearly all the year. The vacancy caused by the resignation of Brother Brown has been filled by the appointment of Rev. M. R. Dougherty, who will soon enter upon his duties.

The Eugene City mission has just completed a good house of worship, and it is expected that it will soon be self-supporting. Rev. S. G. Decherd has entered upon his duties, since the last report, as pastor at Fort Scott.

Rev. J. C. Moore has changed from Scott City to Garden City, and Rev. E. L. Ashmore is in charge at the former place. Rev. T. M. Hartman has been in charge for about ten months at Meridian. From the progress of this Church it is expected that it will become self-sustaining at no distant date.

Rev. W. B. Preston is again in charge at San Antonio. He has started well, and the outlook for that Church has never been so bright as now. Rev. Ph. R. Danley entered upon his duties at Springfield in January. The growth in that mission under Brother Danley has been very gratifying. The membership has been more than doubled, and there are other signs of a healthy growth.

Rev. Alonzo Pearson, after several years of faithful service, has resigned from the St. Joseph mission. Rev. J. R. Crawford also leaves Texarkana.

He has done a fine work in that thriving city, and if the work prospers in the future as in the past few months it will soon be able to get along without assistance from the Board.

Rev. N. D. Johnson has held faithfully on his way at Topeka. He is now striving to complete his church building. His faithful services deserve to be rewarded by the liberality of the church at large in a sufficient amount of money to complete the building.

Rev. D. C. DeWitt, on account of ill health, was constrained to resign from Abilene early in the year. His work in that city was very successful.

Earnest efforts have been made to supply the pulpit at Louisville, made vacant by the resignation of Rev. B. D. Cöckrill, who, as its first missionary pastor, served that mission for a number of years, and had succeeded in gathering a small but devoted congregation. Correspondence is still pending, with reasonable prospects of success in supplying the vacancy in the near future. An encouraging feature in this mission is that the people, though so long without a leader, are resolute, and keep up the Sabbath-school with full numbers and also the weekly prayer-meeting service.

The mission at Sheffield has about completed its handsome brick church building, with no liabilities except to the Church Erection Fund for one thousand dollars.

Some years ago a number of Cumberland Presbyterians organized a church at Fredonia, Kan. A house was built and a pastor called. The congregation having a debt on the property, and being weak, petitioned the Board to pay a small sum on the pastor's salary. This was agreed to without the Board becoming responsible for the debt on the property. The house had been unfortunately located, and the congregation could not pay the debt. Besides this, the membership had been much depleted by removals. It became evident that the outlook for this point was gloomy. The Presbyterians were willing to take charge of the work, pay the debt on the property, and pay back to the Board every dollar it had invested in the work. The membership of the Fredonia church unanimously favored such an arrangement. While the mission has been lost to the church, the matter has been so handled that no money will be lost on account of these reverses.

Charleroi, Pa., has recently been taken under the care of the Board as a mission.

Henderson, Ky., has also been taken under the care of the Board on certain conditions; as soon as the conditions are complied with the Board will supplement the salary of the missionary.

Rev. J. W. Henderson has been serving most of the year as an evangelist in Iowa. He has put new life into many of the congregations that were without pastors. Several good meetings have been held, and the work much benefited. Brother Henderson says the great need in Iowa is men.

REV. FREDERICK LACK.

For the first time in the history of the Board of Missions, as it is now constituted, it is called upon to record a vacancy caused by the hand of death. The Master has called Rev. Frederick Lack, for a number of years vice-president of the Board, to that heavenly sphere, the glories of which "eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, nor hath it entered into the heart of man to conceive." In the councils of the Board we shall ever miss his wise and cautionary advice, which, growing out of his long experience, ever characterized by a constant, prayerful spirit, gave a feeling of helpfulness and security. A full history of Brother Lack's connection with our missionary work would be almost a history of the work itself.

We record our gratitude to God for the help of his work and the example of his life. His zeal in the Lord's work, as it was intrusted to our Board, was such as led him to frequent personal inconvenience and self-denial; yet it was ever tempered with that better wisdom which marks the career of every truly successful Christian worker. In the early history of the work, when the membership of the Board was large and many of the members came to the annual meeting from a distance, Brother Lack's house was

freely thrown open for their entertainment. And while he was ever thus ready to give largely and liberally to the material aid of the work, he never failed to remind the Board that its strength is in God alone, and he always insisted that the members of the Board maintain a constant covenant of daily prayer in behalf of the work.

The vacancy made by the death of Brother Lack has been filled by the election of Rev. B. P. Fullerton as a member of the Board. He has also been elected vice-president.

By a special arrangement between the Board and the Lucas Avenue Church, of St. Louis, Dr. Bell supplied the pulpit of that Church for a few months in connection with his duties as president of the Board. He also delivered his usual course of lectures before the theological classes at Lebanon, Tenn. For these special services he received compensation equal to the balance of salary not drawn from the Board, as shown in the disbursements.

According to the instructions of the last Assembly the Board apportioned the fifty thousand dollars which the Church was asked to raise for Home and Foreign Missions among the Presbyteries. The apportionment was made on the valuation of Church property and the number of members reported; one half was based on each.

The following Presbyteries have raised more than the aggregate of their apportionments: California, Choctaw, Colesburg, Sacramento, St. Louis, Tehuacana, and Tulare. Lexington Presbytery reached its apportionment exactly; and Albion, West Iowa, and Willamette Presbyteries each came within a few dollars of the amounts they were asked to raise. So it can be said, practically, that eleven Presbyteries have responded on the basis that the General Assembly adopted.

These Presbyteries are scattered all over the Church. Some of them are weak, and others are strong. This all goes to prove that the idea of raising fifty thousand dollars for Missions on the apportionment plan is practical. Such a plan sets before each Presbytery a standard to be attained. The standard is not too high. It would be well to maintain the same plan from year to year until, instead of eleven Presbyteries coming up with their amounts, the great majority of the Presbyteries shall send in their apportionments.

The financial and congregational exhibits are presented in the proper places in this report.

WOMAN'S BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

REVIEW OF THE HOME DEPARTMENT.

A backward glance over the work from April 15, 1890, to April 11, 1891, reveals the fact that we are moving, although not at a hurried pace, as we have, no doubt, reached the point where rapid advance can hardly be expected. No very marked movement onward, not many backward steps; yet the encouragements number more than the discouragements, and each auxiliary and congregation has, like each life's history, had its lights and shadows. Looking in upon the family circle, we note that life has been spared to all our missionaries (although the health of some has been impaired), to all the members of the Board, including the synodical vice-presidents, and but few of the rank and file of the army have fallen, a blessing for which we should be profoundly thankful. "O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt his name together."

MISSIONARY ROOM.

We still occupy the same little room, No. 321 Upper Second street, and, although some of our friends who call when passing through the city declare we should have more room and be more comfortably situated, still it

is a very sacred place to those who labor there day after day, and to the ladies who meet in the regular sessions, for we recall many precious experiences during the past twelve months within those four walls, and never see that which our visitors might term uncomfortable. One lady who called during the year said she had planned for months to make that visit, in connection with one to a neighboring town, "when she must pass through Evansville." Let others do the same; we will be glad to see you.

NEW MISSIONARY.

Dr. Mary A. Gault, late of Cleveland, Ohio, under appointment of our Boards for work in Japan, is with us to-day, and will shortly sail from San Francisco to the scenes of her future labors. May our prayers attend her as she goes forth as *our* substitute. "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee, because he trusteth in thee."

PERIODICALS AND PUBLICATIONS.

The change in form and enlargement two years ago of our admirable magazine, *Missionary Record*, furnishes more space for the "Woman's Department," and we have found it profitable. We can not say that our pages are wholly satisfactory, for, while the ladies have kindly furnished us with excellent matter, some inexcusable blunders—they would seem to those who know little of the mysteries of a printing-office—have occurred, which we regret and which we trust will never be repeated. How comforting that the great Dr. A. T. Pearson makes mistakes, and states in the April number of the *Review* that "if any one thinks proof-reading a sinecure he should try it." We are grateful to all those who have kindly furnished us with such interesting and instructive matter, and we trust this periodical will still continue to grow in more ways than one; but as to whether it will ever reach the size of the *Missionary Review of the World* we will not undertake to prophesy. Of one thing we are sure, and that is that it will never be placed upon feet that will hold it up, enabling it to stand alone, but will always go on "crutches" or use a "cane," unless the ministers and women arise in power and determine it *shall be*. Is there not one woman in every Church and auxiliary who will see to it that every other woman is a subscriber to this magazine? The circulation has not increased since last report, the whole number of subscribers being two thousand. Whole number taken by auxiliaries, as reported, 1,768. This is a small proportion when we consider the number of women in our Churches. Is there any good reason why at least one tenth the women of our denomination should not take a paper which gives information as to what the Church is doing for Missions? No, the enlarged form and new dress did not meet with the hearty welcome we had hoped.

In many homes there is no visitor more cordially received than our young people's paper, the *Missionary Banner*. Is it so in *our* homes—yours and mine? The present circulation "foots up" as follows: Number of subscribers in combination with *Gem* and *Crusader*, 8,124. In clubs and single subscriptions, as shown on books of Woman's Board, 1,349. Total, 9,473. By just a little extra work the coming year, this interest will be fully self-supporting; as you will notice from the treasurer's report that only eighty dollars were paid from the Board's funds for its support this year. This matter will be considered at length under the discussion, "Our Publications."

We have issued a number of new leaflets the past year, and have renewed by reprint and re-purchase several, and have issued a new alphabetical list of all our publications, together with a number of books, which we would be glad to loan societies, asking only that they pay postage. While we can commend every leaflet on the list, we wish to call special attention to those published by other boards, and which they have granted us the privilege of using; also "Who is Mainly Responsible for the Apathy of our Churches in Mission Work?" "O Lana San," "Mrs. Holder's Experience," "Home or Foreign—Which or Both?" "Hints for my Helpers," and "An Appeal for Home Missions." We can furnish you with "Thank-

Offering Envelopes," "Mite Boxes," "Hints and Helps," and "Pictures of Missionaries."

What literature does for this cause can hardly be estimated; but who can doubt that it has been the means of touching "many a spring that has moved to prayer, to gifts, and to the consecration of noble lives to missionary service?"

TOURING.

"As iron sharpeneth iron, so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend," has been literally fulfilled in this eleventh year as we note the results of the personal work of Synodical and Presbyterial officers, and the Corresponding Secretary of the Board, who have attended Synods and Presbyteries, as well as visiting unoccupied fields, organizing societies, instructing the women in the work, and encouraging and re-organizing in a number of cases where death seemed almost certain. These Synodical Vice-presidents and Presbyterial officers are, almost without exception, persistent, brave, and untiring. They remind us of the soldier who refuses to see the signal to stop firing, but press on, realizing that recruits are to be gathered one by one. They tell us of long walks and longer rides up and down "hilly hills," but the finishing touch to every report is, "I was so glad and thankful I forgot discomforts." How many bits of "true missionary service" we could give you in this connection, had we time and space! "He that is faithful in that which is least, is faithful also in much."

PRESBYTERIAL.

Our Presbyterial societies have, with but few exceptions, shown marked growth this year - growth especially manifested in activity and a desire to become more systematic—and we now have about sixty such organizations, but, as we have stated, the "exceptions" are not heard from often. Although removed from some of these fields by many miles, we have seen obstacles confronting some on every side. One officer writes, "I often wish some of our dear pastors were better educated in the needs of missionary work, both *home* and *foreign*, and could use the words "Let her alone," with more authority. The excuse last year was you are one-ideaed, now it is you have two "ideas," and you should have a third one—"we must keep up our local work if the heathen at home and in foreign lands are never saved."

It is with pleasure we record the fact that the Presbyterial society is growing in favor, and many acknowledge it to be the proper plan for thorough systematic work, and that the women filling the different offices are realizing more than ever before their individual responsibility.

AUXILIARIES.

Five hundred and twenty-four societies answer to roll call by contributions. Of this number 411 are ladies' societies; 12 young ladies; 101 children's bands; whole number of societies enrolled 1,103; of which 905 are ladies; 15 young ladies; 183 children. As you see, numbers have given nothing during the year. Shall we continue to call them auxiliaries? Which shall we do, revive if they languish, bury or resurrect if dead? Who will answer by "personal effort" trying to bring them back into the ranks where they are so badly needed? We find more than twenty-two hundred congregations in the Church where nothing has ever been done for woman's work. Dear auxiliaries, have you considered (and tell it to the children, please) that upon your small societies our hopes depend, and that with you lies the power to advance or retard the cause?

YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

As before mentioned, the children's bands number one hundred and eighty-three. Their united gifts this year amount to about \$1,465.66 the band giving the largest amount being the "Cheerful Givers" of the First Church, of Evansville, Indiana.

All honor to the lambs of the fold! All honor to the faithful leaders

who have assisted them in reaching this mark, for sometimes they get but little help and sympathy!

Our young ladies' societies are few, but we find them efficient workers, and trust another year will enable us to mention greater results.

Another phase of young people's work should not be overlooked, although we will not dwell on it at length, as it is to be presented in one of the papers; it is the Christian Endeavor movement in our Churches. This calls upon all our young ladies for assistance, but it should not crowd out "woman's work for woman."

Will you listen to the following plain statements: We feel sure that there can not be a well regulated, thoroughly organized Church without a monthly missionary meeting. The Y. P. S. C. E. is known as the training school for the Church, and we believe it should have its regular missionary meeting, or the training is lacking in the one thing needful.

If you will grant me the time I would like to ask, that when our collections are taken in our Churches for the Assembly's Board, do not the women contribute, and are they not just as responsible for the general missionary cause as our ministers, Church officers, and men? This woman's work—referring especially to the foreign phase—is extra, "over and above" our general missionary work, because we realize what the gospel can do for woman. So we say to the young ladies, organize your societies, as it sustains the same relation to the C. E. Society as the woman's auxiliary does to the Church, and we see no need of conflict. Organize, no matter what other calls may come, for your representatives are on the field and must be sustained by your prayers and means. Understand that we do not advise the neglect of any duty, or desire that this special work should overshadow any other.

TREASURY.

It has often been said that the treasury is the pulse of the work. How we watch its "strength or weakness" as the days go by. We trust it is not a wonderful love of money that causes us to do this, but would rather mention it as our deep interest in the coming of the kingdom. It is with thankful hearts that we are able to report a slight increase over the receipts of last year. I say slight, because we have fallen far below the mark set; still, I can not see the slightest room for discouragement. While a number of societies and individuals could have done better had they tried; a hundred or more could have given something, but gave nothing, still great numbers of our women have earnestly labored until the last, and God will give the increase after a while. Many things have been joined together, causing this "falling below the mark," not least among them being the prevailing hard times, and felt greatly in some portions of our beloved Zion. Total receipts for the year, \$11,216.01.

Where are our "so-much-to-do-at-home" women? Why did they not come up by the hundreds, as they thought to do one year ago, and help us lay upon the Lord's altar five thousand dollars for Home Missions? Echo answers—where? Let us hold in mind that as our force of missionaries increases more money is needed, and we must not forget that the health of one was such as to demand a return to the home land. Others are in need of rest, and no doubt will be compelled to return to America soon. These are new calls upon our treasury, but I am sure we will consider and meet them like women. At the lowest estimate ten thousand dollars will be needed next year to carry on regular work. Shall we enlarge our borders? It is for you, my dear friends, to say. Shall we withhold our means when the men and women are waiting to be sent? It would seem, as a missionary expressed it, when she wrote to the Church at home to quit praying for doors to be opened unless the people were willing to give of their means that the laborers might be sent. How many thousand dollars will be given during the year, on which we so soon enter, to assist in sustaining the work at our mission points in our own loved country?

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Woman's Board has made appropriations to the amount of fourteen hundred dollars to the work in Mexico, and trust that the time is even now

at hand when we shall have a representative in that field. The young ladies are still requested to labor for the support of the Misses Morgan, and we hope this delegation will vote a special work for the children. Mrs. S. S. Phelps has had many hindrances in her labors in the Indian Territory, as will be noted in other reports, but goes on notwithstanding, and comes out more than conqueror.

We have had one thousand and five orders for missionary literature since the last report was given, which means more intelligent praying and giving in the future, provided the literature was read and studied. A few more copies of the Annual Report were ordered last year than ever before; still some do not appreciate their value, and one lady, when told of the time and money expended in the publication, and urged to sell a few copies, answered that "the time given to such a thing was nothing; that any member of their society could publish it in twenty-four hours, and as for the money expended such a report as the tenth ought not to cost over two cents per copy." Uniform studies are growing in favor, and we notice deeper consecration and larger offerings as soon as an auxiliary adopts the plan. In union there is strength. A number of solicitors have given good reports, and surely render excellent service in His name.

Ninety-six new auxiliaries represent much new material, to be guarded and cultivated. Sometimes societies furnish when a little attention from "some one" would save them. Life members are few in numbers, and we only have eighty-five, after eleven years' service. Have n't we plenty of women who would gladly lay thirty dollars at the Master's feet and gain the benefits?

The Sabbath evening hour of prayer should be observed by every missionary worker, and we are glad to report the days set apart by the Martinsville meeting for special prayer so universally observed.

The articles of incorporation have been changed as ordered by the tenth annual meeting, a copy of which can be found in the Eleventh Report of the Board.

THE END

of another twelvemonth's service is at hand, and, as usual reports are not quite satisfactory, as of necessity only a meager outline of the work really accomplished or left undone can be given. The year has been one of anxiety, as change tends to make us anxious, but the God of Israel has been our God, and we trust the Spirit has guided in all things for the glory of him who came to redeem the world from sin. Surely we have had more of success than failure, but the proportion is known only to the Father; of one thing we are always certain: it is only, as one has said, when we are in accord with his great plans that any success is achieved. If we are partakers with him, the limit to our possibilities can never be reached. On this rests our success in the months of labor on which we now enter, and let the motto be *Forward*, realizing that the Master who spoke to the Galilean fisherman calls to us to-day to "Launch out into the deep." Will we at his word let down the net?

FOREIGN SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The new years come
And the old years go,
As swings time's pendulum
To and fro.

It seems as if the "pendulum" has only awakened us from a brief, happy dream, so short has been the time since we met to consider the chapters of our first decade in the grand, quiet march of Missions. This day gives opportunity for measuring the distance traveled since a year ago, so it gives opportunity of setting a new mile-stone. It is the starting point for 1892. May it register the first note of a perfect anthem to be sung with grateful hearts of a year hence. It will be grand as we look beyond ourselves for the theme. We are living in an age of men and women, not things—of questions that mean life or death to hungering nations, not dead issues—

and that our anthem will be rich and grand, or only a ditty composed from notes that tell a life lived to serve *self* and not God in the world, we must be in touch or sympathy with those who are looking to the America for the key-note of the anthem of redemption.

The eleventh year has, in many respects, passed like the previous one; it marks some radical changes; it has its mingling of anxieties and encouragements. There has been anxiety over perplexing and vital questions to be considered; over the failing strength of some of our faithful missionaries and the sad fact that so few are ready to fill their places. There has been encouragement in noting the wisdom and the steadfast cheerful labors of our devoted missionaries through the difficulties, the opposition and agitation of the year; in the news of new fields being entered, new prizes won for Christ, and for the kind, tender guidance of our heavenly Father through another year.

The intelligent world has been brought face to face with Japan this past year, and has watched her issues with more intense interest than ever before. The reaction in Japan which followed the failure of the attempt at treaty revision last year was studied with great interest in America. The excitement produced by the prolonged discussion of this question has made itself felt in every department of Japanese life. The election of the first Japanese Parliament under the constitution (which was promulgated February 11, 1889) occurred on July 1, 1890. These questions, which are affecting the thought and life of Japan, have placed her before the political life of America in a new relation. "No feature of the election of this Parliament has been more interesting than its relation to Christianity; and no event more clearly indicates the influence of the young Church in Japan. Before the election in many circles the worst thing that could be said of a candidate, was that he was a Christian. In one district, in urging a Christian to be a candidate, the voters said: "Better give up your Christianity." He answered: "I would rather be a Christian than a candidate." A lesson for America. From a late report from the mission we quote: "Christianity, especially the Protestant type, has much cause for gratitude. Some fourteen members of the Parliament are Christians."

Surely, with a representation of one in twenty-seven, the Japanese Christians have every reason to be gratified at the influence they have gained, and we at home are made to exclaim: "Silently and surely the kingdom of God goes forward."

As to the social life of Japan, our Church and Boards have had the interest of the late union of Church and schools, with its problems and demands before them to be studied during the past year. At home and abroad the question of "union" is challenging the minds of the people; it is the question of convention and association. One great divine lately said: "Union is in the air. Let us get our hearts into it." So we must study it as a convention to take our position upon the side which will do the most good for the cause for which we labor. The Board is in hearty sympathy with the plan. These are lessons that remind us we must be up and doing, for Japan is on the onward march.

THE FIELD.

When I come to report our field and its workers, I meet with a puzzling problem to know where to begin and when to stop when a beginning is made. There is so much good news to publish, so much we want the world to know, and yet for the brevity that a report demands, so much must be left unpictured.

A GIFT TO JAPAN.

During my six years of happy association with you as secretary, it has been my joyous privilege to report an average of one person each year who has said: "I hear of the harvest great, the whitening fields, the Master call-eth *me* to them." And to-day we heartily welcome to our hearts, our sympathies, and to the warmth of this meeting our latest gift, Dr. Mary Gault, who, with deep, earnest, strong personal qualities, and a cultivated mind linked with capacity, received her commission and her charge at your altar yester-

day, and will set sail in a few days for her new life work. We will pledge her our love, our support, and our prayers, wishing her "God speed" in all her untried opportunities and experiences. We trust she carries with her no other motive than that which moved Christ and the apostles. Love—love of the Father and the souls of men. In the name of the Church and the Board you represent, I breathe the benediction, "Mizpah."

While we are rejoicing over the added force of workers, a letter reached us bearing the sad news that our force had been weakened by the failing health of one of its members, Miss Bettie Dunfield, whose request to return to America, by the advice of her physician, for a year's rest, was granted. She sailed for home the 22d of March, hoping to be with us to-day, and bring Japan and the work home to our minds and hearts, as a secretary's pen can never do. We welcome her home, feeling that her rest at home will be a benefit to herself and an influence to the Church, enlisting others in her service of the Master. We regret that her return must be from physical causes, but we hope, with care and rest, that she will be able to return strengthened to her much-loved work.

There are others of our missionaries on the field that need rest, and must soon have it, else their health will demand it perhaps, at a great sacrifice; but the work grows wider, the needs greater, the desires more ardent, the workers fewer, so that some of our number must add year by year burdens to their failing strength. Here is a wide open door for great usefulness. Hear from the letters to-day the stirring heart-cries, the pleadings of the modern Macedonians, as pleading as of old, "Come, O come and help us." Is this not a plea to touch the hearts of one in our gathering to-day, or of any who may read these pages in their homes, who are trying to settle the question of "a useful life-work"? Missionary life no longer requires entire surrender of home ties and heroic courage to face perils of sea and land. Our steamships, our frequent mails, the respect and confidence secured by missionaries, the increased interest of missionary enterprise, contribute to make it a brighter ambition for usefulness in life than in former years. In the report of the Japan Mission last year, it called for three families—it still emphasizes the call, and adds, "the Church should send out some of her wisest and best sons and daughters." Who shall offer the gift of *self* to Japan, and be enrolled in our report of '92?

OSAKA.

Here we report the same missionaries as the previous year, and in the same line of work. The Wilmina Girls' School, under the capable management of Mrs. Van Horn, ably assisted by Misses May and Agnes Morgan, has held steadily on in power, if not in number, during the past year. Mrs. Van Horn's report of the school for the year is as follows:

This is the part that can be shown in figures to us; with this we must consider the visits made, and the questions asked that can not be kept in figures. If we compare this with last year's report, we find only a slight decrease in number, and we have been told through the press and correspondence that this has been a very trying year on all school work in the empire, owing to the political agitation; the anti-foreign spirit, with its consequences, causing a decline in the craze for English; then the temporary return to old customs, and the aversion of educating girls, based

on their theory that it unfits them for wives. With these causes must be considered the epidemic causes of cholera and influenza. But in spite of these difficulties, which reduced the attendance somewhat, we learn "that our Girls' School, from an educational point, is in good condition." The grade of scholarship has been elevated, and through this change, the schools have increased in the higher grades, and decreased in the lower. That facing all opposing forces in the work, the enrollment in the higher grades is even greater than last year. We expect to graduate the present highest classes, of three girls, in June. One graduated from the intermediate English department last July.

It is a pleasing fact to those of us at home to recall a number of girls who have been educated in this school in other years, and are now filling useful positions here and there in Japan as translation teachers; in kindergarten school; in church work or filling good Christian homes. To this year's report we are proud to add four other girls who are willing to be trained "to pass the blessings they receive to some one else." These four girls assist at the churches in the morning by interpreting for the missionary, and in the afternoon they conduct Sunday-school at two different points, doing all the work of teaching and organizing. They selected the location and rented the buildings without aid from any one of the foreign teachers. Their teacher says: "I want to train the older girls for this kind of work, so that when they graduate they will have some experience in independent work." Does the earnestness of this teacher, and the willingness of these pupils "to spend and be spent for the Master," awake the echo of a voice to any of us who are idling our time and playing with our talents, saying, "Arise, He calleth thee?"

The Misses Morgan adjust themselves to all parts of the work in which they see a needed service. The special work of Miss May in the school is that of teaching music; of Miss Agnes, assisting with the English classes in the school, and thus, with the study of the language and Bible work, their time is over full, as the report below shows. Miss Agnes, three hours and a half teaching daily; three hours a day study of language; one Bible lesson weekly given to a class numbering from six to twenty-five, and one Bible class each Sabbath. Miss May gives an average of eighteen music lessons weekly in the school, instructs three vocal classes weekly, with an average of fifty-five pupils, studies from two to three hours daily, gives one Bible lesson weekly, teaches one Bible class of from twenty to forty children on Sabbath. This represents the bulk of their work, but we must remember the many details of a missionary's life that can not be put in figures. The gifts of their daily service assure us that they are allowing no hinge on the gate of opportunity to rust. Young ladies of our church, in reviewing this crowded report of these young ladies, does this question chide you any: "What do ye for the King?"

During the year death has robbed the Girl's School of one of its greatest benefactors, Wm. Saunders, of Texas, who was called home last August. His name will endure as long as the Wilmina School stands, and his memory will be cherished for ages. The teachers and pupils of the school, shortly after its opening, sustained the loss of one of their most promising girls, who died of cholera. The best comfort in parting with her was she was a Christian girl.

YOKAICHI.

We find cause for special gratitude as we come to this station for review. One year ago, as we had closed our reports, word came to the Board of a serious accident that had befallen Miss Rezner, our missionary here, who had then so zealously led the work onward for a year. We rejoice to be able to say that her work was retarded for only a short time, and with her suffering and the perplexities and the oppositions that assail a Christian in these new fields, she has scattered widely from the Tree of Life leaves for the healing of that province.

One, in writing, says, "Our work in this place has never been brighter than now." The following proves the testimony: "Dear Sister: My heart this morning is full of gratitude to our Father in heaven for his blessings to

us. The seed is planted, the good work goes on. By a loan through kind friends in America we have bought a lot and fitted up an old dwelling house for a church; have an organized Church membership of thirty-seven members; have a good, faithful native pastor, the Rev. Mr. Nakas. The first communion held in this little church was administered by this pastor, who baptized five applicants and ordained one deacon, the first time such a thing has been done in this country in the thirteen years' history of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. They have organized a woman's prayer-meeting, which is doing good work among the women; have a woman's society (of aid to the poor), that has contributed \$7.50 this year; a children's band of seven, that has contributed \$5.30."

The contributions of these societies are sent to an orphan asylum supported by the Church. Aside from this work there are three towns near Yokaichi, where the same lessons of love for Christ and charity are taught.

The school at this station is a Government School, under the control of the Japanese. The first quarter's report made by Miss Rezner (the second was lost in the mails) shows the following:

Since February 1, 1891, a Girl's School opened under the control of the Japanese Christians, being the first and only school of the kind in this province of Ise. It opened with eight pupils, three of whom are boarders. Their native teacher for the school arrived March 18. He is to take the higher Japanese studies, also the place of translation teacher, while Miss Rezner takes charge of the English teaching and the boarding department, besides the organizing of the school work and helping in all ways she can. Miss Rezner says: "I have not reported much Bible work—it is the unnumbered quantity. All the work I do has the Bible as its chief ingredient and flavoring, but it is mixed, as Pansy says, 'with dish washing, cooking, studying, taking care of the sick, etc.'" One grand part of her Bible work, besides her daily lesson, is helping two young men for the ministry.

Yokaichi is a fertile field. I have only given a glimpse of the work and the more to do. I wish I could give it all—the struggles of the native Christians against temptations and opposition, the lonely heart cries of those trying to see the Light. Among all this clamor and anxious work lives one foreign Christian woman, who, seeing the blessings that overcome trials, writes: "Send, O send us teachers, women teachers, to reach the women." Who will go? Will you, and *you*, and *you*?

WAKAYAMA.

This station is before us to-day as never before in the person of our representative, Miss Duffield. I will briefly report her here for the first two quarters of the year, and leave the rest of the year's story to be told by herself. The national feeling existing in Japan had its effects in a measure here, but God leads his people on, for an early report says: "Our little band are not disheartened, the Christians here are stronger than ever, before, and our numbers are slowly increasing. The girls are coming forward in the work; they are organized into two bands, and the married women into two societies, and the four divisions hold a union meeting on the fourth Sunday of each month. Besides the women's and girls' classes, there is a boys' class twice a week, the pastor of the Church alternating with the missionary in this work. In reading the report below, bear in mind that this is the average work for only two quarters of the year:

In these figures we can not see *all* the work done; we can not see the prayerful hours and anxious converse with those who are about to give up their idol worship, and those who are just beginning to study the truth, and those who are tempted to give up the battle for Christ.

Let us hope that the good seeds sown, the sifting and the weeding that have been done here, will yield an abundant fruitage for those who have shown themselves approved of God, "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." Miss Leavitt, through the advice of the mission, took Miss Duffield's place at this station in January, with her helper, O Yone San. As she has been here so short a time, we will review her evangelistic work from other stations, which, in addition to those reported last year, are Hikata and Akidju.

As Miss Leavitt is peculiarly adapted to evangelistic work, most of her time is spent in the centers the ministers have opened up, her work—her head-quarters—being until lately, in Shingu. The record of her work, the written and unwritten, as she enters every village, proves that she wins her way into the hearts of the unbelieving Japanese as a sunbeam wins its way through closed blinds. In glancing over the report, let us remember that these are the average of the four quarters of the year:

At Shingu, Miss Leavitt reports the Church work in a more promising spiritual condition than a year ago. Here a society of young people have been organized similar to the Y. P. C. E. Society, superintended by the kindergarten teacher, who, it is said, "takes great pains to keep them interested in Christian progress." These meet twice a week at Miss Leavitt's house to be taught new hymns—thus they try to reach the many by interesting them in the song as well as the Christ-life story.

Judging from the variedness of Miss Leavitt's work, her task is like that of the ancient Israelites—she needs straw in the shape of time and leisure. In this we see the long journey from place to place, then from family to family, class to class, as she carries the Light of Life to all, and through all these, vigilant and wary, the arch enemy is on the watch for the missionary, with his opposing forces, his false system, false doctrines, false promises. It is in battling against these that the missionary realizes the greatest trials and disappointments—it is not the foot-soreness of a long journey here and there, through any village, carrying the message "He is risen," but the heart-soreness of "They believed not," that tries the daily strength of her who day by day carries by earnest act and influence the word with patient perseverance. Not *witness-bearing* merely, but *fruit-bearing* is her motto.

UENO IGA.

This is a city of about fifteen thousand inhabitants, in an interior province of the empire. The mission, seeing a favorable opening here for work, transferred Mrs. Drennan to this point last September from Nagoya, where we reported her last year. As the Boys' School here, in which she was engaged, united with the Southern Presbyterian schools, we will report only the organization of the work in Ueno. This is surrounded by towns and villages, all to be reached from this point; these people are far behind

in the progress others have made; they hold to their old ways, but are anxious to know what foreigners teach. It is a point where no Christian work has been done, and the desire of the people was not for Christianity, but for English teaching. Mrs. Drennan, in reply to their desire, said, "If I am to teach English, it will be with the hope of taking the gospel to this people and winning souls to Christ." Accordingly the work was begun by her, with the assistance of a native preacher, employed by the mission, and a translation teacher, one of her former pupils. Mrs. Drennan so flatteringly speaks of "two of her boys," Kimura San and Maturda San, who are supported by societies and are now attending theological schools preparatory to the ministry, who give her such helpful efficient service in the work here during any holiday season given them. Entering a new field in this way, with its peculiar people, peculiar cares, perplexing duties and problems, it demands courage and much sacrifice. Let us see what has been done.

Mrs. Drennan rented a house on a good street for a home. Near this a house for a church was fitted up comfortably and attractively. The work of organizing for Sabbath-schools, preaching, prayer-meeting, Bible class work, English teaching, work classes, etc., began, and it was found necessary to carry organization into four other parts of the city; hence the work has grown into interesting numbers. They have two Sabbath-schools, the one in the morning numbering about fifty, the one in the afternoon about seventy-five. A letter from this point says, "We are trying to awaken this people to a knowledge of Christ; so we have meetings and classes every night of the week in different parts of the city, and Sabbath is a doubly busy day for all." The work here is not school work, but class work of Bible and English teaching.

Another interesting feature of the work is that among the women, similar to that reported previous years. She says: "It is very hard to draw the women out in this city. They have the idea that women must be only keepers at home. I have a class every afternoon in English, and two work-meetings every Sunday afternoon, teaching knitting, crocheting, etc., with a Bible lesson, singing, and prayer. The older girls make shawls, hoods, capes, etc., and this et cetera might be multiplied into many lines of report; yet in making a report our missionary says, "This seems like a poor report, but I have been busy all the time." Verily the reproof of "These ye ought to have done and not leave the other undone." can not arise before her whose strength is equal to waiting on God for the seed sown to bring the harvest in his own good time.

INDIAN TERRITORY.

The work here which has been hindered and rendered nearly impracticable in some cases, by the attitude of our government, and the character of its agents, etc., is on the whole much more hopeful from the changing tone of public opinion.

The work in Hogan Institute under the care of Mrs. S. S. Phelps, who has spent her fourth year in this work, bears along in about the same line as in other years. We are glad to note a gain, numerically at least, in the attendance of the school during the past year. Numbers do not always stand for the success of the year, and yet in some departments of work there is little success without numbers—school-work is one of these.

The great obstacle in the way of success of this people, is their carelessness to duty. Two thirds of them have no conception of the importance of strict attention to business—hence the slowness of their progress to educate. It is said, "one third who do realize that diligence almost surely brings success, is the third that are reaping the profits. There is no hope of reform with the middle-aged and old; in fact not much hope for adults of any age. Our hope is in the children and youth." We are encouraged to feel that if we succeed in holding and reaching the few each year and sow to the others, we may feel our work is not in vain, and God will give the reaping time.

The average daily attendance is quite small compared with the enrollment; this is the result of la grippe, corn planting, and their characteristic disposition—carelessness, combined with their inability to know how to make time and business convenient to each other.

It must be difficult to teach them the love of Christ and of the white man's God, yet even of these darkened souls, some are brought to a personal experience of this love, and they may be trained to carry the Glad Tidings on to their own people. Our missionary says: "The work would move along to a better advantage had I an assistant—a good music-teacher and school-teacher combined." This work has its needs. Shall we meet them? A late writer says: "Christianity is now the faith of 2,000,000 of the Indian nation; the mission work among the Red Men is full of promise." Then let us strengthen the workers until thousands more are clothed in their right mind, sitting at the feet of their Redeemer.

MEXICO.

The record of the past year is that of progress, slow but sure and steady. As a Church we are represented in this country by Rev. A. H. Whatley and wife, Rev. F. P. Lawyer and wife, stationed respectively at Aguascalientes and Guanajuato. The little ones in these homes should not be overlooked in the summary, as they have their place to fill, and they assist in making the Christian home a wonderful object-lesson where the pure gospel is unknown. Rev. A. H. Whatley and family have been greatly hindered in their labors during the past twelve months by sickness, but hope to be able to resume regular work soon.

It has been the desire of the Woman's Board to send a representative into this field, but not until recently has the way seemed to open, and we may soon be able to announce to the Church that our hopes have been realized. Fourteen hundred dollars have been appropriated for work in this country since last report.

We expect one from the field to present the claim of the Mission, and tell the need of the work, bringing home to the hearts of our women their duty to this cause, hence we only give you this brief review, trusting that all realize the importance of possessing this unoccupied land.

One has said a "Man must not choose his neighbors; he must take the neighbors God sends him." Mexico is our neighbor, and she has surely fallen among thieves. What will we do in the future to bind up the wounds of ignorance, superstition and degradation?

THE FUTURE AND ITS DEMANDS.

Some of the needs which have been yearly mentioned have been promptly met, and have given great encouragement in our work. We must be reminded again and again that *daily* the work asks for more loyalty to its calls; more self-denial; more sympathy; more earnest pleading with God to intensify the Spirit's power in the native Christians, that they may be able to resist the trials of the opposing circumstances that surround them; more continued petitions for our individual missionaries; more systematic giving; more personal interest in the work, and the *great need* is more well-trained, devoted men and women, who are willing to go where God calls them. "All things are now ready," and the need was never so great in our own land, and in the world, as now. Men are hungering, are dying, while we wait. From the mission fields the world over comes the call: "We need men and women by the score to tell of the love of Christ, and we need them *now*."

For the consideration of the future work we recommend the suggestions of a letter, which will be read in your hearing concerning the adoption of a permanent scholarship fund for the support of pupils in the Wilmina School. The necessity is plain, the argument strong, hence we heartily indorse it.

Another year of busy, loving service for our Lord has about closed. With to-morrow's sun we put forth our hands for the work of a new year. What shall the new year require of us? The missionary work is the most hopeful work in the world to-day. It only requires such plans as we are considering here to-day, and devoted earnestness in carrying them out, and the work will be done. The Church at home grows earnest in proportion to the way in which she throws herself into the field. God help us to rise to our responsibility.

EXPLANATION.

Owing to the late death of a very dear relative, your Foreign Secretary's report may be void of new interest to some and lack points that its readers may desire to see. Having been called twice away from its pages on a sad errand, it is incomplete in many of its parts I know, but we recommend to you a careful reading of the Japan Mission's report, which will be found in the next issue of the Minutes of the General Assembly, and you will see the field as pictured by one who stands in its center and by one who looks from across the ocean to the fields through letters.

REASONS WHY THERE SHOULD BE AN ORGANIZATION IN EVERY CONGREGATION.

1. The command, "Go ye into all the World and Preach the Gospel to every Creature," is as binding upon each disciple as "This do in remembrance of Me."

2. To Christianize woman is the first step toward Christianizing a people. If the next generation is to be Christian, the women and children of to-day must be enlightened and converted, and to do this Christian women must be sent to them in largely increased numbers.

3. In most heathen lands, women are kept in such seclusion that the gospel of Christ can be taken to them only by women. The secluded women in Eastern nations are one half of all the women of the earth.

4. The women of our congregations need to be awakened and enlightened as to the magnitude and importance of this work. This can be most effectually done by organized societies, since by this means a deeper interest may be aroused, and missionary intelligence be more thoroughly disseminated.

5. Such a society cultivates systematic benevolence, and is helpful to every department of Christian effort. Small sums are thus gathered regularly, and the aggregate will be large. At the same time this does not detract from, but will rather increase the contributions of the congregation for other causes. It is not expected that this Society will do away with the regular public collections for Foreign Missions. These will be taken as usual, so that all may have an opportunity to aid in sending the gospel to the heathen.

6. People will be prayerful, consecrated, and liberal on the great subject of Foreign Missions in proportion as intelligence increases. Such a society, conducted as it should be, will cause the subject to be discussed in the Sunday-school, the prayer-meeting, and every family of the congregation.

7. The children will thus be trained to love and labor for the cause of Foreign Missions. With little effort, under the influence of a woman's society, they may be successfully organized into Mission Bands. The good effect upon their future and that of the Church would be incalculable.

8. The organization of missionary societies among the women of the Church tends to bring their minds to a due sense of their responsibility in this regard, and opens the way for young women to go to heathen lands. It causes those who go to be sustained, not only by material aid, but by the peculiar moral support of woman's sympathies and prayers.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARD.

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be called the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

ART. II.—The object of this Board shall be to promote an interest among the Christian women of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in behalf of Foreign Missions and the American Indians, and to work in co-operation with the General Assembly's Board of Missions in sending the gospel to the heathen—especially to heathen women and children.

ART. III.—The Board shall consist of nine members, four of whom shall constitute a quorum. They shall elect their own officers, and employ such assistants as the necessities of the work may demand.

ART. IV.—They shall have power to appoint a Vice-president for each Synod, whose duty it shall be to hold annually a meeting in connection with Synods; a Board of Managers, who shall devise and use means for extending missionary influence in the Church, also to seek and recommend to the Board suitable women for missionaries; an Auditor, who shall examine thoroughly all books and papers of the Treasurer, and furnish a certificate of the result of the same to the Board.

ART. V.—The meetings of the Board shall be held monthly, or oftener at the call of the President. There shall be an annual meeting, at which each Auxiliary Society shall be entitled to two delegates. At each annual meeting an address by the President, reports by the Corresponding Secretaries and Treasurer shall be presented, members of the Board elected, and other business transacted.

ART. VI.—Any number of women, contributing each one dollar annually, may form a Society auxiliary to the Board.

ART. VII.—The Board shall have power to make all necessary by-laws, and fill vacancies occurring during the year.

ART. VIII.—The payment of thirty dollars shall constitute a life membership of this Board, provided this sum exceeds the regular dues of any Auxiliary Society.

ART. IX.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two thirds of the members at any annual meeting.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS FOR AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be called the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the _____ congregation of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church.

ART. II.—The object of this Society shall be to disseminate missionary intelligence, to cultivate a missionary spirit in its members and in the Church, and to secure funds to promote the cause of Foreign Missions.

ART. III.—The officers of this Society shall be a President, two Vice-presidents, a Secretary and Treasurer, and shall be chosen annually. These officers shall constitute an Executive Committee to administer the affairs of the Society.

ART. IV.—1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Society; to secure missionary intelligence of other suitable material for giving interest to the meetings, and to have a general oversight of the work. One of the Vice-presidents shall perform the duties of the President in her absence.

2. The Secretary shall keep a careful record of all the meetings, shall conduct the correspondence, and present an annual report.

3. The Treasurer shall superintend the collection of dues from members of the Society, keeping an accurate account of all funds intrusted to her, remitting quarterly, or oftener, as the Society may direct, to the Treasurer of the Presbyterian Society, and she in turn remitting to the Treasurer of the Woman's Board, at Evansville, Ind.

ART. V.—The payment of one dollar annually, on quarterly installments, shall constitute a membership in this Society. In addition, at each regular meeting, members shall have an opportunity of presenting free-will offerings. Any gentleman paying one dollar or more annually shall become an honorary member.

ART. VI.—This Constitution may be amended by a two thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting, provided notice of said amendment has been given at a previous meeting.

BY-LAWS.

1. Meetings of this Society, for the transaction of business and communication of intelligence, shall be held on the _____ of each month. The anniversary meeting shall be held on the _____ of the _____, when the annual reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be read, and officers elected for the ensuing year.

2. At the first regular meeting after her election, the President shall appoint Standing Committees as follows:

First.—A Committee on Membership, of which the Treasurer shall be Chairman. Said committee shall present the claims of Foreign Missions personally to all members of the congregation, soliciting them to become active or honorary members of the Society.

Second.—A Committee on Meetings, of which the President shall be *ex-officio* Chairman. It shall be the duty of this committee to provide a special programme of exercises for each meeting.

3. The Executive Committee shall be intrusted with the duty of procuring and distributing such printed matter as may diffuse missionary intelligence among the members of the Society and of the congregation. They shall also solicit subscriptions to the *Missionary Record*, *Missionary Banner*, and other missionary publications.

4. The President shall call a meeting of the Society at any time it may be deemed necessary.

5. These By-Laws may be amended by a two thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting.

MONTHLY MEETINGS.

The following is suggested as a suitable programme for monthly meetings:

1. Singing, reading Scripture, and prayer.
2. Reading minutes of last meeting.
3. Report of Executive Committee.
4. Report of Committee on Membership.
5. Report of Special Committees.
6. Unfinished Business.
7. New Business.
8. Collection of dues by Treasurer, and reception of free-will offerings.
9. Prayer for the divine blessings upon the offerings made.
10. Reading of missionary letters, essays, addresses, etc., as arranged by Committee on Meetings.
11. Announcement of exercises for next meeting by the President.
12. Adjournment with prayer.

II.—CHURCH ERECTION.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH ERECTION.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:—Having received official information of our appointment by the last General Assembly as a Board of Church Erection in and for the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, to be located in Kansas City, Kansas, we met in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Kansas City, Mo., June 9th, 1890, and after a careful canvass of all the facts relating to our work and the purpose of the organization, we decided that the best interests of the denomination would be subserved by a provisional organization in Kansas City, Mo., which was accordingly done by electing Rev. B. P. Fullerton, President; Rev. J. W. Morrow, Vice-president; L. A. Goodman, Recording Secretary; and J. C. Cobb, Treasurer. Rev. S. Finis King was unanimously elected Corresponding Secretary. A temporary office was secured in the New York Life Building, and furnished, and the work of the Board under its provisional organization was begun.

The Treasurer was put under a ten thousand dollar bond that the funds intrusted to him might be doubly secured, inasmuch as we did not incorporate under the laws of Kansas. We were informed as to the reasons for locating the Board in Kansas, and inasmuch as we understood there was a bill before the legislature making provision so that the Board might safely incorporate under the laws of Missouri, we thought best to await the result of that proposed legislation. In the meantime we consulted the Circuit Judge, whose decision questioned the legality of Church incorporation, and also the Judge of the United States District Court, who is regarded as one of the best constitutional judges, and they and our best lawyers agree that, for our purposes, a trustee is better and less complicated than a corporation. We therefore recommend that you direct your Board to make the Corresponding Secretary the Trustee for the Board, with all the powers and responsibilities of a Trustee as defined by the laws of the State of Missouri, and that you rescind your order locating the Board in Kansas City, Kansas, and locate it in Kansas City, Missouri.

An ample Church-Erection Fund is a large factor in solving the problem of the location and early success of all home mission enterprises. That we may succeed as we desire in gathering the people into congregations for worship, we must first have a permanent place in which they may assemble for such worship. The duty of the Church to the cause of Church Erection is therefore apparent. In view of this, we feel that we can not overestimate the work committed to us as a Board, nor be too zealous in presenting the claims thereof.

The first year of our existence as a Board is closed, and the record is made. It has been a time of organization and preparation, from which we confidently expect results which will be gratifying to us all.

METHODS OF WORK.

1. The General Assembly has assigned to us a time for collections, and during this time we shall endeavor in every legitimate way to secure the co-operation of the entire Church. Believing that the use of envelopes in taking collections produces the most satisfactory results, we have provided an ample supply of envelopes for all, which will be furnished in due time.

2. We have also provided a plan by which any individual, or individuals, congregation, or Presbytery contributing at one time a sum not less than two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), may make such contribution a memo-

rial fund, to be named by the party contributing the same, said fund in each case to be kept intact in the name designated by the donor.

We present herewith a copy of our Constitution and By-Laws for your inspection, and also a tabulated statement of offerings prepared by the Corresponding Secretary. This statement shows the total receipts from all sources to be \$3,085.34; total expenses, \$1,753.77; leaving a balance in the treasury of, cash, \$1,331.57; note of A. Odell, of Pomona, Kansas, \$25. Total, \$1,356.57.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

PREAMBLE.

WHEREAS, The General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, at a regular meeting held at Union City, Tenn., in the month of May, A. D. 1890, among other proceedings did recommend that a Board of Church Election be established, and that it be located at Kansas City, Kansas; and

WHEREAS, The general object of said Board of Church Erection is, and shall be, to solicit, collect, and receive funds for the erection of church houses within the bounds of the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in the United States and elsewhere; and

WHEREAS, The General Assembly did at its said meeting constitute said Board of Church Erection by appointing as members thereof Rev. B. P. Fullerton, Rev. J. W. Morrow, and L. A. Goodman, of Kansas City, Mo., J. C. Cobb, of Odessa, Mo., and G. S. Upton, of Union, Mo.; and

WHEREAS, It is meet and proper that a Constitution and By-laws be adopted for the government of said Board; now, therefore, it is ordained as follows:

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—The Board of Church Erection of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church shall consist of five members.

ART. II.—The officers of the Board shall be a President, Vice-president, Recording and Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, and they shall hold their respective offices for the term of one year, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

ART. III.—It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings of the Board, to preserve order, and to perform such other duties as are usually incumbent on such officer, and as may be prescribed by the By-laws of said Board. In the absence of the President the Vice-president shall perform the duties of that officer.

ART. IV.—In the absence of the President and Vice-president, the Recording Secretary shall call the Board to order and preside until a President *pro tem.* be selected.

ART. V.—It shall be the duty of the Recording Secretary to make and keep a faithful record of the proceedings of said Board.

ART. VI.—It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to conduct the correspondence of the Board and to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the By-laws, or otherwise.

ART. VII.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive, hold, and safely keep the moneys, notes, and securities belonging to the said Board, and to account for, deliver, and pay over the same on the order of the Board, and for the faithful performance of his duties as such Treasurer he shall execute and deliver to said Board his bond in such penal sum and with such securities as may be required by the Board.

ART. VIII.—No money shall be drawn out except upon the check of the Board, signed by the President and Corresponding Secretary.

ART. IX.—A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of a majority of the members of the Board, but a less number may meet and adjourn.

ART. X.—This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Board, on ten days' notice thereof being given to each member of the Board of the proposed change.

ART. XI.—It shall be the duty of the Board to submit to the General Assembly, at each annual meeting thereof, a full and detailed report of all its operations during the past year.

ART. XII.—There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the President, Vice-president, and Recording Secretary, who shall in vacation administer the affairs of the Board.

BY-LAWS.

1. The Board shall hold its regular meetings in its office on the *First Tuesday* of May in each year, at 10 o'clock A.M. of that day; but special meetings may be held as provided in Section 7 of these By-laws.

2. The President, or other presiding officer, shall, at every meeting of the Board, call the members to order, and the following shall be the regular order of business:

- (1) Prayer.
- (2) Reading of Minutes of previous meeting.
- (3) Report of Corresponding Secretary.
- (4) Report of Treasurer.
- (5) Reports of Committees.
- (6) Unfinished Business.
- (7) New Business.

3. In all cases of a tie vote the President shall give the casting vote.

4. At the regular annual meeting the Board shall elect by ballot from their number a President, Vice-president, Recording Secretary, and Treasurer, and a Corresponding Secretary who shall not be a member of the Board.

5. In addition to the duties as prescribed by the Constitution, the Corresponding Secretary shall be intrusted with the work of bringing the cause of Church Erection before the Synods, Presbyteries, and congregations, and shall be the representative of the Board in communicating with them. It shall be his duty to organize effort in the several Synods, Presbyteries, and congregations, and to confer with those bodies, or any committee appointed by them on Church Erection, with a view to awaken and keep alive a suitable interest in the subject, and to secure regular annual contributions to the cause. He shall have general supervision of the entire work of this Board, and be subject to its direction and control, and shall devote all his time, energies, and attention to the business of his office, under the direction of the Board; and for this service shall receive such salary as shall be agreed upon at the annual meeting.

6. These By-laws may be altered or amended by a vote of a majority of the Board at any regular meeting thereof, provided previous notice of the change shall have been given to each member at least ten days before said meeting.

7. Special meetings of the Board may be had, on call of the President, or any two members of the Board.

8. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to make to the Board, at each annual meeting, a detailed report setting forth fully the operations of the Board during the past year.

9. The Treasurer shall make to the Board, at each annual meeting, a report showing all receipts and disbursements of money during the year, and such other matters of interest pertaining to his office as he may deem advisable and proper.

III.—PUBLICATION.

REPORT OF BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:—A kind Providence has kept us through another year, and it is with profound gratitude that we would here acknowledge his goodness and mercy. His interposition in directing and controlling many of the important events of the year has been so marked that we would be undutiful did we not make this public acknowledgement of it. We ask your reverend body and the entire Church to unite with us in thanksgiving and in prayers for his guidance in the future.

In August last the Board determined to establish at Kansas City, Mo., a book depository and Western office for the business and editorial work. We were urged to take this step by some of the leading ministers and laymen of that section of the Church, and it was believed that there was sufficient promise of good in it to warrant the experiment. Rev. Ira Landrith, then in the theological department of Cumberland University, was engaged to make head-quarters at Kansas City, travel much of his time in Texas, Arkansas, and the North-west, acting as an associate editor of the *Cumberland Presbyterian* and agent for the sale of books, and for extending the circulation of the periodicals.

For the brief time that he continued in the work his services were eminently satisfactory. After about two months it became necessary, however, to call him to Nashville, when arrangements were made with Rev. Finis King to assume Mr. Landrith's duties, as far as practicable, in connection with the work of the Board of Church Erection. Brother King has been faithful in the discharge of his duties.

As is already known to you, Rev. W. J. Darby, D.D., was in September last compelled by ill health to retire from the active duties of General Manager. The Board sympathize deeply with him in his affliction, and can but feel that the loss of his valuable services is a great misfortune. We, however, in this, as in all things, would meekly bow to the will of God, and recognize the fact that he can bring good out of what seem to be the direst calamities. We sincerely hope that restored health may permit an early resumption of his labors. His disability made it necessary to recall Brother Landrith from Kansas City and impose on him the duties of acting General Manager. His services as such have been faithful and efficient.

In August, 1890, Rev. D. M. Harris, D.D., resigned his position as one of the editors of the *Cumberland Presbyterian*. His resignation was accepted, and on September 1, 1890, his connection with the Publishing House ceased. Dr. Harris held this position about eight years, and discharged his duties with eminent ability, being recognized as one of the strongest and most vigorous writers in our Church. Progressive in thought, he labored as an editor earnestly and efficiently for the advancement of the Church in all departments of its work. Our best wishes attend him wherever, in the providence of God, his lot may be cast.

THE NEW BUILDING.

As soon as practicable after the last meeting of the General Assembly the Board, upon revised plans and carefully prepared specifications, let the contracts for the foundation of the new Publishing House and for most of the work on the superstructure. According to the contracts the mechanical department was to have been completed by January 1, 1891, and the

remainder of the building by May 1, 1891. For various reasons, however, the contracts, as to time, have not been complied with. The Board was therefore compelled to rent its present quarters for the year 1891. Arrangements have been made, however, by which a new tenant, acceptable to the landlord, will take the lease the very day the Board is able to vacate.

Pursuant to the authority granted by the General Assembly at its last meeting, the Board issued \$50,000 of mortgage bonds to provide the money with which to pay for the new building. They are all dated October 1, 1890; \$35,000 of them are payable twenty years after date, redeemable at the option of the Board, ten years after date, and are secured by a mortgage on the new building and the sixty-two feet and four inches of ground on which it stands. The remaining \$15,000 of bonds are due five years after date, and are redeemable in like manner three years after date. They are secured by a second mortgage on the house and lot and by a first mortgage on the land in Jackson county, Mo., owned by the Board, and upon the Board's printing-presses. All the bonds bear six per cent interest, payable April 1 and October 1 of each year. The mortgages provide that the new building shall be kept insured for \$50,000; \$35,000 of it for the benefit of the holders of the long bonds and \$15,000 for the benefit of the holders of the short ones. Notwithstanding the stringent monetary situation which has prevailed for the greater part of the past year, the Board has been able to sell at par all these bonds, except \$2,000 of the short ones. These will doubtless be disposed of at the same price very soon.

The building, in its adaptation to the publishing work, its stability, and its style of architecture, satisfies most fully all the expectations of the Board and the Church. Its total cost, in round numbers, will be about \$65,000. About \$33,000 of the cost has already been paid, and the remainder provided for, and it will be promptly paid as the work progresses. The mechanical department will be occupied about May 20. The Board still owns about thirty-seven feet front of the ninety-nine feet of ground purchased for the purposes of the new building. This ground contains a good two-story brick residence of about ten rooms, and can probably be sold now or in the near future for \$10,000, its value being considerably enhanced by the erection of our new building alongside of it. This property is likely to still further enhance in price within the next two or three years. There remains unpaid about \$5,000, and interest for two years, of the price agreed to be paid by the Board for the entire lot. This balance falls due on November 21 next. Arrangements have been made by which \$5,000 can be borrowed and secured by mortgage upon the old house and thirty-seven feet of ground. The house will, in our opinion, rent for enough to pay the interest on the loan, the taxes, and the insurance. To the next meeting of the General Assembly there will be made a full, detailed report of the cost of the new building and payments on the same.

From the figures given above it will be seen that after exhausting the proceeds of the \$50,000 of bonds there will still remain to be paid on the building \$15,000. Arrangements are made to borrow this sum, if necessary, temporarily from the bank. It must, however, be ultimately paid out of the profits of the publishing business. We wish, therefore, here and now to state with emphasis four propositions:

1. The Church, by properly sustaining the Publishing House with its patronage, can within one year enable it to pay off this entire \$15,000 of indebtedness.

2. In furnishing the money to pay this debt the Church is simply providing the means to pay for its own magnificent property.

3. While providing, by its patronage, the money to pay for its own property it will at the same time accomplish the direct object for which the Board of Publication was established, namely, the sale of its books and the circulation of its periodicals.

4. The individuals who buy the books and papers will, while aiding the Church in its work, get value received for their money.

With these facts before the Church, argument and entreaty should be

unnecessary. We simply ask that for one year, at least, your Publishing House shall have the undivided liberal patronage of the Church.

The committee of the General Assembly who located the House at Nashville, Tenn., were assured that the citizens of Nashville would donate \$10,000 with which to purchase a lot on which to erect the new building. This sum has been subscribed and \$6,940.06 has been collected. In addition to this about \$1,700 is virtually collected, as most of it is due from the contractors erecting the building. New subscriptions are being obtained from time to time, and we have no doubt that the entire sum will be paid.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL DEPARTMENT.

Increased orders for our own Sabbath-school literature attest the growth of the correct sentiment: Cumberland Presbyterian Sabbath-school literature is the best literature in the world for Cumberland Presbyterian Sabbath-schools. To enable Dr. De Witt to devote the greater part of his time to his work as General Superintendent of Sunday-schools, Prof. R. V. Foster, D.D., has been engaged as one of the editors of the Sabbath-school literature. By this arrangement the Church not only gains the scholarly and valuable labors of Dr. Foster, but the general Sabbath-school work of the Church is benefited by receiving Dr. De Witt's attention for two thirds of his time instead of one half, as hitherto. In addition to paying half of Dr. De Witt's salary from the Children's Day fund, we have continued the policy of co-operating with State conventions and Synods in the employment of State superintendents or Sabbath-school missionaries, who give all or a portion of their time to the work of advancing the Sabbath-school cause, a part of the salary of these State missionaries being paid out of the Children's Day fund. Increasing demands upon this fund, and multiplied opportunities arising for its use in effectual work for the great cause of Sabbath-school missions in the Church, make it important that contributions to the fund be greatly increased this year. It is to be hoped, therefore that all our Churches will observe Children's Day.

The circulation of the several Sabbath-school periodicals, in round numbers, is as follows: *Bible Study*, 3,600; *Comments*, 35,000; *Rays of Light*, 26,000; *Lesson Leaf*, 23,000; *Gen*, 17,000; *Our Lambs*, 27,000.

BOOKS.

We realize the fact that the Cumberland Presbyterian Church is worthy of a permanent literature, and we are making an earnest effort to comply with the Church's demand for books which deserve to live. Nor will we be content with the success already achieved. Instead, if the patronage of the Church shall be commensurate with our enlarged facilities the next few years will witness an unparalleled growth in the number and value of the books of the Church. It will be unnecessary to add that the cost of production is so great that the Church must be liberal book buyers; otherwise the House must suffer loss. During the past year valuable additions have been made to our denominational books; and it is gratifying to announce that these new books have been widely commended by both the press and the general reader, as characterized by great ability. Three numbers of the series of ten books announced hitherto are in the hands of the printer, namely: "The World and How to Take It," by the late Rev. A. J. Baird, D.D.; "Our Country," by Dr. Strong, and "The Doctrine and Genius of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church," by President A. B. Miller, D.D. These will all be out within the next few weeks. Other books will be issued during the coming year.

THE CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN.

We are gratified to report that the subscription list of the *Cumberland Presbyterian* has grown from eleven thousand to twelve thousand during the past year. A vigorous effort on the part of the paper's friends would certainly result in giving it a circulation of fifteen thousand before the meeting of the next General Assembly. Experience has shown that the

Church increases more rapidly in prosperity, and the general enterprises of the Church are more liberally supported, where the Church paper is read than where it does not go. Pastors are generous in their acknowledgment that the paper among their people is a great aid to them in their work. These, and other considerations, are evidence that the *Cumberland Presbyterian* is a great power in the upbuilding of the Church, and all lovers of the Church should foster and use it.

THE REVIEW.

Encouraging growth is noted in the subscription list of this periodical. Last year it had less than 400 subscribers; the number now exceeds 525. Prof. R. V. Foster, D.D., has been engaged as editor, and here he will have the widest field for the exercise of his talents and culture. The *Review* is much appreciated by its readers, and it has received high commendation from leading periodicals everywhere, hence we may earnestly urge that it is worthy of a wider circulation in the Church. Surely it ought to find its way into the hands and libraries of many more readers.

JOB WORK.

Greatly increased facilities encourage us to expect that the amount of job and book work done by the House during the coming year will be far larger than ever before. This has become a very considerable source of revenue, and the local and general popularity of the House in this regard is rapidly growing.

FINANCES.

The gain this year is \$13,795.29. Deducting donations, the increase from the business alone is \$8,756.61. Deducting for wear and tear \$1,894.97, being ten per cent of last year's valuations of machinery, type, etc., leaves the actual net profit from the year's business \$6,861.71. This percentage formerly was perhaps a reasonable one, but owing to the large increase, during the past two years, in presses, folders, stitchers, cutters, and other durable machinery, and the relatively small increase in type and other perishable property, the allowance is perhaps an unduly large one. The gain, inclusive of donations, and after deducting wear and tear, is \$11,900.32. This disposition of the receipts of the year's business is indicated in the following statement:

IV.—MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

To the General Assembly of May, 1891 :

As your servants for the relief of your disabled ministers, and the widows and orphans of deceased ministers, we submit for your consideration our Tenth Annual Report.

As is the custom, we submit the applications on which we have granted aid, and ask your earnest and faithful consideration of the condition of those who call for aid. Indeed, we *urge* you to examine them.

THE PAST YEAR.

like the preceding ones, has been fruitful and has rejoiced our hearts, both because the Church has responded to our appeals in behalf of our applicants, thus giving aid to those who are needing it, and because of the confidence manifested by the Church in this cause, making it a little more prosperous for the year past, and in establishing it, as we believe, on a firmer basis than ever for doing good in the years to come; for we have broadened into a new and larger field in view of the acquisition of the

THORNTON HOME

through the liberality of a generous-hearted, consecrated Christian woman, Mrs. E. Thornton, of Petersburg, Indiana.

THE YEAR'S WORK,

as far as it meets our desires is concerned, is quite unsatisfactory, for there are many necessities we have been unable to furnish from lack of funds.

When you get into the secrets of eighty-seven homes where there is suffering and want, and in some instances dire distress, the heart must be stone if there is not a longing to render aid. The heart of the world beats in sympathy for suffering man, and prompts men who care little for God and religion to supply at least some means of comfort. And what should be said of the Church of God, whose object for existence is to relieve the suffering of mankind, if she should fail to comfort and cheer those of her own household.

Hence, from this aspect of the matter we are not satisfied. But when we look at the times, the number who have contributed, and the good we have been enabled to do, we are satisfied with the small increase over last year in amount and in the number of contributors.

All the Presbyteries in the Church, except a new one (East Louisiana), have reported something for this work. About 1,450 congregations are on our list as contributing this year, a gain of 150 over last year, but by actual count there are 435 Churches of those contributing last year that have not been heard from this year. The amount in actual money as increase over last year is very small, only about \$144.38. The number of beneficiaries has been increased by seven.

THE FIRST DECADE

of your Board's existence is now closing. The work in these years has been pleasant and helpful to the Board.

As those in whose hands these sacred funds are intrusted, God has enabled us, through the generous Church of which we are members, to relieve

much anxiety and actual need in these years. If there had been nothing more done than what has been accomplished this year a good work might be claimed for this cause.

The dying hours of a saintly man in Texas were gladdened, who, in the strength of his middle years, was a bulwark for Christ.

Another young man, in Illinois, failing in the midst of his usefulness, and having a large family to support, was assisted until he could recover to go on with his work.

In Mississippi a faithful worker was overtaken by an accident which disabled him. Through the Presbyterian committee immediate aid was rendered to tide him over until he could resume his charge.

One, a widow, whose husband was once the peer of any man in the Church for learning and ability as a preacher, whose home was left desolate and unprovided for, has been helped in her struggle for an honest livelihood. Several in their dying hours were cheered with the thought, "My Church has not forsaken me in my age and disability." These are but a few of the incidents in the work. They could be multiplied by a score or more even in this year, not to mention all those aided during the ten years past. We submit a comparative statement covering the ten years' work:

THORNTON HOME DEPARTMENT.

Through the columns of the *Cumberland Presbyterian*, *St. Louis Observer*, *Our Church Helper*, and the city papers of Evansville, and perhaps by general report, you have seen and heard of the splendid gift by Mrs. E. Thornton, of Petersburg, Ind., to the Board of Ministerial Relief, to be held as a Home for disabled ministers, missionaries, and the widows and orphans of deceased ministers.

The Home consists of ten acres of ground near the city of Evansville, Ind., on which there stands a commodious and beautiful three-story frame house—plenty large for immediate purposes—comfortably and neatly furnished throughout, ready for occupants. One has only to see it to be proud of it and delighted. It is the earnest desire of the Board that the General Assembly, in a body, visit the Home and spend at least a part of a day in viewing it, for to see is to be convinced more thoroughly than if we should tell you about it ten years.

The property was bought in July, 1890, for the sum of six thousand and five hundred dollars, and the Board of Ministerial Relief, in behalf of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, assumed control.

On November 27, 1890, this Home was formally opened for the purpose for which it was established, when the deed and the keys were given to the President, Dr. W. G. Ralston, by Hon. J. E. Williamson, for Mrs. Thornton, in a very excellent address. The services were appropriate and enjoyable.

On the day of the dedication the Home stood furnished from cellar to garret with an outlay of about \$200 to the Board. Every one was pleased with its neatness and comfort, and congratulated the committee who had it in charge on their success.

Mr. W. W. Hendrix, Jr., of Bowling Green, Ky., did the generous thing in making an offer of certain profits to be realized from the sale of trees and flowers, besides making a donation to the Home of a choice lot.

CONTROL OF THE HOME.

A committee, appointed by the Board, has charge of the Home, of course, subject to the will of the Board. They have employed, as matron of the Home, Mrs. J. B. Madden, formerly of Gibson City, Ill., the widow of one of our ministers. She, with her two children and a little grandchild, reside at the Home. Mrs. Madden is an intelligent and a thoroughly Christian woman, who makes it pleasant for all who enter there.

WHO ARE THERE.

With the holidays came Rev. A. H. Berry and wife, of Wichita Presbytery, to make their home there. Up to this date there are no other occupants, but there is room at present for about ten more.

RULES FOR ADMISSION AND GOVERNMENT.

- 1. The person applying must be a beneficiary of the Board, duly recommended by some Presbytery, or committee of a Presbytery, who will promise to be subject to the regulations of the Home.
- 2. The person applying must not be helpless, nor possessed of a disagreeable malady, as it is not deemed wise to try to run a hospital. Should any one become helpless after going to the Home, he will be cared for in every way that is possible to the conveniences of the Home.
- 3. The Board reserves the right to remove any person whose conduct or condition may be disagreeable to a majority of the occupants of the Home.
- 4. Applications for a place in the Home shall be made directly to the Board of Ministerial Relief.

We agree, that, after this person becomes an occupant of the Home, should the management find that we have been mistaken in the disposition and condition of the person applying, and the Board should deem it wise to remove this applicant from the Home, to conform to the wishes of the Board and take back to our midst the person herein named.

GENERAL STATEMENTS.

The purpose for which this Corporation is formed is to receive, hold, convey, and disburse such real and personal property as may be given by will or otherwise to it, or acquired by it in any legitimate way, for the relief and support of disabled ministers and missionaries, and of the needy widows and orphans of deceased ministers and missionaries, or of such other persons as may be dependent upon said ministers and missionaries.

Appropriations from the funds of the Corporation shall be made alone,

first, to such ministers as are members in good standing of some Presbytery of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, they having fully consecrated themselves, since entering said ministry, to the active duties thereof in said Church, and who are not able to support themselves by any suitable vocation of life, and to such missionaries as have been appointed to work in Home or Foreign fields by the recognized authorities of said Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and who have faithfully discharged the duties assigned them during the time of their appointment, and who are not able to support themselves by any suitable vocation in life; and, second, that so far as may be consistent with the wants of disabled ministers and missionaries, the Board may also furnish aid to the widows and orphans of ministers and missionaries aforesaid, and to such other person or persons as may be, or may have been, dependent upon said ministers and missionaries.

RULES FOR DISBURSING FUNDS.

1. All appropriations for ministers must be made on the recommendation of the Presbytery to which the applicant belongs, or of a standing committee of that Presbytery. Appropriations for the widows and orphans of deceased ministers must be made on the recommendation of the Presbytery to which said minister belonged at the time of his death or of a standing committee of that Presbytery. Appropriations for missionaries who are not ministers, or for those who are, or have been, dependent upon such missionaries, shall be made on the recommendation of the Board by which such missionaries were, or may be, employed.

2. Appropriations are made for one year or less, except when otherwise ordered; and if aid is continued, the recommendations must be renewed from year to year.

V.—EDUCATION.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

It is with gratitude to God for blessings manifold, and thanks to friends for their assistance by word and deed, that the Board of Education presents to the General Assembly its Tenth Annual Report. The work of the Board is growing, and its influence for good is being felt in all parts of the Church.

The imperative demand for the existence of this Board is seen, and is being recognized by the Church at large. It has shown its right to exist by its beneficent works. Since its organization this Board has assisted nearly 250 young men, in their preparation for the gospel ministry; and many of these are among the most active pastors and workers in the whole Church. If any one will take the pains and time to examine the roll of the beneficiaries of this Board in the past, and take their present standing as young men in the Church, we venture the assertion that the most skeptical will be convinced of the necessity for this Board and of the fruitfulness of its labors. The Board is already beginning to feel that it can say of its young men as Cornelia the mother of the Gracchi, said of her sons, "These are my jewels."

The Church, during the past year, has shown her growing interest in this work by her increased offerings to its support. We now make an exhibit of 725 Churches, representing 106 Presbyteries, a gain of 299 Churches and 20 Presbyteries over last year. We have also received contributions from 66 individuals, 14 Sunday-schools, two mission bands, one aid society, and two presbyterial societies, and our cash receipts are nearly twice as large as last year.

But while we gratefully record the fact that there has been an advance in every way, upon the work of any previous year in the Board's history, we are pained by the reflection that only 725 out of 2,776 congregations in the denomination, have followed your directions by sending contributions to the Board. Nor have the contributions from congregations been as large as we had hoped for. We often ask ourselves the question, is it possible that the pastors and elders of these Churches have let their people know how pressing is the need for ministers throughout our denomination, and how real is the necessity for helping to educate a large number of our candidates. The demand for well equipped young men is greater than ever before. If we are to do our full share in evangelizing the world, it becomes our ministers and Churches to put forth far greater efforts to enlist young men for the ministry. And in view of this fact we earnestly hope that you will speak in such tones on this subject as will arouse the Churches to a just consideration of our actual condition, and that you will also set apart a day for prayer that more laborers may enter into the waiting harvest. And we look to you to urge upon the Churches and the ministry the importance of furnishing the means to aid these young men.

STUDENTS AIDED.

The increased contributions the past year have enabled the Board to do more for the young men than heretofore. We have assisted, since our last report, 101 young men who have been in attendance at our schools, as follows:

STUDENTS IN SCHOOL.

We have made careful inquiry to ascertain how many of our candidates and licentiates are in school. We have been in correspondence with the presidents of the various schools of the Church and with the young men themselves, and from the best information we can gather we conclude that 250 of our young men are now in school, and many of these are ordained ministers. We had letters from over two hundred candidates not in school, and they assigned as the reason for this that they are without means.

PRESBYTERIAL RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Board assists no one unless recommended by his Presbytery, either directly or through the Presbytery's Committee on Education. In view of the fact that the demands upon the Board are great, and the means very limited, we think Presbyteries should exercise due care in the selection of candidates whom they recommend, and that those who give promise of largest usefulness should be preferred.

STUDENTS IN OTHER SCHOOLS.

During the past year several applications for aid have been received from young men who were in other schools than those of our own Church, and among them were two attending other Theological Seminaries. As your Board has no instruction from you on this subject, we assisted those in other literary schools than our own, when they were properly recommended, but we did not assist the two young men in the Seminaries. We now ask your instruction for the future.

REPORTED DONATIONS.

Notwithstanding your instructions heretofore to the contrary, we have been requested by Presbyteries, Churches, and individuals, to give credit for donations not sent through this Board. This we have not done. To do so would be to destroy the well-established policy of all the Boards of the Church. It is a rule of this Board that donors may, if they choose, name the person who shall receive their gifts. During the year just past the sum of \$1,680.14 has been thus received and distributed.

ENDOWMENT OF THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

We have audited the accounts of Rev. J. S. Grider, D.D., your endowment agent for the Theological Seminary, for the year ending April 30, 1891, and we find that contributions have been made to this work, as shown by his books, as follows:

At the close of the last fiscal year we find that there was due the agent, on account of salary and traveling expenses, \$648.50, which has since been paid, except \$129.70, now due him.

We find further that the traveling and other necessary expenses for the year just closed, amount to \$188.40, which, added to the salary, aggregates \$1,688.40, for the year's work, all of which has been paid. This statement does not include proceeds of notes formerly taken by Dr. Grider, as agent, a goodly number of which, your committee is informed, have been paid to the Treasurer of Cumberland University.

PRESBYTERIAL COMMITTEES.

We ask you to repeat your former directions, that in every Presbytery there shall be a permanent Committee on Education, whose duty it shall be to look after the educational interests in said Presbytery, the Chairman of said Committee to be the Correspondent of this Board in said Presbytery. Some of these committees have done noble work during the past year.

CHANGE IN BOARD.

During the past year Robert L. Morris, Esq., who for several years has been a member of this Board, and who for two years served faithfully and efficiently as its Secretary has, for good reasons, resigned his membership on the Board. We have elected Prof. A. M. Burney, of Gallatin, Tenn., to fill the vacancy, subject to your approval.

SECRETARY AND TREASURER.

It is only within the last year that any officer of the Board has received a salary. At the last meeting of your body you ratified the action which had been previously taken by the Board, in combining the offices of Secretary and Treasurer, and in electing to said office the Rev. J. R. Henry, at a salary of \$400 per annum. At that time Bro. Henry was pastor of a church, and by agreement was to give only a part of his time to the work of the Board.

During the past twelve months the correspondence of the Board has been constantly growing heavier, and so much time is required to properly discharge the duties of the Secretary and Treasurer, and to develop the work of the Board, that it became evident that the whole time of a competent man should be devoted to the interests of the Board. After a full discussion of the matter, at a meeting of the Board, when all the members were present, it was unanimously determined that a Secretary and Treasurer should be employed for all his time, and as Bro. Henry had served so efficiently in that capacity, giving entire satisfaction, he was elected to the office, at a salary of \$1,000 per annum, his necessary traveling expenses to be paid by the Board. Bro. Henry accepted the office, resigned his pastorate, and entered upon his duties April 1, 1891. We ask your approval and ratification of this action of the Board.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, sitting at Owensboro, Kentucky:

The following is submitted to your reverend body as the Annual Report of the Trustees of Cumberland University:

The College year, nearing its close, has been one of earnest work in all the departments of the school. The catalogue will show a slight decrease in the number of students in attendance.

The whole number of candidates for the ministry, attending one or another of the departments, is seventy-five (75.) Of this number thirty-six (36) are exclusively Theological Students; the others, excepting one who is a law student, are members of the four College classes, and of the preparatory school.

The aggregate amount of endowment for the Theological department is at the date of this report \$65,771.55, as follows:

This is an increase for the year of four thousand seven hundred and seventy-one and 55-100 dollars above the amount shown in last report.

It must be noted that \$10,000 of the fund is controlled by the General Assembly through the Trustees of the Church. It will also be seen that another \$10,000 is represented by notes only, that have been procured by your agent, Bro. Grider. The Trustees do not usually in estimating endowment include notes of donors; they are ordinarily quite an unknown quantity, and are calculated to mislead. But Bro. Grider has been remarkably successful in obtaining notes of parties who pay, and because of this the notes now on hand are included in the above statement. The interest upon this sum substantially pays the salaries of three professors, at \$1,200 each. The fourth professor, Dr. C. H. Bell, delivers a course of lectures during the winter of each college year, covering a period of eight or ten weeks, for which he does not receive any thing.

The Trustees again earnestly press upon your attention the importance of the full endowment, not only of the Theological School, but of the University, every department of which lends its aid in the education of the rising ministry of the Church.

For other information concerning this question, your reverend body is referred to the report of Bro. Grider, agent, made by him to you directly or through your Committee on Education.

The new building, on the grounds of Divinity Hall, which was in process of erection at the date of the last report from these Trustees, has since been completed, and fully paid for. It is highly ornamental and useful. It will accommodate twenty-four persons, and has furnished homes for that many young men during the current year.

The Board of Trustees, and the Faculty of the University, are the same as at the date of last report, no changes having occurred.

PRESBYTERIAL ALLIANCE.

To the General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church:

DEAR BRETHREN:—The Western Section of the Executive Commission of the Alliance of the Reformed Churches holding the Presbyterian system, takes great pleasure in informing your venerable body that during the year ending April 30, 1891, the work intrusted to its care by the Council of the Alliance has been carried forward with diligence and success.

Your attention is respectfully drawn, this year as last, to the fact that the sum of \$2,500 per annum is the quota of the Churches on the American continent toward the expenses of the maintenance of the Alliance. Upon this basis your proportion of the expense fund for the year ending April 30, 1892, is \$495. You are requested to make some arrangement for the payment of this apportionment.

Last year the fact was communicated to your venerable body that the Fifth General Council of the Alliance would meet in 1892, in the city of Toronto, Canada.

The General Council of 1888 accepted from the Presbyterian Church in Canada an invitation to hold the Fifth General Council, in 1892, in the city of Toronto, Canada. Preparations for this meeting are now being made, and it is requested that your Church make due arrangements for representation at the Toronto Council. The basis of representation in the Council is as follows: "For each hundred congregations or less, two delegates, up to one thousand congregations; above one thousand congregations, one delegate for each additional one hundred, up to two thousand congregations; above two thousand congregations, one delegate for each additional two hundred and fifty congregations." It is hoped that the delegates to this Council will be appointed at your sessions during this calendar year.

EXPLANATORY NOTE.

The following Statistical Tables are not as full as they should be, nor are they, as a whole, entirely accurate. The columns which show the contributions made to the several Boards of the Church can be implicitly relied upon, for the figures in said columns were obtained from the reports of these Boards to the General Assembly. In almost every case the footings in those columns were found to be correct. In a few of them, however, there were slight inaccuracies in the additions; but the errors were too insignificant to justify any alterations in the figures.

The greatest defect in these Tables is seen in the column marked "Total Membership." In quite a number of the Reports of Stated Clerks of Presbyteries the membership is considerably diminished; and this decrease, too, is reported in despite of the fact that the column marked "Additions for the Year" shows a very large increase! The reason assigned by Stated Clerks for this inconsistency is that Clerks of Church Sessions will not report "all on Church roll"—will simply give the number of *efficient* members, because they are unwilling to have their congregations "taxed" in proportion to the entire membership. But while this is the case, and while the "total membership" column will make an exhibit of members below what they really should be, yet it is a fact that the denomination, not only in membership, but in all the essential elements of prosperity, is moving grandly forward—has just closed the most successful year in its whole past history.

These Statistical Tables not only give an insight into the doings of each congregation, but they likewise afford a true index in regard to the efficiency of Stated Clerks and of Clerks of Church Sessions. Presbyteries, by examining the same, can form quite an accurate idea as to the fidelity of these officials. If the work is not satisfactory, the remedy is in their own hands. (See Minutes of 1889, page 52.)

The number of congregations will be apparently increased, but this arises from the fact that, in some cases, our Boards give credit to the names of the *post-offices* at which the letters containing remittances were mailed instead of to the *congregations* which contributed the funds. As will be seen, the congregations given by Stated Clerks of Presbyteries are numbered, and the places not thus given have no figures before them. This plan was adopted for two reasons: first, Stated Clerks are presumed to know the congregations in their respective bounds; second, if this had not been done, the whole plan devised for ascertaining the Superintendents of Sunday-schools for specific Churches would have been thwarted. As it is, the name of the Superintendent of the Sunday-school of any particular congregation is known by the *number* which stands before that name—his number and that of the congregation in which he is Superintendent being the same.

The column, "Total Amount Contributed," no doubt contains a number of errors, owing to the fact that Stated Clerks of Presbyteries failed, in many cases, to use the decimal point dividing dollars and cents, when no doubt it should have been used.

In a number of instances Stated Clerks of Presbyteries did not "estimate" for congregations not reporting, but in such cases they authorized the *sum totals* that are seen in the statistical columns relative to Church membership.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The reports from Stated Clerks of Presbyteries show that 142 ministers bore letters of dismissal and recommendation at the time said reports were forwarded. Only a small number of these had had time to join other Presbyteries when the reports were made out. Still, only one half of the number has been added to the list of ordained ministers. Several were stricken from the roll who did not bear letters of dismissal. This was caused, no doubt, from inaccuracies of Stated Clerks of Presbyteries. There are, it is confidently believed, at least 1700 ordained ministers. During the year 17,094 were added to the membership, yet the total number of communicants is only 2256 more than last year. This matter, however, is fully explained on page 162. On pages 292 and 298 a General Summary of Statistics will be found. Some of these items may differ very slightly from those in the tabulated statistics of Presbyteries beginning on page 164 and ending on page 273. These slight changes, however, were authorized by Stated Clerks of Presbyteries. The columns containing the contributions made to our various Church Boards are believed to be accurate, for they were obtained from the reports of the Boards, and great care was taken to have them correct.

On this page, by order of the General Assembly, the statistics of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored, will be found. This organization is separate and distinct from the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, hence its statistics have never been made a part of said Church. If the Cumberland Presbyterian Church were to add these statistics, as some other Presbyterian Churches do, the total membership would be fully 180,000—a Presbyterian membership second only to that of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America (the Presbyterian Church, North), and second in the great family of Presbyterian Churches throughout the world. Its ministry, too (ordained preachers, licentiates, and candidates), would occupy the same position in respect to numbers. Indeed, such is the case anyway in regard to this last item, without the additions.

As will be seen, all the Boards of the Church are doing excellent work, and never before was the outlook more encouraging. In brief, the entire denomination, year by year, is becoming more coherent, aggressive, and efficient.

Statistics of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored.

The General Assembly of 1886 directed the Stated Clerk to embody in the Minutes the statistics, in brief, of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Colored. From the most reliable information at hand the following, it is believed, is a close approximation: Ordained ministers, 200; licentiates, 175; candidates, 190; Presbyteries, 22; Synods, 5; General Assembly, 1; and communicants, 15,000.

REMARKS.—While it is true that these reports are not full, it is proper to remind the Church that this table of statistics must be compared only with that made by the undersigned last year. Comparison will show a very marked increase in the totals given, and the number of Presbyteries represented in our present table is much better than that of 1890. There is manifest growth of a true denominational spirit among our people in the matter of organizing and maintaining Cumberland Presbyterian Sunday-schools. This is going forward without our Church losing its historic fraternal relations with all evangelical bodies. The same brotherhood is held, and yet the greater vigor is given to the forces of the denomination. The Sunday-school life of the Church is rising and it will rise as our people are more thoroughly unified in spirit and in method of work. I earnestly appeal to all the Presbyterial Sunday-school Secretaries for faithful work during the coming year, and, back of them, to the Presbyteries for strong support in their own territories.

THE STANDING RULE OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

- Resolved*, That the following shall be a Standing Rule of the General Assembly:
1. The reports of the several Church Boards shall be presented as follows: Friday, 10 A.M., Education; Friday, 3 P.M., Missions; Saturday, 10 A.M., Ministerial Relief; Saturday, 3 P.M., Publication. The several Boards of the Church shall be limited to two hours each in which to present their respective reports and address the General Assembly thereon; after which the reports may be discussed by members of the General Assembly, speakers being limited to five minutes each. Following such addresses, members of the General Assembly may present in writing propositions or resolutions on the subject, supporting the same in ten-minute speeches. Said propositions or resolutions shall be referred to the appropriate committee, without vote, unless a vote shall be specially demanded upon a given proposition.
 2. The Committees to whom the Reports of the Boards are referred shall report as follows: Monday, 3 P.M., Missions; Tuesday, 10 A.M., Ministerial Relief; Tuesday, 3 P.M., Publication; Wednesday, 10 A.M., Education. The discussion of any of these reports may be continued and made the special order for an evening session if necessary. But Monday night is to be devoted to the interests of Sunday-schools.
 3. Early on the second day of each session the Stated Clerk shall have printed, for the convenience of the members of the General Assembly, this Standing Rule, together with the Roll of Members, and the committees appointed by the Moderator, also a memorandum of unfinished business, if any, from the preceding General Assembly.

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INSTRUCTIONS TO STATED CLERKS.

- (1) Do not write a line until you have all your matter prepared.
- (2) Write with pen and ink, and write plainly. Do not use *pale* ink.
- (3) Arrange names of Ministers, Licentiates, and Candidates *alphabetically*. Do not forget this.
- (4) When you get to the "Statistical and Financial" page or pages, do not fail to arrange names of *Congregations* alphabetically. THIS MUST BE DONE.
- (5) Do not undertake to fill the columns set apart for the several Boards of the Church. Leave those *blank* in your report, for they will have to be filled out from data furnished by the Boards themselves. The Stated Clerk of the General Assembly will look after those columns.
- (6) Insert dollars and cents in column "*Children's Day Collections*" and in column "*Dues to Presbytery.*" Do not put *cents* in any other column.
- (7) Add the figures in all the columns on "*Statistical and Financial*" page or pages (except column 5) and *verify* the same. This *must* be done by you, or you *must* get a competent accountant to do it. All the Presbyterian bodies in the land require this of Stated Clerks of Presbyteries. Do not send your report until this has been done.
- (8) In the column "*Total Contributions,*" put figures in *pencil* marks, for the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly will have to add to them the contributions from the several Boards. By putting that column in *pencil* marks the figures can be erased. Please do not overlook this request.
- (9) Send list of Commissioners as soon as they are elected, and send it in a small envelope *not* in the large one which you will find inclosed, for it is for you to use in sending your report.
- (10) Send Contingent Tax as soon as you collect it. Let it reach me before May 1, or your Presbytery will be reported delinquent. The "tax" is \$2.00 on each *ordained* minister. (See Minutes, 1890, page 36.)
- (11) If a Church is without a preacher, write the letter V after the name of the congregation, and if it has done nothing, let its name stand opposite *blank* columns. But by all means report name and address of Clerk of Session, *number of members*, and all else you may know.
- (12) Persist in your efforts until you get a report from each congregation. If necessary you can withhold your report until May 10. But if you can get it ready earlier, do not fail to send it as soon as it is completed.
- (13) You will see that by this new method of obtaining statistics, ordered by the General Assembly, *your* labors are greatly increased, and those of the Stated Clerk of that body are increased more than a hundred-fold. You will also see that unless your Presbytery is reported it will appear in the Minutes simply as a *blank*. There is no help for such an exhibit, according to the "new form."
- (14) Finally. Your heaviest labor will be the *first* year, for when you once get the names of your *congregations* alphabetically arranged and those of your *Sunday-school Superintendents* arranged as required on the last page of Presbyterian blanks, you can get the same the *next* year, with a few alterations, from the Minutes of the General Assembly.
