EVERGREEN CHURCH, CONECUR Co., September 23, 1876.

The Bethlehem Baptist Association met pursuant to adjournment with the Evergreen Baptist Church.

Received brother C. H. Skelton, the agent of the "Ala-

bama Baptist," and invited him to a seat with us.

The Committee on Preaching made their report as follows: To-night, preaching by Elder A. T. Sims; on Sabbath at half-past 9 o'clock, Elder T. M. Bailey will address the Sabbath School; and at 11 o'clock preaching in the Union Church by Elder B. H. Crumpton, and at the same hour preaching in the Academy by Elder John Wilmer, and at the same hour, Elder J. M. Fortune preached to the colored people, and at 2 o'clock in the Union Church preaching by Elder W. G. Curry, and to-night preaching by Elder B. F. Riley.

On motion of Bro. E. P. Lovless, a committee was raised

to report on Education at this session of the Association.

On motion of Elder J. L. Bell, a committee was raised to report on Foreign Missions at this session of the Association. The Moderator announced the appointment of standing

committees as follows:

Brother Y. M. Rabb, chairman of the committee appointed at the last session of this body to revise the Constitution, Rules of Order, and Order of Business, made his report; and on motion, the further consideration thereof was post-poned until Monday morning 10 o'clock, and made the special order for that hour.

On motion, the Association adjourned to half-past 8 o'clock Monday morning. Prayer by Elder John Wilmer.

On Sabbath the ministers preached in the order of their appointment to large and attentive audiences; and after the morning services, a collection was taken up for Associational purposes.

Monday Morning, Sept. 25, 1876.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Elder J. M. Fortune.

On motion of Bro. J. W. Locke, that the delegates not answering to their names be noted as absentees.

Bro. J. W. Locke, Chairman Committee on Correspondence,

made his report; which, on motion, was received, amended

and adopted. (See appendix A.)

Elder L. W. Duke, Chairman Committee on Sabbath Schools, made his report; and during the pendency of the report, the hour set by previous order having arrived, on motion, the regular order of business was suspended to further consider the Sabbath School report, and after considerable discussion the report was amended and adopted. (See appendix B.)

The hour set by previous order having arrived to consider the report on the revision of the Constitution, after consider-

able discussion the report was laid on the table.

Bro. J. B. Colley, Chairman of the Committee on Domestic Missions, made his report; which, on motion, was amended and adopted. (See appendix C.)

Elder A. Jay, Chairman of the Committee on Periodicals and Publications, made his report; which, on motion, was

received, amended and adopted. (See appendix D.)

Elder J. E. Bell, Chairman of the Committee on State of Religion, made his report; which was received and adopted. (See appendix E.)

The Association adjourned to 2 o'clock P. M. The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

Elder J. E. Bell, Chairman Committee on Foreign Missions, made his report; and on motion was adopted. (See appendix F.)

Elder I. Spence, Chairman of the Committee on Queries and Requests, made his report; which, on motion, was re-

ceived and adopted. (See appendix G.)

Bro. E. P. Lovless, Chairman of Committee on Education, made his report, which was received and adopted. (See appendix H.)

On motion of Elder J. E. Bell, that an opportunity be given to raise funds and pledges to educate Elder J. M. Fortune,

received money and pledges amounting to \$----.

Bro. Y. M. Rabb, Chairman of the Committee on Temperance, made his report. Elder A. Jay offered an amendment; and after some discussion the amendment and report were laid on the table.

On motion of Bro. R. A. Lambert that a committee be appointed to select ministers to preach the annual and missionary sermons at the next session of the Association, committee appointed to-wit: R. A. Lambert, F. M. Walker, Y. M. Rabb, A. J. Robinson.

On motion, that the money on hand, and pledges for the State Board as early as collected, be paid over to the Treasurer of the Association, and by him to be forwarded to the

Treasurer of the State Board.

The Committee on Finance made their report; which, on

motion, was received and adopted. (See appendix I.)

On motion of Bro. Y. M. Rabb, that the endowment fund sent up to the Association be turned over to the agent of the Association.

On motion of Bro. Y. M. Rabb, that an advertisement of the "Alabama Baptist" may be put on the minute or back of the same.

Bro. R. A. Lambert, chairman of the committee to select ministers to preach the annual and missionary sermons at the next session of the Association, reported as follows: Elder J. E. Bell to preach the annual sermon, and Elder L. W. Duke to preach a sermon on missions.

Elder J. E. Bell offered the following:

Resolved, That we learn with pleasure that Bro. W. S. Brown is traveling and exhibiting scenes as entertainments, for the benefit of the First Baptist Church in Pensacola.

Bro. Y. M. Rabb moved to take from the table "The report the revision of the Constitution." The motion was tabled.

Elder A. Jay moved to take from the table "The report on Temperance;" and the motion was laid on the table.

Elder A. Jay offered the following resolution, which was

adopted, to-wit:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Association that true, vital Christianity is the only sure correction of this great evil of intemperance, and recommend that the churches cultivate more the spirit of Christ by enforcing his principles that this great sin may not be found within the pale of the Church.

Resolved, That the item, "Standing Committee on Temperance," be

dropped from the order of business.

Elder A. Jay moved to re-consider the vote, tabling the report of the revision of the Constitution, and to take the same from the table was carried, and on motion the report was re-committed back to the committee to report at the next session of the Association with three additional members added to the committee, to-wit: Elder A. Jay, T. S. Wiggins, F. M. Walker.

Bro. R. A. Lambert offered the following resolution,

to-wit:

Resolved, That the Association tender to the citizens of Evergreen and vicinity its sincere thanks for their kindness, and the hospitable manner in which they have entertained the delegates and visitors to this body; and we leave for our homes deeply impressed with the kindest regards, not only for the members of the church, but for all those who have shown such an interest for our comfort and enjoyment.

On motion, the Association, after a harmonious session, adjourned to meet with the Monroeville Baptist Church, Monroe County, Alabama, on Saturday before the fourth Sabbath in September, 1877.

Resolved, that it is the desire of this Association that the work of the State Mission Board shall go on increasing, and the churches be called upon to make pledges for its support.
