CONSTITUTION

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah

Baptist Associatian.

Art. 2—The object of this Association shall be (a) To advance the cause of Christ among men; (b)—To advocate peace and unity among the churches; (c)—To encourage Home and Foreign Mission. (d)—To promote Ministerial Education;

(e)—To aid in maintaining Rich Square Institute.

Art. 3—This Association shall be composed of ministers from the churches connected with it. Each church shall have a right to send two delegates who must be in good standing and fellowship in the churches which they represent. All ordained ministers doing pastoral work in the bounds of this Association shall be considered as members.

Art. 4—The delegates from each church shall present a letter stating the condition of the church and amount of money sent for each special object, certifying the election and na-

ming the delegate.

- Art. 5—Officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Recording and Corresponding Secretaries, Treasurer and Historian, all of whom shal be at each annual meeting, and shall hold their offices a term of one year from date of election or until their successors are elected or installed.
- Art. 6—Duties of Officers—The Moderator shall preside during the deliberations of the Association; shall preserve order vote in case of a tie; decide questions of order; sign all orders for disbursements of money, and perform all duties of the upon such office.
- Art. 7—The Vice-Moderator shall assume all duties of the Moderator in his absence.
- Art. 8—The Recording Secretary shall record all proceedings of each session; sign all orders legally drawn on the Treasurer; compile the minutes for publication and distribute the same when printed among the churches. Moreover, he shal keep a true account of all money deposited into and paid out of the treasury.
- Art. 9.—The Corresponding Secretary shall keep correspondence with other Associations, religious societies and persons

ordained ministers and render a written report at each annual odained ministers and render a written report to each annual meeting.

- Art. 10—The Treasurer shall receive and hold all funds coming into this Association and disburse the same upon presentation of orders signed by the Moderator and Secretary of this body. He shall report annually to the Association the condition of the treasury and shall be held responsible for all money placed in his hands.
- Art. 11—Any Missionary Baptist Church may become a member of this Association by presenting a petition at any annual meeting through delegates and if admitted shall pay an initiation fee of \$5.00; when so received the Moderator shall extend the right hand of fellowship to the delegates. The Association will not maintain fellowship with any church that fails to adhere to gospel principle.
- Art. 12—There shall be an Executive Board of seven whose duty it shall be to supervise the work of the Association between meetings and to distribute the surplus funds for the promotion of the objects of this Association.
- Art. 13—This Association shall hold its sessions annually at such times and place as it may deem expedient, and may invite visiting brethren to seats and grant them all the privileges of attending legal matters except voting.
- Art. 14—Each applicant before being ordained to the gospel ministry shall furnish a letter of recommendation from his church testifying to his moral standing and fitness—for the ministry and shall pass a tho ough examination before a committee appointed by the Association at its annual session—on the following branches of study: Spelling, Arithmetic, Reading, writing, geography, grammar, the life of Christ and the Apostles, church history, church government and biblical interpretations. A failure to average 80 per cent will forbid ordination.
- Art. 15—This constitution may be amended at any annual session by a two-thirds vote of all the members present.

RULES OF ORDER

Section 1—This body shall convene annually at the time of appointment.

- Sec. 2—During each annual session it shall meet and adjourn from day to day at the hour fixed by the body.
- Sec. 3—All meetings of this body shall be opened and closed by religious exercises.
- Sec. 4—A majority of the members present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- Sec. 5—No member shall absent himself temporarily without leave of the Moderator orinally without leave of the body.



PROCEEDINGS

Garysburg, N. C., October 2nd, 1922

The Beulah Baptist Association convened in its Nineteenth Annual session with Chapel Grove Baptist Church on Tuesday after the frst Sunday in October, 1922. The Moderator called the house to order at 9:30 A. M. Devotional Exercises were conducted by Revs. Moses Johnson and K. E. Grant. Rev. Grant lined hymn No. 369; Rev. Johnson read the 8th chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans. Rev. Thomas Sykes offered prayer. After a few minutes of praise service, the Moderator announced that the first session of the Association would be the meeting of the Executive Board.

Rev. James S. Sills, the pastor extended a very cordial welcome to the Association. He was responded to by Rev. J. A. Nemo. The pastor and deacon board were appointed Committee on Arrangement. Revs. H. Y. Cheek, C. T. Everett and Hous-

ton were introduced to the Association.

The Committee on Arrangements reported as follows:—— Meet at 8:30 A. M.; adjourn at 12:30 P. M.; reassemble at

2:30 P.M.; adjourn at pleasure.

The question of ordination of Rev. Thomas Sykes was discussed. The Association regarded the ordination irregular and his pastor, Rev. Moses Johnson acknowledged his error and asked forgiveness, which was granted. Amount collected was \$6.69.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotions conducted by Revs. Luke Jacob and T. O. Bryant Rev. Jacob lined hymn 962; Rev. Bryant read the 4th chapter of Phil. Prayer was offered by Rev. Jacob. The minutes of the forenoon session were read and approved. Rev. A. J. Parker came before the council for ordination; failing to pass a creditable examination, was recommended to further study.

A collection of \$3.55 was taken.

TUESDAY NIGHT SESSION

Devotions conducted by Revs. J. A. Nemo and C. T. Everett. Rev. Nemo announced hymn 11, which was led by the choir. Rev. Everett read the 32d division of Psalms. The Moderator presented Rev. H. Y. Cheek, pastor First Baptist Church, of Severn, to preach. Rev. Cheek selected for his text the 28th chapter of Genesis and the 12th verse. "And he dreamed and behold a ladder set upon the earth and the top of it reached to heaven." Rev. Cheek discussed the characteristics of the life of Jacob. The theme was logically and eloquently delivered.

After a short praise service, a collection of \$12.75 was rais-

James said that the fire that Jesus sent was quite different from literal fire; it was destructive to sin and burnt eternally. The sermon was pregnant with thought and eloquence from start to finish. He is a great preacher. A collection of \$60.20 was realized.

HISTORIAN



reaping greater benefits of the same.


