The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented a Statement of the Account of Alderman Smith Chairman of the Committee of Arrangement for the Reception of the President of the United States on his visit to this City, stating that he had audited the same and found the sum advanced was Twelve Hundred Dollars, and the Sum expended [117] Twelve Hundred & Eighty Three Dollars Ninety four cents, leaving a Balance due to the Chairman of Eighty Three Dollars Ninety four cents, for which a Warrant was presented this evening—which Report was approved.

The Comptroller presented a Report, stating that the state of the Treasury would admit of discharging a part of the Debt due by the Corporation, and he proposed discharging a Bond to the Mechanic's

Bank of Eleven Thousand Dollars, for which purpose a Warrant was presented this evening—which was approved and the Warrant directed to issue.

A Memorial of Thomas Addis Emmett President and the other Officers of the Irish Emigrant Society, praying the countenance of the Corporation to a Memorial about to be presented by them to Congress for the Grant of a Tract of Land for the settlement of Irish Emigrants was read and referred to Mr. Recorder: Mr. Allen: Alderman Coles.

[118] A Petition of John Thurston, for Remission of Fine incurred by Selling Poultry in the vicinity of Fly Market, was read and referred to the Counsel for his opinion as to the legality of the Ordinance on that subject.

Petitions—from William Patterson, for remission of fine incurred under Street Law: from Daniel Mott and Francis O. Neale, for remission of fine under Market Law: and from Stephen P. Laune, for remission of fine incurred by Sifting Lime in the Streets—were read, and leave given to Petitioners to withdraw their petitions.

A Petition of Edward Doughty, City Surveyor, for payment for Surveying and Maps for 10th Ward—was read and referred to the Committee of Finance.

A Petition of Joanna Bayard, for Remission of Fine for Selling in the Market with Measures made of Tin—was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of John W. Weyman, for [119] payment of sundry Repairs made in the Room occupied by him as Clerk of the Sessions and of other expences incurred in the arrangement of said office—was read & referred to Committee of Repairs.

The Commissioners of Estimate & Expence on the Improvement of Henry, Cross and Anthony Streets requested that they might, agreeably to the Statute in that case made and provided, be furnished with a Profile of the said Streets—whereupon the same was referred to the Street Commissioner to furnish the requisite profiles.

A Representation of the Grand Jury, addressed to the Court of General Sessions of the Peace and by their request to be laid before the Common Council, on several subjects respecting the Police of the City, was presented by his Honor the Mayor and, having been read, was referred to Aldermen Smith: Brackett: Coles: Buckmaster: Mr. Schieffelin: and The Counsel.

with authority to the Mayor to publish the same.

[120] A Petition of Edward C. Priest and others, proposing the

establishment of a Fire Company to be termed a Fire Guard, was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

A Petition of John Simonson, for a Stall in Catharine Market or Centre Market: a Petition of Hassel Wheeler, for Stall No. 57 Fly Market: one of Jacob Pessinger, for Stall No. 41 Catharine Market: and one of John Someryndyck, to Sell meat at the Corner of Duane and Augustus Street—were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Remonstrance from Sundry Inhabitants against certain parts of the Improvements proposed to be made in Roosevelt Street, was read, and leave given to Petitioners to withdraw their petition.

A Petition of the Inhabitants of the 1st Ward, praying that the Permits heretofore granted to Two Butchers at the foot of Broad Street may be continued: and Petitions of John Ackley and [121] of Stephen Doane that Permits heretofore granted to them may be continued—were severally read and laid on the Table—and it was ordered that the Suit against Peter Crawbuck be suspended.

A Petition of James Lyels, for Remission of Fine under the Market Law, was read and granted.

Upon the verbal Representation by the Attorney of the case of William Martine confined on Judgment recovered against him for Selling Liquor without License, it was referred to the Attorney, with authority to relieve him on payment of costs.

A Petition of Thomson Price, Contractor for the Mason work of the Fence around the Park, praying Remuneration for additional expences incurred by the Insolvency of one with whom he had made a Contract for Materials and had advanced a sum thereon—was read, and leave given Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

[122] A Remonstrance, from the Licenser of Chimney Sweepers, against any alteration in the Law Regulating Chimney Sweepers—was read and referred to the Committee on that subject:—to wit Van Amringe: Holmes: and Remmy.

A Petition, that the Law respecting Hogs may be Repealed, was read and referred to the following Aldermen Brackett: Burtis: Coles: Sniith: and Buckmaster.

A Communication was received from the Reverend John Stanford being an address to Parents on the subject of certain dangerous amusements of the youth of this City—which was read and referred to the Committee on Sunday Laws.

Upon the representation of the Street Commissioner, John Targee was appointed [123] Assessor in the Ordinance for Regulating Wash-

ington Street, passed 6th November 1816, in place of James H. Guion removed into the country.

The Counsel, agreeably to order, presented a Law to amend the Law to Regulate the Public Markets, which was read and passed.

The Counsel presented a Lease to William Cutting for Lot No. 17 at Brooklyn, which was directed to be duly executed—He also requested permission to strike out the words "Last part" from another lease to Mr. Cutting and to insert the word "instant"—which was directed to be done.

He also presented a Report (respecting a Deed from the Crugers) to wit

"The Counsel herewith submits a Deed from Bertram P. Cruger and Wife, Henry N. Cruger and Wife, and Nicholas Cruger and Wife for so much of the Road leading to the Hurl Gate Ferry as belonged to the Cruger Estate. This property has recently been sold in pursuance of an Order of the Supreme [124] Court and was purchased by the above-mentioned persons who now give a Warranty Deed for the same and also covenant to save the Corporation harmless from all demands from the heirs or deviser[e]s of the late Nicholas Cruger or of any persons claiming under or thro' them for or on account of or in any measure appertaining to the said premises or any part thereof.

"Four Fifths of the Ground conveyed was long since taken by the Corporation in pursuance of a law of the State, but was not paid for. Some doubts are entertained as to the regularity of the proceedings in the Supreme Court by virtue of which it was sold as aforesaid.

"But as it would be difficult, if not impossible, to obtain a more perfect title, and as the Grantors are understood to be wealthy men, the Counsel is of opinion that the Board can with safety accept their deed."

[125] The Counsel, also, on the Petition of Richard P. Lawrence, which had been referred to him, Reported as follows:

"That he is satisfied that the Statements therein contained are true. That he has consulted the late Counsel of the Board, who conducted the suit against Mr. Lawrence, and that he is of opinion that if Mr. Lawrence pays the costs of the proceedings against him that it would be proper to remit the penalty.

"Under these circumstances, and as it appears to the Counsel that the violation of the Law was not wilful on the part of the petitioner, and as the costs are sufficiently heavy as the suit was commenced in

the Supreme Court, he is of opinion that it is proper that the penalty should be remitted on paying the Costs."

[126] The Counsel, on the Communication of the Street Commissioner respecting the claim of Abijah Hammond to the Earth in certain Streets in Greenwich Village, reported as follows:

"That by the common Law the owner of the ground over which a high way is run is entitled to the earth and all the fixtures upon it, and can maintain an Action of Trespass against any person who shall remove them—But by a Statute of this State it is made lawful for the Corporation "To cause Common Sewers, drains or vaults to be made in any part of the City and to order and direct the altering and amending of any Street within this City." If therefore the roads or ways in question are to be considered as Streets, the Corporation has a right to regulate them. As to such of the roads or ways in question, as Mr. Hammond has sold the whole of his property bordering upon, and has bounded it in his deeds upon those ways and designated them as Streets, (which is said to be the case upon Hammond Street.) The Counsel is of opinion that Mr. Hammond would [127] be estopped from pleading that they were not streets—The Counsel is also of opinion that he would also be estopped from pleading that such of the said ways or Roads were not Streets, as he has sold property upon, and bounded it upon them as Streets, provided there was no other way to it—As to these therefore the Counsel is of opinion that the Corporation have a right to order the altering, amending, &c. in pursuance of the Statute.

"The Counsel thinks it proper that he should state that he has not been able to find any decision bearing directly upon this subject, but is led to this opinion from what he conceives to be the operation of general principles. The question however is one of too much importance to the Inhabitants of this City, to be voluntarily relinquished. He therefore respectfully recommends that the Street Commissioner be instructed to proceed with the regulation of such streets as Mr. Hammond has sold property upon and bounded it upon such Street, provided such property is not accessible from any other Street."

The Street Committee and Street Commissioner to whom was referred the Petition of Daniel Ewing praying to be appointed a City Surveyor, reported in favor of the Petitioner, and he was accordingly appointed.

The Street Committee and Street Commissioner, on the Petition of the Executors of Jonathan Dixon deceased, Reported as follows:

"That they have duly considered the subject, and, from the information they have obtained, they are decidedly of opinion, that the said Gore has always been a part of the Street—and was so considered by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment for widening and improving Orange Street.

"They would therefore recommend that the Common Council confirm and determine that the Line of Buildings on the North Easterly Side of Orange Street [134] between Chatham and Cross Street be and remain the line of Orange Street."

The Committee on the petition of Stephen Huestis presented a Report, in favor of the Petitioner. (A Remonstrance against the appointment of another Weigh-Master at that place was presented and

read) Whereupon the Report of the Committee and the Remonstrance were directed to lie for further consideration.

The City Inspector, to whom was referred the Resolution respecting the alteration of the 4th and 5th Wood Inspection Districts, reported:

"That upon examination he finds that the East Side of New Slip, now forming a part of the Fifth District, is in a great measure deprived of the advantage of an Inspector, from the constant attendance of the Inspectors of said District [135] being required at Peck Slip, in said Fifth District: hence they seldom ascend the River above Dover Street Wharf.

"The City Inspector would therefore recommend that the Fourth District should terminate at Dover Street Wharf, including the East Side of said Wharf, instead of New Slip, as the Regulation now stands.

"This Measure, if adopted, will ensure a more regular Report of Firewood at the Office; one very desirable, and which, it is to be hoped, will be attended with future advantage to the public.

"Connected with the subject of Fire wood Reports, the City Inspector has to regret that Israel Wood, Inspector of Wood of the Fourteenth District, has never made any reports at his Office. The few reports he received, from a part of the said Fourteenth District, were handed to him by John Guest, who gave in the Reports of all the Fire wood he inspected for the said Israel Wood: and farther it is but just to state, that the said John Guest, [136] upon application made to him, reported the Firewood he inspected from the 1st of January 1816 to his removal from office the June following: all the other removed Inspectors having refused to follow his correct example."

The Finance Committee, to whom it was referred to consider the subject of receiving Rent from Butchers' Stalls, presented a Report which was laid for consideration.

Resolved—that a Committee be appointed to enquire into the present state of the Office of the Clerk of the Common Council, and report to this Board whether any and what alterations should be made therein—which was referred to—Alderman Smith: Mr. Stevens: Mr. Allen.

The following Resolution was presented:

“Resolved that his Honor the Mayor appoint another member to supply the place of Assistant Alderman Stone in the Road and Alms House Committee, Mr. Stone having left the City and not [140] expecting to return for some time to come”—which was agreed to, and Mr. Akerly appointed.

A Resolution, directing the Superintendent of Repairs to Number the Pumps anew, and to put up the usual number of Sign Boards, was presented & agreed to.

The Committee on Wharves, Piers & Slips, the Street Commissioner and Comptroller, on the Petition of Fred. De Peyster, reported:

“That they have taken the same into consideration, and find (as the Petitioner [149] represents) that in compliance with his request a Water Grant was tendered him by the Corporation in the year 1814 on certain conditions, and which your Committee are informed the Petitioner declined accepting on the terms therein mentioned.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that the Corporation are not bound now to grant the request of the Petitioner after a lapse of near three years—and particularly after refusing at the time to comply with the terms then specified.

The Committee of Defence, on the subject of the claim of the Corporation against the United States, reported:—

"That, in pursuance of the Resolution passed on the 8th instant empowering them to take such measures as may be deemed most expedient to obtain from the Government of the United States a balance due for expenditures during the late war, they have appointed Alderman Smith and Ogden Edwards Esqr. to proceed to Washington for this purpose.

"This balance, amounting to upwards of Thirty Seven Thousand Dollars, arises from damages done to the lands of [152] individuals in the erection of works of defence in the year 1814, and has been paid by this Board in consequence of awards regularly made. The property was taken possession of by order and under the direction of General Swiit, the Chief Engineer of the United States, and then on this Station.

"The justice of our claims, the present harmonious disposition of the National Legislature, and the flourishing state of the Treasury afford every reason to believe that a speedy settlement of this account may be expected.

The Counsel also presented a Quit Claim Deed from the Corporation to the State of New York for the ground on the West Side of the State Prison—which was approved and directed to be duly executed.

The Ferry Committee, reported, as follows, respecting a Team Boat on Brooklyn Ferry; to wit,

“That the Charter of the City of New York authorizes the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty to establish Ferries to and from the city of New York, and to regulate the same

“ And whereas all the Ferries to and from the said City have been established and regulated by the said Corporation, except the Two Ferries to Brooklyn, respecting which the Legislature have passed certain laws regulating the same—and the said Laws so passed by the Legislature have never been fully enforced, in consequence of their being inapplicable to the state and situation of the said Ferries—and that since the establishment of a Steam Boat on the old Ferry, and a Team Boat on the New Ferry, the said Acts of the Legislature have become still further inapplicable to the said Ferries and to the [156] convenience of the Passengers

“ The Corporation of the City of New York, to whom the regulating of the said Ferries of right belongs, have a more immediate interest in the good regulation of the same, and can always adapt the regulations of said ferries to the existing state of things.

“ The Lessees of the Old Ferry have offered to your Committee to put a Team Boat on the said Old Ferry, large enough to take horses, carriages and freight over the said ferry, in addition to the Steam Boat now used thereon, and to run the said Team Boat of Evenings during the whole of the Regular Ferry Hours—provided the Corporation will permit them by law to receive the same price for passengers in such Team Boat as they are now allowed to receive in the Steam Boat—and that they will also keep on the said ferry such number of Barges and of such dimensions as shall be directed by the Corporation.

“ And your Committee conceive that such Team Boat, to be run during the [157] whole Ferry hours, would be a much greater accommodation to the public than the additional Steam Boat for freight and passengers only, which the said Lessees are bound by their lease (at a future day) to put on the said ferry.

“ Your Committee would therefore recommend

“ 1st That the Corporation pass a Resolution authorizing the Counsellor of the Board to agree with the Lessees of the said Ferry to have an Indorsement entered on their said Lease, authorizing the said Lessees to put such Team Boat on the said Ferry instead of the said additional Steam Boat mentioned therein—provided that such Team Boat be put in operation by the first day of June next, and to be so constructed as to give the same accommodation as the present Steam Boat

“ 2^d That the Board apply to the Legislature to repeal the Laws regulating the said ferries to Brooklyn, investing the right in the Corporation to regulate the same, and allowing the same Fare for the

Team Boat over [158] the said Ferry as is now allowed to the Steam Boat "

such vessel either to bond in the usual way for securing the City against such aliens' becoming chargeable thereon, or of paying the sum of Five Dollars in lieu [160] of said bond for each alien so arriving—Provided, however, if in the opinion of his Honor the Mayor, the said option shall in any case operate injurious to the public interest, bonds shall be insisted on with the necessary sureties.

“Resolved—that all monies so received be paid to the Chamberlain and be appropriated to the use of the foreign poor, and that the Comptroller render quarterly to the Corporation a statement thereof” which were agreed to.

The Second and Third Resolutions of the Police Committee, on Compensation to be made to Constables, Marshalls, &c. which were laid for consideration on the 17th of November last, were called up and read as follows:

“2^d Resolved—that every Watchman who shall attend Court on a subpœna, as required by the District Attorney, in consequence of his so being a Watchman, shall be allowed in all cases of felony two dollars for each case in which he shall so attend: and that such accounts shall be presented to the Comptroller [161] by the Clerk of the Sessions properly authenticated by him, in order that a Warrant may issue for payment thereof.

“3^d Resolved—that Marshalls, when not attached to the Court, and Constables shall be allowed One Dollar each for their attendance on subpœna as Witnesses in cases of Felony, for every case in which they shall so attend as required by the District Attorney.” and, on being read, were agreed to.

The following Resolution, which was laid for consideration on the 1st instant, was called up and agreed to:

The Counsel presented a Law to regulate the Lying of Vessels in the Stream of the North River—which was read and passed.

He also presented the following Drafts of Laws to be presented for Enactment to the Legislature at the ensuing Session: to wit

“An Act to enable the Mayor &c. to raise money by Tax”—which was laid for consideration—and—“An Act relative to the Commissioner of Excise in the City of New York”—which was referred back to the Counsel.

The Attorney presented a Communication, stating that Complaints had been made against sundry Tavern Keepers for permitting Gambling and disorderly Conduct in their Houses contrary to their Recognizances, and recommending that their Recognizances [173] be directed to be put in suit—which was read and referred to the Watch Committee.

The Counsel presented a Letter of Attorney from the Corporation to Thomas R. Smith and Ogden Edwards Esquires, constituting them the Agents & Attornies of the Corporation to adjust and settle with the proper Departments of the Government of the United States the Claims of this Corporation against the United States for Monies paid to the Owners of Lands on account of Damages which they sustained by the Erection of Fortifications thereon for the Defence of this City during the late War—Which Letter of Attorney was directed to be duly authenticated.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund presented the following Report and Account: to wit They Reported that

“during the half year ending the Second Monday (10th) of November 1817. They have purchased during that time Ten Thousand One hundred Dollars City Stock, which has been *has been* paid for out of [174] the funds appropriated by Law for that purpose. “Although purchases have been made above par, yet it was thought advisable to invest the Cash on hand, from time to time, in this species of Stock at the Market price. The main object of establishing the Sinking Fund was the lessening the public debt of the City by purchases, and the Commissioners have considered it most prudent to prefer buying the City Stock, on the best terms, in preference to any other. “The whole amount redeemed, to the 10th November last, was Seventy four Thousand Dollars, since which purchases have been made and more are shortly expected to be accomplished. The balance on hand November 10th 1817 is One Hundred and Twenty five Dollars Twelve cents agreeably to the annexed Account.”

"That they have taken the same into consideration, and have made many enquiries and examinations on the subject, the result of which has been—that the several public Offices in the City Hall have been fitted up at the expence of the Corporation.

"That the fixtures and furniture in most of them, and particularly the [181] County Offices, have also been made at the public Expence.

"That the boxes and cases which at present contain the Records and Papers of the Court of General Sessions of the peace, as well as the seal, screw and press of that Court have been provided at the expence of the present Clerk.

"Your Committee therefore can see no reason why the Office in question should not be put on the same footing as the other public offices in the City Hall.

"That they find the Minutes or proceedings of the Board have not been engrossed later than the 13th May last: That the engrossed

Minutes for 6 months preceding that date have not yet, as they understand, been compared with the Originals and corrected.

"That there appear a number of blanks in the engrossed minutes of several years back, which seem to have been left for entries that have never been made: the Committee however are informed that this omission is not the fault of the Clerk, but to be attributed to other causes.

"It also appears that the book of Ordinances, in which all the ordinances or laws of a general nature should be regularly entered as they are passed with the seal of the Corporation, does not contain an entry since the year 1815—altho' [183] a number of new, and some of them important laws have been passed since that time.

"The Committee are of opinion that the present is an improper condition for the public Records to remain in, and that more attention should be paid to a matter of so much interest and importance to the City.

"The Clerk of the Common Council being also the receiver of the Mayoralty fees, the Committee think it proper to state that by one of our laws it is made his duty to render weekly to the Comptroller an account of these fees and to pay over the amount to the Chamberlain; but by the Comptroller's statement it does not appear that any regular account has been rendered him for some time past, altho' Mayoralty fees have been from time to time paid by him to the Chamberlain.

“ Resolved, that this Committee be empowered to employ a suitable person to enter the whole of general ordinances in the Book kept for that purpose, and if necessary to provide a new one.

“ Resolved, that there be added to the number of Standing Committees one to consist of three members, and to be denominated the Committee on Public Offices; whose duty it shall be to [186] examine and report to the Board quarterly: to wit, on the first Monday in April, July, October and January, and oftener should they think proper, the state and condition of the office of the Comptroller, of the Street Commissioner, of the Clerk of the Common Council, of the City Inspector, and of such other Offices as they may consider for the public interest.

“ The Committee in closing their Report beg leave to observe that their confidence in the ability. and integrity of the present Clerk is undiminished, and they are happy to learn that since their appointment arrangements have been made by him to remedy the existing evils: it is nevertheless their opinion that the public interest will be promoted by so defining the duties of the Officers of the Board, that, if possible, nothing may be left to construction in the execution thereof; and therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the following Resolutions.”

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

A Petition of Colonel Murray (Commanding the 14th Regiment of the 1st Brigade New York State Artillery, called the Governor's Guard.) requesting to be complimented by the Corporation with a Stand of Colours—was read and referred to the Finance Committee to report.

A Petition of Joshua Place and Samuel [190] Percy, to be permitted to sell meat at Private Stalls in Division Street—was read, and leave given to Petitioners to withdraw their petition.

A Petition of Nicholas Steele and Matthias Smith, for Stalls No. 2 and No. 3, Fly Market, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition and Remonstrance of the Licensed Chimney Sweepers, was read and laid for consideration.

A Petition of John Smith Inspector of Firewood for the 9th District, praying to be permitted to inspect wood stored at the Corners of Reed & Washington Streets and of Chamber and Washington Streets, was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of 3^d Ward to Report.

A Representation from the Visiting Committee of the Humane Society, recommending the erection of Stoves in the Rooms of the Debtors' Gaol, was read, [191] and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Petition of Thomas Gardner was presented, stating that he holds a mortgage for \$750 with interest on property formerly belonging to Beekman M. Van Beuren of which he understands the Corporation have received a Release of the Equity of Redemption, and he informs that he is proceeding on his Mortgage to recover the monies due thereon in expectation that the Corporation will direct the amount due to him to be paid in—whereupon, it was ordered that the same be referred to the Finance Committee and Comptroller.

A Petition from a number of Inhabitants that an Ordinance may

be passed restraining the Raking for Crabs in the Winter Season, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition from John Baptiste Robin, Fruiterer, stating that he was prosecuted on a charge of selling Liquor without License of which he was innocent—that he was persuaded to confess judgment and [193] apply to the Honorable Corporation for redress—that he therefore solicited the interference of the Common Council—Ordered to be referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the 4th Ward.

A Petition of Nathan Morse, Tavern Keeper, for Remission of Fine incurred by permitting Card-playing in his house, was read and leave given to Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition of John J. Fink and Abraham Vermilyea to be permitted to exchange with each other Stalls No. 54 and No. 1 Washington Market, and a Petition from Gilbert Cromwell for Stall No. 25 Fly Market, were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Proposal from Jacob Patchen, Ichabod White, John Patchen and Israel Reynolds, to pay to the Corporation for the Stands which they now occupy in the Lower Fly Market One hundred and fifty Dollars per annum each, in lieu of fees, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition from Stephen Huestis, for remission of Fine for weighing Hay without a Commission as a Weigh Master, stating that he had acted under the authority of a Licensed Weigher, which he had supposed was legal, was read, and the fine remitted on payment of costs.

A Petition of Daniel Updike, a Watchman of Captain Hibbert's Company, complaining of being removed from his office of Watchman, and praying his case to be enquired into—was read and referred to the Watch Committee.

A Memorial was received from Dominick Lynch, stating that in the year 1810 he improved certain Water Lots granted to him lying on Water and Walnut Streets by sinking Piers &c.—that the Corporation laid out a Slip at that place and took part of Petitioner's ground for which no compensation has been made—that they have [195] also during that period received the whole of the Wharfage—and praying a settlement of his demands for the same. He also stated that he was indebted to the Corporation for expences in filling in certain Lots on Collect Street and for quit rent on Water lots at Walnut Street—that part of those sums are unpaid as he considered himself as having a claim for a large amount against the Corporation—that a suit has been instituted against him for the same which he prays may be suspended.

He also stated that property belonging to him in Orange Street had been taken for improving and widening said Street without his assent, and praying to be compensated therefor—He finally requested the Corporation would take immediate measures to make a Settlement with him of the above subjects—Whereupon, it was referred to the Street Commissioner, Comptroller and Attorney.

The Street Commissioner, agreeably to order, presented a Map of the grounds [196] included in the Military Square—which was laid on the Table.

He also presented a Communication on the subject of Contracts which shall hereafter be entered into for sinking Wells—which was approved, and it was referred to the Attorney to prepare a Draft of the form of such Contract.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents on Assessment for paving Cross Street—and a Warrant was ordered to issue to the Collector for collecting the same.

Upon the suggestion of the Street Commissioner, Abraham Baudouine was appointed Assessor in the Ordinance for rebuilding the Common Sewer at Peck Slip in place of Michael M. Titus who declined acting.

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for a Pump and Well in Perry Street near Herring Street—which was passed, and Jacob C. Mott, John Brower and Abraham Baudouine were [197] appointed Assessors.

He also presented the assessments for regulating and paving Greenwich Street from Hamersly Street to Christopher St.: for a Well and Pump in Cherry Street near Market Street; and for regulating Bleecker Street—which were confirmed, and Morris D'Camp was appointed Collector on the Two former, and Noah Jarvis on the latter.

[213] The City Inspector presented the following Remarks on a Statement of the deaths, in the City & County of New York, for the year 1817, amounting to Two Thousand five hundred and Twenty seven, succeeded by the Annual Report of Interments:—to wit

"Remarks."

"In 1816 the number of deaths exceeded that of the last year by Two hundred and twelve. The Small Pox in the former year was

very fatal, having carried off One hundred and seventy nine. persons; whereas in the latter, Fourteen only died of that complaint. This circumstance may account for the present decrease in deaths. It is to be lamented, however, that this fatal Complaint has again visited our City, and if the exertions now employed fail in checking its fearful progress, it is to be apprehended that the next year's report will present a melancholy picture of Deaths, which might have been avoided, but for the persevering obstinacy of many who reject vaccination.

"The Consumptive Cases, as usual, [214] occupy a considerable space in the list of deaths, not however in a greater proportion than was formerly presented:—the same causes continue to produce the same effects, in this widely extended Complaint.

"It is a matter of great consolation that our City has been exempted from that dreadful complaint the Yellow Fever: that whilst other cities on the Continent experienced its destructive visitation, we, under the precautionary measures of a vigilant Board of Health, aided by a superintending Providence, have escaped its ruthless devastation.

"It may not be improper to remark, that altho' the number of deaths were fewer the last year than in 1816, yet more persons died of Old Age than in the preceding year. Ninety six persons quietly departed, among whom was a woman born in this City at the advanced age of 103—a proof, if any were wanting, that this Climate is as friendly to Longevity as any other, and that to imprudence alone it is attributable that we have not many such instances to record."

The Comptroller presented the following Report: to wit

“On the 22^d July 1816, the Board resolved, that the Collectors of Taxes who have settled with the Treasurer be, and they are hereby directed and required to deliver to the Treasurer their Books of Assessment, in order that the Arrears of Taxes may be handed over to such person or persons, as shall hereafter be appointed by the Board to collect the same; and that it shall be the duty of the Collectors of Taxes, in every succeeding year, [216] to deliver up their Books of Assessment to the Treasurer, on the day on which they settle their balance of Taxes with him, that similar arrangements may be made for the collection of all Arrears.”

“It was also Resolved, that the Comptroller call upon the several Collectors, and direct them to pay over to the Chamberlain or Treasurer such sums as remain in their hands of Taxes by them collected.

“Agreeably to the above Resolutions, the Comptroller sent a Circular to each of the Collectors of Taxes, informing them of the order of the Board.

“On the 6th August following, a Report was made to the Common Council, that Two of the Collectors have paid the Treasurer the Balance remaining with them—But One has delivered over the Book of Collection, in conformity with the Resolution of the Board—and that it appeared very difficult, if not impracticable to proceed with the Collection of Arrears of Taxes, unless the Order of the Board is complied with.

“By a Return made by Mr. [217] Gilbert, who is the Collector of Arrears of Taxes, it appears that the Collectors of the 3^d, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th Wards have paid to him to the 1st instant the sum of \$1352.30 Amount remaining in their hands of Taxes by them collected in different years.

“The Books of the Collectors, as directed by the foregoing Resolution of the Board on the 22^d July, 1816, have only been delivered complete by the Collector of the 10th Ward, and partially by the Collectors of the 6th 7th and 9th Wards.

“The Collector of Arrears feels much embarrassment in the Collection of Taxes, for the want of the several Collectors’ Books, which he has made exertions to obtain, but cannot.

“To enforce the Resolution of the Board, and also to expedite future Collections of Arrears it is respectfully recommended—“That the Board should direct the Treasurer to demand and receive of the respective Collectors their Books, at the time they settle the Balance of Tax, and that he should with- [218] hold giving a Receipt for said

Balance, to such as refuse or neglect to comply with the Order of the Board."

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

The Clerk of the Common Council laid before the Board Returns which had been made to him by the Clerk of the Markets, (agreeably to the Resolutions of the Board,) of the Butchers holding Stalls in the several Markets either by License [230] or Permit—which were directed to be referred to the Market Committee.

A Request of Elijah Secor, to know if the Corporation will sell or lease the Lot at the Corner of Wall and Nassau Streets, was read and referred to the Finance Committee, Comptroller and Attorney.

Petitions, of Jeremiah Tier for Stall No. 20 in Catharine Market, and of John Akly for Stall No. 35 Catharine Market were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition from Charles McCarly, stating that on the 13th April 1807 Petitioner took a lease for 21 years of a Lot of the Corporation in Cherry Street—that for the purposes of opening Franklin Square the Property has been assessed \$63, and for opening Roosevelt Street \$456.50 cents—that though perhaps in strictness of law the Petitioner by the terms of the Lease might be compelled to pay the said Assessment, yet as the Improvement [231] enures to the benefit of the Freehold, he conceives that the whole of said Assessment should not be borne by him, and requests the aid of the Common Council—which was directed to be referred to the Finance Committee, Comptroller and Attorney.

A Petition of James Stuart was received, stating that in 1815, in consequence of his house on the Lot at the corner of Oliver and Oak Streets being destroyed by fire, a proportion of the Taxes laid on said Property was remitted. that he has lately been called upon for payment

of said Tax, and praying that the same be remitted—was read and referred to the Finance Committee, Comptroller and Attorney.

A Petition of W. M. Thurman, praying a Remission of Tax laid on him in 1815 far above the ability of Petitioner to pay, was referred to the same Committee.

[232] A Petition of William Scott, praying a Remission of Tax for the year 1814 which he avers he paid to John O'Neale the Collector of the 6th Ward, was read and referred to the same Committee.

A Petition of Charles Wilkes, stating that during the winter he resided in Chamber Street and during the summer in Greenwich Village—that he had been taxed for his personal property in Chamber Street and had paid it—that he has since been called upon by the Collector of the 9th Ward for personal tax at Greenwich—and praying Relief—which was also referred to the same Committee.

A Petition of Francis Hammelin for Remission of Penalty for selling Liquor without Licence, was referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the 6th Ward to Report.

A Petition of Inhabitants residing [233] in the Bowery, praying the name of the same may be changed to Great Washington Road, was referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Communication was received from Jacob Smith Junior, stating that he has invented a Machine for throwing down Chimnies and Walls standing after a fire, was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

An Account of some Men of Captain Anderson's Watch for Attending and guarding Goods in the street at the fire in Vesey Street, was presented and referred to the Watch Committee.

A Memorial was received from Richard Varick, stating that the persons employed in digging out for the purpose of regulating Bleecker Street were encroaching on the private property of the Petitioner, and praying the interference of the Board was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants [234] of the 8th Ward and Street Commissioner, and, until the Report of the Committee comes in, the persons employed in digging out Bleecker Street are to be instructed by the Street Commissioner to not interfere with the ground as claimed in Petitioner's Memorial.

A Remonstrance from sundry Inhabitants and Owners against the opening of Dover Street, and a Remonstrance of William Lawrence against the same, were severally read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Walter Din, for Remission of Penalty incurred under Sunday Law, was read, and leave given to Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition was received from Benjamin A. Akerly, Visiting Surgeon of the Alms House, stating that from the remote situation of that Establishment from the City considerable expence attended the Visitations to that place, and [235] suggesting the propriety of an allowance to him therefor, was read and referred to the Committee of the Alms House and the Commissioners of the Alms House.

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for Building a Pier at Spring Street Basin, which was read and passed.

The Street Commissioner presented a Communication, stating that the Side Walks around the Public grounds were not kept in that state of cleanliness, and were not cleared of snow and ice in the winter season as the public comfort required, and recommending an enquiry generally as to that subject, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Lands and the Street Commissioner.

He also presented the following Assessments, which were passed, and Morris D. Camp was appointed Collector in each—To wit—for regulating Asylum Street—for regulating Herring Street [236] from Christopher Street to Bank Street—and Hammond Street from Washington Street to Greenwich Lane—for regulating Perry Street from Washington Street to Asylum Street—for regulating Washington Street to Asylum Street—for regulating Amos Street from Washington Street to Asylum Street—for regulating Hudson Street from Hammond Street to the 9th Avenue—and for regulating Hudson Street from Charlton Street to Christopher Street.

A Communication was presented by the Street Committee and Street Commissioner on the subject of a Gore of Land which will be left by the Improvement of Cross Street between Pearl and Little Water Streets—which was read and laid for consideration.

The Committee appointed on the 8th of December to settle and receive the Balance due this Corporation by the United States for money expended on fortifications during the late War, [237] reported:

“That in pursuance of their Appointment they proceeded to Washington and there laid before the Secretary of War the merits of the claim.

“This Officer appeared fully satisfied of the justice thereof, and evinced every disposition to make a final settlement & to pay the amount, but found himself officially debarred from this course by the decision of his predecessor in the year 1815, who, as it appeared by

the documents of the Office, had expressly declared that the claim could not be allowed by the War Department.

“The Committee then took the course advised by the Secretary of War, and laid the claim of the Corporation before the House of Representatives, together with the necessary explanations and the documents appertaining thereto: where it is believed that it will receive due attention.

“The Members of the House from this City were particularly charged with the business, and every information [238] was given them in relation thereto: in addition to which the Committee received assurance from the Secretary of War that he would afford every facility in the final settlement of the claim.”

"On examination it appears that the Petitioner was assessed in the 7th Ward the last year \$8900—for personal property, and he admits that he is worth \$7000, but owing to a variety of circumstances thinks that there should be some reduction.

"Without entering on the subject of the rate at which he should have been assessed, the precaution taken by the Assessors, agreeably to the amendment made to the law at the last session of the legislature, of giving sufficient notice by printed bills and notices in the public papers of the time and place for hearing appeals,—should preclude any interference after the Tax Books are completed, unless some manifest error which it would be impossible to correct [241] at the time, should make it just and proper. In the present case this does not appear, and at an interview with the petitioner he appeared sensible of the propriety of the above observations. The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

A Petition of Thomas P. Conrey for the appointment of Inspector

of Wood from Wood yards on East River, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition of William Cutting in behalf of the Lessees of Brooklyn Ferry, [253] praying that a Lot at Brooklyn may be leased them for purposes of said Ferry, was read and referred to the Comptroller.

A further petition of John R. Livingston, praying a discontinuance of suit against him, was referred to the Street Committee and City Inspector.

A Petition of Thomas Johnson, stating that some Fowls which he had sent to Market for sale had been seized under charge of their having been blown, and his Agent had been fined Ten Dollars which had been paid to the Attorney of the Board—that he denied the fact of their being blown and requested the money might be returned to him or he might have a trial—was read—whereupon it was ordered that the Attorney be authorised to join issue with the Petitioner and cause the same to be tried.

A Petition of Jonathan Solomon, stating that he had been called up- [254] on for payment of a Tax which he alleges he has already paid to John ONeale late Collector of 6th Ward—was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

The Superintendant of Repairs presented a Statement of the Expences of the Pump and Blacksmith Establishment under his direction, and exhibiting the savings in Expence from the former mode of performing that work, which was read and referred to the Committee of Repairs.

A memorial of certain Inhabitants of Kings County to the Legislature, remonstrating against the Repeal of the Proviso of the 5th Section of the Act entitled "An Act to prevent the fishing in Hudson River &c." passed 11th April 1815, was laid before the Board with a request that they would add their sanction to said Remonstrance—which was referred to the Committee on Applications to the Legislature.

[255] A Petition from Samuel Piersey for a Stall in Catharine Market, and a Remonstrance from a number of Inhabitants residing near Old Slip against erecting a Market at the Old Slip, were read and both referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of John Clark praying there may be leased to him a Water Lot at Brooklyn lying East of the Steam Boat Ferry for the purpose of erecting thereon a Steam Grist Mill, was read and referred to the Ferry Committee and Comptroller.

An Application of the Orphan Asylum, requesting that the Superintendent of the Alms House might be permitted to put out to Board the children of the Asylum under 18 months of age, was read and referred to the Committee on the Alms House.

A Petition of Frederick Traver to be released from payment of an Assessment for Canal Street laid upon [256] Lots Nos. 1090 and 1091 Bayard's Farm, the lease of which Lots were purchased by him from the Corporation in June 1812 on Sales by them on Assessment for regulating Mulberry Street at the intersection of Spring Street, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of John Brown for release from a Judgment recovered against him (for which he is imprisoned) for selling liquor without License, was read and granted on payment of costs.

A Petition of Sundry Inhabitants praying that when the Lot in Whitehall Street opposite Stone Street reserved for an Engine Lot is disposed of it may be sold under the express stipulation that it be occupied by a Building so as to fill up the Vacancy, as in its present situation it is a great Nuisance to the Neighbourhood—was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

[257] A Statement was received from Samuel Parsons, that in the Deed from the Corporation to him for the Lot at the corner of Fulton and Cliff Streets a material mistake has occurred in the Boundaries as expressed in the Deed, and requesting the same may be amended—which was directed to be referred to the Attorney in the absence of the Counsel.

A Petition was received from Samuel Ratcliff, stating that he is Owner of a Lot at the Corner of Charlton and Hudson Streets, and that he has been assessed for opening Hudson Street from Charlton to Christopher Street the sum of \$183.10 cents an amount very far above his proportion of the expence of the same, and praying relief, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Petition of the Hand Cartmen of the City, praying the Law relative to Porters may be so amended as that Hand Cartmen may be also permitted [258] to use Hand barrows, was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

A Petition of John Jacob Astor and John R. Murray, stating that they had received an Ordinance for filling in Lots at the Corner of Laight and Greenwich Streets, and not having complied with the same a Prosecution has been commenced against them, and praying the Suits against them may be discontinued and time given them until

Spring to complete the same, was read and referred to the Street Committee and City Inspector.

A Petition from Owners of Hackney Carriages, that the Hack Stands may be abolished, and a Petition from sundry Inhabitants to the same effect—were read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants, praying that the 10th Avenue may be opened from its intersection with the Bloomingdale Road near 143^d Street [259] to its intersection with the Kings Bridge Road near the House of Mr. Jumel, was read and referred to the Road Committee and Street Commissioner.

The Report of the Special Committee, on the subject of establishing a Slip at the foot of Roosevelt Street and at Oliver Street, was called up—The reading of the Reports being called for, the Report of the Committee of Wharves, Street Commissioner & Comptroller (dated Dec. 8) was as follows:—

“That they have made the [264] necessary enquiry, examined the premises and find that the accommodations for Market and other Boats at the new or James Slip is very limited and deficient of room for the safety and convenience of Market and other boats that ply there.

“It does appear to your Committee that the water applied for the enlargement of the aforesaid Slip will be a very desirable improvement for the purposes petitioned for, and likewise so central for the convenience of all the North and Easterly part of our Citizens.

“It seems as if nature had pointed out this spot for a Slip where Vessels can lie with so much safety at all seasons of the year owing to an eddy always making at that place.

Your Committee believe if the Water petitioned for should be taken for the purposes therein mentioned, it will not cost the Corporation Six thousand dollars at present and probably not more for some years to come

[265] The Report of the Special Committee was, as follows:—

“That they have taken the subject into consideration, and given it all the deliberation which a very important question of public and relative utility seemed to require: and one of the first circumstances that occurred to them was the necessity of having more water reserved for public Slips. This your Committee understand has been often recommended, and they deem it sufficiently important to be kept constantly in view. The comparative amount of revenue to be derived from such slips, when brought into view with the Water grants as usually made, Your Committee consider as belonging to the Comptroller. They however entertain no doubt that a respectable portion of revenue, equal to a due rate of interest, may be drawn from Slippage, and that the rates now paid would bear enhancing, without prejudice to the public interest.

“Your Committee therefore have found it their duty to recommend [266] that both the Waters between the foot of Roosevelt and James Slip, and those at the foot of Oliver Street should be reserved for public purposes; and that neither of those situations should be suffered to become exclusively private property or be appropriated to private use.

“Your Committee, however, are of opinion that the greatest public convenience would result from taking the waters first mentioned (and reported on by the respectable Committee before noticed,) for public use. Some local advantages, coupled with the consideration of a much smaller immediate expence, point to this preference of the waters between Roosevelt and New Slip. These advantages may be readily understood by a view of a Map of the two places, herewith exhibited.

“Your Committee, therefore, recommend that the waters between the foot of Roosevelt Street and James Slip be now taken and occupied as a public Slip, and that those at [267] the foot of Oliver Street be reserved for public use, and be occupied for public purposes, whenever public convenience may require such occupation.

“Your Committee cannot conclude, without expressing their regret that the Report of a previous Committee should have been referred to them. A Copy would have furnished all the information, (if information was necessary after so recent a discussion), and,

viewing the course as unparliamentary, they earnestly hope it will not be drawn into precedent."

The Remonstrances against the establishing the Slip at the foot of Roosevelt Street were also read. Mr. Allen then moved that from the Report the words "between the foot of Roosevelt Street." be stricken out, and instead thereof to insert "at the foot of Oliver Street including so much [268] on each side of said Street as will be sufficient to make a Slip of One Hundred and ten feet in width clear of the piers." A motion was made that the consideration be postponed, until the 1st of June.

The question being taken thereon, and a Division called by Alderman Buckmaster, it passed in the Negative as follows:—

"Resolved that the Attorney enquire and report to the Board the legal mode pointed out by the [269] Statute to take Slips and that he examine the grants given by this Board to the Owners of Property lying between James' Slip and Minturn and Champlins Wharf and that he report the different interests, whether they be in Water grants, Bulkheads, Wharves or Piers which will be valued in taking the Slip between the above points." The question being taken thereon, it passed in the Negative. Alderman Smith then presented the following Resolution:—

"Resolved, that the Street Commissioner, Comptroller and Attorney be directed to report at the next meeting what will be the expence, as near as it can be ascertained, of establishing a Slip at Roosevelt Street to James' Slip, and also the expence of establishing a Slip, at the foot of Oliver Street 110 feet in the clear from Pier to Pier." The question being taken thereon it passed in the negative. The question was then taken on the first Amendment proposed by Mr. Allen and it passed in the Negative.

[270] An Amendment was then proposed by Mr. Allen to limit the expenditure on the part of the Corporation to the Sum of \$8000.

An Amendment of similar import, directing the Committee on that subject to make Arrangements with the proprietors and for that amount, was proposed by Mr. Akerly—both of which were withdrawn to give way to the following Resolution proposed by Mr. Stevens:—

“Resolved that the Street Commissioner and Comptroller be authorized to treat with the Owners of property lying between James’ Slip and Minturn & Champlin’s Wharf, including half the wharf on each side, and that they bargain for the same, provided they can obtain the said property or the Major part thereof at or after the rate of \$8000 for the whole.” The question being taken thereon it was carried in the affirmative.

The Committee on the Petition for widening Dover Street presented a [271] Report, which was read and laid for consideration,

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and approved.

A Petition for a Pump in Bleecker Street near Laurens Street was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Abraham Storms was received, stating that he had [275] built by Contract for the Corporation a Bulkhead at Crane Wharf—that shortly after it slipped out into deeper water and thereby occasioned him an additional expence of more than Six hundred dollars—and praying relief—whereupon, the same was referred to the Committee on Wharves and Street Commissioner.

A further Petition of Robert Latimer, stating that by his Contract for working the 8th Avenue he has suffered great losses, and tho' he considered himself entitled to a larger Sum from the Corporation, yet will be content to receive the sum of Two thousand dollars in full of the work performed—whereupon, resolved that it be referred to the Road Committee.

A Petition of the American Academy of the Fine Arts for further time for payment of their proportion of the expence incurred in repairs to the New York Institution—was read and referred to the Committee on Arts & Sciences.

[276] A Petition from the French Benevolent Society for pecuniary aid was read and directed to be laid on the Table.

A further petition of Thomas P. Conrey, for appointment of Inspector of Wood, and a petition from Caleb Sutton for appointment of Measurer of Grain—were read and referred to the Committee of Applications.

A Petition of John Jenkins, Author of a Treatise on Penmanship, praying the aid and sanction of the Corporation to carry his plan into operation, was read and referred to the Committee of Arts and Sciences.

A further Application of Richard Varick, complaining of the encroachments on his property by the digging out of Bleecker Street, was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the 8th Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants, stating that great advantages would [277] result to the Community from an appointment of an Inspector of Cut-Stone Work and of Laths, and recommending an application to the Legislature for authority to appoint such officers—was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

A Petition of James Gardner, Butcher, to be permitted to continue to sell Meat at No. 94 Hester Street—was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Thomas and William Benton, stating that they were Owners of a Lot fronting on Wall Street and adjoining a Lot on the corner of Nassau and Wall Streets claimed by the Corporation, and praying that the Corporation will sell to them the said corner lot was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

The Street Commissioner stated that the sum of Seven hundred dollars was awarded to Catharine Duryee, as guardian of her infant children Mary and [278] John Kip, for ground taken to widen Bridge Street and for which a Warrant had issued, and he was directed to deliver the same on being satisfied of her authority to receive it—and he submitted an opinion of Silvanus Miller Surrogate of the City and County on the subject—whereupon the same was referred to the Attorney of the Board for his opinion.

" That the said Contracts relate to the subject of an additional Map of the Island of New York, to delineate the Monuments, Avenues, Streets, Buildings, Boundary lines of property, Creeks and the face of the Country generally.

" Your Committee have examined the Minutes of the Board, as far back as November 1812, and find that the Board, on the seventh of the same month. agreed to and adopted a Report of the then Committee of Surveys, which Report, and a Resolution contained therein, authorized the said Committee to agree with John Randel Junior for a Map of the Description abovementioned.

" Your Committee have not learnt that any written Contract or Agreement was ever entered into on this subject: but the Board, by accepting the said Report, authorised the said Committee to give Mr. Randel five dollars per day, while he should be employed in this Work, provided the whole expence [290] should not exceed Four thousand dollars. And your Committee are satisfied from the Documents which they have examined, and from the information which they have obtained from the then Committee of Surveys, that they did actually agree with Mr. Randel for the work in question, and to pay him for the same the sum of Thirty three hundred dollars, and that, in conformity with said agreement, Mr. Randel has considerably progressed in the work.

" Your Committee, under these circumstances, therefore, recommend that the Board execute the said Contract.

" They farther take the liberty to add that the mode of authorising Committees to enter into Contracts of such magnitude is attended with much inconvenience, as such Contracts, when occasion requires to refer to them afterwards, are never to be found, and probably often, as in this case, never properly entered into."

“That the obstructions by poles and Gill nets are very injurious to the Shad Fishery, and should not be allowed, independent of the obstructions to navigation.

“Your Committee are also of opinion that the shad-fishery is of considerable importance to the city of New York, as in the months of April and May when shad are in plenty butchers' meat and other provisions are dear, and that in order to preserve [293] the annual supply of shad, no obstructions should be permitted in the river that would tend to prevent the return of those fish to their usual haunts. It is well known that shad are migratory fish and that they visit annually the same rivers to cast their spawn and return with their young to the depths of the ocean or other places of retreat and safety. The numbers that frequent our Bay and the Hudson River are already much less than in former years and it is feared that if additional obstructions are suffered to be placed in the River, the Run of shad in a few years will be entirely destroyed. Wherefore the Committee concur in opinion with the Inhabitants of Kings' County that the Law “to protect the fishery in Hudson River and to prevent obstructions in the navigation thereof” should not be repealed.”

“The Alms House Committee beg leave to lay before the Board a statement of the expences incurred at Bellevue in erecting the new Alms' House, Penitentiary and other buildings, and for improving the ground connected [322] with those establishments; also the amount expended for an additional piece of ground adjoining the original purchase.

“This Statement exhibits the annual amount expended from the commencement of those buildings in 1811 to the completion of the New Alms House in December 1817; and shewing also the specific amount of materials purchased in each year.

“By this statement it will be seen that the New Alms House establishment at Bellevue has cost Four hundred and twenty one thousand One hundred and nine dollars fifty six cents, leaving a balance in favor of the Treasurer of Two thousand Eight hundred and seventy six dollars thirty eight cents.”

He also presented a Report recommending an Application to the Legislature requesting an Amendment to the Law respecting improvements in Streets, so that when the Report of the Commissioners of Assessment is confirmed by the Supreme Court the Common Council may have authority to delay commencing the Improvement for a period not exceeding fifteen months—which was referred to the Attorney to report the draught of a Memorial and corresponding Bill.

"That, altho' they consider the practice of disposing at public sale, generally, of Corporation property, [351] as highly advantageous to the public interest, yet it is believed that the present case should form an exception to this rule.

“ The Academy established in this place by the petitioners is highly respectable both as to the number of scholars and the various branches of education taught therein. The teachers are men of unexceptionable character, and by their talents, their zeal and industry have made this establishment one of the most useful and most extensive in this part of the City.

“ Your Committee are therefore of opinion that it would operate extremely hard on the petitioners to lease this place at auction, thereby exposing them to the cupidity of others, compelling them to purchase probably at an extravagant price the labors of their own hands, or to abandon them for the benefit of others.

“ That the said Building has been so altered by the said Petitioner, by substituting safe materials against fire in the place of wood, that in their opinion it cannot now be considered dangerous

“ That the Fire wardens of the Ward or a majority of them have examined the said building and are [353] satisfied with the same, as will appear by their opinions expressed in the paper hereunto annexed.

“ They therefore recommend that the suit commenced against the said Petitioner be suspended on payment of costs.”

The Police Committee, to whom was referred the Resolution (dated Feby. 2) on the subject of confining Runaway Slaves, presented a Report. The above-mentioned Resolution as proposed by Mr. Stevens, was as follows:

“ Resolved, that in future in all cases where the Police Magistrates

commit slaves to Bridewell, for the reasons above" (in the preamble) "mentioned, that the said Magistrates first demand and receive the sum of fifteen dollars from the person or persons making application for such commitment, and that the said sum be passed to the credit of this Board [354] by the Clerk of the Police Office, to remunerate the Corporation for the expences of the board of such slave, while in Bridewell, at the rate of 25 cents per day—And that in case any such slaves, so committed shall be discharged before the expiration of sixty days, then the person or persons so paying the said fifteen dollars shall have refunded to him or them, by the said Clerk, such balance as may exist in his or their favour, after charging him or them with the board of such slave at the above rate of 25 cents per day—And that the said Magistrates on committing slaves, for the reasons and in the manner aforesaid, shall also first take from the person or persons making application for such Commitment a Bond (with Surety if in their opinion requisite) whereby such person or persons shall also bind themselves to pay the sum of twenty five cents per day, for each and every day that such slaves shall remain in Bridewell, after the expiration of the first sixty days—Provided always [355] that the Penalty of the said Bond shall not exceed One hundred dollars."

On which Resolution the Report of the Police Committee was—"that they approved of the Resolution proposed, and had drafted a Law agreeably thereto, which the Chairman presented. Whereupon, the same was read and agreed to and passed under the title of "A Law in relation to the Imprisonment of Slaves."

The following Report of Feby. 2, was called up:

The Special Committee, on the Petition respecting encouragement to the House of Industry, Reported:

"That your Committee have visited this establishment, and as far as they have been enabled to judge, the same is carried on, by the respectable members who compose the association, in a manner highly honorable to themselves and beneficial to the Community.

"This institution was established in the summer of 1814, and under the immediate auspices and patronage of this Corporation, [356] who by their Committee hired the Rooms for the Institution and presented them the sum of Five hundred dollars.

"In the Fall of 1815 this Association made to the Corporation their first Annual Report, which appears, by the Report of a then Committee of this Board, to have been highly satisfactory to the Cor-

poration, and they thereon voted the Institution the sum of One thousand dollars.

"In the Fall of the present year a Committee of this Board, without, as your present Committee believes, having visited and examined into the concerns of this Institution, reported in favor of the reduced Allowance of Four hundred dollars, which sum was agreed to by the Board.

"The members of this Association must naturally have concluded that the Corporation had lost their confidence in the mode of managing the Institution, or their good opinion of the description of the Institution itself: neither of which, your Committee are confident, is the fact.

[357] "In the opinion of your Committee, the House of Industry is calculated to prevent indigence and want among the poor of the City, to encourage them to labor, and thus to enable them to obtain a maintenance and support for themselves.

"It is a fact that must be granted, that all descriptions of associations to benefit or relieve the poor are frequently deceived and imposed upon—but the House of Industry, by granting relief only in paying for labor, is certainly the least liable to be imposed upon, and therefore, if on this account alone, peculiarly entitled to encouragement.

"That the usefulness of this Institution may not be curtailed—but that it may be extended, aided and assisted by the advice and resources of the gentlemen who have petitioned in its behalf, your Committee have concluded to recommend, that the Sum of Five hundred dollars be granted them for the Rent of their contemplated [358] increased Establishment."

“ That they are fully sensible of the great advantage which results to the United States from the [359] emigration of industrious foreigners who have come to reside permanently therein. Such emigrants have contributed to add to the strength and enhance the wealth of the nation.

“ Your Committee earnestly hope and confidently believe that Congress will continue to cherish that liberal policy toward all meritorious foreigners of all nations, who are attached to the principles of our free Constitution, which hath hitherto characterized the laws.

“ At the same time your Committee are of opinion that as the Corporation of this City, in common with those of the other cities of the Union, is constituted for local purposes and local views, it is inexpedient in this Board formally to apply to Congress on the subject, or give any special opinion to the Representatives from this City.”

ranted in saying that this property would let for a sum considerably larger than it at present commands: and several difficulties now existing in relation to the lying of vessels in the Slips would be remedied: then places would no longer exhibit vessels converted into retail shops and store-houses, nor would they be incumbered with vessels laid up and dismantled during the whole winter; or if it were so, the Contractor would be properly compensated for such privileges."

Alderman Smith, as a Substitute for [362] the Rates in the foregoing Report, proposed the following Resolution:—

But it is expressly declared that this last regulation shall not affect vessels lying Eastward of Corlaer's Hook on the East River, and Northward of Duane Street Basin on the North River."—which was agreed to, and the Attorney in the absence of the Counsel was directed to report an Ordinance amending [363] the Law to regulate the lying of Vessels at the Public Slips, agreeably to said report—and the Comptroller was directed to advertise to receive Contracts for the leasing of the Public Slips and Wharves until the 9th day of March next.

Mr. Allen presented a Resolution, recommending an Application to the Legislature for a Law amending the Law touching the laying out of Streets, so as to authorize the Corporation to direct the Commissioners of Assessment to assess to them such parts of former Streets as they may judge proper which should be left out and not wanted for improving any streets—which Resolution was approved and referred to the Attorney in the absence of the Counsel to report a Memorial and Bill corresponding therewith.

Mr. Van Amringe presented the following Resolution :

"Resolved that a Committee be appointed to enquire into the [364] propriety of dividing the City of New York into Districts and of appointing proper persons in each district to prevent the settlement of foreign poor and to prevent as far as possible Pauperism in the City." which was referred to Messieurs Van Amringe Holmes and Alderman M^cQueen

[392] His Honour the Mayor informed the Common Council that he had received a Communication from Cadwallader D. Colden Esqr. informing him that he had received from the Honorable the Council of Appointment a Commission as Mayor of the City of New York, and that he proposed taking the Oaths of Office in the presence of the Common Council this afternoon—whereupon, on motion of Alderman Smith, a Committee was appointed to wait on Mr. Colden and inform him the Common Council were in Session and ready to receive him, consisting of Aldermen, Smith Brackett & Mr. Taylor.

A considerable number of Citizens attending to witness the ceremonial of the Induction of the newly appointed Mayor, and the Common Council Chamber not being sufficiently large to accommodate them, the Board adjourned to the Room in the Hall assigned for the holding of the Sessions and Oyer & Terminer Courts.

[393] After a short time Mr. Colden was introduced into the Room by the Committee and was seated on the right of the President. The Commission of Mr. Colden was then read by the Clerk of the Common Council. The Oaths prescribed by the Charter and the Law were then administered to Mr. Colden by the Honorable the Mayor Mr. Radcliff. After which Mr. Radcliff took leave of the Common Council in a short address, and then introduced Mr. Colden to the President's Seat. Mr. Colden, on taking the chair, addressed the Common Council in a short appropriate address. The Board then adjourned to the Common Council Chamber, and being again formed the following business was transacted.

Alderman Buckmaster presented the following Resolution:

“Resolved that the thanks of the Common Council be presented to the Honorable Jacob Radcliff, late Mayor of the City, for his able [394] discharge of the duties of the Mayoralty and for his intelligence and impartiality as the presiding Officer of the Board.” which Resolution was unanimously agreed to.

A Petition of N^l Fisk, to be appointed Captain of the City Watch in place of Michael Norris (deceased), was read and referred to the Watch Committee.

The Committee on Public Offices, on the Remonstrance of Daniel E. Smith and others against John N. Johnson as wood Inspector for monopoly, reported:

“That there appears to be no ordinance prohibiting the Inspector of Firewood from purchasing that article for the purpose of resale: they nevertheless view such practices as highly improper, and presume

the Board would discountenance any of the Inspectors who should be guilty of it.

“From the information had on this subject by the Committee [395] however, they are of opinion the charge against said Johnson is unfounded, at least so far as not to require the interference or notice of the Board.

“The Committee have been unable to learn that any thing is alleged against the moral character of Mr. Johnson, neither is he charged with improper performance or neglect of duty as an Inspector: They therefore respectfully recommend he be continued in his Office, and that the Petitioners have leave to withdraw their petition.”

A Petition of the Trustees of the New York Free School, requesting the Corporation to grant them, for the purposes of a School Room, the Room in the Building lately erected at Greenwich for the Watch of the Second District—was read and referred to the Committee on Public Lands and Places.

“The Street Commissioner would therefore respectfully suggest the propriety of an application being made to the Legislature to pass a Law, declaring that no length of possession whatever of any part of any public Street, Road, Way within the said City so encroached upon, shall be available to bar or prevent the correction and removal of any Nuisance by Buildings, Enclosures or otherwise, which have been or may be erected or made within or upon any Street, Road or Way within the City and County of New York.”

[11] The Counsel, agreeably to order, presented the draught of a Memorial to the Legislature and a corresponding Bill, praying a Law may be passed requiring the Commissioner of Excise in this City to give Security for the payment of Money received for Tavern Licences—which was approved, and directed to be engrossed and forwarded to the Legislature.

The Committee on the Fire Department presented a Report on the subject of extending the Fire Limits—which was read and laid for consideration.

The Committee on Assessments, on the Petition of J. Clermont for relief from an assessment of 50 dollars for personal tax for the year 1817, Reported:

“That they have reason to believe the petitioner is unable to pay said assessment, as, by his Affidavit hereunto annexed, he solemnly swears, that at no period of his residence in the United States has he been possessed of or worth Ten thousand dollars, the sum for which he is assessed—nor of any property whatever except wearing apparel or occasional supplies of Money for subsistence.

“That they have examined the same and taken into consideration the propositions therein contained.

" The Committee have no hesitation in saying that the Memorialists have claims on the liberality and indulgence of the Board, and are satisfied that the erection of the contemplated building would put them to much expence and inconvenience which were not expected at the time of the original purchase by the memorialists: but it must also be admitted on the other hand that it would be unreasonable and unjust that they should derive benefit at the public expence from the non-improvement of this lot of ground by the Corporation.

The Finance Committee, on the Petition of Thomas and William Benton, relative to the purchase of a Lot at the corner of Wall and Nassau Streets, reported:

" That there does not appear to the Committee any good reason why the Board should depart from the rule of selling their property at public Sale (should it be determined to dispose of the aforesaid lot,) nor why the petitioners should have a preference over other persons in purchasing.

" If, as is asserted by the petitioners, the lot lately purchased by them is very much depreciated in value by the improvement of Nassau [18] Street; it is not these persons who should complain—as the improvement in the street was made years before they purchased. It is well known also, that the deed accepted by them from the former owners (the heirs of the Gardner Estate) does not bound their Lot in Nassau Street, nor is it believed by the Committee that the petitioners, at the time of purchasing, had any idea of gaining an interest in the lot of ground in question, by making said purchase.

"The reason set forth in the petition, that the lot can be of little use to any person but themselves on account of its width, is altogether unfounded, as, instead of fourteen feet, it is, by actual measurement, twenty one feet in front.

"What is proper to be done with this piece of ground, your Committee are not at present prepared to say—but as respects the application now under consideration, they unanimously recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be rejected."

"It is their opinion that several items placed on the list of Ways and Means ought not to be counted on for the present. It is not probable that the property, either at Varick's or the Albany Basin will produce funds to meet the expences of the current year, in the opinion of the Committee, nor should any reliance be placed on the proposed additional Tax on Tavern Licences, or a tax on Pleasure Carriages. On Motion of Alderman Buckmaster, Thomas Walton, Captain of the Watch of the Second District, was transferred to the First district as Captain of the same, in place of Michael Norris deceased. Reuben Clark was appointed Captain of the Watch of the Second district in place of Captain Walton transferred; and George Reynolds was appointed Assistant to the Captain of the Second district.

The Comptroller presented the sealed [23] proposals which he had received for the Lease of the Public Wharves and Slips for the ensuing year—whereupon the Lobby was cleared, and

The Doors closed.

The Several proposals were opened and examined, and, it appearing that the Proposition of Daniel M. Hitchcock offering the sum of Forty two thousand Seven hundred and fifty Dollars was the highest—Thereupon it was Resolved that a Lease of the Public Docks and Slips, for one year from the First of May next, be given to said Daniel M. Hitchcock, he securing the payment of the said sum of \$42,750—in quarterly payments, the Sureties to be approved by the Mayor & Comptroller.

His Honor the Mayor informed the Common Council, that agreeably to the Charter of the City it is made his duty to appoint a Deputy Mayor, who in his absence or in case of his sickness may supply his place: that being about to leave the City for a short time he had availed himself of the authority vested in him by the Charter to appoint a Deputy Mayor, and had issued a commission to that effect to Thomas R. Smith Alderman of the 5th Ward, to which appointment the sanction of the Governor, as by the Charter is provided, had been given. The Commission to Alderman Smith under the signature of

the Mayor & Seal [27] of Mayoralty being dated the 3^d day of March instant, and the approbation of his Excellency Dewitt Clinton Governor of the State dated the 7th day of March instant, were read. The Oaths, as prescribed by Charter and the Laws, were then administered to Alderman Smith by the Mayor in the presence of the Common Council.

A Memorial of Daniel Mosher, to be appointed a Wood Inspector, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Memorial from the Society established for the prevention of Pauperism, stating that agreeably to the Constitution of said Society the Corporation are entitled to appoint Five members of their body, who when so appointed are Members of the Board of Managers of said Society, and stating they hope that the Corporation will so far give their countenance to the Society as to appoint Five Managers agreeably to the Constitution. Whereupon the said Memorial was referred to the Committee heretofore appointed on the subject of the Poor.

The Committee, to whom at the last Meeting were referred the Memorials & Bills laid before the Board by the Counsel [28] with an intent to be presented to the Legislature—reported that they had examined the same, and now present them to the Board without amendment. Whereupon the following Memorials & Bills were approved and directed to be transmitted to the Legislature now in Session at Albany—Namely—An act to authorize the Mayor &c. to raise money by tax—An act relative to the opening and enlarging Streets in the City of New York—and an Act authorizing the Mayor, Alderman, &c. to close Streets and Roads

The Committee on the Fire Department, on the Resolution (dated) to extend the Fire Limits, Reported on the 9th Instant—which was to day called up and read as follows:

“That they have taken the subject under their peculiar consideration and believe it proper to extend the limits, but your Committee are aware when they are about protecting the City against fire that they should not go so far as to embarrass improvements, and therefore believe it the most proper to recommend small additions to the limits from time to time as the City increases—therefore beg leave to offer the following Resolution.

“Resolved—that application be made to the Legislature at their [29] present Session to extend the limits against the erection of Wooden buildings so as to commence at the East River at the foot of Montgomery Street—up Montgomery to Cherry—thence thro’ Cherry

to Clinton—thence up Clinton to Harman—thence through Harman to Catharine—through Catharine to Chatham—thence down Chatham to Pearl—thence thro' Pearl to Elm—thence thro' Elm to Walker—thence thro' Walker to Beach—thence thro' Beach to the Hudson River, including also the Lots of ground fronting on both sides of said Streets through which the above-mentioned line runs—and including also the Lots of ground fronting on both Sides of Broadway up to Art Street—and that the Counsel present a Bill for that purpose agreeable to the present Law to the Legislature.”

A Petition of J. Andriese and Catharine Romaine, praying payment of a sum awarded to the Owners of a lot, taken for opening First Street, which belonged to them, but was returned as belonging to persons unknown—was read and referred to the Finance Committee and Comptroller.

The Counsel, to whom was referred the Resolutions respecting the establishing of Public Basins between Roosevelt Street and Catharine Slip and between James Slip and Catharine Slip, reported:

“That he has examined the Law relative to the powers of the Corporation to take possession of the Piers and Dock between Roosevelt Street and James Slip, for the purpose of forming a public Slip or Basin.

[31] “That by the 219 Section of the Act relative to the City of

New York the Corporation are authorized to take possession of the "Ground of any person," which may be required for the purpose of forming a Slip. The question therefore which presents itself is whether the property which is required is ground belonging to any person.

"The land under water between the Piers still belongs to the Corporation: the Dock in front of it is a Street or highway; and the Piers on each side are erected on the ground of the Corporation—individuals, however, are entitled to the Wharfage, which may be received from them. All the interest therefore which it is necessary to extinguish is the right of receiving wharfage. This interest is an incorporeal hereditament, or in other words is a right, not to the soil or the land, but to a privilege attached to it growing out of the land.

"As the ground, therefore, does not belong to individuals, and as the power vested in the Corporation is only to take possession of the "ground of any person" it follows that they have not the power of extinguishing the right of individuals to the wharfage.

"By the 227 Section of the same Act it is further provided [32] that the Corporation may lay out Slips or Basins, wherever they may think proper, but it also provides that nothing therein contained shall be so construed as to deprive any person of any private right or property which they may have acquired, or to interfere with any private property or right or privilege held under grants of the Corporation or otherwise—the power therefore of divesting the owners of their property cannot be derived from this Section.

"The Counsel is therefore of opinion that the Corporation do not possess the power of taking possession of the premises for the purposes for which they are required."

"Whereas it is expedient that a public Slip should be laid out on the East River, and that the ground lying and being on the South Side of Front Street between Front Street and the permanent line so called, and between Roosevelt Street and James' Slip should be taken for that purpose

Therefore—"Resolved, that the Street Commissioner and Comptroller be and hereby are authorized to treat with the said owners and parties interested in the said ground for the same, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and that they report to this Board."

[34] The Report of the Street Committee and Street Commissioner on the opening of Oliver Street, was called up, read and agreed to in the words following: "That they have paid due attention to the subject and have caused a correct Map of this property to be made and which is herewith presented, by which it will appear that it will be necessary to take & remove all the buildings lying between the contemplated continuation of Oliver Street & Fayette Street, which space together with Fayette Street will be about 100 feet wide. Your Committee are of opinion that the improvement, if carried into effect, would be a very desirable one, as it would open another direct communication between the Bowery & the River, add much to the beauty and convenience of that part of the City & to the value of the property in Oliver Street. Your Committee would therefore recommend that the prayer of the petitioners be granted & the contemplated improvement carried into effect—provided that Oliver Street be opened to the width of 60 feet from Bancker Street to Chatham Square aforesaid and arrangements made with the proprietors of property on the Easterly side of Fayette Street to advance on front of the easterly line of the contemplated Oliver Street."

Mr. Van Amringe moved that the Board take up the consideration of the Law relative to the Sweeping Chimnies &c. which was agreed to. Alderman Thorp then moved that the further consideration thereof

be postponed until the third Monday in May next. The question being taken thereon, it was carried in the Affirmative. Mr. Van Amringe gave notice that he would at the next meeting move for a reconsideration of the Vote on the said question.

[35] The following Resolution was presented by Alderman Smith, and agreed to:

“Resolved that the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the case of Fourth Street be requested to assess to this Corporation the value of a certain Lot or Gore of land at the intersection of the Bowery and Fourth Street, belonging to the heirs of John Norman, in order that the Corporation may become possessed of the same.”

Upon the verbal representation of the Counsel, it was moved that the communication of the Street Commissioner on the subject of encroachments on Streets and Roads, which had been agreed to at the last meeting of the Board, be reconsidered—which having been unanimously agreed to, the same was reconsidered and directed to be laid on the Table.

On motion of Alderman Brackett, Resolved—that a Committee be appointed to take the opinion of Counsel, in addition to that of the Counsel of the Board, respecting the powers given to the Corporation by the Law of the State in relation to Wharves, Piers and Slips. The Committee appointed were Aldermen Brackett Smith Holmes

The Minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved. A Petition of William Cairns for permission to construct a Vault in the Street in Park Place, was read and granted on usual terms.

A Petition of James W. Lent, requesting permission to deposit Materials in Water and Broad Streets for purpose of a dwelling

house he was about erecting—A Petition from Samuel Disbrow and others owning lots fronting on Market Street between Lombardy and Henry Streets, requesting permission to occupy one half of the Street for the purpose of depositing [37] Building Materials thereon to be used for buildings they are about erecting—were severally read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the respective Wards with authority to grant the prayer of the Petitioners.

A Petition of Daniel Perrin for Stall No. 19 Fly Market, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Jane Renwick, Administratrix of William Renwick deceased, was received, stating that a Lot owned by the Estate of said Renwick at the corner of Greenwich and Canal Streets is directed to be paved—that that part of the street is not yet regulated, and therefore the paving of the same at the present time is not proper: and praying relief—whereupon, the same was referred to the Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Charles Day, for appointment of Measurer of Grain—and of Henry J. Kingsland for appointment of Inspector of Stone—were read and referred to the Committee of Applications.

A Representation in behalf of a Tuscarora Indian, who has been in the City some time learning the Carpenter's [38] Trade which is considered as being of great utility among the Indian tribe to which he belongs, and recommending some pecuniary aid to be granted to him—was read and referred to Aldermen Holmes Brackett Buckmaster.

A Petition of B. Romaine was received, stating that in December last he obtained from the Corporation permission to construct a Vault in Hudson Street, but in proceeding in the Work the Workmen came across an old Vault of considerable magnitude, and which extended some distance into the street—that he proceeded to construct his vault, and after the same was nearly completed the whole, in consequence of the old vault, fell in—and praying relief—which was referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of John B. Fiora, praying further time for payment of an Assessment for paving and flagging Broadway, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of sundry persons, Quarrymen and Boatmen employed in the portage [39] of Stone, stating that difficulties and disputes frequently arise respecting what constitutes a Carman's Load of Stone, and recommending the creation of an Office of Inspector of

Stone and the appointment of a person to fill that Office—was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

A Petition from Sundry Owners of lots, praying that Collect Street from Pearl Street to Franklin Street, and Leonard Street from Orange Street to Elm Street be regulated and paved—was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Elbert Anderson and Theodorus Bailey, praying that a Triangular lot of ground at the corner of Chatham and Chamber Streets, leased to them by the Corporation, may be sold to E. Anderson in Fee—was read and referred to the Finance Committee and Comptroller.

A Petition of Stephen Whitney, Moses Jaques and John Lang, stating that they wish to improve their property in White Hall Street between Bridge and Pearl Streets, and to place those buildings on a straight line from Bridge Street—and requesting direction in the premises [40] was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Jacob Halsey and Daniel D. Wickham, praying that an Assessment for Canal Street laid upon the Church in Spring Street may be remitted—was read and referred to the Finance Committee and Comptroller.

A Remonstrance from sundry Owners of Lots against the proposed lowering of Pearl Street near Franklin Square was read.

A Petition of Benjamin U. Coles, stating that he is about erecting a Four Story Building at the corner of Broad, Pearl and Bridge Streets—that by the Survey of the Street Commissioner the line of his proposed Building fronting on Broad Street is carried off the Street and runs diagonally which will give an unsightly appearance to the Street—and praying them he may be permitted to erect his building on a line from the Northwest corner of Bridge and Broad Streets to the Southwest corner of Pearl and Broad Streets—Whereupon the same was referred to the Street Committee, Street Commissioner and Attorney

The Committee on the subject of Vaccination on a Resolution relative to the expediency of extending its benefits to the poor, reported, on March 4th

“That from the personal observations of your Committee, from an intercourse with physicians and from a reference to the recorded opinions of Medical writers on the efficacy of the Kine Pock, Your Committee are led to believe that it deserves to be ranked among the greatest blessings ever bestowed upon mankind.

“So unanimous are the best informed persons in every civilized country, in this opinion, that your Committee are induced to consider the preventive powers of the Kine Pock as firmly established as the most undoubted truths in literature or science not susceptible of mathematical demonstration.

“And, it does not appear that any important discovery, whether the result of accident or research, ever met with more favorable reception in every portion of the globe. Even the system of inoculating with the small pox, when first introduced into England by Lady Montague, experienced far more opposition.

“On the propriety of this Board making provision for the further diffusion of the benefits of the Kine Pock, Your Committee would remark that [42] the Practice of Vaccination has been encouraged by legislative and Municipal bounty in every country where it has been once introduced. Your Committee instance the Acts of the British Parliament, the Imperial and Royal Decrees of the European Courts and even the Ukases of the Russian Emperor.

“The attention which has been bestowed on this subject by the Congress of the United States, and by most of the State Legislatures is too well known to require comment.

“The Poor of our City suffer particularly from the neglect of vaccination. It is therefore incumbent on the Board to make provision for them—and the most economical mode of attaining this object has been the subject of consideration by your Committee.

“They remark that the City Dispensary now receives from the Board the sum of Five hundred dollars annually, not for gratuitous vaccination, but for medical attendance on the poor, generally. And it is understood that the Remuneration (necessarily small) made to the physicians of this Establishment would be no consideration for the trouble and loss of time incident to vaccinating the poor at their places of resi- [43] dence and afterwards attending to repeat the operation, or to satisfy themselves that the disease has been communicated.

“It appears that the Institution has divided the City into Six districts, to each of which a Physician is assigned. The Committee are of opinion that thro’ these physicians the benefit of vaccination should be farther extended to the poor

“And therefore recommend an annual appropriation of Six hundred Dollars (during the pleasure of the Board) to the City Dispensary, in consideration of their vaccinating the poor of the City, not only at their Public Establishment, but at the Houses of the Poor, in all cases where they wish the operation performed at their places

of abode, or where the names of persons wishing to be vaccinated may be furnished by any Member of the Corporation:

“ Provided, always, that the Trustees of the Dispensary shall make to the Board an annual report of the number of persons vaccinated designating whether done at the Establishment or out of it, the Physician by whom the operation was performed, the residence of the person vaccinated, and whether the Disease was actu- [44] ally communicated.”

That the object of the same is proper for the general interest of the City, and that they recommend that the Counsel do draft a Memorial to the Legislature for a Law to authorize the appointment of such officers—Whereupon, the same was directed to be referred to the Attorney in the absence of the Counsel for his opinion whether the

Corporation did not possess the right to create and appoint such officers without a Law of the State to that effect.

The Committee on Public Lands, on the Petition of the New York Free School, Society for the use of a Room, Reported, as follows:— That they

“ have taken the same into consideration, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petition [46] should be granted.

“ The petitioners pray to be allowed the use of the upper part of the Engine House at Greenwich for two years, for the purpose of extending the benefits of the Free School Establishment to the Inhabitants of Greenwich.

“ The Committee, deeming the subject of education to be of the utmost importance to the present as well as to future generations, consider the application of the Trustees of the New York Free School as deserving of notice, and the object worthy of encouragement.

“ The Room over the Engine House above referred to being unoccupied, your Committee think that it cannot be appropriated to a better purpose for the present than to employ it for the purposes of Education. Wherefore they recommend that a lease be given to the Trustees of the New York Free School of the room over the Engine House at Greenwich for two years from 1st May 1818.”

[47] The Road Committee, on the Communication of Robert Latimer wishing to abandon his Contract for the 8th Avenue, Reported:

“ That they have had the same under consideration and are fully of the opinion that said Latimer should be released from his engagements, and be paid Two thousand dollars upon giving up his Contract and signing a Receipt in full for his claims in working the Eighth Avenue. The Committee are led to recommend this course of proceeding from the following considerations.

“ From the best information and a personal knowledge of Mr. Latimer, your Committee believe that he is an industrious and hard working man, willing but unable to complete his contract for the want of means. It appears also that he has been led into erroneous calculations and a dependence upon promises of aid which were never fulfilled. It being impossible for him to proceed, and having given no

security, there is no other course left for the Corporation than to accept of his abandonment and compromise with him.

“With respect to the amount of Two thousand Dollars, as [48] proposed to be given on settlement, your Committee have made the following Calculation.

“The Contract for working the Eighth Avenue was Fifteen Thousand dollars. Mr. Latimer has finished, and the Committee with the Street Commissioner have accepted rather more than one third of said Avenue. Five thousand five hundred dollars have been paid the Contractor, and being now unable to proceed, he claims Four thousand dollars for work done on other parts of the Avenue not accepted, but your Committee have estimated that about Two thousand dollars would be in proportion to the Contract for the whole, and as he has finally concluded to accept of Two thousand instead of Four thousand, a settlement with him is accordingly recommended, and that a Warrant pass in favor of the Street Commissioner for Two thousand dollars to effect the same.

“Your Committee would farther recommend in order to complete the Eighth Avenue, that the Work should be contracted for on small portions of it at a time, and that for the ensuing season not more than Twenty five hundred [49] dollars be appropriated for said Avenue.”

The Committee of Charity, on the Petition of Magdalen Eagles, praying relief from an assessment on her property for opening Canal Street, reported:

“That they have long considered the principle as conclusively established that the Corporation, as the agents of the parties damaged or benefitted by opening or improving Streets, are not bound either by justice or equity to remit any assessment imposed for that purpose.

“The present case however in the opinion of your Committee, claims the sympathy and commiseration of the Board. The Petitioner states, that she is now in the 70th year of her age; that she is the widow of Thomas Eagles, a Soldier of the Revolution; and that she

is utterly incapable of doing [52] any thing for her subsistence, and has no dependence except the small income amounting to about one hundred dollars per year derived from the property assessed.

"The Committee candidly confess, that the veneration they feel for the heroes of our Revolution, whose exertions, privations and sufferings have effected the elevated situation of this country, and thro' whose means under providence we enjoy all the comforts and privileges of which human nature is susceptible, has had a strong influence on their minds in forming an opinion on this subject. The widow of a Revolutionary Soldier, therefore, who is now in years more than threescore and ten, will not appeal in vain to the philanthropy of the gentlemen composing this Board who, as she truly says, "would rather add to, than diminish her comforts."

The Committee respectfully recommend that a Warrant pass for Thirty dollars to be applied to the payment of the assessment on the property of Magdalen Eagles for opening Canal Street."

A Communication was received from the Reverend John Stanford, communicating a Manuscript Copy of a Catechism composed by himself for the use of the Children in the school of the Alms House—and also requesting to be permitted to take of [from] the Clerk's Office occasionally one of the volumes of the Minutes of the Council to enable him to complete an historical account of the public Buildings of the City which he is now engaged in—which was ordered to be referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

[62] A Petition of Josephine Du Bourg, a native of Saint Domingo, praying some pecuniary aid to enable her to join her husband now in France—was read and referred to the Committee of Charity, with authority to grant aid to Petitioner in a sum not exceeding Fifty dollars.

A Petition of Abraham Fisher, requesting a Licence for his son a Minor to drive a Cart—was read and referred to the Deputy Mayor, with authority to grant the prayer of Petitioner.

A Petition of William Pye for permission to construct a Vault in Chamber Street, and one of John Adams for a vault in the same Street, were granted on the usual terms.

A similar Petition of Elbert Anderson for a Vault in Chamber Street was granted: and a petition of Mr. Anderson to construct a Brick Cistern in the Street—was referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of the Heirs of John Post, for a Water Grant, and permission to sink a Bulkhead on the Lot at Corlaer's Hook belonging to the Estate [63]—was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Street Commissioner and Comptroller.

A Petition of John Ackerman to be permitted to remove a small Frame House from the corner of Washington and Harrison Streets to the corner of Harrison Street and Rhinelander's Alley—was read and leave granted on condition that the Petitioner employed a Truck for the removal of said Building.

A Petition of Charles Caharty, for Remission of Penalty for keeping a disorderly house on Sunday, was read and leave given to Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition of Alexander R. Wilson, to be appointed a City Weigher, was read and granted.

A Petition of Samuel Johnson, to be appointed a Measurer of Grain, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition of Joseph F. Margin, praying a Loan of a Sum of money—was read and referred to the Committee on Charity.

[64] A Representation or Request of Daniel M. Hitchcock, Contractor for the Public Docks and Slips, that the payments to be made by him may be made in 4 equal Instalments, the first to commence on the 1st of November next and the last on the 1st November following—was read and referred to the Committee of Finance.

A Remonstrance of Sundry Inhabitants of the First Ward residing near White Hall and Bridge Street against the alterations prayed for on said Street by Messrs. Whitney and others—was read and referred to the Committee on that subject

Namely The Street Committee and The Street Commissioner.

A Memorial of Samuel Jones of Oyster Bay in Queens' County was received, stating that he some years since ceded to the Corporation two streets in the Eighth Ward named Jones Street and Bond Street—that, by some inaccuracy of the Surveyor who run out the said Streets, the Northerly line of Jones' Street varies from the line in the Deed of Cession and is a few inches too far north on the Bowery, and about two feet too far north [65] on Broad Way—that the only buildings erected are one erected by Peter Hattrich, another by Joseph Graham, by David S. Jones and Petitioner—that the Buildings erected are upon the line of the Streets as now laid out: and praying that the South westerly corner of the building erected by said Peter Hattrich and the Southeasterly corner of the Building erected by said Joseph Graham may be considered as standing on the Northerly side of Jones Street, and that a line from Broad Way to the Bowery through those points be the future Northerly Line of that street—and that the Southerly line of Jones' Street and the lines of Bond Street be corrected in conformity to said alteration—Whereupon, it was resolved, that the prayer of said

Memorialist be granted and that the lines of the said Street be hereafter considered to run as above described and set forth.

A Petition of William Hunter and Thomas Morrell, Lessees of the Ferry at Grand Street, was received, stating that from various causes they have been unable to establish the Boats on their Ferry within the time prescribed in their lease—and praying an extension of the time. Whereupon, resolved that the Petitioners have time for 4 months from this date for placing [66] said Boats on the Ferry.

A Petition of Walter Covert was received, stating that in May last he took out a License from the Mayor to retail spirituous liquors—which license he lost; that he has been twice prosecuted for selling liquor without license and not being able to produce the License recoveries have been had against him and he has paid the fines thereon—that lately he has been able to produce testimony, which he hoped would be satisfactory to the Common Council, of his having taken out said License—and therefore prayed the monies so paid might be refunded to him. A Deposition by himself of the fact, and of John Ryan and John Wright of having seen such a License in Petitioner's possession, and of Eliza Ryan that her husband compared his License with a License of petitioner's and that they were alike—accompanied the Petition. Whereupon, the same was referred to the Committee on Public Offices and the Attorney.

The Attorney, to whom in the absence of the Counsel was referred the Report of the Committee on Laws on the subject of appointing an Inspector of Shin- [67] gles and a Measurer of Cut Stone and Laths, reported That

“The Petitioner complains of impositions practised in the measurement of hewn stone and in the sale of Marcus Lath, and prays that the same may be regulated by Law, and that a Measurer of hewnstone may be appointed and an Inspector of Lath.

“By the Charter of the City the Corporation possess the power of regulating the measuring and surveying of Commodities in the City; and also the power of passing all Laws which they may deem necessary for the good government and welfare of the City, provided such laws be not contrary to the constitution and acts of the Legislature of the state.

“It is from this general source that the Corporation have derived the power which they have always exercised, and which he has never heard doubted, of passing and enforcing several laws of a similar nature to the one required by the annexed petition viz—the Law to regulate the sale & inspection of Lime—the Law to prevent fraud in

the sale of vegetables—to regulate the sale and inspection of Firewood, Hay &c. These laws all refer to articles or commodities intended for home consumption or for the use [68] of the City.

“The Act of the Legislature, entitled an Act for the Inspection of Lumber, like all the Inspection laws of the State, applies only to such articles as are intended for exportation, and was enacted with a view only to foreign markets. It imposes no regulations on articles consumed or used in the City, and would not therefore clash with any local arrangement of the place.

“As the Petition refers to articles intended for home consumption or City use, and prays for a Law to prevent frauds and impositions practised in the sale and measurement of those articles, the Attorney is of opinion that the Corporation have the power of passing the law required without an Application to the Legislature for that purpose.”

“That as the Law called for by the Petitioners would apply to the inspection of Shingles intended for home consumption only—and as the State laws relating to the Inspection of Lumber applies only to Lumber [69] to be exported, he is of opinion that the Corporation have the power to make the regulation required, and that in so doing they would not contravene any existing act of the Legislature or exceed the power given to them by the Charter.”

Skinner, stating that he had entered into a Contract with the Corporation to complete the Upper Divisions of the Third Avenue—that there were peculiar circumstances in his case—and he requested that a Committee might be appointed to make a settlement with him. Whereupon, it was referred to the Road Committee, with authority to make a settlement with Mr. Skinner on the subject of his said Contract.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants, praying the Removal of a House standing in Lispenard Street—was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 5th Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of the Pawnbrokers, praying that the price of the Licenses may be reduced to Twenty dollars—and also praying that the proper Officer may be directed to enforce the Law respecting Pawnbrokers against persons who are acting as Pawnbrokers without Licenses, was read—Whereupon, the former part was referred to the Committee on Laws and the latter to the City Intendant.

[89] A Remonstrance against the proposed regulation of Vestry Street, was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Sundry Inhabitants, that Avenue "D" may be opened and regulated from its intersection with Columbia Street until it joins the East River, was read and referred to the Road Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Henry Shop, occupying Stall No. 37 Fly Market, and praying Stall No. 35 Catharine Market be granted to him, the present Occupant John Akly being willing to relinquish the same—A Petition from John McCready for Stall No. 35 Catharine Market—a Petition of Samuel Piercy for grant of the same Stall—and a Petition from Richard Ford for Stall No. 7 Fly Market—were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Peter Allaire complaining of an Assessment by the Assessors of Taxes beyond the Sum at which he ought to be assessed—was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

[90] A Petition of Hugh Maxwell, for permission to construct a Vault in Hester Street, was referred to the Street Commissioner with authority to grant the same on usual terms.

A Petition of the Keepers of Livery Stables, praying that the Stands for Hackney Carriages may be abolished—was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner, with the addition of Aldermen Thorp Buckmaster & Mr Allen.

A Petition of Thomas Adams, praying permission to remove on Trucks a small Frame house from Park Place to Collect Street—was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the ward and Street Commissioner, with authority to grant the prayer of Petitioner. A similar petition of Hugh Smith to remove a house from Harman Street to Lombardy Street was granted under similar directions.

A Petition was received from Samuel M^cCoun, stating that his Cellar had been overflowed with water from springs in the vicinity of his dwelling house [91] No. 14 Broadway—and praying permission to construct a Drain to communicate with the Drain in Beaver Street to carry off the water from his cellar—which was referred to the Street Commissioner, with authority to permit the Petitioner at his own expence and under the direction of the Street Commissioner to construct a Drain for the purpose aforesaid.

A Petition of Sundry Boatmen and others who are in the habit of bringing building and other Stone to the New York Market for sale, praying that some regulation may be made defining what shall constitute a Load of Stone—was read and referred to the Committee on that subject; namely: Aldermen Thorp Buckmaster Kip and The Attorney.

A Petition of Moses Jacques, stating that he is about erecting a house in Whitehall Street and praying to be permitted to place building Materials in the Street, was referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the First Ward, with authority to grant the prayer of Petitioner.

[92] A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants in Liberty Street, praying that the Drain or Sewer leading from Liberty Street to Maiden Lane may be opened and cleansed; and a Report of the Street Commissioner, stating that he had viewed the premises and recommending that the prayer of Petitioners be granted, being read, it was resolved that Petitioners have leave, at their own expence and under the direction of the Street Commissioner, to open and cleanse said Drain.

A Petition of William A. Hardenbrook, requesting to be permitted to remain in the house, lately owned by him and conveyed to the Cor-

poration, until the removal of said house shall become necessary for the opening of the Tenth Avenue, was read and referred to the Finance Committee and Comptroller.

The following appointment of Fire-man was made. (the Chief Engineer certifying the vacancy:

“Beside which, the Record kept of the Licenses granted by his Honor the Mayor has been examined by the Committee, and they are satisfied, from the apparent accuracy with which the Entries are made, had any license been granted Walter Covert for the year 1817, it would have appeared by said Record.

“That they have been at considerable pains to examine the situation and ascertain the value of the two several parcels of land in question.

“The piece of land to be conveyed by Mr. Lenox consists of 4 Lots, 2 held by him in fee and 2 on lease, at Ten dollars per annum each, one for 5 the other for 7 years from 1st May next, lying together, fronting on the 6th and extending toward the [104] 7th Avenue, containing 20 $\frac{3}{4}$ Acres:—these lots are Nos. 169, 168, 167 & 166 in the Corporation Map of Public lands.

“The property is under considerable improvements, is principally a smooth but elevated piece of ground, with about 200 fruit trees of various descriptions, and on the 6th Avenue is enclosed with a good substantial fence. On the North and East Boundary however it is either open, or the fence is of little or no value. 100 dollars per annum are offered for the 4 lots during the continuance of the present lease.

“Mr. Lenox is to receive from the Corporation a Deed for 3 lots Nos. 125, 128, 131 on the aforesaid Map containing 16 $\frac{1}{2}$ Acres, which are now under lease to him for 5 years from 1st May next at 10 dollars per annum each—This property extends from the 5th to the 6th Avenue and is about half a mile nearer the City than the preceding—but it is not so well improved nor is it naturally so valuable a piece of land: the fences are poor and a part of the ground rough and uneven.

“After weighing the subject well, and exercising their best judgment, the Committee have agreed [105] that the exchange be effected on receiving from Mr. Lenox the sum of Five hundred dollars—which proposition has been acceded to by him, and the necessary measures are taken to complete the Arrangement.

“The Committee beg leave to recommend that the Comptroller be instructed to lease out for the term of 5 years from 1st of May

next, either by public auction or private contract the property thus reverting to the Corporation."

The Letter (containing the opinion) of Richard Harrison, addressed to Alderman Brackett, was as follows:

New York, 24 March 1818

J. Warren Brackett Esqr.

"In consequence of your letter of the 13th inst. I have considered "the question therein stated, and am of opinion

"1—That the Corporation may legally take and occupy land covered with water for the purposes mentioned in your letter, [107] where water grants have not been given or applied for, or interfering improvements made under the 221st Section of the general Act.

"2. With respect to the Second question that they may take and occupy any land with its improvements for the said purposes where

“ they have never given any grants for the same, unless the possessors
“ have become entitled to the property under the said Section, or have
“ been so long in possession as to have created a Right to it. In
“ either of the latter cases, I am of opinion that the Occupants should
“ be considered as owners or parties interested in the ground, and
“ treated with accordingly.

“ 3. I am of opinion upon the Third question that the rights of
“ the Corporation stand upon the same footing as those of individuals
“ in similar cases. If there was an agreement for a grant it might
“ be enforced in equity, and draw with it the arrears of Rent, pro-
“ vided it was in writing or under circumstances which would justify
“ a Decree for specific performance. If there was no such agreement,
“ the Party who took possession without legal authority, was a wrong-
“ doer, and may be proceeded against as such.

[108] “ 4. I am of opinion that the Corporation can, under the
“ Laws of the State relating to Slips, obtain the waters, Right of
“ Wharfage and interest in the Bulkheads and Piers which are men-
“ tioned in your letter, as far as they are necessary for the Slips now
“ contemplated, by virtue of the 219th and 228th Sections of the general
“ Act. The Proviso at the end of the last mentioned section seems to
“ present the only plausible objection to this doctrine: but as this
“ proviso, if literally taken, would in every instance defeat the powers
“ granted to the Corporation, where they might interfere with any
“ private property; and would thus be repugnant to the other parts of
“ the Law, any construction should be resorted to which might pre-
“ vent an inconvenience so great and so manifest. I am therefore
“ of opinion, that the Proviso was meant only to restrain the depriving
“ of individuals of their property, rights and privileges, without making
“ them a reasonable compensation: and that such is the just exposition
“ of the Statute, when the different parts are compared with each
“ other.

“ It may indeed be said that the Corporation is only entitled to take
“ ground for Slips—by the 219th Section of the Act, and that Wharf-
“ age [109] and Slippage do not fall under the description. The
“ objection however does not appear to be solid. Those payments
“ are taken by reason of the ground and of the improvements upon
“ it; and when the Right to the Soil is taken away, they go with it as
“ mere appendages.

“ I ought perhaps to apologize for not sending you my opinion
“ sooner upon these points; but I have been so much indisposed since

" I saw you and till the present time, that I had neither strength nor
" spirits for the attention requisite to their consideration."

It was then moved that the consideration of the subject be postponed until the next meeting of the Board—which was lost. Mr. Van Amringe then presented the following:

" Resolved, that the Counsel of the Board be instructed to proceed forthwith in the legal measures necessary to be taken to put this Board in possession of the Waters between the foot of Roosevelt Street and James' Slip and the waters between the foot of Oliver Street and Catharine Slip both on the East River. The question being, at the request of Mr. Stevens, divided [110] as to the two Basins contemplated, the divisions were severally agreed to, and the Counsel was directed to take order accordingly.

The following Communication was received from Richard Varick Esquire, relative to the Resolution of the 23^d inst.

" The Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York "
" Gentlemen—

" On the 24th instant I received from the Clerk of the Common
" Council a certified Copy of a Resolution of the Board, of the 23^d,
" touching the bounds of the Street now called Bleecker Street, which
" has occasioned a controversy between us, that has been apparently as
" eagerly sought for by your agents, as it was unwillingly entered into
" on my part, and which I do not at this moment feel myself at
" liberty and ready to abandon.

" I have also received a Duplicate of the Resolution, under cover
" of a letter of this date, from John M^cComb, wherein he names his
" Two Surveyors, to wit Stephen Ludlum and Edward Doughty, who
" cannot be deemed impartial characters, as they have prejudged the
" Cause in their Certificate to the Alderman and Assistant [111] of the
" Eighth Ward and Doctor Graves, upon whose Report you have
" acted.

" In this state of things, it is proper and respectful in me, promptly
" to inform you, that with the mature advice of Counsel I cannot now
" accede to the proposition contained in your Resolution.

" I avail myself of this opportunity, again to admonish the Com-
" mon Council, as I have done their Street Commissioner and other
" known agents, to desist from the trespasses begun and pursued to
" some extent in digging away my ground and destroying my fences

"and buildings, and which have not been wholly discontinued, even
"since the 9th instant."

It was then moved that the Memorial of Richard Varick which was presented on the 9th instant, but the reading of which on account of its great length was dispensed with be now read—which was agreed to, and the said Memorial was read. A Representation was presented from Mr. Bleeker the Comptroller exculpatory of some charges made against him in said Memorial—which Representation was read. After some prefatory observations by Mr. [112] Akerly, he presented certain Resolutions hereafter inserted. On the question of agreeing to the same being taken, it was carried in the Affirmative. It was then resolved that the said Memorial of Richard Varick, the Representation of the Comptroller and the Resolutions be entered at length on the Minutes: and the Street Commissioner was directed to proceed under the direction of the Counsel.

(Here follow the aforesaid Memorial, Representation and Resolutions.)

"Memorial of Richard Varick Esqr."

"To the Honorable the Common Council of the City of New York."

Gentlemen—

"It falls to my unfortunate lot again to address you (altho' I have hardly bodily strength or animal spirits sufficient, since my late severe illness, which commenced on the day on which I last wrote to you, to make this Epistle as full and pointed as my case requires) on the subject of the injury to my Real Estate lying between Thompson and Sullivan Streets and bounded on the late Samuel David's Street: yet my duty requires that I should not be silent.

"Let me then observe to you, [113] that on the Nineteenth day of January last I addressed to you a respectful Memorial, stating to you that I was the Proprietor of that Square of ground; that I had purchased it from Robert Benson Esquire about sixteen years ago: that Mr. Benson derived title thereto from the late Jolin W. Watkins Esquire; and that about twenty five or twenty six years ago, the said John W. Watkins built a dwelling house on the premises near Sullivan Street, and a Stable and Carriage house on the North west cor-

ner of the square, on Samuel David's Street, and also a Green house on the North bounds thereof and on the line of Samuel David's Street.

"I likewise stated to you, that the late Anthony Bleecker owned all the lands East of my Square and on both sides of Samuel David's Street, which was then opened Eastward no further than Wooster or Third Street; and that Mr. Bleecker also owned the Square north of my ground: and if I recollect right, I also made known to you that to my own knowledge, and that of others yet living, the said Anthony Bleecker had encroached on the North Side of Samuel David's Street more than ten feet, as far as his lands were bounded thereon: and I also stated to you that upon Actual measurement from [114] my North Bounds, or the South bounds of Samuel David's Street, to the North bounds of Nicholas Bayard's Lands, as laid down on the Map thereof, there was an abundant Surplus of ground for Samuel David's Street (of fifty feet in breadth and more) and for all the Lots north thereof, as appeared from a Copy of one of the Maps of that land, which I had purchased, to ascertain my rights, from one of the late Surveyors of the City: No Map thereof being to be found in the Street Commissioner's Office, which ought to have been; but, as has since been discovered one was concealed among the papers of the late Mr. Goerck, in the City Comptroller's office, who is the son of the late W. A. Bleecker.

"In that Memorial I also represented to the Common Council, that the Contractor for digging out Samuel David's Street, (the name of which has been lately changed to Bleecker Street,) had so far advanced in digging out that Street as soon to endanger my Buildings and Fences, which being of Stone foundations and paved within and without, could not, together with the Fences, with safety to my garden be removed at that season of the year; and I therefore solicited the Common Council to give such orders [115] to the person or persons employed by them, in digging out and regulating that street, in the exercise of their rights, so to conduct themselves that my individual property might not be injured or impaired.

"This my Memorial was presented to the Common Council, and, as I was afterwards by accident informed, that it had been read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward, together with the Street Commissioner, to take order, so far only as to prevent my property being injured; but without any instructions to examine into the truth of my allegations, with respect to the encroachment of Anthony Bleecker on Samuel David's Street, as for measurement. to

ascertain whether there was or was not Surplus ground for that street, now called Bleecker Street, and the Lots north of it. And such the event has proved for that Committee have not reported on it, nor returned the papers to the Clerk's Office, where I have in vain applied for official papers thereof.

"I was afterwards advised that some days after the 19th of January, when the digging had very nearly approached my ground, Mr. McComb had imparted such order of the Board to the Contractor: but I have since been informed, that his conduct and language [116] on that occasion were as least equivocal.

"As soon as I was informed of the Reference, I sought for Mr. McComb at the Street Commissioner's Office, but he was not then to be found there: Afterwards however I met him in the front of the Hall, and I mentioned to him the references, and that I wished to attend the Committee to measure the ground: and I beg leave now to state to you, Gentlemen, that on that occasion Mr. McComb very significantly and in a voice of tone and manner which indicated Importance, answered me—"There was no necessity of measuring—It had been before that sufficiently measured." This unsuitable answer to a citizen at least his equal in every point of view, and who complained of inaccurate measurement, together with his answer to me before I presented my Memorial to the Board; when stating to him that the ground was mine, he answered with an air—"That the Corporation ought not to take my ground"—thereby insinuating at least that the ground within my inclosure was not mine—And on another occasion, when I observed to him that the pavements and fences could not be taken up in winter, he answered very tauntingly "That there was some- [117] times open weather in which the fences and pavements could be removed," induced me to believe that there was no justice to be obtained from such a man, and that moreover there was some secret in the business which had never been disclosed to me.

"Permit me, Gentlemen, further to state, that a few days thereafter I was advised that if Mr. McComb had really given any order to the Contractor, interdicting him from proceeding, it was not complied with, and that my ground at the North East Corner thereof was actually dug down, and at the Corner of my fence excavated and undetermined.

"To be satisfied of the truth of this information, I walked out to my place, in extreme cold weather, on the 31st January, and found the information I had received to be correct.

“ Having thus in person viewed the Trespass, I did, on the second day of February last, address a long letter to the “ Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Assistants or Common Councilmen in Common Council,” complaining of the encroachment and Trespass: and I moreover stated to you, that I myself, together with the persons under whom I claimed, had been in the quiet possession of that Square for twenty five years, [118] which gave me title against all the world: and I again repeated to you, that there was an abundant Surplus of ground, north of my ground, to satisfy the claim of the public and Individuals, and that there were no improvements on the North side of Bleeker Street to prevent the scite of that street being corrected, and many other matters not necessary to be here repeated.

“ This letter was of necessity sent by me to the City Hall by a Servant; for at that moment I was taken ill of a severe pleurisy, and have been confined to my Bed and sick chamber for near a month: and during that time remained unadvised of what had taken place.

“ On my recovery I was informed by a friend that my letter had been referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 8th Ward and Street Commissioner, and that there had been a Report made thereon, in consequence of which the Contractor, whose name I have been since informed is John Sloan, had been authorized by the Common Council to proceed in his course of digging down my ground and destroying my Buildings and Fences as a part of Bleeker Street, in which Mr. Sloan has manfully acted the part assigned him.

[119] “ I have lately, thro’ a friend, obtained from the Clerk’s Office of the Common Council an official copy of the Report of that Committee: But it does not appear whether that Committee had or had not any instructions as to the line of conduct to be pursued by them, as ought to have appeared, unless it may be inferred from the certificate of the Surveyors thereto annexed, both of which I beg leave to repeat and record in this place, to preserve a Record thereof as an honorable and important public document for my use, lest they should be purloined or withdrawn, as other papers have heretofore been, from among the Common Council Records and not returned there again.

“ The Report of the Committee to the Common Council is in these words to wit:

“ The Alderman and Assistant of the Eighth Ward and Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the Memorial of Richard “ Varick Esqr. respecting a supposed encroachment on his premises, by “ the digging out and regulating Bleeker Street, Report: That they

“have caused a Survey to be made by two of the City Surveyors, (a certificate of which accompanies this Report,) by which it will appear that Mr. Varick has no cause of complaint of an encroachment, [120] as his Stable stands within two inches of the true line, and his Fence stands ten feet on Bleecker Street, giving all the ground, according to the Map of the Block he purchased—Your Committee are therefore of the opinion, that the Contractor for regulating Bleecker Street ought to be permitted to proceed, as he is suffering considerable damage by delay.”

“We have, as directed, measured the Block of Ground owned by R. Varick Esqr. between Houston and Bleecker Streets, on the Northwest side of Thompson Street and find that the Northeast end of Mr. Varick's Stable is 407 feet 10 inches from the north East side of Houston Street, being two inches back from the line of Bleecker Street. The fence of Mr. Varick's enclosure stands ten feet six inches on Bleecker Street, allowing said Bleecker Street to be fifty feet wide at that point.”

City Surveyors.

I beg leave further to state to you, [121] Gentlemen, that I am informed from official authority, that the Report of the Committee above transcribed was accepted and approved by the Common Council, without a dissenting voice, altho' there were then present several high-minded and otherwise very correct men of both political parties; and the Contractor was directed to proceed in his illegal and high handed work of destruction.

“I now assure you, Gentlemen, that I possibly may have laboured under a mistake, until my reading this Report and the accompanying information that the Common Council had approved the same imparted to me the first intimation thereof, that the Common Council of the City of New York, their Committee, their Street Commissioners, or Surveyors, or any of them had the power thus promptly and summarily, and that without a hearing, to decide upon the titles of lands

which the Statute Law of the State, commonly called the Statute of limitations, guarantees to the possessor and declares good and indefeasible title to the owner of such lands.

“ I have been hitherto unwilling to ascribe to the members composing the Common Council improper or unworthy motives for their conduct [122] toward me, but as a man who for near half a century, both in and out of public service, and that without reproach, have earned my property. I am unwilling to part with this part of it, which in the first purchase thereof, as well as in subsequent improvements, has cost me very large sums of money, without the best evidences of right to it being exhibited, and that in a legal cause by my adversaries, whose claim, in this instance, appears to me to be novel, and as extraordinary in the means to enforce it.

“ I have sometimes been led to suppose that upon the solicitations of Mr. Bleecker, and the probable want of correct information from the then Street Commissioner and some of the City Surveyors, of the quantity of ground north of Samuel David's Street, and perhaps the sinister conduct of some one or more designing individuals in a past Common Council, that [the] Board have incautiously permitted Mr. Bleecker to encroach on the North side of Samuel David's Street opposite to his land, when the name of that street was changed to Bleecker Street, and the same carried thro' Eastward from Third or Wooster Street to the Broad way :

[123] “ And at other times, that the Corporation, in the ideal plenitude of their power, had boldly tho' covertly agreed with Mr. Bleecker to convey to him or to permit him in silence to occupy ground along the North side of Samuel David's Street and thus encrease the value of his estate there, on condition that he would, for the aggrandisement of his own estate, lay out the street now called Bleecker Street from Wooster Street to the Broad way, and give in the Surplus ground which he owned South of the South line of Samuel David's Street to be continued to the Broadway; and had then determined to claim from myself and Mr. Nicholas Law and from me particularly in a manner not the most delicate and unexceptionable, or even legal manner, the ground which was supposed to be Surplus ground within my enclosure. The after piece favors the latter supposition.

“ Be all this as it may, Gentlemen, I have purchased my estate and originally not enclosed it myself. There was a surplus of ground of Bayard's, and I am bound to defend that part within my Fence against all legal claims, to entitle me to recover *over* on the Covenants in my

Deed, especially as the buildings which you have directed to be destroyed were on the ground [124] when I purchased. And, Gentlemen, I repeat to you that the Laws of the State secure and fortify my possession, as the best estate in the world, even against the claim you set up to my property: and I again thus publicly assert and shall in due time abundantly prove my assertion, that there is surplus of ground North of my enclosure to satisfy all demands—and further, that any man who does say, (understanding the subject) that my enclosure comprehends any part of Samuel David's Street, (and meaning no quibble about the name Bleecker Street) is a liar and the truth is not in him; and I stake my reputation to prove my assertion from your own public documents which some of you are perhaps uninformed of: and the Actors in this scene, who proceed understandingly in this business, incur the denunciations pronounced in the sacred volume. to wit—"Cursed is he who removeth his neighbour's landmark"—and may this curse attend them.

"Matters having been thus brought to a crisis between us, and I being determined at all events never to submit to such harsh treatment as I have received and am threatened with from the Guardians of this city, without a serious struggle for my rights, I now [125] inform you, gentlemen, that from a regard to my dear-bought and improved interests, and my own reputation, and knowing, as I believe, the powers of the Common Council on the subject, I have been put to the painful alternative of submitting, or at very considerable expence retaining able Counsel; which I have done, with a view of examining in an open and public manner into the conduct of those whom I consider my oppressors; and to this end I have directed Suits to be instituted in the Supreme Court against your Street Commissioner, who avows himself to be your agent and to be by you authorized to commit the trespasses, and against others, and from time to time, for the trespasses committed & to be committed on my possessions—and also a Suit in chancery to try your high-handed proceedings, and to be relieved against illegal Assessments founded upon the usurpation of powers not committed to you. And I trust that with the aid of gentlemen of high Standing in the Community, and who have been from their infancy regularly bred and have practised as surveyors. and who can give constructions to Maps, and not by those better calculated for building pig-pens and selling drams at the [126] counter than for Surveyors, and upon some such you are unfortunately obliged to depend for information, I shall be able to shew that there are lands sufficient, north of the South Bounds of Samuel David's Street or my

enclosure, to satisfy the claims of the Corporation, as well as the measurement of the number of Lots laid out in the Map of Nicholas Bayard's ground, and that the assertion "that I have any public ground in my possession under the present control of the Corporation" is utterly base and false. And I shall be able to exhibit, in very vivid colors, to a Court of Justice and Juries of my Fellow-citizens, instances of tyranny and highhanded oppression rarely to be met with in a well ordered community, and in no instances in this city to be surpassed, except one case, in which the Corporation of this city, not many years ago, attempted to wrest from me, under color of law, a very great part of an estate, at the foot of now Fulton Street, then worth more than fifty thousand dollars, owned by me under a grant from their predecessors to my Ancestor, dated in the year 1743, and respecting which all the deeds had been recorded for nearly twenty years, and which [127] they found to their Interest to purchase from me."

"Representation of the Comptroller."

"It was not until the 27th inst. that the Comptroller had a knowledge of the Contents of a letter which had been presented to the Common Council by Mr. Richard Varick on the 9th—and was then referred to a Committee without being read at the Board. Having been favored with a perusal of this extraordinary document, which alike impeaches the reputation of the Members of the Corporation, as well as that of several of its officers—it becomes a duty to repel an insidious charge, calculated to lessen that confidence which has hitherto been placed in the integrity of the undersigned.

"In the second page of the letter before mentioned, the writer says—"No Map thereof (Nicholas Bayard's land) being to be found in the Street Commissioner's Office, where it ought to have been, but, as has since been discovered, one was concealed among the papers of the late Mr. Goerck, in the City [128] Comptroller's Office, who is the son of the late Mr. A. Bleecker."

"To refute this unfounded charge, it is positively denied that the above mentioned Map, or any other whatever has at any time been concealed in the Comptroller's Office, or elsewhere, to his knowledge.

A number of old Maps were deposited, promiscuously, on the upper shelves in the northerly closet of said Office, about six years ago, at the time of removing from the Old Hall; several of which have been taken out from time to time by the Street Commissioner and his Assistant, when wanted for public purposes; and the City Surveyors have always had free access to these Maps as well as other papers in the Office, whenever they wished to obtain information. The idea conveyed of the concealment of a certain Map to answer interested purposes, the Comptroller pledges his veracity, is totally destitute of the shadow of truth, and should a single member of the Common Council have the least doubt on his mind as to the correctness of this assertion, the investigation of a Committee will remove every scruple and prove highly grateful to the wishes of the subscriber.

"It is quite inexplicable [129] what could have induced the writer of the "Epistle" to make insinuations of the nature above alluded to; as the undersigned was entirely ignorant of the matter in dispute respecting the ground, until he heard the papers read at the meeting of the Common Council.

"Not at all participating in the interests involved in the question, he has never had his mind biassed as to its result.

"In the 10th page a supposition is made of a clandestine agreement or secret understanding between the Corporation and the deceased Father of the undersigned, in laying out streets in a sinister manner for the aggrandisement of his own Estate.

"A surmise so cruel and unjust awakens feelings of indignation, which a respect for the dignity of the Common Council alone can repress. They are fully competent to assert and maintain the purity of their conduct, when assailed by unwarrantable aspersions even when made by those who are conspicuous for legal talent or exorbitant possessions.

"Conscious of maintaining the confidence of the Members of the Board in that Office which they have been pleased to entrust to his [130] charge, the subscriber cannot without a breach of charity but impute the visionary ideas conveyed in a lengthly communication, either to the violent paroxysms of a naturally impetuous disposition, to the imbecility unhappily occasioned by recent disease, or the phantasm of a disordered imagination."

which Report was approved, and the Counsel directed to report a Grant agreeably thereto.

The Street Commissioner stated that he had been served with a Subpoena issuing out of the Court of Chancery of this state directed to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, John M^cComb and John Sloan, dated the 2^d of April and returnable the 10th of the same month, to appear and answer to a Bill of Complaint of Richard Varick in said Court exhibited against said parties: and also that he had been served with a writ of injunction issuing out of said Court, bearing date the 1st inst. and directed as aforesaid enjoining the said parties to refrain from cutting upon, digging or carrying away the earth from the premises in said Bill described as the property of said Richard [141] Varick—which said Copies of the Subpoena and Writ of Injunction he submitted to the Common Council for their direction therein—Whereupon, the same having been read were directed to be referred to the Counsel with directions to take all legal steps to procure said injunction to be dissolved and such other legal measures as may be requisite in the premises—And it was ordered that in the mean time the Street Commissioner be directed to stay all further proceedings in relation to the opening of Bleecker Street as directed by the writ of Injunction aforesaid.

The Finance Committee, on the petition of William A. Hardenbrook, praying to remain in the house he now occupies till the Corporation shall proceed to work that part of the 10th Avenue on which it stands, Reported, as follows:

“ That they have considered the same, and are of opinion that this Board does not possess the right to make such a Grant. The Avenue being a highway and public property for which individuals in the neighbourhood have been assessed, any incumbrance thereon is liable to be removed at the instance of those persons—[142] it is therefore recommended that the prayer of the Petitioner be not granted.

“ It however is not probable that the petitioner will, for some time, be disturbed in the possession of the place, as it appears that all the persons owning property in the neighbourhood have signed the petition, and it is believed there is no disposition on the part of the Corporation to interfere.”

A Petition of sundry Butchers, praying an alteration of the Law so as to permit them to bring their Cattle through the Streets on Sunday before 9 o'clock in the morning and after 5 o'clock in the afternoon—was read and referred to the Committee on Sunday laws.

A Petition of Sundry Inhabitants, praying that the Vacant Lots between Willet, Delancy, Sheriff and Rivington Streets may be filled up, as they [146] are at present in a state highly injurious to the neighbourhood—was read and referred to the City Inspector and Street Commissioner.

A request of John Vanderlyn, that the ground leased to him by the Corporation at the corner of Chamber and Cross Streets may be cleared from the present buildings thereon, as he is about erecting a Building—was read and referred to the Committee of Finance to enquire if Mr. Vanderlyn has complied with the conditions of the Lease to him, and if so that they can cause obstructions to be removed—otherwise to report thereon to the Board.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants that Broadway may be paved, and the side walks flagged, between Bleecker Street and 28 feet north of Great Jones' Street—was read and referred to the Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

A Complaint of John R. A Petition from a number of Inhabitants, in favor of establishing a Ferry between Chamber Street and Spring Street on the Hudson

River to Harsimus in New Jersey was read and referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Recommendation from Sundry Inhabitants for the appointment of John Boyce as keeper of a Pound in the 9th Ward, was read, and the said John Boyce was accordingly appointed keeper of a Pound in the 9th Ward of the City of New York.

A Petition from Sarah Holloway, stating that she had received a notice to remove a house belonging to her standing in Lispenard Street [149] from said Street: that it is the only property she has to maintain herself in her declining years; and praying said house may be permitted to remain, or that a piece of ground may be assigned to her, whereon to place it—was read and directed to be laid on the Table.

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and approved.

A Petition of Ezra Weeks, proprietor of the City Hotel, stating that [a] number of years since he erected a Stone Step and Platform in front of said Hotel, against which no objection was made and it has since remained: that he has lately at the suggestion of the neighbourhood erected an iron railing in front of said Platform: that he has been informed that the Platform extends in the street beyond the distance prescribed by Law, but as it would be attended with considerable expence to remove it, and as it comports with the opinion of the immediate neighborhood, [165] as expressed by their Recommendations accompanying the Petition, he prayed relief—was read—Whereupon it was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 1st Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition from the Licensed Cartmen of the City, praying that the following regulations may be established in respect to licensing Cartmen:

"1. That no single man, especially Mechanics or Minors be licensed.

"2. That no Licenses be granted to Aliens.

"3. That no License be granted to any person unless he shall have been a Resident of the City one year.

"4. That no Cartman be permitted to own more than one horse and Cart."

The same being read was referred to his Honor the Mayor, to act in the premises as he shall deem most conducive to the public Interest.

A Communication which had been made to the Mayor by the Reverend Mr. _____, one of the Clergy of the Catholic Church, was read—stating, that a Coloured Man at the Alms-House who had been sick had been put into a Coffin while yet alive, and that upon a Remonstrance having been made on the subject he had been taken out and had not died for a [166] considerable time after—A Representation from Doctor Brown, one of the physicians at Bellevue, was also read, stating that the person was one who was ill of a malignant fever, and respecting whom directions had been given to place him in the coffin as soon as he was dead: that upon the fact being made known to him that the man was still alive tho' in a coffin he had him immediately removed, and that he lived but about an hour afterwards. Whereupon, the same was referred to the Alms-house Committee, with directions to report a statement of the facts at the next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Allen presented the following Resolution:

“Resolved, that the Street Commissioner lay before the Board a statement shewing the amount paid by the Corporation for opening and improving Streets and Avenues over and above the sum collected from the persons benefitted by said Improvements, and that said statement shew the sums paid for each improvement separately”—which was agreed to.

The following Resolution was presented and agreed to:

“Whereas the improvement of the ground near the old Alms House, lately granted to Mr. J. Vanderlyn for the erection of a building for a Panorama, has made it necessary to remove the Stable used for public purposes for the Commissioners of the Alms house—Therefore

“Resolved that it be referred to a Special Committee to select a suitable place for erecting a Stable for the purpose aforesaid.

“Resolved, that the Superintendant of Repairs proceed to build the same under the direction of the said Committee, [182] as soon as the ground shall be selected.”

Alderman Coles presented the following Resolution:

“Whereas by the Ordinance prescribing the duties of the Comptroller, he is, among other things required “to keep a regular set of books by way of double entry, in which shall be kept an account of all money received and paid out for the Corporation,” and it appears that such regular set of books hath not been kept, but that instead thereof two irregular sets of books have been kept, in which entries have been improperly made and posted in some cases; and in others omitted to be made, in consequence whereof the books do not

balance, and a disorder and ambiguity does and has for many years existed in that department highly disreputable to it:

“And by the same Ordinance it is made the duty of the Comptroller “to exhibit a balance sheet of such books to the Common Council once in every Six months” and it appears that no such balance sheet has been exhibited for many years, by which omission the representatives of this City have been deprived [183] of that salutary supervision of all accounts opened and kept in the books, relating to the Annual Receipts of about half a million of dollars and the expenditure thereof, highly disreputable to that department:

“The great object and end sought for in creating the Office of a Comptroller was, that he should keep a regular Account of all money received from and paid to the other departments and individuals, without receiving or paying any himself, and that all charges of this nature, advanced upon unsettled accounts, should stand open in the books until the same are regularly settled and credited in conformity to the directions and instructions of the Common Council, and that all entries, made in the books or posted, should never be so obliterated but that the original should be legible: thus, and thus only, can that accountability be enforced, so essential and important to the public good—by the double entry every sum it embraces must be posted to the credit of one account or accounts and to the debit of another account or accounts, and thereby check and balance each other—and by the half yearly exhibition of all accounts standing open in the books of the Comptroller, [184] the representatives of this City would see and become more intimately acquainted with all the money concerns ever which they preside and which they direct thro’ their organ the Comptroller—these considerations are particularly important to the people of this City, who annually elect and so frequently and so properly change their agents in the Common Council.

“Under all circumstances connected with this subject, the Common Council do not perceive, that the public good would be advanced by instituting an enquiry into the causes which have led to the state of things here presented, but the present members feel it to be their duty to adopt such measures as appear best calculated to enforce an observance of the aforesaid Ordinance hereafter—and presuming that these irregularities have arisen in some measure from the appointment of Comptrollers not well acquainted with keeping the Accounts as prescribed by law, it seems proper that a suitable Clerk to this Department should be appointed by the Common Council, who shall be acquainted with the nature and keeping of such accounts, to take

charge of the books, to furnish the balance sheets, and to do [185] such other things as may appertain to his office, under the superintendance and direction of the Comptroller.

Therefore—

“Resolved, that at the next meeting of this Board, they will proceed to the appointment of such Clerk so qualified, and that he be paid an annual Salary in quarter yearly payments of Dollars.

“Resolved farther, that the Comptroller lay before this Board a balance sheet of the ledger or ledgers in his office, on the second Monday in May and on the Second Monday in November in every year, to the end that the Members thereof may see every account standing open therein, and the amount thereof to its debit or credit, and that such balances be always struck and carried down in the Ledger in figures, to correspond with the Balance Sheet.

“Resolved farther, that as soon after the appointment of said Clerk as the nature of the case will admit, the Comptroller with the assistance of such clerk shall cause all the Accounts to be brought into one set of books, and that by proper single entries they be made to balance, and be thereafter kept in conformity to the aforesaid Ordinance or such other [186] as may be hereafter made.”

The question being taken on the First Resolution, and a Division having been called by Alderman Coles, it passed in the Negative, as follows:

Affirmative. Alderman Coles Messieurs Jones Stevens Van Amringe 4.

A motion was then made that the consideration of the Second Resolution be postponed until the Second Monday in May—which was carried. The question was then taken on the Third Resolution and negatived. The question being then taken on agreeing to the Preamble, it passed in the Negative.

A Request from Messrs. John, Robert and Samuel Swartwout, praying to be permitted to assign their lease of the Ferries from Vesey and Spring Streets to Mr. Philip Hone who has purchased the Boats and equipment from them—was read and referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Petition of William Baldwin, for permission to remove a House from No. 41 Barclay Street to Leonard Street at the corner of Collect Street—and a Petition from Joseph T. A Petition of Samuel Littlefield, for the appointment of Superintendent of Repairs of Docks—was read, and leave given to Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition of James Smith, for permission to construct a Vault in the Street at 59 Fulton Street—a similar request from D. & G. Bruce for a Vault in Chamber Street—and one from Samuel Davis for a Vault in Duane Street—were severally referred to the Street Commissioner to grant on the usual terms.

A Petition of Amos Corning, one of the City Surveyors, requesting payment for Maps made by him of the Lots assessed for opening Canal Street amounting to One hundred and sixty dollars, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

[191] A Petition of John Dias, praying that a certain Lot on Canal Street in the Eighth Ward and adjoining his property may be directed to be drained or filled up, as its present situation was injurious to

him—was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and City Inspector.

A Petition of Sundry Boatmen employed in the conveyance of Manure, complaining of the operation of the Law which prohibits the receiving or delivery of Manure at any of the Public Slips between the 1st day of May and the 1st day of December, and praying its repeal—was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Petition of Jessy Atkinson, stating that she has been assessed to the sum of Seven hundred dollars on 3 Lease lots she holds being for opening Hudson Street into Chamber Street: that she has lately received a further notice to pay Twenty five dollars Seven cents for paving the Intersection of Hudson and Chamber Streets: that she has paid seven hundred dollars, and prays it may be accepted in full, she being the widow of a person who lost his life in the service of the United States, and having 3 children to support—Whereupon, the same was [192] referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Petition of Mollinor and M^cDonald, praying remission of fine incurred by an obstruction in the Streets—was read and referred to the Attorney to report.

A Petition of James Stuart, complaining of the Assessment laid on him for improvement in Oliver Street—was read and laid on the Table.

A Petition of Richard Wight in behalf of Gibbons, for permission to erect a house for Elizabeth Town Boats at the Pier fronting on Washington Street near the Battery—was read and referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Petition of the Society for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, for the use of a Room in the New York Institution for the purposes of their Institution, was read and referred to the Alms-House Committee.

The Street Commissioner represented, that Mrs. Holloway, the owner of the House standing in Lispenard Street, had been duly noticed to remove the same, but had refused to comply. Where-[193] upon, it was ordered that the Superintendent of Repairs under direction of the Counsel proceed to cause said House to be removed forthwith.

A Petition of Mehitabel Carpenter, and of Bridget Trimble for Hucksters' Stands were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Peter Schmerhorn, Samuel A. Lawrence and William Edgar Jr. for permission to extend the Piers Nos. 9 and 11 as far into the North River [201] as the Pier No. 12, was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves.

A Memorial of John Low, stating that the House occupied by William A. Hardenbrook standing in the Tenth Avenue is a great inconvenience and praying its removal, was read—whereupon the following Resolution was presented and agreed to: "Resolved that the House standing in the Tenth Avenue and now in the possession of Mr. William A. Hardenbrook be disposed of at public sale, under the direction of the Finance Committee; and that its removal on or before the 20th inst. be one of the conditions of said sale."

A Memorial of Benjamin Bruff, stating that he had invented a Machine for sweeping chimnies which will render unnecessary the employment of Sweep-Chimnies, and praying the aid of the Board to enable him to construct the same—was read and referred to the former Committee on the subject of Chimney Sweepers.

A Petition of John Clark and others, stating that on opening the Drain or Sewer in Liberty Street it was found that the Main Sewer in Maiden Lane was obstructed, and praying the said Main Drain may be cleansed—was read [202] and referred to the Street Commissioner to report.

A Petition of William T. Slocum, late Registerer of Deeds, that he

may be permitted to use the Chancery Court Room for a few days for the deposite of Sundry Deeds and Mortgages belonging to individuals and which had been left in his Office to be recorded—was read and referred to the Mayor with authority to grant the prayer of Petitioner.

A Memorial of Mott and Williams in behalf of the Fulton Steam Boat Company was received, stating that in the Spring of 1815 they rented from the Corporation the Easterly half of the West Pier of Fulton Slip for the accommodation of their Boats, for which they pay Seven hundred dollars per annum: that the use they intended to make of it was to store the quantity of fuel requisite for daily consumption: that such use of the Pier is essential to them, and praying the Board to take the same into consideration—which was referred to the Committee on Wharves and Alderman and Assistant of 2^d Ward.

A Request for permission to construct Vaults in Leonard Street in front of the Lots of Gamaliel Smith and George Newbold, and in Broadway in front of [204] the Lots of S. M. Bradhurst, S. Walker and Richardson Kingsland—were referred to the Street Commissioner to grant on usual terms.

A Petition from the New York and Jersey Steam Boat Company, stating that by the Lease to them from the Corporation there was leased to them for the term of 18 years from the 1st of May 1811 all the ferry and right of ferriage from the City of New York to so much of the Jersey shore as lies between a point immediately south of Hoboken and a point due west from the Battery Castle: that they understand an application has been made to establish a ferry from the

The Street Commissioner presented a communication, stating that Hill and Ayres, the Contractors for filling in Dey Street Basin had not complied with their contract, and requesting the instructions of the Board—which was referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Third Ward, Street Committee and Street Commissioner.

The Street Commissioner presented a communication suggesting an alteration in Bleecker Street—which was referred to the Street Committee.

He also presented a communication, stating the accidents which happened by persons leaving open the grates of Coal and Wood Vaults in the Streets, and recommending a remedy therefor—which was referred to the Street Committee.

He also presented an Ordinance for regulating and paving Franklin Street at the intersection of Provoost and Collect Streets, which was passed, and John Targee, Jacob C. Mott and Abraham Bloodgood were appointed Assessors.

[208] He also presented the following Assessments, which were

confirmed, and Noah Jarvis appointed the Collector in each: namely, for regulating and paving Franklin Street from Elm to Orange Street; for regulating Leonard Street from Orange to Elm Street, and for regulating Houston Street from Broadway to Thompson Street.

The Counsel presented a Grant of a Water Lot at Brooklyn to Peter Schermerhorn Junior, Ab. Schermerhorn and Austin L. Sands—which was directed to be duly executed.

The Finance Committee, on the Petition of Thomas and Geo. Lovett, for payment for repairing the Wharf East side of Fulton Slip, Reported:

“That they have ascertained that the Petitioners were employed by Mr. Barnum, the Superintendent of Wharves and Piers appointed by this Board; it is therefore incumbent on the Corporation to pay the Messrs. “That the Petitioner has erected in front of the City Hotel an iron railing upon a platform that had been standing for many years, nearly seven feet from the front of the Hotel upon Broadway between Thames and Cedar Streets being nearly two feet further in the Street than the Law permits—But considering that the Hotel is an establishment ornamental and reputable to the City—that the railing is low, not more than about five feet above the Street, leaving a wide walk—and that it is ornamental to the Street—Your Committee recommend that it be permitted to [210] remain as it is.”

The Alms House Committee, on the communications respecting the person at the Alms House put in a coffin before decease, reported in the following words:

“Richard Furman, Superintendant of the Alms House, states that on the 11th April Job Young a negro-man who had been about 6 months in the Alms House as a pauper died in sick ward No. 5; that said Young was under the charge of Mr. Stephen Brown House Surgeon; that on the day of his death information was brought to witness that a man was put into a coffin before dead, and upon going to the sick ward where the said Young lay the witness found that the orderly man of Ward No. 5 named Lewis Stephens had placed the body of the said Young into a coffin, nailed him up and removed the coffin into the entry-way, but it was discovered a few minutes afterwards that he moaned; and before witness arrived the body had been taken out and placed on a bed, where it lay gasp- [211] ing till the breath finally departed about an hour and a half afterwards. The witness farther states it was on Saturday 11th and the body was not interred till Monday 13th April.

“Stephen Brown House Surgeon states, that about ten days ago (viz. on the 11th April) Job Young a negro-man who had been sick about 3 days with Typhus Fever was put into a coffin by Stephens the orderly-man of sick ward No. 5, in the full belief that said Young was dead. Witness had ordered that Young should be removed from the Ward as soon as he was dead, because the Ward was crowded and the fever was of a malignant cast. The Negro had been insensible nearly 24 hours, had not spoken during that time, and he appeared to have breathed his last when put into the coffin. It was discovered by some of the patients that he still breathed after being put into the coffin and removed into the entry. When information of this was given, the body was instantly removed and placed again upon his bed where he expired about 2 hours afterwards.

“Lewis Stephens, orderly-man of Sick ward No. 5, states that he put the body of Job Young into a coffin with the help of Johnson another [212] black man. Witness thought that the man was dead when put into the coffin, and Dr. Brown had ordered him to remove the body from the ward as soon as the breath had left him. Johnson, as well as the witness, thought Young was dead when they put him in the coffin, nailed him up and removed him into the entry. Johnson has left the Alms House. Body was in the coffin nearly half an hour before discovered to be still alive. Never spoke after being taken out of the coffin, but breathed hard and gasped: lived about an hour &

an half after being taken out. Witness to be sure that Young was then dead, refused to touch the body till the House Surgeon was sent for and it was clearly ascertained that he was no more, when the witness again assisted in returning the body to the coffin and nailed it up.

“ Doctor Benjamin A. Akerly, Visiting Surgeon, was at the Alms House on the 10th April inst: visited the surgical patients that day in company with Mr. Stephen Brown House Surgeon. In going the rounds thro’ the sick wards saw in No. 5 Job Young who appeared to be [213] dying and therefore did not call for any medical prescription.

“ Joseph Starry a Patient in the Alms House states, that on the 11th April while passing down stairs heard a groan and upon listening at the head of the coffin heard the groan repeated, upon which he gave information that the person in the coffin was yet alive. Others then came and with a hatchet opened the coffin while witness went down stairs. The person was a negro, and breathed and moaned after being taken out of the coffin and put upon a bed. How long he lived afterwards did not wait to learn.

“ Patience Bartow, Nurse of No. 1—being called by Starry the preceding witness, went to the coffin in the entry and heard a groan. Immediately hastened down stairs and got a hatchet, and with Slatterly opened the coffin which contained a negro. He had his eyes fixed, he moaned but did not speak: was immediately removed to a bed where he lay about two hours before he died.

“ Peter Slatterly states, that after Job Young was first put into the coffin witness was called, and on listening heard that he still breathed and moaned, and accordingly proceeded to open the coffin with the [214] hatchet procured by Patience Bartow. The negro in the coffin did not open his eyes nor speak, but frothed at the mouth, gasped and moaned, and was immediately removed from the coffin to a bed, where he lay insensible, but how long before he died witness did not call to enquire.

“ Mr. Francis Cooper was on a visit to the Alms House on the 11th April last, in company with several ladies. In passing thro’ that part of the Establishment where the above mentioned sick negro lay, saw the empty coffin in which he had been laid, and also saw the negro lying on the bed having been just taken from the coffin. The witness observed that the Negro was still alive, but insensible and with his eyes fixed. He left a lady praying with the negro, and waited

about half an hour, and then left the house. Witness further states that he saw the coffin when first taken into the house, and he thinks it was not more than half an hour when he again saw it in the entry after the Negro had been removed to the bed.

“The Committee had concluded to report the preceding state-[215] ment of facts without comment, but altho’ they were only required to state the facts, they find the case requires the severe censure of the Board, and is too highly aggravated to be passed by without notice. The sum and substance of the enquiry is, that, on the 11th of April 1818, a negro man named Job Young sick at the Alms house was put into a coffin, nailed up and remained so nearly half an hour while yet alive, and that he lived almost two hours after being taken out.

“It appears to your Committee that the order given by the house surgeon was precipitate and too hastily complied with by the orderly man of the ward in which Young lay, but this haste was occasioned in the negro by the alarm excited in stating that the disease was of a malignant character. Why there should have been any thing alarming in a simple case of Typhus Fever does not appear, for there was no prevailing sickness of the kind in the Alms house at the time, nor any other epidemic disease, and the season was cool and comfortable.

“It also appears to the Committee that the question of life or death in a human being should not be left to the decision of an ignorant negro, as the symptoms of death are generally not well understood and are sometimes equivocal. Hence the common practice of letting [216] our deceased friends lie on a bier or in an open coffin till the moment of removal for interment, when all become satisfied that the vital spirit hath fled. This practice should not be departed from in a public institution like the Alms house. Wherefore to prevent a similar occurrence for the future, the Committee beg leave to propose as part of this Report

“1. That it hereafter be the duty of the House Physician & House Surgeon to the Alms house to examine every person reported to be dead, to ascertain the fact and decide thereon, and thereupon to order the corpse to be conveyed to the Dead House.

“2. That if there be no dead-house attached to the hospitals of the Alms house, the Commissioners be and they are hereby authorized to have one built within the walls of the Establishment.

“3. That after conveying a corpse to the dead house, the coffin

shall not be nailed, screwed or fastened up until the moment of removal for interment."

The same Committee, on the Petition of George W. Varian for Stall no. 13 Catharine Market, reported in his favor and that a License be granted to him for the same—which was approved.

The Finance Committee, on the Petition of Noah Jarvis, Reported:

"That they have considered the same—they find it has been attended with a variety of expences not usual in ordinary cases and much time has and will yet be consumed in the collection and final adjustment of it. It is therefore proposed that he be allowed to retain two and an half per cent out of the monies collected, as a compensation for his services & for all expences he may have been at of every kind relating to this assessment—The said 2½ per cent to be estimated on those accounts adjusted by set-off as well as on monies actually received."

Alderman Smith presented a Resolution directing the sum of Three hundred dollars to be paid to the Reverend John Stanford for his clerical services at the Alms house, Bridewell and Penitentiary dur-

ing the past year—which was approved, and the Comptroller directed to report a Warrant therefor.

Ordered—that a Warrant be reported for Two hundred and Sixty three dollars in favor of Abraham Stagg on account of his Contract for regulating and paving Orange Street—which was passed.

[219] The Report on Hackney Carriages was called up and read. Alderman Smith moved to strike out the first section, for the purpose of introducing a Section as an Amendment. The question being taken thereon, it was carried in the affirmative. He then proposed the following Resolution, which was agreed to:

“Resolved that the Hackney Coaches be permitted hereafter to stand in the crown or centre of those streets which are at least Sixty feet wide, at such distances as shall be pointed out by the Street Commissioner.”

Mr. Allen then proposed the following Resolution, which was agreed to:—

“Resolved—that hereafter each and every driver of a Hackney Carriage shall receive a License as such from the Mayor: and if any owner of a Hackney Carriage shall, after the Third Monday of May instant employ any person as a Driver of his Hackney Carriage, without having first obtained a License from the Mayor for such person as a driver of a Hackney Carriage, he shall, for each and every time such person shall drive his carriage forfeit and pay the sum of five dollars.”

Mr. Vⁿ Amringe then moved the following, which was agreed to:

“Resolved—that every Hackman licensed as a Driver shall for every [220] such License pay One Dollar.”

Mr. Allen then moved, that the Residue of the Report of the Committee be stricken out—which was agreed to. The Counsel was then directed to report an Ordinance agreeably to said Resolutions.

A member stating that he had something to communicate which required secrecy, the Lobby was cleared and the

Doors Closed.

The Street Committee and Counsel of the Board, to whom had been referred on 13th April last a Report of the Comptroller relative to a Contract for the Street Manure, reported:

“That they have had a conference with Messrs. Hitchcocks on the nature of the Law to be passed by the Corporation and the Contract to be entered into by them.

“It appears to the Committee, that the Contractors formed their calculations different in some measure from that contemplated by the

members of the Committee: and under all circumstances, considering the price offered, the arduous duties to be performed, the convenience to the citizens from the adoption of the new mode of cleaning the Streets, and the expences which will accrue to the [221] Contractors by a faithful discharge of their duties, they would recommend to the Board, that a deduction be made of Twelve hundred dollars, leaving the amount to be paid 8500 dollars per annum. They would also recommend that the Street Commissioner be authorized to accommodate the Contractors with a suitable place or places, (provided such place can be furnished without expence or inconvenience to the public) for the Deposit of Street Manure only, from time to time, where he thinks will be suitable."

The Counsel also presented the draught of a Contract with the Messrs. Hitchcocks on the subject of the Street Manure, which was directed to be duly executed, and the Counsel was instructed to attend to the execution of the Contract on the part of the Messrs. Hitchcocks.

[222] It was then Resolved, that, when the Board adjourn, they will adjourn to meet on Monday next at 10 o'clock—and the Clerk was directed to procure from the Clerk of the City and County a Return of the Members and Officers elected at the last Charter Election, and give them notice to appear in the Common Council Chamber on Monday next at 12 o'clock to take the oaths prescribed by Law and the Charter. It was also Resolved that the Board will make the quarterly visitation of the Bellevue Establishment on Monday next at One o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Allen, the Board proceeded to a consideration of the Rules and Orders for the transaction of business at the Meetings of the Common Council, when the following were adopted:

Passed May 11. 1818.

1. Upon the appearance of five Aldermen and five Assistants, the Mayor, or in his absence the Recorder, shall take the chair as President, and the members be called to order.

2. Immediately after the President shall have taken the chair, the Minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read by the Clerk, to the end that any mistakes therein may be corrected by the Board.

3. The President shall preserve order and decorum, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Board.

4. The President shall in all cases be entitled to one vote, and no more.

5. Every Member, previous to his speaking, shall rise from his seat and address himself to [236] the President.

6. When two or more members shall rise at once, the President shall name the member who is first to speak.

7. No Member shall speak more than twice to the same question without leave of the Board, nor more than once until every member, chusing to speak shall have spoken.

8. No question on a motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. When a motion is seconded it shall be stated by the President before debate, and every such motion shall be reduced to writing, if any member desire it.

9. After a motion is stated by the President, it shall be deemed to be in possession of the Board, but may be withdrawn at any time before discussion or amendment.

10. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, unless

1. To amend it.
2. To commit it,
3. To postpone it,
4. For the previous question, or
5. To adjourn.

11. A motion to adjourn shall be always in order, and shall be decided without debate.

12. The previous question, until it is decided, shall preclude all amendments [237] and debate of the main question, and shall be in this form—" Shall the main question now be put?"

13. Every member who shall be present when a question is put, shall vote for or against the same, unless the Board shall excuse him, or unless he be immediately interested in the question, in which case he shall not vote.

14. A member called to order shall immediately sit down, unless permitted to explain, and the Board, if appealed to, shall decide on the case but without debate: if there be no appeal, the decision of the Chair shall be submitted to.

15. All questions shall be put in the order they are moved, except that in filling up blanks the largest sum and the longest time shall be first put.

16. Upon a division in the Board, the names of those who vote for, and of those who vote against the question shall be entered upon the minutes, if any two members require it.

17. In all divisions taken by the Board it shall be the duty of the Clerk to enter on the Minutes the name of the member calling for the division.

18. No motion for reconsideration shall be in order, unless made at the same meeting or in pursuance of notice then given for the next meeting after that on which the decision proposed to be [238] reconsidered took place, except by unanimous consent.

19. All appointments of Officers shall be made by ballot, unless dispensed with by the unanimous consent of the Board.

20. No member shall absent himself without permission from the President.

21. All Committees shall be appointed by the President, unless otherwise ordered by the Board.

A Remonstrance against granting the prayer of Benjamin U. Coles for the use of the Sewer in Broad Street was read and laid for consideration until the Report of the Committee on that subject is made.

A Petition of the African Free School Institution, stating that the increased numbers under their care made it necessary to erect another School Room, and praying the aid of the Corporation to enable them to effect that object, was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Petition from a number of the Inhabitants of Roosevelt Street, praying that the Corporation would immediately proceed to the contemplated improvement of widening said Street [267] between the East River and Batavia Street was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition was received from John Brown, stating that he was about building on the North East corner of Chatham and James Streets and was desirous of building in a line corresponding with the Southwest corner of said Streets. Which was referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Stephen Doane for permission to have a private Stall for the sale of meat at his residence on the corner of Rutgers and Division Streets, and of Thomas Place for a similar permission at the corner of Norfolk and Division Streets—were read and leave given Petitioners to withdraw their petitions.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants for a Lamp in White Street was referred to the Lamp Committee.

A Petition of William S. Hunter & Co. to remove the Steps, now in the Street which leads to their Counting Room, to a door within

twelve feet of their present situation, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner.

An Application from George Cooper for per- [268] mission to construct a Vault in Beekman Street and also one in Barclay Street, and a similar request from H. M. Beare for one in Chamber Street—were granted on the usual terms under the direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition from Christian Heiser for permission to build a vault at the northwest corner of Hudson and Reader Streets, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 5th Ward to report.

A Petition from George Bowen for remission of a Fine under the Hackney Law was read and leave given to withdraw the Petition.

A Petition of Guiliam Cornell for appointment of Inspector of Wood: of Robert Wood for that of Inspector of Manure: of Isaac Loofborrow for an appointment: of Abel Smith for appointment of Inspector of Bread; and of Ezra Frost for appointment of City Inspector or Assistant Street Commissioner—were severally read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition from E. Secor & Co. stating that a Complaint has been made a- [269] gainst them on the subject of an Awning erected by them in the Street, and praying the same may be enquired into, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner

A Petition of Boltis Moore to be permitted to sink a Cistern in Catharine Street in front of his house, as his lot is not sufficiently extensive to admit of one—was read and referred to the Street Commissioner to report.

A Petition of Adam Ten Brook for Stall No. 14 Greenwich Market was read and granted.

A Recommendation in favor of Joseph Townsend for License as a Butcher at Harlaem, was read, and ordered that he receive License therefor.

A Letter from John Kenrick dated Newton Massachusetts 4th May was received, stating that he had invented a plan by which Channels may be opened thro' Sand Bars which obstruct the navigation of Bays and Rivers: that it consists of a process of submarine ploughing and harrowing, the machinery to be drawn by a Steam-boat: that if the Corporation will offer the sum of One hundred thousand dollars he will undertake to cut a chan- [270] nel of ten rods wide and four fathom deep at Sandy Hook. Whereupon the same was referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A Petition of Henry White & James Morris for permission to sink

a pier in the direction of Beaver Lane in the centre of the Wharves on the North River owned by them, was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips.

A Petition of John R. Livingston that a Suit against him on the subject of filling in certain Lots may be discontinued, was referred to the City Inspector.

A Memorial of some considerable length was received from Edmund C. Genet, urging from various considerations that the personal Estates of Banking Companies and other chartered Money Institutions are liable to assessment under the law to raise money by Tax, and ought accordingly to be assessed and bear their proportion of the public burdens: that the taxes on individuals would be thereby greatly lessened by the sum which would be raised, as in the Returns of the Assessors the personal [271] estate of the Inhabitants of the City was rated at Twenty Million, Nine hundred and ninety nine thousand Dollars, and the Capital of the Chartered Money Institutions amounts to Twenty one million, nine hundred and sixty thousand dollars. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition on the subject of permitting Foreigners to receive License as Cartmen to be employed in carting dirt only, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition of the Special Justices to have the Room lately occupied by the United States' Loan Officer assigned to them, was referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition from Sundry Inhabitants, that the Law respecting carting Manure may be altered so as to authorize Cartmen to take it from places where it is made and put it on board of vessels at Slips adjacent, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of William Vandeburgh for Stall. No. 5 in Centre Market: one of Thomas Harrison for Stall no. 5 in Grand St. Market; and one of John Simeson for Stall No. 5 [272] in Centre Market—were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Benjamin Hills for extension of time for filling up lots at the foot of Barclay Street owned by Messrs. Anderson, Burger and Miller, as he has contracted to fill up the same and the time allowed by the Ordinance is not sufficiently extensive to perform the same, was read and referred to the Alderman & Assistant of the Third Ward.

A Memorial from sundry owners of Lots in Greenwich Village, remonstrating against any alteration of the plan adopted for regulating the same, was read and referred to the Committee on that subject.

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A Memorial from sundry owners of Lots in Greenwich Village, remonstrating against any alteration of the plan adopted for regulating the same, was read and referred to the Committee on that subject.

A Petition from Richard L. Walker, Physician & Surgeon to the City Prison and Gaol, for an increase of his Salary, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Letter from Colonel Murray commanding the 14th Regiment of New York State Artillery, stating a former request presented by him that the Corporation would honor the Corps he commanded [273] with a Stand of Colours and begging a reply to the same, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Communication was received from the Street Commissioner representing that the Street in front of the Albany Basin required re-paving, which was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

The Street Commissioner presented an Ordinance for a Well in Chrystie Street between Delancey and Rivington Streets and for one in Cannon Street between Grand & Broome Streets—which were passed, and John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and John Brower were appointed Assessors in the former, and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brower in the latter.

He also presented the following Assessments, which were confirmed—Namely, for a Well and Pump in Lewis Street: for regulating Willett and Sheriff Streets, of which Noah Jarvis was appointed Collector; and for regulating Washington Street from Christopher Street to Hammond Street, of which Morris De Camp was appointed Collector.

The Comptroller presented Releases of Quit Rent to Martin Hoffman for Lots Nos. 118 and 139 Common Lands the Rent of which had been commuted for by him at the usual [274] rate: Whereupon the same Releases were directed to be duly executed.

[275] The Counsel presented the following Report, which was directed to be referred to the Committee of Wharves, Piers and Slips and the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth Ward:

“The Counsel begs leave to inform the Board that the proceedings relative to the Slips have been postponed till Thursday next. If it is contemplated to have so much of the proceedings as relate to the Pier near Roosevelt discontinued, it will of course be necessary that he should be instructed relative to it prior to that time.

“Since the last meeting of the Board he has discovered that the property required for a Slip at the foot of Oliver Street is so imperfectly described in the precept, that it will be indispensibly necessary to discontinue the proceedings in that case altogether. This error arose from an erroneous impression which rested upon the mind of the gentleman who attended to the drawing the precept during the absence of the Counsel, as to the extent of the permanent line.

“The Counsel conceives it to be his duty farther to inform the Board that the Court intimated it as their opinion that it was not in the power of the Corporation to discontinue proceedings of this nature after they had been commenced. The Counsel however is of [276] opinion that the Recorder could not have meant to be understood that under no circumstances could the Corporation be allowed to discontinue, and that if they could be allowed in any case that they would be allowed in the case of the Oliver Street Slip, in which the proceedings must prove abortive, and also as to so much of the property embraced in the precept for taking the property for the Roosevelt Street Slip as relates to Minturn & Champlin's Pier, with regard to which the Corporation rested under a misapprehension as to their rights.

“The Counsel therefore respectfully recommends that he be instructed to move to discontinue the proceedings relative to the Oliver Street Slip, and also that measures be taken to instruct him what course to pursue as it relates to the Pier near Roosevelt Street.”

Resolved—that hereafter in all cases where upon improvements being made by opening or enlarging Streets, Squares or Avenues it becomes necessary to remove dwelling houses or other buildings it shall be the duty of the Street [282] Commissioner to advertise in the public prints employed by the Corporation, at least ten days before such removal, the places from which and the time when such buildings are to be removed, in order that the occupants of the same may be informed thereof.

A Resolution directing the City Intendant to cause the stakes & poles in the Hudson River now within the City and County of New York to be removed on or before the First day of June next, was presented and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

The Recorder presented a Resolution directing the Committee appointed on the subject of causing an Index to be made of the Records of Deeds and Mortgages, to make a Report to the Board of the expence which will attend the same previous to incurring any expence or making any contract on the subject: which was agreed to.

Mr. Akerly presented a Resolution to allow to Henry Abell Clerk of the Commissioners a Salary of Eight hundred dollars per annum, which was read and referred to the Committee on Laws.

The Minutes of the two last meetings were read and approved.

A Petition from a number of Inhabitants, that the old Post Road leading to Boston extending from 125th Street to Harlaem Bridge may be closed up, and a Remonstrance from a number of the Inhabitants of Harlaem against that measure, were read and referred to the Road Committee.

A Petition from Joseph Tremaine for appointment of Weigh master: one of Benjamin Disbrou for appointment as measurer of grain; and one of Abel [295] Smith for appointment as Measurer of Grain, were read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition of Noah Brown and Daniel D. Tompkins, Lessees of Pier No. 1 or West Pier, was received, stating that they are Lessees of a part of said Pier for the term of Ten years from the 1st of April 1817 and for the residue of said Pier for one year which expired on May last: that from the Covenants enjoined on the part of the lessees respecting certain expenditures by them, and which they have performed, they presume the intention of the Corporation was, and the construction of the grant would be, that the Lessees were to have possession of the same under the control of the Corporation in case of and until the premises should be wanted for public purposes: they therefore

pray that a Lease may be given to them for the residue of said Pier to continue during their term in the other part of said pier and until the said pier should be wanted for public purposes, of which Two months notice should be given to the Lessees. The same having been read was referred to the Ferry Committee to report thereon.

A Memorial from the Committee on behalf [296] of the licensed cartmen, urging that the decision of the Mayor not to grant new Licenses to any but citizens should be extended to the renewal of licenses, was read and referred, together with the letter of the Mayor to the Committee on that subject, to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Representation of John Slidell and William Harrison, stating the injury they received a few days since from the overturning of their carriage in the Streets by some Hogs, and praying the Law may be reenacted to prevent those animals from running at large in the Street, was read and referred to the Committee on Laws, who immediately reported a Law entitled "A Law respecting Swine," which was read and the consideration postponed till the next meeting of the Board.

A Petition from sundry Inhabitants, that the Drain or Sewer in Roosevelt Street may be repaired and cleansed, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A Petition of certain Inhabitants [297] and Tenants of Houses in Roosevelt Street, praying that the contemplated improvement of widening Roosevelt Street may be delayed until May next, as it will put many of them to great inconvenience to be obliged to remove immediately, was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Petition from a number of Inhabitants of the Seventh and Tenth Wards, that John Winship may be permitted to sell small meats at his stall on Sunday morning, as they do not receive their weekly wages until late on Saturday night and it is exceedingly inconvenient to procure necessaries for their families at so late an hour, was read and it was resolved that Petitioners have leave to withdraw their petition.

A Petition of John Jermain, for permission to take on board a vessel from Pike Slip 500 loads of Manure purchased by him, was read and leave given to him to withdraw the Petition.

A Petition of Francis O'Neale for Stall No. 7 in Fly Market was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of Isaiah Smith and Gilbert Sniffen, for remission of a fine in- [298] curred by incumbering the Street with their Carts, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 7th Ward.

A complaint from sundry Inhabitants against the situation of the

Gutter in Pearl Street at the head of Collect Street, was read and referred to the Street and Canal Committees.

A Petition of Mary Greene for permission to construct a Vault in the Street opposite No. 17 Orange Street was read and granted on the usual terms under the direction of the Street Commissioner.

A similar petition in behalf of Hallsted Haight for vaults at Nos. 76 and 78 Hudson Street was granted on like terms.

An Account of Andrew Van Norden, as Keeper of the Battery, for one month for Forty nine dollars ninety four cents was presented, and a Warrant ordered to be reported therefor at the next meeting of the Board.

The Street Commissioner presented a Return of Delinquents on Assessments [299] for opening and extending Bancker Street. Whereupon a Warrant was ordered to issue to the Collectors for collecting the same.

The Street Commissioner, on the Petition of E. Secor & Co. reported:

"That in his opinion Mr. Secor's Awning is not exceptionable in itself: but, with respect to the neighbouring Store-keepers, it is. It is complained of as being contrary to the general regulation for Awnings, and as giving Mr. Secor a decided advantage over others in that trade by being able to make a greater display of his goods than others can do, for want of an awning over their second stories; and which they cannot have except where they have trees in front of a sufficient height. The Street Commissioner is therefore of opinion that it would be improper to grant the request."

The City Inspector, on the Petition of John R. Livingston, reported:—

" Mr. Livingston was ordained to fill in his Lots (East of Columbia Street) in June 1817: the Ordinance expired in August last, but upon petitioning the Board the period was extended two months longer: after the termination of the last-mentioned time, the City Inspector, finding the ordinance not then complied with, sent it to the Attorney for prosecution.

" On the 12th of January last Mr. Livingston petitioned the Board, praying a discontinuance of the Suit brought against him by the Attorney, which petition was referred to the Street Committee and City Inspector; who, after due examination, reported unfavorably on [303] said petition, and which the Board accepted. A second petition on the same subject, on the 26th of the same month, was presented and had a similar reference—but no report was made thereon, in consequence of the Street Committee conceiving that as no alteration, in their judgment, had taken place and that the Board had already accepted their report, it therefore, for the reasons stated, became unnecessary.

" The City Inspector farther states that last week he viewed all the Lots of Mr. Livingston, between Stanton Street on the North and Rivington Street on the South that lie east of Columbia Street. Those lots between Columbia on the west and Cannon on the East have been completed, and those farther Eastward partially complied with. From the various complaints made of water passing into the cellars in Stanton Street near the East River where the largest reservoir of water

remains, ordinances have been again presented against Mr. Livingston to occasion an acceleration of his Contracts for filling in his Lots and thereby correcting those nuisances so often complained of."

“That two lots of ground in the Eighth Ward which were assigned to the Corporation by Beekman M. Van Beuren have been sold in pursuance of a Decree of the Chancellor; and that the purchasers are willing to relinquish their bids to the Corporation. The Lots were sold for much less than their real value, and it would be for the interest of the Corporation to accept of the proposition. There were other lots included in the same mortgage, and the Corporation will be enti- [306] tled to the surplus of the proceeds, after satisfying the mortgage: but it is necessary that the whole amount of the purchase-money should be first paid into Court. The whole amount which is necessary to satisfy the mortgage over and above the proceeds of the lots' rent mortgaged to the Corporation is Five hundred and ten dollars. Of this Mr. Van Beuren has paid the Counsel Two hundred dollars and promises shortly to pay the balance. The amount over and above this sum which it will be necessary to pay into Court will be Six hundred and thirty five dollars, Four hundred and twenty five of which the Chancellor will order to be repaid to the Corporation, and it will be necessary for them to look to Mr. Van Beuren for the balance.

The Counsel therefore recommends that a Warrant issue for Six hundred and thirty five dollars. As the Court of Chancery will sit in a few days, it will be necessary for the Board to act upon this subject this day.”

[307] The Counsel of the Board, on the subject of the proposed Slips at the foot of Roosevelt and Oliver Streets, reported:

“That the amount awarded the proprietors of the premises required for a Slip between Catharine Slip and Oliver Street is Four thousand One hundred and Thirty nine dollars fifty cents. The Counsel for the Owners of that property has informed the Counsel of the Board that they are dissatisfied with the verdict and that unless the Corporation will allow Mr. Coster and Mrs. Courtney each Twelve hundred and fifty four dollars fifty cents and an additional sum to the Heirs of John Murray, that he will endeavour to have the verdict set aside. The grounds however upon which he predicates his objections to the verdict are not such as in the opinion of the Counsel are tenable.

“In the case of the lower Slip between James' Slip and Roosevelt Street, the Counsel moved for leave to discontinue so much of the

proceedings as related to the premises south of John Clark's property which the Court refused to grant him. He then entered a nolle prosequi as to the whole, notwithstanding which the Court proceeded, and the Jury awarded about Twenty thousand Seven hundred and fifty dollars exclusive of what they conceived ought to be [308] [308] allowed to Walter Franklin for his property which was Seven hundred and fifty dollars. The Counsel for Mr. Franklin had obtained leave to discontinue as to so much as related to his property. It is the opinion of the Counsel of the Board, and of those who were associated with him, as well as of several eminent Counsel who have given their opinion upon the subject, that this verdict is not binding upon the Corporation, and that upon application being made to the Supreme Court they will issue a Mandamus requiring the Mayor's Court to enter judgment upon the nolle prosequi.

The Comptroller, on the subject of Water Lots possessed by persons who have not taken out Grants therefor, reported, (agreeably to order):

"That on the 11th April 1803, the Street Commissioner and Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of Samuel Franklin requesting permission to extend his wharf near New Slip farther into the East River, reported 'that the prayer of the petitioner be granted, [309] upon condition of his extending the wharf not exceeding 210 feet from the South side of Front Street and making bridges and piers alternately in the same manner that the piers and bridges are ordered to be made extending from South Street.'

"The report was confirmed, and the prayer of Samuel Franklin granted agreeably thereto. No grant has been since taken out for the property above mentioned

"On the 9th June 1806, the Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the petition of Dr. Mitchell relative to sinking a Pier in Front Street, having reported in favor of the same, it was ordered that Dr. Mitchell have liberty to erect a Small pier adjoining to that of Mr. Agnew in Front Street to the west of Roosevelt Street in the 4th ward, in such manner as to enable him to receive the wharfage of the same.

"The Finance Committee made a report to the Board on the 3^d November 1817 (which was approved,) that on the application of

Samuel L. Mitchell, Minturn & Champlin and John Agnew, grants should be issued to them at the old rate (*viz.* One dollar per foot.) but the Rent to commence on the 1st May 1805, about which time the property was first improved, [310] together with legal interest. Those Lots are between Dover Street and Roosevelt Street, and the Counsel of the Board was requested to prepare grants accordingly.

“The Finance Committee, on the application of Silvanus Miller for a Water grant in front of his property near Roosevelt Street, reported that a grant should be made out by the Counsel, on certain conditions, and with a provision that the grant be taken out previous to the 1st March 1818—This Report was laid on the table Dec. 22. 1817, and has not since been acted on.

“Grants were ordered by the Board several months since in favor of Samuel M. Thompson, Richard J. Tucker, Thomas S. Clarkson and the Representatives of J. Le Roy deceased for water lots on the North River near the State Prison; but the Counsel has not had time to prepare them. Also one to the Heirs of John Post deceased for a Lot near Walnut Street on the East River, but the Applicant for this grant has since declined taking it, on account of not being permitted to extend further into the River than Front Street.

“It is understood that Nathan Sanford Esqr. possesses property [311] bounded by the North River near the State Prison for which a grant should issue. He inquired some time since as to the rates of Quit Rent, and was requested to furnish a Map of the premises, previous to an Application, agreeably to an order of the Common Council August 14. 1809, by which ‘all communications for grants must be accompanied with a Map or Survey of the property applied for, certified by a Sworn Surveyor, and after a report thereon by the Comptroller recommending the issuing a Grant, the applicant shall execute the same within four weeks from such report, or forfeit his claim to the said grant.’

“Henry Simmons applied for a grant for a Lot at Corlaer's Hook, but for want of a Map the grant could not be made.

“Some property at Brooklyn is similarly situated, and the Applicants have promised to obtain Surveys and Maps in order to apply for grants.

“An order passed the Board last Summer, directing all persons subject to Quit-rents on Water lots, who had not already obtained grants, to get the same previous to the 1st November last.

“Whenever it is ascertained that Water-lots have been improved or occupied previous to taking out a Grant, the Arrearages of rent

are always charged. It may possibly be the case, from the constant routine of public [312] business necessarily engaging the time and attention of the subscriber, that some persons may be in the use of water rights who have neglected to obtain a title thereto: when instances of this kind are known, the regular steps will be taken to enforce a compliance with the orders of the Common Council.

" The 14th Regiment have [315] designated themselves by the name of the "Governor's Guard," and the Committee believe have particularly attached themselves to the person of the Commander in Chief, as his Body guard during his stay in this City. This may be very laudable in the Regiment, and the Committee wish to be distinctly understood as by no means condemning the course they have marked out or adopted; but they contend that, inasmuch as, at the first organization of the Regiment, they adopted the appellation of "Governor's Guard," and thereupon were complimented by his Excellency Daniel D. Tompkins with their first Stand of Colours, it appears but just, now that new Colours are wanted, that application should be made in the first instance to his Excellency the present Governor, who otherwise may consider himself indecorously treated by the Corps, and the Corporation also may be charged with arrogating to themselves what of right belongs to the Commander in Chief of the Sate. The Committee therefore recommend that the petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition."

The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A Communication was received from the Honorable William P. Van Ness, Judge of the United States' District Court, stating that the Resolution of the Common Council at their last meeting directing the removal of the Clerk of the United States' District Court from the Room occupied by him as a public office in the Hall would be attended with extreme difficulty and embarrassment, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition from John H. and W. C. Bol- [325] ton for permission to remove a Frame House from Park Place to the lower end of Vestry and Washington Streets, for which purpose they will employ Trucks, was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the 3^d and 5th Wards and the Street Commissioner, with authority to grant the prayer of petitioners.

A Petition from William Niblo, stating that a prosecution has been commenced against him for contravening the Law for the prevention of Fires, and praying a Committee to enquire and report as to the

State of the Building complained of, was read and referred to the Attorney, to report.

A Petition from Robert Ferguson, stating that a complaint had been made against him for employing Carts not licensed; that Petitioner is under a Contract with the Corporation for filling in and regulating certain Streets; that he has employed Carts in that business and no other, and praying the Suit may be discontinued, was read and referred to the Attorney to report the facts of the case.

A Petition of Claudius G. Fontaine, for permission to sell goods at auction before his door in the Street, as allowed by a Resolution of the Common Council in May 1817 but which expired on the 1st of May [326] last, was read and referred to the Street Committee and the Alderman and Assistant of the First Ward.

A Communication was received from Monsieur Monneron, proposing to establish at the City Hall Two Solar Dials connected with Clocks, one of which shall give the mean or apparent time of the day and the other the true time; which was directed to be referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A Representation from Dominick Lynch Jr. in behalf of himself and the neighbourhood of the Battery, complaining of the great inconvenience experienced by them from the practice of shaking and dusting Carpets in the Street in front of their dwelling houses, and proposing that the Northwest corner of the Battery should be assigned for that purpose, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Lands.

A Request of Colonel Charles Graham, in behalf of himself and other Officers of the Infantry Militia, that the Common Council would set apart a Lot near the Collect, in which the Officers might assemble for military improvement, was read and referred [327] to the same Committee.

A Petition for a Well and Pump in Mill Street was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A Petition of Dennis M^cCarthy, for permission to sink a cistern in the Street at the corner of Chatham and Duane Streets, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner to report.

A Petition of sundry Fishermen attending the Fly Market, complaining of an undue preference given in the Stands of said Market to the sellers of Shell-fish &c. was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of George Schaffer, for Stall No. 19 in Catharine Market, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of William Somerindyck, for permission to put some manure which he had purchased on board of a Boat at the foot of Charlton Street, and a request that a Suit against him for depositing Manure South of the prescribed line might be discontinued, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistants of the Eighth Ward to report.

[328] A Petition of Henry S. Brooks, stating that he had built a small shed over his Store door at the corner of Cherry and Catharine Streets, which projects about three feet from the house into the street, and which he is now informed is contrary to law, and praying the subject may be referred to a Committee to direct whether it may remain or must be removed, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Seventh Ward to report.

The Counsel presented a Quit claim Deed to Robert R. Hunter, for Two Lots of ground at the Albany Basin, prepared in pursuance of an Agreement made with him by the Finance Committee, which was directed to be duly executed.

The Ferry Committee, on the petition of the Messrs. Swartwouts, reported:

“That on the 13th day of April 1811 a Lease of the said Ferry

was granted by this Corporation to Mr. John Stevens for fourteen years and three months from the 1st day of February preceding, at the rent of Three hundred and fifty dollars for the first year, with an annual increase of Seventeen dollars and fifty cents for each succeeding year of the said term:—

“ That Mr. Stevens in some manner unknown to your Committee assigned his interest therein to the Messrs. Swartwouts, who have since sold the Establishment to Mr. Philip Hone, and that there is now due to the Corporation the sum of Five hundred and fifty three dollars Thirteen cents, for arrears of Rent: that [332] in the lease so granted to the said John Stevens there is contained a Covenant on the part of this Corporation that they shall at their own expence provide and keep in repair such accommodations as may be deemed necessary for the lying of the Boats employed in that Ferry on the New-York side, during the said term.

“ Your Committee, from their personal knowledge of Mr. Hone, are satisfied that the public will sustain no injury by placing this ferry under his direction, but they consider the Covenant above mentioned as unreasonable and not warranted by the small amount of rent reserved. Your Committee are therefore of opinion that the lease to Mr. Stevens ought to be surrendered, and, upon payment of the said arrearages of rent, they recommend that a new lease be granted to Mr. Philip Hone for the term of Twelve years from the 1st day of May last, at the same rent and annual increase as was agreed to be paid by Mr. Stevens, and with the like covenants on the part of the Lessee as are contained in the said lease to Mr. Stevens, substituting however a good and substantial Team Boat, in the place of a Steam Boat as required by the said Lease.

[333] “ The present landing place of the Ferry on this side of the River is at the foot of Murray Street, a situation too remote from the Market to afford proper accommodation to the Country people who bring their produce for sale, and is moreover destitute of every convenience for landing, having neither Piers, Floats nor Bridge. The situation at the foot of Vesey Street, where the petitioners are desirous of placing it, would obviate many of the difficulties which now exist: piers are already run out there, and it would afford a tolerable landing place at very little expence. But as that place is very much confined and constantly crouded with carts, and is immediately at the side of the Market, your Committee deem it an improper place for a ferry, and, under the circumstances they recommend that the said Ferry be permanently located at the foot of Barclay Street, as soon as the

ground in that vicinity shall have been filled in and properly regulated, and for that purpose that the right of the Corporation to the Bulkhead in front of that Street be granted to Mr. Hone during the said term, and in the mean time that the landing-place shall continue to be where it now is, at the foot of Murray Street: that the right of ferriage to be granted to Mr. Hone on the New York side shall extend [334] from the northerly bounds of the limits granted to the York and Jersey Steam Boat Company to the North Battery or Hubert Street."

The Ferry Committee, on the petition of Rodman Bowne, Lessee of Catharine Slip Ferry, reported:

"That by the original Contract, made with the petitioner at the time his Lease was granted, the Corporation stipulated to sink a narrow pier in the centre of Catharine Slip against which to rest the Float: but as such pier would be a permanent obstruction and render the Slip useless in case of a removal of the Ferry, at the suggestion of the then Ferry Committee and Street Commissioner, the Petitioner consented to substitute Chains and Anchors for his Float instead of the pier, which were provided and were to be kept in repair by the Corporation.

"Your Committee find that the petitioner has expended the sum of One hundred and eighty dollars seventy six cents in repairing those chains, and the further sum of Eight dollars [335] for repairs to the piers at his place of landing: That, in consequence of some objection by the Street Commissioner to the amount of the Bill presented to him for repairing the said chains, the petitioner was sued and put to the expence of Twelve dollars, amounting in all to the sum of Two hundred and six dollars seventy-six cents, which your Committee are satisfied ought to be refunded to him.

"The petitioner represents, that, in consequence of the Pier on the southerly side of Catharine Slip being too short, the bridges have been frequently injured by the Ice, and that the rapidity of the current is such as often to render it difficult and dangerous to land, of the truth of which your Committee are fully satisfied, and believe it to be the duty of the Corporation at no distant period to sink a Block of from forty to fifty feet at the end of that pier, unless the contem-

plated pier at Oliver Street shall be found to obviate the difficulties which now exist."

[338] Mr. Stevens presented a Resolution, on the subject of placing the granting of Booths under the direction of the First Marshall and High Constable. Alderman Mesier presented a Resolution directing that hereafter no booths be permitted to be erected without the special permission of the Common Council. The Resolution proposed by Mr. Stevens was laid on the table. It was then moved to refer the Resolution of Alderman Mesier to a Committee, which was negatived. The question was then taken on agreeing to the Resolution, and passed in the Negative. Mr. Stevens' Resolution was then called up and being read, was as follows:

"Resolved—that the granting permission for Booths or Stands on public days be hereafter done under the direction of the First Marshall and High Constable, and that the perquisites arising therefrom be equally divided between the said Officers: and further that it be the duty of the High Constable to prevent drunkenness and riot in and about such booths on all public days."

A Memorial of Francis A. Everard was received, stating that he had invented a machine for Sweeping Chimnies previous to the invention of Mr. Bruff now before the Common Council, and praying the Corporation to examine his Machine previous to their granting any exclusive privilege to Mr. Bruff.

A Report was received from the Keeper of the City Prison and Bridewell, agreeably to the Law of the Common Council made and provided, of the Prisoners confined [342] in said prison, detailing the

Crimes for which imprisoned, by whom committed, their Sex, Colour and State of Health; which was directed to be filed.

A Memorial was received from the Directors of the Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, lately incorporated in this City, stating that they have under their immediate care Sixty of those unfortunate beings, that the Subscription books of the Institution have been sometime opened but that the sums subscribed are quite inadequate to the purposes of the Society, and praying aid from the Corporation; which being read was referred to the following Committee:— viz. Mr. Allen, Ald. Van Amringe, Ald. Morss.

A Memorial from sundry Butchers holding Stalls in the Fly Market, complaining that Butchers are in the habit of purchasing small meats and selling them in the lower or Fish Market, under pretence of being agents for the Country people, and praying as there are many vacant Stalls in the upper Market that they may be compelled to sell their meat [343] at those Stalls, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Request of E. S. Lazarus, to be permitted to construct a Vault in front of a Lot in Hester Street between Broadway and Rynder Street opposite Crosby Street, and a similar request from Peter Jay Munro for a Vault in Walker Street at the Corner of Broadway, were read and granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

An application from Brigham Howe, for permission to construct a cistern in Fulton Street, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner to report.

A Remonstrance of Richard Montgomery Livingston, complaining of an assessment for a Well in Dominick Street, was read and referred to the Committee on Assessments.

A Communication from General Morton, stating that the Standard directed by the Corporation to be presented to the Regiment of Artillery commanded by Colonel William L. Hunter was finished, and that the Regiment proposed parading on Thursday next to receive the same, and that the Officers requested the Common Council would honor them by dining with them on that day, was read, and the [344] arrangement proposed was agreed to.

Two Memorials from Sundry Bakers and Citizens, on the subject of frauds practised in Loaf Bread, were read and referred to the Committee appointed on that subject, Viz. Committee on Laws.

A Memorial from a number of Inhabitants of the Tenth Ward, stating that from the increased population of said Ward and other

considerations it was necessary that a Market should be erected for their accommodation, and praying that one may be erected in some central part of the Ward, was read and referred to a Committee consisting of the Aldermen and Assistants of the 10th, 8th and 7th Wards.

A Petition of Abraham Coddington, for appointment of Inspector of Lime, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Resignation from Samuel Thorne of the Office of Inspector of Lime was read and accepted.

A Petition of the Inhabitants of Harlaem, that the Engine at present stationed in that village may be [345] exchanged for a larger one, as it is too small to answer any beneficial purpose, was read and referred to the Committee on the Fire Department.

A Petition of Henry Fanning, Executor of Frederick Davoue, praying further time for payment of an assessment on property of Estate of said Davoue for opening Franklin Square, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Robert Polly, to be permitted to sell Earthen Ware on the side walks at Catharine Market, was read and leave given petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition from James R. Mullany, for permission to erect Stairs on the outside of a Building to be used for a short time as an Office in Warren Street, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

A further petition of John R. Livingston complaining of proceedings had against him on the subject of filling in certain Lots, and praying that a Suit against him may be discontinued, was read and leave given petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition from sundry Inhabitants, that a Bridge may be built in Hudson Street over the Canal of Canal Street, was read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the 5th and 8th Wards, with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioners.

The Finance Committee, to whom was referred the Report of the Street Committee relative to altering the line of Chatham Street, reported:

“That the Committee are uninformed by the paper referred to them which of the lines on the profile was fixed on by the Street Committee: they have therefore been guided by their own opinion on this subject, and have adopted that line drawn from the northeasterly corner of James Street, extending up Chatham Street 98 feet; which will permit Mr. John Brown to advance on Chatham Street at the corner of James Street 4 feet [368] and at the eastwardly line of his lot 2 feet 5 inches, and will add to his ground 168 square feet. The Committee are of opinion that Mr. Brown is benefitted by this addition to his property, together with the permission to advance on the Street, to the amount of Three hundred dollars: Mr. Brown however differs with the Committee, and is unwilling to give more than Two hundred and fifty dollars for the advantages to be derived from said improvement. The Committee, being unable to treat therefor, respectfully submit the subject to the decision of the Board, either to confirm their opinion as to the value of the benefit, or to accept of the offer made by Mr. Brown.

“The Committee farther state, that there are two lots to the east of the last mentioned property, which by the arrangement under consideration will have a small addition of ground on Chatham Street: The owners of this property have not been seen on the subject, and the Committee are unable to inform the Board what their opinions or intentions are as to the improvement under consideration.”

The following petitions were read and referred to the Market Committee; viz.—of George Goodheart for Stall no. 54 in Washington Market; of Elias Deforest for the same; of Cornelius Vandenburg (with a recommendation) for a Stall in the market about to be erected in the Tenth Ward; of Joseph Graaf to be restored to his Stall in Washington Market, for which Charles Gilman has taken out a License; and of Abraham Pierre, to continue selling Smoked Meat in Market.

[374] A Petition that Lawrence Street may be regulated and the Curb-Stone laid from Broome to Prince Street, and that a Well may be sunk at the corner of Lawrence and Spring Streets, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition that the Carriage-Way of Hammond Street from Washington to Asylum Street may be laid was referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Sarah Ver Plank, for permission for a Huckster's Stall in the Street, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Sixth Ward.

A Petition of Stephen Allen, for permission for himself and Catharine Marsellis to construct vaults in Beekman Street was granted on usual terms, under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition from a Committee, in behalf of the owners of lots at the Bowling Green, requesting that a plan for the Court yard in front of their Dwelling houses accompanying the petition may be accepted and acted on in lieu of the one [375] adopted by the Board in 1816 and filed in the Register's Office, was read and granted, under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition of James Mallory, stating that a complaint had been made against him to the Attorney of his having permitted gambling in his house, and praying that a Committee be appointed to investigate the same, was read, and leave was given petitioner to withdraw his petition.

A Petition on behalf of Mary Green, stating that permission had been given her to construct a vault in Orange Street; that in computing the amount to be paid for the same a mistake had occurred, and a considerable sum more than the law required was paid, and the mistake

not discovered until the money had been paid into the Treasury, and praying that the proper officer may be directed to refund the same, was read and referred to the Street Commissioner to report thereon.

The Street Commissioner, Comptroller and Counsel, on the petition of Dominick Lynch, reported:

“ That Dominick Lynch by order of the Board made the whole of that part of Front Street which adjoins the Walnut Street Slip, altho’ by his grant he was required to make but one half of it. The water at the head of the Slip would not have been sufficiently deep for the accommodation of vessels if the whole of Front Street had not been filled up. Under these circumstances the undersigned are of opinion that Mr. Lynch ought to be allowed the sum which he has thus expended beyond the requisitions of his grant, together with the interest which has accrued upon the same. They therefore respectfully recommend that the Street Commissioner be authorised to audit his account for such expences, and that they be allowed him: provided he pays forthwith the balance which is due from him to the Corporation, and the costs of the suit which has been commenced against him. [378]

“ With respect to the demand of Mr. Lynch for a piece of ground constituting a part of Orange Street, the undersigned are of opinion that he has no good claim upon the Corporation for the same. That ground was left open by him and was regulated by the Corporation under an impression that it was part of the Street: if it was not so, (which the undersigned do not admit to be the fact) the expence, for taking it for that purpose ought to be borne by those who may be benefitted thereby, in pursuance of the provisions of the law, and not by the Corporation.”

The Comptroller presented a Release of Quit Rent on Water Lots in the First Ward granted on 3^d February 1773 to David Provoost commuted for by a Deed of Release to Isaac Heyer, which was directed to be duly executed.

The Street Commissioner presented a Communication, stating that Mrs. Downey, who had been ordered to remove a house from the Bowery, had refused to comply with the order, and requesting further instructions, was referred to the Counsel with directions to take legal measures for removing the same.

The Street Commissioner presented an Assessment for paving the Intersection of Provost and Franklin Streets, and [380] for regulating Collect Street, which were confirmed, and Morris De Camp was appointed Collector in the former and Noah Jarvis in the latter.

The Street Commissioner, agreeably to order, presented a report on the subject of Canal and Collect Streets. The Report of the Canal Committee on that subject was called up. After some consideration it was resolved that so much of said report as relates to paving Collect Street to Franklin Street be approved; and it was ordered that said report, together with the report of the Canal Committee, be referred to the Canal Committee and Street Commissioner for further consideration, and that they report thereon at the next meeting of the Board; and the said subject was made the order of the day at the next meeting. It was also requested of the Committee that they would in their report state what proportion of the expence of said improvement should be borne by individuals to be benefitted thereby and what by the public.

The Street Commissioner, on the Petition of Brigham Howe, reported that Mr. Howe had not room for a Cistern on his lot, and he therefore [381] recommended that he have permission to construct one under the Street—which report was approved.

The Street Commissioner, on the subject of Mrs. Morrell's Lot in Rose Street, reported:

"That some time since an agreement was made with Mrs. Morrell for a Lot of ground in Rose Street for the purpose of erecting two Engine houses thereon. The size of the lot was taken at that time (from what now appears to be an imperfect sketch of the property)

to be 25 feet front by 53 feet deep. Since the first of May the building that was on it has been removed, and the lot surveyed: by which it appears that the lot is 25 feet in front and 39.5' in the rear, and 54 feet deep. As there are infants interested in this property, it became necessary to make an application to the Court of Chancery to enable them to make sale of their share, which has been done, and an order has been obtained for that purpose: but the description of the lot corresponded with the sketch first made, being 25 feet front and rear and 53 feet deep. This proceeding has been done in good faith at the expence of the Infants: They are now willing to convey the residue of the lot on condition that the Corporation will pay the expence of the second application which will not exceed fifty dollars, and [382] to allow the grantors to retain a triangular piece of the lot, of 5 feet on Rose Street running to a point 25 feet back, as shaded red on the sketch herewith, by which the Corporation will gain about one sixth more ground than was at first supposed to be in the lot, as it will then be 20 feet front, 39'. 5" rear, 54 feet on the North Side and 50 feet on South side."

Whereupon it was referred to the Committee on the Fire-Department, with authority to make such agreement respecting the purchase of said Lot as to them should appear just and equitable.

The Committee of Wharves, Piers and Slips, on the petition relative to completing South Street, reported:

"That they have maturely considered the subject of the Memorial and are fully of opinion that in consequence of the many improvements about to take place in that vicinity, it is rendered necessary that South Street should be completed east to the east line of Jno. Clark's property and adjoining the waters about to be taken by the Corporation between James' Slip and Roosevelt Street for a [383] public Basin or Slip. In so doing there will be made a Bulk head along aforesaid water or Slip of about Eighty feet and will be a substitute for all the purpose of accommodation for the present and for some time to come.

"Your Committee offer the following Resolution:—Resolved—that all the proprietors or owners of Water-lots between Dover Street and the east line of John Clark's property adjoining the water about to be taken for a publick slip be directed to complete and finish the Bulk-head of South Street to the aforesaid line by the 1st day of November next: and that the said proprietors or owners of Water Lots be also directed to cause the same to be filled in to the Bulk-head

of South Street by the 1st of July 1819 under the direction of the Street Commissioner and in conformity to the Map annexed: also that the Street Commissioner be directed to draft an Ordinance in the usual way, in conformity to the aforesaid Resolve and to carry the same into effect."

Dover Street, and the like Board for closing and opening Oliver Street have permission as such Commissioners, and for no other purpose, to occupy the Room No. 2 Basement floor of the City Hall now occupied by Mr. Gilbert Collector of Taxes and by Mr. Jarvis Collector of the Canal Street Assessments during the pleasure of the Common Council: Provided such company shall not in any manner interfere with, interrupt or molest the said Collectors or either of them in the use of said Room."

Alderman King presented an Ordinance entitled "A Law to amend a Law concerning Dogs" which was passed.

The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

A Petition of Patrick Byrnes, stating that he is seized in right of his Wife of a Lot in Mott Street upon which has been assessed the sum of Twenty seven dollars seven cents for improving Mott Street, that petitioner is in very indigent circumstances, and praying relief: Whereupon—resolved that the Collection of said Assessment be delayed, and that the sum due remain a lien on the said lot.

A Memorial from sundry owners of property to be taken for opening the Sixth [388] Avenue, stating that in their opinion the plan for improving said Avenue would be altered for the better by extending the Avenue the width of Seventy feet from Greenwich Lane to its junction with Carmine Street, instead of carrying down said Avenue One hundred feet as contemplated, and praying said alteration may be made, was received:—which was referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of the Trustees of the New York Free School, that the garret of the Engine House at Greenwich may be lathed and plaistered for the farther accommodation of said School, was read and referred to the following Committee, with authority to grant the request of the petitioners:—Viz. Ald. Thorp Mr. Schieffelin Ald. Munson

A Petition of Lynde Catlin for permission to construct a Vault in Cliff Street, and of Jesse Scofield for a Vault in Park Place, were read and granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition for a Well and Pump in [389] Cherry Street between Scammel and Walnut Streets was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefor.

A further petition of Colonel James Murray for a Standard for

the Regiment under his command was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Letter from Mr. Mezzara addressed to the Mayor, on the subject of a fine imposed on him by the Court of Quarter Sessions on conviction for a libellous painting, was read and referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A Petition of Harriot Babcock, a native of England, for some pecuniary aid, was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Letter from Chauncey Hall, offering a plan for the defence of Harbours, was read and referred to the Committee of Defence.

A Letter from Thomas Nixon, remonstrating against the proposed regulation of raising Pine Street between Pearl Street and the River, and a Remonstrance from sundry Inhabitants on the same [390] subject, were read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Presentment from the Grand Jury at the June Sessions, stating their opinion that the present Watch system was insufficient, and recommending that the Police Magistrates should be consulted on a new arrangement of the same—recommending also that the Marshals & Constables should be directed to patrole the streets on Sunday and take up and commit all vagrants and disorderly persons, was read and referred to the Watch Committee.

A Petition of Henry Bonta for relief from a fine imposed on him by the Clerk of the Market for forestalling for purchasing butter for sale previous to the hour prescribed by Law, was read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition of sundry boatmen concerned in bringing Stone to Market for sale for the appointment of an Inspector of Stone, was read and referred to—Alderman Morss Alderman Thorp Mr. Westervelt.

[391] A Petition of Caleb Coffin, for the appointment of Measurer of Grain, was read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition of Joseph Dean for permission to remove a Wooden Building from Chamber Street to Spring Street, and a similar one from John Lovett to remove a stable from a Lot in Orange Street, were read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the respective Wards, with authority to grant the prayers of the petitioners.

A Request of the New York State Society of Cincinnati, for the use of a Room to hold their annual meeting in on the 4th of July next, was presented, and the Mayor's Court Room was assigned to them for that purpose.

A Remonstrance against the Continuance of the Hackney Stands in Broad Way was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Memorial was received from John Hopper, stating that he had received an order from the Street Commissioner to remove certain materials from ground in front of Petitioner's house alleged to be the Street: that petitioner is satisfied said ground is the property of petitioner, [392] and not belonging to the Public, and praying a Committee may be appointed to investigate the same. Whereupon, the same was referred to the Committee on Laws and the Counsel.

The Street Commissioner presented an ordinance for a Bulkhead and making South Street from Dover Street to the Easterly side of John Clark's property, which was read and the consideration postponed.

He also presented an Assessment for paving Orange Street from Hester to Grand Street, and for a Well and Pump in King Street, which were confirmed and Noah Jarvis appointed Collector in the former and Morris De Camp in the latter.

He also presented an Ordinance for paving Collect Street from Pearl Street to the northerly side of Franklin Street, which was passed, and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brower appointed Assessors.

The Street Commissioner, on the petition of Mary Green, reported:—That

“Permission was given to Mary Green to build a vault in front of Lot No. 17 Orange Street. The agent of [393] Mrs. Green, one of the persons named in the petition applied for “as much ground as the Law would allow him.” The street being 40 feet wide, 16 feet, being $\frac{2}{5}$ ths of the whole width, was accordingly allowed, and the calculation made on 16' by 26 feet, and the money paid to the City Chamberlain. Some days after, one of the petitioners called at the Office and stated that he had paid for more ground than was wanted for the vault, and requested a return of the surplus money. The Street Commissioner did not feel himself authorised to do so, and recommended as the proper course an application to the Board.

“The Street Commissioner feels confident that no error has been committed by “An Officer of your honorable body,” as stated by the petitioner, but the error if any has been wholly on the part of the Agent for Mrs. Green, in asking for and paying for more ground than was wanted.

“When the vault is built and the size ascertained, the Street Com-

missioner would recommend that a Warrant be issued for the difference."

"That the Committee have viewed that part of the City and its vicinity referred to by the petitioners, in order to ascertain whether

the public convenience required the accommodation requested, and are of opinion that the prayer of the petition ought to be granted. A large proportion of the inhabitants of this section of the City are mechanics and labouring men, who reside from half a mile to one mile and a half from any of the markets now established: the inconvenience experienced by these citizens, whose time is of the utmost importance to them, may be easily conceived, particularly as the privilege heretofore permitted of selling meat at dwelling-houses in that part of the city has been peremptorily refused by the Board.

“The Committee are of opinion that where accommodations of the kind under consideration can be afforded at a moderate expence, they ought to be granted: and as the present one is of importance to the inhabitants of the upper parts of our City and will only cost about seven hundred [398] dollars, they respectfully recommend the adoption of the following Resolutions:

“Resolved—that a market house 40 feet by 20 be erected on the centre of Grand Street, between Ludlow and Essex Streets in the Tenth ward of this City.

The Finance Committee, on the Resolution relative to the High Constable's being allowed a Salary, reported:

“That they have maturely considered the subject, and altho' they are sensible of the merits of that officer they are nevertheless of opinion that it would be improper to grant him a yearly salary.

“The fees allowed the High Constable, it is presumed, are a sufficient compensation for the performance of his ordinary duty: and the Committee believe he has no reason to complain of the liberality of the Corporation whenever his exertion has been required on extraordinary occasions. The object of the Committee is to stimulate the exertions, not only of the High Constable, but of every officer connected with our City Police by holding [400] out to them a prompt and ample recompence for their services on all occasions where any extraordinary exertions and vigilance have been used in detecting offenders against the laws. To effect this, the Committee recommend the adoption of the following Resolution:

“Resolved—that the Police Committee be directed to report to this Board any extraordinary services performed by the High Constable and Marshalls, as often as it shall occur, and recommend what, in their opinion, is the amount of compensation proper to be allowed them for such services.”

The Market Committee, on the petition of Joseph Hyde for Stall No. 19 Catharine Market reported in his favor and that a License should be granted to him for said Stall; which report was approved and a License directed to issue agreeably thereto.

The Canal Committee and Street Commissioner, to whom was referred the [401] Report of the Canal Committee on the subject of a plan for regulating Canal and Collect Streets and also the Report made

thereon by the Street Commissioner, presented a Report. The Reports of the Canal Committee and of the Street Commissioner referred to in said Report were as follows:

I. "Report of the Canal Committee."

June 15. 1818.

"They have given the subject that deliberate consideration which its importance requires, and, after having examined and considered on the several plans and surveys in the Street Commissioner's Office, do recommend the adoption of the following outlines of a plan for regulating said streets: to wit—the water to pass on the surface of Collect Street to Canal Street, the gutter or kennel of Collect Street to be in the middle of the Street and to be formed with cut stone not less than six inches thick and of a suitable width, a common sewer to commence at the head of Canal Street at Collect Street and to be continued to the River.

"By the Surveys in the Street Commissioner's Office, it appears the kennel at the intersection of Collect and Pearl Streets is about 10 feet above high water mark, and the distance to the River is about 5600 feet: it is intended to give Collect Street, from Pearl street to Canal [402] Street, a distance of 1400 feet, a descent of 4 feet, which is $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches on an 100 feet. The bottom or floor of the sewer, where it commences at the head of Canal Street, to be laid 3 feet 3 inches below the kennel of Collect Street from its head to Chapel Street, a distance of 1800 feet, to have a descent of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches on the 100 feet, which will bring the floor of the sewer at Chapel Street about 1 foot below high water mark from Chapel Street to the contemplated permanent line on the Hudson River, which is 2400 feet, to have a descent so that its floor at its discharge into the river will be $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet below high water mark: the dimensions of the sewer will require to be at its head 8 feet wide and 6 feet high, at Broadway 10 feet wide and 7 feet high, which will conform to the present regulation of Broadway, at Chapel street to be 12 feet wide and 7 feet high, and at its discharge into the river 16 feet wide and as high as the nature of its situation there will possibly admit: the sides of the sewer to be built with large blue building stones, to be from 3 to 4 feet high and from 2 to 3 feet thick: the floor to be laid with flagging with a cut stone gutter in the centre: the [403] arch to be of brick 12 inches thick and to have openings of about $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet square every 100 feet, for

the conveniency of cleaning. The foundation for about 1000 or 1200 feet will require to be timbered with square timber, laid cross ways the whole width of the sewer including the walls. The Committee have been induced to go thus far into detail, in order to estimate with some precision its probable expence: this they find by estimation will cost from 15 to 20 dollars per foot, say 17 dollars and 50 cents; which for the whole distance, which is 4200 feet, will come to 71,500 dollars, in addition to which a small sewer will be required on Chapel Street, of about 400 or 500 feet in length, and another on Thompson Street. of about the same length; these will cost about 6000 or 8000 dollars, so that the whole expence may be fairly estimated at 80,000 dollars, and which sum your Committee are well satisfied will be amply sufficient to complete the same.

“By this regulation Canal Street will be made one of the handsomest streets in the City, and it is our decided opinion that a lot of ground on it would be worth nearly double as much as if the water was carried above the surface thro’ a deep kennel in the centre of the street: from which consideration we do think that the proprietors of the lots of ground [404] can well afford to pay a very large proportion if not all the expence, which would be about Two hundred and fifty dollars a lot.”

II. “Report of the Street Commissioner.”

June 22. 1818.

“He has devoted all his spare time to the subject, and is of opinion that the plan as a general one will answer the purpose intended and is the best, taking all the circumstances of the case into view, that can be devised and which will give satisfaction to the public as well as to the proprietors of the adjacent property.

“It is now proposed to have a simple sewer: the size that is described will have a capacity, I presume, amply sufficient to carry off all the water that will have to pass through this sewage as quick as it may fall, making a large allowance for the worst contingent that may happen: and by keeping the sewer low a great advantage will result

to those in the vicinity, by being able to drain all the cellars in the [405] streets that border on the sewer.

"The Street Commissioner is of opinion that the sewer must be continued up Collect Street for about 450 feet or within 1000 feet of Pearl Street, which he presumes will be as far as the water of Collect Street can be conveyed on the surface as to keep the pavement of a convenient form for passengers and carriages to cross without bridges: at which point the sewer should commence, the size to be 6 feet by 5', regularly increasing to Canal Street, where the dimensions will be 8 feet by 6' as described by the Committee. He would also recommend that a Sluice Gate be fixed at the end next the river in order to retain the water to its full height, so as to scour the outfall at suitable times: and that grooves be worked in the walls at suitable distances for fixing Stop Gates, for the purpose of forming a scour thro' the sewer at the ebb of every spring tide, if it should be found by experience that the weight and velocity of the water does not keep the sewer clean.

"A number of things might be pointed out as requisite to be attended to at the commencement of this work; but as they relate chiefly to the execution he forbears to mention them at present, as the time allowed him has not permitted him to make out a [406] plan, or to go into a particular examination of the expence, but presumes it will not exceed that computed by the Committee.

"One thing he must beg leave to suggest as to the execution of the work, that it ought to be of the best, both as to work and materials; that it ought to be placed under the particular care and direction of a competent workman, as the success of this undertaking is of too great consequence to be trusted to job work, and as it will require much more care and attention than can be expected if done by contract.

"He can see no objection to putting this work into immediate execution, the improvements at each end of the line call loudly for its completion, and the work at both ends may be going on at the same time."

on which Reports the above named Committee composed of the Canal Committee and Street Commissioner, reported:

"That they have attentively considered the said reports, and are

of opinion that the plan therein recommended is the best under all the circumstances of the case that can be devised. The Committee do [407] therefore recommend that the same be adopted, and for which purpose they beg leave to submit the following Resolution:

“Resolved—that Collect Street be so regulated as to carry the water on the surface from Pearl Street to within 450 feet of Canal Street, with a descent of 4 inches on the 100 feet: that 450 feet of Collect Street and the whole line of Canal Street be regulated with a common sewer: that the floor of the sewer at its head on Collect Street be laid 3 feet 6 inches below the kennel of the Street at that point and to have a descent from its head to Chapel Street of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches on the 100 feet, or so that its floor at Chapel Street will be 1 foot below high water-mark, from Chapel Street to the Hudson River to have a descent so that its floor on the River will be 3 feet 6 inches below high water mark: that the dimensions of the sewer at its head on Collect Street be 6 feet wide and 5 feet high: at Canal 8 feet wide and 6 feet high; at Broadway 10 feet wide and 7 feet high; at Chapel Street 12 feet wide and 7 feet high, and on the River to be 16 feet wide and as high as the situation will possibly admit. That a sewer be made in Chapel Street from Canal street to the centre of the Block between [408] Lispenard and Walker Streets; to be 5 feet wide and 4 feet high at its head and 6 feet wide and 6 feet high at its junction with the sewer on Canal Street; its floor to have a descent of $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches on the 100 feet. That a sewer be made in Thompson Street from Canal to the centre of the block between Grand and Broome Streets, to be of the same dimensions and to have the like descent as the sewer on Chapel Street.”

Resolved that the Chairman of the Finance Committee be requested to purchase an Eight-day Clock to be placed in his Honor the Mayor's Office.

Alderman King presented a Law entitled "A Law to prevent the firing of Guns and discharging of Rockets, Squibs, Crackers and other Fire-works," which was read by paragraphs and passed—and the Law entitled a "Law to prevent the firing of Guns," passed 5th May 1817, being the 46th Chapter of Revised Laws, was repealed.

A Petition of Christopher Heiser was received, stating that in June 1817 he purchased at auction from the Corporation a small piece of ground at the corner of Hudson and Read Streets with an intention of purchasing the adjoining ground but that the same went for a larger sum than he was willing to give: that he lately applied for permission to construct a vault in front of his lot, which was [5] denied to him: he therefore requested the Corporation would repay to him the sum paid by him and his expences on reconveying to them the ground. Upon reading whereof it was resolved that Petitioner have leave to withdraw his petition

A Petition of Edward S. Cory, stating that he is master of the Schooner Lord Wellington: that he has been sued by the Attorney of the Corporation for the sum of Ten thousand dollars for landing passengers at Norwalk in Connecticut; that he brought said passengers in

said vessel by order of his owners from St. John's and landed them by like order at Norwalk, not knowing it was contrary to Law, and praying to be permitted now to report said passengers and give bond for them or pay the Commutation allowed by the Resolution of the Common Council, was read and leave given Petitioner to withdraw his petition.

Petitions of William and Gerardus Post for permission to construct vaults opposite [6] Nos. 57 and 59 Fulton Street, and a similar one from Stephen Gorham for a Vault in Warren Street, were granted upon the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition from Owners of property in the neighbourhood of Roosevelt Street, remonstrating against extending South Street, from Dover Street to John Clark's property as proposed by the Report of a Committee on that subject, was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves and the Alderman and Assistant of the Fourth Ward.

A Petition of Hugh Maxwell, stating that through mistake the Stoop of his house in Hester Street extends farther than is authorised by Law and praying to be exempted from the penalty incurred, which being received was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the 6th ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Charles McCarty praying that for sundry reasons the sum assessed upon the [7] property he holds under Lease from the Corporation for improving Roosevelt Street may be remitted, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition that Vestry Street may be regulated and the Carriage Way paved from Hudson Street to Washington Street, was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of a number of Inhabitants and owners in the vicinity of Market Street, praying said street may be widened to sixty feet was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition of Sundry Inhabitants of Provoost Street, praying the Side-Walks may be regulated and paved, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Fifth Ward and Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Simeon Freeland to be employed as a Lamp-lighter was read and referred to the Lamp Committee.

[8] A Petition of Stephen S. Clay to be appointed one of the City Weighers, was read and referred to the Special Committee on Weigh-masters.

A Petition of Benjamin Birdsall for further allowance on his

Contract to furnish Iron Railing in front of the City Hall, was read and referred to the Committee on Arts and Sciences.

A further petition of James R. Mullany on the subject of Stairs erected by him in Warren Street was read and referred to the Street Committee.

The Street Commissioner presented the following Ordinances which were passed: Viz—for regulating Grand Street from Forsyth to Suffolk Street; for regulating and paving Ludlow Street from Delancey to Rivington Street—in which Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Bau-douine and John Brower were appointed Assessors: for a Well and Pump in Cherry Street between Scammel and Walnut Streets—in which [9] Abraham Bloodgood, John Targee and Jacob C. Mott were appointed Assessors; and for paving Broadway from Bleecker to Art Streets, in which John Targee, Abraham Bloodgood and John Brower were appointed Assessors.

He also presented an Assessment for paving Water Street from Clinton to Corlaer's Street, which was confirmed and Noah Jarvis appointed Collector.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents for Assessments for a Well and Pump in Laurens Street, for a Well and Pump in Jay Street, and for paving Orange Street. Whereupon Warrants were ordered to issue to the Collectors for collecting the same.

He also presented a Return of property on which sundry Assessments had been laid, and which remained unpaid; and he recommended that the said property be advertised and sold agreeably to the law in that case made and provided—which was approved, and he was directed to sell [10] the same, previously advertising.

The Street Commissioner presented the following report, respecting property sold for Assessments, which was approved and the publication directed to be made as in said Report mentioned: which report was: "That on the 6th of March 1817 a considerable deal of property was sold for the payment of sundry Assessments, and the certificates thereof given agreeably to the Law passed on April 12th 1816, by which it is also enacted that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall, at least six months before the expiration of two years after any such sale, cause an advertisement to be published, at least once in each week, for four weeks successively, in the news-paper printed by the printer to this state, and in one of the public newspapers printed in this City, in such form as they shall deem best calculated to give notice of such sale; and that unless the lands sold be redeemed by a certain day they would be [11] conveyed

to the purchaser; and if the person claiming title to the said lands and tenements, or some one on his or her part, shall not within two years from the date of the Certificate pay to the Street Commissioner of the City of New York, for the use of the purchaser, his executors, administrators or assigns, the sum mentioned in such certificate, together with the interest thereof at the rate of 20 per cent per annum, from the date of such certificate, The Mayor, Alderman and Commonalty shall, at the expiration of the said two years, execute to the purchaser, his executor, administrator or assigns a Lease, under the Common Seal of the said City, of the land and tenements so sold, for such term of years as the same shall have been sold, and such lease shall be conclusive evidence that the sale was regular &c.

“The Street Commissioner would therefore respectfully suggest the propriety of a notice being prepared under the directions of the Counsel for that purpose.”

[12] The Attorney of the Board, on the Petition of William Niblo, reported:

“That the alterations or additions, alluded to by the petitioner in his petition, consist of a Two-Story building intended for a dwelling-house adjoining the one occupied by him on the corner of William and Pine Streets. The building of the said house was commenced by erecting a wooden frame, usual in the erection of wooden buildings; that after it had been erected and under cover a complaint was made at the Office of the Attorney against the same by persons owning real property in the neighbourhood: that some time thereafter a suit was commenced on said complaint: that after the commencement of said suit several material alterations were made in the mode of completing said building—one of the sides instead of being slated was filled in or run up with bricks in such a manner as to give satisfaction in a great measure to persons who felt themselves interested. The walls [13] generally, altho' not composed of bricks or stone as directed by the act for the more effectual prevention of fires, are made to consist of brick and the wood posts which are a part of the frame of the building. He has caused the house to be examined since it has been finished, and it having been done in a manner to exhibit the appearance and in a great measure to have the effect of a fire-proof building. He would respectfully suggest the propriety of recommending to the Chamberlain of the City a discontinuance of the suit and a remission of penalties upon payment of costs.”

[19] The same Committee, on the petition for laying the Carriage Way in Hammond Street, reported:

"That they, having duly considered the subject of the petition, recommend that the request of the petitioners be granted and that the Street Commissioner be directed to report ordinances accordingly."

The Canal Committee, on the subject of Three several memorials from owners and Inhabitants in the vicinity of Canal Street praying for an immediate execution of the intended regulation of that street, reported:

“That the regulation lately adopted ought to be carried into immediate effect. They are fully persuaded that if these streets had been regulated two or three years ago the greater part of the ground in their vicinity now vacant [20] would have been covered with buildings: the Committee can see no good reason whatsoever for postponing it: on the contrary they believe that the health and interests of the City require it and those of the neighbourhood particularly demand it. The state of the finances of the Board may be considered an objection against giving immediately into the measure, but this obstacle may be easily surmounted and the regulation carried into effect without taking one dollar from the Treasury. The Committee do therefore respectfully submit the following system for carrying the said regulations into effect—towit: “That the work and materials of the sewers be done by contract, to be divided into two or more sections, and separate proposals be received for each section: that the contracts describe in the most particular manner the quality of the materials to be used and the manner in which the work is to be done: that it be done subject to the inspection and control of a person to be appointed by [21] the Corporation; and, if required by the Corporation, the work in each section to be commenced at 2 or more points at the same time: the Contractors to be paid by instalments as the work progresses, say 25 per cent when $\frac{1}{4}$ of the work is done, 25 per cent more when $\frac{1}{2}$ is done, and 25 per cent when $\frac{3}{4}$ done, and the remaining 25 per cent when the whole is completed: to meet these payments, so soon as the expence can be ascertained, which will be when the contracts are entered into, Assessors to be appointed to assess the same according to law; which assessment to be collected by instalments to meet the several payments: and that the Street Commissioner under the direction of the Canal Committee take the necessary measures to carry the same into immediate effect.”

[22] The Report of the Special Committee on the petition of the Trustees of the Institution for the Relief of the Deaf and Dumb was called up and being read the blanks therein were filled up and the Report agreed to as in the words following: Viz.

“ They have given the subject all the attention which their time and capacity for investigating its merits would admit, and have no hesitation in saying that, if properly patronized the Institution for the instruction of the Deaf and Dumb will become one of the most beneficial and useful establishments in this City.

“ For the purpose of ascertaining the practicability and method of instructing these interesting objects, the Committee visited the School in company with some of the Directors and were highly gratified at the progress of the scholars as well as the emulation excited in them by their teacher to excel each other in their studies. Judging from this exhibition of the talents displayed by the Deaf and Dumb, the Committee are satisfied that they may not only be taught the rudiments of education but, with attention and perseverance attain a knowledge of many of the higher branches of study.

“ The Committee are unable to express the feelings of humanity and commiseration excited in them on viewing the wretched condition of these sons and daughters of ignorance, and feel themselves bound by every consideration of propriety to recommend their case to the humane consideration of the Board as one of peculiar interest, both as it respects the objects themselves as well as the public at large.

“ The Institution was incorporated by Act of Legislature on the 17th of April 1817 and has been in operation only 5 weeks. The school consists of 11 scholars, 3 females and 8 males, who are taught reading, writing and the art of conversing by signs, and an attempt with some success, has been made to instruct them to articulate words and short sentences

[24] “ Only two of the scholars pay for their education: the friends and relations of the others being poor and unable to pay, they are taught gratis. The price of a quarter's schooling is fixed by the Directors, for those who are able to pay, at Ten dollars, including the necessary stationary, Slates &c.

“ The annual expence of the present establishment, altho' very limited in the numbers, cannot be estimated at less than 2500 dollars, for the payment of which the Directors have no other resource except the voluntary donations of the charitable and benevolent. Frequent applications are made for admission in the school by those whose circumstances will not permit them to pay the expence of tuition;

but the finances of the Institution are at so low an ebb, that it is impossible to admit more than the present number, and even they will be found too many, unless something is done to foster and protect them until efficient aid can be obtained.

[25] "It has been ascertained that more than Sixty of these unfortunate beings are now residents in this City, the greater part of whom, if left in their present ignorance, must sooner or later become chargeable on the public for their support. Under this consideration is it not the interest of the Corporation to foster and encourage this Institution, inasmuch as it will not only serve the cause of humanity but eventually prevent an increase of paupers and an addition to the expenditure for their support.

"The Committee have no reason to doubt that a disposition exists in the Board to assist, as far as propriety will warrant, so laudable an undertaking as the one under consideration: they therefore respectfully recommend the adoption of the following Resolutions:

"Resolved—that the Institution for the instruction of the Deaf and Dumb be permitted to occupy, during the pleasure of this Board, a room in the Third Story of that part of the Old Alms' House reserved for the use [26] of the Corporation, provided it is used for no other purpose except for the instruction of the scholars.

"Resolved—that the Directors of said Institution be authorised to receive in their school Ten Deaf and Dumb persons at the expence of the Corporation, provided such persons are in needy circumstances and unable to pay the expence of their instruction, and are inhabitants of this City, and, that the expence of each scholar shall not exceed Forty dollars a year.

"Resolved—that a donation of Five hundred dollars be made to said Institution to aid them in carrying into effect this laudable undertaking, and that a Warrant now pass for said amount.

"Resolved that the Committee on this subject be charged with the execution of the foregoing Resolution."

The Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

His Honor the Mayor presented the Calender of persons confined in the City Prison and Bridewell on the 20th July inst. accompanied with the following observations:— (see page 31)

[31] “The Court of Sessions adjourned on the 18th inst. after having delivered the City Prison by sentences, acquittals and discharges of 66 prisoners. It appears that there were in the Bridewell on the Monday following 94 persons, 52 whites and 42 blacks. Of the 94 twenty five are convicts, all but one of whom are sentenced by the Magistrates of the Police Office as Vagrants, generally for the term of 60 days. Fourteen are committed by the same magistrates until they shall find security for their good behaviour, and 6 are committed as disorderly, that is, as appears by the warrants of commitment, they are to be confined until they shall be delivered by due course of law.

“Thirty seven are committed to answer on charges of crimes or misdemeanours: Viz—14 for assault and battery, 1 for arson, 3 for disorderly houses, 11 for larceny, 5 for forgery and counterfeiting or passing counterfeit money, 1 for administering poison, and 2 for prison breaking. One is committed for examination and 3 are [32] paupers about the house.

“One black woman, it appears, has been detained in the Bridewell since the 21st of April last, as being a slave run from New Orleans.

“The Mayor begs leave to call the attention of the Board particularly to this case, and to submit whether it be agreeable to them that the public prison should be rendered subservient to the authority of slave holders.

“Our laws permit a master under certain circumstances to hold a fellow creature in slavery, but it is believed that they do not authorise the commitment of a slave to a public prison to be held there during the pleasure of the master.

“The cases of the 7 persons who are represented in the within calender to be delirious or deranged appear also to deserve particular attention.

“No place can be more unfit for such unfortunate persons than the City prison. The Commissioners of the Alms house have expressed their willing- [33] ness to receive them in the Institution under their care, but, notwithstanding the great sums which have been expended on the buildings at Bellevue and their great extent, the Commissioners represent that they have no room for these patients: And indeed the portion of the penitentiary which is appropriated for persons of this description is so limited that they can receive but a few: and even these few can have none of the accommodations which common humanity requires should be provided for those afflicted with this calamity.

“There are only 6 cells of about 10 feet by 12 appropriated to male lunatics. In these there are now 19 persons. The cells are extremely confined and are in a part of the penitentiary that exposes the occupants to the smell and bad air which necessarily arise from the receptacles of the filth of other parts of the buildings. It is very certain that there is no convict who is not more comfortably provided for than those persons whose calamity is the only [34] cause of their confinement.

“The Mayor begs leave also to present for the consideration of the Board the situation of those young persons who are sentenced to confinement in the Penitentiary. There are now there 11 boys

under eighteen: several are under fourteen. They are shut up in cells with other convicts. It must be obvious that under such circumstances it would be in vain to expect that their punishment will improve their morals: It can hardly fail to have a contrary effect. It is presumed that some system might be adopted which would separate the aged and the young, and at the same time afford the latter employment and instruction. This might extend to both sexes and be a means of benefitting and perhaps of reclaiming many young females, a great number of whom are at all times confined within the walls of the Penitentiary.

“It is proper to notice that 6 of the prisoners mentioned in the within [35] Calender are sick. The diseases are Syphilis, Phthisis, and Fever.”

All which is respectfully submitted.

A Complaint against the offensive and dangerous situation of the Cellars under Duane Market was read and referred to the Chief Engineer and the Fire Wardens of the Fifth Ward.

A Complaint of Alexander Canniff against Smith Wood Inspector for refusing to give such measurement in a [38] Load of Wood as the Law allows, accompanied by a Certificate of Jacob Aiker a Wood-Inspector that said Load was deficient, was read and referred to the Committee on Public Offices.

A Petition of Melatiah Nash that the Collection of an Assessment on Lots Nos. 329 and 331 Broadway, the Lease of which is owned by him may be delayed, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Jacob Hyatt, stating that he had opened a marble Quarry on his land at King's Bridge, and praying a grant of the Water right of the Corporation near Spuyten devil Creek for the purpose of constructing a Dock at that place, was read and referred to the Road Committee.

A Petition of G. Vintroux Hersan, stating that in April 1817 he purchased at auction the Lease of Lot No. 162 Com- [39] mon Lands: that he finds the same in the occupancy of a person who has held it upwards of 28 years: that he was also deceived in the conditions of sale, and praying relief, was read and referred to the Comptroller.

A petition of John G. Warren, stating that in constructing an Area in front of his premises No. 46 Wall Street he had made the same larger than allowed by the Law, tho' no larger than that of his adjoining neighbour, and praying he may be permitted to continue the same, was read and referred to the Street Committee with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

A Petition of John Low, for a Water grant opposite his land on Hudson River between 61st and 63^d Streets, was read and referred to the Comptroller.

A Petition of John De Clew, for remission of fine incurred for

selling liquor at the Flag-Staff without license, was read. On motion to grant the prayer of petitioner, and a Division being called thereon, it passed [40] in the Negative as follows:—

[43] A Petition on behalf of Stephen Whitney for a Vault in front of his House in White Hall Street, and on behalf of William King for Vaults in front of 4 houses in Grand Street at the corner of Mercer Street were read and granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

Betts and of John Dusenberry to be appointed City Weighers—were severally read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

A Petition of John Mannel for remission of fine under the Street Law for selling Manure was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Petition of Deborah Post for herself and the Heirs of John Post deceased, praying a Water grant on East River opposite a Lot situated between the Lots of Cornelius Ray and Abraham Leggett and to extend from Water Street to South Street, was read and referred to the Committee on Wharves.

A Petition of Benjamin Clark, stating that for Ten years past he has been from bodily infirmity unable to perform military duty: that he has not to his knowledge during that time [45] been called upon to perform it, tho' had he been so called he feels it his duty to state he should from conscientious scruples have refused performing it: that he has lately been called upon to pay his fine or exempt Tax and praying relief, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition was received from a number of Builders in the City,

stating that they are under the necessity of using considerable quantities of Lime: that a Combination has been lately entered into among the persons supplying Lime so as that only a small number of vessels shall discharge Lime at the same time and that no other vessel shall discharge until those are fully unloaded, by which the purchasers are imposed upon and frequently compelled to take Lime of very inferior quality, and praying the interference of the Common Council. The Street Commissioner presented the Surplus Assessment for regulating Perry Street and an Assessment for paving South [50] Street from Peck Slip to Dover Street—which were confirmed and Morris De Camp appointed Collector in each.

He also presented an Assessment for a Well and Pump in Rivington Street near Chrystie Street, which was confirmed and Noah Jarvis appointed Collector.

He also presented a Return of Delinquents on the Assessments for a Well and Pump in Lewis Street and for a Well and Pump in Division Street: and warrants were ordered to issue to the Collector for collecting the same.

He also presented the following Ordinances, which were passed: Viz—for paving the Carriage Way in Hammond Street from Washington to Asylum Street, and Jacob C. Mott, Abraham Baudouine and John Brown[er] were appointed Assessors: for repairing the Drain or Sewer in Oak Street between Roosevelt and James Streets, and John Targee, Jacob C. Mott and Abraham Bloodgood were appointed Assessors: [51] for paving and regulating Vestry Street from Hudson to Washington Street, and the same Assessors were appointed; and for filling up and regulating King Street between Hudson and Greenwich Streets.

The Street Committee, on the petition for paving Vestry Street, reported that the prayer of the petition should be granted and that the Street Commissioner should report an Ordinance therefor: which was approved and an Ordinance presented agreeably thereto and passed.

The Attorney of the Board, on the petition of Robert Ferguson, reported:

"That Ferguson was complained of generally for driving and keeping in his employ Two Carts without License; in answer to which he stated, as is set forth in his petition, that he is a sort of Sub-con-

tractor under a Mr. Sloan who has entered into an agreement with the Corporation for filling in Houston, Thompson and other Streets and keeps his carts employed constantly in the Banks for that purpose.

[52] "There are many other persons situated similar to the petitioner, who generally work in the Banks, some filling in Streets, others filling in lots for private individuals. They all receive a compensation for the use of their horses and carts and are generally paid by the load. In the present case the petitioner receives 4 cents for every load he carts and is therefore carting for hire and within the meaning of the Ordinance. But inasmuch as the petitioner, when the Contract was made, was impressed with the idea that a License was not necessary for carts employed in that kind of way it might be proper to permit him to continue in the Banks with his carts, provided they are not otherwise employed, until the Contract for filling in said streets is fulfilled.

"The Attorney however states that in examining the complainant it appears that the petitioner has employed his carts, or one of them in carting for private individuals articles for which he [53] has received pay, viz—furniture, sods &c. and which is considered an interference with the business of the regular Cartmen and the principal cause of complaint which ought not to be passed unnoticed. He therefore respectfully suggests to the Board the following:

"Resolved that the complaint against the Petitioner as far as it relates to the employment of his Carts in the Banks be discontinued, but for employing his carts in any other manner the Law be enforced against him."

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and approved.

A Petition was received from Patrick Redmond, Captain of the Brig San Domingo, stating that he sailed from Ross in Ireland in May last having 115 Alien passengers on board; that the vessel was consigned to Thomas C. Butler Jr. of this City who refused to act as Consignee: that petitioner being a stranger and totally without funds has not been able to procure the surety for the Alien passengers [65] which is required by Law: that he has been prosecuted for not giving that surety and is now in prison on that account; and praying relief. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee with authority to act in the premises as they shall judge expedient.

A Petition of Naphthali Phillips to be appointed Clerk of the Common Council: of John G. Clark, of Aaron Pell, of Peter Riker and of Robert S. Hedden to be appointed Weighmasters; and of John Turk at present holding the Commission of Weighmaster to be continued as such—were severally read and referred to the Committee on applications.

A Petition was received from Aaron Ogden of Elizabeth Town, stating that the Slip between the Battery and the Pier erected by petitioner from the South side of Marketfield Street, under lease from the Corporation, for the accommodation of his Steam-Boat plying between New York and Elizabeth Town, is fast filling up and is now [66] too shallow to accommodate his Boats: that in consequence thereof in April last he made an arrangement with the Lessee of Slips for an accommodation for his Boats after the First of May then ensuing: at the exterior of the Piers lately erected by the Corporation at the South side of Whitehall Street, the same being then under lease to his Excellency Daniel D. Tompkins and others until the 1st of May last, and in consequence of such arrangement changed the Landing place of his Boats to White Hall Slip: that he understands the Corporation have extended the said Lease of his Excellency D. D. Tompkins: that petitioner has made an arrangement with the Lessees of Public Slips for their right to the use for his Boats of the water on the West side of White hall Slip between the North Line of the grant to his Excellency D. D. Tompkins and the head of the Slip; and praying that said accommodation may be given to him for such time and under such conditions as to the Board shall seem proper. Where- [67] upon the said Memorial was referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Petition of Elbert Anderson for permission to construct a Brick Cistern in Chamber Street in front of his house, he having no yard—which was accompanied with a Certificate from the Street Commissioner that he had viewed the premises and recommended granting the request of Mr. Anderson—was read and the prayer thereof granted on the usual terms under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Petition of Peter Jay Munro and others was received, stating that they hold under Lease from the Corporation Lots in the Sixth Ward which are charged with an annual rent payable in wheat: that they are desirous of commuting for the same but consider the terms as settled by the Board disadvantageous to them, and request the Board will take those terms again into their consideration. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

[68] A Petition was received from Charles McCarty, stating that he is Lessee under the Corporation of a Lot in the Fourth Ward on the South side of Cherry Street: that the opening of Roosevelt Street has left on the side of petitioner's Lot which is bounded by Roosevelt Street a small gore of unappropriated ground; and praying said gore may be added to his Lease. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of Ann Lockwood for a Huckster's Stand in the Washington Market: one of Margaret Johnson, Widow of James Johnson, stating that her husband had rented one of the Cellars under Washington Market which they had used as a Cook Shop, that she had received an order to pull down the Stove erected in said cellar, which would render the cellar useless to her, and praying relief: A petition of Jacob Patchin, Jesse Cook and Israel Reynolds, butchers, inhabitants of Brook- [69] lyn, stating they have received an order suspending them from bringing meat to be sold in the Country Market in the City, and praying to be restored to that privilege; and Petitions from George Paff, Samuel Preney, John Miller, Henry N. Disbrow, Thomas Place, John Akley, John Lee, Joshua S. Place, Thomas Bockover, Andrew Van Deusen and Lawrence Martin for Stalls in the Market about to be erected in Grand Street—were severally read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Petition that a Bell may be hung in the Market in Grand Street when finished was referred to the Committee on the subject of said Market.

A Petition for a Well and Pump at the intersection of McDougal and King Streets, and for one at the lower end of Mott Street were read and referred to the Aldermen and Assistants of the respective wards and Street Commissioner to report Ordinances therefor.

A Petition of Elbert Anderson for permission to construct a vault in front of his House [70] at the Bowling Green—a similar request of Gibson and Davis for Two vaults in Chapple Street—and of Robert Pearsall for a Vault in Elm Street—were granted on the usual terms and under direction of the Street Commissioner.

A Complaint from sundry Inhabitants that several small houses and shops in Washington Street on the Westerly side between Courtlandt and Liberty Streets project so far into the Street as to destroy the regularity of the same and to interfere with the convenience of passengers— and a Request from the same that Washington Street might be made of uniform width between Courtlandt and Liberty Streets—was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition that Crosby Street between Hester and Grand Streets may be regulated and paved was read and referred to the Street Committee.

A Petition from William Mackling con- [71] fined in gaol on suit for selling liquor without license and praying a release from the same was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Petition of Mary Crooker and Mary Moncrief for advance of

sums awarded them for ground taken to widen Roosevelt Street, was read and referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition of a number of Inhabitants of Roosevelt Street was received, stating that as the Street had lately been widened and must be regulated they wished a permanent regulation might be made, and as the Drain or Sewer in said street was offensive and injurious to the property in said Street they prayed the Street might if practicable be raised and the Water carried over the surface in place of passing thro' a Sewer—which being read was referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Petition of John Lovell to be permitted to remove a Frame House from Harman Street to Franklin Street was read and referred [72] to the Alderman and Assistant of the Seventh Ward and Street Commissioner with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

An Account of the Jurors who valued the property taken by the Corporation between Oliver and Catharine Streets and between Rose Street and New Slip was presented and was referred to the Counsel.

A Petition of Emmanuel Abrams to be relieved from a penalty incurred by opening made ground at the corner of Water and Broad Streets without having first obtained, agreeably to the directions of the Ordinance of the Corporation, the permission of the Common Council for that purpose, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

A Petition of James Hunt, Wood Inspector, to be relieved from a fine incurred by permitting a Cartman to cart Wood in his District without having the number of [73] his cart painted on the same was read and referred to the Committee of Charity.

A Petition of Catharine Hubbard, Widow and Administratrix of Ruggles Hubbard deceased, was received—stating that her Husband on the 21st April 1817 leased from the Corporation Lots Nos. 84, 110, 163 and 188 on Manhattan Island—that rent is due on said Leases—that she has no [money] nor is likely to have any to pay said rents—and praying that the Corporation will reenter on said Lots and discharge the Estate of said Hubbard from the rents due and to grow due thereon. Whereupon the same was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition that Water Street at Corlaer's Hook may be paved was read and referred to the Committee on Streets—and a petition that said Street from Pike to Rutgers Street may be filled in and regularly laid out, was referred to the same Committee.

He also presented grants for Water Lots on the North River to Samuel M. Thompson, Richard J. Tucker, Thomas S. Clarkson, Campbell P. White, Mary White, Goldsborough Le Roy Banyar, Mary Le Roy and [79] Cornelia Le Roy, and Water grants on the East River to John Agnew and Samuel L. Mitchill—which were directed to be duly executed.

He also presented a Lease to Daniel D. Tompkins and Noah Brown for the Ferry at Whitehall, which authorized the erection of a Toll house upon the same which was referred to the Ferry Committee.

The Attorney, on the petition of Davis Hunt, presented a report detailing a number of instances in which petitioner had acted as a dealer in second hand articles without having a License—whereupon the Attorney was directed to proceed in the Suit against said D. Hunt.

The Committee of Wharves, Piers and Slips, on the petition of Cornelius Harsin, reported:

"That they have taken the same into consideration and are of opinion that it will be establishing a precedent that will give the Board much trouble and altercation to settle cases of this nature, and to receive back property from persons who happen to make a bad bargain. Your Committee in this case recommend that the Corporation receive back the water grant from the [80] petitioner, and he be re-

leased therefrom by forfeiting the improvements now made on said premises if Harsin see fit to abandon on such conditions."

The Aldermen and Assistants of the 8th and 5th wards, to whom had been referred the petitions for a pump at the corner of Varick and Vandam Streets and for a pump near Walker, Beach and Chapel Streets, reported in favor of the same—which was approved and the Street Commissioner presented Ordinances for the same, which were passed.

The Finance Committee, on the petition of Benjamin Clark, reported: "That the subject is one of considerable importance, and involves in it the principle whether it will be just and proper in the Corporation to exact from the Society of Friends the Tax or Commutation fixed by Act of Legislature to be paid by them in lieu of military duty.

[81] "The Committee are of opinion that the Legislature have acted with great liberality and consideration toward this class of our Fellow citizens, in relieving them for a trifling commutation in money from the performance of a very inconvenient though necessary and indispensable duty; and in order that the payment of this sum should not interfere with their religious opinions on this subject it is declared by an Act passed the 15th of April 1814, that "the Commutation money to be received from the people called Quakers shall be paid to the several County Treasurers for the use of the poor of said Counties." The payment of this money, therefore, is a Tax for the use of the poor and not a fine for the nonperformance of military duty.

"From the view taken of this subject by your Committee, it will be perceived that it places the people commonly called Quakers in a situation, as it respects the performance of military duty, differing materially from the rest of our fellow-citizens—the former being exempt by law and not required to perform said duty, while the latter are not only bound to appear on parade at the call of the proper officer, but must furnish at his own expence the necessary [82] accoutrements or incur the penalty exacted.

"It follows, therefore, that the causes which would excuse the last from said penalty, such as sickness, being out of town previous to being notified and at the time of parade will not excuse the first from

paying said Tax or Commutation, and that the plea of Benjamin Clark stating that "he has been unable from bodily infirmity to do military duty" can be of no validity in the present case, inasmuch as he candidly confesses, had he been required, for conscience sake he would have refused.

"The Committee are decidedly of opinion, therefore, that Mr. Clark is justly bound to pay the amount of tax due from him as one of the Society of Friends, and that the Board ought not to interfere in any instance to prevent the operation of the measures now in train for collecting and applying to its proper object the commutation money due from the people called Quakers: for which purpose they recommend the passage of the following resolution:

"Resolved—that it is inexpedient to adopt any measure which will prevent or retard the collection of the Commutation money legally due from the people called Quakers."

His Honor the Mayor presented the Calender of persons confined in the Bridewell or City Prison returned to him by the Keeper with the following observations thereon—Whereupon the subject respecting Slaves was referred to the Committee on Laws. The remarks follow :

“The Mayor has nothing to remark of this Calender further than that it is gratifying to observe that the charges for high crimes are, considering the extent of our population, [87] but few, And to recommend to the attention of the Committee of Laws the case of the Slave whose name is reported in the Calender, that it may be ascertained by what authority the City Prison is rendered subservient to the authority of Slave holders.”

A Petition of Philip Brasher for a Vault in Chamber Street was read and referred to the Street Commissioner to grant on the usual terms.

A Petition of George Camerdener for a Stall in Washington Market or in the Market about to be erected in Grand Street, of Staats Dawson for Stall No. 30 Fly Market—of Isaac Varian and Henry Spicer for Stalls in the Market about to be erected in Grand Street—of John Glashong for Stall No. 4 in Spring Street Market—of George Limbert for Stall No. 41 in Washington Market, and of Thomas Vermilyea for a Butcher's License—and a Complaint of the Inhabitants near Catharine Market of Waggons encumbering the Streets and Side-walks were read and referred to the Market Committee.

A Memorial of Benjamin Watson, Register of Dogs, [88] stating that from the opposition he has met with he is not able to enforce the

laws respecting dogs without some aid, was read and referred to the Police Committee with authority to direct such aid to be afforded him as they shall judge proper and expedient.

A Petition of Anthony Tieman, stating that he has in his employ in grinding Paint Colors a number of Dogs, and praying said dogs may be exempted from the Tax upon dogs, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A Remonstrance from Cornelius Vanderbilt and others against granting the prayer of the petition of Aaron Ogden for accommodation for his Steam Ferry Boat at Whitehall, was read and referred to the Ferry Committee.

A presentment of the Grand Jury presented to the Court of Sessions held in the Commencement of this month was presented by his Honor the Mayor, read and ordered to be filed.

A Proposal to the Common Council, to purchase an elegant Brass 32 pound cannon was read [89] and referred to the Committee of Defence.

A petition of William Herriman to be continued as a City Weigher of Abraham Ackerman to be appointed a City Weigher—of John Stuyvesant to be appointed a Measurer of grain—and of John Conover for appointment of Fence and Damage Viewer for the 9th Ward, were severally read and referred to the Committee on Applications.

Two remonstrances against raising Roosevelt Street and causing the water to pass over the surface of the Street instead of passing thro' a Sewer or Kennel as proposed by a petition preferred to the Board, was read and referred to the Committee on Streets.

A Petition of J. Waterman was received, stating that he is Lessee under the Corporation of a Lot situated at the corner of Water and Roosevelt Streets, that there has been assessed upon said lot toward the expence of opening Roosevelt Street the sum of \$515 sixty eight cents, and praying to be exempted therefrom—which being read was referred to the Finance Committee.

A Petition for a Well in Willet Street near Stanton [90] Street, was read and referred to the Alderman and Assistant of the Ward and Street Commissioner to report an Ordinance therefore.

A Petition from Resolvert Stephens, Assistant Clerk in the Police, praying on account of the increased duties of his office that his Salary may be increased, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

A Representation of the Captains of the City Watch of the First District, stating that the Caps of the Watchmen were in a great measure worn out and required to be replaced by new ones, was read and

referred to the Watch Committee with authority to make the necessary provision in the premises, and extending their powers also to the 2^d & 3^d Watch Districts.

A Petition was received from Thomas Morrell, William Vail and William Hunter, Lessees of Grand Street Ferry, stating that they wished to commence the necessary fixtures for the landing of their Horse boat and requesting liberty for that purpose—under direction of the Street Commissioner: stating also that Mr. Gardner's [91] Pier on the Northeastwardly side was unfinished and created an Eddy which would be prevented by completing the same, and praying the same may be ordered to be done—which being read was referred to the Ferry Committee.

A Petition of Niobe Minturn was received, stating that Benjamin Minturn, William Minturn and John T. Champlin, as Executors of William Minturn deceased, sold to petitioner Lots of ground on the South side of Front Street between Roosevelt and Dover Streets; that prior to said sale said Executors sold the Lots opposite thereto on the northerly side of Front Street to divers persons, reserving the Water right; that petitioner has recently discovered that upon the petition of said Executors the Corporation have ordered a grant to be made to said Executors of the lots so purchased by petitioner, but that no grant has yet issued; and praying the grant may be now made to Petitioner—And a similar petition from John Patten respecting lots purchased by him of said Executors on the South side of Front Street bounded westerly by the said lots of Niobe Minturn—were severally read and referred to the Committee on Wharves, Piers and Slips and the Comptroller.

[92] A Petition from Abiathar Rogers, that a suit against him for not regularly reporting passengers might be discontinued, he having made a due report of the same, was read and referred to the Committee on Laws, with authority to grant the prayer of the petitioner.

[97] The Counsel, on the resolution respecting arrears of military taxes due from the Quakers, reported:

“ That he has given the subject his consideration and is of opinion that there is no legal mode by which the payment of those fines or taxes in arrear can be enforced. The Act to organize the Militia of this state provides that the Supervisors shall at their first meeting after they receive the list of the Quakers who may refuse to pay military duty issue warrants to the Collectors of the Wards for levying, within 60 days from the time the warrant is delivered to them, the sum of Four dollars of the goods and chattels of each of the persons named in the said list. This is the only remedy which the law has provided for the collection of these fines, and as the period within which the Collectors are required to levy the same has long since elapsed, it follows that they cannot now be collected. The act for the more effectual collection of taxes and Assessments in the City of New York passed 12th April 1816 is confined to such taxes in arrear as are laid on lands and tenements, and does not extend to personal taxes. The question whether a suit can be maintained for a personal Tax has never been decided by the Supreme Court of this State. It was once brought before them upon a Certiorari from [98] a Justice's Court, when it was decided that the proceedings had been irregular, and that the judgment could not be sustained in that case, if it could in any for the recovery of a personal Tax. As these penalties were imposed by a statute which has pointed out the manner in which they are to be enforced, the Counsel is of opinion that no other mode of compelling the Delinquents to pay them can be resorted to.”

He also upon the account of the Jurors for valuing property taken for public purposes referred to him at the last meeting of the Board reported that the account does not exceed what has been heretofore taxed and what has been usual to allow them for the like services—which was approved and a Warrant directed to be reported therefor. The account as stated was for 5 days service each juror, being 60 days One hundred and eighty dollars.

The Road Committee on the application of Jacob Hyatt for permission to build a Bulkhead and wharf adjoining Spuyten Duyvel Creek near Kings' bridge—reported that the prayer of the petitioner ought to be granted: which was approved and a grant directed to be prepared agreeably thereto.

The Finance Committee, on the subject of Alien passengers, reported. " That on the 23^d of December last a resolution was adopted, authorising his Honor the Mayor to leave it at the option of the Captain or Consignee of Vessels arriving at this port with Alien passengers either to bond in the usual way or pay the sum of Five dollars for each Alien [100] passenger in lieu of Bonds: that comparatively a very small number of the Aliens who have arrived since the above date have accepted of the option to commute, owing, as the Committee are informed, to the disproportion between the sum demanded and the risk to be taken by the persons executing the Bonds.

" The Committee are of opinion that the interest of the Corporation will be promoted by a reduction of the sum to be paid in lieu of Bonds, and therefore, for the purpose of bringing the subject before the Board respectfully propose the following Resolution:

" Resolved that his Honor the Mayor be, and he is hereby authorised to receive from the Captain or Consignee of vessels arriving with Alien passengers Three dollars for each Alien so arriving, in lieu of Bonds; and that so much of a Resolution passed the 23^d of De-

ember 1817 as fixes the sum to be received at Five dollars be and the same is rescinded."

The Finance Committee, on the petition of Patrick Redmond, re-

ported: "That being satisfied of his inability to pay the penalty incurred by landing Alien passengers previous to giving the necessary bonds, and also that his transgression was owing to the distressed situation in which he was placed and not to any premeditated intention to violate the law, have directed the Clerk, at the solicitation of the friends of said Redmond, to receive bonds in the usual way for the passengers [103] by the San Domingo and to release him, the said Redmond from confinement, all which has been complied with." (signed) The whole Committee—Which was approved.

The Finance Committee, on the petition of Peter Jay Munro and others, presented a report recommending the following Resolutions:

"Resolved that the Owners of Lots in the 6th ward subject to the payment of an annual wheat rent be permitted to commute for the same on the conditions as follow—that is to say:—the amount of cash to be paid for each lot shall be such as to produce an annual amount of interest at 6 per cent which will be equal to the amount of rent, calculating said rent at Two dollars and twenty five cents for each bushel of wheat annually to be paid for the lots respectively.

[104] The Finance [Committee], on the Petition of Catharine Hubbard, reported: "That on the 1st instant the rent due on said lots was Sixty dollars: that the leases held for the same are sealed Instruments and therefore have a preference in law, as the Committee are informed over other debts: and as in the last resort the Corporation have the right to reenter for the non-payment of rent, the Committee cannot perceive any reason why they should accede to the terms offered by the petitioner. They have reason to believe however that the Estate left by the said Ruggles is not very ample and that the lots alluded to will be of little or no advantage to the Administratrix, otherwise the petition under consideration would never have been presented to the Board. The Committee feel disposed, under all the circumstances, to recommend an acceptance of the leases provided the back rent is paid and therefore propose the following Resolution.

“Resolved that the Administratrix of the Estate of the late Ruggles Hubbard be permitted to surrender the lease of certain lots of ground in the Ninth ward leased to the said Ruggles, provided she shall pay all the rent which may appear due on the same at the time of making [105] such surrender and shall make the said payment on or before the 1st day of November next.”
