#### REPORT ON ORPHANS HOME.

When Mrs. Woodson, in November 1890, made known to the Baptist State Convention her intention to give all her real estate, estimated at \$30,000, for the maintainance of a home for Baptist Orphans, the initial step was taken.

The Home was located at Evergreen, January 16, 1893, and on March 10th, following, in a small rented house, the Home was formally opened, with Mrs. Clara W Ansley as matron.

matron.

Later the Convention purchased eighty (80) acres of land, 30 of which is in cultivation, 30 in pasture and 20 in woodland.

Since the establishment of the Home, there have been gathered into it some 53 boys and 69 girls, and I am informed it is managed as far as possible like any well regulated family. The boys are taught to do farm work and the girls various kinds of housework.

Attendance upon church and Sunday school is required

and family worship is held each day.

The time has come when the people of this beautiful southland, God's great sanitarium, must open their hearts and pocket books to take care of our orphans. Owing to the drouth the field and garden crops were badly damaged. With profound gratitude to God and sincere thanks to the generous friends for their aid, we beg leave to say we are still in need of money to meet the needs of the inmates. Your Committee would urge each church in this Association to make liberal contributions to this end.

#### Declaration of Faith of Alabama Baptist Association.

Article 1. Of the Scriptures.—We believe the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired and is a perfect treasure of Heavenly instruction (a) that it has God for its author [b] salvation for its end (c) and truth without any mixture of error—for its matter (d); that it reveals principles by which God will judge us (e); and therefore is and shall remain to the end of the world the true center of Christian union, (f) and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions shall be tried (g).

(a) All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doc-

(a) All scripture is given by inspiration of God. and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness; that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works,—2 Tim. 3, 6-17. (b) For the prophesy came not in old time by the will of man; but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost—2 Peter, 1—21. [c] These things are written that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God: and that, believing, ye might have life through his name—John 20, 31. [d] For the word of the Lord is right; and all his works are done in truth—Psalm, 33-4. [e] God shall judge the secrets of men according to my Gospel, Romans, 2-10. And the dead were judged out of those things which were written in the books. according to their wrks—Rev. 22-12. [f] Though we, or an angel from Heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let them be accursed—Gal. 1-9. [g] If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that ye have received, let him be accursed—Gal.

received, let him be accursed—Gal 1-10.

Art. 2. Of the True God.—That there is one, and only one true and living God, [a] whose name is Jehovah. [b] the maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and earth (c] inexpressibly glorious in holiness: worthy of all confidence and love [d] revealed under the personal and relative distinctions of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, equal in every divire perfection [e] and executing distinct but harmonious offices in the great work of redemption.

[a] God is one—Gal. 3-20. [b] That men may know that thou, whose name is Jehovah, art the most high over all the earth. Psalms 83-18 [c] For by him were all things created, that are in Heaven, and that are in earth, visble and invisible. Col.—1-16. [d] Who is like thee, glorious in holiness,

fearful in praises, doing wonders .- Ex. 15-11. [e] For there are three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Word and the Holy Ghost; and these three are one-1 John 5-7. For in Him dwelleth all the fullness of the God head bodily—Col. 2-9. Who being in the form of God thought it not robbery to be equal with God—Phil. 2-6. f] God sent his Son into the world that the world through him might be saved-John 3-17. Christ died for our sins, according to the Scriptures-Cor. 15-3. And was raised again for our justification-Romans 4-25. He ever liveth to make intercession for them.

Heb. 7-25. It is the Spirit that quickeneth—John 6-63.

Art. 3. Of the Fall of Man.—That man was created in a state of Holiness under the Law of his Maker, [a] but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state in consequence of which all mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice (b) being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, wholly given to the gratification of the world, of Satan, and of their own sinful passions [c) and therefore under just

commendation to eternal ruin, without defense and excuse.

(a) So God created man in his own image, Gen. 1-27. God made man upright—Ec. 7:29. (b) In adam all die, 1 Cor. 15-22. There is none righteous, no, not one—Romans, 3-10. Ye are of your father the devil, and the lists of your father you will do.—John 8-44. (c) He that believeth not is condemned already; because he hath not believed on the name of the only begotton Son of God--John 3-18. Who shall be punished with everlasting destruction-2 Thes. 1-8. (d) And he was speechless-Matt. 22-12. For the invisible things of Him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even his eternal power and Godhead; so that they are without excuse. Romans, 1:30.

Art. 4. Of the Way of Salvation .- That the salvation of sinners is wholly of grace [a] through the mediatorial office of the Son of God (b) who took on him our nature, yet without sin (e); honored the law by his personal obedience, and man's atonement for our sins by his death (d) being risen from the dead he is now enthroned in Heaven [e]; and uniting in his wonderful person the tenderest sympathies with divine perfection is every way qualified

to be a suitable, a compassionate, and an all sufficient Savior [f].

[a] For by grace ye are saved, through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God-Eph. 2-8. [b) For there is one God and one Mediator between God an man, the man Jesu- Christ-1 Tim. 2-5. [c] For as much as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also took part of the same-Heb. 2-14. And in Him is no sin-1 John 3-5. (d) The Lord is well pleased for his righteousness sake; he will magnify the law and make it honorable. Isa-42-21. We were reconciled to God by the death of his Son-Romans, 5-10 [e] But we see Jesus, crowned with glory and honor-Heb. 2-9. [f] For we have a High Priest that can be touched with the feeling of our infirmities-Heb. 4-15. For in Him dwelleth the fullness of the Godhead.Col. 2-9.

Art. 5. Of Justification .-- That the great Gospel blessing, which Christ of his fullness bestows on such as believe in him in justification [a]: that justification consists in the pardon of sin and promise of eternal life on the principles of righteousness [b]; that it is bestowed not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through his own redemption and righteousness [c]; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for

time and eternity. (d.]

(a) Therefore being justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ-Romans, 5-1. b] Whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins-Acts, 10-30. He that believeth in the Son hath everlasting life, John, 3-36. Whom God hath set forth to be a propitiation, through faith in his blood to declare his righteousness for the remission of sins that are past, through the forbearance of God-Romans 3-25. [c]; not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost—Titus, 3-5. d); He that spared not his own Son but delivered Him up for us all. how shall be not with him also freely give us all things. Romans, 8-32.

Art. 6. Of the Freeness of Salvation.—That the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the gospel (a); that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial and obedient faith [b]; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, except his own voluntary refusal to submit to the Lord Jesus Christ [c; which refusal will subject him to an

aggravated condemnation. [d].

(a) Look unto me and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth; for I am God and there is none else—Asa, 45-22. Whoever will, let him take the water of life freely—Rev. 22-17. [b] Now he commandeth all men everywhere to repent—Acts. 17-30. (c: Ye will not come unto me that ye might have life. John, 5-40. [d] It shall be more tolerable for the land of Sodom in the day

of judgment than for thee .- Matt. 11-24.

Art. 7. Of Grace in Regeneration.—That in order to be saved we must be regenerated or born again [a]; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind, and is affected in a manner those our comprehension for calculation, by the power of the Holy Spirit, so as to secure our voluntary abedience to the gospel [b]; And that its proper evidence is found in

the holy fruit we bring forth to the glory of God. [c]

[a] Except a man be born again he cannot see the kingdom of God—John 3-3. [b] And be renewed in the spirit of our mind. And that ye put on the new man which, after God is created in righteousness; and true holiness—Eph. 4:23-24. The wind bloweth where it listeth and you heareth the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh nor whitier it goeth, so is everyone that is born of the spirit—John 3-8. Everyone that loveth is born of God and knoweth God—I John 4-7. If a man love me he will keep my words John 14-23. [c] For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them—Eph. 2-10. We know that whosoever is born of God sinneth not—I John 5-18

Art. 8. Of God's Purpose of Grace.—That elect on is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he originates, sanctifies and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of m.n. it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, being infinitely wise, hely and unchangable; that it utterly excludes boasting and promotes humility, peayer, praise, trust in God and active immitation of his free mercy; that it is ascertained by its effect in all who believe the gospel; is the foundation of christian assurance and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves, demands and deserves our

utmost dilligence.

[a] God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the spirit and belief of the truth 2 Thes. 2-13 (b) Therefore I encure all things for the elect's sake that they may but in the salvation which is in Christ Jesus with eternal glory—2 Tim. 2-10. [c] According as he has chosen as in him before the foundation of the world. 4 hat we should be holy and without blame in love—Eph. 1-4. [d] And they that are with him are not called and chosen and faithful—Rev. 17-14. [e) Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect? If is God that justifieth, who is he that condemneth?—Romans, 8-33-34. [f] Wherefore the Lather. brethren, give all diligence to make your calling and election sure.—2 Peter, 1-10.

Art. 9. Of the Perseverance of the Saints.—That such only are real believers that endure unto the end; that persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from supericial professors; that a special providence watches over their welfare, and they are kept by the

power of God through faith unto salvation.

[a] Whosoever is born of God doth not commit sin: for his seed remaineth in him; and he cannot sin because he is born of God. In this the children of God are manifest and the children of the devil.—I John 2-9-10. [b] They went out from us but they were not of us—2 John 2-19. [c] God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be fempted above that you are able; but will, with the temptation, also make a way to escape that we may be able to bear it—1 Cor. 10-13. Who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation, ready to be revealed in the last time—1 Peter 1-5.

Art. 10. Harmony of the Law and Gospel.—That the law of God is the eternal and unchangable rule of his moral Government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability, which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen man, to fulfill its precepts, arises from their love of sin. to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a mediator to an unfeigned obedience to the holy law, is one great end of the gospel and of the means of grace con-

nected with the establishment of the visible church.

(a) Till Heaven and earth pass one jot or one title shall in no wise pass from the law till all be fulfilled—Matt. 5-18. [b] Wherefore the law is holy and the commandment holy, and just and good—Rom. 6-12. [c] That the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us who valk not after the flesh but after the spirit—Bomans, 8-4. Do we then make void the law through faith? God forbid; yea, who establish the law—Rom; us. 3-31.

Art. 11. Of a Gospel Church—That a visible church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel, observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by laws, and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by his word, that its only proper officers are Bishops, pastors; and deacons, whose qualifications, claims and duties are defined in the Epistles of Timothy and Titus.

(a] Paul a servant of Jesus Christ to all that be in Rome, beloved of God, called to be Saints--Rom. 1-7. Therefore we are buried with him by baptism

unto death-Romans, 6-4. Paul, an Apostle to the churches of Galatia—Galt-2. For ye are the children of God by faith in Jesus Christ. For as many of you as have been baptized into Jesus Christ, have put on Christ--Gal. 3-26-27. [b) Now there are divirsities of gifts, but the same spirit. And there are differences of administration, but the same Lord—I Cor. 3-4-5. (c) A Bishop then must be blameless-1 Tom. 3:1-7. Likewise must the deacons be grave—I Tim 3, 8-9-10; see also Titus 1.7.8. 9. Let the clders that rule well be counted worthy of double honor, especially they who labor in word and doctrine; and the laborer is worthy of his reward. Against an elder receive not an accusation, but before two or three witnesses.-I Tim. 5. 17.18.19.

Art. 12. Of Baptism and the Lord's Supper.—That Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father. Son and Spirit (a); to show forth in a soiemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in a crucified and risen Savior; with its purifying power (b); that it is a prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and the Lord's supper, (c] in which the members of the church, by the use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ, preceded always by solemn

self-examination (d.

(a) See here is water; what doth hinder me to be baptlzed? And Phillip said, "If thou believest with all—thy—heart, thou mayest; and he said I believe Jesus Christ is the Son of God.—And they went down—into—the water, both Phillip and the eunuch, and he—baptized—him—Acts \$36.37-38.—Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the floly Ghost—Matt. 28-19.—(b)—Buried with him in baptism wherein also ye are risen with him, through faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead.—Col. 2-12.—(c)—Except a man be born of water and of the spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God.—John 3-5.—Jesus took bread and blessed it and brake it, and gave it to the Disciples-Matt. 26-26.—And upon the first day of the week, when the Disciples came together to break bread-Acts 29-7. For as oft as ye cat this bread and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come-1 Cor. 11-26. (d But let a man examine himself, and so let him eat of that bread—and—drink of that cup.—Verse—28.

Art. 13. Of the Christian Sabbath.—That the first day of the week is the Lord's day or Christian Sabbath [a); and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes by abstaining from all secular labor and recreations [b]; by the devout observance of all the means of grace, both private and public [c]; and by preparation for that rest which remained for the people of God. [d]

and by preparation for that rest which remaineth for the people of God. [d] [a] I was in the spirit on the Lord's day—Rev. 1-10. [b] Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy—Ex. 20-8. For in six days the Lord made Heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested on the seventh day wherefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day and hallowed it—verse 1. [c] Upon the first day of the week when the Disciples came together to break bread. Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow.—Acts 2-7 [d] There remaineth, therefore, a rest unto the people of God—Heb. 4-9. Let us labor, therefore, to enter into that rest—verse 11.

Art. 14. Of Civil Government.—That civil government is of divine appointment for the interest and good order of human society. [a) And that magistrates are to be prayed for [b] conscientiously honored and obeyed [c] except in things opposed to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ (d] who is the

only Lord of the constince and prince of the kings of the earth. [e]

[a] For there is no power but of God; the powers that be are ordained of God—Rom. 13 1. For he is the minister of God to thee for good—verse 4. For rulers are not a terror to good work but to evil—verse 3. (b] I exhort therefore, that first of all supplications, prayers, intercessions and giving thanks be made for all men: for kings and for all that are in authority—I Tim. 1-2. [c] Wherefore ye must needs be subjects not only for wrath, but also for conscince sake—Romans 13-5. [d] We ought to obey God rather than men—Acts 5-29. (c) Christ is the blest and only potentate, the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords.—I Tim. 6-15.

Art. 15. Of the Righteous and the wicked.—And there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked (a); that such only as through faith are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the spirit of God are truly right-ous in his esteem [b), while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wheed, and under the curse [c); and this distinction holds among men both in a id after death [d].

(a) He that is not with me is against me—Luke, 11-23. Now if any man have not the spirit of Christ he is none of his—Rom. 8-9. in this the children of God are manifest, and the children of the devil: whosoever doeth not righteousness is not of God, acither he that loveth not his brother—I

John 3-10. [b] To declare I say at this time his righteousness: that he might be just, and the justifier of him who believeth in Jesus—Romans 3-26. But ye are washed, but ye are sactified, but ye are justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the spirit of our God—1 Cor. 6-11. [c] Except ye repent ye shall all likewise perish—Luke 13-3. He that believeth not is condemned already.—John 3-18. [d] He that is unjust let him be unjust still: and he that is filthy let him be fifthy still; and he that is righteous let him be right-cous still: and he that is holy let him be holy still—Rev. 22-11.

Art. 16. Of the World to Come.—The end of the world is approaching (a: That at the last day Christ will descend from Heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution (b): that a solemn separation will then take place [c); that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment; and the righteons to endless joy [d]: and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of man in Heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness [e)

(a) But the end of all things is at hand; be ye therefore sober and watch unto prayer-1. Peter 4-7. [b] For the Lord will descend from Heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first-1. Thes. 4-16. All that are in their graves shall hear his voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good to the resurrection of life, and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation—John 5-28-29. (c]. And before him shall be gathered all nations; and he shall separate them one from another as the shepherd divideth the sheep from the goats—Matt 25-32. [d]. And these shall go away into everlasting punishment; but the righteons into life eternal—Matt. 25-2. [e and the sea gave up the dead which were in it, and death and hell delivered up the dead which were in them, and they were judged every man according to his works. And death and hell were cast into the lake of fire. This is the second death—Rev. 20-13-14. Shall not the judge of all the earth do right?—Gen. 18-25.


