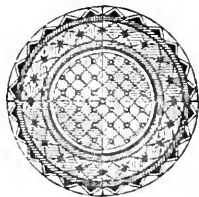

MINUTES.

FIRST DAY--MORNING.

PROVIDENCE CHURCH, CHAMBERS COUNTY, ALA.
Wednesday, September 22nd, 1886.

The Fifty-First Annual Session of the East Liberty Baptist Association of Alabama, met with the Providence Baptist church, Chambers County, on Wednesday, the 22nd day of September, A. D., 1886.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Home Missions have a very encouraging report to make on the success of our work as accomplished through our Home Board, located at Atlanta, Ga. The field for the work of the Home Board continues to open wider and reach farther every year. And we thank God that through the liberality of the friends of Missions and the earnest efforts of the Secretary of the Home Board, Dr. I. T. Tichenor, the Board has been enabled for the last Conventional year to extend its work farther than in any year in its past history, as the following will show: Last year the Board had in its employ 255 Missionaries, supplied 649 churches and stations. Did 9,599 weeks' of labor. Delivered 27,263 sermons and addresses, attended 5,238 prayer meetings, baptized 3,812 received by letter, 2,344; total addition, 6,156. Sunday schools reported 326; teachers and pupils, 12,154; religious visits made, 33,154; churches constituted, 70; meeting houses built, 49; pages and tracts distributed, 228,615.

Though the Home Board is doing a great and good work, yet when we think of the eighteen millions of people in the Southern States out of the ark of safety, we can say the work is just begun. The Home Board is doing an extensive work in Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, Florida, the Indian Territory, Texas, Western North Carolina, District of Columbia, and has stretched out her hand to help the Island of Cuba. The Home Board proposes to inaugurate an active work among the colored people in our own midst. The Home Board desires to raise ten thousand dollars to be expended in labors among this people this year. Will Alabama do her part?

May the great head of the church bless the work of Home Missions and prosper it until all American people shall have heard of the plan of Salvation in Christ, and be made christians and missionaries if possible. All of which is respectfully submitted.

The report contained the following sentence which was on motion stricken out: "There is no work fostered by the denomination that is of more interest, and that should claim so much of our prayers and money as the Home Mission work." The Association was unwilling to concede that the work of the Home Board was more important than

There are 31 Permanent Colportage Funds in the hands of the State Board, some of them not complete, however. The management of these costs a large amount of heavy labor to our Secretary, and interferes to a considerable degree with his opportunity to visit among the churches and associations. These colporteurs sold during the last Conventional year 2243 books, valued at \$1429.02, and donated Bibles and Testaments to the value of \$60.35. They have also aided in organizing churches and Sunday Schools.

Our own colporteur, Eld. J. F. Bledsoe, has given part of his time this year to the Tuskegee Association by an arrangement between the Executive Boards of the two bodies and the State Board. He has traveled 2377 miles. Sold and donated 613 books, valued at \$595.85. Has preached 91 sermons, visited 195 families, assisted in meetings where 96 were baptized, and distributed about 4000 tracts.

By this work the Bible and other religious literature is scattered over the field, the seed planting from which a precious harvest is expected.

Eld. J. P. Shaffer, Chairman of the Committee on Sunday Schools, read the Report of the Committee, Eld. J. F. Bledsoe occupying the chair. The Report follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The time for offering an apology for the Sunday school in the Association has past.

To urge the importance of Sunday school work is equally a waste of words, since it is universally accepted in our bounds, and almost all of our churches have schools.

What shall we say then? If our brethren will exercise a little patience and hear us, we beg leave to call their attention to some views we entertain in regard to Sunday schools and Sunday school work.

First: The school should be a theological seminary, in kind, and should with utmost care present and teach the doctrines of God's word. Great care should be taken to secure the very best teachers at our command. Teachers should appreciate the **RESPONSIBILITY AND DIGNITY OF THE CHAIRS WHICH THEY OCCUPY**, and should prepare for their work according to its importance and sacredness. If they will not do this, they should be relieved by others who will. No school has ever been known to succeed with a faculty indifferent to their work. A Sunday school does not constitute an exception to this rule.

Utmost prudence and wisdom should be exercised in the selection of a Superintendent for the school. In making the appointment it should not be forgotten that he is to the Sunday school what a President is to a Seminary of learning. Mere scholastic ability does not make men fit for College Presidents—they must have other abilities indicated by the character of work to be done.

The very gravest mistake that can be made in the organization of a Sunday school is to **APPOINT THE WRONG MAN FOR SUPERINTENDENT**. Can we expect that a College will succeed with a dead president to direct it? No more will a Sunday school with a **DEAD SUPERINTENDENT**.

Second: The teachers should bear in mind that the salvation of sinners is the central thought of the gospel of Christ, and that it is their duty to present this great doctrine of the gospel **CAREFULLY AND PRAYERFULLY**.

They should put forth their best efforts to lead their students to Christ, that they may be saved. They should be men and women of piety and faith, and they should expect that their blessed Lord and Master will sanctify their labors to the good of those whom they teach. All the children of God, in the school, should continually pray for the conversion of the unconverted students.

The second thought of the gospel is the development of christian character. The school, therefore, should address itself to this work, **WITH ALL ITS MIGHT**.

The very worst of our church troubles come of the want of christian development. Developed men and women, in Christ, and only such, may be expected, to act the part of heroes and heroines in the great battle against Satan and sin.

A christian may not be said to be developed unless he is benevolent **AND VERY BENEVOLENT**. He must be unselfish—Christ like.

Christianity proposes to eliminate selfishness from our character. We are fit for nothing in the Master's cause until this is done.

"If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me."—Matth. 16:24. Benevolence is a result from unselfishness, and cannot be taught by theory. We must act it; not merely accept the doctrine.

Mere words and resolution are a cheap sort of benevolence. The school must give—must put into practice what it teaches.

A school may give little or nothing for missions, or any other cause, beyond itself. Some schools are of this sort. This is not good training. If they collect any money, they manage in some way to spend it upon the school. This amounts to training the students to be selfish; no more, no less.

Such schools, if they should conclude to send a few dollars for Missions, gather the money by sending some of their irrepressible little girls out on the field to get it outside of their schools. All honor is due to the dear girls who go out to work for the Master, but the funds thus obtained are not given by the schools, and the facts in the case are misrepresented by their reports.

There is no development of the students by this sort of work. It is well enough to gather gifts from others, in order to develop them, but if we would develop ourselves, WE MUST GIVE.

"God loveth a cheerful giver."—2nd Cor. 9:7.

"It is more blessed to give than to receive."—Acts 20:35.

But we need not extend this report by quoting from the word of God to prove that we should be benevolent, that we should give, for the whole christian system is a system of giving; a system of Grace, from beginning to end.

It has been said that, the boy is father to the man, and if so, schools which do not train our boys and girls with reference to future usefulness, in both church and State, are not worthy the name, whether they be called Sunday schools or State Universities.

Third: In all that we have said we have taken for granted that the Sunday school is understood to be under the control of the church. That we may not be misunderstood, we will say that the Sunday school should be the church at work. It should not be regarded by the church as a separate and independent institution; nor should it be educated to so regard itself.

Untold troubles between church and school might be the result; indeed we do not see how it could be otherwise. To avoid all this, the school should be fully under the control of the church. The church should appoint the officers and teachers of the school, select its literature, and be responsible for its conduct in every respect.

As nearly as possible, the entire membership of the church should be connected with the school. NOT TO BE IS HARDLY PARDONABLE. To encourage others to attend the school and refuse to do so ourselves, places us where it will be very difficult for us to explain our conduct. indeed IT CANNOT BE DONE, SATISFACTORILY TO THINKING CHRISTIANS.

In this connection we would very earnestly urge upon our churches the adoption of the "Envelope Plan," devised by our efficient Secretary, Bro. Crumpton, who will supply gratis all necessary material to put the plan into operation. Many of our churches have already adopted this plan with good results.

THE REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Brethren : When we consider this age of progress with all the varied duties of life pressing upon us, we feel so much in need of a well developed mind. In every department in life we stand in need of it. While it is necessary and very important to train the mind, it is more important to train the heart. The true idea of education was born of the church of God; and now can but be regarded as a heavenly enterprise of the church of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Wisdom and understanding are commended by the inspired word of the Most High and both are the fruit of genuine education.

I do not know what to think of a christian church that opposes education, and thereby endorses and encourages ignorance amongst its members and their children.

With this wonderful responsibility upon her, and the dread command of God urging her forward, the church which folds her hands and allows the unconverted world to take charge of the cause of education.

We should patronize and encourage denominational schools. I fear—yes I know, that we Baptists have not thought enough upon this subject. Everything considered, we cannot afford to fail to patronize our denominational schools. In this connection we recommend to the favorable consideration of the brethren our denominational schools—the Howard and the Judson, in both of which we have beautifully blended heart and mind training. Brethren, there are so many fields to-day ripe unto harvest, and the laborers are comparatively few, and the Master is still calling them to the work. Now let us contribute more liberally in the future for our means, for the developing and training of their minds for the great and glorious work which the Master has called them.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Dr. Nunnally was asked to address the Association on behalf of the Howard College endowment. He made a strong appeal, but was not overwhelmed with cash or pledges. He raised \$35.00 cash; \$625.00 in notes divided into five annual payments.

The Chairman, Eld. A. S. Smith, read the Report on State of Religion which was adopted without discussion, as follows:

.. **REPORT ON STATE OF RELIGION.**

Your Committee on State of Religion beg leave to make the following report:

From what we have been able to learn from the reading of the letters from the several churches composing this body, and from reports through our State paper, we conclude that we have made an improvement on the past year in a religious point of view. Quite a goodly number have

been induced to renounce sin and declare themselves servants and friends of our Lord Jesus Christ. There seems to be an increased interest in the cause of missions and Sunday schools. We are also glad to say that nearly all of our churches report regular or occasional prayer meetings. This we conceive to be the basis of religious prosperity. While all this is encouraging, yet we are far beneath the plain we hope to reach; and that we will reach by the help of God in the near future. In order that we keep the onward march, we insist that we realize the fact that the only hope for men and women who are down, and struggling to rise is the gospel, and that we forsake not the assembling of ourselves together, and to feast our souls upon its teachings. We also think much trouble could be avoided by insisting more strongly upon having a converted membership. May God speed the day when the professed followers of Christ may be fully awakened to their duty realizing that they are the salt of the earth and the light of the world just in that degree that they represent Christ, the great head of the church and Savior of mankind.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee beg to report the following:

The subject of Temperance has engaged to a very great degree the minds and attention of the brethren everywhere in the bounds of the Association, out of which has grown much good for the cause. Many places where liquors have been openly sold to the public, have been closed up by the favorable action of the people where they have had elections on prohibition.

It is potent to the observer of events that public sentiment all over the country is rapidly being educated up to a higher and nobler plain of morals on the Temperance question, and ere long we hope to see christian influence drive the whiskey traffic out of the land. We urge upon all our brethren from the churches the importance of continuing and extending their efforts in forming and enforcing public opinion against the destructive traffic of whiskey in any part of the territory occupied by this Association. We believe that properly directed, the influence of the churches of the Liberty Association is sufficiently strong to close up every liquor shop in our bounds. To do this will require courage and perseverance on the parts of the pastors and membership of the several churches.

If Baptists fail to do their duty on this question, who will be responsible for all the woes that come from this traffic? Brethren, we leave you to answer the question.
