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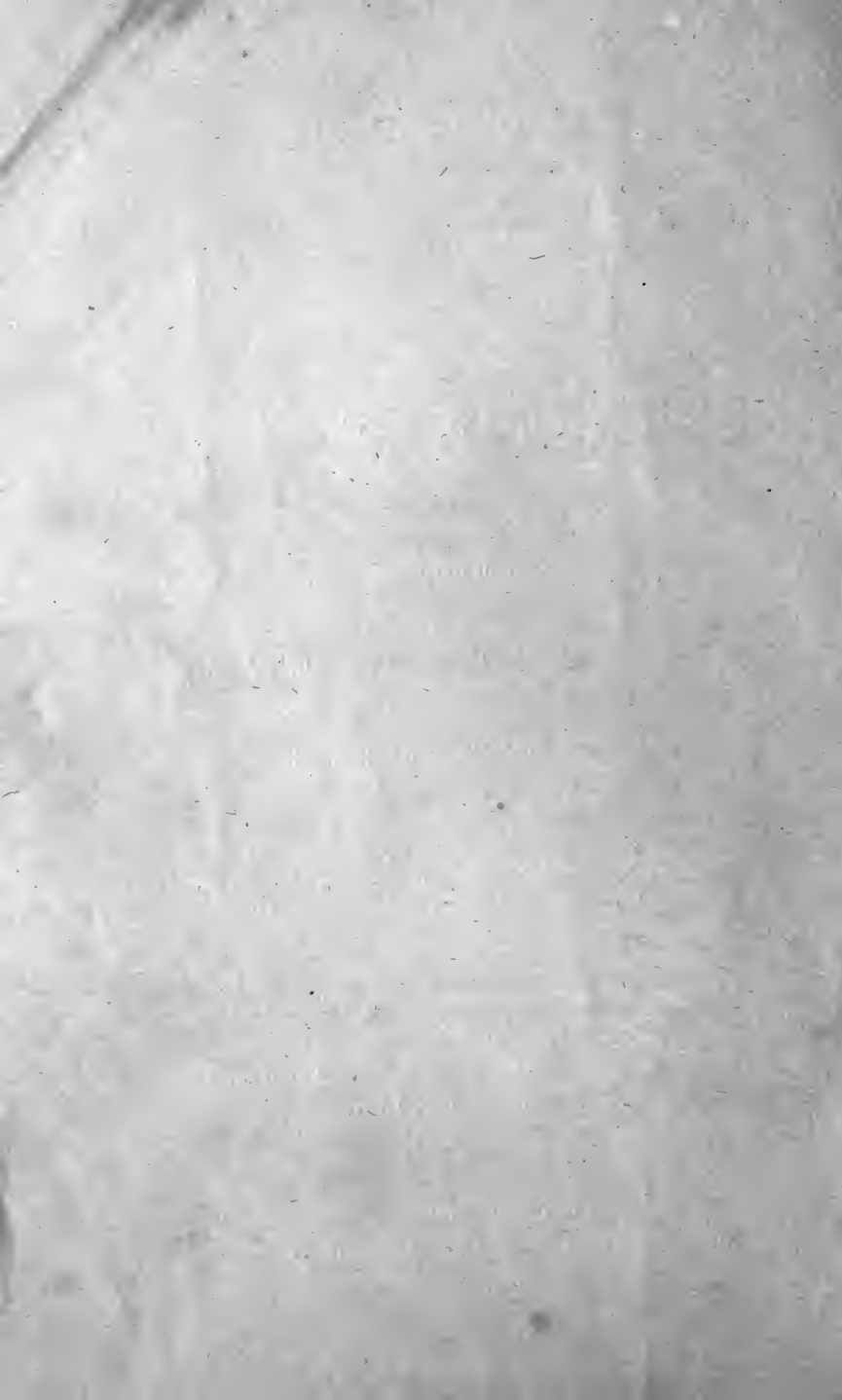

MINUTES.

SPRINGVILLE, ALA., Sept. 24th, 1886.

The Canaan Baptist Association met on Friday, September 24th, 1886, for the purpose of holding its Fifty-Third Annual Session.

At 10 o'clock, A. M., the hour for delivering the Introductory Sermon, it was thought best to postpone the delivery of the Sermon until a future hour, the greater part of the delegates not being present. Prof. Giles, of Howard College being present was asked to preach, which he did.

At 2 o'clock, P. M., the delegates assembled in the Baptist church house, and were called to order by the Clerk, the Moderator being absent.

After reading a part of God's word and singing a hymn, prayer was offered by J. C. Hudson.

The letters from the churches were then brought forward and read by R. W. Beck and R. J. Waldrop.

On motion of D. I. Purser, churches having petitionary letters were requested to present them, and the following named churches presented letters requesting membership:

The Deacons of Springville Church, together with Pastor J. A. Glenn and Brother Penn Cheek were appointed as a Committee on Devotions.

On motion of D. I. Purser, B. F. Giles, of Howard College, was invited to present the claims of Howard College, which he did in an interesting discourse.

The following committee were appointed to pro-rate amount among the churches asked by the State Mission Board: J. M. Huey, E. Y. Daniel, T. W. Herring.

The hours of meeting and adjournment of the Association were fixed as follows Meet 9 A. M. ; adjourn 12:30 P. M. ; meet 2 P. M. ; adjourn 4:30 P. M. Night session, meet 7:30 ; adjourn at will.

On motion, the Report on Education to be made at 7:30 o'clock to-night and the subject of ministerial education to be specially considered.

On motion of G. T. Green, the Association appointed correspondents to the colored Association adjacent to the Canaan.

On motion of R. W. Beck, the Association was divided

into three Districts: Committee on Division, R. W. Beck, J. M. Huey, O. J. Waldrop.

On motion, adjourned.

NIGHT SESSION.

7:30 P. M.—The house was called to order by the Moderator.

Prayer by R. W. Inzer.

The Report on Education was read by R. J. Waldrop, and on motion for adoption, was discussed by Prof. Giles, C. H. Hudson, D. I. Purser and others. During the discussion the following pledges were made for Ministerial Education: First Church of Birmingham, \$35.00; Ruhama, \$15.00; South Side, \$20.00; Pratt Mines, \$5.00; Central, \$5.00; Salem, \$5.00; Springville, \$5.00; Cahaba, \$10; Canaan, \$5.00; Pleasant Ridge, \$10.00; Dolomite, \$10.00; Second Church of Birmingham, \$10.00; New Prospect, \$5.00; A. J. Nunnally, \$5.00, paid; R. W. Beck, \$5.00; W. R. Dean; \$5.00; E. B. Waldrop, \$5.00; J. H. Hudson, \$5.00; after which the report was adopted.

The Moderator appointed J. M. Huey, E. Y. Daniel T. W. Herring to pro-rate among the churches asked of Association by the State Mission Board.

On motion adjourned.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 25th, 9 A. M.

The Moderator called the house to order.

Prayer by H. B. Ralls.

Called for Report on Foreign Missions, which was made by E. B. Waldrop, and on motion of D. I. Purser the report was laid on the table until the reports of Home and State Missions were read, so that the subject of Missions might be considered under one general head.

The Report on Home Missions was read by G. A. Chunn.

The Report on State Missions was made by D. I. Purser, he reading Crumpton's circular and commenting on same.

The subject of Missions was discussed by R. W. Inzer, H. B. Ralls, J. A. Glenn, W. E. Herring.

During the discussion raised \$15.50, balance on A. J. Waldrop, colporteur fund.

The following resolutions was offered by R. W. Beck and passed by the body :

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the editorial management of the *Alabama Baptist*, and urge its support upon this Association and that we ask the pastors of the churches of the body to have appointed a committee in each church whose duty it shall be to see that, as far as possible, every family connected with the churches shall take this paper.

On motion, adopted reports on Missions.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

There are three motives for missions: The motive of the divine command; the motive of blessing the Church; the motive of saving the nations; and that there are three methods by which we may expect to realize a true ideal of missions.

We must have renewed prayer, we must have renewed faith, we must have a renewed system. The religion of the Bible is a universal religion, intended for all nations of people, and intended to be carried into all the earth. At the birth of our Saviour we are told that the angels that announced his birth to the astonished shepherds, declared that they brought good news of glad tidings, which should be to all people. Again we find our Saviour himself, from time to time, calling and commissioning men to go forth and proclaim His religion; to the people of Israel first—they were to go to them first from the fact they were looking for and expecting the advent of the Messiah. This being accomplished, our Saviour, before he left his disciples, widens and extends their commissions to all nations. "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." Every church of Jesus Christ, and each individual member of all the churches are required by the spirit of our holy religion to aid in this work. There is a grand and growing interest in our denomination, in regard to the subject of missions, not only in the Home and State missions, but in Foreign missions. There is a progressive as well as an ag-

gressive spirit, manifested among many of our churches, and we hail this as a brighter omen for the future of our denomination.

Some facts as reported by the Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board. In 1855, thirty years ago, when the Southern Baptist Convention met in Montgomery, Ala., there were twelve missionaries of the Convention from the United State of America, laboring for us in two countries. Now there are over fifty located in the five continents of the globe. Then the contributions of the churches to this Foreign Board were about \$30,000.00, now about \$80,000.00. For what God has enabled us to do, we bless His name and take courage and look hopefully to the future.

In conclusion, your Committee would most heartily recommend to all our churches reglar, systematic collections for missions, as recommended by our Secretary of the State Mission Board.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON HOME MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on Home Missions, beg leave to report that the number of missionaries during the past conventional year has increased more than thirty per cent; meeting houses built over two hundred per cent.; churches constituted over thirty per cent.; baptisms and additions of membership by letter, from twenty to thirty per cent.; and contributions about twenty eight per cent., as will appear from the following table which we have gathered from the minutes of the Alabama State Convention :

These figures show a very great increase, and this is as should be, for the prosperity of this work indicates the success of the Baptists of the South. We can say that the Home Board has under its control one of the most important fields of labor, and we firmly believe it to be the chief agency in developing and christianizing the waste places in our Southern land. Now, brethren, as there was an increase in the contributions last year, let us try to make it greater this year. Brethren let us be more liberal in our contributions than we have in the past. We also suggest that we ask the pastors of the churches of this Association to preach more on the subject of missions. The Lord has greatly blessed our labors in the past, and therefore we should take courage and do more than we have ever done before.

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

It gives us pleasure to note the fact that one hundred and seventy new schools have been organized under the direction of the State Mission Board during the past year. Let us call earnest attention to the importance of three things in extending this great work:

1st. Make earnest effort to get pious teachers who seek to know the Lord Jesus as the great teacher of men and Savior of sinners.

2d. Teach the Scriptures in the Sabbath Schools with the aid of the best Baptist literature, such as published by our Home Board at Atlanta, Ga., "Kind Words," etc.

3d. Seek earnestly to lead the children to Christ in their early years, for He says, "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Temperance in its ample fields of government, spreads its influence over all our human passions, proposing to restrain and keep them within proper bounds, but in this report our purpose is to urge all our churches, collectively as such, and all our members as christian men and women, to oppose the use of all spirituous or intoxicating liquors in all their forms, and to use every lawful means to prohibit the manufacture or sale of all intoxicants in our midst.

We deem it unnecessary to make an array of statistics to show either the loss of money and time thus wasted; or the untold amount of crime, misery, poverty, degradation, disgrace, wretchedness, ruin and death caused by this the most infamous, disgraceful and wicked of all human avocations—the Liquor Traffic. And while we rejoice and thank God for the great success the Temperance Cause is making in this, our day, throughout our country, and for the manifest hold the Cause of Temperance is taking upon the common minds of the people, through the efforts of christian agitation, we realize that we are in the midst of a great conflict in which we dare not falter, but must fight. The old Canaan Association covers a territory of sublime prospects and of fearful responsibilities which must be met. While we look with pride at the wonderful strides made in the development of the natural resources in our midst, we, as a christian people, organized to work for Christ, should remember that, "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging and he that is deceived thereby is not wise," and every rising smoke stack or sinking shaft marks an increase of labor for us to save the incoming people from the curse of the saloon and the fearful influence of drink, whose tide of wickedness, woe and death must be driven back. Therefore be it

Resolved, That we as an Association of christians, exercising an abiding trust in an ever blessed God, pledge ourselves to pray and labor

availing ourselves of every moral and legal means in our power, to banish from our broad land, and especially from the entire bounds of our loved Canaan, the monster fiend Intemperance, in all its forms of intoxicants.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS.

Your Committee on Church Improvements, realizing this to be rather a new feature in Associational work, is at a loss just how to make a full report. But it is a recognized fact that great progress is much needed in this direction. The brethren generally are too apt to give most of their attention to home comforts and home improvements, to the detriment and neglect of the House of God. Many places we find the houses of worship very inefficient and unfit for the use for which they were intended. Brethren, this ought not to be. God will not hold us guiltless if we neglect the charge over which he has placed us. Many of our houses of worship are planted in fine communities, where the people are blessed abundantly with the good things of the world, yet to look at the House of God one would suppose that it was an orphan an autocrat had placed in the community to be supported by the meagre charities of the people. Let us pause a moment and estimate God's goodness to us, and see if we do not owe more to Him for what we are recipients of from his hand. Do we give to His cause in proportion what we use for our own personal comforts? Brethren, if we were to do it our houses of worship within the bounds of Canaan Association would present a different appearance to what they do now. Suppose we were to do half, to say nothing for our whole duty in this direction, during our next Associational year, what would be the result? We would see marked improvements at once and the old houses that have been standing as makeshifts, so to speak, for quarter and half centuries past would be torn away to give place to new and elegant houses, and the spirit of enterprise and progress would be pleasing.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education report as follows :

We do not deem it necessary to enter an argument to prove the importance of Denominational Education, or Education on general principles. That has long since been settled. Our national government, the separate States of our union, denominations of all sorts have their especial schools for the Education and training of pupils. We, as a denomination, are not behind in this work. We can point with commendable denominational pride to our seminaries and colleges all over our commonwealth, where men and women are fitted for the great battles of life. We would call special attention to one phase of our denominational Education viz: Ministerial—a subject that some of the grand, great and good men of our State have taken on their hearts. The able Baptist State Convention, some few years ago, took this subject under special consideration, and for the last two years have made considerable progress. The past conventional year the Board has had thirty-two young ministers under its direction—young men earnestly laboring to prepare themselves to preach the gospel and preach it acceptably. These young men have been in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, in Howard College and in the High Schools of the State and we think much efficient work has been done for them. We cannot think that our Association has been intensely in earnest in this matter, judging from the last Treasurer's report. The amount contributed by the Association for Ministerial Education is not more than five cents per member, according to our statistics. We are aware of the fact that much more than this has been done, but it has not gone through the proper channel, and hence cannot be shown. So much for lack of system in our benefactions.

We take this opportunity of urging upon our pastors and deacons the importance of systematizing their church benefactions, and for the cause of the blessed Master press the importance of Ministerial Education. This work should be near every Baptist heart. It should command our money, our sympathy, and elicit our warmest support. *This is a work that the Baptists of Alabama can not let fail.* The present Board is located at Montgomery with Rev. Dr. M. B. Wharton as President, and we bespeak for it the assistance and the support that the magnitude of the work demands. We would not place a collegiate Education above genuine and christian manhood, but properly coupled we can send forth men "that needeth not to be ashamed." Your Committee considers the Education of our girls second in importance to no work, and in view of the fact that the first and most lasting impressions are received from the mother, then let us give our girls an Education, of both head and heart, that will fit them to train the children of the succeeding generations so as
