MINUTES.

CUBA STATION, ALA., Sept. 8, 1892.

The Bigbee Baptist Association met in its fortieth session in Cuba Baptist church, Cuba Station, Sumter county, Ala., on Thursday, September 8, 1892, at 10:30 a. m.

The meeting opened by singing "Jesus lover of my soul." The Moderator read the 34th Psalm. Prayer by J. W. Bozeman.

The Association then proceeded to the election of officers.

On motion of W. G. Curry, the former Moderator, J. R. Larkin, was re-elected by acclamation; F. M. Pond, Clerk by ballot, and E. M. Shaw, Treasurer by acclamation.

The following resolution was read by A. B. Spidle and unani-mously adopted by the Association:

"While discharged duty always carries with it its own reward, I think it but a deserved tribute to Bro. J. D. Cook that this Association express to him its hearty thanks for the efficient, prompt and faithful manner in

which he has discharged the duties of Clerk of the Bible Association for the past seventeen years; and we assure him that the good wishes and prayers of this Association will be with him in whatever field he may be called to work for the Master."

On motion of W. G. Curry, it was ordered that the Clerk be required to complete the file of minutes presented to the Association by J. D. Cook, and that the absent copies be requested through the minutes.

On motion, the introductory sermon was deferred until 7:30 p. m.

The Association then adjourned to 2 p. m. after benediction by W. G. Curry.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association re-assembled at 2 o'clock, and after singing "Nearer my God to Thee," J. G. Apsey led in prayer.

The report on Bible and Colportage Work was read as follows:

REPORT ON BIBLE AND COLPORTAGE WORK.

Your committee are of the opinion that this board has not received the encouragement and support in the past that its importance merits. Its work is done in a quiet, unobtrusive way, reaching out to the destitute part of the country, benefiting the poor, those who by reason of their poverty are unable to provide for themselves religious literature and who are not able to employ preachers. It is this class who specially bless God for the work being done by the colporter. Owing to the fact that some of the twelve colporters employed by the board failed to have their report in in time to have results embodied in the board's report to the State Convention, we cannot make us full a report as we would like.

From the consolidated reports of five we find room for encouragement. They sold and gave away during the conventional year 2,355 religion-books and 8,000 pages of tracts. Who can estimate the amount of good these books and tracts may do? They visited 10,255 families. Can you place a monetary value upon the influence the visits of these consecrated followers of him who spent his life working among the poor, on the joy and comfort they carried to the firesides of the humble followers of God?

To accomplish this work they traveled 7,010 miles, not in palace cars, but a part of it as Christ traveled—walking. If the sum not reported did the same pro rata, then the board's agents traveled 16,824 miles, visited 24,564 families, sold 6,372 books and gave away 19,200 pages of tracts.

Your committee, in conclusion, would call the attention of the Sunday-schools in the Association to the importance of buying their Sunday-school literature through the board, as it comes promptly, and at the same price, and pays into the board 20 per cent. of cash price.

The American Baptist Publication Society and Kind Words Series allow the State Board to retain this per cent. of all orders sent by them. Then, as a business proposition, it is to our interest. We would also state that you can buy any book suitable to be found in a Christian home from the board as cheaply as at any bookstore.

The report on State Missions was read by the chairman, as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We are of the opinion that great progress has been made in this field of the mission world since the last session of our body. Again, we can see many bright gleams of sunshine flitting here and there, which manifestly augur a growing interest all along the lines that mark out our Lord's vineyard. Judging from the reports of our Corresponding Secretary, many churches have received the benefit of missionary labor, and we feel a thrill of gratitude in being able to report to this body that there has been a decided advancement in State Mission work, and a general awakening to this glorious cause is now being manifested all over the noble State of Alabama. We might add to this another truth of great potency, namely, that the churches of this country have arisen from their sleeping lethargic state, and by the power and grace of God, are determined to redouble all efforts heretofore made to accomplish all available good for the Master's cause in this part of His faithful vineyard. In corroboration of this statement we big leave to submit a brief summary of the work carried on in the State Mission field. We find the number of men employed by this cause 51, days of service rendered 4,023, miles traveled 27,968, sermons delivered 27,908, addresses made 719, churches constituted 8, parishes 1,114, 1,015 those baptized in connection with missionary labor, 1,000 by letter. 141, reported 25, Sunday-schools organized 51, and a total of 177 prayer meetings organized 17, prayer meetings held 160, meetings of evangelizing stations without churches 29, number of visits to parishes 1,000, 1,000 churches visited 269, number of visits made 4121, parishes organized 1,000, 1,000 meeting houses commenced 22 and the same had not yet collected for meeting houses \$4343.29, money for State Mission cause 1,007.50. The whole amount for State Mission cause would reach between \$10,000 and \$11,000.

THURSDAY—EVENING SESSION.

Re-assembled at 7:30 p. m. The introductory session was preached by J. R. Larkin. Opening hymn, "All hail the power of Jesus name." Read the 2nd chapter of Romans. Text, John 13:34, 35.

FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Association met at the appointed hour. T. B. Woodward led the prayer service. Minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

The Moderator appointed the following committee on Finance: J. W. Blakely, J. W. Cook, E. A. McLean.

The report on Sabbath-schools was next called for and read as follows:

REPORT ON SABBATH-SCHOOLS.

It is with regret that we find a decline instead of an increased interest in our Sabbath-schools. If we are missionary Baptists with a full conviction of the rightful manner of honoring and worshipping our Lord and Master, why should we not give greater time and energy to the cause of Sabbath-schools? This is certainly not a day for idleness if we are Baptists, and want our children to be Baptists. We should wake up to its great importance, for it is in Sabbath-schools that all religious denominations are doing their greatest work. We hear this admonition every year at our Association and still we are growing less. If a church has no pastor it should have a Sabbath-school and keep up its organization by sending its delegates to the Association, and here we would request the churches to be more particular in reporting their schools in the associational letters. And again, if you can't have a Sabbath-school at your church, be sure to get good literature and teach your children at home, and this literature should be purchased through our board at Opelika, Ala., and that the churches be requested to purchase their Sunday-school literature from the Sunday-school Board at Nashville.

Next called for report on Ministerial and General Education, which was presented by the chairman and read as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL AND GENERAL EDUCATION.

Denominational education is only another name for Christian education. It comprehends all the institutions directed by Christians for the special scholastic training of the young. It stands in contrast with what is known as secular education. The purpose of such institutions is to give to the young men and young women from Christian homes such training as will fit them properly to meet the issues of life. Under the Baptists of Alabama we have two institutions which have been founded for the special purpose of equipping our boys and girls for life. The Judson Institute, at Marion, founded in 1839, has had a successful career ever since its establishment. Last year was one of its most successful. The college is justly esteemed one of the leading institutions for the education of young women. The attendance last session was 159 and the graduating class numbered 19. The Howard, located at East Lake, is the male college of the State, under the supervision of the Baptist State Convention. The wisdom of our people is vindicated in the removal of the college to its present location, as the attendance is double that of its attendance in its old location. It now has five handsome brick buildings and a faculty of seven professors and three

tutors. Its success is very great, giving tone of character to the young men while their intellects are being developed.

Howard College is doing a vast work in the education of our young ministry, thirty in attendance last session. For this purpose, the Missionary Board has been established. That board is dependent upon the churches for their contributions, and this year asks this Association for \$170 of the \$2000 needed to prosecute this work. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville is peculiarly our school of the prophets. After fitting themselves in literary schools for the course offered at Louisville, our young ministers should be encouraged to attend at the Seminary.

FRIDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association re-assembled at 2 o'clock. Began by singing, "Blest be the tie that binds." Prayer by the Moderator.

Committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located at Richmond, Va., has reached an epoch in its history. Conducting successful missionary enterprises upon four continents, it desires during this year to broaden its work. Its earliest missions in China are wonderfully prosperous,—reaching further toward the heart of the great empire of the Chinese and casting in the gospel heaven as they advance. The reports of the work from that portion of the field are most gratifying.

In Japan, our infant mission, the enterprise is under the direction of our own courageous and consecrated Alabamian—Jno. McClellan. The hope created in this enterprise, scarcely begun, is the fervid desire on the part of the Japanese to obtain information relative to American customs and practices. In the providence of God, this will furnish an open door to the minds and heart of that ingenious and restless people of the East. Our European mission in Italy is making steady progress year by year. In Africa much interest is excited in mission work by reason of the remarkable attention which is now being given to the Dark Continent. So much has been done and so much written about Africa that its invasion by the heralds of the cross is destined to be steady and encouraging.

Upon the continent of America there are two missionaries, viz: The Mexican and the Brazilian. The former has been successful from the beginning. All that can be done is being done in this priest-ridden republic. The Brazilian mission has received quite a providential impulse in the overthrow of an empire that was operated under papal influence and in the establishment of a republic of free thought and free speech.

This cursory view of our Foreign Missionary work affords a partial insight into the providential direction of our work. The work, in its scope, its spirit, its power is such as to awaken confidence and encouragement. The year 1892 is the centennial of foreign missions. During this year it is proposed to raise \$250,000 in addition to that which is usually contributed.

The Bigbee Association is earnestly asked to participate in this onward movement.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, the Committee on Temperance, beg leave to report: That it is gratifying and cheering to every good citizen to know that the cause of temperance is making great headway in every section of our country. It must be acknowledged that the liquor power is fast weakening. The forces at work against it are irresistible, and these are multiplying and increasing in strength and intensity. The people are waking up to a sense of their duty. Prohibition laws are being passed by States, cities, towns, villages and hamlets. Laws of temperance orders that used to be branded as foolish and fanatical, are now honored as wise, logical and good philosophy. Every institution that has for its object the accomplishment of good is arrayed against intemperance. All large laboring institutions have set their veto against it. Go to a railroad or a factory and ask for employment, and you are asked, "Do you drink?" If so, they will say, "We want no drunkards. Thousands of dollars have been spent on the different societies and organizations for the advancement of temperance. But the grandest temperance society in the world is the church of the living God. If the religion of Jesus Christ will not stop rumor from drinking, nothing else will.

And last but not least, we hope to see the time in the near future when the young ladies of our land will not receive the attention of our drunken young men.

SATURDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Association met at the usual hour, and the Moderator read the 3rd chapter of Hebrews. Prayer by W. F. Pond.

Called for the report on Woman's Work, which was read as follows:

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

Withing the last few years woman's work has assumed astonishing proportions within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. In all the States of the South, central committees have been organized composed of some of our most consecrated women, who give direction to their work. These central committees seek to appoint an efficient sister as vice-president in every Association in a given state. The Central Committee of Alabama is located at Birmingham, with Mrs. T. A. Hamilton as president. Mrs. Hamilton is the gifted daughter of Dr. H. A. Tupper, the corresponding secretary of our Foreign Mission Board. The vice-president of the Biblee Association is Mrs. A. G. Mellen, of Livingston. Her purpose is to see that a Woman's Missionary Society be appointed in each church. In view of the excellent results attendant upon woman's work in the past, and in view of that which is proposed to be done, your committee recommend for adoption the following:

Resolved, That the pastors of the Biblee Association be earnestly requested to assist in, and to encourage the organization of Woman's Missionary societies in their respective charges.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Your committee beg leave to report:

The interest in Home Missions is keeping pace with State and Foreign Missions. They have pushed their work to the extent of their ability, at their command. This forced by general request had given them the best of our cause in Cuba, and their efforts there under Bro. Diaz has been especially gratifying; while the field is being covered those parts of the territory occupied by our denomination, they have been able to make progress at all points.

The board has increased its workers and ask for means to enable them further increase. Your committee believe that it is only necessary for our people to know more fully about the objects of the board to respond more liberally, and to secure this end, we would earnestly recommend that the pastors of this Association exert themselves to increase the circulation of Missionary literature. If there was a general interest in State and Home Missions there would naturally be an increased interest in Foreign Missions.

CONSTITUTION.

1. This body shall be known by the name of the BIGBEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.
2. The officers of the Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at each annual meeting, from its own body, and shall hold their office until their successors are elected.
3. The Moderator shall preside over the Association, and shall discharge the duties usually imposed upon officers presiding over deliberative bodies.
4. The Clerk shall keep a fair record of the proceedings of this Association, and shall attend to the printing and distributing of the Minutes.
5. The Treasurer shall perform the duties usually assigned to such officer, and shall report annually to the Association.
6. The Association shall hold its meetings at such time and place as it shall from time to time appoint.
7. Every church shall be entitled to two delegates, and also one for every twenty-five members exceeding twenty-five.
8. This Association disclaims all right of exercising authority over the internal regulation of churches, believing that within their own sphere they are accountable to God only.
9. The Constitution may be altered or amended by the concurrence of three-fourths of the members comprising the Association.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one living and true God: that in the Godhead are Father, Son and the Holy Spirit.
2. We believe that the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the New Testament is the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe that the Church of God is composed of such persons as believe in Jesus Christ, and have been baptized; that baptism consists in the immersion of the whole body in water; and that the Lord's Supper should be administered to church members only.
4. We believe in the doctrines of grace taught by the United Baptists, viz: In the depravity of man; in the converting grace of God; in the resurrection of the dead; in the general judgment; in the eternal life of the righteous; in the everlasting punishment of the wicked.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. At each meeting of this Association the Moderator shall take the chair, shall call the members to order, shall decide questions of order subject to an appeal, shall open and close the Association with prayer, shall appoint committees, when not otherwise ordered, and shall pronounce the decisions to the Association.
2. The names of members shall be called each day, and invitations to seats extended to ministering brethren.
3. The members shall observe respect to officers and to each other, shall arise when addressing the Moderator, shall confine themselves to the questions, shall avoid personalities, shall not speak, without leave, more than once, until every member shall have opportunity to speak, and shall sustain that bearing to each other which becomes gentlemen and Christians.
4. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Moderator, and then shall be in the possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn by the mover before amendment or decision.
5. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend or postpone; which motion shall have precedence in the order enumerated.
6. All questions, except those relating to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority. Any member voting with the majority may move for a reconsideration on the day of decision. Members may not leave the Association without permission.
7. When questions of order are not provided for in these rules, they shall be decided according to the rules and regulations governing legislative bodies generally.
8. The Association shall have power to receive into its body and fellowship such churches as apply for admission; and shall also be empowered to withdraw its fellowship from any church or body of men walking disorderly, and supposed to be unworthy the fellowship of this Association.

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
