# MINUTES

CUEA STATION, ALA., Sept. 8, 1892.

The Bigbee Baptist Association met in its fortieth session in Cuba Baptist church, Cuba Station, Sumter county, Ala., on Thursday, September 8, 1892, at 10:30 a. m.

The meeting opened by singing "Jesus lover of my soul." The Moderator read the 34th Psalm. Prayer by J. W. Bozeman,

#### REPORT ON BIBLE AND COLPORTAGE WORK.

Your committee are of the opinion that this board has not received the encouragement and support in the past that its importance merits. Its work is done in a quiet, uno-tentations way, reaching out to the destitute part of the country, benefiting the poor, those who by reason of their poverry are unable to provide for themselves religious literature and who are not able to employ preachers. It is this class who specially bless God for the work being done by the colporter. Owing to the feet that come of the twelve colporters employed by the board failed to have their report in in time to have results embodied in the board's report to the State Convention,

time to have results embodied in the board's report to the State Convention, we cannot make as full a report as we would like.

From the consolidated reports of five we find reom for encouragement. Trey's Id and gave away during the conventional year 2.55 religions books and 8,000 pages of tracts. Who can estimate the emount of good those books and tracts may do? They visited 10.255 families. Can you place a monetary value upon the influence the visits of these consecrated followers at his life working among the work or on the light and of the second of th of him who spent his life working among the poor, on the joy and comfort

of Hill who spent his fire and high and the position of the properties to the irresides of the humble followers of God?

To accomplish this work they traveled 7,010 miles, not in palace cars, but a pertofit as Christ traveled—walking. If the sum not reported did the same projects, then the board's agents traveled 16,824 miles, visited 24,564

families, sold 6,372 books and gave away 19200 pages of tracts

Your committee, in conclusion, would call the attention of the Sunday-schools in the Association to the importance of buying their Sunday-school literature through the board, as it comes as promptly, and at the same price. and pays into the board 20 per cent, of cash price.

The report of Sabbath-schools was next called for and read as follows:

#### MEPORT ON SABBATH-SCHOOLS.

It is with regret that we find a decline instead of an increased interest in our Sabbath-schools. If we are missionary Baptists with a full conviction of the rightful manner of honoring and worshiping our Lord and Master, why should we not give greater time and energy to the cause of Sabbath-schools? This is certainly not a day for illeness if we are Baptists, and want our children to be Baptists. We should wake up to its great importance, for it is in Sabbath-schools that all religious denominations are doing their greate-4 work. We hear this admonition every year at our Association and still we are growing less. If a church has no postor it should have a Sabbath-school and keep up its organization by sending its delegates to the Association, and here we would request the churches to be more particular in reporting their schools in the associational letters. And again, if you can't have a Sabbath-school at your church, he sure to get your literature and teach your children at home, and this literature should be purchased through our board at Opelika, Ala, and that the churches be requested to parclase their Sunday-school literature from the Sanday-school Board at Na-hville.

## REPORT ON MINISTERIAL AND GENERAL EDUCATION.

Denominational education is only another name for Christian education. It comprehends all the institutions directed by Christians for the special scholastic training of the young. It stands in contrast with what is known as secular education. The purpose of such institutions is to give to the young men and young women from Christian bands such training as will fit them properly to meet the issues of life. Under the Equists of Alabama we have two institutions which have been founded for the special purpose of equipping our boys and girls for life. The Judkon Institute, at Marion, founded in 1839, has had a successful career ever since its establishment. Last year was one of its most successful. The college is justly esteemed one of the leading institutions for the education of young women. The attendance last session was 150 and the graduating class numbered 19. The Howard, located at East Lake, is the male college of the State, under the supervision of the Eaplist State Convention. The wisdom of our people is vindicated in the removal of the college to its present location, as the attendance is shoulde that of its attendance in its old location. It now has five hand-some brick buildings and a faculty of reven profes ors and three

thtors. Its success is very great, giving tone of character to the young men while their intellects are being developed:

#### CONSTITUTION.

1. This body shall be known by the name of the Bigbee Baptist Associa-

2. The officers of the Association shall consist of a Moderator, Clerk and and shall hold their office until their successors are elected.

The Moderator shall preside over the Association, and shall discharge the duties usually imposed upon officers presiding over deliberative bodies.
 The Clerk shall keep a fair record of the proceedings of this Associa-

tion, and shall attend to the printing and distributing of the Minutes.

5. The Treasurer shall perform the duties usually assigned to such officer, and shall report annually to the Association.

The Association shall hold its meetings at such time and place as it shall from time to time appoint.

7. Every church shall be entitled to two delegates, and also one for every

twenty-five members exceeding twenty-five. 8. This Association disclaims all right of exercising authority over the internal regulation of churches, believing that within their own sphere they are accountable to God only.

9. The Constitution may be altered or amended by the concurrence of

three-fourths of the members comprising the Association.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

We believe in one living and true God: that in the Godhead are Father, Sor and the Holy Spirit.

We believe that the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God.

and the New Testament is the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe that the Church of God is composed of such persons as believe in Jesus Christ, and have been baptized; that baptism consists in the immersion of the whole body in water; and that the Lord's Supper should be administered to church members only.

4. We believe in the doctrines of grace taught by the United Baptists, iz: In the deprayity of man; in the converting grace of God; in the resurrection of the dead; in the general judgment; in the eternal life of the righteous; in the everlasting punishment of the wicked.

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

1. At each meeting of this Association the Modertor shall take the chair, shall call the members to order, shall decide questions of order subject to an appeal, shall open and close the Association with prayer, shall appoint committees, when not otherwise ordered, and shall pronounce the decisions to the Association.

2. The names of members shall be called each day, and invitations to

seats extended to ministering brethren.

3. The members shall observe respect to officers and to each other, shall arise when addressing the Moderator, shall confine themselves to the questions, shall avoid personalities, shall not speak, without leave, more than once, until every member shall have opportunity to speak, and shall sustain that bearing to each other which becomes gentlemen and Christians.

4. When a motion is made and seconded, it shall be stated by the Moderator, and then shall be in the possession of the Association, but may be with-

drawn by the mover before amendment or decision.

5. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend or postpone; which motion shall

have precedence in the order enumerated.

6. All questions, except those relating to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority. Any member voting with the majority may move for a reconsideration on the day of decision. Members may not leave the Association without permission.

7. When questions of order are not provided for in these rules, they shall be decided according to the rules and regulations governing legislative

bodies generally.

8. The Association shall have power to receive into its body and fellowship such churches as apply for admission; and shall also be empowered to withdraw its fellowship from any church or body of men walking disorderly, and supposed to be unworthy the fellowship of this Association.
