SATURDAY OCTOBER 2---MORNING SESSION

Association assembled at the appointed hour. Prayer by Brother A. Daughety.

Upon motion the speeches were limited to 15 minutes.

Malone, Sr., offered as an amendment to this report that the American Baptist Flag be added to the list of publications recommended by the committee. After discussion by Brethren A. J. Preston and M. M. Wood, the amendment was voted on and lost. The report was then adopted.

The report of the Finance Committee was submitted, and upon motion, was adopted.

Moved by Brother J. B. Ward that Brother A. J. Preston be requested to furnish the Clerk the amounts paid to the State Evangelist for State Missions, by the several churches of the Association, which shall be added to the financial report.

Reports of Standing Committees.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The work of the State Board of Missions for some time past has, to a great extent, been confined to that of establishing new churches and assisting weak ones in the support of their pastors. The policy of the Board, however, has undergone some change during the past two years. The line now most largely engaging the energies of our people is evangelistic work. There were two evangelists who devoted their entire time to the work last year, viz.: Brethren A. E. Burnes and S. O. Y. Ray. This year we have six evangelists in the several sections of the State, to-wit: Brethren A. E. Burnes, G. S. Anderson, J. E. Dickinson, J. W. Sandlin, W. A. Farker and A. J. Preston. These brethren are selected because of their fitness for the work, and are now operating under the appointment and counsel of the Board. They collect and remit contributions for foreign and home missions, as well as for State missions; indigent ministers, their widows and orphans; ministerial education and the Orphanage. They are spending their time largely in the rural districts of the country and are trying to reach all the churches and assist all the preachers in unifying the brethren in their local Christian and church work. The Board is also doing colportage work in different parts of the State where most needed. Some of our Colporters are doing great good in distributing religious literature among our people. They visit from house to house with Bibles, Testaments and denominational literature, which they leave in the homes.

Besides this, we are still assisting weak churches in the support of their pastors, as far as practicable, and helping infant churches at weak points where otherwise Baptist churches could not be established. This enlargement of the work of the Board calls for a corresponding increase in our contributions. The work of this year has shown this advanced work of the Board to be a wise policy, and next year we would like to put at least twelve evangelists in the field, as it is impossible for six men to do the work necessary. "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest." "Let us go up at once and possess it, for we are well able to overcome it." Let the old Judson take her place among the leading associations in the State and honor God with her substance, and God will honor her with His richest blessings. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Our Home Mission Board is doing work in almost all the Southern states, the Indian Territory and Cuba. There are about 380 missionaries in her employ. These brethren are living on very small salaries, the average being but little over \$300.

The Home Board has been instrumental in establishing a large number of churches, which are now among the most liberal contributors to the work. More than \$100,000 is needed to meet the requirements of this Board.

We are sorry to note that our State is far behind other states in her contributions to the Home Board. It is from our home work that the foreign work must draw. If the root of the tree is neglected the tree will die, so if we neglect our home work there will be a collapse in our foreign work. Respectfully submitted.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT.

"God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whomsoever

believeth in him should not perish, but have eternal life."

The gift of God was on account of His love for a lost world. The command of Christ to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature was but the expression of the will of the Father. As we enter into the love of God and the purpose of God we must become a part of his plan to save a lost world.

All Missionaries are one. We divide the work according to different localities and call it by different names for convenience, but wherever one goes, even if it is only across the street, to teach a soul of God and lead him to God, there is a Missionary. Blessed be the one who is a Missionary in his own land; thrice, yea, a thousand times blessed is the one who can leave home, friends, loved ones, all, and go in the midst of superstition, sin and iniquity in far away lands to tell the sweet old story of God's love in Christ.

Missions in the days of the Apostles. "Now, they which were scattered abroad upon the persecution that arose about Stephen, traveled as far as Phenice and Cyprus and Antioch, preaching the word to none but unto the Jews." Acts 11:19. They seem to have failed to understand that the Gospel was intended for all, both Jews and Gentiles. Even Simon Peter had to be convinced by a vision that he should preach to the Gentiles. Philip preaching in Samaria got a further call and went south to preach to an African as he journeyed. Barnabas was sent by the church at Jerusalem up to Antioch, where he, in company Saul, labored for the space of a whole year. The Lord then called upon Antioch to separate Barnabas and Saul unto the work whereunto he had called them, "And they laid their hands upon them and sent them away." Their missionary labors extended through all Syria and Cilicia, and in fact all Asia Minor, Macedonia and Achaia, and was afterwards carried to Rome. The Gospel made wonderful progress in the earlier centuries. Then somehow lether seemed to take possession of those naming the name of Christ. False doctrines had gotten hold of the people and with these an indifference of souls for dying men.

THE REVIVAL—With the Reformation came a deeper sense of sin and more longing for true piety and holy living. In England God's spirit was working mightily in the heart of an humble cobbler and preacher, William Carey. The story of his going to India in 1793 is well known to all. Judson was soon afterwards sent out by the Congregationalists to Burma, together with Luther Rice. They both became Baptists and were thus thrust upon us by God. Mr. Rice came back to this country and aroused the brethren on the subject of missions. On May 21, 1814, the Triennial Convention was organized in Philadelphia, which continued until 1845, at which time the Southern Baptist Convention was organized and two committees appointed—one to take charge of the foreign and the other the home mission work.

We have now about 190 missionaries in the foreign field counting the native helpers. To support these missionaries about \$108,000 is needed. Our Board is in better condition than ever before, but still needs our co-operation, prayers and support. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE,

Its name is Louise Short Baptist Widows' and Orphans' Home of Alabama.

The first steps taken towards its establishment was when Mrs. M. L. B. Woodson made known to the State Baptist Convention in November, 1890, that she would give all her real estate for the maintenance of the Baptist Widows' and Orphan's Home of Alabama.

The Home was temporarily located at Evergreen January 16, 1893, the present

Financial Secretary being asked to take the management of it, without remuneration, he being then pastor at Evergreen.

March 10, 1893, in a small rented house, the Home was opened to receive the first inmates. By November of that year we had received 22 children, and the trustees decided to locate the home permanently.

After daily advertising for bids for a location. Evergreen was chosen and property purchased consisting of 80 acres of land lying on Main street, 30 of which is in cultivation, 30 in pasture and 20 in woods.

The buildings were a ten room brick house, and three tenant houses.

The purchase price of the property was \$5,000, which with interest on the deferred payments amounted to \$5,400.33, which has been paid.

The boys are taught to do farm work and the girls do various kinds of house work.

All that are old enough attend the Southwest Alabama Agricultural School, where no tuition is charged, the matriculation and incidental fees amounting to about \$5 to \$10 per year for each pupil.

All attend Sunday school and church.

The current expenses amount to about \$6 per month for each child.

Since the Home was started there have been gathered into it 33 boys and 37 girls, and out of it have gone by apprenticeship 2 boys; returned to their people 5 boys and 4 girls; by adoption 10 boys and 12 girls, leaving in the Home 16 boys and 21 girls.

Important improvements are being made in the arrangement of the Home by which we are to have eleven new rooms added, and all the old ones renovated.

Money is greatly needed to complete this work and pay for food for the children. Will not the churches, Sunday schools, Missionary societies and friends remember us and send regular contributions?

The children have come from nineteen counties as follows: Barbour 3, Butler 3, Conecuh 2, Escambia 7, Lee 3, Marengo 3, Montgomery 2, Bibb 2, Chambers 1, Covington 8, Jefferson 8, Limestone 1, Monroe 4, Pike 2, Russell 1, Talladega 8, Tuscaloosa 3, Tallapoosa 2. Walker 6.

CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This union shall be known and distinguished by the style and title of the Judson Baptist Association.

Art. 2. This Association will be composed of representatives from the churches in the union in the following ratio: All churches composed of one hundred members and under shall be allowed two messengers; those being over one hundred members three messengers; those having over one hundred and fifty and not two hundred members, four messengers. and so on in graduation, one messenger for every fifty members, who shall be required to furnish satisfactory evidence of their appointment by their churches before they take their seats.

ART. 3. The messengers when convened shall organize themselves into a deliberative body, by the election of a Moderator and Clerk. These officers shall be chosen by ballot at each annual meeting, and continue in office until new ones are elected.

Art. 4. The Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which she is composed. She shall regard them as independent bodies in all matters of internal government, and only act as an advisory council, assuming no authority except what is expressly delegated to her by the churches or evidently implied by the very nature of this compact; she nevertheless claims authority over her own members, the messengers of the churches, and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming unorthodox in faith or disorderly in practice. She should, therefore, regard all the churches united under this Constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Her principal business shall be to promote the glory of God by extending His kingdom of grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the Gospel and other means in accordance with the Gospel; to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ, and especially with those united in this Association.

Art. 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union by their sending their messengers to an annual meeting, with a petition, and by those messengers agreeing to the Abstract of Principles herewith published.

Art. 6. The churches of this union shall transmit to every annual session of this Association written communications specifying the names of the messengers, number in fellowship, baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, restored and dead, since last session, and all other information which the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.

Art. 7. This Association shall have a fund, supplied by the voluntary contributions of the churches and paid over through the Committee on Finance to the Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot and hold his office until the pleasure of the Association. He shall receive and manage the funds according to the orders of the Association and present annually for insertion in the minutes a clear and full statement of all receipts and expenditures.

Art. 8. This Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.

Art. 9. This Association shall not take cognizance of any query sent up by the churches unless they have endeavored to solve the same and failed; nor of any difficulty between churches unless they have pursued the directions contained in the 18th chapter of Matthew and have not been able to settle it. Then the Association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at her discretion.

Art. 10. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a regular file of printed minutes of every session of this body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

Art. 11. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by proper rules of decorum, which she is authorized to form and amend according to her own views.

Art. 12. This Constitution may be altered or amended at a regular meeting of this body, and by a concurring vote of two thirds of the members present. Provided, such alteration or amendment be approved by a majority of the churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

Article 1. We believe in the existence of one only true and living God, and that he has made himself known to His people under the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, the same in essence and equal in divine perfection. Is. 45:22. 1 John 5:7.

Art. 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice. 2 Tim. 3:16-17; Pet. 1:20 21.

Art. 3. We believe in the doctrine of election, that God chose His people in Christ before the foundation of the world; that they should be holy and without blame before him in love, having predestined them to the adoption of children by Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will. 1 Pet. 1:2; Eph. 1:4; Rom. 8: 28 29

Art. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sins. Ps. 51:5; Rom. 3: 9-10; Ps. 58:3.

Art. 5. We believe in man's incompetency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own will and ability. Eph. 21: 8-10; Rom. 8:7.

Art. 6. We believe sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ. Rom. 10:4 and 4:22-25.

Art 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost. 2 Tim. 1: 9-10; Rom. 8: 29-30; 1 Pet. 1:2.

Art. 8. We believe that nothing can separate the true believers from the love of God, but that they will be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation. Rom. 8: 35-39; 1 Pet. 1:5.

Art 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, that the true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances, and immersion only is baptism. Acts 2. 41-42 and 16: 31-33; Rom. 6: 4-5.

Art. 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment. 1 Cor. 15: 50-54; Acts 17:31; 2 Cor. 5:10.

Art. 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked to be everlasting and the joys of the righteous to be eternal. Matt. 25:46.

Art. 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances unless he is called of God, and come under the imposition of hands by a Presbytery, and he is in fellowship in the church of which he is a member. 1 Tim. 1:12 and 4:14; Matt. 28: 18-20.

RULES OF DECORUM.

1. Every query sent up to the Association by any church in the union shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator, whether it shall be debated or not, provided that Article 4 of the Constitution has been complied with; and if there be a majority for it, it shall be taken up and investigated; but if not, it shall be withdrawn. Provided, always, that those be first considered which effect the union of the churches.

2. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

3. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and he shall not be interrupted while speaking unless he depart from the subject in debate.

4. No person shall speak more than three times on the same subject without leave of the body.

5. No member shall abruptly break off and absent himself without leave of the body, and if he so does he shall be marked as an absentee.

6. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as the body may require.

7. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall not vote except the body be equally divided.

8. It shall be the duty of the clerk to keep a regular record of the proceedings of the body.

9. The minutes of the Association shall be read and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the body rises.

10. Amendments may be made to this form of government by two-thirds of the members in session.
