1. The Columbia Baptist Association met, according to adjournment, in its Fourteenth Annual Session, with Annie York Church, Geneva County, Ala., Wednesday, November 2, 1898.

2. The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. W. P. Stewart; text Acts 1: 8.

The Association was called to order at 2 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. J. A. Howard.

The Committee being absent the subject was left to discussion, and was richly discussed by W. P. Stewart, P. G. Thompson, A. J. Preston, S. A. Savelle, J. D. Pearce, J. A. Howard and I. A. White. Bro. F. W. Zimmerman offered the following resolution:

Resolved 1st, That we reaffirm our loyalty to the temperance cause; 2nd, That we earnestly urge our brethren to total abstinence. Adopted.

10. On motion of W. P. Stewart to hear report on hospital-ity read by Bro. W. P. Deshazo, and homes assigned the mes-

sengers. Report on preaching Bro. S. L. Loudermilk to preach at the church to-night. Reports adopted.

11. On motion the hour for meeting was fixed at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning.

THURSDAY MORNING NOV. 3RD.

12. Called to order at 9 o'clock. After devotional exercises led by Bro. J. O. Chancy, the Association went into regular business. Minutes of yesterday read, and after proper amendments they were adopted.

13. The committee on Orphanage not being ready to report, Brother J. W. Strwart was invited to address the Association about the Orphan's Home, which he did in a way that no one except J. W. Stewart, the father of the fatherless, could do. Bro. J. A. Howard made a short talk on the Orphanage, followed by that generous-hearted B. A. Forrester, who started his speech with a liberal contribution, which was raised to the amount of \$20.35 for the Orphan's Home.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We, your Committee on State Missions, regret to report that we are falling far behind other states in our State Mission work. We have only 17 missionaries at work and they are poorly paid. We are sure that our missionaries have done faithful work but we fear that some of them have had to live on promises. We began the year with a debt of several hundred dollars, so the money contributed had to be applied upon these debts, and our missionaries have had to wait. We are glad, however, to be able to report that our Board will not be more than \$500 00 behind when the Convention meets. We ought to pay out of debt and double our number of Missionaries. Let us bear our part in this work at home. It is the beginning at Jerusalem—it is taking care of the root of the great Mission tree. Let us water it with tears, and with consecrated hand so cultivate it, that every leaf and twig will sparkle with divine brightness.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

We are only able to make a brief report to be spread on our Associational minutes. We are able to show though, that our work has gone on progressively this year. Last year our home board was in debt, \$8,000. Our contributions together with the economical management of our faithful Missionaries enabled the board to come out of debt, and have a balance of \$620 80 on hand. But the increasing needs year by year as it attempts to supply the spiritual wants of our people. The board becomes more impressed not only that the field of destitution widens but the importance of our world's evangelization becomes more and more manifest. Should any child of Grace feel at ease when he knows of the twenty five millions of people of whom twenty millions are unaccountable beings, and of those not more than eight millions make any profession of religion, leaving twelve million unregenerated, unaccountable beings and of this number about six millions are included among the Missionary Baptists.

Now what the board asks: 1st, That its claims to a higher place among the con-

tributions and prayers of the churches be earnestly considered. All our work succeeds in proportion as home mission work is made aggressive and successful.

2nd, We ask our brethren to hear the Macedonian call, coming from so many places, where a little help now given to struggling churches, would bridge the chasm between failure and success.

3rd, We ask earnest attention to work in our cities. The success which has attended our work in many places has been very encouraging.

4th, The Board asks the Association to consider the needs of the negroes.

5th, That we look after the many foreigners, who through divine providence are brought to our doors annually—they are dependent upon us for a pure gospel.

6th, We are asked that Cuba, who with joyous heart now listen to those coming to her, may have an opportunity of being freed from superstition and enjoy the peace of conscience with God's dear children.

7th, That all who love God, and love their country, and love humanity, unite in an earnest prayerful effort to bring America to Christ, that Christ may use America in the world's evangelization and for that cause the Churches be asked to raise not less than one hundred thousand dollars. It can be done by each member of the several Churches giving 25cts per member next year.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Year after year a report or rather an essay is presented, and adopted by this body. Some of these essays, if not all of them, advocate the mission cause in the strongest terms. We declare to the world, by these reports that we are missionaries, but by our acts, if we may judge by the letters sent up here, we say to the world we are anti missionaries or at least omissionaries. The last report on Foreign Missions to our State Convention shows that the one hundred and eighteen thousand white Baptists in this state for the past twelve months gave only six thousand one hundred and seven dollars. Of this amount the two thousand four hundred and sixty members of the Columbia Association gave only eighty one dollars and sixty-six cents or a little more than three and one-third cents per member. If adopting reports would satisfy the demand and would be accepted as obedience to the command of our Master, your Committee would say let us continue to adopt reports; but if it is our duty to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, then we would urge upon our members to begin to practice what they preach. Let us go back to our churches with a determination to show our faith by our works. Let our beloved Association wipe out her shame by taking her stand with our very best Associations for Jesus and his cause. The evangelization is our work. If the inhabitants of earth are ever to know the truth we must give it to them. "The harvest is plenteous, but the labourer's are few. Let us be up and doing while it is called to-day."

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Our Orphanage was temporarily located and opened Mar. 10, 1893. It was permanently located there in November of the same year. Our property there is worth about ten thousand dollars, and is all paid for. Since the Home was started there have been received into it 101 children. 42 have gone out of it leaving 59 in it at present. The chief thing that commends a child to our Orphanage, is, that it is

an Orphan in deep need. The boys are taught to do farm and other out door work, and the girls do numerous kinds of house work. All that are old enough attend the agricultural school; all attend S. S. and church. Fifteen of them have been baptised. They are diligently trained to become useful men and women. We cordially commend it to the support of our churches, and urge them to make contributions of money, food, bedding, clothing or anything that can be used in a large family. We rejoice that we have such a home and commend it to the prayerful consideration of our people, and pray God to guide his servants who have charge of it, that they may be able to bring up the little ones committed to them to His praise.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

At this day of increasing intelligence it is unnecessary to argue the necessity and importance of an education—this is recognized, proper education, and the best means of securing the same, is the most important question with us now.

Baptists have always been the champions of popular education and intelligence, and it is their bounden duty more than ever, to take active interest in the teachers, text-books and local schools where our children are to receive their first and most indelible teachings.

But when we come to select boarding schools abroad to send our children for more advanced training, we should be exceedingly guarded and wise. It is unchristian unamerican and unscriptural to send your children to a Catholic School. The proper province of the State is to train the children in the local schools and common branches, but the higher education of our people properly belongs to the churches of Christ, for nothing else can truly and properly educate in the higher sense. Higher and proper education consists in the co-training and developing of the moral (as well) as the mental and physical powers, and no institution in the world can possibly meet this need but the church. Parents should select such schools as will be governed by men and women of high piety, and such communities as will furnish the BEST social and religious influence and advantages, and baptists should especially provide and support just such schools within reach of all sections of our country. It is the duty of the Alabama baptists to support and patronize the Judson Institute, the Howard College, and the Seminary at Louisville, just as far as possible.

We announce with pleasure the establishment of the Southeast Alabama Baptist Collegiate Institute, at Newton, Dale County, Ala., as the Baptist School of this section for the advanced education of our youth, and we especially note its remarkable and unequalled low rates of board and tuition, and gladly and heartily recommend our people to patronize it.

In view of the fact that the Baptist Church at Newton offers the school, property and all to the Baptist free of charge, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution by this Association. Respectfully, R. M. Jackson, Chairman.

Whereas, We, as a Missionary Baptist people, representing and constituting the Columbia Baptist Association, fully realizing the great importance of the proper education of the children of our country; and

Whereas, We, believing it to be proper and right, when practicable, to educate our children in schools and Institutions of learning under the auspices of the Missionary Baptist Denomination; and

Whereas, We, having ascertained it to be a fact, that The Southeast Alabama Collegiate Institute has been located at Newton, Dale County, Ala., is now in session with bright prospects, under a Board of Trustees composed of Missionary Baptists, and being taught by an efficient faculty composed of Missionary Baptists, to be un-

der the auspices of the Baptist denomination of Southeast Alabama; Therefore, be it Resolved.

1st, That the Columbia Baptist Association, through the messengers composing the same, endorse said school, and adopt the same as The Missionary Baptist School of Southeast Alabama, with all or its intents and purposes, as exhibited by its Constitution.

2nd, That this Association, during its present session, appoint a Trustee or Trustees for said school, and he or they be hereby authorized to co-operate with the Board of Trustees for said school; and that we herein and hereby recommend that the Missionary Baptist Denomination of Southeast Alabama adopt and patronize said school.

The report was discussed by Bro. S. L. Loudermilk. The report was tabled for special order to-morrow morning, at 9 o'clock.

22. The Moderator appointed Bro. J. R. Keyton to conduct the devotional services to-morrow morning at 8.30 o'clock.

23. Adjourned. Benediction by Bro. J. J. White.

24. After devotional services conducted by Bro. J. R. Keyton, the Moderator called the Association to order. Minutes of yesterday read and adopted.

25. Nine o'clock having arrived, the special order, the report on education was taken up, the resolution to the report was read by the Moderator. On motion N. S. Fellows, to strike out the resolution from the report, discussed by brethren J. R. Keyton, N. S. Fellows, S. Williford, and B. A. Forrester. On motion F. W. Zimmerman, to refer the resolution to the committee on Education to be adopted at next session, and that Bro. B. A. Forrester be added to the Committee on the resolution. On motion the name of B. A. Forrester was taken off and Bro. F. W. Zimmerman made Chairman of Committee on the resolution. Motion adopted. Brethren I. A. White and J. A. Howard addressed the body on education, after which the report was adopted.

26. Bro. F. W. Zimmerman read the

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

From information gathered we must confess that the interest in S. S. work has declined during the past year. Letters of the churches to this Association to some extent, failed to report S. S. in active operation and by that we are led to the conclusion, that, outside of churches in towns within this Association, there are very few alive at present. If such be the case, the question arises, "What are the causes of this neglect?" and next, "What is the remedy?" It cannot be that the pastors are losing sight of this important work, for they are always prompt and insisting at our Associations with their advice and encouragement and surely they will not neglect their own advice when at home.

Your committee is impressed that the importance of educating the spirit and soul of the youths is now of great moment as when the Savior said: "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not, for such is the kingdom of heaven,"

We would impress upon the churches the necessity of a live S. S. and when they are at work, to report such work in full, giving to the Association complete statistics as well as such information or suggestion as would redound to the good of others in the same work.

We further suggest that if churches have neglected to report Sunday Schools which are at work, they are requested to make verbal report now.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We, your Committee on Ministerial Education, find from data furnished us by the various churches of the Columbia Association that a fund of _____ has been raised and applied to the general fund set apart for the purpose of aiding indigent and worthy young men in securing an education—young men who are unable to educate themselves for the noble work and high calling to which they have been called. It is the sense of your committee that an imperative demand for an educated ministry is constantly growing, from the fact that the people are progressing and becoming more intelligent. Therefore we would respectfully recommend that each church in this Association adopt some systematic way of contributing to this laudable and important fund, a system by which every member can be made to feel the necessity of contributing. It is known to your committee that Owen Chancy, a member of the Baptist Church, at Dothan, is a deserving, humble Christian, who feels the divine call to the ministry, is making a hard and honest effort to prepare himself for his God given work; and that he is without means. Bro. Chancy is at Howard College and expects every Baptist of the Association to help.

We earnestly hope that everyone will feel impressed to do something to promote Ministerial Education.

The congregation joined in singing "Amazing Grace How Sweet the Sound," Bro. I. A. White preached a deep and interesting sermon from Luke 6:38. after which the parting hand was taken. Prayer by the Moderator, and the Association adjourned, sine die.

APPENDIX.

NOTE.

The good sisters of the Association should have credit for all the amounts they have paid in, for all purposes, and I was anxious to do so, but the Clerks of their churches failed to make statements in a way that the amounts could be divided, I am informed that the "Willing Workers of Dothan Baptist Church," and "The Ladies Aid Society, of Cowarts Baptist Church;" have done great good in raising funds for the Lord's Cause." "The Young Peoples Society of Bluff Spring Church" raised a neat sum for the Orphans Home. For which may the Lord be praised; now I ask the Clerks of the several churches to make out your next Associational letters in a way that all information may be gained and due credit given, and may God bless and keep us all.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the style and name of 'The Columbia Baptist Association.'

ART. 2 The object of the Association shall be to combine our Christian efforts for the purpose of carrying the appointed means of grace to dying men and women, and to regard all churches united under this constitution with a vigilant eye for good. Her principal object shall be to promote the declarative glory of God by extending His kingdom of grace on earth through the medium of preaching the gospel, and all other means within reach of a working christian organization.

ART. 3 This Association shall be composed of representatives from the churches as follows: Each church having one hundred members or less shall be entitled to two messengers, and to one additional messenger for every fifty members or fractional part thereof in excess of one hundred. But in the business of the Association whenever the messengers from any church desire it the vote shall be taken by churches in which case each church shall be entitled to two votes.

ART. 4. The messengers when convened shall organize themselves into a deliberative body, by the appointment of a Moderator and Clerk, and these officers shall be chosen by ballot, or otherwise as the body may decide at each annual meeting, and continue in office until their successors are chosen. Should any event transpire, so as to prevent any annual meeting of this Association, the Moderator shall have the power to call a meeting at any time and place, which meeting when convened, shall have all the rights of a regular meeting.

ART. 5. This Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which she is composed. She shall regard them as independent bodies in all measures of internal government, and shall act in an advisory council assuming no authority but what is expressly delegated to her by the churches, or evidently implied by the very nature of the compact. But she nevertheless claims authority over her own members, the messengers of the churches, and in justice and propriety must have power to withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of the compact by holding opinions repugnant to the doctrines of the Scriptures or are disorderly in practice.

ART. 6. Newly constituted churches or churches dismissed from Associations of the same faith and order may be admitted into this union on their sending up messengers to an annual meeting with a petition, and those messengers agreeing to the abstract principles adopted by the Association.

ART. 7. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association written communications specifying the names of messengers, members in fellowship, baptised, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, restored since last session, and such other information as the churches may deem important, which shall be read and minuted accordingly.

ART. 8. This Association shall have a fund, supplied by voluntary contribution of the churches; and all moneys thus contributed or otherwise received shall be transmitted through the finance committee to the Treasurer who shall be elected by ballot or otherwise, as the body may decide, and hold his office during the pleasure of the Association.

ART. 9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular file of printed minutes of every session of this body and deliver over the same to his successor in office.

ART. 10. This Association when convened shall be governed by proper rules setting forth the duties of officers and such other matters necessary for a deliberative body, and may alter or amend such rules from time to time by a majority vote of the body in annual session.

ART. 11. The Executive Committee shall attend to such duties as may be imposed upon it by the Association and when the Association is not in session this Committee shall have power to fill vacancies that may occur.

ART. 12. This Constitution may be altered or amended at a regular meeting of the Association by a vote of two thirds of the members present, provided such alteration or amendment is not disapproved of by a majority of the churches in their written communications to the next annual session of the body.

DECORUM.

1st. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the deliberations of the Association in session, preserve order, submit motions or other matter and announce results when passed on by the body. He may have the same right of of speech as any other member provided the chair is occupied, but is not allowed to vote except the body be equally divided, in which case he shall give the casting vote

2nd It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a correct record of the minutes of the proceedings in a clear and concise manner, and immediately after the adjournment of each annual session, to prepare a copy of the same for distribution to the churches, for the payment of which he shall draw his draft upon the Treasurer of the Association

3rd. The Treasurer shall keep a correct account of all moneys coming into his hands, as well as the manner in which it is distributed. He shall only pay out money upon the order of the Association in session or the Executive Committee in vacation. He shall render an annual statement to the Association of all funds received and distributed by him showing the balance, if any, remaining on hand

4th This Association shall not consider any query or other matter affecting the churches, unless they have first endeavored to solve the same and failed; nor any difficulty between churches, unless they have pursued the directions contained in the 18th chapter of Matthew and have not been able to bring about a settlement and reconciliation, in which case the Association shall take such matters under consideration, and act upon them or not at her discretion.

5th. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation and be acted upon by the body except it be withdrawn by the member who made it

6th. Every person who speaks in debate, shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject of debate.

7th. No member shall speak more than twice upon the same subject without leave of the body. And it shall be a violation of these rules for any member to abruptly break off or absent himself without leave of the body; and if he does so he shall be liable to reproof by the Moderator

8th. The Clerk, Treasurer and all members of the standing committees shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking and voting as other members, except in cases where the interests of any individual church is to be affected by the matter at issue. In this latter case they may express their views, but shall not be allowed to vote

9th. These rules may be altered or amended by a majority of the members in session.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. We believe in the existence of one only true and living God, and that he has made himself known to his people under the name of Father, Son and Holy Ghost, the same in essence and equal in divine perfection. John 4:24 Ps. 147:5, Rom 1:20, Jer. 10:10, Ex 15:11, Rev 4:6, 8 John 10:30, John 5:17

ART. 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice. 2 Tim 3:16, 17, Rom. 3:1, 2, 2 Tim. 3:15, Proverbs 30:5, 6, Rom 2:12

ART. 3. We believe in the doctrine of election, and that God chose his people in Christ before the foundation of the world; that they should be holy and without blame before him in love, having predestined them to the adoption of children by Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will. Tim 1:8, 9, Eph 1:3, 12, 1 Pet 1:1, 2, Rom. 11:5, 6, Rom 8:28, 38, 2 Thess 2:13, 14 Ex. 33:18, 19, Matt. 20:15, 2 Pet 1:10, 11

ART. 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin. Gen 1:27, Gen 3:6-24, Rom. 5:19, Eph 2:1, 3, Ezek 18:19, 20.

ART. 5. We believe in man's incompetency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature by his own will and ability. Eph. 2:8, Matt. 8:11, Acts 13:11, Isa 53:4, 5 Heb 7:25

ART. 6. We believe sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ. Acts 13:39, Ro.m. 5:9, Rom. 5:17, Rom. 4:4, 5. Rom. 5:19, Rom 5:1, 2.

ART. 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost. John 3:3, John 3:6, 7, 8, 2 Cor. 5:17 John 1:13, James 1:14-18,

1 John 5:1.

ART. 8. We believe that nothing can separate the true believers from the love of God, but that they will be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation. John 8:31, 1 John 2:19, Rom. 8:8, Phil. 1:6, Phil. 2:12, 13.

ART. 9. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances, and that immersion only is baptism. Acts 8:36-39, Matt. 3:5, 6, Matt. 28:19, Rom. 6:4, Col. 2:12, Acts 2:41. 42

ART. 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment. 1 Pet. 4:7, Acts 1:11, Acts 24:15, Matt. 13:49, Matt. 25:31-46.

ART. 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal. Mal. 3:18, 1 John 5:19, Prov. 14:32, Luke 16:25, John 8:21-24, Matt. 7:13, 14.

ART. 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinance unless he is called of God, and comes under the imposition of the hands of a Presbytery, and is in fellowship in the church of which he is a member. 1 Cor. 1:1-13, 2 Cor. 8:5, 1 Cor. 11:2, Rom. 16:17-20, 1 Cor. 4:17.

ART. 13. We believe that a proper administrator of the ordinance of baptism should be called of God, set apart by a Presbytery and in full fellowship with the church of which he is a member. Phil. 1:1, Acts 14:23, 1 Tim. 3, Titus 1.

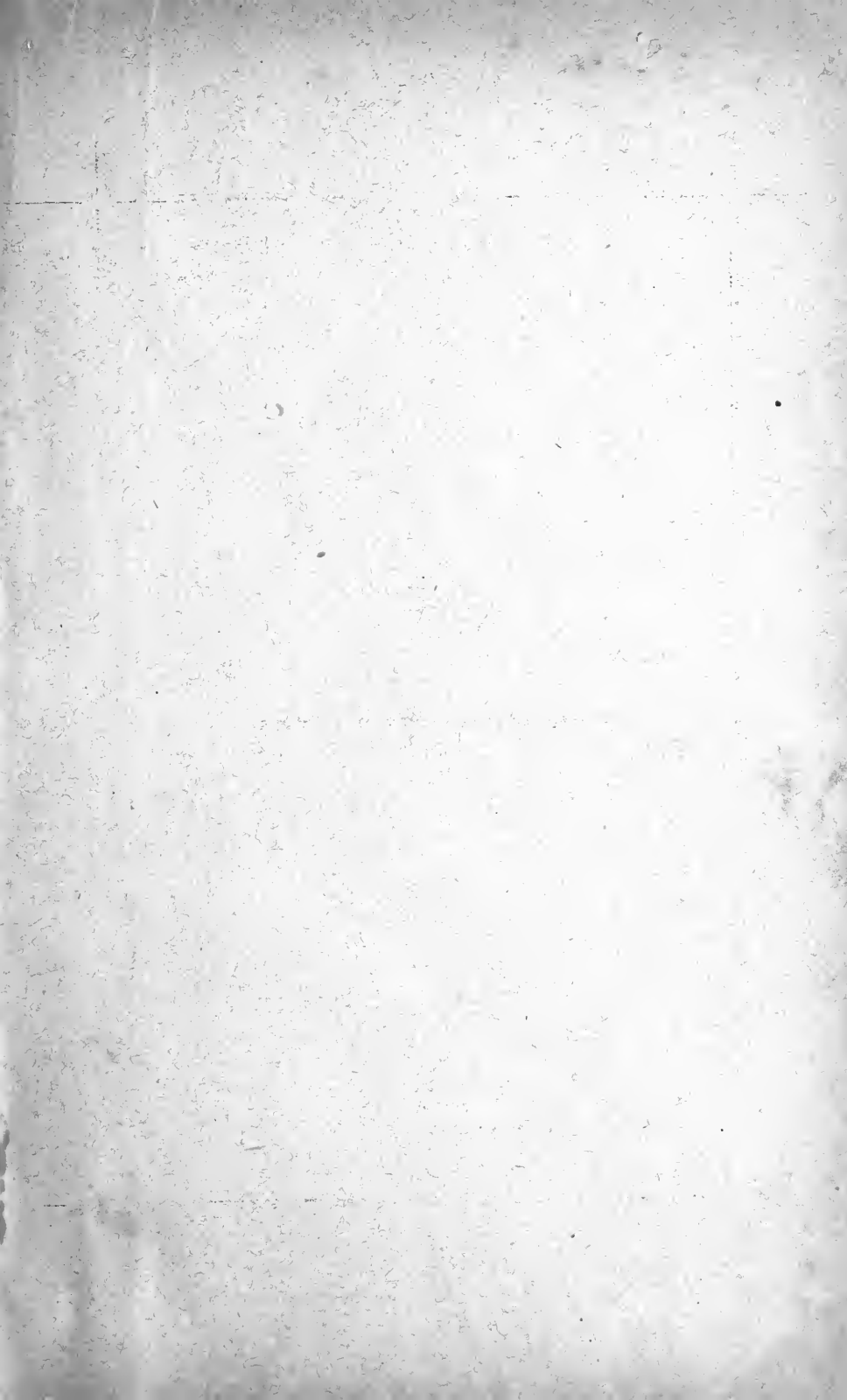
