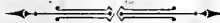

MINUTES.

FIRST DAY—MORNING SESSION.

1. The Mobile Baptist Association met in its fourteenth annual session with St. Francis Street Baptist Church, Mobile, Ala., at 10:30 a. m., August 9th, 1894. Bro. R. L. Maupin, the Moderator of last year, called the body to order, after singing and prayer.

2. On account of the inclemency of the weather, and the delegates not arriving, permanent organization was postponed until 3 p. m.

3. On motion, the morning hour be spent in devotional exercises. The Moderator called upon Bro. D. R. Cooper to conduct the services. After talks by Brethren Cooper and J. W. Dossett the body took a recess until 3 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

4. The body re-assembled at 3 p. m., Bro. Maupin acting as Moderator. After devotional exercises, conducted by the Moderator, the Association proceeded to permanent organization.

5. Brethren D. P. Bestor, J. N. Pollard and W. A. Alexander were appointed to read the church letters, and also as a Finance Committee.

10. Bro. E. R. Quattlebaum read the following, which, on motion, was adopted:

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee held frequent consultations concerning Associational Work, and jointly attended to all of its minor details. Only one full meeting of the committee was called; that was for the consideration of the invitation of Bethany Church, Whistler, for the Association to convene with that church. The invitation was accepted in behalf of the Association and the churches were notified to that effect. The Secretary having received semi-official information that our hospitable brothers and sisters of Bethany Church were in distress, upon the closing of the railroad shops of Whistler, he laid the matter before the St. Francis Street Church, which expressed its sympathy for, and appointed a committee to confer with, said church as to the holding of the Associational meeting with the St. Francis Street Church. This was done and consent given to hold the meeting, as subsequently directed, with the St. Francis Street Church, Mobile, Ala.

12. Bro. D. P. Bestor read the following report on

WOMAN'S WORK:

At the Association of 1890, held at Zion Church, Rev. D. R. Cooper urged the newly appointed Vice President of Woman's Work to lay a request upon the table for a place in the proceedings of the Association. Then Mr. W. A. Alexander moved that she be given a seat in the Association, which was unanimously carried.

To these two brethren is the "work" indebted for a part and place in the Association.

The minutes of 1890 contain three lines regarding the work. The report to-day is as follows: Societies in co-operation, 7, letters written, 50; postals written, 30; one Sunday School re-organized with seventy-two pupils; societies visited out of city, 1; object lessons delivered to Sunday Schools out of city, 2; one box clothing sent to frontier missionary, value \$25; money contributed for various objects. Total \$641.87.

The work is advancing steadily. More interest is manifested all along the lines, and wider, prompter co-operation with the Vice President.

Our women are in closer touch with each other than ever before in the Association's history, and better acquainted, and are doing more for the kingdom's sake.

13. After benediction by Bro. Lumbard, the body adjourned.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

14. The Association met at 10 a. m., Moderator Maupin in the Chair. Devotional exercises conducted by Bro. S. O. Y. Ray. Minutes of yesterday's session read and approved.

15. Bro. J. S. Lumbard read his report as

MISSIONARY.

Work commencing October 1, 1893, and ending June 30, 1894.

Amount received on my salary from the Board, \$229.71; days of service, 111; miles traveled, 902; addresses made, 31; number of persons baptized, 12; baptized by others in connection with my labor, 4; received

by letter, 5; restored, 3; Sunday School addresses made, 13; prayer meetings held, 10; number of preaching stations without churches, 6; number of visits to preaching stations, 11; number of churches visited, 7; number of visits made, 18; tracts distributed, 100; Sunday Schools organized, 2; Ladies' Missionary Society, 1; meeting houses commenced, 2; money collected for church building, \$38.05; money collected for State Missions, \$5.31; sermons delivered, 73.

Magnolia Spring Baptist Church, at Theodore, Mobile Co., has been for some time without a pastor. The church has gone down to almost nothing. A few months ago I was requested by some of its members to visit them, which I did, and after the preaching met with some of the brethren and had a talk about the condition of the church. They informed me that in the community in which the church is situated, the Mormons have a good following, and are hurting the cause considerably; and as a matter of fact, some of the members of Magnolia Spring Church had actually joined them. They insisted that I should give them an appointment, which I did. I am glad to report that the church is not only in a fair way to regain its former members, but, add new ones to it. One candidate is to be baptized on the fourth Sunday in August. The church has a membership of twenty-three (23). We have in view a protracted meeting; and I would suggest that when it takes place, some of the brethren of the Association attend. Since I have taken hold, a good Sunday School has been organized with a membership of about fifty (50).

Brethren, we need help.

After being discussed by Brethren Cooper, Newell, Gaston, Ray, Vane, Shell, Lumbard, Hanson, Alexander, Meyers and Quattlebaum, it was adopted.

Brethren H. H. Shell, J. Vane and D. R. Cooper, volunteered to visit Magnolia Spring Church from this Association, and to induce the members of that church to become active workers of this Association.

16. Bro. H. H. Shell read the report on

SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK:

We have in Alabama about 1,600 churches and about 109,000 communicants, while we only have about 700 schools with an enrollment of 30,000.

In this association we have fifteen churches with a membership of about 1,300. We ought to have at least twenty Sunday Schools and an enrollment of 1,500. As a matter of fact, we only have thirteen Sunday Schools with an enrollment of about 1,000. Should this state of things exist? Can we afford for it to continue? Can we sit quietly down with folded hands and let children grow up under the shadow of our churches, ignorant of the word of God? Most assuredly we cannot. Let our pastors and live laymen determine that there shall be a school in every church in the Mobile Association. Look out for school houses remote from churches and, where at all practicable, organize a school. We recommend that our Association organize a Sunday School Convention, and get our Sunday School workers together occasionally.

This, we believe, would awaken a deeper interest in the work and bring gratifying results.

We most heartily commend to our schools the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, its literature and missionary work.

17. Upon reconvening the session was opened with devotional exercises, conducted by Moderator Maupin, with prayer by Bro. Guy.

18. The special order 12), the report on Woman's Work, made yesterday, was then taken up, and after a discussion participated in by Brethren J. Vane, D. R. Cooper, S. O. Y. Ray, W. N. Harris and A. W. Averett, was adopted.

19. Adjourned until 10 a. m. to-morrow. Benediction by Bro. W. L. Cahall.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

20. The Association met at 10 a. m., Moderator Maupin in the Chair. Devotional exercises were conducted by the Moderator, with prayer by Bro. H. P. Hanson. The minutes of the previous day's sessions were read and approved.

21. The pending report on Sunday Schools (16) was taken up and discussed by Brethren J. R. Newell, J. S. Lumbard and A. B. Gaston, and adopted.

22. Bro. D. R. Cooper moved that a committee of seven be appointed to organize a Sunday School Convention for this Association. This motion was adopted and the Moderator appointed the following committee: Brethren D. R. Cooper, H. H. Shell, D. P. Bestor, A. B. Gaston, J. B. Fletcher and W. P. Woods.

23. The Moderator appointed the following committee on nominations: Brethren J. G. Robertson, A. B. Gaston and D. R. Cooper.

24. It was decided that the reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions, should be discussed jointly.

Bro. W. L. Cahall read the report on

STATE AND HOME MISSIONS :

When Christ sent His disciples out into the world, He sent them clad, not in their own strength, but in the blessed vestments of His might and power, and with the further assurance : " Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end."

Realizing then, our coadjutor and stay, should we not, the Baptists of the Mobite Association, put forth more strenuous efforts for the evangelization of our neighbors? Should not we go forth in the power of our might, conquering to conquer for Christ? But some say that they are opposed to foreign missions, because "charity begins at home." Then, my dear brother, in the name of Him who came to rescue dying humanity from the thralldom of sin and the mire of iniquity, I beseech you to begin your charity even at home. And what is charity? Is it not the greatest of the three cardinal virtues, "Faith, Hope, Charity" (or, as we now translate it, "Love")? That love which rules the universe, which can take in, not only the membership of its own church or denomination, but also those upon the highway of corruption, those in the hovels of sin and disgrace, irrespective of nationality or color; even as our Lord, the Great Pattern of the church, was irrespective thereof.

The State Mission Board has had a very good year, considering the financial depression; still, they have been somewhat handicapped in their labors on account of the scarcity of the funds necessary to pay the salaries of the missionaries. Nevertheless, great good has been done, and we should be thankful to the Great Master of the Vineyard that He has sent us such noble, consecrated men, to work among us, and to spread the word of truth throughout the length and breadth of our State.

And what has been said of State missions may be said of home missions. We should constantly labor until in every lot in our broad Southland there is a herald to proclaim the message unto all. Let us, then, show our appreciation to God for His manifold blessings by increasing our contributions to the Boards accordingly.

Bro. E. O. Fowlkes read the report on

FOREIGN MISSIONS :

Would that these few words of mine might enliven the zeal and interest of our people in the great and important field of foreign missions.

The time has arrived when we should practice more rigid self-denial, so as to meet the demands of this noble cause, and keep it advancing aggressively all over this broad and sinful world. Owing to the depressed condition, financially, of our country for some years past, the danger is apparent of incurring a large debt to sustain our present force in the field, not to mention the desire we all should cherish, of increasing the work of bringing souls to Christ. Therefore, as Baptists, let us with one accord endeavor to arouse among our churches new life and interest in this all important work. Giving is an act of worship, none are exempt. Poverty, age, sex nor any conditions of life releases a

Christian from this privilege of worshipping God. The churches of Macedonia were poor, which were especially cited by Paul as examples of liberality. The poor widow, who gave "all her living," was commended by the Master himself.

It is a healthy stimulus to us to give, as God has prospered us to the extension of this all important field of work.

The Bible teaches this duty, and it is left to us to follow it. God loveth the cheerful giver, and by living worthily of this love, and keeping the Lord's treasury full, we would avoid many financial failures, and we would be obeying God and worshipping Him according to His own prescribed plan. Let us strive to make ours a banner association in this particular line of work. We find as reported in our last Alabama Baptist State Convention, about the following condition of our work in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Japan, China and Africa :

In Italy we have 17 missionaries, 17 organized churches, 372 members and 38 baptisms, for the past year. Brethren Taylor and Eager have reasons "to thank God and take courage."

In Brazil we have 15 missionaries, 17 churches, 519 members and 150 baptisms, last year. We have much to praise God for in this field.

In Mexico we have 30 missionaries, 37 churches, 1,163 members, 277 baptisms. This, indeed, has been a year of great blessing to Mexico. God has abundantly blessed our work under the direction of Bro. W. D. Powell. The above embraces our Papal missions, and the three latter are our Pagan missions.

In Japan we had 4 missionaries, 1 church, 31 members and 9 baptisms, last year.

In China there are 38 missionaries, 22 assistants, 13 churches, 1,068 members, 222 baptisms. Southern China has been peculiarly blessed the last year.

In Japan and China our missionaries are passing through the hardships endured by the war now going on between those two countries. Especially do they need our prayers and help at this time.

In Africa we have 9 missionaries, 7 assistants (natives), 5 churches, 166 members, and 9 baptisms. We have a total charge of 119 missionaries, 29 assistants, 84 churches, 3,328 members, 629 baptisms—77.13 per cent. better than last year.

Twelve new missionaries have gone forth—6 to China, 2 to Mexico, 4 to Brazil. Our Foreign Missionary Board of the Southern Baptist Convention is now in debt \$30,823.78.

Let us work to get our membership filled with the holy spirit, so that we can do something to advance the "cause of our Redeemer among the nations of the earth!"

We have in Mobile Association 15 churches, 1,228 members in 1893, given to foreign missions \$1,146.68, which is 9½ cents per capita.

Alabama contributed to foreign missions last year \$7,847.68, or 7 cents per member.

The Women's Missionary Association contributed \$1,170.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

26. The Association reconvened at 3 p. m., Moderator Maupin presiding. The exercises were opened by the singing of a hymn, followed with a prayer by Bro. J. Vane.

27. Bro. W. A. Alexander read the following report on

BIBLE AND COLPORTAGE :

Among the many blessings enumerated by our Saviour that attended His coming into this world, was "That the poor had the Gospel preached unto them." It was the joy of the Lord that this was the case in His day. It should be the joy of every Christian to enter into the joy of their Lord, by making it their individual business to see that all the poor—especially those about them, have this blessing in their day. This is the object designed to be accomplished by the State Mission Board, through its Bible and Colportage department.

We note from the reports of those engaged in this work on the field, the report and recommendations of the State Board of Missions and their adoption and endorsement by the Alabama Baptist State Convention, that more than ordinary interest is being manifested and the pressing necessity of extending the work fully appreciated.

The State Board of Missions recommended to the convention, and it was unanimously approved, that the permanent fund for colportage work be increased \$2,000 and a suitable man employed in every association in the State. Should this recommendation be carried out, there is not an association that would have more cause for rejoicing than our own. It only remains for the membership represented in this Association to second the efforts of the board by heartily co-operating with them. To this end we recommend that a stated collection be taken every three (3) months by the churches of this Association and sent to the Board of Bible and Colportage work. We also recommend that as every kind of religious literature can be purchased from the Bible and Colportage Board at the same price as paid to the publishers, and still leave a small margin of profit for the board to use in colportage work, the brethren and especially the Sunday Schools represented in this Association, obtain their supplies from Bro. J. B. Collier, Secretary Bible and Colportage Board, Montgomery, Ala.

THE COMMITTEE.

The report was discussed by Brethren W. N. Harris, S. O. Y. Ray, H. P. Hanson, J. W. Dossett, J. Vane, and adopted.

28. The Clerk read the following report on

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION :

It is often asserted by persons unacquainted with the facts, that the members of the Baptist Church require less in the way of study and learning on the part of their preachers than members of other churches. This impression prevailed in the early years of our country, because the simplicity of the Baptist faith and form of worship adapted it well to the wants and wishes of a pioneer people, and many good men among the pioneers felt called on to preach the Gospel, according to that faith, who had no opportunity to acquire book learning.

But they were men who could find

“Sermons in stones,
Books in the running brooks,
And good in everything,”

and they accomplished a wonderful amount of good in smoothing the rough places of a primitive society and in leading people to Christ.

But surroundings have changed. The tide of civilization has swept over our broad and beautiful land, and the sweet tones of church bells are heard where but a few years ago the wild whoop of the savage rang through primeval forests. The log cabins of our fathers have disappeared and given place to cottages and buildings of elaborate designs.

In the settlement of our country any pioneer of good eye and steady hand could notch the logs and carry up one corner of a log cabin. But now, any one wishing to build a modern house would be likely to consult or study the plans and specifications of an architect, who gives time and study to that business. So, in a primitive state of society, ahead of schools and educational advantages, a man with a sound head and good heart could preach the gospel with effect. But under present conditions, our ministers should study and be educated. This being so, it behooves the members of our church to aid in giving educational advantages to our young men wishing to prepare themselves for preaching. The Baptists are fully alive to the importance of this subject, and are constantly adding to the number of their educational institutions.

The value of their educational property in the Southern States is now \$7,716,640.

But many young men who would gladly avail themselves of the advantages afforded by these institutions, need money to defray their expenses during their time of study, and the churches should aid them. Our State Board of Ministerial Education is now in need of money for this purpose. In fact, our board has gone in debt giving aid to worthy young theological students, and has had to decline aid to others applying for help.

This is most unfortunate. It is painful to think that any young man who wishes to prepare himself for ministerial duties and service is not furnished with what money he needs.

Our board should be relieved at once. No contributions are calculated to do more good in advancing the cause of Christ than contributions to aid ministerial education.

TEMPERANCE:

The consumption of alcoholic drinks is so far reaching in its evils that it is impossible to estimate it. In order that public opinion may be moulded into correct thinking and the evils stamped out, it is necessary to begin aright. The remedy must be attained through the individual, and not the nation. Religion is the only solution of the temperance problem. Get men's hearts right and the nation will be right. Temperance should begin in the home. Not until fathers quit frequenting barrooms, mothers offering wine to the young, and parents using it socially in the presence of their children, can this momentous question be solved. Example is stronger than precept, and actions speak louder than words. Through this and this only will the friends of temperance see this nation what they hope to make it.

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CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.

This body shall be styled THE MOBILE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, and it shall meet annually at such time and place as may be duly determined.

ARTICLE II.

It shall be composed of all pastors within the bounds of this Association and of messengers from Baptist churches holding substantially the articles of Faith adopted by this body, at the rate of one messenger for every twenty-five members.

ARTICLE III.

We adopt as our scriptural belief the "Declaration of Faith" as published in the Baptist Church Manual by the American Baptist Publication Society at Philadelphia, Pa.

ARTICLE IV.

Its object shall be without interfering with the independence of the Churches, to concentrate Christian effort in the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom at home and abroad.

ARTICLE V.

Its officers shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall perform the usual duties of such officers. They shall be elected annually by ballot, and remain in office until their successors are elected. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer may be in one.

ARTICLE VI.

Corresponding Messengers from other bodies of our Denomination shall be entitled to all privileges except voting.

ARTICLE VII.

The business of this Association shall be conducted, between its sessions by an Executive Committee of thirteen members, appointed annually, five of whom shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII.

The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds belonging to the Association, and give an itemized report thereof, annually.

ARTICLE IX.

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the delegates present.
