NEW YORK, MAY 15, 1856.

THE General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America met, agreeably to appointment, in the First Presbyterian Church New York city, on Thursday the 15th day of May, in the year of our Lord 1856, at eleven o'clock, A. M., and was opened with a sermon by the Rev. Nathan L. Rice, D. D., Moderator of the last Assembly, from 2 Tim. iv. 1, 2: "I charge thee, therefore, before God and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at his appearing and his kingdom; Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long-suffering and doctrine."

After the sermon, the Moderator proceeded to constitute the sessions with prayer.

Lee, minister, and John House, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Troy; J. M. H. Adams, minister, and E. R. Mills, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Bethel; John V. Dodge, minister, and John D. Todd, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Sangamon; Robert W. Orr, minister, from the Presbytery of Clarion; F. R. Harbaugh, minister, and George Sinclair, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Burlington, present, with informal commissions: and H. W. Hunt, minister, from the Presbytery of Raritan; John Hendrick, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Indianapolis; W. J. Bingham, minister, from the Presbytery of Orange; Alexander Guy, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Oxford, and G. A. The report was adopted.

The Stated Clerk announced that he had received official information of the formation of a new Presbytery by the Synod of New York, to be called Nassau; and of two others by the Synod of Iowa, to be called Dubuque and St. Paul; and that the Synod of Albany had dissolved the Presbytery of Columbia, and the Synod of Alabama had annexed the Presbytery of Talladega to that of South Alabama; and the Synod of Mississippi had changed the name of "Yazoo" to Central Mississippi.

On motion, the Commissioners of the new Presbyteries were admitted to seats.

The Assembly then proceeded to the election of officers.

The Rev. Francis McFarland, D. D., was chosen Moderator, and the Rev. J. N. Campbell, D. D., Temporary Clerk.

On motion of Dr. Phillips, the regular time of session for this Assembly was ordered to be 9 o'clock, A. M. for meeting, and 3 o'clock, P. M. for adjournment.

On motion of Dr. Rice, the order for hearing the Annual Reports of the several Boards was so changed as to begin the series to-morrow; making it the third order of the day; to be continued on Monday, at 10 o'clock, and

so on daily till it is finished, with the Report of the Committee on Church Extension, two days sooner than the original arrangement.

Mr. M. Newkirk presented the Annual Reports from the Boards of Directors, and Trustees of the Theological Seminary at Princeton, which were read, and referred to the Committee on Theological Seminaries.

Dr. Humphrey presented and read the Reports from the Boards of the Theological Seminary at Danville, Ky., which were referred to the same committee.

The Annual Report from the Union Theological Seminary was presented, and read, and referred to the same committee.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock was called up, and reports from the several Boards were accordingly presented.

A communication was received from Samuel R. Fisher, Stated Clerk of the Synod of the German Reformed Church, inclosing a Minute of that body, intimating that the existing mode of correspondence between it and the General Assembly is abolished.

On motion, this paper was referred to the Committee on Nominating Delegates to Corresponding Bodies.

A communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Synod of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church was received and read, and ordered to be put on the Minutes, as follows, viz.

Sessions of the General Synod of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church at New York, October, 1855.

The Committee on Correspondence reported, and their report was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Correspondence beg leave respectfully to report:

That they have received a communication from the Rev. John Leyburn, Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, in which, by direction of the Assembly, he expresses to the General Synod, in relation to their complaint of the violation of the terms of correspondence by the Presbytery of North River, in the case of the church recently organized at Kingston, N. Y., "the deep regret felt by them that there should have been any cause for complaint or recrimination; their profound respect and strong fraternal affection for their brethren of the Dutch Church, and their desire that nothing should be allowed to weaken the ties which bind the two Churches together." Your committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That Synod cordially reciprocate the above expressions of fraternal affection and esteem, and their earnest desire for the strengthening and perpetuating of those ties that now bind the two Churches in Christian communion.

Resolved, 2. That the Stated Clerk of Synod furnish a certified copy of the above to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church.

A true copy from the Minutes of the General Synod of the Reformed Dutch Church, convened in the city of New York, October, 1855.

The Annual Report of the Treasurer of the General Assembly was then presented and read, and referred to the Committee on Finance.

On motion of Dr. Junkin, it was made the order of the day for to-morrow at 10 o'clock, to call for Statistical Reports, as well as Records, from the several Synods.

The Assembly then proceeded to appoint a place for the meeting of the next General Assembly. Of the 208 votes given, 85 were for Lexington,

Kentucky; 24 for Cincinnati; 24 for Pittsburgh; 9 for St. Louis; 29 for Indianapolis; 23 for Baltimore; and 23 for Philadelphia.

On motion of Mr. Shotwell, Lexington was chosen, without another calling of the roll, by a vote of 168; and the First Presbyterian church was designated as the house.

Dr. Rogers presented a report from a Committee of the Trustees on the Fund for "Disabled Ministers," &c., which was read, and on motion of Dr. Rice, referred to a special committee. Messrs. E. P. Rogers, Cater, George Marshall, Porter, and Matthew Newkirk, were appointed this committee.

Reports on Systematic Benevolence were made the fourth order of the for to-morrow.

Reports from the Delegates to Corresponding Bodies were called for, and reports from Dr. N. Murray and Mr. Schenk were given.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer.

SATURDAY MORNING, MAY 17.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

The following additional Commissioners appeared and were enrolled, viz. W. M. Marshall, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Carlisle; Stephen Potts, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Zanesville; William Patterson, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Iowa; R. L. Todd, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Missouri; William W. Caldwell, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of California; and James H. Thompson, minister, from the Presbytery of East Mississippi.

Mr. Jennings presented and read the Annual Report of the Board of Directors of the Western Theological Seminary, which was then referred to the Standing Committee on Theological Seminaries.

Dr. Dabney presented an additional report from the Union Theological Seminary, which was referred to the same committee.

The Moderator announced as a Committee to review the Records of the Synod of Wisconsin, Messrs. Dabney, Thompson, and Wm. Patterson.

Mr. M. Newkirk, from the Committee on Finance, presented the following report, which was accepted and approved, viz.

That the Treasurer has submitted to them his duplicate books of accounts, accompanied with certificates of the Committee of the Trustees of the Funds.

The Committee find the books kept in accordance with the principles adopted by the Assembly in 1854.

The Trust funds are in one general mass of investments, while each Trust forms a separate and independent account, debited with its proper amount of investment of capital, which amounts appear in the balance sheet accompanying the Treasurer's Report as the balances of the Permanent funds for each Trust, or in the name of the Trusts.

The Trust funds are also credited with their appropriate accruing income, and debited with the expenditures appropriate to the Trusts respectively; and the balances appear in the balance sheet as contingent funds of the respective Trusts.

The Committee, on inquiry, are satisfied as to the representations of the value of the securities.

They therefore recommend the following resolution, viz.

Resolved, That the accounts of the Treasurer be approved.

On motion, the second order of the day was suspended, in order to hear from Dr. Rice a report of the Committee on Bills and Overtures, which is as follows, viz.

Overture No. 1. An Overture from the Church Extension Committee, asking the Assembly—

1st. To remove the limitation which requires that other than ministerial members of the Committee shall be ruling elders, so that laymen may serve upon this Committee as upon other benevolent organizations of the Church.

2d. To add to the present number of the Committee one minister and two laymen resident in the city of St. Louis, to guard against the contingencies to which a large city is liable in the summer season, and secure at all times a quorum.

3d. To make the Corresponding Secretary, *ex officio*, a member of the Committee.

4th. To authorize the Committee to make such arrangements as may be necessary to enable the Committee to hold and secure legacies.

5th. To recommend to each of the Synods in our connection to set apart a definite time for an Annual Church Extension Collection in all the churches within their bounds.

The Committee recommend that these requests be granted.

The report was adopted.

Overture No. 2; from the Synod of Pittsburgh, memorializing the Assembly on the necessity and importance of deacons in the churches.

The Committee recommend that the Assembly answer this memorial by referring the Synod to the action of the General Assembly in 1840 and 1841. The report was adopted.

Overture No. 3; from the Synod of Illinois, requesting the erection of a new Synod, to embrace the Presbyteries of Chicago, Rock River, and Schuyler, as these Presbyteries now exist, and to be called the Synod of Chicago.

This request was granted; and, on the recommendation of the Committee, it was ordered, that the first meeting be held in Princeton, Illinois, on the third Thursday of October next, at seven o'clock, P. M.; to be opened with a sermon by the Rev. J. Pillsbury; or, in case of his absence, by the oldest minister present, who shall preside until a moderator be chosen.

The Rev. Dr. Musgrave, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of Missions, according to the order of the day, then delivered his Annual Report; after which, Dr. Rogers, from the Standing Committee on this Board, to which an abstract of the report had been referred, presented the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted, viz.

Resolved, That the Assembly recognizes with devout and humble gratitude the goodness of Almighty God, in the successful prosecution of the great work of the evangelization of our country during the past year. This expression of gratitude is demanded by the fact, that during the year, the number of missionaries employed, the amount of receipts from the churches and from individuals, and the amounts appropriated to the support of missionaries, have been considerably increased.

Resolved, That the Assembly approves the diligence and fidelity of the Board and its officers, in carrying out the important trusts committed to them; and would again call upon the pastors and ruling elders of our churches to come up to their aid, by regular and enlarged contributions to

this cause, which, in its present and prospective relations and objects, is second to no other in magnitude and importance.

Resolved, That this Assembly approve the action of the Board in increasing the number of itinerant Missionaries; and, believing that much may be accomplished in the more destitute parts of the field by such an agency, they would urge upon the Presbyteries, in laying out and arranging their missionary fields, to pay more attention to this subject, and endeavour to enable the Board to carry out the policy which they have wisely and successfully adopted.

Resolved, That while the Assembly are gratified to learn that an addition of one hundred has been made to the number of contributing churches, during the past year, they would call the attention of the Presbyteries to the mournful fact, that there are still about seventeen hundred churches within our bounds who contribute nothing to Domestic Missions, and express their earnest hope that such a fact may never hereafter disfigure their reports.

The Committee recommended nominations of members of the Board to serve for four years, and that the election be made the second order of the day for Tuesday morning.

The next order of the day was then called up—to hear delegates from corresponding bodies.

The Rev. T. Shepard, D. D., appeared on behalf of the Evangelical Consociation of Rhode Island; and the Rev. W. R. Jewett on behalf of the General Association of New Hampshire. The Moderator responded to each with cordial greeting and fraternal salutations.

Dr. Prime, from the Special Committee, to whom were referred the invitations to visit various literary and philanthropic institutions in the city and vicinity of New York, submitted a report, which, after amendment, on the motion of Dr. Campbell, was adopted, and is as follows:

Resolved, 1st. That the General Assembly return their thanks for the courtesies tendered.

Resolved, 2d. That the Assembly will adjourn on Saturday next, at 10 o'clock, for the purpose of giving opportunity to the members to visit these institutions.

Dr. Rogers, from the Committee to nominate Delegates to Corresponding Bodies, presented a report, which was adopted, and is as follows, viz.

To the General Conference of Maine, which meets at Calais, Tuesday, June 24th, Rev. Isaac W. Platt, principal, and Rev. N. A. Pratt, D. D., alternate.

To the General Association of New Hampshire, which meets at Exeter, Tuesday, August 28th, Rev. John M. Krebs, D. D., principal, and Rev. Henry G. Van Dyke, alternate.

To the General Convention of Vermont, which meets at Waterbury, Tuesday, June 17th, Rev. Francis Bowman, D. D., principal, and Rev. S. I. Prime, D. D., alternate.

To the General Association of Massachusetts, which meets at Salem, Tuesday, June 24th, Rev. A. T. McGill, D. D., principal, and Rev. James W. Alexander, D. D., alternate.

To the Evangelical Consociation of Rhode Island, which meets at Providence, Tuesday, June 9th, Rev. N. L. Rice, D. D., principal, and Rev. Robert Steel, D. D., alternate.

To the General Synod of the Reformed Dutch Church, which meets at Utica, Wednesday, June 10th, Rev. A. G. Vermilye, principal, and Rev. John D. Mathews, D. D., alternate.

The following communication was read, and the invitation it contains unanimously accepted, viz.

To the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church :

Rev. and dear Sir—Allow me, through you, respectfully to bring to the notice of the General Assembly the following resolution, adopted by the Managers of the American Bible Society at a meeting held at the Society's House on the 15th inst.

Resolved, That the Secretaries be instructed to wait on the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, now in session in this city, and invite the members of that body to attend a public meeting in the Church of the Puritans, Union Square, on Thursday, the 22d inst., at 7½ P. M.; the object of the meeting being to encourage a proposed effort to supply, without delay, all the destitute families of our country with the Bible.

On motion, the Assembly then took a recess for half an hour.

When the house was called to order again, Dr. Marshall presented and read the Annual report from the Trustees of the Western Theological Seminary, which was referred to the Committee on Theological Seminaries.

Dr. Junkin submitted the following paper, which, after an extended discussion, was adopted, viz.

Whereas, By reason of the diminished value of money, the increased price of nearly all the necessaries of life, the changed modes and customs of society, and style of living, and other causes, the salaries of ministers of the gospel, never, as a general thing, sufficient, have become distressingly and alarmingly inadequate to their decent and comfortable maintenance, be it

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to report to the Assembly upon this subject, and to draught a letter in regard to it; to be adopted by the General Assembly, and addressed to the churches

Dr. Phillips, from the Committee on Devotional Exercises, presented a report, which was approved.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet on Monday morning at 9 o'clock.
Closed with prayer.

MONDAY MORNING, May 19.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

The Moderator announced, as a special committee on the paper adopted in the session of Saturday, respecting the inadequacy of ministerial support, Messrs. Dabney, A. Phillips, Vermilye, Welch, and D. C. Campbell.

Dr. J. N. Campbell, from the Judicial Committee, submitted a report on two judicial cases, viz.

Case No. 1. The complaint of the Session of the church in Stillwater, N. J., against the Synod of New Jersey, for dismissing a complaint of the said Session against the Presbytery of Newton, in the case of Peter B. Shafer.

The report was, on motion, put on the docket.

Case No. 2. Complaint of B. C. Howard, William F. Murdock, and H. Easter, against the Synod of Baltimore.

The Judicial Committee report, that in their judgment this complaint cannot be laid before the Assembly for final action, for the following reasons, viz.

1. The record of the proceedings of the Presbytery of Baltimore, which are directly involved in the consideration of this complaint, has not been exhibited to the committee; and without such record, the complaint cannot be intelligently investigated and decided.

2. The above named B. C. Howard, William F. Murdock, and H. Easter, are the persons who sign the notice of an intention to complain of the action of the Synod of Baltimore; but neither of them appear to prosecute the complaint before the Assembly. The Committee regard this as an abandonment of the complaint, in accordance with the 11th Article of Section 3, Chapter VII. of the Book of Discipline.

The Committee therefore recommend that this complaint be dismissed. Adopted.

On motion of the Rev. Albert Williams, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the Rev. James H. Thornwell, D. D., for his able and eloquent sermon on Foreign Missions, delivered last evening; and that he be requested to furnish a copy of it to the Board of Foreign Missions for publication, in such a form as to secure its wide diffusion among the churches.

On motion, it was made the second order of the day for Wednesday next, to call for reports from the Committees on Synodical Records.

The time for the first order of the day having arrived, and the Committee on the Board of Foreign Missions not being ready to report, it was, on motion, postponed for a short time.

On motion of Dr. Macdonald, the Rev. Joseph Addison Alexander, D. D., was appointed to preach the Annual Sermon on Foreign Missions, before the next General Assembly; and, on motion of Dr. Phillips, the Rev. Edward P. Humphrey, D. D., was appointed his alternate.

The order of the day was then taken up; and Dr. Gibson, from the Committee on the Board of Foreign Missions, presented the following resolutions, viz.

The Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Board of Foreign Missions, after as careful examination as the time allotted for the purpose would permit, recommend to the Assembly that it be approved, and printed for circulation.

They would also present the following resolutions, founded upon the general statements and facts of the Report, for the consideration, and, if approved, adoption by the Assembly.

1. *Resolved*, That this Assembly finds occasion for the devoutest gratitude to God, for the success which has attended its missionary operations during the past year, as appears in the extension of missionary labours, and the blessing of God upon the efforts of our missionaries, unexampled by any former year—no part of the missionary field remaining without some special token of Divine favour, and the admissions to the communion of the missionary churches being more numerous than in any former year.

2. *Resolved*, That this Assembly desires to express its cordial approval of the manner in which the Church's Foreign Missionary operations have been conducted during the past year by the Executive Committee and officers of the Board, and would render adoring praise to God for the success which he has been pleased to vouchsafe.

3. *Resolved*, That the Assembly express special satisfaction in the

increased liberality of the churches towards the Foreign Missionary Board, showing the unabated interest of God's people in this great cause, so immediately connected in its final success with the glory of the Church's Head.

4. *Resolved*, That this Assembly render special gratitude to God, in that our Board of Foreign Missions has been enabled so much to enlarge its operations during the past year, and the increased number of missionaries sent into the foreign field, with sufficient means contributed by the Church for their support; and especially for the unusual indications of the presence of the Holy Spirit in almost all our missionary stations and churches.

5. *Resolved*, That it is the indispensable duty of every member of the Church to contribute, according to his or her ability, to the various schemes of benevolence conducted by the Church; and this Assembly express their regret that so many of our churches have failed to contribute anything to foreign missions during the past year; and would hereby urge upon the pastors and sessions of these delinquent churches to see to it, that the cause be remembered in their prayers and contributions, in the time to come.

6. *Resolved*, That the General Assembly feel greatly encouraged to go forward in the missionary enterprise, from the fact, that from a comparatively recent origin, our Board now takes its place along side of sister associations which have done so nobly in this cause; and would urge upon the churches increased and still more vigorous efforts to occupy the fields which are being opened by the providence of God for the introduction of the glorious gospel of our ever blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

7. *Resolved*, That the Assembly approves of the course pursued by the Board in regard to the setting apart a special fund for the education of the children of foreign missionaries; and, because it is due to these men of God that their children be educated in Christian lands, the Committee recommend increased contributions on the part of the wealthy members of the Church to the above fund.

Also, in connection with the above resolutions, the Committee would direct the attention of the Assembly to the fact, that notwithstanding the recommendation of the last General Assembly, the fund of twenty thousand dollars devoted to the endowment of Professorships in the Theological Seminary of the Waldensian Church, is still incomplete by about seven thousand dollars, very little having been contributed for that object during the past year.

On the motion to adopt these resolutions, the Rev. Dr. Wilson, Assistant Secretary of the Board, the Rev. M. S. Culbertson, and the Rev. A. P. Happer, M. D., Missionaries, addressed the Assembly at length, and the resolutions were adopted.

The house then took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, the Assembly took up Judicial Case No. 1.

The report of the Committee was approved, and the house proceeded, after the usual charge from the Moderator, to take up the papers relating to the case, in the order recommended, as follows, viz.

1. The complaint of Peter B. Shafer to the Presbytery of Newton, June 20, 1854.

2. The Minutes of that Presbytery, of October 3, 1854, November 21, 1854, and April 18, 1855.

3. The Minutes of the same Presbytery, of October 2, 1855, with the Records of the Session of the Church in Stillwater, of December, 1854, and April, 1855, which were before that Presbytery, and on which their action was taken.

4. The complaint of the Session of Stillwater to the Synod of New Jersey, and the Minutes of that Synod; complaint October 11, 1855, Minutes October 17, 18, 1855.

5. The Minute of the Presbytery of Newton, of April 23, 1856.

6. The complaint to the General Assembly upon the action of the Synod of New Jersey.

The Rev. Thaniel B. Condit was heard in prosecution of the complaint, and the Rev. Dr. Robert Davidson on behalf of the Synod of New Jersey; it having been determined, on motion of Dr. Rice, after Mr. Condit had spoken, that the complainant and the Synod should be considered the only parties in the trial of this cause as it comes before the Assembly.

The regular time of adjournment having arrived, the proceedings were arrested at this stage, and the Assembly adjourned till to-morrow morning, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Closed with prayer.

TUESDAY MORNING, May 20.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Alexander R. Banks, minister, from the Presbytery of Ouachita, appeared as an additional commissioner; and the Rev. Abraham Polhemus presented credentials as Delegate from the General Synod of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church.

Dr. Junkin, from the Committee on Elections, reported Alfred Hamilton, minister, from the Presbytery of New Castle, as present with an informal commission, recommending that he be admitted to a seat.

The report was adopted.

On motion of Dr. Gibson, it was made the order of the day, for 1 o'clock, to fill vacancies in the Board of Foreign Missions.

The Assembly then took up the unfinished business, Judicial Case, No. 1.

Members of the inferior judicatory, the Synod of New Jersey, were heard, when the hour having arrived, the order of the day for 10 o'clock was called up, the Annual Report of the Board of Education.

Dr. Dickinson, from the Standing Committee on this Board, offered the following resolutions, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That in the review of the operations and results of the Board of Education during the past year, the Assembly has reason for gratitude to the Great Head of the Church. Notwithstanding the embarrassments which at the commencement of the year seemed to threaten the treasury of the Board, and which occasioned no little anxiety, the exigency was met, and by some of the churches with redoubled liberality; so that the receipts of the Board, over those of the preceding year, have amounted to \$4,913. Though the appropriations to candidates, in compliance with the recommendation of a previous Assembly, were increased *one-fifth*, the Board has not failed to meet, with all their wonted promptness, these increased demands on their treasury. And it is a fact not to be overlooked, demanding as it does, grateful record, that during the last twenty-five years, the Board has never failed to fulfil the Church's engagements with her own candidates; thus encouraging the hope, if not affording assurance, that the Church will never allow the candidates for her ministry to suffer through any disregard or neglect of her own engagements.

2. *Resolved*, That, though the number of new candidates does not quite

equal that of the preceding year, there is abundant cause for thanksgiving that no less than one hundred and two have been taken under the care of the Board during the past year, thus making the aggregate for this year, three hundred and eighty-two, which is eighteen more than the aggregate in 1855, and forty more than that of 1854.

3. *Resolved*, That in view of the origin and design of the Christian ministry, the greatness of the field which it is called to occupy, the weighty interests which it involves; its relation to the spread of revealed truth, to the extension of the Church, and the salvation of dying sinners, it is solemnly incumbent on Presbyteries in every scriptural way to seek the increase, as well as guard the purity and promote the efficiency of the ministry.

4. *Resolved*, That in view of those untoward influences to which even the children of the Church are exposed, and which tend to depreciate the ministry as a profession in the estimation of the rising generation; in view also of the dangers to which the youthful mind is so imminently exposed from the insidiousness of error, the blandishments of a secularized religion, and the devices of a paganized christianity, this Assembly enjoins it upon the pastors of our churches to devote especial attention to the religious culture of the youth of their respective charges, and urgently advises Christian parents to throw around their children the shield of biblical and catechetical instruction, that by the early inculcation of right views of truth and duty, they may be not only preserved from error and evil, but ultimately inclined, under God's blessing, to devote themselves to his service in the work of the gospel ministry.

5. *Resolved*, That while the Assembly continues to approve of the course of the Board in establishing schools, academies, and colleges, on a definite religious basis, a sound discretion is necessary as to their number and location; and lest the operations of the Board in this relation should be exposed to invidious misconstruction, it should be distinctly understood that the Church does not undervalue the importance of any institution of learning, which, though not subjected to ecclesiastical supervision, recognizes the authority, and inculcates the principles of God's written word, much less disparage the Common School system, as adapted to useful ends, so long as the Bible is not excluded.

6. *Resolved*, That though Christians should pray habitually that the "Lord of the harvest will send forth labourers into the harvest," yet in thankful remembrance of the signal marks of Divine favour with which the observance of a special season of prayer has heretofore been attended, this Assembly recommends that the last Thursday of February, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, be observed by the churches as a day of prayer for the blessing of God on the work of the ministry, especially in its relation to the baptized children of the Church; and for the outpouring of the Spirit on the youth of our land, particularly those under instruction in our various institutions of learning.

After addresses from the Rev. Dr. Van Rensselaer, Corresponding Secretary of the Board, and Messrs. Baker, George Marshall, Macdonald, Junkin, Prime, Crozier, Harrison, Hewit, and A. Phillips, the resolutions were adopted.

On motion of Dr. Dickinson, the following paper was adopted, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That a Sermon be preached before the next General Assembly on the subject of Christian Education.

2. *Resolved*, That Rev. William S. Plumer, D. D., be appointed to preach the Sermon, and that the Rev. C. C. Jones, D. D., of Georgia, be his alternate.

The Assembly then took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, the Assembly took up the second order of the day, the election to fill vacancies in the Board of Missions.

On motion, the following persons were elected, having been duly nominated according to the rule:

And to supply vacancies in the class of 1857—Thomas Creigh, D. D., to supply the place of D. McKinley, D. D., deceased; and Selah Matthews, to supply an omission of last year.

Also, in the class of 1858—Mr. T. U. Smith, to supply the place of Hugh Auchincloss, deceased.

Dr. Campbell, from the Judicial Committee, presented the following paper, as containing Judicial Case No. 3, with the action, which the Committee recommend to the Assembly. It was adopted, viz.

Judicial Case No. 3, is a complaint of the Rev. H. B. Gardiner against the Synod of Wisconsin, for reversing the proceedings of the Presbytery of Dane, which recognized the election and ordination of Julius T. Clark and

others, as elders and deacons of the Church of Madison. And also a complaint of the said J. T. Clark, against the same decision of the said Synod; and also against their decision, reversing the action of the Presbytery of Dane, in putting a call from the said church of Madison in the hands of the said H. B. Gardiner, to become their pastor.

In the matter of this last named complaint, viz., that which refers to the call to the Rev. H. B. Gardiner, although the papers are voluminous, there is a lack of evidence on both sides to enable the Assembly to judge of the verity of certain allegations which are contradictory; and, on this account, although the complaints are in order, the Judicial Committee is of opinion that a satisfactory adjudication could not be made by the General Assembly. The representatives of both parties, however, agree to the following statement of the case, viz.

The church of Madison, Wisconsin, made out a call for the pastoral services of Mr. Gardiner. A portion of the church opposed the putting the call into his hands, alleging that the opposition was too important to make it prudent for him to be settled over that church; and that certain members, who constituted part of the majority voting the call, were disqualified from voting, by Section 4, Chapter XV. of the Constitution of our Church; and that without them there would not have been a majority. This statement of disqualification is contradicted by the other party; and there is no evidence before the Assembly by which this fact can be settled. The Presbytery of Dane put the call into Mr. Gardiner's hands. Complaint was made to the Synod of Wisconsin. That Synod reversed the decision of the Presbytery. For doing this, the present complaint is made to the Assembly against the Synod.

With this statement of the case, and in view of the fact that, under the various discouragements arising from this state of affairs, Mr. Gardiner has left that field of labour, the Judicial Committee, with the consent of the representatives of both parties, recommend that, without expressing any opinion concerning the act of the Synod, this part of the case be dismissed.

In the matter of the other part of the case, viz., the disputed election of elders and deacons, both parties agree on the following statement, viz.

G. B. Smith and J. T. Clark were elected elders of the church of Madison, Wisconsin, at a meeting held on Sunday, 26th August, 1855. David Dennon and H. J. Davidson were elected deacons. Notice of the meeting had been given on the previous Sabbath from the pulpit, and also on the day of meeting. Messrs. G. B. Smith and J. T. Clark were ordained as elders on the evening of that day. David Dennon was at the same time ordained as deacon. At the next meeting of Presbytery, called *pro re nata*, at the request of the party opposed to the present complainants, J. T. Clark and J. Y. Smith both claimed seats as the representatives of the Madison church. Mr. Clark had been appointed by the Session—the vote being a tie, and the casting vote being given for him by the Moderator. The two former elders of the church—one of whom was an ordained minister, and a member of the Presbytery of Dane—withdraw; alleging that they disputed the fact that the other two were elders. At the Presbytery, J. Y. Smith contested the right of Clark to a seat in that body, on the ground that the meeting to elect elders had not been called by order of the existing Session. The existing or former Session, and their party, had due notice of the meeting, and were present at its commencement. They attempted to postpone the election, and withdrew after the majority had voted to proceed with the election.

The Presbytery of Dane admitted Mr. Clark to his seat, thus recognizing the validity of his election and ordination. Against this action of the Presbytery, J. Y. Smith and his party complained to the Synod of Wisconsin.

The Synod sustained the complaint, thus pronouncing the election and the ordination of the new elders invalid. Against this decision of the Synod, Mr. Gardiner and Mr. J. T. Clark complain.

The above is the statement of the case, as agreed upon by the parties. It is submitted with a view of saving the time of the Assembly.

The Judicial Committee recommend to the Assembly the adoption of the following minute, as a final settlement of the case, agreed on by both parties.

1. That the complaint be sustained *pro forma*, and the decision of the Synod be reversed, so far as it pronounces the election and ordination of the elders and deacons invalid—the Assembly being of opinion that the informality in the call of the congregational meeting was not so serious as to vitiate the election and ordination.

2. That the Synod was right in pronouncing the call of the congregational meeting irregular.

3. That although the Assembly thus recognize the validity of the election and ordination of the said elders and deacons, they yet recommend, the said elders having assented thereto by their representatives, that in view of past and existing difficulties, the said elders and deacons cease to act, according to our form of government, until such time as in the estimation of the Presbytery of Dane the church can be reasonably harmonious in receiving them in their official capacity.

On motion of Dr. Phillips, the Rev. William D. Howard, D. D., was appointed to preach the Annual Sermon on Domestic Missions before the next General Assembly; and the Rev. J. L. Yantis, D. D., was appointed his alternate.

The Assembly then took up the unfinished business, Judicial Case, No. 1, the Complaint of the Session of Stillwater against the Synod of New Jersey, Mr. Condit was heard again.

The parties and members of the inferior judicatory were then required to withdraw; which the Assembly, by a formal vote, interpreted to mean, a literal retirement from the house.

Dr. Rice moved that the complaint be sustained.

Pending a discussion of this motion, in which Messrs. John C. Lord, Daniel Lord, Fine, and Junkin participated, the hour having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, May 21.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

Milton W. Brown, minister, from the Presbytery of Coshocton, appeared, and was enrolled as an additional commissioner.

The Rev. John Maltby appeared as Delegate from the General Conference of Maine.

On motion of Dr. Junkin, from the Committee on Elections, Jefferson Ramsey, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of New Castle, present with an informal commission, was admitted to a seat.

On motion of Dr. E. P. Rogers, the subject assigned yesterday to Dr. William S. Plumer, for a Sermon before the next General Assembly, was changed from "Christian Education" to "Ministerial Education."

On motion, the order of the day for 10 o'clock was postponed, in order to hear Delegates from Corresponding Bodies.

Dr. Rogers, from the special committee on the subject of "Disabled ministers, &c.," presented and read a report, which was made the second order of the day for to-morrow, Thursday.

The Rev. B. G. Northrop, Delegate from the General Association of Massachusetts, and the Rev. John Maltby, from the General Conference of Maine, addressed the Assembly, and their fraternal salutations were reciprocated by the Moderator.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock was then called, and the Rev. William E. Schenck presented the the Annual Report of the Board of Publication.

Dr. Hewit briefly addressed the Assembly on the subject.

Dr. Bowman, from the standing committee on this Board, followed him, with a report and resolutions; which, after an address by the Rev. Samuel J. Baird, were adopted, and are as follows, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That every successive year's operations of the Board of Publication exhibit increasing evidence of its great importance and efficiency in promoting all the great interests of the Church. This report of its doings, the past year, presents an unprecedented degree of prosperity, which calls for the most fervent thanksgiving of the Assembly to the Divine Head of the Church, for the increased success with which its labours have been crowned, manifested in the enlargement of its field of operations; in the steadily advancing liberality of the Church; in the largely augmented number of volumes circulated; and in the increase of the number and efficiency of its self-denying Colporteurs, employed to disseminate among all classes of our population the precious truths contained in these volumes.

2. *Resolved*, That in view of the difficulty and delicacy frequently involved in determining as to the expediency of publishing particular books, the Assembly, relying on the wisdom and knowledge of the Board, commits this matter, in general, to their sound discretion; and as it regards the publication of an "Abridged edition of the Psalmodist," mentioned in their Report, the Assembly recommends to them to do whatever, in their judgment, is best adapted to supply the wants of the Church.

3. *Resolved*, That it is to the Assembly an exceedingly gratifying fact, that the Board have been able to publish so many books of sterling value, suited for Sabbath-School Libraries; and the Assembly earnestly recommends to the Board to add to the number of such books as fast as works of the requisite character can be obtained. And the Assembly would urge upon all our ministers, and all in our Church, male and female, whom God has blessed with talents for writing books suited to children and youth, to employ those talents in furnishing the Board with the needed works for publication in this department.

4. *Resolved*, That the Assembly deems it worthy of special notice and commendation, that the Board have received a considerably increased amount of funds during the year, without any paid agencies; and this gratifying result of their experiment to dispense with such agencies, is particularly interesting, because it is believed to be, in part at least, the result of the beneficent working of our "Plan of Systematic Benevolence."

5. *Resolved*, That the Assembly deems it important to direct the attention of the churches to the fact brought in view in the Report of the Board, that

there are, in reality, two distinct departments under its management. One, that of publishing and selling books, a purely business department, conducted on strictly commercial principles; the other, the Colporteur enterprise, a charitable and missionary department, conducted on benevolent principles. Benevolent contributions to the charitable department, constitute all the resources of the Board for its Colporteur work and for gratuitous distribution of books among the needy. A large increase of contributions to this fund is greatly needed, and the churches are earnestly entreated to come to the aid of the Board in this benevolent department of its work with greater liberality. The Assembly is pleased to perceive that the Board have determined that in future all accounts of these two departments shall be kept separate.

6. *Resolved*, That while the Assembly finds so much cause for gratitude and encouragement in the prosperity and usefulness of this Board, and so much to commend in the energy and economy with which its affairs have been conducted, it cannot forbear to give utterance to the painful feelings which are caused by the fact that there are still very many churches which have not, as yet, contributed anything to the Colporteur funds of the Board, and that there are still so many families in our Church who do not take either the "Home and Foreign Record," or "The Sabbath-School Visitor." The Assembly reiterates its earnest exhortations to our ministers and elders to endeavour to secure a more general circulation of these papers among the members of our Church.

The Committee also recommend that the Rev. Joseph B. Stratton be appointed to preach the Sermon before the next General Assembly, in behalf of the Board of Publication, and that the Rev. N. Hewit, D. D., be appointed the alternate.

Mr. Phelps moved the following additional resolution, viz.

Resolved, That in view of the rapidly increasing German population of our country, the opening God in his providence has given to our Church to labour for their evangelization, the success which he has already granted to the feeble efforts that have been made, and the importance and necessity of having the standards of our Church in a language which can be understood by the churches organized on these standards, the Board of Publication be instructed to issue, as speedily as possible, an edition of the Confession of Faith in German, and to have the same bound and published with the English and German on alternate leaves, so that the German and English shall be on opposite pages.

Pending a discussion of this resolution, the Assembly took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, the second order of the day was taken up—reports from the Committees on Synodical Records.

The Records of New York, Allegheny, Ohio, Cincinnati, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Virginia, Nashville, Alabama, and Memphis, were approved, without exception, on the recommendation of the respective committees.

The Records of Pittsburgh and Northern Indiana were approved, with the exception, in each case, that the Book had not been sent up for review to the Assembly of last year.

The Records of Buffalo were approved, with the following exceptions, viz.

1st. That they have not been submitted to the Assembly for four years, contrary to the requisition of the Form of Government, Chap. XI. Sec. 6.

2d. That the record on pages 61 and 62 is imperfect in two instances, contrary to the Form of Government, Chap. XI. Sec. 6. The instances are, that the report of a special committee and a report of the Committee of

Bills and Overtures are only referred to as documents lettered for distinction.

3d. That it appears by the record on page 75 that a meeting of the Synod was opened without a sermon, whereas the Form of Government, Chap. XI. Sec. 5, requires that a sermon shall be preached.

And again, on page 79, that at the opening of the Synod no sermon was delivered, as the Constitution requires, but on the following evening.

The Records of the Synod of Wisconsin were approved, with the following exceptions, viz.

1. The records are marked by several verbal omissions and the neglect of orthography and punctuation; and the absentees of 1852, 1853, are not recorded.

2. During the sessions of 1852, there is no evidence that the Synod read, corrected, or approved the records; though on page 16, it appears that the records of that year were read twelve months after in Synod, though still there is no evidence that they were approved by it. The Minutes of 1853 do not appear to have been ever read or approved in Synod. And the records of 1854 were not read and approved till the meeting of 1855.

3. On page 23, it appears that the Synod, Oct. 13th, 1853, adjourned to meet at Neenah, the second Thursday of October, 1854. A quorum having failed to meet at that time, the members present adjourned to a *different time and place*, (Madison, October 26th;) and there is no evidence that any steps were taken to cause their Moderator to notify all the ministers and Church Sessions of the new meeting. This is contrary to the spirit of the precedents approved by the Assembly; (see Minutes 1796, p. 113, Baird, p. 212,) and transcends the liberty allowed for such cases by the third general rule for Judicatories.

4. On pp. 23, 27, and 32, are recorded adjournments without any evidence that the sessions were closed with prayer.

5. On pp. 35, 36, the report of a Committee of Review on the Records of the Presbytery of Dane, containing an exception against the action of the Presbytery for appointing *Rev. J. W. Sterling* its *lay* Commissioner to the General Assembly, is entered on the records of Synod, without any record of its adoption by Synod; and again it is stated that this report was amended by striking out the exception; and there is still no evidence of its adoption as amended. Also, on pp. 39, 40, the report of a committee touching the complaints of *J. Y. Smith* is made a part of the records of Synod, though so far as these records show, it was only *accepted* and *laid on the table*.

6. The records of the Synod's action on the complaints of said *J. Y. Smith* against the Presbytery of Dane, are not complete enough to fulfil the demands of the Book of Discipline, Chap. IV. § 23, which says that the record ought to "exhibit everything which had an influence on the judgment of the court." No exception is proposed against the *action* of Synod touching those complaints, inasmuch as they have been brought before this Assembly through another channel (the Judicial Committee) and passed upon.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of North Carolina reported, that the Book had not been put into their hands; and were, on motion, discharged.

The Records of the Synod of Arkansas were commended for approval, with exceptions.

Pending a discussion on these exceptions, the hour of adjournment arrived.

Dr. Prime was permitted to move that, when the Assembly adjourn on Friday next, it adjourn till Monday morning at 9 o'clock, in order to give the members more time and convenience in accepting various invitations to

visit literary and philanthropic institutions of the city and vicinity. The motion was carried.

On motion of Dr. Prime, it was

Resolved, That the Rev. Dr. Thornwell be requested to preach on the subject of Foreign Missions, in the First Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn, on Sabbath evening next.

The Assembly then adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer.

THURSDAY MORNING, MAY 22.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

Charles Macalester, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Philadelphia, and Edward Crosby, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Bedford, appeared, and were enrolled as additional commissioners.

Dr. Hewit, from the Committee on Theological Seminaries, reported, and the report was made the order of the day for 12 o'clock, excepting so much as recommended the granting of a request from the Directors of the Seminary at Princeton, viz. that the plan of the Seminary, Art 2, Sec. 13, be so altered as to read, "During the annual examination, or at its close, a sermon shall be preached before the Seminary, by a member of the Board of Directors."

On motion of Dr. Phillips, this request was granted, and the change was made accordingly.

On motion of Mr. R. K. Rogers, the order of the day for ten o'clock was postponed, in order to receive a report from the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

Dr. Rice, from this Committee, reported

Overture No. 5; a memorial from a Committee of the Synod of South Carolina, touching a correspondence of that body with the Associate Reformed Synod of the South.

On motion, the report upon this Overture was put on the docket.

Overture No. 6; a memorial from sundry ministers and elders, on the subject of an itinerating ministry.

Also put on the docket.

Overture No. 7; from the Presbytery of Elizabethtown, the papers of a foreign minister, the Rev. John Wirz.

The Committee recommend that these papers be returned to the Presbytery, with the recommendation that Mr. Wirz be received into regular standing, at their proper discretion.

The report was adopted.

Overture No. 8; a memorial from the Synod of Mississippi, for the erection of a new Synod within her bounds; with a remonstrance against it, from the Presbytery of Mississippi.

The Committee recommend the refusal of the request in said memorial.

Adopted.

Overture No. 9; from the Presbytery of Cedar, asking the General Assembly to authorize our Church Sessions to keep a reserved roll, upon which

shall be entered the names of church members who have removed beyond their bounds without letters, and whose residence is unknown, and who shall not be reported in our statistical reports.

The Committee recommend that this request be granted.

The report was adopted; and it was accordingly ordered, that Sessions be so authorized.

Overture No. 10; from sundry members of the Assembly, inquiring whether an ordained minister may accept and exercise the office of ruling elder in a church belonging to the same Presbytery of which he is a member.

At the recommendation of the Committee, this was answered in the negative.

Overture No. 11; from the Synod of Virginia, proposing that the Assembly mature some plan for changing and reducing the present representation of the Presbyteries in the General Assembly, so as to diminish the aggregate attendance of commissioners, and adjust the ratio upon a more equitable basis.

The Committee recommend, that the Assembly decline action on this subject.

The report was adopted.

Overture No. 12; from a Committee of the Board of Colportage of the Synods of Pittsburgh and Allegheny, respecting a greater supply of Sabbath-school books by the Board of Publication.

This was answered, on the recommendation of the Committee, by referring the memorialists to the action already taken by this Assembly, in adopting the Report of the Standing Committee on the Board of Publication.

Overture No. 13; from the Presbytery of Londonderry, asking the Assembly to define more explicitly the rights and relations of baptized members.

The report was put on the docket.

Overture No. 14; from a member of this Assembly, submitting two inquiries, viz.

1. In an application to the Moderator of a Presbytery to call a *pro re nata* meeting of that body, is it competent for the applicants to specify a particular time and place for such meeting?

2. If a particular time or place, or both, be specified in the application for a *pro re nata* meeting of Presbytery, has the Moderator a right, on such application, to call a meeting at a different time and place?

The first question was answered affirmatively, the second negatively, at the recommendation of the Committee.

Overture No. 15; from the Presbytery of Stockton, memorializing the Assembly, in consequence of the peculiar difficulty of convening in the Synod of the Pacific, to constitute a new Presbytery in the present bounds of the Presbytery of Stockton, to be called the Presbytery of Benicia; to consist of the Rev. Sylvester Woodbridge, jr., and the Rev. B. B. Bonham, of the Presbytery of Stockton, and the Rev. James Woods, of the Presbytery of California, ministers, together with the churches of Benicia and (when organized) Santa Rosa; the first meeting of the newly organized Presbytery to be held at Santa Rosa, on the third Tuesday of August, A. D. 1856, to be opened with a sermon by the oldest minister present.

This request was granted.

Dr. Campbell, from the Judicial Committee, reported Case No. 4, embracing a complaint of the Rev. D. J. Waller and Dr. W. J. Gibson; and an appeal of the Rev. John Smalley against the Synod of Philadelphia.

On motion, it was made the order of the day, next after the unfinished business of Judicial Case No. 1 shall have been disposed of.

On motion of Mr. Eckard, the following paper was adopted, viz.

Whereas, Since the dissolution of the late General Assembly, the Presbytery of Baltimore has dissolved the pastoral connection between Rev. J. M. P. Atkinson and the Bridge Street Church, Georgetown, District of Columbia, in order that Mr. Atkinson may devote himself to raising funds for the Assembly's Church, to be erected at Washington City; therefore, be it

Resolved, 1st. That this Assembly reiterates the sentiments and expressions of previous Assemblies in regard to the great importance of the speedy completion of the said church in Washington.

Resolved, 2d. That this Assembly recommends Mr. Atkinson to the sympathies and liberality of all the churches under its care, recognizing his present agency as an act of self-denial, and of laudable zeal for the interests of Christ's cause and Church.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock was then taken up, the Annual Report of the Church Extension Committee.

The Rev. Henry I. Coe, Corresponding Secretary and General Agent, addressed the Assembly.

Dr. Macdonald, from the Committee on this Annual Report, presented the following report, which, after addresses by Messrs. Rice, Albert Williams, and others, was adopted.

The Committee on the Report of the Church Extension Committee, report that they have attentively considered this document, and recommend its approval and publication by the Committee for general circulation in the Church; and recommend further to the Assembly the adoption of the following resolutions, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That we regard the following principles upon which the Church Extension Committee are conducting their operations, as both just and wise, to wit:

1. To make no appropriation to any church under the care of a Presbytery, without the recommendation of that Presbytery or its Church Extension Committee.

2. To be guided in determining the amount to be appropriated in each case by the carefully ascertained necessities of that case, and the state of the treasury.

3. To diffuse appropriations as widely and equitably as possible, over the whole country.

4. To require, as the ordinary prerequisite of the payment of every appropriation from the general fund, a certificate from the Trustees of the church aided, that the church lot is fully secured to the Old School Presbyterian Church, and that the amount granted by the Church Extension Committee will complete their house of worship and leave the whole property free from debt.

5. To withdraw every appropriation not properly called for within two years of its date.

6. To recognize the right of donors to designate the recipients of their donations.

7. Inasmuch as it is frequently of the highest importance to a church to know definitely the amount of aid upon which it may rely, a considerable time before the money can be drawn, the Church Extension Committee have felt at liberty to make, in anticipation of the incoming of funds, several appropriations, payable as soon after a fixed time in the future, as the churches aided comply with the conditions on which the appropriations are made.

2. *Resolved*, That we highly approve of the determination of the Committee to endeavour to dispense with salaried collecting agents.

3. *Resolved*, That in view of that determination, and the great intrinsic importance of the church extension work, the Assembly would "earnestly and affectionately enjoin it upon all our churches to take up collections annually for this object, and upon all Presbyteries to see that this is done."

4. *Resolved*, That it be recommended to the Church Extension Committee to report annually to the General Assembly, the names and localities of the churches to which appropriations have been made, and the names and localities of churches from which appropriations have been withdrawn, when the conditions on which the appropriations were made have not been complied with.

It was made the order of the day for Monday next, at 10 o'clock, to fill vacancies in this committee, and nominations were made.

On motion, the time for prayer and mutual exhortation to-morrow, (Friday,) was limited to two hours—from 9 to 11 A. M.

The second order of the day was then taken up—the report of the special committee on the support of "Disabled ministers."

Pending an extended discussion, in which Messrs. Porter, Jacob, Leavitt, Fine, Benedict, Putnam, and others, participated, the Assembly took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, the Assembly allowed Dr. Hewit to present additional items to the report from the Committee on Theological Seminaries, relating to the Union Theological Seminary and the Western Theological Seminary.

Dr. McMullen, from the Committee on Systematic Benevolence, submitted a report, which was put on the docket.

Rev. R. K. Rogers, from the Committee on Leave of Absence, reported that they had given leave to Mr. Philip M. Thompson, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Memphis; Mr. Henry Fetter and Mr. William M. Marshall, ruling elders, from the Presbytery of Carlisle; Mr. William P. Buffit, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Long Island; Mr. Peter Cromartie, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Fayetteville; and the Rev. Mr. Cummings, from the Lake Presbytery.

The report was approved.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Mississippi reported, recommending the approval of them, with certain exceptions. The report was put on the docket.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Georgia reported, recommending the approval of them, without exception. Adopted.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Missouri also reported, recommending the approval of them, without exception. Adopted.

The Rev. Dr. Shepard briefly addressed the Moderator again, in taking leave of the Assembly.

The Rev. Abraham Polhemus, Delegate from the General Synod of the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, then addressed the Assembly, and the Moderator responded in the same appropriate and happy manner that characterized all his addresses in this fraternal exchange of Christian salutations.

On motion of Dr. Junkin, the Assembly agreed to hear the Rev. Mr. Cather, a foreign minister, when the report on Systematic Benevolence should be taken up.

The unfinished business, on the report of Dr. Rogers, from the special committee on "Disabled ministers," &c. was then resumed, and after the discussion had been continued by Messrs. Riggs, George Marshall, and

others, and the adoption of the first resolution and amendment of the second, the whole business was recommitted to the same committee.

It was made the peremptory order of the day for to-morrow (Friday) at 11 o'clock, to take up the report on Theological Seminaries.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.
Closed with prayer.

FRIDAY MORNING, May 23.

The Assembly met, and agreeably to the resolution of yesterday engaged in singing, prayer, and mutual exhortation, for two hours—from 9 to 11 A. M.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

On motion of Dr. Prime, the remaining business connected with the Board of Publication was made the next order, after the order of the day for 11 o'clock.

This order of the day was then taken up, the report of the standing Committee on Theological Seminaries. The remaining items of the report, which relate to the Seminary at Princeton, were adopted, including the following expression of the Committee: "We would ask leave to be urgent in our own exhortations, in conjunction with those from the Faculty and Overseers of Princeton, in insisting on an uninterrupted prosecution of study the full term required. Instead of shortening the period of preparation for the ministry, we would, if possible, extend it, and enlarge the sphere of study. The enemy, in every quarter, is meeting his foes, and burnishing his weapons. True, the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but spiritual; and, therefore, as the Spirit is the Spirit of truth, the intellectual, as well as the moral faculties of the soul, must be purified and disciplined. If there be danger, as danger there is, of the pride of learning, let us not forget that none are more certainly lifted up with pride, and fall into the condemnation of the devil, than novices who commonly think they know more than any, because they know the least of all."

To fill vacancies in the Board of Directors, the following were, on motion, elected, *viva voce*, having been duly nominated by the chairman of the Committee:

The report on the Union Theological Seminary was next considered, and at the request of the Board of Directors, in consequence of the previous

connection of the Presbytery of Winchester with the Synod of Virginia, and its continued interest in the Union Theological Seminary, it was

Resolved, That the Presbytery of Winchester may hereafter appoint one minister and one ruling elder, as Directors of the said Seminary, it being understood that the Synod of Virginia relinquishes these two places to the said Presbytery.

It was further

Resolved, That the change in the course of studies, and the establishment of a fourth Professorship, to be called that of Biblical Introduction, be approved by the Assembly as a part of the Plan of this Seminary, and that the election of the Rev. William J. Hoge, of Baltimore Presbytery, to this Professorship, be approved.

The portion of the report relating to the Western Theological Seminary was then taken up, and the nominations of the Committee to fill vacancies in the Board of Directors weré, on motion, confirmed, *viva voce*, and are as follows:

The Committee recommended the election of a fourth Professor in this institution—of Ecclesiastical History, and the Composition and Delivery of Sermons—inasmuch as, in the judgment of its immediate friends, the providence of God had opened a door for the completion of its faculty.

This recommendation was adopted.

And thereupon the Rev. Richard W. Dickinson, D. D., was nominated by Dr. Phillips; and the Rev. Luther Halsey, D. D., was nominated by Mr. Beattie; and the election of this Professor was made the second order of the day for Monday next.

The Assembly then proceeded to that part of the report which related to the Theological Seminary at Danville. An amendment was offered by Dr. Humphrey; and a discussion ensued, until the Assembly agreed, on motion, to take a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, Mr. Newkirk, on behalf of the Committee on Mileage, presented a report, stating that the amount contributed to the Commissioners' Fund was \$1273.35; that the miles travelled were 22,742; which would allow five cents a mile to the Commissioners applying, and leave a balance of \$36.25 in the hands of the Treasurer.

This report was approved; and the recommendation of the Committee, that the Treasurer be directed to pay this rate of allowance to said Commissioners, provided no one receive more than the amount of his actual expenses in coming to the Assembly and returning home, was adopted.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Wheeling, reported, recommending that they be approved, without exception. Adopted.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Northern India reported, that these records had not been put into their hands; and, on motion, they were discharged.

The unfinished business was then resumed—the Report of the Committee on the Seminary at Danville.

The Chairman of the Committee, with leave from the House, accepted the

amendment offered by Dr. Humphrey; and also an amendment offered by Judge Fine.

The report was then adopted unanimously, as follows, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That the General Assembly now reaffirms its purpose, in conformity with its action in 1853, and its stipulations, by way of covenant, in 1854, to proceed, in good faith, and with the least practicable delay, to take measures for endowing and establishing this Seminary as one of the first class. To this end it is earnestly recommended to all the congregations under our care, especially those in the West and South-west, by liberal contributions to aid in its complete endowment; and the Board of Trustees, as the agents of the Assembly, are renewedly invested with ample powers to institute the means necessary to the collection of funds, under this action of the Assembly.

2. *Resolved*, That as the Presbyteries of the Synod of Kentucky, and the Directors, together with the present Professors, ask the Assembly to elect, at its present sessions, a Professor of Pastoral Theology and Church Government, the Assembly will proceed to an election accordingly.

3. *Resolved*, That this Assembly, with thanksgiving to the great Head of the Church, congratulates the more immediate patrons of this Seminary for the smiles of his providence on their wise and persevering efforts in founding and advancing this school of the prophets to its present prosperous and hopeful condition.

Nominations were called for by the Moderator, in pursuance of the second resolution; and the Rev. Stuart Robinson was nominated by Dr. McMullen.

The election was made the third order of the day for Monday next.

In view of both these elections thus made the second and third orders of the day for Monday, and in accordance with the rule and usage in such cases, the Assembly united in prayer; being led by Dr. Phillips, at the request of the Moderator.

The election of members to supply vacancies was then called up, according to a previous order; when a resolution, offered by Mr. Cummins, was introduced, and discussed, and adopted, as follows, viz.

The second order of the day was then taken up, the election of a Professor of Ecclesiastical History and Composition and Delivery of Sermons, in the Western Theological Seminary.

On motion of Dr. Prime, it was

Resolved, That blank votes shall be counted in ascertaining the result of any such election.

A motion was made by Mr. Conrad to postpone this election until the Board of Directors of that Seminary shall have formally decided on the expediency of such a measure.

Mr. Riggs moved to amend this motion, by postponing the election till to-morrow morning.

A discussion ensued, in which Messrs. Conrad, Hastings, Beattie, Humphrey, Frame, and Grimes took part; and during which, the Rev. Dr. Herron, and the Rev. Dr. Plumer were, on motion, introduced successively to address the Assembly on the subject.

The amendment and the original motion were lost; and the Assembly proceeded to elect the Professor, according to the previous appointment.

Messrs. R. K. Rogers and Reuben Frame were appointed tellers to collect and count the ballots.

The third order of the day was then taken up, the election of a Professor of Pastoral Theology and Church Government, in the Theological Seminary at Danville.

Messrs. Conrad and James Williamson were appointed tellers to collect and count the ballots.

The following resolutions, offered by Mr. Harrison, were adopted, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That this Assembly tender their heartfelt thanks to the Governors of the Alms House department, to the President and Managers of the House of Refuge, to the gentlemen of the city, at whose expense the arrangements were made, and to the committee who carried them out, for their courteous invitation to visit the institutions over which they preside, and for the polite and hospitable manner of their reception.

2. *Resolved*, That we hereby express the very great gratification afforded to us in our inspection of these noble charities, and that we will carry home with us a grateful recollection of our delightful excursion.

The committee on "Disabled Ministers, &c." presented their report again.

On a motion to adopt it, and another to amend, there was an extended discussion, in which Messrs. McCorkle, Benedict, Phillips, Matthews, and others, participated.

Dr. Thornwell moved the indefinite postponement of the whole subject; on which motion he and Dr. Junkin spoke.

The Assembly then took a recess for half an hour.

After the recess, Messrs. Rice, Rogers, Cater, Hendrick, and others, continued the discussion on the motion of Dr. Thornwell, until he asked and obtained leave to withdraw it.

Dr. Junkin then moved to strike out a part of the preamble and insert an amendment.

This motion was carried.

He then moved to strike out all the resolutions, as reported by the Committee, and insert others.

Pending a discussion on this motion, the regular time for adjournment arrived. It was then, on motion,

Resolved, That the Assembly will continue its sessions in the evening, until its business be finished.

The committees appointed to collect and count the ballots for Professors,

both reported, and it appeared that the Rev. Richard W. Dickinson, D. D. was duly chosen Professor of Ecclesiastical History and the Composition and Delivery of Sermons in the Western Theological Seminary; and that the Rev. Stuart Robinson was duly chosen Professor of Pastoral Theology and Church Government in the Seminary at Danville.

The Assembly then took a recess till 8 o'clock, P. M.

When called to order again, Mr. Rodgers, from the Committee on Leave of Absence, reported that leave had been given to the following: Rev. Mr. Allen and Mr. Pettingal, ruling elder, Presbytery of Londonderry; Mr. G. A. The report was approved.

The unfinished business was resumed—the report of the Committee on “Disabled Ministers,” &c.—the question being on the motion of Dr. Junkin to strike out the resolutions of the committee, and take up those offered by himself. This motion was carried; and the whole paper, as thus amended and adopted, is as follows, viz.

PHILADELPHIA, May 1, 1856.

The Committee of Trustees in the case of “Disabled Ministers,” &c. report, that during the year, beginning May 1855, they have given aid to twenty persons, on applications received from fifteen Presbyteries. Of these, eleven were widows, one an orphan daughter, and eight clergymen. Some of them are unable to labour, by reason of advanced age; and others are helpless from chronic diseases. The whole amount distributed is \$1580 which, divided equally among the twenty, would give \$79 to each. The money, however, has been given in different proportions, as the comparative claims of each case have been estimated by the committee. The largest sum granted to any family has been \$200, and the smallest \$35.

The committee regret that they have been restricted by having so small an amount at their disposal, as in every case they would gladly have given twice, and in some instances, three times the sum asked for, would the fund in the treasury have warranted it. The facts stated in some of the letters from Presbyteries are touching, and make it evident that what is given from the fund of the Assembly ministers only partial relief, although it is very gratefully received.

It is greatly to be regretted that so little attention has been given to the action of the Assembly in 1849, commending this subject to the churches. Two of the wealthiest Presbyteries belonging to the Assembly drew more from the treasury last year than they contributed. The chairman of your committee has addressed letters to several Presbyteries, and to prominent individuals in different parts of the Church, from whom gratifying answers have been received. He has also solicited an exchange of pulpits with several clergymen, with permission to mention the case of their afflicted brethren, and in no instance has the proposal been received with indifference, but always with the greatest cordiality. He has also made, occasion-

ally, short statements in some of the religious papers, or procured them from their editors, and the result has been, as the treasurer lately informed him, a gratifying increase of the contributions of the churches.

No subject should command more attention and elicit more interest than the general subject referred to in the paper under consideration. That an urgent necessity exists for some prompt and efficient action on the part of the Church to make suitable provision for those who have become worn out in her service, and for their dependent families, cannot for a moment be questioned. Facts of the most painfully interesting nature, which are constantly coming under the notice of those who are more immediately concerned with this matter—facts which speak in simple but eloquent language, telling the sad story of disease, privation, poverty, and helplessness—might be collected in volumes from the history of all our Presbyteries. Could some of these sad pictures from real life be spread before this Assembly, no eye could look upon them without a tear; no heart could contemplate them without deep emotion.

That it is the solemn and imperative duty of the Church to make abundant provision for her disabled ministers and their families, not as a matter of charity, but of right and justice, is equally unquestionable. The records of this General Assembly show conclusively that this duty is fully acknowledged. In 1849, the following action was had on this subject:

Whereas, There are many disabled and superannuated ministers in connection with the Presbyterian Church, and widows and families of Presbyterian ministers who are in indigent circumstances, and as the Church increases, their number is likely to increase; and whereas, it is the duty of the Church to provide for those who have devoted their time and spent their energies in her service, and also for their families; and whereas, no local provision can effectually meet this object, and no efficient general provision has ever yet been made, therefore,

Resolved, 1st. That in order to constitute a fund for the support of the widows and families of deceased ministers, and for the relief of superannuated and disabled living ministers, it is hereby enjoined upon all our Synods and Presbyteries to take such action as may secure a contribution annually.

Resolved, 2d. That a column be added to the table of Statistical Reports, for these contributions.

Resolved, 3d. That the funds thus contributed be placed in the hands of the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly, to be disbursed by the Board of Publication upon the recommendation of Presbyteries, as the funds for Domestic Missions, Education, and Church Extension, are now appropriated.

Resolved, 4th. That in order to the founding of a permanent fund for this same object, special contributions and legacies be invited from all parts of the Church, the principal of which shall be safely invested by the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly, and the interest be added to the general fund provided for in a foregoing resolution.

Yet, as the results of that action, we find that all that has been actually accomplished by our churches during the past year towards such a fund as these resolutions contemplate, is less than \$2500, or less than an average contribution of seventy-five cents from each of our churches.

The minister of Christ who offers himself to the Church as her servant for Jesus' sake, has no right to expect in that service worldly distinction, or large emolument. But he has a right to expect that while he ministers to

God's people in spiritual things, they will not forget to minister to him in temporal. The Church is not always aware of the extent of the capital which the ministry invests in her service, and which produces to them personally such a meagre and insufficient return. The minister not only gives himself, his body, mind, soul, time, talents, and labours, but he actually invests no inconsiderable amount of capital of another sort in the service of the Church. To qualify himself for the sacred office, he needs to devote at least ten years of life to study in the academical, collegiate, and theological departments of education, and that at no inconsiderable pecuniary expenditure.

What has he received in return for his labours, his tears, his anxieties, his mental toils, his life-long devotion of himself to the interests of the Church? He has received a salary less than that of a third-rate clerk in a merchant's counting-house, a competent overseer on a southern plantation, a clerk on a Mississippi steamboat, or a bar-keeper at a fashionable hotel! And all that is left to his account when he is called to his rest, will hardly pay for a plain coffin for his worn out body, and a simple stone to mark the spot where a faithful man of God sleeps till the resurrection morning! But who can estimate the worth of his life to the Church and to the world? What have the contributions been worth which he has made to the most enduring part of the literature of the world? What have the sympathies been worth which have been drawn from his heart's deep stores by hundreds of tried and endangered souls? What has it been worth to the mother, as in speechless anguish she bends over the beautiful corpse of her darling babe, to hear the accents of the man of God, saying, in solemn tenderness, "It is well with the child?" What is it worth to the convicted sinner, trembling in view of an angry God, and an everlasting hell, to hear from his faithful pastor the words, "Behold the Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world?" What are the ten thousand varied and diversified labours of the ministry in behalf of every interest of this life and of that which is to come, worth to the world? No arithmetic can compute them, no money can compensate them. They cannot be gotten for gold, neither shall silver be weighed for the price thereof.

The Church, then, should consider it her solemn duty, at once to take energetic action on two points—the more adequate support of her living and labouring ministry, and a liberal and just provision for those who are disabled, and for their dependent families. If the average salaries of her ministers were doubled at once, she would not surpass the measure of their necessities, and her obligations. Why should the minister of God be the only man in the community who shall not be allowed to lay by something from his hard earned means for the future wants of those who are dear to him? Why should he, in addition to the other trials necessarily incident to his calling, be compelled to walk through life's journey with the dark shadow of a dependent old age, or a helpless family, always brooding over his path? It is cruel, it is wicked, to bind this mill-stone round his neck, to press this burden on his heart. Where is the man, outside of the ministry, who will submit to such palpable injustice? It is easy to talk of a mercenary spirit, and of the spirituality of ministers being in danger from an abundance of the good things of this life. We wonder why one kind of spirituality is considered as necessary for the minister, and another sort for the people. If poverty be essential to growth in grace, let our people be diligent in cultivating and using this means of spiritual progress likewise. It is a poor way, as Dr. Mason observes, to promote a man's spirituality, to rob him of his bread. The farmer, who is a wise and thrifty man, will not stint his cattle nor his labourers. The merchant or the corporation who desire able and

faithful officers and agents, will deem it good policy to pay them adequately. It is reserved for the Church of Christ to ignore the wisdom of this policy, and deny its justice, and to add insult to injury with a miserable cant about a mercenary spirit, and considerations of spirituality. It is reserved for the Church of Christ to demand of her ministry that they shall give all that they are and have to her service, with the inevitable prospect that old age or failing health will find them absolutely pennyless, or death fling their widows and children on the cold charities of an unsympathizing world.

In view of these considerations, the Committee, in recommending that the Report of the Trustees of the Fund for Disabled Ministers and their families, be approved, would also propose the following resolutions, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That it be earnestly recommended to the Presbyteries to take such action in regard to this matter, as will tend to bring up the Church to the performance of her duty in regard thereto.

2. *Resolved*, That every minister and church session be earnestly requested to present this subject to their congregation, during the coming year, and obtain a contribution to the object; which contribution shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the General Assembly, to be disbursed in an economical way, and upon an equitable ratio, upon application made through the Presbytery to which the party applying for relief naturally belongs, or a committee of that Presbytery; the Board to report to the next General Assembly.

3. *Resolved*, That a committee be appointed to digest and report to the next General Assembly, a scheme for future operations.

The committee, under this third resolution, it was ordered, should consist of five members, and, on motion of Dr. Kirkpatrick, the same committee is to confer with the Corporation of the Widow's Fund, and report to the next Assembly.

On motion of Dr. Hendrick, it was ordered, that committees be appointed to inform the Professors elected to day, of their appointment, and solicit their acceptance of the same.

The unfinished business on Judicial Case No. 1, was then taken up, the question being on the motion of Dr. Rice, that the complaint be sustained.

After Dr. Junkin had concluded his remarks, Mr. Peck moved to reconsider the vote by which the members of the inferior judicatory had been required to withdraw, literally, from the house.

This motion was lost.

Mr. Baird moved, that the roll be called, as in the order prescribed for trying appeals.

This motion was also lost.

The question returning to the motion, that the complaint be sustained, a protracted discussion ensued, in which Messrs. Johns, Jones, Jacob, Fine, Thompson, Allen, and others participated; pending which the Assembly adjourned.

Closed with prayer.

TUESDAY MORNING, May 27.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

The Moderator announced the following committees, viz.

To inform Dr. Dickinson of his election to a Professorship in the Western Theological Seminary—Drs. Phillips and Marshall.

To inform the Rev. Stuart Robinson of his election to a Professorship in the Seminary at Danville—Drs. Humphrey and Matthews.

To digest and report to the next General Assembly, a scheme for the relief and support of "Disabled Ministers, &c."—Hon. H. H. Leavitt, of Cincinnati, Dr. E. P. Rogers, of Philadelphia, Daniel Lord, of New York, Thomas C. Perrine, of South Carolina, and Isaac D. Jones, of Baltimore, Maryland.

Dr. Dabney, from the Committee on the inadequate support of Ministers, presented a report in the form of a pastoral letter to the churches, which, after discussion, was adopted, with a resolution appended, reaffirming the action of the General Assembly on this subject in 1854.

On motion of Dr. Rice, it was ordered that this document, the letter now prepared, and the resolutions referred to, be published in the various weekly newspapers, of a religious character, throughout our bounds.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Albany reported, recommending the approval of the same without exception. Adopted.

The unfinished business on Judicial Case No. 1, was then resumed, the motion of Dr. Rice being still before the House, to sustain the complaint.

After continued discussion by Messrs. Rice, Hewit, Junkin, Phillips, and others, Dr. Thornwell proposed the following amendment, viz.

Resolved, That this General Assembly sustain the complaint, *pro forma*, and direct the Session of Stillwater church to give Mr. Shafer a regular trial.

This amendment was accepted by Dr. Rice for the original motion, and adopted by the Assembly as its final action in the case, it being understood that the merits of the case were in no wise adjudicated; but the whole question decided was one of technicality and jurisdiction.

The Assembly then took up Judicial Case No. 4; a complaint of the Rev. D. J. Waller and Dr. W. J. Gibson; and an appeal of the Rev. John Smalley, against the Synod of Philadelphia.

The papers were read in the order recommended by the Judicial Committee; when the Assembly took a recess for half an hour.

After recess, the following paper was, on motion of Dr. Prime, adopted unanimously:

Whereas, The American Bible Society, at its late Anniversary, resolved upon a general re-supply of the United States and Territories with a copy of God's word in every destitute household;

And whereas, The members of this Assembly have enjoyed an opportunity of visiting the Society's House, and observing its admirable arrangements, and unprecedented facilities for the publication of the Sacred Scriptures; therefore,

1. *Resolved*, That this Assembly rejoices in the prosperity with which the great Head of the Church has blessed this important Institution for the diffusion of truth; and particularly in view of the great work which it now proposes to undertake, in supplying the wants of millions in our country who are still destitute of the Bible.

2. *Resolved*, That the Assembly earnestly recommends to the ministers and churches under its care, to co-operate efficiently with the American Bible Society, and with its auxiliaries in their respective counties, towns, or villages, in prosecuting the great work proposed; and that, by regular annual collections, according to the ability that God giveth, they aid the Society in its efforts to give the word of God to the whole world.

On motion of Mr. Jennings, it was

Resolved, That in addition to the action already had on Overture No. 2, from the Synod of Pittsburgh, on the necessity and importance of deacons in the churches, it be enjoined upon all the Presbyteries under the care of the General Assembly, to take such order on this subject as shall secure the appointment of deacons in all the churches, with the exception of those in which it is impracticable from paucity of male members.

Mr. Rodgers, from the Committee on Leave of Absence, reported that leave had been given to the following, viz. Rev. H. M. Painter, Presbytery of Upper Missouri; Rev. Dr. Lord, Presbytery of Buffalo City; Rev. Mr. Cooley, Presbytery of New Brunswick; Mr. Blair, ruling elder, Presbytery of Huntington; Rev. A. P. Happer, Presbytery of Canton; Rev. Mr. Donaldson, Presbytery of Fort Wayne; Mr. Swan, ruling elder, Presbytery of Central Mississippi; Mr. Bishop, ruling elder, Presbytery of East Hanover; Mr. Jones, ruling elder, Presbytery of Baltimore; Rev. Mr. Wilson, Presbytery of Concord; Mr. Brown, ruling elder, Presbytery of Louisville; Rev. Mr. Noyes, Presbytery of Worcester; Rev. Mr. Bartley, Presbytery of Londonderry; Mr. Jacob, ruling elder, Presbytery of Washington.

Approved.

The unfinished business on Judicial Case No. 4, was resumed, and Mr. R. K. Rodgers appeared on behalf of Mr. Smalley, reading to the House the argument of the latter, in support of his appeal. Dr. Gibson was heard in prosecution of his complaint. Dr. McLean and Dr. Leyburn were heard in defence of the Synod of Philadelphia.

The Assembly then took a recess till eight o'clock, P. M.

When called to order again, the following resolution of Mr. Hendricks was adopted, viz.

Resolved, That the sincere thanks of this Assembly are due to the families of this city and its vicinity, so far as we have been their inmates, for the kindness and hospitality extended to us individually. And also to the reporters and publishers of the daily and other papers of this city, for the respectful and accurate reports and notices they have been pleased to make of this body. Also to the pastor, elders, and trustees of the First Presbyterian Church in this city, for the use of their church edifice and lecture-room, during the sessions of this Assembly.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of New Jersey reported, recommending the approval of the same, as modified by the decision on Judicial Case No. 1—the complaint of the Session of Stillwater Church against this Synod. Adopted.

On motion of Mr. Rodgers, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of this General Assembly are due to the Rev. Samuel J. Baird, for the labour incurred by him in the preparation of the "Assembly's Digest," recently published by the Board of Publication.

Resolved, That the Digest is earnestly commended to the attention and patronage of all in our connection; and that any persons having suggestions to make in reference to any proposed improvement in the work, are invited to make them to the author thereof, before the issue of a new edition.

The unfinished business, Judicial Case No. 4, was resumed. Mr. Waller was heard in prosecution of his complaint; and Drs. McLean and Leyburn were heard again.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer.

WEDNESDAY MORNING, May 28.

The Assembly met, and was opened with singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The Minutes of last session were read and approved.

Dr. Rice, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, reported

Overture No. 16. From the Presbytery of Rock River, asking the Assembly to direct the Board of Education to appropriate a legacy of William Hempstead to the Presbyterial Institution at Dixon, Illinois.

The Committee recommend that it be referred to the Board of Education, to act in the case according to their best judgment. Adopted.

Overture No. 17. From the Trustees of the Westminster Presbyterian Society, Utica, New York, to direct the Trustees of the General Assembly to alter and amend the deed by which the corporation of the said church holds the title to their lot.

The Committee recommend the following resolution, viz.

Resolved, That the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, in the United States of America, hereby direct their Trustees to execute a written instrument, whereby they shall decline accepting the Contingent Trust, under the deed made and executed by Hugh S. Dickson, granting to the Trustees of the Westminster church, in the city of Utica, New York, a lot of ground, on which their church building is erected; and also renouncing all interest that might, under any circumstances, accrue, or be derived from the conditions in said deed inserted.

The report was adopted, and the Trustees are hereby so authorized and directed.

Overture No. 18. From the Presbytery of South Carolina, asking the Assembly to devise arrangements with other Christian denominations, so as to secure the attendance of witnesses, in process for discipline.

The Committee recommend that no action be taken on this overture by this Assembly. Adopted.

Overture No. 19. From several members, ministers, in this Assembly, asking for the erection of a new Presbytery, to be called "Kansas."

Upon the recommendation of the Committee, this request was granted, and it was ordered, accordingly, that W. W. Backus, minister, in the Presbytery of Dane, C. D. Martin, in the Presbytery of Kaskaskia, and D. A. Murdock, in the Presbytery of Des Moines, be erected into a Presbytery, to be called the "Presbytery of Kansas;" to hold their first meeting at Leavenworth, on the first Tuesday of September next, at 11 o'clock.

Overture No. 20. From the Presbytery of Donegal, asking the Assembly to take action on the subject of Catechizing and Bible instruction of youth.

The Committee recommend that the Presbytery be referred to the action of former Assemblies as sufficient for the present. Adopted.

Overture No. 5 was, on motion of Mr. Cater, taken up from the docket, and the following resolutions, recommended by the Committee, were adopted, viz.

Resolved, 1st. That the Synod of South Carolina be authorized to open a fraternal correspondence with the Associate Reformed Church of South Carolina, on the same terms as with other evangelical denominations.

Resolved, 2d. That the Assembly appoint a committee to confer with a similar committee to be appointed by that body, with reference to a closer union between the two Churches.

The nomination of this committee was referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

Overture No. 13. Relating to the rights and relation of baptized mem-

bers, was, on motion of Mr. Cater, taken up, and after a brief discussion by Messrs. Fine, Junkin, and others, the Overture and Report were laid on the table.

Dr. Campbell, from the Judicial Committee, reported Case No. 5, R. J. Cross against the Synod of Baltimore. Docketed.

The Report of the Committee on Systematic Benevolence was then taken up, and after a slight amendment adopted, and is as follows, viz.

The Committee on Systematic Benevolence beg leave to report to the General Assembly, that very few of the Presbyteries have given any response to the call of the Assembly for written reports upon the subject.

It is, therefore, not practicable at present, to arrive at exact conclusions as to what has been done, or the degree of favour with which the cause has commended itself to the hearts of the people.

It is a gratifying fact, however, that as far as reports have been presented, there is but a single case in which the effort has not been made to bring the churches up to the performance of their duty in this respect.

The great truth, that it is the duty of every man to give according as the Lord has prospered him, is beginning to find favour, practically, among the people; and so is that other great truth, that this should be done both regularly, and as an ordinance of worship.

It was not to be expected that so great a change in our benevolent operations, involving the changes of habit which have obtained amongst us for so many years, could be made at once, and without difficulty.

The Presbyteries of Sangamon, Fort Wayne, Beaver, Bedford, West Lexington, Memphis, Richland, Knoxville, Hopewell, Tuscaloosa, Ohio, Nassau, Baltimore, Long Island, Des Moines, Greenbrier, Palestine, and New Lisbon, report that they have adopted plans for systematic benevolence, and that those plans are generally working well; both doing good and finding increasing favour with the people. A partial compliance is reported by the Presbyteries of Donegal, Louisiana, and Harmony.

It is much to be regretted that the number of reports presented is so small; but in those which have been presented, there is a gratifying indication of a good work commenced. And we have reason to know that several Presbyteries have taken efficient action upon the subject, from whom we have no formal reports.

In the practical working of this system, we are persuaded that all failures are owing mainly to the neglect or timidity of the ministry, in not bringing the subject fairly and prominently before churches.

The Committee, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolution, viz.

Resolved, That all our pastors and stated supplies be earnestly requested, for our Lord's sake, to give to every member of their churches the opportunity to contribute something for the glory of God, presenting the claims of the various objects ordered by the Assembly, publicly and prominently from the pulpit; and that the Presbyteries be earnestly requested to see that the same privilege is afforded to all their vacant churches, and that they report their action on this subject, and the success of it, to the next General Assembly.

The unfinished business—Judicial Case, No. 4—was then resumed. Members of the inferior judicatory were heard, and then required by a vote of the house to withdraw, literally; excepting Dr. Leyburn, who, being an officer of the Assembly and not a Commissioner, was allowed to remain.

The roll was then called; a special motion having been carried to limit each one to five minutes in giving his opinion.

Messrs. Fine, Stockton, Hewit, James Williamson, Kirkpatrick, George
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Marshall, Lobough, Bracken, John W. Johnston, Dool, Leavitt, Spence, Badau, Thompson, Hendricks, Crozier, Baird, Strong, Strahan, Ryors, Shotwell, Dabney, Chevalier, Bingham, Mebauc, Lorance, Cater, D. C. Campbell, Marks, McAuley, Frierson, Williams of Arkansas, Banks, Wallis, and W. W. Caldwell expressed their opinions.

The vote was then taken, and fifty-two voted to sustain; one hundred not to sustain; and fourteen, to sustain in part. So the Assembly decided not to sustain the Appeal and the Complaint.

Dr. Prime, from the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, announced as the Committee to correspond with the Associate Reformed Synod of the South, the Rev. Edwin Cater, George Howe, D. D., James K. Douglas, Esq. of South Carolina, and Francis Bowman, D. D. and N. A. Pratt, D. D. of Georgia.

The Assembly then took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, Mr. James Williamson, from the Committee on the Records of the Synod of Philadelphia, reported, recommending the approval of the same, with the exception, that on page 277 it is stated, that the Rev. James Latta, in a certain case, entered his protest against the action of Synod; yet no protest is recorded. Adopted.

Dr. Rice, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, reported Overture No. 21, from the Central Presbytery of Mississippi, respecting the desirableness of greater union among Presbyterians. The Committee recommend the following resolution, viz.

That the General Assembly entertains a sincere desire for the fraternal union of all sound Presbyterians; and even, if possible, their communion in one denomination; and any who may desire to be united with this Church, and who cordially approve of the doctrine and polity of our standards, are affectionately invited to seek this union in the mode prescribed by our Constitution. It was adopted.

Mr. Shotwell moved the appointment of a committee to bring in a minute, expressing the judgment of the Assembly in Judicial Case No. 4; and Dr. Hewit moved, that the same committee be instructed to report a minute, which shall indicate an order suitable to be observed in the installation of elders who have been previously ordained.

Both motions were carried; and the Moderator appointed Drs. Rice, Humphrey, and Hewit, and Messrs. Welch and Walsh, this committee.

The report of the Committee on the Records of the Synod of Mississippi was then taken up from the docket and adopted, approving of the same, with the exceptions,

1st. That the absentees are not recorded, in their meetings of 1854 and 1855.

2d. On page 10, Vol. IV. of these Minutes, Synod takes exceptions to the Minutes of the Louisiana Presbytery; because this Presbytery considers it not inconsistent with the principles of our Church for ruling elders, in the absence of the pastor, to read the Scriptures and explain them, and to endeavour to enforce the truth upon the conscience by suitable exhortations. The Assembly believe the Presbytery of Louisiana were right, according to Chap. XXI. Form of Government.

The unfinished business, on the report of the Committee on the Records of Arkansas, was then taken up, and discussed till the hour of adjournment, when the Assembly ordered that the Narrative on the State of Religion be called for at 8 o'clock this evening; and then took a recess till that time.

When called to order again, the unfinished business on the Records of the Synod of Arkansas, was resumed. These were approved, so far as they

contain the Minutes of 1853 and 1854. In regard to those of 1855, the Assembly declares,

1st. That the proceedings and acts of the members of said Synod, met at Little Rock, Sept. 20, 1855, are unconstitutional and void—inasmuch as they proceeded without such a quorum as the Constitution requires—except so far as relates to the appointment of the time and place of the next meeting.

2. The Synod is directed to review, at its next regular meeting, the proceedings and acts of said members, and to adopt or reject them, in whole or in part, as they may see fit.

On motion of Mr. Baird, the following paper was adopted, viz.

Whereas, The General Assembly, in 1853, determined to endeavour to raise an endowment for the Theological Seminary of the Waldensian Synod, and it appears, from the Report of the Board of Foreign Missions, that this endowment is not completed; therefore,

Resolved, That it be recommended to all those churches which have not contributed to this object, so interesting and important, to do so on the second Sabbath of November next, or on some day as near that date as may be convenient, and remit the same to the Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Missions.

The order of the day was then taken up—the Narrative on the State of Religion. This was reported by Dr. Junkin, from the Standing Committee, and adopted, and ordered to be printed in the Appendix to the Minutes.

Judicial Case No. 5 was then taken up from the docket—the complaint of R. J. Cross against the Synod of Baltimore.

After the usual admonition from the Moderator, the order recommended by the Committee was pursued. The papers were read, including the complaint of Mr. Cross, the action of the Synod, and the action of the Presbytery of Baltimore, respecting the use of proxies in the election.

Mr. Cross was heard in prosecution of his complaint. Mr. Peck was heard on behalf of the Synod; also Dr. Creigh. Mr. Cross followed with a few words.

A motion was then made, and carried by a large majority, that the complaint be dismissed.

Mr. Welch, from the Committee to prepare a minute, expressing the judgment of the Assembly in Judicial Case No. 4, and to prepare a form for the installation of ruling elders, reported the following; which, being amended, was adopted, and is as follows, viz.

1. *Resolved*, That any elder regularly ordained and installed in one church, and subsequently elected to the same office in another church, and who has heretofore, pursuant to such election, served as an elder in such other church *without objection*, shall be presumed to have been duly installed therein, and his right to act shall not be now questioned.

2. *Resolved*, That when an elder shall hereafter be elected to the same office in a church other than that in which he has been ordained and installed, the minister and session are hereby enjoined formally to install him.

3. *Resolved*, That this Assembly hereby declare, that the existing law of the Church, as to the mode of such installation, is as follows: After sermon, the minister shall speak of the office and duties of ruling elders, as in case of ordinations; and shall then propose to the elder elect, in the presence of the congregation, the following questions: “Do you sincerely receive and adopt the Confession of Faith of this Church, as containing the system of doctrine taught in the Holy Scriptures?” “Do you accept the office of

ruling elder in this congregation, and promise faithfully to perform all the duties thereof?" "Do you promise to study the peace, and unity, and purity of the church?" The elder elect having answered these questions in the affirmative, the minister shall ask the members of the church, whether they accept him, as in cases of ordination. The members of the church having answered in the affirmative, by holding up their right hands, the minister shall declare him an elder of that church; and accompany this act by exhortation, and such other proceeding as he may deem suitable and expedient.

On motion of Dr. Prime, it was

Resolved, That a delegate be commissioned to represent this body among the foreign evangelical denominations, in any part of Europe, and at any time within the next ensuing ecclesiastical year.

The Rev. James W. Alexander, D. D., was appointed this delegate; and the Rev. John M. Krebs, D. D., was appointed his alternate. It was also moved and carried, that James Lenox, Esq., be added to this delegation.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Iowa reported, recommending the approval of the same, without exception. Adopted.

Overture No. 6—on an Itinerating Ministry—was taken up from the docket, on motion of Dr. Junkin; and, after a brief discussion, was referred to the Board of Missions, with the earnest injunction that they do what is possible in the premises.

The thanks of the Assembly were voted to the Committee of Arrangements, for the courteous and munificent care with which they provided for the entertainment and comfort of the members.

It was then, on motion,

Resolved, That this General Assembly be dissolved; and that another General Assembly, chosen in like manner, be required to meet in the First Presbyterian Church of Lexington, Kentucky, on the third Thursday of May, A. D. 1857, at eleven o'clock, A. M.

Closed with singing, prayer, and the apostolic benediction.

APPENDIX.

NARRATIVE OF THE STATE OF RELIGION,

ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES, AT THEIR SESSIONS AT NEW YORK CITY, MAY, 1856, AND ADDRESSED TO THE CHURCHES UNDER THEIR CARE.

Brethren Beloved in the Lord—"Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night?" is an inquiry which will be often upon the lips of those who pray for the peace and prosperity of Jerusalem. And no function of the General Assembly is more pleasant, and few more profitable, than its annual response to this inquiry. Occupying as it does, once every year, the loftiest of Zion's summits, and from that elevation telling the towers thereof, marking well her bulwarks, and gazing abroad over all the coasts of our Israel, it is meet that the Assembly should give, and reasonable for the churches to expect, the results of this survey: and this is attempted in the following narrative. Whilst every year enhances the importance of this annual history, every year also increases the difficulty of its execution. Every year adds to the number of our Presbyteries, and of Presbyterial reports, and to the multiplicity of facts that may justly demand memorial in a narrative like this. And this fact itself is worthy of distinct and emphatic mention. Our Bible-born polity, realizing the great idea of Church organization—many members in one body in Christ the glorious Head—*E Pluribus Unum*—already covers the continent, and may embrace the world. Indeed, upon the floor of the present General Assembly are represented not only the various parts of our own broad land, but also some of the most distant nations. California is here; Texas is here; the remotest North, the furthest South, the densely peopled East, the distant West. China is here; India is here; and the day is not far distant when, with God's blessing upon our missionary enterprises, the *representative world* will stand upon the floor of your General Assembly.

Of course, as our borders are enlarged, and the thousands of our Israel are multiplied, it will be more difficult to condense the tidings that flow in from so ample a field into a narrative of the usual length. The larger portion of our one hundred and fifty Presbyteries have sent written statements of what the Lord is doing among them; and it would rejoice the Assembly to spread before the churches these interesting narratives, in all their freshness, and unabridged. But this is impossible; it would fill a volume. The most meager and compact syllabus is all we can furnish.

The tone of the Presbyterial narratives varies according as the Lord hath dealt with them. Some are vocal with the glad hallelujah, awakened by God's reviving and enlarging grace. A few are sad as the wail of the son of Hilkiah, as they mourn over the drought and the desolations of Zion. Whilst many breathe the calm spirit of gratitude for some tokens of God's favour, alternating with the sigh that piety will heave, when conscious that for our unfaithfulness these tokens are afforded in diminished number. As in the days of the herdsman of Tekoah, it may be said of the past year, "One piece was rained upon, and the piece whereupon it rained not withered." Yet is the General Assembly cheered with the belief that the verdure that betokens life is a broader feature in our ecclesiastical landscape than the blackness that follows burning, or the seariness that indicates drought or death.

In arranging the facts that are furnished in the numerous Presbyterian narratives, we shall mention, first, such as are prosperous, and call for gratitude and rejoicing; and then such as are of an opposite character.

I.—THE FACTS INDICATING PROSPERITY.

[a.] Most of the Presbyteries speak of large and increasing attendance upon the public worship of God, and the means of public instruction. Congregations are large, decorous, and solemn. God is honoured in the great assembly; and, as the chief end of all religion is to glorify God, the Church should be profoundly grateful for this evidence of the Master's favour.

[b.] Many Presbyteries report an increased degree of diligence on the part of ministers, both in pulpit and parochial duties; that Bible and catechetical classes and Sabbath-schools have been multiplied, and are generally well sustained; and that the weekly lecture and prayer-meetings are well attended in most of the churches.

[c.] A large proportion of the Presbyteries mention an increased interest, both amongst the church officers and people, in the great department of systematic benevolence, and also a growing attachment to the Boards of the Church, and the various branches of the evangelical enterprise conducted by them; and, in some of the Presbyteries, both the ability and the disposition of the people to support the gospel ministry and ordinances of religion are represented as decidedly on the increase; and, in many congregations, manses for the minister's residence have been provided.

[d.] All the Boards of the Church, as will be seen by their several reports, have made truly encouraging progress, and the Church extension enterprise has made marked advances during the year just closed. Several Presbyteries report special success in this branch of the Church's progress. In the newer States very encouraging facts have been reported, and the Presbytery of Philadelphia subscribed \$25,000 to this object, in the city itself, during the last year. And the Presbytery of Baltimore reports great interest and progress in this enterprise.

[e.] All of our Presbyteries inform us that, with few exceptions, peace, harmony, and brotherly kindness reign throughout the churches; and this is a blessing worthy of special gratitude and praise.

[f.] Many new congregations of the Lord have been organized all over the land, and in the widening West and South-west our denomination is making extensive progress. The Presbyteries of Iowa, Wisconsin, and in all the frontier States, make special mention of this encouraging fact; and even amongst the German and other foreign population our principles and polity are finding favour. The Presbytery of Passaic in New Jersey, of Iowa in the West, with others, make mention of this fact, and cheer us with the hope that these strangers may, by God's grace, become at once good Christians and good citizens.

[g.] Many of the Presbyteries report a cheering improvement in the observance of the the Lord's day, a gratifying increase of the number of family altars, an improvement in the tone and spirituality of family religion, and increased faithfulness and diligence in family instruction. A return to the more effective use of our Catechism, in the instruction of youth, is mentioned in many instances as a matter of gratitude and hope.

[h.] The Presbyteries of Georgia, West Hanover, Harmony, Bethel, Tuscaloosa, East Alabama, South Alabama, and indeed nearly all the Presbyteries of the Southern country, report increased attention and success in the great work of instructing and Christianizing the coloured population, and in many instances most encouraging results are specified. In some of our churches the number of coloured communicants and constant worshippers exceed that of the whites; and delightful accounts are furnished of the conversion of the slaves. Many planters have built churches upon their estates, and employed able and faithful ministers to labour among the servants, and this work is chiefly retarded by the want of preachers. No Church in the land has freer access to this very important field of Christian enterprise than our own, and it is very desirable that more be done.

[i.] An encouraging increase of Christian schools, academies, and colleges, for both sexes, has marked the history of the past year; and God has, in many instances, shown his special love for these nurseries of the Church, by shedding upon them the reviving dews of his grace.

[j.] The Temperance reformation, although it has in some sections encountered the sternest opposition, appears upon the whole to be on the advance; and the Presbyterian Church still maintains her position as its loyal and efficient friend. It is gradually as-

suming a new and, we hope, a more effective form—the civil aspects of the subject claiming the attention of the legislative bodies, and its moral and religious bearings the attention of the churches, whose mission it is to hold forth that gospel which is the power of God unto salvation from this and all other moral evils.

[k.] The past year, we are rejoiced to announce, has not been a year of the absence of God's quickening and reviving Spirit. Good tidings of great joy have reached the ears of your General Assembly, and it is a most delightful privilege to repeat to you some of the great things which God has done for his Church, and whereof we are glad. Some of the revivals of last year have extended into the present, demonstrating their genuineness by their perpetuity. Unlike the morning cloud or the early dew, whose gem-like drops vanish before the beam that gives them beauty, a genuine revival transmits and prolongs its blessings. And such have been not a few of the revivals of last year. Many of the churches, too, that had not reported revivals the former year, have been visited during this. In some cases, the gently distilling dews of heaven, bringing verdure and beauty and fruitfulness to the plants of the Lord, have descended, whilst in not a few churches and colleges the Holy Ghost has descended in special and powerful measure, gloriously reviving his work, awakening, convincing, converting, and gathering large numbers into the kingdom.

CHURCHES AND COLLEGES REVIVED.

Of the churches and colleges that have been more or less favoured, some have not been mentioned by name in the several reports, whilst the following have been specially mentioned:—Williamsport and Hopewell, in the Presbytery of Maury; Pontotoc and Water Valley, in the Presbytery of Chickasaw; the church of Fulton and Westminster College, in the Presbytery of Missouri; the two churches of Morristown, in the Presbytery of Passaic; Valparaiso, Tassimony, South Bend, Rolling Prairie, and Constantine, in the Presbytery of Lake; Lambertsville and Flemington, in the Presbytery of Raritan; Rocky Springs and eight others, in the Presbytery of South Carolina; College Church, Hat Creek, and Charlottesvile, in the Presbytery of West Hanover; Springfield, Jacksonville, Union, and Providence, in the Presbytery of Sangamon. Besides these, several Presbyteries mention revivals, without giving the names of the favoured churches. Two are thus reported in the Presbytery of Fort Wayne, one in Long Island, and one in Northumberland, (believed to be Bloomsburg,) and several in the Presbytery of Peoria. Black Creek, in the Presbytery of Wooster; Athens, in the Presbytery of Hocking; the First Church, Allegheny City; the Central Church and Manchester, in the Allegheny City Presbytery; Scranton and Tunkhannock, in the Presbytery of Luzerne; Dunlap's Creek and Tent, with the Dunlap's Creek Academy, in the Presbytery of Redstone; Delaware, Liberty, Marsilles, Canaan, Pisgah, and some others, in the Presbytery of Marion; several churches in the Presbytery of Rochester City; Lower Tuscarora, Sinking Creek, Spring Creek, Jacksonville, and some others, in the Presbytery of Huntingdon; Salisbury and Blairsville, in the Presbytery of Blairsville; and Path Valley, in the Presbytery of Carlisle. The last mentioned church has been signally favoured with the power of God unto salvation; about one hundred have professed faith in Christ, and the work was still in progress when the narrative was written. Seventy conversions are also reported in the church of Kingston, Presbytery of Albany. In the Presbytery of New Brunswick, the churches of Trenton Second and Jamesburgh have been revived, and a blessed work has been wrought among the students of the College of New Jersey. The church of Lexington and Washington College, Virginia, in the Presbytery of Lexington, are now enjoying a blessed revival.

In the Presbytery of Washington, Pennsylvania, God hath wrought great things, whereof we are glad. The churches generally are in a prosperous state: four have enjoyed precious seasons of revival, including Washington and Washington College, in which many of the students have been brought to God. In the Second Presbytery of Philadelphia, one church, Bridesburg, has enjoyed a time of refreshing. The Lodianna Presbytery of Northern India reports an encouraging state of religion among the European residents, and that among the Hindoos and Mohammedans the past year has been one of quiet progress. Few cases of discipline had occurred among the native converts, and the church is relatively in a prosperous state; and the mission churches and stations are all in a hopeful condition.

This rapid abridgment of the information furnished to the Assembly from so many parts of our own vast country, and from other parts of the world, if not so full and satisfactory, will enable you, dear brethren, to form some estimate of the amazing extension of our

beloved Church; and will, we doubt not, elicit from every heart thanksgiving and praise for what God hath wrought through her humble instrumentality; and with us you will be ready to exclaim, "Ebenezer! hitherto hath the Lord helped us!"

II.—FACTS TO BE DEPLORED.

But while it is the privilege of the General Assembly to tell of great mercies, and large prosperity vouchsafed to our churches, we are constrained, in truth and faithfulness, to tell also of things that will sadden your hearts, as they do ours.

SABBATH DESECRATION.

Many of our Presbyteries report the discouraging fact, that *Sabbath desecration* is increasing within their bounds. The very facilities for travel afforded by railroads and steamboats, and which, by saving secular time, ought to have a tendency to remove the temptation to rob God of his holy day, seem to produce the very opposite result. Such is the insatiate temper of this generation, that, not content with accomplishing twenty-fold more in a day than was formerly possible, the Sabbath also must be taken for secular purposes. In the face of historical admonitions upon the subject; in the face of God's law; in the face of what has been demonstrated to be a *sound business policy*, many corporations still continue their Sabbath trains. It is in vain they are reminded that this policy excludes from their service all the most careful, conscientious, and reliable employés, who fear God and regard man; that it keeps down their stock, by excluding all that large class of capitalists who do not wish their money used in profaning the Sabbath; that it occasions the almost total loss to the companies of the expenses and wear and tear of one day in seven, when the *same amount* of business would be done in the six; and that a large proportion of the disasters which occur may be traced to the demoralizing effect of Sabbath profanation upon the employés. All seems in vain. Intent upon yielding to a morbid, mammon worshipping, God-dishonouring public sentiment, men of great practical wisdom in other matters, seem in this to ignore alike the dictates of sound policy and true piety. Some companies, to their honour and pecuniary advantage, have stopped their Sabbath trains; others have effected a partial reform—running only the mail train—but still the evil is so wide-spread as to call for deep humiliation before an offended God, for the earnest, bold, and continued protest of the ministry and the people of God, and for fervent prayer that the Lord of the Sabbath would interpose to rescue that indispensable institution from entire prostration.

OTHER MATTERS FOR LAMENTATION.

2. The *crying destitutions* of the ministry and ordinances of religion, of which so many Presbyteries complain, constitute another cause of discouragement, which the people of God should ponder, and over which they should weep and pray.

3. Quite a number of the Presbyteries mention the disheartening and humiliating fact, that one half of their ministers "are so straightened for want of support, as to find it impossible to discharge their duties in a profitable way." Others report a still greater proportion as suffering the same grievance. O! surely, brethren, the fact need only be mentioned, to call forth the prayers and exertions of God's people to remedy this wide-spread and lamentable evil.

4. The neglect of family worship; the neglect of infant baptism; unwillingness in some cases to submit to discipline; a few instances of unhappy dissensions in churches; the growing worldliness of professing Christians, and the increase of intemperance in some sections of the land, are also mentioned as matters calling for the humiliation and prayers of the Church.

5. Several of the Presbyteries report the death of valuable and beloved ministers of the word; some speak of prevailing sickness; and the Presbytery of East Hanover mentions the terrible visitation of pestilence that desolated the cities of Norfolk and Portsmouth—a solemn providence that has already awakened the deep sympathies of the people of the country.

6. We gather, also, from the Presbyterian narratives, that there is still, after all our advances, a mournful lack of steadfast faith, and of active piety, throughout our churches. Mighty works have not been done, because of unbelief. There is not that *earnest desire* for the advance of the work of the Lord, and that *believing expectation* that it *can* be done, and *will* be done, which men engaged in so glorious a cause, under so wise, good, and mighty a leader, ought to maintain.

EXHORTATION TO REPENTANCE AND INCREASED DEVOTEDNESS.

In view of God's dealings with our beloved Zion during the past year, the General Assembly affectionately exhort the people and the ministers of God to humble themselves before the Lord, in view of past delinquency—to be grateful for God's forbearance, and for mercies bestowed in the midst of our failure, and to gird themselves for renewed and more faithful efforts in time to come. Ours, by the good hand of our God upon us, is a glorious history. Ours, we cannot doubt, is an august, a momentous mission. Vast interests for our country and the world, for time and eternity, are committed to us. Let us prove worthy of our history; worthy of our mission; worthy of the wonderful age in which God has permitted us to live and labour; worthy of our resources and advantages; “worthy of the vocation wherewith we are called.” “Wherefore, take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand! The toil, and the strife, and the trial will soon be over, and the coronation day will come.” “Peace be to the brethren, and love, with faith, from God the Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.”

Abstract of the Report of the Board of Missions, presented to the General Assembly in New York, May 1856.

In presenting the Fifty-fourth Annual Report of the Board of Missions to the General Assembly, the Board desire, first of all, to acknowledge with thankfulness their indebtedness to Almighty God, for the measure of success which he has graciously vouchsafed to them, during the past year, in the management of the important cause intrusted to their care. We are the more sensible of our obligations to the Great Head of the Church, because, at one period of the year our treasury was well nigh exhausted and our financial prospects were discouraging. With the blessing of God upon the appeals which were made to the churches for pecuniary aid, and the prompt and liberal responses of many friends of the missionary cause, the Board were not only seasonably relieved of all apprehensions of embarrassment, but have been enabled to close the year with an unusual degree of prosperity.

There has been an increase in the number of missionaries employed during the year—an augmentation of receipts, both from the churches, and in individual donations and legacies—an increase in the aggregate appropriations—a larger average salary paid to our missionaries—and an increase in the balance on hand at the close of the fiscal year. In every department there has been an encouraging progress, and we doubt not that the Assembly will heartily unite with the Board in their expressions of gratitude to God for his unmerited goodness and mercy.

OPERATIONS OF THE YEAR.

OF MISSIONS.—*Statistical Details.*—The number of missionaries in commission April 1, 1855, was 346, to which have been added to March 1, 1856, (11 months) 220, making the whole number 566, and more by 41 than the year previous.

The number of churches and missionary stations, wholly or in part supplied, (as far as reported,) by our missionaries, is 943.

The number of newly organized churches is 42.

The number of admissions on examination is 1932, and on certificate 1836, making a total of admissions of 3668.

The number in communion with churches connected with the Board is 22,916.

The number of Sabbath-schools is 332; of teachers, 2,443; and of scholars, 15,887.

The number of baptisms is 2,217.

Of the 566 missionaries who have been in commission during the year, 187 have sent in no special report for the Assembly, very nearly one-third of the whole number; consequently we must increase all the returns very nearly one-third to make them correct.

APPROPRIATIONS.—The appropriations made to our missionaries, from April 1, 1855, to March 1, 1856, (11 months,) have been at the office in Philadelphia, \$50,103.34, and at the office in Louisville, \$32,475.83; making a total of \$82,579.17.

Adding the appropriations made during the month of March, 1856, to the above, for the sake of comparison with other years, the figures would stand thus: Appropriations made from April 1, 1855, to April 1, 1856, at the office in Philadelphia, \$51,703.34, and at the office in Louisville, \$33,425.83; making a total of \$85,129.17.

The appropriations made to our missionaries from April 1, 1854, to April 1, 1855,

were, at the office in Philadelphia, \$48,735.42, and at the office in Louisville, \$25,759.00; making a total of \$74,494.42.

From this statement it appears that the appropriations made at the office in Philadelphia exceeded those made the year before \$2,967.92, and at the office in Louisville, they were more by \$7,666.83; thus making the total appropriations this year more than the year preceding, by \$10,634.75.

For the purpose of further comparison we may state, that the *average* appropriations made during the preceding three years, from 1852 to 1855, were, at the office in Philadelphia, \$42,185.50, and at the office in Louisville, \$26,756.97; making a total average of \$68,942.47.

From this statement it appears that the appropriations made from April 1, 1855, to April 1, 1856, at the office in Philadelphia, exceeded the average of those made during the three previous years, \$9,517.84; and at the office in Louisville, \$6,668.86; thus making the total excess of appropriations this year above the average appropriations of the three preceding years, \$16,186.70.

RECEIPTS.—The total amount of receipts from all sources, from April 1, 1855, to March 1, 1856, (11 months,) is \$85,747.73, to which add balances on hand in the different treasuries, April 1, 1855, (less the sum in Flint River Presbytery, \$320.25,) \$15,223.34, making the available resources of the Board during the year, \$100,971.07.

Adding the receipts at the offices in Philadelphia and Louisville during the month of March, 1856, for the purpose of comparison with other years, the total amount of receipts from April 1, 1855, to April 1, 1856, is \$94,848.87; to which add balances on hand in the different treasuries, April 1, 1855, as above, \$15,223.34; thus making the available resources of the Board during the year, from April 1, 1855, to April 1, 1856, \$110,072.21.

The amount paid out at the different treasuries from April 1, 1855, to March 1, 1856, (11 months,) is \$79,837.90, leaving an available balance in all the treasuries, on the 1st of March, 1856, of \$21,133.17. The amount due the missionaries at the same date was \$13,226.54; leaving an unexpended balance of \$7,906.63.

The aggregate receipts from April 1, 1855, to April 1, 1856, have been larger, as compared with the receipts from April 1, 1854, to April 1, 1855, \$23,014.40. The excess has been in individual or special donations and legacies \$16,958.95, and in the contributions of the churches \$6,055.45. The receipts at the office in Philadelphia, including the Presbyterian treasuries, were larger by \$14,067.95, and the receipts at the office in Louisville \$8,946.45.

The amount due the missionaries at the close of the fiscal year, as previously stated, was \$13,226.54, leaving an unexpended balance of \$7,906.63. The unexpended balance on April 1, 1855, was \$5,539.70. From this statement it will be observed, that the unexpended balance in the treasury on the 1st of March, 1856, is only \$2,366.93 more than the amount which was reported on the 1st of March, 1855.

Although the available balance on hand at the close of the fiscal year is considerable, and somewhat larger than that of the year preceding, yet it is no more than is needed. With so large an addition to the number of our missionaries and the considerable increase in the average appropriation made to them, there will be of course a proportionate augmentation in the accruing liabilities and current expenditures of the Board. It ought to be distinctly understood by all, that the amount on hand at the period of the year when our balance is reported, is always larger than at any other time. From the month of March the receipts begin to fall off, and during the latter part of the spring, the entire summer, and the early part of the fall, the receipts are comparatively small; so that unless our available balance at the commencement of the fiscal year is comparatively large, it would be impracticable to carry on the operations of the Board during the year. For example, at the beginning of the fiscal year, April 1, 1855, we reported an available balance of more than \$15,000.00; and yet by the 1st of November ensuing we had only about \$2,000.00 in hand!—not enough to meet the usual payments for a single fortnight!—and but for the prompt and generous responses to our appeals for aid by many of the friends of the cause, our operations must have been seriously embarrassed. These responses show the strong attachment of our people to the Board, and do, as they ought, inspire us with confidence as well as gratitude; but the facts also show how desirable it is to have a proper working balance on hand at the beginning of the fiscal year, and how important and necessary it is for the friends of the cause to respond promptly and liberally to appeals when the low state of our funds compels us to call for aid.

RE-ENFORCEMENTS AND ENLARGEMENT OF THE CHURCH.—During the year the Board have established new missions in various sections of our country, as well in the larger cities and towns, as in the smaller villages and rural districts. They have also, to the extent of their ability, re-enforced our missionaries in the newer States and Territories. Three additional missionaries have been sent to California, two to Wisconsin, one to Minnesota, and one, in addition to those already there, has been employed in Oregon. We have also sent one to Nebraska and one to Kansas. Arrangements have likewise been made to send an additional one to Minnesota and two to Kansas. Thirty-nine of our missionaries have been commissioned as itinerants. The greater part of our missionaries perform more or less of such service, but the number above-mentioned are either wholly, or almost entirely employed as itinerants.

STATE OF OUR MISSIONS.—The reports of our missionaries respecting the state of religion among their people are varied. Some of them communicate to us the cheering intelligence of revivals of religion, and the most of them write encouragingly of the religious state and prospects of their ministerial charges.

CLOTHING.—Clothing valued at \$7,837.14 has been received during the eleven months, from April 1, 1855, to March 1, 1856, and distributed among the missionaries who needed it. Our friends are cautioned against permitting their donations of clothing (which are never deducted from the salaries of the missionaries) to interfere with their *cash* contributions to the Board.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Board take pleasure in stating that, agreeably to the direction of the last General Assembly, they transferred, on the 20th of July last, all the funds and papers in their possession, respecting the business of Church Extension, to the Church Extension Committee at St. Louis, Missouri. The cash balance on hand at that date was \$4,595.74.

ASSOCIATE SECRETARY.

The work of Church Extension, which, while connected with the Board of Missions, was chiefly under the care of the Assistant Secretary, having been transferred to a Committee of Church Extension, it became expedient to re-arrange the duties of the executive officers of the Board. The Corresponding Secretary being willing to perform and superintend all the work in the office without an assistant, it was thought desirable to appoint an Associate Secretary, whose duties should be mainly external. Accordingly the Board elected the Rev. Reese Happersett, Associate Secretary, and passed the following resolution, viz.

“Resolved, That the duties of the Associate Secretary shall be, under the direction of the Executive Committee, to attend to the legacies which may from time to time be bequeathed to the Board; to visit the Synods, Presbyteries, and churches, for the purpose of diffusing missionary intelligence, and collecting funds; to visit various sections of the country for the purpose of conferring with our agents, collecting information, and communicating the same to the Board, and promoting the general interests of the cause; and such other service as may from time to time be assigned to him.”

OBJECTS OF THE BOARD, AND THEIR IMPORTANCE.

The objects of the Board of Missions are two-fold:

1. To supply vacant churches, and assist weak and feeble congregations in the support of pastors.

2. To extend the boundaries of the Church by employing ministers to preach the gospel, organize new congregations, and form churches in the hitherto neglected and waste places of our country.

Without the aid derived from the Board, hundreds of our weak and feeble churches would be unable to support and retain their pastors. Nor would it be practicable to supply the numerous places scattered throughout our widely extended country, which are as yet destitute of evangelical ministers, without some such agency as the Board of Missions.

The Board continue to receive from almost every section of our country the most urgent appeals for missionary aid. The wants especially of our newer States and Territories are pressed upon us with increasing and affecting earnestness, and the importance

of supplying them with intelligent and evangelical ministers, while in their formative state, cannot be too highly estimated.

The Board continue to employ a number of missionaries among our foreign population.

PROGRESS MADE BY OUR CHURCH IN THE MISSIONARY WORK.

In 1828, the year of the re-organization of the Board, there were but thirty-one missionaries, and an income of \$2400 only.

In 1840, two years after the division of the Church, and when the parts were fairly separated, there were 256 missionaries, and an income of \$40,734.

In 1855-6, the number of missionaries employed was 566, and the income \$94,848.87.

Since the re-organization of the Board, we have increased 14 Synods, 58 Presbyteries, 976 ministers, 1111 churches, and 85,096 members. Since 1840, two years after the division of the Church, we have increased 13 Synods, 53 Presbyteries, 646 ministers, 1406 churches, and 104,821 members.

These results may well excite our gratitude to God, and ought to stimulate and encourage us to greater activity, liberality, and prayer.

SALARIES OF MISSIONARIES.

During the past year, the Board have increased their average appropriation to the missionaries \$11.35.

During the last three years, the Board have increased their average appropriations to the missionaries \$41.90, which is a little over $31\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. By this advance, the annual liabilities of the Board, with the present number of missionaries, have been augmented nearly \$24,000.

If the people whom they serve had advanced proportionately, our missionaries would now be comfortably sustained. But while the Board have increased their appropriations $31\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. their people have advanced a little less than $20\frac{1}{4}$ per cent.

NEED OF FUNDS.

The receipts *from the churches*, from April 1, 1855, to April 1, 1856, *fell short* of the payments, during the same period, *upwards of eighteen thousand dollars!* and but for the balance on hand at the commencement of the fiscal year, and the unusually large amount received from individual donations and legacies, we would have been in debt to our missionaries at the close of the year!

With an increased number of missionaries, and a higher scale of appropriations, the expenditures of the Board have been very largely augmented; so that during the year upon which we have entered, we shall need much larger receipts from the churches.

Moreover, it is very important that the Board should not be hampered or embarrassed in undertaking the establishment of new missions.

A larger number of churches contributed to the Board during the past than the preceding year—the increase being about one hundred. Still it is to be lamented, that out of the 3079 churches reported in the Minutes of the General Assembly of 1855, only about 1350 of the number contributed anything to the Board during the past year!

As there will probably be no collecting agents in the field assigned to the Executive Committee, in Philadelphia, and probably none in the larger portion of the field assigned to the Western Executive Committee, we must rely mainly upon the pastors and sessions to see that collections are taken up for the Board during the year.

CONCLUSION.

The report concludes with an earnest appeal to Christians to be more liberal in their contributions, and more fervent in their prayers for the Divine blessing upon the missionary cause.

Abstract of the Annual Report for 1856.

Part I. MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.—The number of new candidates received this year is 102. The total number on the roll is 382, being 18 more than the preceding year. 1. This whole subject is eminently connected with God's sovereignty. 2. Our operations call for gratitude to God. 3. The statistics indicate the inadequate impression of the Church in regard to her responsibilities and duties.

The Board next present a plea for educational operations *on the basis of Scripture*, and maintain the following propositions: 1. The perpetuation of the ministry is made by the word of God an object of special concern to the Church. 2. The Church is required to use means for the attainment of the great end in view. 3. The Scriptures authorize the belief that many of the Church's ministers will always be from among the poor. 4. The ministry should be an educated as well as pious ministry, called of God to their work. 5. It is a scriptural principle, that pecuniary aid should be granted to those candidates whose condition requires it.

Agencies.—The whole work of the Board has been performed by the Secretaries, with the single exception of a few weeks' voluntary service, and at a less cost than for any year during the last eleven.

Part II. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS, ACADEMIES, AND COLLEGES.

Primry and Parochial Schools.—The number of these schools is about 100, of which 34 have received aid from the Board, and 7 more have lately applied. One of the elders of a church in New York City has continued his offer of \$5000 per annum to this object.

Presbyterial Academies.—The number of Presbyterial Academies is 58. These are located in every section of the Church, north, south, east, and west. They contain on an average from 70 to 80 students each, and are doing a great work in the cause of thorough Christian education.

Colleges.—The colleges directly under the care of the Church are 18, which, with four others indirectly under our control, make a total of 22 institutions. The number of students, regular and irregular, connected with these institutions, is 2100. Of these, about 5000 are communicants of the Church, and 350 are candidates for the ministry. During the year, upwards of 100 students have been hopefully converted to God. Revivals of religion have occurred at Princeton College, Washington College, Pennsylvania, and Oglethorpe University, Georgia.

The Board offer the following remarks on the Collegiate policy of the Church: 1. It ought to be the universal aim to incorporate thorough religious instruction into the course of studies. 2. The Church ought to cultivate the harmony now happily prevalent among our institutions. 3. Our colleges ought to increase in number from time to time, but not too fast or too near each other. 4. Ample endowments ought to be provided for all our colleges, and chiefly from the districts of country where they are located. 5. A larger

number of young men ought to be encouraged to seek the advantages of a liberal education. It may be added, that whilst our Colleges are struggling to secure an endowment, especially during their infancy, it is good policy to assist them with a portion of the funds which the liberality of the churches may supply for the general object.

Conclusion.—On the whole, the operations of the Board, in both departments, are in an encouraging state, and with the blessing of God upon the faithful efforts of his people, a constant advance in our work is to be expected.

Abstract of the Nineteenth Annual Report, May 4, 1856.

The Board acknowledge, with gratitude to God, the many favours that have been extended to the Missionary work during the past year.

The advance in the receipts of the treasury from all sources, over those of the last year, has been something more than \$10,000, the greater part of which is from the ordinary contributions of the Church, and which is regarded by the Board as an encouraging feature in the Missionary work.

The publications of the Board have been the same as those of the previous year.

MISSIONARIES AND ASSISTANT MISSIONARIES SENT OUT.—Eighteen missionaries, (five of whom have been in this country on a visit) and thirty male and female assistant missionaries, making forty-eight in all, have been sent out during the year. This is a much larger number of missionary labourers than has ever been sent out in any previous year.

MISSIONS AMONG THE INDIAN TRIBES.—There are nine Missions among the various Indian Tribes of our own country; connected with which there are thirteen principal stations and out stations, twelve ordained missionaries, sixty assistant Missionaries, ten churches, three hundred and twenty-one church members, ten schools, and more than five hundred pupils in the various stages of their education. Most of these Missions have been favoured with the special presence of the Holy Spirit during the year, and some of them have enjoyed his blessing in large measure.

MISSIONS IN AFRICA.—There are two Missions in Western Africa, one in Liberia, and the other on the Island of Corisco; connected with these there are nine stations, seven Missionaries, fifteen assistant Missionaries, five churches, one hundred and seventy-one church members, seven schools, and one hundred and seventy-nine pupils. Several of these churches have also enjoyed the special reviving influences of the Spirit during the year.

MISSIONS IN INDIA.—There are two Missions in India, three of them having been consolidated in one during the year. Connected with these Missions there are fifteen stations, twenty-seven ordained Missionaries, and sixty-four assistant Missionaries and native helpers under the care of these Missionaries. There are eleven churches, and two hundred and ninety church members; eighteen schools, and three thousand six hundred and fifty-six pupils. There has been no period in the previous history of these Missions when they presented a more encouraging aspect, or promised richer fruits than at the present time.

MISSION IN SIAM.—In Siam there is one Mission at Bangkok, connected with which there are three ordained missionaries, three female assistant missionaries, one Chinese assistant, and one boarding-school numbering twenty-eight pupils.

MISSIONS IN CHINA.—There are three Missions in China: at Canton, Ningpo, and Shanghai. Labouring in connection with these missions there are twelve missionaries and fourteen male and female assistant missionaries, and three boarding-schools embracing ninety pupils. The church at Ningpo has been favoured during the year by the addition of ten native converts. At the other mission stations, the various departments of missionary labour have been carried on with efficiency, and with many encouraging tokens of good.

The Mission to the Chinese in California is still continued under the care of the Rev. William Speer, whose labours have been of great service to the Chinese in various ways.

MISSIONS AMONG ROMANISTS.—There are two missions under the care of the Board in South America, one at Buenos Ayres, and the other at Bogota, in New Grenada. The one at Buenos Ayres has been of two years' continuance, and has been favoured by the converting presence of the Holy Spirit during the year, fourteen converts having been received to the communion of the church during the last summer. The other mission at Bogota has just commenced.

Funds have been remitted to the Evangelical Missionary Societies of Belgium, Paris, Geneva, and to the Waldenses Synod, to the amount of \$6000, exclusive of the interest on the endowment fund of the La Tour Seminary. It is believed that the cause of evangelical religion has been greatly promoted in Europe during the last year by the labours of these various societies.

MISSIONS TO THE JEWS.—Two Missionaries are labouring in this city for the benefit of the Jews, and though no very marked results have as yet attended their labours, they report from time to time encouraging facts in connection with their work.

CONCLUSION.—The Report of the Board contains much to encourage the people of God. The missionary work is going forward with manifest tokens of the Divine blessing.

In each of the general divisions of the missionary field some fruit has been gathered, and the converts admitted to the communion of the Mission Churches are more numerous than in any former year. These proofs of God's favour towards the work of his servants call for devout thanksgiving.

Abstract of the Eighteenth Annual Report of the Board of Publication.

The following is an abstract of the Eighteenth Annual Report of the Presbyterian Board of Publication, presented to the General Assembly, in the city of New York, May 1856.

The Board reports a year of signal prosperity. There has been, during the past year, an increase in receipts, in the number of publications, in the number or colporteurs employed, and in every department of the labours of the Board.

The limits of the financial year of the Board, have recently been changed, so that it will hereafter commence annually on the 1st of March, instead of the 1st of April. Owing to this change, the portion of time under review comprehends this year only *eleven months*.

The operations of the Board were presented under the three following heads: I. Production. II. Distribution. III. Sustaination.

I. *Production.*—The Publishing Agent reports, that there have been issued 39 *new works*, viz. 16 new volumes; and 23 smaller publications. Of these new works there have been published 111,000 copies. The *reprints* of former publications have been 485,250 copies. Thus the *total publications* of the year have been 596,250 copies.

The total number of copies published since the organization of the Board to March 1, 1856, has been 5,550,938.

There has been an *increase* in the number of copies of all kinds printed during the past year, of 129,500 copies over the year preceding.

The largest work issued in the year has been the "*Assembly's Digest*," by the Rev. Samuel J. Baird, a volume of 856 pages, which has received much commendation. The Board has also issued an edition of the "*Life of Dr. A. Alexander*," by Dr. J. W. Alexander. Several additions have also been made to the Board's list of German tracts.

Much attention has been given to the judicious increase of its *Sabbath-school Library*. An anxious desire is expressed for its enlargement, and suitable manuscripts are invited from ministers and laymen in every part of the Church.

Periodicals.—Circulation of the *Home and Foreign Record*, 17,500 copies, being an increase within the year of 500 copies. *Sabbath-school Visitor*, 43,000 copies, increase 2,000 copies.

II. *Distribution.*—There are three distinct channels through which the publications of the Boards reach the hands of the people.

1. Distribution by sales from the publishing house to private individuals and book-sellers. These have amounted during the eleven months now reported on, to 171,516

volumes, besides tracts, pamphlets, and periodicals. The value of these sales (including the *Sunday-school Visitor*, but not the *Record*,) has been \$70,702.28.

2. *Distribution by Colportage*.—In this department there has been great enlargement and encouragement during the past year.

The number of colporteurs commissioned within these eleven months has been 210, an increase of 37 over those of the preceding twelvemonth. These have been distributed throughout 28 States and Territories, as well as through all the British Provinces, from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to Lake Superior. They have also begun to occupy Oregon, California, Kansas, Nebraska, the Lake Superior mining region, and hitherto unoccupied portions of Texas, Arkansas, Missouri, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Michigan, and Florida.

These Colporteurs have sold 125,790 volumes, an increase of 27,940 volumes sold. They have gratuitously distributed 13,913 volumes, an increase of 3,133 volumes. They have also distributed gratuitously 1,046,964 pages of tracts. And they have visited 91,734 families, an increase of 12,642 families visited.

There is much evidence that the Colporteurs have also increased in qualifications and efficiency during the past year, and that the Spirit of God has largely attended and blessed their labours.

3. *Distribution by Donation of Executive Committee*.—This has amounted to 3,269 volumes and 111,873 pages of tracts, which have been chiefly given to Sabbath-schools, feeble churches, needy ministers, and to individuals for gratuitous distribution.

III. *Sustentation*.—There has been so gratifying an increase in the receipts of the Board from every source this year, that for eleven months only, they exceed those of the preceding twelve months. They have been as follows:

Agencies.—Not a single collecting agent has been commissioned during the past year. There is an evidently growing disposition on the part of pastors themselves to instruct and train their people in habits of benevolence, a tendency in which the Board greatly rejoices. During the past year the income of the Board has been derived from a larger number of Presbyteries and churches than ever before, although there has been no collecting agent in the field.

The whole aspect of the work committed to this Board is one of progress and encouragement, such as it rejoices to be able to spread before the General Assembly, and as encourages it to new and enlarged exertions for the time to come.

APPROPRIATIONS FROM THE GENERAL FUND.

No appropriation is made without the recommendation of the Presbytery, or the Church Extension Committee of the Presbytery within whose bounds the church applying for aid is located.

No appropriation is *paid* until the Committee receives a certificate from the Trustees of the church aided, stating that their church lot is properly secured, and that the amount appropriated will complete their house of worship and leave the whole property free from debt.

Appropriations not called for within two years of the date thereof, are regarded as withdrawn.

Abstract of the First Annual Report of the Church Extension Committee.

This new enterprise was organized in the city of St. Louis, Missouri, on the 3d of July, 1855, under the appointment of the last General Assembly. The Committee elected the Rev. N. L. Rice, D. D., Chairman; Archibald Gamble, Esq., Treasurer; and David H. Bishop, Esq., Recording Secretary. On the 4th day of September, 1855, the Rev. H. I. Coe, of Galena, Illinois, was unanimously chosen Corresponding Secretary, and entered on the duties of the office on the 20th day of the same month. His salary was fixed at \$1500 per annum. The valuable services of the other officers, especially of the Treasurer, during the past year, have been rendered gratuitously.

In carrying on the work entrusted to them by the General Assembly, the Church Extension Committee have, as far as practicable, acted upon the following principles, viz.

1. To make no appropriation to any church under the care of a Presbytery, without the recommendation of that Presbytery or its Church Extension Committee.

2. To be guided in determining the amount to be appropriated in each case by the carefully ascertained necessities of that case, and the state of the treasury.

3. To diffuse appropriations as widely and equitably as possible over the whole country.

4. To require, as the ordinary pre-requisite of the payment of every appropriation from the general fund, a certificate from the Trustees of the church aided, that the church lot is fully secured to the Old-school Presbyterian Church, and that the amount granted by the Church Extension Committee will complete their house of worship, and leave the whole property free from debt.

5. To withdraw every appropriation not properly called for within two years of its date.

6. To recognize the right of donors to designate the recipients of their donations.

7. Inasmuch as it is frequently of the highest importance to a church to know definitely the amount of aid upon which it may rely, a considerable time before the money can be drawn, the Church Extension Committee have felt at liberty to make, in anticipation of the incoming of funds, several appropriations, payable as soon after a fixed time in the future as the churches aided comply with the conditions on which the appropriations are made.

These principles are chiefly deductions from the eleven years' experience of the Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions, and the past has only added to the evidences of their wisdom.

The number of new applications for aid in erecting churches, received from April 1st,

1855, to April 1st, 1856, (including thirteen applications acted upon by the late Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions, previous to the transfer of their books, papers, and funds, to the present Committee of the General Assembly,) is one hundred and five. These one hundred and five new applications come from churches in the bounds of twenty-six of our thirty Synods, and fifty three of our one hundred and forty-eight Presbyteries. The amount of aid asked for in these one hundred and five applications is over \$27,000.

Besides these, forty-one old applications, amounting to nearly \$7000, (action upon which was deferred by the Committee of the Board of Missions for want of funds,) remain on file, awaiting later information.

In addition to all these, forty-two unpaid appropriations of the Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions, amounting to \$5090, have been assumed by the General Assembly's Church Extension Committee, and may properly be regarded in the light of applications. The whole number of requests for aid during the year just closed, that may be ranged under the general head of applications, is therefore 188, amounting to over \$39,000.

During the year ending April, 1, 1856, appropriations have been made to seventy-one churches, to the amount of \$12,785.99.

Appropriations to twelve churches, amounting to \$1525, have been withdrawn.

The balance in the treasury of the Church extension Committee of the Board of Missions, April 1st, 1855, was \$4173.10. The receipts from April 1st, 1855, to April 1st, 1856, were—from churches, \$8059.72; from other sources \$1697.59—making in all \$9757.31. This, with the balance on hand, April 1st, 1855, gives for the available resources of the year ending April 1st, 1856, \$13,930.41.

The receipts of this year are \$4510.83, or more than 85 per cent. in advance of the receipts of the last year.

The number of churches that have contributed this year is nearly two and a half times as great as the number that contributed last year, and the amount received from churches is considerably more than double the amount received from churches in any previous year.

The number of churches which this year for the first time have sent in donations, is at least one and a half times greater than the whole number of different churches which have contributed in any former year.

The expenditures of the year closing April 1st, 1856, were \$11,083 51, including a temporary loan of \$700 to the Church Extension Committee of the city of St. Louis, out of the contributions of the Second Presbyterian Church of St. Louis, made in accordance with the desire of that church.

The balance on hand in the different treasuries, April 1st, 1856, was \$2846.90, to meet appropriations made to the amount of \$8575. The liabilities therefore of the Committee exceeded its resources, April 1st, 1856, \$5728.10.

 THE CONTINGENT FUND.

There is still a necessity for calling the particular attention of the churches and Presbyteries to this Fund. The expenses for which it provides are indispensable, not only to the vigorous working, but to the maintenance of our ecclesiastical organism. And in this certainly every church, and every member of the church, will feel an interest.

 REGULATION RESPECTING THE MINUTES.

Adopted by the Assemblies of 1836 and 1837, and directed to be republished in the Appendix to the Minutes.

“Each Presbytery shall forward to the Treasurer, for the *Contingent Fund* of the Assembly, at or before the meeting of the Assembly in each year, a sum equal to fifty cents for each member of the Presbytery, and for any licentiate or other person who shall desire the Minutes, and whose post-office address shall be given. And the Stated Clerk shall not forward the Minutes to the members of any Presbytery from which no such remittance shall be made, but only to the Stated Clerk of such Presbytery, and to such members as shall forward the sum above stated.”

In addition to the above, where copies are sent by mail, *five cents* additional must be forwarded to pre-pay postage.

 TO THE STATED CLERKS OF SYNODS.

It is the duty of the Stated Clerks of the respective Synods, to send up to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly an annual report, stating, in brief, the number of Presbyteries, ministers, churches, licentiates, and candidates within their bounds, and particularly all changes which may have been made in the arrangement of Presbyteries. By the Assembly of 1841, (see p. 425.) it has been made their duty also to transmit to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly, the time and place of meetings of their respective Synods.

To the above should be added, Charles E. Hedges, James S. King, and Charles H. Young, graduates of the College of New Jersey, who entered at the close of the last session, but began their studies in this; making the total admissions through the year, *forty-one*.

Of the above list of admissions, Robert L. McCune was a graduate of the Western Theological Seminary, and a licentiate. Joshua B. Garritt, and Edward C. Sickles were received on certificate from the Theological Seminary at New Albany. Henry M. Baird, and Joseph W. Hubbard from the Union Theological Seminary, New York. Frank H. Bowman from the Union Theological Seminary, Virginia. James K. Large,

from the Western Theological Seminary. Donald McLaren from the Associate Reformed Theological Seminary at Newburgh, N. Y., and Henry Willard from the Theological Seminary at Andover, Mass.

The whole number of matriculated students whose names have been on the roll during the whole or a part of the year, is *one hundred and one*.

One student, viz Charles Boyd, has died in the course of the year.

In regard to the religious character and deportment of the students, the Professors have made the following report: "The religious life of the Seminary compares favourably with that of previous sessions. The customary religious exercises have been well attended by the students; their diligence in study has been of a gratifying character; and their walk has been generally exemplary. Some of the graduating class expect to go as foreign missionaries; and others in the lower classes have the same work in contemplation."

The Professors reported to the Board that seven of the students of the second class in the Seminary have been licensed to preach the gospel by their respective Presbyteries. To this statement they add the following paragraph, viz. "The Faculty in reiterating their conviction of the injustice done to the Seminary, and the injury to the students themselves, by their licensure in the early part of their course, beg leave to refer the Board to the numerous and earnest representations on this subject, in their reports from the very origin of the Seminary." The opinion expressed in this paragraph, the Board approved, and they appointed a committee to prepare an article for publication on this subject.

At the close of the session the students were examined for nearly a week, in presence of a Committee of the Board. The Committee of Examination in their report to the Board, "express their high gratification with the whole examination, as furnishing evidence of the faithfulness of the Professors, and of the diligence of the students."

Certificates of having finished the whole course prescribed in the Plan, were conferred on the following *twenty-four* young men, viz. Amzi L. Armstrong, Henry R. Avery, Henry M. Baird, Walter V. Couch, Francis F. Ford, Samuel R. Gayley, Francis B. Hall, J. Aspinwall Hodge, Joseph F. Jennison, Jacob A. Lefevre, Joseph W. Lewis, Daniel McGilvary, Robert S. Manning, Charles R. Mills, William J. Morcock, J. Howard Nixon, J. Lansing Pearse, D. Dubois Sahler, John H. Sargent, Frank C. Statham, A. Sinclair Stewart, William C. White, Henry Willard, and Jonathan Wilson.

The Board at their present meeting passed the following resolution, viz.

"Resolved, That the General Assembly be requested to alter the Plan of the Seminary, Article II. Section 13, so as to read as follows:

"During the annual examination, or at its close, a sermon shall be preached before the Seminary, by a member of the Board of Directors."

The Board have to report, that it has pleased Divine Providence, through the year, to remove two of their members by death, viz. Mr. Hugh Auchincloss, who departed this life, July 9th, 1855, and the Rev. Dr. John Johnston, who died August 22d, 1855. Mr. Auchincloss had been a member of this Board twenty-four years, and Dr. Johnston had been a member thirty-eight years. Two years of the time for which Mr. Auchincloss was elected remain unexpired, and one year of the time for which Dr. Johnston was elected.

He has loaned out to the students, on three notes, the legacy of Dr. Patrick Gannon, of Albany, in the manner pointed out in the Testator's will, amount, - \$350 00

With regard to the John Hoff legacy, the Board passed the following resolution, viz.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be directed to invest, of the legacy of \$2,500, of John Hoff deceased, with such portion of the accumulated interest as will amount to the sum of \$3,000, to endow a Scholarship, to be called the John Hoff Scholarship; and to invest of the said legacy the further sum of \$1000, the interest of which is to defray the expense of printing the annual address contemplated by the testator; and the residue of said legacy, being \$364.50, to be applied under the direction of the Professors, to carry out, as far as practicable, the intention of the testator.

At the meeting of the Board in September last, the Treasurer reported that he had received the third and last instalment of the legacy of Miss Catharine Naglee, amounting to \$3,525.01. In consequence of this receipt, the Board resolved that \$3000 be appropriated from the legacy of Miss Catharine Naglee, towards the purchasing or erection of a

house for a Professor; and that when the residue of the money necessary for such house is secured, the committee appointed for the purpose, purchase, or commence building said house. At the present meeting of the Board, the committee on a Professor's house reported, that since the last meeting Professor Green had vacated the house he occupied, belonging to the Board, having provided a house of his own; and that Dr. McGill had removed to the house thus vacated. The need of a new Professor's house, has thus been obviated for the present, and the committee were discharged. In consequence of the above, the Board passed the following resolution,

Resolved, That the Treasurer invest from the legacy of Miss Catharine Naglee \$1000, and add it to the Permanent Fund; and that the residue of said legacy, not otherwise appropriated, continue in, and belong to the Contingent Fund.

From the Librarian's report it appears that there has been added to the library, through the year, by donation, 195 volumes, and by purchase, 2 volumes. The whole number of volumes now in the library is 14,057.

Of the donations, Messrs. R. L. and A. Stuart, of New York, have presented 125 volumes; among which is a complete set of Tischendorf's elegant and valuable publications, Bickersteth's works, 16 volumes, Bunsen's Hippolytus, 4 volumes; 2 copies of Turretin; Grimm's Deutsche Wörterbuch, Vol. I., and Dillman's Ethiopic Old Testament, Vol. I.

The Presbyterian Board of Publication have presented 12 volumes of their publications; 18 volumes have been presented from the library of the late Rev. J. M. Connell; Rev. J. Perkins, of the Nestorian Mission, has presented the Old Testament in ancient and modern Syriac; the Smithsonian Institution has presented 1 volume; the United States Commissioner of Indian Affairs, 2 volumes; the United States War Department 1 volume; a Friend in Baltimore 15 volumes, among which are 3 volumes of Ritter's Erd Kunde, Dörner's Lehre von der Person Christe, Dillman das Buch Henoch; and Rev. James Smith 2 copies of Turretin.

The Librarian also reported that a box of valuable clothing had been received from the ladies of the Third Presbyterian Church of Newark, N. J.; also one from the Female Charitable Society of Morris Plain, N. J.; two from the Nineteenth Street Church, New York; and a bundle from the Church on University Place; all which has been distributed among the needy students, agreeably to the wishes of the benevolent donors.

The Board deeply regret that their financial agent in the City of New York, James Donaldson, Esq., has felt it to be his duty to resign this office. The following is a copy of the letter of Mr. Donaldson to the Board:

NEW YORK, May 6, 1856.

Gentlemen—I beg leave to lay before you my usual annual statement, which I hope will be found correct.

It has afforded me much pleasure for ten years past to attend to the duties of the appointment conferred upon me in 1845, and if my health admitted of it, I should be glad to continue in the discharge of them. Such, however, is not the case, and I am therefore compelled to ask for my release, and for the appointment of another in my stead; to whom, under your authority, I will deliver the securities in my hands. I am happy to say that the mortgages are now all yielding seven per cent., that they are of unexceptionable character, and that the interest is punctually paid.

A comparison of our Reports for the last three years with those of several years previous, evinces a gratifying increase in the average attendance of students. Though the number is absolutely smaller than our expectations and our wants would alike have suggested, yet relatively it is nearly double that for the previous years alluded to. This increase commenced coincidentally with the determination of the Synods, under whose care the Institution has been placed and by whose agency it has mainly been endowed, that this endowment should be completed, and the means of theological instruction there should be as adequate as those elsewhere afforded. We are further gratified to state that this enterprise of completing the endowment has been so far successful that we are now able to report that our whole investments are \$75,000. This sum yields an income in five per cent. interest on \$10,000, and six per cent. on \$65,000, amounting in all to \$1400 per annum. There are subscriptions of responsible men now in process of collection and investment, amounting to about \$20,000. Our efforts to increase the endowment shall not be relaxed till we feel satisfied that the enlarged and liberal plans of the founders of the Seminary shall have been accomplished. Though endowed and mainly sustained by the two Synods of Virginia and North Carolina, represented by this Board, the Seminary has ever been contemplated by its friends as designed for a sphere of usefulness only limited by the boundaries of the Church. While on the one hand its central position restricted very much its peculiar sources of a supply of students, at the same time this very fact renders it more accessible from all portions of our Church; and increasing facilities of travel have recently removed physical inconveniences hitherto hindering such convenient access.

This Institution has been frequently and sorely bereaved by the death of its Professors. No less than four of the most valued and able among them have died in office within twenty-five years, and two of the number within five years. It received also a severe shock in the disruption of our Church in 1838-9. Such causes conspiring with its incomplete endowment, will sufficiently account for its long-continued state of depression, especially since co-incidentally with their operation three other Seminaries have grown up in our bounds. We humbly trust a more cheering day is at hand.

The wants of our Synods demand a supply of ministers for which there are no other reliable sources; while the obligations of our 20,000 communicants and nearly 300 churches to contribute their proper quota to the ranks of the ministry at large fully justify the maintenance of such an institution within the field assigned them by God. Their providential location must for ever prevent the proper enterprise and success in cultivating that field, if they are left dependent for a supply of ministers on other sections of the Church, or if they are exposed to the natural operation of influences to which their choicest young men might be subjected, when sent out of their bounds to pursue a professional education.

With the increase in our funds and students, we have felt encouraged to complete our corps of instructors by the establishment of a fourth Professorship. To this has been assigned all that part of a theological course which properly falls under the denomination of *Biblical Introduction*. It includes the subjects of Biblical Criticism, the Canon, Special introduction to the various books of the Scriptures, Archæology and History of the Church prior to the new dispensation, and the interpretation of the Gospels as an exercise of training in the art of interpretation, as well as a means of developing by the teachings of the Saviour and his inspired biographers, the elementary truths of the Christian system.

The arrangement of the course of studies in the other departments is substantially that hitherto adopted by us, and carried out in other seminaries. Their names, "Theology," "Church History and Polity," and "Oriental Literature," suggest the tenor of their respective subjects. Each Professor, however, gives exegetical instruction in the Scriptures, the Professor of Theology on the pastoral epistles in connection with pastoral Theology; the Professor of Church History on the Acts of the Apostles; the Professor of Oriental Literature on parts of the Old Testament and the Pauline Epistles; and the Professor of Biblical Introduction, as already mentioned, on the Gospels.

The propriety of this somewhat extended notice of our present transactions will appear fully obvious, when it is remembered that the establishment of a fourth Professorship, and the arrangement of the course of studies therewith connected, are topics on which the constitution of our Seminary requires us to present a detailed report to the General Assembly. The assent of the Assembly is respectfully solicited to the organic changes above described.

The *real estate* of the Institution consists of about 35 acres of land. On this have been erected a building 200 feet long, by 40 wide, and of three stories, besides a commodious basement, (affording accommodations for a Professor and family, a chapel, library, lecture-rooms, and forty rooms for students, most of which will accommodate two each,) a large and commodious steward's house, and two other residences for Professors now occupied. Another similar residence is now in process of erection. The students' rooms are provided with suitable furniture, much of which is new, and efforts are making for the renewal of the whole.

The Library has received this year an accession of 39 volumes. The whole number is 4370.

The Electors of the Seminary met on the 12th ult., and elected the Rev. William J. Hoge, pastor of the Westminster Church, Baltimore, to the fourth Professorship.

The Seminary enjoys at this time the confidence and affections of the churches which have sustained it by their prayers and contributions. At no previous period of its history has it ever received more marked evidence of this fact. The success which has attended the labours of its instructors in training able and efficient ministers, known by their works in all parts of our Church and country, constitutes at once their best commendation to the Christian public, and forms the best guarantee for the future. Besides the endowments provided for the support of its Professors, there are four Scholarships, whose proceeds are available to aid its indigent students. These are the "Winchester," under the control of the Winchester Presbytery; the "Hoge," and the "Samuel Davies," under that of West Hanover; and the "Francis Dèveux," under that of Orange Presbytery. And in addition to the facilities afforded by the Board of Education, responsible members of the Directory of the Seminary have pledged themselves to the Board that no suitable candidate for the ministry shall lack means of support while pursuing his studies at this Institution.

The Winchester Presbytery which until recently formed a part of the Synod of Virginia, but now belongs to the Synod of Baltimore, has contributed money both formerly and recently to the endowment, and owns a Scholarship in this Seminary. It therefore desired to be represented in the government of the Institution. To that end it has been agreed by the Synods of Virginia and North Carolina, that this Presbytery shall henceforth appoint one minister and one ruling elder as members of the Board of Directors, the Synod of Virginia relinquishing these two places in its favour. The assent of the Assembly is needed to make this change a part of our constitution.

Believing that the Assembly will bid us "God speed" in our important service, and relying on the prayers of the Church for the Divine aid, we respectfully submit this Report to your consideration. Signed by order of the Board.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE DANVILLE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY FOR THE SESSION ENDING MAY 1st, 1856.

The Directors of the Danville Theological Seminary respectfully submit to the General Assembly their Third Annual Report as follows. During the session which terminated on the 1st inst. twenty-two new students have been received.

The whole number of students in attendance during the session has been forty-five.

The Seminary has now completed its first period of three years, through which, under the operation of its plan, the course of instruction extends. The general results of this first period of its existence may thus be summed up.

1. Sixty-six candidates for the ministry have received instruction.
2. Twenty-seven are now preaching the gospel either as ministers or licentiates. Of these, five have entered the ministry among our Baptist and Methodist brethren.
3. A plan of instruction, new to the Seminaries of this Church, has been instituted and carried through the entire course of study, with results most satisfactory to the Faculty and students.
4. The burden of instruction originally, assigned by the Assembly to four full Professors, has been borne through this whole period by two Professors and an assistant teacher; all of whom entered office without any previous experience in these arduous and difficult labours.
5. Many of the embarrassments and inconveniences incident to the establishment of a new institution, have been in a great measure overcome. Buildings adequate to the present uses of the Seminary, and a valuable library, have been procured; means for the spiritual and intellectual culture of the students have been instituted, and the minute but important conditions belonging to the interior life of such an institution have been adjusted.
6. The report of the Board of Trustees shows that the funds of the institution have been so managed as to support the school on their income, leaving the principal undiminished.
7. The favour of God made manifest towards the Seminary through every period of its existence, and the course of his Providence in bringing it face to face with unlooked for perils, and then interposing with unlooked for methods of deliverance, and in making every one of its perils the occasion of increased prosperity; all these things indicate the commencement here of a great and enduring work for the Church.

In the judgment of the Directors, the interests of the Seminary demand the appointment of a new Professor at the present time. Such also is the fixed conviction of the office bearers of this Church within the Synod, in the bosom of which the institution is established. Their conviction has made itself known through the action of all the Presbyteries in Kentucky. The measures proposed by these judicatories in the resolutions adopted at their late meeting, copies of which resolutions are appended to this Report, and made parts thereof. These Presbyteries desire the General Assembly at this time to appoint a third full Professor, and they engage to pay his salary by annual collections in their congregations, until the chair shall be permanently endowed. This generous proposal is additional to the \$77,000 with which the churches of Kentucky have already endowed the Seminary. We are also encouraged to believe that two of the churches in the Synod of Cincinnati taken together will contribute annually as much as any single Presbytery in Kentucky towards this object.

The Directors do not doubt that these engagements will be fulfilled; and such is the confidence of the present Professors in the good faith of their brethren, that they have voluntarily proposed to place the new Professor on the vested funds of the Seminary, and rely for their salaries on these pledges, so far as may be necessary. The Directors therefore unite with these Presbyteries in asking the General Assembly to elect, at this time, a Professor of Pastoral Theology and Church Government.

It is the opinion of the present Professors, that three full Professors, all in vigorous health, with some assistance in the elementary teaching of the Hebrew tongue, might carry on the whole instruction of a Theological Seminary. At an early period of this school, our Professors made this suggestion to their brethren in the other schools of the Church, with a view of settling this part of the policy of the Church on this basis. But some of the most successful and experienced teachers in the other seminaries expressed the opinion that the work could not be well done by less than four full Professors. The General Assembly has given its final judgment to the same effect, by appointing a fourth Professor in its oldest and best endowed Seminary. As the General Assembly has resolved to make this a Seminary of the first class, the Directors have no other course to pursue than to accept the judgment of the Assembly as to the number of Professors necessary to such a school, and to place this institution as soon as practicable on that footing.

But all that is at present proposed is to organize a Faculty with three Professors and an assistant teacher. The Directors ought to add that one of the incumbent Professors has been in such feeble health during the last winter, and has discharged his duties amidst such bodily suffering, and with such extreme hazard of life, that he has expressed it as his deliberate judgment that he ought to resign his chair. But the friends of the Seminary peremptorily refused to accede to his views; and this circumstance renders the appointment of an additional Professor an urgent and vital necessity. This measure will render practicable such a distribution of the labour of the institution as will afford material relief in any case of sickness or infirmity that may occur in the Faculty, and will, it is hoped, induce the particular Professor who has been recently afflicted to retain his chair.

The generous action of the Kentucky Presbyteries has relieved the Seminary of the most serious embarrassments and of the greatest perils. But this relief is only temporary and provisional. To render this relief permanent the endowment of the Professorship is indispensable, otherwise the perils through which we have now passed will be renewed at no distant period. To this end we earnestly invoke the aid of the General Assembly. In the beginning it "commended the subject to the prompt liberality of all the churches under its care, and more especially to those churches which lie in the wide region which will be first and most largely blessed by the institution." For the satisfaction of these churches, we ask the Assembly by some further action to use its influence in opening the way for our plea. We wish to obtain a hearing from our brethren throughout the whole Church. We respectfully ask the Assembly to clothe us renewedly with the same authority with which it constantly invests the other institutions and Boards of the Church, by virtue of which we may be enabled to appeal to the liberality of the whole Church, with every motive suggested by the immense interest of the Church in the Seminary, and by the fact, to be now once more distinctly made known through the voice of the General Assembly, that the Danville Seminary is one of the permanent, acknowledged institutions of the whole Church, and is to be accepted as such by all those who revere her authority.

The Directors further report that the term of office of the following Directors expires with the present General Assembly.

PAPERS REFERRED TO IN THE FOREGOING REPORT.

Resolutions of the Presbytery of Transylvania touching the Theological Seminary at Danville.

Resolved, 1st. That God's exceeding great kindness, as manifested in the rapid growth of the Danville Seminary, both as to endowment and number of pupils, (a growth unparalleled, as far as we can learn, in the history of similar institutions) is adapted not only to inspire us with gratitude and humility, but also to encourage us to proceed with promptitude and energy in completing those arrangements which may be necessary to its highest success.

Resolved, 2d. That the fact that two Professors and a competent Teacher of Hebrew have been sustained for three years, and a building purchased and fitted up so as to furnish ample accommodations for the instruction of all the pupils, and the lodging of a portion of them, without trenching upon the permanent fund for the three Professorships, which the Kentucky churches had undertaken to endow, and without diminishing by

more than a few hundred dollars any portion of the capital of the Institution, is full proof of the skill and economy with which its funds are managed.

Resolved, 3d. That the completion of the endowment of all the Professorships, before the close of the third year of the Seminary's existence, would have been an event so far beyond what had ever occurred in the history of other institutions, that a failure to complete the endowment within this period does not present any ground of discouragement to the friends of the Institution.

Resolved, 4th. That a full corps of instructors is necessary to place the Institution on an equal footing with our older Seminaries, as well as to furnish to its pupils the advantages of a larger aggregate of instructing talent, and to its professors the opportunity, through a minuter subdivision of labour, of qualifying themselves more thoroughly for instruction in their respective departments.

Resolved, 5th. That while our churches have fully redeemed their pledges in regard to endowment, having promised the General Assembly to raise \$60,000 for the Seminary, and having actually raised nearly \$80,000; and while we regard it as, for many reasons, exceedingly desirable that the funds for establishing and maintaining the Institution should be contributed from different parts of the Church, we are confident that sooner than see the Seminary decline, the churches of our own Synod would raise any additional amount needed for its full and permanent endowment.

Resolved, 6th. That we have full confidence in the speedy endowment of an additional Professorship, either through the action of some of our sister Synods, or through the liberality of some of our wealthy members.

Resolved, 7th. That the favour with which, through the blessing of God, our churches regard the Seminary, warrants us in unhesitatingly pledging ourselves to sustain, in conjunction with our sister Presbyteries of this Synod, an additional Professor, until permanent provision can be made for his support.

Resolved, 8th. That the Board of Directors of the Seminary be respectfully requested to ask of the General Assembly the appointment of an additional Professor; so that there may be a full corps of four instructors prepared to enter upon their work at the commencement of the next session.

Resolved, 9th. That in order to perform our part of the work of supporting this additional Professor, the Committee on the Commissioners Fund be instructed to lay on our churches such a pro-rata assessment as will yield \$400 per annum, and report before the rising of the Presbytery; and that the Stated Clerk be directed to notify each church not represented on the floor of Presbytery, the amount of its assessment.

Resolved, 10th. That if the Assembly shall appoint such additional Professor, and he shall accept, our churches be and hereby are directed to bring to the next stated meeting of Presbytery the respective sums which they shall have been assessed, and pay them over to the Treasurer of Presbytery, to be by him transmitted to the Treasurer of the Board of Danville Seminary.

Action of the Presbytery of Paducah.

The special Committee, appointed to take into consideration the subject of the Danville Theological Seminary, would respectfully report:

1st. That we regard that Institution as one of the greatest interests of the Church.

2d. That the work it has already done, and the success it has had, is a call and encouragement to us to carry it on; and, therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we tender our thanks to the Professors for what they have done and suffered for the good of the Seminary, and express our desire that they should remain in it.

Resolved, 2. That if Providence lays it upon the Synod of Kentucky to endow it, we deem it our duty to do so; and we hereby recommend to all our churches to give of their substance for that purpose.

Resolved, 3. That our Commissioners be instructed to request the General Assembly to appoint a third Professor.

Resolved, 4. That this Presbytery hereby pledges the sum of at least \$100 per annum to support this third Professor, until his chair be fully endowed.

Action of the Presbytery of Muhlenburg.

The Presbytery of Muhlenburg, deeply impressed with a sense of the unspeakable importance of the Danville Theological Seminary to the general interests of religion in our country, and especially to our Church in all the South-West, desire to express—

1st. Their unbounded confidence in, and sympathy with the Professors of said Institution, because of the very able and efficient manner in which they have, with much labour and sacrifice, sustained the interests of the Seminary, successfully, through the first term of its existence.

2d. Our deliberate conviction that the time has come when all the friends of the enterprise should unite, in vigorous efforts, to complete the endowment, and to make the Institution every way worthy of the great interests which it represents.

3d. Our belief that the speedy, permanent success of this Seminary presents eminent and urgent claims upon our churches for their prayers, sympathy, and pecuniary aid.

4th. That the appointment of a third Professor is imperatively demanded, in justice to the present Professors; and, to this end, we hereby direct our Commissioners to request of the Assembly, at its approaching meeting, to make such appointment; and, for the support of such Professor, we pledge our churches for at least \$200 annually, till such time as said Professorship be fully and permanently endowed.

Action of the Presbytery of Ebenezer.

The Special Committee appointed to draft a minute touching the present posture, wants, and necessities of the Danville Theological Seminary, would respectfully report:

1. That the success which has thus far attended the enterprise is beyond our fondest anticipations, and should be regarded as a loud and distinct call of the great Head of the Church upon all its true friends, to united, vigorous, and immediate effort to complete the endowment, and to make the institution at once worthy, in all respects, of the great interests which it represents.

2. It is the deliberate sense of this Presbytery, that the present Professors of the Danville Seminary have done their work ably and faithfully, and that the whole Presbyterian Church in Kentucky (to say nothing of the true friends of the institution elsewhere) owe them a debt of profound gratitude for the sacrifices which they have so nobly and patiently made, in successfully conducting the institution through the first term of its existence—performing, with their assistant, all the time, substantially the work of four men.

3. In the judgment of this Presbytery, it would be manifestly unwise and unjust in the friends of Danville Seminary, to allow its present Professors longer to bear the burthens and endure the sacrifices which the necessities of its infancy have hitherto imposed upon them. And to prevent this, we hereby request the next General Assembly to appoint an additional or third Professor; and we instruct our Commissioners to the next General Assembly to do all they can to effect this object. To accomplish this desirable object, this Presbytery hereby pledges the churches to do their part towards raising a temporary salary for the support of the new Professor, until the Synod of Nashville, or the friends of the Seminary in Tennessee, shall have fulfilled their promise and redeemed their pledge, in permanently endowing the newly filled chair. And further:

Resolved, That just so soon as the General Assembly shall appoint the additional Professor asked for, and he shall have signified his acceptance, the Moderator or Stated Clerk of this Presbytery is hereby instructed to issue a call for a meeting, to be held in the Maysville Presbyterian Church, for the specific purpose of devising ways and means for reliably raising a sum, not less than three hundred dollars, towards supporting the Professor for the time, until the chair be permanently endowed.

Resolved, That the agent of the Danville Seminary, Rev. Joel K. Lyle, has the thanks of this Presbytery for his visit and address; and that he leaves us with our warmest wishes and sincere prayers for his perfect success in the great work of its permanent pecuniary endowment.

Received, and unanimously adopted.

Resolutions adopted by the Presbytery of Louisville, April 18th, 1856.

Resolved, 1. That the favour of God has been so clearly manifested toward the Danville Theological Seminary as greatly to encourage its friends and to require them to persevere until the Institution shall be firmly established.

Resolved, 2. That in the opinion of this Presbytery, the General Assembly, by whose authority the Seminary was founded, ought to carry out all the pledges made to the Institution, and ought to use all the means in its power to secure its permanent and enlarged usefulness.

Resolved, 3. That the next General Assembly be requested to appoint a fourth Professor for the Seminary.

Resolved, 4. That the ministers and elders of this Presbytery will lay this cause before our respective charges, and recommend and urge them to contribute their due proportion of five hundred dollars annually towards the maintenance of a fourth Professor, until the permanent endowment of a Professorship.

Resolved, 5. That W. L. Breckinridge, Curran Pope, and J. P. Curtis be appointed a Committee, whose duty it shall be, so soon as the appointment and acceptance of a third Professor is announced, to fix upon what they may deem the equable proportion of each church towards this amount, and forward the same to the session of each church, with the request that they will make efforts to raise the said sum, and this committee shall receive all moneys thus raised and pay them over to the Treasurer of the Seminary for the support of the Professor.

Resolved, 6. That there is no necessity for a lingering and feeble infancy to this Institution; but the interests of the Seminary, the cause of Christ and the ability of the churches, all demand that the Seminary shall be fully and speedily endowed.

Resolved, 7. That we recommend it to our churches to aid yet more, according to the ability which God has given them, in the permanent endowment, and that the Professors be requested to present the claims of the Seminary to our churches as they may have opportunity.

Action of West Lexington Presbytery, April 20, 1856.

The Committee appointed to take into consideration the present position and wants of the Danville Theological Seminary, reported the following resolutions, which were adopted:

1. *Resolved,* That the success which has thus far attended that enterprise, exceeds what could have been reasonably anticipated; and should be regarded (especially by the Presbyterian people of Kentucky) as a distinct call of the Great Head of the Church upon all its friends, to unite in a vigorous and an immediate effort to complete the endowment, and thus make the Institution at once efficient in the highest degree, and worthy of the great interests which it represents.

2. *Resolved,* That it is the deliberate sense of this Presbytery, that the present Professors of the Danville Seminary have done their work ably and faithfully, and that the whole Presbyterian Church owes them a debt of profound gratitude for the sacrifices they have made and the labours they have endured in so successfully conducting the Institution through the first full period of its existence—performing, with the teacher of Hebrew, the work of four competent men.

3. *Resolved,* That in the judgment of the Presbytery it would be manifestly unwise and ungenerous in the friends of the Danville Seminary to allow the present Professors longer to bear the burdens which the necessity of its infancy have hitherto imposed upon them; and we hereby formally and distinctly recognize the propriety (and considering the complete condition at the present time of similar institutions of the Church) the necessity of appointing immediately at least one additional professor; and we instruct our Commissioners to the next General Assembly to use all diligence to effect this object.

Resolved, 4. That to remove every obstacle in the way of securing the services of an additional Professor, we pledge ourselves individually, and our churches, so far as we can assume any obligation in their behalf, to raise from year to year not less than four hundred dollars towards the support of the new Professor, until the chair shall have been endowed; and it shall be the duty of church sessions to report annually to Presbytery what has been done within their respective churches in this cause.

Resolved, 5. Should the Synod of Kentucky be disappointed in her just expectations of aid in the endowment of a Seminary under the care of the General Assembly, and designed for the common benefit of the Church; should the pledges and promises, express and implied, made by brethren and judicatories in other parts of the Church, fail to be fulfilled;

Resolved, 6. That it is for the interest and would be to the just renown of the eldest of our Western Synods, to complete the endowment herself; and we hereby pledge ourselves to the other Presbyteries of Synod, should she be abandoned by all others in this common and sacred cause, to co-operate with them in a manly and earnest effort to effect this great purpose.

To carry out the fourth resolution Presbytery recommends to the churches under its care, to raise as soon as practicable at least three times the amount of their present Presbyterial assessment, and to forward the same to the Treasurer of the Seminary at Danville.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE DANVILLE THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

DANVILLE, Ky., April 29th, 1856.

On the 9th of May, 1854, this Board of Trustees made its *First Report* to the General Assembly. It will be found on pp. 221-4, of the printed Minutes of that year. In that Report the entire funds and property of this Seminary are stated at \$76,868; consisting at that time of certain bonds and stocks, but mainly of individual notes and subscriptions, which had been put at the disposal of the Assembly by the Synod of Kentucky; or had been taken up by a special effort in Kentucky, within the year preceding the said Report to the Assembly; and the whole was designed to form a part of the endowment of this Seminary; and to be used in its support until an adequate and permanent endowment could be secured. All this had occurred with relation to, and most of it after the action of the Assembly of 1853, in the establishment of this Seminary.

The *Second* Report of this Board of Trustees to the Assembly, is dated April 25th, 1855, and was made to the Assembly of that year; it will be found on its printed Minutes, p. 339. That second Report did not enter into a detailed statement of the funds and property of the Seminary; but made special reference to the Report of the preceding year, and a general statement of the plans and operations since the first Report was made, and of its purposes and hopes for the future.

It is the design of this Report to state, in a clear and detailed manner, the exact condition and amount, at this time, of all the property and funds of the Seminary; having reference, all the while, to the original Report of this Board in 1854, to which particular attention is invited, in order to a perfect understanding of the subject.

This sum, it will be observed, is many thousand dollars more than the largest sum for which Kentucky was pledged to the General Assembly of 1853, conditionally and in consequence of the pledges of the General Assembly itself. It is somewhat greater than the sum reported by this Board to the Assembly of 1854, in its first annual Report; although in the meantime, the expenses of the Seminary for three years, amounting to \$10,500 have been borne; the expenses of all agencies have been paid; and the whole fund held, has been either collected and invested, or reduced to individual notes and bonds. Nothing could more clearly prove the moderation, the justice and the truth of the statements which have been heretofore made by this Board to the Assembly; and nothing could more distinctly show how sound the immense subscriptions were, which were given by the people of Kentucky to endow this Seminary. Perhaps, too, the Board of Trustees owes it to that part of its members as well as to its officers and agents, who have had the chief part in conducting so great an interest, through so great difficulties to such a result, to express the deep sense it entertains of their energy, fidelity and skill.

There will, no doubt be considerable difficulty as well as delay, in making a clean collection and a permanent investment of the large outstanding debt due from individuals to the Seminary; and after all that can be done the uncertainty of human affairs makes it nearly impossible to avoid an ultimate loss more or less considerable. Moreover it is to

be remembered that the real estate of the Seminary, set down at \$9,000, of which \$5,000 worth were given to it, is wholly unproductive at present; and that ultimately heavy expenses must be incurred in the erection of suitable and permanent buildings for the accommodation of the Institution. Besides this, the sum of \$1,900, which appears under the third division of the preceding statement, as "Rail-road and Turnpike stocks, given to the Seminary," does not at present produce any income. Add the further fact, that the interest payable on the notes and bonds of individuals, in which so large a part of our funds still consist, cannot be collected with regularity, nor without considerable expense. All these considerations place the whole matter of reliable income in such a position, that this Board of Trustees is confident, and so report to the General Assembly, that while the sum of \$4,000 a year, may with good management and good fortune, be relied on as a yearly income from the present funds of the Seminary, no greater yearly amount can be expected from them, or can be expended for some time to come, without consuming a portion of the principal of the fund itself. That sum pays the salaries of two Professors, at \$1,500 each, and of an assistant teacher at \$1,000; which is the present corps of instructors in the Seminary.

The Board of Directors of the Seminary will, no doubt, report fully to the Assembly the late action of the Presbyteries in Kentucky, which has resulted in their undertaking to raise on certain conditions and for a limited period, an annual sum sufficient for the support of another instructor, who shall be additional to those already connected with the Seminary, and who shall be a full Professor. It will be recollected that the General Assembly of 1853, (Minutes p. 445,) appointed a committee of which Dr. William L. Breckinridge was chairman, to take charge of the endowment of this Seminary, and report to the Assembly from year to year. Under date of the 17th of May, 1854, that Committee reported to the Assembly, that more than \$70,000 had been secured to the Seminary by a voluntary and unpaid agency in Kentucky; that the Synod of Nashville had engaged to raise \$25,000 in addition, and had instituted an agency for that work; and that the Legislature of Kentucky had created by charter, a Board of Trustees for the Seminary, with ample powers. Under these circumstances, the Committee of endowment asked the Assembly to discharge them, and to commit the further work of endowment to the Trustees of the Seminary. (Minutes of 1854, p. 224.) Upon the recommendation of the Assembly's Committee on Seminaries, these suggestions of the standing Committee for the endowment of this Seminary, were approved, and the unfinished part of that work was turned over to this Board of Trustees. (Minutes of 1854, p. 42.) The Assembly of 1854, also approved the "*Plan of the Danville Seminary*," and directed it to be officially certified, and transmitted to the Board of Directors; the Plan itself had been reported by a Committee, of which Dr. J. C. Young was Chairman, appointed for that very purpose by the Assembly of 1853. (Minutes of 1853, p. 445—Minutes of 1854, p. 42.) This *Plan* devotes a whole chapter (the Fifth) to Boards of Trustees and Funds; and while the Assembly authorized all three of the Boards of Trustees, whose most valuable charters were put at its service in Kentucky, to go on at their discretion and collect additional funds for the benefit of the Danville Theological Seminary; it did at the same time, especially charge this particular Board of Trustees with this vital obligation; and did, in addition, make a distinct enumeration of the objects to be immediately aimed at. The very first of these is, *the current support of the Seminary on an effective basis*. (Plan, pp. 22-3.) Thus empowered and thus urged by the Assembly itself, upon the presentation of the First Annual Report in 1854, it was not without reason that this Board felt itself called on, in its Second Annual Report to that venerable court in 1855, to set forth the causes which had prevented it for a whole year, from making any further effort at new collections in Kentucky, and any efforts at all out of that State; an omission altogether temporary, and approved by the Assembly itself. (Minutes of 1855, p. 289, and p. 339.)

It is now about a year since this Board of Trustees has commenced in earnest to lay its plans with a view to a persistent effort to complete the endowment of this Seminary, at least to the extent of providing it with a full corps of Instructors, and with such additions to its Library as the wants of the Professors and Students demanded; designing at the same time to follow the indications of Providence in securing, if it were possible, the further objects to which our attention has been especially directed by the Assembly, to wit, funds for the erection of permanent and suitable buildings, funds to aid in the support of indigent students, &c. (Plan, p. 22.) We did not think that it was right, nor did it seem to us that the General Assembly could approve our conduct, if we should make a new appeal to the Christians of Kentucky, before giving other portions of the Church a fair opportunity of doing their part in a work in which the whole Church had

embarked, and to which the whole Church was committed. The Synod of Kentucky had given to the General Assembly more than \$27,000 for the use of this Seminary; funds collected by that Synod for ministerial education, before the Assembly established this Seminary. That Synod had also granted to the Assembly the complete use of two charters held by it—both of them of the greatest value—and had, still further, granted free of all charge, and in perpetuity, the entire advantages of the Centre College of Kentucky to the pupils of this Seminary established by the Assembly. And the Presbyterian people of Kentucky, in the same generous spirit which actuated their Synod, had given about \$50,000 in sound subscriptions, and had given two of their Pastors occupying positions of the greatest importance, to the immense labour and risk of practically founding, what the Assembly had ordained, and Kentucky had that far endowed. We did certainly feel that the time had come for other pledges to be redeemed, and other portions of the Church to contribute of their abundance to this general work. We made the effort in good faith, and with strong confidence of success. We made it in various ways; over wide regions of country; with repetition increasing in earnestness for the greater part of the past year. *We have totally failed.* Pressed by so great a misfortune, nevertheless two most important results have followed that failure. In the *first* place, a new appeal to the Presbyteries of Kentucky, based on that failure, was made; the noble response has been already stated to be their resolve to ask the Assembly to appoint an additional Professor, and their pledge to support him temporarily. In the *second* place, this appeal to the Assembly, for further and effective action, promotive of the further and adequate endowment of the Seminary—which we now distinctly make. What we desire the Assembly to do, is to make such an expression of its sense of the relation in which this Seminary stands to the Church and to the Assembly, and of the duty of the Church towards this Seminary, as will secure to us the same sort of access to Presbyterian Congregations everywhere in our connection, as have been possessed by the managers of all other causes, distinctly under the direct control and immediate authority of the Assembly. If the Assembly does not consider this Seminary, as at present organized and controlled, worthy of such an effort to establish it, let the Assembly exert its complete power over it, and place it in such a position, as will justify such a proceeding as we ask for on its part. If it believes there is no moral objection of this sort in existence, then let the Institution have the benefit of such an authoritative action of the Assembly, as will at least give us the same sort of access to those whose charity we need, as has been enjoyed under favour of the power and good-will of the Assembly, by other great interests which it seeks to promote, including both the Seminaries previously established by it. What we expect to secure, by means of such an action on the part of the Assembly as we desire, would be a general, but not excessive contribution from the churches of our denomination, so far as the Christian people were willing, under those circumstances, to contribute to this object; by means of which, the comparatively moderate sum of money needed for the complete endowment of this Seminary, could be raised in a reasonable time.

That the action which we have ventured to urge that the Assembly should take, additional to what it has hitherto done, though less than it has done heretofore for the other two Seminaries established by it, may, under the blessing of God and the liberality of the Church, be found sufficient, if wisely and energetically pursued, is, we think, reasonably to be expected. We have, on that account, the more carefully endeavoured to convey to the Assembly our impression of the actual posture of the great interests at stake here, and of the particular method, which seems to us at once simple and effective, for their present relief and permanent security.

The career of this Institution has been very extraordinary. Three months before the Assembly founded it, no one, perhaps, had any idea of its ever existing here. When it was first suggested, no one had any idea how it could be supported; yet, within a few months, between seventy and eighty thousand dollars were subscribed for its support. Up to the moment the course of instruction actually commenced, no one knew certainly that it would have a single student; yet its prosperity in that respect has been wholly unprecedented. Beginning with only individual subscriptions for its fund, at the end of its third year, its successful efforts to collect, invest, and consolidate those subscriptions, leave it better off than when it began, having paid its way by the skilful management of so strange an endowment, and having in the meantime put that endowment into a safe and productive form. It has been, apparently, always in the most perilous condition—and yet has always escaped every peril, and seemed to gain new strength amidst every new danger. And now this last danger which seemed greater than all—appears almost ready to vanish: for the prompt and generous action of the Kentucky Presbyteries secures the temporary support of another Professor, and the Assembly has it completely in its

power, to open to its plea a free access to all the churches of our denominations, thus ensuring the early completion of its permanent endowment. At every step, the particular blessing of God has been indispensably necessary, and has been signally bestowed: at every crisis everything has been in peril, yet every crisis has brought a signal triumph. We who have not only seen all this continually from the beginning until now, but have been obliged to endure the responsibility attached to such a state of things, may be allowed the more emphatically to express our confidence, that after so many interpositions, God will assuredly, and in one way or another, bring to pass the objects, for the sake of which he has thus dealt with the great work which his Church has been endeavouring to establish here, to the glory of his name.

SPECIAL PRAYER FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

In the Minutes of the General Assembly for the year 1821, is the following important rule, which was adopted by the Assembly.

“An overture from the Synod of North Carolina was received and read, and is as follows, viz.

“Whereas, the General Assembly is the highest and most important judicatory of the Presbyterian Church: and whereas, to obtain the divine blessing on that judicatory, must appear to every Christian of our denomination to be a matter of the utmost moment; therefore,

“Resolved, That the Synod do respectfully suggest to the General Assembly the propriety of recommending to all the churches under their care, to observe, annually, *the afternoon or evening previous to the meeting of that body*, as a season of special prayer to Almighty God for his blessing; that he would of his infinite mercy, condescend to superintend and direct all their measures, deliberations, and decisions; so that all may redound to the promotion of his own glory, and the general prosperity of that particular Church to which we belong.”

THE STATED CLERKS OF PRESBYTERIES

Are earnestly requested,

1. To make their Annual Reports to the Assembly, if they have no printed blanks, after the form on the following page, 585. Blanks can always be obtained gratis on application to the Stated Clerk.

2. To make their Reports in fair, distinct writing, especially the columns of figures.

3. To make them as accurate and full as possible. If, in any instance, churches do not report to Presbyteries, it is desirable that their number of communicants should be inserted from their last report.

4. To report *no cents*. The Assembly has so ordered. If therefore they are reported, the Stated Clerk of the Assembly is obliged to throw them out altogether, or to incorporate them with the dollars. This costs him a serious amount of labour, to which he ought not to be subjected.

5. To *add up* each column of figures with care. Many still neglect this, and thus oblige the Clerk of the Assembly to do what they should do themselves.

6. To append to the statistics of Presbyteries a brief account of changes which have occurred during the year, such as the *number* of licensures, ordinations, installations, dismissions of pastors, organization of new churches, and the names of ministers deceased.

7. To transmit their Reports to the Stated Clerk, either at the meeting of the Assembly, or to Philadelphia, not later than the first day of June.

The Assembly, in order to simplify its statistical tables, and to render them more full and accurate as to the contributions of the churches for religious purposes, recommended:

For Domestic Missions; to include all moneys collected for the purpose, whether for the Boards, or any of the judicatories of the Church. 2. Foreign Missions; including all moneys for that purpose. 3. Education; including all that is given for the education of candidates for the ministry; for Theological Seminaries; Presbyterian colleges, academies, parochial, and Sabbath schools. 4. Publication; all moneys for the Board of Publication, and for Synodical and Presbyterial depositaries, and colportage. 5. Church Extension; all the moneys for that purpose. 6. Presbyterial; to include Commissioners' and Contingent Funds, and contributions for the support of aged ministers. 7. Congregational; all moneys contributed for the congregation, as pastors' salaries, building and repairing churches, liquidation of debts, and current expenses. 8. Miscellaneous; including all other collections.

To the Trustees of the Board of Missions of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and to their successors and assigns, I give and bequeath the sum of _____, or I devise a certain messuage, and tract of land, &c., to be held by the said Trustees, and their successors for ever, to and for the uses, and under the direction of the said Board of Missions of the said General Assembly, according to the provisions of their charter.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

I give and devise to the Trustees of the Board of Education of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, the sum of _____, to be applied by said Board to the Education of pious and indigent young men for the gospel ministry.

BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

To the Trustees of the Presbyterian Board of Publication, and to their successors and assigns, I give and bequeath the sum of _____, or I devise a certain messuage and tract of land, &c., to be held by the said Trustees and their successors for ever, to and for the uses and under the direction of the said Board of Publication, according to the provisions of their charter.

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
