NEW ORLEANS, LA., MAY 6, 1858.

THE General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America met, according to appointment, in the First Presbyterian Church in the city of New Orleans, on Thursday, the 6th of May, A. D. 1858; and was opened with a sermon by the Rev. Cortlandt Van Rensselaer, D. D., Moderator of the last Assembly, from 2 Cor. xiii. 11—"Be of one mind, live in peace, and the God of love and peace shall be with you."

After the sermon, the Moderator proceeded to constitute the sessions with prayer.

The Stated Clerk informed the Assembly that the Permanent Clerk was prevented from arriving previously to the opening of the session, by the non-arrival of the steamer, in which he had embarked at New York, and the Rev. B. M. Palmer was appointed in his place, *pro tem*.

The Stated Clerk then reported that the following persons had been duly appointed, and were enrolled as Commissioners to this General Assembly, viz.

He also reported a list of persons who appeared with commissions imperfectly attested, and some without any commission. A Committee on Elections was therefore appointed, consisting of Messrs. Dumont, Elias Harrison, and Gamble, to whom these and other similar cases were committed.

The Stated Clerk announced that he had received information of the organization of the following Synods, in accordance with the action of the last General Assembly; viz. the Synod of Upper Missouri, and that of Southern Iowa; and also of the organization of the Presbytery of Highland, under the order of the last Assembly; and of that of Platte by the Synod of Missouri.

Mr. Dumont of the Committee on Elections, reported that the Committee had received satisfactory evidence that the following persons had been appointed Commissioners to this General Assembly, and recommended that they be admitted to seats: viz. John W. Grier, minister from the Presbytery of New Castle; John F. Cowan, minister from the Presbytery of St. Louis; Michael H. Bittinger, minister from the Presbytery of Greenbriar; Richard V. Shanklin, ruling elder from the Presbytery of Greenbriar; W. A. Scott, minister from the Presbytery of California; L. C. Long, minister from the Presbytery of Sidney; D. G. Doak, minister from the Presbytery of North Mississippi; Robt. Marshall, ruling elder from the Presbytery of Madison; Wm. C. Lewis, ruling elder from the Presbytery of Lexington; Wm. Bishop, minister from the Presbytery of Madison; S. W. Doak, minister from the Presbytery of Holston; P. R. Bland, minister from the Presbytery of Memphis; Laurens Reeve, ruling elder from the Presbytery of Nassau; Samuel Wherry, ruling elder from the Presbytery of Carlisle.

The report was adopted, and the said Commissioners enrolled.

The Committee on Elections also reported, that they had satisfactory proof that it was the wish of the Presbytery of Allahabad, in Northern India, that the Rev. L. G. Hay should represent said Presbytery in the General Assembly, but that on account of the rebellion in India, and consequent confusion, the Presbytery had not held a formal election; and the Committee refer the case to the Assembly.

On motion, it was ordered that he be admitted to a seat, and his name was accordingly enrolled.

The Assembly proceeded to the election of a Moderator; and before the announcement of the vote, there being three candidates, it was on motion,

Ordered, That in this, and all subsequent elections by this Assembly, a majority of all the votes given shall be necessary to a choice.

It was also ordered, that in this election of Moderator, after the first ballot, the person having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped.

The Rev. William A. Scott, of the Presbytery of California, having received a majority of all the votes given, was declared duly elected Moderator, and assumed the Chair.

The Rev. D. X. Junkin, having received a majority of all the votes given, was chosen Temporary Clerk.

It was on motion,

Ordered, That the business sessions of the Assembly begin at nine o'clock, A. M., each day, and continue to half-past two o'clock, P. M., and that the Assembly will attend a devotional meeting from eight to nine o'clock, A. M., under the conduct of the Moderator.

It was made the order of the day for to-morrow morning at ten o'clock, to receive the annual reports of the several Boards of the General Assembly.

It was on motion ordered that 750 copies of the roll be printed for the use of the members.

Communications from the Mercantile Library Association of the city of New Orleans, and the Young Men's Christian Association, were read, tendering to the General Assembly the hospitalities of their Halls, and the free use of their Libraries and News-rooms.

And, on motion, the invitations were accepted, and the thanks of the Assembly tendered to these Associations respectively, for their courtesy.

After which the Assembly adjourned.

Closed with prayer by the Moderator.

FRIDAY, MAY 7th, 8 o'clock, A. M.

After an hour spent in devotional exercises, according to the order appointed, the Assembly was opened with prayer by the Moderator. The minutes of the preceding day were read, amended, and approved.

On motion of Dr. Breckinridge, the use of titles to the names of the members, whether ministers or ruling elders, was ordered to be expunged from the roll, and discontinued in the remaining records of this Assembly.

Resolved, That the time for the centennial celebration, proposed by the last General Assembly, of the reunion of the Synods of New York and Philadelphia, be fixed for Wednesday next, May 12th, at ten o'clock, A. M., and that the order of exercises for the occasion be referred to the Committee on Devotional Exercises.

On motion of James Hoge, it was

Resolved, That it be the order of the day, for Saturday next, at ten o'clock, A. M., to hear the report of the standing Committee on the Board of Domestic Missions; Monday next, that of the Committee on the Board of Foreign Missions; Tuesday next, that on the Board of Education; Thursday next, Publication; and Friday next, that on Church Extension.

On motion of R. J. Breckinridge, the time for the consideration of these reports, respectively, was limited to two hours for each.

The order of the day for ten o'clock was then taken up, and the Secretaries of the various Boards presented their reports, for the examination of the respective Committees, and for distribution, in whole or in part, among the members. The reports from Theological Seminaries being called for, those from the Seminary at Danville, and the Union Theological Seminary, were presented; and subsequently one from the Directors of the Western Theological Seminary, for reference to the proper Committee.

A report from the Trustees of the General Assembly on the funds for disabled ministers was presented, and referred to the Committee on Systematic Benevolence.

On motion of J. Eagleson, it was made the order of the day for to-morrow (Saturday) at nine o'clock, A. M., to receive Narratives, Statistical Reports from the Presbyteries, and Synodical Records, for reference to the proper committees.

On motion of R. J. Breckinridge, the Permanent Clerk was instructed to select the items of business, referred by the last General Assembly, and place them at the head of the docket, for this Assembly.

On motion of S. C. Logan, the Assembly then proceeded to appoint the place and the time for the meeting of the next General Assembly.

The First Church in the city of Pittsburgh was nominated by David McKinney; the Seventh Church in the city of Cincinnati, by S. C. Logan; the Third Church in the city of Indianapolis, by David Stevenson; and the First Church in the city of Rochester, by Charles Ray.

On calling the roll, twenty-one votes were given for Pittsburgh; twenty-four for Cincinnati; twenty-two for Rochester; and one hundred and forty-nine for Indianapolis.

It was thereupon

Resolved, That the next General Assembly be called to meet in the Third Church of the city of Indianapolis, Indiana, on the third Thursday of May, 1859, at eleven o'clock, A. M.

After a recess of fifteen minutes, the following resolution was offered by J. Eagleson, viz.

Resolved, That Overture No. 5, respecting the alterations made by the American Bible Society, and the publication of the Bible by the Board of Publication, which was referred by the last General Assembly to this, be taken up and read, and referred to a committee, with instructions to draft and report a minute expressive of the views of this Assembly on these subjects, in reference to the claims of the American Bible Society on our churches.

This resolution was adopted, so far as to have that Overture read; and,

On motion of R. J. Breckinridge, the further consideration of it was made the second order of the day for Monday next.

A report from John Woodbridge, Delegate of the last General Assembly to the General Synod of the Reformed Dutch Church, was read and accepted.

A letter from G. Fisch, "President *pro tem.* of the *Commission Synodale* of the Free Church of France," was read, and referred to the Committee on Foreign Correspondence.

On motion of A. H. Dumont, the Assembly reconsidered the order of yesterday, respecting the time for devotional exercises in the morning; and it was

Resolved, That for the remaining sessions the meeting shall be convened at half-past eight o'clock, and devotional exercises continued half an hour.

B. M. Palmer, from the Committee on Devotional Exercises, reported, in part, arrangements for the annual address on behalf of the Presbyterian

Historical Society, this evening, by George Howe, Professor in the Theological Seminary at Columbia.

The report was approved.

It was then

Resolved, That the order respecting the hour of adjournment be suspended, for this day.

And the Assembly adjourned, to meet to-morrow, at nine o'clock, A. M.

Closed with prayer, by S. C. Logan.



SATURDAY, MAY 8th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The General Assembly, having engaged for half an hour in singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer, was formally constituted and called to business by the Moderator.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

On motion of James Hoge, the resolution of a preceding Assembly, to discontinue the impersonal mode of keeping the Minutes, was modified and explained, so far as to dispense with the names of members who merely participate in the discussion, inserting the names only of the movers, in recording the actual proceedings.

The following additional Commissioners appeared, and were enrolled: C. Foster Williams and J. Franklin Ford, ministers; Barton A. Jenks, John Stuart, and Warwick Tunstall, ruling elders.

It was, on motion, granted to the Moderator, that he may, at his own discretion, appoint another to preside over the Assembly during the half hour of devotional exercises.

The order of the day for nine o'clock was then taken up; and Narratives, Statistical Reports, Reports on Systematic Benevolence, and Synodical Records, were called for, and referred, in the usual order.

The order of the day for ten o'clock was then taken up—the Report of the Board of Domestic Missions, and that of the Standing Committee thereon.

The Secretary, G. W. Musgrave, presented a printed report, with accompanying remarks, which was distributed by tellers to the members.

The Standing Committee then reported, through their Chairman, D. McKinney, a series of resolutions; the first, second and third of which were adopted.

The fourth being read, was amended, on motion of George Hill, so as to connect it verbally with the fifth.

Another amendment was moved by R. J. Breckinridge, to strike out a part of the resolution.

Pending the discussion of this motion, another was made and carried, to recommit this portion of the report to the same Committee.

B. M. Palmer, from the Committee on Devotional Exercises, made a report, which was approved.

The Assembly then took a recess of fifteen minutes.

When called to order again, A. H. Dumont, from the Committee on Elections, reported that I. S. K. Axson, bishop, and Thomas R. R. Cobb, ruling elder, from the Presbytery of Hopewell, had appeared with informal commissions, and recommended that they be admitted to seats; the informality having been satisfactorily explained.

The report was adopted, and these Commissioners were enrolled accordingly.

The Rev. J. M. Young, delegate from the Associate Reformed Synod of the South, addressed the Assembly, and presented the fraternal greeting of the body he represented; and the Moderator replied with tender of welcome, and assurances of reciprocal confidence and love.

C. Van Rensselaar, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, reported Overture No. 1, a request from the Presbytery of West Hanover, to change the time of meeting of the Synod of Virginia, recommending that the request be granted, and that the time of meeting, in the town of Charlottesville, be changed from the 20th of October to the 3d of November next, at 12 o'clock, M.

This report was adopted, and the change accordingly ordered.

Overture No. 2, from the Presbytery of Memphis, to "change the boundary line between the Synods of Nashville and Memphis, so that the Presbyterian church in Savannah, Hardin county, Tennessee, situated on the east bank of the Tennessee river, and within the ecclesiastical bounds of the Presbytery of Tusculum, and Synod of Nashville, may be within the bounds of the Synod and Presbytery of Memphis."

The Committee recommend that the petition be granted, and that the boundary lines of the Synods of Nashville and Memphis be so altered as to include the church at Savannah, Tennessee, within the bounds of the Synod of Memphis. Adopted.

Overture No. 3, a request from the Rev. William C. Mosher, of the Presbytery of Stockton, to be transferred from said Presbytery, which is at present without a quorum of attending members, to the Presbytery of Michigan, within the bounds of which he has, in the Providence of God, been called to labour.

The recommendation of the Committee that the request be granted, was adopted.

Overture No. 5, from the Presbytery of Palestine, to be transferred from the Synod of Indiana to the Synod of Illinois, due notice having been given by said Presbytery to both Synods.

The Committee recommend that the petition be granted, and that the Presbytery of Palestine be, and hereby is, transferred from the Synod of Indiana to the Synod of Illinois. Adopted.

Overture No. 6, from the Presbytery of Knoxville, asking that the Psalms of David, in Rouse's version, or in such other version as the Associate Reformed Synod of the South may prefer, be published in the front part of our present Hymn Books, provided that such a procedure be agreeable and satisfactory to said Synod.

The Committee recommend that no action be taken on the subject at the present time. Adopted.

Overture No. 7, a petition from the Presbytery of Lake Superior in relation to its boundary lines, and also a petition from certain members, stating that the Presbytery had been dissolved by the death of the Rev. T. R. Elder, one of its members.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the Presbytery of Lake Superior be re-constituted, and shall consist of the following ministers and churches.—Rev. J. Irwin Smith, and Rev. J. M. Barnett, ministers of the former Presbytery of Superior, and Rev. Wm. B. McKee, of the Presbytery of Allegheny City, together with the churches of Ontonagon, Superior, Sault St. Marie, and Bayfield.

Resolved, 2. That the boundaries of the Presbytery of Lake Superior be the following, viz.—To commence at the St. Mary's river, and follow the 46" parallel of latitude west to the 93d degree of longitude, thence north along said meridian to the boundary line between the United States and

Canada, and thence east along that line to Lake Superior, and the point of beginning.

Resolved, 3. That Rev. J. Irwin Smith be appointed to preach the opening sermon, and preside until a Moderator be chosen; and that the first meeting of the Presbytery be at Ontonagon, on the first Wednesday of August next.

Resolved, 4. That the Presbytery of Lake Superior be connected with the Synod of Wisconsin.

Adopted.

On motion of J. Eagleson, it was made the order of the day for Thursday next, after that for ten o'clock, A. M., to receive the reports of Committees on Synodical records.

The thanks of the Assembly were voted unanimously to the steamboat and railroad companies which have extended to the members the favour of a free return passage, or reduction of fare over their several lines. Also, to the Board of Directors of the First District Public Schools in this city, for an invitation to visit the schools, and use the Public School Library.

A report from the Committee appointed by the General Assembly of 1856, and continued by that of 1857, to confer with one from the Associate Reformed Synod of the South, respecting a closer union of the two bodies, was received and read; and, on motion accepted.

It was moved by Pierpont E. Bishop, that the committee be continued; and that it be enlarged according to a request in the close of the report.

It was moved, as a substitute, by R. J. Breckinridge, that the committee be discharged from the further prosecution of the object, and that the report be printed in the Appendix to the Minutes.

It was then moved by James Hoge, to amend this substitute, by adding as a reason, that the object is deemed impracticable, without a sacrifice of principle, and danger to the edification of the Church.

It was then moved by J. Eagleson, that the report be referred to a committee, to report a minute expressive of the views of the Assembly on the subject.

Pending a discussion on this motion, the hour for adjournment arrived.

On motion of C. Van Rensselaer, the adjournment was postponed, in order to have a communication read, from a Committee of "the United Synod of the Presbyterian Church," organized in Knoxville, Tennessee, on the 2d of April last.

The paper being read, was put on the docket.

And the Assembly then adjourned, to meet on Monday morning, at half-past eight o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by Alexander T. Rankin.

MONDAY, MAY 10th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly met, and was formally constituted for business, with prayer by the Moderator, after half an hour of engagement in singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer.

The minutes of the preceding day (Saturday) were read and approved.

The following additional Commissioners appeared, and were entered on the roll:—Francis McMurray, L. C. Spofford, and J. A. Smylie, ministers; and John P. Kingsbury, ruling elder.

George Howe, from the Judicial Committee, reported Case No. 1. A

complaint of the Rev. James P. Fisher against the action of the Synod of Albany, in the case of the Rev. George H. Thatcher.

This report was accepted; and a motion was made for its adoption.

Pending a discussion of this motion, the order of the day for ten o'clock was called.

R. L. Stanton, from the Standing Committee on the Board of Foreign Missions, presented a report.

Addresses were made by the Secretary, Walter Lowrie, and others, until the expiration of the time to which the consideration of the report was limited, by a general resolution; when,

On motion of James Hoge, that rule was suspended for this occasion.

The Assembly then took a recess of fifteen minutes.

After which, the missionaries, Lawrence G. Hay and John Edwards, and other members, addressed the Assembly, on a motion to adopt the report of the Committee.

This motion was then carried unanimously; and the report is as follows, viz.

The Committee, to whom was referred the Annual Report of the Board of Foreign Missions, beg leave to report:

That they have had under consideration the important matters referred to them, and find, in the events of the last missionary year, causes of profound gratitude and thanksgiving, as well as of deep humiliation and sorrow.

The last year opened with prospects never more encouraging since the commencement of our foreign missionary operations, whether we regard the number of missionaries sent out, the whole number sustained in the field, their general health and prosperity, or the blessing of God upon their efforts in the several departments of labour into which the missionary work is divided; and although last year the Board reported a debt of over eleven thousand dollars, this was rapidly diminished by the prompt liberality of the churches, the example being set by a special contribution made at the time in the General Assembly.

But the year now drawn to a close, presents some features in painful contrast with the encouraging aspects at its commencement. The commercial revulsion which has passed over the country, has fallen heavily upon the churches, and seriously affected the various causes of benevolence. The Sepoy mutiny in India resulted in the violent death of eight missionaries, and two of their children, and in the destruction of a large amount of mission property. Five missionary labourers have died in other parts of the field, over against two of last year. The work continues suspended at one of the principal stations in China. And a considerable number of missionary labourers have withdrawn from the field, either temporarily or permanently, on account of enfeebled health.

These unfavourable events, however, have, we trust, been overruled by a wise Providence for greater good to the Church, and greater glory to her divine Head. While the commercial pressure has crippled other causes of benevolence, the contributions to our Foreign Board, from collections made in the churches, the chief source of permanent reliance, as the Board state, have steadily advanced, and the receipts are larger from this one source by more than six thousand dollars, than in any former year; and the ratio of increase is believed to be greater than that of the Church itself. This is especially gratifying, when it is known that the Board rely, for congregational collections, wholly upon the coöperation of the pastors and sessions of the churches, the Board not having employed the cumbrous machinery of

agents for five years past. It is also cause of devout thanksgiving to God, that, while four mission families in India were destroyed, a visitation which should cause earnest searchings of heart among all Christ's people, as it has filled the whole land with mourning, the great body of missionaries and their families were preserved. And while it is matter of wonder and thanksgiving that so few perished, when we consider the perils which environed them, it is worthy of special praise to the Head of the Church, that, though under fierce persecution, some native converts yielded for a time to the power of Satan, yet Christ's abounding grace prevented, so far as is known, any final apostasy among them, while the most of native converts, and among them those most widely known to the Christian world, preserved an unwavering fidelity to their Master. Another favourable bearing of these mournful events in the experience of the Church abroad, is seen in the fact, that they seem to have deeply humbled the Church at home, and to have led her to earnest supplication at the throne of grace; and we have reason to believe that this may have been, under God, a proximate cause of the mighty outpouring of the Holy Spirit in our land, and upon the Church, which has followed, and which is destined to be felt in all Christian lands, and far into the heathen world.

In view of this summary of events, of both a painful and an encouraging nature, as gleaned from the Annual Report of the Foreign Board, your Committee recommend the following resolutions to the consideration of the General Assembly, viz.

Resolved, 1. That we are called upon as a Church, through this Supreme Judicatory thereof, to record our especial thanksgivings to God for the favour which he has shown us in this department of the labour, which his providence and grace have committed to our hands. 1. In that, in the midst of an unparalleled monetary disaster, the receipts of our Foreign Board have been larger than in any former year, and this without any agency beyond the regular action of the inferior judicatories of the Church, and the spontaneous offerings of the people. 2. In that, while his hand has been laid heavily upon us in the melancholy death of our beloved brethren in India, the same hand has been stretched out for the deliverance of the great body of our missionaries and their families;—and 3. In that the salutary effect upon the people at large of the death of those who have fallen victims to Mohammedan and Pagan cruelties, in awaking the Church to deeper humiliation, and more earnest prayer for Zion's increase, has so signally illustrated a proverb of primitive times, that "the blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church."

Resolved, 2. That while we are encouraged by the continued liberality of the people in their contributions to Foreign Missions, we feel called upon to admonish the Churches to make even greater sacrifices in this regard, in view of two important considerations, presented in the Annual Report of the Board, viz.—1. That they may repair the great losses sustained in the destruction of the mission property in India, amounting in the aggregate to \$150,000, only \$25,000 of which have been refunded by an assessment of the British government upon the city of Lodiana, under circumstances, however, which do not apply to any other case: and, 2. That the Board may promptly enter, to use their own language, "the new fields for missionary enterprise, in portions of the earth heretofore inaccessible," and that they may improve "the prospective enlargement of the missionary area in those which have heretofore been but partially occupied;" and therefore, we earnestly recommend to all inferior judicatories to take such action as shall bring forth for this cause the united, systematic and generous charities of the Church, until all the tithes shall be brought into the storehouse, and every

member of Christ's body shall faithfully exemplify that grace of the Spirit exhibited in free-will offerings to the Lord's treasury.

Resolved, 3. That we highly approve of the action of the Board in giving the "Foreign Missionary" gratuitous circulation in all our Sabbath-schools, which make contributions to the Board; and that all church sessions be, and they are hereby recommended to aid in this work, that the children of the entire Church may early become interested in the Foreign Missionary cause, and be trained in the duties of an active Christian charity.

Resolved, 4. That the great loss of property sustained by our Board in the Sepoy revolt, is no discouragement to our future work in India, and that it is the manifest duty of the Church at once to repair these desolations; and with this view, while as a general rule, we should rely upon regular and steady rather than special contributions to all our Boards, the General Assembly, under the peculiar circumstances of the present case, earnestly urge upon the churches, and in particular upon individuals whom God has blessed with wealth, contributions to a special fund which the Board is endeavouring to raise for this purpose, now amounting to over \$18,000, which contributions, however, should in no case interfere with the regular collections for the ordinary and progressive operations of the missionary work.

Resolved, 5. That the report of the Board be approved, and referred to the Executive Committee for publication.

It was made the order of the day for Friday next, immediately after that for ten o'clock, A. M., to elect members to fill the vacancies occurring in this Board, and the other Boards of the Church. It was also ordered, that the election for preachers, on behalf of the several Boards, be held at the same time.

The Rev. Talbot W. Chambers, D. D., delegate from the Reformed Dutch Church, appeared with his credentials; and it was made the order of the day for to-morrow, at a quarter of an hour before ten o'clock, to hear him.

The second order of the day was then taken up, Overture No. 5, referred by the last General Assembly, respecting the American Bible Society; the question being on a motion to refer the same to a special Committee.

R. J. Breckinridge asked and obtained leave to offer the following paper, as a minute on the whole subject; and it was, on motion, adopted unanimously, viz.

By a vote of the General Assembly of 1857, an overture to that body, which is printed in its Minutes, pp. 35, 36, relating to the American Bible Society's new standard English Bible, and to the best method of preserving, in its integrity, the common version of the English Bible, was specially referred to the consideration of the present General Assembly. During the year which has intervened, the attention of the Christian public has been diverted to this important subject in a very unusual degree; and so far as this Assembly has the means of judging, it is apparent that the Presbyterian Church throughout the country is decidedly opposed to the line of conduct in the premises pursued by the late Committee on Versions of that Society, and to the circulation by that Society of their new standard English Bible. It is, therefore, matter of great satisfaction to this General Assembly, that the Directors of the American Bible Society have resolved to cease publishing and circulating the aforesaid new standard Bible, and to resume the publication and circulation of the standard English Bible in exclusive use by the Society before the late work of collation and change, commenced about the year 1847. We also cordially approve the further action of the Board of Directors, so far as it secures a more vigilant oversight, in future, of the work of its Committee on Versions, and prevents

any future change, either of the text or its accessories, without the careful consideration and special order of the Board of Directors. With regard to any change whatever, either in the text of the English Version of the Bible, commonly called King James's Version, or in the accessories to that text as they were commonly printed at the formation of the American Bible Society: we do not admit that the said Society has any power or authority to make any alteration in said accessories or said text, except such as appertain to a printer and not to an editor. By the text of King James's Version, we do not mean a copy corrupted by errors and unauthorized changes—no matter where that copy may have been printed, nor how those errors may have occurred, nor who may have ventured to make those changes;—but we mean the true text in English, produced and published after the labours of the translators appointed by King James the First of England, which for nearly two centuries and a half has been the standard Bible of all people speaking the English language, and which the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America is resolved to preserve in its integrity and purity, and to use and circulate. Along with the greater portion of the Christian public in this country, we have confided to the American Bible Society the great work of circulating the English Scriptures, in the version in common use, and while we deeply regret the serious error into which it was betrayed, its recent action, in the premises, demands a cordial response from all the earnest supporters of the great work in which it is engaged. In discharge, therefore, of our duty as the General Assembly of one branch of the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ, to which he has committed his most blessed Word for the guidance and salvation of men, we have made this deliverance. And upon the terms herein set forth, we reiterate our approval of the principles upon which the American Bible Society was founded, our desire to coöperate with our brethren of all Christian denominations, in united efforts to furnish the whole world with the word of God, and our earnest recommendation to our people to give liberally to the support of this good cause.

The regular time having arrived, the Assembly adjourned, to meet to-morrow at 9 o'clock. Closed with prayer, by David Stevenson.

TUESDAY, MAY 11th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly was called to order, and opened for business, with prayer by the Moderator—after the appointed exercises of devotion, for half an hour.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

C. Van Rensselaer, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, reported Overture No. 4, from the Presbytery of White Water, being an application to receive into membership the Rev. J. A. Devine, a foreign minister of the United Presbyterian Church of Canada, who, having spent the requisite time under the care of the Presbytery of Baltimore, although only seven months within their bounds, had been dismissed by that Presbytery to the Presbytery of White Water, and after examination, been received under its care.

The Committee recommend that the rule of the Assembly, requiring a foreign minister to spend a whole year under the care of the Presbytery that desires to receive him into membership, be not suspended in the present case. Adopted.

Overture No. 8, from the Presbytery of Newcastle, to set off all the churches of our connection, in the Peninsula, not already within the bounds of the Presbytery of Newcastle, to that Presbytery.

The Committee recommend that, from want of sufficient information, no action be taken on the subject by this Assembly. Adopted.

Overture No. 9, from the Synods of Texas and Mississippi, for the establishment of a Committee of Domestic Missions in New Orleans.

On motion, this report was put on the docket.

Archibald Gamble, from the Committee on Finance, presented a report, which was also put on the docket.

On motion of William M. Cunningham, the communication of the Committee of the United Presbyterian Synod, held at Knoxville, Tennessee, was taken up from the docket. A motion was made by L. W. Green to refer the whole business to a special committee. An amendment was moved by C. Van Rensselaer, that a committee of three be appointed to meet the Committee of the United Synod of the Presbyterian Church, to ascertain the nature of the terms of union proposed by that body to the General Assembly, and to report the same to the Assembly.

After the discussion of this amendment, which was continued by a vote on motion of C. Van Rensselaer to postpone the order of the day, R. J. Breckinridge offered a paper on the subject, as a minute, for adoption by the Assembly.

A motion was made to adopt this minute, as a substitute for the amendment.

Thomas R. R. Cobb obtained the floor to speak on this motion, and yielded it to a call for the order of the day.

The Rev. Talbot W. Chambers, D. D., delegate from the Reformed Protestant Dutch Church, was then introduced, who addressed the Assembly with fraternal greeting, and assurances of love from the Synod he represented.

The Moderator responded with fraternal reminiscence, and reciprocated confidence and love.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock was then taken up—the Report of the Board of Education, and that of the Standing Committee thereon—when C. Van Rensselaer, the Secretary, briefly addressed the Assembly; and J. Edson Rockwell presented, with accompanying remarks, the report of the Committee; which, after addresses by several members, and an amendment moved by John Edwards, and another by James E. Caruthers, was adopted unanimously, and is as follows:

The Committee to whom has been assigned the review of the work of the Board of Education, would respectfully report:

That while the statement of the results of this important branch of our benevolent operations is full of encouragement, it ought to be impressed upon our pastors and people, that if our Church is to do its part in preaching the gospel to every creature, the work of raising up an educated ministry is but begun. Even in our own land, the increase of candidates for the office of an ambassador for Christ has by no means kept pace with the growing wants of our country; while in foreign lands, hundreds of millions are yet without the living teacher, and must die in ignorance of the way of salvation.

Your Committee would also invite attention to the fact, that while the funds of the Board indicate the unfaltering attachment of the Church to the cause of Christian education, the anticipated withdrawal of one annual donation of five thousand dollars, renders it necessary for the Board to look to

the Church generally for aid in carrying on efficiently the schools which have been mingling religious instruction with the ordinary course of a common education.

The Committee would also report, that they notice with regret the financial embarrassments which still seem to check the progress of the Ashmun Institute, designed for the education of young men of colour, and would express the hope, that by the liberality of our churches that excellent institution, full of encouragement as it is, may be placed on a firm and substantial pecuniary basis, and thus be, in years to come, a source of blessing to the African race.

The Committee would also respectfully ask of the Assembly if, in view of the remarkable outpourings of the Holy Spirit upon our land, in which many of our churches have largely shared, the time has not come for increased and earnest efforts to set before such of our youth as may give indications of usefulness, the duty of consecrating their lives to the work of preaching the gospel. They would in this connection call special attention to that part of the Report which is entitled "Causes of anxiety to young men and candidates," and would express the earnest wish that the considerations there presented, and which they deem of great practical value, may be laid before the youth of our Church.

In conclusion, the Committee would respectfully submit the following resolutions.

Resolved, 1. That the General Assembly record with profound gratitude to God, the abundant tokens of the divine blessing which have attended the efforts of the Board of Education to introduce young men into the ministry, and to aid in the religious instruction of our children and youth, as seen in the unfaltering attachment of our churches to the cause, manifested even during a period of commercial disaster, in the numbers who have already been assisted to enter the gospel ministry, the enlarged number of institutions for Christian education, and the special influences of the Spirit of God, which have been poured out upon many of the Colleges and Schools under the care of this Assembly, or in connection with Synods and Presbyteries of our Church.

Resolved, 2. That the field which now lies before our beloved Church, demanding, as it does, a vast increase of ministers of the word, calls for earnest prayer to the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest, and that the Assembly, while they trust that the cause will be daily remembered by the people of God, recommend the last Thursday of February as a day of special and united prayer for the outpouring of the Spirit upon our Colleges and Seminaries of learning.

Resolved, 3. That in view of the great work which Christ has laid upon his Church to preach the gospel to every creature, it be earnestly enjoined on pastors to set before youth of piety and promise the question of their responsibilities in this matter, and to endeavour so to direct and assist them, as that there shall be an increase of candidates for the gospel ministry, in some measure proportioned to the growing demands of the Church and the world.

Resolved, 4. That this Assembly earnestly urge parents to consecrate their children to the work of extending the kingdom of the Saviour in the earth, train them for it, and, when prepared to enter upon the work, cheerfully to give them up to go wherever God in his providence may call them.

Resolved, 5. That the last Thursday in February next be observed as a day of prayer for the children and youth, especially those collected in

Academies, Colleges, and Seminaries, whether at home or in the foreign field.

Resolved, 6. That the present gratifying condition of the treasury of the Board, encourages this Assembly to believe that the churches are impressed with a sense of the duty of providing for the liberal support and maintenance of indigent young men, desirous of entering the gospel ministry, and authorizes a renewed invitation to such to enter upon the studies necessary to fit them for the duties of such office, with the confident assurance of being sustained by the churches, through this Board.

The Assembly then resumed the unfinished business, respecting the communication from the United Synod, held at Knoxville, Tennessee, the question being on the adoption of the minute offered by R. J. Breckinridge. The discussion was continued till the hour of adjournment; and, on motion, continued half an hour longer, when the Assembly adjourned, to meet tomorrow morning, at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by John F. Cowan.

WEDNESDAY, MAY 12th, 9 o'clock A. M.

The Assembly met, and was constituted with prayer, by the Moderator, after the usual engagement in devotional exercises for half an hour.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

Walter Lowrie offered nominations for a preacher, before the next General Assembly, on behalf of Foreign Missions, principal and alternate. The election to be held on Friday next, as already ordered.

A. H. Dumont, from the Committee on Theological Seminaries, presented a report, which was accepted and put on the docket.

James Holmes, from the Committee to nominate Delegates to Corresponding Bodies, presented a report, which was adopted; and is as follows, viz.

Rev. L. W. Green, as principal, and Rev. J. Leroy Halsey, alternate, to the General Synod of the Reformed Dutch Church.

Rev. George Howe, as principal, and Rev. J. H. Thornwell, alternate, to the Associate Reformed Synod of the South.

On motion of John F. Cowan, Judicial Case No. 3, was taken up, and the report of the Committee was adopted, and is as follows:

The Judicial Committee report Judicial case No. 3, being the complaint of E. N. Sawyer and others, against the decision of the Synod of Chicago, in the case of O. M. Hoagland, as being fallen from by the failure of the complainants to appear and prosecute their complaint. They, therefore, recommend that the complaint be dismissed, and that Mr. Hoagland be considered as entitled to all his former rights and privileges in the Church of Hopewell.

The Assembly then proceeded to the centennial commemoration of the accession of the Synods of New York and Philadelphia, May 1758, according to the appointment of the last General Assembly, and the special arrangement of the Committee on Devotional Exercises. The Moderator presided, and read the Scriptures. C. Van Rensselaer delivered the address; and James Hoge, and R. J. Breckinridge, assisted in the devotional exercises, the former preceding, and the latter following the speaker, in prayer.

On motion of R. J. Breckinridge, it was referred to the Committee on

Bills and Overtures to prepare any further action and record, proper to be made, of this occasion and its exercises.

The Assembly then took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, D. McKinney, from the standing Committee on the Board of Missions, to whom had been recommitted a portion of their report, presented the remaining resolutions, which were adopted; and the whole report is as follows:

The Committee on the Report of the Board of Domestic Missions, present to the Assembly, for consideration and adoption, the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the deepest gratitude of this Assembly is due to God for his goodness, in that, during a year of great financial embarrassment, he has disposed and enabled his people to supply the wants of the Board; making the period to close happily, with an increase of funds and labourers.

Resolved, 2. That the Assembly rejoice in the increase of contributing churches; and now cherish the hope that, by due effort, all may ultimately be induced to do their part in the work.

Resolved, 3. That this Assembly give devout thanks to God for the outpouring of his Spirit upon our missionary churches, in common with other portions of his beloved Zion.

Resolved, 4. That while the Board have prudently made their appropriations, still the want of funds is such, and the demands upon the treasury are so great and numerous, that there is a large amount of work needed which can scarcely be attempted. The Assembly hence regret that there should be need for an intimation in the Board's Report, that possibly there are churches receiving aid which ought to be self-sustaining, and others receiving more help than is really necessary. It is, therefore, earnestly recommended to Presbyteries to look into this subject, and to use all possible caution in presenting churches for aid; and also, when practicable, to unite several small churches in one charge; and thus save men and money for use in other parts of the field.

Resolved, 5. That the magnitude of the cause, the adaptation of the Presbyterian Church to a successful work in every part of the country, and the calls for labourers, multiplying with the country's increase, demand of the Assembly new efforts to enlarge their contributions of both men and means. The field is the world; but the part of the field specially entrusted to this Church's care, comprises the States and Territories where God has given her a being.

Resolved, 6. That the Assembly is pleased with the efforts of the Board to increase the number of itinerating labourers, believing that the system may be extended to the great advantage of sparsely settled districts.

Resolved, 7. That the failure of nearly one-third of the missionaries to send in a special report for the use of the Assembly, is to be deeply regretted; and that they be urged, hereafter, to promptitude and punctuality.

Resolved, 8. That in view of the many demands upon the treasury, and also of the happy working and bright prospects of the scheme of Systematic Benevolence, the Assembly suggest to the Board the propriety of considering the question, whether the services of an Associate Secretary might not be dispensed with, and the amount of the salary of the office saved: whilst the Assembly cherish full confidence and regard for the brother now holding this appointment.

The regular time for adjournment having been postponed, in order to take the vote on this paper, the Assembly now adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at nine o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by Daniel McNair.

THURSDAY, MAY 13th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly met for business, after half an hour spent in devotional exercises; and was opened with prayer by the Moderator.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

Walter Lowrie asked and obtained leave to offer a modification of the eighth resolution, adopted yesterday, in the report of the Standing Committee on the Board of Domestic Missions; and it was unanimously adopted.

Nathaniel Hewit, from the Committee on Foreign Correspondence, presented the following report, which was adopted, viz.

The Committee on Foreign Correspondence reports:

That the only communication referred to them from foreign bodies, is a letter to the Moderator of this Assembly, from the President *par interim* of the Synod of the Free Church in France.

The letter is most affectionate, expressing their congratulations for our harmony and rapid growth; and more especially with thanksgiving and praise to the great Head of the Church, for the remarkable outpouring of the Holy Ghost upon our Church, and upon the evangelical churches throughout our land.

The Rev. President of the Synod, Dr. Monod, who was requested to attend this session of the Assembly, and was charged to make to us a more extended communication, was obliged to return home early in May, and consequently we have only a brief and general statement of the present condition and future prospects of that Church—one with us in faith, worship, and government. Though comparatively few and feeble, it is nevertheless vigorous and hopeful, and greatly animated at present by an interest in one of their particular churches, after the manner of the revivals of religion with us.

This Assembly is requested to send a delegate to the next annual meeting of their Synod, at Vigau, on the last Thursday of August next.

In view of the foregoing summary of the letter before us, your Committee beg leave to propose, for the consideration of this Assembly, the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That when the statistics of the last year are completed, and more particularly that relating to the present revivals of religion, our Moderator be requested to reply to the President of the Synod of the Free Church in France, expressive of the sympathy, veneration, and affection of this Assembly for that sister Church.

Resolved, 2, That if one more of our brethren shall visit Europe the ensuing summer, our Moderator be empowered to commission him or them to represent this Assembly in that Synod.

William Rankin, from the Committee on Mileage, reported, that the amount paid to the Commissioners' Fund, this year, is one hundred and ninety-six dollars and sixty-six cents; the number of miles travelled is eight

thousand two hundred and forty; and consequently the rate allowed per mile is two cents and three and a half mills.

On motion of Francis Bowman, the Assembly then resumed the unfinished business respecting the communication from the "United Synod."

The question being on the paper offered by R. J. Breckinridge, as a minute on the subject, the mover himself proposed to lay it on the table, for the purpose of voting on the resolution of C. Van Rensselaer, to appoint a committee of three, to meet with the committee of the United Synod, in order to ascertain the nature of the terms proposed for union.

This resolution was adopted; and Messrs. Van Rensselaer, Cunningham, and Palmer were appointed this committee.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock was then taken up—the Annual Report of the Board of Publication, and that of the Standing Committee thereon.

William E. Schenk, the Secretary, addressed the Assembly, in presenting his report; and W. H. Mitchell, from the Standing Committee, offered a series of resolutions, with accompanying remarks.

After several addresses by members of the Assembly, and a motion was made for a recess,

C. Van Rensselaer, from the Committee of three, to confer with the Committee from the United Synod, was allowed to make a report; which was put on the docket, and made the third order of the day for this day.

The Assembly then took a recess for fifteen minutes.

After the recess, R. J. Breckinridge moved to amend the report under consideration, by adding another resolution, presenting a plan for the preparation and publication of a Commentary on the whole Scriptures.

This resolution was discussed till the regular time for adjournment, when the Assembly adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at nine o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by Nathaniel Hewit.

FRIDAY, MAY 14th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly met for business, and was opened with prayer by the Moderator, after the usual season of devotional exercises.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

C. Van Rensselaer, from the Committee on Bills and Overtures, reported

Overture No. 10, a minute in relation to the centennial celebration, which was adopted, and is as follows:

This General Assembly having been called upon in the providence of God to unite in a centennial commemoration of the re-union of the Synods of New York and Philadelphia, in 1758, deems it proper, on this occasion, to adopt a minute relating to that interesting and important event.

The Assembly recognize the good hand of God in early bringing to these shores emigrants of Scotch, Scotch-Irish, English, and Huguenot extraction, to assist in establishing the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ among the waste places of this continent. The memory of the ministers who commenced the work of evangelization, and who laid the foundations of the Church, is treasured by this Assembly, with gratitude to Him who sent them forth to accomplish his purposes, with many self-denials, abundant labours, and great success.

The Assembly record the goodness of God in leading the fathers to adopt authoritatively the Westminster standards for the future guidance of the Church, and under such circumstances in the ratification of the "Adopting Act," as to afford the clearest evidence of the entire unanimity of the Synod in doctrinal sentiment, and in all matters pertaining to Presbyterian order.

The Assembly further record their views of the unspeakable importance and blessedness of pure revivals of religion in the Church; praising God for the general results of the great revival of religion within our bounds, in the days of Whitefield and the Tennents, and rejoicing that the present year has been signalized by the same precious and glorious outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

The Assembly further put upon record their sense of the obligations of the Church to its great Head in preserving incorrupt its outward forms of order in the olden time; in gradually and surely increasing its educational and evangelistic resources, and in endowing it, after the lapse of the first century of re-union, with such enlargement of its missionary work at home and in heathen lands.

On an occasion which forcibly brings to mind the blessings of God upon re-union, and which commemorates the dwelling together of brethren in unity, the Assembly expresses a deep conviction of the desirableness of the union of all sound Presbyterians, and do hereby cordially and earnestly extend an invitation to all, who are of like mind with ourselves, to unite with this General Assembly in the way and manner conformable to the acts and deliverances on this subject, already made by this Assembly.

On motion of R. J. Breckinridge and J. M. Worrall, the thanks of the Assembly were voted to C. Van Rensselaer, for the address delivered in accordance with the order of the last Assembly; a copy was requested for publication, and it was committed to the Board of Publication, to publish the address in a book, containing, with the address, the whole record of proceedings respecting this occasion.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures proceeded to report,
Overture No. 11, which was received, and put on the docket.

Overture 12, a memorial from the Synod of Southern Iowa, to change the boundary lines between the Synods of Iowa and of Southern Iowa, so as to attach the county of Muscatine to the latter Synod; together with a remonstrance from the Presbytery of Cedar, against the proposed change.

The Committee recommend that no action be taken upon the subject.
Adopted.

Overture No. 13, which was received and put on the docket.

Overture No. 14, a memorial from the Presbytery of Highland, in Kansas, stating that the Presbytery of Kansas has failed in two attempts to organize, and that that Presbytery is virtually dissolved from want of a quorum, and asking the General Assembly to take action in the premises.

The Committee recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Rev. W. W. Backus, of the Presbytery of Dane, and the Rev. F. P. Montfort, of the Presbytery of White Water, be transferred to the Presbytery of Highland, together with the churches of Leavenworth City, Leecompton and Big Spring, and all other churches organized in the territory, so that the jurisdiction of the Presbytery of Highland shall extend, for the present, over the whole territory of Kansas. Adopted.

Overture No. 15, which was received and put on the docket.

Overture No. 16, a memorial from the Presbytery of Lodiana, asking the General Assembly to recommend the first Monday of January next, as a day

of special prayer for the blessing of God upon Foreign Missions throughout the world.

The Committee submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Assembly entertains an increasing conviction of the importance of Foreign Missions, and of the close connection, under God, between prayer and their success, and earnestly recommends to all their churches the regular, conscientious and fervent observance of the monthly concerts for prayer.

Adopted.

Overture No. 17, which being received, was put on the docket.

Overture No. 18, an overture from the Synod of Illinois, in reference to the transfer of the Theological Seminary of the Northwest, located at Chicago, to the control of the General Assembly; said Synod agreeing to said transfer with certain stipulations.

The Committee submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That inasmuch as only one Synod has given notice to the Assembly of a desire to transfer to the Assembly the control of the Theological Seminary of the Northwest, located at Chicago, and inasmuch as it requires a constitutional majority of the Synods now having the control of said Seminary, to bring the matter within the jurisdiction of the Assembly, it is judged not to be expedient to take any action at the present time.

Resolved, 2. That the memorial from the Synod of Illinois be placed on file, among the papers of the Assembly.

Adopted.

Overture No. 19, a memorial from John Woodman, an elder in the Presbytery of Iowa, asking the Assembly to define the rights of the Session of a church in regard to the singing in the house of God.

The Committee recommend that the petitioner be referred, for a sufficient answer, to the action of the Assembly in 1845, Minutes, pages 20 and 21, or Baird's Digest, page 170.

Adopted.

Overture No. 20, a memorial from the Presbytery of Ohio, on the subject of Temperance.

The Committee submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Assembly continues to cherish a deep interest on the subject of Temperance, and refers to its previous testimonies in answer to the memorial.

On motion of J. M. Worrall and G. W. Musgrave, the report of the Committee on Theological Seminaries was taken up, and the order of the day for 10 o'clock was postponed for this business. The report was adopted, and is as follows:

The Committee on Theological Seminaries respectfully report, that they have received and considered the annual reports of the Seminaries under the care of the General Assembly, viz. Princeton Seminary, N. J., Union Seminary, Va., Western Seminary, Pa., Danville Seminary, Ky.

The Assembly will learn, with joy and devout gratitude to the Head of the Church, that all these Institutions have during the past year been highly favoured; that the teachers have been faithful in their work of instruction; that the pupils have been diligent in study, and exemplary in their deportment. It is also gratifying to know that the numbers in attendance have been increased, and an enlarged desire for the foreign missionary field has been manifested.

Only one death has occurred, and generally, it has been a year of health.

The several reports in detail, as presented by the Directors and Trustees of these Institutions will fully develope their present condition.

In respect to their financial aspect, the Assembly, while rejoicing in what has already been done, will appreciate the need of continued effort to enlarge their means, and complete their endowments. Your Committee would recommend the reiteration of the resolution adopted by the last Assembly, viz.

"That the churches be urged to complete the endowment of those Seminaries that are not yet fully endowed, to increase the number of scholarships, to furnish funds for repairs and erection of suitable buildings, and the enlargement of libraries."

The Committee find in the report of the Directors of Princeton Seminary the following resolution, viz.

Resolved, That the General Assembly be requested to amend the Plan of the Seminary, Article II., Section 1, so as to erase the following words, "and the president, or in case of his absence, one of the vice-presidents, shall be one." The Committee recommend that the request be granted, and that the Plan of the Seminary be so amended.

They also recommend that the arrangement made for this year, to terminate the session of the Seminary at Princeton two weeks earlier, or on the last Wednesday of April, be made permanent in this Institution.

In the report of the Directors of the Union Theological Seminary, Va., they request that "the Board of Directors be authorized, with the concurrence of other judicatories to whose care the Assembly has committed the Institution, to transfer to "the Trustees of Union Theological Seminary, in the county of Prince Edward," recently incorporated by the General Assembly of Virginia, all the lands, funds, and other property now committed to the trust of the Directors.

The Committee recommend that the request be granted, and the following resolution be adopted, viz.

Resolved, That "the Board of Directors of the Union Theological Seminary, in Virginia," be authorized, with the concurrence of the Synod of Virginia, the Synod of North Carolina, and the Presbytery of Winchester, to transfer to the Trustees of Union Theological Seminary, in the county of Prince Edward, Va., all the lands, funds, and other property belonging to said Seminary, now in the hands of said Directors, or which may hereafter come into their hands.

By the report of the Directors of Danville Seminary, it will devolve on the Assembly at its present sessions to elect a Professor of Church Government and Pastoral Theology, to fill the chair made vacant by the resignation of Stuart Robinson.

It is also recommended that these reports be printed, as usual, in the Appendix to the Minutes.

In pursuance of this action, nominations were made to fill the vacant Professorship at Danville.

J. A. Smylie nominated L. J. Halsey, of Louisville, Kentucky. L. W. Green nominated Joseph B. Stratton, of Natchez, Mississippi. H. M. Painter nominated S. J. P. Anderson, of St. Louis, Missouri. D. X. Junkin nominated Thomas E. Peck, of Baltimore, Maryland; and John Squier nominated Alfred Hamilton, of Fagg's Manor, Pennsylvania.

It was made the first order of the day, for Monday morning next, to make the election. The Assembly then engaged in prayer, being led by L. W. Green, at the call of the Moderator.

The order of the day for 10 o'clock was now taken up, the report of the Committee on Church extension, and of the Standing Committee thereon.

The Secretary, H. I. Coe, presented his printed report, with accompanying remarks.

R. J. Breckinridge, from the Standing Committee, presented the following report, which after several addresses, was adopted, viz.

The Committee on the Third Annual Report of the Assembly's Church Extension Committee, having considered said report, recommend the adoption of the following by the General Assembly, viz.

1. That the Church Extension Committee appears to have conducted the great interest committed to them by the Assembly, with diligence and fidelity; and the Lord has blessed and prospered them, for which thanks are due to His blessed name.

2. Inasmuch as the work of building houses of worship over a region so immense, and so diversified as that covered thinly, by the Presbyterian Church, presents difficulties so various in their nature, as to render it impossible to give specific directions concerning them, the General Assembly, exhorting the Committee to press forward in the important work, and exhorting the churches to contribute liberally to it, content itself with the general authorization to the Committee to prosecute it in such manner as its own increasing experience and the continual indications of Providence shall satisfy them is most wise and effectual, diffusing their aid impartially throughout the Church.

3. Such of our congregations as have insufficient accommodations for public worship are exhorted, according to their means, to provide themselves with good and permanent places for the public worship of God. Such as have none, are exhorted to make vigorous efforts to provide themselves with them; this being the form of Christian effort, especially in neighbourhoods where we have no stated place of worship, towards which those without are usually most disposed to contribute.

4. All our congregations in country places, and especially those in new settlements, are exhorted to make provision where it is possible of suitable and sufficient grounds for a school for their children, a home for their minister, and a burial place for their dead, all convenient to their place of worship. And in all these necessary matters, secured while the land is still low priced, let all parsimony be avoided, and due care be taken to secure their titles alike against future disputes and future injury to the cause of truth. And thus laying sure foundations, they may act as becomes those who trust God, and build for many generations.

5. Seeing the vast extent of the land yet to be possessed, the almost indispensable necessity of a sufficient place of worship to the permanent establishment of a congregation, and the great and constant blessing of God upon our Church, in all its endeavours, it becomes all ministers and people whose lot is so cast as to enable them to serve the Lord in this way, to use a wise forecast in the matter of obtaining, as far as may be necessary in good time, such necessary sites for church buildings both in towns and in country places, as will facilitate the constant extension of the Church and its firm establishment in every quarter of the country.

6. That the Third Annual Report of the Committee be approved and published.

They would further recommend that one minister be added to the organic number of the Committee.

The next order of the day was then taken up—to elect members to fill the vacancies in the several Boards—nominations having been made at the time of presenting reports by the Standing Committees, respectively.

The Assembly then took a recess for half an hour.

When called to order again, George Howe moved, that it be the first order of the day for to-morrow, to take up

Judicial Case, No. 4, the appeal and complaint of Robert Finley and Smith Bloomfield, against the Synod of New Jersey.

R. J. Breckinridge was allowed, at the request of the former appellant, to aid him in conducting his cause; and James Hoge and Nathaniel Hewit were allowed, at the request of Myron Barrett, to aid him, in the absence of two other members of a Committee appointed by the Synod of New Jersey, to defend the Synod in this case.

The unfinished business, on the first order of the day for yesterday, was then taken up; the report of the Committee on the Board of Publication—the question being on the amendment offered as an additional resolution, by R. J. Breckinridge.

On motion of C. Van Rensselaer, this resolution was referred to the next General Assembly; and it is as follows, viz.

Inasmuch as the want of a sound, godly and thorough Commentary upon the whole word of God, composed in the sense of the constant faith of the Church of God, as that is briefly set forth in the standards of the Westminster Assembly, held by the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, has long been felt to be a grievous want, whereby a great lack of due service to God and to his truth occurs, and whereby constant danger arises to men of needless ignorance on one side, and of dangerous misguidance on the other; Therefore, be it

Resolved, By the General Assembly, that the Board of Publication shall, and it is hereby directed to proceed with all convenient dispatch, to have such Commentary composed, prepared for the press, and published. And

in the execution of this great work, the following rules and orders, together with such further as may be adopted from time to time by the General Assembly, shall be carefully observed by the Board of Publication, and by all others in any way engaged in the execution of any part thereof.

1. The Commentary shall be prepared exclusively by members of this Church. And in the preparing of it, they shall have all such indulgence, as to time, as they shall respectively demand. And for their compensation, they and their heirs, for the legal period of twenty-eight years, shall receive a fair per centum on the price of the work sold, which shall be settled in advance by the Board of Publication, and which shall be uniform, and in lieu of all claim and cost of every sort in any way connected with their said work.

2. The said Commentary shall be fitted for common use by all men, and in the preparation of it, free use may be made of all materials that may exist, the design being to produce, not so much what may be original, as what may be best, in the way of enlightening and saving men. It shall not be prolix, but so arranged that the whole may be embraced in five or six royal octavo volumes, of good print, containing beside the Commentary, the English text in full, together with the usual accessories thereof and such other suitable helps to its understanding as plain people need. And the text used in it shall be strictly that of the version prepared by the translators appointed by James the First, King of England.

3. In order to secure the fittest men for this great work, the Board of Publication shall make special application to the several Synods of our Church at their next stated meetings respectively; and the said Synods shall, upon careful consideration, nominate to the said Board of Publication any number of their own members, not to exceed five from any one Synod, of such as they shall consider qualified to undertake the work. And the Board of Publication may add not more than five in addition to the whole number thus nominated to it. And it shall communicate the list of names thus obtained by sifting the Church, to the General Assembly, at its stated meeting in May of next year; making, at the same time, and from year to year thereafter, report of its doings under and by virtue of this minute.

4. The General Assembly of 1859 will take such further order in the premises, especially with regard to the selection of persons out of the list communicated to it, to the distribution of the work amongst them, and to all things needful for its effectual prosecution, as shall seem most expedient.

The following resolution was then offered as an amendment, by D. X. Junkin, and adopted, viz.

Whereas, Hymns 336 and 454 of our collection are one and the same,

Resolved, That the Board of Publication be authorized and directed to replace hymn 336 with some other hymn not now found in the book, of the same typographical dimensions, and of evangelical sentiment and decided poetic merit.

The whole report as offered by the Committee was then adopted; and is as follows, viz.

The Committee to whom was referred the Annual Report of the Board of Publication, would respectfully recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the Assembly recognizes and commends the Board as an efficient and honoured instrumentality in counteracting the pernicious effects of a licentious and corrupt literature; and in disseminating through the waste places of our Zion, the seeds of sound theology and of vital piety,

which doubtless will ultimately produce in the hearts of God's people, thirty, sixty, and even an hundredfold.

Resolved, 2. That it is subject matter for devout gratitude to God, that, although within the past year an unprecedented commercial embarrassment pervaded the country, and brought sorrow and penury to the homes of thousands, the Lord put into the hearts of the members of our churches, a spirit of more than ordinary benevolence, in consequence of which (although there was a diminution in the miscellaneous receipts) the amount of church collections for the colportage fund were larger than they had been in any former year: and that this unexpected and happy result was accomplished without the payment of a single cent to collecting agents.

Resolved, 3. That it affords the Assembly much gratification to learn, that notwithstanding the aforesaid revulsion, the Board, by the discreet and prudent management of its resources, during the crisis, not only paid all its pecuniary obligations in the publishing department, but also increased its usefulness by the publication and gratuitous distribution of a greater number of books and tracts than it had published in any previous year.

Resolved, 4. That it gives the Assembly pleasure to learn that the Board, as fast as circumstances justify, are publishing evangelical works in the German language, suitable to the wants of the German population.

Resolved, 5. That the humble and self-denying colporteur is doing God's work, and deserves the sympathies of God's people; and that, as he visits from house to house the Lord's poor, with Christ's love in his heart, and the books of the Board in his hand, he is effectually aiding the missionary of the cross in diffusing Christian light and knowledge, where darkness and ignorance prevail.

Resolved, 6. That the Assembly earnestly urges on the churches the importance of increasing their contributions to colportage, in order to enable the Board not only to pay off the arrears which during the past year necessarily accrued, but also to expand its operations in a degree commensurate with the demands of the Church.

Resolved, 7. That the Assembly expresses its heartfelt gratification at the laudable and successful efforts which the Board has made to publish works for Sunday-school libraries; and that this body believing, as it does, that the books published are admirably adapted to the wants of children, would impress on the minds of ministers and members, that it is their duty to purchase and circulate the books of the Board rather than those published by any societies not connected with our beloved Church: and that whenever Sabbath-schools have funds to expend for the purchase of libraries to present to feeble churches in various parts of the land, the Board should have a decided preference.

The second order of the day, for yesterday, was taken up, the reports of Committees on Synodical Records.

The Records of the Synods of Buffalo, New York, Baltimore, Ohio, Indiana, Northern Indiana, Chicago, Upper Missouri, Missouri, Kentucky, Virginia, Nashville, Alabama, Memphis, and Arkansas, respectively were approved, without exception.

The Records of the Synods of Albany and New Jersey were approved, subject to the decision of the Assembly in judicial cases now pending, and appearing in the records of these Synods respectively.

The Records of the Synod of Illinois were recommitted to the same Committee.

The Records of the Synod of Wheeling were approved, with the exception, that certain abbreviations appear where words should be written in full.

The Records of the Synod of Georgia were approved, with the exceptions,

1st. That they have not been presented to the General Assembly for examination and approval for two years, and

2d. That on page 337 we have the following minute, "That the rule in the book requiring the members of the inferior judicatory to withdraw from the house be understood *metaphorically*, and that the rule be understood as fully complied with, by excluding the Flint Presbytery from any further participation in the discussion, and from voting in the case."

The Records of the Synods of Allegheny, Cincinnati, Iowa, South Carolina, Mississippi, Texas, the Pacific, and Northern India, were reported as not sent up for review.

The Committees on the Records of the Synods of Pittsburgh, Southern Iowa, and North Carolina, being called, did not answer with any report.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Philadelphia, after having them recommitted, presented a report, which was put on the docket.

The third order of the day, for yesterday, was then called up, the report of the Committee appointed to ascertain from the Committee of the "United Synod," held in Knoxville, the terms on which they propose to form a union with this General Assembly.

These terms being read, the paper already offered by R. J. Breckinridge, amended on his own motion, to correspond with the fuller revelations made by the Committee, was unanimously adopted, as a minute expressing the mind of the Assembly, and is as follows:

In the matter of the proposals made to this General Assembly, on behalf of the United Synod of the Presbyterian Church, lately constituted in the State of Tennessee, out of a portion of those New School Presbyterians residing in several of the southern States, who have seceded from that denomination, at and after their General Assembly of 1857, this General Assembly makes the following deliverance:

1. The Committee appointed by the Synod of the United Presbyterian Church, has communicated to this Assembly the official action of the said Synod, settling, on their part, the "*Terms of Union*," deemed by them to be "indispensable;" and the Assembly is informed, through the public press, of the contents of a paper adopted by that Synod, and called, "*A Declaration of Principles*." In the judgment of this Assembly, those official papers do not afford a basis of conference, upon which this Assembly is able to see that there is any prospect of advancing the interests of Christ's kingdom in general, or those of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, or those of the United Synod of the Presbyterian Church, in particular.

2. The Presbyterian Church in the United States of America has always received frankly, and in Christian love, all churches, office-bearers, and private persons, of all denominations, making application for admission into her communion, upon the single condition that they were like-minded with herself. At this time, ample provision is made in her existing Acts and Ordinances for the reception of all such into her communion, on terms and by methods precisely equivalent, and where it is possible, identical with those provided with regard to her own children, reared in her own bosom. Seeing that it was in a voluntary secession from the Presbyterian Church that the present difficulties of the United Synod of the Presbyterian Church had their origin, and that the door has always been open for the orderly return of such of those who left us, as were like-minded with us, it can

hardly be unexpected that we decline any official conference, based on terms which appear to us to involve a condemnation of ourselves, and a renunciation of the rich and peculiar favour of God upon us, in the very matters which led to their secession from our Church twenty years ago.

3. With reference to the recent schism in the New-school Presbyterian body, this General Assembly does not see in that event, or in anything which has hitherto resulted from it, any call of Providence for the Presbyterian Church to take any new step whatever, either with the view of union, or that of closer intercourse than now exists, with either of the parts into which that body is now divided. The subjects upon which the whole New-school body differed from us at the period of their separation from us, and the subject upon which the two very unequal portions of that body have recently separated from each other, are questions upon which we, as a denomination, are at peace; and with regard to the whole of which we see no occasion to revise the constant and unalterable faith of our Church, or to enter into fruitless conferences.

It was then ordered, that a copy of this minute, duly certified by the Moderator, be communicated to the Stated Clerk, or the Committee of this United Synod.

On motion of William Rankin, the thanks of the Assembly were voted to the preachers on behalf of the different Boards, before this Assembly; and copies of their sermons were requested for publication.

The time of adjournment was postponed for half an hour.

On motion of C. Van Rensselaer, Overture, No. 9, for the establishment of a Committee on Domestic Missions in New Orleans, was made the second order of the day for to-morrow.

The unfinished business respecting the report of the Committee of Conference with the Associate Reformed Synod of the South, was then resumed, the question being on the motion of J. Eagleson to refer the business to a special committee.

This motion was carried, and J. Eagleson, I. S. K. Axson, and James M. Calhoun, were appointed this committee.

A letter was read from R. Baird, one of the brethren appointed by the last General Assembly to attend, on its behalf, any Assembly of evangelical Christians in Europe during the year, reporting for himself.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by David McKinney.

SATURDAY, MAY 15th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly was called to business, and opened with prayer by the Moderator, after the usual time of devotional exercises for half an hour.

The minutes of the preceding day were read and approved.

The Committees on the Records of the Synods of Pittsburgh and North Carolina reported, recommending the approval of the same, without exception, and both reports were adopted.

The Committee on the Records of the Synod of Illinois reported, and the report was put on the docket.

The first order of the day was then taken up—Judicial Case No. 4—the Appeal and Complaint of Robert S. Finley and Smith Bloomfield, against the Synod of New Jersey.

A motion was made by James Hoge to postpone the trial of this cause to the next General Assembly.

This motion was discussed at length; the Moderator deciding, in the course of the discussion, that the members of the Synod of New Jersey might speak on such a motion. It was ultimately laid on the table, on motion of E. Emerson.

The Assembly then proceeded to take up the business, according to the recommendation of the Judicial Committee. After the usual admonition, read from the Book, to the members in their judicial capacity, the papers were read, according to the constitutional order; and after all the papers presented by the Committee had been read, a recess was taken for half an hour.

After the recess, George Howe moved that the whole records of the Presbytery in relation to the case now before the Assembly be read.

This motion was carried, and the Minutes of the Presbytery of Elizabethtown were accordingly read, in everything pertaining to the case, until it was carried by appeal to Synod of New Jersey; the Moderator deciding that any subsequent record should not be read.

The parties in the case were then called, and R. J. Breckinridge was heard on the behalf of Robert S. Finley.

A question arose when he concluded, respecting the original parties—whether the Presbytery of Elizabethtown or the Synod of New Jersey should be regarded as the other party; upon which the Moderator decided that the action of the Assembly, in allowing James Hoge and Nathaniel Hewit to take the place of absent members of the Committee appointed by the Synod of New Jersey, did virtually recognize the Synod as the party to be heard at this stage of the proceedings.

The hour for adjournment having arrived, it was moved and carried by a majority of more than two-thirds, to reconsider the order of the Assembly for closing its sessions each day at half-past two o'clock.

It was then resolved, that the Judicial Case now before the Assembly be made the second order of the day for Monday next; that the Assembly meet again this evening at a quarter before eight o'clock; and that the first order for the evening session be to hear the Narrative on the state of Religion.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet this evening at a quarter before 8 o'clock. Closed with prayer, by E. Halley.

SATURDAY EVENING, 8½ o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer; C. Van Rensselaer presiding, in the absence of the Moderator.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

J. Eagleson, from the Committee to whom was referred the report of the Committee of Conference, in relation to a closer union with the Associate Reformed Synod of the South, reported the following resolutions, which were adopted unanimously, after another brief address from the Rev. J. M. Young, delegate of that body, viz.

Resolved, 1. That the fidelity of the Committee be approved.

Resolved, 2. That the Committee be continued, with the addition of Messrs. Job Johnson, Thomas Hoyt, Thomas L. McBride, and James H. Thornwell, said Committee to report to the next General Assembly.

Resolved, 3. That it be recommended to all, and especially our ministers and churches in the South, to circulate, for examination and use, the Psalms in metre, according to the version used in the Church of Scotland.

The first order for the evening was then taken up, the Narrative on the state of Religion. It was read by L. J. Halsey, Chairman of the Committee, and adopted.

On motion of E. T. Baird, it was recommended to all the pastors, that this report be read to their congregations, as soon as convenient, after it is published.

It was resolved, on motion of W. M. Grimes, that a song of praise be sung, and that special prayer be offered, in view of the great goodness of God, which has a memorial in the narrative of revivals for this year. Accordingly, a hymn was sung, and the Assembly united in prayer, being led by Mr. Grimes, at the call of the Moderator.

D. X. Junkin, from the Committee on Systematic Benevolence, reported the following paper, which, after certain verbal amendments, was adopted, viz.

The Committee on Systematic Benevolence, respectfully submit the following report:

Two somewhat distinct subjects have been devolved by the Assembly upon this Committee.

1st. The great subject directly appertaining to this Standing Committee of the Assembly: and,

2d. The report of the Committee of the Trustees of the General Assembly, for disbursing the money given for "disabled ministers in need, and the needy widows and orphans of deceased ministers;" which report was referred to this Committee by vote of the Assembly.

1. Upon the first mentioned subject, the Committee are gratified to be able to state, that the recommendations of the General Assembly have been regarded, and with a good degree of efficiency carried out, by all the Presbyteries that have sent up reports; and the number of Presbyteries that have been reported is greater than last year. Last year only twenty-four Presbyteries made report; this year reports of diligence and progress in this good work are sent up by forty-six Presbyteries, whose names are worthy of record, and are as follows: New Orleans, Kaskaskia, Western Texas, Winchester, Erie, Lexington, New Castle, Montgomery, Philadelphia, Albany, New York, Mohawk, Fayetteville, Louisiana, Connecticut, Central Texas, Columbus, Tusculumbia, Indian, Londonderry, Wetumpka, Palestine, South Alabama, Louisville, Newton, Harmony, Georgia, Huntington, Knoxville, Raritan, Tuscaloosa, Ebenezer, Memphis, Concord, Long Island, Tombeckbee, Iowa, Logansport, Baltimore, Arkansas, Donegal, Presbytery of Philadelphia 2d, Missouri, Beaver, Carlisle, and Blairsville.

All these Presbyteries have, in obedience to the injunctions of the General Assembly, taken order with a view to bring the churches under their care to adopt regular systems of making collections for our Boards, and to spread the scriptural principles that lie at the foundation of Christian benevolence. With a single exception they report encouraging success; and that exception is owing to the poor and scattered circumstances of the congregations, rendering the introduction of system difficult. It is evident from the reports of these Presbyteries, that decided progress has been made, in diffusing right sentiments, in the inauguration of regular *plans* of contribution, in the recognition of contribution and distribution as part and parcel of practical religion, and in holding the churches to such regular accountability as cannot fail to stimulate and encourage the discharge of this part of Christian duty. But for the danger of swelling this report to an inconvenient size, it would be desirable to detail the facts, reported in the communications of the several Presbyteries. We must be content with a comprehensive statement. Some reports mention the number of collections due

from the churches, and the number actually made. Some specify the number of their churches that make weekly, monthly, quarterly and annual collections. Some mention the number that have adopted a system, and the number that have not. Some give a list of delinquent churches, and one Presbytery (Memphis) mentions the amount of contributions given to the several Boards, and exhibits the amount per church member (\$2.52,) which they average. But on account of the diverse nature of these reports, it would be impossible, without reciting them all, to digest and present these contents, except in the general way we have done. Your Committee is convinced that nothing is wanting, in order to bring up the churches to effective organization for systematic giving, but diligent perseverance in the line of effort, which for four years the General Assembly has been pursuing. And for the purpose of making steadfast advance in this direction, it will be wise for the General Assembly to continue to reiterate from year to year deliverances similar to those already pronounced.

The Committee therefore propose for adoption by this General Assembly, the following deliverance concerning the doctrine and duty of Christian stewardship.

1. Every man is a steward of God, in the use and management of the talents, time and substance which God has entrusted to him.

2. Under the command "occupy till I come," the steward is bound to employ the trust, be it great or small, for God's glory and the good of the world.

3. Contribution of our worldly substance for religious purposes, from religious motives, and in a scriptural way, is a Christian duty, and is part of true piety, as fully and completely as are praise, prayer, sacraments, or any other religious duty or exercise. It is not one of the offices of religion which a Christian man is at liberty to neglect, or slightly perform, at his own pleasure. He who is not regularly a man of prayer, cannot be accounted a consistent Christian, neither can he who is not regularly a man of beneficence. If every Christian ought to pray for the establishment of Christ's kingdom, every Christian is equally bound to pay towards its establishment and maintenance.

4. Offerings of property to God for religious purposes, formed a large part of the worship of the ancient Church. Can it be that, with a world to conquer for Christ, offerings of property for religious purposes form no part of the worship of the Christian Church, and no part of Christian piety? Paul calls beneficence and contribution, Christian sacrifices. (Heb. xiii. 16.)

5. "As God hath prospered" the donor, so does he require him to give. (1 Cor. xvi. 2.)

6. Contribution is a means of grace, as well as a part of practical piety, and ought to be as regularly and systematically employed as any other means. It is the means by which "covetousness, which is idolatry," is counteracted, by which the love of the world is crucified, the grace of charity strengthened by exercise.

In view of these principles, therefore be it

Resolved, 1st. That this General Assembly do most earnestly urge upon all the Presbyteries and Sessions, to persevere in their endeavours to inaugurate in all the congregations such plans for systematic benevolence as may most effectively cultivate and call into exercise the graces of giving, and to report of their faithfulness herein.

Resolved, 2d. That they be careful to cultivate this grace alike in the rich, the poor, and the young; striving to lead all, of every age and condition, to attend as regularly to this part of piety as any other.

Resolved, 3d. That ministers be requested to take special pains to inculcate the doctrines and duties of Christian stewardship.

In regard to the other subject referred to this Committee, the following is respectfully submitted.

1. That no scheme of beneficence more powerfully appeals to the justice and the sensibilities of the Church than this, which aims to make provision for the necessities of ministers disabled by age or other infirmity, and for the needy widows and orphans of deceased ministers. Even the cold heart of Cæsar feels for the soldier that has become disabled in the field, and for the fallen soldier's widow and orphans; earthly governments make provision for such. And shall the tender heart of the spouse of Christ, the blood-bought Church, have no feeling for those who, in her service and by reason of it, have become exposed to privation and want? She ought to feel—she ought to care for them.

2. The very nature and circumstances of the service to which the ministry of our Church is called, prevent the ordinary possibility of their accumulating worldly substance against the day of sickness, age, or death: without the vow of voluntary poverty which is affected by popish monks, the thing itself is, by the force of inevitable circumstances, unavoidably brought upon a large proportion of our faithful brethren. Does not justice require that they and those that they love better than life, should be guarded and guaranteed against want, and the apprehension of want, in case of the failure of health, and in the case of the widow and the fatherless.

3. By the report of the Committee of the Board of Trustees, it appears that one-half of the churches have paid no attention to the previous action of the General Assembly upon this subject, or at least have made no collection.

4. If all would contribute, even a little, this lovely charity would be amply provided for from year to year; whilst the prayers of the infirm, of the widow, and of the fatherless, would ascend for the churches that remember them in their need, and the rich blessing of the Master, and the God of the widow, would more than reimburse the donors. Be it therefore

Resolved, 1st. That this General Assembly most earnestly requests Presbyteries and church sessions to see to it, that in every church a collection be made every year for this fund, and forwarded to the Treasurer of the General Assembly at Philadelphia.

Resolved, 2d. That every minister in our connection be requested to present this cause to his charge, at least once a year, and ask for the gifts of the people in aid of this fund.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet on Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Closed with prayer, by E. R. Craven.

MONDAY, MAY 17th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly, after half an hour spent in devotional exercises, was formally constituted for business, and opened with prayer by the Moderator.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

On motion of Archibald Gamble, the report of the Committee on Finance was taken up from the docket; and after discussion, and a motion carried to lay the resolution on the table, which contained a request to the Trustees to invest the funds at more than six per cent., as far as practicable, the report was recommitted to the same Committee.

The first order of the day was then taken up—the election of a Professor in the Theological Seminary at Danville.

The name of S. J. P. Anderson was withdrawn, with leave of the Assembly, from the list of nominations, by H. M. Painter, who stated that such was the desire of the nominee himself. A similar statement was made by John Squier respecting Thomas E. Peck; whereupon the name of this nominee was also withdrawn, with leave of the Assembly, by D. X. Junkin. Requests were made also by Messrs. Smylie and Squier for leave to withdraw the names of their nominees respectively, L. J. Halsey and Alfred Hamilton.

These requests were granted.

The name of Joseph B. Stratton, of Natchez, being the only one remaining, it was, on motion of R. J. Breckinridge, resolved unanimously, without balloting, that Joseph B. Stratton be chosen Professor of Church Government and Pastoral Theology in the Theological Seminary of Danville.

It was then, on motion,

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to inform this Professor elect of the choice, and urge, in every proper way, his acceptance of the office, and transference from his present pastoral care.

L. W. Green, E. T. Baird, and John M. Worrall, were appointed this committee.

Alexander T. Rankin, from the Committee on Leave of Absence, reported that the Committee had given leave to Thomas Savage, John W. Grier, C. B. H. Martin, H. H. Patten, T. S. Parvin, James Quarles, Bartholomew Fuller, Alexander Long, E. M. Gregg, James Holmes, Joseph McCormick, and Levi Tenney.

The report was approved.

The second order of the day was then taken up—Judicial Case No. 4—the Appeal and Complaint of Robert S. Finley and Smith Bloomfield against the Synod of New Jersey.

Nathaniel Hewit asked to be excused from assisting the Committee in defence of the Synod of New Jersey.

The request was granted; and, on motion, James T. English was allowed to take his place.

Messrs. English and Barrett then spoke in defence of the Synod.

After which, a recess was taken for fifteen minutes.

When called to order again, the Assembly proceeded with the Judicial Case No. 4.

James Hoge was heard in defence of the Synod; and R. J. Breckinridge in defence of the appellants.

The regular time for adjournment was, on motion of W. H. Mitchell, postponed for half an hour.

A. T. Rankin, from the Committee on Leave of Absence, made a report, that the following members had obtained leave for the remaining sessions of the Assembly, viz.—S. C. Hepburn, D. M. Barber, A. Hepburn, W. C. Hagan, W. D. Hart, A. A. Porter, L. Reeve, J. H. McCampbell, E. S. Henderson, E. Tompkins, N. English, P. A. Studdiford, S. W. Doak, T. Stearns, H. W. Taylor, I. S. K. Axson, R. Russell, D. Stevenson, G. Gilliford, W. Cathcart, J. Pankey, S. W. Penn, P. May, C. H. Gingles, D. G. Doak, G. W. Buford, J. E. Caruthers, T. C. Smith, J. R. Galtney, J. M. Calhoun, J. W. Hannah, C. F. Williams, David Wills, P. Calhoun, J. M. Frierson, L. G. Hay, and R. Barnet.

The report was approved.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet this evening at half-past seven o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by Francis Bowman.

MONDAY EVENING, 7½ o'clock.

The Assembly met, and was opened with prayer by the Moderator.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

The unfinished business, on Judicial Case No. 4, was resumed. The members of the Synod of New Jersey were heard; and then the parties all withdrew from the house. The roll was called, that every member might have an opportunity to express his opinion on the case; after which the final vote was taken. W. T. Findlay and E. T. Baird were excused from voting. *Eighty-four* voted to sustain; *twenty-four* to sustain in part; and *thirty* not to sustain.

R. D. Morris moved that a Committee of seven be appointed to bring in a minute, expressing the sense of the Assembly in this decision. This motion was carried; and Messrs. R. D. Morris, George Howe, G. W. Musgrave, Francis Bowman, John Squier, E. H. Fitzhugh, and James Pankey, were appointed this Committee.

The Assembly then adjourned, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Closed with prayer, by A. T. McGill.

TUESDAY, MAY 18th, 9 o'clock, A. M.

The Assembly met and was opened for business, with prayer by the Moderator, after the usual season of devotional exercises.

The minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

On motion of G. W. Musgrave, Overture No. 9 was taken up from the docket.

Before proceeding further with this business, Archibald Gamble, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, obtained leave to return his report, which had been recommitted. It was read and adopted unanimously; and is as follows:

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred the Treasurer's accounts, respectfully report, that they have examined the books and papers presented by the Treasurer, and find them correct.

It appears by the statement of the Income Paper, No. 4, that the sum of \$108,516 is invested in bonds and mortgages, principally in the cities of Philadelphia and Pittsburgh, yielding an income of six per cent. per annum.

As there is no restriction in the charter preventing the Trustees from loaning the funds out of the State of Pennsylvania, it is for the General Assembly to consider whether these funds might not be more advantageously invested.

The value of money has been so changed of late, that some of the States have legalized a higher rate of interest than six per cent. Ten per cent. has been legalized in some of the States, and loans are sought for at that rate upon the most satisfactory security.

The Secretary of the Board of Trustees having officially announced to the Assembly the death of the Hon. John K. Kane, a member of said Board, the General Assembly will have to fill the vacancy occasioned by this death at the proper time, which, we are informed, will be when the General Assembly meets in the State of Pennsylvania.

The Overture above mentioned was then resumed; the question being on a motion to grant the request of the Synods of Texas and Mississippi, to establish a Committee of Domestic Missions for the southwest, in the city of New Orleans.

B. M. Palmer, after advocating the adoption of the Overture, moved to refer this whole business to the next General Assembly.

G. W. Musgrave, after expressing objections to the measure proposed, moved, as an amendment, that the Board of Domestic Missions be requested to transmit to the next Assembly the views of the Board on the whole subject; and then accepted the following amendment, offered by E. T. Baird, viz.

Resolved, That the Board of Domestic Missions be requested to consider the whole subject brought before this body by this Overture, and report to the next General Assembly whether in their judgment any improvement can be made in their plans of operations, so as to further the interests of the Church in our frontier regions.

This amendment was adopted, and the original motion to refer the subject to the next General Assembly thus amended, was carried.

On motion of John F. Cowan, Judicial Case, No. 2, was taken up from the docket.

Joseph T. Eccles moved to continue the case to the next General Assembly—this Assembly expressing the hope that in the meantime the matter involved in it may be amicably adjusted.

E. T. Baird then moved, as a substitute for the report of the Judicial Committee, that this case cannot be tried as an appeal, and that the appeal be dismissed. This motion was carried.

Thomas W. Hynes gave notice that he protested against this action, in behalf of himself and others.

On motion of Wm. M. Cunningham, it was

Resolved, That the thanks of this Assembly are due, and are hereby cordially tendered to the Rev. R. C. De Lancy, Chairman of the Committee of Arrangements, for his generous and successful efforts in securing from so many steamboats and railroad companies free return tickets for the members of this body.

On motion of R. J. Breckinridge, the thanks of the Assembly were tendered to the citizens of New Orleans, for their kindness and hospitality to the members of this Assembly.

Also, to the Hon. Mayor of the city, for his great courtesy in the efforts he has made to keep our place of meeting free from molestation, by the ordinary noises of the street.

On motion of E. T. Baird, it was also

Resolved, That the thanks of this Assembly be returned to the editors and reporters of the daily press of this city, for the exceedingly faithful reports which they have published of our proceedings.

On motion of George Howe, the unfinished business on Judicial Case, No. 1, was resumed, and the report of the Judicial Committee was adopted, and is as follows:

Judicial Case, No. 1. The complaint of the Rev. James P. Fisher against the action of the Synod of Albany, in the case of the Rev. George H. Thatcher. It appears that the Presbytery of Albany allowed Mr. Thatcher to demit the office of the gospel ministry, of which action complaint was made by Mr. Fisher to the Synod in 1856. This complaint was sustained,

but no copy of it appears on record, nor are the minutes of the Presbytery, out of which the complaint grew, before us. The Synod, in sustaining the complaint, did not make any order to the Presbytery as to what disposition they should make of Mr. Thatcher—but no protest was entered against this action; nor was any complaint taken to this body at that time. At the meeting of the Synod, in 1857, a memorial was presented from the Presbytery of Albany, asking Synod to define their action in the case, which memorial was laid on the table. The complaint now before us purports to lie against this latter action, but yet it is entitled a complaint “of the action of the Synod in the case of the Rev. George H. Thatcher,” and undoubtedly all the reasons of complaint are aimed against that action. The Judicial Committee recommend that the case be dismissed for the following reasons, viz.

1. The complainant having failed at the proper time to make his complaint of the action of the Synod in the case of Mr. Thatcher, has thereby forfeited his right to complain.

2. Were the Assembly to allow a judicial case, when once adjudicated, to be revived on a simple memorial, it would give rise to endless litigation, insomuch that no judicial case could ever be known to be finally settled.

3. Even if the Assembly were disposed to entertain the complaint, no intelligent or just decision could be had in the case, in the absence of the complaint which the Synod sustained, and of the records of the Presbytery in the original case.

On motion of John Jones, Overture No. 20, referred by the last General Assembly, was taken up, and the following resolution, moved by Mr. Jones, was adopted, viz.

Resolved, That the Overture from the Genesee River Presbytery, calling attention to the general law, under which most of the churches of the State of New York are incorporated, and referred by the last Assembly to a Committee to report to this Assembly, be again referred to the same Committee, substituting the name of Mr. E. B. Miller for that of Mr. Putnam.

The Report of the Committee on the Records of the Synod of Philadelphia was taken up, and adopted—approving of the same, with exceptions.

The Assembly then proceeded to take up the remaining business on the docket, in order.

Overture No. 11—on which the report of the Committee was adopted; and is as follows:

Certain papers, which have a necessary connection with each other, viz. Paper No. 1, which is the petition of certain ministers in Nebraska Territory, asking to be set off into a new Presbytery; Paper No. 2, which is the petition of the Presbytery of Council Bluffs, asking that the ministers in Nebraska Territory, with the Rev. D. L. Hughes, of Huntingdon Presbytery, be attached to the Presbytery of Council Bluffs; and Papers Nos. 3 and 4, which are petitions of the Presbyteries of Des Moines and Iowa, in favour of strengthening the Presbytery of Council Bluffs, and against the organization of a Presbytery in Nebraska Territory.

The Committee, after consultation with the parties interested, recommend the following action as the best, under all the circumstances:

Resolved, 1. That a new Presbytery be erected out of the Territory of Nebraska, to be called the Presbytery of Omaha, which shall consist of the following ministers and churches, viz.—Rev. William Hamilton, of the Presbytery of Upper Missouri; Rev. George P. Bergen, of the Presbytery

of Cincinnati; Rev. Simeon Peck, of the Presbytery of Findley; Rev. William Young Brown, of the Presbytery of New Lisbon; Rev. Charles Sturges, of the Presbytery of Long Island; and Rev. William B. Hall, of the Presbytery of _____, together with all the churches in the Territory of Nebraska.

Resolved, 2. That the Presbytery of Omaha be connected with the Synod of Southern Iowa; and that it meet for organization on the second Wednesday of July next, at 11 o'clock, A. M., at Omaha City; and that Rev. William Hamilton preach the opening sermon, and preside until a Moderator be appointed; and that Rev. G. P. Bergen be his alternate.

Resolved, 3. That Rev. D. L. Hughes, of the Presbytery of Huntingdon, be transferred to the Presbytery of Council Bluffs, and that the latter Presbytery be directed to meet at Pacific City, Iowa, on the third Tuesday of July next, at 8 o'clock, A. M.; and that Rev. John Hancock preach the opening sermon, and preside until a Moderator be appointed; and that Rev. D. L. Hughes be his alternate.

Overture No. 13, on demission of the ministerial office.

D. X. Junkin moved that, as an amendment to the report of the Committee, the overture be sent down to the Presbyteries, with the request that they take action, and report to the next General Assembly.

The motion was carried, and the overture is as follows, viz.

Resolved, That it be referred to the Presbyteries whether the following sections shall be added to the 15th chapter of the Form of Government, viz.

XVI. The office of a minister of the gospel is perpetual, and cannot be laid aside at pleasure. No person can be divested of it but by deposition. Yet, from various causes, a minister may become incapable of performing the duties of the office; or he may, though chargeable with neither heresy or immorality, become unacceptable in his official character. In such case he may cease to be an acting minister.

XVII. Wherever a minister, from any cause not inferring heresy, crime, or scandal, shall be incapable of serving the Church to edification, the Presbytery shall take order on the subject, and state the fact, together with the reasons of it, on their record. And when any person has thus ceased to be an acting minister, he shall not be a member of any Presbytery or Synod, but shall be subject to discipline as other ministers, provided always that nothing of this kind shall be done without the consent of the individual in question, except by advice of the Synod; and provided, also, that no case shall be finally decided except at a stated meeting of the Presbytery.

XVIII. Any minister having demitted the exercise of his office in the manner herein provided, may, if the Presbytery which acted on his demission think proper, be restored to the exercise thereof, and to all the rights incident thereto, provided that the consent of the Synod be obtained, in case his demission was ordered by the Synod in the manner above recited.

Overture No. 15, a memorial from Dr. Awl, of the Presbytery of Columbus, asking the Assembly to take measures for the observance of a national prayer-meeting on the 4th day of July next.

The Committee recommend, that inasmuch as the 4th of July occurs this year on the Sabbath, the Assembly recommend that special prayer be offered on that day for the blessing of God upon our whole country, in all the relations of its national and international affairs. Adopted.

Overture No. 17—A joint request from the Synod of Georgia and the Presbytery of East Alabama, for the Assembly to attach to the Presbytery

of East Alabama that portion of Florida within the bounds of the Synod of Georgia and west of Holmes county, Florida.

The Committee recommend that the petition be granted. Adopted.

D. McKinney offered the following paper, which was adopted.

Whereas, It is desirable that a Presbytery should be formed of the territory lying between the Atlantic Ocean and Delaware Bay, on the east, and the Chesapeake Bay on the west; and whereas, it seems expedient and just that the wishes of the churches and ministers concerned should be granted without unnecessary delay, be it, therefore,

Resolved, 1. That the counties of Northampton and Accomac in Virginia—Worcester, Somerset, Dorchester, Talbot, Caroline and Queen Anne in Maryland, and Sussex in Delaware, be, and they hereby are, constituted the Presbytery of Lewes; to which, with the consent of the Presbytery of Newcastle, shall also be added the county of Kent, in Delaware. Said Presbytery to be attached to and form a part of the Synod of Baltimore.

Resolved, 2. That said Presbytery hold its first meeting for organization and the transaction of business in the church of Lewes, Sussex county, Delaware, on the third Wednesday of September, 1858, and that Rev. A. C. Heaton, or the oldest minister present, preach the sermon, constitute the Presbytery and preside till a Moderator be chosen.

John Squier, from the Committee on the Records of the Synod of Mississippi, reported, recommending that they be approved. Adopted.

R. D. Morris, from the Committee appointed to bring in a minute expressing the judgment of the Assembly in the decision on Judicial Case, No. 4, reported accordingly.

B. M. Palmer moved, to lay the report on the table, for the purpose of considering a substitute, which he read.

This motion was carried; and a motion being made to adopt the substitute, R. J. Breckinridge rose to speak in opposition to it; when objections were made to hearing him, inasmuch as he was counsel for one of the parties. The Moderator decided, that he should be heard in any discussion on the adoption of a minute. An appeal was taken from this decision of the Chair, by A. T. Rankin, but was not sustained. The Moderator's decision was approved.

On motion of E. T. Baird, the substitute was laid on the table, by a vote of 64 to 58.

The Assembly then took up the report of the Committee, which had been laid on the table.

Several motions were made successively; to amend, to recommit, and to postpone indefinitely; when on motion of D. X. Junkin, these motions were all laid on the table, and the paper of B. M. Palmer was taken up again; and finally adopted as the minute of the Assembly, by a vote of 80 to 47.

This paper is as follows, viz.

This General Assembly sustains the Appeal and Complaint of Robert S. Finley and Smith Bloomfield, against the Synod of New Jersey.

In this decision, it is not intended to censure the courts below for want of zeal and faithfulness in doing according to their best judgment what the case required. Much less is it intended to reverse, in form, what has been done in the case of Mr. Finley, so as to restore him to his pastoral relation, in the Second church of Woodbridge; for this would be not only impracticable, in the circumstances, as they now exist, but inexpedient, even if it were practicable.

But the Presbytery of Elizabethtown erred in attempting too much to direct and control the action of that Session, interfering without being

called to do so, according to the forms of our constitution; in arresting the process of discipline, before it had been issued—while the Session were pursuing it in an orderly manner; and in dissolving the pastoral relation upon a mere presumption of a majority of the people desiring it, without the regular application of either party; thus making what they judged a necessity in the case, of more importance than the forms of the constitution.

The Synod of New Jersey erred, not only in sustaining the action of the Presbytery in this case, but also in refusing to entertain as an appeal the remedy sought by a party, who was both injured and aggrieved by said action of the Presbytery.

John H. Rice asked leave to have his dissent entered on the Minutes, and others joined him in the request.

On motion of E. T. Baird, this leave was granted. The dissent is as follows:

The undersigned dissent from the vote of the General Assembly, assigning reasons for the decision in the case of the appeal of the Rev. R. S. Finley, because in their opinion it does not express the sense of the court deciding the case, and because the minority were permitted by this vote to change or modify the deliberate decision of a majority of the court.

Resolved, That this General Assembly be now dissolved; and that another General Assembly, chosen in like manner, be required to meet in the city of Indianapolis, Indiana, in the Third Presbyterian Church, on the third Thursday of May, 1859, at eleven o'clock, A. M.

Closed with singing, prayer, and the apostolic benediction.

APPENDIX.

NARRATIVE OF THE STATE OF RELIGION

ADOPTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES, AT THEIR SESSIONS AT NEW ORLEANS, MAY, 1858, AND ADDRESSED TO THE CHURCHES UNDER THEIR CARE.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, met in the city of New Orleans, Louisiana, is once more permitted, with the most profound and grateful acknowledgments to God for his mercies, to greet all under its care and supervision, with another annual narrative of the state of religion.

One hundred and seventeen Presbyteries have sent up reports on the work of the Lord within their bounds during the past year; and from a careful examination of these, we are enabled now to send back to the churches, for their information and encouragement, the following condensed statement of what the Lord, in his infinite and amazing grace, has done for us and for our people, since the meeting of the last Assembly.

It is manifest, on the very face of these reports, that it has been a memorable year in Zion—a year of the right hand of the Most High. It has been a year of great awakening in our churches—a year of refreshing influences from the presence of the Lord. “The Lord hath visited and redeemed his people.” “The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad.” It has been a year marked by unusual peace, concord, unanimity, co-operation, and brotherly kindness among our churches; unusual encouragement, fidelity, zeal, and success in all the labours of our ministry. It has been a year in which all the great charities and enterprises of the Church have moved steadily and successfully forward, as under the guidance of an unseen, but irresistible hand, to the accomplishment of these great objects, for which the Church herself was ordained of God. And notwithstanding the commercial reverses which at one time visited our country, and the sad disasters which fell upon a portion of our foreign field, still of our Zion it may be said, that we have had “peace within her walls, and prosperity in all her palaces.” The great majority of reports coming up to us from all parts of our vast domain—the North, the South, the East, the West—open with ascriptions of humble yet adoring love and thanksgiving to the great Head of the Church, for this wonderful manifestation of his presence and power.

In so wide a field as that covered by these reports, and with so vast an array of facts as they bring to view, it is not easy to present, in so brief a statement as this must be, all the information they give us; but some definite and comprehensive view may perhaps be communicated by classifying them under the three following divisions.

1. A small number of our Presbyteries—very small, as compared with the whole, perhaps not exceeding a dozen—have no glad tidings to report. The cloud of gracious visitation which has overshadowed our land, seems not as yet to have reached them. They speak of coldness and discouragement within; of prevailing worldliness and iniquity without. With them the ways of Zion still mourn, and few come to her solemn feasts. Intemperance, Sabbath desecration,

neglect of ordinances, fashionable amusements, covetousness, and love of worldly pleasure, still abound. And yet all these reports come to us breathing the spirit of prayer; burthened with the most earnest longings for a better state of things; full of expressions of faith and hope in God, and of strong determination to cry aloud, and spare not—holding forth the word of life until the Lord shall appear for their help.

2. The second, and a much larger division of these reports, embraces all those Presbyteries in which there has been a gradual and most marked increase of activity in the churches during the year, and especially the latter portion of it. They speak of the more than ordinary willingness of the people everywhere to hear the gospel preached, of growing attendance on all the stated means of grace, of new life and zeal in the eldership, and of constant accessions to the membership of the churches; but yet without such marked manifestations of the Spirit's power as usually attend revivals.

In all these Presbyteries, the work of the Lord in the conversion of sinners, the edification of saints, and the training of the lambs of the flock, seems to have gone steadily forward, widening and deepening in interest to the very close of our year; so as in some cases to leave God's people cheered with the prospect of an immediate outpouring of his Spirit upon them. They tell us with grateful, rejoicing hearts, how the gospel has been preached, in season and out of season, as with a new unction from on high poured upon the ministry; how the beloved children and youth of their charges have been cared for and instructed in catechetical and Bible classes; how the coloured people at the South are receiving everywhere the fostering care of our ministers and churches; how the Sabbath-school cause has been sustained and extended; how feeble churches have been strengthened, pastoral relations cemented, backsliders reclaimed; how systematic benevolence, church extension, and all the Boards of the Assembly have been steadily growing in favour with the people; and how, just in proportion as these good things have prevailed, intemperance, Sabbath-breaking, and all those evils mentioned in the former class of reports, though still existing, have been gradually and greatly abated.

3. But another, and by far the largest class of these reports, embracing in fact about seventy Presbyteries, or nearly two-thirds of the whole number reported, bring us the blessed and glorious tidings of deep and powerful revivals. They record the signal and mighty operations of the Spirit of God, poured out almost simultaneously upon a vast multitude of our churches, covering an area almost as wide as our whole domain. The greater part of them refer to the latter portion of our year, or the closing months of winter and the opening months of spring, as the beginning of these precious seasons of revival; some tracing them to the day of prayer for Colleges, some to the general prayer-meeting at Pittsburgh, and some to other things, as the starting point, but all, without exception, to the unmerited grace, and the infinite power of God, as the only efficient cause.

Over and above all those indications of good, which we have mentioned as characterizing the second class of reports, and which to a great extent characterize these also, especially in the first part of the year, it is manifest that these seventy Presbyteries, scattered in all parts of our land, have been blessed with displays of the presence, power, and grace of the Holy Ghost, to a degree which must render the latter portion of the year for ever memorable in our annals, as the era of a general and wide-spread awakening of the public mind of our country to the great things of salvation. It would be tedious to mention all the churches, or even all the Presbyteries, that have shared, more or less, in this great work. The list of churches would swell to many hundreds. The number of churches thus visited, varies in these Presbyteries from two or three in a single Presbytery, to as many as all the churches of a Presbytery, except two or three. The number of converts reported by these Presbyteries, leaving out a few smaller accessions, varies from fifty to as high as six hundred. Several of them mention about five hundred. These converts are spoken of as including all ages and all classes of the people; the rich, the poor, the bond, the free, the young, the old; from the old man of three-score and ten to the child of ten and twelve; from the hardened sceptic, the veteran moralist, and the poor outcast prodigal, to the beloved sons and daughters of God's covenant. But the great body of them have been gathered in from the ranks of the young; from the Sabbath-school and Bible-class;

from the baptized children that adorn our family altars and grow up under the droppings of our public sanctuaries.

In some of these reports this great work is described as exceeding in power, and in all its blessed influences, anything that the most aged servants of God had ever witnessed before. It is invariably and universally represented as deep, solemn, and silent; unattended by any extravagances, excitements, or extraordinary measures; coming not by human might or power, but as by the still small voice of God's Spirit; coming as a direct answer to the prayers of his people, and in the regular faithful use of all the appointed means of grace; but chiefly the preaching of the word and prayer. Many of the Presbyteries were enjoying these seasons of refreshing at the very date of their reports, and some of them, where the interest had long existed, speak of it as continuing with unabated power.

As showing how wide has been this great awakening in our churches, it will be sufficient to mention only a part of these seventy Presbyteries, selecting those, which so far as we have been able to judge, have shared most largely in the blessing. These are, New York, Hudson, Nassau, North River, Troy, Mohawk, Londonderry, Long Island, Connecticut, Donegal, New Brunswick, Elizabethtown, Passaic, West Jersey, Newton, First and Second of Philadelphia, Baltimore, Susquehanna, Huntingdon, Erie, Washington, Allegheny, Beaver, Bedford, Schuyler, Clarion, Rock River, Chicago, Madison, Findlay, Columbus, Maumee, Dubuque, Cedar, Orange, Luzerne, Allegheny City, Ohio, Zanesville, Peoria, Kaskaskia, St. Clairsville, Cincinnati, Crawfordsville, Indianapolis, Ebenezer, Louisville, Greenbrier, Charleston, South Carolina, East Alabama, South Alabama, North Mississippi, Memphis, St. Louis, and Upper Missouri. This list, though it seem long, is far from being complete; but these are named as indicating the wide extent of the Spirit's operation in our land. Many other Presbyteries, not named, have shared in this great blessing.

Among the pleasing results recorded in these reports, we must not fail to mention, that the Lord has poured out his Spirit upon several of our Colleges, Schools, and Presbyterial Academies, and many of our beloved youth, both male and female, have been led to seek and find an interest in the Saviour. This has been the case, especially in Davidson College, North Carolina, in Oglethorpe University, Georgia, in Hanover College, Indiana, in Washington and Jefferson Colleges, Pennsylvania, in Miami University, Ohio, and in Richmond College, Missouri.

One of the most remarkable features of this great awakening has been the disposition on the part of the people of God everywhere to gather together around the throne of grace in the social prayer-meeting. Christians have loved to meet their fellow-Christians, of all evangelical churches, in the house of prayer; to lift up the voice of song, of thanksgiving, and of supplication together, at morning, noon, and night, around one common mercy-seat; whilst men, unused to prayer, have quit the business of the world, saying, Come and let us go up to the house of the Lord.

And still another remarkable feature, frequently referred to in these reports, is the new zeal and activity manifested on the part of the ruling elders and deacons of the churches, enabling them to uphold the hands of the ministry, not only by their prayers, but by their own efficient co-operation and assistance, in meetings for prayer and inquiry, in Bible classes, and especially in personal visitation from house to house.

But time would fail us to tell the whole story of this great and wonderful work of the Lord. Eternity alone can adequately disclose all its great and blessed results, when that uncounted multitude of souls that have been born in Zion during the past year shall stand amongst the redeemed before the throne of the Lamb.

And now, brethren beloved in the Lord, ministers, ruling elders, and people of our great charge, on an occasion so extraordinary as this, and after such a review of the unspeakable mercies of God, vouchsafed to us as a Church, we should fail to discharge our high and solemn obligations, as the chief judicatory of the whole Church, if we did not seek to impress upon your minds, however briefly, some of those great practical lessons which have been so deeply impressed upon our own, by the Lord's dealings with us.

1. The first relates to the manner in which this visitation has come; showing that the Head of the Church is the God that governs the world, and that he is working all things for her good. At the opening of the year there was a tide of worldly prosperity in our land that threatened to engulf all serious thoughts of God and eternity. God laid his hand upon us, and then there was a cry of alarm and distress in all the walks of industry and labour, which caused men's hearts to fail, and turned their thoughts directly to God and another world. But as if this was not enough, our Zion was called to listen to a tale of horror, coming across the waters from the graves of her martyred missionaries, which filled all eyes with tears, all hearts with dismay. What was the Church to do at such a time, her substance and her sons destroyed abroad, and the arm of her power so crippled at home that she seemed utterly unable to fill up the vacuum? She could only do what she has ever done in the hour of calamity—arise and call mightily upon God. This, by grace, she was enabled to do; and this great revival of her vital spirit is the result. Through the fires of affliction and disaster she was led to humiliation and repentance, and stronger trust in God; and by these to the blessings of his grace.

2. The next great lesson is derived from considering the means which have been used in all this season of revival. They have been those, and those only, which God has authorized in the Scriptures—earnest, importunate prayer, the faithful preaching of gospel truth, the instruction of the young, pastoral visitation from house to house, and steady perseverance in every work and labour of love. Never in the annals of our Church has her ministry appeared more agreed and determined to know nothing but Christ and him crucified; to leave all human devices and inventions, and preach boldly and solely the grand doctrines of salvation as expounded in our Calvinistic standards, whether men will hear or forbear to hear, than during the past year. And lo! what has God done? How has he rolled away our reproach, put honour upon the preaching of the cross, and all the means of grace; and made us feel, as by a public demonstration from heaven, even by the descent of that same Spirit which was poured upon the disciples on the day of Pentecost, that this gospel is the power of God and the wisdom of God unto salvation to all that believe.

3. Once more. What a lesson of encouragement for all the future does this record of the past read to us. Is there any argument for Christianity more powerful, any evidence of piety more pleasing, any motive to exertion more blessed and glorious, than to feel that the Lord God has been with us; has succoured us in distress; has heard our poor prayers; has answered and blessed our unworthy labours? But hundreds of our ministers, thousands of our people, have had this testimony from God during the past year. And we all have it to-day, as we send forth this annual narrative. Let us then, with renewed zeal, gird on the whole armour of the gospel for the conflicts and the labours of another year; feeling that no faithful labour shall be lost, and no praying breath spent in vain. In due season we shall reap, if we faint not.

With the most profound gratitude to God, we would record the fact, that this year, which closes a century since the great reunion of 1758, has been marked as a year of revivals. And now, as we enter the labours of a new century, we would humbly commit ourselves and all our people to God.

Grace, mercy, and peace be multiplied to all, from the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Ghost, world without end. Amen.

Of these, Edward P. Shields was a graduate of the Theological Seminary at New Albany, Indiana. Albert B. King and Nathaniel McConaughy were received by certificate from the Union Theological Seminary, New York. Chester Bridgman and John Darrach from the Theological Seminary at Columbia, South Carolina. William R. Marshall from the Western Theological Seminary at Allegheny, Pennsylvania. And H. Graham Finney from the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Presbyterian Church at Philadelphia.

The whole number in attendance upon the exercises of the Institution, during the present year, has been *one hundred and thirty-two*, including one resident missionary and four resident licentiates.

One student, viz. Charles H. Young, has died in the course of the session.

The Professors reported to the Board, that the religious life of the students, as far as it has come under their observation, has been exemplary. The customary religious meetings have been maintained with the usual frequency, and with apparent devotion. The interest in the work of foreign missions has been more marked than ordinary, and several are expecting to engage personally in labours among the heathen.

At the close of the session, the students were examined, for nearly a week, in presence of a Committee of the Board.

The Committee of Examination, in their report to the Board, state that the results of the examination have been alike creditable to Professors and students. The attendance on the exercises, on the part of the members of all the classes, has been unusually large. The members of the Committee who have been present on former occasions, can recall no occasion on which the students have discovered such familiarity with the grammatical construction of the Hebrew and Greek languages, or with the interpretation of the Old and New Testaments. To the subjects too, of Introduction and Biblical History, great attention has been paid, and with these the several classes have discovered an acquaintance highly gratifying.

The Committee further reported their special approbation of the examination on Pastoral Theology and Homiletics.

The Committee further reported, that on the whole, in their judgment, this examination has proved more satisfactory than any preceding one which they have had the privilege of attending, and that the standard of professional acquisition has been decidedly elevated.

Certificates of having finished the whole course prescribed in the Plan, were conferred on the following *twenty-nine* students, viz.—Henry C. Alexander, Robert Alexander, Lewis C. Baker, James F. The Trustees of the Theological Seminary of the Presbyterian Church, located at Princeton, New Jersey, present to the General Assembly, the following as their Thirty-Third Annual Report.

Agreeably to the recommendation of the Treasurer, the Board passed the following resolution, viz.

Resolved, That the Treasurer pass to the credit of the Education Fund the sum of \$364 55, being the uninvested balance of the John Hoff legacy, to be used as other moneys on the Students' Fund.

From the Librarian's Report it appears there have been added to the library through

the year, by donation, 531 volumes, and by purchase, 1 volume; making the entire number of volumes now in the library, 14,661.

The Presbyterian Board of Publication have presented 47 volumes of their issues; the Smithsonian Institution their last Report, and the last volume of their Contributions to Knowledge; Rev. Dr. Sprague, volumes 3 and 4 of the Annals of the American Pulpit; the Rev. Evan Davies of Richmond, England, 5 volumes, of which he was the Editor or Author; and Samuel Agnew, Esq., of Philadelphia, 475 volumes.

These last are part of a collection which Mr. Agnew has been gathering with great pains and diligence for a number of years, and in which he has endeavoured to bring together all the rare and valuable publications which have appeared upon certain specific subjects. These volumes comprise, in addition to other valuable works, a complete set of the books of the Parker Society, except one volume, which it has been impossible to obtain; the most complete and sumptuous editions of the works of the venerable Bede, and Boston, and a large number of publications on the Trinity, many of which are very rare and difficult to be procured.

A large amount of binding has been executed at the expense of Robert L. Stuart, Esq.

Valuable boxes of clothing for the Students have been received from the Female Charitable Society of Morris Plain; the Third Presbyterian Church, Newark, N. J.; and from the Ladies of the Church under the pastoral care of the Rev. James W. Alexander, D. D., New York. Some of the Professors have also received benefactions for the use of the students, from benevolent persons, whose names have not been reported.

The students have been examined, at the close of the term, in the presence of a Committee of the Board, who report that the attendance and attention of the students were highly commendable. They also report, that they were gratified in the unmistakable evidences of study on the part of a large proportion of the students, and of industry and diligence on the part of our excellent corps of Professors.

The Faculty report "that the health of the students has been uninterrupted, with scarce a single exception, and the course of study has been prosecuted with exemplary diligence and animation. They take pleasure in reporting a very aroused interest in the work of Foreign Missions. Three of the students in the different classes have already offered themselves to the Board and been accepted, and others are purposed to offer themselves at the proper time. The present wide-spread religious awakening with which God has very signally blessed this region of our land, has furnished the students a precious opportunity of labouring in the great harvest field. They have been able, with little interruption to their studies, to give important aid to pastors in social meetings, and to witness the work of the Spirit in the ingathering of souls. In this densely settled Presbyterian region there has been the amplest opportunity of training in this practical department, and the happy effect of such exercise has been very manifest on the students themselves."

At no period in the history of the Western Theological Seminary have the tokens of Divine favour been more encouraging than during the past term. The state of religious interest in the Seminary has been peculiarly gratifying, and calls for special gratitude to the great Head of the Church.

The Board take great pleasure in reporting to the General Assembly the acceptance of the Rev. Samuel J. Wilson of the Professorship to which he was elected at their last meeting. Mr. Wilson has performed the duties of his Professorship during the entire term, and was regularly inaugurated at the late meeting of the Board, under the most flattering prospects of acceptance and usefulness.

UNION THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

Report of the Union Seminary of the General Assembly, under the care of the Synods of Virginia and North Carolina, and the Presbytery of Winchester; located in Prince Edward County, Virginia.

To the General Assembly of 1858.—The undersigned, the Faculty of the above Seminary, were authorized and appointed by the Synods of Virginia and North Carolina, at their last regular meeting, to prepare the usual Annual Report to the General Assembly, inasmuch as the meeting of that venerable body is this year before the meeting of the Board. We therefore submit, on behalf of the Board of Directors, the following Report of the state of the Institution from May 1st, 1857 to April 15th, 1858.

The number of students receiving instruction during the year has been twenty-one, of whom nine were matriculated this year, viz.

All the above vested funds are at 6 per cent., except the bank stocks, which have yielded as much as 8 per cent., but cannot be relied upon to yield more than 6 per cent. in future.

In addition to the above vested funds, the Treasurer reports about \$1000 in hand, received from the churches or individual donors, for the behoof of the permanent funds and buildings of the Seminary, which is liable to be reduced by small payments still to be made for real estate.

While all this sum, except the debt of \$900 due to the West Hanover Presbytery, enures to the service of the Seminary in some form, yet when deducted from the total of \$97,125, above given, it leaves the sum of \$84,632 37 available for the support of instruction proper in the Seminary. But in addition to this, the Seminary draws \$250 per annum, for this purpose, from the rents of its real estate; so that estimating the yield of all vested funds at 6 per cent., the Seminary possesses this year an income of \$5327 94 for meeting all of its current expenses, exclusive of Scholarship and Library.

It should be stated in explanation that last year's Report gave \$82,300 as the total of the vested funds of the Seminary. It was intended to report in this amount only the permanent endowments of the Seminary proper, exclusive of Scholarships, but by oversight, some funds, newly invested in Virginia State Bonds, for the unfinished Scholarships of West Hanover Presbytery and others, were included. The statement which we now give presents the true state of the case. It is also proper to state, that the financial year of the Treasurer of the Seminary ends May 1st, so that the state of the funds at that day may not tally precisely with the above tables.

The Agent of the Board of Directors for the permanent endowment is still in the field, and continues to meet with a cordial and liberal response from all the churches. It is not in our power to report the exact amount of outstanding subscriptions to the permanent endowment, inasmuch as they are receiving weekly increase; and the Agent has made no detailed report since the last meeting of the Board; but from reliable data, they must be not less than \$8500, of which the larger part are good, and will ultimately be collected. The Directors propose to seek a permanent endowment of \$125,000 before they pause.

The salaries now paid the Professors are \$1350 each, per annum. The real estate of the Seminary consists of about thirty-five acres of land, the Seminary building, capable of accommodating from 60 to 80 students, four Professors' houses, and a large and convenient Steward's house. The Library now consists of 4627 volumes—and the increase during the year has been 184 volumes, by donations, as follows: Mr. G. W. Gretter, 15 volumes; Presbyterian Board of Publication, 44 volumes; members of Congress, 8 volumes; Mrs. Dr. J. H. Rice, 1 volume; Rev. James N. Lewis, 58 volumes; Rev. W. B. Sprague, D. D., 4 volumes; Mrs. L. G. Shearer, 9 volumes; and from the Society of Alumni, 45 volumes.

There are at present four Scholarships, and beginnings made for three others.

The General Assembly of Virginia, at its last sessions, granted to a Board of Trustees of Union Theological Seminary an Act of Incorporation, constituting the following persons—Asa D. Dickinson, Albert G. Green, David Comfort, Joel W. Marshall, Francis N. Watkins, Clement C. Read, John Dupuy, Francis P. Wood, Robert C. Anderson, and Thomas T. Treadway—a body politic and corporate, with liberal privileges, to hold all real and moveable property and funds of the Seminary. A copy of this charter is herewith submitted to the General Assembly, and it is requested that, should it seem proper to the wisdom of that venerable body, the Board of Directors of the Seminary be authorized, with the concurrence of the other judicatories, to whose care the Assembly has committed the Institution, to transfer to said Trustees all the lands, funds, and other property, now committed to their trust. The Assembly should be informed, that as this property has hitherto been disposed by the Board, it has no secure legal protection. The real estate has been conveyed to certain individuals and their legal heirs, to hold jointly, in trust, for the exclusive benefit of the Seminary for ever; and all of the public securities are held in a similar manner. But the Board has always been assured by learned counsel, that should these personal Trustees, or their heirs, or their creditors, in case of bankruptcy, choose to violate the trust, the laws of Virginia would hitherto have given the Board of Directors no certain remedy. It is believed, that should the General Assembly, the Synods, &c., authorize it, the Board can now easily procure the relinquishment of the trust by all these individual Trustees, into the hands of the above mentioned corporation.

AN ACT

To amend an Act entitled an Act for the incorporation of the Trustees of Union Theological Seminary, in Prince Edward, passed December 20th, 1855.

Passed March 6th, 1858.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly, that the Act entitled "An Act for the Incorporation of the Trustees of Union Theological Seminary in Prince Edward," passed December twentieth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five, be amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

Be it enacted by the General Assembly, that Asa D. Dickinson, Albert G. Green, David Comfort, Joel W. Marshall, Francis N. Watkins, Clement C. Read, John Dupuy, Francis P. Wood, Robert C. Anderson, and Thomas T. Treadway, be and they are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name and style of the Trustees of Union Theological Seminary, in the county of Prince Edward; and by that name shall have succession for the space of twenty-five years, and have a common seal; may sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, with power to hold, receive, and purchase lands, tenements, money, and other chattels, and dispose of and manage the same as shall seem best for the said Seminary: provided that the lands so held and acquired shall not exceed

two hundred and fifty acres, nor the money and other chattels the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and provided, further, that a majority of said Trustees or their successors, may at any time, (with the approbation of the Board of Directors of said Seminary,) increase their number to twenty-one, and that not less than two-thirds of the Trustees, for the time being, shall be sufficient to authorize the sale or mortgage of any real estate belonging to said Institution.

The said Trustees and their successors shall have power to appoint a President, Treasurer, and Secretary, and such other officers as they may deem best, from their own body, and to make and establish, from time to time, such by-laws, rules, and regulations, not contrary to the Constitution and laws of this State and of the United States, as they may deem proper. A majority of the Trustees shall constitute a Board for the transaction of business, except for the sale or mortgage of real estate; and any vacancy or vacancies amongst the Trustees, occasioned by death or otherwise, shall be supplied by appointment by the Board of Trustees, on the nomination of the Board of Directors of said Seminary.

The Treasurer shall receive all money accruing to the Seminary, and property delivered to his care, and shall pay or deliver the same to the order of the Board of Trustees. Before entering upon the discharge of his duties, he shall give bond and security, and in such penalty as the said Board may direct, made payable to the Trustees and their successors, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duty under the rules and regulations adopted by the said Board; and it shall be lawful for the Trustees to obtain judgment for the amount thereof, or for any special delinquency incurred by said Treasurer, on motion in any court of record in this Commonwealth, against the said Treasurer and his security or securities, his or their executors or administrators, upon giving ten days notice of such motion.

The said Board of Trustees shall have power, either by themselves or their agents, to take and receive subscriptions for said Seminary; and in case any person shall fail to pay his or her subscription, to enforce the payment thereof by warrant before a magistrate, or by motion in any court of record in this Commonwealth, according to the amount of such subscription, upon giving ten days notice of such motion.

The Professors and teachers for the instruction of the theological students, shall be appointed by the Board of Directors of said Institution, and the management of the Seminary, and the course of instruction, shall be prescribed by said Directors.

The Board of Trustees shall, out of the interest of the funds, provide for and pay the salaries of the Professors and other officers, as may be directed by the Board of Directors aforesaid.

All investment of funds belonging to said Seminary, shall be made in good State or United States stocks, or, if in private hands, on mortgage at double the value of the investment; and the permanent funds shall, in no case, be used for the current expenses of the Seminary; and the income shall be applied, first, to the salaries of the Professors of the Seminary regularly appointed, according to the "Plan" of the Institution, to be paid semi-annually, so far as the proceeds of the funds and other property will avail; secondly, to the necessary repairs and insurance of the buildings, to be provided for so far as the funds will allow; and thirdly, to the improvement of the Library, and for the payment of such other contingent expenses as shall be recommended by the Board of Directors of the Seminary, and approved by the Board of Trustees.

At the expiration of this charter, unless the same shall have been renewed by act of legislation, the Trustees shall convey all the funds and property of the Seminary to such person or persons as shall be directed by the Board of Directors of said Institution; and any one or more of the said Directors may, in his or their names, on behalf of the said Seminary, commence and prosecute a suit in equity against any one or more of said Trustees, to compel him or them to surrender the said land, buildings, or property, for the use and benefit of the said Institution, as heretofore provided; and the suit or suits may be proceeded in, heard, and determined as other suits in equity, except that it may be proceeded in notwithstanding the death of the plaintiff or plaintiffs, as if he or they were still living.

This Act shall be in force from its passage.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS.

The Directors of the Theological Seminary under the care of the General Assembly, at Danville, Kentucky, respectfully submit to the General Assembly their Fifth Annual Report, as follows:

During the year now closed, the whole number of students in attendance has been forty. Of these, the following twenty-four new students have been matriculated:

The following candidates for the ministry, having completed the course of study prescribed by the Plan of the Seminary, and having sustained a final examination on the whole course, in the several departments, in the presence of the Board of Directors and the Professors, have received the certificate of the Seminary:

Herman H. Allen, of Kentucky; John C. Brown, of Virginia; Samuel Hibben, of Ohio; Alpheus H. Holloway, of Ohio; A. C. Kemper, of Ohio; Matthew McFeaters, of Pennsylvania; William R. Moore, of Kentucky; William A. Sample, of Tennessee; and Henry M. Scudder, of Kentucky.

The students of the Seminary are gathered from a wide dispersion. Of the nine who have just closed their studies, only three are from Kentucky; and of the forty students in attendance, only twelve are from that State—the remaining twenty-eight being from thirteen different States, besides one from Prussia.

The Faculty report to the Directors, that the students have been regular, punctual, and diligent; and that much interest has been awakened among them in respect to the missionary work of the Church, both foreign and domestic.

In the Plan of the Seminary, the Assembly has distributed the work of endowing the Seminary into five distinct stages. These, in the order prescribed, are the endowments—first, for the professorships; after that, for the erection of suitable public buildings; then, for the enlargement of the library; then, for the erection or purchase of residences for the Professors; then, for scholarships for students. Of these five forms of endowment, one has been secured by the labours of five years, to wit—the fund for the support of the Pro-

fessors, with a considerable balance for the next item. Although this is perhaps the most important, as it is the largest of them all, yet without the others it is wholly insufficient for the purposes of a theological school. It must be supplemented by the four other forms of endowment. Suitable public buildings, especially a fire-proof edifice for the library, a library constantly increasing; residences for Professors; and scholarships for students, are indispensable. None of these yet exist here in the sense of the Plan. The buildings now in use are insufficient, and the library in them exposed to destruction by fire. The library, though valuable as far as it goes, has received no accessions by purchase, and is therefore wanting in very many of the most valuable helps to a right understanding of the divine word. Not a house for the Professors is found here—their salaries being inadequate—nor a scholarship for the indigent student.

Is it the mind of the Church to carry out its original purposes respecting this Institution, and to fulfil in good faith the covenants of which these purposes were the explicit conditions? It is not to be supposed that the Church has abandoned its plans, after having drawn more than one hundred thousand dollars from the people of God, who have relied on the engagements of the Church to put the school in a position of complete endowment and the highest usefulness. The Directors cannot acquit their consciences without respectfully urging these decisive considerations on the attention of the venerable court which has required them to oversee with fidelity and diligence this immense interest. The report of the Board of Trustees will show the present state of the funds, which of itself will indicate both the means and the necessities of the Institution.

The Board of Directors have to report, with extreme regret, the resignation of the Rev. Stuart Robinson, Professor of Pastoral Theology and Church Government. He has felt himself constrained to take this step by peculiar circumstances in his private relations, which are not within his control. He has discharged the duties of his chair with signal ability, and now returns to the pastoral office with the best wishes of his brethren here. The election of his successor devolves upon the General Assembly, and in the opinion of this Board, the interests of the Institution demand that this vacancy be filled without delay.

A copy of the resolutions adopted by the Board in regard to the resignation of Professor Robinson, is herewith transmitted to the Assembly.

The Rev. Stephen Yerkes, appointed by the last General Assembly to the chair of Biblical and Oriental Literature, was duly inaugurated by the Board of Directors on the 16th day of December, 1857.

The Board have to report the death of the Rev. John C. Young, D.D., of the class of Directors whose term of office runs till May, 1860. This eminent minister was the Moderator of the General Assembly of 1853, which established this Institution, and a member of the Assembly of 1854, which adopted the acts and covenants on which it rests. By his efforts in procuring its endowments, his counsels in its Boards of control, and his steady and uniform adherence to its fortunes, he may well be numbered among its founders.

Resolved, 1. That in view of the eminent abilities of Professor Robinson, and the signal success which has attended his labours as a Professor in this Seminary, as well as in view of the circumstances which seem to render this step necessary on his part, this Board accept his resignation with profound regret.

Resolved, 2. That the Board will remember, with the liveliest gratitude, the services which he has rendered the Seminary, and will cherish the deepest interest in his future welfare, and in his success in the field of labour on which he proposes soon to enter. And,

Resolved, 3. That in order to meet what appear to be the wishes of Professor Robinson, and to facilitate the election of a successor by the General Assembly, the chair of Church Government and Pastoral Theology which he has held, be declared vacant at the termination of the present session of the Seminary.

5. It will be seen by the preceding statement, that on the present footing of the Seminary, it may be considered able to sustain itself. In the meantime, the Board of Trustees is making constant efforts to collect and invest that portion of the funds which remain due from individuals. All the investments heretofore made in public securities are believed to be entirely safe; and the whole of the stocks and bonds purchased, have been got at such rates as to increase the funds of the Seminary considerably. In the present state of the stock market, it is greatly to the interest of the institution that the private funds due to it should be paid and invested in public securities.

6. The compensation given to the Professors is inadequate; and the promise was made to them, and reiterated in the Plan of the Seminary, that houses should be provided for them as soon as the state of the corporate funds would allow of it. Besides this, the fund necessary to erect suitable public buildings has yet to be created; a fund for the augmentation of the library has yet to be provided, as well as a fund for the support of indigent students. Great as has been the liberality manifested towards this Seminary, it is therefore apparent that large additional funds must be given to it, in order to put it on a footing answerable to the work it is expected to perform. The Trustees will not fail to use all proper endeavours to collect these additional funds; and they venture to believe that the past economy, diligence, and success with which the pecuniary interests of the institution have been managed, will be considered by the Christian people a guaranty that their future charities to it will also be properly managed.

7. The real estate of the Seminary, which is of considerable value—its public buildings, which answer its present necessity; its library, which is of considerable extent and great

value, together with some small amounts of unproductive stocks of very uncertain value—are not estimated in the preceding statements. With respect to the greater part of this unproductive but indispensable property, the Seminary has been favoured by the same providential care of God, which has been manifested in everything that related to it. The whole of it has been acquired either by donation or at very reduced rates. Within the past year a much better chapel, lecture-room, and library have been provided in the buildings already owned by the Seminary; and large additions have been made to the permanent funds of the Institution. Upon the whole, although the country has passed through a period of extraordinary embarrassment, the pecuniary interests of this Seminary have not only not suffered any serious losses, but have, on the other hand, received a greater impulse than during any year of its existence, except the first.

The Board of Trustees reverently acknowledge the great goodness of God, and his constant favour towards their endeavours in consolidating and advancing the interests committed to them.

ABSTRACT OF THE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1857-8.

In presenting their Fifty-sixth Annual Report to the General Assembly, the Board of Domestic Missions feel that they have great cause for gratitude and praise to Almighty God for the signal favours shown to them during the year, in the prosecution of the important work of domestic missions entrusted to their official management. During the period covered by this Report, our country has suffered an extraordinary commercial and financial revulsion, compelling a general suspension of specie payments by the banks—producing a great derangement in our domestic exchanges, the almost total suspension, for a time, of business of every kind; rendering thousands bankrupt, and reducing hundreds of thousands of operatives to actual want. At the commencement of this sudden and violent monetary crisis, the treasury of the Board was nearly exhausted, and for a considerable time after the panic had become general our current receipts amounted to almost nothing. Our accruing liabilities being very large, the prospect was indeed gloomy, and the Board felt constrained, while appealing for assistance to meet their weekly payments, to begin at once the prudential work of retrenchment. As our fiscal year progressed, however, we were gradually relieved by the liberal contributions of individuals and churches; and these, with the timely restrictive measures adopted by the Board, enabled us, with the divine blessing, to meet all our engagements, and to close the year in a safe and prosperous condition. Truly God has been better than our fears, and to him be all the praise!

There has been, during the year, an increase in the number of our missionaries; a considerable augmentation of receipts, both from the churches and in individual donations and legacies; a slight increase in the aggregate appropriations; and a small increase in the balance on hand at the close of the fiscal year. In every department there has been an encouraging progress; and, what is better than all, the Holy Spirit has graciously visited many of our missionary churches, and blessed the ministrations of our missionaries to the conversion of many precious souls. For all these signal favours, we doubt not the General Assembly will heartily unite with the Board in their expressions of gratitude and praise to the great Head of the Church for his unmerited goodness and mercy. Without further anticipating our report, we proceed to exhibit the details.

OPERATIONS OF THE YEAR.

OF MISSIONS.—*Statistical Details.*—The number of missionaries in commission, March 1, 1857, was 419, to which have been added, to March 1, 1858, 191—making the whole number 610, and more by 20 than the year previous.

The number of churches and missionary stations, wholly or in part supplied (as far as reported) by our missionaries, is 990.

The number of newly organized churches is 45.

The number of admissions on examination is 2,338, and on certificate 1,820; making a total of admissions of 4,158.

The number in communion with churches connected with the Board is 23,384.

The number of Sabbath-schools is 332; of teachers, 2,440; and of scholars, 15,910.

The number of baptisms is 2,568.

Of the 610 missionaries who have been in commission during the year, 200 have sent in no special report for the Assembly, nearly one-third of the whole number; consequently we must increase all the returns one third to make them correct.

APPROPRIATIONS.—The appropriations made to our missionaries, from March 1, 1857, to March 1, 1858, have been, at the office in Philadelphia, \$61,085.00; and at the office in Louisville, \$35,025.00; making a total of \$96,110.00.

The appropriations made to our missionaries, from March 1, 1856, to March 1, 1857, were, at the office in Philadelphia, \$58,885.17; and at the office in Louisville, \$37,219.75; making a total of \$96,104.92.

From this statement it appears that the appropriations made at the office in Philadelphia exceeded those made the year before, \$2,199.83; and at the office in Louisville they were less by \$2,194.75; thus making the total appropriations this year more than the year preceding by \$5.08.

For the purpose of further comparison, we may state that the *average* appropriations made during the preceding five years, from 1852 to 1857, were, at the office in

Philadelphia, \$47,598.00; and at the office in Louisville, \$30,427.30; making a total average of \$78,025.30.

From this statement it appears that the appropriations made from March 1, 1857, to March 1, 1858, at the office in Philadelphia, exceeded the average of those made during the five previous years, \$13,487.00; and at the office in Louisville, \$4,597.70; thus making a total excess of appropriations this year above the average appropriations of the five preceding years, \$18,084.70.

As the missionary appointments are made, with very few exceptions, for twelve months, and are scattered over the whole year, of course a large number of the appropriations made during the year have not yet fully matured, but will be falling due as the present year advances.

RECEIPTS.—The total amount of receipts from all sources, from March, 1, 1857, to March 1, 1858, is \$105,277.52; to which add balances on hand in the different treasuries, March 1, 1857, \$19,260.40; making the available resources of the Board during the year, \$124,537.92.

The amount paid out at the office in Philadelphia, including the Presbyterian treasuries, was \$87,712.59; and at the office in Louisville, \$16,441.08; making the total amount of payments during the year, \$104,153.67; leaving an available balance in all the treasuries, on the 1st of March, 1858, of \$20,384.25. The amount due the missionaries at the same date was \$11,871.44; leaving an unexpended balance of \$8,512.81.

The aggregate receipts from March 1, 1857, to March 1, 1858, have been more, as compared with the receipts from March 1, 1856, to March 1, 1857, \$12,028.53. The increase has been, in individual or special donations and legacies, \$3,392.38, and in the contributions of the churches, \$8,636.15. The receipts at the office in Philadelphia, including the Presbyterian treasuries, were greater by \$12,174.70, and were less at the office in Louisville by \$146.17.

The balance in the treasury on the 1st of March, 1858, is more by \$1,123.85, than the amount which was reported in hand on the 1st of March, 1857. This gratifying result could not have been anticipated until very near the close of our fiscal year. About the beginning of the month of November last, the treasury was *entirely exhausted*; and although from that time our receipts began to improve, yet so late as the 12th of January, (the date of one of our appeals,) the balance on hand was less by \$3,500.00 than it was at the same date the year previous. The receipts of the Board during the last two months of the fiscal year, viz. January and February, were greater by nearly \$5,000, than during the corresponding months of the year preceding. This sudden and large increase, notwithstanding the depressed financial condition of the country, was indeed extraordinary, and shows how deeply and generally the churches sympathized with the Board in their pecuniary embarrassment. The balance on hand, although a little larger than that of last year, is not more than is necessary to enable the Board to carry on their operations during the coming year.

OUR MISSIONS.

During the year the Board have established new missions in various sections of our country, as well in larger cities and towns as in smaller villages and rural districts. They have also, to the extent of their ability, re-enforced our missionaries in the newer States and Territories. Two missionaries have been added to the number in California, and one in Oregon, and arrangements have been made to send an additional missionary to the Territory of Washington. Four missionaries have been added to the number in Minnesota, and we have also commissioned one in the State of Rhode Island. Four additional missionaries have been employed in Missouri—four in Wisconsin—six in Arkansas—eight in Iowa—and ten in Alabama. We have likewise added four to the number of our missionaries in the Territory of Kansas, and two to the number employed in the Territory of Nebraska.

The Board will endeavour, as heretofore, to enlarge the sphere of their missionary operations as rapidly as the means placed at their disposal will allow. They deeply regret, in view of the urgent demands that are made upon them, that their resources are, comparatively, so limited. We have neither the men nor the means to supply adequately the wants of a population so immense, and so rapidly multiplying and expanding. In the circumstances in which we are placed, our policy is to maintain the ground already secured, and to occupy the more promising points yet destitute, as fast as our resources will admit.

In this connection we state, that we have continued to employ a number of missionaries among our foreign population. One has laboured among the French, two among the Welsh, and eighteen among the Germans. Seven of our missionaries have laboured chiefly among the coloured people.

We will add that, during the year, thirty-five of our missionaries have been commissioned and employed as *itinerants*. The greater part of our missionaries perform more or less of such service, but the above number are either wholly or almost entirely employed as *itinerants*.

With regard to the spiritual state of our missions, the Board are rejoiced in being able to say, that we have reason to believe that the condition of many of our missionary churches is unusually encouraging. From the reports of many of our missionaries we learn that the Holy Spirit has graciously visited their churches with his reviving and sanctifying influence. Some of them report large additions to their churches, and very many of them increased attendance upon the means of grace and serious attention to the preached word.

CLOTHING.—Clothing valued at \$9,590.83 has been received during the year, and distributed among the missionaries who needed it. Of this amount \$6,591.10, were received at the office in Philadelphia; \$2,064.42, at the office in Louisville, and \$935.31, at the depot in Pittsburgh.

OBJECTS OF THE BOARD AND THEIR IMPORTANCE.

In order to keep the objects of the Board, and their importance, distinctly before the churches, we repeat the statements made under this head in our previous Reports. The objects of the Board of Domestic Missions are two-fold: 1. To supply vacant churches, and assist weak and feeble congregations in support of pastors: and 2. To extend the boundaries of the Church by employing ministers to preach the Gospel, organize new congregations, and form churches in the hitherto neglected and wast places of our country.

SALARIES OF MISSIONARIES.—The Board have, during the year, slightly *decreased* the average appropriation to our missionaries. This was indispensable in order to bring the accruing liabilities of the Board within their means of payment. Notwithstanding this reduction, the aggregate appropriations, during the year, were a little larger than the year preceding, owing to the increase in the number of our missionaries. We are gratified in being able to say, that the people have, during the year, *increased* the average salary paid by them to their ministers, which has much more than counterbalanced the slight reduction made by the Board. The decrease in the average appropriation made by the Board to the missionaries, during the year, is \$3.46, while the average increase in the salary paid by the people is \$21.96, making a total increase of \$18.50.*

The Board have increased their average appropriations to the missionaries, during the last five years, \$55.92, which is nearly forty-two and a half per cent. The average increase of salary paid by their people, during the same period, is \$94.17, which is nearly thirty-nine and a quarter per cent. The total average increase, during the last five years, is a little over forty and a third per cent.

NEED OF FUNDS.

It is true, the available balance in hand on the 1st of March, 1858, is comparatively large, and without explanation, may readily mislead the patrons of the Board. From the month of March the receipts begin to fall off, and during the latter part of the spring, the entire summer, and the early part of the fall, the receipts are comparatively small; so that unless our available balance at the commencement of the fiscal year is comparatively large, it would be impracticable to carry on the operations of the Board during the year. For example, at the beginning of the fiscal year, March 1, 1857, we reported an available balance of more than \$19,000, and yet, about the beginning of the month of November, the treasury was *entirely exhausted*! and we were obliged to issue repeated and urgent appeals to the friends of the cause, for immediate donations to enable us to meet our current liabilities. Sometimes the falling off after the close of the fiscal year is not only very sudden, but very great. For example, while the receipts at the principal treasury in Philadelphia, during the month of February last, amounted to \$14,188.99, during the

month of March, (the first month in the new fiscal year,) the receipts were only \$3,909.12; thus showing a falling off of more than *ten thousand dollars* (\$10,279.87) in the space of a single month, while our monthly payments average nearly the same during every period of the year,

When the number of missionaries was much smaller than at present—when the average salaries was much less—when the annual expenditures of the Board were not half so great as now, of course a much smaller balance at the commencement of the fiscal year was all-sufficient. But with the present enlarged operations and expenditures, experience has shown that an available balance at the beginning of the fiscal year of about \$20,000, is indispensable to enable the Board to meet their engagements promptly, and without embarrassment during the entire year.

Indeed, it is obvious that a considerable *increase* in the receipts of the Board is indispensable to meet our present prospective engagements. From the financial statements made in a former part of this Report, it appears, that the receipts during the year exceeded the payments by only \$1,123.85; and as the number of our missionaries is steadily increasing, it is evident that the receipts during the coming year must be very considerably augmented, to enable the Board to meet their liabilities.

Moreover, as we have had occasion repeatedly to state, it is important that the receipts of the Board should be increased, in order that they may not be hampered or embarrassed in undertaking the establishment of *new missions*. The establishment of such missions, particularly in the more distant States and Territories, requires, in many cases, an amount of expenditure which the Board cannot prudently incur, with the limited means at their disposal. If the available resources of the Board would enable them safely to incur the expense of their establishment, they would soon return, in divers ways, the amount expended upon them. It has, indeed, been a matter of great regret to the Board, that they have not been able to establish more missions in some of the more distant States and Territories; but it has been impracticable to do so, without either declining or reducing the appropriations recommended by the Presbyteries, to other portions of the missionary field. With funds scarcely sufficient to maintain the ground already occupied, the Board are unable to extend their operations as rapidly and extensively as the interests of our Church and country most obviously and urgently demand.

THE SYSTEMATIC BENEVOLENCE PLAN.

We are gratified in being able to state, that the number of contributing churches has been considerably increased during the year—the increase being very nearly two hundred over the year preceding. The progress that has been made in this direction, since the inauguration of the Systematic Benevolence Plan by the General Assembly, in 1854, is certainly encouraging, and now perhaps justifies the hope that it will ultimately realize the expectations of the Assembly. We have never doubted the superiority of this plan, as it dispenses with collecting agents, whose employment is not only very expensive, but also in other respects objectionable; and because it is adapted to raise a much larger sum, regularly and systematically, from the whole Church, provided the pastors and church-sessions would generally and energetically carry it out in practice. The number of non-contributing churches is still very large. By subtracting the number of contributing churches during the year from the whole number of churches reported in the Minutes of the General Assembly for 1857, viz. three thousand two hundred and fifty-one, it appears that one thousand five hundred and forty-nine churches contributed nothing during the year to the Board of Domestic Missions. That many of these churches could have contributed something, there can be no reasonable doubt; and that they ought to have done so, there can be no question. Doubtless many of them would have contributed, if the pastors and sessions had dutifully heeded the repeated and earnest injunctions of the General Assembly, and brought the subject properly before their respective congregations. Our great surprise and deep regret is, that the authority of the Assembly is not more generally obeyed, and especially that the love of Christ, and a desire for the salvation of souls, have not constrained all who have the ability to do at least something, to aid this important cause. We trust, however, in view of the progress that has been made, that the number of contributing churches will continue steadily to increase, and that the time is not far distant when all the churches which are able will regularly contribute to assist the Board in the great work of Domestic Missions.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

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ABSTRACT OF THE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1858.

PART I.—MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

The aggregate number of candidates this year is two greater than last year; whilst the number of *new* candidates is eleven more than were received last year—an increase that is encouraging, chiefly from the fact that there is no decrease.

The Report discusses the *causes of anxiety to young men and candidates* who think of entering on the work of the ministry. 1st. The want of sufficient piety. 2d. The want of sufficient evidences of a divine call to the work of the ministry. 3d. The want of pecuniary means. 4th. Advanced age, beyond the usual period. 5th. Ill health. 6th. Defectiveness of early education. 7th. A profession in life already selected and entered upon. 8th. The scanty salaries of ministers. 9th. The opposition of relatives and friends. 10th. The want of natural ability. 11th. Obscure birth in a low condition of life. 12th. The ministry is too vast a profession.

These various topics are discussed with the purpose of removing the objections and anxieties of candid and inquiring minds. Throughout the whole discussion the Board not only assume, but lay stress upon the following propositions: 1. The individual possesses, in other respects, the qualifications requisite for making a useful minister. 2. The Holy Spirit can alone give a call to the work. 3. The standard of mental and moral requirement, prevalent in the Presbyterian Church, is not intended to be lowered by the arguments and incidents herein stated, but, on the contrary, the age demands higher qualifications than any preceding one.

PART II.—CHRISTIAN EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS, ACADEMIES AND COLLEGES.

Primary Schools.—The aggregate number is about one hundred. Thirty-two have been aided by the funds of the Board. Six of them report considerable religious interest among the pupils.

Presbyterial Academies.—The number of Presbyterial Academies is sixty. In four of these institutions there have been revivals of religion during the year.

Colleges.—The number of Presbyterian colleges is twenty-four. Seven of them have been visited with the gracious effusions of the Holy Spirit, viz., Davidson College, North Carolina; Oglethorpe University, Georgia; Hanover College, Indiana; Washington College, Pennsylvania; Jefferson College, Pennsylvania; the College of New Jersey, at Princeton, New Jersey; and Richmond College, Missouri.

State of the Treasury.—The following is a general view of the pecuniary affairs of the Board during the ecclesiastical year. The accounts closed on the 18th of April, which is about two weeks earlier than usual.

Great thankfulness is expressed "that in a year of such serious commercial embarrassment, the contributions of the churches have not been diminished, but have been somewhat increased, and the aggregate receipts of the Board have been larger than in any former year."

PUBLICATIONS.—No change is reported in these, excepting in the newspaper *Foreign Missionary*, which is now adapted to the reading of children, and a copy is sent, free of charge except for postage, to the children of each family in every Sunday-school in which regular collections are made for the Board. 24,000 copies are now published of this edition.

MISSIONARIES SENT OUT.—To *China*, eight missionaries and assistant missionaries; to *Siam*, three; to *India*, one; to *Western Africa*, two; to the *Indian Tribes*, sixteen.

MISSIONS AMONG THE INDIAN TRIBES.

Among the Chippewas and Ottawas, Omahas, Otoes, Iowas, Kickapoos, Creeks, Seminoles, Chickasaws, and Choctaws, there are fifteen ministers, one of whom is an Indian; fifteen male, and forty-nine female assistant missionaries, and nine Indian assistants; 570 communicants; 272 boys and 254 girls in boarding-schools, besides some scholars in day-schools.

MISSIONS IN AFRICA.

At three places in Liberia, at Settra Kroo, and at three stations on Corisco, there are nine ministers, eight male and eight female assistant missionaries, and three native assistants; 176 communicants; 58 boys and 16 girls in boarding-schools, and 136 boys in day-schools.

MISSIONS IN INDIA.

Sixteen stations are under the care of the Board in the north-western part of this country; twenty-four ministers, two of whom are Hindus; one male and eighteen female assistant missionaries. Owing to the calamitous events described in the Report, as connected with the mutiny of the Sepoys, the statistics of native assistants, communicants, and scholars, cannot be reported with accuracy. The heavy loss of mission property, the trials of the native converts, and the martyrdom of two of their number, the lamentable death by violence of the Rev. Messrs. John E. Freeman, David E. Campbell, Albert O. Johnson, and Robert E. McMullin, and their wives, and two children of Mr. and Mrs. Campbell, together with the great interruption of the missionary work at nearly all the stations, have made the last year a memorable one in the history of these missions. It is believed that, hereafter, fewer obstacles and brighter prospects of success will attend the labours of the Church for the conversion of the Hindus, than at any former period.

MISSION IN SIAM.

In connection with this mission there are four ministers, three assistant missionaries, and one native assistant; 47 scholars are reported in the boarding-school.

MISSIONS IN CHINA.

At Macao, near Canton, Shanghai, and Ningpo, there are fourteen ministers, three male, and fifteen female assistant missionaries, and ten native assistants; 58 communicants; 31 boys and 63 girls in boarding-schools, besides some scholars in day-schools.

MISSIONS IN SOUTH AMERICA.

At Buenos Ayres there is one minister, and at Bogota one minister. Another minister and his wife are ready to embark for the latter field.

MISSIONS IN PAPAL EUROPE.

The sum of \$6466.67 was remitted to Christian friends in Brussels, Paris, Geneva, the Waldensian Valleys, &c., to be expended in efforts for the spread of the gospel amongst Roman Catholic peoples.

MISSION TO THE JEWS.

One missionary is employed among the Jews in New York and its vicinity, who is also pastor of a German church; and a call is made for enlarged labours for the lost sheep of the house of Israel.

This abstract necessarily gives but a very imperfect account of the Foreign Missionary work of the Church. Full information is embodied in the Annual Report, showing much cause for humility before God, and yet not less for gratitude and hope. The Report concludes with a reference to the enlarged work in fields of labour now occupied in part, and to some of the new fields which stand open for the gospel labourer.

ABSTRACT OF THE TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT, 1858.

Notwithstanding the extraordinary commercial embarrassments and depressions of the whole community during the past year, the Board of Publication is enabled, by divine favour, to report results which compare favourably with those of any former year. This will appear from the following summary:

I. In the department of PRODUCTION. The Publishing Agent reports that 55 new works have been issued, of which 45 are new volumes. Of these new volumes, there have been printed 85,750 copies. In addition to these, 24,000 copies of 9 new tracts have been issued, and 30,000 copies of the Presbyterian Almanac, making in all 139,750 copies of new publications. Besides these, there have been published 324,000 copies of works before upon the Board's Catalogue.

The total number of copies issued during the year has been 463,750 copies.

The total number of copies issued since the organization of the Board to March 1, 1858, has been 6,817,188.

The Report gives special notice to the publication, by the Board, of "The Presbyterian Social Psalmist."

The Confession of Faith has been published in German, and other German publications are now passing through the press.

Attention is called to "The Sailor's Companion," as a new work, admirably adapted to do good among the brave and hardy sons of the deep.

Dr. Jacobus's "Notes on the Gospels," with the accompanying questions, are now issued by the Board, and afford valuable aid to Sabbath-schools and Bible-classes.

A considerable number of choice volumes have, during the year, been added to the Board's Sabbath-School Library, which is increasingly popular and useful. The Board aims to furnish, as soon as possible, all needful facilities for Bible-class and Sabbath-school instruction. A good beginning has already been made by furnishing a variety of catechisms, question-books, and commentaries.

Periodicals. The circulation of the *Home and Foreign Record* has declined during the past year from 19,000 to 17,500 copies.

The circulation of the *Sabbath-school Visitor* is now 54,000, an increase of 9000 copies since the last report.

II. In the department of *DISTRIBUTION*. The publications of the Board reach the hands of the people chiefly through three channels:

1. The regular trade sales at the publishing-house have been during the year 191,993 volumes, a decrease of 1583 volumes on the sales of the preceding year. Comparing these results of the year with those of other publishing-houses during the recent severe commercial embarrassments of the country, they afford cause for profound gratitude.

The sales of tracts at the Publishing-house have amounted to 706,963 pages, an increase of 229,522 pages on those of the year preceding.

2. The Executive Committee have granted in response to appeals made to it, to Sabbath-schools, feeble churches, humane institutions, and to individuals for gratuitous distribution, 3724 volumes, and 246,395 pages of tracts.

3. By colportage, a most important amount of divine truth has been put in circulation, and the results of the year, considering all things, have been in the highest degree favourable.

The number of colporteurs in commission during the year has been 263, being an increase of 9, notwithstanding the recent curtailments found to be necessary. These have been distributed into 29 States and Territories, besides all the British Provinces of the North. Increased quantities of books and tracts have been sent to California, Oregon, Washington Territory, and all the frontier and more destitute regions of our wide land.

The number of *volumes sold* by colporteurs has been 123,924, being a decrease of 655 volumes.

The pages of *tracts* distributed by them have been 1,555,469.

The number of *volumes gratuitously distributed* this year has been 17,905, an increase of 876 volumes on the number last year given.

The number of *families visited* has been 119,685, an increase of 5503 over that of last year.

The *total distribution* of the year has been as follows:

Besides the above matter, the Board has issued a large number of pamphlets and periodical papers.

III. In the department of *SUSTENTATION*. The *Treasurer's Report* shows an aggregate of receipts for the year of \$126,960.28, which is an increase of \$7,639.25 over the receipts of the preceding year. The total of expenditures has been \$106,801.68, leaving a balance in the Treasurer's hands of \$20,158.60. This, however, will rapidly be called for by the renewed and enlarged operations of the publishing department.

The amount received from sales of books, tracts, and Sabbath-School Visitors, has been \$80,842.86, being a decrease of \$6,581.52 on the sales of the previous year.

The *Colportage Fund*. The amount received from all sources for this Fund has been \$21,369.76, a decrease of \$3,453.86. This decrease, it is pleasant to observe, arises not from decreased church contributions, but from diminished receipts from legacies and miscellaneous sources. The sum received from the churches has been \$17,150.92, an increase from this source of \$1,761.67. The receipts from legacies and miscellaneous sources, have this year been only \$4,218.80, while last year they were \$9,434.37.

The balance in which the Colportage Fund was overdrawn, March 1st, 1858, was \$8,788.46. It is hoped that the churches will help to make up this sum soon, so that the Board may proceed to extend its Colportage operations to many new, important, and inviting fields.

Agencies. During the past year no paid collecting agents have been employed. The results are such as greatly to encourage the Board to hope that no general recurrence to such agencies will become necessary.

ABSTRACT OF THE ANNUAL REPORT.

The Church Extension Committee are glad to state that the past year shows a decided advance in the work entrusted to them.

The receipts from all sources during the year ending April 1, 1858, exceed those of the previous year nearly fifteen hundred dollars, less, however, than half of this excess is from donations.

The number of contributing churches named in this report is five hundred and eighteen. The number named in the preceding report was five hundred and two. These results have been reached in the midst of the hard times, without any salaried collecting agent, and are as gratifying as they were unexpected.

The sum *paid out* to churches this year is in advance of the sum paid out to them last year, over seven thousand dollars.

The amount *appropriated* to churches this year is in advance of the amount appropriated last year, nearly ten thousand dollars.

The applications received from April 1, 1857, to April 1, 1858, may safely be said to ask for twelve thousand dollars more than those filed during the preceding year.

Early in the month of February, 1858, the Committee found their appropriations so far beyond their means, and the applications so large, that they ceased for a few weeks to make appropriations, and issued a special appeal for funds. The appeal was so liberally responded to, that on the 29th of March, 1858, they resumed the pleasant work of pledging the gifts of the benevolent to needy congregations engaged in church building. They hope to go on without serious interruption, though the following more detailed statement of applications and appropriations, shows that this hope can only be realized through the continued liberality of those who love our Zion.

APPLICATIONS.

The number of applications for aid received from April 1, 1857, to April 1, 1858, is ONE HUNDRED. These applications are from churches in the bounds of twenty-eight Synods, and fifty-nine Presbyteries. Eighty-nine of these applications ask for aid, amounting in the aggregate to \$41,238.68. The other eleven do not state definitely the smallest sum from the Committee that will enable them to complete their house of worship free from debt, but would easily swell the aggregate of aid asked for during the year to more than \$45,000.

Besides these applications, received since April 1, 1857, there were on file and undisposed of at that date, *forty-four* applications calling for nearly \$17,000.

The Committee have, therefore, had before them during the year, one hundred and forty-four applications, calling for at least \$62,000. These applications average four hundred and thirty-one dollars to each church.

There remained on file, April 1, 1858, awaiting the receipt of additional information, and therefore not yet acted upon, sixty applications, calling for not less than \$25,000.

APPROPRIATIONS.

During the year ending April 1, 1858, appropriations were made to SEVENTY-SIX churches, amounting to \$27,571.03. The names and localities of these churches will be found in the appendix to this Report. These churches are scattered over twenty-five Synods and fifty-one Presbyteries. Leaving out of view the special appropriations, the others average two hundred and seventy-six dollars per church.

Sixty-five churches *received* their appropriations during the year. The amount paid to these churches is \$21,342.53.

From April 1, 1857, to April 1, 1858, four churches forfeited their appropriations by

failing to comply with the usual conditions within the two years allowed for that purpose. These churches were Swedsboro' and Woodstown, New Jersey; Stirlingville, Pennsylvania; and Plover and Stephens Point, Wisconsin. The appropriations withdrawn from these churches amounted together to \$500.

The pre-requisites to appropriations and the conditions on which they are paid, remain as they were at the date of the last Annual Report.

RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES.

The appropriated balance in the treasury of the Church Extension Committee, April 1, 1857, was \$8,634.58. The receipts from April 1, 1857, to April 1, 1858, from all sources, were \$24,741.15, of which \$14,341.48 was from churches, \$9,094.50 from individuals, and \$253.18 from Sabbath-schools. The available resources of the year were therefore \$33,375.73.

The expenditures of the year, as shown by the Treasurer's statement appended to this Report, were \$24,384.03, leaving in the treasury, April 1, 1858, an appropriated balance of \$8,991.70. There were, however, unpaid at that date, appropriations to fifty-six churches amounting to \$16,475.

The liabilities of the Committee consequently exceeded their means on hand, April 1, 1858, \$7,483.30. For sixteen of these unpaid appropriations, amounting to \$7,100, the Committee were not, however, immediately liable on that day, as by the terms on which they were granted, they did not become due until after April 1, 1858. The immediate liabilities, therefore, of the Committee at the close of their fiscal year, exceeded their means at hand \$383.30.

COST OF CHURCH EDIFICES.

The Church Extension Committee have continued to act in accordance with the recommendation of the last General Assembly, in reference to the cost of church edifices.

As nearly as can be ascertained, *forty-seven* of the seventy-six churches aided during the last year, cost from \$500 to \$2,500; twenty-two cost from \$2,500 to \$5,000; and seven over \$5,000. Four of the seven appropriations to churches costing over \$5,000, were special appropriations.

In the two and a half years the Committee have been fairly at work, they have made appropriations to two hundred and five different churches. One hundred and fifty-three of these two hundred and five church buildings cost from \$500 to \$2,500; thirty-nine from \$2,500 to \$5,000; and the other thirteen over \$5,000. Five of the thirteen were special appropriations.

The simple fact that the cost of *three-fourths* of all the churches aided does not exceed \$2,500, proves that the work of the Committee has been mainly among the poor, and in aid of those who are not extravagant in their desires.

SIZE OF CHURCHES.

A careful analysis of the number of members in the two hundred and five churches aided, shows that one hundred and sixty of them had from 3 to 50 members; thirty-nine from 50 to 100; and six over 100 members. One-half the whole number of churches aided had less than 30 members.

DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS.

The Committee have endeavoured to distribute the funds entrusted to them as equitably as possible over the whole Church. How far they have succeeded in this endeavour, may be determined from these two facts:

1st. Only three of the 300 new applications received by them have been declined.

2d. Grants have been made to churches in thirty of the thirty-one Synods, and eighty-six of the one hundred and two Presbyteries from whose bounds applications have come. The Synod and Presbyteries to whom no appropriations have been made, are those from whose applying churches the requisite information has not yet been received.

RESULTS.

Scarcely three years have elapsed since the Assembly's Church Extension Committee was organized. In that time over \$57,000 has been raised for the Church Extension cause, without any salaried agent. This is within \$11,000 of the whole sum raised during the eleven years of organized effort in connection with the Board of Domestic Missions. The amount received from churches in the last three years is double the amount received from churches during the previous eleven years.

These results encourage the Committee to hope that the blessing of God and the favour of God's people will advance the Church Extension enterprise, until all our waste places shall be supplied with sanctuaries wherein the Lord will take pleasure, and will be glorified.

TO THE STATED CLERKS OF SYNODS.

It is the duty of the Stated Clerks of the respective Synods to send up to the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly an annual report, stating, in brief, the number of Presbyteries, ministers, churches, licentiates, and candidates, within their bounds, and particularly all changes which may have been made in the arrangement of Presbyteries. By the Assembly of 1841, (see p. 425,) it has been made their duty also to transmit to the Stated Clerk of the Assembly the time and place of meetings of their respective Synods.

THE STATED CLERKS OF PRESBYTERIES

Are earnestly requested,

1. To make their Annual Reports to the Assembly, if they have no printed blanks, after the form on page 481 of these Minutes. Blanks can always be obtained *gratis* on application to the Stated Clerk.

2. To make their Reports in fair, distinct writing, especially the columns of figures.


3. To make them as accurate and full as possible. If, in any instance, churches do not report to Presbyteries, it is desirable that their number of communicants should be inserted from their last report.

4. To report *no cents*. The Assembly has so ordered. If therefore they are reported, the Stated Clerk of the Assembly is obliged to throw them out altogether, or to incorporate them with the dollars. This costs him a serious amount of labour, to which he ought not to be subjected.

5. To *add up* each column of figures with care. Many still neglect this, and thus oblige the Clerk of the Assembly to do what they should do themselves.

6. To append to the statistics of Presbyteries a brief account of the changes which have occurred during the year, such as the *number* of licensures, ordinations, installations, dismissions of pastors, organization of new churches, and the names of ministers deceased.

7. To transmit their Reports to the Stated Clerk, either at the meeting of the Assembly, or to Philadelphia, not later than the first day of June.

 Blank forms for *Sessional Reports* are not furnished by the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, but are kept *for sale* by the Presbyterian Board of Publication.

THE CONTINGENT FUND.

There is still a necessity for calling the particular attention of the Churches and Presbyteries to the Contingent Fund. The expenses for which it provides are indispensable, not only to the vigorous working, but to the maintenance of our ecclesiastical organism. And in this certainly every church, and every member of the church, will feel an interest.

REGULATION RESPECTING THE MINUTES

Adopted by the Assemblies of 1836 and 1837. Directed to be republished in the Appendix to the Minutes.

Each Presbytery shall forward to the Treasurer, for the *Contingent Fund* of the Assembly, at or before the meeting of the Assembly in each year, a sum equal to *fifty cents* for each member of the Presbytery, and for any licentiate or other person who shall desire the Minutes, and whose post office address shall be given. And the Stated Clerk shall not forward the Minutes to the members of any Presbytery from which no such remittance shall be made, but only to the Stated Clerk of such Presbytery, and to such members as shall forward the sum above stated.

In addition to the above, where copies are sent by mail, *five cents* additional must be forwarded to prepay postage.

SPECIAL PRAYER FOR THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

In the Minutes of the General Assembly for the year 1821, is the following important rule, which was adopted by the Assembly.

“An overture from the Synod of North Carolina was received and read, and is as follows, viz.

“*Whereas*, The General Assembly is the highest and most important judicatory of the Presbyterian Church; and *whereas*, to obtain the divine blessing on that judicatory must appear to every Christian of our denomination to be a matter of the utmost moment; therefore

“*Resolved*, That the Synod do respectfully suggest to the General Assembly the propriety of recommending to all the churches under their care, to observe, annually, *the afternoon or evening previous to the meeting of that body*, as a season of special prayer to Almighty God for his blessing; that he would, of his infinite mercy, condescend to superintend and direct all their measures, deliberations, and decisions; so that all may redound to the promotion of his own glory, and the general prosperity of that particular Church to which we belong.”

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

I give and devise to the Trustees of the Board of Education of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, the sum of _____, to be applied by said Board to the Education of pious and indigent young men for the gospel ministry.

BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

I bequeath to my executors the sum of _____ dollars in trust to pay over the same in _____ after my decease, to the person who, when the same shall be payable, shall act as Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, to be applied to the uses and purposes of said Board, and under its direction, and the receipt of the said Treasurer shall be a full and legal acquittance of my said executors for the same.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION.

To the Trustees of the Presbyterian Board of Publication, and to their successors and assigns, I give and bequeath the sum of _____, or I devise a certain messuage and tract of land, &c., to be held by the said Trustees, and their successors for ever, to and for the uses and under the direction of the said Board of Publication, according to the provisions of their charter.

CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE.

The Church Extension Committee of the General Assembly is not incorporated, but the following form of bequest, it is supposed, would be valid.

I bequeath to my executors the sum of _____ dollars, in trust, to pay over the same in _____ after my decease, to the person who, when the same shall be payable, shall act as Treasurer of the Church Extension Committee of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, located in the city of St. Louis, Missouri, to be applied to the uses and purposes of said Committee, and under its directions, and the receipt of the said Treasurer shall be a full and legal acquittance of my said executors for the same.

For *Domestic Missions*; to include all moneys collected for the purpose, whether for the Boards, or any of the judicatories of the Church. 2. *Foreign Missions*; including all moneys for that purpose. 3. *Education*; including all that is given for the education of candidates for the ministry; for Theological Seminaries; Presbyterian colleges, academies, parochial, and Sabbath schools. 4. *Publication*; all moneys for the Board of Publication, and for Synodical and Presbyterianal depositories, and colportage. 5. *Church Extension*; all the moneys for that purpose. 6. *Presbyterial*; to include Commissioners' and Congregational Funds, and contributions for the support of aged ministers. 7. *Congregational*; all moneys contributed for the congregation, as pastors' salaries, building and repairing churches, liquidation of debts, and current expenses. 8. *Miscellaneous*; including all other collections.
