

Most of the churches have met their apportionment the past year. A few have found it difficult to do so, sending but a portion of the amount asked for, and a few have sent nothing at all. Your committee hoped to retire all of the notes that were outstanding a year ago and also to remit the \$300 appropriated towards the Hungarian Church building in Yonkers, besides taking care of the Italian Mission at Port Chester. Because of not receiving the amount asked for from all the churches, one of the notes for \$100 remains unpaid, and at this writing the \$300 towards the Yonkers'

work has not been paid, although it it hoped that before the next Fall Stated meeting of the Yonkers Church Extension Committee the latter Meeting. sum will be in their hands. Your committee learns that in one or oct. 5, 1914 more instances the offerings of our churches for church extension work have been sent to the Board of Church Erection instead of to your committee. If these amounts had come into our hands the sum appropriated for work in Yonkers would have already been available.

The recently organized Hitchcock Memorial Church at Hartsdale, which received assistance from your committee a year ago, has become self-sustaining. Some progress has been made in the matter of the reorganization of the Port Chester Church. The new Church at Larchmont is already looking forward to erecting a house of worship. To give assistance to such work is the province of the committee.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as

follows:

There was filed with the chairman, under date of September 12, 1914, the notice of Mr. Robert B. Galt of his intention to apply at this meeting of Presbyterv to be taken under its care as a candidate for the ministry. Mr. Galt is a member of the North Avenue Church of New Rochelle and has served as assistant to the pastor since January of this year. He has virtually been under the supervision of the committee through one of its members for that period. Mr. Galt desires to be examined for licensure and ordination at this meeting. In view of the circumstances and in the belief that the spirit and intent of Standing Rule No. 8 (1) will be sufficiently carried out by such action, your committee recommends and moves that the examination of Mr. Robert B. Galt as to his religious experience and motives for entering the ministry be now conducted by the Moderator, and that, if the examination be satisfactory, Mr. Galt be received under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

Your committee also recommends and moves that Mr. R. Irving Barnett, a member of the South Yonkers Church, be examined as to his religious experience and motives for entering the ministry, and, if the examination be satisfactory, he be received under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

Messers. Galt and Barnett were then examined as ordered. Their examinations were sustained, and it was ordered that their names be enrolled as candidates for the ministry.

The Rev. Charles L. Carhart was appointed to serve at this session of the Committee on Education and Examinations in the place of the Rev. John M. Trout, who is absent.

The Committee of Arrangements presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

I. That Presbytery close its session this afternoon at 5 p.m., or as soon thereafter as possible:

- 2. That a popular meeting be held this evening at 8 o'clock with an address on Foreign Missions by Rev. Stanley White of the Board of Foreign Missions;
- 3. That the time for the devotional service of to-morrow morning be extended to twenty-five minutes, and that it be a "Prayer Conference for International Peace."
  - 4. That in other respects the docket be approved as printed.

Prayer was offered and a hymn was sung.

Presbytery reassembled at 8 p.m.

After devotional exercises an address on Foreign Missions was delivered by the Rev. Stanley White, of the Board of Foreign Missions.

Presbytery extended to the speaker its thanks for his address.

The Rev. R. E. Wilson, of the New York Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Presbytery then adjourned until 9 a.m. to-morrow. Closed with prayer and the benediction.

The Business Committee presented a report, which

was received, adopted and is as follows:

1. The request of the Rev. John M. Trout for the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between him and the Greenburgh Church, referred to the committee under the standing order of Presbytery (p 5).

Mr. Trout, who makes the request, was heard by the committee, together with the commissioners from the congregation, which concurs with regret in the request. The reason given is that Mr. Trout proposes to spend a year in study. We recommend and move

(1.) That the request be granted and the pastoral relation existing between Mr. Trout and the Greenburgh Church be hereby dissolved, the dissolution to take effect on October 15 next.

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 6, 1914

- (2.) That the Rev. Daniel Russell be appointed moderator of the session, and the session be granted leave to supply its own pulpit until the next stated meeting of Presbytery.
- (3.) That in the severing of this relation the Presbytery places on record its appreciation of the faithful work of Mr. Trout in the years of service in this church, and its regret at his laying down the active pastorate even for a season. The best wishes of the Presbytery go with him in the year's work before him.
- 2. A communication from the General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply (\$\rho\$. 5) concerning ministerial support, calling attention to the increase in the cost of living without a corresponding increase, in many cases, in the salaries of the ministers. If the Presbyterian Church is ever to have an adequate ministry, it must see that its ministers are given a fair and proper support. Therefore we recommend and move

That a committee of three elders of the Presbytery be appointed by the Moderator to consider the whole matter, ascertaining exactly the conditions that prevail in our own Presbytery, conferring with ministers and church officers, as may be advisable to them, and recommending such action to churches or Presbytery as will tend to remedy any shortcomings they may find to exist with respect to this most important relation.

3. The election of the Rev. J. Ritchie Smith to the chair of homiletics in the Princeton Theological Seminary (p. 5). We recommend and move that the Presbytery adopt the following minute and that a copy be sent to him:

The Presbytery of Westchester has heard with great pleasure of the election of the Rev. J. Ritchie Smith, for many years an active member of this Presbytery, to fill the professorship of homiletics in the Princeton Theological Seminary. It extends to him its congratulations on the opportunity for such splendid service for the church and its Lord as now opens before him, and to the seminary in securing a man so eminently fitted for the task of training the young men in the all-important work of preaching the "unsearchable riches of Christ." We pray that God's richest blessing may rest upon him, the seminary, and the students there in this relation thus constituted.

4. The celebration of the 175th anniversary of the Yorktown Presbyterian Church (p. 5). We recommend and move the adoption of the following minute and that a copy of it be sent to the Yorktown Church:

One hundred and seventy-five years of existence and of service is a rare privilege for any church, the more so when such service has brought forth its fruit in the organization of other churches, sons and daughters in the work and faith of Jesus Christ. Such a privilege has been granted to the Yorktown Presbyterian Church, which has just celebrated the 175th anniversary of its founding. Not only has this church been the light in the immediate vicinity of Yorktown, but for many years was the only church in all that region and the mother church of many others.

Presbytery extends its heartiest congratulations to the Yorktown Church and records its appreciation of the splendid history of faithful devotion to Christ that the years have shown; and we

pray that for years to come the blessing of the great Head of the Fall Stated Church may rest upon it, continuing its power and usefulness Meeting, throughout the whole region, which it has been permitted and is still permitted to serve.

5. The accounts of the Treasurer of Presbytery (p. 6). These accounts have been examined with their vouchers and found

correct and we recommend and move their approval.

- 6. The accounts of Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions (p. 7), showing the receipts and expenditures for presbyterial and synodical missions. These accounts have been examined with their vouchers and found correct, and we recommend and move that they be approved.
- 7. The accounts of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, giving receipts and expenditures for church extension. These accounts have been examined with their vouchers and found correct, and we recommend and move that they be approved.
- 8. A bill from the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions for administrative expenses amounting to \$6.40. We recommend and move
- (1.) That the bill be paid for this year by the Treasurer of Presbytery.
- (2.) That hereafter committees, which have funds of their own, be urged to make arrangements for the administrative expenses of such committees out of such funds.
- 9. Five other papers have been referred to the committee, four overtures sent down by the General Assembly on Deacons, Deaconesses, Divorce and Executive Commissions, and a communication from the Stated Clerk of the General Assembly on the apportionments for 1915 (p. 5). We recommend and move action on these papers be deferred until the January Intermediate Meeting of Presbytery.

The Moderator appointed Elders Ransom E. Wilcox, Orson W. Sloat and Jay R. Decatur a special committee on ministerial support called for in the above report.

The special committee on the request of the Port Chester Church for the return of its property (Vol. 1', p. 575) reported progress. The report was received and the committee continued.

The commission to organize a church at Larchmont (Vol. V, p. 576) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your commission met in Larchmont on Sunday, June 28, and organized by electing Rev. Paul Stratton Moderator and the Rev. James Packard Gillespie Clerk. Forty-five persons presented letters from other evangelical churches and were received into communion of the new church, and six persons were received on profession of their faith. After a brief devotional exercises and an address, the newly received members joined in a solemn covenant to walk together as disciples of Jesus as a Presbyterian Church

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 6, 1914 in connection with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and were by the Moderator declared to be the Presbyterian Church in Larchmont. Elders and deacons were duly elected, ordained and installed. The celebration of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper followed, and the service was closed with the benediction. It is recommended and moved that the church be enrolled.

The commission on the Bedford Church (Vol. V, p. 574) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The Bedford Church, since the retirement of the Rev. James W. Rae, nearly a year ago, was served by Mr. Ward W. Adair, a local evangelist, until May last, and from about June 1 by Mr. Aubrey C. Ross, a student in Union Theological Seminary, who has been engaged with the approval of your commission as stated supply for one year. The officers of the church speak very highly of his work and influence. From a Sunday-school practically extinct they have a school of 30 members with the attendance on the increase. During the past year one member has been received into the church and one has been dismissed. Encouragement is found in the gathering together of the young people, and through them some of the adults are renewing their interest in the church.

The problem of the Bedford Church is the problem of the rural community. Five Protestant church organizations and a Catholic church in a community of from 800 to 1,000 people, including the outlying territory, of which Bedford is the center, are holding services with more or less regularity. Three of the Protestant organizations, the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist, should be united into one. As a first step in that direction the trustees of the former invited the other two to hold services in their building, if not together, at different hours. In case of a union the Presbyterian Church is the logical one to be continued, because in the first place it is the oldest, the oldest Presbyterian society with one exception within the bounds of this Presbytery, and in the second place it has much the most valuable church property, the church edifice having been built and given to the society by the late Francis Palmer at a cost of \$40,000. It would seem unfortunate indeed to have this historic church become extinct. Presbyterianism owes much to the old Bedford Church, which was organized in 1681, two hundred and thirty-three years ago. For four years Presbytery through its Committee of Presbyterial and Synodical Missions has been aiding them in keeping a pastor on the field. The pastor of the Bedford Church ought also to supply the Pound Ridge Church, about five miles east, but for a number of years the Rev. James H. Hoyt, a member of Presbytery, formerly pastor of the Bedford Church, but now serving the Congregational Church of New Canaan, Conn., has been conducting a service for them Sunday afternoons, and the Pound Ridge people prefer this arrangement for the reasons that Mr. Hoyt's ministrations are acceptable and that they are assured of a permanent arrangement, which would not have been the case had they been dependent on Bedford. What they are able to pay would quite materially assist in keeping a man permanently at the latter field.

The problems confronting the Bedford Church are:

Fall Stated

- I. The election of elders, of which there are none at present, Oct. 6, 1914 to form a session. If other churches in the community were to unite with them the union might bring in men who might be induced to accept the office of elder.
- 2. The union of the three Protestant churches mentioned would make one and a stronger organization.

The Committee on the Every Member Campaign (Vol. V, p. 555) presented a report, which was received, and the committee was continued.

The Commissioners to the General Assembly presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

The six commissioners representing this Presbytery responded to the first roll call and, with two exceptions, remained to the close.

The report of the Evangelistic Committee showed that during the past year 93,000 persons had united with the church on profession of faith in Christ, a marked increase over the numbers re-ported in former years. The work of the committee on the everymember canvass was emphasized and continued. The committee on co-operation and union reported the failure of the negotiations for union between the Reformed and Presbyterian Churches. The hope was expressed, however, that a federative union of all Presbyterian bodies might be effected. The Christian Education Committee recommended the consolidation of the three boards, education, colleges and publication, and Sunday-school work, into a new board of Christian Education. This was left over for one year for further consideration. Perhaps the most notable action was taken in regard to the Home Board. Where opposition was looked for perfect harmony prevailed.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee begs leave to report as follows:

First of all, regarding work of church erection and church extension under our sub-committee, we report that our preliminary plan to begin Christian work at Larchmont has successfully de-veloped into a Presbyterian Church, organized on June 28 last (p. 13). Since that date the membership has grown from 51 to 60, and steps have already been taken, looking to the purchase of a suitable lot and the erection of a church edifice. It is gratifying also to note that this new church has already taken its place on the list of contributors to the benevolent agencies of our church. It is the regret of your committee that material and substantial assistance to such worthy and promising church enterprises must end with such preliminary work as your committee has carried on at Larchmont, since we are without funds to give further aid in the larger and more important work of providing suitable equipment for the churches we encourage to organize. The church at Larchmont has a right to look to this Presbytery for financial assistance in providing itself with a church home. It is manifestly unfair to the people, whom we have organized into a church, and

Fall Stated to the Board of Church Erection, from which we have withdrawn Meeting.
Oct. 6, 1014 our support, for us to be without funds to help and to send them to that board for assistance. This Presbytery needs a large fund for such work.

This committee further reports that, in obedience to your directions (Vol. V, p. 559), we have purchased the property, 23 Slater Street, Port Chester, and that it is being used for our work among the Italians. We are glad to report that the purchase has been made at the price named (\$5,000), that \$1,200 was borrowed to make the cash payment, and that the mortgage of \$3,800 has been extended for a period of three years. The title has been vested in the Trustees of Presbytery who have accepted it.

For the fiscal year just ended your committee has received of the amount (\$1,000) apportioned among our churches \$843.08, which has been accounted for in the report of our Treasurer already submitted (\$p\$. 8). The work of the new year calls for even a larger budget than the one just closed. At least \$400 of the \$1,200 borrowed to purchase the Port Chester Italian Mission property must be paid to avail ourselves of the generous offer of the lender and save the interest on the loan. In addition there will be larger demands for help in church extension and church erection. For the current fiscal year we recommend and move the adoption of the following apportionments:

The work among foreign-speaking people is progressing satisfactorily. The Port Chester Italian Mission has taken on new interest and assumed new proportions, since the purchase of the property was made. The Port Chester Church has also given interest and encouragement to the work, and the results are evident in an increasing interest on part of the Italian constituency. The little chapel is entirely inadequate to the work and must soon

be enlarged. Work among the Italians at White Plains and New Fall Stated Rochelle is also progressing satisfactorily. We hope soon to report Meeting, Oct. 6, 1914 a well-equipped mission house at New Rochelle.

At Yonkers the work among the Hungarians under the Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, is most encouraging, carried on by a regularly organized church with efficient and active organization within among both young and old. At least three of the young men of this church are already under the care of this Presbytery as candidates for the ministry, which speaks well for the spiritual training of the Hungarians of Yonkers. Through help of the Church Extension Committee of the Presbyterian Churches of Yonkers, land has been purchased and plans are being prepared for a church home for these people.

Nothing need be added with respect to Presbyterial and Synodical Missions beyond what is given in the report of the Treasurer. submitted to Presbytery at this meeting (p. 7). We again urge upon members of Presbytery the need of meeting in full the apportionments of the churches. Unless this is done you cannot expect your committee to give aid to deserving churches, and the usefulness and efficiency of the committee will be impaired. For the current fiscal year we recommend and move the following apportionments:

Your committee, through its sub-committee on evangelistic work, has not yet been able to put into execution the plan of extended visitation and conference with the local church, reported at the Spring Stated Meeting (Vol. V, p. 558), but hope soon to begin, by which we hope to arouse a new consciousness of evangelistic responsibility and stimulate a new evangelistic activity upon part of every member and every agency of the local church.

We call attention to the annual Day of Prayer for ministers and laymen, which will be held on Tuesday. November 17, in the North Avenue Church of New Rochelle. These days have been helpful and inspiring, and ministers and elders are urged to preempt the day and plan to be present.

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 6, 1914

Your committee call attention to these important facts:

- I. That there exists upon part of some of the ministers and sessions a confusion of the work of the two sub-committees of the general committee on presbyterial and synodical missions and church erection and church extension, and that as a result contributions to the work are too often misdirected. One sub-committee has to do with supplementing the salaries of pastors of weak churches, while the other is intrusted with the duty of extending the cause of Presbyterianism within the bounds of Presbytery and in aiding churches in erecting and enlarging their church homes. We urge our churches, in sending their contributions, to bear in mind the plan of Presbytery (Vol. V, pp. 486 and 487).
- 2. We note with disapproval within the bounds of our Presbytery, as well as elsewhere, the presence of so many small and inefficient churches of our own and other denominations in neighborhoods that are small and consequently overchurched. churches are a drain upon the church at large and, as a rule, make little or no advance towards self-support. Some way should be found to unite these churches in the interest of efficiency and self-support. The Synod has appointed a committee to investigate and to recommend a plan to meet the situation. Your committee is in agreement with this committee in its disapproval of appropriations for the support of a church in any community of 500 or fewer persons, where there exists another church of an evangelical body recognized of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, except in the case of missions among foreign-speaking or other exceptional groups of people.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions also presented a report on appointments churches without pastors which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received.

Elder Frank W. Pearsall was excused from service Fall Stated Meeting, on the Committee on Social Service.

The Committee on Sessional Record presented a report, which was received, accepted and is as follows:

Your committee would respectfully report as follows:

1. The sessional records of the following were presented for review:

Gilead, Greenburgh, Harrison, Katonah, Mahopac Falls, Mt. Kisco, Mt. Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, and Patterson.

2. That the records of the following, called for, were not presented:

3. We recommend and move that all the records presented be approved without exception.

The sessions of the Huguenot Memorial and the Irvington Churches were excused for not presenting their records for review at this time.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts and Elder William B. Jones tellers of votes for Delegates to the Synod.

The Committee on Education and Examination presented a report, which was received, and its recommendations, with exceptions of 4 and 5, were adopted. The report is as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports as follows:

#### I. SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Reports have been received from 35 schools. Non-reporting schools are Hope Chapel and Union School, Irvington; and Broadway Mission and Calvary, Ossining. Perhaps Irvington and Ossining totals may include the figures of these schools. The total of money raised is \$9,902, as against \$8,932 in the previous year. This is a gain of \$970. The average gift of each person present each Sunday is 4½ cents, against 4 cents the year before. Each enrolled member averages \$1.50 for the year, against \$1.30 for the previous year. This increase went chiefly to self-support. \$4.855 went in this direction, an increase of \$405. \$148 less than last year was given to the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, \$294 more to other boards and \$558 less to miscellaneous objects.

The total enrollment is 6,732. The Dayspring is the largest, 832, Mt. Vernon next with 473, then New Rochelle North Avenue 470, New Rochelle 440, and Westminster 400. The average attendances are: Dayspring, 540; New Rochelle, 280; New Rochelle North Avenue, 254; Mt. Vernon First, 248; Westminster, 241; Immanuel Chapel, 212; Irvington, 200. Increases in enrollment are: Harrison 50 per cent., Yorktown and New Rochelle each 30 per cent., Mt. Vernon First 25 per cent. The largest number of new pupils are in Irvington, 90; Westminster, 87; Dayspring, 75; Mt.

Fall Stated Vernon First, 71. Three Schools, Harrison, Huguenot Memorial Meeting.
Oct. 6, 1914 and South Yonkers, have an average attendance of 80 per cent. In order to make accurate comparisons, however, it is needful to have uniformity of method in reporting. Of this we are by means assured. One school may report the number on the roll at the time the report is rendered, while another reports all on the roll during the year.

Organized Bible Classes of adults are reported in 11 schools. Peekskill First leads with 89 members, or nearly one-third of the entire school; New Rochelle North Avenue has 65 and Westminster 60. The total enrolment in such classes is 295. Here is a field for large work. The cradle roll grows in popularity, increasing 226 last year, with the present number 687. The home department falls off 151, leaving 895. Grades are reported in 15 schools. The grades vary in number from 1 to 13. Westminster Helps are used by 26 schools. Bible Study Union or Peloubet Helps are in use in 3. The churches have received into full membership 154 scholars against 275 last year, a falling off of 91. No explanation is forthcoming. Definite decision has been urged upon the pupils in 28 schools. Decision Day has been observed in one-third of the schools, Children's Day by 28, and Rally Day by 22. Communicant classes are reported by 3. A new school has been organized at Hartsdale.

#### II. EDUCATION.

Recent communications from the Board of Education to your committee call attention to the new rules adopted by it in accordance with directions of the General Assembly with regard to pecuniary aid to students for the ministry. Under these rules the aid granted to students in the preparatory school and college is in the form of a loan, for which the applicant is to give his note. The note is to be cancelled on the request of the maker, after he has been in the ministry of an evangelical church for five years; but if he should abandon his purpose or demit the ministry within five years after ordination, the note becomes payable with interest from its date. During the preparatory years it is necessary for the note to be endorsed with one responsible name. The attention of all pastors, having candidates or prospective candidates for the ministry in their churches, is especially called to this requirement. Sufficient reason for the adoption of such a rule may be found in the fact that the Board of Education has now on its delinquent list the names of 296 men, who for various reasons have given up their intention to enter the ministry. Of these 14 have paid something toward the refund, which is expected of them, and 8 have entirely discharged their obligations.

The work of the Board of Education is expanding along new lines of college visitation and State university work. The number of candidates aided during the last year was 825, an increase of 31 over the previous year. Presbytery has 3 candidates, who have received aid during the past year. Twenty-seven of our churches have sent contributions; 7 have not contributed. The total of our contributions is \$555.93; and the total of aid received by our candidates was \$280.

#### III. EXAMINATIONS.

The committee has examined Mr. Robert B. Galt, a candidate Fall Stated under care of Presbytery (p. 9), in the subjects required by the Meeting. Form of Government of candidates for licensure and ordination, Oct. 6, 1914 except the original languages of Scripture. The committee has also examined Mr. George M. Whitmore, a licentiate under our care (p. 5), in theology and church government on his applica-

Your committee recommends and moves:

tion for ordination.

- r. That Mr. Andrew F. Janowicsky, a member of the Hungarian Church of Yonkers, whose application was reported to Presbytery at its June meeting (Vol. V, p. 576), be now examined by the Moderator as to his religious experience and motives for seeking the ministry, and, if the way be clear, his application to be taken under the care of Presbytery as a candidate, be granted.
- 2. That the following candidates, now under our care, be recommended to the Board of Education for necuniary aid to the full amount and under the conditions specified in its rules at their several stages of study:
- Mr. George R. Brunjes, of the Greenburgh Church; Mr. Chas. Papp, Jr., Mr. Eugene Meray and Mr. Andrew F. Janowicsky, of the Hungarian Church of Yonkers, and Mr. R. Irving Barnett, of the South Yonkers Church.
- 3. That Presbytery now hear the trial sermon and statement of belief of Mr. Robert B. Galt and the statement of Mr. George M. Whitmore.
- 1. That the Presbytery sustain the examination of Mr. Robert B. Galt, and grant his request for licensure and ordination.
- 5. That the Presbytery sustain the examination of Mr. George M. Whitmore and grant his request for ordination.

Mr. Galt then read his statement of belief and part of a sermon, and Mr. Whitmore his statement of belief.

Mr. Galt and Mr. Whitmore were examined on their statements of belief.

Rev. John S. Allen, of the Classis of New York, of the Reformed Church, and the Rev. William P. Schell, of the Presbytery of Geneva, were invited to sit as corresponding members

Presbytery then took a recess until 2 p.m. Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 P. M.

Presbytery reassembled at 2 p.m., and was opened with prayer.

The polls for election of Delegates to Synod were declared closed.

The examination of Mr. Whitmore on his statement of belief was concluded.

Fall Stated

Recommendations 4 and 5 of the report of the Com-Meeting, Oct. 6, 1914 mittee on Education and Examinations that the examinations of Mr. Galt for licensure and ordination, and of Mr. Whitmore for ordination be sustained, were adopted.

Mr. Whitmore answered in the affirmative the constitutional questions required of a licentiate coming from

another ecclesiastical body (p. 5).

Mr. Galt was then with prayer duly licensed to preach the Gospel in accordance with the requirements of the Form of Government.

The Rev. George Reynolds was named as the representative of Presbytery at Synod's Committee on Synod-

ical Missions.

Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor was made a committee to report arrangements for the ordination of Mr. Galt, and Rev. Daniel Russell to report arrangements for the ordination of Mr. Whitmore. Messrs. Galt and Whitmore are to be ordained as evangelists that they may serve as assistant ministers in the North Avenue and Irvington Churches.

Presbytery then held a conference on the present problems of Foreign Missions under the leadership of the Rev. William P. Schell, of the Board of Foreign Mis-

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

1. That the Intermediate Meeting be held in New York and that the Stated Clerk be the Committee of Arrangements; and

2. That the Fall Stated Meeting be held in the Mt. Kisco Church, for which an invitation has been received.

The Commission on the Bedford Church presented a report which was received and is as follows:

During the past six months Mr. Aubrey C. Ross has continued to supply the church, holding services there each Sunday and doing

the pastoral work of the parish.

There are several features of encouragement. The Sunday School has shown a marked increase in attendance and interest. The present enrollment is 50 as compared with 30 reported six months ago and practically nothing a year ago. In addition to this Mr. Ross has formed a Boys' Club, which meets regularly each week, and in this way he is reaching the boys and young men of

the community.

Since our last report the Methodist and Baptist Churches have discontinued holding services, and some of the people formerly connected with these churches are now attending the Presbyterian Church, and more of the children are attending the Sunday School. No special effort has been made to get these people from the other churches beyond cordial invitations that so long as no services were being held in their own churches they would be made very welcome at the Presbyterian Church. It is apparent, therefore, that there are added reasons for maintaining regular services in the Presbyterian Church, which may ultimately be the only Protestant Church, aside from the Episcopal Church, maintaining an organization and services there, and these two churches are over a mile apart.

One communion service, conducted by the Rev. Mr. Payson, has

Spring Stated been held, and another will be in the near future. There is one man waiting to unite with the church by letter and there is every reason to expect that there will be other accessions, as the result of Mr. Ross' work. No members have been dismissed, but three have been lost by death, making the present membership 69.

During the year the congregation has raised about \$1,000 for church support, which with the aid given them by presbytery of \$250

has enabled them to keep a man in the field.

There is a movement under way in the congregation looking to the calling of Mr. Ross, and the commission is in hearty accord with this step. It will involve a continuance of the support Presbytery has been given them, but with one church there in place of three the time may come again when the work will be self-supporting.

The church is still without a session, but if Mr. Ross continues at Bedford there is reason to believe that one may soon be secured.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee makes the following report on matters referred

to it:

1. Call of the Greenburgh Church (p. 49). The Greenburgh Church presents a call for the pastoral services of the Rev. Philip Smead Bird, just received from the Presbytery of New York. salary is \$1,800 a year with the free use of the manse and four weeks' vacation. The minutes of the congregational meeting were presented and the commissioner was heard. We recommend and move that the call be found in order and placed in the hands of Mr. Bird, when he shall be able to appear in Presbytery.

2. Protest of the Session of the Yonkers First Church (p. 49).— This protest pertains to the increase in the apportionment of the General Assembly. We recommend that it be received and placed

on file.

3. A communication from the Presbytery of Cayuga (p. 49).— At the January meeting Presbytery received a communication from that presbytery (b. 44), asking us to join in an overture to the General Assembly concerning the action of the Executive Commission in sending out a "Declaration of Principles of the Reformation." Presbytery at that time voted to take no action. The present communication explains the action of the Presbytery of Cayuga in that request. We recommend and move that no action be taken.

4. Two communications from the General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply (p. 48)—These practically request Presbytery to adopt the plan of Vacancy and Supply, which was sent out a year ago. The plan was presented at the Spring Stated Meeting in 1914, was discussed at the June meeting, was on the docket for the Fall Stated Meeting, but no action was taken at that time. The committee feels that the matter is a most important one and Presbytery should be willing to either approve or reject the plan. Therefore that Presbytery may take definite action we recommend and move, one member of committee dissenting.

(1) That Presbytery approve the plan, and (2) That in event of such approval, a special committee be appointed by the Moderator to propose necessary changes in the standing rules or orders of Presbytery if any changes be needed.

5. Trustees of Presbytery (p. 49).—We recommend and move that the following be elected Trustees for a term of three years:

Rev. Arthur C. McMillan, and Elders Alfred C. Dodge and Spring Stated Meeting,
Orson W. Sloat.

6. Bill for binding Minutes (p. 49).—We recommend and

move that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the bill for the binding of the fifth volume of our Minutes for the Presbyterian Historical Society.

7. Apportionment of the Larchmont Church (p. 48).—This new church has never had any apportionment assigned for presby-

terial expenses. We recommend and move it be fixed at \$5.

8. Minutes of the Trustees (p. 49).—The committee has examined the minutes referred to us, and we recommend and move their approval.

The Special Committee on the request of the Port Chester Church for the return of its property (p. 42), presented a report which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee appointed to represent Presbytery in the reorganization of the Port Chester Church is happy to report the satisfactory fulfillment of its mission.

Acting under the competent legal advice of Mr. A. R. Wilcox a regularly called meeting of the congregation was held Wednesday evening, April 7th, which was well attended. At this meeting action was taken making the spiritual officers of the church the trustees of the church. Four elders and nine deacons were elected, and will be ordained and installed Sunday, April 18th. Two of the elders were elected three years ago. The ecclesiastical year for the elders was changed from June to April A financial statement was made, showing the finances of the church to be in a satisfactory condition. Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth, who has so wisely and faithfully led the church as its acting pastor during this time of crisis, now desires to withdraw, and requests Presbytery to release him as moderator of the session and appoint a successor. The meeting was adjourned to June 16th, when any vacancies that may occur will be filled.

Your committee desires to state that, in the opinion of the legal adviser of the church, the action taken at this meeting was as radical a reorganization of the church as was called for under the law, or as existing conditions demanded. Under wise pastoral leadership we believe that the future of the church is full of promise.

Your committee recommends and moves

I. That the committee be discharged and the care of the church be now intrusted to its officers;

2. That the request of the Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth to be released as moderator of the session be granted and a successor appointed; and

3. That Presbytery advise the Port Chester Church to call to its pastorate a man of accredited standing and ability as soon as provision has been made for his financial support, and that the officers of the church take immediate steps to attain this desirable goal.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report,

which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee would report that reports have been received from 23 churches. Eighteen have had at least one temperance ser-

Spring Stated mon or address during the past year; 12 Sunday-schools observed Meeting, Apr. 20, 1915 Temperance Day at some time and in some way; 4 churches are using at least some of the supplies furnished by the Board of Temperance; 11 are receiving and distributing The Amethyst; 15 churches have given \$184.98 to the temperance work of our denomination; 3 Sunday-schools have given a total of \$39; 2 churches have given \$25 to local work; 16 have given \$1,444.06 to outside organizations, among which the Anti-Saloon League seems to have received the largest part; 12 churches state that the Board of Temperance has been placed on the schedule for annual contributions. While the reporting churches are manifesting a commendable in-terest in this cause, Presbytery as a whole is not as interested as we think it should be. We would commend this work of our board again to the attention of our churches, asking that it be given our careful consideration, and, if even local or nearby outside agencies be more present with us can we not more generally and generously support this agency, which is peculiarly ours, in the large work it is undertaking in our name?

We have received a request from the Lord's Day Alliance that their General Secretary, Rev. Harry L. Bowlby, be granted the privilege of addressing Presbytery regarding their work. We would recommend and move that this request be granted and that

fifteen minutes be given for that purpose.

The Committee on the Every Member Campaign (p. 15) presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

We were able to report to you a year ago that 16 of our 34 churches had made, or had definitely planned to make in the near future, the Every Member Canvass; that 8 had the plan under consideration; that 8 had made no reply to our inquiries, due in most cases to the fact that their pulpits were vacant; that only one church had seemed wholly indifferent; and that only 2 had returned

a positive refusal.

Under date of March 4th of this year an urgent letter was sent to the churches asking that those who had not already done so should undertake the canvass, and recommending, in accordance with the policy of the Joint Executive Committee, that wherever the canvass had been made last year it should be repeated. This letter stated that the Rev. U. L. Mackay, Synod's special representative, was ready to aid any church, which might desire his services, the same being true of the chairman of your committee.

The expenses of your committee, amounting to \$89.24, have been secured from friends, so that no call has been made upon the

treasury of Presbytery.

Your committee recommends and moves

1. That the duty of making the Every Member Canvass be

strongly urged by the Presbytery on all its churches; and

2. That the special committee, having fulfilled to the best of its ability the purpose for which it was created, be now discharged, and the further prosecution of the work be entrusted to the Missionary Committee.

The thanks of Presbytery were extended to the committee and especially to the chairman.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Mis-Spring Stated sions presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, Apr. 20, 1915 and is as follows:

Your committee would report as follows:

I. Work among the Foreign-speaking Population.-At Port Chester, reorganized a year ago, we report excellent work is being done with the spiritual and financial support of the Port Chester Church. Here as well as elsewhere there has been a falling off in financial support on part of the people themselves owing to adverse industrial conditions. The interest and attendance upon the mission services, however, has not diminished, and during the past year our missionary effectiveness has undoubtedly increased. The license of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano as a local evangelist has expired, and should be renewed at this meeting. At 'New Rochelle the work among the Italians is most encouraging. A new mission house has been erected at a cost of \$15,000, the money being raised by the New Rochelle Church. In Yonkers plans have been completed and bids received for a church edifice for the Hungarian Church, which will represent an investment of \$11,000, of which the Hungarians contribute about \$3,000 in cash in addition to assuming the repayment of a loan of \$4,000 from the Board of Church Erection. Our other work among the foreign-speaking people is well cared for, and results are satisfactory.

Under the new plan of the Board of Home Missions the fiscal year for this work will begin July 1st instead of April 1st as at present, and the appointment of our missionaries will only be for three months and until July 1st instead of for a year as formerly. For this reason it would be best to request the Board of Home Missions to appoint our missionary workers for fifteen months from

April 1st.

Your committee recommends and moves

(1) That the license of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano as a local evan-

gelist be renewed for one year.

(2) That the Board of Home Missions be requested to appoint for the term of fifteen months the following missionaries for work among our foreign-speaking population:

Mr. Pietro Guiffrida, Mt. Kisco and Pleasantville, at \$30 a

month;

Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, Yonkers, at \$83.33 a month; Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, Port Chester, at \$75 a month; Miss Mary Kellogg. White Plains, at \$37.50 a month; Mr. Domenico Blasi, New Rochelle, at \$45.83 a month.

2. Evangelistic Work.—Your committee has no special report to make. Our efforts since the Pulpit Exchange and Day of Prayer have been to stimulate evangelistic desire and activity, and we are glad to report that not a few of our churches have during the winter months held special evangelistic meetings with varying success. At Harrison a whole month of such services with a trained evangelist resulting in quickening church members, an awakening of the whole village, and the gathering of many into the kingdom. In Yonkers and New Rochelle interdenominational evangelistic meetings were held.

3. Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.—Your committee has aided to the extent of its financial ability our weaker churches.

Spring Stated The Hungarian Church has been added to our list for an annual gift of \$150 and the old South East Church for an additional \$100. We recommend and move that these appropriations be approved.

4. Church Extension.—Ever since this work was placed upon your committee we have been conscious of a vital lack in our equipment. The object of church extension in a community like ours is to supply the growing suburban population with the gospel service they have left in their city homes, and also encourage and assist them to provide for themselves a church for their religious life and activity. This is the work we believe you intended us to do, and which we have made every effort to do, and, moreover, we believe we have done this work as effectively as our means would allow, but always has our work been circumscribed because of the limited resources at our command. We have received from the churches since 1910 \$2,842.78, out of which we made a liberal gift to the Pleasantville Church at the time of their rebuilding, paid the rent of the Italian mission chapel at Port Chester, contributed to the purchase of the lot for the proposed Hungarian Church in Yonkers, aided materially in the furnishing of the equipment for the work of the Hitchcock Memorial Church, and otherwise contributed to the work intrusted to us; and yet scarce a year has passed by since our organization that there have not come to us opportunities we have been unable to accept, all of which has impressed upon us the inadequate resources at our command for the work you desire us to do. As we are able to see our presbyterial territory there are many locations within our bounds that seem ripe for some preliminary work looking toward the establishment of a church, but we are unable to prosecute such a work through a lack of funds that would enable us to send our agents to these fields.

Your committee is, therefore, agreed that the future effectiveness of our work will require a large invested fund upon which we could draw to meet the opportunities for church extension, and out of which we could assist the organized churches within our bounds in providing and in enlarging suitable equipment. Under the rules of the General Assembly the Board of Church Erection is unable to meet the first and most vital needs of such new church enterprises as it is the function of your committee to organize and foster.

We therefore recommend and move

(1) That Presbytery undertake at once to raise a permanent fund of \$100,000 to be used by the churches of Presbytery, and under proper guards and limitations, for the advancement and extension of the Kingdom of Christ within the bounds of Westchester Presbytery, as now or hereafter constituted.

(2) That Presbytery through its Moderator appoint a committee of seventeen, composed of nine ministers and eight elders, to prepare plans and conduct a campaign of raising such permanent

fund at the earliest possible moment.

The five churches having the largest contributions by the societies to the boards of the church, Huguenot Memorial \$150.77, Ossining First \$137.25,, Yonkers Dayspring \$82.50, Peek-skill Second \$76.46, and New Rochelle \$54. The five churches having the highest average per member of contribution to the boards are Ossining First \$2.28, Peekskill Second \$1.59, Bedford \$1.50,

The Committee of Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

The committee has examined Mr. Aubrey C. Ross, a candidate for the ministry under care of Presbytery in all the subjects required by the Form of Government in examinations for licensure except the original languages of Scripture. The examination in the original languages was omitted, because the candidate has not studied these languages during his seminary course. Your committee recommends and moves that Mr. Ross be now brought before Presbytery for his public parts of trial, his sermon and statement and belief.

Mr. Ross then read his statement of belief and part of his sermon, and was questioned thereon by members

of Presbytery.

The order of the day was then suspended and the Spring Stated Narrative was read. It was ordered that an abstract be Apr. 20, 1915 sent to the General Assembly and entered on the minutes. The abstract is as follows:

The membership reported this year is 9,431, a net gain over last year of 349. 493 united with our churches on examination. Two preaching services are held on the Lord's Day, with 25 per cent. of the children and youth present. Weekly meetings for prayer are held, 21 churches reporting an average attendance of 33.

There are 43 Sabbath schools in connection with our churches. 35 church schools, 6 branch and 2 mission. The shorter catechism is not taught. Westminster Helps are generally used. Teachers' meetings are held in a majority. One-third have adult Bible classes, and 5 report teacher training classes; 20 report home departments. The total membership is 6,849; 300 were received from the schools into the church on examination.

The spiritual condition is generally good. Children of Christian parents are generally presented for baptism. No means practically are used to revive family worship beyond an occasional

Almost all the churches contribute regularly to the boards with an increase in offerings. Weekly envelopes or old system of monthly offerings are employed. The budget plan is in use in a few of the churches. The Sabbath schools contribute on the average to three boards each.

Financial obligations are promptly met. Temporalities are generally managed by trustees. Income in a few is from pew rents; in most, from weekly envelopes, or both.

The order of the day was resumed, and it was ordered to proceed with the licensure of Mr. Ross, but that action on his request for ordination be postponed for at least six months.

The Committee on Education and Examinations further reported that Mr. Pietro Guiffrida, a member of the Mt. Kisco Church, has filed notice of his intention to apply to Presbytery to be taken under its care as a candidate for the ministry. This notice was received April 19, 1915. The report was received.

The Rev. Harry L. Bowlby, of the Lord's Day Alliance, was heard in behalf of that organization and its

work.

A resolution relating to it was referred to the Business Committee, report to be made thereon at the June Intermediate Meeting.

Mr. Aubrey C. Ross was then licensed to preach the gospel in accordance with the provision of the Form of

Government.

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves

1. That the January Intermediate Meeting be held in New York City and that the Stated Clerk be the Committee of Arrangements.

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 5, 1915 2. That the Spring Stated Meeting be held in the North Avenue Church of 'New Rochelle, for which an invitation has been received.

The Commission on the Bedford Church (p. 51) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Mr. Aubrey C. Ross, a licentiate of this Presbytery, continues to supply the church, and his services have proved very acceptable. He has maintained and increased the interest of the church-going people of the community, and especially of the young people, and a thriving Sunday School and Christian Endeavor Society are now being maintained. In July last a communion service was conducted by the Rev. Walter L. Steiner, at which time nine young people were received into the membership of the church upon profession of faith and a number of children were baptized. There is a prospect of a further ingathering within the next few months, and these facts speak much for the character of the work done. The present active membership of the church is 79 and of the Sunday School 51.

The Methodist Church has apparently been closed for good, and it is reported that the property is for sale. After several months without services the Baptist Church has placed a man on the field again. The Trustees of the Francis Palmer Estate have given \$500 towards maintaining the property. This money is not available for the expenses of maintaining services. A legacy of \$2,500 has recently been left the church, the proceeds of which are not immediately available.

At a meeting of the congregation held in the church on the 3rd of this month, a unanimous call was extended to Mr. Ross, and it is hoped that he may be ordained and installed as pastor in the near future. There are good reasons for believing that Mr. Ross will be able to secure suitable men to form a session, the lack of which at the present time is one of the serious drawbacks in the situation.

The Committee on the Church Extension Fund (p. 64) presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted, and is as follows:

The Rev. Paul Stratton was chosen temporary chairman and Elder George W. Banks temporary secretary, pending the adoption of a final plan for the campaign. Committees have been appointed upon method and plan, upon a survey of the field and securing initial gifts. Your committee is of the opinion that it is not wise to begin the actual work of raising the money at this time and have postponed this part of the program until the time seems more opportune. It is the opinion of your committee, also, that so large and important an undertaking should have the direction of some one qualified by experience and training to plan and prosecute the work, and we are looking for a man, who will be able to furnish us the knowledge and leadership we desire.

In our appeal to churches and individuals for money, it is important that we be able to present to them rules and regulations for the use of the Fund, which have been adopted and authorized by Presbytery; and to this end we submit the following and respectfully recommend and move their adoption:

I. CUSTODIANS OF THE FUND.

Fall Stated Meeting.

The custodians of this fund shall be the Trustees of the West-Meeting, chester Presbytery, an incorporated body, or the Board of the Oct. 5, 1915 Church Erection Fund, also incorporated, as shall be subsequently ordered by Presbytery, who shall hold all such moneys in trust, subject to the direction of the Presbytery of Westchester as to the uses thereof, and whose duties and responsibilities shall be similar to those of trustees of trust funds, and who shall issue loans to such enterprises and in such amounts as they may be directed by the Presbytery at the recommendation of the Presbytery's Permanent Committee on Church Erection and Extension or their successors.

#### II. LOANS AND GRANTS.

From this permanent fund loans shall be made by action of Presbytery on the recommendation of the Permanent Committee on Church Erection and Extension. In no case shall a sum exceeding one-half of the value of the property for which a loan is asked be loaned to anv one church enterprise; and in all cases the amount advanced shall be returned to the custodians of the Fund in equal annual payments within a period not exceeding ten years.

The funds so to be contributed for the purpose of Presbyterian Church Extension in the Presbytery of Westchester and paid to the custodians of said Fund, shall be loaned on bond and mortgage for the purpose of church extension, and at such rate of interest and for such time as Presbytery shall direct on recommendation of the Permanent Committee on Church Erection and Church Extension.

All interest on said funds from any sources may be loaned for the purpose of the Fund on bond and mortgage without interest and to be repaid on such terms and at such times as Presbytery shall direct upon the recommendation of the Permanent Committee on Church Erection and Extension.

### III. CONDITIONS OF THE LOANS.

In order to maintain undiminished the original fund, to the end that its service may be perpetual, title shall be taken by the custodians of the funds to all land, for the purchase of which money from the Fund has been loaned.

When the loan is made for the building of a church edifice, a first mortgage therefor shall be held by the custodians of the Fund on any building erected by the moneys loaned by the Fund

and upon the land, upon which the same stands.

### IV. Bequests.

In order that this Fund may grow with the growth in population of our Presbytery, we heartily recommend to benevolently minded friends that they remember this cause in their wills. Here-

with appended is a form of bequest:

I give, grant, devise and bequeath to the custodians of the Church Erection Fund of the Presbytery of Westchester (state amount of money, or describe land, if land) the same or the proceeds thereof to be held by said custodians in trust as a part of the funds raised in said Presbytery for Presbyterian Church Extension in said Presbytery, and to be loaned for said purposes, and as the said Presbytery shall order and direct.

Fall Stated Meeting. Oct. 5, 1915

The Commissioners to the General Assembly presented a report, which was received, and is as follows:

All the commissioners to the General Assembly were able to accept their election and serve on committees, when appointed. Elder Nathan P. Bushnell was made a member of the Permanent Judicial Commission of the class of 1917.

No action of Presbytery is made necessary by the Assembly, but your commissioners call attention to the following matters

affecting Presbytery or the churches:

1. Overtures on Divorce and Executive Commissions, sent down by the Assembly of 1914, are now a part of the organic law of the church (Min. of G. A., 1915, pp. 204 and 206).

2. Absentee members (p. 33).

3. Attendance of children at church services (p. 33).

4. Presbyteries to appoint standing committees on Life and Work (p. 119).

5. Co-operative Church Work (p. 120). 6. Licensure of candidates (p. 288).

7. Ministers received from other bodies (p. 101).

The Rev. William H. Wilson of the Presbytery of Corning was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Special Committee on Vacancy and Supply (t. 60) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee, appointed at the Spring Stated Meeting, "to propose necessary changes in the standing rules, or orders, if any changes be needed, by the adoption of the new plan of Vacancy and Supply" (p. 52), respectfully report changes as follows:

1. In Standing Rule 34 omit "(6) Vacancy and Supply" and all

following the words "the preparation of the narrative.

2. After Standing Rule 38 add—"38a. A Committee on Vacancy and Supply shall be appointed as provided for in Standing Rules.

3. Omit Standing Rules 64, 65, 66 and 67, and in place of these insert the plan of Vacancy and Supply (Min. of G. A., 1914, pp. 441-2) as follows:

- 64. Manner of Election of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply.—(1.) Nominations shall be made only by ballot, each member of Presbytery voting for three persons regarded by him as specially fitted for membership on this committee, and the six persons who on this initial ballot receive the highest number of votes (if so many receive votes), shall by the Moderator be declared to have been duly placed in nomination by the direct vote of the Presbytery.
- (2.) Election shall be by ballot. On the first electing ballot the nominee who receives the highest number of votes, providing that he has received a majority of all votes cast, shall be declared elected a member of the committee to serve for three years. In like manner the nominee receiving the second highest number of votes shall be declared elected for two years, and the nominee receiving the third highest number of votes shall be declared elected for one year. However, should it be found that any one of these three persons failed to receive a majority of all votes cast, then the name of the nominee who on the same ballot received the

lowest number of votes shall be dropped and a second ballot taken, Fall Stated and this course shall be followed until three persons are duly Meeting, Oct. 5, 1915 elected.

(3.) Vacancies in the membership of the committee shall be filled in the same manner. On the initial ballot each member of Presbytery shall vote his choice of persons to fill the vacancies on the committee, and from those receiving the highest number of votes the Moderator shall declare duly nominated a number of persons equal to twice the number to be elected (if so many receive votes), and no ballot shall at any time be counted which does not contain a number of names equal to the number of members of the committee to be elected at that particular time.

65. From the members of the committee thus chosen, Presbytery shall without nominations and by ballot elect one person to serve as chairman of the committee for a period of one year, or until the next spring meeting of Presbytery. If after the vote is taken it shall be found that no member of the committee received a majority of all votes cast, then the name of the member receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped from further consideration in connection with the chairmanship and another ballot taken. A chairman shall be regularly elected at each spring

meeting of Presbytery.

66. Whenever the session of any church in the Presbytery shall have knowledge that a vacancy in the pastorate of that church is soon to occur, it shall be the duty of the session to promptly convey this information to the chairman of the Presbyterial Committee on Vacancy and Supply, and the committee shall take immediate steps to adequately provide for the supply of the pulpit, and the proper care of the work of the church when it shall have become vacant. (See also Article 5 of the following section.)

67. Any church of the Presbytery becoming vacant shall by virtue of that vacancy be under the care and direction of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply of the Presbytery.

(1) The Committee on Vacancy and Supply shall nominate to Presbytery a minister to serve as moderator of the session of

the church during its period of vacancy.

(2) It shall be the duty of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply to see that the pulpit is properly supplied until a pastor is chosen, and remuneration of such supply shall be at a rate approved by the said committee, not less than one-half the regular salary for an equal period of service.

- (3) If the Presbyterial committee does not have knowledge of a suitable minister who is available for immediate consideration for the pastorate, then the committee shall promptly report this fact to the office of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply of the General Assembly in order to secure therefrom information as to men located elsewhere who may be available and adapted to the needs of the vacant field.
- (4) All correspondence in regard to the vacant churches of the Presbytery shall go to the Presbyterial Committee on Vacancy and Supply which committee shall make all appointments of ministers to preach in the vacant pulpits of the Presbytery, whether as temporary supplies or as being under consideration for pastorates.
- (5) Each vacant church shall at all times have the right, through its session or committee regularly appointed, to be heard before the Committee on Vacancy and Supply in regard to any

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 5, 1915 matter related either to the temporary supply of its pulpit or to the location of a pastor and suggestions or recommendations thus presented by the church shall always be given first consideration

by the committee.

(6) The Presbyterial committee shall seek to avoid all "Candidating" in the sense of putting one minister against another in competition for a vacant church. When a minister apparently suited to the needs of the field has been appointed to visit and preach before the congregation he shall be regarded as the only man then under definite consideration by the vacant church. The committee may arrange for him to return and fill the pulpit on additional Sabbaths, but when heard as often as the situation seems to demand, the matter shall then promptly be disposed of by the congregation, either by the issue of a call, or if there is not sufficient unanimity to make this advisable, then by definite elimination.

67a. In addition to the duties ordinarily attached to this office and those growing out of the foregoing provisions, the chairman

of the presbyterial committee shall render service as follows:

(1) He shall promptly report vacancy conditions in the Presbytery to the office of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply of the General Assembly, these reports to be of such character and furnished at such intervals as the Assembly's committee may desire.

(2) He shall report fully on the work of the committee at each regular meeting of the Presbytery and at such other times

as Presbytery may determine.

67b. Presbytery shall provide for the ordinary expenses incurred by this committee by annually including in its financial budget an amount equal to the estimated expense of the committee in the proper prosecution of its work

mittee in the proper prosecution of its work.

4. At the end of Standing Order No. 6 add—"The order of the day for 10.30 a. m. of the Tuesday session of the Spring Stated Meeting shall be the election of members of the Committee on

Vacancy and Supply."

It was voted:

I. That the plan of Vacancy and Supply and amendments to the standing rules and orders, given in the preceding report, be adopted; and

2. That three members of the Permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply be elected to serve until the Spring Stated Meet-

ings of 1917, 1918 and 1919.

The election of members of the permanent Committee on Vacancy and Supply was made an order of the day immediately following the conference this afternoon.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports on matters under its care:

#### I. SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Thirty-eight schools reported an enrolment of 836 officers and teachers and 6,178 scholars, making a total of 7,014, a gain of about 200, with an average attendance of 4,419, being 63 per cent. of enrolment. 624 new members were received during the year, and

293 were received into the church, a gain of 60 per cent. over Fall Stated the previous year and any former year. Seven of the reporting Meeting, schools teach the Shorter Catechism and a few the Intermediate Oct. 5, 1915 Catechism. Twenty-five use Westminster Helps, and 8 use other

Catechism. Twenty-five use Westminster Helps, and 8 use other lesson helps, viz., Bible Study, Union Graded Lessons, Charles Scribners' Sons Completely Graded Series, International Graded and Peloubet. Six schools report courses in teacher training with a membership of 30. Two mention text-books used, viz., Oliver's Preparation for Teaching and Prof. Coe's Syllabi. Fourteen schools report organized classes varying from one in a school to 23. The total number in organized classes in the secondary division is 523, and in the adult division 390. The Westminster Adult Bible Magazine is used in 3 schools. The Bible class for men does not reem to be popular in this Presbytery in the large degree reported from other parts of the country, where such classes report membership in such classes by the hundreds. Twenty-one of the 38 schools report missionary offerings. The method of giving this instruction varies. In one school missions is a part of the curriculum. As near as there is uniformity, instruction is given quarterly. Temperance is faithfully taught in 28 schools.

Results.—Twenty-nine schools say that definite decision for Christ is urged on pupils. The result is seen in the fact that 75 per cent. of all those received into the church on examination were members of the Sabbath school. This then remains not only the chief safeguard of our youth, but the great feeder of the church.

## II. Colleges.

The aggregate of contributions to the College Board from this Presbytery for the past year is \$803.83. This board is making an effort to establish chairs of instruction in the Bible in all the colleges aided by it. It offers to Sabbath Schools contributing to this project a souvenir college pennant. This work is heartily commended to churches, Sabbath Schools and individual donors.

#### III. EDUCATION.

The aggregate of our contributions to the Board of Education for the past year is \$677.15. This comes from 29 churches. As we are asking \$450 this year for our candidates and this sum is likely to be increased next year, it will be seen that Presbytery gives only about 25 per cent. more than it hopes to receive.

#### IV. CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY.

There was filed with the chairman of your committee in July last a notice of the intention of Mr. Milton Skaater, a member of the Dayspring Church of Yonkers, to apply to be taken under the care of the Presbytery at this meeting.

The committee recommends and moves

I. That the following candidates under the care of Presbytery be recommended to the Board of Education for the full amount of pecuniary aid granted to students at their respective stages of study for the current academic year:

Collegiate.—R. Irving Barnett, New York University; Eugene Meray, Bloomfield Seminary; Charles Papp, Bloomfield Seminary; Pietro Guiffrida, Bible Teachers' Normal School of New York.

Preparatory.—Andrew F. Janowiczky, Bloomfield Seminary;

Arthur P. Dawson, Central High School, Rochester, N. Y.

2. That this addition to Standing Rule No. 9 be adopted:

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 5, 1915 "Licentiates shall in all cases undergo a probation of six months or more before ordination is granted."

3. That the following action be adopted:

The Presbytery has noted with deep concern the fact that students for the ministry frequently defer their applications to be taken under the care of Presbytery until too late in their course for Presbytery to exercise that supervision of their preparation, which is required by the Form of Government; and the fact that in recent examinations for licensure and ordination candidates have shown serious deficiencies in the knowledge of the Bible and of Christian doctrine and in clearness of religious belief. The Presbytery, therefore, respectfully presents these facts to the theological seminaries, which educate students for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, and earnestly invites these institutions to cooperate with us and with other Presbyteries in remedying the conditions noted.

(1.) By bringing to the attention of all their students, who have in view the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, the requirement of the Form of Government, Chapter XIV, Section VI, and Constitutional Rule No. 3, that candidates must be under the care of a Presbytery not less than one year before licensure is granted, and that the application to be received under the care of Presbytery must be filed three months before the meeting, at which such action is sought.

(2.) By taking requisite measures to secure on the part of such students both thorough knowledge and firm conviction of evangelical doctrine as held by the Presbyterian Church, and a good knowledge of the English Bible both as to its contents and the relation of its separate parts and portions to each other, as required in the Form of Government, Constitutional Rule No. 2.

4. That a copy of the above action be sent to all the theological seminaries in the United States, east of the Mississippi River, which are training students for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in

the United States of America.

The Rev. William H. Wilson of the College Board, by invitation of Presbytery, was heard on its work.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, its recommendations adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee reports as follows:

r. Work among Foreign-speaking People.—Work among foreign populations living within the bounds of Westchester Presbytery has progressed steadily and slowly. There are six substantial missions supervised by Presbytery and partly supported by the Board of Home Missions, which pays this year \$3.260 toward the salaries of five missionaries. Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, our missionary at Port Chester, receives a total salary of \$900 from the Home Board. Since the mission property at Port Chester has been legally transferred to the Presbytery and at the same time the Presbyterian Church at Port Chester has taken an interest in the Italian work, the mission has wakened to new life. Mr. Cigliano is putting forth his best efforts to Christianize the people, because he feels to some extent the support and backing, as never before, of Presbytery and the local body of Christian men. The people have shown themselves

responsive to his pastoral visits. The attendance and offerings Fall Stated have increased in spite of the summer vacation season, and from Meeting, monthly reports there appears a steady and substantial progress, Oct. 5, 1915. The Sunday-school is flourishing with its six consecrated teachers and an earnest Christian man at the head. In fact, the interest among the Italian people at Port Chester has increased to such an extent that they have outgrown their small quarters. Much has been done to interest all classes of the Italian population of Port Chester, and especially the children, with summer outing classes and entertainment. During the past year 12 have joined the Port Chester Church.

Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, pastor of the Hungarian Church, receives a total salary of \$1,180, the Board of Home Missions contributing \$1,000, \$100 over last year. This promising work has made real progress in the acquisition of property, under the closer care and supervision of the Presbyterian Churches of Yonkers, in the acquisition of property. There have been 14 additions during the year and increased interest and spiritual growth.

Mr. Domenico Blasi, pastor of the New Rochelle Mission, receives a salary of \$800, the Home Board contributing \$550 of this amount last year. In New Rochelle this remarkable work has advanced by leaps and bounds. The deep interest of the Italian population together with the generous donations from the Presbyterians of New Rochelle has brought about the erection of a splendid institutional plant with its beautiful chapel and equipment for classes and entertainments.

Mr. Pietro Guiffrida cares for the Italian work at Mt. Kisco, Pleasantville and White Plains. He receives a salary of \$750, \$360 of which is the gift of the Home Board, an increase of \$80 over last year. The work of Mt. Kisco is meeting with an ardent response among the group of loyal Italians, who thoroughly appreciate this privilege of Christian service. Owing to the war numbers of Italians have removed from Mt. Kisco and the work has been retarded.

In Pleasantville a flourishing little Sunday-school of thirty-four members, under the direction of Mrs. Bender, gives promise of great things in the future. There the Italian people have rallied with a good will to the support of the work, giving evidence of their interest in the religious welfare of their children and in the worship of God's house. They have entirely remodelled the little building, fitting it out as a chapel.

In White Plains, where Miss Mary Kellogg has charge of the Italian work, receiving a salary of \$450 from the Home Board, the well-founded work has made during the past year extended progress. There is hope now of procuring a needed new building with all its adequate equipments as an institutional center. The Presbyterian Church of White Plains has a direct supervision over all this work, which guarantees the permanence and success of the enterprise. Just here is the secret of success or failure in our work among the foreign-speaking peoples. To assure success a local church must be tied to the project.

A work was attempted at Harrison during the summer, but because of lack of funds the mission could not be continued. The experiment, however, was long enough to prove the deep need of work there. Meeting, Fall Stated Oct. 5, 1915

- A remarkable work among the Persians, which started many years ago, has recently been revived in Yonkers. This work nearly died from an excess of paternal interest and well-meant Christian charity. The people were simply pauperized and allowed church members to pay all their bills and their debts too. A new plan of self-support was advised, and weekly envelopes have been distributed among these people, who have arisen to the occasion, paying their visiting minister and taking a pride in their self-support. Should this faithfulness continue, Presbytery should give them assistance.
- 2. Evangelistic Work.—The sub-Committee on Evangelistic Work announces that the annual Day of Prayer will be held in the Presbyterian Church of Mt. Vernon on Monday, November 8, at 10.30 a. m. This sub-committee have decided not to hold a day of exchange of pulpits this year, owing to a lack of real interest or demand for it. It is also the intention of your committee to formulate a definite campaign in the interest of evangelism.

By the removal of the Rev. Daniel Russell from this Presbytery (p. 72) this committee has lost one of its members. We recommend and move that the Rev. Lester H. Bent be appointed to fill the vacancy.

3. Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.—A plan for a religious survey of the field of Presbytery, which we believe will be valuable as a basis for a religious forward movement, has been considered. The Rev. James Packard Gillespie of our committee is both qualified and willing to make it under the direction of the Board of Home Missions and without cost to it or us.

We, therefore, recommend and move that the Board of Home Missions be requested to authorize Mr. Gillespie to make a religious survey of our field, the same to be done without expense to Pres-

bytery.

4. Church Extension.—The church at Larchmont organized two years ago has purchased a lot, and a church building is now in process of erection. The Hungarian Church of Yonkers, thanks to the generous assistance of the Yonkers churches and the fraternal co-operation of Presbytery, will soon have a church building of its own, adequate to its needs. The Italian Mission at Port Chester, since that property was taken over by Presbyterv, is in a satisfactory condition, and improvements in the property are under consideration. A year ago, by order of Presbytery, this committee borrowed more than \$1.200 in order to purchase that property, besides assuming a mortgage of \$3.800. The interest in this mortgage and the proper care of the property must be met and maintained out of the funds of the committee, and a substantial part of the loan should be paid back yearly. Every dollar of the amount asked for will be needed in this year, if we are to meet our current obligation.

5. Apportionments.—Your committee recommends and moves the adoption of the following apportionments on our churches:

Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, Patterson, Port Chester, South East Center.

2. The records of the Irvington and Katonah churches, called

for review, were not presented.

3. Your committee recommends and moves that all presented for review be approved without exception.

Rev. Anthony N. Petersen and Elder Henry C. Holbrook were appointed to prepare a minute on the transfer of the Rev. Daniel Russell from this Presbytery to the Presbytery of New York (p. 72).

The action of Presbytery fixing the hour for the election of a Committee on Vacancy and Supply (p. 78) was reconsidered, and it was voted that the election take place at once; and the election was held.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

The call of the Bedford Church (p. 72).—The call is for the pastoral services of Mr. Aubrey C. Ross, a licentiate of this body. It is in proper form and the proceedings of the congregation were regular. The salary stipulated is \$1,000, of which the church is to pay \$700 and Presbytery is expected to grant \$300, with the free use of the manse and a vacation of three weeks. The commissioner of the congregation was heard.

Your committee decided that in case Presbytery shall vote to ordain Mr. Ross, we recommend and move:

That the call be found in order and be placed in his hands, provided the amount of \$1,000 stipulated as salary in the call be binding only so long as Presbytery continues its grant of \$300 towards that sum; and that the same interpretation be placed upon the back of the call and signed by him; if he is willing to accept so endorsed.

Pending the consideration of the two reports immediately preceding, the order of the day, a conference (*p*. 72) was taken up.

The Rev. U. L. Mackey of the Presbytery of Brooklyn be invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Mr. Mackey took charge of the conference and delivered an address.

The thanks of Presbytery was then extended to him. It was ordered that a new Committee on the Every-Member Canvass (p. 54) be appointed by the Moderator.

It was ordered that the Moderator appoint a committee to nominate permanent committees.

The tellers of votes for Delegates to the Synod presented a report, which was received, and the following were declared elected:

The path that such a committee must travel is not altogether smooth. Some tact with insistence upon the principles of presbyterial efficiency and fairness to ministers and churches, for which the committee stands, is a necessary requisite. We cannot please all nor can we allow personal triendship to take precedence of ability and efficiency in our advisory capacity. While the committee aims to give all assistance possible to ministers seeking to better their position and enlarge their sphere and influence, it stands none the less as a shield to the churches against unworthy aspirants. When you consider that for one vacant church there have been more than a score of ministers seeking the pulpit, you will realize the need of some intermediary agency or clearing hours. if the old iniquitous and unjust system of church flirtation with candidates is to be ended.

Through the help of the committee the Rev. John J. McClella 11 has been called by the Port Chester Church. Katonah is co sidering a few names recommended by the committee. The session of the Irvington Church called the committee into consultation acknowledged its aid and advice, and under its advice and direction is endeavoring to secure a pastor. Besides the Port Chester pulpit was supplied by the committee during its period of vacancy.

After devotional exercises an address was delivered by Mr. Joseph Ernest McAfee, of the Board of Home Missions, on "The Meaning of the Panama Congress."

A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. McAfee for his

excellent address.

Presbytery then adjourned until 9 a. m. tomorrow. Closed with the benediction.

The Commission on the Bedford Church (p. 103) presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

The regular church, Sunday School and Christian Endeavor services have been maintained with unusual interest and attendance through the winter and spring months notwithstanding the rough weather. The Christian Endeavor Society, including junior workers, has 45 members. The Sunday School roll numbers 44 children. Attendance in each during the last quarter has averaged more than half the members enrolled.

At a congregational meeting held after services April 16, 1916, pursuant to a call by the commission, the following persons were elected elders: Edward Williamson, J. Willis Clark, George P. Coopernail, M.D., and Robert K. Clark.

It was ordered that the Commission on the Bedford Church be discharged, to take effect when elders are ordained and installed.

The special committee to which was referred overtures to the General Assembly, presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

1. At the January Intermediate Meeting two overtures were referred to your committee (p. 99). Your committee recommends and moves that, in lieu of the adoption of these overtures in their present form, the Presbytery adopt a new overture embodying so much of the matter involved in them as necessary, but couched in general terms; and as such substitute overture your committee proposes the following: The Presbytery of Westchester, a presbytery under the juris-

diction of the General Assembly, hereby respectfully overtures the

Spring Stated

Meeting, April 25, 1916, said General Assembly to say and advise upon the matters and

questions set forth below:

(1) When a church or congregation under the care of a presbytery is without a regularly constituted session, either because it has not yet become a fully organized church by reason of the lack of suitable persons to serve as its elders, or because, having once been fully organized, it has lost all of its elders by death, removal or resignation, and cannot find suitable persons to fill the vacancies thus made;

Is such church or congregation possessed of the right and qualification to elect and call a minister to the pastoral office therein and to have the pastoral relation with such minister duly con-

summated?

(2) Wherein does a special commission, such as is authorized in the Form of Government, Chapter XXVI, Section 9, differ, if at all, from a committee; and what powers, if any, are possessed by such commission, other than those specifically conferred by the appointing body?

2. There was referred to your committee at this meeting an overture to the General Assembly for a simple and reasonable provision for changes in time or place of a regularly appointed

meeting of a presbytery (p. 111).

The committee recommends and moves that, in lieu of sending such overture to the General Assembly, the Presbytery adopt the

following standing rule, to be appropriately numbered:

Whenever it shall become necessary or advisable to change the time or place, or both the time and place, of a regularly appointed meeting of Presbytery, the Moderator with the Stated and Permanent Clerks shall be authorized to make the requisite change at the request or with the concurrence of two ministers and two elders, not of the same church, duly presented in writing, provided that the notice of such meeting shall be issued not less than fifteen days previous to the date determined upon, and ten days prior to the date originally set.

The Committee on The Every-Member Canvass (p. 88) presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Of the committee (p. 88) Rev. Anthony N. Petersen declined to serve, and Rev. Harry B. Roberts was appointed to fill the vacancy. In the absence of Elder E. Stanley Sloat, Elder Walter Thomas was chosen vice-chairman. Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts was chosen secretary and treasurer. Three meetings have been held and plans were discussed and adopted.

1. Literature on the every-member plan was procured and sent to each pastor with a letter and a stamped envelope for a reply. Replies were received from most of the pastors. The services of all and any of the members of the committee were offered to churches, which have not yet adopted the plan. The Bryn Mawr Park Church invited the vice-chairman to speak at a meeting. Since then the plan has been adopted with very gratifying results. The Port Chester Church intends to make a canvass in the Fall, and desires a member of the committee to visit them at that time. Twenty of our thirty-five churches have adopted the plan. We would emphasize these points-An annual canvass, every member a pledged giver to both funds, and weekly gifts as an act of

worship. The canvass is not merely a method of raising money, Meeting, but the canvassers going two by two can pray, converse with and encourage and help members. It promotes good fellowship. We commend it most earnestly to all our churches.

2. Regarding the other part of the uncl.

2. Regarding the other part of the work assigned our secretary sent a personally typewritten letter to every pastor urging his attendance and also that of such members as could, at the conferences recently held in New York City.

The Trustees of Presbytery presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

The Trustees held three meetings during the year. Permission was asked of the Supreme Court, and obtained, to mortgage the Jackson Street property in Yonkers used by the Hungarian Church, owned by your Trustees. The property has been improved by the erection of a commodious church building, costing, with fixtures, about \$8,500. Two mortgages were issued to the Board of Church Erection Fund of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, one for \$1,000 to cover a grant made by that board, and the other for \$3,000 for a loan to run ten years, without interest, to be repaid in ten annual payments. The mortgages were given by your Trustees, as owners, but the bonds were signed by the trustees of the Hungarian Presbyterian Church in Yonkers.

The condition of the funds held by your Trustees is as follows: Adams Fund, \$1,223.04, including interest, \$47.48; Frost Fund, \$1,308.81, including interest, \$60.02; Milne Fund, \$6,462.84, including interest, \$273.02; General Fund, \$4,303.88, including interest, \$183.24; Port Chester Fund, \$2,000, the interest of which is paid to the session of the Port Chester Church.

The terms of the following trustees expire with this meeting of Presbytery: Rev. Anthony N. Petersen and Elder Robert G. Abercrombie. A vacancy in the same class was caused by the

death of Elder George W. Banks.

The Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell and Elder Edwin A. Slosson were appointed a committee to nominate trustees.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, which was received. The first two recommendations were adopted and the third laid on the table for the present. The report is as follows:

The committee desires to voice its high appreciation of its colleague and efficient member, the late Elder George W. Banks. His death is lamented and his loss keenly felt by your committee

as well as by Presbytery.

Your committee has corresponded with seventy-two applicants since the January meeting, and has made special investigation of nine of these candidates. To the Katonah Church the names of three candidates with their credentials have been recommended and four to the Irvington Church. Complete lists of vacant churches and of presbyteries, which have adopted the new plan of Vacancy and Supply, and advices of the permanent committee of the General Assembly relative to its scope of authority and the enlarged service, which each local committee may render its presbytery, have been

Spring Stated
Meeting, procured. Among such services is the important item of the April 25, 1916, minister's calculation in many parishes in whally inadequate to minister's salary, which in many parishes is wholly inadequate to his needs and service and incommensurable with the financial ability of the church and the amounts expended in other directions of religious maintenance. The General Assembly took the follow-

ing action:

Believing that the proper support of all of our pastors is a matter of intense importance, the General Assembly commends the investigation being made in many of the presbyteries in the hope that existing wrongs may be righted and inequalities adjusted, and the Assembly again calls the attention of all the presbyteries to the necessity that careful consideration be given all phases of the subject of the ministerial support.

This action has been transmitted to your committee by the Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply with the recommendation that your committee make an investigation into salaries of

our ministers.

I. Your committee, therefore, propose to make a survey of the entire field with a view of ascertaining the support given to ministers. The committee expects the co-operation of all sessions in this important matter, and asks the endorsement of Presbytery in carrying out the General Assembly's instructions.

2. We recommend and move the following appointments for

churches without pastors:

(1) That moderators of sessions be appointed as follows:

Rev. James H. Hoyt, Pound Ridge; Rev. Murray H. Gardner, South East;

Rev. Murray H. Gardner, South East Center; Rev. Charles L. Carhart, Larchmont; Rev. George M. Whitmore, Irvington;

Rev. Walter L. Steiner, Katonah. (2) That supplies be appointed as follows:

Rev. James H. Hoyt, Pound Ridge; Rev. Murray H. Gardner, South East;

Rev. Murray H. Gardner, South East Center;

Rev. Charles L. Carhart, Larchmont.

3. Further the committee thinks wise to advise that service be held at the South East Church during the summer season only, the people availing themselves of the privilege of worshipping in the South East Center and Patterson Churches during the winter months. On account of historic associations of the field the committee feels that services should be maintained part of the year in this church, but the situation obtaining there now does not seem to warrant continuous services. Neighboring pastors have offered to conduct an afternoon service during the summer months, they also invite the people of South East to worship in their churches in the winter. We recommend and move that Presbytery confirm this action.

The special Committee on Ministerial Support (pp. 12 and 13) was discharged and its duties assigned to the Committee on Vacancy and Supply.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted

and is as follows:

 Foreign Speaking Peoples.—During the past six months work among our foreign neighbors has progressed, and in some

places with marked advancement.

In Yonkers, through the united effort of the Presbyterian Churches there, the devoted labors of the Hungarian pastor, Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, and the loyalty of his people, the well founded work has reached its fruition in a beautiful and substantial building with equipment for worship and Sunday School, the Hungarians giving nearly two-thirds of the money to erect the building. Spiritual grace has been bestowed upon the congregation, the membership has increased and a large and influential community work has been established. The present church membership is 192, an increase of 11 in the past six months, and that of the Sun-

day School 67, an increase of 14.

Among the Italians work is being carried on at various points. White Plains is accomplishing fine results in its many-sided instruction of the children in English, music, sanitation, first aid and civic classes. The mission has outgrown its small quarters and is poorly housed. With a small loan they could erect an adequate building and double the extent and value of this influence among the Italian people of White Plains. The little Sunday School at Pleasantville under the tireless efforts of Mr. and Mrs. Bender, with a membership of 12, is prospering and to some degree is reaching the parents in their homes. In Mt. Kisco the Italian Mission is meeting the hard situation of a decreasing population. The Sunday School has a membership of 21, a sewing class of 15, a Sunday attendance of 15, a prayer meeting with an attendance of 8, and English, American and Italian history classes with a total membership of 18. Mr. Guiffrida, the Italian missionary, proposes to organize a men's club and a mutual aid society. Plans are being made for the reorganization of the work there on a community basis, providing a hall for the Italians and calling together the denominations interested to co-operate in this splendid work. At Port Chester definite plans have been laid for a community interest in the mission and its better financial support. There is a loyal body of Italian Christians and a large opportunity for future growth, but the work is retarded by the insignificant building and the woeful lack of equipment. The mission has now 54 members, an increase of 5 in six months and a Sunday School attendance of 27. In New Rochelle the Italian population are proud of their beautiful new chapel. The well-established work there is flourishing in all its branches, religious services, men's and boys' clubs, classes in English, civics, sewing and music, and kindergarten work. The church membership is 62, and Sunday School 83, an increase

(1) Last year the grants by the Home Board to the different missions among our foreign speaking peoples amounted to \$3,260. As there is an excess of contributions from our churches to the Home Board over its grants, it is proposed to increase the aid to the various fields to the amount of \$400. We, therefore, recommend and move that Presbytery request the Home Board to make

the following grants:

White Plains, Miss Mary Kellogg, \$500; Port Chester, Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, \$900; New Rochelle, Mr. Domenico Blasi, \$550;

Meeting, Mt. Kisco, Pleasantville and White Plains, Mr. Pietro Guiffrida, April 25, 1916. \$460; Yonkers Hungarian, Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, \$1,100; Harrison, under the direction of the Rev. Lester H. Bent, \$100, and Pleasant-

ville, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Bender, \$50-a total of \$3,660.

(2) The attention of your committee has been called to work among Assyrians in Yonkers, which has been for the past year conducted under the supervision of one of our pastors, who is also a member of this committee. The Rev. Isaac Yohanan, an Episcopal minister, has been preaching weekly to these Assyrians and has been giving such other pastoral service as needed, the Assyrians supporting the work from weekly offerings that during the past year have totaled \$240, more than 40 being weekly contributors by an envelope system which has averaged for the past year \$4.55 a week. Many of these people are communicant mem-bers of the Presbyterian Church, having been received into this relation for the most part in Urumia, Persia, but until now no opportunity has been given them to support work here. They are enthusiastic for a church of their own, and hope, after help for the home land on account of the war is no longer necessary, to begin a fund for a church of their own. Your committee feel that their interest and sacrifice should be encouraged, and we recommend and move that the Board of Home Missions be requested to grant \$100 for the current year to supplement the contributions of the Assyrians, with the assurance that continued and increased interest and support on their part will be met by a continued and increased interest and support upon part of Presbytery.

(3) We call attention to the conference in the interest of work among the Magyars of this country, which was held under the direction of the Department of Immigration of the Board of Home Missions at Kingston, Pa., on February 1-3 last, at which over forty representative leaders, pastors and workers among the Mag-The Rev. Andrew Szilagyi of the Hungarian yars were present. Church in Yonkers at his own expense attended the conference and was prominent in the discussion of the problems and formulating the plans adopted by this conference. Your committee feels that the plan of the conference is a step in the right direction to strengthen a work that is both much needed and rich in promise of fruitfulness: and we recommend and move that the Presbytery express its interest in and approval of such a conference, and that we assure it our cordial support in so far as the way may be clear.

2. Presbyterial and Synodical Aid.—A request has come from the South East Church for aid to support a service again after a brief interval, when the work was abandoned. Your committee has investigated the plans of the church, and recommend and move that it be authorized to grant aid to the amount of \$60 for the

six months beginning May I.

3. Church Extension.—Your committee reports that \$100 is needed to complete the payments on the new edifice of the Hungarian Church. The Presbyterians of Yonkers have contributed generously to this work and the Hungarians themselves are supporting it with liberal gifts. While the Hungarians have made no request for further aid your committee feels it a duty and privilege to make this last payment. We recommend and move that it be paid.

4. The Treasurer.—Your committee has suffered a loss that cannot be portraved in words in the death of Elder George W.

Banks, who has served efficiently and faithfully first as chairman Meeting, of the sub-committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Aid and later April 25, 1916. as treasurer of both funds, and in which capacities he was not only efficient but untiringly faithful. As a committee we feel our report would be incomplete, if we did not take some formal recognition of its loss. He bore a large share in all our administrative work. Courteous, self-sacrificing and ready to respond to any and every call made upon him, he has endeared himself to the whole presbytery, and we desire to place on record our high appreciation of his untiring efforts for the success and advancement of the work

of the Kingdom of God within our bounds.

To fill the vacancy caused by his death your committee has chosen Elder William J. Yates treasurer of both of its funds. Like Mr. Banks Mr. Yates has been a faithful and attentive member of your committee for several years and is qualified by his knowledge of the committee's work and of accounts to serve in this capacity. With this meeting of Presbytery Mr. Yates loses his membership in this committee, not having been re-appointed, due to his change of church membership from the South Church to the Westminster Church and the severance of his active eldership. This fact does not make impossible his serving as treasurer, and your committee recommends and moves that his appointment as

treasurer be approved.

5. Evangelistic Work.—Nine of our churches have engaged in some form of evangelistic work during the past year. There seems to be a real desire for such effort in our own churches and in the church at large, and your committee is anxious to encourage and assist in making that desire count for the most in advancing the Kingdom of Christ. We are convinced that special evangelistic efforts in the local church can be made most effective and successful by a combination of special preaching services and conferences, in which the various interests of the whole church are gathered to squarely face their peculiar responsibility, to pray for the success of the special evangelistic meetings and to definitely plan their part to assure such a success. Your committee is prepared to cooperate with any church in arranging and conducting such a series of conferences.

The recommendation of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply with reference to the South East Church (b. 115) was taken from the table and adopted.

The Committee on the Church Extension Fund (p. 74) presented a report, which was received; adopted and is as follows:

The special committee to secure a fund of \$100,000 for Church Extension begs leave to report it was unanimously voted that a further postponement of the campaign was not necessary and that the time seemed opportune to begin active efforts looking to the securing of the fund. A sub-committee on initial subscriptions was appointed to secure from the local churches the names of such individuals as might be induced to begin the fund with a sub-scription of \$1,000 upward, in hope that the committee could secure, and with the conviction that in order to be successful in our work, it was necessary to secure at least one-half of the \$100,000 in

Spring Stated

Meeting, initial gifts before a campaign for small gifts were made. Our April 25, 1916, work in this preliminary effort has not been eminently successful, due in no small measure to a lack of willingness upon the part of pastors to co-operate with us in reaching members of our congregations, who might be induced to join the number of initial givers. However, there are sufficient names in our hands to enable us to begin our work. When this preliminary effort is completed we shall seek an opportunity to present the cause in every church and to make our appeal for subscriptions to the fund payable over a period of years, that will not in any way affect the interests or the calls of the local church. We ask the interest and co-operation of every pastor and elder in our personal campaign for initial gifts and in our general campaign, when it is announced later.

The committee has prepared a pamphlet showing the need of church extension within our bounds, which should be taken by the pastors for distribution among the officers of the church. Later, when the general campaign is being conducted, it is planned to

place a copy in every family.

A vote of thanks was extended to the Permanent Clerk, Elder Ralph E. Prime, for a generous supply of his paper on "Christian Desiderata" for members of Presbytery.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted, and is as follows:

Reports on temperance have been received from 25 churches. Sixteen have had temperance sermons or addresses. Sixteen have observed Temperance Day-eleven have not. Only two have used the Temperance Day Program, and one has used pledge cards, while three have used other literature. Nine churches have been receiving the Amethyst. Seventeen churches have given to the Board of Temperance a total of \$215.45, while from Sunday Schools \$27 has been received. Two of our churches have given \$10 to local work, and nine to the Anti-Saloon League \$1,040.23. Seventeen report the Board of Temperance on the regular schedule of benevolence.

In order to emphasize the request of our Board of Temperance your committee would recommend and move that the recommendation of Presbyterv be made to every one of our churches to place this board upon its annual schedule of benevolence, in order that we may be doing our part in financing the active and aggressive work, which this board of our denomination is undertaking.

The Committee on Social Service was instructed to enquire into the advisability of securing a speaker from the

Board of Temperance to visit our churches.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee would respectfully report:

I. The sessional records of the following churches were pre-

sented for review:

Bedford, Irvington, New Rochelle, Peekskill First, Peekskill Second, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Rye, Scarborough, Scarsdale

Hitchcock Memorial, South East, South East Center, South Salem, Meeting, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, April 25, 1916. Yonkers First, Yonkers Hungarian, Yonkers South, Yonkers Westminster, and Yorktown.

2. The records of the Pound Ridge Church, called for review,

were not presented.

3. We recommend and move:

(1) That all with the exception of the record of the Irvington

Church be approved without exception; and

(2) That the record of the Irvington Church be approved with the exception that it has not been presented for review since 1912.

The Committee on Every-Member Canvass was con-

tinued for one year.

Presbytery took a recess until 1:45 p. m.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 1:45 p. m.

Presbytery re-assembled at 1:45 p. m., and was opened

with prayer.

Rev. E. Munro Dill and Elder Frederic I. Johnson were appointed tellers of votes for Commissioners to the General Assembly.

The Narrative was read. After consideration it was ordered that an abstract be sent to the General Assembly.

The report is as follows:

The churches of the Presbytery of Westchester had a fair share of religious and spiritual success during the past year. There were added on examination 391, of which number 258 were from the Sunday School, and 433 on certificate. The total membership reported 9,704, an increase over last year of 273. The average attendance at the morning service has totaled 3,722, more than a third of the membership, while that at the evening service was only 1,756, and at the prayer meeting 677. There has been raised for local support \$187,382 and for benevolence \$52,680. The women of the church are as faithful and active as usual. There seem to be men's clubs in many of our churches, but there is no report of anything conspicuous on their part for the kingdom. The influence of the Christian Endeavor Societies upon the spiritual life and activity of their members is strong and healthy. Family worship is little observed. The general spiritual life of the church is reported to be reasonably good. There seems to be need of effort to develop family religion, to build up the second service, to carry on evangelistic work, to realize on part of the ministry that the church in its spiritual life is just about what we are in ours.

A conference under the leadership of the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister was held on "Men's Bible Study Work."

Your committee would recommend and move, in view of the thirty years of service of our Stated Clerk and also in view of the large increase of work during the last few years, that the salary of the Stated Clerk and Treasurer be fixed at \$175 annually.



The Moderator appointed the Rev. Arthur Requa and Elder Rodney Gibson the committee to prepare minute ordered under item 3. It was ordered that the Moderator express to the Intermediate Rev. Andrew Szilagyi the sympathy of Presbytery for June 20, 1916 him in his illness, and prayer was offered in his behalf.

The Commission on the Bedford Church (p. 113) reported that on the first Sunday of June two elders had been ordained and installed, and that in accordance with the orders of Presbytery the Commission had dissolved. The report was received.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report on Sabbath Schools, which was received,

and is as follows:

#### SABBATH SCHOOLS.

The number of officers and teachers is 814 and scholars 6,060, making the enrolment of our schools 6,874. This is 174 less than in 1915. The average attendance is 4,367, or 63% of the number on the roll.

Seven schools do not report the number added during the year. The total in the other schools is 1,014 new officers, teachers and scholars, or more than a seventh of the enrolment. This is a much larger gain than in several preceding years. But as the total enrolment is less than last year, there were evidently serious losses. The attention of sessions is drawn to this matter in the hope that an investigation will be made in each school as to whether any losses were unnecessary. Each school ought to know the exact reason why any pupil drops out.

Fifteen per cent. of the pupils are church members. This item has little practical value, because some schools are composed largely of little children, while others have large adult classes. The proportion of church members would be smaller in the former than in the latter. There are no statistics available, which indicate the ages of the various departments of the school nor their relative size. The number of pupils uniting with the

church is 257.

Under the heading "The Sunday School Standard", the blanks call for report in ten items, viz.: Cradle Roll, Home Department, Organized Classes, Training Classes, Graded Lessons, Instruction in Missions and Teachers' Meetings. No school furnishes a report on every item. Twenty-five schools have Cradle Rolls, with a total enrolment of 788. Nineteen schools have Home Departments with an enrolment of 755. This is a decrease of 180. In a few cases churches offer to members of the congregation suggested daily Bible readings, which take the place of the Home Department. But in view of the fact that the answers in the narrative relating to family religion are so unsatisfactory emphasis may well be placed on this department of the school. As in many other enterprises, the success of the work depends almost entirely upon the zeal, devotion and courage of the superintendent of the department. Still, in every church there ought to be found some man or woman who has the capability and willing to give the time to this effort to enlist men and women in the study of God's Word. The criticism has been made that pastors some-

times do not give proper encouragement and support to the efforts of the Home Department superintendent. On the contrary the pastors ought to be the first to attempt to enlist people in the reading of the Word and the plan of the Home Department with the friendly calls of the visitors is certainly a simple and efficient way of enlisting definitely those who otherwise might neglect the Bible in the home.

Sixteen schools report organized classes of the secondary grade and 10 report organized adult classes. Only 2 are registered at the State or denominational headquarters, perhaps because most of them cannot conform to requirement of doing some specific form of Christian service outside of the Sabbath School. Still, there is value in organization itself, for it arouses class spirit

and loyalty and adds zeal to the school.

There are six Teacher Training Classes with a total memship of 55. Three of these classes use Oliver's "Preparation for Teaching"; one uses Coe's "How to Teach S. S. Classes"; or Barkley's "First Standard Manual", and one class uses the Bible. ; one uses Coe's "How to Teach S. S. Classes"; one

Eleven schools have five grades: Beginners, Primary, Junior, Intermediate and Senior. Six schools have four grades and the others less, or not reported. Thirteen schools report that promotions are held; ten report they are not, and two are expecting to introduce promotions. Ten schools use the Department of Graded Lessons, and three others use them in one or two grades. Twenty-three use Westminster Helps and 8 do not. From these returns it seems evident that the experimental stage of grading has not passed. The graded lessons, now called "Closely Graded" commonly, did not meet with much favor. They were too complicated. The Departmental Graded Lessons, being graded in departments only, are more acceptable to the church and are being adopted more widely. A few schools use the Bible Study Union. There is nothing in the reports to indicate whether any schools are graded on the model of the public schools with regular promotions as merit. All schools have some grades, as primary or senior, and until there is more unanimous opinion as to particular methods, perhaps the best we can do is to do the best we can, with open mind, willing to adopt any new method that will increase the efficiency of the school in training the young in knowledge and character.

Twenty-two schools report that regular instruction is given in missions with an offering, while 6 report it is not. There is a wide diversity in method. The largest number having one method give instruction once a month in the classes or from the platform, or both. A few state that missionary instruction is given weekly with the lessons. Two have quarterly lessons or missions. One pastor made an address, as reported, although doubtless most pastors did that. One school has week-day classes once a month.

Only two schools report "no" to the question: "Is temperance

faithfully taught?" It may be that some method was not ac-

centable.

Definite decision for Christ is urged on pupils in all schools but one. Here we come to the most important item in these reports; for if pupils leave the Sabbath School unconverted, the likelihood of their ever being professing Christians is small. Although the pastors can do much in communicant classes and otherwise, and superintendents can create a devotional atmosphere, which Intermediate leads to serious consideration of this all-important question; after June 20, 1916 all, the weekly intimate contact of the teachers with the scholars is the finest opportunity of presenting the claims of Christ to the individual members of the classes. Such an opportunity should never be overlooked or neglected.

The Shorter Catechism is not in great favor, only 7 schools

use it.

The amount of money raised for all purposes shows a falling off of \$1,761, or nearly 20%. The amount sent for Sabbath School Missions exceeds the previous year by \$25. The losses are in the

other items of money sent to the other boards (\$2,370) and the support of the school (\$3,527) and miscellaneous (\$1,192). The greatest loss is \$1,005 in support of the schools. Nothing in the schools reveal any reason for this loss.

Regarding the few other items little need be said. Nineteen different song books are used. Most of them are of the better grade of music, like "Hymns of Worship and Service", used in 5 schools. One school has already adopted "Alleluia", the new hymnal of our board. It is satisfactory to know that most of our hymnal of our board. It is satisfactory to know that most of our schools are educating the young in the great hymns and tunes of the church.

All but five schools annually elect officers. Children's Day is generally observed and two-thirds use the programs furnished by

the board.

The Committee on Social Service reported that it had been organized and that at an early date several plans may be taken up. The report was received.

The Rev. Lester H.. Bent presented a request for the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between him and the Harrison Church in order that he enter the Country Church Work of the Board of Home Missions in Iowa. The commissioners of the church were heard, who stated that it concurred, but with regret, in the request. On motion the request was granted to take effect on July 1st next.

The Rev. Harry C. Meserve was appointed modera-

tor of the session of the Harrison Church.

The question of the steps necessary to constitute an associate pastor was referred to the Business Committee for investigation and report.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a

report, which was received.

The Business Committee presented a report, which

was received, adopted, and is as follows:

1. The Hungarian Church of Yonkers has unpaid apportionments amounting to \$52.34 (p. —). The committee recommends and moves that the church be directed to pay \$10 of this sum, the balance to be apportioned among the churches of the presbytery in accordance with Standing Rule No. 72.

At his request, the Rev. William T. Edds was dismissed to the Suffolk Association of Congregational Churches.

The Commissioners to the General Asembly (p. 122) presented a report, which was received and is as follows: Your commissioners beg leave to submit the following report:

Your commissioners were on hand at the opening session, and with only one exception, and that only for one day, continued in faithful attendance and, of course, voted on the proper side of every question that had to be decided. Not one of them received any special honor or recognition by the Assembly, and rarely were

their voices heard in debate or from the platform.

Among the notable actions that should be called to your attention was the merger and consolidation of the Board of Education and College Board into a single new board under the name of the General Board of Education of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. But until the scheme and plan of union shall have been fully and completely consummated as outlined, each of the boards is to continue to exercise and discharge its respective functions. The union is not to go into effect until after the next General Assembly in 1917. (Min. of G. A., 1916, pp. 200-204).

Interest centered in the response to be made to the large num-

Interest centered in the response to be made to the large number of overtures that had been sent to the Assembly in regard to the alleged licensure by the Presbytery of New York of candidates who denied some of the fundamental doctrines of our church. The Committee on Bills and Overtures presented its report, and the report itself was voted unanimously and was followed by much thanksgiving and praise. (Min of G. A., 1916, pp. 130-132).

Of the two overtures sent up from the Presbytery of Westchester, (pp. 84 and 113), the first was granted, giving power to erase the name of the Rev. Arthur R. Teal from the roll (Min. of G. A., 1916, p. 63, Overture 59); and the second propounding cer-

tain interrogatories was answered as follows (Min. of G. A., 1916, Fall Stated pp. 63 and 244, Overture 64):

1. The church can act only under the oversight and direction Oct. 3, 1916

of presbytery.

2. A "commission" has power to act subject to the review and reversal of the judicatory; a "committee" renders a report only. the same being submitted for approval to the judicatory.

The only overture sent down to the presbyteries is that on a new chapter in the Form of Government, chapter XVIII on "Mis-

sions" (Min. of G. A., 1916, p. 124).

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves

1. That the January Intermediate Meeting be held in New York and that the Stated Clerk be the Committee of Arrangements; and 2. That the Spring Stated Meeting be held in Greenburgh

Church, for which an invitation has been received.

The committee to prepare a minute on the completion of forty years of service by Elders James A. Merritt, James C. Gerow and Orson W. Sloat, of the Patterson Church (b. 126) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

At a meeting of Presbytery that was held in New York on June 20 last, attention was called to the fact that the Presbyterian Church at Patterson had recently celebrated the completion of forty years of service in the eldership of three men, who were elected and installed as elders at the same time, and who continuously served their church as elders from May 7, 1876. The elders referred to are James A. Merritt, James C. Gerow and Orson W.

While single individuals may have been permitted, in many inthan forty years, yet very seldom, if ever, has it occurred in the history of any church that three men to whom have come the honor and responsibility of the eldership, having been set apart to that sacred office, have been permitted to serve together and without interruuption for the space of forty years. We think of the kind and merciful dispensation of Him who is the great Head of the Church in sparing the lives of these three elders, while, during those forty years, so many of the members of that Patterson Church were called to their eternal home. And we think of the confidence placed in these elders by their church to continue them in office without change for so long a term of years. Verily the congratulations of this presbytery are due both to these elders, who together have made such a remarkable record as servants of their church to which such a providential favor has been shown.

During those same years different ministers of the Gospel have served the Patterson Church as pastors, viz.: Rev. Messrs. James Baird, Isaac L. Kip, John S. Allen, Oliver S. Dean, Alfred Ray Atwood and Henry Fairfield Watts, the latter being the happy pastor at the present time. But while pastors have come and gone, and while many and great changes have occurred in the church in the community in which it is situated, these three faithful elders, earnest in spirit, exemplary in their lives, devoted

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 3, 1916 to their church and true to their ordination vows, have, together with their fellow elders chosen from time to time, labored on unceasingly and unweariedly in their allotted place, as God has

given them strength and grace.

As today these three elders recall their many experiences of the forty years now behind them, we think of the joy of their hearts as they think of how many times in their meetings of session they have had the privilege of voting to receive and welcome new members into their communion. Having cooperated so long in such a blessed work as that of the eldership, we can hardly think of their session meetings without recalling the sweetness of a family gathering. The ties, which bind these three hearts together are today very strong and tender. The ripening processes of the passing years have left their imprint upon them, and they are today a united trio of elders moving forward with resolute hearts Christward and heavenward. And well may they anticipate the rich reward that is in store for them.

Alas! In more ways than one time tells! Already for some of these the burdens of fleshly infirmity are increasing. As ever "the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak." At the present time one of these, Elder Merritt, is very seldom able to be present in the house of God, where for so many years he has served not only as an elder, but also as a prominent member of the choir. While to him, in common with his fellow elders, we extend our congratulations, we may well also voice our tender sympathy in view of the growing limitations imposed by the infirmi-

ties of age.

In our contemplation of the long and uninterrupted term of service of Elders Merritt, Gerow and Sloat, we see one more happy illustration of the sweetness, power and telling effect of a long-lived consecrated and cooperative service. And to these elders, to their fellow elders and to the church they continue to serve, we as a presbytery today extend our most cordial and heart-felt greetings, praying that Christ, the Divine Master, whom they have served so long and faithfully, may cause them daily to experience the sweetness of His love and the power of His sustaining grace, and help them to live in anticipation of the reward that is promised to the faithful.

The Stated Clerk was directed to write a letter to Elder James A. Merritt expressive of Presbytery's appre-

ciation and sympathy.

The Committee on the Church Extension Fund (p. 119) presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Your committee beg leave to report that we are about to actively engage in this work and we bespeak from every pastor and elder cooperation and support. During October efforts will be made to see every member of our churches, who might be able and who could be made willing to be one of many to start the fund with a subscription of \$1,000 or more. We especially need the help of the pastors in this preliminary canvass for initial givers. We regret to say that until now we have not received the generous assistance of the pastors in reaching these prospective initial givers, but we hereby serve notice upon one and all that we will no longer be denied the secret passage to the pocketbooks of your givers, and

that they must be found either with or without your cooperation, Fall Stated It should be understood that any appeal that this committee may Meeting, make will not interfere with the gifts of individuals to their local Oct. 3, 1916 church work, since the subscriptions are payable in easy payments

covering a period of three years.

At the conclusion of the preliminary campaign for individual initial givers it is planned to present the cause from every pulpit of Presbytery and to appeal for subscriptions from every member of every church. Your committee hopes to begin their general campaign by Sunday, Nevember 5, and to continue it as opportunity is ripe until every church is visited. The plan of the committee calls for the formation of a committee of laymen in each church with whom the campaign team may advise and through whom it can conduct an educational and inspirational campaign among our church members. Pastors will hear from the chairman of the committee, asking for dates.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

I. Young People's Societies.—Twenty-eight churches report 69 young people's societies, having from I to 9 each. Four churches report no societies and 5 make no report. There are Christian Endeavor, 21; Intermediate Christian Endeavor, 1; Junior Christian Endeavor, 10; Mission Bands, 6; Boys, 10; Girls, 11; other societies, 10. The total membership of these 69 societies is 2,748. The total net gain in membership is given as 319, but the is much less than the apparent net gain based on the reports of 1914 or 1915. From these societies 106 members were received into the churches. The contributions were as follows: Home Missions, \$855; Foreign Missions, \$848; Department of Young People's Work, \$58 from 10 societies; other boards, \$68; self-support and local church, \$1,382; other objects, \$512. The money given is 65%

advance over 1914 or 1915.
2. Religious Education.—Thus far the churches generally have been content to teach the children a half hour a week or to allow them to meet in young people's meetings for prayer and praise. The church has a larger duty to the coming generation than this. The Board of Publication has established a department of Religious Education and appointed a secretary. Among the many suggestions we may cite the training of the children for service in the Sabbath-school or church in such ways as children's choirs, the care of equipment, ushering, and those many other necessary duties usually assigned to adults, the object of such activity is to train the children and youths in the conduct of church life. Another example is found in the suggestion that the church make itself responsible for the guidance of the young in the choice of life's vocation. Your committee feels that there is need of educating our youth also along denominational lines, not to make sectarians, but to make intelligent churchmen. At a later meeting the committee hopes to present a simple and specific plan, which would include lessons on the functions of church officers and courts and the methods of conducting our denomination of a million and a half members, which would include also instruction regarding the boards.

3. Board of Education.—The General assembly ordered that

the Board of Education and the College Board be united. The labor of aiding students for the ministry has been continued, but to this has been added the task of spiritual oversight of 30,000 Presbyterian students in state colleges and universities. The number of students in such institutions has increased from 22,816 to 182,596, or over eightfold. Investigation of 51 state colleges and universities revealed the fact that one-half of the members of the faculties were unrelated to any church and the majority of the other half retained only a nominal relationship. The Board of Education and Church Erection have undertaken to secure funds for proper church buildings in college and university towns, to be operated by the local church, in which religious instruction would be given and opportunity for worship offered, but where also training in church work, begun in the students' home churches would be continued during the critical years of college life. This presbytery contributed to the Board of Education last year \$669. Candidates under our care received from the board \$475. Eight of our churches sent no contribution to the board.

The committee recommends and moves:

1. That the following candidates under our care be recommended for aid to the Board of Education for the full amount of pecuniary aid granted to students at their respective stages of study for the current year, when satisfactory reports have been received from them:

Collegiate.—R. Irving Barnett, New York University; Eugene

Meray and Charles Papp, Bloomfield Seminary.

Preparatory.—Andrew Janowiczky, Bloomfield Seminary; Arthur P. Dawson, Central High School, Rochester, N. Y.
2. That Richard C. T. Othen and Thomas Rudy having been licensed by other presbyteries, their names be dropped from our roll of candidates.

3. George R. Brunges having relinquished his intention of

studying for the ministry, his name also be dropped.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received and the first item on the subject of an associate pastor was referred back to the committee for further consideration.

The Rev. William M. Dager, of the Presbytery of Corisco, and the Rev. Warren H. Wilson, of the Presbytery of New York, were invited to sit as correspond-

ing members.

The hour fixed for the conference (p. 135) having arrived Presbytery took up the subject of the social survey of its field, and an address was delivered by the Rev. Warren H. Wilson of the Board of Home Missionss.

The order of the day for 11 a.m. (p. 135) was taken up and the Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

I. Your committee would recommend and move that the overture sent down by the General Asembly on new chapter xviii

of Form of Government, entitled "Of Missions" (p. —).

2. Your committee calls attention to the work of the Board of Ministerial Relief, and urges all our churches to contribute. It urges upon young ministers the advisability of uniting with the Fall Stated

Sustentation Fund speedily.

3. Your committee recommends to pastors the great import- Oct. 3, 1916 ance of having, if possible, an efficient church missionary committee in every congregation in order that every department of the local church may be fully enlisted in the cause of both Home and Foreign Missions.

The following minute was adopted:

That pastors be directed to call the attention of their congregations to the appointment by the President of the United States of October 21 and 22 as days when contributions shall be made for the relief of the persecuted Armenians and Syrians, and pastors and sessions be requested to provide some means, by congregational offerings or otherwise, for the collection and forwarding of contributions for this cause.

The Rev. William M. Dager, a missionary of the Board of Foreign Missions in West Africa, delivered an

address on missionary work in that country.

A vote of thanks was extended to him for his address. The consideration of the report of the Business Committee was resumed. Its recommendations were adopted and are as follows:

I. The Treasurer's report, referred to your committee (p. 134), has been audited and found correct, and it is recommended

and moved that it be approved.

2. Requests for dissolution of pastoral relations:

(1). The Rev. Robert P. Gibson and the Croton Falls Church. It was presented by the pastor in person, the reason given being the necessity of a change of residence on account of the illhealth of his wife. It is concurred in by the church as certified by an extract from the minutes of the congregational meeting and statement of the commissioner. It is to take effect on November 8. It is recommended and moved that the request be granted.

(2). The Rev. George P. Noble and the Gilead Church. It was presented by the pastor in person, the reason given being a condition in the church, which renders it desirable. It was concurred in by the church as certified by the minutes of the congregational meeting held August 13 last and the commissioners. It is to take effect December 31 next. It is recommended and moved that the

request be granted.

(3). The Rev. Royal A. Stout and the South Yonkers Church. It was presented by the pastor in writing, the reason given being ill health requiring change of climate. It is concurred in by the church as certified by the minutes of the congregational meeting held September 13 and by the commissioners. It is to take effect immediately. It is recommended and moved that the request be

granted.

In connection with your committee's recommendations regarding the dissolution of the pastoral relationships of Mr. Gibson and Mr. Noble, we would call Presytery's attention to the long and faithful services of these two brethren—Mr. Gibson being the longest settled pastor of Presbytery and Mr. Noble, after the age of three score years and ten, closing the longest pastorate in the history of the Carmel Church-and express to these two loyal Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 3, 1916 servants of the Master, who have spent long lives in His service, our prayerful hopes for the divine blessings on the evening of their lives.

3. It is recommended and moved that the following be the order for the installation of the Rev. W. Francis Irwin as pastor of the Irvington Church.

The service to be held in the church October 27, at 8 p. m. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon.—Rev. John Timothy Stone, of the Presytery of Chicago, to be invited. Charge to the pastor,—Rev. Paul Stratton. Charge to the people,—Rev. Philip S. Bird. The session shall have power to fill vacancies.

The Stated Clerk was directed to convey to the Rev. Royal A. Stout the sympathy of Presbytery in his ill health.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee has carried on its work through its four subcommittees. Since its appointment in January your committee has lost two of its most efficient elders, George W. Banks and Henry M. Lester, by death and a promising minister, Rev. Lester H. Bent, by removal. We have already spoken of Mr. Banks (p. 118). Mr. Lester was a man of wide interests and of large activities, and the calls upon his time and thought were many, yet he let no interest destroy or even supersede his interest in the work of the kingdom of our Lord and Master. No member of our committee was wiser in counsel or more efficient in service. Mr. Banks' place as treasurer has already been filled by the appointment of Elder William J. Yates, 61 Point Street, Yonkers, N. Y. (p. 118). Your committee recommend and move the appointment of Elder Charles J. Dunlap of the New Rochelle Church, Elder Albert S. McClain of the South Yonkers Church, and the Rev. John J. McClelland to fill the vacancies caused by death and removal in the committee.

- I. Presbyterial and Synodical Aid.—Your committee has been able to meet every request for assistance made by the churches and to make a substantial increase in its contribution to the work of the Synod. The new fiscal year begins with this meeting, and for that work we bespeak you continued interest and substantial cooperation and support by meeting to the full your apportionments. For the year 1916-1917 we recommend the adoption of the apportionments of last year (p. 82) with the addition of one on the Hungarian Church of \$5.
- 2. Church Extension.—Your committee report satisfactory progress of the work in the growing sections of our field. The rapid development of Larchmont as a residential section and the growing activities of our recently organized church have justified the wisdom of taking up work there. The situation at Hartsdale gives promise of an early beginning of the much-needed church edifice. Plans are being made for a loan from the Board of Church Erection that can easily be repaid when the bequest of the late Mr. and Mrs. Welcome Hitchcock is available. In the meantime the infant church needs the interest and cooperation of Presbytery. Under the immediate support and supervision of the Committee on Presbyterian Church Extension of Yonkers regular preaching services have been begun in a portable chapel, owned by that committee, situated at Armour Villa Park, a rapidly growing suburb of Yonkers. The Rev. Robert Berry has been engaged by the Yonkers committee to minister to this field for the

Fall Stated Meeting. Oct. 3, 1916 period of four months with a view to the organization of a church in the near future. Your committee feels the handicap our limited funds place upon us, and we long for the day when the permanent fund of \$100,000 will be available.

(1). As a substantial evidence of the interest of Presbytery in the Hartsdale Church and with a firm confidence that the future will see that church one of our most generous contributors to all forms of presbyterial activity, and for the purpose of easing the burden incident to a loan from the Board of Church Erection this committee have voted to extend aid to it for the current year not to exceed \$300 as our funds permit and their needs require, provided a loan is made by the board, we recommend and move that our action in pledging this aid be approved by Presbytery.

(2). Our budget for the work of the next year will be met

by an apportionment similar to the year just closed, and we recommend and move the adoption for the year 1916-1917 for Church

Extension of those of last year (p. 83) with the addition of one on the Hungarian Church of Yonkers of \$5.

3. Work among Foreign-Speaking Peoples.—Your committee report that our activities are well cared for and supervised by the pastors and churches in the respective localities where the work is carried on. It is gratifying to note that the work of the Italian Mission at Port Chester is approaching a stable and efficient organization. Through the activity of the Port Chester Church a cooperating "Italian Evangelical Mission Alliance" has been organized, which has rallied to the support of our Italian Mission many of the most prominent Christian leaders of the city without regard to their denominational connection. A constitution has been adopted and officers elected and a membership roll of active, sustaining and life members, based upon amount of annual contribution to the supoprt of the work, has been gathered and the promise is bright for the suupport of this work, which is conducted in buildings owned by this Presbytery and under the immediate control of your committee. A constitution was adopted subject to the action of Presbytery. We recommend and move that the organization of "The Italian Evangelical Mission Alliance of Port Chester, N. Y.," be commended and that its constituution be endorsed and approved.

4. Evengelistic Work.-We note with pleasure the increasing evangelistic efforts during the summer months as evidenced in the Sunday open-air services in New Rochelle, White Plains, Dobbs Ferry, Yonkers and elsewhere. We believe these open-air efforts of our churches will bring the Church a growing interest and sympathy of the unchurched about us, and give the inspiration for a

continuous evangelistic emphasis throughout the winter.

5. Day of Prayer.—This committee has received a most hearty and cordial invitation from the Hungarian Church of Yonkers to hold its annual Day of Prayer with them. Your committee has already voted to accept the invitation and to urge upon the pastors and elders of our churches especial effort to attend. We recommend and move that the annual Day of Prayer be held in the Hungarian Churuch on Tuesday, November 14.

Tuesday, 2 p.m.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer. Prof. Howard C. Butler was heard with reference to the dissolution of the pastoral relation between the Rev. Robert P. Gibson and the Croton Falls Church.

The Rev. Anthony N. Petersen and Elder George E. Reed were appointed tellers of votes for Delegates to

Synod.

A conference was then held on a social survey of Presbytery's field under the leadership of the Rev. James

Packard, who delivered the address.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report on communication from the Presbytery of Washington City relating to a Sabbath law for the District of Columbia, which was referred to it (\$\psi\$ 133).

The following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, That the Stated Clerk be instructed to communicate in the name of Presbytery with the Senators from the State of New York and the Congresmen representing the field of Presbytery, calling their attention to the Jones Sunday-rest bill and requesting them to support it.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

1. The sessional records of the following churches were presented for review: Bedford, Gilead, Greenburgh, Harrison, Huguenot Memorial, Irvington, Katonah, Larchmont, Mahopac Falls, Mt. Kisco, Mt. Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, Patterson and Port Chester.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

I. Vacancy and Supply.—Since the last Fall Stated Meeting, when your committee came into existence eight churches with vacant pulpits have asked for the assistance of the committee and been supplied in part by it during the period of vacancy. Three of these vacant pulpits have been filled through the recommendations of the committee, and others still vacant are advising with it and accepting its assistance. Three of the churches have with its assistance installed pastors. Four others are vacant and are consulting with us in their efforts to fill their pulpits with worthy men. Your committe deeply appreciates the deference and cooperation of sessions, pulpit committees and pastors in this important and difficult task through the year.

2. Ministerial Support (p. 116).—The action of Presbytery was communicated to each session with a list of seven suggestive questions. The response was promptly and fairly complete.

The two smallest churches have no regular services and therefore, no pastor's salary. In two churches the salary is under \$1,000 (\$800 and \$875). In twelve churches the salary is \$1,000 to \$1,200; in six churches \$1,500 to \$1,800; in five \$2,000 to \$2,500; in four \$1,750 to \$4,000, and in two over \$4,000 (\$5,000 and \$5,500). In the majority of the churches the salary is \$1,500 or less. All but seven churches have manses. In nine churches the salary is increased by, e. g., a small income loan, an endowment—free fuel or other gifts. In only one church has the salary been decreased in ten years. That is one of the larger churches, which gives \$3,000 now. Twenty-four churches have increased the salary in ten years, the largest increase being \$1,500, in a church whose membership has increased threefold. The smallest increase is \$100. In the other churches the salary remains the same as in 1906. Eighteen churches express the opinion that it costs the pastor

Eighteen churches express the opinion that it costs the pastor more to live now than ten years ago. The lowest estimate of increase being 10%, and the highest 200%, but the majority estimate an increase of one-third. Two churches say the cost is the same as ten years ago. In no church has the increase in salary equalled the estimated increase in cost of living. Only seven churches think

an "increase in the pastor's salary would increase his influence, Fall Stated standing and efficiency in the Church and community." Nineteen Meeting, churches state that it would not.

Regarding the ability of the churches to give, twelve report the ability greater than ten years ago. Twelve say it is less. Six think it equal. The report thus far covers the answers returned to the committee. From the Minutes of the General Assembly, 1906 and 1916, we obtain further facts. There are thirty churches in Presbytery, which were connected with it prior to the erection of the Presbytery of Connecticut Valley. These only are used for comparison. The church membership has increased from 6,948 to 8,856, or 27%. Eight churches show a loss in membership. The gifts for all causes have increased from \$171,440 to \$214,247, or 25%. The congregational expenses increased \$44,744, but the benevolent offerings decreased \$1,937. The per capita gifts are the same now as ten years ago, \$24.32 and \$24.18. Nine churches raised less money last year than in 1906. The assessed valuation of all property in Westchester County has increased about 80% in ten years. Nominally the money in circulation would correspond. Yet the Presbyterian Churches have received no benefit whatever. Why it is that there is three-quarters more wealth in this county than ten years ago, and none of it is in the Presbyterian Churches, is a matter for serious consideration.

Your committee would further call attention to the fact that the Director of the Bureau of Standards in New York City recently announced that patient investigation has shown that unskilled laborers with a family cannot live decently on less than \$840 a year, while the New York Central Railroad is advertising that locomotive engineers on passenger trains receive \$1,800 a year. Two-thirds of the ministers in this Presbytery come somewhere between the

two.

It may be of interest to note that the members of one of the larger churches give the average of \$3,25 a year toward the pastor's salary. That is about three cents every three days. Another gives \$3.50, and another \$3.70; that is a cent a day. Eight give \$5,00 to \$5.50 a year. Seven \$6.00 to \$9.00. Ten give give \$10.00

to \$15.00. One gives \$20.00, and one gives \$27.00.

In conclusion your committe would say that either the grace of giving or else the ability to give has not grown in this presbytery in ten years, that the pastor's salaries have not increased in proportion to the increased cost of living, that the laymen, who returned the answers to the committee, do not think that larger salaries would increase the efficiency and standing of the ministers; nevertheless, that the churches giving less than \$6.00 per capita for leadership in Christian work should consider praverfully their obligations to free pastor's "from worldly cares and avocations," and that Presbytery designate some committee to investigate the stationary standard of giving in Westchester, where wealth is increasing.

was received, adopted and is as follows:

I. The report of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, referred to it (p. 134), has been duly audited and found correct, and it is recommended and moved that it be approved.

2. The resignation of Elder Ralph E. Prime as Permanent Clerk was referred to your committee (p. 133). It is recommended

any moved that the following action be taken:

Presbytery values too highly the faithful and efficient services of its Permanent Clerk to permit them to terminate at this time. Presbytery therefore declines to accept Elder Prime's resignation, and, on condition of his remaining in office, will provide, if necessary, an assistant to do such part of the clerical work as he may feel unable to perform.

3. The question of an associate pastor was referred back to your committee for further consideration (p. 140). It is recom-

mended and moved that the following answer be adopted:

The Form of Government nowhere uses the term "associate pastor," but provides for the dual or plural pastorate, in which two or more pastors are of equal status in the session and preside over it alternately (Form of Government, chapter ix, sections I and 5). Churches with the dual or plural pastorate are termed "collegiate churches" and are entitled to be represented in the Presbytery by as many elders as they have pastors (Form of Government, chapter x, section 3) as interpreted by the General Assembly in 1868 (O. S.) and 1874. In constituting the pastoral relation in such cases, the same steps are to be taken with each of the pastors as in the single pastorate, as no other mode is authorized by the constitution.

A telegram from the Rev. John A. Ingham, a former member of this presbytery, was read, in which he presented his "hearty greetings to the brethren," and the Stated Clerk was directed to answer it.

The Rev. Robert P. Gibson and Elder Alfred C. Dodge presented their resignations as members of the

Missionary Committee. They were accepted and the Fall Stated committee was authorized to fill the vacancies.

The committee to report appropriate action with reference to the twenty-fifth anniversary of the North Avenue Church of New Rochelle (p. 133) presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved that action thereon be deferred until the April meeting and that the matter be permitted to remain in the hands of the committee in the interim.

3. That the call of the Gilead Church for pastoral services of the Rev. William Parker, who was received and enrolled this morning (p. 163). The call stipulates an annual salary of \$920 in regular monthly instalments with the free use of the manse and four Sundays' vacation. It is recommended and moved (I.) That the call be found in order and placed in Mr. Parker's hands; and (2.) If accepted by him the following order be taken for his installation:

Time—February 6, 1917, at 7:30 p. m. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—Rev. A. Raymond Eckels; Rev. William P. Stevenson, alternate. Charge to the pastor—Rev. Thomas C. Straus; Rev. James A. Mc-Williams, alternate. Charge to the people—Rev. James Packard Gillespie; Rev. Arthur C. McMillan, alternate. Prayer of installation—Rev. Murray H. Gardner. (3.) That permission be given to the session to fill vacancies.

4. That action on the communication from members of the Presbytery of Philadelphia on consolidation of the Boards of Home Missions and Missions for Freedmen, be deferred until the April meeting and that the matter be permitted to remain in the hands of the committee in the interim.

The call of the Gilead Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. William Parker was placed in his hands, and was accepted by him.

The Rev. Andrew Szilagyi was heard on the work Meeting. among the Persians in Yonkers.

That work was referred to the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.

The Committee on Education and Examinations was authorized to draw upon the Education Fund for aid for Mr. Abraham Shleemon, a candidate for the ministry, under the care of Presbytery, who is unable to obtain aid from the Board of Education (p. 149).

The Missionary Committee reported, recommending and moving that the Rev. George P. Noble be placed on Presbytery's roll of honor. The report was received and adopted.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report, which was received and action thereon was deferred until later.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted, and is as follows:

The request of the Rev. Harry C. Meserve to be released from the pastorate of the Rye Church. The parties, Mr. Meserve and the commissioners of the congregation, were heard, and the minutes of the congregational meeting, duly called by the session and held January 14, 1917, were presented. The reason for the request is the desire of Mr. Meserve to engage in other pastoral work. The congregation concurs in the request.

The committee recommends and moves (1.) That the request be granted to take effect March 1, 1917; (2.) That the Rev. George Reynolds be appointed moderator of the session of the Rye Church from March 1, and (3.) That the Committee on Vacancy and Supply be directed to recommend an appointment for moderator of the session of the Harrison Church in the place of Mr. Meserve (p. 148).

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, recommending that the Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth be appointed Moderator of the session of the Harrison Church. The report was received and adopted.

The Committee on the Every-Member Canvass (p. 114) presented a report, which was received, adopted

and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

1. That there be an interchange of pulpits on part of pastors on February 25 next, and that conferences be held in various parts of the presbytery on the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday following and that the churches be asked to send the committee not less than \$2 each to pay the expenses of the pastors.

Intermediate Meeting, Jan. 16, 1917

- 2. That the subject suggested to the pastors, making the exchange, be:—The Unfinished Task of the Presbyterian Church.

  1. In Christianizing our own country and 2. In evangelizing the non-Christian world.
- 3. That each church send two delegates from each of its departments to the conferences, expenses to be paid by the individual churches.

The speakers, who are expected to attend these conferences, are Mr. David McConaughy of the Assembly's Committe on Every-Member Canvass, Rev. Paul Abbott of Chefoo, China, and the Rev. John S. Lefeyre, engaged in work in the French Broad Presbytery.

Elder E. Stanley Sloat requested that he be excused from serving longer as chairman of the Committee on the Every-Member Canvass. His request was granted and Elder Walter Thomas was appointed chairman.

The consideration of the report of the Committee on Social Service was resumed (p. 165).

The Rev. Robert G. Davey, of the Lord's Day Alliance, was heard on bills before the Legislature of the State of New York in favor of professional baseball and moving pictures on Sunday.

The report of the Committee on Social Service was adopted, and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved:

- I. That Presbytery place itself on record as being opposed to any bill that may come before the Legislature of the State of New York permitting professional baseball and moving pictures on Sunday; and the Stated Clerk is directed to send copies of this action to members of the Legislature representing Westchester and Putnam Counties, and also to the Lord's Day Alliance, to be used in its discretion.
- 2. That pastors and sessions of Presbytery be urged to allow no opportunity to pass by to study and meet the problems for social health. In addition to the neighborhood social service of a constructive and positive order, which each church may find to do, your committee endorses the aims and work of the Anti-Saloon League, the New York Civic League and the Lord's Day Alliance, and urges the churches to support them financially and morally, hearing their field representatives often enough to educate and inspire their congregations along these much-needed reforms.

Leave of absence was given to the Rev. Messrs. Lewis Gaston Leary, William Parker, Harry C. Meserve, Murray H. Gardner and George Reynolds.

The action of Presbytery fixing the date for the installation of the Rev. William Parker as pastor of the Gilead Church (p. 164) was reconsidered and the date was Intermediate changed to February 8th.

The Rev. Robert G. Davey, of the Presbytery of New York, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The foregoing minutes were approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the Greenburgh Church, Dobbs Ferry, N. Y., Monday, April 16, 1917.

Conferences were held at Yonkers on February 26th, Katonah on the 27th, and New Rochelle on the 28th. The largest attendance was at Katonah, 105; Yonkers,

54; New Rochelle, 36.

Your committee reports that the South Yonkers Church has adopted the every-member plan. Quite a number of churches have not yet accepted it, and also that many that think they have, have only in part or in a modified form. We earnestly recommend those which have not to prayerfully consider it and adopt it. The members of the committee offer their services to churches, or, if desired, the services of Mr. David McConaughy will be secured as a speaker. We urge upon every church the great desirability of having a canvass of the congregation at some other date, preferably about six months after, this canvass to be of an entirely social and spiritual nature. Such a canvass would go a long way to disabuse the minds of our people that our interest in them was not merely a financial one.

The receipts (p. 165) to date, from 24 churches, have been \$48; and the expenses, printing and speaker, \$41.92, pulpit exchange, \$9.70—a total of \$51.62; leaving a deficit of \$3.62.

Resolved, That the Presbytery of Westchester, in session in Dobbs Ferry, N. Y., this the 17th day of April, 1917, does hereby respectfully overture the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., which shall meet in Dallas, Texas, May,

(1) That the General Assembly express its fraternal affection for the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. and its earnest desire for reunion at the carliest time consistent with the arrangement of necessary details on the basis of our common inheritance of faith and order and the prevalence of mutual confidence and love, which are necessary to a happy union and to the permanent peace and prosperity of the united church.

(2) That the General Assembly appoint a committee for the purpose of conferring with representatives of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. in regard to the desirability and practicability of reunion and if after conference and inquiry such reunion seem to be desirable and practicable to suggest suitable measures for

its accomplishment, and report to a future assembly.

An overture to the General Assembly from the Presbytery ) asking the General Assembly to authorize of Brooklyn (p the Stated Clerk of the Assembly to add to the list of abhreviations already in use the abbreviations Bus. and Law and such others as may be necessary to carry out the rule of 1916 (Minutes of the G. A copy of a preamble and overture to the General Assembly, adopted by the Presbytery of Kansas City, September 21, 1916, asking for the federation of the Boards of Home Missions and Church Erection on the plan adopted by the Assembly of 1911 for the federation of these two boards and the Board of Missions for Freedmen, a communication from certain members of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, accompanied by an uncertified copy of an overture purporting to have been passed by said Presbytery, December 4, 1916, petitioning the General Assembly to merge the Board of Missions for Freedmen and Board of Home Missions, and a communication from the chairman of the Freedmen's Committee of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh, calling attention to the action of the said Presbytery, declining unanimously to favor such a merger with other papers relating to the same subject (p. 171). The Presbytery of Kansas City invites Presbytery to join it in sending up such an overture. The overture would exclude for the present, the Board of Missions for Freedmen from the execution of the plan of 1911 and would have the plan of consolidation re-ferred to the Executive Commission to be worked out. Your committee recommends and moves as sufficient action that Presbytery concur in the overture of the Presbytery of Kansas City.

6. An overture to the General Assembly from the Presbytery, of Kansas City (p. -) asking the Assembly to submit to the presbyteries the question of the eligibility of ruling elders to the moderatorship of the General Assembly. This overture is communicated to this presbytery with a view to our taking similar action. The committee recommends and moves that Presbytery decline to join in this overture inasmuch as the eligibility of ruling elders to the moderatorship of the Assembly is not open to question.

7. A communication from the Presbytery of Houston enclosing an overture to the General Assembly on expediting the printing and distribution of the Minutes of the General Assembly (p. 171). Similar action is asked of this presbytery. of 1916, which deals with the statistical report of presbyteries and which was referred back to said committee. The report of the majority propose to print two volumes instead of one, the first to contain the proceedings of the Assembly and appendices, and the second the rolls and statistics. The names of the churches are to be in alphabetical order. Contributions to the treasuries of the boards are to be printed in bold-faced type under the totals for the several causes. The increased expense for printing and mailing which would be about \$6,500, is to be borne by the boards. Two minority reports modify this plan in some particulars with some-The committee recommends and moves that what less expense. no action be taken.

9. The report of the Trustees of Presbytery.—The committee

The committee to nominate trustees presented a report, nominating the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt and Elders Ralph E. Prime and Ransom E. Wilcox. The report was received and the persons named were elected by ballot.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as

follows:

### I. YOUNG PEOPLE'S ORGANIZATIONS.

No reports have been received from five churches, but of these at least two have no organizations for young people to the best of our knowledge. Of the 31 churches reporting, 2 only report no such organizations, while 3 others have just organized, or are about to organize Christian Endeavor Societies, which are not included in this report.

The churches reporting show 55 different organizations for young people, having a total membership of 1946, a net gain of 413 over last year. These 55 societies furnished but 75 new church members during the year-11 of them reporting no additions from the young people, and the other 44 averaging less than 2 each. This would seem to indicate that our young people's organizations are not the evangelistic agencies that they might be.

As to kinds of organizations reported the Christian Endeavor

Societies still hold the lead, there being 19 Young People's, 2 Intermediate, and 7 Junior Societies, a total of 28, one-half of all the organizations. The other organizations represent, as far as we can judge by the names, 7 societies for boys, 5 for girls, 5 Mis-

sion Bands, 3 Westminster Guilds and 7 miscellaneous.

In gifts to missions the report shows a total contribution from all the societies of \$1,100, while \$1,265 was raised for local church and self-support; an almost equal division of money for others and for themselves. 31 of the societies give to Foreign Missions, 34 to Home Missions, and 14 to other boards, while 18 give nothing whatever to benevolence. The Christian Endeavor Societies and Mission Bands, of course, almost all give something to benevolence, but it is significant that few of the organizations for the boys or the girls make such contributions. This is a fact worth consider-

ing, when we realize that in these boys and girls we have the Meeting, church of the future.

It is probably in the matter of study classes that the organizations make their most meagre attainments. Out of the whole list but 8 societies report study classes during the year, and these were all in 5 churches. That is, 25 of our churches are doing nothing in a systematic way in the study of the Bible, missions or church history in their young people's organization.

We make the following suggestions:

We believe that there should be as much attention paid to the grading of organizations of young people as for the same persons in the Sunday School. We believe that there should be in every church, if possible, at least three organizations covering the three periods of young life, a junior for ages from 8 to 12, an intermediate for ages from 13 to 17, and a senior for ages above 18. These periods may correspond to the various departments of Sunday School, and may well be correlated to them and perhaps organically

connected with them.

2. We believe that every one of these organizations ought to have every year some definite study in either the Bible, missions, or church history or polity. Material for such courses is easily obtained, graded lessons for the Sunday School, normal course in the Bible for Bible study, and the books of the missionary education movement for missions. Attention is called to the coming celebration of the four hundredth anniversary of the Protestant Reformation under Luther to take place this fall as a splendid opportunity to impress the facts of the Reformation upon the young

people.

We believe that the churches need a more intelligent and trained leadership for their young people's work. This can be accomplished by a training class in the local church, such as a class in "expert endeavor"; or it may well be done by sending some well chosen young people to some of the excellent summer conferences for such training. The Conference for Presbyterian Young People at Pocono Pines, Pa., from July 11-17, this year offers a fine opportunity for the young people and the Auburn School of Christian Workers another. The International Christian Endeavor Convention to be held in New York, July 4-9, brings to our very doors a great inspiring convention of Christian Young People.

In view of these things we offer the following recommenda-

tions:

That Presbytery adopt for young people's work the fol-1.

lowing standards:

(1) At least three organizations for young people in every church, corresponding to the junior, intermediate and senior departments in the Sunday School.

(2) At least one study class in each of these organizations

every year.

(3) At least one member of one young people's organization in attendance upon some conference or training school each year.

2. In view of the importance of this branch of the church's . work, that Presbytery direct that the conference on the afternoon of the second day of the Fall Stated Meeting of Presbytery be denoted to young people's work.

### II. SABBATH SCHOOL WORK.

The schools report fewer officers and teachers, 804, a decrease of 10, a greater enrollment 7,132, an increase of 268, a greater average attendance 4,506, an increase of 139, and more pupils who are communicants, 1,191, an increase of 273. There is an increase in all benevolent offerings, \$1,190 for the Sabbath School Board, an increase of \$260; \$2,918 to other boards, an increase of \$548, except to "all other objects" \$1,181, a decrease of \$11.

Only 5 schools are reported as ungraded. Some are graded by departments. Six use Scribner's Graded Lessons and one Peloubet. The rest presumably use for the most part the Westminster Lessons. A considerable number are seeking to attain ten points of the "International" standard. None report an attempt to compass

the Presbyterian Advance Standard.

Nearly all schools report missionary and temperance instruction. Teachers Training Classes are using the First Standard Manual, Barclay's First Standard Course, the Extension Course of

Dr. White's School, Schauffler, etc.

Organized Bible classes show a slight increase in enrollment, 508; an increase of 8. A Billy Sunday Bible Class is forming in In another, Dr. Hartshorne's Book of Worship is one school. used with good results. Adequate training in worship is a need that is often overlooked. Nine schools teach the Shorter or the Intermediate Catechism. The latter is also used in at least one communicant class.

It was ordered that the recommendations relating to young people's organizations be printed and sent to the pastors of the churches.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

1. Foreign Speaking Peoples.—There are 5 centers of Italian mission work under the supervision of Presbytery with a total membership of 169; Sunday School, 360; total average attendance of 194; total gains, 36; membership of English classes, 102; experience of principles of principles (\$1,000) and the supervision of the supervision of

penditures for mission, \$1,069; salaries of missionaries, \$3,200. The Hungarian and Persian work in Yonkers show encouraging figures: Hungarian-Church membership, 193; average attendance, 125, a gain of 1; Sunday School, 73; enrollment in English classes, 32; expenditures \$592; salary of pastor \$1,100. Persian-Mission membership, 83; average Sunday attendance, 50; expenditures for salary of missionary, \$250. We, therefore, recommend and move that Presbytery request

We, therefore, recommend and move that Tresbytely request the Home Board to make the following grants:

White Plains, Miss Mary Kellogg, \$500; Port Chester, Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, \$900; New Rochelle, Rev. O. B. Villante, \$550; Mt. Kisco and Pleasantville, Miss Bertha Latshar, \$720; Yonkers, Hungarian, Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, \$1,100—a total of \$3,770.

2. Church Extension.—Your committee reports encouraging progress in the work at Larchmont and Hartsdale. The Larchmont

Church is housed in a most attractive building, which can be enlarged as the needs of the work require. The section is growing rapidly, and the church is showing a correspondingly encouraging

growth. The church at Hartsdale has added 54 members to its Meeting, roll this past year, making its membership at the present time nearly April 16, 1917. 150. The church has recently secured a loan of \$15,000, and will begin the erection of its much needed house of worship the last of this month. At the completion of the building the portable chapel now used will be released for pioneer work elsewhere.

The financial condition of the fund appropriated for this work is satisfactory, though your committee cannot too strongly urge each church to the and meet its full apportionment and as promptly

each church to try and meet its full apportionment, and as promptly as possible. Every dollar of the one thousand dollars voted the

committee will be needed and more.

Your committee recommend and move the payment of the following items of expense incurred in connection with the Port Chester Italian Mission: Six months' interest on mortgage \$114; decorations on manse \$15.15; repairs to roof \$29.73, a total of \$158.88 from funds in the hands of the committee for church extension.

3. Presbyterial and Synodical Aid.—No new applications for aid have been received. Appropriations have been made during this fiscal year for the following churches: Hungarian, \$150; Harrison,

\$200, and Bedford, \$300.

Your committee recommends and moves

1. That the committee be enlarged by the addition of new members so as to effectively perform the important work committed to its care, and present the following names: Rev. Messrs. W. Francis Irwin, Walter L. Steiner and Robert Gardner McGregor and Elders Ralph M. Leonard, Rodney Gibson and Joseph P. King, Jr.

2. That in view of the exceptional religious awakening created by the Sunday evangelistic campaign in New York City, the Sub-committee on Evangelistic Work be instructed and authorized to prepare ways and means to convey and conserve this helpful

influence to our churches.

3. That Presbytery authorize this committee to outline several different plans for new equipment for adequate work at Armour Villa Park, Port Chester, White Plains, Mt. Kisco and Pleasant-ville, and to present the same to the Board of Church Erection with a definite request for co-operation.

4. That Presbytery confirm the action of this committee in employing Miss Bertha Latshar for the Italian work of Mt. Kisco, Pleasantville and White Plains, to take the place of Mr. Pietro

Guiffreda.

That Presbytery sanction the purchase by the sub-committee on Church Extension of a lot in Pleasantville 100 x 50 feet at \$150 for Italian work.

6. That the Persian work in Yonkers be continued, but the

organization of a Persian Presbyterian Church be deferred.

7. That the Italian work in Katonah be taken under the supervision of Presbytery.

A motion that the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions be authorized to apply to the Board of Home Missions for aid in support of the Persian work in Yonkers for six months was referred to that committee.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report, summing up the answers of the churches to the questions Spring Stated Meeting, April 16, 1917.

in the blank sent out by the Board of Temperance, and reporting on paper referred to it (p. 171). It was received and its recommendation adopted. The recommendation is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that Presbytery con-cur in overture of the Presbytery of Rochester referred to it, and

that it be sent to the General Assembly. It is as follows:

Whereas, The Presbyterian Church recognizes the efficiency of the gospel of Christ to meet the complicated social as well as personal needs of men; and

Whereas, The application of the gospel to these needs is the obligation of the whole Church in all its branches and organiza-

tions, through all its functions and activities; and

Whereas, Adequate provision is not made in the present organization to carry the spirit of social service into the thought and

program of our churches; therefore be it

Resolved, 1. That the General Assembly constitute a social service commission of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A.

2. That this commission, like similar commissions of other denominations, have as its function to stimulate and guide the forces of the Church in the uplift of the life of the community.

That the commission work through existing boards and church organizations and set up only such additional machinery

as is necessary.

4. That the commission be authorized to seek individual contributions to defray its expenses.

Presbytery then took a recess until 2:00 P. M.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer. Rev. Charles L. Carhart and Elder Charles G. Mead were appointed tellers of votes for Commissioners to the General Assembly.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Two churches, Gilead and South Yonkers, through the aid of your committee, have secured pastors. A year ago your committee, by order of the General Assembly, asked Presbytery to authorize an investigation of ministers' salaries in our Presbytery (p. 116). The response of the churches to our letter was prompt and courteous. A study of the conditions shown by the figures was furnished at the Fall Stated Meeting (pp. 146 and 147). The lack of manses and the inadequacy of the salaries resulted in a vote by Presbytery for the appointment of a special committee to investigate the stationary standard of giving in Westchester, when wealth is increasing (p. 147). This committee has not been appointed.

East Center, and Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park.

3. Your committee recommends and moves:

(1.) That the sessions of the Scarsdale Hitchcock Memorial and Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park Churches having given excuse for not presenting their records, be excused.

(2.) That records presented be approved without exception. By a unanimous vote after prayer it was ordered that

the following be sent by night-telegram:

To the President of the United States, Washington, D. C.: The Presbytery of Westchester, in session at Dobbs Ferry, N. Y., expresses to you its confidence and to our country and the interests of the Kingdom of God, its complete Christian loyalty and support, and prays for the speedy establishment of a peace based upon righteousness and guaranteeing liberty.

Presbytery then united in singing the first verse of our

national hymn.

The conference was then held and an address was delivered by the Rev. Robert Mackenzie, Secretary of the College Board.

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Year 1917 is the four hundredth anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, the outstanding feature of which was the appeal to Holy Scripture as a rule of faith and practice and the giving of the open Bible to all the people; and

Whereas, The General Assembly and most of the Synods have called upon Presbyterians to celebrate this anniversary by making special offerings on or before October 31, for the improvement of

Bible teaching in Presbyterian Colleges; therefore be it

Spring Stated Meeting, Resolved, That the Presbytery of Westchester recommends to April 16, 1917. all its churches that the anniversary be suitably celebrated and that

an offering be taken for the purpose named.

Resolved, That the Moderator appoint a committee of three to assist the churches in conducting an appropriate celebration and to encourage individuals to make gifts for the improvement of departments of English Bible in our Presbyterian colleges.

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk send a copy of these resolutions to all ministers and session clerks of the Presbytery, and that

he send to the College Board the name and address of the chair-

man of the special committee.

The thanks of Presbytery were extended to the speaker for his address and he was invited to sit as a correspond-

ing member.

The Rev. Foster A. Coons of the New York Conference of the Methodical Episcopal Church and the Rev. G. W. Gulick of the Classes of Ulster of the Reformed Church were also invited to sit as corresponding members.

The Narrative was read and adopted, and it was ordered that an abstract be sent to the General Assembly, and entered upon the minutes. The abstract is as follows:

# I. CHURCH MEMBERSHIP AND SERVICES.

The total membership reported is 9,795, with 341 added on examination and 367 on certificate. Two preaching services are held, well attended in the morning, but with a much smaller attendance at the second service. Communion services are held in most of the churches four times a year; in a few, oftener, with an attendance of 58 per cent, of the membership. Eight churches do not have prayer meetings. Those that do report an attendance of about 13 per cent. Bible study, topical lectures, and religious, social and missionary subjects have been found helpful in stimulating interest and in the order given. When members remove to other communities most of our pastors notify churches in such communities, and urge absentees to take their letters.

# II. RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

The importance of the religious training of children is impressed upon our congregations. Efforts are being made to promote family worship and religious training in the home by sermons, pastoral work and through the home department of the Sunday School. In some of the churches conferences are held between pastors and parents, and Sabbath School teachers. Christian parents are faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Eight churches observe Decision Day, 26 do not. Twenty-seven have communicant classes; 197 Sabbath School pupils were received into the churches on examination, of whom 135 were baptized in inthe churches on examination, of whom 135 were baptized in in-

fancy. Special work is being done for boys and girls through the Meeting. Boy Scouts, Camp-fire Clubs and classes; and children's sermons. April 16, 1917.

stereopticons and junior choirs are employed to interest young people and secure their attendance at church services.

Forty-three Sabbath Schools are reported, 34 church, 3 branch, 2 union and 4 mission schools. The Shorter Catechism is taught in 9 and the Intermediate Catechism in 5. There are teacher-training classes in 7. Of these schools 11 are fully and 14 partially graded and 24 report teachers' meetings. Westminster Lesson Helps are used in 24. Twenty-two churches have organized Bible classes, and 20 have adult-classes. Five make annual community canvasses for new scholars; 14 maintain libraries for general reading; 6 reference libraries for teachers; 11 for mission study, 5 for Bible Study. Twenty churches have home departments with an enrollment of 710.

Our churches report: 14 junior, 6 intermediate and 24 senior societies in good condition with 6 mission study classes. There are 11 Junior Mission Bands and 4 Westminster Guilds. Five young people attended the summer conferences. Nineteen are in our denominational schools and colleges, and 125 in other institu-

tions.

### III. EVANGELISM.

Seven churches report evangelistic services with additions and improved spiritual conditions.

### IV. THE COMMUNITY.

Systematic study of their neighborhoods are reported by several of our churches, and efforts have been made to interest people in the neighborhood problems. Various church organizations have been engaged in community work, and the churches co-operate with the different societies whose purpose is the improvement of community life.

### V. MISSIONS AND BENEVOLENCE.

Opportunity is given to our congregations to contribute regularly to every board. Ninetcen contributed to all, 7 contribute to some, and the remainder make no answer. Eighteen churches have adopted the Every-member Plan and the canvass is made by personal visitation. Opportunity is given for contributions to causes other than those in the budget, one or two churches making appropriation from a general benevolence fund. The women's societies contribute to Home and Foreign Missions, and work among the freedmen, young people's add to these Education, and Sunday Schools give in addition to the mission boards to Sunday School work. Provision is made for the poor. Twenty churches report 504 subscribers to the Assembly Herald,

# VI. FINANCE.

The expenses of the churches are fully and promptly met. Ten churches report an indebtedness of \$110,000. The benevolences of the church are managed by the sessions, the funds being kept separate from those for church support—with separate treasurers in a majority of our congregations. Seventeen of our churches support their Sunday Schools, others only in part. One church derives its income from pew rents, 24-from envelope contributions and 6 from both. Twenty-eight churches report 5,155 contributors to church support, and 2,775 for benevolence.

The thanks of Presbytery were extended to the narrator, the Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts, for his excellent report.

sympathy for him in his failing health.

The committee to organize a church at Armour Villa Park (p. 185) reported. The report was received and the committee continued.

The Committee on the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation (p. 185) presented a report, which was received, and its recommendations with the exception of the one appropriating money, which was referred to the Business Committee, adopted. The report is as follows:

Owing to the possibility of changed conditions before the fall, the Committee on the Celebration of the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation do not feel that it is possible at this time to make definite and detailed plans for the celebration.

We therefore would simply make the following recommenda-

tions:

1. That, if the way be clear, the evening meeting on Monday at the Fall Stated Meeting of Presbytery be set aside as a special service of celebration of the anniversary, and that the arrangements therefor be in the hands of the Committee of Arrangements

for that meeting.
2. That Presbytery request each church to celebrate the anni-

versary in some way, and suggests the following as suitable:
(1.) A special service or series of services of a historical nature with sermon or sermons by the pastor or other speakers.

(2.) A special offering for the improvement of the departments of the English Bible in our Presbyterian Colleges, as recommended by the College Board,

(3.) A study class on the Reformation and its meaning either

in the Young People's Society or in the mid-week service.

3. That this committee be continued and be allowed five dollars for expenses in communicating with the churches and organizations, as the plans may develor.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was

received, adopted and is as follows:

1. The call of the Dayspring Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. William Crawford (p. 188). The call is in due form, was voted at a congregational meeting held April 18, 1917, with the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan as Moderator, who attests the call. The salary is \$1,500 per annum, with the use of the manse and four weeks vacation yearly. The commissioners are present and were heard. Charge to the pastor-Rev. Arthur C. McMillan. Charge to the people-Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth. Prayer of installation—Rev. Ernest Glen Wood.

The Rev. William Crawford and the session of the church are

authorized to fill vacancies in the order, should any occur.

2. The request of the Committee on the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation for an appropriation of five dollars to meet expenses (p. 189). It is recommended and moved that the said committee be authorized to draw on the Treasurer for the amount specified.

The call of the Dayspring Church was placed in the hands of the Rev. William Crawford, and he signified his

acceptance.

The Rev. William P. Stevenson requested the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between him and the First Church of Yonkers in order that he may become the pastor of the Maryville College, Tennessee. The minutes of the congregational meeting concurring in the request were read, and the commissioners were heard, who stated that the congregation concurred with regret.

On motion, the pastoral relation was dissolved to take

effect July 1.

The Rev. Ernest Glen Wood was appointed Moderator

of the session.

At the request of the Rev. William P. Stevenson, the Stated Clerk was authorized to issue a certificate dismissing him to the Presbytery of Union.

The Rev. Arthur C. McMillan was appointed to prepare Intermediate a minute in view of the removal of the Rev. and Mrs. June 19, 1917. Stevenson from our bounds.

The special committee to prepare a minute on the retirement of Elder Ralph E. Prime from the office of Permanent Clerk (p. 189) presented a report, which was re-

ceived, adopted, and is as follows:

In accepting with deep regret and sorrow the resignation of Elder Ralph E. Prime, as Permanent Clerk of this presbytery, we place on record our warm affection for him as a brother in the Lord, our high appreciation of his years of faithful and efficient service in the Permanent Clerkship and in all other positions occupied by him in the presbytery and our grateful recognition of his serene and positive Christian faith and character. We assure him of our heartfelt sympathy with him in his failing health of body and his inability to continue in the service he has so willingly and lovingly rendered, and we pray that God's grace may sustain and comfort him in this his time of trial.

The Moderator, Stated Clerk and Temporary Clerks were appointed a committee to recommend action with reference to the vacancy in the office of Permanent Clerk.

The special committee on Persian work in Yonkers

Resolved, That Presbytery send to the Young People's Association its congratulations and good wishes at the meeting of celebration to be held tonight, and that the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan

be appointed to present them.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions reported the resignation of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, Italian Missionary at Port Chester. On motion his resignation was accepted.

The special committee to prepare a minute on the removal of the Rev. and Mrs. William P. Stevenson (p. 191). presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is:

In accepting the resignation of the Rev. William P. Stevenson of the pastorate of the First Presbyteries Church of Yonkers and in granting him a letter of dismission to the Presbytery of Union, Synod of Tennessee, the Presbytery of Westchester records its sense of the great loss that has come to us.

In the First Church of Yonkers, Mr. Stevenson took a field of

large and historic influence and leaves it larger and more powerful. His zeal, courtesy, mental ability and felicity of speech have found expression in the many activities of the First Church and in the many good works of the city at large. His contribution of brain and heart have enriched the church and civic life of Yonkers,

Intermediate Though never a partisan his loyalty to Presbyterianism has been Meeting, 1917, constant and his influence has aided materially in the notable ex-

tension of Presbyterian churches in the city during recent years. We congratulate Maryville College in securing the services of Mr. and Mrs. Stevenson in a work for which they are peculiarly fitted. We wish them and the college all good in many years of union and work for our common Lord and in training the youth of His church.

The special Committee on Ministers' Salaries (p. 185) presented a report, which was received.

Pending its consideration all pastors were on motion, permitted to retire.

Elder Walter Thomas was called to the chair.

After amendment, a quorum being present, the report was adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

the necessary steps in laying and carrying out plans, which will result in ascertaining whether their congregations possess the ability to increase the pastor's salary, or provide a manse, or both.

2. That an annual salary of \$1,200 and free use of manse be

the minimum salary paid to pastors of churches of Presbytery, un-

less it otherwise order.

That in case a church has no manse, then \$1,600 shall be

the minimum salary paid, unless Presbytery otherwise order.

4. That at the Spring Stated Meeting, 1918, of Presbytery, each church shall report, in writing, to Presbytery, what it has done towards carrying out the requirements of the first recommendation.

5. That a copy of this report be forwarded to each elder and the chairman of each board of trustees, together with a letter signed

by t'se Stated Clerk and the chairman of this committee.
6. That ample time for the reception of reports from the churches shall be provided on the docket of the Spring Stated Meeting.

The pastors returned and the acting Mcderator re-

sumed the chair.

The special Committee on the Four Hundredth Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation presented a report, which was received.

The special Committee on Armour Villa Park (p. 189) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee reports that the conditions have so changed since last meeting that some services will be carried on without the aid of Presbytery and a Sabbath School maintained. Your committee recommends and moves that no action with respect to that field be taken at this meeting.

The special committee on the vacancy in the office of Permanent Clerk (p. 191) presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That the office be not filled until the Spring Stated Meeting, at which time a new term begins; and
- 2. That your committee be authorized to present at that time a nomination.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 2, 1917

Reports have been received from candidates under your care. These reports and reports from others about them are satisfactory. We recommend and move that Eugene Meray, Charles Papp, Andrew Janowicsky and Arthur P. Dawson be recommended to the Board of Education for such aid as is given to students at their several stages of preparation.

The acting Moderator appointed the Rev. Messrs, Frank S. Hunnewell and Charles L. Carhart and Elder Rodney Gibson a committee to revise the permanent committees.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

1. The request of the Rev. Thomas C. Straus for leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Second Church of Peekskill. The commissioners of the congregation were heard and the minutes of the congregational meeting, duly called, were read. The congregation concurs in the request. The following minute was adopted by the congregation:

We, the members of the church and congregation of the Second Presbyterian Church, Peekskill, N. Y., in concurring in the request of the Rev. Thomas C. Straus that the pastoral relation between him and the church be dissolved, desire to express our appreciation of the faithful, efficient and conscientious service rendered by him. For twenty-one years he has broken for us the bread of life. The teachings of Holy Writ have been presented to us clothed in such language that any one could understand and be helped thereby. He has ministered to us in times of sickness and suffering as a minister of Christ, and has been always ready with words of comfort and hope in times of sorrow.

Not only in the church but in the community at large he has been a force for good against evil, and as secretary of the Ministers' Association he has helped materially in every fight for civic righteousness.

For the future we pray that the blessing of God may rest on him and his, and prosper whatever he may undertake.

It is recommended and moved that the request be granted to take effect October 31.

- 2. Your committee has audited the accounts of the Treasurer of Presbytery and of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, referred to them (pp. 195 and 199), and it is recommended and moved that they be approved.
  - 3. Overtures sent down by the General Assembly (p. 195):
- (1.) Overture No. 1 proposing an amendment to Chapter XII, Section VII, of the Form of Government, relating to elder-moderators.
- (2.) Overture No. 2 proposing an amendment to Chapter XIX, Section III, also relating to elder-moderators.

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 2, 1917 It is recommended and moved that these overtures be answered in the negative—the first on the ground that the implication that a ruling elder may not preach the Gospel is un-Presbyterian and unChristian, and the second on the ground that the distinctions implied between the functions of a ruling and a teaching elder are indefinite and possibly un-Presbyterian.

(3.) Overture No. 3 proposing an amendment to Book of Discipline, Section 132, relating to the review by the General Assembly of a judgment of the Permanent Judicial Commission.

It is recommended and moved that it be answered in the affirmative.

The Committee on Every Member Canvass (p. 165) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

There have been no definite efforts since the conferences of last winter to increase the number of churches using the everymember plan, but a meeting of your committee for that purpose will be held on November 5. One more church expects to make a canvass, while the pastor of another church promises to renew efforts with view to its adoption. The names of the group leaders are: Harlem, Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts; New Haven, Rev. John J. McClelland; Hudson River, Elder Walter Thomas.

From the apportionment of two dollars on each church to pay the expenses of conferences held last winter, your committee acknowledges the receipt of \$60. The expenses have amounted to \$54, leaving a balance of \$6 on hand. It is recommended and moved that Presbytery authorize the committee to use it for expenses in the future,

The Missionary Committee presented reports on Foreign Missions and Ministerial Relief and Sustenation which were received.

Rev. Ernest Glen Wood and Elder Ralph M. Leonard were appointed tellers of votes for Delegates to Synod.

Recess was taken until 2 p.m.

A conference was held on Young People's Work (p. 177) under the leadership of the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee submits the following report:

The report of the treasurer of this committee, showing receipts and disbursements for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Church Extension, has already been presented (p. 199).

1. Presbyterial and Synodical Aid.—The number of churches receiving aid continues the same as last year and the amount granted is about the same. In addition to assisting four churches your Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 2, 1917

committee has made a loan of \$500 for one year to meet an emergency arising in connection with the work at Port Chester. Although Presbytery is classed as self-supporting in the Synod of New York, we have followed the urgent request of the Synod in granting \$250 for the Synod's work.

The same applications for aid are expected for the coming year as for the past year. It is recommended and moved that they

be granted, if made.

2. Church Extension,—No new fields have been entered. We cannot too strongly urge upon our pastors and elders the duty of keeping watch over their own local fields and of reporting to your committee any localities where there seems to be a demand for church extension work. The financial report is satisfactory. The mortgage indebtedness on the Italian Mission property at Port Chester has been satisfactorily adjusted with the generous cooperation of friends of the work, and we expect that the next year will record a substantial reduction of this indebtedness. The buildings of the mission have been put in good repair at an expense of less than \$50. The committee has also bought a lot at Pleasant-ville, and the chapel occupied by the Italian Mission has been moved to it.

The Hitchcock Memorial Church at Hartsdale has begun the erection of its house of worship and hopes to occupy it before the close of 1917. This will release for church extension work in other fields the "Ruth Memorial Chapel," which that church has been occupying since its organization. Your committee has under consideration a request for the removal of the chapel to White Plains for the use of the Italian Mission at that place. To meet interest charges, payments on account of mortgage and notes, and the expense of moving the portable chapel your committee will require about the same amount as was appropriated last year, and we request that this amount, say \$1,000, be voted and appropriated for the coming year. If more is received, your committee will be glad to apply the excess to the further reduction of our mortgage indebtedness.

Work among Foreign-Speaking Peoples.—The past six months have been months of blessing in our foreign work. The conditions have been particularly trying. Important readjustments had to be made after the departure from Mt. Kisco and adjoining fields of Mr. Pietro Guiffrida. We were able to secure through the aid of the Board of Home Missions the services of Miss Bertha Latschar, who resides in Mt. Kisco and visits Pleasantville, White Plains, Port Chester and occasionally Katonah. Her work for the summer has been principally farming classes among the children, and is to be followed up in the fall and winter by educational and religious classes. A revival of interest is already manifest. In Mt. Kisco during the five months of the summer there has been an attendance of 869, in Pleasantville 939 at Sunday services and 152 in garden Miss Latschar has called frequently on Italian families, making in Mt. Kisco 112 calls in five months and in Pleasantville 119. The Home Board has agreed to pay her \$50 a month for six months beginning June 1, 1917. The Harlem Valley Foreign Workers' Association, including the churches of Mt. Kisco, White Plains, Pleasantville and Katonah agreed to meet her traveling expenses. At a recent meeting it was agreed that her services were no longer needed at Pleasantville, White Plains or Katonah and that she should devote her time to Mt. Kisco.

The Italian Mission at Portchester has been under a severe Fall Stated strain due to the resignation of Mr. Cigliano, and the later with- Meeting, drawal of it. He is now working from month to month. A readjustment is necessary to the success of the work. A strong local committee is backing up the work under the leadership of the Rev. John J. McClelland.

Oct. 2, 1917

The New Rochelle Mission, under the efficient leadership of the new missionary, Mr. Villante, has improved in its methods of work and shows increase in both attendance and contributions of the Italian constituency. The Pleasantville Mission is making good, founded upon the solid ground of self-help, and there is a very efficient group of leading men under the splendid direction of Mr. and Mrs. Bender. A striking and successful feature of the White Plains Italian Mission has been the Vacation Bible School conducted by Miss Kellogg. Preaching services, led by Mr. Cigliano, have been renewed. In Katonah there is some plodding Sunday School work conducted in a masterly way by Miss Barrett and her helpers with an average attendance of 18.

4. Evangelism.—The chairman of the sub-committee, the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister, has gone into national service of the Young Men's Christian Association, and the Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor has been appointed to take his place.

Your committee recommends and moves

- 1. That the apportionments of the churches for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Church Extension for the coming year be the same as the past year with the exception that those of the Gilead Church be fixed at \$14 instead of \$20 (p. 143).
- 2. That the Rev. William Crawford be appointed a member of the committee.
- 3. That your committee be authorized to secure funds for work among the Persians and to use unexpended balances in conference with the Trustees.

Elder Walter Thomas was appointed to represent Presbytery at the meeting of the Synod's Committee on Synodical Home Missions.

The Committee of Arrangements presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your Committee make the following recommendations and move their adoption:

- 1. That the Rev. Thomas C. Straus be appointed to distribute the bread and the Rev. James A. McWilliams to distribute the wine at the celebration of the Lord's Supper; also that Elders Walter Thomas and Harris S. Lines be appointed to distribute the bread and Elders Ranson E. Wilcox and Robert G. Abercrombie to distribute the wine.
- 2. That the public meeting at 8 P. M. be presided over-by the Moderator and that the action of the committee in inviting the Rev. Ralph Felton of the Board of Home Missions to address us be approved.
- 3. That the devotional service tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock be led by the Rev. Walter L. Steiner.
  - 4. That a recess be had tomorrow from 12:30-2 P. M.

2. It is recommended and moved that the Fall Stated Meeting be held in the Huguenot Memorial Church, for which a "very cordial invitation" has been received.

The Rev. Thomas Morgan and Elder James R. Brash were appointed a committee to nominate trustees of Presbytery

An overture on the ordination of deacons to be sent to the General Assembly was referred to the Business Committee.

The special committee to prepare an overture to the General Assembly on the work of the National Service Commission (p. 231) presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommend and move that the following overture be sent to the General Assembly:

In view of the extensive and comprehensive work inaugurated by the Young Men's Christian Association for our soldiers and sailors, and of the growing importance of Christian unity which that work so beautifully fosters and exemplifies, the Presbytery of Westchester most earnestly overtures the General Assembly to appoint a committee to investigate the work of the National Service Commission, to define anew or modify its functions to meet the changed conditions of the past year, and to report whether in its judgment the expenditure of money through this commission for the carrying on of distinctive denominational work is called for, report to be made to the Assembly of 1918.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 16, 1918.

The Rev. George S. Avery was received from the Presbytery of New York by certificate of dismission, and it was ordered that his name be enrolled.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Wendell Prime Keeler and the Rev. Walter L. Steiner a committee on the invitation of the Auburn Theological Seminary (p. 230).

The Delegates to the Synod presented a report, which was received.

The Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts and Elder Walter Thomas presented their resignations as members of the Committee on Every Member Canvass (p. 88). The resignations were accepted, and the filling of the vacancies was referred to the Rev. Charles L. Carhart of the committee appointed to nominate permanent committees (p. 201).

The Committee on Ministers' Salaries (p. 199) presented a report, which was received. The committee was continued.

Elder Ward W. Adair was re-elected a member of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply for the term of three years.

Standing Rule No. 71 was suspended and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved—That the expenses of the Stated and Permanent Clerks in attending the meetings of Presbytery be paid by Presbytery out of its general fund.

The Rev. James Packard Gillespie was re-elected chairman of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply for the term of one year.

The committee to fill vacancies in the Committee on Every Member Canvass presented a report recommending and moving the appointment of the Rev. John H. Sanders and Elder Rodney Gibson.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports on items of business referred to it as follows:

Spring Stated Meeting, April 16, 1918.

- 1. With reference to the overture on the proposed form of statistical report sent down by the General Assembly (Minutes of the G. A., 1917, pp. 294-297) it is recommended and moved that it be answered in the negative with the statement that an improved form of statistical blank is desirable.
- 2. With respect to the overture to the General Assembly proposed by certain ministers of the Madison Presbytery (p, -) on organic church union, in which Presbytery is asked to join, it is recommended and moved that the following overture be sent to the General Assembly:

The Presbytery of Westchester respectfully overtures the General Assembly to renew its former most worthy efforts toward practical church union of the American evangelical bodies.

- 3. The request of the Rev. A. Raymond Eckels and the Bryn Mawr Park Church for a dissolution of the pastoral relation. The commissioners were heard and the minutes of the congregational meeting were read. It is recommended and moved that action on this request be deferred until the June Intermediate Meeting of Presbytery.
- 4. A motion to reimburse the Rev. Messrs. George Reynolds and Robert Gardner McGregor for the expense of the floral tribute to the late Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell was referred to your committee (p. 231). It is recommended and moved that the reimbursement be ordered.
- 5. With reference to the overture to the General Assembly on the ordination of deacons (p, 234), it is recommended and moved that the following be sent to the General Assembly:

Since the Form of Government provides that it is the business of deacons to take care of the poor and also to them may properly be committed the management of the temporal affairs of the church and other administrative, charitable and community duties, their functions being such as may be discharged by a communicant member of the church of good report, full of the Spirit and of wisdom; and

Since our churches sometimes find difficulty in securing in this office the services of devout and capable men because of scruples concerning doctrine not affecting their Christian character and efficiency, this difficulty being most serious where there is committed to the deacons the management of the temporal affairs, which is commended in the Form of Government and permitted by the civil law in some states;

The Presbytery of Westchester respectfully overtures the General Assembly to send down to the presbyteries for their action the proposed amendment to the Form of Government as follows:

Shall the Form of Government, Chapter XIII, Section IV, be amended by the addition of the following sentence—In the case of the ordination of deacons question 2 shall be omitted.

The Business Committee was directed to prepare and report action governing the appointment of moderators of sessions of churches, whose pastors are absent on leave for special service. The committee to which was referred the invitation of Meeting, the President and Directors of the Auburn Theological April 16, 1918. Seminary (p. 230) reported, recommending and moving that the Moderator, the Rev. Anthony N. Peterson, be appointed a delegate to attend the celebration of the One Hundredth Anniversary of that institution. The report was adopted.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was accepted, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports—

- 1. That they have examined Abraham Shleemon, a candidate under the care of this presbytery, for ordination (p. 224). The subjects covered include the English Bible, Hebrew, theology, church history and church polity. The examination was entirely satisfactory to the committee and they unanimously recommend the candidate for ordination. Mr. Shleemon has been in charge of the Persian Mission in the Hungarian Church at Yonkers and his labors have been highly successful.
- 2. Mr. John N. Cornwell, son of the late Rev. George Cornwell and his wife, who died while missionaries in Chefoo, China, asks to be taken under the care of Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry. He is recommended by the session of the Yorktown Church, of which he is a member. Being of conscription age, your committee recommend that unanimous consent (Standing Rule No. 8) be given to receiving him now and that we do not wait three months.

Mr. Abraham Shleemon read his statement of belief and was examined upon it. On motion the examination was sustained.

It was ordered that when Presbytery adjourns, it adjourn to meet in the Hungarian Church, Yonkers, N. Y., May 12. at 3:30 P. M.

The Sub-Committee on Young People's Work of the Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Of the thirty-five churches, reports have been received from Three of these report no organizations. Of the remaining 28, but 10 were complete reports, 7 others with more than one society, had at least one of those societies making a complete report, and 11 did not make a complete report from a single society.

There are organizations for young people in 28 of our churches, although other churches not reporting, we know have such organizations. These organizations number 64 in all, of which 20 are Young People's Societies of Christian Endeavor, 1 Intermediate Society of Christian Endeavor and 9 Junior Endeavor Societies. There are 5 mission bands, 10 societies for boys exclusively and 12 for girls exclusively, and 9 others not classified.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 16, 1918. The total membership reported for these 64 societies is 2,007, and during the year 74 of their membership united with the church on confession of faith. The total gifts to all causes were \$1,908.73, of which \$43 went to the Young People's Department of the Board of Publication, the department which has the oversight of these societies.

Last year there were 66 societies reported with a total membership of 2,225—two years ago 69 societies with a membership of 2,748, a loss of 741 in two years, or 27 per cent. The total contributions this year \$1,908; last year they totaled \$2,519, and two years ago \$3,725, or a loss in contributions in two years of \$1,817, or nearly one-half.

Much of this loss may be attributed to the war with its consequent distraction and its call for service. The 665 young men, who have gone into the service of the nation from the churches of this presbytery, means a great loss in the active work of the young people in the church at home. But we doubt if all the loss can be attributed to the war, nor even to carelessness in making reports. It means that to too large an extent the church is not keeping pace with the demand or opportunity that its young people present.

A year ago your committee suggested and Presbytery adopted a standard for young people's organizations in each church (p. 177). The report blanks do not show these facts, but they tell enough to show that not a single church has reached this standard. But 5 or 6 churches, by a liberal construction, might claim to have reached the first standard. There are but 10 study classes in all the Presbytery.

In addition to this standard (p. 177) for organizations for the church we call attention to the new program for Young People's Societies as adopted by our Department of Young People's Work. Nine societies have reported that they have already adopted it, and others may well follow their example.

The Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received, and its recommendations, as follows, were adopted:

1. That all churches, which have not introduced the Every Member Canvass be urged to do so.

2. That the churches which have conducted the Every Member Canvass, continue it annually and proceed to the next phase of its development, the organization of the fellowship of stewardship, which is an advance from systematic to proportionate giving.

The Rev. Robert R. White of the Presbytery of New York was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Mr. John N. Cornwell, as recommended by the Committee on Education and Examinations (p. 236), was examined as to his religious experience and motives for entering the ministry. The examination was sustained and he was received under the care of the Presbytery as a candidate for the ministry.

Recess was then taken until 2 P. M.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday. 2 P. M.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer. April 16, 1918.

The Rev. Walter L. Steiner and Elder James B, Brash were appointed tellers.

A conference was then held on the Narrative under the leadership of the Rev. William Crawford.

The Narrative was read, and it was ordered that an abstract be entered in the minutes and sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

- 1. Church Membership and Services.—The total membership reported is 10,152, with 496 added on examination and 320 on certificate. Two preaching services are held on the Lord's Day with the largest attendance in the morning and that in the evening is reported as good. Six of our churches have been without pastors for a portion or the whole year, but have been regularly supplied. One church has been closed. Communion services are held by most churches four times a year, one seven times, six six times, two five times, one three times, and two two times, with an attendance of 56 per cent. of membership. Some report no weekly prayer meeting; one reports prayer meeting part of the year, but nearly all hold them regularly. The attendance reported is 14 per cent. Most of the churches find Bible Study and topical lectures the most interesting in stimulating interest. A few employ religious, social and missionary subjects. When members move to other communities most of our pastors notify churches in such communities and urge absentees to take their letters.
- 2. Religious Education and Young People's Work.—Twelve churches report supervision of the educational work in all departments. The importance of the religious training of children is impressed upon our congregations as reported by 24 of our churches. Means are used to promote family worship in most churches. In the Hungarian Church all the people have it, due to their ancient custom in Hungary. A committee is employed for the purpose and conferences are held very often. One church makes use of daily readings printed in the church bulletins. Nearly all the churches employ no committees and only a few have conferences, and where these exist it is only as the pastor attends the teachers' meetings. All the churches except one reported that Christian parents were faithful in precenting their children for battism. Four churches faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Four churches observe Decision Day and twenty-five do not. Nearly all use other times to induce the children to confess Christ, some in the Sunday School sessions, a few from the platform and classes prior to communion. Seventeen have communicant classes; 252 Sunday School scholars have been received into the churches on examination, an increase of 55 over last year, of whom 145 were baptized in infancy. Special work is being done for boys and girls in most of the churches, through the Boy Scouts, Camp Fire Clubs and classes, children's sermons, the Red Cross, West Guild, Knights of King Arthur and Girls' Bible Class, simple, direct illustrated sermons for the young at the morning service and stereopticon service in the evening, junior sermons and junior talks. Of the primary department 25

per cent. regularly attend church, 31 per cent. of the junior and 40 per cent. of the intermediate.

Thirty-six Sabbath Schools are reported, 27 church, 3 branch, 2 union, and 4 mission. The Shorter Catechism is taught in 6, the intermediate in 4, teacher training classes in 9, four are enrolled at denominational headquarters. Of these schools 15 are fully and 10 partially graded, and 20 report teachers' meetings. Fifteen schools use the Westminster Helps, 14 use teachers' quarterlies, 2 use the adult Bible Class monthly, 14 use the home department quarterly, 9 use the Sunbeam, 6 use the Queen's Garden, 7 use the King's Treasuries and 11 use the Forward. Fourteen churches have organized Bible Classes, 13 have intermediate classes, 8 have senior Bible Classes, 11 adult Bible Classes, 23 report that the members of the adult classes generally attend church services, 90 per cent, are church members, 6 make annual canvass for new scholars, 2 report doing it constantly, 12 maintain libraries for general reading, 8 reference libraries for teachers, 9 for mission study and 4 for Bible studies; 19 churches have home departments with an enrollment of 549, 24 schools report total membership, including officers, teachers and scholars, but not including cradle roll or home department, 5,001. Nine schools report gains, making a total of 216 members and 5 schools report loss of 126, making a net gain of 90.

Our churches report 13 junior, 4 intermediate and 20 senior young people's societies, 8 junior mission bands, 4 Westminster Guilds, a total of 49. Four of our young people attended summer conferences, 37 our denominational schools and colleges, and 19 other institutions, a decrease of 35 from last year.

- 3. Evangelism.—A few report special evangelistic services with 104 accessions and a higher spiritual tone.
- 4. Community.—Four have made a systematic study of their neighborhoods with regard to races and nationalities, 3 social conditions, 3 industrial and 7 religious. Ten have interested themselves in neighborhood problems such as temperance relief work through the Red Cross, canteen, soldier and sailor clubs, no-license campaigns, day-nursery, personal work among the soldiers in camp. Thirteen churches co-operate with the Young Men's Christian Association, 9 with the Young Women's Christian Association, 9 with the Young Women's Christian Association, 12 local temperance work, 1 vacation Bible schools, 1 playgrounds and 1 grange. Two members of our churches have volunteered for the ministry, 1 for missionary work, 14 for Y.M.C.A. work, 4 for Y.W.C.A. work and 4 for settlement work.
- 5. Missions and Benevolence.—The sessions of 24 churches report that they have given an opportunity to their congregations to contribute regularly to every board during the year, 16 contributing to all, 5 to all but one, 3 to some. Twenty-three churches use the every-member plan, and make the canvass by personal visitation. Opportunity is given to the people to contribute to causes not provided for in the church benevolence budget—10 through a general benevolence fund. Systematic instruction is given by sermons, literature and addresses by representatives of the boards. Men's societies contribute to home and foreign missions and temperance, women's to home and foreign missions and treperance, and Sunday Schools to home and foreign missions and temperance, and Sunday Schools to home and foreign missions and

Sunday School work. Provision is made for the poor of the Spring Stated churches and for general charity, in most cases through the dea- Meeting, April 16, 1918. con's fund.

6. Finance.—The church expenses are fully and promptly met by most of the churches. The mortgage indebtedness reported foots up \$96,400. The benevolences are administered in all but one church by the session. In all but one there are separate funds for church support and benevolence, with separate treasurers in all except 11. The Sunday School is supported by 18 of our churches, not by 13, and partly by one. Thirteen schools use their offerings in their own support and 11 part for support and for benevolence. Three churches report income for church support derived from pew rents, 26 from envelope contributions, and 6 from both. There were reported 4,069 systematic contributors for church support and 2.138 for benevolence.

The Stated Clerk was instructed to obtain and send out blanks for narrative as soon as issued, and to obtain and send to the churches duplicates of all statistical blanks.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

- 1. The committee has approved of the plans, submitted to it, for a proposed new building to house the work of the Italian Mission at Port Chester, but has assumed no financial responsibility.
- 2. The action of Presbytery authorizing the expenditure of any unexpended balance in the hands of the committee for foreign work was taken advantage of in connection with the Persian work in Yonkers (p. 205) and \$375 was appropriated to pay the salary of Mr. Abraham Shleemon until July 1. Your committee respectfully asks Presbytery for further instructions concerning the continuance of the work.
- 3. Your committee reports with sorrow the death of the Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell, a member of this committee and chairman of the sub-Committee on Church Extension. His death is a serious loss both to the committee and the Death of the Rev. ous loss both to the committee and to the Presbytery. At his request the use of the Ruth Memorial Chapel was granted for Italian Mission work at White Plains.
- 4. The following appropriations have been made: Bedford, \$300; Harrison, \$200; Yonkers' Hungarian, \$150; and South East, \$60.
- 5. Three vacancies have occurred in the membership of the committee—the Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell by death, and the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister and the Rev. Thomas Morgan by resignation in order to take part in the war work of the Young Men's Christian Association. It is recommended and moved that the Rev. W. Francis Irwin, the Rev. Wendell Prime Keeler and the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan be appointed to fill these vacancies.
- 6. Your committee report the reorganization of the committee as follows:

The appropriations of the committee were approved and the committee was authorized to fill vacancies.

The sub-Committee on Foreign-Speaking Peoples of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

The missionary work among foreign-speaking peoples within our bounds has passed through many changes during the year ending April 1, 1918. Notwithstanding the adverse circumstances caused by this world war and the demand made by foreign governments upon their peoples residing here, the missions have been maintained with some progress and prosperity. Immigration has for the present ceased and there has been a considerable exodus among our mission folks, particularly the Italians.

- 1. Pleasantville.—Total receipts from collections among the Italian members of this mission, \$120.80, averaging a little over \$2 a Sunday. Expenditures were \$108.84, including \$15 for moving and repairing the chapel, leaving a balance of \$11.96. The average attendance at the Sunday School through the year was 20 and at church services 12. This small but substantial work is practically self-supporting in its running expenses, and there is no missionary to pay. Mr. and Mrs. Peter Bender have for many years given their services free and have worked loyally among this appreciative group of Italians. Last summer a lot was purchased by Presbytery for \$200 and the little chapel built by the Italians at their own expense and mostly with their own hands was moved from the leased property where it was for many years located. Services are held every Sunday afternoon following the Sunday School.
- 2. Mt. Kisco,—The small work in Mt. Kisco was dropped with the resignation of Miss Bertha Latschar, our Italian missionary residing there. Miss Latschar conducted interesting garden classes

at Mt. Kisco, Pleasantville and White Plains, and assisted in the Sunday School work at Port Chester.

- 3. White Plains,—It reports an Italian membership of 10, an increase during the year of 3, and an average attendance at Sunday services of 9. The total amount of collections last year from all sources for this Italian work, exclusive of missionary's salary, was \$600. 'The mission has accepted the offer of a portable chapel at Hartsdale, but, owing to the expense of moving, has as yet been unable to use it. The work of the Vacation Bible School, conducted during the summer by Miss Mary Kellogg, was very successful and instrumental in stimulating new interest among the Italians and adding to the membership of the school. The work in the early spring met with a great misfortune in the serious illness of Miss Kellogg, who has been unable to resume the full burden of the work, and on April 5 the mission suffered a great loss in the sudden death of its devoted friend and worker, the Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell. Miss Kellogg's salary has been continued.
- 4. Port Chester.—It reports a present membership of 75 Italians with an increase during the year of 25, an average attendance at Sunday School of 40 scholars in five classes. The total collections during the year amounted to \$195.68, and the expenditures, exclusive of repairs, salary, taxes and interest on mortgage, were \$205.78. The Sunday work and classes are being handled by an efficient corps of Christian teachers from the local churches. Since the mission has received the combined backing of these churches a new and hopeful spirit has stimulated the work. Mr. Cigliano, hesides his regular labors as pastor of the mission, has given very acceptable service both at Pleasantville and White Plains, preaching to the Italians at these places.
- 5. New Rochelle.—The Italian Evangelical Church reports: Present membership, 33; an increase during the year of 18; neophytes, 37; average attendance at morning service, 25; evening service, 23; average attendance at Sunday School, 44; average attendance at classes, Italian and English, 13. This Italian Church was organized a year ago and the Rev. O. B. Vallante became its pastor during the year. The work under his leadership and with the loyal support of the Presbyterian Churches of New Rochelle is enlarging its usefulness and serving well the Italian population there through sewing school, mothers' meetings, men's clubs, girls' circle, Italian and English classes.
- 6. Yonkers.—(1.) Persian Mission reports a present membership of 96 with an increase over last year of 11, and an average attendance at the Sunday services of 78. Total collections received from the Persians amount to \$369.71, and the total expenditures for the year were \$352.50, leaving a balance of \$17.21. Mr. Shleemon is the devoted leader and pastor of his Assyrian flock, which meets weekly in the Hungarian Church building. The work is progressing fully and calls for the sympathetic support and an adequate salary for Mr. Shleemon.
- (2.) The Hungarian Presbyterian Church reports a present membership of 192, a loss during the year of 1, owing to the war conditions; average attendance at Sunday services. 130 in the morning and 85 in the evening; five Sunday School classes with an average attendance of 68; total receipts, \$1,556.73, and total expen-

ditures \$1,290.77, leaving a balance of \$265.96. The pastor, the Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, reports the year 1917 as a very good one for the church. The severe winter weather caused great damage in the church building, the boiler and pipes freezing and bursting, entailing an expenditure of \$761.16 for repairs, so that instead of a balace of a few hundred dollars there is a deficit of over \$400.

In our summary we report as follows:

There are two organized churches among the foreign populations of Presbytery, one Hungarian and one Italian. There are in addition four missions; three of which are Italian and one Persian. The total membership reported this year from these churches and missions is 418, a gain during the year of 56; average attendance at the church services, 50; average attendance at Sunday School, 42; total expenditures, exclusive of missionaries' salaries, \$2.822.71; total collections, \$3,127.73.

We recommend and move-

1. That the following appropriations for salaries be requested from the Board of Home Missions for the foreign work in this presbytery—Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, Hungarian Church of Yonkers, \$1,100; Mr. Vincent Cigliano. Port Chester Italian Mission, \$900; Rev. O. B. Vallante, Italian Evangelical Church of New Rochelle, \$550; Miss Mary Kellog, White Plains Italian Mission, \$600.

2. That the committee be authorized to use the unexpended balance, not to exceed \$600, for Mr. Abraham Shleemon's salary,

3. That the committee be empowered to act in procuring from the Board of Home Missions the appropriations for the missionaries' salaries, to apply the same for the coming six months, and to act at its discretion ad interim.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions was instructed to report at the June Intermediate Meeting a plan for such reconstruction or division of this committee as will be most adapted to needs of the work.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

With respect to rule governing sessions in case pastors are absent on leave for special service (p. 236) the committee recommends and moves that the following addition be made to Standing Rule No. 66—This rule shall apply so far forth, to churches whose pastors shall be granted by the presbytery leave of absence for six months or more.

2. With reference to the letter of the clerk of session of the First Church of Yonkers your committee recommends and moves as follows (p. 230):

The action of Presbytery in dissolving the pastoral relation between the Rev. William P. Stevenson and the First Church of Yonkers to take effect July 1, 1917 (p. 190), is to be understood as applying to the services of Mr. Stevenson as pastor and does not invalidate such agreement as may have been made between him and the church as to the continuing of the period of payment of his salary to cover his vacation terminating August 31, 1917.

Leave of absence for one year was granted to the Rev. Thomas Morgan and for ten months to the Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts to engage in war work in connection with the Young Men's Christian Association.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Five of our churches have been vacant during the year—Croton Falls, Rye, Yonkers First, South Yonkers and Peekskill Second. Three have called pastors, who have been installed—Larchmont, the Rev. Charles L. Carhart; Peekskill Second, the Rev. John H. Sanders, and Yonkers First, the Rev. Wendell Prime Keeler. The churches now vacant are Croton Falls, Harrison, Rye and South Yonkers. Croton Falls and Harrison are supplying their pulpits.

A good proportion of our ministers are or have been engaged in war work for longer or shorter periods. The Rev. Harry C. Meserve is a chaplain in the army and the Rev. George M. Whitmore in the navy. The Rev. James Allen Whitmore, the Rev. Aubrey C. Ross, the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister and the Rev. A. Raymond Eckels have been or are in France. The Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor, the Rev. George Reynolds, and the Rev. Philip S. Bird have labored in the cantonments under the auspices of the National Service Commission or the Young Men's Christian Association, and the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt, the Rev. George H. Smyth, the Rev. James H. Hoyt and the Rev. John H. Sanders in the local camps. These make a total of fourteen who have engaged in war Two more, the Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts and the Rev. Thomas Morgan are preparing to take part in war service of the Young Men's Christian Association. Mr. John Gabrielle has been engaged by the Bedford Church to supply its pulpit until January 1, 1919, during the absence of its pastor on leave in France.

The General Assembly's Committee on Vacancy and Supply has arranged conferences on this important phase of Presbyterian life and activity throughout the country. The conference for our section will be held April 25 at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, and the Assembly's committee advises and urges a representation from all our churches.

Your committee respectfully reports that the request of the Rev. A. Raymond Eckels for the dissolution of the pastoral rela-tion to the Bryn Mawr Park Church of Yonkers was reported by this committee at the Spring Stated Meeting, and, on its recommendation, action thereon was deferred until this meeting (p. 238). Your committee recommends and moves that Mr. Eckels' request be granted to take effect immediately.

The special committee to advise with the South Yonkers Church (p. 224) presented a report, which was received

A communication from a committee representing the South Yonkers Church, present at the meeting, was presented, and on motion was referred to a special committee to be appointed by the Moderator, report to be made later in the day.

A request was received from the session of the North Avenue Church of New Rochelle for the appointment of a moderator to act during the absence of the pastor, Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor, on account of illness. It was ordered that the session be advised that under the Form of Government the session has the power to invite any minister of the presbytery to act as moderator during the inability of the pastor to act.

The Committee on Education and Examinations, through its sub-committee, presented a report on Sunday-Schools which was received, and is as follows:

Your committee's report is defective through the lack of sedulously sought information from one pastorless church with an excellent Sunday School. Allowance for this lack is made as far as possible in the comparison with last year's record.

- 1. The number of officers and teachers reported is 740, a decrease of 50; of pupils, 5,674, a decrease of 501. The total enrolment is 6,414, a decrease of 551. There were added to the Sunday School rolls the names of 526 persons, a decrease of 55. The average attendance was 4,101, a decrease of 281. Twelve schools fail to report additions. One may suspect that there were new pupils or teachers in some of these schools, and that some that report additions have reported only the increase of enrolment. The roll is doubtless kept on various principles and with varying thoroughness, but after due allowance the unfortunate fact remains that the average attendance shows a decrease in spite of the fact that 22 schools report that systematic efforts are being made to increase their membership.
- The scope of the work is indicated by the fact that of the 33 schools reporting, 26 report cradle rolls, enrolling 749 babies,

a decrease of 80; 28 schools report pupils of beginners' grade; 31 primary; 27 junior; 28 intermediate; 23 senior; 3 young people; 18 adult; and 20 home departments, enrolling 613 members, an increase of 161. 1,028 pupils are reported in full membership of the church, a decrease of 132. The proportion of communicants in the schools ranges from 1/23 to 3/4. Five churches report pupils in all departments but young people's, and one reports pupils in all. One church gives no information as to grades. Some schools lack small children, many lack older people, one reports no pupils between primary and adult. The local variation in personnel connotes a diversity of problems and accounts for differing results.

3. Methods vary. Most of the schools appear to be graded in some measure, if only in the use with the youngest and oldest pupils of different matter or different methods. Only one reports no grading, and two report no graded classes between primary and home department, 22 report the use of graded lessons, 11 in all departments. One has given up the use of graded lessons and returned to the plan of one lesson with graded helps.

Twenty-four report the use of the Westminster helps, 17 using the new departmentally graded lessons in one or more departments. Two schools report the use of Pelonbet lesson helps, 2 the Bible Study Union lessons, 3 the Closely Graded Lessons, one of these in one class only, 1 Cook's Primary Teacher, and 3 use other helps. The collater of these reports ventures the opinion that an intelligent range of choice might in special cases result in a happier adaptation of means to desired ends.

Organized Bible classes are reported in 15 schools, with 613 pupils in organized secondary classes and 567 in organized adult classes, an increase of 294 and 59. No schools claim to have attained the ten points of the Board's "Sunday School Standard." Twenty-four schools claim to give regular instruction in missions and temperance. It may be supposed that increasingly this instruction on a well arranged course of Sunday School lessons and that specific missionary exercises will find their place in the co-ordinated expressional activities of mission bands and kindred organizations... Seven schools report regular instruction in the Shorter Catcchism, one the Intermediate Catechism in one class. All the schools reporting observed Children's Day, all but 6 Rally Day, the Board's programs being used in 14 and 13 cases respectively. One reports having part in a union daily vacation Bible school. No school reports classes studying the Bible for public school credit.

- The administration is supervised by a church council or committee in five churches. In one of these the council is composed of the pastor and directors of departments, in another of elders. Twenty-four schools report that officers are elected annually, 4 that according to Presbyterian fashion they are appointed by the session. Twenty-six schools report gifts for the support of the school and church to the amount of \$4,152, an increase of \$1,067. Apparently few churches provide in their budget for religious education.
- 5. In the effort to improve the quality of the work of the school there are workers' conferences in 24 schools, meeting mostly every month, but a few weekly, bi-monthly, quarterly or occasionally. Eleven teacher-training classes of from 3 to 20 members

enroll 104 members, mainly prospective teachers, an increase of 4 classes and 57 members. The crux of the Sunday School problem is in the teacher. Only as we get teachers who realize the need of taking pains to increase their efficiency shall we have pupils who will feel the need of taking pains to increase their knowledge on to assimilate what the teacher offers. or to assimilate what the teacher offers.

6. Among the results of religious education is the preparation of adolescents for the full communion with the church. As reported, 298 pupils were received into full communion during the past year from 27 schools, an increase of 25. Completing the service of the schools in this matter there were 20 communicants' classes conducted by the pastors for a period of from 2 to 10 weeks, one lasting a year, most for 5 or 6 weeks.

Although the school is for religious instruction rather than re-Rithough the school is for religious instruction rather than religious activity, the gifts indicate in some measure the result of religious training. Here is encouragement. Our schools have felt the urge of the great appeal of others' need in these days of desolation. While gifts to the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work are \$949, a decrease of \$241, gifts to other boards amount to \$3,101, an increase of \$228, and to all other objects of benevolence \$3,854, an increase of \$2,689. The total to all objects in \$12,056, an increase of \$2,689. is \$12,056, an increase of \$3,638.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, and its recommendations after amendment adopted. They are as follows:

- 1. That Presbytery approve of the acceptance by the Trustees of Presbytery of the offer of Elder Edwin A. Slosson of \$1,000, payment to be made May 5, 1919, for the Ruth Haven Prime Memorial Chapel, formerly located at Hartsdale and recently removed to White Plains, the same to be given to the White Plains Church.
- 2. That the \$1,000 received from the sale of the chapel be known as the Ruth Haven Prime Memorial Fund, the income therefrom to be used in church extension work of Presbytery.
  - 3. That Presbytery extend its thanks to Elder Slosson.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. Charles L. Carhart and Elders Ransom E. Wilcox and E. Stanley Sloat the special committee on the communication from the committee on the South Yonkers Church (p. 257).

The committee was authorized to nominate some one to take the place of the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan, excused from service thereon.

The Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received, with a request for an appropriation for expenses of \$25. The request was referred to the Business Committee.

Presbytery then took a recess, to reassemble at the call of the Moderator this afternoon.

Closed with prayer.

Presbytery reassembled at the call of the Moderator at 3:45 p. m. and was opened with prayer.

The special committee on communication from committee representing the South Yonkers Church (p. 259) presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to secure subscriptions to the running expenses of the South Yonkers Church to the extent of \$1,500 annually for three years—one member of the committee to be from the South Yonkers Church or Congregation.

The Moderator appointed as the committee the following:

Elders.—Allan Bourn and Ransom E. Wilcox; and Mr. Fenwick A. Fulton.

It was ordered that the Stated Clerk prepare a roll of those in our churches and congregations, both male and female, who have entered the war service of the country.

The Business Committee presented a report recommending and moving the appropriation of \$10 for the Missionary Committee (p. 259). The report was received and adopted

A hearty vote of thanks was extended to Elder Jay R. Decatur, our host, and those associated with him, for so delightfulfully entertaining Presbytery at this meeting.

The minutes of today's sessions were read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the Huguenot Memorial Church, Pelham Manor, N. Y., Monday, September 30, 1918.



The Special Committee on the South Yonkers Church (p. 260) reported that after considering various plans suggested for the raising of the \$1,500 required, it was judged best to apportion shares of that sum among all our churches and ask them to have a part according to their ability in raising the amount. This action was taken in view of the fact that we are concerned with what is an enterprise in presbyterial church extension. know how much of the required sum may be depended upon. Further action will be conditioned by the reply of the churches to the appeal. The report was received.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

- 1. The call of the White Plains Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Samuel K. Piercy, of the Presbytery of Geneva (p. 262). The call is in due form; was voted unanimously at a congregational meeting duly called and held in the church September 15, under the moderatorship of the Rev. George Phillip Payson who attests the call. It is signed by a selected committee authorized at said meeting. It specifies an annual salary of \$2,500 with the free use of the manse and furnishings, and an annual vacation of one month. The minutes of the congregational meeting, duly certified, accompany the call and show that it was duly voted as above stated and the moderator was empowered to appoint the commissioners and the persons to sign the call. The commissioners were heard. The committee recommends and moves:
  - (1.) That the call be found in order; and

(2.) That further action be deferred for the present.

- 2. Request of the Rev. William Parker for the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between him and the Gilead Church to take effect November 1. The minutes of the congregational meeting held September 29, were presented, and the commissioner was heard. Thee congregation voted unanimously to concur in Mr. Parker's request. His reason for making the request is a desire for larger work. It is recommended and moved that the request be granted.
- 3. The report of the Treasurer of Presbytery (p. 263). It is recommended and moved that the report be approved.
- 4. The report of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions (p. 264.) It is recommended and moved that the report be approved.
- 5. The call of the Rye Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Charles G. Sewall. The call is in due form, signed by those appointed at the congregational meeting and attested by the moderator. It stipulates an annual salary of \$5,000 with the free use of the manse and an annual vacation. The commissioners were heard. It is recommended and moved:
- 1. That it be found in order and placed in Mr. Sewall's hand; and
- 2. That, if he accept the same, the following shall be the arrangements for the installation:

Time—Wednesday, November 6, at 8:15 p. m. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—The Rev. George Reynolds; the Rev. Lewis Gaston Leary, alternate. Charge to the pastor—The Rev. William Adams Brown, of the Presbytery of New York, to be invited; the Rev. Frederick E. Stockwell, of the Presbytery of New Brunswick, to be invited, alternate. Charge to the people—The Rev. Stanley White, of the Presbytery of Morris and Orange, to be invited; the Rev. Charles L. Carhart, alternate,

The call of the Rye Church was then placed in the hands Oct. 1, 1918 of Mr. Sewall and he signified his acceptance.

The Committee on Education and Examination presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that Eugene Meray, Charles Papp and Andrew Janowiczky be recommended to the Board of Education for aid for the scholastic year.

The Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that Presbytery approve of the suggestion of the executive committee of the New Era Movement and proceed to the election of one Minister and one layman as representatives of that movement in this presbytery.

Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt and Elder E. Stauley Sloat were elected such representatives.

The Rev. Odoacre B. Villante was received by certificate from the Presbytery of Hudson and his name enrolled.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

- 1. The sub-Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions recommends and moves the following appropriations:
- (1.) Bedford, \$300; (2.) Hungarian, \$150; (3.) Assyrian, \$240; (4.) Synod's work, \$250. Your committee also recommends and moves that the Rev. Charles G. Sewall be appointed to take the place of the Rev. Murray H. Gardner (p. 262).
- 2. The sub-Committee on Church Extension has no definite report to make. It has a large outlook at the close of the war.
- 3. The sub-Committee on Evangelistic Work reports that the annual meeting for prayer will be held on Monday, October 28, in the Hitchcock Memorial Church, and that the day be largely a day of prayer. The general topic will be "The Church's Task," subdivided as follows—"The War's Effect on Religion and Faith—The War's Effect on Church Efficiency" in the morning; and "Meeting Our Men in Arms—Reaffirmation of Faith and Fundamentals of Religious Life" in the afternoon.

Your committee would suggest that efforts be made (1.) to deepen the spiritual life of the church by private, family and public prayer, (2) to impress the responsibility on every member to be a soul winner, and (3.) to meet the dearth in the ministry owing to absence in war service by developing the laity in public speaking and preaching, and that methods to that end be adopted such as classes in communities or by a correspondence course as may be deemed best.

It is recommended and moved that the method to do this be by a committee of visitation, the committee to be appointed by Presbytery and its duty to be to press these responsibilities upon the churches.

4. The sub-Committee on Foreign Speaking Peoples reports four Italian Mission centers, New Rochelle, White Plains, Port

Chester and Harrison. The work has continued in the various departments of educational, industrial, patriotic and religious. The latter has met with the least success, and all the missions have to contend with the strain of war conditions of food and draft, and Italy's demands upon her people. Nevertheless the faithful adherents have helped to maintain their missions, valuing the consolations of religion and Christian cheer still more in these hard times, and the reports coming regularly have in the whole been favorable.

The Hungarian Church and Persian Mission of Yonkers have been able to meet all their expenses, and manifest signs of health and good management. Special financial aid to the amount of \$120 has been furnished by the sub-Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.

Miss Mary E. Kellogg, who has for twelve years faithfully discharged the duties of superintendent of the White Plains Italian Mission, has been incapacitated for service through serious illness for a year, and has tendered her resignation and been released from further service. Miss Mildred Payne, who assisted Miss Kellogg in the Italian work during the latter's illness, has proveed to be such an efficient helper that she has been asked, with the approval of the White Plains Church, to assume responsibility for the work. The Home Board has had communication with Miss Payne and Miss Kellogg and asks our committee and Presbytery to concur.

It is recommended and moved (1.) that your committee's action be confirmed and Miss Payne be engaged to succeed Miss Kellogg in the Italian Mission work with the salary paid to Miss Kellogg.

- (2.) That due acknowledgment be made of the excellent and self-sacrificing service of Miss Mary E. Kellogg in the Italian Mission at White Plains, and that copies of such acknowledgment be sent by the chairman to her and to the Home Board.
- (3.) That the \$100 on hand be presented to Miss Kellogg, whose health has been permanently impaired by her arduous labors in the Italian work at White Plains and who is no longer able to continue work. The Home Board approves of this gift to her for her faithful and successful work.
- (4.) That \$48 be paid to Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano of the Port Chester Italian Mission from the unexpended balance.
- (5.) That \$200 be paid for improvements on the Italian Mission property at Port Chester.
- (6.) That the \$52 balance be paid into the treasury of the committee.

There will be two general meetings of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions on the Tuesdays preceding the Spring and Fall Stated Meetings in the Railroad Young Men's Christian Association in New York.

Prime, our faithful and beloved Permanent Clerk Emeritus, in the great sorrow that has fallen upon him in the death of his devoted wife, Anne Ricards-Wolcott Prime, who died at Yonkers, N. Y., January 1, 1919, in her 78th year. On the death of her mother she became the foster-daughter of her grandfather, Calvin Wolcott, and changed her name to Anne Richards-Wolcott. She married General Ralph E. Prime in August, 1866. Eight children were born to them, of whom five are now living, the eldest child being the wife of the Rev. William Jessup, a missionary of the Board of Foreign Misssions at Beirut, Syria. May the God of all comfort richly sustain our dear brother in this time of lone-liness and grief.

The Presbytery also records its deep appreciation of the heroic deeds of Sergeant Donald P. Hunnewell, who paid the last full measure of service to his country September 28, 1918, and of Corporal Gordon C. Thurlow, who died of wounds, in France, August 4, 1918. Sergeant Hunnewell was the son of the late Rev. Frank S. Hunnewell of White Plains and was serving a machine gun at his death. Corporal Thurlow was a son of the Rev. H. Marshall Thurlow, of New Rochelle, in command of a machine gun squad at Chateau Thierry, where he was fatally wounded by the bursting of a German shell.

A commissioner from the church was heard, and the minutes of the congregation concurring in the request with resolutions were read. The request was granted to take effect May 1.
- 2. A call of the Pleasantville Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Lester H. Bent. It is in due form and stipulates an annual salary of \$1,800 with the free use of the manse and coal, and an annual vacation of four weeks. The commissioners of the congregation were heard and the minutes of the congregational meeting were read. Mr. Bent also expressed his willingness to accept the call. Your committee recommends and moves that the call be found in order and placed in his hand, and on his acceptance of the same the following be the order for his installation:

Time—May 7, 1919, 8.15 P. M. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—The Rev. James Everett Frame of the Presbytery of New York, to be invited; the Rev. Lewis Gaston Leary, alternate. Charge to the pastor—The Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt. Charge to the people—The Rev. George H. Smyth. Prayer of installation—The Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth. The session are empowered to fill any vacancies arising in this order.

The call was placed in Mr. Bent's hands and was accepted.

The Committee on the New Era Movement (p. 295), presented a report, which was received, and the recommendations bearing on the spiritual phase of the movement were adopted (see below).

Pending action on the remaining recommendations of the report, the reports of the Committees on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Vacancy and Supply were presented.

The report of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, which was received and adopted, is as follows:

The sub-committees on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Church Extension report at the Fall Stated Meeting, and that on Foreign Speaking Peoples at the Spring Stated Meeting.

Your committee calls attention to the fact that one new church makes appeal for aid, Mahopac Falls; the amount of aid cannot be determined at this meeting, but request will be cared for by the com-

Your committee recommend the employment of a presbyterial superintendent or evangelist, whose work shall be under the direction of the Committees on the New Era Movement, Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Vacancy and Supply.

The sub-committees of your committee, as at present organized are as follows: 1. Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, Rev. Murray H, Gardner, chairman; 2. Church Extension, Rev. Wendell Prime Keeler, chairman; 3. Foreign Speaking Peoples, Rev. Charles G. Sewall, chairman. The Rev. Herbert Barber Howe and the Rev. Lester H. Bent have been added to the committee.

The report of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply, which was received and adopted, is as follows:

The following churches have been vacaut all or part of the past year: Bedford, Croton Falls, Gilead, Harrison, White Plains, Mt. Kisco, Pleasantville, Pound Ridge, South East, Bryn Mawr Park and South Yonkers. South Salem has notified the committee of the pastor's resignation to be acted on at this meeting. South Yonkers, White Plains and Mt. Kisco have installed pastors, and Bryn Mawr Park hears a man shortly, who, it is hoped, will prove the man for the place. Pleasantville has called the Rev. Lester H. Bent.

Although your committee has an active list of applicants of some one hundred names and has written some three or four hundred letters regarding these vacancies, the primary problem must be solved first as to what can be done with the churches now vacant. This committee has no jurisdiction over churches beyond the pulpit problem. Under our rules no other committee or officer has any jurisdiction either, unless the church is aided by Presbytery.

Although Westchester County has increased 50 per cent, in population since 1875, and is now the most populous county in the state excepting the counties containing New York City and Buffalo, the rural communities in the central and northern part have lost population. The townships of Lewisboro, North Salem, Pound Ridge, Somers and Yorktown have declined. Some others have increased only because towns increased in population. Farms have been purchased by "city people" and turned into estates. Beautiful and expensive houses have been erected by these people and are occupied only in the summer. Farming in other places is not profitable and young men and women have gone to the cities. The New York water supply has flooded large areas. Our rural churches face a crisis. Some churches were given up long ago. Others need the advice and the best wisdom Presbytery can give.

Bedford has lost 30 per cent, in membership in twenty years, 50 per cent, in the Sunday School, and benevolent gifts have decreased 70 per cent. South Salem has lost 27 per cent, in membership, 67 per cent, in Sunday School, and 20 per cent, in benevolence. Mahopac Falls has lost 30 per cent, in membership, 70 per cent, in Sunday School and 64 per cent, in benevolence.

Bedford and South Salem both have good church buildings with manses and more or less land adjoining. The congregations are small. The Gilead Church at Carmel has a fine plant, church and manse in good condition. There are also in the village Methodist, Baptist and Catholic Churches, and an Episcopal service is held in a rented room. The population is 600 to 700, of which 300 to 400 are Catholics. Your committee cannot agree to encouraging these churches to call pastors, none of whom could receive proper support, either in money or in men and women to make such a pastorate a man's job. We have, therefore, recommended to our church

at Carmel a union of effort of the three churches, having one pastor, who need not be in ecclesiastical connection with either the Baptist, Methodist or Presbyterian churches, using such building for worship as is most suitable and using another as a community center, the churches to continue their separate corporate existence, and members would be received as at present. The combined churches could easily pay \$1,800 and manse, and a good sum of money be released for missionary objects.

The South Salem Church should be maintained as it is with the highest efficiency. There is no other Protestant Church with regular services from Katonah east to Ridgefield, Conn., a distance of a dozen miles, nor is there a church convenient north or south. The church, however, cannot raise the minimum salary fixed by Presbytery of \$1,200 and manse. We have suggested to South Salem and Bedford that they unite their fields into one parish. Both together would not offer too much work for one man. They are some twelve miles apart but are connected by a good state road. Both churches, however, want a morning service, which they now have, neither having an evening preaching service; and both want the minister to occupy their manse. If this arrangement cannot be made, possibly Croton Falls could be combined with South Salem.

The practical matter before your committee is this: What steps are justified toward securing pastors for these fields, when none of them can pay \$1,200 and manse, the minimum set by the Presbytery. Your committee cannot select a man from the long list of applicants, who would come for less than our minimum and who gives promise of filling the requirements of these difficult places. He must attract the summer residents from the city, and also those who live summer and winter in the neighborhood and on whom the real work of the church falls, and in addition be the inspiring leader of all community activities.

Shall your committee ignore your decision as to minimum salary and assist these churches to secure the best men available for what they can raise? Or shall your committee expect you, through the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions to vote enough money to each church to bring the salary up to the minimum? Does Presbytery care to invite the Country Life Department of the Board of Home Missions to make a study of these fields and seek a solution? Your committee is anxious to earry out your wishes, but just now does not seem to know what they are.

Your committee recommends and moves that appointments be made for churches without pastors as follows:

This Committee, appointed at the meeting of Presbytery last fall, has, by the authority of Presbytery, added the following members: *Ministers*—Charles L. Carhart, William Crawford, Harry B. Roberts and Henry Fairfield Watts; and *Elders*—Walter Thomas and Daniel H. McFalls.

The committee organized its work upon the group plan, dividing the Presbytery into six groups and placing over each group one of its members as leader.

The chief thing that occupied the attention of the Committee during the past three months has been the Victory Fund Campaign, although the movement had previously been inaugurated in some churches by Re-enlistment Day and Home Day in January.

There was apportioned to this Presbytery by the Committee of Synod for the Victory Fund a quota of \$90,594 for the New Era Benevolences. It is well to remember that the amount of this apportionment was handed down to your committee without any choice on their part and the causes that were included in it were determined by the Assembly's Committee and the Executive Commission. All argument as to what should be included in the quota of the churches is beside the mark, as far as this committee is concerned—it can include only those causes which were included by the New Era Committee of the Assembly.

To this quota for the New Era handed down to your committee, we added \$4,406 for the work within the bounds of the Presbytery, traking a total for the Presbytery of \$95,000, which by a single adjustment was later reduced to \$94,080. This quota was divided among the several churches upon the basis of the average total gifts for benevolences, as reported in the Assembly Minutes, for the last five years. These quotas were sent to the churches in the middle of February. The total amount asked for from each church included the amounts to be given for the New Era causes by the church, the women's societies, the Bible Schools, and all other organizations in the church.

The Women's Presbyterial Society, whose representatives, Mrs. A. C. McMillau and Mrs. Arthur Corning, worked with the Committee in the matter, sent a very carefully prepared schedule of gifts for their constituency, which was also sent to each church.

Definite reports are hard to get, so early in the movement. The chairman has done his best to get such a report from each church and has received one from every church with one exception. While the interpretation of the reports is at times difficult and there may have been included in the figures some gifts which are not for the New Era causes, the results show that the church has taken a great step forward, even if the whole quota may not have been reached.

Eighteen of the churches made their canvass during March or April; four of them had made such a canvass earlier in the year, while nine churches have tried to reach their quota in other ways or will so try. From the reports received there seems to be in sight a total of \$88,473. We are so near the goal that the committee feels that every effort should be made to reach it and we are planning to do what we can to bring the Presbytery up to its full quota.

Since the total quota was made up, several needs in the work Meeting, of the Presbytery have appeared and hence we believe that the quota April 22, 1919, asked for from the Presbytery should be a several needs in the work Meeting, asked for from the Presbytery should be raised to a total of \$97,-694 -making an additional amount over and above what seems to be promised of \$9,221.

But the New Era Movement was not entirely financial. Immediately after the Victory Drive there was an effort made by the committee to inspire the churches to make a special evangelistic effort for new church members, culminating in the Easter season. The reports of such a campaign are not complete, but we have had reported to us thus far a total of 277 new members added to our churches since the first of April.

Some of the lessons learned from the Movement thus far the committee feels should be mentioned.

- The value and efficiency of the Every Member Canvass plan for meeting the financial obligations of the church.
  - The value of the group plan for church organization.
- The value of setting definite goals for the work of the church.
- 4. The value of synchronizing our efforts, thus taking advantage of the inspiration of doing the same thing that thousands of others are doing at the same time.

But the New Era Movement is not over; we are not looking backward, but forward. That we may be ready to make the best of the opportunities that are before us, we offer the following resolutions:

- 1. Financial.—We recommend and move:
- 1. That Presbytery approves and adopts the budget suggested for the New Era benevolences and for presbyterial work, viz., \$97,694, \$7,100 of which shall be for work within the Presbytery and Synod, and that the committee be instructed to continue its efforts until that amount is raised, if possible.
- 2. That the amount asked for for presbyterial work be divided as follows, the same to be used only if necessary:

\$1,500 for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.

\$1,100 for Presbyterial Church Extension.

\$1,500 for the South Yonkers Church.

\$3,000 for the employment and expenses of a Presbyterial Ex-

ecutive Secretary.

- 3. That the churches be asked to take the amount asked for presbyterial work first from the quota raised and that the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions be authorized to make a new apportionment immediately for this amount and to send the same down to the churches.
- 4. That we again assert our conviction that the Every Member Canvass plan is the best plan yet found for meeting the financial obligations of the church.
- 5. That our churches be asked to so arrange their church fiscal year, if possible, so as to close the year with the month of March, thus making possible the simultaneous efforts such as the Victory Drive of this year.
- H. Spiritual.—We recommend and move:

- 1. That we reaffirm our belief in the supreme importance of the prayer life in the individual Christian, the family and the church and urge pastors and session to take such steps as are possible to maintain and develop it.
- 2. That we recommend the continuance of the effort for the winning of souls during the spring and summer months, suggesting the use of the group plan, the Church Service Banner and the development of personal evangelism.
- 3. That we urge every church to endeavor to continue the life and work of the church in full vigor both in its organizations and its services until at least Children's Day, June 8th, putting off the laxity of the summer as long as possible.
- 4. That we urge every church to take up some definite summer work, such as open air meetings, park meetings, vacation Bible schools, summer camps, etc.

## 111. Presbyterial.—We recommend and move:

That in consideration of the fact that the New Era Movement is a five-year program, Presbytery adopt for its own work, the following goals, to be accomplished on or before April 1, 1923.

- 1. The employment of a Presbyterial Executive Secretary to assist the Presbyterial and Synodical Missions Committee, the Committee on Vacancy and Supply and the New Era Committee, and for such other work as Presbytery shall deem best to be done by him.
- 2. The reorganization and development of the work of our churches so that every field, both old and new, within the bounds of the Presbytery shall be adequately cared for, either by a Presbyterian church or by one of some other denomination.
- 3. The securing of an adequate salary for every pastor, the minimum salary, as already decided by Presbytery, being \$1,200 with a manse, or \$1,600 without a manse.
- 4. An annual net increase in membership of ten per cent, for the whole Presbytery, or 46 per cent, by the end of the period.
- 5. The securing of at least 50 "life-enlistments" for distinctly religious service, either in the ministry, the mission fields, deaconess work, Y. M. C. A. or Y. W. C. A. work, or the like.
- 6. An every member canvass and a social visitation annually in every church.

# IV. Church Organization.-We recommend and move:

- 1. That we recommend to each church the group plan of church organization, i. e., that a careful list be made of those for whom the church is religiously responsible, that such a list be divided into groups and that there be placed over each group a leader, or leaders, who shall endeavor to win all the group to church membership and church service.
- 2. That we recommend that each church seek to appoint a chairman or committee for both education and for stewardship.
- 3. That we urge every pastor and session to carefully and prayerfully study their community and the parish responsibilities of the church, with the purpose of preparing an adequate program for the church the coming winter.

The Committee on Presbyterian and Synodical Missions, through its sub-committee, presented a report on work among Foreign-Speaking Peoples, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

There are six fields under care—two organized churches, the Italian Evangelical Church at New Rochelle, and the Hungarian Church in Yonkers; three missions among the Italians at Port Chester, White Plains and Pleasantville; and a mission among the Persians in Yonkers. The work at White Plains has been furnished by Elder Edwin A. Slosson at his own expense with portable chapel formerly used at Hartsdale, involving an expenditure of \$3,033 in all. The total membership reported, in the churches 233 and in the missions 283, is 516. Financial reports show the receipts \$2,462.73 and expenditures \$2,260.88 in the churches, and \$1,136.61 and \$1,159.06 respectively in the missions; making totals for both churches and missions, \$3,599.34 and \$3,419.94.

It is recommended and moved:

- 1. That an appropriation of \$4,500 be asked from the Coard of Home Missions.
  - 2. That under this appropriation
- (1.) The following grants be requested for salaries—Rev. Odoacre B. Villante, Italian Evangelical Church of New Rochelle, \$550; Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, Hungarian Presbyterian Church, in Yonkers, \$1,100; Rev. Abraham Shlemon, Persian Mission in Yonkers, \$600; Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, Italian Missions at Port Chester, White Plains and Pleasantville, \$1,150; Miss Mildred Payne, White Plains Italian Mission, \$600.
- (2.) That the \$100, paid to Mr. Cigliano by the White Plains Mission for services, be now assumed by the three fields as follows: Pleasantville, \$25; White Plains, \$25, and Port Chester, \$50; and that for the present these amounts be transmitted to the Board of Home Missions as over against the above appropriation.
- 3. That, in as much as no improvements upon the Port Chester Italian Mission property are contemplated just now, the balance of \$124.14 from the \$200 appropriated for such improvements (p. 270) be paid into the treasury of the committee until such time as the improvements shall have been made.
- 4. That \$50 be paid from the Home Board appropriation for 1919-1920 to Miss Mary E. Kellogg, whose health has been impaired by her labors in the Italian work at White Plains.
- 5. That the expenses of the committee be paid to date, and \$50 be appropriated for expenses of the committee in 1919-1920 from the Home Board appropriation.
- 6. That in view of the requirement of Presbytery of a salary for pastors of \$1,200 and manse, or \$1,600 without a manse (p. 199), the committee be authorized to co-operate with the Board of Home Missions in the realization of this recommendation on behalf of the missionaries among foreign speaking peoples.

The Committee on the South Yonkers Church (p. 267) presented a report, which was received, and is as follows:

At the June meeting (p. 260) it was voted to secure subscrip-

tions to the running expenses of the South Yonkers Church to the extent of \$1,500 annually for three years. This action was taken in view of the fact that the church is located in a section where the prospects are bright for building up a strong and useful organization, if the financial burdens, which now so greatly hamper its activities can be temporarily lightened. Thus the assistance rendered this church may be considered in the light of an investment in church extension.

The growth of the church during the past year seems to warrant the confidence placed in the situation by the above action of Presbytery. The Rev. A. Murray Porter was unanimously called as pastor and has been installed. The officers of the church report now that the church is progressing beyond their expectations. It is united in spirit and working with enthusiasm. The Sunday School has increased in attendance from 85 to 146. The weekly pledges for church support and benevolence are showing steady and encouraging increase. Sixteen new members were received at the last communion and twenty-seven were received at Easter. Mr. Porter has the loyal and affectionate support of the congregation.

Turning now to the way in which the churches of Presbytery have backed up their resolution of assistance by actual deeds, we find that fifteen churches have made contributions, one has written to the committee that it will be impossible to meet its allotment, while the rest have sent nothing, though committee assumes that it may expect the latter to participate in this enterprise to the amount named. If any church feels it cannot the committee asks that they be notified at once. Monthly payments of \$125 have been made by the treasurer of the committee to church beginning with December. To make the April payment the account was overdrawn to the amount of \$5, so that the committee can make no more payments unless the other churches of Presbytery immediately respond.

The chairmen of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, Vacancy and Supply, and New Era Movement, were appointed a committee to select a presbyterial superintendent and to present an outline of the duties of such superintendent and a plan for the direction of his activities.

The Committee on Every Member Canvass (p. 267) presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that during the period of the New Era Movement in our church at large that it be relieved from its duty and discharged.

The Committee on the New Era Movement was directed to present to the proper authorities a request that the Victory Banner be made to bear an upright cross in place of the slanting one in the banner now in use.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, and is as follows:

Regarding the candidates for the ministry, Eugene Meray's bealth has been seriously impaired and he has been obliged to give up his studies for the present and is now employed on a farm. Charles Papp is in the theological department of Bloomfield Seminary. He is doing good work. On Saturday and Sunday he does Sunday School work in New York City. Andrew F. Janowiczky has completed the academic course at Bloomfield and expects to enter college in the fall. John N. Cornwell, who was received as a candidate at the April meeting, 1918, has been in war service a year. He also expects to enter college in the fall with advance standing, being credited with a year's work for the time he studied in the Agricultural College of Cornell University. No reports have been received since the last meeting of Presbytery from R. Irving Barnett, Pietro Guiffrida and Arthur P. Dawson.

The Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That pastorless churches through the Missionary Committee or the Committee on Vacancy and Supply or in direct co-operation with the agencies of the church arrange to have some missionary causes presented to the congregation during such vacancies.
- 2. That the churches which have achieved their quota as assigned by the Committee on the New Era Movement be heartily congratulated, and those, who have not, be earnestly entreated to work toward it until they do.
- 3. That the chairman of the Committee on the New Era Movement be given the thanks of the Presbytery for his faithful and efficient service.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report, which was received, and is as follows:

The following figures are of particular interest:

- 1. Twenty-two churches out of 35 have sent in returns on their Temperance blanks.
- 2. Three hundred and ninety dollars have been contributed by our churches to the temperance work of our denomination; 17 churches have not so contributed.
- 3. Two churches have contributed to the temperance work of the denomination through their Sunday Schools, the amount being \$23.
- 4. Five churches have contributed to local temperance work, the amount being \$218.
- 5. Thirteen churches have contributed to outside temperance organizations, the amount being \$1.555.17. Of this amount, \$355.25 is reported as given to the Anti-Saloon League. It is probable that most of it went to that organization.

The Committee on Sessional Records presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee reports:

1. That the sessional records of the following churches were presented for review: Bedford, New Rochelle, Peekskill First, Peeks

skill Second, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Rye, Scarborough, South East Center, South Salem, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers First, Yonkers Hungarian, Yonkers South, Yonkers Westminster and Yorktown.

- 2. That the sessional records of the Pound Ridge, Scarsdale Hitchcock Memorial, and South East Churches, called for review, were not presented.
  - It is recommended and moved:
- (1.) That the sessional records of the Bedford, New Rochelle, Peekskill First, Peekskill Second, Pleasantville, Port Chester, Scarborough, South East Center, South Salem, White Plains, Yonkers Bryn Mawr Park, Yonkers Dayspring, Yonkers First, Yonkers Hungarian, Yonkers Westminster and Yorktown Churches be approved without exceptions.
- (2.) That the records of the South Yonkers Church be returned with direction that they be completed.
- (3.) That the records of the Rye Church be approved with the following exceptions:
- a. No record of any moderator at the meetings of May 6, June 8 and August 5.
- b. In four instances the minutes are unsigned, pp. 135, 136, 137 and 140.
- c. Ministers not members of this presbytery acted as moderator, pp. 137 and 138.

Recess was then taken until 2 p. m

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 p. m.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

The Rev. Herbert Barber Howe and Elder Joseph P.

King, Jr., were appointed tellers of votes for Commissioners to the General Assembly.

A conference was held under the leadership of the Rev. Anthony N. Petersen, at which the Narrative was presented by the Narrator, the Rev. Thomas C. Straus, and was followed by a discussion. The Narrative is as follows:

This narrative is compiled from the reports of twenty-five churches. No reports have come from Bedford, Croton Falls, Harrison, Hitchcock Memorial, Irvington, Katonah, Mt. Kisco, Pound Ridge, Sonth East.

The points of view for our survey are the several heads of the narrative blank under which are grouped 126 questions, which each church is asked.

1. Church Membership and Services.—The number of members reported this year to the General Assembly is 8,763; there have been added on examination 229; on certificates, 242; the largest number

of additions on examination is 30; the smallest is one. One church reports no additions on examination.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 22, 1919.

Two regular services on the Lord's Day are the rule. Three churches have but one. The morning service is for the most part well attended; only a few chuches report good attendance at the second service, whether held in the evening or the afternoon.

Nine churches have been without a pastor for part or all of the year, either because of vacancy or through the absence of the pastor on war work; but all such churches have been supplied in the meanwhile.

Each church holds a communion service from four to seven times a year. From 30 to 60 per cent, of the members attend these services; in one case all the residents attend; the average is 53 per cent.

Weekly prayer meetings are held in 19 churches. The percentage of attendance ranges from 1 to 25. The average is 10. Six churches report no prayer meeting. The methods found most helpful in stimulating interest in the prayer meeting are persistent work by the minister's cabinet; discussions; special series of subjects dealt with in lecture form; getting nearly all present to take part; consecutive Bible exposition; illustrated talks; Bible study; gospel message, book study and conference; Bible study conducted on the plan of an informal conference; discussion and study group; Bible study class method; courses on some religious book, or great books; war speeches; "sings"; union services with the Episcopal Church; illustrated missionary lectures; one church says the pastor has a selective method all his own. As this church reports a twenty-five per cent, attendance at its prayer meeting, it is hoped that that pastor will tell what his method is.

In the majority of cases when members of a church move to other communities the Session notifies churches in such communities, but the practice is not as general as the proper oversight of members requires.

II. Religious Education and Young Peoples' Work.—Committees of the Session for supervising the educational work of the church in all departments are reported in 8 churches; the importance of the religious training of children is presented in sermons or otherwise in all of the churches, as a rule. There is general fidelity on the part of Christian parents in presenting their children for baptism. With six exceptions the requirements of the Directory of Worship, Chap. X, Sec. 1, are carried out so as to make clear the relationship of baptized children to the Church.

Only six churches have annual Decision Days, when an effort is made to induce the children and youth personally to profess Christ; some doubt the wisdom of this method; some make every Sunday a decision day.

Classes of instruction preparatory to the Communion are held in 18 churches. Sabbath School pupils to the number of 127 were received into church membership on examination; of these, 104 had been baptized in infancy.

Work outside the Sunday School and young people's societies is done for boys in t6 churches; and for girls in 13 churches. This work is social, religious, educational, literary and athletic. The

leading form of organization for boys is the "Boy Scouts"; for girls, the "Camp Fire Girls"; there are also the "Knights of King Arthur" for boys; and clubs for boys and for girls.

In most of the churches effort is made to adapt the regular services to the religious needs and interests of the children and vouth of the congregation. This is usually done by special services and sermons; one pastor reports that his sermon is formulated so that all can understand.

The percentage of young people in attendance at these services ranges from 10 to 50. The average is 20.

111. The Subbath School.—The church schools reported number 25; branch schools, 1; union schools, 1; mission schools, 4; total, 31. Of these schools, 5 teach the Shorter Catechism; 3 the Intermediate; 8 have teacher training classes; of which 2 are enrolled at headquarters; 16 have teachers' meetings or workers' conferences; most or all use the lesson helps or the papers issued by the Board of Publication.

Organized Bible classes exist in 12 schools to the number of 58; 35 are intermediate; 14 senior; 9 adult. Men are in adult Bible classes to the number of 302; practically all of these attend church.

An annual community canvass for new scholars is made by 4 schools; libraries for general reading in 9; home departments exist in 16 schools; the total enrollment of these departments is 644; the aggregate membership of the schools, not including home departments and cradle rolls is 4,135. Gains amounting to 185 are reported by 9 schools; losses amounting to 36 by 2 schools; other schools report losses without giving figures; the figures given make net gains amounting to 149.

IV. Young Peoples' Work.—Junior societies exist in 10 churches; intermediate in 6; senior in 17; the general condition of these societies is for the most part good and their influence described as helpful and beneficial to the life of the church. Three senior societies are engaged in special study and training for Christian service and Church leadership through mission study classes; 1 through classes in social service; 2 through classes in personal work. There are junior mission bands in 4 churches; Westminster Guilds in 5. Young people to the number of 14 are in our denominational schools and colleges; 156 in other institutions.

V. Evangelism.—Negative answers for the most part are given to the questions regarding evangelism. Some of the churches have held services during Holy Week, but special evangelistic services are reported by only one and the results of such efforts in accessions are 0: in the improvement of spiritual conditions in the church and community, one pastor writes: "We have strengthened the spiritual tone." In view of these meagre facts it is scarcely necessary to add that the men of the churches are not organized for this work.

V1. The Community.—Systematic studies of their neighborhoods have been made by 3 churches; of these, 2 have had regard to races and nationalities represented; 2, social conditions; 2, industrial conditions; 3, religious conditions. In 10 churches effort has been made to interest the church people in neighborhood problems. Five have men's societies for this work, with an aggregate of 175 members. Other agencies of the churches engaged in forms of

community work are women's or girls' societies, the Red Cross and the officers of the church.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 22, 1919.

In 17 churches the members support the local Y. M. C. A., in 10 the Y. W. C. A., in 14 the local temperance work, in 2 vacation Bible schools; in 8, playgrounds; in 2, settlements; in 4, rural community organizations.

During the year 50 members of our churches have volunteered for or entered lines of distinctive Christian service as a career, as follows: The ministry, 2; Home or Foreign Missionary work, 3; the Y. M. C. A., 24; the Y. W. C. A., 10; settlement or philanthropic work, 11.

VII. Missions and Benevolence.—Sessions as a rule give opportunity to the congregations to contribute regularly to every Board during the year. The Every Member Plan recommended by the General Assembly has been carried out, by personal visitation by all of the reporting churches, except 2, and opportunity is also given to the people to contribute to causes not provided for in the church benevolence budget. Systematic instruction is given in the work of the boards and benevolent agencies of the church by lectures, sermons, leaflets and other publications. Where the every member plan is not used, the method of personal calls and subscriptions is used.

The New Era Movement has been entered heartily by most of the churches and those who have not done so promise to do so soon, with scarcely an exception. The results in some instances have been more than asked for; in some instances, it is too early to report results.

The Sunday Schools contribute to the church boards as follows: To all, 2 schools; to Home Missions, 19; Foreign Missions, 18; Education, 3; Freedmen, 10; Publication and Sunday School Work, 14; Ministerial Relief, 3; Synodical Aid, 1; Temperance, 4; Clurch Erection, 2; Colleges, 2.

The poor of the church are provided for through deacons' funds, session funds and communion offerings or through women's societies or personal aid. General charity is provided for by local organizations and by sessions' and deacons' funds or women's societies.

VIII. Finance.—Church expenses are always fully met and in almost every case, promptly met. Mortgage indebtedness rests upon 10 churches, to the amount of \$106,750. Benevolences are administered by the Sessions in all the churches; the two funds for church support and benevolence are kept distinct in all but 2; with separate treasurers in all but 8. Remittances to the boards are made annually, semi-annually, quarterly or monthly by the several churches.

The offerings of 9 Sunday Schools are for benevolences only; of 16, partly for benevolences and partly for self support.

The income for church support is derived from pew rents in one church; from envelope contributions in 18 churches; from both in 4 churches.

The total number of systematic contributors in 22 churches last year was 4,740; for church support 3,643; for benevolence, 2,559. Manses are owned by 16 churches.

IX. The Nation.—The 25 reporting congregations of this Presbyterv furnished 1,111 persons to the service of the United States, as follows: The Army, 474; the Navy, 258; Y. M. C. A., 39; Y. W. C. A., 9; Red Cross, 49; Officers, 100.

As to the influence of the war upon spiritual conditions in the churches, answers vary. About half of them regard the influence of the war as in some degree beneficial—"Quickened, I think," "Has increased zeal for spiritual development"; "Has intensified it; Prayers more definite for boys in service and world peace"; "Influence has been towards increased interest"; "Favorable in deepening spirit of earnestness"; "It has apparently deepened the spiritual life of the church. I believe that people are willing to give more liberally of themselves and their money than before the war"; "There has been a deepening of the spiritual life of our people"; "The war has deepened the spiritual life of the church"; "Perhaps a deepening of our thought on things spiritinal"; "Helpful"; "A decided impetus to all lines of church activity"; "A general spirit of earnestness"; "The war has stimulated spiritual interest and bound us closer together." Thus twelve of the reporting churches. Now come answers of an opposite tenor. One says laconically, "Detrimental." A second—"Distracting. Attendance not so good. People too busy to do their usual church work." A third-"Bad, as war always is bad on religious conditions. The returning soldier does not return to the church and can scarcely be dragged there. In most cases his contribution of personality is uil." Still a different tone is that of uncertainty. One says: "No marked effect, but we have put much energy in war work of all kinds." Another, "Our church without a pastor for twenty-one months is in no position to judge, except that but for the war he would still be with us." Another says briefly, "Hard to tell," and the rest, or about onethird the entire number, make no effort at reply.

The facts in this survey which call for special consideration seem to your narrator to be these:

- 1. Additions to the churches on examination are fewer than those on certificate.
- 2. Church attendance on the part of the great majority of the people is confined to the morning service on the Lord's Day.
- 3. The communion service is attended by little more than half of the members of the church.
- 4. Nearly one-fourth of the reporting churches have no weekly prayer meeting; and in the churches that have a prayer meeting an average of nine-tenths of the members fail to attend it.
- 5. More than half of the members received on examination are pupils from the Sabbath School; yet with the increase of accessible population indicated by additions by letter, only nine schools report a gain in membership and a number report a loss.
- 6. Evangelistic effort through special services for the purpose has almost entirely ceased.
- 7. Of those from the churches who offer themselves for distinctive Christian service as a career, only one out of twenty-five chooses the gospel ministry.
- 8. While the churches make a good financial showing, the number of systematic contributors to church support is only one-third

of the membership; the number of contributors to benevolences is no more than one-sixth of the membership.

9. The New Era Movement promises well for the treasury of the Church; what it holds in store for the progress of vital religion has yet fully to appear. May consecration of the purse bring with it consecration of the personality.

The Rev. Ernest J. Houghton was received by letter from the Presbytery of Chicago, and it was ordered that his name be enrolled.

The Committee of Arrangements presented a report recommending that the Rev. Alfred R. Ehman be heard in connection with the New Era Movement and also that recess be taken at 12:30 p. m. The report was received and the recommendations adopted.

The Committee on the South Youkers Church (p. 309) presented a report, which was received.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee respectfully reports as follows:

Call of the Bryn Mawr Park Church of Yonkers.—It is for the pastoral services of the Rev. Ernest J. Houghton just received by Meeting, Presbytery, and stipulates a salary of \$2,500 per annum, with the June 17, 1919. free use of a manse and an annual vacation of four weeks. The call is in due form and is signed by a committee appointed for the purpose. The commissioners have been heard.

- It is recommended and moved:
- 1. That the call be found in order and placed in Mr. Houghton's hands.
- 2. That, if accepted, the following arrangements for the installation be made:

Time.—June 24, 8 P. M. To preside and profound the constitutional questions—the Moderator. Sermon.—The Rev. Wendell Prime Keeler. Charge to the pastor—the Rev. Edgar P. Hill of the Presbytery of Chicago, to be invited. Charge to the people— the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan. Prayer of installation—the Rev. Ernest Glen Wood.

The call was then placed in Mr. Houghton's hands and accepted.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report on Sunday Schools, which was received, and is as follows:

In numbers the schools continue to show a decrease even from the figures of last year, from which the report from one school was missing. The enrollment is 6,079 instead of 6,414, a falling off of 335, or more than 5%. Average attendance, which is more significant, is 3,624 instead of 4,101, a decrease of 477, or more than 11%. In the last two years the decrease has been a little more than onesixth.

A new school, Hope Chapel, in Tarrytown, is reported by the session of the Irvington Church.

Twenty-three of the 35 schools reporting to your committee have given \$3,618 for the support of the school and the church. No information is reported as to the number of churches including in their financial budget a provision for the support of the school.

Sixteen schools do not have an annual election of officers. In this matter the session has the duty of supervision and the right of appointment.

Seventeen schools report separate classrooms. Of the two church buildings most recently erected the newer provides for the Sunday School twelve classrooms, the other two. One session reports the need and hope of a new and larger building for its school. "The classroom is the unit of architecture for the graded school, "The classroom is the unit of architecture for the graded lessons." Separate rooms for the beginners' department and the primary department are essential. For the junior department they are desirable, as they are for the classes of the older grades, though makeshifts of privacy are more tolerable here.

What do they learn? Concerning the curriculum the only information furnished by the report is that 23 schools are using the Westminster helps. Missionary education is given in 26 schoots, supplemented in 11 cases each by a mission study class, or one or more missionary societies of boys or girls. Eight have a special Intermediate Meeting, June 17, 1919, missionary committee, and 11 instruct in systematic giving. Other expressional activities associated with the schools are 18 societies for boys, mainly Boy Scout Troops; the Knights of King Arthur, the Pioneers and other clubs are also found. Young People's Societies exist in 22 congregations. In 9 there is also a junior society. Such societies may well be co-ordinated with the Sunday School, and perhaps departmentally graded.

The offerings of the schools for all objects amount to \$10,729, a decrease of \$1,327, or 11% from last year. Offerings for the Boards are \$4,326, \$277 or about 7% more than last year. For the largest part of the decrease is in "other objects," which made the strong appeal in war time.

Spiritual results are indicated by the accessions to the communicant membership of the churches. Twenty-eight schools report 554 pupils received into full communion, a number which is 15% of the average attendance. This percentage is more than twice that of last year.

How shall they learn? Eighteen schools report libraries. To be thoroughly furnished schools should have and use good books of Biblical, religious and missionary education.

Twenty-two schools are graded more or less, 11 of them departmently only, 11 in all departments. Our Board is committed to the grading by departments. Are the theoretical advantages of close grading realized by our schools that use it? Is grading by departments a stage or a goal?

In 16 schools organized classes are reported with 820 members, almost evenly divided between adult and secondary pupils. Communicants' classes are reported in 20 schools. They are mostly led by the pastor.

None of our schools has attempted the daily vacation Bible School. Nor have any of us sought public school credit for Bible study. Happy the school that is prepared to face an unbiased judgment on its work. Pupils prefer the school, the class, the teacher that insists on good order and demand definite mensurable achievement.

The crux of the Sunday School problem is the teacher. If we are to have a supply of fit teachers we must prepare them by training. Nine schools report teacher training classes. Three use the Westminster courses. Others use Dr. Schauffler's Training of the Teacher, W. C. Barclay's Standard Manual or Margaret Slattery's Talks with the Training Class. The Hitchcock Memorial Church had a course of lectures by Dr. Milton S. Littlefield. Teacher training will not produce religious effectiveness, nor guarantee spiritual results. But, if the teacher is a man of God it will help materially to render him thoroughly furnished to every good work.

The Committee on Education and Examinations also presented a report on young people's work, which was received.

The Missionary Committee presented a report on the Freedmen, which was received.

The special committee appointed to select a presbyterial superintendent and to present an outline of his duties of

such superintendent with a plan for the direction of his Intermediate activities (p. 310) presented a report, which was received. Meeting, June 17, 1919,

Pending its consideration a recess was taken at 12:30 p. 111.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

The unfinished business was taken up and the recommendations of the report were adopted. They are as follows:

Your committee recommend and move:

- 1. That Presbytery secure the services of a new officer to be known as the Executive Secretary of the Presbytery of Westchester.
- 2. That the duties of the Executive Secretary shall be to act as the agent of the Presbytery of Westchester for the following committees:
- (1.) Presbyterial and Synodical Missions—a, Church Extension, including the survey and rearrangement of local fields; b, Work among Foreign-speaking Peoples; c, Oversight over all aid-receiv-
- (2.)Vacancy and Supply—oversight and assistance of vacant churches.
- (3.) The New Era Movement—a, the budget of the New Era Movement; b, Evangelistic Work; c, the New Era Plans for the churches; d, Inter-church World Movement, if adopted.
- (4.) That the work of the Executive Secretary shall be under the supervision and be directed by a Committee on General Missions to be composed of the Moderator as Chairman, the next-preceding Moderator, the Stated Clerk, and the chairmen of the Committees on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, Vacancy and Supply, and the New Era Movement.
- (5.) In general his duty shall be to work under the supervision of the Committee on General Missions in carrying out the plans of the above committees and such other work as Presbytery shall assign to him.
- 5. That Presbytery combine into one fund to be known as the fund for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, the two funds now known as Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Church Extension and all monies received for the Executive Secretary, said combined fund to be held by the present treasurer of the funds for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and Church Extension, Mr. William J. Yates, or his successor, and to be used at the order of the Committee or General Missions.
- 6. That the churches of Presbytery be asked to send at the end of each quarter, before the benevolent funds then on hand are divided among the various boards and other benevolent agencies, ten per cent. (10%) of the funds in their benevolent treasury to the treasurer of the Fund for Presbyterial Missions.

Intermediate Meeting, June 17, 1919, 7. That this plan do not become operative before October 1, 1919, and that it be tried for a period of not less than three years.

8. That the Stated Clerk be instructed to make such changes in the standing rules of Presbytery as may be necessary to harmonize them with this action and to report at the next meeting of Presbytery.

It was ordered that the recommendations of the above report be printed and sent to all the elders of our churches.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved:

- 1. That a reduction of the mortgage at the Italian Mission property on Slater Street, Port Chester, from \$2,500 to \$2,000, be authorized.
- 2. That the Rev. Abraham Tamraz, a member of the Presbytery of Urumiah, Persia, be appointed stated supply of the Assyrian Mission of Yonkers, in place of the Rev. Abraham Shlemon, who has been obliged to return to his Persian home on account of the sufferings of his family incident to the war.

The Rev. Abraham Tamraz was received from the Presbytery of Urumiah without certificate of dismission, and, on the recommendation of our American missionaries, because that presbytery has been unable to hold any meetings during the past three years on account of the war.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, which was received.

The Rev. Alfred R. Ehman, of the Presbytery of Morris and Orange, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Committee on the New Era Movement (p. 306) presented a report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved:

- 1. The New Era Movement.—That pastors urge their young people to assume their part in the reconstruction task of our churches by having their societies (Intermediate and Young People's) become "Companies of the New Era," and by having individual society members enroll with Young People's Work, Witherspoon Building, Philadelphia, subscribing to the fourfold covenant of prayer, study, service and giving to the furtherance of the Kingdom among our young people. (Literature available upon request.)
- 2. Organizing Young People's Societies.—That pastors and church sessions co-operate with leaders among the young people of the church in making a careful study of the present situation as regards young people's societies to the end that
- (1.) Churches now without expressional organizations for Juniors, Intermediates and Young People make diligent effort to or-

ganize such societies, specializing by using distinct boys' organizations and girls' organizations for Intermediates, if desired.

- (2.) Where but one Young People's Society exists, the organizations for the other ages be established.
- (3.) In all Young People's Society development, there be careful correlation with the Sunday School work.
- 3. A Yearly Goal.—That Intermediate and Young People's Societies adopt as a yearly goal the "Presbyterian Young People's Societies' Program," issued by Young People's Work of our Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, as a very practical program of service and the best foundation upon which to build the work of the New Era. (Literature available upon request.)
- 4. Denominational Loyalty.—That pastors urge all Young People's Societies, Junior, Intermediate and Young People's, to express their loyalty to their denomination by a yearly gift to the support of Young People's Work of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work in accordance with the recommendations of the General Assembly. (Literature available on request.)
- 5. Leadership Training.—That each church avail itself of the opportunity to provide a better trained leadership in Young People's Societies by sending a delegation of carefully chosen young people to a Presbyterian Summer Conference, and Winter Institute, wherever such gatherings are accessible. (Literature available on request.)

The Missionary Committee presented an additional report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

The adoption of the following resolution is recommended and moved:

Resolved. That the Westchester Presbytery approving the work of education and evangelization among the negroes as evidence during fifty years of progress, conscious of the present emergency through the large migration of negroes from the southern to the northern states and the responsibility, thus laid upon us, and deploring the un-American spirit of batred manifest in recent acts of outrage and lynching, records its sense of the justice of the cause of the negro, its commendation of our Board of Freedmen and its work, and its attitude of fraternal interest toward the colored churches within our bounds and readiness to assist in any practical way.

The Rev. Alfred R. Ehman was then heard on the New Era Movement.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Presbytery set aside Sunday, October 12, as a day of general exchange of pulpits in this presbytery, that the Committee on the New Era Movement be authorized to make assignments for such exchange, and that the expenses of such exchange be paid by the treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.

The following minute, which the Stated Clerk was instructed to send to our representatives at Washington, was adopted: Intermediate Meeting, June 17, 1919, The Presbytery of Westchester representing Presbyterian Churches in Westchester and Putnam Counties with a membership of over 10,000 communicants, respectfully protests against any repeal or modification of the U. S. Food Law prohibiting the sale of wine and beer, which becomes effective on July 1 next.

A vote of thanks was extended to Elder Jay R. Decatur, our host, and the ladies who assisted him in entertaining Presbytery.

The minutes of today's sessions were read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the Presbyterian Church, Rye, N. Y., Monday, October 6, 1919.

The call for the meeting was read.

The request of the Rev. A. Raymond Eckels for dismission to the Presbytery of Monmouth was granted.

A brief historical sketch of the Tennent Church was read and ordered spread on the minutes. It is as follows:

William Tennent (1673-1746) had emigrated from Ireland to America in 1716. He was in episcopal orders, but was of Scotch-Irish stock, and had married Catherine Kennedy, the daughter of Special Meeting, Sept. 15, 1919 an eminent Presbyterian minister. In 1718 he renounced the prelatic forms of government and worship and was admitted without reordination into the Synod (American Church History—Presbyterians, p. 30. Robert Ellis Thompson, D.D.)

The minister called (to the Bedford Church) in 1720 was the Rev. William Tennent. The town by public vote gave him a farm by Cantatoe, where his four sons, Gilbert, William, John and Charles, all of whom achieved distinction, grew to manhood. After serving the church seven years, he went to Philadelphia (Ms. History of Bedford, by James Wood).

In 1726 William Tennent became pastor at Neshaminy, Pa., although he was never formally installed. Impressed by the lack of educational facilities for the young men growing up around him, he crected, in 1728, a log house, the famous "Log College," wherein he taught three of his four sons and a number of other youth, several of whom afterwards rose to eminence in the church. Log College was the first of the literary and theological institutions of the Presbyterian Church in America. Knowledge of his life and his college is in good part derived from Whitefield's Journal, which shows his apostolic character (New Schaff-Herzog, XI, 299.)

Rev. John Tennent, saintly man and effective preacher, was the pastor in the new meeting house on White Hill. He was educated in the Latin School at Neshaminy, Pa., founded by his father, Rev. William Tennent, Sr., which was called the Log College (A brochure on the old Tennent Church, p. 4).

Rev. William Tenneut, brother of John, was pastor in this new church on White Hill from 1733 until it was replaced by the larger and present one in 1751 (*Idem*, p. 4).

Here (in the present building) Rev. William Tennent continued his pastorate, preaching in its unique pulpit with the great sounding board overhanging, until he died in 1777. He was buried beneath the middle of the floor of the church. Presumably because of his strong support of the colonists' cause, it was feared that his grave in the open yard might be molested by English sympathizers in these troublous times. A marble tablet was reared to his memory in 1818, being set on the inner side of the wall of the church (Idem, pp. 5 and 6.)

The Stated Clerk was directed to accompany Mr. Eckels', letter of dismission with an expression of the pleasure which Presbytery takes in recommending him to the Presbytery of Monmouth to take charge of this historic church.

The minutes were read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet at Rye, N. Y., Monday, October 6, 1919.

- 2. That a new rule be adopted to be known as 22a, as follows:
- 22a. The Executive Secretary shall act as the agent of the Presbytery in carrying out the plans of the committees on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, Vacancy and Supply, and the New Era Movement, and such other work as Presbytery may assign to him under the supervision of the Committee on General Missions.
- 3. That a new rule to be known as 38b, to read as follows, be adopted:

38b. A Committee on General Missions shall be appointed to be composed of the Moderator as chairman, the next preceding

Moderator, the Stated Clerk and the chairmen of the committees on Fall Stated Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, Vacancy and Supply, and the Meeting, New Era Movement.

Oct. 7, 1919

4. That a new rule to be known as 68a, to read as follows, be adopted:

68a. Each church shall at the end of each quarter, before the benevolent funds then on hand are divided among the various boards and other benevolent agencies, send ten per cent. of the funds in their benevolent treasury to the treasurer of the funds for Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.

It was ordered that a committee consisting of the Stated and Permanent Clerks be instructed to investigate and report at the next intermediate meeting the possibility of altering the schedule of regular and special meetings of Presbytery and all conferences within its bounds, so that the business portions of such meetings may be held at hours when it will be possible for elders and other business men to attend.

The Commissioners to the General Assembly presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Attention is called to the following deliverances of the General Assembly:

- 1. Minutes of the General Assembly, 1919, p. 166, Presbyteries are to exercise special care in the election of members of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply.
- 2. P. 166. Adequate ministerial support in view of the present economic conditions.
- 3. P. 266. More earnest cultivation of the spiritual life of ministers, officers and members of the church in view of the enlarged opportunities and obligations of the new times.
- 4. P. 265. The propriety of assigning a period of at least one hour, at the morning session, for the narrative, accompanied with praise and prayer.
- 5. P. 291. Except in unusual and exceptional circumstances, Presbyteries are to ordain only those men who have had a full course of college and seminary training.
- 6. P. 241. Presbyteries are reminded of the duty to correspond annually with army and navy chaplains.

The Committee on the South Yonkers Church (p. 322) presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Your committee reports its receipts to date, \$1,450. It has paid to the South Youkers Church \$1,375 and for typing, postage, etc., \$2.50, making a total of disbursements of \$1,377.50, leaving a balance on hand, \$72.50.

3. The reports of the Treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions were also referred to the committee for audit (p. 335). It is recommended and moved that they be

approved.

- 4. There was referred to your committee a motion appropriating money from the treasury of Presbytery to pay the expenses of correspondence of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply (p. 333). It is recommended and moved that a sufficient sum be appropriated to reimburse the committee for past expenditures and that in the future these expenses be a fixed charge upon the treasury of Presbytery.

- 1. That the chairman of the Committee on Social Service be added to this committee.
- 2. That all matters dealing with the various boards and agencies of the church and all matters which have hitherto come under the direction of the various committees of the Presbytery, even though they originate from the New Era Headquarters in New York, be referred to the appropriate committee for action thereon.
- 3. That the assignments for the day of pulpit exchange on Sunday, October 12, be approved.
- 4. That pastors be urged to secure as large a delegation as possible to the New Era Institutes to be held on Tuesday, October 14, at Yonkers, on Wednesday, October 15, at New Rochelle, and on Thursday, October 16, at White Plains.
- 5. That, in view of the holding of these institutes, the usual Day of Prayer be omitted this year.

The end came suddenly on July 7, 1919. During the summer services have been maintained according to the wishes of the church and arrangements are being made for the future service there of the Rev. Arthur Requa.

The Rev. Ernest Glen Wood has taken up the work at South Salem, and the committee entertains the highest hopes of his ministry there.

We have welcomed back the Rev. Aubrey C. Ross after his absence in war work and Bedford rejoices in his decision to take up the work he was doing so well there.

Carmel has been under the able ministry of the Rev. Thomas C. Straus as a temporary supply and adviser. No arrangement has been made for calling a pastor.

Croton Falls is vacant. Mr. Chilton has ceased his services.

Harrison has been supplied by a student in the Methodist Seminary. Such work is not constructive, as the proper time could not be devoted to the field, and your committee is trying to assist the church in finding a pastor.

- 3. That the Board of Home Missions be requested to make a survey of work to be done for the Italians of Mt. Kisco and Katonah.
- 4. That the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt represent Presbytery at the meeting of Synod's Home Mission Committee.

The Business Committee presented a final report, which was received, adopted, and is as follows:

1. A call of the Mahopac Falls Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Arthur Requa was referred to your committee (p. 332). The call is in due form; was unanimously voted at a duly called meeting of the congregation, held September 28, 1919, moderated by the Rev. Thomas C. Straus; is signed by the elders and trustees as appointed by the congregational meeting; and attested by the Moderator.

The salary stipulated is nine hundred dollars per annum, with four weeks' vacation and the free use of the manse. It is expected that this will be supplemented by a grant by the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodial Missions of \$200. The minutes of the congregational meeting have been presented and the commissioners heard.

Your Committee recommend and move:

(1). That, inasmuch as aid to the amount of \$200 has been granted on the recommendation of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, and that Mr. Requa is receiving enough from other religious work to make his total salary at least eual to the minimum required by Presbytery (p. 199), the call be found in order and placed in his hands.

(2). That in case Mr. Requa accepts the call, the following order for his installation be adopted:

The Stated Clerk presented a report on communications, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

- 1. Attention is called to the change in the date of this meeting. It was appointed for the 20th of this month. Accommodations could not be secured for that date, and in accordance with Standing Rule 5a it was changed to the 28th, and notice therefor was issued. On account of the increase of business of the Home and Foreign Boards they find it difficult to accommodate us longer for meetings of presbytery or even of its committees. It is therefore recommended and moved that a committee, with the Moderator as chairman, be appointed to investigate the situation, report to be made at the Spring Stated Meeting.
- 2. There has been referred to the Business Committee the following papers:
- (1.) A call of the Gilead Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. John J. McClelland.

The Rev. Milton S. Littlefield, of the Manhattan Congregational Association, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

A call of the Harrison Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. William Bulloch of the Presbytery of Monmouth has been referred to your committee. The call is in due form, is signed by the elders and trustees and attested by the Moderator, the Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth. The salary stipulated is \$1,800 a year with \$200 additional a year for rent—until such time as a manse shall be secured, with a vacation of one month each year. The commissioners were heard and the minutes of the congregational meeting were read. It is recommended and moved that the call be found in order and placed in the hands of Mr. Bulloch; and that, if the way be clear, the following order of installation be adopted:

Time.—March 3, at 8 p.m. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—the Rev. Charles G. Sewall. Sermon—the Rev. Robert Watson of the Presbytery of New York, to be invited; the Rev. Charles L. Carhart, alternate. Charge to the pastor—the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt; the Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth, alternate. Charge to the people—the Rev. Lester H. Bent; the Rev. Charles G. Sewall, alternate. Prayer of installation—The Rev. Louis A. Lindemuth. It is also recommended and moved that the session be empowered to fill vacancies.

The Rev. William Bulloch was received from the Presbytery of Monmouth and it was ordered that he be enrolled.

The call of the Harrison Church was then placed in his hands, and accepted by him.

The special committee appointed to revise schedules of meetings (p. 339) presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted, and is as follows:

Your committee find that the so-called popular meeting of the Monday evening of the stated meetings has ceased to be popular either with the members of this presbytery or the congregations of the churches where the meetings are held, and speakers who are invited to make addresses find small audiences.

Your committee, therefore, recommends and moves

1. That the so-called popular meeting on Mouday evening be omitted at the next stated meeting and that the evening be given to the most important business of this presbytery and its churches,

Intermediate Meeting Jan. 28, 1920 merely routine administrative business being assigned to other sessions.

- 2. That the officers and members of the church, where the meeting is held, and of the nearby churches be invited and urged to attend and take part in the discussions.
- 3. That the devotional service of Tuesday morning be discontinued, and in its stead such a service be held at the end of the morning session for half an hour.
  - 4. That all conflicting standing orders be repealed or amended.
- 5. That the committee be continued to further consider the schedules and to report such further changes, as may seem wise.

The Rev. Milton S. Littlefield, by invitation, addressed the Presbytery on Near East Relief.

The Committee on General Missions (p. 343) presented a report, which was received and its recommendations were adopted, and are as follows:

- 1. That the name of this committee be changed to the Executive Committee of Presbytery.
- 2. That the fiscal year of the Committee on Prebyterial and Synodical Missions be changed so as to end March 31.
- 3. That the expenses of the members of the Executive Committee be paid from the funds of Presbytery upon demand of the chairman of the committee.
- · 4. That the treasurer of this committee be elected annually by Presbytery at its Spring Stated Meeting.
- 5. That the treasurer of this committee and the treasurer of the Trustees of Presbytery become, ex-officio, members of the Executive Committee.
- 6. That the Executive Committee be given authority to fill any vacancies in the committee, such appointment to be effective only until the next ensuing regular meeting of Presbytery.
- 7. That the engagement of the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt as Executive Secretary (p. 343) for a term of three years begin February 1, at a salary of \$3,000 a year, payable monthly, with an annual vacation of one month.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report, which was received, and its recommendations adopted as follows:

- 1. Resolved, That as a Presbytery and as churches we set ourselves to the supreme task for the coming months of winning souls for the Master, culminating in the Easter ingathering.
- 2. Resolved, That in order that the mind of the people may be given most heartily and entirely to this great task, we recommend

to our churches, as far as possible, they accept the recommendation of the Interchurch World Movement, the New Era Movement and the Executive Commission of the General Assembly, to postpone their annual financial canvass and every-member drive until the dates April 21 to May 2.

- 3. That wherever possible and expedient, we urge our pastors to take steps to bring about such co-operation of the evangelical churches of their communities that this financial canvass may be, as far as possible, representative of a united Protestantism.
- 4. That the Stated Clerk be instructed to communicate this action to the churches as soon as possible.

The Business Committee presented a second report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

- 1. An overture of the General Assembly proposing an amendment to Section 114 of the Book of Discipline, providing for the issue of certificates of good standing to members of churches to enable them to establish affiliate membership in churches in places to which they remove for the purpose of securing an education. In the judgment of the committee this overture is both incomplete and unnecessary. It is incomplete in that it fails to define affiliate membership; and it is unnecessary in that sessions have sufficient power under existing provisions of the Form of Government to attest the good standing of a communicant without transferring his membership. The committee recommends and moves, therefore, that the overture be answered in the negative.
- 2. The call of the Gilead Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. John J. McClelland. The call is in due form, was duly voted at a regularly called congregational meeting, and is signed by the elders and trustees present at said meeting, and attested by the moderator, the Rev. Thomas C. Straus. The salary named is \$1,200 a year, with the use of the manse and a vacation of four weeks. The minutes of the congregational meeting accompany the call, and the commissioners have been heard. It is recommended and moved
- (1) That the call be found in order and placed in the hands of Mr. McClelland.
- (2) That, if the way be clear, the following order of installation be adopted:

Time—February 26, at 7.30 p.m. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—Rev. Thomas C. Straus; Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt, alternate. Charge to the pastor—Rev. James Packard Gillespie; Rev. Wendell Prime Keeler, alternate. Charge to the people—Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor; Rev. Arthur C. McMillan, alternate. Prayer of installation—Rev. Murray H. Gardner; Rev. Henry Fairfield Watts, alternate.

3. The request of the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt for the dissolution of the pastoral relation existing between himself and the Peekskill First Church in order that he may accept the office of Executive Secretary, to which Presbytery has appointed him (p. 343). The resolutions adopted at the congregational meeting of

Intermediate Meeting Jan. 28, 1920 the church concurring in the request with sincere regret and expressing appreciation of his labors as pastor were read and the commissioners were heard. It is recommended and moved that the request be granted to take effect February 2, and that the Rev. Thomas C. Straus be appointed moderator of the session.

4. The request of the Rev. John J. McClelland for the dissolution of the pastoral relation between himself and the Port Chester Church in order that he may accept the call of the Gilead Church. The concurrence with regret of the church in the request is certified by the minutes of a congregational meeting held January 14, and by the commissioners, who have been heard. It is recommended and moved that the request be granted to take effect January 31.

The call of the Gilead Church was placed in Mr. Mc-Clelland's hands, and was accepted by him.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received and its recommendations adopted as follows:

Attention is called to a plan for a Presbyterian City Council for Greater New York, the purpose of which is the development of a program and policy for Home Mission and Church Extension Work in the entire metropolitan area. The council is to be composed of the moderators of the Presbyteries of New York, Brooklyn—Nassau and Westchester, the chairman and executive secretary of each of the Home Mission and Church Extension agencies concerned, the director of the City and Immigrant Work of the Board of Home Missions, the chairman and superintendent for Synodical Home Missions, secretary of the Board of Church Erection, superintendent of Missions of the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work.

It is recommended and moved

- 1. That the program for the Presbyterian City Council for Greater New York be approved.
- 2. That the officers of Presbytery and its agencies named in the plan be authorized to participate in the council.
- 3. That the request of the Hungarian Church of Yonkers for \$150 be granted.

The Rev. J. Newton Armstrong of the Presbytery of Newton was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The special committee to which was referred the proposed standing rule, to be known as 38b (p. 338), begs leave to report as follows:

The proposed standing rule was referred to your committee without any instructions as to the nature of the changes. All it has to go by are suggestions, made on the floor during the debate, in favor of a new and more appropriate name for the Committee on General Missions and of a plan to avoid special meetings. As

Presbytery has at this meeting changed the name of that committee Intermediate to the Executive Committee no recommendation on our part is Meeting called for. It is, however, recommended and moved

Jan. 28, 1920

- 1. That Standing Rule 22a, recently adopted (p. 338), be amended by the substitution of the name Executive Committee for that of the Committee on General Missions.
- 2. That the proposed rule, to be known as 38b, amended to read as follows, be adopted:
- 38b. An Executive Committee shall be appointed to be composed of the Moderator as chairman, the next preceding Moderator, the Stated Clerk, the chairmen of the committees on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, Vacancy and Supply and the New Era Movement, the treasurer of this committee and the treasurer of Trustees of Presbytery.
- 3. That Standing Rule 78 be suspended and that the amendment to Standing Rule 22a and the proposed rule to be known as 38b be now adopted.

As to the second suggestion of a plan to avoid special meetings, your committee calls attention to the fact that in their judgment some of them may, with a little forethought, be avoided and the business be transacted at the regular meetings. Others, such as those called to dismiss a minister, not a pastor, may be rendered unnecessary by the election of an executive commission, consisting of not less than three members as provided for by Chapter XXVI of the Form of Government. The objection to the appointment of an executive commission is that all the general and specific powers that may by vote be conferred can much more easily be conferred and exercised by ordinary committees with the single exception of receiving and dismissing ministers not pastors, etc., and that it adds to our ecclesiastical machinery. In the same chapter of the Form of Government special commissions for specific administrative and executive purposes are recognized and permitted.

### It is recommended and moved

- 1. That since special meetings cannot always be avoided, Presbytery, while recognizing that three ministers and as many elders as may be present constitute a quorum and that such a quorum is quite sufficient for the transaction of ordinary business, urges upon members not to request special meetings unless in cases of necessity; and
- 2. That under Chapter XXVI, Section 9 of Form of Government, the Moderator, Stated Clerk and Permanent Clerk be appointed a special commission empowered to dismiss ministers, not pastors, in good standing, in the interim between the meetings of Presbytery.

Standing Rule 78 was suspended, and the proposed amendment to standing Rule 22a, changing the name of the Committee on General Missions to Executive Committee and the proposed new standing rule, to be known as 38b, were adopted.

Intermediate Meeting, Jan. 28, 1920. The Rev. Charles G. Sewall was appointed moderator of the session of the Port Chester Church.

The Committee on Vacancy and Supply presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Harrison.—Your committee submitted two names to that church. A call has been extended to the Rev. William Bulloch, for eight years pastor at Englishtown, N. J., and previously for twelve years at Pen Argyle, Pa.

Croton Falls.—This church continues vacant. Your committee has not been able to solve the problem there. The field is small and the financial support is in proportion.

Gilead.—The Gilead Church has called the Rev. John J. Mc-Clelland.

There are no other churches without supplies except South East, for which no supply is sought.

The Committe on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee has recommended Charles Papp to the General Board of Education for aid to the amount of \$100, which has been granted. It is recommended and moved that the above action be confirmed.

The minutes of today's session were read and approved.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the South Yonkers Church, April 19, 1920.

It is recommended and moved that Presbytery approve the action of the committee in asking the churches for the work of Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and the Executive Secretary the same amount asked last year, namely, ten per cent. of last year's New Era quota.

He then, by invitation, addressed the Presbytery on the Interchurch World Movement.

The Narrative was presented by the Rev. Lester H. Bent, and a discussion followed.

Presbytery then adjourned until 9 a. m. tomorrow. Closed with prayer and the benediction.

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That the June Intermediate Meeting be held in the Uncas Lodge, Lake Mohegan, N. Y.; and
- 2. That the Fall Stated Meeting be held as appointed (p. 357), at Patterson, N. Y.

The Rev. William J. Cumming and the Rev. James Packard Gillespie were appointed a committee to nominate Trustees.

The Standing Rules 64 and 65 were suspended, and the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan was re-elected a member of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply for the term of three years and chairman for the term of one year.

Elder William J. Yates was elected treasurer of the Executive Committee for the term of one year.

The Delegates to the Synod presented a report, which was received.

The Moderator appointed the Rev. George Reynolds, the Rev. Charles G. Sewall and the Rev. William J. Cumning a committee on the fiftieth anniversary of Presbytery (p. 368).

The Rev. James G. Bailey of the Presbytery of Jersev Spring Stated City was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Meeting, April 20, 1920.

The committee to nominate trustees (p. 370) presented a report, recommending the election of the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt, and Elders Ralph E. Prime and Ransom E. Wilcox for the term of three years to succeed themselves, and of Elder Thomas M. Logan for the unexpired term caused by the death of Elder Orson W. Sloat. The report was received and the persons nominated were elected.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, and its recomendation adopted. The report is as follows:

Eight churches have failed to report. Of those reporting 16 show gains in S. S. membership—the smallest 2 and the largest 158. The total gains, 1,248, an average of 80. We are not advancing in proportion to the increase of population in our field. The total enrolment is 6,766, a gain of 767 over last year. The average attendance reported has fallen from 3,875 to 3,558, a loss of 317. The gain in membership is 12 per cent., as compared with 7 per cent. in the church at large.

No attempt has been made at Vacation Schools. Children's Day and Rally Day are generally observed, and the program of the Board is used. Six schools have a S. S. Workers' library or the beginnings of one. Three schools have a Teachers' Training Class with an enrolment of 7 each and one with 4. Five sent delegates to Presbyterian Conferences and 4 to other conferences. Some schools sent as many as 20 delegates. The practice is to be commended.

In the way of "Expressional Organizations" some churches have elaborate programs to meet every age. North Avenue, for example, has a Junior Christian Endeavor for ages of 9-12 years, Nicholls Mission Band for 6-9, Christian Endeavor 12-15, Boy Scouts 13-17, Girls Scouts 12-16, Westminster Circle 15-17, with 150 enrolled in these organizations. Other churches meet the situation under other names, such as "Sunshine Club," "O. A. K.," "Over the Top," "Polyanna Club," "Camelot Circle," "K. O. K. A.," and

Ten churches have "Communicant Classes" with a total enrolment of 209, the largest 65. This church received 33 into membership from the school. Only 2 report a "Council of Religious Education." Five report an organized effort to promote family worship. It is suggested that schools discuss, in a serious way, whether or not the matter of increasing family worship is not a part of Bible instruction, which properly belongs to the Sabbath-School. Other departments have failed. Let the school take hold. Nine schools are supported wholly by the church, 3 in part. Teaching the catechism does not grow in favor. Only 3 report teaching it and 2 others in part. No figures are available as to the use of graded system of lessons.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 20, 1920. Your committee recommends and moves that no action be taken on the communication from the Presbytery of Cayuga on Religious Education referred to it. (p. 367).

The chairman of the Committee on Education and Examinations was requested to prepare an overture to the Synod bearing on Religious Education.

The discussion of the Narrative (p. 369) was continued under the leadership of the Narrator, the Rev. Lester H. Bent. The Narrative was adopted, and it was ordered that an abstract be entered upon the minutes and also sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

I. Church Membership and Services.—The churches report a membership of 10,965, with additions of 532 on examination and 518 on certificate. Two preaching services are held on the Lord's Day, usually morning and evening, a few holding the second service in the afternoon. The morning service is fairly well attended, but the attendance at the second is not remarkable. Eight churches have been without a pastor. They have, with but a single exception, a small church, been regularly supplied. Four communion services are held yearly by a majority of our churches, in a few oftener, in some 8 times, with an attendance varying from one-third to three-fourths of the membership. Twelve report no prayer meeting. Where held, the attendance is less than 12 per cent. No method employed to stimulate interest seems to have proved very helpful, though some novel features have been used. Some churches do, some do not, notify churches in other communities of the removal of members.

II. Religious Education and Young People's Work.—The importance of the religious training of the young in the church and the home and of family worship is emphasized. Christian parents are generally faithful in presenting their children for baptism. Decision Day is observed in various ways, some such a day, others Lent, others by appeals in the Sunday-School. Twenty churches have communion classes. There have been reported 322 additions to the church from the school, 236 of whom were baptized in infancy. Special work is being done for the young of both sexes by scout and other organizations. Children's sermons are employed. The reported attendance of children and youth at the regular church services varies from 10 to 65 per cent. Forty-one schools are reported—32 church, 2 union, and 7 mission. The Catechism is arrely taught. A few have teacher training classes. Ten are fully graded, 12 partly and 8 not at all. Quite generally teachers' meetings or workers' councils are held. Many of the helps of the Board of Publication are used. Eighteen have organized Bible classes—10 intermediate, 21 senior and 10 adult with a membership of 350 men, who practically all attend church services. Not many schools make an annual canvass of the community for new scholars. A number maintain libraries. There are 17 Home Departments with an enrolment of 727. A S. S. membership of 5,805 is reported by 30 churches, as against 6,137 last year. The figures are plainly incomplete.

The churches report 42 C. E. societies—13 junior, 4 intermediate and 25 senior. Christian Endeavor is strong in Westchester

County. There are in our churches 2 or 3 "Expert C. E." classes, Spring Stated 7 Junior Missions Bands and 6 Westminster Guilds. Twenty-eight Meeting. of our young people are in our denominational schools and colleges April 20, 1920. and 166 in other educational institutions.

- III. Evangelism.—Only 2 churches report evangelistic services with 6 accessions, a deepened spiritual condition and evangelistic note conserved.
- IV. Community.—None of our churches report the systematic study of the racial, social and industrial conditions of their neighborhoods. Three Men's Societies with 292 members have attempted something in this line. Community work has been engaged in by Men's Clubs, Women's Societies, New Era Groups, Flower Guilds and other organizations. In the larger towns, where there are Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., our churches support them. During the year there have been no volunteers for the ministry; 3, however, are reported for missionary work, 8 for Y. M. C. A., 5 for Y. W. C. A., and 14 for settlement and philanthropic.
- V. Missions and Benevolence.—Opportunities are given to our congregations to contribute regularly to the Boards. The Every-Member Plan is in general use, by personal visitation. Information is desseminated by sermons, addresses, mission-study classes and literature. Part has been taken in the New Era Movement, and its success is witnessed by increased offerings, and by accessions to the church. The Sabbath-schools contribute quite generally to Home Missions, Foreign Missions and S. S. Work, and some to other Boards. Provision is made for the poor through the Deacons' Fund and in other ways.
- VI. Finance—The Churches' expenses are fully and promptly met. A mortgage indebtedness is reported by 12 churches of \$125,150. The benevolent funds are administered by the sessions. The funds for church support and benevolence are kept separate, and usually by different treasurers. Quarterly remittances are made to the Boards by a majority. The offerings of the Sabbath-schools are used in a few cases entirely for self-support, in others for benevolence, and in some for both. The income for church support is derived in a few churches from pew rentals, in others from pew rentals and envelope contributions, but in most from envelopes. Figures as to number of systematic contributors are incomplete. There have been reported 4,773 to church support and 2,776 to benevolence.

VII. Nation.—The influence of war upon spiritual conditions has not in most cases been very marked. A few report it helpful, and some hurtful.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report, which was received, and the first four recommendations were adopted. It is as follows:

It has been the committee's aim to aid in keeping our churches in touch with general forward movement of quickened life and enlarged service throughout the church. It is a movement that is a stirring of life. The spiritual campaign is primary and fundamental. Accessions to the churches on confessions since April 1 number more than 240. This is 45 per cent, of the accessions on confession of faith reported for the year 1919-1920.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 20, 1920. With your committee has been merged the former committee on pastors' salaries. Partly at the suggestion of its sub-committee of ruling elders, thirteen of our churches during the past year have increased their pastors' salaries, some of them largely.

Of the New Era goals adopted last autumn we have gained a 12 per cent. net increase in Sunday School membership, and the financial every-member canvass is in very general use among the churches of Presbytery. The financial goal proposed a year ago was \$90,594 for the work of the boards and agencies of the Pres-. byterian Church in the U. S. A. With no report from five of the smaller churches it appears that some \$72,000 have been paid in for this purpose. This is 80 per cent. of the asking. The women's societies have given all that was asked of them, and may be depended upon to meet their slightly increased quota for the coming year. The apportionment for the year to come, as handed down to us through ecclesiastical channels, is \$168,595. This includes \$8,200 for presbyterial purposes. This is an increase of some 80 per cent. over last year's apportionment. An average gift of 53/4 cents a member for each working day of the year will make up this sum. Or, if the number of possible contributors be counted at two-thirds the reported membership, the goal could be reached by an average daily contribution from each of these of less than 8 cents.

The committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That Presbytery continue in hearty co-operation with the New Era Movement, and that the pastors and churches make such use of its aid, printed, pictorial and personal, as may produce increased efficiency in the service committed to them.
- 2. That much importance be given to the spiritual side of the work, especially prayer and evangelism.
- 3. That education in stewardship and missions be stressed in the coming year in all our churches, more especially by the appointment of directors of missionary education and stewardship, and the formation of classes for the study of these subjects.
- 4. That in the coming year each church study its community and its parish, and undertake its work in accordance with a well planned program. This program should include a social visitation and the every-member canvass, the latter, in the absence of countervailing reasons, at the time in the spring agreed upon by the churches.

Pending the consideration of the fifth recommendation the report was laid on the table until after the recess.

Presbytery took a recess until 2 P. M.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 P. M.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer.

The Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt and Elder Edwin A.

Slosson were appointed tellers of votes for Commissioners to the General Assembly.

The Rev. Morgan P. Noyes was received by certificate Spring Stated of dismission from the Northern New Jersey Congrega- Meeting, tional Association after answering in the affirmative the constitutional questions.

April 20, 1920.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

- 1. The request of the Rev. Philip S. Bird to be released from the pastorate of the Greenburgh Church, in order that he may accept a call to the First Church of Utica, N. Y., in the Presbytery of Utica (p. 367). Action having already been taken by Presbytery (b. 368), the committee has no recommendation to make.
- 2. The request of the Rev. John H. Sanders to be released from the pastorate of the Second Church of Peekskill in order to accept a call the Presbyterian Church of Canton, Pa., in the Presbytery of Lackawanna. The church concurs in the request, as certified by the commissioners, who have been heard. Your committee recommends and moves that the request be granted, the dissolution to take effect April 30, and that a letter of dismission to the Presbytery of Lackawanna be granted to Mr. Sanders.
- 3. A copy of an overture from the Presbytery of Cincinnati to the General Assembly, relating to the Committee on Church Union, representing seventeen evangelical bodies. The overture asks the General Assembly not to give its assent or in any way commit the church to any plan of union or any united council, membership in which is not definitely limited to evangelical churches. Your committee recommends and moves that no action be taken.
- 4. A copy of a resolution of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh directing its delegation to the General Assembly to move to secure a review of the decisions of the Executive Commission in so far as they relate to the budgets and expenditures of the Boards' New Era and Interchurch Agencies, and inviting the co-operation of other presbyteries in seeking such review. The committee recommends and moves that the matter contemplated in this resolution be commended to the earnest consideration of the commissioners of this Presbytery to the General Assembly.
- 5. An overture from the First Church of Peekskill asking Presbytery's consent and approval to the union of the two Presbyterian Churches of Peekskill, provided a similar request is made by the Second Church. This overture is presented pursuant to action taken at a meeting of the congregation held March 31, 1920, and is accompanied by a certified copy of the minutes of the meeting. These minutes show that it was unanimously voted to approve heartily of the union of the two churches; to overture Presbytery for its consent and approval of the union of the two churches, provided a similar request be made by the Second Church; and to appoint a committee to confer with a similar one of the Second Church with full power and instructions to arrange all the details for such union, and instructions to take all ecclesiastical, legal and civil proceedings to accomplish the same.

Also an overture from commissioners representing the officers and people of the Second Church of Peekskill asking Presbytery to take such steps as may be necessary to effect the consolidation of that church with the First Church.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 20, 1920. The commissioners of both churches have been heard.

Your committee recommends and moves the adoption of the following answer:

- (1) The Presbytery records its hearty approval of the proceedings so far taken by the congregations of the First and Second Churches of Peekskill with a view to their union and hereby grants its consent to such union.
- (2) The Presbytery hereby creates and appoints a commission, composed of the Moderator and the Stated and Permanent Clerks, whose duty it shall be to act in the name of the Presbytery in the review and approval of the completed agreement of the First and Second Churches of Peekskill to consolidate their corporations, when such agreement shall be duly executed in accordance with the provisions of the civil law and submitted to the said commission.
- 6. A call of the Greenburgh Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Morgan P. Noyes. The salary is \$2,800 a year in regular monthly payments, with the use of the manse and a vacation of six weeks each year. The call is in due form and was voted unanimously at a congregational meeting, duly called, signed by the officers of the church as authorized at the congregational meeting and certified by the moderator. The commissioners were heard. Your committee recommends and moves that the call be found in order and placed in Mr. Noyes' hands; and, if the way be clear, the following order of installation be adopted:

Time—Tuesday, June 15, at 8 P. M. To preside and propound the constitutional questions—The Moderator. Sermon—The Rev. Henry Sloane Coffin of the Presbytery of New York, to be invited. Prayer of installation—The Rev. Sidney Lovett of the Suffolk West Association of Congregational Churches. Charge to the pastor—The Rev. W. Francis Irwin. Charge to the people—The Rev. Philip S. Bird.

The call was placed in Mr. Noyes' hands, and he signified his acceptance.

The Committee on Presbyterial Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Already the usefulness of the Executive Secretary is gratefully apparent. With Mr. Everitt, as executive, we feel that large advance steps will now be the order of the day. The committee feels that a strong effort be made to unite or combine some of our smaller churches, especially those we call country churches. There are several organizations now claiming the full time of a minister and receiving aid from this committee, which we believe could be combined with other churches near by to the great conservation of our funds and at the same time to the real benefit of the churches concerned.

Your committee recommends and moves:

1. That aid be asked from the Board of Home Missions as follows: Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano, \$1,200; Rev. Odoacre B. Villante, \$750; Rev. Abraham Tamraz, \$600; Miss Mildred Payne, \$720; Rev. Andrew Szilagyi, or his successor, \$1,200; Community Worker, Yonkers, \$1,200; Contingent Expenses, \$500.

2. That the work under our care at Armour Villa Park, adjoining Brouxville, be transferred to the oversight of the Reformed Church at Brouxville, the details of the transfer to be left to the subcommittee on Church Extension.

Spring Stated Meeting, April 20, 1920.

- 3. That the following applications for aid be granted: The Hungarian Church, Yonkers, \$150; Mahopac Falls for six months, \$100.
- 4. That Presbytery record its approval of the formation of a Presbyterian Council for the Metropolitan Area, to consist of representatives of the seven presbyteries of Brooklyn-Nassau, New York, Westchester, Jersey City, Newark, Morris and Orange and Elizabeth; and that it authorize the Moderator of Presbytery, the chairman of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions and the Executive Secretary of Presbytery to represent Presbytery in the deliberations of the council.
- 5. That Presbytery authorize our Italian missionaries to attend the Biennial Presbyterian Conference at Auburn, N. Y., June 22-24, and that we comply with the suggestion of the Board of Home Missions to provide half the expenses of all of our workers under our supervision, the Home Board to pay the balance-expenses of board \$2 a day, besides traveling expenses.
- 6. That we authorize the chairman of the committee to attend the meeting of the Synodical Committee on Home Missions as the representative of Presbytery at the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, 85 S. Oxford Stret, Brooklyn, on Tuesday, May 11, at 10 A. M.

The report of the Committee on the New Era Movement was taken from the table (p. 374), and the fifth recommendation was adopted. It is as follows:

5. That the Presbytery of Westchester, while loyally accepting the New Era Budget for the year 1920-1921 and recommending to all its churches the honest and faithful attempt to raise it, hereby wishes to register its serious question as to the advisability of the policy of increasing the budget so rapidly from year to year as it has been increased this year, respectfully suggesting education and inspiration must lead our people more gradually into an adequate conception of their privilege and responsibility in giving. We hereby suggest to our Commissioners to the General Assembly that, if the opportunity shall arise in the Assembly, they express this feeling of our Presbytery.

- 2. That the Rev. John A. Ingham of the Classis of New Brunswick be invited to deliver an address at that meeting.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report on Young People's Work, which was received and is as follows:

Reports have been received from all except 8 churches. The number of societies has increased from 52 to 70, and the membership from 1,615 to 1,717. The gifts have increased from \$337 to \$605 for Home Missions; \$321 to \$520 for Foreign Missions; \$537 to \$913 for self-support and all other objects. The total given was \$2,147, an increase of \$800, or 60%. Seven churches report more societies than last year, and 5 less.

The societies vary in character. Christian Endeavor is far in the lead—20 Senior, 8 Junior and 2 Intermediate, a total of 30. In two cases the society has been abandoned for the present. Frequently real progress is made by having a change. Young people never run far or smoothly in a rut. There are 9 troops of Boy Scouts, 4 of Girl Scouts and 1 of Camp Fire Girls. Under proper leadership much can be done for boys and girls through the Scout idea. Success depends upon proper leadership, but efficient leaders are hard to find. From the names of the societies your committee judges that some are missionary societies—the number cannot be given. It should be noted, however, that nearly all societies give to missions.

The chairman of the Missionary Committee reported orally on Ministerial Relief and missionary literature. The report was received.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Mrs. Picuitsky, who has been engaged to work in the district of Immanuel Chapel of Yonkers, has taken up her work and is giving satisfaction. The Rev. Abraham Tamraz, working among the Persians at Yonkers with a salary of \$900 a year, \$600 of which is paid out of our treasury, is doing satisfactory work. Mr. Darvezy, who succeeds Mr. Szilagyi in the Hungarian Church of Yonkers, has been approved by the committee.

The treasurer of the committee reports the receipts since April 1 with the balance to amount to \$2,599.40 and the payments \$663.99, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,935.41.

The Synodical Missions Conference held on May 11 at the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian Church, Brooklyn, N. Y., was attended by the chairman (p. 377). Reports were presented from all sections of the state. The Metropolitan Area Conference was attended (p. 377). A temporary organization was formed, and plans for a meeting in the autumn and publications were left in the hands of an executive committee.

The Italian Workers have been notified of the conference at Auburn (p. 377). Our Executive Secretary was appointed to obtain information with regard to our participation in the Synodical Home Missions organization and also surveys made by the Inter-Church Movement, and to place the latter at the disposal of our churches,

We recommend and move that an increase of \$10 a month be given to the Rev. Abraham Tamraz, our missionary to the Persians, for the four months until the Fall Stated Meeting.

The chairman of the Committee on Social Service called attention to the work of the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare, the cause of Sabbath Observance and to the subject of Church and Industry, as reported to the General Assembly.

It was ordered that the reports of committees shall s'ate whether action has been taken on the report by the committee, or whether it is simply the report of the person who presents it.

Recess was taken until 2.30 p.m.

Presbytery reassembled, and was opened with prayer.

The chairman of the Executive Committee reported orally on the work of the committee. The report was received.

He also presented a copy of a night letter of the session and true ees of the South Yonkers Church in joint meeting, expressing its thanks and appreciation for spiritual oversight and financial aid and assistance received during the past two years, and unanimously requesting Presbytery to reduce its gifts to that church for the year, April 1, 1920, to April 1, 1921, to \$75 a month instead of \$125 a month as heretofore.

In compliance with the request, Presbytery directed the treasurer of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions to reduce the payments to the South Yonkers Church from \$125 to \$75 a month.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The committee commends again to all the churches the everymember financial canvass, the group plan of parish organization and the adoption of a definite program for the year's work; and calls attention to the New Era Lecture Bureau as offering important help for the stimulation of missionary interest. Your committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That the Rev. Lester H. Bent, the Rev. Ernest J. Houghton, Elder E. Stanley Sloat be appointed a special committee to consider the feasibility of carrying through during the coming autumn and winter a program for presbyterial evangelism, report to be made at the Fall Stated Meeting with plans for the work, if they consider it feasible.
- 2. That the committee be authorized to arrange for a day of presbyterial exchange of pulpits next autumn.
- 3. That the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister be made a member of the committee in order that he may serve as director of missionary education,

The thanks of Presbytery were extended Elder Jay R. Decatur, our host, and to the ladies who assisted him in its entertainment at this meeting.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved.

The Stated Clerk reported that the call for the meeting had been issued in accordance with the provisions of the Form of Government.

The Commission appointed to act in the name of the Presbytery in the review and approval of the completed agreement of the First and Second Churches of Peekskill to consolidate their corporations (p. 376) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

By the action of Presbytery on April 20, 1920, this commission

was created and appointed to act in the name of Presbytery in the review and approval of the completed agreement of the First and Second Churches of Peekskill to consolidate their corporations, when such agreement shall be duly executed in accordance with the provisions of the civil law and submitted to the said commission.

The commission has had before it the following papers: 1. A paper entitled "Agreement of Consolidation of the Presbyterian Church of Peekskill and the Trustees of the Second Presbyterian Church in Peekskill into the Peekskill Presbyterian Church, dated June 30, 1920." A copy of this paper is given below, and will be referred to as "The Agreement of Consolidation." 2. A copy of the minutes of a corporate meeting of the First Church of Peekskill, whose corporate name is "The Presbyterian Church of Peekskill," held June 23, 1920. 3. A copy of the minutes of a corporate meeting of the Second Church of Peekskill, whose corporate name is "The Trustees of the Second Presbyterian Church in Peekskill," held June 23, 1920.

The "Agreement of Consolidation" is as follows:

"Agreement of consolidation, dated this 30th day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty, executed in duplicate, between The Presbyterian Church of Peekskill, a corporation of the State of New York, and more commonly known as the First Presbyterian Church (hereinafter called the First Church), party of the first part, and The Trustees of the Second Presbyterian Church in Peekskill, a corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Second Church), party of the second part.

"Each of the parties hereto is a religious corporation, organized under the laws of the State of New York for one or more purposes mentioned in the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York.

"Each of the parties hereto is a Presbyterian Church in connection with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America; and each has its principal place of worship and its principal office in the Village of Peekskill in the Town of Cortlandt, County of Westchester, State of New York.

"The number of trustees of the First Church as duly and lawfully fixed by it prior to the year 1890 is five, and the number of the trustees of the Second church as fixed by its certificate of incorporation is five.

"The parties hereto desire to merge and consolidate the respective corporations into a single religious corporation pursuant to Section 13 of the Religious Corporations Law of the State of New York; and have by the affirmative vote of more than a majority of the qualified voters, more than six (a legal quorum) being present, at the respective corporate meetings of the parties hereto, called for the purpose of said merger and consolidation, authorized and directed their respective boards of trustees to prescribe the terms and conditions of the said merger and consolidation and the mode of carrying the same into effect, as contained herein; and in pursuance thereof the boards of trustees of the respective parties hereto upon an affirmative unanimous vote of said respective boards of trustees, made and entered into this agreement, and the respective parties hereto do agree as follows:

"Article First.—The First Church and the Second Church shall be merged and consolidated into a single religious corporation (hereinafter sometimes called the receiving church), under and in pursuance of Section 13 of the Religious Corporations Law afore-

"Article Second.—The name to be borne by the receiving church, formed by the said merger and consolidation, shall be the Peekskill Presbyterian Church, and its principal place of worship and its County of Westchester, State of New York; and that it shall be a Presbyterian Church in connection with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and be subject to the jurisdiction of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, and be subject to the jurisdiction of the Presbytery of Westchester of the said church. "Article Third.—The temporalities of the receiving church shall

be managed by trustees to be elected by the church.

"Article Fourth.—The number of trustees of the said receiving church shall be nine (9).

"Article Fifth.—The following persons shall constitute the first board of trustees of the receiving church and shall hold office until the first annual meeting or until their successors are duly elected and qualified, to wit:

"Sanford R. Knapp, William L. Dyckman, Elmer E. Seymour, Frank M. Dain, George D. Evans, Alonzo W. A. Stevens, Ralph F. Hopkins, Thomas C. Gardner and Eben A. Wood; all being citizens of the United States of America and residents of the Village of Peekskill, Town of Cortlandt, County of Westchester, State of New York; and each being a qualified voter of one of the parties hereto.

"Article Sixth.—The date of the first annual corporate meeting of the receiving church shall be held on the first Wednesday of April, A. D. 1921, and thereafter the subsequent annual corporate meetings shall be held on the first Wednesday of April of each and every year.

"Article Seventh.—At the first annual corporate meeting nine (9) trustees shall be elected by ballot from persons qualified to vote at such meeting, to succeed the same number of trustees whose offices are then terminating, for the terms as follows—Three to be elected to hold office for one year; three to be elected to hold office for two years; and three to be elected to hold office for three years; and each to hold office for the term so designated and until their successors are duly elected and qualified; and thereafter at the second and all subsequent annual corporate meetings three (3) trustees shall be elected by ballot from persons qualified to vote at such meetings for the term of three (3) years and until their successors are duly elected and qualified to succeed the same number of trustees whose offices are then terminating.

"Article Eighth.-This agreement, duly executed and acknowledged in duplicate, by the boards of trustees for the respective parties hereto, and sworn copies of the proceedings of the meetings of the respective qualified voters or members of the parties hereto shall be submitted to the Presbytery of Westchester, that being the governing body having jurisdiction of said parties hereto for and in connection with the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America; and upon approval by the said Presbytery of WestSpecial Meeting, Aug. 16, 1920.

chester, it shall then with the sworn copies of the proceedings of the meetings of the respective qualified voters or members of the parties hereto, together with the approval of the said Presbytery of Westchester, be referred by a separate petition of the parties hereto, to the Supreme Court of the State of New York for the County of Westchester for an order of consolidation pursuant to Section 13 of the Religious Corporations Law aforesaid. If an order of consolidation, by the said court, is duly made and entered thereon, it shall thereupon become binding upon both parties hereto, and upon recording a certified copy of such order of the said Supreme Court in the office of the Clerk of the County of Westchester, that being the county in which is located the principal place of worship and office of the receiving church, this agreement shall then take effect according to its terms, and the merger and consolidation herein provided for shall thereupon take place as provided in this agreement, and thereupon the First Church and the Second Church shall be merged and consolidated in the Peekskill Presby-terian Church, the said receiving church, and all the estate, rights, powers and property of whatsoever nature belonging to either corporation shall without further act or deed be vested in and transferred to the said receiving church as effectually as they were vested in or belonged to the former corporations.

"Article Ninth.—In case this agreement shall not be approved by the said Presbytery of Westchester or an order of consolidation by the said Supreme Court is not made and entered thereon, then this agreement shall terminate and cease to have future effect.

"In witness whereof the respective boards of trustees of the First Church and the Second Church have entered into and made this agreement under their respective corporate seals of said corporations, attested by their respective secretaries, and have caused the respective names of said corporations to be hereunto signed by their respective presidents of said boards of trustees, and all or a majority of the board of trustees of each of said churches have hereunto set their hands and seals, all the day and the year first above written."

It is shown by the minutes of the respective corporate meetings that each was legally called, convened and conducted more than a quorum of those entitled to vote at such meeting being present and voting in each instance; that the full text of the "Agreement of Consolidation" was presented to each meeting; and that upon a vote being taken by ballot, each church authorized its board of trustees to execute the said "Agreement of Consolidation."

The minutes of the respective corporate meetings show further that concurrent action was taken by the two congregations to the effect that the present elders and deacons of the First and Second Churches respectively, shall constitute the boards of elders and deacons respectively of the consolidated church, until otherwise ordered by the members of the consolidated church.

The commission finds that the "Agreement of Consolidation" complies in form and effect with the requirements of the civil law, being duly signed by the authorized parties thereto and the signatures being duly witnessed.

The judgment of the commission is that the "Agreement of Consolidation of the Presbyterian Church of Peekskill and the

Trustees of the Second Presbyterian Church in Peekskill into the Peekskill Presbyterian Church, dated June 30, 1920," and submitted to this commission for review and approval, be and is hereby approved.

Special Meeting. Aug. 16, 1920.

The commission recommends and moves the following action by the Presbytery as competent and requisite in the matter of the approval and validation of the "Agreement of Consolidation":

1. It is ordered that the report of the commission be entered in full upon the minutes of Presbytery.

2. The judgment of the commission, as contained in this report, is hereby recorded as the judgment of Presbytery, and the "Agreement of Consolidation of the Presbyterian Church of Peekskill and the Trustees of the Second Presbyterian Church in Peekskill, dated June 30, 1920," be and is hereby approved.

3. The Stated Clerk of Presbytery is hereby authorized and instructed to certify to the approval of the "Agreement of Consolidation" by Presbytery.

The Commission recommends and moves further the following action, contingent upon the consummation of the proposed consolidation through the action of the civil court:

- 1. On and after the date on which this "Agreement of Consolidation" shall become effective, as provided in Article VIII of the "Agreement," the names of the First and Second Churches shall cease to be retained upon the roll of Presbytery and the name of the Peekskill Presbyterian Church shall appear thereon in their stead; and the names of the present ruling elders of the First and Second Churches of Peekskill respectively shall be placed upon the roll of Presbytery as the ruling elders of the Peekskill Presbyterian Church.
- 2. The Rev. Thomas C. Straus is hereby appointed moderator of the session of the Peekskill Presbyterian Church, to serve from the date on which the "Agreement of Consolidation" shall go into effect.

The minutes of this meeting were read and approved. Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the Presbyterian Church, Patterson, N. Y., Monday, October 4, 1920.

A statistical report of the Presbytery for the past fifty years, 1870-1920, was read. It is as follows:

The Presbytery of Westchester was erected by the Synod of New York June 21, 1870.

The first meeting was held in the Presbyterian Church, Ossining, N. Y. (then Sing Sing), October 4, 1870.

Presbytery, as originally constituted, included "the churches with their pastors, and all ministers resident or in active work in the counties of Westchester and Putnam (with the exception of the church at Cold Spring), and in the State of Connecticut."

October 22, 1874, the boundaries of Presbytery were extended so as to include the church or chapel at Narragansett Pier, R. I.

October 19, 1887, the Synod of New York transferred that portion of Westchester County, which had been annexed to New York City, now known as the Borough of the Bronx, with the churches situated therein with their pastors to the Presbytery of New York.

October 21, 1897, the Synod of New York ordered "that the territory lying within the boundaries of Hampden County, Mass, with the Presbyterian ministers and churches therein be and it hereby is transferred from the Presbytery of Boston to the Presbytery of Westchester."

May 23, 1912, the Synod of New England was erected by the General Assembly and ten churches and ten ministers were set off from Presbytery to constitute the Presbytery of Connecticut Valley.

The minutes of vesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The printed minutes pp. 365-388 were corrected by adding the name of the Pleasantville Church to the list of churches (p. 380), which presented their sessional records for review, the records of that church having been presented and approved, and striking it from the list of those, which did not so do. The printed minutes, as so corrected, were then approved.

The Stated Clerk' presented a communication from the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, Missionary and Educational Department, announcing that the Eastern District Conference of Presbyterian Daly Vacation Bible Schools would be held under the austices of the Boards of Publication and Sabbath School Work and Home Missions on October 14th at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York.

The Rev. Daniel M. Geddes was appointed a delegate to the conference.

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved:

1. That the January Intermediate Meeting be held at 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, at the time fixed by the Standing Rules, or as near to that time as accommodations can be secured; and
2. That the Spring Stated Meeting be held in the Mt. Kisco

Presbyterian Church, for which an invitation has been received.

The Executive Committee presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Your committee has held regular monthly meetings with the exception of July and August, at which three classes of discussion and resultant plans obtained, namely, (1) oversight of the work of the executive secretary, (2) supervision of the financial resources of our unified treasury, and (3) the broader question of our responsibility to the unchurched portions of Westchester and Putnam Counties.

During the thirty-one weeks since his appointment the executive secretary has preached in the churches of Presbytery on twenty-four Sundays, and four other Sundays were given to visitation of the churches. It should be understood that all compensation, which he receives as pulpit-supply reverts to this committee and the amount thus received thus far has been sufficient to pay all the office expenses of the secretary and leave a balance, turned over to the treasurer, of \$196.26. The secretary has paid over a hundred visits to churches, pastors and workers, visiting all but five of the Churches for one purpose or another, many of them several each. He has materially assisted the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions, especially in the foreign-speaking work, and also the Committees on the New Era Movement and Vacancy and Supply and the sub-Committee on Evangelistic Work. He has given valuable assistance to the Moderator of the Presbytery, and has carried on a large and varied correspondence from his office in Ossining. With the committee's approval he has made, and is still making, valuable surveys of religious conditions within the bounds of Presbytery. During the month of June he attended a conference of Italian workers at Auburn, N. Y., and in August headed a party of Westchester County young people at the Stony Brook Conference. Your committee is unanimous in feeling that Mr. Everitt's appointment has already been more than justified by the very faithful and efficient way, in which he is interpreting the duties and opportunities of the new office, and we ask that he be allowed to address Presbytery at the conclusion of the report allowed to address Presbytery at the conclusion of the report.

As to financial matters, the churches, with very few exceptions, have met the apportionments for presbyterial purposes which were assigned them. If all the churches will do their share to support the single treasury, which now includes several former funds, each of which in days gone by had to make its own separate appeal, it will not be necessary for us to increase the quotas in the immediate future.

The Commissioners to the General Assembly presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

Attention is called to but four things:

- 1. To the fact that the Minutes are not yet in the hands of all the ministers, doubtless due to the death of the Stated Clerk, so that it is not possible to cite pages. Action, however, was taken, which should receive careful attention.
- 2. The overture regarding organic union with other Evangelical Churches, which may come up at this meeting, should receive careful consideration.
- 3. The same thing may be said of the overture regarding the admission of women to the office of ruling elder.
- 4. Your attention to the Assembly's Permanent Committee on Evangelism, which shows that in the year 1919-1920 98,885 persons were added to the church on examination, as against 62,014 the previous year. In only two years has this figure been exceeded—116,064 in 1914-1915 and 104,526 in 1915-1916. In 1918-1919 there was a net loss of 28,715, but this year a net gain of 42,478, thereby overcoming the loss of 1919. It was pointed out, however, that even the present figures were nothing to be especially proud over; that there is great need of a more fully awakened evangelistic spirit and zeal in all our churches.

Standing Rule No. 52 was amended to the effect that the report of the Commissioners to the General Assembly shall be presented at the June Intermediate Meeting.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

Your committee reports on business referred to it as follows:

- 1. An overture from the General Assembly on the "Eligibility of Women to the Eldership and the Deaconship."

Eugene Meray was obliged to leave Bloomfield Seminary because of ill health. Andrew F. Janowiczky is at Maryville College. Charles Papp is at Bloomfield Seminary and does Christian service on Saturday and Sunday among the Hungarians in New York. We have no knowledge of Pietro Guiffrida since he left our bounds.

The Committee on Education and Examinations was instructed to inquire into the feasibility of holding a vocational conference for the young men of our churches, and was authorized to make arrangements for such a conference, if it seems best.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Daily Vacation Schools among eight different nationalities with an enrolment of 457 were successfully conducted. The third biennial an enrolment of 457 were successfully conducted. The third blenmal conference on Italian Evangelization, held at Auburn, N. Y., June 22-24, was a remarkable gathering and a source of inspiration. Only one of our workers was in attendance. All of our Italian workers were given invitations, and allowance was made for all their expenses. These workers should be directed with some authority to attend this conference, and a statement of their attendance in their report to the Home Board and to our sub-committee be required. Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano has withdrawn his ministrations from the Italian work at White Plains and there is immediate need. from the Italian work at White Plains and there is immediate need for another consecrated worker to take his place there.

Many of our country churches present a very grave problem and the problem is a long way from solution. Rev. Warren H. Wilson, a member of Presbytery and the head of the Department of Church and Country Life of the Board of Home Missions, has

consented to aid us and to enable us to start on a solution of this difficult problem in the northern end of Presbytery. Pound Ridge, Croton Falls, Mahopac Falls, Somers and South East offer opportunities for these demonstrations.

Armour Villa Park has been transferred to the oversight of the neighboring Reformed Church at Bronxville, and is in a far better condition through this connection.

The immediate needs, which your committee presents, are as follows:

- 1. Church Extension.—(1) An imperative demand for united effort among struggling churches and, if need be, the withdrawal of one or more of these churches from the tragic and un-Christian competitive struggle now going on.
- (2) A definite aggressive campaign to establish churches and Sunday schools among growing populations, and to minister to the unchurched.
- 2. Foreign Peoples.—(1) A worker at large for small groups of Italians scattered in our outlying sections with no missions or churches. The Interchurch Survey gives over 800 Italians scattered in six widely separated sections of Westchester County, beside the large colonies in the suburban towns and cities.
  - (2) A supply for the Italian Sunday service at White Plains.
- (3) An expansion of the important work at Port Chester in a large Italian population to meet the institutional needs of that rapidly developing section and furnish suitable buildings.
- (4) An interdenominational co-operation of all the foreign work in Westchester County to co-ordinate, strengthen and properly house this great enterprise and particularly to avoid duplication and competition, unwise and hurtful in the eyes of these Catholic foreigners.

Your committee, therefore, recommends and moves

- 1. That our Executive Secretary be instructed to make surveys of the growing sections of White Plains, Mount Vernon and Port Chester and other promising fields in co-operation with the Presbyterian Churches there established, looking toward the inauguration of new religious work.
- 2. That, without remuneration from Presbytery, the services of the Rev. Warren H. Wilson be accepted in conference with our Executive Secretary and the chairman of this committee in demonstration work for churches too weak to pay for a settled pastor's services.
- 3. That Presbytery adopt the policy of employing capable persons to inaugurate and carry on Sunday school work in needy sections of our field and among the unchurched populations, that the children be not religiously neglected. And we further recommend and move that this important enterprise be placed under the supervision of the Executive Secretary and this committee, who shall report semi-annually; and we further recommend and move that the treasurer of the committee, Elder William J. Yates, be empowered under the direction of your committee to remunerate such persons as may serve as religious teachers in these new fields.
- 4. That Presbytery request the Board of Home Missions to employ a worker among the smaller groups of Italians within our

bounds, and further we request that our denominational board approach other church boards with a view to cordial co-operation in our foreign peoples work and the joint employment of a field worker or secretary.

- 5. That Presbytery grant aid to the Presbyterian Church of Mahopac Falls, N. Y., to the extent of \$100 for the six months ending with the next stated meeting, providing only that this church so aided shall make an energetic every-member canvass before any payment of aid be given.

- 7. That Presbytery grant authority to our Executive Secretary to make special investigation of the possibility of a larger work among the Italians of Port Chester, and that the necessary funds for this investigation be paid by our treasurer.
- 8. That group conferences of neighboring churches under the direction of the Executive Secretary be immediately planned and fostered.

The report of the Committee on the New Era Movement was made the second order of the day for this afternoon.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions was instructed to refuse aid to any church in the Presbytery unless that church shall have conducted an every-member canvass during the year just preceding.

A motion that the Rev. Lester H. Bent be appointed to prepare the narrative for the Spring Stated Meeting was referred to the sub-Committee on Evangelistic Work.

The chairman of the Committee on Social Service made a statement as to the plans of the committee.

The Presbytery then held a devotional service of half an hour under the leadership of the Rev. Morgan P. Noyes.

- 1. That the records of the following churches were presented for review: Bedford, Croton Falls, Gilead, Greenburgh, Harrison, Huguenot Memorial, Irvington, Katonah, Mahopac Falls, Mt. Vernon First, New Rochelle, New Rochelle North Avenue, Ossining First, Patterson, Peekskill First, Scarsdale Hitchcock Memorial, and South East.
- 2. The records of the following, called for, were not presented: Larchmont and Mt. Kisco.
  - 3. It is recommended and moved
  - (1) That all presented be approved without exceptions.
- (2) That the Stated Clerk be asked to supply moderators and clerks of sessions with the book of forms for sessional records, published by the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work, or similar aid.
- (3) That clerks of sessions be requested to use the printed form of letters of dismission, and that in the records print be used for clearness, instead of script, in recording names.
- (4) Attention is called to the fact that sessional records are neither the historical records nor files for church papers, but only the record of sessional action.

The Permanent and Stated Clerks were appointed a committee to ascertain the requirements of the law of the church as to the entering of the minutes of congregational meetings upon the sessional records.

A conference was held under the leadership of the sub-Committee on Evangelistic Work with Elder E. Stanley Sloat in the chair, based on the report of the committee. After discussion the following recommendations were adopted.

- 1. That Presbytery stress this year the thought and methods of parish evangelism, and that our churches be urged to make an effort to keep the growth of their membership up to the growth of the population in their vicinities. Also that the churches attempt to reach the great mass of unchurched and non-Christian people that have no ecclesiastical connection whatsoever.
- 2. That Monday, October 11, be a day set aside for prayer and evangelistic conference. That this conference be held at Wallace Lodge in Yonkers; that it begin at 10 a. m. and close at 4 p. m.; that the arrangements be left in the hands of the committee; and all ministers and elders be invited and urged to attend and aid in

making this a day of peculiarly sacred significance for evangelism in all our churches. Also that the expense incurred be paid by the treasurer of the Executive Committee.

- 3. That Presbytery approves the establishment of close relations between the churches and your committee, and that it recommends to the churches that they invite members of the committee to their churches for conference with the pastor and officers and for such public meetings, as shall be deemed wise by the conference, the details of these visitations to be left in the hands of your committee.
- 4. That Presbytery would urge upon the churches the holding of special services some time during the year, by means of which the entire congregation will be led to turn their minds to, and engage in, the winning of men to Jesus Christ.
- 5. That we urge each of our churches to form and train an invitation committee, which will be the main support of the pastor and session in carrying on the personal effort needed in church evangelism.
- 6. Recognizing the great leakage still found in Protestantism, a leakage that comes between the Senior Sunday School age and the early age of church membership, Presbytery urges every session to make a very earnest effort to close this gap and to win every Sunday School student to church membership.
- 7. That this Committee be continued; that it become the Committee on Evangelistic Work; that the evangelistic work, now in the hands of the Committee on the New Era Movement, be intrusted to it, but that it labor in close harmony with the Committee on the New Era Movement,
- 8. That since the Executive Secretary is acting as secretary of this committee also, that he be authorized to include the expenses of the Committee on Evangelistic Work separately in his expense account, the same to be paid after audit by the Executive Committee.

It was ordered that the traveling expenses of a minister to be assigned to work in the town of Somers by the Board of Home Missions be paid by Presbytery.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

There were reported to the General Assembly last May from the churches of Presbytery gifts to benevolence amounting to \$78,089, an increase over the previous year of \$26,908.56.

From the church at large there were reported in gifts for benevolence an increase of three and two-thirds millions of dollars, 59 per cent.; including miscellaneous an increase of five and one-half millions of dollars, 50 per cent.; for all objects an increase of ten and four-fifths millions of dollars, 33 per cent.; (it took six years, 1914-1919, nearly to equal this increase); for congregational expenses an increase of four and two-thirds millions of dollars, 24 per cent.; in the receipts of boards, agencies and self-supporting synods an increase of three millions of dollars, 66 2/3 per cent.; (it

took ten years, 1910-1919, to make an increase of two millions of dollars).

There are 34,072 more communicants reported than last year, the least net increase since 1912, except 1919, 2 per cent. The increase in communicants is by no means keeping pace with the increase of gifts.

It is recommended and moved that Presbytery urge

- 1. Regarding money—That pains be taken to secure the payment of individual subscriptions; that funds collected for benevolence be paid over at least quarterly; that the central receiving agency, A. R. Nicol, Treasurer, 156 Fifth Avenue, New York, be used as a convenient distributing agency; that an honest effort be made by the churches to meet their benevolent apportionment, or at least as near an approximation thereto as possible; that churches that have not recently increased their pastor's salary seriously consider whether, in view of present conditions, they are giving him that competent compensation, which they promised (16 churches in this Presbytery have increased their pastor's salary since April, 1919).
- 2. Regarding methods—That churches adopt a definite program of service for the year, setting up specific goals where that may promise stimulus to achievement; that this program take account of "seasonal activities," such as suggested by the New Era Movement, including a "social visitation" in the autumn, preferably through the group organization, so often commended; that if any church has not made an every-member canvass this year it do so.
- 3. Regarding men—That in view of the large numbers placed on the suspended roll, each church make an effort, beginning in this month of October, to reclaim delinquent members and to secure the transfer of absent members to the roll of the church in the place of their residence; that pastors be requested to send to the Executive Secretary the names of absent members residing within the bounds of the Presbytery.

The Missionary Committee presented a report, which was received and its recommendations adopted:

- 1. In view of the fact that the New Era quotas, assigned to the churches severally, have had their origin and express the needs of the various missionary agencies of the church, that all the churches be urged to honestly and prayerfully realize these quotas as goals of achievement as quickly as possible.
- 2. All churches, which have not done so, appoint a director of missionary education, and send his or her name to the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister, Mt. Vernon, N. Y.
- 3. That the Rev. Herbert Barber Howe be appointed to fill the vacancy, caused by the dismission of the Rev. James A. Mc-Williams to another presbytery.

The Stated Clerk presented a report on communications which was received, adopted and is as follows:

- 1. A letter of the Presbytery of Soochow, Synod of Five Provinces, of the Presbyterian Church of China, dismissing the Rev. D. Willard Lyon to this presbytery. It is recommended and moved that he be received and enrolled on answering the constitutional questions in the affirmative.
- 2. A letter of the Presbytery of San Francisco dismissing the Rev. John R. Voris to this presbytery. It is recommended and moved that he be received and enrolled,
- 3. The following papers were referred to the Business Committee:
- (1) A communication from the Presbytery of Brooklyn-Nassau, proposing an overture to the General Assembly on "Revision of General Assembly Representation."
- (2) One from the Presbytery of Logansport, proposing an overture to the General Assembly asking that the Stated and Permanent Clerks of that body be elected for terms of five years.
- (3) One from the Presbytery of Portland, proposing an overture to the committee in charge of the Stated Clerk's Office and the Executive Commission of the General Assembly to present to the next General Assembly a plan of reorganization.
- (4) One from the Presbytery of Cayuga, proposing an overture to the General Assembly in favor of a reorganization of the executive offices of the General Assembly.
  - (5) The apportionments of the General Assembly.
- 4. The following was referred to the sub-Committee on Ministerial Relief:
- (1) A communication on Ministerial Relief from the Presbytery of San Joaquin.

5. The application of Mr. Antonio Zaccara to be taken under Intermediate the care of Presbytery with view to ordination was received December 29, 1920, and forwarded to the chairman of the Committee on January 18, 1921. Education and Examinations.

6. It is recommended and moved that the following be excused for absence from this meeting:

#### 7. Died:

(1) At Danbury, Conn., December 31, 1920, Hart Curry, an elder of the Mahopac Falls Church, aged 73 years. It is recommended and moved that the Rev. Arthur Requa be appointed to prepare a biographical minute for the memorial service.

The Rev. Frelon E. Bolster of the Classis of New York of the Reformed Church and the Rev. Arnaldo Stasio of the Presbytery of New York were invited to sit as corresponding members.

The printed minutes (pp. 389-427) were approved.

The Rev. D. Willard Lyon answered the constitutional questions in the affirmative, and was received and enrolled.

The Stated Clerk presented a report on amendment to standing rules or orders required in order that the Spring Stated Meeting may be held earlier (p. 408). It was received, but its recommendation was not adopted. It is as follows:

No amendment to either standing rules or orders is required. Standing Rule No. I fixes the dates of the regular meetings, but with this proviso—"unless in either case Presbytery shall otherwise order." All that is necessary is for Presbytery to "otherwise order." The ecclesiastical year ends March 31. Nothing will be gained by holding the meeting earlier than that date, and it is to be doubted whether the purpose in view can be attained by any change in date that we can possibly make.

If, however, Presbytery is still disposed to make the change suggested, it is recommended and moved that, as a trial, the Spring Stated Meeting this year be held beginning Monday, April 4.

The Permanent and Stated Clerks presented a report on the requirements of the law of the church as to the entering of the minutes of congregational meetings upon the sessional records, as ordered by Presbytery (p. 412). The report was received, adopted and is as follows:

Congregational meetings may be divided into two classes, which for convenience may be designated as ecclesiastical and civil. The first are called by the session, have to do with the "spiritualities," and are subject to the laws of the church; and the second, called Intermediate Meeting, January 18, 1921. by the trustees, have to do with the so-called "temporalities," are subject to the laws of the state, and are designated as "corporate meetings." At the former pastors, elders and deacons are elected, etc.; while at the latter trustees are elected, and the financial interests of the church are attended to. The call for the first class of congregational meetings must be made a matter of record by the session in its minutes. If nothing further concerning the congregational meeting, so called, appears in the sessional records, in some cases certainly and in most probably, the record will be incomplete. At such a meeting, for example, a pastor or elders may be elected, but all that appears in the minutes are the new names on the rolls of the meetings, either of a new moderator or of new elders. There is nothing to show that a new pastor has been chosen and installed or new elders elected or ordained, and that the persons named are entitled to seats in the judicatory.

The subject submitted to your committee came up in the General Assembly of 1887 on an overture from the Presbytery of Pittsburgh relative to the meaning of Section 72 of Chapter IX of the Book of Discipline, which reads in part as follows:

"All proceedings of the church shall be reported to, and reviewed by, the session, and by its order incorporated with its record."

The deliverance of the General Assembly is as follows:

"1. That the rule is not discretionary, but mandatory, that the church session shall order the incorporation of the proceedings of congregational meetings with their own records.

"2. That it is in the power of the session to direct that the proceedings of such meetings, or of the church (whether said proceedings are reported to the session in the form of minutes of meetings or as reports of boards or committees) shall be incorporated in the sessional records in such a manner, and to such extent only, as will faithfully exhibit the action taken.

"This construction of the rule in question is to be understood to apply to the proceedings of trustees in all cases, in which, under the laws of the places where they exercise their functions, their action is subject to review of the session." (Min. of G. A., 1887, pp. 117 and 118; Digest, 1898, pp. 678 and 679.")

We have the following from the General Assembly of 1901:

"Overture from the Presbytery of Washington City relative to Article LXXII, Chapter IX of the Book of Discipline, whether under that article it is discretionary with the church session to order the minutes of the Board of Deacons to be incorporated with the records of session? Answer:—It is discretionary." (Min. of G. A., 1901, p. 107; Digest, 1898, p. 679.)

Your committee recommends and moves:

1. That the proceedings of all congregational meetings, called by the session, for any purpose whatever, shall be reported in full to the session for review, and record made of the same by order of the session, not separately but in the minutes of the meeting, at which they are reported, in full, or better for brevity in abstract. This is mandatory.

2. Review of the minutes of the Board of Deacons and record

of the same in the minutes of the session is discretionary, and not Intermediate mandatory.

3. The proceedings of corporate meetings, called by the trus- January 18, 1921. tees, and the proceedings of the trustees, being subject to the laws of the state, are not subject to review by the session, except only as required by such laws.

A call was presented from the Port Chester for the pastoral services of the Rev. Frelon E. Bolster. The call stipulates a yearly salary of \$2,400 in regular monthly payments with a vacation of four weeks in each year. The procedure as reported has been regular; and the call, certified by the moderator of the meeting, is regular in form. The commissioners of the congregation were heard. The call was found in order, and it was ordered placed in Mr. Bolster's hands, when he has been received by Presbytery.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee met on January 10, a quorum being present, and instructed the chairman to present to Presbytery the following actions:

- The Rev. Arthur C. McMillan was elected chairman and the Rev. Warren N. Nevius secretary.
- 2. Arthur P. Dawson has informed the committee that he is engaged in secular employment. R. Irving Barnett is also engaged in secular employment but has given no answer to the enquiry of your committee. The health of Eugene Meray shows no improvement, so as to warrant an expectation of returning to his studies. The whereabouts of Pietro Guiffrida are unknown. It is, therefore, recommended and moved that the names of these persons be dropped from the roll of candidates.
- 3. Charles Papp has notified your committee that he expects to present himself for examination for ordination at the Spring Stated Meeting, and the Committee has assigned him parts of trial.
- 4. Antonio Zaccara has notified the committee that he will apply to be taken under our care, as soon as our rules permit, with a view to ordination. He has been a licensed preacher in the Methodist Episcopal Church. He is now working under the supervision of our Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions at White
- 5. Vicenzo Cigliano, a local evangelist, under care of Presbytery and for eighteen years in charge of our work among the Italians at Port Chester, applies for ordination. He has submitted to your committee an extended statement of his faith. His views are sound and orthodox. His course of study covered all requirements of our regulations. Your committee believe that his usefulness would be increased, if he were to administer the sacraments, and his standing among the Italians would be greater. It is recommended and moved that he be ordained and that his ordination take place at this meeting.

- 6. Attention is called to the value of having one or more of the young people in each church attend the conference at Stony Brook in the summer. Sessions should have this in mind and make their selections on some basis of merit, to be determined by months of experience in the regular work of the church, and early, because some young people make their arrangements for the summer early.
- 7. The Rev. David H. Craver is superintendent of Synod's Department of Religious Education. It is recommended and moved that he be invited to conduct a conference on religious education at the afternoon session of the June meeting of Presbytery.
- 8. Attention is called to the fact that Sunday, January 30, is Christian Endeavor Day, in our calendar, and February 6 is Young People's Day. Most churches will not care to observe both, but the idea of honoring our young people is well worth giving one service to them.
- 9. A conference for older boys and leaders will be held at White Plains, Friday to Sunday, February 4-6. This conference is held under the auspices of County Sunday School Association and the County Young Men's Christian Association. Each church is permitted to send two boys and one leader. The objects of this conference include the presentation of a Christian program, the inauguration of a county-wide effort to enlist boys for Christian work, and win them to church membership before Easter. Your committee has not seen the way to hold a conference for Presbyterian boys for the whole Presbytery. Consideration is being given to a plan of holding regional conferences, at which boys in the first years of high school and also in the eighth grades could be gathered and the subject of Christian life work, especially the ministry, could be presented to them. This may be attempted toward the close of the present school year.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Three conferences of the rural pastors of this presbytery have been held in the Katonah Presbyterian Church. The most helpful outcome has been the determination upon co-operation with all other denominations in an every-member visitation in the spring. An inter-denominational ministers' meeting was held at Brewster, N. Y., January 11, at which plans were formulated for such a visitation during the two weeks preceding May 8.

The old Somers Church has been again opened for services every Sunday at 7 p. m. under the direction of the Rev. Warren H. Wilson of the Board of Home Missions (p. 409). The Rev. Charles T. Greenway preaches there on Sundays and carries on pastoral work. The good attendance and the interest in the services is most encouraging. An enthusiastic Christmas entertainment was provided on Christmas eve.

We commend for his faithful service among the Italians of Port Chester Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano and we bid him Godspeed in his new capacity as minister of the Italian congregation at that place.

It is recommended and moved:

1. That inasmuch as the officials of the Mahopac Falls Church

feel that a canvass at the present time would complicate matters and have promised to take an every-member canvass at the beginning of the next year on May 1, the treasurer of the committee be authorized to pay the amount voted by Presbytery to the Mahopac Falls Church for the quarters ending December 31, 1920, and March 31, 1921.

- 2. That \$300 be paid by the treasurer to the Synod for its home mission work.
- 3. That the treasurer by authorized to pay on January 29, the next interest date, \$1,000 to reduce the mortgage on the property occupied by the Italian mission, Slater Street, Port Chester, N. Y.
- 4. That inasmuch as the Board of Home Missions has been unable to furnish a worker among the smaller groups of Italians, as requested by Presbytery, Presbytery requests the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work to furnish a colporteur for Italians, if such can be found, to work under the direction of this committee.
- 5. That the action of the sub-Committee on Work Among Foreign-Speaking Peoples in engaging Mr. Antonio Zaccara to take charge of the work among Italians at White Plains up to April 1 be approved; and that the sub-committee be authorized in conference with the Executive Secretary to make suitable arrangements for this work for the year beginning April 1.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was received and its recommendation adopted. The recommendation is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that the Stated Clerk be authorized to send to the churches with the blanks for the narrative a separate sheet, upon which the pastor may summarize his views of the spiritual condition of his church.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

For the year 1921-1922 the Executive Commission of the General Assembly has approved a budget of \$12,000,000 for our Presbyterian boards and agencies. Of this \$2,109,653 has been apportioned to the Synod of New York, and \$100,829 to the Presbytery of West-chester, which your committee has apportioned among our churches. The amount is some 60 per cent. of last year's budget. The total asked of Presbytery is less than the total amount of benevolences, including miscellaneous, reported by our churches in April, 1920. It averages \$9.31 per member, 2½ cents a day per member. It will not be reached without effort, without more effort than this current year in many cases. The churches must have more thorough presentation of the facts, more and better education in Christian stewardship, more insistent and prevailing claiming of the heart and life for the blessed Lord and His service.

Your committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That Presbytery approve of the committee's apportionment to the churches of quotas for benevolence.
- 2. That Presbytery urge that these quotas be considered as a standard from which none shall willingly fall short, which many shall gladly exceed.

The Moderator was directed to send a letter of sympathy to the Rev. Abraham Tamraz, who is in a hospital in Youkers

The following motion was referred to the Business Committee:

That the Stated Clerk be directed to convey to the Executive Commission of the General Assembly the protest of Presbytery against the inclusion in the apportionments of the General Assembly of such items as "Publicity," which are not ecclesiastical expenses and which should be provided for in same way as other benevolent funds.

The foregoing minutes were read and approved.

Presbytery then proceeded to the ordination of Mr. Vincenzo Cigliano to the ministry.

The Moderator propounded the constitutional questions, which were answered in the affirmative, and offered the prayer of ordination; and Mr. Cigliano was set apart to the ministry with the laying on of the hands of the Presbytery.

Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the Presbyterian Church, Mt. Kisco, N. Y., Monday, April 18, 1921.

Presbytery convened at 9 a. m. and was opened with prayer.

The following, not in attendance yesterday, were present:

The printed minutes (pp. 429-436) were approved.

It was ordered that an abstract of the narrative, presented last evening, be entered on the minutes and sent to the General Assembly. The abstract is as follows:

The impressions made upon the minds of the narrators by the narratives of the churches, especially by the personal reports of the pastors, may be summed up somewhat as follows:

- 1. A rising, even if as yet only a slowly rising, tide of spirituality within the membership of the churches.
- 2. There is a turning, even though it be small as yet, to a sane, but virile emphasis upon evangelism (meaning the evangelistic message and method and atmosphere), though our Presbytery as a whole is still too afraid of the word "evangelism," and does not apparently realize that it cannot at the present time be spoken of as a presbytery, whose chief atmosphere is the evangelistic atmosphere. We are hoping that this may all be changed as we Presbyterians learn once more that a church has nothing to fear, if it is known primarily as a church, not of great preaching or unusual organization or of wondrous aesthetic appointments, but as a church that is winning men individually to Jesus Christ. "Parish evangelism," however, it must be said in all fairness, seems to have been fairly well stressed this past year. A two weeks' evangelistic campaign was conducted by the Executive Secretary, the Rev. Benjamin H. Everitt, at Katonah with such success, that it has been suggested that it be the practice of presbytery to allow him a month or six weeks from his executive work before each Easter in order that he may give himself to evangelistic preaching and leadership in such churches as may desire his services.
- 3. The churches have done exceedingly well in their gifts this year toward their benevolent apportionments. The latter had been unreasonably large, and but one church, that at Patterson, reached its full quota. Yet many churches report splendid increases in benevolent education and giving, and several churches have "taken on" the partial or full support of a home or foreign missionary.
- 4. Some fine things are being done among the foreign speaking populations, but there is call for a much larger and more aggressive effort. In this suburban center, in the judgment of the narrator, we shall never adequately meet our Protestant responsibilities without a very real co-operation between all the larger denominations.
- 5. We have a real field for study and effort in the northern part of our presbytery. Much faithful work is being done, but

the situation is not an ideal one. The Rev. Warren H. Wilson's "Community Church" idea probably contains the germs for the solution of this very important problem.

In conclusion, one of our devoted pastors put this statement in his narrative: "The war has left an aftermath of spiritual fatigue, dullness of ethical judgment, a feeling that idealism is impractical, an intolerant attitude toward non-conformists, and a desire to get back to the status quo ante rather than press on to establish the Kingdom of God." This, perhaps, is one of the finest summaries of the effects of the war. We feel that it is a true one. It constitutes, too, a challenge to the ministers, elders and leaders of the churches that we love. Dare we say that we also long to get back to the status quo ante rather than to press on to establish the Kingdom of God? "Speak unto the children that they go forward!" The pillar of the cloud and fire is moving! "Who follows in his train?"

The minutes of yesterday's sessions were read and approved.

The following were placed in nomination for Commissioners to the General Assembly:

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves

- 1. That the June Intermediate Meeting be held in the Presbyterian Church, South Salem, N. Y., for which an invitation has been received.
- 2. As no invitation has been received for the Fall Stated Meeting, action fixing the place therefor be deferred until the June Intermediate Meeting.

The committee to nominate Trustees presented a report recommending and moving the election of Elder Rodney Gibson for the term of one year to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Elder Allan L. Sutton, of Elder Joseph A. Greene for the term of two years to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Elder Ralph E. Prime, and of the Rev. Arthur C. McMillan and Elders Howard Whittemore and Thomas M. Logan for the term of three years to succeed themselves. The report was received and the persons nominated elected.

Elder Walter F. Haskett was elected a member of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply for the term of three

Spring Stated Meeting April 19, 1921. years to succeed Elder Ward W. Adair, whose term of service now expires.

The Rev. Arthur C. McMillan was elected chairman of the Committee on Vacancy and Supply for the term of one year.

The Delegates to the Synod presented a report which was received and fidelity of the delegates approved.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The New Era Committee reports that \$1,009,000 more than the previous year's receipts have been received by the boards and agencies, and in the absence of figures it is evident that the churches of Presbytery have given more to the boards and agencies and to benevolences at large than ever before in a single year.

It is recommended and moved that the following overture be sent to the General Assembly:

The Presbytery of Westchester overtures the General Assembly to instruct the Stated Clerk's office to revise the instructions at the head of the statistical blank for the "Annual Report of the Church to Presbytery" in order to secure uniformity in the reporting of offerings: especially those for objects, which are included in the list for the division of undesignated offerings, which is recommended by the Executive Commission, or for other objects to which numerous churches are likely to be giving. Doubt has been felt regarding the head under which should be reported offerings for Interchurch debt, New Era expenses, Soldiers and Sailors, Training Schools, Churches in Europe, Famine Relief, and the like.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received and its recommendations adopted. They are as follows::

1. That aid be asked of the Board of Home Missions to the amount of \$7,350 to be distributed as follows:

2. That the sub-Committee on Foreign Speaking Peoples be instructed to enquire into the necessity for and the possibility of enlarging the present building of the Italian Mission at Port Chester, and at their discretion proceed with such enlargement.

3. That a \$50 grant be made to the South East Church, provided that at the time of the June Intermediate Meeting of Presbytery the pulpit arrangements and church work at South East shall be approved by the Committee on Vacancy and Supply and the Executive Secretary.

4. The approval of the plan of rural visitation, as outlined by the conference of the pastors of all Protestant denominations, in Northern Westchester and Putnam Counties; and in order that Prespytery may do its share of the visitation, the Executive Secretary be authorized to employ assistance to an amount not to exceed \$100.

- 5. That a representative of Presbytery attend the Synodical Home Missions Conference of the Synod of New York to be held Tuesday, April 26, in the Italian Branch of the First Presbyterian Church, Schenectady, N. Y., and that the expenses of the delegate be paid by the treasurer.
- 6. That Presbytery through the chairman of the sub-Committee on Foreign Speaking Peoples send to all other denominations working within the bounds of our presbytery fraternal greetings and call for a conference prior to the Fall Stated Meeting to consider definite proposals of co-operation and adjustment in the work for Foreign Speaking Peoples.
- 7. That, providing a working arrangement at Croton Falls and Somers can be arranged, a sum not to exceed \$500 a year be granted for this combined work to secure an able pastor, who can with the aid of an automobile properly care for the whole work in that neighborhood.
- 8. We desire to make acknowledgment of the thirty-five years of faithful service of our loved and honored Stated Clerk, the Rev. William J. Cumming, and of our deep regret that he has resigned the office which he has made most honorable, and we here express our appreciation for his scholarly advice and courteous aid, which he has given this committee.

The Executive Committee presented a report, which was received and action thereon was deferred until the June Intermediate Meeting.

Mr. James Wood, a minister of the Society of Friends, President Emeritus of the American Bible Society and President of the Westchester County Bible Society, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

A communication from the South Yonkers Church to the effect that financial aid from the funds of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions would no longer be needed. It was ordered that the congratulations of the Presbytery should be conveyed to the South Yonkers by the Moderator, and that action granting such aid (p. 309) be rescinded to take effect April 1.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

1. Overtures from the General Assembly (p. 398).—(1) Overture on the "Eligibility of Women to the Eldership and the Diaconate." Your committee recommends that inasmuch as this overture contemplates an amendment to the Form of Government and is not adequately formulated to effect such amendment, if approved, the Presbytery of Westchester respectfully declines to express itself

Spring Stated Meeting April 19, 1921. upon the proposition therein contained until the same shall be presented in definite and adequate form, according to the provisions of the constitution for the amendment of the Form of Government.

- (2) The second overture is the "Plan of Union for Evangelical Churches U. S. A." It is moved that it be answered in the affirmative.
- 2. Seven overtures from other presbyteries to the General Assembly of 1921 are offered to this presbytery for concurrence:
- (1) One is from the Presbytery of Brooklyn-Nassau (p. 430), asking an amendment to the Form of Government providing for the election of Commissioners to the Assembly for the term of two years and not later than the fall meeting next preceding the meeting of the Assembly. As it is already within the power of any presbytery to pursue this course in the election of its commissioners, your committee sees no need of amending the form of Government to this effect and making such a course obligatory. The committee therefore recommends and moves that no action be taken.
- (2) Three overtures, coming from the Presbyteries of Cayuga, Logansport and Portland, ask the reorganization of the offices of the General Assembly. Your committee recommends and moves that the subject matter of these overtures be commended to the diligent consideration of the commissioners of this presbytery, but that no further action be taken.
- (3) An overture from the Presbytery of Flint (p. 439) asks that the Assembly rules be so amended that any Evangelical minister, serving a "federated church," of which a Presbyterian church is a constituent member, may be authorized to act as moderator of the session in certain matters, and that non-Presbyterian ministers serving Presbyterian churches in "federation" shall have their names included in the list of ministers in the "Minutes," with the abbreviation "Fed. S. S." added. This overture shows a lack of acquaintance with constitution of the church. Your committee recommends and moves that no action be taken.

(4) An overture from the Presbytery of Jersey City asks for the merging of the Boards of Home Missions and Missions for Freedmen. Your committee recommends and moves that no action be taken.

- (5) An overture from the Presbytery of New York asks the Assembly to eliminate all assessments, except for the annual expenses, and to make no appropriations which involve levying a tax upon the members of the church till approved by a majority of the presbyteries. This overture is in accord with a resolution offered on the floor of this presbytery at the January Intermediate Meeting and referred to your committee (p. 436), to the effect that "The Stated Clerk be directed to convey to the Executive Commission of the General Assembly the protest of Presbytery against the inclusion in the apportionments of the General Assembly of items such as Publicity, which are not ecclesiastical expenses, and should be provided for in the same way as other benevolent funds." The item of "Publicity" in this year's apportionments of Presbytery is \$162.41. Your committee recommends and moves that Presbytery concur in the overture from the Presbytery of New York.
  - 3. Sundry resolutions and requests.

(1) A resolution of the conference of Self-Supporting Home Missionary Agencies and the Board of Home Missions, held January 25-27, 1921, expresses the hope that the minimum salary of \$1,500 and manse, as fixed by the Assembly, shall apply only to regularly installed pastors living on the field and giving their whole time to the work. Your committee is of the opinion that no action is needed on this resolution and reports upon it simply for the information of Presbytery.

Spring Stated Meeting April 19, 1921.

- (2) A request from the American Bible Society that a committee of Presbytery be appointed to look after its interest as an accredited agency of the church. Your committee recommends and moves that the Westchester County Bible Society be recognized as the agent of the American Bible Society and heartily commended to the churches of Presbytery.
- 4. Resignations.—The Rev. Arthur Requa asks leave to resign the pastoral charge of the Mahopac Falls Church, resignation to take effect on April 30. The church concurs in the request as voted at a congregational meeting duly called by the session and held on April 6, 1921, under the moderatorship of the Rev. Thomas C. Straus. The minutes of the congregational meeting were before the committee, and the commissioners of the church were heard. The reason assigned for the request is the unfavorable conditions in the church. Your committee recommends and moves that the request be granted.

## 5. Calls.—

- (1) The Ossining First Church presents a call for the pastoral services of the Rev. Robert Meade Patterson. The call is in due form, was voted at a duly called meeting of the congregation held March 16, 1921, is signed on behalf of the congregation, and is properly attested by the moderator of the meeting. The minutes of the congregational meeting were presented, and the commissioner of the congregation was heard. The salary is \$3,500 a year, with a manse and six weeks' vacation. Your committee recommends and moves that the call be found in order, that further action be deferred until Mr. Patterson, to whom the call is issued, shall become a member of this presbytery, and that when Presbytery adjourns, it adjourn to meet in the Ossining First Church on Wednesday, May 11, at 3.30 p. m.
- (2) The Peekskill Church presents a call for the pastoral services of the Rev. S. Willis McFadden. The call is in due form, was voted at a duly called meeting of the congregation held on March 9, is signed on behalf of the congregation by the pastoral committee and the officers of the church, as authorized at the congregational meeting, and is attested by the moderator. The minutes of this meeting were before the committee, and the commissioners were heard. The salary named is \$4,000 a year with a manse and an annual vacation. Your committee recommends and moves that the call be found in order, and that further action upon it be deferred until Mr. McFadden becomes a member of Presbytery.
- 6. The call of the Port Chester Church for the pastoral services of the Rev. Frelon E. Bolster was found in order at the January Intermediate Meeting, and has been placed in his hands and accepted at this meeting. Your committee recommends and moves that the following order of installation be adopted:

Spring Stated Meeting April 19, 1921. Date.—May 5, at 8 p. m. Sermon.—Rev. William I. Chamberlain of the Classis of New Brunswick, to be invited. Charge to the pastor.—Rev. Arthur C. McGiffert of the Manhattan Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers, to be invited. Charge to the people.—Rev. Charles G. Sewall. To preside and propound the constitutional questions.—The Moderator. Prayer of installation.—Rev. Charles L. Carhart. The session is authorized to fill any vacancies that may occur in this order.

7. The reports of the treasurers of the Trustees and of the Executive Committee have been referred to your committee for audit. Your committee finds them correct and recommends and

moves their approval.

8. There has been referred to your committee a statement of the financial condition of the Presbytery by the Treasurer. Your committee recommends and moves that it be referred to a special committee, with instructions to revise the estimates of expenditures and the apportionments and to report at the June Intermediate Meeting.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The committee recommends and moves:

1. That Presbytery urge the churches to make a careful "follow up" effort in some quiet but organized way to gather in the persons, who were interested but did not come to a definite decision during the Easter ingathering.

2. That the Monday night meeting at the Fall Stated Meeting

be given to the subject of Evangelism.

- 3. That Presbytery authorize its Treasurer to pay the expenses of the narrator in connection with the preparation and presentation of the narrative.
- 4. That Presbytery approves of the effort of the Executive Secretary in conducting evangelistic campaigns in the churches, and that it authorizes its Executive Committee to permit him to do this work, whenever it seems wise to him and the committee.

The Moderator appointed the Stated Clerk, the Permanent Clerk and Elder Frederick I. Pugsley a special committee on the finances of Presbytery.

The Rev. H. A. Pritchard of the Diocese of New York was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

Presbytery then held a devotional service of half an hour under the leadership of the Rev. Joseph H. Hollister.

Presbytery took a recess until 2 p. m.

Tuesday, 2 p. m.

Presbytery reassembled and was opened with prayer. Elders Daniel P. Townsend and Stanley D. Cornish were appointed tellers of votes for Commissioners to the General Assembly.

Spring Stated Meeting April 19, 1921.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work has issued a joint appeal with the Board of Ministerial Relief to all the presbyteries asking them to overture the General Assembly to direct the Executive Commission to reallocate the whole budget for the year 1921-1922. The reason for this request comes from the fact that the budget gives such a percentage of the \$12,000,000 expected to be raised this coming year, as will give these boards less than they actually received in the year just closed.

Your committee recommends and moves that Presbytery overture the General Assembly to reopen the matter of the budget, making such changes in percentages as may seem wise.

The Rev. Charles S. Beatty of the Presbytery of Erie was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

It was ordered that a letter of sympathy be sent to the near relatives of Mr. John N. Cornwell, a candidate under the care of this Presbytery, who has been obliged to discontinue his studies on account of ill health.

Mr. Charles Papp, a candidate for the ministry under the care of Presbytery, read his statement of belief and was questioned thereon, as an applicant for licensure and ordination. On motion the examination was sustained.

Standing Rule 38b was suspended, and it was ordered that the Executive Committee for the coming year be composed of the same persons as last year.

The committee on the resignation of the Stated Clerk (p. 439) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Presbytery has heard with deep regret the request of the Stated Clerk that at a time to be appointed by Presbytery he be relieved of the responsibilities of the office, which he has so ably filled for thirty-five years—probably a longer term than that of any other clerk now serving the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. The Presbytery would like to appoint as a date for the acceptance of the resignation of the Rev. William J. Cumming the Greek Kalends. But, if that be possible, it ventures to ask of Mr. Cumming that he consider the continuation of his faithful and accurate service to the Presbytery for another lustrum, reminding him that the Scripture equivalent of a good round number is forty. When he shall have served forty years, he may bring the matter up again. If Mr. Cumming may now or later wish to have assistance in his duties, or may find it wise to train a successor, the Presbytery will be very willing to consider a suggestion of an assistant clerk.

- 2. There has been referred to the Business Committee a request of the Rev. James Packard Gillespie for leave to resign charge of the Katonah Church.
- 3. There has been referred to the Missionary Committee a report of the Women's Missionary Society of this presbytery.
- 4. A communication from the Stated Clerk of the Presbytery of Springfield commending the Rev. S. Willis McFadden, who recently united with this presbytery and has been installed pastor of the Peckskill Church. It is recommended and moved that it be read.
- 5. On May 25 the Rev. Edward P. Herrick and Mrs. Herrick, returned missionaries, celebrated their golden wedding at their home in Gaylordsville, Conn. It is recommended and moved that the Stated Clerk to be directed to present to them the congratulations and best wishes of Presbytery.
  - 6. From the Stated Clerk:

The Stated Clerk wishes to place on record his sincere thanks for the purse of gold, amounting to \$215, presented to him at the Spring Stated Meeting, and for the words of appreciation spoken at that time in recognition of his thirty-five years of service. He would also thank Presbytery for its offer of assistance, which he feels he does not need at present, and for the privilege of training his successor, of which he does not think it wise to avail himself (p. 451). It seems to him, however, best to leave his resignation in the hands of Presbytery, to take effect whenever it may see fit to appoint a successor.

The Committee on Place of Meeting presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved that the Fall Stated Meeting be held in the Presbyterian Church, New Rochelle, N. Y, for which an invitation has been received.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report, which was received and is as follows:

During the past year the board and agencies received from the churches more than \$10,000,000, one half of the budget, \$2,000,000 more than the previous year, twice the gifts to benevolence of two years ago. The churches of Presbytery reported gifts of \$96,000, an increase of 28%, following an increase the previous year of 56%. For the current year the new apportionment is well within our reach.

It was ordered that a day of pulpit exchange be held in the month of November.

The special committee on the finances of presbytery (p. 450) received permission to present its report at the Fall Stated Meeting.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented reports on Sabbath School Work and Young People's Societies, which were received.

The Committee of Arrangements presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves

1. That at 12.15 p. m. there be held a devotional service under the leadership of Elder William H. Baxley.

2. That recess be taken for luncheon at 12.30 p. m.

3. That there be held a conference on evangelism this afternoon under the leadership of the Rev. Francis S. Downs of the Presbytery of Philadelphia, North.

The chairman of the Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

It is recommended and moved:

- 1. That the treasurer of the committee be authorized to pay the expenses of Mr. Zaccara in his investigations in Dobbs Ferry, upon the approval of such expenses by the Executive Secretary.
- 2. - 4. That, in view of the need of the enlargement of the Port Chester Italian Mission Building, the treasurer of this committee be authorized to pay toward such enlargement an amount equal to that raised by the people of Port Chester, dollar for dollar, up to the limit of \$1000; and that the sub-Committee on Foreign Speaking Peoples be authorized to proceed with such enlargement according to their best judgment and in co-operation with the Italian Evangelical Association of Port Chester.
- 5. That the treasurer of this committee be authorized to pay off the mortgage on the Port Chester Italian Mission property, if the way be clear.

The Missionary Committee presented a report on work among the Freedmen, which was received.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves:

- 1. That Preshytery reconsider its action, taken at the meeting last January (p. 434), that the conference this afternoon be on the subject of religious education, and that there be substituted a conference on evangelism, with an address, the same to be led by a representative from the Assembly's committee on Evangelism, the Rev. Francis S. Downs of the Presbytery of Philadelphia North.
- 2. That Standing Order No. 5 be suspended, and that the Committee of Arrangements for the Fall Stated Meeting be empowered to arrange a dinner for the Monday evening session, and that the program for that session be arranged by the Committee on Evangelistic Work in conjunction with the Committee of Arrangements.

The Rev. William Horace Day of the Fairfield County Association of Congregational Ministers and Churches was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The Committee on Evangelistic Work presented a report, which was received, and its recommendations with the exception of that portion of No. 3, which proposes an appropriation and which was referred to the Business Committee. The report is as follows:

The Committee on Evangelism, through its chairman, made an oral report, the substance of which is as follows:

The report began with a note of optimism and thanksgiving over the fact that about two million new members were added to the Protestant Church last year. Attention was called to the conception of evangelism that the committee is holding in mind—the conception which means not merely adding Sunday School scholars and those who come by letter from other churches to the roll of our churches but also the evangelism which adds the unchurched and non-Christians to church membership. Attention was called to the report of the Assembly's Committee on Life and Work (Minutes of the G. A., 1921, p. 231). The ministers were urged to study this report. The plans for the Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer, to be held Tuesday, November 15, 1921, were presented. A conference is to be called soon with Rev. George G. Mahy, of the Assembly's Committee on Evangelism, for the purpose of informing our ministers and elders accurately concerning the plan of presbyterial evangelism as projected by the Assembly's committee. Churches were urged to begin preparation this fall for their Easter evangelistic campaigns. This committee is glad to hold conferences with the sessions and leaders of our churches, if evangelistic zeal and efforts will be stimulated thereby. Attention was called to the fact that the Assembly's Committee on Christian Life and Work is preparing a revised blank for the narrative to be submitted to the churches for trial. Dr. Biederwolf's book on "Evangelism" (Revell) was recommended.

Rejoicing, as we do, in the hopeful "Signs of the Times" as regards the state of religion, we recommend and move as follows:

- 1. That it be the sense of the Presbytery of Westechester that a genuine and wise evangelism be practiced by our churches with greater zeal than ever before, and that our churches be urged to formulate definite plans and methods to this end.
- 2. That Presbytery puts its approval on the committee's plan to call into conference the Rev. George G. Mahy of the Assembly's committee, in order that ministers and elders may learn the exact plan of presbyterial evangelism, as advocated by him and his committee.
- 3. That realizing the great reason that exists just now for gratitude to Almighty God for the large additions to the churches last year, Prebytery most heartily sanctions the plans of its com-

Oct. 3, 1921. mittee for the observance of a Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer, to be held in one of our churches November 15, 1921, coming, as it will, between our President's International Conference on Limitation of Armaments and our own National Thanksgiving Day—the program to be arranged by your committee, and the expenses to be paid by the Treasurer of Presbytery.

4. That the Presbytery approves of the plans of the Assembly to restore to membership in the churches many whose names are now upon the Suspended Roll. We further recommend and move a prayerful discussion of this whole matter during this meeting.

5. That the Rev. Herbert Barber Howe be the narrator for the Spring Stated Meeting, with the Rev. A. Murray Porter as associate narrator, and that the Stated Clerk be authorized to send a supplementary blank with the narrative blanks, as was done last year, for the pastors' personal report of the condition of his church.

The Rev. William Horace Day, Chairman of the Congregational National Council Commission on Evangelism and the Devotional Life, by invitation of Presbytery, delivered an address on evangelistic work, which was followed by questions and discussion.

On the recommendation of the Committee on Evangelistic Work the following was adopted:

Presbytery most heartily thanks our honored guest and speaker of the evening, the Rev. William Horace Day, Chairman of the Congregational National Council Commission on Evangelism and the Devotional Life, for his presence at this Monday evening session of Presbytery, and that we extend to him our hearty congratulations over the strong efforts being made in the Congregational Church along the lines of evangelism.

The Executive Committee presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

The Executive Committee has held stated meetings every month except August, at which it has received the reports of the valuable work done by our untiring and capable Executive Secretary, and lucid statements from our accurate Treasurer. The things reported appear elsewhere in the proceedings of Presbytery and its committee.

In the matter referred to the committee by Presbytery (p. 464), the proposed payment by Presbytery for New Era expenses of 2.27% of the gifts of our churches for Presbyterial Missions, it is recommended and moved that since the Board of Home Missions has paid that amount for us, that a contribution of 2.27% be given to that board to reimburse it for its expense in the New Era Movement.

At the request of the chairman of the Committee on Sessional Records the Rev. Messrs. Herbert Barber Howe and John J. McClelland were added to the committee.

The resolution on p. 179 of the Minutes of the General Assembly, 1921, relative to the Fund for the Churches in Europe, the American Church in Paris, and the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, was referred to the sessions of the individual churches for interpretation and action.

The Committee on the New Era Movement presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

To the boards and agencies the churches of Presbytery gave last year \$77,110. This year's apportionment is \$100,829. Let no church fall below the self-set quota of last year's gifts. If the assigned quota seem to any impossible, let such church set its own standard not less than 30% advance asked of Presbytery as a whole.

Your committee recommends and moves that

- 1. The Committee on the New Era Movement be included among the committees for which the committee appointed at this meeting to nominate permanent committees shall present recommendations at the January Intermediate Meeting.
- 2. That a Presbyterial day of exchange be held and the date fixed by the Committee on the New Era Movement.

The chairman of the Committee on the New Era movement, the Rey. Charles L. Carhart presented his

resignation as a member of the committee and requested that a successor be appointed.

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 4, 1921.

The special committee on the finances of Presbytery (p. 462) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

The deficit in the finances of Presbytery is a hardy annual of four years vigorous growth. With a practically stationary income of \$550, the outgo has increased to \$738.32 in 1921. The increase is to be charged almost wholly to printing, which has risen from \$199.25 in 1917 to \$397.95 in 1921. The expenses of delegates to Synod vary according to the distance of the place of meeting, but will maintain a high annual average as long as railway rates refuse to recede to pre-war figures.

Your committee recommends and moves

- 1. That the Stated Clerk be authorized, at his discretion, to omit from the printed minutes the rolls of Presbytery, wholly or in part.
- 2. That the Stated Clerk be authorized, unless otherwise ordered, to omit from the printed minutes such portions of reports of committees as do not consist of recommendations adopted or essential facts, upon which such recommendations are based.
- 3. That committees be directed to make their reports as concise as is consistent with clearness; and to present only such recommendations as involve definite and relevant action on part of Presbytery.
- 4. That the schedule of apportionments for presbyterial expenses be revised by a committee appointed by the Moderator, report to be made at the January Intermediate Meeting. This should be done as a matter of fairness, as the present schedule dates from 1912, and is the result of a horizontal increase of 35% on the schedule of 1904.

The Rev. John Steele of the Presbytery of Pittsburgh was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The committee appointed to consider the advisability of the purchase of a permanent camp to be used by the churches in the summer months (p. 464) presented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves that the Executive Secretary be instructed to send to the sessions of the churches of Presbytery through their moderators an explanatory letter and a questionnaire blank, requesting a frank discussion and a reply to the blank and letter before the January Intermediate Meeting.

The Business Committee presented a report, which was received, after amendment adopted and is as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves

1. That the overtures from the General Assembly on the "Election of Commissioners to the General Assembly for Two

Years" and the "Eligibility of Women to the Deaconship" be answered in the affirmative.

- 2. That the report of the Treasurer be approved as correct.
- 3. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses of the Day of Thanksgiving and Prayer, as recommended and moved by the Committee on Evangelistic Work, and the expenses of the Rev. William Horace Day, the speaker of last evening, in coming to the meeting.

The Committee on Education and Examinations presented a report, which was received.

The Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions presented a report, which was received and its recommendations adopted. They are as follows:

Your committee recommends and moves

- 1. That request be made to the Board of Publication and Sabbath School Work to continue the services of the colporteur, Mr. Lorenzo Cerchiara, within the bounds of Presbytery until the Spring Stated Meeting, and that Presbytery continue to pay \$20 a month toward his salary.
- 2. That approval be given to the proposed Westchester County Home Missions Council, and that the Moderator appoint at this meeting three representatives to that council, viz.—the Executive Secretary, the chairman of the sub-Committee on Foreign-Speaking Peoples, and the chairman of Committee on Presbyterial and Synodical Missions.
- 3. That approval be given for a conference between the Executive Secretary, the chairman of the sub-Committee on Foreign-Speaking Peoples, and all interested parties in Mt. Kisco concerning the situation there.
- 4. That request be made to the Trustees of Presbytery to loan \$500 from the Grove P. Mitchell Memorial Fund to the Italians of Port Chester in view of their liberal subscriptions toward the enlargement of that mission building.
- 5. That \$3 each Sunday for pulpit supply be paid to the Presbyterian Church work at Somers until the Spring Stated Meeting if services are held until that time.

A devotional service was then held under the leadership of the Rev. Frelon E. Bolster.

A recess was taken until 2 p.m.

Closed with prayer.

Tuesday, 2 P.M.

Presbytery reconvened and was opened with prayer. Rev. Herbert Barber Howe and Elder J. Lorton Lee were appointed tellers of votes for Delegates for Synod.

Rev. Robert Gardner McGregor and Elder Ransom

E. Wilcox were appointed a committee to nominate per-manent committees.

Fall Stated Meeting, Oct. 4, 1921.

It was ordered that the following overture be sent to the General Assembly:

Having answered in the affirmative the overture on the "Election of Commissioners to the General Assembly for Two Years," the Presbytery of Westchester overtures the General Assembly that, in the event the said overture shall be adopted, to send down to the Presbyteries the following overture or one of like tenor:

Shall the following section be added to Chapter XXI of the Form Government?—

When any commissioner shall sever his connection with his Presbytery during the term for which he was elected, his commission shall pass to his alternate or to a successor to be elected by the Presbytery.

The Rev. David H. Craver of the Presbytery of Geneva, Synodical Superintendent of Religious Education, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

By invitation of Presbytery, he made an address on Religious Education.

The Committee on Social Service presented a report, which was received and its recommendations adopted. They are as follows:

1. Inasmuch as the International Conference on Limitation of Armaments has been called by President Harding to take place in Washington, D. C., on November 11 (Armistice Day); and inasmuch as we believe that this conference will have its due influence in affecting the peace, the happiness and the safety of the whole world; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Stated Clerk of Presbytery be directed to express to the President of the United States our appreciation of his leadership in calling the conference, and to assure him of our prayers and hopes for its success.

- 2. That Presbytery earnestly urges its churches and all their members to observe the recommendation of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America that Sunday, November 6, be observed as a day for special prayer, self-examination and supplication for God's blessing upon the International Conference on Limitation of Armaments; and that our ministers are hereby urged to preach on that day, November 6, on some phase of this all-important topic of world peace.
- 3. That the afternoon conference hour of the Spring Stated Meeting be given over to the Committee on Social Service.

By invitation, the Rev. John Steele of the Board of Temperance and Moral Welfare addressed Presbytery on the subject—"Behind Prison Bars."

The Committee on the New Era Movement pre-

sented a report, which was received, adopted and is as follows:

Your committee announces that, as authorized by Presbytery (p. ..), the day of exchange will be October 30, and that the Executive Secretary is authorized to arrange a general Presbyterial exchange on that date among the churches that desire it and in cooperation with the ministers, who are willing to participate; that the theme will be the Responsibility of Church Membership; that the Moderator prepare for use in the exchange a letter to the churches; and that the Treasurer of the Executive Committee be authorized to pay the traveling expenses of those participating in the exchange.
