





CONFERENCE 'PROCEEDINGS.

[OFFICIAL RECORD.]

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

STEELTON, PA., September 26, 1900.

THE East Pennsylvania Conference of the United Brethren in Christ met in its one hundred and first session in the Centenary United Brethren Church, Steelton, Pa.

Bishop E. B. Kephart, D. D., LL. D., presided. The Bishop opened the Conference by reading the thirteenth chapter of Matthew and offering prayer. The hymns, "Jesus, I my cross have taken," and "All hail the power of Jesus' name," were sung. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. T. Shaeffer.

The opening address of the Bishop was very practical and forcible, outlining the work of the Church at home and in Germany and Africa.

The roll was called, and forty ministers and twenty-seven lay delegates responded to their names.

The secretaries of last year were reëlected—Z. A. Weidler, Recording Secretary, and E. A. G. Bossler, Statistical Secretary.

The bar of the Conference was made to include the first eight seats across the church.

The provisional program provided for the Conference was adopted, making the hours for opening the sessions at 8:30 A. M. and 1:30 P. M., and to adjourn on motion.

The following persons were recommended to the Conference for license to preach: G. Barstow Raezer, I. N. Seldomridge, C. L. Swartz, and S. E. Rupp. They were referred to the Committee on Applicants.

The transfer of Rev. J. T. Shaeffer was received and referred to the Committee on Credentials.

Master Frank Oyler was recognized as the page of the Conference.

The Bishop appointed the following committees:

The presiding elder, D. D. Lowery, read his annual report, as follows, which was adopted:

PRESIDING ELDER'S REPORT. '

To the Presiding Bishop and Members of East Pennsylvania Conference, in Session at Steelton, Pa., Greeting.

MY DEAR BRETHREN: I can hardly realize that another year, with its cares, toils, and rich blessings, is to be reckoned with the past. It is with deepest gratitude to our Heavenly Father for his abundant mercies toward me that I appear before you again to render my annual report of the district.

Deaths.—The ranks of our ministry have been depleted by the death of one member, Rev. C. G. F. Miller, who had been appointed at our last session of Conference to serve in the pastorate of the Lititz charge. Already quite indisposed during Conference, he left before the final adjournment, and in a few days took his bed with typhoid fever, from which, after lingering several weeks, he died in the calm assurance and bright hope of a blessed immortality. I appointed Rev. P. A. Bowman to write a memoir of our departed brother. Rev. A. L. Shannon recently buried his youngest child.

Resignation.—Rev. P. A. Bowman had been appointed to the Grantville charge, which he resigned, whereupon I appointed him to fill the vacancy on the Lititz charge occasioned by the death of Rev. C. G. F. Miller.

Rev. U. S. G. Renn, pastor at Ephrata, left in the early part of the year for Dayton, Ohio, where he has entered upon a course of study in Union Biblical Seminary. Rev. G. B. Raezer, of the New Holland quarterly conference, has since very acceptably filled the appointments.

Material Improvements.—A number of church buildings and parsonages have been repaired, one new church dedicated, and twochurch-houses are now in process of erection. The Iona church, Rev. W. W. Fridinger pastor, was dedicated in the early part of the Conference year. Reference to this church and its cost having been made in my last annual report, further mention here will therefore be unnecessary. At Denver, an appointment organized. a little more than a year ago, under the supervision of the pastor at Ephrata, Rev. U. S. G. Renn, a fine church building, costing about \$4,500, is now nearly completed, and will shortly be ready for dedication. This is one of the most vigorous and thriving little congregations in the Conference, with a hopeful outlook, and, under God's blessing, will undoubtedly grow rapidly into a strong congregation. The dilapidated Mt. Pisgah church building was taken down a few months ago, and a new building is now being erected. An evening having been set apart on the program for the consideration of Home Church-Extension Work, with special reference to Mt. Pisgah, Philadelphia, I do not deem it proper to anticipate at this time the program of Thursday evening by any further remarks. Lebanon Trinity parsonage has been repaired, and the now. church is now undergoing quite extensive repairs at a total cost of about \$3,200. The pastor, Rev. C. I. B. Brane, has labored untiringly toward the accomplishment of this good work. The New Holland church building, Rev. J. G. Smoker pastor, has been repaired—practically a new church—at a cost of \$3,000, and is now just about reaching completion. Lancaster Covenant, Rev. E. A. G. Bossler pastor, has been repaired at a cost of \$1,500. On the Manor charge, Rev. S. G. Kauffman pastor, the Refton church has received some slight improvement at a cost of \$75, and the Highville church has been repaired at a cost of \$1,500. The Oberlin church, Rev. M. A. Salt pastor, was carpeted and otherwise improved, at a cost of \$177. I am pleased to say that these pastors deserve a great deal of credit for the work of improvement thus accomplished on their church and parsonage properties. Church and parsonage debts have been greatly reduced. The church in which we are now assembled has recently paid its last indebtedness of \$1,500.

Conventions.—The usual annual conventions of the Conference Branch of the Woman's Missionary Association at Harrisburg Memorial, and of the Sunday-School at Hummelstown, were held during the year, with indications of increasing interest and steady growth.

Camp-Meetings.—There were three camp-meetings held during the month of August, Mt. Gretna, Sea Grove, and Hillsdale, and all three of them with the largest attendance in their history, and undoubtedly unsurpassed in deep spiritual interest and the immediate quickening of the spiritual life of the people.

Lebanon Valley College.—This school was never in so flourishing a condition. Owing to the rapid growth of the College during the past few years, it became necessary to enlarge the building by erecting a wing to the main structure, at a cost of \$13,500. The enrollment for this term already exceeds all previous records.

Mission Stations.—We have six missions within the bounds of

the Conference, Mt. Pisgah, Central Philadelphia, Pottstown, Mont Clare, Royalton, and St. John's Lebanon. Some of these are doing well, while others have made little progress. The committee having further charge of this interest of the Conference will no doubt look carefully into this work and report more fully than it is possible for me to do at this stage of our proceedings.

Spiritual Condition.—Considerable progress, I think I may safely say, has been made in the spiritual life of our people. The ministry and laity generally are reaching out for better and larger things in their Christian lives. Some of them have recently come into the enjoyment of rich blessing and a larger hope, with a deep peace that "passeth all understanding," by giving themselves more completely in service to the Lord. I could hardly be excused if I did not bear personal testimony to the gracious manifestation of my Lord toward me. During the past few weeks my heart has been full of an abiding peace. I long intensely for all my brethren, and desire that they may here and now join with me in entering upon the "life more abundant," by giving ourselves in absolute surrender to God. I pray that this session of our Annual Conference may prove to all of us a richer blessing, and become the gateway into a larger life of usefulness and spiritual power.

I am grateful for all the kindnesses I have received at the hands of my brethren, both in the ministry and the laity.

Praying that this session of Conference may be to those in attendance a season of quickening, and that the Lord may be very near to all of his servants, I subscribe myself

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SECOND YEAR'S COURSE OF READING.

We, your Committee on Second Year's Course of Reading, would submit the following report:

There appeared before us Brother I. Moyer Hershey, who was examined by us as per Discipline. We have graded him as follows: Theology, 90; Bible Study by Books—Old Testament, 95; Homiletics, 93; Church History, 89; Logic, 92; Extemporaneous Preaching, 95; Exegesis, 92; Essay, 75—average, 90[§]. We recommend that he be passed to the Third Year's Course of Reading.

There appeared before us also Brother M. M. Weber, whom we examined and graded as follows: Exegesis, 85; Extemporaneous Preaching, 70; Homiletics, 85—average, 80. On the other subjects

of the course he was not prepared to take an examination. We recommend that he be retained in the Second Year's Course of Reading.

Rev. L. O. Burtner, of the Maryland Conference, made a statement relative to placing a memorial window in the new church at Frederick City, Md., in honor of Bishop E. B. Kephart, of the Eastern District.

Rev. G. W. M. Rigor then offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

WHEREAS, There is a movement under way to place a window in the Centennial Memorial Church of Frederick City, Md., as a memorial to the Rev. E. B. Kephart, D. D., LL. D., Bishop of the East District of the United Brethren Church, at a cost of \$400, by the East Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania, Allegheny, and Eastern Conferences, therefore,

Resolved, That the East Pennsylvania Conference hereby agrees to assume the raising of \$100, our proportionate share of the above amount.

On motion, a committee of three was appointed to arrange for a Ministerial Association and provide a program for the same.

J. M. Shelly, A. A. Long, and E. Ludwick were appointed that committee.

The report on Moral Reform was read by J. G. Smoker, and, after an address by M. J. Mumma and Bishop Kephart, was adopted:

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM.

We have reached the age of moral reformation, when the world as well as the church, is looking out for moral reform, both in political and religious circles. The air is full of reforms as fruit is on the tree—some of it very green—some of it almost ripe; they seem to be connected with separate trees, but he who climbs a little and looks over the wall finds that they are mostly on converging branches of the one great tree of Christian civilization. There are very many branches of moral reform, but time will only permit us to touch upon a few of them. The necessity of reform in the political world is endless, and time would be lost in speaking of them here; but, as Christian ministers and laymen, let us be on the

alert, and use our influence and power to endeavor to aid in establishing reformation along all lines.

The first we desire to notice more especially is Sabbath reform. It is true that the Christian people of our land wake up to meet on one common battle-ground—all desecrations of the Christian Sabbath. We are pleased to note the growing sentiment in our own and other lands by the church and labor organizations for the overthrow of Sunday labor; that those employed in military, mail, and railroad service may no longer be deprived of their God-given right of their weekly rest.

Also, we should not overlook the necessity of funeral reform. First, in the way of more economy and less display, with absolutely no Sunday funerals, except in cases of real necessity.

While there are many more reforms to which we might call attention, yet one great monster remains to be mentioned in this connection—the rum trade. We believe that it cannot be properly conducted; that to license it is to murder our fellow-men for a price, and the only remedy that will prove effectual in its removal is the unity of the Christian people and the strong arm of prohibition. Quoting the words of Dr. Cuyler, "We never can create public sentiment strong enough to suppress the dram-shops until God's people take hold of the temperance reform movement as part of their religion." Therefore,

Resolved, 1. That we call upon our people and all Christians everywhere to study this problem in the light of truth.

2. That we will use all our powers to aid in strengthening all moral reforms of whatever character or nature for the lifting up of fallen humanity.

3. That we cannot justify the use of intoxicants as a beverage in any case and under any circumstances whatever.

4. That we will diligently teach the children, and persuade all others to adopt the principle of total abstinence.

5. That we declare ourselves the pronounced enemies of the liquor traffic, and will give it no support by act, influence, or ballot as Christian citizens.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN MISSIONS.

What a century it is that lies behind us. What brightening prospects are before us! What a record of missionary growth! Nearly four hundred societies, great and small, in place of a half dozen

when the century began. The few score of missionaries then are multiplied to sixteen thousand, at work in every continent and nation and island of the globe, and the missionary enterprise is the dominant movement of the day. It already records greater successes and signal triumphs, and the preparations are complete for a far wider and more rapid growth than the world has yet seen. In the close of this century alone it may be said that Christian missions are universal. We may take up the psalm, "All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of God." The very air is filled with unusual expectations which easily become articulate. Our Lord issued no impossible command when embracing without exception all the nations of the earth, he said, "Go ye into all the world and preach my gospel to every creature."

In obedience to the divine commission, we do hereby pledge ourselves—

1. To diffusing missionary intelligence among our people, and by presenting to them the great need of the hour and by urging their personal obligation and duty.

2. That we express our gratitude to God for the success that has attended our foreign work, especially in China and Japan, and for the early prospect of occupying our newly-acquired American territory by missions of our own Church.

3. While we thus bid Godspeed to our foreign work, we will renew our diligence in pushing forward our missionary work in the home land. Respectfully submitted,

Appropriations.—Philadelphia, Mt. Pisgah, \$400; Denver Mission Station (see action of Conference), \$300; Pottstown Mission Station, \$525; Royalton Mission Station, \$175; Lebanon St. John's, \$100.

Interest Moneys.—Philadelphia, Mt. Pisgah, \$50; Pottstown Mission Station, \$96; Harrisburg Church lots, \$162.

2. We recommend that Central Mission Station, Philadelphia, and Mont Clare Mission Station be referred to the Conference for such disposal as they may see proper.

3. We recommend that the sum of \$700 be paid out of the Conference funds toward the erection of the new Mt. Pisgah Church, Philadelphia.

The place of holding the next Annual Conference was referred to the presiding elder.

On motion, the secretaries were voted ten dollars each for services, and as much more as will be necessary for the payment of stationery and postage.

D. D. Lowery was reëlected editor of the *Conference Herald*, with the privilege of appointing assistants, if necessary.

C. B. Rettew made a statement concerning the Herald.

The report on Education was read by S. D. Faust, and in connection therewith Dr. H. U. Roop, president of Lebanon Valley College, read his annual report. After addresses by Dr. S. D. Faust, of Union Biblical Seminary, and Dr. H. U. Roop, of Lebanon Valley College, and Rev. H. B. Dohner, Financial Secretary of Lebanon Valley College, and Bishop Kephart, they were adopted.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

How largely the redemption of the race is dependent upon education in its most general application has never been shown. The first command given man by the Almighty is double in its application, providing for the multiplication of the number of persons and the intensification of their capabilities. Obedience to the first

provision of this command is fundamentally the product of in-Obedience to the second springs from self-determining, stinct. self-impelling rationality. To "subdue the earth" is the task that was assigned man as made in God's image. He has never been released from the task assigned, but there has been added, as the penalty of his disobedience, the more exacting demand that he regain his so largely lost moral and spiritual capacity. For this he learns to walk and talk and think and reason and act. Generation slowly succeeds generation, but as surely builds upon its predecessor the scaffolding from which it attempts God's thoughts after The race is always in childhood to-day, promising manhood him. to-morrow. To be able to do is its immediate goal. To be, in order to be able to do, is its essential life. Such being is its redemption, and for this Christianity stands. Christianity is therefore most intimately identified with education; it is life, but it is educated The schools are its children. Industry and commerce and life. invention and discovery and art and literature are its grandchildren.

On these accounts, and others, the church is the friend and guardian of the public and state schools, and the immediate support and inspirer of the denominational and distinctively Christian schools. We desire to express ourselves—

1. As friendly to every form of education which in any way aids in lifting men into a keener appreciation of the true destiny of the race, and contributes to the development of a true manhood.

2. We regard the common, normal, and other state schools as efficient factors in the hastening of God's kingdom, and deem it our God-imposed duty to interest ourselves actively in making their influence for true piety most effective and wholesome.

3. We are gratified with the extraordinary prosperity and success of Lebanon Valley College, and believe that to our denominational life in this section of the Church this institution is indispensable. We recognize ourselves as bound to its support and encouragement by every effort suggested by loyalty to the Church and fidelity to God; and we will, in its interests, observe College Day, make our assessments full, and aid its president, its financial manager, and its officers in every way possible. We will turn our young people to its halls, and keep in loving remembrance its benefactors.

4. We believe the theological school of any denomination ought. to be specially dear to its ministry, since it is specifically the minister's school. It ought to be dear to the heart of the layman, since here his pastor receives theological training in definite preparation for pulpit and pastoral service. We are therefore glad to pledge ourselves together to support Union Biblical Seminary in all that its interests contemplate. We respectfully ask our Finance Committee to apportion the \$450 assessed by the General Conference to our several fields, and will do what we can to secure the full amount. We urge our brethren who have given notes to the Seminary to pay out as soon as possible. We emphatically advise our young men to make the Seminary course a part of their preparation for the ministry.

5. Since the demand upon the Beneficiary Fund is constantly increasing, and the need for schooled preachers becoming more pressing, and as our Conference has been largely drawing upon this fund, we will assess to our fields the amount asked by the Board of Education for this interest (\$150), and strive to collect it in full.

REPORT OF LEBANON VALLEY COLLEGE.

It is my pleasant duty to report to you on the past year's work and the present condition of Lebanon Valley College. God has greatly favored us as a school throughout the year with most excellent health, a large number of earnest Christian students, and with a fair improvement in our finances.

During the year 292 students were enrolled, as against 252 of the previous year.

Last June were given 36 diplomas, 5 in music, 11 in scientific course, 13 in the classical course, and 7 upon the completion of the post-graduate course for the Master's degree.

A high standard of thorough work in all the departments was well maintained. Our students, as a rule, are diligent and obedient, thus conducing to proper development. The large, well-organized literary societies give students great inspiration, and provevery efficient aids in promoting literary improvement.

The religious condition of the college last year was very gratifying. More than ninety per cent. of all the students were professing Christians. All the resident students were, or became Christians during the year. During the winter term one of the winds of God blew through the college. Many accepted Christ, and others were spiritually revived. No college is better fulfilling its purpose, namely, that of promoting sound learning and deep piety in its students.

The reports of the financial condition of the college were encouraging. The income from tuition, room rent, and board exceeded the expenses nearly three thousand dollars. Our Field Secretary labored faithfully, with good results.

The present college year opened very auspiciously. Our enrollment to-day is larger than the corresponding term of last year, notwithstanding the fact that 36 completed courses of study last June. Quite a number are going to professional schools to continue their preparation for life's work. Our graduates are admitted to the

Senior class in Harvard, Yale, and Princeton without examination. The college aims to give the highest collegiate and musical education to young men and women at the lowest possible cost. The regular literary tuition is only one dollar per week; the tuition, board, and room rent is \$186 per year.

In my last report to this body it was stated that the increased attendance demanded enlarged facilities. The Executive Committee realizing the need, ordered a special meeting of the Board of Trustees last January, the twelfth, for the purpose of considering the best method of enlarging the capacity of the college. At this meeting it was unanimously decided to erect a north wing of 84 by 60 feet to the main college building, work to be begun as early in the spring as possible. The building is now almost finished. This addition doubles our dormitory space, gives us much-needed recitation-rooms, and splendid apartments for the scientific departments—biological, physical, and chemical laboratories.

The Music Hall, which is said to be the finest in the State connected with a literary college, is now occupied by the Department of Music. For the large auditorium the Executive Committee of the college purchased fine opera chairs and a beautiful pipeorgan. J. C. Heckert, of Dallastown, assumed the cost of the pipeorgan, thus making a very liberal and greatly appreciated donation. Three new upright pianos have also been placed in the conservatory this month.

During the summer the old frame science building was sold and removed from the campus, thus greatly improving the aesthetic appearance of the campus.

A central heat plant is now being installed, at an expense of about six thousand dollars.

These improvements not only increase our facilities, but also add much to the dignity and influence of our institution. The annex, heat plant, and equipment cost us twenty thousand dollars, a large part of which amount is not yet raised. We desire to provide for all of it, or at least before our next commencement. To this end we need your prayers and earnest, liberal coöperation.

Now is the proper time for a greater forward educational movement. Educational currents are running swiftly and strongly. Institutions that do not take the current will be beached. Now should be the harvest-time for Lebanon Valley College.

Dear brethren, let us put still greater energy in the sowing and reaping, and the voyage will be quicker and the harvest much larger. Let the impulse from the new spirit of the age, with the conscious power born of achievement, and knocking, in authoritative fashion, at the door of every spiritual and material mystery, and summoning all nature to pay tribute to man, and discerning in man the supreme value of his intellectual, moral, and social life, greatly increase our present enthusiasm for our college and Christian education. If we will, it will be a splendid vindication of practical Christianity, for grace and truth came by Jesus Christ.

Every member of this Conference, every graduate and student, every friend of the institution, every member of the United Brethren Church, should now help promote the growth of our college in every possible way, and rejoice in its success, and greet each new gift with a cheer.

Persons ask why Christian colleges are crying for more money. It is because they are a part of the benevolent agency of the church. They are organized, not to make money, but to do good. Our motives in giving may vary. One man gives out of gratitude to his *alma mater*; another gives because he loves youth and will give it every chance; another, the philanthropist, gives because he loves his country's highest good; another, including all motives in the Christian, gives because he believes in the right of the Spirit of God to fill and build all life, and that the way of the Lord is made, and made straight, by Christian education.

If the demands are great—if Dartmouth College wants one million dollars, and Yale two millions, and the Northfield School three millions, and all others sums greater or less, up to Chicago University modestly asking for ten million dollars more for the present, remember this, the fortunes made are even greater. The New Brunswick Hotel in New York City is to cost ten million dollars, the coming rapid transit system in that city, thirty-five million dollars—sums vastly greater than are asked for the intellectual and moral entertainment of thousands of strenuous young minds, or for the swift transit gained through trained knowledge, out to unmeasured good for the nation and for the world. Our own colleges have never had the means to do a tithe of what they could do.

Every minister and every lay delegate should now seriously ask himself, "Under God, what can I do to make this central and very vital work a greater success?" Perhaps not great things, certainly not all one wishes, but we can all give something—do something as the days go by. Perhaps the remaining days are not very many, and God says, "Do quickly." No wealth is intrinsically ours. God owns it all—the silver and gold and cattle and all that is. There is no titled deed that is good for more than a little while. If we desire to hear the welcome, "Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the mansions prepared for you," we must be heroic, self-sacrificing, and true to our trust.

. God hasten the day when our entire membership in the coöperating territory of the college shall awaken to its ability and responsibility in this all-important interest.

This century sees indications of literary degeneracy upon the part of the secular press to cater to a morbid desire for sensationalism, and thus foster a vitiated public appetite.

It is indeed refreshing to turn to the columns dedicated to the defense of the gospel, and realize that the best intellects, the utmost consecration are at work to stem the tide of corruption, and thus deepen the spiritual life of the sons of God among the children of men.

Every profession, every calling, every trade has its own literature, and the church must have, too.

If a people would be broad-minded and loyal in their church life, the papers and books of their own publishing house must be liberally patronized.

As a Church and Conference, we rejoice in the success of our own Publishing House at Dayton, Ohio, which is doing so much to furnish our Zion with literature that is pure in tone and fearless in presenting the truth. Therefore be it

Resolved, 1. That we are well pleased with the *Telescope*, both typographically and editorially.

2. That we recognize in the *Watchword* an auxiliary to the Young People's movement.

3. That our Sunday-school literature ranks well with similar publications.

4. That the Search Light and Woman's Evangel are deserving of a much larger patronage.

5. That we see in the *Quarterly Review* a high standard magazine.

6. That the *Conference Herald* is worthy of a much larger circulation.

7. That we are well pleased with the growth and management of our Publishing House.

The report on Church Erection, read by G. W. M. Rigor, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT ON CHURCH ERECTION.

Fifty years ago the trend of the United Brethren Church was tosecure the cheapest location possible, without any regard to its eligibility, and erect thereon a cheap, plain structure, generally of wood, as an evidence, in very many instances, of the humility and piety of those who proposed to worship there.

In some of these instances such a course was an actual necessity; in others it was deliberate choice, not actuated by the Spirit which prompted Peter on the Mount of Transfiguration, when he realized that it was good to be there, to propose to build three tabernacles, one for Moses, one for Elias, and one for Jesus.

But we are pleased to record the fact that the organization of our Church-Erection Society has wrought advancement in the erection of houses of worship, made necessary by the eternal spirit of progress that is abroad in our land, coupled with the stern demand for better located, more substantial, better planned, and more commodious churches, and that the present generation is striving, with commendable success, to meet that growing necessity. For this we render praise to Almighty God, and submit the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That we rejoice in the manifest increasing interest in the cause of church erection in the United Brethren Church, and trust that a tidal wave of prosperity may come upon it, so that in the East and in the West, in the North and in the South hundreds of substantial, commodious churches may be erected and filled with devout worshipers, for it is to the strong churches that we must look for the means to carry forward the great benevolent interests of the church, which do so much for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom in the earth.

Resolved, 2. That we record it as our deliberate judgment that very great care should be observed in locating churches and in planning for their erection and payment, so as to secure the very best results in providing for the accommodation of the worshipers of the living God.

Resolved, 3. That the providing of a fund for the building of parsonages meets with our approbation.

The report on Sabbath Schools was read by M. E. Bachman, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Believing that the Sabbath school is one of the greatest and most powerful agencies by which civilization is advanced and the church strengthened, therefore be it

Resolved, That we recognize five essentials to make our Sabbath schools a success:

1. Good teachers and good teaching. The best equipped and the most consecrated only should be appointed as teachers. The "Bible Normal Union" and the teacher's meeting are indispensable features in helping the teacher.

2. Good music. Only the best should be used, for music has a great influence upon the life and character.

3. Good literature. The kind of reading a person loves decides, to a great extent, his character.

4. Attendance. Only seventeen and four-tenths per cent. of the population of the United States attend the Sabbath schools, and in Pennsylvania only twenty-one and nine-tenths per cent. are in the Sabbath schools. While twelve millions are in the Sabbath schools, eleven millions are still out, so there is plenty to do to get them in. Better teaching, better music, and literature will do much toward bringing people into the Sabbath school.

5. Organization may also be considered as one of the essentials. Guerilla warfare may do for bush fighting, but for a long and hard campaign we need thorough organization. Let the schools be thoroughly organized, and the work will be easier as well as more progressive. Let us, then, be loyal to our God and our Church, and be up and doing, keeping unceasingly at it.

REPORT ON Y. P. C. U. AND Y. P. S. C. E.

While philosophers and scientists in the past have been disputing over the existence of God, millions of souls in the centuries gone by have been finding God and Christ and salvation. And thousands in the daily present have been, and are living in the power of an endless life and proving their faith by consecrated Christian service which they render for Christ and the church, and

WHEREAS, the life of the church demands just such a surrender and consecration as this, therefore,

Resolved, 1. That, as a Conference, we urge upon the young people of this East Pennsylvania Branch to most earnestly pray for the baptism of the Holy Ghost upon us, and that we, in order to enable God to make our Zion a praise in the earth, rest not until such a consecration results in the salvation of thousands of precious souls such as shall be *eternally* saved.

2. That we recommend the adoption of the Christian Endeavor pledge by all of our Christian Union societies, believing that the adoption of the said pledge tends to the deepening and broadening of the spiritual life of our young people and makes them more loyal to Christ and the Church of their choice.

3. We believe that a systematic study of the Word of God, and a thorough acquaintance with the Holy Spirit, are the only means by which a great revival of religion may be brought about in our midst.

4. We urge upon all the pastors and leaders of the Young People's societies of our Conference to recommend and secure as many subscribers as possible to the *Watchword*, and thus increase the interest of the society and inform its members along the line of church work in general.

5. That as God has made us stewards over his sacred heritage, we recommend to all our young people the systematic and proportionate giving of their income.

6. That the Junior societies be encouraged by the Senior societies, and the most competent superintendent that can possibly be secured be elected to take charge of this work, who shall, under God's power and grace, feed the lambs and train them to walk in the fear of God, and to be subject to the teachings of the church of Jesus Christ. The greeting of the Conference Branch Society of the Woman's Missionary Association was beautifully presented to the Conference by Sister Jennie Detweiler, of Middletown.

Rev. J. T. Shaeffer made the response to the greeting, supplemented with remarks by Bishop Kephart. The memorial service held in honor of our sainted dead was opened with a paper read by P. A. Bowman on the life and labors of the late Rev. C. G. F. Miller.

Addresses were made by P. A. Bowman, S. G. Kauffman, and Bishop Kephart.

Rev. C. G. F. Miller was born at Newtown, Clay Township, Lancaster County, Pa., and died November 7, 1899, aged 39 years, 10 months, and 29 days. Rev. Mr. Miller was a son of John H. and Susanna Miller. He was educated in the home schools, and in 1883 and 1885 he graduated from Millersville Normal School in both the elementary and scientific courses. He taught school several years, and afterwards feeling called of God to preach the gospel, he prepared for the ministry. He spent one year at Union Biblical Semi-nary at Dayton, Ohio. Brother Miller was converted at the age of sixteen, and united with the United Brethren Church at Paradise, Clay Township. He was granted quarterly conference license to preach in 1891. M. J. Mumma was elder. He was admitted to the Annual Conference at Lebanon, in 1892, and was ordained as an elder in 1896. He was appointed to the Lititz charge as its pastor in 1892, which charge he served faithfully until death removed him from labor to reward. Rev. Mr. Miller was a talented man, and possessed many excellent qualities as a minister. He was a kind husband, a good father, and we pray that the bereaved family may have the presence of Him who is a husband to the widow and a father to the fatherless children, to whom we extend our heartfelt sympathies. His remains were laid to rest in the United Evangelical Church cemetery at Millersville, November 10. His funeral was largely attended. Twenty-nine ministers of the Conference were in attendance, and a number of ministers of other denominations were present. May God grant that when our life work is ended we may all meet in heaven.

The opening service on the Sabbath was a prayer and praise service led by J. R. Meredith.

Bishop Kephart then preached with great power a sermon based on John 17:17, "Thy word is truth."

The Sabbath school was addressed by members of the Conference, who conducted a very enthusiastic review of the third quarter's lessons on the life of Christ.

The evening sermon was preached by Dr. T. C. Carter, of the Virginia Conference.

Thus closed another session of Conference. The business was disposed of with dispatch and thoroughness. Aggressive work was the motto of the Conference, and, with faith in God, personal diligence, and fervent prayer, we look for his blessing and abundant success.


