First Day.

Peru, Ind., Wednesday, April 2, 1884.

The North Indiana Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened for its forty-first annual session in the Baptist Church, at Peru, Ind., April 2, 1884, at 8:30 A. M. Half an hour was occupied by devotional services, conducted by N. Gillam. At 9 o'clock Bishop Cyrus D. Foss took the chair, and read the second chapter of 2d Timothy, after which the 1st hymn was sung—

"O, for a thousand tongues to sing!"

and the Bishop led in prayer.

After prayer, the Conference sang one stanza of

"Jesus, lover of my soul,"

after which Bishop Foss addressed the Conference in a few very appropriate remarks.

State of the Church.—A communication was read, containing the action of the Detroit Conference, memorializing the General Conference to license women to exhort and to preach, and on motion it was ordered that it be referred to a committee of three, to be called "The Committee on the State of the Church." M. Mahin, E. Holdstock, and W. S. Birch were appointed such committee.

Conference Relations.—A Committee on Conference Relations was ordered, and the following were appointed such committee, viz: J. Greer, I. M. Woolverton, A. Greenman, J. W. Lowry, N. H. Phillips, E. F. Hasty, H. J. Meck.

Apportionments.—The Presiding Elders were appointed a committee to apportion the benevolent moneys to the districts, and to nominate the standing committees for the next session.

A committee of one from each district was ordered on the observance of the Sabbath, and I. J. Bicknell, W. M. Van Slyke, C. U. Wade, C. E. White, D. D. Powell and O. S. Harrison were appointed such committee.

Appeal.—The appeal of L. C. Harrison was presented to the Conference, and a select number of fifteen Preachers was ordered

to be named by the Bishop to hear the appeal, By the request of the accused, O. S. Harrison was directed to act as his counsel. A. J. Lewellen was appointed to act as counsel for the Church, and H. N. Herrick was assigned as Secretary for the select number.

The Bishop nominated the following as the said select number to hear the said appeal, who were confirmed, viz: E. P. Church, W. O. Pierce, J. Greer, W. S. Stewart, L. A. Retts, J. L. Ramsay, H. J. Lacey, G. H. Hill, F. A. Robinson, T. Stabler, J. Leonard, J. W. Miller, J. S. McCarty, P. J. Albright, A. C. Gerard. The counsel for the accused was asked if he had any objections to the number selected, and replied that he was content with the persons nominated. The Bishop appointed M. Mahin as chairman of the select number.

- N. H. Phillips was appointed a committee on the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.
- W. S. Boston was appointed as Treasurer of the funds for the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference and of the Episcopal Fund.

A committee of one from each district was appointed to gather up the Episcopal Fund, consisting of J. A. Lewellen, W. S. Stewart, M. Swadener, J. W. Cain, F. G. Brown, J. C. Murray.

Bar.—The bar of the Conference was fixed on a line with the rear of the third window from the south end of the Church.

Sessions.—It was directed that the sessions of the Conference begin at 8:30 A. M.; that the first half hour be occupied with religious exercises, and that the sessions close at 12 noon.

Election of Delegates.—The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the election of delegates to the General Conference be the order of the day for 10 o'clock a. m., on Friday, or immediately after the reception of probationers into full connection; that all names without initials shall be thrown out, if there is more than one of the same name in the Conference; that the four persons having the highest number of votes, not less than a majority, shall be the delegates; that in case there shall a fifth person having the same number of votes as the fourth, a new ballot shall be

cast, and that no ticket shall be counted having either more or less names than the number of delegates to be elected on any ballot.

It was also ordered that there shall be two reserve delegates elected by ballot under the above rules.

J. W. Welch was appointed a committee on the Woman's Home Missionary Society.

Dividends.—A communication was read from the Book Agents saying that a dividend had been made to this Conference for \$226, and a draft was ordered for that amount.

A draft was ordered on the chartered fund for \$30.

The assessment to this Conference for the Episcopal Fund for the ensuing year was announced as \$1,285, and the Presiding Elders were directed to apportion said amount to the districts.

A communication was received from the Bishops, relating to the Centenary of 1884, which was referred to the Centenary Committee.

Collection for Education.—On motion of M. H. Mendenhall, it was directed that in the column of the Statistical Tables giving the amounts raised for education, there be included the amounts raised for De Pauw University, for Ft. Wayne College, and the general collections raised by the Sunday Schools.

It was ordered that all undesignated funds for education be paid to Ft. Wayne College.

Adjournment.—The time having expired, notices were given, the doxology was sung, and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. Vincent.

Second Day.

THURSDAY, APRIL 3, 1884.

The Conference convened at 8:30 A. M. The religious services were conducted by F. T. Simpson.

At 9 o'clock Bishop Foss took the chair for the transaction of business.

Journal.—The Journal of the session of yesterday was read and approved.

Committees.—It was directed that the Committee on the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and the Committee on the Woman's Home Missionary Society be designated to receive any moneys for the said societies.

Roll.—The names of those who were absent at roll-call yester-day were called, and the following responded: W. E. Curtis, F. A. Robinson. F. Craft, J. S. McElwee, J. W. McDaniel, W. D. Parr. The further calling of the roll was dispensed with.

The Twentieth Question.—The Twentieth Question was resumed—"Was the character of each preacher examined?"—and the following Presiding Elders made the reports for their districts: C. E. Disbro, R. D. Robinson, C. Skinner, and Y. B. Meredith.

Session of the Preachers' Aid Society.—At 10 o'clock the Conference ceased business, and a session of the Preachers' Aid Society was held, the Bishop in the chair.

Nominating Committee.—On motion, A. Greenman, F. T. Simpson, and J. W. Miller were appointed a committee to nominate the officers of the society for the following year.

Report.—W. S. Birch, the Secretary of the society, presented his report of the finances of the society, which was received, and adopted. (See Report.)

Takahara Yasutaro was continued on trial.

The time of the session was extended.

Visitors.—The following were introduced: R. S. Rust, D. D., Corresponding Secretary of the Freedmen's Aid Society, and J. A. Farmer, of the United Brethren Church.

On motion, the Conference adjourned, with the benediction by Bishop Foss.

Third Pay.

FRIDAY, APRIL 4, 1884.

The Conference assembled at 8:30 A. M. The devotional half hour was conducted by H. J. Lacey.

At 9 o'clock Bishop Thomas Bowman took the chair, Bishop Foss being called to St. Louis to attend a funeral, and the transaction of business began.

Journal.—The Journal of yesterday's session was read and approved.

District Conference Records.—M. Mahin was appointed to examine the records of the District Conferences.

Auditing Committee.—A. W. Lamport, W. O. Pierce, and C. King, were appointed to audit the accounts of the Secretary for the past year.

Boston University.—A communication was presented from the Theological School of Boston University, which was referred to the Committee on Education.

Freedmen's Aid.—A communication was read from Dr. Rust, of the Freedmen's Aid Society, which was referred to the committee on this society.

Visitors.—A. A. Gee, of the Northwest Indiana Conference, and Jackson Mitchell, of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, were introduced.

Transfer.—The transfer of T. J. Elkin, from the Kansas Conference, was announced.

Fifth Question.—The fifth question—"Who are admitted into full connection?"—was resumed, and Orange V. L. Harbour and John W. Bowen were admitted into full connection, and elected to Deacons' orders.

Stewards' Report.—On motion of the Stewards, a basis of one hundred dollars was allowed for J. Maffit.

Twentieth Question.—The twentieth question was resumed—"Was the character of each preacher examined?"—and M. H. Mendenhall and W. J. Vigus reported their Districts.

Introductions.—B. F. Cavins, pastor of the Baptist Church of Peru, and L. P. Marshall, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Peru, were introduced to the Conference.

Election of Delegates.—On motion, the order of the day was taken up at 10 o'clock, being the election of delegates to the General Conference.

On motion, H. N. Herrick, C. W. Church, and J. B. Carns were appointed tellers. The Conference cast a ballot for four delegates, and the tellers retired to count the vote.

Rev. J. M. Walden, D. D., book agent at Cincinnati, was introduced to the Conference.

A. Cone, E. F. Hasty, I. J. Smith, L. J. Naftzger, H. N. Herrick, and F. Craft were appointed such committee.

W. Birch, A. Greenman, W. O. Pierce, and T. Stabler were added to the Committee on Public Worship.

The time of the session was extended.

REPORTS.

On Education.

The Committee on Education respectfully present the following report:

De Pauw University.

Upon the unanimous petition of the Joint Board of Trustees and Visitors of the Indiana Asbary University its name is now changed to De Panw University. Under the new name this well-known institution of learning bids fair to equal in the extent of its influence and usefulness any similar establishment for higher education in the West. During the present year the number of students in attendance is somewhat more than five hundred—a number which is likely to be largely increased next year.

Its board of instruction now numbers fifteen professors and instructors. At a recent meeting of its trustees Hon. A. C. Downey, late Judge of the Supreme Court, was elected Dean of the Law Department; Prof. W. F Yocum, President of the Fort Wayne College, was elected Principal of the Preparatory School and Professor of Normal Instruction.

The University has recently purchased a farm of one hundred and twenty acres, adjoining and partly within the city of Greeneastle, which is to be laid out into a park. Within it will also be erected buildings for various purposes. During the present season Robert McKim, of Madison, will erect upon a fine elevated site on the farm an astronomical observatory. Other buildings are to be erected this season adjacent to the present University buildings. These are (1) one dormitory to accommodate fifty ladies; (2) one dormitory to accommodate one hundred gentlemen; (3) a building for the Law School; (4) a building for the Theological School.

Additional professors are to be added to the corps of instructors in June. It is expected that the erection of dormitories will enable the University to furnish accommodations to students at such very cheap rates that the best facilities for education can be extended to those whose resources are limited. It is a cause of just pride to Indiana that such ample opportunities for education are extended to our youth from the primary school to the great University.

We recommend the election of M. H. Mendenhall, T. B. Redding and J. A. S. Mitchell as Trustees; and W. S. Birch, J. K. Walts and J. B. Carns as Visitors.

Fort Wayne College.

The attendance at this institution has been about the same as that of last year. The average attendance is about one hundred and fifty. The total enrollment for the year is about three hundred. A good religious interest prevails among the students. A gracious revival of religion, beginning in the Berry Street Church, extended to the College and numbered among the converts about forty of the students, many of whom have been added to the Church.

Pursuant to the action of the Conference at its last session, a partial canvass has been made for funds for the erection of new buildings for the use of the College. The success of the canvass thus far has been gratifying. Something over nine thousand dollars has been subscribed, seven thousand of which are from Fort Wayne. Besides these subscriptions a benevolent lady has promised to provide, by will, for a gift of three thousand dollars.

The whole sum necessary to be raised in order to make the institution creditable to the Church and efficient in the cause of education, is not less than thirty thousand dollars. Your committee recommend that the approach of the one-hundredth anniversary of the organization of the Methodist Church in America be improved to the fullest extent in efforts to place this deserving institution on a basis of permanent prosperity.

We recommend the appointment of W. F. Yocum as President; J. K. Walts, Homer C. Hartman, Lem R. Hartman, Philip Harter and J. I. Metts as Trustees; and C. W. Lynch and C. King as Visitors.

We also recommend the Bishop to appoint M. S. Metts as agent for the College for the ensuing year.

Garrett's Biblical Institute.

We are rejoiced to learn of the continued prosperity of the Institute, and of the satisfactory work of the past year. We recommend the Institute to the young men of the Church who feel called of God to the work of the Christian ministry, that they may add to the discipline acquired in a literary institution the training of this School of the Prophets.

We recommend the Institute to our people as worthy of their support, and respectfully request them to remember it in their gifts and donations.

We recommend that II. N. Herrick and L. A. Retts be appointed Visitors.

Children's Day.

The establishment of a permanent fund, whose income shall be used to assist young men preparing for the ministry, is an object which commends itself to the judgment of all who approve of an educated ministry.

We recommend the faithful observance of Children's Day in all the churches.

On De Pauw University.

At the last session of the Conference a committee, consisting of W. S. Birch, J. W. Welch, A. Greenman, M. H. Mendenhall, J. E. Earp, A. W. Lamport, J. B. Carns, M. S. Metts, E. F. Hasty and L. A. Retts, were appointed to co-operate with the agent, Rev. J. W. Welch, in the work of securing an enlarged endowment for the Indiana Asbury University. The committee met and elected an executive committee, consisting of W. S. Birch, A. Greenman, J. E. Earp and E. F. Hasty, with authority to direct the general operations within the Conference.

The agent immediately set to work, with the co-operation of the various pastors and other liberal friends. The plan of raising \$150,000 in the State by the 1st of August failed. On the 24th day of October, new propositions were agreed upon between Mr. W. C. De Pauw and the Trustees of the University, and the essential features of the great enterprise have been conserved.

The De Pauw University has been established with prospects of great usefulness in coming years. Within our own Conference the sum of \$11,186,93 was reported to the agent, or raised by him, including \$8,150 in notes and \$3,036,93 in cash. It is estimated that \$3,000 were raised and reported directly to the treasurer of the University, making a total for our Conference of \$14,186,93. The expenses of the canvass were \$1,404.55—somewhat less than ten per cent. of the amount raised or pledged.

When we remember that the work was nearly all accomplished between the first of May and the first of August, we are compelled to say that this outpouring of the liberality of our people is beyond all expectation, and deserves the highest praise. But for the high appreciation of our church, of the cause itself, together with the favor of Divine Providence, so great an undertaking could not have been accomplished.

Your committee, in making this final report of the work intrusted to their hands, desire to express their appreciation of the untiring labors of the agent, Rev. J. W. Welch, to thank the pastors who co-operated in this great work, and especially to give thanks to Almighty God for raising up in our day and generation the princely Christian benefactor, Bro. W. C. De Pauw, and not least of all to the hundreds and thousands of friends who aided according to their means in this worthy cause.

On Centenary of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Your committee appointed on the subject of the Centennial of Methodism submit the following as their report:

Resolved 1st—That we respectfully acknowledge the receipt of the address of the Bishops on the subject of the Centenary of 1884, and recommend the following as the action of the Conference.

Resolved 2d—That the Bishop be requested to appoint a Centennial Agent to solicit and receive funds for the objects hereinafter specified.

Resolved 3d—That, in accordance with the action of the Conference at its last session, we recommend that the principal object for which the agent shall solicit funds shall be the Fort Wayne Odlege, but that he shall also invite donations to the Preachers' Aid Society, and is authorized to receive gifts for other benevolent objects

Resolved 446.—That we recommend that the Presiding Elder and one other person from each district be appointed to ex-operate with the agent in arranging for the canvass of that district in behalf of the objects above stated.

Resolved 5th—That, as the sum necessary to complete the contemplated buildings for the College is about \$30,000, we ask that urgent efforts be made to secure at least that amount.

Resolved 6th.—That the last Sunday in November and the first three days in December be devoted to a simultaneous effort in behalf of the objects above named: that each preacher be requested to preach on education on Sabbath, and to devote the three secular days to a vigorous canvass for funds.

Resolved 7th—That whereas the Island Park Assembly has invited the Conference to participate in a general Centennial Celebration to be held at Rome City, on July 10, we recommend the preachers and people, so far as possible, to join in that celebration.

Resolved 8th—That we recommend the holding of a Centennial Convenin each district during the summer months for the purpose of calling the attention of the people to the growth and prosperity of the Church and its connectional interests; the time and programme to be arranged by the Presiding Elders, and that we request the Presiding Elders to arrange the dates of these meetings so as to allow the agent to be present at each meeting.

Resolved 9th—That the Centennial Committee be authorized to form a Centennial Association to further the ends above mentioned, and to arrange such constitution and by-laws as they may deem suitable.

On Temperauce.

Whereas—The liquor interest, representing less than two per cent, of the voting population of the State of Indiana, in its united strength, has assumed to dictate what shall be the policy upon the liquor question, and is becoming annually more aggressive, a necessity exists for the overthrow and the extermination of the liquor traffic; therefore, be it

Resolved—That we reaffirm what we declared at our last session, that we are most emphatically opposed to the license system in any form.

Resolved—That we are in favor of so amending the Constitution of the State of Indiana, that it shall forever prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, and for this we will continue to work and

Resolved—That we hail with gratitude and devout thankfulness to Almighty God the increasing and growing sentiment all over the United States in favor of legal prohibition, and we pledge ourselves to support all proper means to bring about this result.

Resolved—That, inasmuch as our discipline calls for the election of a Temperance Committee annually in every charge, we earnestly request of each Presiding Elder to require a quarterly report of such committee; also, that they recommend to such committees the holding of monthly meetings in the churches, or other places, to have temperance talks, to hear lectures, addresses, essays, or readings on the subject of temperance; to raise funds and distribute temperance literature, so that each of our churches shall become an active power to remove from among us this terrible sin and curse of the ionor traffic.

Resolved—That we recommend the appointment of R. D. Spellman as Temperance Agent of the North Indiana Conference.

Isaac E Springer, of the Detroit Conference, containing the action of said Conference on the subject of giving to women, in certain cases, license to exhort and preach, recommend the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions, substantially as adopted by the Detroit Annual Conference:

Whereas, There is no provision in the Discipline for the licensing of women as exhorters and preachers; and,

Whereas, Facts have demonstrated that God has been pleased to place the seal of His sanction upon the ministration of women in the preaching of the Word and public evangelistic work, by granting large results in the salvation of souls; and,

Wierras, It is desirable to have the formal economy of the Church, which claims to be the child of Providence, fully harmonize with the past indications of Providence and the custom of early Methodism: and,

Whereas, It is occasionally desirable to employ the services of women as evangelists in our home fields, and especially desirable to have the Missionaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society legally licensed as exhorters and preachers, to perform the gospel work of evangelism their respective fields demand; therefore—

Resolved. That the ensuing General Conference be and is hereby memorialized to make provisions for the licensing of women as exhorters and preachers, when, as in the case of men, by the tests of gifts, grace, and usefulness, the Church is satisfied that God has called them thereto.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. E. Maynard.

Rev. Ezra Maynard was born in Jefferson County, Ohio, June 5th, 1846, and died in Dunkirk, Ind., November 8th, 1883, aged 67 years, 5 months and 3 days.

His early youth was passed in Ohio, and his attendance at school was principally at Canton. Of his boyhood and youth we have not been able to obtain any particulars. We know that he was converted in early life, after reading Baxter and his quotations, but our brother, himself, was not able to fix the date. In October, 1834, when he was sixteen years old, he became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and in August, 1844, when he was twenty-six, he was licensed to preach. The next year he was received into the North Indiana Conference, at the session at Lafayette. He was ordained Deacon in 1849, by Bishop Janes, and Elder in 1852, by Bishop Baker.

His fields of labor were Alamo, Greenfield, Decatur, Auburn, LaGrange, Covington, Warren, Orland, Baubago, LaGro, Huntington, until, in 1855, on account of failing health, he received a superannuated relation, in which he remained until death, supporting, with all cheerfulness, that relation for twenty-eight years. For twelve years after his superannuation, he engaged in mercantile pursuits, but after 1868 he was not able to transact any business whatever.

Brother Maynard was married June 27th, 1852, to Miss Letitia English in Steuben County. Ind. Two children were given to them. One died in infancy, and the other is a promising young man. Sister Maynard, after thirty-one years of happy married life, now belongs to our honorable list of conference widows.

Brother Maynard always had feeble health, and from the age of fourteen, battled with disease, sometimes prostrated, sometimes able to do full work, but always cheerfully taking things as they came, and ever trying to make the best of them. Nearly all of his life he was afflicted with a cough. When his failing health forced him to leave his loved work of the ministry, he did not sit fully down to repine at his lot, but went bravely to work on a little farm. He declined all aid from the Conference. He soon sold his farm, and removed to Albany, Ind., and opened a store, in which he was quite success-

ful, and where he remained for twelve years. After relinquishing this business, he never had the strength to follow any other pursuit. He was, however, able to attend to his own affairs as long as he lived. For the last three years he was confined at home, and, for the most of the time, to the house,

We are informed that ten years ago no one thought that he could endure another year, but he lingered on from year to year a wonder to himself and all who knew him. For the last year of his life he seldom slept more than a few moments at a time, and that either sitting in his bed or his chair. No one will ever realize how much he suffered. Yet, during it all, he was exceedingly patient, never complaining, but praising the Lord in the midst of all his sufferings. His faith in the promises of God was strong, and he died as he had lived, trusting in Jesus.

All the summer of 1883 he grew weaker and weaker, and on the 1st day of November he was taken with a chill, after which he sank rapidly, and, in a week, on the 8th, he passed away quietly and peacefully as a child going to sleep. He was fully conscious during all his last hours. Although not able to talk much, yet some of his last utterances were, "Tell my brethren and friends that I am ready to depart, and only waiting the Master's call." Again, he said, "Tell my friends that I am ready for the land of bliss."

He was buried at Dunkirk by his pastor, Brother Sawyer.

In his family he was a kind, affectionate husband, and a loving and indulgent father. He was an excellent extempore preacher. He was very punctual in all his engagements, and neither rain, cold nor storm ever prevented him from filling his appointments. As a member of the church he was faithful, active, and liberal, ever giving wise counsels to his pastor, holding up his hands, and aiding in the interests of Zion. As a man he was diligent, patient, meek, submissive to the Divine will, conscientious, holy. He was broad and liberal in all his ideas, free from that narrow bigotry which so often disfigures many characters. He had none of that littleness which sets up individual opinion as the standard for all the world. He had none of that censorious spirit which seeks for motes in others' eyes. He walked humbly with his God, content that other men should enjoy the same liberty that he himself possessed.

He always helped the needy. Many a poor man, struggling to make a home for himself and family, found in our brother a true friend and counselor, and many owed their start in life to his kindly aid. One of the preachers of the Austin Conference to-day is a man whom he aided to obtain his education at Greencastle. He often said that his helping to send out this minister of the gospel gave him the greatest satisfaction of any act that he had ever done in all his life. When he was obliged to leave the active work, he said that he felt that he was as much called to superannuate as he was at first to go forth and preach.

He has left behind him an unblemished record. He was faithful over a few things, and doubtless shall be made ruler over many things. Faithful in

his day and generation, he has gone to his reward. He has gone "where the inhabitant shall not say, I am sick."

Rev. J. H. Payton.

Rev. John Hinkle Payton was born in Butler County, Ohio, June 1st, 1814, and died in Champaign County, Illinois, December 14th, 1883, at the age of 69 years, 6 months and 13 days.

While he was yet a child his parents removed to Deleware County, Ind., where he grew to manhood and entered upon the active duties of life work. He was converted at fifteen years of age, on the 29th of June, and united with our Church in September of the same year. While he was yet a youth, the Church gave him license to exhort, of which he made active use. So useful did he become that he was granted license to preach in 1843. He was received on probation in the North Indiana Conference in 1849, at the session at Logansport. He had already been ordained as Local Deacon in 1847 by Bishop Janes. He was ordained Elder by Bishop Ames, at Richmond, in 1853.

He was appointed to the following charges:—1849, Bluffton: 1850, Monmouth; 1851, Adburn: 1852, Allen; 1853-4, Leesburgh; 1855, North Manchester; 1856-7, Columbia City; 1858, Bluffton; 1859, Winchester; 1860, Albany; 1861-2, Farmland; 1863, Muncie Circuit; 1864, Camden. In 1865 he took a superannuated relation, and moved to Henry County, Illinois. In 1866 he served Edwards' Mission, in Illinois, for six months. He supplied Millersburgh for six months in 1867, in the Central Illinois Conference. In 1868 he took an effective relation, and was appointed to Warren Circuit, which he served for six months. His health again failing he was again superannuated. In 1869 he organized Pera Circuit in Illinois, afterward known as Ludlow Circuit, which charge he was supplying at the time of his death. He was not content to remain idle, but preached wherever and whenever he could. The last Sabbath that he spent on earth he preached in the village of Ludlow, and administered the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

He was married to Miss Temperance Dragoo, March 23, 1837, whom he has left behind as his widow, after 46 years of wedded life. Of the thirteen children, who were the fruit of this union, five daughters and one son survive, and seven passed to the other side in advance of their father.

Brother Payton's death was very sudden. Without long sickness or suffering he ceased to work and live. He was stricken down with apoplexy, December 14th, last. He appeared to be in his usual health, arose in the morning and attended to his duties on the farm as usual, held his family services and lead the devotion around the family altar for the last time, and went out into the field. About 9 o'clock he came in and sat by the fire. He was suddenly taken with vomiting and dizziness, lay down, and speedily passed into the deep come of apoplexy, from which he was never aroused, but in a very short time fell on sleep. His funeral services were held in Rantoul, Rev. F. L. Walden officiating.

Brother Payton's life is his best epitaph. It was such that there was no need of dying testimonies to assure us that he is with Jesus, whom he so faithfully preached. His family speak of him in the most affectionate terms as kind, loving, and indulgent. He was a man of ability, a good extempore preacher, exemplary in all his life, untarnished in character, and devoted to every interest of the Church. He was always faithful in his work, never neglecting his appointments, and always willing and anxious to do what he could for the Master. His death seems almost like a translation. Preaching up to his last Sabbath, administering the blessed emblems of redemption, he heard the voice of the Savior, and laying down his weapons he departed "to be with Christ, which is far better." "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

Mrs. W. R. Jordan.

Bessie Kibbey, wife of Rev. W. R. Jordan, of this Conference, died Saturday morning, December 7, 1883, at her home in Trenton, Michigan, aged nearly thirty years.

She was born in Centerville, Ind., April 9, 1854. She was converted and became a member of our church in 1874. Her Christian life was one of beauty. She was of a calm and quiet cast of mind. After her marriage to our brother, she entered heartily into the work of the ministry, and bore bravely and uncomplainingly all the trials and difficulties of the itenerant life; she was faithful in all her relations, and a precious help to her husband. Her daily example was more eloquent than words, so that to all who knew her, her memory will be as the perfume of a sweet flower.

She was faithful and loving as a wife, tender and affectionate as a mother, a true friend, and an intelligent member of society. She was amiable, re-fined, generous, and unassumingly good. During the pastorate of her husband in Trenton, she taught a class of ten young men in the Sunday School, was a member of the church choir, and was identified with all the interests of the church. Nothing that has transpired in Trenton for years awakened such universal sorrow as her sickness and death.

Her final illness lasted for several days. While her physicians and friends had hope of her recovery until a few hours before her departure, she herself did not believe that she could recover, and talked to her husband calmly and hopefully of the future. In conversation with our brother, she said, "If my religion were a thing of fiction, how could I meet this hour?" Again, she remarked, "It will be hard to leave my family and friends, but I submit all to his will who doeth all things well" To her, Christ was a blessed reality. The nearer she came to the beautiful gate, the more triumphant was her faith. She broke forth into singing, and in a sweet, clear voice, sang, "Rock of ages, cleft for me," and, "I need thee every hour," and. "Triumph by-and-by." In this blessed trust she fell asleep in Jesus.

Her funeral services were held in Richmond, Ind., at the home of her father, Judge J. F. Kibbey. Rev. I M. Hughes conducted the services, assisted by Rev. F. Craft, Rev. A. W. Lamport, of Richmond, and Rev. Dr. Potter, of Cincinnati. Her remains were laid to rest in the beautiful Earlham Cemetery, to await the resurrection of the just.

As a Conference, we do most heartily and sincerely extend our sympathy and condolence to our dear brother in this the greatest calamity which can befall a man in this world. We pray that the divine grace which he has so often preached to others, may be his abundant stay in these sad hours. May heaven-inspired hope lift up his soul and sustain him with the prospect of a happier day of bright reunion in our Father's house.

ABSTRACT OF THE MINUTES

OF THE

LAY ELECTORAL CONFERENCE.

The Lay Electoral Conference met in the Methodist Episcopal Church at Peru, Friday, April 4, 1884, at 9 a. m.

William A. Thompson was elected President, and Charles C. Binkley, Secretary.

The delegates presented their credentials, which were referred to a committee, who duly reported the delegates present and entitled to a seat.

On motion, the Conference proceeded to elect two delegates to the General Conference, the same to be elected by ballot, one at a time.

Jacob J. Todd, John H. Baker, W. S. Jordan, J. K. Walts, D. L. Overholser and C. L. Henry, were placed in nomination.

The first ballot resulted in no election. On the second ballot, Jacob J. Todd, of Bluffton, was elected delegate. The third ballot resulted in no election. On the fourth ballot, John H. Baker, of Goshen, was elected delegate.

Charles L. Henry, of Anderson, was elected the First Reserve Delegate, and Daniel L. Overholser, of Logansport, was elected the Second Reserve Delegate.

A committee from the Ministerial Conference invited the Lay Conference to meet in joint session with the Ministerial Conference at 3 o'clock this afternoon, which invitation was accepted.

On motion, the Lay Conference adjourned until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Lay Conference met pursuant to adjournment. Devotional services were conducted by John A. Moonman.

A resolution was adopted, instructing the Lay Delegates, and requesting the Ministerial Delegates, to oppose any change in the ministerial term as now fixed. The same was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Resolutions were adopted favoring statutory and constitutional prohibition at the earliest moment practicable. A resolution was adopted, instructing the Lay Delegates, and requesting the Ministerial Delegates to do all in their power to reduce the ratio of representation in the General Conference to one-half of the present representation, and to make the Lay representation equal in number to the Ministerial.

A resolution was unanimously adopted against the use of tobacco in all its forms.

A vote of thanks was passed to the church and citizens of Peru for their

A vote of thanks was passed to the church and citizens of Peru for their hospitable entertainment of the Lay Conference.

The President and Secretary were appointed to respond in behalf of the Lay Conference at the joint session.

The Secretary was instructed to prepare the minutes of the Lay Conference, and request the publication of the same in the minutes of the North Indiana Conference.

The hour of 3 o'clock having arrived, on motion, it was resolved that the Lay Conference proceed in a body to the joint session, and, after the conclusion of the joint session, the Lay Conference stand adjourned without day.

The Lay Conference then proceeded to the joint session.
