RULES OF ORDER

OF THE

NORTH INDIANA CONFERENCE.

RULE 1. The Conference shall meet at 8:30 a.m., spend a half hour in devotional exercises, to be conducted by a member of the Conference appointed by the Bishop, proceed with the business at 9 a.m., and adjourn at 12 m. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.

RULE 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.

RULE 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

RULE 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule 5. The motions to Lay on the Table, to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.

RULE 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions should intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:

- (1.) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
- (2.) To adjourn.
- (3.) To take a recess.
- (4.) To lay on the table.
- (5.) For the previous question.
- (6.) To postpone to a given time.
- (7.) To refer.
- (8.) To substitute.
- (9.) To amend.
- (10.) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend an amendment shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

RULE 7. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the

President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.

Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses, personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

RULE 9. When a member desires to speak to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a question of privilege.

RULE 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

RULE 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a nondebatable motion shall be decided without debate.

RULE 12. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

RULE 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.

RULE 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference for special reasons, shall excuse him.

RULE 15. It shall be in order to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by a vote of two-thirds, the question shall be taken.

RULE 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

Rule 17. These rules shall not be suspended except by a vote of twothirds of the members present and voting.

JOURNAL.

FIRST DAY.

Muncie, Ind., Wednesday, April 2, 1890.

The North Indiana Annual Conference convened for its fortyseventh annual session, in the High Street Methodist Episcopal Church, in the City of Muncie, Ind., at 8:30 o'clock, A. M., Wednesday, April 2, 1890, Bishop William X. Ninde presiding. The Bishop read seventeen verses of the third chapter of Collossians, after which the 765th hymn was sung,

"Happy the souls to Jesus joined."

The Bishop then proceeded to consecrate the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, which he administered with the aid of the Presiding Elders and of W. S. Birch, and at the conclusion of the sacrament Brother Birch led in prayer.

The Society adjourned and the Conference resumed business.

Delegates for the Ecumenical Conference.—The Chair announced that the Commissioners of the Ecumenical Conference, to be held in 1891, requested each annual Conference to nominate two ministers and two laymen, from whom the said Commissioners might select the members of the said Ecumenical Conference. On motion of W. S. Birch, the Presiding Elders were requested to nominate two ministers and two laymen from this Conference for the said purpose.

The Sample Gift.—On motion of A. Greenman, the Secretary was instructed to insert a suitable note in the Minutes, acknowledging the gift of \$1,000 made to the Church Extension Society, by Brother Joseph Sample, of Marion.

Adjournment.—The time having expired, notices were given, the doxology was sung and E. Holdstock pronounced the benediction.

FOURTH DAY.

SATURDAY, April 5, 1890.

The Conference convened at 8:30 A.M. The devotions were conducted by E. L. Semans. After singing the five hundred and twenty-first hymn,

"O for a heart to praise my God,"

and prayers by J. H. Lowry and W. J. Vigus, Brother Semans read the twenty-third Psalm. Prayers were offered by T. D. Tharp, J. K. Walts, J. Heim, C. G. Hudson and Bishop Walden. At 9 o'clock Bishop Ninde took the chair, and the Conference began the transaction of business.

Journal.—The Journal of Friday's session was read and approved.

Committee on Relations.—On motion of B. A. Kemp, the Committee on Conference Relations was granted leave to retire, and the case of I. J. Bicknell was referred to the committee.

Accounts of the Treasurer.—On request of the Treasurer, a committee was ordered to audit the accounts of the Treasurer, and J. K. Walts and W. D. Parr were appointed such committee.

S. L. Bowman.—The Secretary communicated to the Conference the fraternal greetings of S. L. Bowman, and his regrets that he was not able to be present at the session.

Introductions.—The following were introduced: J. M. Walden, one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church; D. J. Starr, of the Cincinnati Conference; T. S. Johnson, Presiding Elder of the Oude District, North India Conference, formerly a member of this Conference; J. P. D. John, President of DePauw

University; G. L. Curtis, Professor in the Theological School of DePauw University; C. A. Van Anda, of the Southeast Indiana Conference, and C. F. Steck, pastor of the Lutheran Church of Muncie.

J. Johnston.—The Stewards requested leave to change the basis of J. Johnston from \$100 to \$200, which was granted.

Statistical Secretary's Report.—The Statistical Secretary presented his report, which was read by summary, and was received and adopted. It was directed that the recapitulation of Statistical Table No. III be printed in the Minutes.

Hessong, recommended by the Kokomo District Conference and Mark S. Armitage, recommended by the Pennville Quarterly Conference.

Sixteenth Question.—The Sixteenth Question was taken up— "What Local Deacons have been Elected Elders?" And no recommendations were presented.

The Committee on Education was granted leave to retire.

Fifth Question.—The Fifth Question was called—"Who are Admitted Into Full Connection?" The Probationers of the second year were called forward. The Conference sang,

"A charge to keep I have,"

and Bishop Walden led in prayer. Bishop Ninde then addressed the class and asked the disciplinary questions. The following were passed in character and admitted into full connection: Asher S. Preston, John M. De Weese, William J. Gamble (required to be examined in Logic next year), Charles M. Hollopeter, Dorie V. Williams, Cassius C. Cissell, Joseph A. R. Gahring, Wilber M. On motion of C. W. Lynch, the relation of M. Swadener was changed from effective to supernumerary.

M. Swadener.—The following was presented, and adopted:

The Committee on the Book Concern presented their report, which was received and adopted, and the Secretary was instructed to furnish the Book Committee with so much of the same as refers to the distribution of funds, and also to publish in our Minutes a portion of the annual report of the Book Committee. (See Reports.)

The Committee on the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See Reports.)

The Committee on the Woman's Home Missionary Society presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See Reports.)

The Committee on Sunday-Schools presented their report, which was received and adopted. (See Reports.)

The report of the Committee on the American Bible Society was read and adopted, after remarks by W. J. Vigus. (See Reports.)

D. J. Starr.—D. J. Starr, of the Cincinnati Conference, addressed the Conference, and presented the interests of the Subscription Department of the Book Concern.

Mrs. R. B. Powell.—The Secretary represented the condition of the widow of the late Rev. R. B. Powell, and a collection was taken for her, amounting to \$58.81, which was paid into the hands of D. D. Powell.

Reports.—The Conference Treasurer presented his report, which, after correction, was adopted. (See Reports.)

The Citizens' National Bank.—On motion of the Treasurer, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That our thanks be hereby returned to the Citizens' National Bank for the many accommodations they have rendered to us, free of charge, and for the courtesies they have extended to our Conference Treasurer.

Resolved, That Wednesday, March 18, 1891, be adopted as "Statistical Day" for the coming year, and that it be the duty of each pastor on that day to fill out and mail card No. 1 to the Statistical Secretary.

Resolved, That at the third meeting of each Quarterly Conference for the year a fair estimate shall be made of the value of all Church property, and that all improvements made after said meeting shall be added to the valuation by the pastor.

Resolved, That it shall be the duty of each Presiding Elder to forward to the Statistical Secretary by October 1st of each year a list of all apportionments made to each charge, with claims of Pastors, including house rent, or rental value of parsonages.

Resolved. That we pledge ourselves to make a special endeavor to bring our statistical work nearer to perfection next spring than ever before.

REPORTS.

ON EDUCATION.

We present the following report of the Board of Visitors to DePauw University as a part of our report, viz.:

DEPAUW UNIVERSITY.

To the North Indiana Annual Conference:

Dear Fathers and Brethren—We, your Board of Visitors, appointed at your last session, to visit DePauw University and its Theological School, do hereby respectfully present our report. It is with deep sadness that we first refer to the fact that the number of these visitors is no longer complete, and that but a portion of the Board sign this report. The Rev. R. D. Robinson, D. D., who wrote the brilliant report of the visitors last year, and who we trusted would this year pen these lines, has ascended into the Heavens, after he had faithfully performed his duties as your visitor.

It is with great pleasure that we are able to report that the past year and the present year, up to this date, have been the most successful and prosperous in the history of this great institution. Never before has the number of students in attendance been as great. We expect that this year will see at least a thousand names enrolled. Students are to be found on our rolls from all portions of the land, proving that the grand reputation of the institution in the past has been fully maintained.

The accomodations of the school are taxed to the utmost by the classes, and new buildings, dormitories, and boarding-houses are greatly needed. A new laboratory, accommodations for the Department of Physics and of Biology, for the Theological School, the Normal School, and the Military School, are needed to-day, and must be provided in the near future. We sincerely hope that God will put it into the hearts of those to whom He has entrusted of this world's goods, that they shall soon aid the University in these regards.

The income of the University still falls short of meeting its necessary expenses, though the deficiency is less, and we are still indebted to the liberality of the Messrs. DePauw for material assistance. We are getting nearer the time when we shall be relieved of these embarrasments, and when the munificent bequests of Mr. DePauw can be fully realized.

Peace and harmony have marked the history of the University since our last report. Both the faculty and the students have worked hand in hand, and with deep earnestness; and, above all, a powerful undercurrent of religious life and power, has pervaded the institution. The members of the faculty are doing good work, and we feel that excellent men are at the head of the various departments, and we take great pleasure in commending them and their assistants.

We found the discipline of the University admirable. We have noted this during all the years of our visitorship. We doubt if any institution of its size can be found where there prevails such order, such devotion to study, and such sincere endeavor to realize a true ideal of manhood and womanhood. The atmosphere pervading the institution is healthy, moral, devout, and full of incentive.

At the Commencement in June, President Alexander Martin, of his own free will and accord, earnestly requested to be relieved of the burden of care and of executive administration that he had borne so long and so successfully. It was with great regret that the Joint Board acceded to his firm determination, and accepted his resignation. The years of his administration have been momentous in the history of the Institution. When he was elected, the East College Building was incomplete, and was burdened with a mortgage of twenty thousand dollars. During his presidency that building has been completed, furnished, and rendered free of all incumbrance. the same time the West College, consumed by fire, has been rebuilt; a dormitory for gentlemen, a boiler house, a dormitory for ladies, a building for the Musical School, and the McKim Observatory, with its excellent equipment, have all been built. During the same time the Law School has been reorganized; the Theological School, the Normal School, the Music School, the Art School, have been organized and built up to their present condition of efficiency, with the help of his grand coadjutors. During this time Mr. Washington C. DePauw was interested in the University, and induced to give it his time and labor, and his munificent endowments; while the various patronizing Conferences have also done their portion toward the endowment, and the attendance has been built up to nine hundred.

But we are happy to say we are not to be deprived of the services of Dr. Martin. He was retained as Professor of Mental and Moral, Philosophy, and during the year has also taken some of the classes in the Theological School.

The Joint Board did not attempt to fill the vacancy in the Presidency at Commencement. A special meeting was held in August. Vice-President John was placed in charge as Acting President. So well was the Board pleased with his administration, that at a special meeting in December, Dr. John was unanimously elected as President. President John was received with great enthusiasm by the Faculties and the students, and the Univer-

sity heartily approved of the choice. His administration has proved the wisdom of the choice. His theory of discipline, placing young men and women upon their honor, is working with the happiest results, and his administration thus far has been one of continued success. We confidently expect that his presidency will be of great benefit to the University.

In the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences Professor Post has returned from two years of absence in Europe, and resumed his labors. The Department of Biology is marked by great interest and enthusiasm. Dr. Jenkins and some of his pupils this last summer made an expedition to the Sandwich Islands, to study the fauna of that group. The result, when fully studied, together with his researches the summer before in the Gulf of California, will reflect great credit upon him and upon the University.

Professor Brown was made Director of the Observatory. New equipment has been added, and we confidently expect that McKim Observatory will take its place among the famous observatories of the world.

The other departments of the College, and of the Preparatory School have maintained their efficiency, doing faithful work, and proving the University to be specially fortunate in obtaining the services of such well qualified and sacrificing men and women as instructors. Again the University was honored by the success of its representative in the State and Inter-State Oratorical contest.

The Law School, under Dean Downey, has had its largest attendance this year, and at its recent commencement graduated a class of twelve.

The Theological School has been very prosperous, and has had as large an enrollment as any of the Theological Schools of the country. At the end of last year the arrangement with Dr. Parkhurst, the Pastor of College Avenue Church at Greencastle, was discontinued.

It is with regret that we say that Dean Bowman, a member of this Conference, was obliged to resign January 1, 1890, on account of the failing health of his wife, and remove with her to a different climate. Seven years ago Dean Bowman founded this school, and with the aid of Drs. Pocher and Curtis, has raised it to its present state of efficiency.

To fill this vacancy, at our last special meeting we elected Dr. Hilary A. Gobin, President of Baldwin University, Kan., and formerly Professor of Greek in the University, as Dean of the Theological School, to commence his labors at the beginning of the school year next fall. We also transferred Prof. Beals from the Preparatory School to the Theological School to assist in filling out the year. We think the institution very fortunate in securing the services of Dean Gobin. We expect that soon a Professor of Pastoral Theology will be elected. Thus equipped, we take great pleasure in recommending this school to the attention and patronage of all who think of entering the ministry.

At his own request Lieutenant May has been relieved from the charge of the Military School in order to return to his regiment. The Joint Board requested that Lieutenant Williams be detailed by the military authorities at Washington, which was done. The drills, the discipline and the general bearing of the companies of the Military School deserve the highest praise.

In the Normal School Professor Arnold Tompkins was elected Dean Dean Tompkins is a man of large experience, fine views, and is assisted by a thoroughly competent corps of assistants. The Normal School has had a good attendance. It is not the desire of the Board, nor of the Dean, to attempt in this School to compete in numbers with some of the superficial normal schools of the country, nor do we desire to occupy the time with elementary instruction. Our object is to confine the school entirely to the theory and practice of teaching, and to have an advanced grade of students, already proficient in the elements, who may be sent forth fully equipped and ready to stand in the front rank of the educators in our common and high schools. We have secured the services of a Training School teacher, who comes to us with the highest recommendations. We ask your patronage and your recommendation for this school.

The Music School has been doing excellent work. A very fine vocal teacher has been secured, and the attendance has been increased. The recitals and concerts of this school are of the highest order. Dean Howe is making a deep impress upon the School, and giving it a fine reputation throughout the country, both by his excellence as a teacher, and by his ability as a composer and author of musical text books.

The Art School, under the charge of Dean Mills, increases in numbers. Dean Mills is one of the finest portrait painters in the country, and in all branches of painting we have not seen his equal west of New York City.

Club-houses—one for the Theological School and one for the Normal School—have been very successful, and have given board at a very low rate.

Taking it all in all, we feel that we have nothing but good to report of the University. In its equipment, in its faculty, in its spirit, and in its religious influence, it stands in the very front rank. It is a thoroughly Methodist institution, where we may be assured that none of the so-called higher criticism, and none of the unbelieving tendencies of the age will have a foothold but a true and devout learning, that goes hand in hand with religion will be inculcated. Our Indiana Methodism should be proud of its great University and give it its hearty support.

We recommend that W. S. Birch and T. B. Redding be elected trustees, and that J. K. Walts and C. G. Hudson be elected visitors to DePauw University, and C. H. Brown and H. J. Norris visitors to the DePauw School of Theology.

FORT WAYNE COLLEGE.

Your committee have given the condition of Fort Wayne College very careful and prolonged consideration.

The institution has had a struggle for existence for many years. The

environments have always been of an adverse character and such as were beyond the control of this Conference.

There is now an indebtedness of \$20,000. A state of despondency exists in the Board of Trustees. The conviction seems to be general among the members of this Conference that the College property should be sold and the surplus proceeds of the sale be used for buildings in a new location within our Conference territory.

Your Committee therefore respectfully recommend that steps be taken for a new location for the College, as follows:

1. That the Trustees be instructed to sell the College real estate, and, after paying off the debt, the surplus be used in the erection of a building on the new location which may be selected.

2. That the Board of Trustees be empowered and instructed to pay over to any new Board of Trustees which may be elected any surplus remaining after such sale and to deliver to such new Trustees all assets, notes, apparatus, furniture and other personal property of which the said Trustees are

now possessed.

3. That a commission consisting of W. S. Birch, E. F. Hasty, C. U. Wade, C. E. Bacon, W. D. Parr, D. C. Woolpert, H. N. Herrick, C. W. Lynch, and M. H. Mendenhall, be appointed by this Conference to take full charge of the question of changing the location of the College; that the commission invite overtures from the towns in the Conference, stating the amount of land offered for a campus, and the amount of money and other property included in such overtures; that, in our judgment, not less than twenty-five (25) acres of land should be provided for a campus; and that, in order to secure the College, at least the sum of fifty thousand dollars should be donated, in addition to the campus; that the commission allow reasonable time for the maturing of proposals; that they consult the educational authorities of the Church in the matter of location; determine the proper location in due time; that the institution, as reorganized, shall assume the rank of an academy, in harmony with the University curriculum; that the commission have power to employ a financial agent, and to take all the legal and advisory steps necessary to prevent the waste or sacrifice of the College property, and to secure an advantageous sale thereof, and the complete reorganization of the College; that Fort Wayne be allowed to compete with other towns on the same conditions; and that the expenses of the commission be paid out of the College funds.

We recommend that the College classes at Fort Wayne be continued

only until the end of this Collegiate Year.

We recommend that G. H. Hill, A. W. Lamport, W. D. Parr, C. U. Wade and F. G. Browne be elected Trustees of Fort Wayne College; that J. W. Welch be elected Trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the death of R. D. Robinson, and C. E. Bacon to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of W. S. Birch.

6. We recommend that H. M. Lamport, F. G. Browne, L. A. Retts, C E. Disbro, L. J. Naftzger, W. S Boston and J H. Jackson be elected Visitors.

7. Resolved, That one thousand dollars be apportioned among the districts and charges, to be used for the benefit of the Conference institution wherever located, and that the sums thus raised be placed in the hands of the Commission on Change of Location, and by them reported to the Conference.

BOSTON SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY.

We are glad to receive a communication from the School of Theology of the Boston University, the oldest of our Theological Schools, and recognize in its location in the center of the great metropolis, and otherwise, special advantages to the Student of Theology. We heartily recommend it to all young men seeking a higher qualification for the great work of the University.

GARRETT BIBLICAL INSTITUTE.

We are greatly pleased to hear of the continued and increasing prosperity of this School of the Prophets, and heartily recommend it to our young men in the University who desire to be well equipped for their life work. The Faculty of the Institution continue to retain their reputation for thoroughness in discipline and instruction. They are earnest, efficient Christian teachers in their respective departments, fully up to the demands of the age, and are doing a grand work in the cause of Christian Education. We recommend J. A. Lewellen, F. G. Browne and W. S. Birch be elected as visitors to Garrett Biblical Institute.

CHILDREN'S DAY.

We recognize the important work that the Board of Education is doing and we pledge to it our earnest support. We recommend:

1. That Children's Day be observed and a collection be taken in all our Sunday Schools, and that this collection be taken and reported separately from educational collections for local objects, and that a separate column be devoted to it in our Conference Minutes.

That the Children's Day collection be forwarded to the Board of Education at New York immediately after it is taken and the receipt be presented to the Conference Treasurer as a voucher.

ON TEMPERANCE.

Resolved, That we reaffirm our adherence to the teachings of the Discipline of our Church on the question of temperance, viz.: Voluntary total abstinence from all intoxicants as the true ground of personal temperance, and complete legal prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating drinks as the duty of civil governments; and that it is "the wisest policy and the supreme duty of all legislative bodies to enact such legislation that, under the forms of the constitution the people may protect the home against the saloon by no-license votes, under the forms of the constitution, and as soon as possible by constitutional prohibitory amendments," and by enforcing laws that tend to the closing of the saloon; but this action shall not be construed as an indorsement of license.

Your Committee on the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society submit the following report:

We congratulate ourselves that we are able to report an increase of \$395.00 over the collections of last year, which indicates an increasing interest in Christian Education in the South.

Because of the very close relation existing between the work of the Society and the welfare of our country, and the urgent claim with which it comes to our Church for its support, we urge the Pastors of the North Indiana Conference to earnestly present this course to their respective charges, and use their utmost endeavor to secure the last dollar apportioned to their charges.

We sincerely recommend to our Conference the Christian Educator, published in the interest of christian education, especially in the South, as helpful in this work. We also call attention of our ministers to the Sunday service and subscription envelopes, as excellent aids in securing the best of results.

Again we refer to the last action of our General Conference, Article 406 of our Discipline, in which the duties of our Presiding Elders are clearly defined, and we urge them to see that this is fulfilled to the letter.

And to aid in this great and important work, we ask that the first Sabbath of July, as far as practicable, be observed as Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Day, at which time the members of this Conference shall take the collection for this Society.

We recommend the re-appointment of our Brother Rev. J.C. Murray, to a Professorship in Gammon Theological Seminary at Atlanta, Ga.

BOOK CONCERN.

Your Committee on Book Concern beg leave to make the following report:

In response to the request of the Book Committee that its annual report be published in our Conference minutes, and that the Conference shall express their judgment on the question of dividends to annual Conferences patronizing and enjoying incomes from local organs,

1. Resolved, That our Secretary be instructed to insert the annual report

of the Book Committee in the minutes of this session.

2. Resolved, That this Conference advise the Book Committee to consider what may be required in order to an equitable distribution of dividends from the Book Concern in cases where Annual Conferences may be receiving financial aid from local papers patronized and sustained by them or in heir special interest.

3. Resolved, That we request the Book Committee at its next session to review the method by which it proposes to distribute one-half of the dividend for 1891 in proportion to the Conference claimants, believing, as we do, that the actual needs of claimants vary in different sections of the church as they do in the Annual Conferences themselves; that the Conference provision for needy cases is apt to be the most meager where the demand is most urgent; that, therefore, a connectional fund should be administered with reference to the needy claimants, instead of their numbers. We further recommend to the consideration of the Committee, where this method does not make it impracticable, to administer Book Concern dividends with reference to the rightful claims of Western preachers whose salaries are so small as to prevent their attendance upon sessions of their Annual Conferences.

4. Resolved, That we urge our people to purchase books that can be supplied by the Concern, to subscribe generously for the periodicals, to patronize the department of Sunday-school publications and to remember that they can purchase anything kept in a first-class book house from the

Western Methodist Book Concern.

5. Resolved, That we, having heard with profit the address of Dr. D. H. Moore, take this occasion to assure him of our satisfaction with his editorship of the Western Christian Advocate, and that we will not suffer the subscription list of the Western to grow less but will diligently seek to make it larger.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE.

To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church:

The Book Committee, as directed by the Discipline, reports to the several Annual Conferences the condition of the publishing interests of the Church.

The death of J. H. Bayliss, D. D., occurring August, 1889, necessitated a special meeting of the committee, which took place September following. At this meeting D. H. Moore, D. D., of the Colorado Conference, was unanimously elected editor of *The Western Christian Advocate*, and within a few days thereafter he entered upon his duties. His six months of editorial supervision are gratifying to the committee as we know they are to the patrons of the paper.

The committee held its second annual session of the present quadrennium

in New York City, February 12, 13 and 14.

The Eastern and Western sections held separate sessions February 11, at which time they received the reports of the local committees, and carefully

reviewed the work of the past fiscal year.

Reports were received by our committee from all our editors. The reports made and the well known condition and prospepity of the publications give evidence for the most part of wise and energetic editorial supervision. Our periodical literature is invaluable to the ministry and to the Church at large. It fortifies the pastor in his work, serves to educate our people in the spirit, mission, and connectional interests of Methodism, acquaints them with the progress and enterprises of the Church, and stimulates them to a wiser adjustment of their resources to its legitimate and pressing demands. It does all this in addition to the cultivation of a deeper spirituality, a happier and more refined home life, and a more useful citizenship.

The committee is pleased to say that many of our periodicals have a healthy and encouraging increase. The Methodist Review has added sixty five per cent, since the last General Conference to its subscription list, and has now the largest circulation in its history. The aggregate number of weekly Advocates and the Christian Apologist amounts to 170,000. We are greatly gratified at the popularity and extensive circulation of our Sunday-School literature. The various issues in this department reach millions of our youth and their instructors. The scholarly, practical and suggestive interpretations of the Bible lessons render them of the greatest value to our Sunday-schools, and any disposition in our schools to select other helps in the place of those of our Church must result from a lack of acquaintance with the latter.

We are constrained to call your attention, and to some extent through you the attention of our people, to the books published by our agents in New York and Cincinnati. We need not speak of the value of a pure literature to church, home and personal life, but you will permit us to suggest that the pastors' more intimate knowledge of our publications may be utilized in suggestions to our people, and thus made to subserve their personal good and the good of the Church.

It will not be considered unjust to other authors to call your attention at this time to the great work of Bishop Foster now issuing from our press at New York, whose comprehensive researches, whose logic and rhetoric aglow with spiritual life, will convince the judgment, warm the heart, elevate the

spirit and charm the attention of every reader.

The agents have guarded carefully the great interests intrusted to them. Owing to our great building enterprise in New York and the improvement of our property in Chicago, they have sustained added burdens; but the results of the year and the present healthy condition of our publishing interests show a faithful and wise oversight. The obligations of the Church in the achievements of the past year are more than ever due to the local committees at New York and Cincinnati.

The net assets of our publishing houses and their depositories amount to nearly \$3,000,000. They have done an aggregate business during the past year of about \$2,000,000. The net earnings authorize a liberal distribution to the Annual Conferences. The cash sales, as compared with credit sales, are greater than any previous year. A dividend of \$110,000, for the benefit of our Conference Claimants, will be distributed to the Conferences the com-

ing year.

Inasmuch as our publishing interests are established and conducted in the interests of the entire Church, and the profits of our business are always returned to the patrons, either in the maintenance of religious and literary centers that can not as yet be self-supporting, in improving our periodical and Sunday School literature, or returned to the Annual Conference for the purposes prescribed in the Discipline, we suggest that any Conference supporting an independent paper should in equity relinquish its claim to the Conference Claimant Fund distributed to the Annual Conferences from the profits of the Book Concern, to the extent of the amount received from its independent enterprise.

In our report one year ago we reminded you of our great building then in process of erection on Fifth Avenue, New York. It is now completed and occupied. It is a model of stateliness, solidity, and symmetry without, and of beauty, brightness, and adaptability within. It is said to be the most complete and best appointed religious publishing house in the world. It is a worthy memorial of the one hundred years gone, and an "Ebenezer" raised at the beginning of a new century. May it ever serve to develop an

intelligent religious enthusiasm at home, and to secure the evangelization of

nations that yet sit in darkness!

Our property on Broadway and Mulberry Street has been sold, and the proceeds, supplemented by money previously earned in our business, are sufficient to meet all the expenses incurred in the erection of the new publishing house. The whole Church will be grateful to know of this concentration of our property into a locality and edifice that will eminently serve our wants, and for the century upon which we have entered be an honor to our Methodism.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

Your Committee on the American Bible Society beg leave to report as follows:

This Society is an auxiliary to every Christian effort. Its work is both missionary and benevolent. To all classes the Bible is sold at the mere cost of production; while to the poor it is given without money and without price. The object of the Society is to supply every destitute family in the country with the Scriptures, and to do this in their own tongue.

Special attention is given to the translation and circulation of the Bible in foreign lands. Eleven District Superintendents are in the field, and 337,807 Bibles and Testaments were distributed during the past year. One million and a half of Bibles and Testaments, and portions of the same are issued annually from the presses of the Society. We would therefore recommend the passage of the following resolutions:

1. We will give to this great non-sectarian institution our earnest prayers.

2. We recommend the District Superintendent, Rev. W. J. Vigus, to our

people, and extend to him a cordial invitation to our charges, and we will take collections in all our charges for this cause.

ARMY AND NAVY CHAPLAINCIES.

The Army and Navy may be looked upon as our home guard—the guards of the homes of this nation. Twenty-five thousand men are enrolled for this purpose, and these are gathered largely into 134 posts or stations, only thirty-four of which are provided with chaplains.

The circumstances and conditions of these men are peculiar—they rarely having the privilege of enjoying religious instruction and public worship, unless it is afforded within the limits of army regulations.

As a natural result of this comparative isolation, gambling, drinking, profanity and kindred evils prevail to an alarming extent. The government owes it to these men whom it has called into its service to afford them every safeguard and opportunity for mental and spiritual improvement, so that when released from service the elements of good citizenship may be developed rather than destroyed. We therefore indorse the action of the last General Conference in considering carefully the matter, and respectfully submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That we earnestly petition our Representatives and Senators to favor such legislation as will afford suitable religious instructors for all departments of our army and navy.

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MEMOIRS.

THE REV. REUBEN D. ROBINSON, M. D., D. D.

Reuben Davisson Robinson was born in Clark county, Ohio, August 10 1818, and died in the city of Indianapolis August 18, 1889, aged seventy-one years and eight days.

When he was quite young his parents removed to Indiana, and settled in Tippecanoe county, five miles west of Lafayette, on a farm, where our brother spent his youth and remained until he was of age. He was blessed with an excellent Methodist parentage, his father being an exhorter and an active member of the church, and his mother being one of the most devoted of women. Their home was ever the abode of the itinerant. Under such influences, Dr. Robinson began a life of prayer, as he himself records, at the age of eight, joined the church at fourteen, and was soundly and satisfactorily converted at fifteen.

Upon attaining his majority, he felt his need of education, and enrolled himself as one of the students of Asbury University, where he completed his course and graduated with the degree of A. B. in 1843. In 1845 he took the degree of A. M. in cursu, and in 1873 the Indiana University conferred upon him the honorary degree of D. D.

Upon the completion of his collegiate course, he began the study of medicine, with Dr. Deming, of Lafayette, as preceptor. He entered upon the practice of that profession, which he followed for a short time. But feeling within him the divine call to preach, he soon surrendered this chosen profession, gave up all, and presented himself before the North Indiana Conference in 1845 for admission on trial. He was received, in due time admitted in full, ordained deacon by Bishop Janes, at Indianapolis, and Elder by Bishop Waugh, at Logansport.

His appointments were as follows: '45, Independence Circuit; '46, Williamsport; '47-8, Newport; '49-50, Logansport; '51, Wayne St., Fort Wayne; '52-3, Professor in Fort Wayne College; '54-66, President of Fort Wayne College, at the same time in '64 and '65 serving as Presiding Elder of Fort Wayne and of Warsaw Districts; '66, Centennial Conference Agent; '67-8 Trinity Church, Indianapolis; '68-71, Presiding Elder of Indianapolis District; '72, Presiding Elder of Greensburgh District; '73-4-5-6, President of Fort Wayne College; '77-80, Presiding Elder of Kokomo District; '81, Elkhart; '82-5, Presiding Elder of Muncie District; '86-8, Greenfield; '89, Superintendent of the Board of Control of Deaconess' Work.

In 1864 he was the leader of the delegation in this Conference in the

General Conference. For a long time he has been one of the Trustees of Fort Wayne College. He has for years been the Chairman of our Committee on Education, and at the time of his death was one of our visitors to DePauw University.

September 1, 1847, he was married to Miss Mary K. Mahurin, who has faithfully shared with him all the toils of his long and useful life, gladdened his home, inspired his work and now mourns her unspeakable loss, together with their three daughters and one son. These daughters and this son have all reached manhood and womanhood, finished their education, the son graduating at DePauw a few months before his father's death. They are all earnest Christians, and together with their mother look forward to the hour when they shall join husband and father, an unbroken family circle, in the heavens.

Dr. Robinson was a loving husband, a tender and careful father, for whom it was a pleasure to make any sacrifice for his family. He was a man of marked ability in any and every department of church work. He was eloquent in the pulpit, possessing a grand command of language, and speaking with all the unction of a man who believes with all his heart in his message. He was an excellent pastor. He was an efficient Presiding Elder, tenderly caring for the interests of his preachers, defending them eloquently, preserving their secrets, and never babbling about them before the laity. As Professor and President of Fort Wayne College, both in the departments of instruction and of executive administration, he carried the Institution through one of the darkest periods of its history, and by his counsels and influence in its Board of Trustees, he aided in maintaining it to this hour.

In the Conference Dr. Robinson was a wise, safe, careful councilor, and was loved and honored by all. He never carried the heat of debate into private life. He was the friend of the young men, a brother to the older members, and always spoke kindly of the fathers. His gentle, kind, and cheerful words brought sunshine into our sessions, while his genial humor wreathed our faces in smiles. We shall miss him deeply, and the sense of this loss time will strengthen, not efface. Diligent, faithful, sincere, his faults were few, his virtues were many.

When, at our last Conference, he finished his pastorate at Greenfield and was put in control of Deaconess' work his force was not abated and he promised yet many years of usefulness Eleven days before his death the writer met him in the Joint Board of Trustees and Visitors of DePauw University and thought he never seemed more hale. He took part in the debates and was exceedingly cordial in his private conversation.

The last day of his life was the Sabbath. Every hour of that day, even up to the last he seemed in his usual health. He led the household devotions in the morning, kissed his wife affectionately at the time of going to the morning service, and wished she could accompany him. He attended at

Robert's Park. At dinner he expressed his thankfulness for God's mercies. He spent the afternoon in conversation with his wife and in reading. In the evening he attended the Murphy meeting at Tomlinson Hall. Here he made an earnest prayer for the divine blessing on the temperance cause. At the close of the service he spent some moments in social converse and handshaking, and started for home. When within one square of his dwelling he was seen by some young men to stagger and fall. Some ran to his assistance and others for a physician, but when the physician arrived he was dead. Thus painlessly, suddenly and desirably was he translated, and was not, for God had taken him.

His last sermon was preached the week before at Castleton, from the text. "There Shall Be No Night There." His sermon is said to have been full of premonition, and for an hour he talked of Heaven as he only can do who is almost there.

His funeral took place August 21st, at Robert's Park Church, and was conducted by the Rev. W. S. Birch, assisted by the Revs. Keen, Gillett and many others of the Conference and of the pastors in the city. His remains were buried in Crown Hill Cemetery.

Surely one of the purest and most devoted ministers of the Lord Jesus Christ has gone from our ranks to join the host above. The beautiful life he lived he has left behind him as an example for us, that we should follow in his steps. We look forward to the day when we shall greet him in the rest above.

THE REV. ORANGE V. LEMON.

Orange V. Lemon was born in Clark county O., January 27, 1813, and died in the city of Richmond, Ind., September 30, 1889, at the age of 76 years, 8 months and 3 days. His father was of Scotch-Irish decent, and came from Virginia.

Brother Lemon was raised on a farm, and gleaned his education in the district schools. He learned the tanner's trade, and followed it for five or six years in Springfield and Cincinnati. In 1835 he moved to LaPorte county, Ind., where he entered eighty acres of government land. This he farmed for several years. Here he felt the call to preach, and settled the question that he would devote his life to the service of the ministry. In 1841, he was appointed by the Rev. Aaron Wood as a supply on the Warsaw Circuit. This year he was admitted on trial in the Indiana Conference, and was re-appointed to Warsaw. From this time for thirty seven years he was engaged in effective and arduous work. At the division of the Indiana Conference, his membership fell in the North Indiana Conference, of which he remained a member as long as he lived.

The statement of his work is as follows: '41-2, Warsaw Circuit; '43, ordained Deacon by Bishop Andrew, appointed to Union; '44, Mishawaka; '45 ordained Elder by Bishop Hamline, appointed to Terre Coupee Circuit;

'46, Marion Circuit; '47-8-9-50, Presiding Elder of Peru District; 51-2-3-4, agent of Fort Wayne College; '55, Centerville and Cambridge; '56-7-8, agent of the American Bible Society; '59-60-1-2, Presiding Elder of the Richmond District, except some months in 1861-2, when he was Chaplain of the 36th Regiment of Indiana Volunteers.

1863-4-5-6 he was Presiding Elder of the Muncie District. In 1867 he was made Financial Agent for the North Indiana Conference, his Agency covering the interests and accounts of the Preachers' Aid Society, Asbury University, Mission House, Garrett Biblical Institute, and Fort Wayne College. These trusts he continued to hold until he superannuated. In 1870 he supplied a vacancy as Presiding Elder of Anderson District, but relinquished the appointment at Conference in order to devote his entire attention to the agency. 1873-4-5-6, he was Presiding Elder of Goshen District. In 1877 he was sent to White Water Circuit, where he remained one year, and in 1878, at the session at Anderson he was obliged by failing health to take a superannuated relation.

His long service comprised eight years in the pastorate, sixteen and a fraction in the Presiding Eldership, ten in Financial Agencies, and some months as Army Chaplain. During this time he was one of the most active and influential men in this body. He was elected as a Delegate to the General Conference at the sessions of 1856, 1864, and 1872, and was a Reserve Delegate in 1868. He was also a member of the Book Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church from 1872 to 1876.

During our sessions he always took a keen interest in all our business.

Rising to the front of the Conference early in his ministry by his ability and influence, he held his commanding station until failing health compelled his retirement. Kind, thoughtful, fatherly to the young men, tender and loving, he is cherished in the hearts of many of us whom he befriended, and to whom he was a father. The posses-or of a melodious voice, he often led our devotions and hymns. How often he would start some stirring lyric, and lead the great volume of melody that went up before the throne. Faithful, earnest, devoted, a pure gospel preacher, there was no one who

After his superannuation he first resided in Winchester for some years, and then removed to Richmond, where he remained until the day of his death.

He was first married, at the age of twenty, to Miss Rosetta J. Jones, who lived some three years, and left one daughter, who preceded her father to the better world. In 1837 he married Miss Charlotte Warnock, of LaPorte county, who died in Richmond in 1870. She left six sons and two daughters, all of whom are still living, except one son, who died a short time before his father. In 1872 he married Mrs. Mary C. Ferris, his now widowed companion, who faithfully ministered to him during his long illness.

During the years of our brother's superannuation he was greatly afflicted with melancholia, which put him to heavy trials, and often settled into deep despondency, and made him seem unlike his former self. This, however, in a great measure left him before his last days. In the midst of it all he continued to take a deep interest in all the work of the Church, and was glad to see his pastors and brethren. He was deeply grateful for the faithful ministry of his wife and children, and appreciated all their devoted care.

Growing weaker day by day, he at last fell gently asleep. His funeral was held in the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Richmond, and was conducted by his Presiding Elder, the Rev. T. Stabler, assisted by a large delegation of his brethren in the ministry.

Like David, "After he had served his generation by the will of God, he fell on sleep."

THE REV. ALPHEUS J. LEWELLEN.

Alpheus J. Lewellen was born in Randolph county, Virginia, September 8, 1824 When he was about thirteen years of age his parents removed to Indiana, in 1837, and settled in the wilderness in the eastern portion of Delaware county. Here his youth and early manhood were spent battling with the hardships of that early day. His educational advantages were consequently limited to what could be afforded by the schools of that time in that section.

He united with the Methodist Episcopal Church on probation in 1839, and was converted at a camp meeting, held at Campbell's Creek, in August, 1841. July 27, 1846, he was married to Miss Eleanor Kinett, of Windsor, Randolph county, Ind., who is now his widow.

In 1853 he removed to Iowa, and lived there some nine years. In 1862 he was licensed to exhort, in January, and in August of the same year he was licensed to preach by the Rev. J. S. Dimmitt, of the Upper Iowa Conference. Soon thereafter he removed to Mulberry Grove, Ill., and the next year to Smithfield, Ind.

April, 1868, he was appointed as supply on the Montpelier Circuit. At our session in 1864 he was admitted on trial in this Conference. He passed his probation, was admitted, and was ordained deacon by Bishop Clark, at Peru, and Elder by Bishop Thomson, at Warsaw.

His appointments were as follows: Warren Circuit, Alexandria Circuit, Lincoln Circuit, Xenia and Boxley. In '73 and '74 he was supernumerary, but supplied Tipton Station a portion of the time. Being again made effective, he was appointed to Jerome, Eaton, Farmland, Macy, LaGro, Warren, Dunkirk and Upland, where his health failed. With the exception of Warren, he remained in each of these charges two years. At Eaton he built an excellent brick church.

About a month after his appointment to Upland his health failed so that he was obliged to resign his charge. He then took up his residence in Dunkirk, where he continued to live until his death. The greater portion of this time he was very feeble, and it was evident to all that the end was not far away. Here he died in great peace November 14th, 1889, at the age of 65 years.

His funeral was conducted by the Rev. J. W. Welch, assisted by Brothers C. E. White, W. H. Pierce, J. A. Ruley, L. A. Retts and G. S. V. Howard, and was largely attended by his brother ministers and his former parishioners. He was buried at Mount Pleasant, Delaware county, Ind.

Brother Lewellen was a man of great usefulness, beloved by multitudes on the charges he served, and in every way was a successful and faithful minister of the Gospel. Besides his wife he leaves one daughter. He was a man of commanding presence and of exemplary life, whose daily walk exemplified the Gospel he preached. To-day he walks with the Master he served.

THE REV. RICHARD B. POWELL.

Richard B. Powell was born near Whitewater, Wayne county, Ind., January 23, 1847. He was converted at the age of ten years and connected himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Whitewater. He received his first license as a local preacher from M. Mahin, Presiding Elder. He was recommended by the Whitewater Quarterly Conference, Richmond District, to the North Indiana Annual Conference and admitted on trial in the spring of 1871, at Huntington. From this Conference he was appointed as junior preacher on the Butler Circuit, which he served one year. His appointments were La Fontaine, one year; Windfall, two years; Spiceland, one year; McCordsville, three years; New Britton, three years; Alto, one year; Cadiz, three years, and Middletown, four years; making in all nineteen years.

Brother Powell was married to Miss Sarah H. Welling, near Indianapolis, Ind., on the 25th day of May, 1876. One daughter was born to them at Alto.

Some three years ago our brother had a severe attack of sickness, from which, it was thought by his friends, he would not recover. Although it did not terminate in immediate death, yet he never fully recovered. However, he continued to perform the labors of a Methodist minister—at times in much bodily weakness, until about ten weeks ago, when he was attacked with the then prevailing epidemic, which developed heart failure, attended with severe suffering. He seemed from the first to be impressed that his time had come, and to be anxious to depart. When his companion talked hopefully of his recovery, his reply was, "Don't be deceived." Of the end he talked freely and with the utmost confidence and resignation. Among the many beautiful things he said, he gave utterance with emphasis to this

expression: "I have never desired to be a great man, but have greatly desired to be a good man."

He departed this life on the 8th day of March, at the parsonage in Middletown, Ind., aged 43 years, 1 month and 13 days. A wife, one daughter, a mother and two brothers, one of whom is of our number, the Rev. D. D. Powell, with a number of friends mourn his departure.

His funeral services were held in the church of which he was pastor, at Middletown, by his Presiding Elder, the Rev. T. Stabler, assisted by a number of his brethren in the Conference, and his body was interred by the I. O. O. F.

Brother Powell was an earnest and active worker, and by his pleasing address, his cordial greetings, as well as by his noble Christian character, won the admiration and esteem of all. In society generally, as well as in church work, his good influence was felt. As a pastor Brother Powell was highly esteemed and his untiring efforts were appreciated of men and blessed of God. The members of the churches he served were especially attached to him, and remembered him with kindness. He was an enterprising citizen, a companionable gentleman, a faithful friend, and was always willing to extend aid where needed, to the extent of his ability. None knew him but to bear testimony to his good character. In all the walks of life where good is to be done. Brother Powell will be sadly missed. He will be especially missed in the home so saddened by his death. While his words of comfort and cheer, his noble counsel and kindly advice will no more be heard by wife or child, they will not be forgotten. The remembrance of his love, and of his pure life and Christian character, will ever be to them a source of consolation as the years carry the bereft ones nearer the reunion beyond. Until then may the God of the widow and of the fatherless be their stay.

MRS. MARY I. LAMPORT.

Mary Isabella Sweeny was born near Mishawaka, Ind., October 28, 1847. She was a frail child, and battled with some form of disease all her life. When eight years of age she was orphaned by the death of her father, and in the tollowing year doubly orphaned by the death of her mother. But friends were raised up who cared for and shared their home with her.

At the age of fifteen, in 1862, she was converted under the labors of the now sainted Thomas Comstock. Her conversion was clear, and as a result, her whole Christian life was even and firm.

She was married to our bereaved brother, with whom we so tenderly sympathize, May 7, 1868. Three precious children were bestowed upon them. The eldest born died in his third year, and two sons are left to their father in the desolate home.

Sister Lamport most willingly shared with her husband all the toils and responsibilities of the Methodist itineracy for eighteen years. She took part

in every labor, was diligent in all the means of grace, and made herself felt and loved in all the important and responsible charges in which they were stationed. Her husband ever looked to her for cheer, and found inspiration and courage. Her presence made the home light about her. The people loved her wherever she went, and cherished her memory. She always sustained herself in trying positions, and did far more than her frail health and frequent illness would warrant.

When she and her husband returned to the First Church, Richmond, for the second pastorate, her health was exceedingly frail. She was a constant sufferer, and could do but little in pastoral work, yet she taught in the Sunday-School a large class of twenty-four young ladies until within a few weeks of her death.

Just five weeks previous to her departure she was taken alarmingly ill, and steadily grew weaker until life ended on Sabbath morning. May 26th, 1889, at 7 o'clock. The long and painful struggle of her illness was relieved by the remarkable quietness with which she finally yielded up her life; yet, with commendable devotion, she earnestly desired to live for the sake of her children and husband.

During the early portion of her illness she received one night a wondrous baptism. In answer to the question if she were sleeping well she said: "None at all; God has so wondrously blessed me that I can not sleep for joy. Never but once have I received such annointing from God. It must be that he intends to heal me, soul and body." Again that night she said: "I've never been so happy before; I keep singing in a whisper lest I should disturb the rest of you, but I feel like shouting aloud the praises of God." Thus she continued to testify and in the morning joined in the family worship and song.

In this precious experience she continued, praying to be raised up, if it were the Divine will. But when the final hour came her husband said to her: "Mamma, do you know you are dying?" She seemed surprised at the question, and asked: "Does the Doctor says o?" "Yes," he answered, "the Doctor says that this is death." "All right," she said, "all right." Then she gave a message to her brother for his wife, saying, "Tell Mary to be a faithful Christian and meet me in Heaven." Then, after some lingering and much pain, she closed her beautiful life like the quiet breathing of an infant.

There was a large gathering of the people to the services held in her memory in the First Church, Richmond, which were conducted by Dr. Stabler and Dr. Mahin; her remains were taken to Mishawaka for interment and the Rev. F. T. Simpson preached the sermon in the Methodist Episcopal Church in that place in the presence of a large circle of friends and kindred.

May the Divine grace and the promises of that Gospel, of which our brother has been called to be a minister, be his abundant stay, strengthen him in his doubled responsibilities and keep him to the joyful day of the eternal reunion.

MRS. ELIZABETH CAIN.

Elizabeth Fearnow, daughter of David and Mary Ann Fearnow, and wife of the Rev. J. S. Cain, was born in Morgan county, West Virginia, February 15, 1851. She was brought up in the place of her birth, and lived there until her marriage.

She was reared under religious influences. In early girlhood she was converted, and united with the United Brethren Church. From the time of her conversion to her death she was an earnest, devoted Christian, and an active worker in the church.

She was married to our sorely-stricken Brother at Kempton, January 25, 1878, at the time of Brother Cain's pastorate in that charge. As his wife, filling such a position of responsibility in the church, she proved herself to be a remarkable woman. She identified herself closely with all the interests of the churches. With intelligence and energy she anticipated every demand and every need of the pastorate and of the church. There was no part of our work in which she did not take an interest.

She was greatly interested in 'our woman's missionary societies, and usually took lead in them. Her chief delight was in the care and instruction of the children of the church. Childless herself, yet was she a mother of the children in their charges, and in this particular field of usefulness she was especially blessed. She was a constant companion of her husband in all his work. In the social meetings and in revival services her presence and labors were powerful inspirations to all. She often took charge of the social services in the absence of her husband, and shared with him his pastoral labors.

Sister Cain's death took place at their home in Nappanee, February 4, 1890. Failing health caused her departure to be expected for some time previous. She was confined to her room for several weeks, but was not confined to her bed the entire day at any time. For years pulmonary weakness had given prophecy of the inevitable end, and an attack of the prevailing influenza hastened her death. She was sustained in great peace, and without a fear went down to the river hand in hand with the Redeemer she had served so faithfully and so well. She passed away at the last quietly and painlessly, and entered into the eternal house.

Her funeral took place in our Church at Nappanee on the 15th of February, conducted by the Rev. C. H. Murray, and attended by a great number of sympathizing friends. Her remains were taken to Williamsburgh, Wayne county, for interment.

May He who hath promised to wipe away all tears from all faces be the strong stay and consolation of our sorrowing brother, and lead him gently all his days until his great change shall also come.

MRS. CORA E. FORKNER.

Cora E. Bell, wife of the Rev. A. L. Forkner, was the only daughter of Dr. J. G. and Emily Bell. She was born in Greenville, Indiana county, Pennsylvania. February 16, 1864, and died at Huntertown, Allen county, Indiana, March 3, 1890, at the age of 26 years and 17 days.

Sister Forkner was left an orphan when she was one year old by the death of her father. Soon thereafter her widowed mother removed to Indianapolis to live with a brother, and there our sister was brought up. Her school days were passed in that city. She was an excellent student, and became a fine musician. At the age of seventeen she removed with her mother to Anderson, and engaged for three years and a half in teaching the schools in Richland township, in which she was very successful. The Trustee of the township claimed that she was the best teacher he had. During this time she met our brother, and their acquaintance ripened into love. They were married May 6, 1885.

This happy union was blessed with two little daughters and an infant son, orphaned at four days of age, and never to know his mother's tender care.

Our sister was converted when she was fifteen, and became a member of our Church. She went cheerfully with our brother into the work of the ministry, and bore all its toils and anxieties heroically. The words of praise from her husband show her to have been a helpmeet, indeed; never hurried, never discomposed, always doing the right thing at the right time, and ever endearing herself to the hearts of their parishioners. She was never heard to complain. She was full of patience and meekness, and her words were full of comfort and cheer. Whatever her hands found to do, she did faithfully and well.

She was sick a few days only, and was conscious until the last. When it became manifest that the time of her departure was near at hand, on the night before her death she talked, sung and prayed in the presence of many friends. She exhorted all to be faithful a little longer, and told her little daughter to be good and the angels would come for her as they had now come for mamma. She said she had had doubts during her life-time as to her being wholly the Lord's, but now she no longer doubted; she had looked upon death as a thing to be most dreaded, but she found it now to be most blessed, the way was so bright. After many exhortations she joined in singing a stanza of

"O for a thousand tongues to sing,"

and with rapture repeated the chorus,

"Blessed be His name."

In this triumphant frame she laid aside the earthly and put on the heavenly.

Her body was taken to the Anderson Circuit, to the home of Brother Forkner, where the funeral services were conducted by the Rev. B. A. Kemp, assisted by the Revs. S. L. Johnson and F. Lacey. She was buried in the beautiful cemetery at Anderson.

God be gracious to our brother, bereaved under such sad circumstances, and give him strength for his double burden of responsibility, and sustain him until he shall be reunited with her who was thus early crowned.

MRS. L. W. MONSON.

Louisa, daughter of Rev. Thomas Baker, late of Pittsburg Conference, and Roanna Baker, was born at Houlttown, Marion county, West Virginia, April 11, 1831. and died the wife of Rev. L. W. Monson, at Wabash, Ind., March 8, 1890, near the close of her fifty-ninth year. Our sister had the advantage of birth and training in a Methodist preacher's home. She early became a member of the church, but was converted at a meeting held in a large barn, near Fortville, Ind. The meeting was conducted by the Rev Eli Rammel and her now bereaved husband, the Rev. L. W. Monson.

Sister Monson's youth, passed in a Methodist preacher's home, fitted her to become an itinerant's wife, which she did by marrying the Rev. L W. Monson, at Fortville, Ind., October 6, 1857. Very few, if any, were better prepared to understand the genius or to enter enthusiastically into the Methodist economy. In the following appointments she helped make her busy husband's itinerant life successful:

From time of marriage until the Conference session of 1861 they served the Goshen District. In 1861 they were sent to Wabash Station, during which time the present church, though afterward greatly altered and improved, was begun; 1862-67, Peru District; 1866-70, Ft. Wayne District; 1870-74, the Warsaw District; 1874-77, the LaGro Circuit; 1877-80, Roann Circuit. Since 1870, with but short intermission, our sister's home has been in Wabash, and for the last ten years her husband's labors have been in connection with Wabash County Auxiliary of the American Bible Society and in serving as supply at different places. About Wabash, and throughout this thickly settled Methodist section of our Conference none were more highly or universally esteemed than Sister Monson and her greatly revered husband.

Four children were born of this union, one daughter and three sons, one son alone surviving her. She leaves also two step-daughters, one step-son, together with an aged mother.

Sister Monson's religious experience was of a clear, trustful, faithful kind. Her chief desire was to do the work of her Master. On account of the deafness of her husband, her sphere of Christian activity was narrowed from the more responsible work of active itineracy, yet she was not only patient, but cheerfully happy.

Brother and Sister Monson accepted the situation and entered earnestly into the local church work, and the whole community had occasion to rejoice in the providence of God that threw into their midst two such Christian characters as bulwarks of our blessed Christianity. We can but suggest the breadth of her Christian labors. She was the first President of Wabash Auxiliary of the W. F. M. S., a position she held many years, and to her zeal it owes much to the position it occupies as the banner auxiliary of the North Indiana Conference. She presided at the first crusade meeting in her city, and led the women in that noble march of song and prayer against the Saracens of the saloon. She afterwards became the first President of the local W. C. T. U. For twenty years Sister Monson taught the ladies' Bibleclass in the Sunday-school, and a correct Bible knowledge and great fidelity characterized her work.

A friend of every effort to soothe sorrow and care among the unfortunate, she entered heartily into an effort to organize an "Orphans' Home," and was the first President of its Board of Managers, and remained active in its interests to the time of her death. She was active in all church work, as far as her strength would allow, and was a prayer-meeting, class-meeting, and everyday Christian. With tenderest care she waited on all the wants of her aged mother and deaf husband, who relied very much upon the help and counsel of his wife. And in his latest effort to benefit his ministerial brethren, the preparation of "The Manual of the North Indiana Conference," he was greatly assisted by her in gathering facts, arranging material and reading proof. The day before her death the last proof was read, and on the following day this faithful helper and companion fell asleep in Jesus. Thank God, these faithful workers were enabled to complete this little book, so valuable to all Methodists of the North Indiana Conference territory. Thus we come to the close of a beautiful and useful Christian life. After an attack of la grippe came a relapse, and because her lungs were especially weak, hemorrhages; and on the morning of the 8th of March our sister bade us an unexpected adieu. When the messenger of death came to her room she said to her sister, "I am going; pray for me;" and being assured they were praying, then clamly, as if addressing the sister and the messenger, also, she said, "I am ready," and stepping into the chariot she went home to God. Her funeral services were conducted at Wabash, Ind., March 10th, by Revs. C. E. Bacon and W. J. Vigus. She believed all things work together for good to those who love God, and in her Bible, which was marked with the text and date of sermons she had heard, in the leaf, where she marked the text of a sermon preached by her pastor, March 3, '89, was found a beautiful poem, "God Knoweth Best," which seems her parting testimony and counsel to us.
