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# MINUTES.

First Session.

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Goldsboro', N. C., Oct. 29th, 1862.

The Synod of North Carolina met according to adjournment, and was opened with a sermon by Rev. Edward Hines, Moderator, from II Cor. 5th chap., 14th and 15th verses.

After the sermon the Synod was constituted with prayer by the Moderator.

The roll of Ministers and Churches was then called, and the following members were found to be present:

On motion it was resolved to spend the first half hour of each morning's session in devotional exercises.

The Synod then adjourned to meet to morrow morning at 9 o'clock. Closed with prayer.

### Second Session.

# THURSDAY MORNING, October 30th, 1862.

The Synod met according to adjournment, and spent the first half hour in devotional exercises, conducted by the Moderator.

The roll of Synod was then called.

Rev. John D. Wilson and Rev. D. A. Penick, Jr., of the Presbytery of Concord appeared in Synod, and after rendering satisfactory reasons for tardiness, took their seats.

The Minutes of last night's session were read and approved.

The Moderator then appointed the following standing committees:

The reading of the minutes of the last session of Synod was, on motion, dispensed with.

Rev. Messrs. Willis L. Miller, D. A. Penick, Jr., John D. Wilson, and Neill McKay rendered satisfactory reasons for absence from the last regular session of Synod.

The Statistical reports from the Presbyteries were presented, and are as follows:

#### THE PRESBYTERY OF ORANGE.

The Presbytery of Orange report to the Synod of North Carolina that they consist of thirty-three Ministers, and have under their care fifty-two churches, six licentiates and four candidates: that on the 10th day of April, 1862, they changed the name of Spring Grove Church to Oak Hill, and received on certificate as a member, Rev. J. H. Coble, from the Presbytery of Louisiana, and also dissolved the pastoral relation between Rev. T. G. Wall and the church of Newbern; that on the 12th day of April, 1862, they licensed Mr. Halbert G. Hill and Mr. John A. Woodburn, as probationers for the holy ministry; that on the 13th day of the same month, they ordained Mr. Calvin N. Morrow to the full work of the ministry as an Evangelist; that on the 5th day of June, 1862, they dissolved the pastoral relation between the Rev. John B. Shearer and the church at Chapel Hill; that on the 25th day of October, 1862, they received on certificate of dismission, as a member, Rev. H. B. Pratt, from the Presbytery of Cherokee, and on the same day they dismissed Rev. T. G. Wall, to join the First Presbytery of Philadelphia, in connexion with the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States; and that on the 4th day of October, 1862, they organized the Church of Winston, in Forsythe county, North Carolina.

#### THE PRESBYTERY OF CONCORD.

The Presbytery of Concord report to the Synod of North Car-

olina, that they consist of forty-one Ministers, and have under their care seventy churches, two licentiates and two candidates; that on the 1st day of November, 1861, they received under their care Mr. William M. Kilpatrick, a licentiate from the Presbytery of Orange; that on the 16th day of November, 1861, they received under their care Mr. S. C. Alexander, a licentiate from the Presbytery of Charleston; that on the 17th day of Nov. 1861, they ordained to the full work of the ministry Robert Z. Johnston, and installed him pastor of the church of Providence; that on the 23rd day of November, 1861, they installed Rev. Robert Z. Johnston pastor of the church of Sharon; that on the 21st day of December, 1861, they ordained Mr. Samuel Caruthers Alexander to the full work of the ministry, and installed him pastor of the church of Steel Creek; that on the 23rd day of January, 1862, they dissolved the pastoral relation existing between the Rev. Alexander Sinclair and the church of Charlotte, and declared said church vacant; that on the 15th day of March, 1862, they lost by death the Rev. Henry N. Pharr; that on the 10th day of April, 1862, they received as a member, Rev. B. L. Beall from the Presbytery of Bethel; that on the 18th day of April, 1862, they installed Rev. Samuel Caruthers Alexander, pastor of the church of Pleasant Hill; that on the 9th day of May, 1862, they received as a member the Rev. S. S. Murkland, from the Presbytery of West Hanover; that on the 10th day of May, 1862, they ordained to the full work of the ministry, Mr. William M. Kilpatrick, and installed him pastor of the church of Concord town; that on the 24th day of May, 1862, they ordained to the full work of the ministry, Mr. Robert B. Anderson, and installed him pastor of the church of Bethel; and that on the 3rd day of October, 1862, they dissolved the pastoral relation existing between the Rev. R. H. Chapman, D. THE PRESBYTERY OF FAYETTEVILLE.

The Presbytery of Fayetteville would respectfully report to the Synod of North Carolina, that at present they consist of thirty-one Ministers and have under their care seven licentiates, five candidates for the ministry, and sixty-five churches; that on the 2nd day of November, 1861, they organized Marks Creek Church; that on the 30th day of the same month, they installed Rev. John M. Sherwood, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Fayetteville; that on the 31st day of December, 1861, they lost by death Rev. Frederick K. Nash; that on the 12th day of

April, 1862, they dissolved the pastoral relation between Rev. Archibald McQueen and Harmony church, and declared said church vacant; that on the same day they licensed Mr. William A. McDonald to preach the Gospel of Christ as a probationer for the holy Ministry; that on the 30th day of August, 1862, they installed Rev. N. T. Bowden, pastor of Mineral Spring Church; that on the 3rd day of October, 1862, they dissolved the pastoral relation between Rev. James Sinclair and the church of Ashpole and declared the said church vacant, and that on the 4th day of October, 1862, they ordained Mr. James H. Colton to the full work of the Gospel Ministry, and licensed Mr. Angus N. Ferguson to preach the Gospel as a probationer for the holy Ministry.

Letters were read from Rev. Messrs. Hector McLean, E. F. Rockwell, S. C. Pharr, D. D., Neill McDonald, R. Z. Johnston, and J. P. McPherson, assigning satisfactory reasons for absence from the present session of Synod.

A letter from Rev. John Leyburn, D. D., on the subject of Domestic Missions was read and referred to the Agent of Domestic Missions.

The annual Report of the Board of Directors of Union Theological Seminary was read and referred to the committee on the Seminary.

Rev. A. G. Hughes and Rev. J. Rumple rendered satisfactory reasons for absence at the close of the last regular session of Synod.

On motion, the committee on Union Theological Seminary was directed to make nominations to fill vacancies in the 4th class of the Directors of the Seminary.

A complaint from Rev. James Sinclair against the action of Fayetteville Presbytery, with certain papers relating to the same subject, was presented to Synod, and on motion, was referred to the Judicial Committee.

Reports on Systematic Benevolence from the Presbyteries were read, and ordered to be printed in the minutes and are as follows:

THE PRESBYTERY OF ORANGE.

The Presbytery of Orange present to the Synod of North Car-

olina the following report on Systematic Benevolence: From all the sources of information in our possession it appears that our churches are not declining, but rather growing in the grace of giving to the various benevolent enterprises of the church.

It is true that the benevolent contributions of some of our churches are small, and that other churches are altogether delinguent so far as their conduct can be ascertained from the records of the church. But this apparent lack of liberality may be attributed in some cases to neglect on the part of the officers of the church in presenting the claims of others upon our christian liberality, and in other cases to a want of carefulness in gathering up the fragments of our scattered contributions and spreading them upon our statistical reports. Individual contributions of no inconsiderable value are frequently made, but these are very seldom accounted for in our sessional reports, and therefore many churches appear to be doing nothing, when they are in fact doing much for the cause of Christ in the earth. we need, therefore, is a more faithful and systematic presentation of the claims of our church enterprises, and a more careful entry of the contributions which are actually made, upon our statistical records.

From the Sessional records of about three-fourths of our churches we gather the following statistics:

A great variety of new and interesting fields of christian enterprise and benevolence has been presented to our church since the commencement of the war. Our people have generally responded to these new calls for self-denial and liberality, and your committee would encourage the hope, that our churches will not fail to meet, in a good measure the heavy responsibility which now devolves upon them.

#### THE PRESBYTERY OF CONCORD.

The Presbytery of Concord present to the Synod of North Carolina the following report on Systematic Benevolence: Of our seventy churches there are twenty-one that make no report of contributions to any of the five Boards of the church. For-

ty-four churches have contributed to the cause of Domestic Missions. Twenty-eight churches have contributed to the support of Foreign Missions. Nineteen churches have contributed to the cause of Education. Twenty churches have contributed to the cause of Publication. Five churches have contributed to Church Extension.

The aggregate of these contributions is as follows, viz:

#### THE PRESBYTERY OF FAYETTEVILLE.

The great commission of the Church of Jesus Christ is to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature. And whatever means and instrumentalities are adapted to this end are to be carefully developed and skillfully used in thus promoting the glory of God in the salvation of men. All that we are and have are to be laid upon God's altar for this purpose, and it becomes the Church to make still greater sacrifices in this import-

ant and glorious work.

During the first half of the present Synodical year, out of sixty-four Churches, nineteen contributed to the cause of Domestic Missions; twenty-two to Foreign Missions; twelve to Education; nine to Publication; six to Church Extension, and two to Disabled Ministers. During the last half of the same year, out of sixty-five Churches, twenty-three contributed to the cause of Domestic Missions; twenty-four to Foreign Missions; twelve to Education; twelve to Publication, and three to Church Extension.

It is to be regretted that a large number of the Churches do not appear to have contributed to more than one or two of the benevolent objects of the Church, while several do not appear to have contributed any thing at all.

The aggregate amounts contributed, compare favorably, under

existing circumstances with previous years. But when we consider our numbers and our material resources, we would fain hide our faces, and pray that God would give us and our people more and more the spirit of enlarged benevolence.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the minute appointing Agents to report on the operations of the Boards of the Church, adopted at the sessions of Synod in Danville, Oct'r 1852, be amended so as to read as

follows, viz:

1. Resolved, That this Synod will appoint one Agent on each of the following objects of Christian Benevolence, viz: Foreign Missions, Domestic Missions, Education and Publication; and that these Agents be required to take into consideration the whole field committed to their supervision, and present at each meeting of Synod a written report of all that is doing within the boundaries of the Synod, on the subjects severally assigned to them.

2. Resolved, That the consideration of these reports shall be a

special order at each meeting of Synod.

The following members were reappointed as Agents, viz:

Rev. John M. Sherwood, on Domestic Missions.

" Neill McKay, on Education.

" Jethro Rumple, on Foreign Missions.

" C. K. Caldwell, on Publication and Colportage.

The report of the Agent for Foreign Missions was made the order of the day for to-morrow at 11 o'clock, A. M.

The report of the Agent for Publication and Colportage was made the first order of the day for to-morrow afternoon, immediately after recess.

The Committee on Union Theological Seminary made a report, nominating Rev. S. A. Stanfield, Rev. Jethero Rumple, and Mr. M. V. Lanier, to fill the vacancies in the Fourth Class of the Board of Directors of the Seminary. This report was accepted and adopted.

A paper submitted to Synod at Raleigh, 1861, embracing an Overture to the General Assembly in relation to Home Missions and referred to this meeting, was on motion laid on the table.

The report of the Trustees of Synod was read, and referred to a Committee, consisting of Rev. Neill McKay, Mr. E. B. Stimson, and Alexander Sprunt.

Salisbury, N. C., was chosen as the place, and Wednesday before the first Sabbath in November, 1863, at 7 o'clock, P. M., as the time for the next meeting of Synod.

The following preamble and resolution were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, the Southern Presbyterian Review, a journal published in the City of Columbia, S. C., devoted to the dissemination, in a permanent form, of the great doctrines and principles of the Presbyterian Church, is the only agency of the kind in our Assembly, and has in time past rendered most eminent service, is in urgent need of funds; therefore,

Resolved, That the Ministers and Ruling Elders of the Synod of North-Carolina will at once exert their influence in their respective fields of labor to extend the circulation of the Southern

Presbyterian Review.

On motion, it was resolved that the salary of the Stated Clerk be increased to Seventy-Five Dollars per annum, allowing him that sum for the present year, now drawing to a close.

Rev. Colin Shaw appeared in Synod, and rendered satisfactory reasons for tardiness at the present, and absence from the last sessions of Synod.

Rev. John C. Sinclair and Rev. Martin McQueen appeared and presented satisfactory reasons for tardiness.

Messrs. Neill R. Blue and A. J. McQueen, Ruling Elders from Fayetteville Presbytery, appeared in Synod and took their seats.

On motion, it was resolved, that the Stated Clerk be directed to publish in the Appendix to the printed Minutes, a list of the Ministers of the Synod with their Post-Offices respectively.

Rev. R. H. Lafferty, Rev. D. A. Penick, Sen., and Mr. S. W. Caldwell, were appointed a Committee to prepare a suitable minute with reference to the death of Rev. Henry N. Pharr.

Rev. Martin McQueen, Rev. Neill McKay and Mr. Neill R. Blue, were appointed to prepare a suitable minute with reference to the death of Rev. F. K. Nash.

Mr. J. B. Pigford, Ruling Elder from Fayetteville Presbytery,

appeared in Synod and took his seat.

Rev. G. M. Gibbs, Rev. James Sinclair and Rev. James Mc-Queen of Fayetteville Presbytery, appeared in Synod and presented satisfactory reasons for tardiness.

The Committee appointed to examine the Records of Orange Presbytery, reported, recommending their approval as far as written—Page 217. This report was accepted and adopted.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted, viz:

Resolved, That this Synod enjoin it upon each Minister within its bounds to preach at least once as soon as practicable on the observance of the Sabbath.

The account of Mr. D. A. Davis, Treasurer of Synod, was presented and referred to the Standing Committee on that subject.

Rev. Neill McKay, Synodical Agent on Education, made a verbal report and submitted two resolutions which were referred to a Committee consisting of Messrs. Neill McKay, Willis L. Miller, D. Lacy, D. D., G. A. Russell, D. A. Penick, Sen., and Walter W. Pharr, Ministers, with Dr. E. Nye Hutchison and R. H. Tate, Ruling Elders.

The Committee on leave of absence reported that they had granted leave of absence to Rev. James Sinclair after Thursday evening.

The Committee on the Records of Concord Presbytery made the following report, which was accepted and adopted:

The Committee on the Records of Concord Presbytery beg leave to report that we have read the Minutes of said Presbytery, and recommend that they be approved as far as written, page 628, with the following exception:

On page 559 it appears that the Presbytery failed to examine a candidate for ordination on experimental religion, philosophy and languages, which we deem contrary to Form of Government.

Chap. XV. See XI.

Synod then adjourned to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock. Closed with prayer.

## Third Session.

FRIDAY MORNING, Oct. 31, 1862.

Synod met according to adjournment, and spent half an hour in devotional exercises.

The Roll was then called, and the Minutes of yesterday were read, corrected and approved.

Rev. A. Wilson, D. D., and Rev. James Phillips, D. D., appeared in Synod and rendered satisfactory reasons for tardiness.

Letters were read from Rev. Thomas N. Paxton and Rev. Robert Burwell, assigning satisfactory reasons for absence from the present meeting of Synod.

The Judicial Committee made the following report which was accepted and adopted:

The Judicial Committee respectfully report to Synod, that certain papers have been placed in their hands, from which it appears that on the 1st day of October, 1962, Rev. J. Sinclair notified the Presbytery of Fayetteville, through Rev. J. P. Mc-Pherson, that he intended to complain of some parts or of all of the proceedings of Fayetteville Presbytery, on matters connected with himself and Ashpole Church, which proceedings of Presbytery were had, as appears, from an extract from the Minutes of the Presbytery, on the 3rd day of the same month.

The Committee further report that last night after the Synod had adjourned, the Stated Clerk of Synod placed in their hands a complaint from Rev. J. Sinclair, addressed to the Moderator of Synod, dated October 24th, 1862, against the action of Fayette-ville Presbytery, touching the dissolution of the pastoral relation between himself and Ashpole Church, containing seven specifications with reasons; that the complaint is in respectful terms, and appears to be in time and form, such as to claim the attention of Synod.

The Committee therefore recommend that the complaint be entertained, and that the following order be pursued in the disposal of it, viz:

- 1. That the complaint with its reasons be read.
- 2. The proceedings of the Fayetteville Presbytery in the case be read.
- 3. That Synod then hear the original parties, viz: The Complainant and the Fayetteville Presbytery.
- 4. That the roll then be called for remarks from the members of Synod, and
  - 5. The yote then be taken.

The Committee appointed to prepare a narrative on the state of religion in the form of an address to the Churches, presented the following paper, which was accepted and adopted, and on motion it was ordered to be spread on our records, and published in the North Carolina Presbyterian:

An Address from the Synod of North-Carolina, to the Churches under its care, on the State of Religion within its bounds:

DEAR BRETHEEN: We feel that in the Provieence of God we are called to address you under circumstances of unprecedented solemnity. An aggressive war of merciless fury is waged against our people. Our homes are invaded, our property taken; our citizens murdered. Under these circumstances the public mind is powerfully agitated and in general preoccupied with public interests to the partial or total exclusion of their religious concerns.

In the case of some of our Churches, the attendance on the means of grace has been visibly diminished by the large draughts made upon them for the prosecution of this cruel war, which has been forced upon us in the face of every concession and protest dictated by humanity and christian charity. The additions to the Churches reported are comparatively few, still our God has not left us wholly destitute of the tokens of his gracious presence. We have reason to fear that the faithful instruction of the young in families has been criminally neglected, and that parents have devolved on others what God has made peculiarly incumbent on them.

The violation of the Sabbath by political conversation and unnecessary travelling is an offence against God, alike common and criminal; and one that we may expect to be visited by consuming tokens of the Divine displeasure, unless it be abandoned

and repented of.

We should be remiss and unfaithful in the enumeration of the sins which have exposed us to the just wrath of Almighty God should we fail to signalize the making, vending and use of intoxicating drinks by some of the members of our Churches, as one of the principal sources of demoralization and scandal. To these and the alike causes we are constrained to ascribe the lukewarmness and spiritual languor which we are compelled to confess and bewail.

It gives us hearty satisfaction to turn from this gloomy record of our sins to the bright picture of Providential favors which our historical retrospect for the year presents. In many of our Churches the attendance on the means of grace is evidently increasing and highly encouraging. An unwonted spirit of prayer, connected with a profound and growing sense of dependence on the favor of Divine Providence, is believed to prevail among us; and this pleasing conviction is confirmed by the multiplication of meetings for prayer, the apparent solemnity and fervency of the public devotions, and the improved attendance on the Month-

ly Concert. We especially hail with pleasure the greater attention bestowed on the instruction of our colored population, and recommend to Ministers and masters to render to them in spiritual things that which is just and equal; knowing that they also have a Master in heaven. The Bible cause has attracted, as it deserves, high interest, and commendable liberality has been evinced to circulate more widely the inspired Scriptures. have observed indications of a more faithful exercise of discipline and a more jealous concern for the honor of God's house and ordinances. We would gratefully acknowledge the goodness of Providence in preserving so many of our Churches from the hands of the enemy; while we express our sympathy for those which have fallen into his power and suffered from his presence. The spiritual needs of our soldiers have been supplied in part by our pas of sand chaplains, and we have learned with unspeakable satisfaction of their eagerness to receive tracts and bibles and oral instruction.

We can report no general revival during the year, but one brother makes mention of an addition of one hundred to his churches, and others of accessious of from twenty to thirty. We would seek to impress upon our churches the great truth that our troubles are subordinate to the final and universal triumph

of the kingdom of grace and peace.

And now, beloved brethren, we would commend you to God and to the word of His grace, who is able to build you up and comfort you, and present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy.

The Committee on the Treasurer's account made the tollowing report, which was accepted and adopted, viz: Your committee report that they have examined the Treasurer's account, find it correct and the items sustained by proper vouchers.

The committee recommend that the assessment upon each of

the Presbyteries for the next year be sixty dollars.

The Committee on the Annual Report of the Directors of Union Theological Seminary reported that they found nothing calling for the action of Synod. This report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The Committee on the Minutes of the General Assembly reported that they found nothing requiring the attention of Synod. This report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The following resolution was adopted, viz:

Resolved, That the Synod earnestly urges all our churches to increasing prayer with confession of sin, that the Lord God may be as a wall of fire round about our land; that the Angel of the covenant may go forth as the Captain of our hosts; that the Holy Ghost may pour out upon our people a spirit of grace and of supplication that we may be a people exalted by righteousness. That prayer be made especially on behalf of our State and Commonwealth, our Governor and Legislature—the President of the Confederacy and his counsellors—the Generals, officers and soldiers of our armies—that the Lord may deliver us from our malignant enemies—for the bereaved widows and orphans of our murdered brethren, and that the Lord may send us peace in his own time, and that he may overrule all these calamities for His own glory, for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom and for the welfare of the people.

The Committee on leave of absence made the following report: That they had granted leave of absence to B. L. Beall, S. C. Alexander, T. U. Faucette and J. D. Wilson, Ministers; to J. W. A. Kerr, R. H. Tate, J. W. Carr, and E. Nye Hutchison, Ruling Elders, after Friday morning; to Rev. Dan'l A. Penick, Seu'r, Daniel A. Penick, Jr., D. T. Towles and J. C. Sinclair, Ministers, to W. S. Moore, E. B. Stimson and S. W. Caldwell, Ruling Elders, after Friday evening; to Colin Shaw, G. M. Gibbs, J. W. Montgomery and P. H. Dalton, Ministers, after Saturday morning.

This report was accepted and adopted.

The hour for the order of the day having arrived, the report of the Agent of Foreign Missions was read and accepted, and the resolutions appended to the report were adopted, and are as follows:

Resolved, 1st. That the present scheme of Foreign Evangeli-

zation has our unlimited confidence.

Resolved, 2nd. That we feel a deep interest in sustaining the Missionary work among the South Western Indians and commend the cause to the Churches.

Resolved, 3rd. That we urge upon the Churches an increased

liberality in contributing to the cause of Foreign Missions.

Rev. E. M. Peterson of the Methodist Episcopal Conference of Virginia being present, was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

On motion it was resolved that an opportunity be given to Mr.

Peterson, Agent of the Evangelical Tract Society of Petersburg, Virginia, to address the Synod immediately after the order of the day this afternoon.

Synod then took a recess until half past 2 o'clock, P. M.

After recess the Synod met and the order of the day was taken up, whereupon the Agent of Publication and Colportage offered the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, 1st. That the Synod remind all our Churches of their duty to sustain, by liberal contributions, the efforts of the Assembly's Committee in disseminating printed truth in the Confederate army.

Resolved, 2nd. That all parents and Sabbath Schools be recommended to supply themselves with the Children's Friend, a

monthly periodical edited by the Committee.

Resolved, 3rd. That the attention of brethren be called to the desire of that Committee to receive original tracts for publication.

The Rev. Mr. Peterson then addressed the Synod.

Dr. James H. Hicks, Ruling Elder from Fayetteville Presbytery, appeared in Synod and took his seat.

The Committee on the Records of Fayetteville Presbytery reported that the said records had not been placed in their hands. The report was accepted and the Committe discharged.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Synod have heard with pleasure the address of Rev. Mr. Peterson, Agent of the Evangelical Tract Society, and we hereby commend this Institution to all who desire to promote the interests of true morality and fervent piety in our land.

The Rev. R. S. Moran, of the North Carolina Conference, being present was invited to sit as a corresponding member.

The complaint of Rev. James Sinclair against the action of Fayetteville Presbytery, was made the order of the day for 7 o'clock this evening.

Synod then took a recess to meet in the Methodist Church at 7 o'clock this evening.

After recess Synod met and the order of the day was taken up, viz: The complaint of Rev. James Sinclair against the action of Fayetteville Presbytery.

The Moderator reminded the members of their duty as a court of Jesus Christ.

The case was then taken up in the order prescribed in the report of the Judicial Committee.

The papers were read.

The complainant was heard, through Rev. Neill McKay.

The Rev. D. D. McBryde appeared in behalf of the Fayette-ville Presbytery.

An opportunity was then given to other members of Fayetteville Presbytery to express their opinion.

After which the original parties withdrew from the house.

The roll was then called, giving each of the remaining members of Synod an opportunity to express his opinion in the case.

The roll was again called and the vote taken, the result was as follows: Sustained, 12; Not sustained, 15; Non liquet, 2; Sustained in part, 1.

The Rev. A. Wilson, D. D., Rev. R. H. Lafferty and Rev. John B. Shearer were appointed a Committee to bring in a minute expressing the sense of the Synod in the case.

Synod then adjourned to meet in the Presbyterian Church tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. Closed with prayer,

### Fourth Session.

SATURDAY MORNING, Nov'r 1, 1862.

Synod met according to adjournment and spent half an hour in devotional exercises.

The roll was called.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The Committee to whom was referred the report of the Trustees of Synod, reported that they had examined the same, and recommend its adoption by the Synod. This report was accepted and adopted.

The Committee on Bills and Overtures reported that no business had come before them. The report was accepted and the Committee discharged.

The Committee appointed to prepare a minute expressing the sense of the Synod respecting the complaint of Rev. James Sinclair against the action of Fayetteville Presbytery, reported the following, which was accepted and adopted:

Whereas, Synod has heard the complaint of Brother Sinclair against the Presbytery of Fayetteville, for dissolving the pastoral relation between himself and Ashpole Church, when that Church was in arrears on his salary; and whereas Synod has decided not to sustain the complaint; inasmuch as the Presbytery has neither acted unconstitutionally nor irregularly; and whereas the facts brought to light in the case seem to call for some action of the Synod, therefore,

Resolved, 1. That in case the said Church manifest any reluctance to come to a fair and equitable settlement with their former paster, which reluctance does not appear to the Synod, the Presbytery shall use all proper means to effect such settlement at as early a period as possible, for the peace and welfare

of the Church.

Resolved, 2. That it is much to be deplored that the pastor and the people in this and perhaps in other cases allowed their pecuniary affairs to fall into such confusion by long neglect.

Resolved, 3. That in the judgment of Synod it would save much trouble in future, if the Presbyteries would require an annual reciprocal report from each pastor or supply and session as to the performance of their mutual obligations.

The Committee on leave of absence made a report which was on motion laid on the table.

The Committee appointed to prepare a minute on the death of Rev. Henry N. Pharr, reported the following, which was accepted and adopted:

Synod being called in the providence of God to record the death of the Rev. Henry Nelson Pharr, here express their sense of the great loss which they have sustained in the departure of

this beloved brother.

He was licensed by Concord Presbytery, September 5th, 1823, and was ordained and installed by the same Presbytery, pastor of the Church of Prospect, June 9th, 1825. He was afterwards for many years pastor of the Churches of Concord and Shiloh in Iredell county, N. C., until about the year 1854, when he was released from this charge to accept a call to a church in the bounds of the Presbytery of East Alabama. He remained in Alabama until the year 1860, when he accepted a call from the churches of Philadelphia and Bethlehem in the bounds of Con-

cord Presbytery, and was the pastor of these up to the time of his death. He was an instructive and impressive preacher, a

faithful pastor, and wise, punctual presbyter.

He labored faithfully in word and doctrine until within a few days of his death, when by disease he was stricken down, and after a few days of suffering, he fell asleep in Jesus, on the 15th day of March 1862, being about sixty-three years of age. In his death we hear the Divine Master exhorting us, "Be ye also ready."

The Committee appointed to prepare a minute with reference to the death of Rev. F. K. Nash, reported the following, which was accepted and adopted:

The Rev. F. K. Nash was born in Hillsboro', N. C., about the year 1813, and was therefore in his 49th year at the time of his death. He enjoyed peculiar advantages in his literary and religious training; having pursued his early studies under such eminent instructors as Mr. W. J. Bingham and Rev. John Witherspoon, D. D.,—afterwards at the University of North Carolina. It was while in the University he gave his heart to the Lord, and soon after his return home, he made a public profession of his faith in Christ, by connecting himself with the Church. He then entered upon the study of law, under the instruction of his father, Chief Justice Nash, a man no less distinguished as a christian gentleman, than as an able jurist and In 1834 he was admitted to the bar, but soon was impressed with the conviction that the Lord had called him to proclaim the unsearchable riches of Christ. He immediately entered upon a course of theological study in Union Seminary. in 1837 he was licensed by Orange Presbytery to preach the Gospel, and he immediately entered into the Vineyard of the Lord, where he labored for 24 years with fidelity and success.

And during that period he had been instrumental in winning many souls to Christ, who will at the last day rise up to call him blessed. But the Lord has called him from his labors to receive his reward—to lay down the Cross and receive his crown.

Resolved, 1. That this Synod feel deeply the loss it has sustained in the death of this highly esteemed and much beloved brother, who has fallen in the midst of his days and usefulness. And while we bow with humble submission to the will of Him who gave us this lovely brother, and has now taken him away, we cannot fail to record our unfeigned sorrow that we shall no more see his face in the flesh, and enjoy his wise counsel and christian tellowship.

Resolved, 2. That we deeply sympathize with the immediate

family and friends of our deceased brother in this sad dispensation of Providence, and heartily commend them to the tender care of our heavenly Father, who has promised to be a father to the fatherless and a husband to the widow.

The Agent of Domestic Missions made a report which was accepted, and the following resolutions which were appended were adopted:

Resolved, 1. That the Synod urge upon the Presbyteries the duty of more diligence, energy and zeal in supplying the waste places in our bounds with the preached word, and upon our Churches more liberality in sustaining this cause of christian benevolence.

Resolved, 2. That Synod call the special attention of the Presbyteries to the duty of doing more for this cause than simply supplying their own destitutions; and we recommend that some plane be adopted by them for securing from the Churches, contributions to the general object of Domestic Missions in our Confederacy.

Resolved, 3. That our soldiers have urgent claims upon us for Missionary labor, and that the members of this Synod be urged to devote as much time in visiting the camps and hospitals as they may deem consistent with the claims of their own pastoral

charges.

The Committee to whom was referred the two resolutions submitted by Rev. Neill McKiy, Agent of Education, made a report which was accepted, adopted and is as follows:

The Committee to whom was referred the resolutions submitted by the Synodical Agent of Education report, that after giving the subject matter of said resolutions as full and as thorough consideration as their limited time would admit, present to Synod the following considerations and resolutions:

The Committee are unanimous as to the importance, and by the Divine blessing the entire practicability of providing for the intellectual, moral and religious education of the children of our men who have fallen or may fall in defence of our country and our country's cause. We have the broad foundation of success already laid in the enlightened and liberal educational policy of the State.

In our popular or common school system, provision is made for the primary education, not only of the children of the indigent, not merely for the orphan, but for all the sons and daughters of our entire population. Not only so, the State has provided for the collegiate education of all her worthy indigent youth at the University, free of college fees. It only remains for the different religious denominations to supplement the efforts of the State, and do for our youth in the way of religious and moral training, that which from the nature of the case the State

cannot accomplish.

In meeting our obligation and fulfilling our mission as a denomination in this respect, we are greatly encouraged from the fact that the most difficult part of our work is already done. We need no new organizations, no new charters, no more brick and mortar work, we have no risk to incur in the employment of unknown, untried and unsuccessful teachers. Our State is dotted with numerous colleges, academies and schools, under the influence of Presbyteriaus, controlled by Presbyteries, corporations and individuals, set in operation by an expenditure of more than half a million of dollars, with professors and teachers of tried ability, success and experience, commanding at once the entire confidence of our whole population.

With such encouraging facts before them the committee sub-

mit the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1st. That a committee of three from each Presbytery be appointed for the purpose of raising, securing and disbursing in the most advantagious manner, funds for the education of children of deceased soldiers.

Resolved, 2nd. That Pastors and Sessions be directed to present this subject to their respective congregations and take such action in the premises as in their judgment will best secure the united and cordial support of all our people.

Resolved, 3rd. That one Agent from each Presbytery be appointed by the Committee to co-operate with the same, and with the Pastors and Sessions in their respective Presoyteries in carrying out the object of the first and Second resolutions.

The following committee on Education was then appointed;

Orange Presbytery.—Rev. Joseph M. Atkinson, Rev. Willis L. Miller, and Mr. Jesse H. Lindsay, Ruling Elder.

Concord Presbytery - Rev. J. Rample, Rev. Walter W.

Fayetteville Preshytery.—Rev. Neill McKay, Rev. C. Shaw, and Mr. J. G. Shepherd, Ruling Elder.

The minutes of this day's proceedings were read and approved.

The roll was then called, when it appeared that the following members of Synod were absent without permission:

## APPENDIX.

## Ninth Annual Report on Foreign Missions.

Since the last annual meeting of the Synod of North-Carolina, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the Confederate States of America has been organized. At its first sessions schemes were devised and executed for exciting, directing and controlling the benevolent energies of the Church. The wisdom and the unanimity which characterized these initiatory labors of the Assembly furnish abundant reason for devout gratitude to the Head of the Church for the evident display of

the presence of His Holy Spirit.

By this new organization the cause of Foreign Missions assumes a new and more interesting aspect. Instead of a large cumbrous and semi responsible Board, we have now a small, select and efficient committee, directly responsible to the General Assembly, even to an annual review of its books and accounts. In this new agency the Church reposes unlimited confidence, as is evinced by her contributions. In more prosperous times, with our lives unimperilled, and our means unembarrassed by a cruel and wicked war, and with the shores of all nations open to our christian efforts, we may reasonably expect a golden harvest to be gathered from the world-wide field by this instrumentality.

#### ACCESSIBLE FIELDS.

By the blessing of a kind Providence, the Committee of Foreign Missions has been able to cultivate, with some degree of success the only fields accessible.

#### SOUTH-WESTERN INDIANS.

The principal of these is the Indian Territory—an extensive region, bounded by Kansas, Arkansas and Texas, and inhabited by a population of about 100,000 Indians. Many of these are the remains of once powerful tribes, as wild as they were centuries ago. But the five principal tribes—the Cherokees, Creeks, Chickasaws, Choctaws and Seminoles, numbering about 70,000

souls—have become partly civilized, have regular government, laws and schools, and have abandoned their roving life. The Missionary Committee have among them 15 preaching stations, 12 ordained ministers, and a church membership of 1600. The work is going quietly on, notwithstanding the excitements and troubles of war. The Committee have expressed the desire to send among them four additional missionaries. The mission schools however, have been generally, if not entirely discontinued, and the teachers returned to the United States, whence they originally came.

#### SIAM.

From the public prints we learn that the Committee succeeded, nearly a year ago, in sending funds to Siam, to the support of the brother who has gone from our Synod to that distant land. It is with gratitude that we learn that his sympathies are with us, and that he will be pleased to receive his support from our churches. And from still later accounts it is ascertained that arrangements are in progress to procure a visit from that beloved brother to the churches of our Confederacy.

#### THE AMOUNT OF FUNDS NEEDED.

To carry on the established missions among the Indians, the Secretary of Foreign Missions informed the General Assembly, would require about 20,000 dollars. To support a Mission family in Siam has required an average of 2,000 dollars annually. The support of a family of Missionaries among the American Indians will require an annual expenditure of 1,200 or 1,500 dollars. In South America the annual expenditure will be about the same as in the Indian Territory. If then the Indian Mission should receive the contemplated addition of four, the single Missionary sustained in Siam, and any Missionary is sent to South America, the sum of 30,000 dollars will be needed annually. And for the present inflation of prices, or depreciation of paper currency, may require a still larger expenditure. Having thus ascertained the amount demanded, let us notice

#### THE AMOUNT ACTUALLY CONTRIBUTED.

Since the establishment of the Provisional Committee in Columbia, S. C., something over a year ago, there has been reported the aggregate contribution of 24,431 dollars and 86 cents.\* During the current Synodical year there has been contributed 18,891 dollars and 80 cents. From this statement, it will be seen that the churches have fallen short by more than 1,000 dollars of the sum needed for the Indian Missions alone. It is also painful to notice that the amounts acknowledged for the last few

months, are becoming less and less and are not more than one third of the amount acknowledged in the corresponding months of last year, although money has become more and more abundant and prices more remunerative.

#### CONTRIBUTIONS OF THE SYNOD OF N. C.

In the past Synodical year, there has been contributed by all the churches in our bounds, the sum of 2,413 dollars and 79 cents

This amount is thus distributed among the Presbyteries, viz: 

From these figures you will perceive that there has been a decrease of 364 dollars and 13 cents from last year. Last year we contributed \$2,778 92. But this itself was far beneath the liberality of 1859, which amounted to 4,688 dollars.

When this contribution is compared with the present abundance of money, and the enormous prices received by farmers and manufacturers, we are constrained to feel that the Church has not paid into the treasury according as the Lord has prospered it.

In view of these facts and statistics—

Resolved 1. That the present scheme of Foreign Evangelization has our unlimited confidence.

Resolved 2. That we feel a deep interest in sustaining the missionary work among the South-Western Indians, and commend the cause to the Churches.

Resolved 3. That we urge upon the Churches an increased liberality in contributing to the cause of Foreign Missions.

## Report on Domestic Missions.

The Presbytery of Concord has in service the present year one Evangelist and five Missionaries. The Evangelist has only been employed eight months of the year, having been granted a turlough for four months because of unwillingness to travel in winter. The Missionaries have been laboring in six different counties, principally in the mountain region of our State.

The whole appropriations in this Presbytery for the year, amount to about \$1500. A brother of whom some informa-

tion as to the missionary work was asked, writes: "We were several hundred dollars overdrawn in funds at the beginning of the year; and we anticipated a continued and perhaps increasing embarrassment. But in this respect we have been greatly disappointed. Our treasury is now rather flush, and our most serious want is more suitable Missionaries.

The Presbytery of Fayetteville has had during the year five Missionaries employed, though at this time there are but three. The Evangelist employed by the Presbytery gave up the work some two years and a half ago; two or three efforts have been

made to fill his place, but so far without success.

The appropriations during the year, including some arrearages for last year, will amount to about \$1300. The amounts collected from the Churches are not altogether so large as for three or four years previous. The difficulty of obtaining Missionaries has been very great. Several additional ones might be employed, and would be supported, if their services could be obtained. For the people of God, when they see a necessity for increased liberality, are sure to exhibit it.

The Presbytery of Orange has one Evangelist and six Missionaries employed. To these brethren about \$1900 have been appropriated for the present year.

These are the facts collected by your Agent and deemed worthy of being presented for your consideration. They are not as encouraging as they should be; but are hopeful in their There are, we know, many points within our bounds where Missionaries might be employed with fair prospect of successful labor. The great difficulty at present seems to be to find the workmen. The present state of our country, taking off into the military service cur young men, will deprive us of many who, under other circumstances, would have preached the gospel of the grace of God. The prospect of vacant Churches and destitute fields should call forth earnest efforts from those who are actually in the ministry, to devote as much labor as possible to the missionary work outside of their respective charges; and should also call into requisition the abundant talent in the Eldership, in efforts to disseminate the truths of God's word among the people who have called them to rule over them.

It is feared that too many of our people feel that if our own waste places are pretty well supplied, or if unable to supply them because of the want of laborers, their duty to this object has been discharged. It has no further claims upon them. In this they seriously err. We owe a debt to the destitute and perishing in other parts of our Confederacy. We have a general agency that overlooks the whole field, and it is our duty to do

our part in sustaining this agency and enabling it to accomplish

the work that it was designed to accomplish.

It would not be a fair exhibition of the amount of missionary work within our bounds, to fail to notice the fact that a number of the brethren have engaged as voluntary chaplains in our army for a season. What amount of labor has been done in this way, your Agent is unable to say; but he knows of several instances—some in all the Presbyteries. And this is a work that commends itself to the hearts of us all, as well as to the hearts of our people. Visits of a few weeks to the camps and hospitals by pastors, may be greatly blessed; and congregations will generally not only acquiesce heartily in the wishes of a pastor to make such missionary tours, but will be pleased to give him up to so noble and praiseworthy a work, as long as he shall deem it proper to be absent.

In view of all the statements made in this report, your Agent would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 1. That the Synod urge upon the Presbyteries the duty of more diligence, energy and zeal in supplying the waste places in our own bounds with the preached word; and upon our Churches more liberality in sustaining this cause of Christian benevolence.

Resolved, 2. That Synod call the special attention of the Presbyteries to the duty of doing more for this cause than simply supplying their own destitutions; and we recommend that some plan be adopted by them for securing from the Churches contributions to the general object of Domestic Missions in our

Confederacy.

Resolved 3. That our soldiers have urgent claims upon us for missionary labor, and that the members of this Synod be urged to devote as much time in visiting the camps and hospitals as they may deem consistent with the claims of their own pastoral charges.

Annual Report of the Board of Directors of Union Theological Seminary to the Synod of North-Carolina.

The Board of Directors of Union Theological Seminary, here-

with present their annual report, as follows, viz:

I. Students.—The regular exercises of the Institution have been attended to for the larger part of the last session, with less interruption than might have been expected from the distracted condition of the country; and all the departments of study have

been regularly pursued according to the plan of the Seminary, so far as circumstances have allowed. The following eleven new students have been received during the year, viz:

Parke Poindexter Flournoy, a member of the 1st Presbyterian Church, Richmond, Va., and graduate of Hampden Sidney Col-

lege.

Isaac Pancake Huskile, member of Romney Church, Presbytery of Winchester, and student of the University of Virginia.

John K. Hisner, member of College Church, Presbytery of

West Hanover, and student of University of Virginia.

Jonah W. Lupton, member of 1st Presbyterian Church, Allegheny City, Pa., and student of Western Theological Seminary in the U.S.

Edward Hammet Barret, member of Presbyterian Church, Christiansburg. Va., in Montgomery Presbytery, and graduate

of Hampden Sidney College.

Samuel Valentine McCorkle, member of the Independent Presbyterian Church in Greenville, East Tennessee, and graduate of Princeton College.

Nathan Bachman, member of the Presbyterian Church in Kingsport, East Tennessee, connected with the United Synod, graduate of Emory and Henry College, and student of Union Theological Seminary in New-York city.

David Comfort, member of Village Church, in Roanoke Presbytery, graduate of H. S. College, and student of Princeton Theological Seminary.

Tazwell M McCorkle, member of the 1st Presbyterian Church, Lynchburg, Va., and student of Hampden Sidney College.

Certificates of having completed the full course of study were given to C. J. Armistead, T. W. Gilmer and J. mes W. Wharey, and also to G. H. Gilmer, Henry Gilmer, and Wm. S. Lacy, with the exception of a small portion at the end of the term

when they were called to the service of their country in the army.

II. LIBRARY.—Forty one volumes have been added to the Library, all, except one, purchased at the sale of a private library, making the whole number of volumes now 5059.
