On motion of J. W. Jenkins, the Conference adjourned at 5 o'clock.

- R. B. John introduced the following resolution, as an amendment to the substitute, and it was adopted:

Whereas, the Christian Advocate Publishing Company claiming the ownership, and upon this ownership claims the entire control of the North Carolina Christian Advocate, and will not concede to this Conference any right of interference with its management, therefore

Resolved, That this Conference declines to take any action as to the North Carolina Christian Advocate.

Resolved, That three preachers and three laymen be elected by this Conference and be constituted a Board of Publication to act, if the Western North Carolina Conference shall provide a like Board, in conjunction with said Board, in establishing or purchasing an organ for North Carolina Methodism. The Joint Board from the Conferences shall be authorized to purchase any paper now in the field, if it can be done at a reasonable price, or to establish one, to choose an editor and business manager, fix

the salaries of the same, and the price of the paper; provided that no action that they may take shall involve this Conference in any financial obligation; and provided, further, that no action shall be taken for securing an organ for the two Conferences unless a majority of the representatives from each Conference shall concur.

Should the Western North Carolina Conference decline to co-operate with us, or should our Board fail to come to a satisfactory arrangement with them, then our Board shall mature a plan for an organ for our own Conference, and present it to the next session of this Conference.

Furthermore, said Board of Publication shall make annual exhibit to this Conference or the Conferences of the financial condition of said organ, including income, outlay, salary of officers, and shall provide for the Conference or Conferences ultimately to own all financial interest in it.

MEMOIR OF REV. V. A. SHARPE.

Rev. V. A. Sharpe, son of John and Catherine Sharpe, was born in Pickens county, S. C., June 12th, r834. He was reared in a Christian home, became a member of the Church when a boy, and gave all of his life to the service of God. He joined the South Carolina Conference at Charlotte, N. C., November, 1857. He served as junior preacher in 1858, on the Laurens circuit, Rev. John Mood P. C. He was P. C. of Pickensville circuit 1859-'60; Pendleton circuit 1861-'62; Pickensville circuit 1863; Spartanburg circuit 1864-'67; Rutherford circuit 1868-'71; Lincolnton circuit 1872-'74; agent for Trinity College 1875-'76; Rockingham circuit 1877-'80; Yanceyville circuit 1881-'84; Trinity College district 1885-'88; Haw River circuit 1889-'90; Granville circuit 1891-'94.

Thus for thirty-seven years there was no break in his active ministry. He was a Trustee of Trinity College eight years. No one among us was truer to the interest or made greater sacrifice to help the College than did Brother Sharpe—He was elected delegate, while on the Haw River circuit, to the General Conference which met at St. Louis—did his duty well and enjoyed the occasion greatly. "He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and faith, and much people was added to the Lord." Acts 11:24. This description of Barnabas by St. Luke was equally true of Brother Sharpe. He was wise, discreet, courageons, pure in life and faithful to every trust committed to him. He enlarged and greatly improved the fields in which he labored. He had gracious revivals wherever he went, and thousands were soundly converted and brought into the Church through his ministry.

On one of his review days, not long before his death, he said to his children, in the presence of their mother and myself: "Wherever your father has made a track it is a clean one. There is nothing in my life you will have to defend or apologize for."

The last sermon he preached was from the memorable words of St.

Paul: "I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of right-eousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day." How beautifully these wonderful words were illustrated in the life and experience of our sainted brother.

He was taken very ill at Durham Saturday night of Conference. We thought he would die before the Sabbath morning, but he was spared to reach home on Thursday following, where he died the ninth day after. He was not confined to the bed much of the time, and died at 6 a. m., the 21st of December, 1894, while sitting in his chair, alone with his wife and his Saviour. We carried his body to Durham on Saturday evening, and buried it from Trinity church at 11 o'clock, a. m., Sunday. As a token of the high esteem in which he was held, all the other Methodist churches in the city were closed at that hour, and that large church was filled with sympathizing friends. The following brethren in the ministry were present and participated in the services: Revs. E. A. Yates, J. W. Jenkins, L. L. Johnson, T. J. Gattis, B. R. Hall, President J. C. Kilgo and W. H. Pegram, and at the close we laid him to rest by the side of Brother Baxter Phillips, in the lot in the cemetery owned by Trinity congregation and set apart for the burial of ministers.

The friends in Durham showed marked kindness, in a tender, Christian way, to the family, and all possible honor to the fallen hero. They honored themselves in this Christ-like service.

Brother Sharpe was united in marriage to Miss Ann McDarid, October, 1860, in Greenville county, S. C. She has been a helpmeet indeed, and contributed her full share to his successful ministry. Six children—two sons and four daughters—were given them, all of whom have reached maturity, and with the mother mourn their irreparable loss. May the great Shepherd enfold and keep them unto eternal life.

[Document No 2.] MEMOIR OF REV. MILES FOY.

Miles Foy, son of Enoch and Annapolis Foy, was born in Jones county, N. C., May 21st, 1811, and died at Mt. Airy, March 10th, 1895. He was converted July 16th, 1826, in the town of Trenton, Jones county, N. C.; licensed to preach on Trent circuit January 1, 1829, and joined the Virginia Conference at Lynchburg, Va., the same year. He was sent to Banks and Islands in 1830, where he witnessed the conversion of two hundred souls; was on Bedford circuit in 1831; Bath in 1832; Greenville in 1833-'34; Neuse in 1835. Failing health compelled him to locate till 1838, when he joined the Conference again at Greensboro. In 1844 he was transferred to the Holston Conference and travelled the Marion In 1845-'46-'47 he was at Broad Street church, Knoxville, Tenn.: on Jonesboro, Greenville and Favetteville circuits. In 1860 he again located on account of failing health. In 1868 he re-entered the travelling connection and travelled Alexander circuit, North Carolina. was on Jonesville, 1870-'71; Wilkesboro, 1872-'73; Hyde, 1874-'75; Cabarrus, 1877-'78; Stanley, 1879; Pilot Mountain Mission, 1880, which ended his travelling experience. He was three times married, first, to Mis Martha D. Hawks; second, to Miss Meekie A. Graves, mother of four of his children (three still living); third, to Mrs. Selina Nelson, who died leaving one son.

We thus see that Brother Foy preached over a broad field—in North Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee. None of his colaborers in the North Carolina Conference lived so long after entering the ministry. Peter Doub lived fifty-one years, James Reid fifty-seven, B. T. Blake fifty-eight, J. B. Alford fifty-one, T. S. Campbell fifty-seven, Gaston Farrar fifty-three, Daniel Culbreth sixty, R. O. Burton fifty-eight, J. H. Wheeler sixty, and Miles Foy sixty-six.

He was eight years in the Virginia Conference before the North Carolina Conference was created, in 1837, and fifteen years in the Methodist Episcopal Church before the division of that Church, in 1844. Very few of the present members of the North Carolina Conference were born when Miles Foy rode from Pollocksville, N. C., to Lynchburg, Va. (on horse-back), to enter upon his life-work as a class-mate of D. S. Dogget.

MEMOIR OF REV. WASHINGTON SANDFORD CHAFFIN.

The Rev. Washington Sandford Chaffin, an honored superannuated preacher and a member of this Conference for nearly fifty-five years, died at his home in Jonesboro, N. C., on the 9th of November, 1895, in the eighty-first year of his age.

He was a native of this State, and spent his long and useful life within its borders. From a record left in his own handwriting we obtain certain important facts and dates. He was born in Stokes county, February 8th, 1815. He was converted to God at Mount Tabor church, in the Stokes circuit, then Virginia Conference, on the 22d day of September, 1835, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church at Mount Zion on the 25th of August, 1836. He was licensed to preach at Love's Meeting House on the 29th of November, 1840-Rev. James Reid, P. E., and Rev. Hillary Tippet, P. C. He was received on trial in the North Carolina Conference on the 23d of December, 1840, at Mocksville—the Rev. Bishop Thomas A. Morris, presiding, He was ordained deacon by Bishop Beverly Waugh at Louisburg, October, 1842, and was ordained elder by Bishop Joshua Soule at Pittsboro, December, 1844. He filled the following appointments: 1841, Straits circuit; 1842, Bath circuit; 1843, Jonesville circuit; 1844, Randolph circuit; 1845, Portsmouth circuit; 1846, Mattamuskeet circuit; 1847, Tarboro circuit; 1848, Trent circuit; 1849, Franklinsville circuit; 1850, Snow Hill circuit; 1851-'52, Topsai circuit; 1853-'54, Whiteville circuit; 1855-'56, New Berne Mission; 1857; N. H. and O. Mission; 1858, Buckhorn circuit; 1859-'60, Deep River circuit; 1861, Williamston circuit; 1862, Granville circuit; 1863-'64, Cape Fear circuit; 1865-'68, Robeson circuit; 1869-'70, Elizabeth circuit; 1871-72. Snow Hill circuit; 1873-'74, Cumberland circuit; 1875-'76, Buckhorn circuit; 1877, Drowning Creek Mission; 1878, South Fork circuit; 1879, White Sulphur Springs Mission; 1880-'81, Lillington circuit; 1882, Ashpole Mission; 1883, Rockingham circuit; 1884, Lumberton circuit; 1885-'87, Cape Fear circuit; 1888-'89, Deep River circuit; 1890-'92, Cape Fear circuit.

At the Conference held in Goldsboro in December, 1892, he was granted, at his own request, a superannuated relation, which he sus-

tained to the end of his mortal life. Thus, for fifty-two years, consecutively, he was an effective itinerant preacher, never without an appointment; and then, for nearly three years, a superannuated member of the Conference, nevertheless attending all its sessions, and through these last years preaching often for one of his advanced age—preaching, too, with clearness of thought and remarkable spiritual fervor, attracting congregations in his own town larger than could be attracted there by almost any of his brethren still in their prime.

Five weeks before his death he preached a sermon at Antioch church, in Bladen county, of great power, which was immediately followed by a most gracious revival of religion.

He was no ordinary man. His early life takes us back to the morning of the present century, when scholastic advantages were not so general as now, and his childhood home was and is remote from any educational or business center; but from far away rural districts, and even from the midst of craggy mountains, has come much of the world's best. Back, among inaccessible peaks in the Appenine mountains in Italy, are the quarries from which were obtained the beautiful white marble used in building the Pantheon at Rome, which, for the fineness of the stone, no less than for the skill of the sculptors, has been the admiration of the world. The subject of this sketch partook much of the granite character of his native hills, and, under the hand of the Divine Sculptor, developed into a beautiful and strong character. His after-life is in itself sufficient proof that he improved well such opportunities as were early afforded him; on even to old age he was a hard student, and thus a naturally good mind, well disciplined, acquired large stores of information and gave out much valuable thought. Always courteous, yet having the courage of his convictions, he spoke on the floor of his Conference when he believed there was something that he ought to say, and generally he said it well. In the pulpit he was solemn, reverential and a good expounder of the Scriptures. He impressed me not only as a good preacher, but as one deeply conscious that he was delivering a Divine message.

Brother Chaffin married twice—the first time Miss Eliza Whitehurst, of Portsmouth, N. C., on the 24th of November, 1846 This wife died

on the 30th of November, 1855, leaving one son, Robert Chaffin, who now resides at Bennettsville, S. C. On the 21st of January, 1857, Brother Chaffin was married to Miss Sarah Abbie Smith, of Vermont, who, with four children, survives him. The children are all married. The widow, one daughter and her tamily, live in the home our brother left in Jonesboro. The other daughter lives in Florida. One of the remaining sons, Claude, lives in the same town with his half brother, Robert. The other son is one of the promising young preachers of this Conference—Rev. Leonidas M. Chaffin.

Brother Chaffin was greatly beloved by his family, and he was kind and affectionate to them all. It deserves to be specially mentioned that through his long life he observed with scrupulous regularity family worship. His home was a house of prayer. His widow and those of his children, well-known to this writer, are active and faithful members of the Church. After an appropriate funeral service in the presence of a large congregation in our church at Jonesboro, conducted by his friend, the Rev. J. D. Pegram, of this Conference, and the reading of the burial service at the grave by the minister, the mortal remains of Rev. Washington Sandford Chaffin were interred in the cemetery of that town.

Another of the old veterans of this Conference—the one whose name, had he lived, would at this session have become first on our clerical roll—has gone from the earth. We recognize his worth. We are grateful that he was spared so long to live and labor among us. By the grace of God we expect to meet him in Heaven.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

I. Our Publishing House.

A great deal of unwholesome and pernicious literature finds circulation among us. This ought not so to be. We believe that a warning voice should be lifted up and that our people should be called to consider the danger that will come to our faith and morals if we are not more guarded in the class of literature that our people read.

As a safeguard to our people, we therefore commend to them the books issued from our Publishing House as offering to them a literature both pure and strong and well suited to develop the religious and intellectual life of our Church. We urge upon them to buy our own books, and thus seek to accumulate in every home in our Church a library of wholesome and edifying Methodist literature.

II. The Nashville Christian Advocate.

We recognize in the Nashville Christian Advocate a religious journal of the very highest order. It is a paper of which every Southern Methodist may justly feel proud. Under the editorial control of Dr. Hoss, it has grown to a journal of commanding dignity and of very lofty character equal, we believe, to the best published in all the borders of our great country. It stands for the truth and for the polity of our Methodism. We commend it most heartily to all our people, and urge our preachers to introduce it as extensively as possible.

III. The Southern Methodist Review.

This periodical is ably edited by Dr. Tigert, and takes rank among our best religious quarterlies. It furnishes a real need in the higher literature of our ('hurch, and should be taken by our ministers and laymen who read this class of literature

1V. The Methodist Review f Missions.

This is a publication greatly essential to the mission cause of our Church. As now edited, we believe it will quicken the mission life of our Church wherever it circulates. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We rejoice in the confident belief that at no period of our history have our people been so thoroughly aroused and enthused upon the great and vital question of Christian education as at present. Our people are awaking to the fact that it is the business of the Church to educate her sons and daughters under Christian auspices and positive Christian influences. The Church of the future will be determined by the educational institutions which look to the perfection of character in the likeness of the Son of God.

TRINITY COLLEGE.

From the report of the Trustees and the Visiting Committee we are gratified to learn of the prosperity of Trinity College.

The religious influence of the College is most positive and healthful. We are glad to note that a department of Bible study has been added to the regular course of the College, and every student is required to take this department during the entire course of study.

The various departments are up to the best standards of College work, and a large amount of equipments has been added to them.

We are also glad to mark the vast improvements that are now being made in the College Park. These improvements are being made through the gift of that noble philanthropist, Mr. B. N. Duke.

In every respect we regard Trinity College abreast with the best Southern colleges and worthy of the confidence and patronage of our people.

During the present year Mr. W. Duke has shown his deep interest in Christian education and his faith in Trinity College by proposing to donate \$50,000 to the endowment fund on condition that the two Conferences raise \$75,000. The Board of Trustees suggest that our Conference undertake to endow during the coming year a chair with \$25,000, to be known as the North Carolina Conference chair. A like proposition has been made to the Western North Carolina Conference and accepted. This will secure \$50,000 of the amount. The Board also suggests the endowment of the Braxton Craven chair by the joint contributions of both Conferences, the amount to be \$25,000.

The Board also decided to raise scholarships worth \$1,000 each, the income from which will be loaned to worthy young men with which to pay their tuition. They are not to be free scholarships.

A church, a circuit, a town, an individual or any set of individuals may endow a scholarship. These scholarships shall be a part of the endowment, and shall be under the control of the Trustees of the College. All loans, when returned, shall be added to the principal, and will then increase the general endowment.

Any individual endowing a scholarship shall be entitled to free tuition for his own sons at Trinity College, and after they have been educated the scholarship shall become the property of the College. We recommend its adoption.

The Board recommends the following Trustees for election, viz: Hon. Walter Clark, Rev. W. S. Black, D. D., Rev. F. A. Bishop, Jos. G. Brown. The Board recommends the following:

(1) That \$5,000 be assessed upon the charges in the Conference for the current expenses of Trinity College, and that it be appropriated as follows:

- (2) That an assessment of \$323 for the General Board, as provided under paragraph 411, be added to the above, to be prorated with it.
- (3) That the Conference recognize and endorse the appointment of Rev. A. P. Tyre, of the Western North Carolina Conference, as the Secretary of Education for Trinity College in both Conferences.
- (4) That the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. C. Kilgo, D. D., President of Trinity College.

PREPARATORY SCHOOLS.

TRINITY HIGH SCHOOL.—We are gratified to note the marvelous success of Trinity High School under the leadership of Professor T. A. Smoot. He took charge of the School under the most adverse circumstances, and, in face of the great opposition, has succeeded beyond the most sanguine expectation. He is a young man of superior ability, and his associates are strong and progressive.

Burlington Academy.—This School has been accepted as a fitting School to Trinity College, and under the leadership of Professor T. C. Hoyle is having gratifying success.

We ask our preachers to do all they can to secure for these schools the patronage of our people who are sending their children from home to be prepared for College.

GREENSBORO FEMALE COLLEGE.

We rejoice to note the continued and increased prosperity of this noble and time-honored institution. There have been improvements in several departments this year. The standard of scholarship has been raised, but, in spite of this fact, there are more boarding pupils in attendance than in the past four years. The atmosphere of the College is decidedly Christian. It is a Christian College in fact and not in name. President Peacock is doing a noble work for our girls—a work that will tell in the years to come—and we most heartily commend him and the institution over which he presides to the favorable consideration of all our people.

LITTLETON FEMALE COLLEGE.

This young but vigorous institution, located in one of the most healthful and delightful sections of the State, continues to do honest and thorough work. It is no longer an experiment. It has demonstrated its right to live. It is a safe place for our girls, and our people can rest assured that neither the head nor heart of their daughters will be slighted while in the hands of its consecrated President and his faithful faculty. We recommend that Rev. J. M. Rhodes be appointed its President.

LOUISBURG FEMALE COLLEGE.

We are glad to note that this institution has had a prosperous year, and that the outlook for the future is hopeful. There is room for the institution, and it is meeting a recognized want in the work which it is endeavoring to do. We heartily commend it to our people.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. A. Green as President.

THE GENERAL BOARD.

The Conference Board desires to keep in touch with the General Board of Education, and to assist it, as far as possible, in the accomplishment of its important work, and to this end we recommend the continuance of the plan of the General Board as adopted by the last Annual Conference, and we would urge the presiding elders to greater efforts in making this plan more efficient.

The Board asks that Professor W. J. Cranford, of Trinity College, be appointed Secretary of Education for the Conference, to co-operate with the Secretary of the General Board in carrying out the aim and policy of the General Board,

The Board recommends the continuance of the assessment of \$600 for Paine Institute.

Resolved, 1st, That the presiding elders be requested to emphasize during their second rounds of quarterly conferences the subject of Christian

education and the interests of our schools; and that they hold in connection with these conferences, on Saturday, an educational mass meeting in each charge.

- 2d. That one Sunday in each quarter be known in our Sunday Schools as education day, and that the pastor of each charge shall insist that Sunday School superintendents shall observe these days by reading some article on education or by such remarks upon the subject as they may think proper.
- 3d. That an educational mass meeting shall be held on Friday night of each session of our Annual Conference.

Resolved, That we express to Brother W. Duke our gratitude for his generous ofier of \$50,000 for the endowment of Trinity College, and that we assure him that we will do all in our power to advance Christian education and Trinity College, to which he has made such handsome gifts.

2d. That we assure Brother E. N. Duke of our appreciation of the improvements that are being made at the College Park through his untiring philanthropy.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF COLPORTAGE.

We are highly gratified at the success that has attended the work of our Agent of Colportage and Sunday Schools during the past year, he having sold within the bounds of the North Carolina and the Western North Carolina Conferences \$14,822.62 worth of religious literature.

Your Board is of the opinion that there ought to be some means inaugurated by which our colportage work may be more successfully carried into the rural districts of our Conference. There is a growing need of placing our own publications in the homes of our people in order to counteract the increasing flood of pernicious literature that is constantly pouring into our communities.

In view of this pressing need the Board recommends that our Colporter use every means within his grasp to more successfully reach our country people with his work.

Resolved, 1st, That we gladly accept the proposition of the Western North Carolina Conference to continue with them in one system of colportage.

2d, That we heartily appreciate the action of the South Carolina Confer-

ence in joining our system of colportage, and trust it may prove as successful with them as it does with us.

3d, That we earnestly request our preachers and people to buy all of their books from our Agent, as well as the Sunday School supplies.

4th, That we request Bishop Wilson to appoint Rev. T. J. Gattis Colporter and Sunday School Agent, and we pledge our continued support to this important work.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Your Sunday School Board submits the following report: We are rejoiced at the rapid progress of our Sunday School work as indicated in a communication to you from the Sunday School Editor, and hereby pledge him our hearty support in his noble work.

There are within the bounds of the North Carolina Conference 659 schools, 4,789 officers and teachers, 38,303 scholars, 21,006 volumes in libraries and 62 Missionary societies.

The following amounts have been raised through the Sunday Schools during the present year:

For Sunday School literature, \$6,375.15; for Foreign Missions, \$1,742.62; for other objects, \$2,508.16, and by juvenile societies, \$1,273.73; Children's Day, \$204.61; total, \$12,104.27.

Twenty-six schools have been aided to the extent of \$280.99, leaving a balance of \$159.40, as per Treasurer's report, in the hands of Barbee & Smith, subject to the order of this Board.

Add to this the amount received this year from the Joint Board of Finance, \$161.17, and we have on hand \$320.57.

The Board continues its offer to donate funds to those schools having no libraries to an amount not exceeding fifty (\$50) dollars, provided in every instance the school so aided shall have raised for this purpose a like sum. And we urge upon those schools in need of literature and unable to purchase the same to apply to this fund for aid. We request all persons applying for aid from our Board to make application through our Secretary, as no aid can be obtained except upon his endorsement, and that all moneys raised on Children's Day be forwarded immediately to the Secretary, who will forward the same to the Treasurer, taking his receipt therefor.

Your Board would earnestly insist upon the use of our own Sunday

School papers, quarterlies and magazines in our Sunday Schools, and emphatically condemns the substitution of any other literature therefor.

We regret to note the absence of the Bible in many of our Sunday Schools, and urgently request our people to give it prominence in every Sunday School.

We offer the following recommendations:

rst. That the Sunday School District Conferences shall hereafter be composed of one delegate from each Sunday School having less than one hundred members, and two delegates from each school having one hundred or more members,

2d. That a joint anniversary of the Sunday School Board and Epworth League Committee be held annually, on Thursday night, during the session of the Annual Conference, and that a suitable programme for the same be furnished by the chairman of said boards.

3d. That a joint meeting of the Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools, or their representatives, to be appointed by the same, be held annually, not later than the last of May, the time and place of the first meeting to be determined by the chairman of the Epworth League Committee and the chairman of the Sunday School Board, and the Conference to appoint time and place for subsequent meetings.

4th. That there be in connection with each District Conference a meeting of the workers in Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, and that the presiding elders are requested to appoint the time of holding the District Conferences early enough in the week to enable them to devote two days, if necessary, to the consideration of these interests.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EPWORTH LEAGUES.

The Committee on Epworth Leagues is gratified to report the greatly improved interest in this department of our work during the past year.

We reported last year in the bounds of our Conference 30 Leagues, with a membership of 1,714. We now report 31 Leagues, with 1,405 members.

Believing the general interest of the Church will be better conserved by uniting, as far as possible, the Epworth League and Sunday School work, we recommend that the Sunday School Board unite with the Epworth League Committee in observing Thursday night of Conference week as the

anniversary of the two departments of our work, and that the chairman of the Sunday School Board co-operate with the chairman of the Epworth League Committee in arranging for the anniversary exercises.

We also recommend, the Sunday School Board concurring, that the chairman of the Epworth League Committee and the chairman of the Sunday School Board be authorized to consider the advisability of holding a joint conference of the two interests in the bounds of our Conference during the ensuing year, at such time and place as they may select, provided such conference shall not be held later than the month of May. If it shall be deemed feasible to hold such conference, the above named chairmen are hereby authorized to prepare a suitable programme, determine the prorata of representation and issue the call for such conference through the papers.

The conference shall organize by electing its own officers and arrange or sessions to be held in the future, and shall make such rules for its own fgovernment as are needed.

We further recommend that the presiding elders organize the Epworth Leagues in their districts into conferences to be held in connection with the Sunday School District Conferences.

We earnestly urge upon the pastors to organize Epworth Leagues, as far as possible, at every church in time to send representatives to their District Conferences. We especially plead with the laymen in every pastoral charge to give hearty co-operation to their pastors in establishing and perpetuating this Epworth League work.

Out of the 31 Leagues we find only 6 that have secured charters, and we recommend that the pastors see that their Leagues secure charters as soon as organized.

From Rev. S. A. Steele, D. D., Secretary of the General Epworth League work, we learn that a very large number have failed to remit the 10 cents per member, as required by the Board of Managers, for expenses, and that our Leagues be requested to forward the same at once.

Believing that the Epworth Era, published at Nashville, Tenn., at one dollar per year, is doing good work in its especial field and is properly conducted, we therefore cordially recommend it to the patronage of all our people, and we also recommend to our people the course of study authorized by the Board of Managers.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee on Bible Cause has had before it the last annual report of the American Bible Society, and has heard remarks in exposition of the work from Rev T. H. Law, District Superintendent, in Conference and in Committee. From these sources we gather:

- 1st. That the foreign work of the American Bible Society, which is so thoroughly involved in our Foreign Missions and so fundamental in their operations, has greatly expanded, and that last year's report shows the largest circulation in the foreign field ever reported in one year of the Society's history. The circulation aggregated over 730,000 volumes. And it is specially interesting to us to know that most encouraging reports as to the growth of the work come from China and Japan, where the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has important missions. In China, last year, the circulation reached over 305,000 volumes, and late reports show that the circulation for the past six months of the present year reached 3,000,000. And in Japan, where special efforts were made during the war with China to supply the soldiers in camp and hospital with the Word of God, there has also been an unprecedented condition, marked by such encouraging reports as to give great promise of blessed results. In Mexico, too, where our Church conducts large missionary operations, and in Korea and other countries, there are encouraging reports of the work of the Society.
- 2d. That in the home field the work has been maintained at its usual proportion, amounting to about 950,000 volumes. The Society continues the important work of supplying with the Scriptures, in their own tongues, the immigrants landing on our shores, and the desolate of all classes, and everybody who desires to purchase, at cost prices.
- 3d. That the work of supplying our children with the Bible is still being vigorously prosecuted, many thousands being sold to children who can read, but do not own a Bible, at half-cost price. And especially in the District of North and South Carolma has this good work been successful, so that many children and youths in our midst, who had no Bibles of their own to read at home and in the Sunday School, are supplied.
- 4th. That the receipts of the American Bible Society last year show a considerable falling off, through the stringency of the times, which, if continued, may embarrass and curtail the work. In view of these facts it is gratifying to notice the large increase in the contributions to this good cause of the charges of our Conference last year, and to have evidence of good collections the present year.

In consideration of these facts we recommed therefore, first, that the Conference commend the American Bible Society to the support and confidence of all our churches; and second, that our pastors and Sunday School superintendents be advised to avail themselves of the generous offer of the American Bible Society to purchase Bibles for children who can read, but do not own Bibles, at one-half of cost price.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee to whom was referred the consideration of the Temperance question, recognizing its great importance, respectfully request the adoption of the following report:

ist. That we are heartily and unequivocally in favor of the absolute suppression, by law, of the sale of intoxicating liquors, and that we exert every possible effort in disseminating this sentiment among our people.

2d. That we furthermore most earnestly uige that the preachers and laymen of this Conference, and all other sympathizers with the Temperance movement, co-operate with us in the organization of County Temperance Associations, in line with the State Temperance Associations, as the best means of agitating this question and educating our people and creating in them a healthy Temperance sentiment. That we earnestly request the preachers to encourage and insist on the organization of County Temperance Associations in line with the non-partisan Temperance Associations of the State. That each preacher hold Temperance mass meetings in his charge so as to agitate the question and educate the people.

3d. We call attention especially to Chapter 5 of our Discipline, on page 97, which gives the law of our Church on Temperance as amended by the last General Conference, and we recommend that our preachers enforce the Discipline of this in all gentleness and fidelity.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee on Church Property beg to report as follows: We are gratified to find the interest in church and parsonage-building still unabated. The number of churches reported this year is 642, valued at

\$811,109. Though there is an increase of 12½ churches, their valuation has decreased \$9,265.25. The number of parsonages is 104, an increase of 3, valued at \$131,576. Number of District parsonages 8; value of District parsonages and other District property, \$8,500.

Your Committee would respectfully recommend:

- ist. That in the erection of churches and parsonages due attention be paid to the selection of suitable sites, paying no deference to proffered out of the way plots of land for these purposes; that wherever practicable churches be located in the centre of the membership and that parsonage sites be chosen with reference to the social and educational advantages of the preacher's family,
- 2d. That the Building Committee be urged to erect houses of worship on the modern improved style of architecture, and that attention be paid to comfort and convenience in the erection of parsonages.
- 3d. That more attention be paid to the comfort, in winter, of those who attend church and Sunday Schoal; that our chnrches be used solely in the service of God, and that the promiscuous and indifferent uses made of God's houses of worship be condemned by this Conference.
- 4th. That, as parsonage property is often improperly used and abused, thus discouraging the people in their efforts to keep the preachers neat and comfortable homes, that the preachers be urged to give the property even better use than were it their own.
- 6. Whereas the Woman's Parsonage Home Mission Society is an institution of the Church, and in view of the fact that it fills a long felt want; and whereas a thorough organization of this Society means an increase of parsonages and better furnished parsonages, both at home and abroad,

Resolved, That, wherever practicable, the members of this Conference lend their influence and aid to the members of the Woman's Parsonage and Home Mission Society to organize an auxiliary in the bounds of their respective charges.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

During the past year we have done what could be done in the way of informing and stirring up our people in behalf of the Missionary cause.

A large number of leaflets have been distributed in a systematic way, quite a list of subscriptions to the World for Christ have gone up from our Conference, and our people otherwise put in touch with good missionary

literature. The pastors have been furnished with missionary materials, as far as they have needed them or called for them, and a considerable number of our Sunday Schools have been organized into missionary societies.

We believe some good has been done, and our people have been reading more than usual on the subject, and are being prepared for the necessary advance movements demanded by the Providential openings in behalf of missions.

Your Board has carefully considered the interests of missions within the bounds of our Conference, and ask the hearty co-operation of the Conference in carrying out their plans.

The following is the action of the Board in reference to a Conterence Missioaary Secretary:

This Board is of the opinion that the time has come for us to make a decided advance in behalf of the cause of missions, both of our home and foreign work, and therefore be it

Resolved, 1st. That we ask Bishop Wilson to appoint a Conference Missionary Secretary, to be supported by this Board.

- 2d. That the Conference Missionary Secretary be paid a guaranteed salary of twelve hundred dollars and travelling and other necessary expenses, not to exceed four hundred dollars.
- 3d. That we add \$1,200 to the Foreign Missionary assessment on the Conference, and \$1,000 to the Domestic Missionary assessment, to cover the salary and expenses of the Conference Missionary Secretary.
- 4th. That the pastors are requested to raise their missionary assessments as early as possible and forward to our Conference Treasurer, M. Mial, Raleigh, N. C.; and that the Treasurer be authorized to pay the Conference Missionary Secretary monthly.
- 5th. That the Conference Missionary Secretary is hereby instructed, as far as in his power, to see that the disciplinary regulations concerning Missions and the provisions of this Board and of the General Board of Missions be carried out within the bounds of this Conference.

The following resolutions are presented for adoption by the Conference:

Resolved, That it is the firm persuasion of this Conference that all our Sunday Schools ought to be considered and used as Missionary societies, according to the provision of the Discipline, and that, for the furtherance of the cause, they ought to subscribe for and circulate as many copies as possible of the World for Christ.

Resolved, 2d. That we heartly recommend the Methodist Review of Missions to our people, and urge them to subscribe to and read it; and that we call their earnest attention to the catalogue of Missionary books, maps, etc., issued by our General Board, and urge them to furnish themselves with the catalogue and from it select and order such books as will best furnish them the information they may need from time to time.
