

Memorial sermon was preached by J. E. Lamb, using the subject, "These All Died in the Faith."

SECOND DAY, MORNING SESSION

Thursday, May 27, 1948.

Devotions—The Invocation by Bishop Magee was followed by the Conference singing Hymn No. 3, "Before Jehovah's Awful Throne." Responsive Reading for the Forty-Sixth Sunday, First Reading. Prayer was offered by Bishop Magee. Hymn No. 146, "Never Further Than Thy Cross" was sung. The Bishop gave a devotional address on the subject "Redemption." The devotional period closed with the singing of Hymn No. 329, "I Know That My Redeemer Lives."

Report of the Board of the Orphans' and Children's Home—T. B., Sowers presented the report of the Board of the Orphans' and Children's Home and moved the adoption of the report to be placed in the Minutes without reading. The motion was seconded by Paul Brown and the motion carried. (See Report). T. B. Sowers read the names of the Board of Managers of the Home and moved their election. Motion carried. (See report).

Excused—T. B. Sowers was excused from attendance at the Conference today on account of important business.

District Superintendent's Composite Report—E. C. Phillips, District Superintendent of the Olney District read the composite report of the District Superintendents. The report was adopted. (See Report)

Report of the Board of Education—F. E. Harris, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, made his report. Walter Brown made the motion, seconded by C. C. Dawdy, that the report be adopted. The motion carried. (See report).

F. E. Harris made the nomination for the Board of Education. C. R. Yost made the motion, seconded by F. M. Hedger, that the nomination of the members on the Illinois Council be referred to the Cabinet for nomination. A substitute motion was offered by H. G. Hurley, seconded by Walter Brown that all nominations for Boards, Commissions, and Committees in the Conference, not provided for through regular Disciplinary provision, be referred to the Committee on Committees and that this be made a standing rule of the Conference. Motion carried.

Carl C. Bracy nominated the Board of Trustees for McKendree College and moved their election. The motion seconded by C. L. Peterson. The ballot was cast by the Secretary and the Board of Trustees was declared elected. (See report). Carl C. Bracy read his report as President of McKendree College. Report adopted. (See report).

Paul Burt, Director of Wesley Foundation, was introduced and addressed the Conference. Mr. Comrade E. Kranz, Director of Public Relations of Wesley Foundation, was also introduced to the Conference.

F. W. Schwarzlose presented the plans for the College of Christian Life to be held at Urbana, July 19-23.

R. J. Weiss, Conference Director of Youth Work, moved that the mimeographed report of Youth Work be received and printed in the Journal without reading. Motion carried. (See report).

Be it resolved that we set up a Commission, consisting of the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the President of the College, the Lay Leader of the Conference, the Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Conference President of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, and five additional members (representing each district and the College Board of Trustees) and to be known as the Conference Center Commission.

Be it further resolved that we do instruct this Commission to give careful study to this proposed Conference Center and to present a plan for its future development to the next session of the Annual Conference and to the Board of Trustees of the College for their approval. Report of the Old Folks' Home—Orin H. Young presented a report of the Directors of the Old Folks' Home and on his motion it was adopted. (See report). On nomination of Orin H. Young the Board of Directors of Old Folks' Home were elected. (See list).

Introductions—Reverend Ralph Kofoed of the Rock River Conference, and Roy A. Sturm, Director of Research and Surveys of the Department of Town and Country Work; Rev. Leroy Williams, A. M. E. Church, Harrisburg, Illinois; Rev. L. L. Johnson, A. M. E. Church, Mounds, Illinois; Rev. V. J. Oliver, A. M. E. Church, Carbondale, Illinois; and Rev. L. P. Ashford, W. J. E. Church, Carrier Mills, Illinois, were introduced to the Conference.

Hanbaum, Dale Harmon, John Henderson, J. W. A. Kinison, W. A. Robinson, Walter Smith, D. C. Williams, Frank Harris, D. S. Lacquement and Garrett Phillips. They were elected.

H. G. Hurley, Secretary of the Cabinet, made the nominations for the following Commissions and Committees: Commission on World Service and Finance, Committee on Accepted Supplies, The Representative to the American Temperance Society and The Board of Temperance. They were elected. (See list).

Introduction—Dr. George Morelock, Executive Secretary of Board of Ldy Activities, Chicago, Illinois, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes—C. L. Peterson presented Mrs. Alice Avery, who made the report for the Board of Hospitals and Homes. The report was received. (See report).

Report of the Board of Holden Hospital—C. C. Hall reported that the Board of Holden Hospital had not held their annual meeting and their report would be made at the next Session of the Annual Conference.

Report of Conference Trustees—C. R. Yost made the report of the Conference Trustees, and offered the following resolutions:

Resolutions-

WHEREAS, on the 12th day of March, 1948, R. Hal Compton of Owensboro, Kentucky, presented an oil and gas lease to the Board of Trustees of this Conference for execution, and

WHEREAS, under the will of C. C. Boster, the Children's and Orphans' Home of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church, is one of the beneficiaries only to the extent of a portion of the oil and gas produced from lands owned by him at his death, and

WHEREAS, it appears to the best interest of the Children's and Orphans' Home of this Conference, that the said oil and gas lease be executed

to the said R. Hal Compton, now

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the action of the Board of Trustees of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church in the execution of said oil and gas lease be, and the same is hereby approved by the membership of this Conference. Resolution adopted.

Resolution—

"WHEREAS, it is the desire of this Conference to avoid damage to or deservation or disturbance of graves located on the hereinafter described land by any drilling or other operations for production of oil or gas; and,

"WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Conference that it realize the value

of any minerals that may underlie said land:

"NOW, THEREFORE, to accomplish the purpose aforesaid, be it resolved that the Trustees of the Southern Illinois Annual Conference of the Methodist Church be hereby authorized and directed, for the consideration of \$50.00 bonus, to execute and deliver unto the Pure Oil Company, as lessee, an oil and gas lease (containing a non-drilling clause) covering the following described land, to-wit:

"A certain tract of land described as being out of the West side South of the center of the East Half (E½) of the Northeast Quarter (NE½) East of the Third Principal Meridian, known as the Ebeneezer Church and Cemetery tract and being the same land conveyed by deed dated November 12, 1898, and filed January 7, 1936, in Deed Record 243 at page 112 in the office of the Recorder in Saline County, Illinois, and containing one (1) acre, more or less.

"Said oil and gas lease, in order to avoid drilling of the aforesaid tract, is to contain an agreement authorizing the said lessee to consolidate said tract with adjacent land for unit operation.

"Said parties are further empowered, authorized and directed to execute the usual division orders setting out divisions of mineral interest under any such consolidated tract, and to collect and receipt for any and all royalty that may become due in the event of production on or from any such consolidated tract.

"Be it resolved further that a copy of this resolution be spread at large upon the minutes of this meeting and a copy thereof delivered to the Pure Oil Company." Resolution adopted.

SPECIAL SESSION

THE SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE

Special Session of the Southern Illinois Conference was held at the First Methodist Church in Centralia, Illinois, February 4, 1948. The Conference was called to order at 10 A. M. by Bishop J. Ralph Magee. The Worship Service was led by Rev. C. H. Todd, Superintendent of the Carbondale District.

Roll Call was taken by the Secretaries with following number present: Effective Members, 112; Retired Members, 6; Probationers, 3; Accepted Supplies, 54; Lay Delegates, 59.

The Bishop presented H. G. Hurley who spoke to the Conference on the Subject: "The Church and its Educational Task; (1) In the Field of Higher Education."

Warren Peters made the motion, seconded by Frank E. Harris that this fine address be printed and sent out over the Conference. Motion passed.

Special music was presented by the McKendree Chapel Choir under the direction of Prof. Chester S. Bagg.

An address on the Subject "The Church and its Educational Task; (2) In the Local Church" was given by Frank E. Harris, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. After two selections by the Male Quartette from McKendree College, Carl C. Bracy, President of McKendree College, spoke on the Subject "The Church and its Educational Task; (3) At McKendree College." A brief comment was given by W. E. Bush, Special Director of McKendree College.

Whereas: Sunday, February 15, has been designated as Committment Sunday throughout the church, and

Whereas: Sunday, February 15, had already been set in the Southern Illinois Conference as the Official date for the launching of the canvass in our local churches for McKendree's Million Dollar Campaign,

Now therefore, be it resolved: that Sunday, February 29, be observed in

our Conference as Committment Sunday.

Be it further resolved: that each Pastor and Church seek to make this a day for high and holy decision in the lives of our Methodist people, pertaining to the DRINK question. Resolution passed.

Conference adjourned to meet 1:30 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference joined in singing Hymn 180 "Breathe on Me, Breath of God." Prayer was offered by Bishop Magee. N. C. Henderson, offered a Resolution from the Conference Board of Trustees.

(See Resolution.)

H. G. Hurley made the following motion: That the Church at Fieldon, Illinois, eight miles west of Jerseyville, be declared abandoned and that the Conference Trustees be authorized to sell this church in conjunction with the authorized representatives of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, it being held jointly by these two bodies; and that the proceeds from our part of the sale be divided between the church at Jerseyville and the church at Washington Park in East St. Louis on these terms: (1) Half to go to the Jer-

seyville Church as a loan on their new parsonage project. If the Conference makes no call for repayment of this loan within five years, then it becomes an outright gift, (2) half to be given as an outright gift to the congregation at Washington Park to apply on their new church building program. Motion carried.

H. G. Hurley moved, seconded by O. F. Whitlock, that the Secretary of the Conference be the Registered Agent with the State. Carried.

Music was given by the McKendree College Chorus.

A Series of Three Minute Addresses on the Subject, "We Answer the Challenge" were given by the following: Robert C. Adair, President of Alumni Association of McKendree College, and Rev. E. C. Phillips, Superintendent of Olney District. After music by the McKendree's Girls Sextette, the speeches were resumed by Rev. O. F. Whitlock, Walter Smith, W. L. Hanbaum, of the Harrisburg District; Clyde Todd, James Weiss, and W. E. Bush of Carbondale District. Vocal solo, "The Publican," was given by Glenn Freiner. Speeches resumed by H. G. Hurley, Billy Hahs, Farrell D. Jenkins, of the East St. Louis District. Arthur Knapp spoke for the Layman's Association, Mrs. O. E. Connett for the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and Paul Sims for the Methodist Youth Fellowship. After music by the McKendree Male Quartette, the closing address of the day was given by J. Ralph Magee. The McKendree College Chorus sang Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus," and Bishop Magee pronounced the benediction.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT By Earl C. Phillips

Bishop Magee, Members and Friends of the Southern Illinois Conference:

We, the Superintendents of the four districts submit to you our composite report on the state and activities of the churches of the Southern Illinois Conference.

For the fifth consecutive time Bishop Magee is presiding over the session of our Annual Conference. We welcome him and pledge our allegiance to his wise and vigorous leadership. We deeply appreciate his unstinted efforts to give our Conference better organization, a better Conference calendar and a better informed and trained ministry. We commend him for the college of Christian life, the Annual meeting of all the District Superintendents of the Area and other avenues he has opened to bring to the ministers of the three Conferences a fellowship never known before in this area. We wish to express our appreciation of his secretary, Miss Dorothy Magee. Her efficiency, graciousness, and friendly manner has endeared her to many people in our Conference.

During this last quadrennium Bishop Magee has borne the responsibility and successfully led one of the greatest movements ever inaugurated by the Christian Church. The Crusade for Christ program has made the world vastly better, has lifted up the ideal of a new world order, and inspired every Methodist who participated in the movement.

We commend the pastors, evangelists, men, women and youth of the Conference for their loyalty to Christ and His Church during this Conference year. Your prayers and kindly cooperation has often time made the work of your Superintendents a delight.

This is our first spring Conference. Inasmuch as this has been a nine month year, it has been difficult to make statistical comparisons. How-

ever, we do know that reasonable progress has been made in many phases of our work. The shortness of the Conference year has been an incentive to intensive endeavor. The tragedy of world conditions and trends of world thought have created in the minds of Christians an urgency and divine compulsion toward Christian social action.

In his recent book, "The Path to Perfection," Dr. W. E. Sangster, eminent pastor of Central Hall, Westminster, London, England, states that for many years Wesley regarded the doctrine of Perfect Love as the "grand depositum" which God had committed to him and to his followers. The badge of this experience is humility. Wesley believed the best definition to be found was in the first great commandment, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, thy whole soul, and thy whole mind." (Weymouth). In this present day we can better understand the close relationship of the first great commandment to the second great commandment, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as much as thyself." In a world of radio and radar, jet propulsion and atomic energy, the Church must be insistent that a Christian world brotherhood is imperative. It seems but yesterday since we came to the close of the most cruel war in human history. While this tragic conflagration was still raging it seems that secret diplomacy at Yalta and other conferences gave the green light to atheistic communism to spread throughout the earth. Since the end of the war our state department, influenced by the military has gradually lost the peace until we now find our people in war hysteria.

The Methodist Church under the leadership of Mr. Charles F. Boss, an apostle of peace, and the wisdom and guidance of the College of Bishops, put a great deal of prayer and thought into the formation and on going of the United Nations. We have steadfastly fought against economic tensions, racial discrimination, power politics and peace-time military conscripton, believing that these are causes of war. The Church continues to create an atmosphere of poise, clear thinking and sound judgment, that the kingdoms of this world may become the kingdoms for our Christ; that there may be, "On earth peace among men in whom He is well pleased!" Let our world Service program grow and our Missionaries continue to be good-will ambassadors.

Likewise the Church must continue to strengthen our own National morale and our democratic processes. There must be an acute consciousness of the evils that weaken the foundations of our own National Structure. America is becoming the most drunken nation on earth. The minds of men and women entrusted with leadership in our nation are often poisoned with nicotine and liquor. Can we as a nation be strong with open-door saloons and night clubs outdoing Belshazzar in revelery, and fast turning our youth into drunken drivers and liquor addicts? The Church should be militant in her protests against magazine and radio advertising of liquor invading our homes. The gambling mania is a gigantic evil. Many of our Church people are guilty. Looseness in sex-relationships is a national scandal. Our crime wave is alarming. The Church has come to America for such a day as this. Her prophetic ministry is the need of the hour. Let the church awaken and manifest her love for God and the world. By radio, visual education, Christian education and clear thinking in the pulpit, let us bring to the whole world the Christian ideology.

Two major emphases have called forth our prayers and work this year. The last phase of the Crusade for Christ program has enlisted us in the work of Christian Education. Too much praise cannot be given to Dr. Frank Harris, Executive Secretary of our Conference Board of Education. His fine spirit, informed leadership and prodigious labors, have brought most heartening results. Not only have we seen a gain of 3340 in Church School enrollment

and 1780 in average attendance, but we have seen definite advancement in organization of the divisions of children, youth and adults. Perhaps the outstanding advance has been made in Leadership education. Accredited instructors have given their services in Sub-District Leadership Schools throughout the Conference. Pastors must assume a large responsibility in Christian Education. The recent decision of the United States Supreme Court against holding classes for religious instruction in public school buildings should awaken us to the need of ample provision being made by the Church for week-day religious instruction. That instruction should be vitally evangelistic. The General Board of Education of the Methodist Church discloses that the population of Illinois is 7,897,241, that 4,343,483 of this number are unchurched. Out of Methodist Church Schools approximately 10,000 are in Illinois, are joining the Church each year. This indicates that we are giving far too little time and effort in teaching for a verdict. It is well that many of our pastors earnestly seek the lost by public evangelism and revivals of religion. It is commendable that laymen are increasingly assisting their pastors in visitation evangelism. These methods are good, because they reach many adults. However, any pastor who fails to organize membership training classes for children and youth, fails in one of his largest opportunities. This type work does not need to be shallow. It can be genuine. This conference should increase its membership training classes ten-fold next year. Any church that cannot save its children and youth cannot save itself.

Our second major emphases has been the million dollar campaign for McKendree College. Our hearts rejoice when we think of the splendid success thus far in the campaign. However, we know that there must be sustained enthusiasm over a long period to reach the goal of one million dollars. It can be done, and when it is done, we will have a feeling that we have had a part in one of the finest accomplishments in the history of the Southern Illinois Conference. Dr. Carl C. Bracy, youthful President of McKendree College, follows in line a succession of Sincere Christian metwol loved the cause of Christian Education. Reared in the environs of our own Conference, with high scholastic training, an appreciation of the deep and mystical in religious experience, love for his Alma Mater, and a mind to work, he is eminitely fitted to lead this Conference in the training of our youth. It is an inspiration to see Dr. Bracy at a Sub-District youth meeting. He plays the piano, leads in group singing, entertains with with and humor and then impresses youth with the need of a college education and a life dedicated to Jesus Christ. With his leadership, the cooperation of our young people, our Churches, and our many friends, it is evident that we will achieve the goal of the Million for McKendree. We eagerly await the breaking of ground for the first new building. Let us offer daily prayers for the school, the faculty, the Board of Trustees and the people who have money which should be given to promote the school.

Our other Institutions are: The Orphans' and Children's Home at Mt. Vernon, The Old Folks' Home at Lawrenceville, The Alton Memorial Hospital at Alton, and The Holden Hospital at Carbondale. Beautiful Christian Service has been given by all of these Institutions and their reports to this Conference will indicate the excellent progress they have made. It is the aim of the District Superintendents, as they visit the churches to give up to date information to the people concerning the work of our Institutions.

We are glad to report that our Conference Organizations have made good progress this Conference year. Perhaps no other organization has developed so rapidly as the Methodist Men. Mr. Arthur Knapp is the Conference Lay Leader. Mr. L. N. Davenport is Secretary-Treasurer. The District Lay Leaders are Francis Watson, Virgil Duncan, S. E. Dudley and Roy V. Jordan. Working with these men are the Associate Lay Leaders.

These men are leading the laymen of all our churches in a program of Fellowship, Evangelism and Stewardship. The men have completed such worthy projects as the purchase of a house-trailer for the Conference Missionary Evangelist and providing a new District Parsonage for the East St. Louis District. We trust that the men of the other three Districts will undertake to provide District Parsonages, also. When the men of the churches are thoroughly awakened to the joy of Christian service, it will be a new day for this Conference.

Mrs. O. E. Connett is the efficient President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of our Conference. For a good many years this has been the best organized group in the Conference. At the Quarterly Conferences the report of the Women's Society of Christian Service is often the best report given. The women are to be commended for their Missionary Educational program which keeps them world minded. Their vision stimulates the entire Church. They are continually organizing new Societies and urging better programs and attendance in the General Meetings of the local church. The field is still "White unto the harvest." There are now in the Conference 261 Societies with 12097 members. The total amount of money raised by these Societies was \$39,303.

Our Methodist Youth Fellowship is under the direction of R. J. Weiss, as Conference Director, and Paul Sims as Conference President. They have proven themselves to be good leaders. So much progress has been made that we hope within a few years we may have a paid Director, giving full time service to Youth Work. Young people represented our Conference at the Area Planning Conference at Bloomington, the Regional Training Conference at Clear Lake, Iowa. About 100 from our Conference attended the National Youth Convocation at Cleveland, Ohio, and our Conference President attended the International Youth Meeting at Oslo, Norway. More than 1500 Intermediates and Seniors attended our Summer Institutes at McKendree and Eldorado. This summer there will be a third Institute at Louisville, giving special attention to Crafts, Drama, Music and Counselling. The Booth Festival Supplies and cash given in one night to our Institutions amounted to \$39,484.

Concerning our ministry we express our profound gratitude that none of our members have been called by death during this Conference year. We share in the sorrow of Reverend W. D. Richardson and Reverend J. B. Cummins, in the passing of their good wives. "The memory of the just is blessed."

The spring Conference brings to our Pastorates a good number of Young men who have recently graduated from Seminary. They should have the leadership ability which our Conference needs. Inasmuch as many other Conferences are calling for them we appreciate their decision to serve in our Conference. We feel that our welcome should include as good a charge as we can open for them. We also feel that the Reserve Pension Plan should soon be launched in the Conference. Better provision for our aged ministers, their wives and our Supply Pastors is long over-due.

Our Pastor's School and the College of Christian Life are splendid agencies for the enrichment of our ministry.

Throughout the Conference better and more modern and comfortable parsonage homes are being provided for the pastors and their families. Congregations are remodeling, redecorating and beautifying church buildings. Several new organs are being installed. Several new Churches are under construction. People see now more clearly the need of sanctuaries conducive to worship, also the need of educational and recreational facilities.

There has been a very general advance in ministers salaries. However, prices and the cost of maintaining a car have increased more rapidly than salaries. The economic problem is so acute in many parsonage homes that the minister and his family cannot render the service that they would if the church would relieve this tension. We believe that there would be better results through longer pastorates.

We face a new quadrennium in Methodism. The recent General Conference has challenged all of us with a new quadrennial plan known as "For Christ and His Church." The plan includes two objectives: "A Teaching and Preaching Endeavor in which Methodists may achieve a deeper understanding of and commitment to our faith, our church, our ministry and our mission. A world-wide advance in which Methodists may share in a ministry of relief and in carrying the Gospel of Christ to the peoples of the earth." Let us rally to this high and holy task. Grace Noll Crowell has written:

PREACH CHRIST, O MEN!

Preach Christ, O men—His blood, His saving power!
Never the need was greater in an hour
Than in this hour! Cry out His blessed name.
O Preachers, Teachers, set the world aflame
For Christ, that those who walk earth's darkened roads
May feel His hand beneath their heavy loads,
May come to know Him as their Savior, Friend,
Who will walk with them until the journey's end.

Preach Christ, O men! Their hunger is so great! The days are swift—there is no time to wait. You hold the bread of life within your hands, And the living water for their thirst. The lands Of earth cry out for what you have to give! The living Christ—preach Him, that they may live.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY, BOARD OF EDUCATION, SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE

To the members of the Board of Education and to the Southern Illinois Conference:

This is my second report to the Board of Education and to the Annual Conference. This report covers only nine months work. We desire to express our appreciation to the District Superintendents and to the ministers of the conference for their splendid cooperation. We are also indebted to the Church School Superintendents and Officers and the Teachers for the splendid way they have worked with us in this great task of Christian Education. We wish to express our appreciation to the Boards of Education in the local churches for the way they have supported us through the Rally Day Offerings. The Rally Day Offering was larger this year than ever before in the history of the Conference, this indicates to us the fine interest there is in this area of the Christian ministry.

We have held two Executive Committee meetings during this nine operation and security in planning and carrying out the work of the Conference. We have attended fifteen National meetings, six Jurisdictional meetings, fifty-two Conference meetings, twelve Area meetings, firty-five District meetings, forty Sub-District meetings, and fifty-seven Local Church meetings in the interest of Christian Education. We have spent a

total of 230 days out of the 273 days of the nine month period in meetings of various kinds in the interest of the Conference Board of Education, this left us forty-three days in which to work in the office, which means that much of the office work had to be done on the road. With a minimum of help we have edited and composed eight issues of THE CRUSADER and have 1100 names on our mailing list for the CRUSADER AND WIDENING HORIZONS. We have mailed out approximately 45,000 pieces of literature, and distributed about 52,000 pieces of literature in all the meetings, we have written 1200 personal letters.

Three new summer enterprises have been organized which were authorized at the last Annual Meeting. The Epworth M. Y. F. Institute, at Louisville; The Intermediate Christian Adventure Camp, at Giant City State Park, and the Adult Bible Conference and Young Adult Assembly at McKendree College.

Splendid progress has been made in the field of Leadership Education. We now have fifty-five fully accredited teachers, twenty-nine accredited deans. We are in a position to offer seventy-one accredited courses through these teachers. The final reports will reveal more persons in Leadership Schools this year than ever before in our conference. We have spent three weeks in teaching in Leadership Schools within the Conference. We have just completed a two-day COACHING CONFERENCE on Leadership Education, with Earl Cunningham and Richard Belcher of the General Board of Christian Education as our leaders and resource men. We evaluated the work of the past year and made plans for the coming year. A total of forty persons participated in these meetings. The Joint Leadership School with The Woman's Society of Christian Service, held at McKendree College last year was better attended than any other year since its beginning, plans are going forward for the school this summer.

There was more interest and better attendance at the eight Vacation Bible School Coaching Conferences this year than in previous years. Mrs. J. W. Webster, Mrs. Mildred Broadway, Mrs. A. B. Clodfelder and Milton Q. Connett furnished splendid leadership and proved to be valuable help in these conferences. They have confirmed our faith in our own workers who are willing to prepare themselves for this specialized type of work. In spite of the very cold weather and slippery roads last February, we had very good Church School Institutes in each of the Districts of the Conference.

Under the splendid leadership of R. J. Weiss, our Youth Work has made progress. He has given untiringly of his time to this work. His help in organizing and carrying out the trip to Cleveland was excellent. He also organized the Youth forces for the Regional Planning Conference at Clear Lake, Iowa, where we had a delegation of twelve persons. Twenty-seven Conference, District and Sub-District Officers attended the Area Planning Conference at Bloomington. There were 121 youth and adults at Cleveland from Southern Illinois Conference. Paul Sims, our Conference M. Y. F. President, led us in one of the best Mid-Year M. Y. F. Rallies ever held in the conference.

Under the leadership of Walter Smith and Paul Stevens, an Adult Bible Conference and Young Adult Assembly are being planned to be held at McKendree in August. The Young Adult Work is progressing under the direction of Paul Stevens and his District leaders.

The Children's Division, under the leadership of Mrs. J. W. Webster, sponsored the Vacation Bible School Coaching Conferences, and is promoting this valuable Christian Education Enterprise. They are also send-

ing the District Leaders to the Laboratory School for Children's Workers at Bloomington this summer.

Milton Q. Connett is making splendid progress in the development of the Intermediate Work of the Conference in cooperation with the Youth Division. Three Intermediate Institutes are being held this summer.

The organization of our Student Work is developing. We had a fine group from McKendree College and Carbondale, Southern Illinois University at the state conference held in Urbana, at Wesley Foundation, there were forty-seven from our conference present and "Mike" Katayama, a student from McKendree College, was elected state President of the organization.

We have added twenty new books to our lending library, in an early edition of THE CRUSADER a complete list of our library books will be published. We have twenty-two film strips on various subjects that are available to loan to the preachers and church school superintendents. We also have seven recordings that are helpful in the promotion of the education work of your local church. We expect to build up this phase of the work as time and funds are available.

Recommendations For Leadership Education

- 1. As soon as possible after the Annual Conference the Executive Secretary meet with the District Superintendent and the District staff of Christian Education and Sub-District leaders of Leadership Education to formulate plans for Sub-District Leadership Schools.
- 2. We also recommend that the findings of the Leadership Education Coaching Conference be mimeographed or printed and sent out to the ministers and Church School Superintendents.
- 3. We recommend that in so far as is possible the Leadership Schools be planned for the months of September, October and November.
- 4. We also recommend that where teachers or faculty members are imported for Leadership Schools from outside the local church, sub-district, district or conference, that they be allowed as a minimum five cents a mile for their travel expenses, any church that desires to give an honorarium may do so.
- 5. We recommend that the Conference Board of Education pay for the text book used by teachers seeking accreditation for teaching, when they receive their invitation to teach from the General Board Office.

Further Recommendations

· We recommend that Sunday, September 12, be recognized in so far as possible as Rally Day, and that an offering be taken in every church school in the Southern Illinois Conference for the Board of Education of the conference, and that the goal be set at ten cents per enrolled member in our Church Schools. This money is to be used for Christian Education work within our own conference. This past year nearly every church in the conference sent in an offering to our conference treasurer. We wish to express our appreciation for this fine offering and hope that all the churches will meet their responsibility in this matter next year. See paragraph 196 of the Discipline.

We further recommend the continued support of our M. Y. F. Institute at McKendree College, the Beulah Institute at Eldorado, the Epworth Institute at Louisville, and the Intermediate Christian Adventure Camp to be held at Giant City State Park; also the Leadership Training School and Adult Bible Conference and Young Adult Assembly to be held at Mc-

Kendree College. We feel that these enterprises are meeting a very real need in our conference and that ministers and laymen should give their hearty support to them for the spiritual enrichment that they bring to the life of the conference.

We furthermore recommend the whole-hearted support on the part of our pastors to the COLLEGE OF CHRISTIAN LIFE, held in Urbana, on an area level. This is a real opportunity for Christian fellowship, it is also a genuine opportunity for refreshing our ministerial training and for spiritual enrichment. We suggest to the churches of the conference that they send their pastors to this important meeting and to provide some means for helping him in the financial responsibilities he incurrs, his attendance will help to make him more effective and efficient in his work in the local church.

We also recommend the continued support of our Pastor's School at McKendree College. We feel that this school meets a real need in our conference.

We recommend the continuation of the fine support of The McKendree Million Dollar Campaign. We commend the churches for the splendid response to the first phase of the campaign and urge that they continue to do all that they can to support Dr. Bracy and W. E. Bush in their effort to raise \$350,000 in larger gifts as the second phase of the campaign. We also recommend to the churches that they send their fine young people to McKendree College for their collegiate training in a Christian atmosphere.

We also recommend that pastors send to Dr. Paul Burt at Wesley Foundation at Urbana, and to the director of the Christian Student Foundation at Carbondale, the names of their students who are to attend one of the State Universities so that these young people can be contacted for these Foundations and become related to them early in their college career.

NO REPORTS

There will be no reports at this conference from our Vacation Bible Schools, M. Y. F. Institutes, Pastor's School, College of Christian Life, Adult Bible Conference, Young Adult Assembly, Leadership School or other education enterprises that will be held following this Annual conference. They will be reported at our 1949 conference.

- 1. McKendree Chorus trip took our musicians on a tour of cities for first time in five years. A good program, fine students representing the College and good public relations . . . Radio and television broadcasts were included.
- 2. McKendree Men's Quartette made seventy-five appearances in forty-four cities. These boys have contributed a great deal to success of campaign.
- 3. McKendree Review received first rating by Illinois College Press Association for Colleges in Class B (under 1000.)
- 4. Masaichi (Mike) Katayama, McKendree Sophomore, elected President of Illinois Methodist Student Movement.
 - 5. Thirty-one graduates in past year. Twenty-two in May Class, 1948.

Million Dollar Campaign:

- 1. As of May 21, over \$200,000 has been pledged of which \$75,961.80 has been paid in cash.
- 2. We must continue to collect unpaid pledges of the \$200,000 subscribed.
- 3. The second phase of campaign calls for \$300,000 to be raised in the conference in larger gifts. Rev. W. E. Bush, special representative, is to be in the field to assist in this phase. Pastors are asked to cooperate in cultivating these prospects.

Christian Emphasis:

With the recent decision of the Supreme Court in the McCollum Case, many tax supported institutions are being compelled to remove credit courses in religion from their curriculum. Church related colleges like McKendree, must strengthen themselves. They will be the citadels of religion in the field of higher education. We must continue our emphasis on a rational Christian faith adequate for our day. McKendree must continue to be "Christian without apology and Methodist with pride."

WESLEY FOUNDATION AT URBANA

The enrollment at the University of Illinois, on the Champaign-Urbana campus, reached an all time high this last fall with more than 18,000 students, of whom 3,410 registered Methodist membership or preference. This gives a measure of our opportunity and our responsibility.

Nor is this enrollment likely to suffer a slump in the foreseeable future. For many more would have been enrolled if accommodations could have been provided for them. The University is planning and actively undertaking a program of expansion of staff, classroom, laboratory and housing facilities which may bring even a larger student population to the campus only a few years hence. To meet this challenge now and in the future is our utmost concern.

During the past year our outstanding features have been:

- 1. The development of student leadership. This has always been one of the major emphases of the Wesley Foundation program. During the war years and those immediately following, when normal university life was so largely disorganized, this was difficult to achieve because the student turnover was so rapid, and there was reluctance to accept any continuous responsibility. But now again we have been able to lead students through the various stages of training, including caravan, summer work camps, and regional training conferences, so that they come to places of leadership and responsibility with maturity and effectiveness. The student council recently installed is one of the strongest we have ever had.
- 2. A well rounded effective staff, perhaps the most nearly adequate that we have ever had, in making the many necessary contacts with students, directing their varied activities, and counciling with them in regard to their personal, religious and vocational problems.

Our staff has consisted, besides the director and the office personnel, or. W. A. Goodell, teaching two courses with University credit, Mrs. Kathryn Smith, Robert J. Trobaugh and Dean Leeper. In addition for part time service, Mr. Glenn Gothard, pastor of our rural parish, Mr. Kenneth Burns, instructor in speech at the University, who directs our drama activities, and Mrs. Marie Barbe, supervising our food program and other aspects of our housekeeping.

- 3. Our Extension Program. This naturally divides itself in two aspects:
- (a) The participation in the activities of the Wesley Rural Parish.
- (b) Our general expansion program, serving many churches in a radius of 50 to 60 miles. It has been a significant fact that no part of our program has met with greater popular response on the part of our students. This should dispell the notion, if held by any, that students are interested in Wesley Foundation merely as an opportunity to have a good time. Indeed, they quite properly want to have a good time, but they seem to find it above all in rendering some useful service and in training themselves for more effective churchmanship.
- 4. Program for graduate and foreign students. The University of Illinois will be more and more the center of graduate study. The Chemistry Department alone has 350 graduate students. These students are extremely busy and on the whole difficult to reach. Yet they are extremely important, for from among them shall come those who will shape the pattern of University life in the years to come. We have been greatly encouraged and rewarded by our efforts among this group. I can think of nothing more important than to break through the concentrated speciliza-

tion to which they are subjected with broad human concerns and especially with the challenge of the Christian faith.

So also with the 350 or more foreign students that are in our midst. Naturally many of these never come within our orbit. But many do, either through our graduate fellowship or our church services. This is a strategic opportunity for missionary service. A Chinese student with a Buddist background, and a Peruvian student, brought up as a Roman Catholic, have been received into the church upon confession of faith. Also a Mohammedian student from Pakistan, on leaving the campus, wrote a most beautiful letter of appreciation, saying that the hospitality and fellowship of the Wesley Foundation will always make a difference in his life.

WESTMINSTER THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

The Seminary is closing another successful year's work. Twelve will be graduated with the Bachelor of Sacred Theology. Several others will finish their work in the summer session in July. Including students in our summer school, the total enrollment for this academic year was ninety-three. This is approximately the same as in the previous year. There are three students here from the Southern Illinois Conference. At a recent meeting of the Board of Governors, a program of expansion and advance was adopted to begin at once. It included additions to our faculty, increasing the number to at least eight full time members. Provision is also made for our fund for the erection of a new building to provide for enlarged library and chapel facilities. There is included in the plans for the addition of needed volumes to our library. This program will be gotten under way soon and its successful completion will greatly strengthen the work of the Seminary.

CHRISTIAN STUDENT CENTER AT SOUTHERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY AT CARBONDALE

This has perhaps been the most successful year of the operation of this Interdenominational Institution. It renders Christian service and opportunity to all protestant students in the University. Of the increased student enrollment at the University there are approximaely five hundred who claim Methodist membership or indicate the Methodist church as their preference. We do reach quite a percentage of these students and also students from all other major protestant groups. The strongest features of the program are the NOON-DAY Prayer Meetings, The Religious Emphasis Week, the Interest Cells and Bible courses. There can be no Sunday program at the Foundation because most of the students commute and those who remain on the campus over the week-end are urged to participate in their own church programs. We are anticipating an expansion of the work at this Foundation. We Methodists and most of the participating denominations are urging an increased support for the Foundation both in interest and funds. There is an opportunity there for far reaching service and the development of leadership and churchmanship. We need to promote the interest of this institution more thoroughly throughout our conference especially the areas of the Carbondale and Harrisburg Districts, where most of our Methodist students come from. The Board of Education has suggested to the Commission on World Service and Conference Benevolences an increase in our support of the Foundation for the coming year. You are cordially invited to visit this Foundation when in or passing through Carbondale. We are strategicaly located in our relationship to the University.

METHODIST YOUTH FELLOWSHIP, 1947-48

This year has been filled with youth activities. Our young people have given evidence of great advancement. Their travel and fellowship with young people from all parts of our own Conference and from all parts of Methodism has increased their enthusiasm and deepened their spiritual life. Their Church has taken on new meaning and from the reports received, the young people of the Conference are working to make their part of the program function.

The Area Planning Conference was in every way a success. A report on it is given by one of the youth. The cost to the conference was \$47.95. This was for registration and transportation.

The Annual Conference Planning Conference, held at Mt. Vernon, Ill., was the first attempt to formulate a program by the youth for the youth in our Conference. The findings and plans adopted at this conference have created new interest and made the Sub-District meeting more meaningful. The cost of this conference was \$35.50. The District Set-up Meetings that followed were very well attended and the Mt. Vernon Conference plans were adopted by part of the Districts.

The Booth Festival gathered together more than \$40,000 in cash and supplies. Almost every charge in the Conference participated.

The Cleveland Conference report is given by one of the young persons that attended the Conference.

The Mid-year Rally held at Benton, Ill., was as near a "Little Cleveland" as could be produced in one day. A great crowd attended and we are still hearing comments concerning its worth.

MY NINTH ANNUAL REPORT AS SUPERINTENDENT OF THE ORPHANS' AND CHILDREN'S HOME

May 17, 1948

Mr. President, Members of the Board of Managers of The Orphans' and Children's Home, the Southern Illinois Conference, and Friends: I bring you greetings from our large family (children and workers).

We have not the time and space, neither the command of words to adequately express our gratitude to God for blessings which have come to us in the Children's Home during the year. We do rejoice in the fact that God has led and blessed so richly all the efforts to which this Home is dedicated by the Southern Illinois Conference, in this particular phase of service in the Kingdom of our God.

In the success of the work here, too much cannot be said in commendation for the loyalty and cooperation upon the part of the staff of workers in the Home, the Board of Managers, every church of Southern Illinois Conference, contributing friends, and all who have shared by prayer or in any other way the work of caring for dependent children who need care and help so much.

The shortage of the proper type of help with the Home carrying the maximum number of children at all times has meant added burdens upon all workers, and in most every instance, this added service has been sacrificially and graciously given, and I am persuaded that all have heard the Christ, saying again and again, "Insmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto me."

We have been deeply grieved through the year because we were compelled to turn away so many needy and deserving children through the lack of means and workers to care for them. When the new building, which is now nearing completion, is finished, this will, I am certain, prove a great asset to the work in general, as well as give additional room, which is so badly needed.

Health: God has blessed in a remarkable way; the Home has maintained the excellent health record of the eight previous years. There has not been a single case of food poisoning, pneumonia, serious accident nor death from any cause among the children or workers. We have an average population, including those of the administration building, of eighty-two (82) people, and it has not been necessary for our Staff Physician, (Dr. W. G. Parker) to make a single call during the year, and only eight such calls during the past nine years. We have, however, made a number of visits to his office that Dr. Parker might examine, give vaccination, tonsillectomies, and all such medical care as needed.

The Kiwanis Club has again volunteered to care for the expenses of all surgical and dental needs of our children. The Lions Club, in like manner, has cared for the expenses pertaining to the care of the children's eyes, such as paying for their glasses, etc. Mrs. Maurice E. Smith has, without any charge, taken care of all X-ray services needed for the children of the

Home. All of this, we consider a most excellent gesture on the part of these good people.

At the time this report is being written, the health conditions of the children as a whole are such as would be difficult to surpass by any group of equal age and number.

Finance: The Children's Home, through the Unified Financial Plan for the Conference Institutions, has received from our Conference Treasurer from August 1, 1947, to May 1, 1948, (nine months) \$14,039.84. There was received from this same source last year (eleven months) \$12,511.72, an increase of \$1,528.12. Designated gifts from August 1, 1947, to May 1, 1948, (nine months) amounted to \$7,239.83. From this same source for the fiscal year of eleven months of the preceding year, there was received \$7,071.54, showing an increase from this source of \$168.29. From all other miscellaneous receipts for the nine months, covering the period from August 1, 1947, to May 1, 1948, we received \$22,833.76, compared to \$26,989.03 during the preceding year of eleven months, showing a decrease from these sources of \$4,155.27. Total receipts, from all sources for the nine months of this fiscal year, were \$44,113.43, compared with the receipts of the preceding fiscal year of eleven months, which were \$46,572.29, giving us a decrease of \$2,488.86. We do rejoice on our thanksgiving to God that the good people of the Southern Illinois Conference have made such a fine effort in the support of their Children's Home.

The Auditor's Report shows a balance in the hands of the Treasurer at the end of the fiscal year of \$27,207.80, compared to \$17,311.89 the previous year, a gain of \$9,895.91.

This makes the seventh consecutive year that we have been able to meet all bills every thirty days without borrowing money or drawing on our endowment fund.

We sincerely appreciate the fact that some of our very finest Christian stewards, out of their abundance, make very excellent and necessary contributions to this work, and that many in a heart-touching and most sacrificial spirit gladly share their meager incomes for the relief of homeless and dependent children. We feel most keenly that every contribution (large and small) coming to us for this work belongs to God and the use thereof accounted for to Him as well as to the Southern Illinois Conference.

I have no words nor means by which to adequately express my sincere appreciation to all who have shared in maintaining and forwarding the work here in the Children's Home. I an truly thankful to God for having supplied us with such a fine cooperative staff of Christian workers; were we to use great space and time in naming all and each of them, trying to tell their fine Christian virtues, quality of work, etc. the half could not be told. Too much praise cannot be given to those of our workers who have given many years of the most faithful and sacrificial type of service to our Children's Home. The records show that the tenure of service continues to grow longer, and while the wage scale is far below that which I would like to see, it too, has improved for the scale is now more than treble what it was nine years ago.

We are grateful to Bro. N. C. Henderson, to Rev. George E. Whitfen, our Pastor and Secretary of the Board of Managers, to Marlin Rich, our Sunday School Superintendent and Member of the Executive Committee, to V. E. Richardson, O. A. Jones and N. T. Jones, Members of the Building and Grounds Committee, to Dr. W. G. Parker, our Staff Physician, who has proven himself efficient, willing and liberal in his professional services for the children of the Home over a span of many years; to Attorneys Alvin

Lacy Williams, John Lannin and Marion E. Burks, for their legal counsel and services which have been given gratis to the Home.

I would like to recommend that V. E. Richardson, O. A. Jones, and N. T. Jones be re-elected as members of the Building and Grounds Committee; that Dr. W. G. Parker be re-elected to the position of Staff Physician; that Alvin Lacy Williams and John Lannin be elected as Attorneys for the Home; also that Marlin Rich be included, as members of the Executive Committee for the Home. I recommend the election of the above-named men as members of the Board of Managers.

Without a single exception, we have had a most kindly reception from all the pastors and church leaders of the Southern Illinois Conference as we have represented the Children's Home. The many county courts and court officials of various counties with which we have had dealings, have in every instance treated us personally, and the Children's Home and its work, with the utmost respect and consideration.

I could go on and on, trying to express my sincere appreciation and deepest gratitude to churches, organizations, individuals, etc., and still there would be a multitude of people and things of which I would like to write or speak, so may I close my thanksgiving by stating, "I include all in all that I have tried to say."

As Superintendent of the Orphans' and Children's Home for the past nine years. Mrs. Sowers having served the same length of time as Secretary, Bookkeeper and Matron, not only have we given our best, we have given our all to the task assigned to us during the nine years. We have spoken to churches, Bible schools, youth fellowship groups and other church organizations 2.023 times, traveled approximately 175,000 miles, have not taken a single public collection, offering or subscription from the pulpit during that time for the Home. I have, with God's help, tried to give them a word picture of what the Southern Illinois Conference is trying to do for the homeless and helpless children, and left it up to them to either hand their contributions to me after the service or send it direct to the Home by mail, asking them to remember the Home in their prayers, their contributions, wills and life insurance. Whatever has been accomplished through my efforts for the Children's Home is due to the marvelous help received from God in meeting the many and complex duties with which I have been confronted. Too much credit cannot be given to the fine loyalty and cooperation upon the part of the Board of Managers, the fine staff, both in and out of the Home, and to the children themselves who live in the Home, and for whom the Home is operated.

In closing, let me say I have reasons to know "That they who wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength;" God's promises are true, "He is able to do exceedingly, abundantly, above all that we can ask or think;" "That all things work together for good to those who love God and are called according to His riches and glory in Christ Jesus, if we love Him and keep His commandments."

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THE OLD FOLKS' HOME, LAWRENCEVILLE

from August 1, 1947, to April 30, 1948

Mr. President and members of the Board of Directors:

I bring you greetings from our large family including the staff as well as the members. This is my fourth report, due to the change of the date of our annual Conference this report covers the nine month period from August 1, 1947, to April 30, 1948.

We are deeply grateful to God for His Divine guidance during this period.

We wish to express our thanks to the churches of the Southern Illinois Conference including pastors and members for their splendid cooperation and support through World Service and Annual Conference Benevolences, and to the Youth Fellowship for their contribution of cash and supplies through the Booth Festival; and to friends in the churches and out of the churches for their special gifts to the Home; and to all who have helped in any way to carry on this important work.

Our current expenses for the operation of the Home have increased during this period due to rising prices and an unusual amount of illness especially during the months of January, February and March. But with all the sickness we have only lost five by death. Our population at the beginning of the period was fifty-six, after losing five we have received three new members which leave a total population of fifty-four.

We have had some splendid chapel services conducted by different people among whom were Miss Helen Bus, a missionary on furlough from Dehli, India, whose mother is a member of the Home; Dr. Dean Dutton, noted lecturer; Rev. D. C. Williams of Edwardsville,who furnished a program of picures and music; Mr. Chas. Bare of Anna, who gave a very interesting program of moving pictures of the Conference Institutions and other scenes related to the Conference; pastors of nearby churches have also conducted splendid services in our chapel. We make special mention of Rev. Niles Stone who was accompanied by a large group of his church members.

We have added a new Projector to our equipment and have been giving a series of illustrated lectures on the Old Testament which has been accepted in a fine way by the members of the Home. During Holy week we held a number of special services with illustrated lectures in keeping with the season. We also had a very impressive White Communion Service during Holy week.

We deeply regret that we do not have enough room to receive all who

wish to become members of the Home. We are deeply moved with compassion for all who seek admission whom we are compelled to turn away; we do so with hope and a prayer that they will find a comfortable Home somewhere in which to live. It was reported at our National Convention of the Board of Hospitals and Homes that there are 10,600,000 old people in the nation. According to the 1947 report of September Federal Social Security Bulletin that 2,297,995 persons past 65 are receiving Federal and State Old Age Assistance, and this number is rapidly increasing. Millions of aged people may have incomes but are still unable to care for themselves.

These facts and figures indicate the growing need for additional room to help meet the urgent necessity for giving adequate care to our aged people. We realize that it is one thing to provide food and shelter and medical care for the aged and it is another thing to keep them contented and happy, hence the great need of occupational therapy. We hope to develop this as much as possible in the present situation when we can secure the proper personnel to promote this work; always looking forward to a better and more extensive program with the new building and modern facilities.

Our Home affords opportunity for splendid Christian service and we are always glad to receive application from efficient Christian workers who wish to join our staff.

A well-informed man recently said to me, "I have watched that Methodist Home for some time, and to me it is Christianity personified."

We solicit the co-operation of all in carrying on this important work in helping to answer the prayer of the aged who join with the Psalmist in saying, "Cast me not off in the time of old age; forsake me not when my strength faileth." Psa. 71:9.

ALTON MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT May, 1948

The results from the operation of our institution during the past seven months in the various professional and non-professional activities of the hospital clearly indicate the present trend of our times. The general unrest, not only throughout our nation, but all over the world, has affected deeply the affairs of every charitable and eleemosynary institution of our country irrespective of creed or non-religious foundations.

We find ourselves facing a future which is obscure and replete with unknown quantities and, I might say, social perils. Influences beyond our control create problems from day to day which present ponderous problems causing anxiety and discouragement, sometimes despair. Perplexities far beyond anything which most hospital administrators have ever experienced are encountered daily in handling personnel problems.

Morale building among employees was never more necessary than today. On the one hand, we praise and reward loyalty; on the other, we are perplexed with the attitude of many employees who are giving a minimum service. Never was there a time when a greater challenge has been presented to the administrator—never such complications to defy, and never has a better opportunity been offered to accomplish by ingentity and deliberate actions the many tasks which thrust themselves upon us with alarming seriousness. These problems must be faced with unflinching courage, and any tendency to look too much on the dark side of the picture only begets hopelessness and despair.

We can hold no optimism toward lower costs for good hospital service in the light of present prospects if we are to keep our service at highest levels. Our chief concern today in face of these conditions is how far can the patient go in meeting the advancing cost of hospitalization? We hospital people have hesitated about passing increased costs along to our patients, always hoping that a ceiling of expense might be just around the corner.

Hospitals today need public understanding and support—financial and otherwise—more today than ever before in their long outstanding history of service to mankind. The only way public support can be maintained is through a sincere effort by all hospitals—individually and collectively—to fully inform the public of their purposes, problems, progress, and plans.

During the past year, I have endeavored to maintain business and professional efficiency in the hospital. The services of various departments are constantly expanding. Some have been financially profitable—others not. There has been an increase in Blue Cross patient participation which, no doubt, is due to the expanding subscriber membership in Blue Cross.

There has been a general decrease in the number of new-born during the past year. The decrease in the number of maternity cases has been offset in the number of medical cases. Therefore, the adult patient days is practically the same for the first four months of this year. The number of x-ray and laboratory services being rendered has progressively increased each month. This is, also, true in the pharmacy department. There has been a decided decrease in the number of minor operations and a slight increase in the number of major operations being performed. The average length of stay per patient has declined during the past two years. The number of patients admitted for the last seven months is 3,561 as compared to 3,468 with the same period of the previous year, or an increase of 93.

With the foregoing statistics before you, you will note that the demand for various hospital services has been steadily increasing. Operating losses have occurred especially during the past six months because of the abnormal increase in the cost of commodities and increased payrolls. The patient income has not increased in proportion to the increased cost of maintaining the hospital. Adjustments in increasing our patient income are now in the process of discussion in order to decrease further operation losses. Economics are, also, being affected at the present time and will be continued with an effort to maintain an adequate patient service.

There have been very few changes in our medical staff. The officers of the staff are Doctor E. R. Quinn, President; Doctor C. D. Ehlert, Vice-President; and Doctor D. D. Monroe, Secretary-Treasurer. The staff membership now consists of 79 doctors, classified as 7 Honorary, 19 Consulting, 19 Active, and 34 Associate members. Due to the change in the closing date of our Conference year, it has been recommended that the present staff officers elected last August hold over until their by-laws can be amended.

The report of the inspection made by the American College of Surgeons last May was received recently. The hospital was given full approval. Suggestions and recommendations contained thereon are now in the process of discussion.

The Nurse Division of the Department of Registration and Education of the State of Illinois has been reorganized during the past six months and all are now members appointed by the Governor. An inspection was made recently of the program and physical facilities of our training school, but no written report has been received to date. However, many suggestions and recommendations were made verbally and another inspection will be made again in August of this year.

Commencement exercises were held May 12, 1948, with twenty-four students receiving diplomas. Out of this number ten have already graduated, and fourteen will finish training between now and September. At this time we will have only 23 girls left in training, 15 of which are from the September, 1947, class.

Student enrollment now becomes imperative if we are to continue to give a high type of professional patient care and train nurses for the care of the future health of our community. Both Alton hospitals have embarked on a campaign to enlist public support in trying to recruit the required number of students for a fall class. The situation is now desperate and should warrant the immediate attention of our entire Southern Illinois Conference as well as our community.

We have shown our sound movies, "For You To Decide," in six churches and hope we will be able to bring it before many more in the near future. The response from our local newspaper has been most commendable in projecting our hospital problems to the community.

The White Cross Auxiliary has continued to be of much support to our hospital both financially and otherwise. They are continually striving to stimulate interest in our hospital. It is no exaggeration to state that many institutions would have been unable to carry out certain necessary and essential services to humanity without the whole-hearted support of their respective auxiliaries. As a result, our White Cross Auxiliary has become firmly entrenched in our institution. They are to be commended for their accomplishment during the past year.

The installation of a Deep Therapy Unit is now in process and should be ready for use within the very near future. There is no other Deep Therapy unit in the Alton area, and it will definitely fill a need for the treatment of various ills heretofore sent to St. Louis for treatment.

I have only begun my task here at Alton Memorial Hospital and have given one year of service. I want to express my sincere appreciation and thanks for the splendid and loyal support which has been given me by the members of our Board of Directors, more especially the members of the executive committee. In my attempt to meet the responsibilities of my new task, I have found those familiar with the work ready to assist to the very best of their abilities. I like to look upon my hospital as home. The happy homes are those in which there is full cooperation from all its members of the family, where budgets are joint responsibilities, and changes are the result of family consultation. A hospital that operates in this manner will succeed in its mission of providing good care to all who enter its doors.

At this time, I want to also express my appreciation to the members of the Office of the Executive Secretary of the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Methodist Church in Chicago for their untiring efforts to be of service to myself and to Alton Memorial Hospital. Their wise counsel has been invaluable to me, and without this source of inspiration and guidance, the functioning of my position would have been most difficult.

In closing, I would like to repeat the last paragraph of my address given at our Cincinnati Convention. Quote: The community hospital of today is serving a vital need and needs the support and cooperation of all churches. If human institutions and divine ordinances are to endure, the church must not fail us in this work of ours. Close Quote.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM, SOUTHERN ILLINOIS CONFERENCE Year 1947-1948

Condensed from Auditor's Statement—April 27, 1948. C. J. Schlosser and Company, Certified Public Accountants.

THE RISING TIDE AND GROWING CONCERN

The radical rising tide of godlessness must be offset by a rising tide of radical gospel preaching and living. The General Conference approval of a great program of evangelism for this new quadrennium indicates the current interest in winning converts to Christ and retaining those converts we have already won. Men's hearts are failing because of fear. We have

the gospel of perfect love which casteth out fear. Therefore, let us with renewed evangelistic zeal forward a program in Southern Illinois which will stand the test of the stewardship of souls.

Programs which are ahead for us include: Visitation Schools of Evangelism, Spiritual retreats for laymen and pastors, city-wide, district-wide and County-wide Simultaneous Revivals, organization of new churches, reaching inactive members and training courses for pastors.

THE EVANGELISTIC CALENDAR

Evangelistic Lecturer—Pastors School—June 21-24—Dr. John H. Chitwood, pastor of McCoy Memorial Methodist Church, Birmingham, Alabama.

Fifth Annual Evangelistic Convention—November 15-16—First Church, East St. Louis. Speakers: Dr. Harry Denman, Dr. John Church, Dr. Paul Rees, Dr. Harry E. Jessop.

A Ministers Workshop—is to be conducted in cooperation with other Boards in helping pastors in practical methods of evangelism. All pastors who have served less than ten years in the ministry will have expenses paid. Date to be announced.

District-wide Simultaneous Revival: It is the Board's program to concentrate in one district each year in a district wide revival until all four districts have been assisted. This fall the work will begin in the East St. Louis District.

Missionary Evangelism: This phase of our calendar is on a year round basis. We plan for our workers in this area to be at the disposal of churches which cannot afford to hire a specialist in evangelism but which have definite needs. Calls for services in this field shall be made to the District Superintendent who will clear the schedule through the Conference Secretary of Evangelism.

STANDARDS FOR APPROVED EVANGELISTS

Sending the need for qualifications for those who are recommended by the Board of Evangelism to do the work of a full time evangelist our Board in a recent meeting voted to set the following standards:

- 1. The approved evangelist must be a member of the Southern Illinois Conference.
- 2. He will be responsible to the Board of Evangelism of the Southern Illinois Conference for the approval of his methods in holding revivals.
- 3. He must give his time exclusively to the work of evangelism, preferably to our own Annual Conference, but after which he has the consent of the Board of Evangelism to work elsewhere.
- 4. All applicants must appear in person before the Conference Board of Evangelism to make request for recommendation as approved evangelist. The request must be in the hands of the Chairman of the Board of Evangelism sixty days before Annual Conference convenes.
- 5. Each evangelist shall make a semi-annual report in duplicate to the Chairman of the Board of Evangelism and the district superintendent in whose district he resides. This report shall be sent on December 1st, and May 1st.

Failure to make this report will result in the evangelist being called before the Board of Evangelism to give reason for not making his report.

6. The financial support of the evangelist shall be agreed upon by the

pastor, the Church and the Evangelist prior to each series of evangelistic meetings. Any exhibition of a mercenary motive hurtful to the Church, shall be sufficient grounds for withdrawing the approval of the Conference Board of Evangelism toward the evangelist.

- 7. Each persons who desires to be recommended for the work of an approved evangelist must have sufficient pastoral experience before being accepted.
- 8. Any missionary evangelist under the full time employment of the Conference Board of Evangelism shall pay the same rate to the Conference Claimants as those serving in other Conference Institutions. Approved evangelists shall pay the same rate as District Superintendents and College Professors and all others under special appointment.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPROVED EVANGELISTS

- 1. We recommend the appointment of E. O. Allen and one other worker who will be appointed after consultation with the cabinet, to specialize in rural evangelism, as missionary evangelists under the direction of the Board of Evangelism. All calls for their services shall be made to the District Superintendents who in turn will clear their schedules through the Conference Secretary of Evangelism.
- 2. We recommend as approved evangelists: E. C. Chastain, E. O. Hobbs, Herbert R. Bennett.

THE EVANGELISTIC PROGRAM FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH

- 1. At least a 10% increase in membership in each Church on confession of faith this year. This should be the minimum goal.
- Each Sunday School is urged to have a "Decision Day" before which the teachers shall be adequately instructed in leading their pupils to acknowledge Christ.
- 3. Visitation Evangelism should be a continuing experience in each Church. We propose that a week of visitation be set aside in the fall and another several weeks before Easter. In addition to this one night a week should find the pastor and his laymen calling on prospect assignments.
- 4. A Family Altar Crusade is suggested for this year. Order enough Upper Rooms for each family in the Church. Arrange a Morning Service for the establishment of family altars. Introduce ways of family worship by means of the Upper Room.
- 5. Public Evangelism for a two or three weeks period during which the great Christian doctrines of repentance, conversion, growth in grace, the baptism with the Holy Spirit, and Christian service are preached will prove a great boon to the spiritual growth of every congregation. We challenge every pastor to make plans early for such a series of evangelistic meetings.
- 6. The local Church Committee on Membership and Evangelism should be assigned a three-fold responsibility, (1) winning new members to Christ and the Church, (2) reclaiming inactive members and (3) assimilating new members.
- 7. The Mid-week Service should be carefully planned in order to arrive at the highest spiritual potential. Some one has said, "The attendance at Morning Worship indicates the popularity of the Church, the attendance at Evening Worship reveals the popularity of the pastor, but the attendance at the Mid-week Prayer Service discloses the popularity of Jesus Christ." Is Christ popular in your Church?

8. Youth Evangelism lays claim to the hearts of all pastors. We encourage each Church to present a "Youth Evangelism Week" this fall sponsored for the youth.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

1. We are asking every local Church to receive a free will offering during the year for our work and send it to the Conference Treasurer, E. W. Barrett. If some of the churches prefer they may place the Board in their budget rather than receive the offering. This money is used largely for our Missionary Evangelism.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY-EVANGELIST E. O. ALLEN

Another year has come and gone.

We have given of our selves and talents to the Lord in trying to serve our fellow man.

The more we do, the more we see that needs to be done, for truly the harvest is ripe.

This past year found us doing our best in this needy missionary field of the Southern Illinois Conference.

We gave a couple months in the beginning of the year to the New Church in Washington Park, East St. Louis. We raised about \$4600 in cash and pledges. Helped them excavate the basement and get started with their new building.

We have checked with them through the year and now the first floor of building is nearing completion, which is valued at \$9000.

Several revivals conducted in our small rural churches, two of which were outstanding. The Logan Church that was on the Thompsonville charge had been left without a pastor, was given a three weeks revival with results of a complete reorganization, 21 conversions, and their pastor, Rev. Paul Ragsdale is carrying on.

The church at Cypress was given three weeks with 19 conversions, and the church taking on new life.

Much of our time has been taken in survey work in new fields. The Herrin Survey in the Egyptian Hight revealed about 300 Methodist which need further attention.

About 500 house calls have been made.

Only \$334.75 raised for the Board of Evangelism since most of our time has been in places where no offering was taken.

We are seeing more and more the bigness of this field and praying that our Conference will provide in a large way a Home Missionary fund to take care of the many things in connection with this worthy work which is under the direction of the Board of Evangelism.

Every great spiritual reformation in history has been dominated by the four essentials of evangelism; Christian education, personal visitation, the ministry of music, and preaching. It is our desire that these four fundamentals shall prevail in our work.

During this nine month Conference we have conducted 13 two week revivals, held 65 children's services with an average attendance of 150, presided in 80 youth meetings, preached 260 times and presented numerous sacred concerts.

We have received \$3,165 for our services.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF THE COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The cultivation work for the improvement of the Rural Church and its leadership continues. The most important step in the foundation for this Commission has been the organization of the Rural Life Fellowship. This National organization with its charter and by-laws is strictly for the rural pastor and his rural system.

We recognize the need for a more adequate leadership in the Rural Church and Community, and we believe the church should minister to the total life of all our people all the time. Therefore the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work in its capacity as an advisory commission to Conference Agencies and to the Conference, presents the following recommendations for adoption by this Conference:

- 1. We recommend that a Rural Leadership Institute be held during the Conference year, 1948-1949.
 - a. We recommend that this Institute shall be planned and carried through by the Conference Board of Education and the Conference Board of Missions, together with the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work. Each Board and the Commission shall appoint three (3) persons to serve on a joint committee. The ex-officio members shall be the Chairman of the Conference Board of Missions, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, and a representative of the Cabinet to be selected by the Cabinet.

b. All matters of policy and program shall be determined by this joint committee.

- c. We recommend that this committee shall broaden the scope of the program to include other areas of rural interest and activity.
- d. We recommend that this committee shall be set up on or before July 1, 1948, and that the Secretary of the Town and Country Committee shall convene the committee.
- That a news bulletin be sent at least quarterly to pastors and men on the Town and Country Commission by the Secretary of the Town and Country Commission.
- 3. That Special emphasis be placed upon stewardship and that cooperation be given in the presentation of the Lord's Acre Plan by DuMont Clark, May-June, 1948. Wherever possible we urge that this plan be put into practice.
- 4. That Rural Life Sunday be observed with an exchange of pulpits between City Churches and the Town and Country Churches, so that the entire Church may be more conscious of the problems and opportunities in the rural community. Responsibility for this observance shall be given to the Methodist Rural Fellowship in each District in cooperation with the District Superintendent and representative City pastors.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

To the Southern Illinois Conference convening at Murphysboro, Illinois, May 26th to May 30th, 1948

The Lay Delegate Conference was held on Friday afternoon, May 28th, 1948. A report from each of the District Lay Leaders, Frances Watson from East St. Louis District, Dr. S. E. Dudley from the Harrisburg District, Roy V. Jordan from the Carbondale district, and Virgil Duncan from the Olney District was read and appreciated very much by the Delegates as they went into much detail of the activities in each of their Districts, showing by definite action that our work covers all phases of the entire church program.

These reports were complimented on very highly by our executive Secretary of the Board of Lay Activities of our Chicago office, Dr. George L. Morelock, and I want to say that I, as Conference Lay Leader appreciate very deeply the works and efforts that these District Lay Leaders have done the past year. Probably the outstanding work was our Men's Rally given by each District the early part of May. After their reports were given the question was asked each District Lay Leader, "What percent of the Pastors actively supported the program of Lay Activities." Olney District reported 10 to 20 percent—Carbondale District 25 per cent—Harrisburg District 25 per cent and East St. Louis District 75 per cent. An encouraging part of the East St. Louis District has been in active service

for about nine years. The other three Districts, none of them more than three.

The following motions were put before the Conference and voted.

The question was asked, "How many delegates were familiar with the program laid out by the Board of Lay Activities in the Methodist Discipline. About 15 per cent had ever read it.

The question was asked how many had read the Conference Journal. About one-half.

A motion was made by Dr. McCracken of Greenville, Ill., seconded and carried, that attention be called to both Pastor and Laymen that they should be better informed on these two sources of information.

A motion was made by J. E. Stein, seconded by Mr. Williams, and carried that we recommend to the charge churches that they send their ministers to the college of Christian life held at Urbana, July 19 to 23, 1948, and that the charge church pay a portion or all of their expenses.

A motion made by John Boyd, seconded by Dewey Bresell, and carried, that some action be taken to avoid so many collections taken up at our Annual Conference. We suggest that the expense be estimated before the Annual Conference, and then pro-rated on the basis of the Pastor's salary.

A motion made by J. H. Davis, seconded by S. E. Dudley, and carried, that we push subscriptions to the Christian Advocate, the Methodist Laymen and the Upper Room.

Motion made by Chas. Stout, seconded by J. H. Davis, and carried, that we go on record as favoring Visual Education in each charge church. This carried with only 2 negative votes.

Moved by Mr. Mohlenbrock, seconded by R. Ackerman, that we continue our annual Laymen's District Rallies. This was carried unanimously, very enthusiastically.

Frank Ledbetter, Carterville, Illinois, spoke in regard to Radio broadatof parts of the program of the Annual Conference. Mr. Ledbetter made a motion that the Laymen underwrite or raise funds and arrange to broadcast daily services of the Conference sessions. The Conference inspirational address and the news of the Conference. Seconded by Herschel French, from Mills Shoals. This carried unanimously.

A committee appointed to make investigations and possibilities of this program were Frank Ledbetter and the four District Lay Leaders.

The Wesleyan Foundation asked our Board to elect two representatives to that Foundation. Dr. D. D. Monroe of Alton, Ill., and John Harmon, Lebanan, Ill., were named and unanimously elected.

Meeting adjourned to reconvene at a banquet at 6 o'clock.

As your Conference Lay Leader, I definitely urge the ministers of the Conference to study the program as outlined in the Discipline by the General Board of Lay Activities, and with a very close cooperation with your District Lay Leader, your Associate Lay Leader, and your Charge Lay Leader, and carry out this program in your church.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION OF WORLD PEACE

Christian people are vitally interested in the cause of World Peace during these troubled days. However, they are finding it very difficult to think soundly and act wisely. The greatest danger that they face is the temptation to follow unChristian forces, largely because we fail to define and commend to them Christ's program to permanent peace.

Our world needs to have a will to peace, that nothing can shake. To establish this attitude, we suggest that each local church request its standing committee on World Peace to study the position of our Church on this subject, as it was outlined by the recent General Conference.

We commend the Harrisburg District for its recent peace Seminars held at Harrisburg and McLeansboro, in which Dr. Carl Soule of the General Commission on World Peace forcefully and clearly presented the international picture. As a result of these gatherings several churches have set up new committees on peace. Christians must become more peace conscious. We sincerely hope that our people will become aroused to a cause, for which almost 300,000 young Americans gave their lives—to establish a way of peace and goodwill.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

WHEREAS, we are living in an age when great masses of American people, as well as the peoples of the world, have sold their birth-right, not only for a mess of pottage, but a glass of liquor. Alcohol beverage is the greatest menace to society today. It is a militant foe that used its power to rob men and women of their reason. It causes the murderer to take up his deadly weapon, and the parent to spend his wages for strong drink, while his children cry for food.

Alcohol is a foe that causes the wife and children of the drunkard to hide in terror upon his return to his impoverished home, and the drinking workman to lose his skill. When the drink demon is taken into the body of the driver of a high powered automobile, it not only jeopardizes his life, the lives of those in his car, but the lives of all those whom he meets or passes on the highway.

WHEREAS, in the face of the declaration of the United Nations Food Organization that the world supplies of bread cereals are at least ten million tons short of the amount needed to maintain even the present meager allowance in many lands, and in face of the further fact that millions of persons, in many parts of the globe, are suffering from hunger, and threatened with actual starvation during the coming winter, the breweries, distilleries and wineries of the United States have been permitted to consume foodstuffs in the manufacture of intoxicating liquors to the rate of four millions of tons annually.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Methodist Church is and will ever remain a deadly foe against beverage alcohol.

FURTHERMORE, we believe that the liquor traffic is a moral issue, and no Christian can cast his lot in favor of it directly or indirectly without committing sin.

We Christians deplore the fact that the major political parties have evaded their moral responsibility in their failure to make any pronouncement on the liquor question.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that it is the duty of the church and every Christian to continue a policy of education, and be militantly alert in the passing and enforcing of state and local legislation for the abatement of the liquor traffic.

We urge a complete temperance educational program in our church schools, in our Methodist homes. We further urge that our minister preach a temperance sermon at least annually from their pulpits.

FURTHERMORE, we heartily commend the action of our General Board of Temperance in urging our church school pulpits, and in getting many signers to the temperance pledge. We also commend the work of the Anti-Saloon League, the W. C. T. U. and other such approved Temperance agencies for their fine work.

We further urge local option elections wherever and whenever possible. We urge the State Legislature at Springfield to enlarge local option units so as to include townships and counties in such elections. We urge the President of the United States, the Congress, and enforcement officers everywhere to exercise their power against the use of beverage alcohol, and remove its blighting presence from any training camps where any American Youth are stationed, and to defend the ideals of our Christian way of life.

Finally may the day hasten when they will transform the breweries into respectable, useful, and worthwhile factories, and the ripened grains, and the luscious juicy fruits will be used to feed the hungry millions of the earth.

We request that a copy be sent to our State Representatives, to our Copyressmen, and to the United States Senators, and to the President of the United States.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Southern Illinois Conference For the Year 1948-1949

Out of the desperate need of the World comes the challenging and impelling opportunity for Kingdom building. "For Christ and His Church," is the theme of our new quadrennium program, and with this thought in mind, we, the World Service and Finance Commission, composed of the following members: Pastors: E. M. Dycus, Chairman; Heber E. Burge, Secretary; M. B. Van Leer, Virgil W. Corrie, W. Clyde Bruce; (Laymen) J. R. Collins, Virgil Duncan, Floyd Bracy, Floyd Miller, Harvey Nooner, and C. L. Edwards, wish to present to the Tenth Session of the Southern Illinois Conference of the Methodist Church the following recommendations for its consideration:

The General Conference voted to increase World Service asking over the 1944-8 apportionment by thirty-three and one-third percent, $(33\,1/3\%)$. Since we have surpassed our asking for the last three years, the Commission recommends that we increase our asking for World Service and Conference Benevolence by 10% over the asking of 1947-8.

- The apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences shall be \$176,146 to be divided 50% or \$88,073 for World Service, and 50% or \$88,073 for Annual Conference Benevolences.
- 2. The Claims to be paid from Annual Conference Benevolences shall be as follows:
 - a. 21% to McKendree College.
 - b. 21% to the Orphans' and Children's Home.
 - c. 21% to the Old Folks' Home.
 - d. 8% to the Hospital Service Fund.
 - e. 8% to the Conference Board of Evangelism.
 - f. 9% for Conference Missions, to be administered as approved by the Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension.
 - g. 12% for fixed sum distribution as ordered by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Items included in the fixed sum distribution by order of the Commission are as follows:

- (1) \$2,200 For Conference Treasurers Salary.
- (2) \$ 300 For Conference Treasurers Office Rent.
- (3) \$ 750 For expense and promotion by the Conference Missionary Secretary. (Not to exceed).

(4) \$ 500 For the Pastors Summer School at Lebanon.

(Not to exceed).

\$ 600 For Christian Student Foundation at Carbondale. We recommend that a thorough study be made to determine whether or not our students might be served more efficientally by placing a full time student worker there in connection with our churches.

(6)

\$ 600 For Wesley Foundation at Urbana. \$ 450 For Town and Country Work. We recommend that a study be made of the work of Board of Evangelism, The Board of Missions and Church Extension, and the Commission on Town and Country Work to discover if their work could be coordinated to a better advantage.

\$ 260 For Staff Members at Conference. \$10.00 each.

Retroactive for 1948.

\$ 100 For Conference Secretary's expense. (1948-9).

(10) \$ 150 For Illinois Church Council. (11) \$ 50 For expense of Chairman

50 For expense of Chairman of Conference Commission

on World Peace. (Not to exceed).

- The remainder of the fixed sum of 12% of Annual Conference Benevolences may be used for expense and equipment for offices of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Conference, and for miscellaneous and emergency expense, as approved by the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 4. The Booth Festival Cash and Supplies are free-will offerings and do not apply on the apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences. The amount received for Booth Festival Cash shall be divided equally to the following institutions: McKendree College; Orphans' and Children's Home; The Old Folks' Home. The Thanksgiving offering, Christmas offering, February McKendree offering and Mother's Day offering shall be placed in the World Service and Annual Conference Benevolences.
- 5. The salary of each District Superintendent shall be set at \$4,500. Each Superintendent shall be allowed \$50,00 per month for house rent; Also not to exceed \$1800 for travel and office expense, for which they are to present a monthly itemized voucher to the Conference Treasurer. We recommend all automobile travel expense be fixed uniformly at six cents per mile.

A new District Superintendent's first moving expense from his charge to the district will be paid not to exceed \$75.00. This is not a part of his expense account.

- 6. For special opportunity, November will be for the Old Folks' Home. December for the Orphans' and Children's Home. February for McKendree College. May for the Hospital Service Fund. But the offerings shall be a part of World Service and Conference Benevolences.
- 7. Holden Hospital. We recommend the suggested new program for Holden Hospital, but we caution those in charge against the inauguration of the campaign so as to conflict with the "Million For McKendree" drive. Also that the cultivation be centered in the Carbondale area.
- 8. On the basis of the pastor's cash salary, the Commission recommends the following apportionments:

a. District Superintendent6% The Administration Fund to be allocated as follows:

Area expense 1/2 of 1%. (1) Journal Fund ¼ of 1%. (2)

(3) Pastor's School Fund 1/4 of 1%.

- (4) General Conference Expense Fund 1%.
- (5) Conference Board of Education 1%.
- 1% of the Pastor's cash salary to be paid by the pastor, himself, to the Conference Claimants Society.
- 10. That Robert Davis, C. P. A. Robinson, Illinois, be employed to audit books of all institutions, boards, commissions, and treasurers of the Southern Illinois Conference, except those institutions, boards or agencies who have a C. P. A. audit, and the findings of such audit be published in the Journal. (see Paragraph 722 of 1944 Discipline). Each institution, board, commission or treasurer to be responsible for the expense of their own audit.
- 11. That each District Superintendent apportion to the churches for World Service and Annual Conference Benevolences.
 - 12. That the following banks be authorized for Conference money:

Citizen's National at Albion; St. Clair National Bank at Belleville; First National at Litchfield; First National at Mt. Vernon; Old National at Centralia; First National and Trust Co. at Alton; Carbondale National at Carbondale; First National at Kinmundy; Bank of Marion at Marion; Harrisburg National at Harrisburg; People's National Bank at Lawrenceville; Salem National at Salem; Lawrenceville National Bank and Trust Co. at Lawrenceville; First National Bank at Bridgeport; First National at Lebanon.

- 13. We recommend that an offering be taken in each church on Veterans Day, to be sent to the Conference Claimants Society to be used for the benefit of the retired ministers of the Southern Illinois Conference, their widows and dependent children.
- 14. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be made the depository for funds for:

The Board of Evangelism

The Publishing Commission

The Pastor's School

The Conference Missionary Secretary
The Conference Secretary of the Commission for Town and Country Work

The Hospital and Service Fund

The Secretary of each of the above Boards, Commissions, or Secretary to requisition the Conference Treasurer for funds as needed.

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE

- 1. When any member of the Conference intends to object to the passage of the character of any member, he shall hand the name of such member to the President, who shall pass the name by and direct the case to be investigated.
- 2. When any one of our members is called from earth, it shall be the duty of the nearest pastor or district superintendent of the district to notify all the preachers in the district of such death and of the time set for the funeral service.
- 3. At each Annual Session of the Conference a publisher shall be elected to publish the Minutes of the next Annual Session of the Conference in the Journal and Year Book of the Conference, who shall be authorized to make arrangements and enter into contract for the publication in advance of the session.
- 4. The district superintendent of the district and the preacher in charge of the station where the Conference is to be held, together with the presidents of the several Conference societies, are instructed to arrange the program of religious exercises and, if practicable, secure their publication in the Christian Advocate.
- The Board of Conference Claimants shall consist of six ministerial members of the Conference, each of whom shall serve three years, two being elected at each annual session of the Conference. The Conference shall add two lay members of the Conference to this Board, which members shall be elected annually. The Board shall organize each year by electing a president, secretary, and treasurer, whose names shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book.
- When the names of candidates for admission on trial or for orders are called, they shall, if present, be called forward and introduced to the Conference.
- 7. All candidates for recognition of orders shall, unless excused by vote of the Conference, be examined in the same manner as candidates for ordination, and the Committee on Conference Relation shall inquire into the character and fitness for the traveling connection of each candidate for admission on trial, for admission into full connection, or for readmission

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

into the Conference, and all persons desiring a change of relation or any special appointment, except those taking the retired relation on reaching the age of voluntary retirement.

- 8. The Statistical Secretary and Conference Treasurer shall complete their work and compare their reports, and be ready to report to the Conference not later than the opening of the session of Friday morning.
- 9. No person in the second year's course of study shall be placed on the Statistician's or Treasurer's force.
- 10. The Stewards are authorized to take annually from the pro-rata due the claimants from The Book Concern a sum according to their discretion, not to exceed 10 per cent of their indebtedness to The Book Concern, until it shall be paid in full.
- 11. All reports of committees and resolutions shall be handed to the Secretary in duplicate.
- 12. No person shall have his orders recognized who comes from a church that requires a lower standard of literary qualifications than The Methodist Church, without passing an examination with us.
- 13. To admit on trial any candidate who is over thirty-five years of age, it shall require a two-thirds vote of all members present and voting, provided the two-thirds equal a majority of all members of the Conference.
- 14. We will recommend for admission into the Conference only those who are qualified and who propose to undertake regular pastoral work.
- 15. The plan for entertaining Annual Conference Session shall be as follows:
- Sec. 1. The entertaining church shall provide lodging and breakfast for all ministerial members of the Conference, and their wives but not for any child or children; provided request for such entertainment is filed with the entertaining Church Committee on Entertainment at least seven days preceding the opening day of the Conference; except in the case of the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference and their respective Staffs of Assistants, whose entertainment on the same basis as above indicated shall begin as of Monday evening of Conference Week, rather than as of Wednesday evening as provided for in the case of all other Ministerial Members of the Conference and their wives; provided that the Statistician and the Treasurer of the Conference shall file with such Entertainment Committee, their names and the names of their Assistants at least seven days prior to the opening day of the Conference. If such notification shall not have been made according to the foregoing such Officers of the Conference and their Staffs of Assistants shall bear their own expenses and entertainment for Monday and Tuesday of Conference week, following which their entertainment shall be as provided for on the same basis as that affecting other Ministerial Members of the Conference.
- Sec. 2. Conference Claimants and their wives, and widows of deceased ministers, shall be given full entertainment: provided that this provision shall not obtain for superannuates serving a charge. All such ministers shall come under the same provisions as those affecting ministers provided for in Sec. 1.
- Sec. 3. Lay members of the Conference shall bear their own expense. We recommend that the church or churches represented by such lay members of the Conference shall provide for such member's expenses.
- Sec. 4. The entertaining Church will be expected to secure room and breakfast at a reasonable rate for those who bear their own expenses, and to see that noon and evening meals may be obtained at usual prices.

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

- Sec. 5. If and when it shall appear that no invitation is forthcoming from the charges for the holding of the succeeding Annual Session of the Conference, the responsibility of arranging for and fixing the place of holding of such Annual Session of the Conference shall revert to the resident Bishop of the Area, and the District Superintendents of the Conference.
- 16. All members of the Conference under appointment as Conference Evangelists shall file with the Secretary of the Conference an annual report of their work of the past year, stating the number of revival meetings held, together with the name of the place of holding of such meetings, indicating the number of professed conversions, reclamations, and accessions to the membership of the churches. Such reports to be filed in typewritten form, double-spaced, and in duplicate, for inclusion in the printed Journal and Year Book of the Conference.
- 17. The reports of all pastors to the Annual Conference shall be mailed or sent to the Conference Treasurer on or before Wednesday next prior to the Monday of Conference Week, addressed to the Conference Treasurer at his home address. In the absence of the receipt of such reports by the time indicated, the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer shall be authorized to use the reports of the previous year from the charges so affected in compiling their reports to the Conference, and the names of all such delinquent charges and their pastors shall be published in the Conference Journal and Year Book for the year of such delinquency.
- 18. On the first day of the Conference, at the hour following the Communion Service, a memorial shall be held for the ministers and ministers' wives who have died during the year. The Bishop shall appoint someone to deliver the address, and also an alternate.
- 19. Any minister of the Conference desiring to be absent from any session or sessions of the Conference, shall report his desire to his District Superintendent who, if such excuse is granted, shall, in turn, report the names of such ministers so excused to the Secretary of the Conference, indicating the session or sessions of the Conference for which such excuse is granted. The Secretary of the Conference shall record the action in the Journal of Daily Proceedings.
- 20. Beginning October 1, 1938, Institutions employing a Conference member shall be required to pay annually into the Conference Claimants' Fund an amount equal to the disciplinary rate as stated in Paragraph 952, section 5.
- 21. The gold headed cane bequeathed to the Southern Illinois Conference by Dr. J. A. Scaritt shall be loaned to the man, residing within the bounds of the Conference, who has been a member of the Conference for the longest term of years. It shall be returned to the Conference on his death or earlier at his election. If the member to whom the cane shall have been loaned shall remove from the territory of the Conference the cane shall be returned and loaned to the next one in line.

In case two or more members shall have the same number of years of membership, then the cane shall be loaned to the older or oldest of this number.

22. The Conference Secretary and the publisher of the Journal and Year Book of the Conference shall edit the Minutes of each session of the Conference before the same are printed. The printed Minutes of the Conference shall be the official record of the Conference.

The publishers of the Journal and Year Book of the Conference shall furnish one copy of the Journal and Year Book, without cost, to each

STANDING RULES OF CONFERENCE (Continued)

retired minister of the Conference, and to each widow of deceased members of the Conference.

- 23. All members of the Conference, together with all Accepted Supply Pastors of the Conference shall, immediately following the close of the Annual Session of the Conference, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing, of his or her correct mailing address, and shall, in the event of ad interim changes of such address, notify the Secretary of the Conference, in writing of such change and of their new mailing address. The addresses so provided shall be published annually in the Conference Journal and Year Book, and the Secretary shall, at all times maintain a corrected list of all such ministers in his files for reference.
- 24. It shall require the vote of two-thirds of those present and voting to change or suspend any of these rules, except the rule determining the admission on trial in the Conference of any Candidate who has passed his thirty-fifth birthday, which rule has its own provisions.
- 25. Official Program. The Printed program, subject to necessary changes, shall be the official program of the Conference.
- 26. Official Records. The Minutes kept by the Secretary of the Conference when approved by the Committee on Daily Journal, shall be the Official Record of the Conference.
- 27. Assistants. The Assistants to the Secretary, the Statisticians, and the Treasurer of the Conference shall when named by such Officers, be considered elected.
- 28. All matters not pertaining to the regular business of this Conference shall be referred to the Committee on General Reference and Procedure.
- 29. Should any omissions in the Disciplinary Questions, or oversight of any necessary matter for the completion of the Work of this Conference occur, the same shall be referred to the Conference Secretary and the District Superintendents for adjustment.
- 30. The roll call shall be taken by all present signing the slips prepared for that purpose and presenting them to the Secretaries.
- 31. All members of the Conference desiring to have their vote recorded shall be within the bar of the Conference at the time the vote is received, providing that such members as may be working on the staffs of the Statistician or Treasurer may be privileged to file absentee vote with the Secretary of the Conference.
- 32. All announcements must be in writing and given to the Conference Secretary for reading.
- 33. Motions on the floor of the conference must be given to the Secretary in writing for the purpose of accuracy.
- 34. All material for the Journal shall be filed with the Secretary in duplicate, double-spaced, and type-written at the time of their presentation or immediately following the session in which they are presented. Materials that are not in the hands of the Secretary within five days following the adjournment of Conference may be excluded from the Journal.
- 35. All nominations for Boards, Commissions, and Committees in the Conference, not provided for through regular Disciplinary provisions, be referred to the Committee on Committees.
