The Shelby Association met with Bethesda church on Wednes-

day, the 10th day of September, 1890.

The Moderator read the 84th Psalm and devotional exercises were engaged in for about thirty minutes, consisting of singing and prayers.

face?"

After an intermission of one hour, for dinner, the Association convened.

Rev. H. C. Taul represented the Board of Bible and Colportage Work by offering a resolution which, after some amendments and discussion by H. C. Taul, R. H. Pratt, W. C. Cleveland, L. P. Arnold, Henry Cabaniss, J. M. Crenshaw and C. W. O'Hara, was adopted.

Resolved, That this Association request Bro. F. M. Woods to act as colporter in our bounds, and recommend him to the Board at Opelika and to the brethren wherever he may go in his work. And that we raise \$25.00 to be used in securing books and tracts necessary for this enterprise. And that the colporter travel and sell books, tracts, &c., so far as the commissions on the same will justify him. And that all pastors be requested to correspond with him patifying him of the number of books and tracts needed. pond with him, notifying him of the number of books and tracts needed, and that Bro. Wood thus supply destitution in literature through the pastors.

Took up collection for the above, amounting to \$25.00. On motion, fixed the time of meeting and adjourning. Meet at 9 a. m., adjourn at 12 m.; meet at 1 p. m., adjourn at 4 p. m.

Took up a collection for the benefit of Hopewell church, amounting to \$3.35. After prayer by Bro. Abner Williams, adjourned.

### SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, Sept. 11.

Association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayers by C. W. O'Hara and W. S. Henderson.

Minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

Report on Family Religion was read and discussed by C. W. O'Hara and W. S. Henderson.

### REPORT ON FAMILY RELIGION.

We, your committee on Family Religion, ask permission to submit the following: We think, to make a full and concise report on family religion, an impractical idea. We know of no plan by which we might know the amount of religious piety that exists in our bounds. We believe there is a creditable amount of religious influence in our Association, but the extent thereof we cannot tell. It may be suggested that we could determine, by inquiring how many hold family prayer. But that would not be sufficient, for Christ said, of those who hold prayer three times a day, that except righteousness exceeded such, we could in no case enter the kingdom.

We wish to offer this concluding suggestion: That religious piety should engage our most sincerc attention, and that if we (by the help of God) can wield an undisputed religious influence over those around us, our religious effort in life will be a happy success.

Report on Education was read. Prof. S. W. Averett, president of the Judson Female Institute, being present, was recognized in his official capacity. He then favored the Association with an address pertaining to the Judson, and the subject of general education, endeavoring to press upon the hearts of parents the great importance of educating their boys and girls. After some further discussion the report was adopted.

### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Never in the history of our government has the cause of Education been more encourageing than at present. New school houses are being built throughout the country, and the demand for educated men and women was never greater than now, and the increased appropriation of one hundred thousand dollars to the common school fund places a common school education within the reach of almost every child in the State. We recommend in the selection of teachers that great care be taken in securing earnest, Christian teachers, for intellectual culture without the moral training is Christian teachers, for intellectual culture without the moral training is ruinous and pernicious in its tendency; this fact is attested by the history of nations as well as individuals. We heartily recommend the Howard College and the Judson Institute to those having boys and girls whom they desire to give a collegiate education. These institutions are doing a grand work in upbuilding the great educational interest of the country, and are justly the pride of the Baptists of Alabama.

### MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We deem it to be the duty of a church, upon whom the Lord has bestowed the gift, to exercise great care to determine whether the young man is worthy of this "high calling;" and then the responsibility of church and pastor does not cease, until they have done all that can be done to develop this

gift.

The education of a Baptist Christian ministry for the coming generation is at once the most sublime and profitable of all the agencies for the propagation of Baptist principles. Education will never impair but will always im-

prove the right man.

Our Board of Ministerial Education at Montgomery afford us the means by which a young man can secure the cheapest and most thorough educa-tion that can be obtained. We recommend that contributions be taken regularly for this purpose and forwarded to the Board, and then reported by voucher to the Association.

Adjourned for one hour.

### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Association met. Prayer by S. P. Lindsey.

Report on Periodicals was read, and, on motion, Bro. S. P. Lindsey was recognized as the representative of the Alabama Paptist and invited to address the Association in the interest of the same.

Distributed the State Mission Quarterly.

Reports on State, Home and Foreign Missions were read.

Report on State Missions was amended. The general subject of missions was then discussed by R. H. Pratt, W. S. Henderson, Abner Williams, J. D. Martin, W. C. Cleveland, F. M. Woods and Charles Johnson,

A collection was taken for Missions, amounting to \$24.00. On motion, this amount was divided equally between State, Home and Foreign Missions.

The reports were then adopted:

### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The State Mission Board, located at Selma, is thoroughly organized for the accomplishment of its purposes, and during the past year has done gratifying work in supplying the gospel at home.

The most effective means for securing the Word of God for the heathen nations is to develop the resources awakened by its power at home. The spirit of giving to the Master's cause in proportion to its needs, is found only where His divine grace has been planted in the hearts of the people, and the

means he has given them are properly used.

In the older towns and cities of the State where large population has obtained by steady growth, the Word of God is preached and the people respond to its demands. But never in the history of Alabama has the State Mission Board been so taxed to supply the demands made upon it as now. The large towns that are springing into life where new railroad and commercial enterprises are being pushed, bring into the State hundreds of people whose religious character is undetermined, yet who will be live factors in the progress of our material wealth. If they are promptly offered the means of salvation, what a powerful addition they may become to God's cause! Small communities long undisturbed are contributing to the population of these new towns, and are left in a weakened condition, and need outside assistance from this board; and the board is cognizant of this fact.

In pursuance of its plans it constituted during the past year 14 churches, organized 54 Sunday-schools, and 10 ladies' mission societies; it held 869 prayer meetings, commenced the erection of 16 meeting houses and finished five; it visited 581 churches, and reports 132 preaching stations without

churches.

Let us repond to its calls, and by generous contributions, regularly taken, render still more effective its good work in diffusing the gospel "unto the salvation of men."

### AMENDMENTS.

1st. Resolved, That this Association endeavor to raise 33 cents per member, as suggested by the State Mission Board, for all the objects fostered by the denomination, and that we co-operate with the State Mission Board 2nd. Resolved, That this Association recommend the churches in our

bounds to take collections for missions quarterly, and forward the same to Bro. Howard Griggs, Treasurer of the Association, to be by him applied to such objects as may be indicated by the church.

### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Association, it ought to be regarded a privilege as well as a duty, on the part of stronger churches, to aid weaker ones in the regions around them, attempting to occupy centers

population, in getting foothold and maintaining the worship of God.

2. Resolved, That where other services can not be maintained in centers of population, it is a good policy for enterprising brethren to organize Sunday-schools, which have often, under such circumstances, proved the germ

of churches.

3. Resolved, That State Mission Boards, within their respective States, have done a good work in looking out larger centers of population, and ap-

pointing ministers to occupy them.

4. Resolved, That still larger centers like New Orleans, Savannah, Memphis and other like places, presenting great destitution, are the appropriate field of her Home Mission Board. And that all these departments of mission work, as the best our brethren collectively have been able to devise, deserve our interest, prayers and liberalities No necessary confusion results, when we choose what appears most to demand our assistance, whether one or more or all. Also, that the contributions ought to be carefully reported in the letters of the churches to the Association, for information, system and mutual encouragement.

Resolved. That churches were designed to be self edifying bodies, to the end that they might "do good and communicate," rather than get good and accumulate; that therefore Home Missions are the basis of Foreign Missions, the one a necessity to the other; and that the maxim applies to the two departments, "this ought ye to do and not to leave the other undone." The primit ve organization of Christianity was a system of propagandism, adjusted to the times and circumstauces; the system was not left to be changed, but the adjustments left to the intelligence of the age.

### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee on Foreign Missions, leaving out the usual details, and even the usual summary of statistics, confine discussion mainly to a single subject, namely—the oneness of Foreign with all other missions. We are accustomed to speak of State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, etc., localizing the departments of the work. This habit is sometimes misleading, as the work in fact and in Scripture is but one; hence, when people sometimes say they are in favor of Home Missions, but not of Foreign Missions, or vice versa, it is a contradiction in terms. Let us see whether this is so or not:

1. The first commission given to the twelve Apostles was in these words: "Go not into the way of the Gentiles and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not; but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." Mat. 10:5,  $\vec{6}$ , 7. That is, the Apostles were sent, for the time being, only to Israelites. Some churches to this day act as if under the first commission,

confining themselves to their own neighborhood.

II. But the first commission applying to the brief period between the calling of the twelve and our Lord's ascension was superseded on the eve of that event by another, making the field the world: "All power is given unto me in heaven and in the earth; go ye, therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you. And, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." That is, if they carry out the orders, in fact and spirit, aiming to preach the gospel everywhere, in its purity and fullness, and all its requirements. 28:19, 20.

There were present on this occasion, when the second commission was given, with the "eleven" on the mountain in Galilee where Jesus had ap-

pointed (Mat. 26:32; 28:7), and other disciples, a large number; it would seem, probably, the "five hundred" mentioned by Paul in 1 Cor. 15:6, who saw the Lord at once after his ressurrection. An illustration of the way in which the discipleship at large began to carry out the commission is found in the fact that, leaving the Apostles at Jernsalem, on the persecution raised about Stephen, they "went everywhere preaching the gospel" among the Samaritans and Gentiles as well as Jews. The order of the work is intimated in our Lord's words recorded by Luke, just as he was about to ascend to the Father: "Thus it is written, and thus it behooved Christ to suffer, and to rise the third day from the dead and that reportance and remission. and to rise the third day from the dead, and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in his name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem " 24:47-49

III. Peter, James and John, on the one hand, and Paul on the other, who appear to have been leaders even among the Apostles, formed an agreement after awhile, that the former should go to the circumcision, the latter, as especially directed, to the heathen. Peter's diligence is to be inferred from his Epistles. Paul's we trace a little farther as an example for us

Gentiles.

Not long after his conversion, we find him at Antioch in Syria exercising his ministry there with many others. "As they ministered to the Lord and fasted, the Holy Ghost said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul, for the work whereunto I have called them." They went forth preaching in many cities and centers of population in Asia Minor, the Holy Spirit attended the work, and many churches were founded. Returning after a while to report, they were sent forth a second time, with similar success among Jews and Creakis. Greeks, in Achai as well as Asia Minor. This was all Foreign Mission work.

Of course, the church at Antioch defrayed the expenses.
Paul says afterward it was his "rule" to be "enlarged" by the churches already founded, "to preach the gospel in regions beyond." 2 Cor. 10:16.
Brazil, Italy, and even China and Japan are now, practically, nearer to us than were Asia Minor and Greece to Palestine.

IV. Who should bear the expense of missions and in what proportion? We answer, Every one "according to that he hath;" according as God hath prospered every one. The rich of their abundance, the poor of their penntry. The widow who gave two mites, all her living, gave more in God's sight than all the rich. The grace of God was so bestowed on the churches of Macedonia that their "deep poverty abounded to the riches of their liberal-

ity." 2 Cor. 8:1-8.
There is just as much necessity for one class to give as another, as the object of the Master is not the accumulation of money or means especially, "as though he needed anything," but to exercise our benevolence and gratitude, to let us see whether we love the souls of men enough to expend money in sending the gospel to them, or love Jesus enough to give ourselves and our money to Him; to see whether we have any kinship to Him who, though he was rich, yet for our sakes became poor that we might be rich. If we give willingly, we shall receive a reward; if unwillingly, a dispensation is laid upon us.

Bro. F. M. Woods accepted the appointment of Colporter of the Association.

On motion, appointed a standing committee on Bible and Colportage Work.

### THIRD DAY.

Friday, September 12.

Association met pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by J. W. Wood.

Report on Aged and Infirm Ministers was read, amended, and, after some discussion, adopted:

### REPORT ON AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS.

We, your committee on Aged and Infirm Ministers, beg leave to report, that at the last meeting of this Association it was recommended that churches having within their membership brethren needing pecuniary assistance would confer with the committee, stating their necessities, that the committee might take such steps for their relief as were necessary. No communication of this kind has reached us from any source; we therefore conclude that there must be few or no cases needing relief of this kind, or else the churches are remiss in not making reports. Contributions to this fund will probably be sont in but the churches are the churches are the churches are remission not making reports. Contributions to this fund will probably be sent in by the churches and reported to the Association, but the committee have so far no knowledge of it. It is difficult for your committee to make a satisfactory report upon this important subject without information from the churches, and we would therefore recommend that each church in the Association be requested to appoint a committee, or adopt such other means as it may deem most efficient, to ascertain the true condition of this class of ministers and make a full report of the same to this committee as early as practicable. The sum of \$5 10 was paid by Columbiana church to Bro. J. W. Wood. Other churches have doubtless continuous to the contract of tributed to the same, but no reports have been made to this committee. In our judgment this subject has claims upon the Association which should not be overlooked. We regret that we are not able to report larger contributions to and a greater interest manifested in this subject, and hope your next committee may be able to make a more favorable report.

Report on Sunday-schools was read and discussed by F. M. Woods, J. M. Crenshaw, H. C. Taul and R. H. Pratt. Report adopted:

### REPORT ON SABBATH-SCHOOLS.

We, your committee on Sabbath-schools rejoice to know that interest is manifestly increasing in this great work; but feel sure that there is yet much to be done on this line before a satisfactory report can be made.

We suggest that the International Lessons be thoroughly studied at home.

We fear that too many of our teachers and children are content to merely read over the lesson, and gather the little they can from this way of reciting. We would call the attention of parents to the fact that if they would have their children benefited, they must teach them at home. Otherwise, they can not understand it sufficiently to impress their minds to that extent which the Sabbath-school is intended to do.

We further suggest that every Sabbath-school in our bounds get their lit-

erature from the Colportage Board at Opelika, Ala.

We gather from the letters to this session the following: Number of churches reporting Sabbath schools, 13; number of teachers, 75; number of scholars, 604.

We insist that a Sabbath-school be organized in every church in the land.
