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Many who wish to sell books write us that they want to buy on time, and some that they wish to sell on commission. SUGGESTIONS.

To those who desire to sell our books, as colporteurs or depositary agents, who have not the money to buy with, we would say, ordinarily there are many good brethren in each county, who, in order to help in this good work, would be willing to lend five, ten, or twenty dollars, thus making up a fund for the purchase and circulation of good, sound, religious literature; the profit made on the books would pay the salary of an efficient colporteur, and thus supply the people in the surrounding country, and when the work is done, let the money be returned to those who loaned lt.

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Remittances made by bank checks, postoffice money-orders, express or in registered letters, are at our risk; otherwise not.

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Any one who has the desire to do good, and at the same time make 33 to 50 percent, can send and get one of our descriptive Catalogues, make out an order for \$25, \$50, or \$100 worth of our books, and send the same, with the money, and we will return the books as directed, at a discount from our catalogue prices that will enable them to realize a profit of from forty to fifty per cent, and sell our publications at the same prices that we retail them.

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MINUTES

The Judson Association convened in its Twenty-fifth Session with Walnut Grove Church, Oct 2nd, 1875.

The Introductory sermon was preached by Elder E. M. Knowles, from Heb. 10; 14: "For by one offering he hath perfected forever them that are sanctified."

Singing, and prayer by brother L. R. Sims.

At 2 o'clock the body was called to order by the former Moderator. Prayer by brother T. E. Langley.

5. The Committee on preaching report, brother L. Hargrove to preach to-night, brother T. E. Langley at the stand at 11 o'clock Sabdath, and brother A. L. Martin in the house at the same hour. Brother Z. Knowles to preach at 2 o'clock Sabbath. Brother Hargrove asked to be excused from preaching, and brother J. C. Skipper was appointed in his place.

6. On motion it was decided that the body meet at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock,Sabbath morning and spend $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours in prayer for the reviving grace of God in our bounds.

7. The Moderator was allowed until Sabbath morning to announce Committees.

On motion adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock Monday morning. Prayer by Bro. Z. Knowles.

SABBATH.

At $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock the congregation met at the stand and spent one hour in singing and prayer. The services were conducted by Bro. Sims, who delivered a very appropriate lecture on the nature of pure revival.

At 11 o'clock brother Langley preached a good and interesting sermon.

The services were closed by brother Sims, and a collection taken up amounting to \$16 35.

Monday morning 9 o'clock, Elder L. R. Sims, in the Chair. Prayer by brother A. L. Martin.

1. Read and adopted minutes of Saturday and Sabbath.

2. Read and adopted the following :

REPORT ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Dear brethren there are a few churches in our Association which feels a great interest in Sabbath-schools. There is a very interesting Sabbath-school at Columbia, superintended by brother John T. Davis. One at Hebron, superintended by brother Wm. H. Granberry. One at Shorterville, B. A. Fowler, superintendent. One at Jadson, J. W. Malone, superintendent, and one at Sardis

While these few churches are taking some interest in Sabbath-schools, there are many that sleep over the moral education of the children of this Association. While every other denomination are spreading their sectarian doctrine and so educating the world as much as they can, we who hold the true doctrine of the Bible, are asleep to the great truths God has committed to our keeping. Wake up brethren to your duties, and begin to teach the world the truths of the Bible. Begin around your fire-side—in the streets—on the highways and in your churches. Meet every Sabbath morning, old and young, male and female, there to teach and be taught. There teach from the Bible, its doc'rines, that the truth may be planted in the minds of the young, that it may grow up with them. By this we drive out heresy and have a sound church. Sound members, and our children grow up sound in the faith of the Bible, which is the faith of the Baptist Church. All of which is submitted,

REPORT ON DOCUMENTS.

The Committee on Documents make the following report:

On examination of the documents coming up through the delegates from the churches, while we regret the state of Zion at the present time, yet we do earnestly believe that God who works all things after the councils of his will, is only using this as a means for the purpose of gunishing his children, and as a trial of their faith. We find that the letter from the Pleasant Grove Church contains a petition, asking your body to hold its pext session with that church. Your Committee recommend that the body meet with that church, Oct., 1876.

Dear brethren we believe that every brother composing this Association, ought to take some religious organ.

We recommend "The Bap ist" publied by brother Graves, as the organ of this body, also the Baptist Psalmist as a good work and recommend our Brethren to purchase and use that work. (A. F. SPANTON,

6. Bro. J. T. Davis, read, and the body adopted the following

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We the Comittee appointed at the last meting of your body to compile a report on Missions to be read at the present term, find our work rather a dificult one, from the fact, that the Association seems to be engaged in no direct mission labors, either at home or abroad.

It is true, your body at its last session resolved to set on foot a plan of evangelical work within the limits of the Association, and by subsequent action empowered the Executive Committee to put the plan in execution by employing one or more evangelists to visit the various churches and instruct them in the great principles of those doctrines which we advocate.

While we acknowledge this movement as both an opportune and worthy one, yet we cannot feel that we are discharging our whole duty as Missionary Baptists, so long as we stand aloof and withhold our support both from Home and Foreign Missions, or we might more appropriately say, so long as we fail directly to support by labor and means both Home and Foreign Missions. It we persist in our present course as an Association, it cannot be long before we must merit just cause of centure from our brethren in other fields. Our minutes show that we have no destitution in our own bounds where we might employ the labor of a missionary. But we must know there are many other fields both in this and foreign lands that are already white for the harvests. While we may continue in our evangelical work with a hope of the best results therefrom. Yet if we lose sight of missionary work when taken in its true sense, there is great danger in our becoming careless and lukewarm in the great cause of our Master. In conclusion, we would suggest and recommend that your body by motion or otherwise making a strong appeal to the several churches, through their respective delegates here assembled, to send up a special contribu tion for missions, at the next annual meeting of the Association, to be disposed of and applied as the wisdom of the body may determine. While it suddens our hearts to reflect on the vacancy which his death has caused in our midst, yet it impresses us will the solemn though precious truth, that God will sooner or later call his elect home. We are also called on to report the death of brother W. B. Hopkins, a licentiate. Brother Hopkins was devoted to the cause of his Redeemer. Although we mourn his loss, yet we enjoy the strongest hopes that he has gone to the reward of the righeous. Respectfully submitted,

8. Read and adopted the following :

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

At the last session of your body a motion prevailed to procure the service of an Evangelist to canvass the entire field of the Judson Association, and preach and endoctrinate the several chuches in the great and important truths which we advocate as the true church of Christ on earth. By subsequent motion of your body the whole matter of putting this evangelical plan into execution, by procuring the service of an evangelist, was referred to the Executive Committee. In order to discharge our duty promptly, and thereby carry out the intention of the Association, your Committee held a regular session with Judson Church on Saturday before the 5th Sabbath in November of last year, and after a free and full discussion of the matter before us, adopted the following plan, beleiving it would give the most general satisfaction and result in the greatest good, viz:

To procure the service of brother L. R Sims, to labor in the 1st and 2nd districts, and brother E. M. Knowles, in the 3rd district. Brother Sims, was to devote one-forth of his time (embracing one Sabbath in each month) to this work, and receive for his services two hundred dollars.

Brother E. M. Knowles, was to devote one-forth of his time to this work, and received for his services one hundred dollars.

The Association will at once see that the Committee had not the means at their control to employ the services of an Evangelist for the whole time which would have been the better plan.

Brother Sims reports to us that he has not been able to devote as much time and labor to the Evangelical work as we had a right to exect of him under the contract. But it gives us much pleasure to say that he reports most of the churches growing in strength as to the prominent doctrine embraced in our articles of faith, and that our ministers are becoming more impressed with their duty to preach the whole truth as it is in Christ Jesus, and to boldly teach and defend the doctrine of our church. Brother Sims further reports having preached 40 sermons and traveled 502 miles while engaged in this work, and feels confident that good results will follow his labors.

Brother Knowles reports in a simular manner as brother Sims, in regard to

the time and labor devoted to the work assigned him, and we regret to learn that he is not so sanguine as to any spiritual growth in the membership of the churches. Brother Knowles further reports having preached 28 sermons in the 3rd District while laboring as an Evangelist.

Your Committee is firmly impressed with the fact, that if the above named brethren could have faithfully carried out the letter and spirit of the contract as made with them, that the best of results would have followed therefrom.

In view of a partial failure, both on the part of brother Sims and brother Knowle:, to carry out their contract, we recommend that the original contract be cancelled, and in lieu thereof, that the Treasurer beinstructed to pay brother Sims, the sum of one hundred and thirty-five dollars, inclusive of the amount already received by him under the original contract. And that Treasurer be instructed to pay brother Knowles the sum of fifty two dollars and fifty cents inclusive of the amount already received by him under the said contract. The Treasurer's report will show and explain the amounts mentioned above as having been received by the respected brethren. Respectfully submitted,

CIRCULAR LETTER.

SUBJECT CHRISTIAN HUMILITY—"And be clothed with humility," 1st Peter, 5: 5.

The Apostle has placed this exortation in the midst of several others, as their immediate and primary source. In fact none of the christian duties can be performed properly without it. Humility does not consist in mare words, or in speaking degradingly of curselves, but in thinking soberly of ourselves as we ought to think. The gratest and best of men think and speak of themselves with the deepert abasement, saying with the Centurian, "Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldst come under my roof," and with Paul, "unto me who am less than the least of all Saints." If humility be considered in reference to the objects with which it is conversant, we shall see its nature and effects. Humility as it relates to God is that state of mind by which we may lie low before him. It is right that every being should occupy his proper place. The proper place for us as mortals is in the dust. In all our dealings with God for salvation, it becomes us to seek it as utterly unworthy; and as the gift of grace. To come as guilty without a plea to off r on our behalf, except what arises from the blocd of the cross.

Christian humility may be seen in its effects with regard to men. Pride disposes persons to think themselves of great consequence among men, and that the upper seat becomes them. Too much of this spirit appeared in the disciples of our Lord in the early part of their profession. "And there were striftes among them, who should be greatest in the Kingdom." But humility will render us meek and lowly in heart, and dispose us to think more highly of others than ourselves. Humility may be considered as to the circumstances in which we are placed. If rich in the world, humility will make us feel for the poorand destitute. If we are poor and low in the world, humility will make us content with our station in life. Humi ity is that state of mind which causes every one to know his proper place, whether master or servant, parents, or children. Humility is the greatest ornament of a christian character. To be clothed with humility, is to be beautified with salvation. Humility is a grace which all admire, both religious and profane, and was one of the principal excellencies in the charact r of our blessed Lord. Humility is most friendly to a growth in grace, and advancement in true holiness. "He resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble." Humility, makes room for other Humility, empties us of self, that we may be filled grace to grow and thrive. with the fulness of God. Humility is favorable to commuton with God. "The Lord is nigh them that are of a broken heart, and dwells with such as are of a contrite spirit." Pride on the contrary, can have no fellowship Humility engages him on our side; while the self-sufficient are with him. left to their own weakness.

Dear brethren, let these considerations reconcile us to all the ills of this life. Ever looking unto Jesus as our sufficient strength in time of trouble. Yea all of you be subject one to another, and be clothed with humility.
