MINUTES.

The Twenty-fourth Annual Session of the Sulphur Springs Baptist Association was held with the Arkadelphia Baptist church, Arkadelphia, Ala., on Oct. the 9th, 10th and 11th A.D. 1896, and was called to order by Eld. W. R. Fullmer, the former moderator. The former Brethren who were appointed to preach the Annual Introductory sermon at last session Long absent, the Moderator called on Rev. D. L. James to preach it, who responded to the call. After which the Moderator gave a few minutes for recreation, after which the body met in the church house for further business and, after singing a suth ble hymn, prayer was offered by the Moderator, W. R. Fullmer, who proceeded to call for letters from the various churches, and appointed Reading Clerks to-wit:—W. R. Martin and T. D. Holcomb.

Received letters with list of delegates as follows:—New Prospect, Sulphur Springs, New Hope. Arkadelphia, Harmony. Cane Creek, New Antioch, Mount Zion, Union B. C., Union J. C., Fairview, Mount Joy and Mount Hope.

On motion received Eld. M. M. Russell and Bro. T. W. Rivers from Mount High church as delegates without a letter.

On motion adjourned until 2 o'clock for dinner.

The delegates met in the church house and was called to order by the Moderntor

On motion the body cent into the choice of Moderator. Clerk, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, which resulted in the choice of Rev. G. S. Slean, Mederator; J. M. James, Clerk; and J. F. Mc-Neal, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer, who took their positions and the new Moderator called for new churches. Three were presented as follows:—Mount Olive, Pi grand Pilgrains Rest. On motion all were received into the body by seating the delegates.

Martin on Temperance; J. F. McNeal and Wm. Rouse on Documents; H. H. Buzbee and T. J. Boyd on Education; I. C. McCrary and T. P. Vandiver on Sabbath Schools; Dr. M. Roberts and W. M. Keith on Superannuated Mimisters: Hill Charfin and Blan Parker on Finance: Robert Jones, W. R. Fullmer and R. Kemp on Deceased Minister and Deacons.

On motion adjourned for the day to meet 9 a.m. to-morrow.

EATURDAY MORNING. 9 a. m.

The delegates met in the church house and after a considerable share of music led by the Arkadelphia choir, prayer was offered by the Moderator who proceeded to appoint standing committies, to-wit:

On motion the report, after being discussed, was received and adopted as read, to-wit:—

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your committee on temperance report that we find from reading and observation that there is being a slow but yet progressive reformation in the temperance cause. Intemperance in all things being contrary to the spirit and word of the Holy Scripturs. We would urge upon this association and all christain people everywhere to not only abstain from the use of intoxicating Liquors as a beverage, but to use all diligence to suppress the great evil which is the cause of perhaps 90 per cent of all crime committed in our country; we also urgently advise that ail the churches hold a tighter reign and enforce a stricter discipline over their members relative to the temperance cause.

On motion ordered the Clerk to have two hundred and fifty copies of the minutes printed and distribute them to the churches in proportion to the money paid by each church and keep the balance of the money for his services.

Your Executive Board submit our annual report as follows: After considering the mission work in our bounds we decided to employ our Brother, G. S. Sloan to travel and preach in the community of Yarbrough School house and agreed to pay him \$15.56 being the amount collected by your board for his services.

Supplement report by the Brother G. S. Sloan, who was employed by the Board, commenced his work at the Yarbrough School house in June 1896. Preacled once a month until September, then run a meeting of days, traveled, 185 miles, preached, 15 sermons and found at that place the most destitute portion of the field visited, and recommends the association to continue their work there until an organization is effected at that place as there is a good opening to build up a strong church in that vicinity.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We report that we find that there has been some mission work done by Rev. G. S. Sloan the past summer, and we also find some communities that are yet destitute of regular preaching. We would be glad to have our masters cause established in every community as we feel that we could not do too much in the salvation of souls, but we will say that it is sad to find that we have one church which has been established through our mission work that neither represents in the association nor even try to procure a Pastor to help them along,

so we think the same spirit may prevail in some of our destitute places so we recommend that our ministers should work up such places and we believe they will if they have the love of Christ at heart. We fear that there is a lack of mission Spirit in the minds of our brethren at home in the support of the pastors and we feel that if pastors were better cared for that the work would be done and we would be able to do more in foreign fields where the Gospel has not shined as it has on us.


