C - Supervise your child safety or get with a group and take the children door to door; place florescent tape on the costume.

Military: Flu Shots

H - Veterans Day & Thanksgiving.

C - Safety briefing on long weekend activity (DUI, Drug abuse, etc.); establish a hot line in case the soldiers have problems on returning.

Military Family : Thanksgiving

H - Cold and flu season.

C - Contact the clinic and schedule your family members for a flu shot.

H - Thanksgiving.

C - Do not leave raw meats out for a long period of time. take special cautions when handling poultry and clean the area thoroughly; turn all handles inward on the stove so that people will not knock a pot or pan of hot fluid on them self; clean up all spills immediately.

Military: Winter starts

H - Christmas; TRADOC and military schools breaks for the holidays.

C - Commanders decision: Ensure that soldiers and students on leave via airplane has a round trip ticket; conduct a unit level POV Safety Inspection; conduct Safety Briefing on DUI, Drug Abuse and the High Risk on hitch-hiking.

Military Family:

H - Schools and colleges breaks for the holidays.

C - Talk to your children about safe sex, drugs, drinking and driving, and the negative out look it will have on their future.

H - Christmas.

C - Do not burn candles on Xmas trees; use only U/L approved lights and follow the warnings on the product; Have the fireplace inspected prior to using it.
