
Background

- Directive of the President
 - August 13, 2012,U.S. Department of Defense Press Release
 - Accelerated purchases to provide relief to the drought stricken agriculture industry
 - DLA Troop Support to forward purchase beef/poultry/ pork/lamb/catfish and secure longterm proper storage



Background

U.S. Cattle Areas Experiencing Drought



DLA Troop Support Drought Strategy

- Identified major SPV suppliers: OCONUS SPV Supreme Foodservice and CONUS SPVs Sysco Foods and US Foods
- Contract with all three suppliers to forward purchase and store
 - 6 months worth of product
- Items to be purchased are limited to high-demand items
- All products will be frozen to achieve maximum shelf-life

fference between the CONUS and OCONUS Model

OCONUS:

- No change to item pack sizes
- No "Lean Finely Textured Beef"
- Support small business wherever possible
- Title passes to the Government when product arrives at SPVs warehouses: Kabul, Bagram, and Helmand Regional Distribution Center (HRDC)
- Contracting Officer Representative (COR) to monitor and verify product count and storage time
- Customer billing: Separate billing for delivered price/distribution fee/storage fee

CONUS:

- Services concurred on using standard pack size for commodity items that is most prevent in industry, i.e. 90/10 ground beef, 4/10 lb. packages
- Additional storage and handling fees
- No "Lean Finely Textured Beef"
- · Support small business wherever possible
- Government does not own product until delivered to customer but does guarantee sale
- Sysco and US Foods to hold product at either manufacturers and or other cold storage warehouse
- Customer billing: no change



Contract Actions to Date

- OCONUS:

- Issued Contract Modification on September 27, 2012
- Purchased \$79.3M dollars of product/36 line items
- Total overall product cost savings: \$1.9M or 2.3%
- Additional \$3.94M in storage costs
- Product arrives in country end of February 2013
- First forty-five (45) days of storage free of charge
- Storage fees begins mid April 2013

- CONUS:

- Purchasing approximately \$10M dollars of product
- Negotiating with individual houses
- Supplier proposals are under evaluation. Proposals are being analyzed and negotiation objectives for additional storage prices are being developed.
- Award anticipated within the next few weeks



Looking Ahead to 2013

-This is a Win-Win

- Farmers and ranchers will have an opportunity to sell more of their products at this critical time
- DoD will obtain better pricing on food that would have been purchased at a later date
- Future potential savings to offset the cost of storage
