As to mail matter destined for or coming from inland places where the I. P. O. has not yet established offices it is transmitted by the local agencies at rates fixed by them and payable by the sender or the receiver.

The following articles cannot be sent in mail matter: articles of a nature likely to soil or injure the correspondence; explosive, inflammable, or dangerous substances; articles of contraband or liable to Customs duty; gold, silver, jewellery, precious stones, etc. Dutiable articles and articles of value may, however, be sent by the Parcel Post under special regulations.

Business Hours.—The Imperial Post Offices are open for the transaction of public business on week days from 8 A.M. to 6 P.M.; on Sundays and holidays, from 9 to 10 A. M. and 3 to 4 P. M.

Inquiries.—Inquiries concerning postal business must be made at the Post Office (Custom House).

Complaints.—All complaints and representations which cannot be adjusted by the Postal Officer should be addressed to the Postmaster.

SUMMARY OF REGULATIONS.

1. LETTERS.—No limit of weight and dimensions.
2. POSTAL CARDS.—For transmission abroad: “Universal Postal Cards” only should be used for this purpose.
3. PRINTED MATTER OF ALL KINDS.—Printed Matter of all kinds which does not contain any letter, and manuscript not having the character of *actual and personal correspondence*, made up in such a manner as to admit of being easily examined. Any one packet may not exceed 2 kilogrammes in weight, or measure more in any one direction than 45 centimetres. Packets in the form of a roll, however, may not exceed 10 centimetres in diameter and 75 centimetres in length.
4. COMMERCIAL PAPERS.—Commercial Papers are all documents written or drawn wholly or partly by hand, which have not the character of *actual and personal correspondence*, and that they be made up in such a manner as to admit of being easily examined. Both the limits of weight and dimensions are the same as for Printed Matter.
5. SAMPLES OF MERCHANDISE.—Packets of Samples of Merchandise may not contain any article having a saleable value; any one packet must not exceed 350 grammes in weight, or measure more than 30 centimetres in length, 20 centimetres in breadth, and 10 centimetres in depth, or if the packet is in the form of a roll, 30 centimetres in length and 15 centimetres in diameter. Articles of glass, packets containing liquids, oils; fatty substances, dry powders or live bees, may be sent to Postal Union Countries if packed so as to prevent injury to the mails or to postal officials.
6. CORRESPONDENCE FOR PREPAYMENT.—Articles, other than letters and post cards, must be prepaid at least partly.

7. REGISTRATION.—Printed matter of all kinds, Samples of Merchandise and Commercial Papers, as well as Letters, may be registered.

8 ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF DELIVERY.—Articles for which the sender requires an acknowledgment of delivery, are charged a fee of 5 sen in addition to the ordinary postage rate and register fee.

9. CORRESPONDENCE DELIVERABLE BY EXPRESS —Correspondence deliverable by Express is charged a fee of 12 sen in addition to the ordinary postage rate.

The countries with which correspondence deliverable by Express may be exchanged are the following:—Argentine Republic (that only addressed to Buenos Ayres, Rosario, and Plata). Austria-Hungary. Belgium. Bosnia-Herzegovina (that only addressed to places where Post Offices are established). Chili. Denmark, except Iceland and Faroe Islands (that only addressed to places where post offices are established). Germany. Great Britain. Italy. Liberia (that only addressed to Monrovia, Buchanan, Edina, Greenville, and Harper). Luxemburg. Montenegro. Netherland. Paraguay (that only addressed to Assumption). Portugal. Salvador (that only addressed to San Salvador). Servia. Siam (that only addressed to places where Post Offices are established). Switzerland.

10. ARTICLES FORBIDDEN TO BE SENT BY MAIL.—Articles of a nature likely to soil or injure the correspondence; explosive, inflammable, or dangerous substances; animals or insects, living or dead; current coin, or articles liable to Customs' duty; gold or silver bullion, precious stones, jewelry or other articles of value.
