March 9, 1858.

My Dear Jim:

come here three times a week
& I can't think I enjoy it so
much. We have just done to
the Revolutionary Period, while
winter & spring & summer we are
planning to enlarge the school
build buildings and have an
English boarding school here
for the English children of
Kenya. We are asking the M.E.
Foreign Mission Board &
the Presbytarian Board to

Paid us salaries for two
teachers, and permission to
raise ten thousand dollars
for buildings and two
thousand dollars for an
endowment fund. We hope to
have a school here soon to
keep the children until they
are strong the high school
ready for the College course.
The parents of the children
are very enthusiastic
over it. It means so much
to us and to our children
if we can keep them with
us for four years longer.
We have sent to Shanghai
to get a second hand
figurine and I trust our
children can take lesson
right along.
Well! I must bid you all

a short letter but here it
has grown so this length:
you will I amily tire of
reading so much.

I wanted to assure you
that you all have our
loves and kindest
sympathy in this
great bereavement.

Our children are all over
as well since they had
measles. Mary is getting
over it and I trust

Gertrude is forever over
the malaise but it is
hard to tell. She is so
well & growing fast.

Will is out for a few days
helping our neighbors.

We came out on the river
July 22. Wm has been out just one
week today and will brought his week
& his days mon & all goes well.
Will, D'Innis, Gilbert & Gerlach
came out on Sat July 18. Came
home on Tuesday for us. It began
raining on Sunday evening rained
all night & all day Monday without
stopping. Had a good quiet time
writing letters all day Monday &
mailed some Monday my reports.
Took all my letters answered all
the during done I had planned
baked and got ready to send out
on Wednesday. Was so tired it
took me several days to get
rested. But since coming out here
I have done nothing but rest & do less

so I am feeling fine. There are
nine house boats on the river
and three families built Shacks
up on an elevation up the river
two days travel by boat from P. Y.

So you see the house boat outing on
the river is very popular.

Mr. M^c. Murtrie who came out last
fall to take charge of the industrial
department in the College & Academy
said he had been to many summer
resorts in the U.S. but he had
not found any equal to this.
It is ideal in many ways. We
have the most beautiful scenery
every day & changing all the
time as our boat moves up
the river. Sandy beach
all along the way, so we can
anchor our boat at a fine beach
and have a swim, come in till
the river is over us & run

house was warmer back.
We need no mosquito nets
and it is quite unusual that
in we can sleep without a blanket.
Our children are learning to swim
quite well. If you could see Wilbur
dive & cut franks in the water
you would think so. I really am
learning to swim a little. As soon as
I get a friend to go with a
little more confidence I think I
can swim. Well! it is a bit of fun
any way. Sunday eight boats
were anchored at one beach

I read a great deal. The children
are allowed to read stories to their

and next month he will be reading
"Ghosts" written by Mary & Sidney

There was Ezra, Nehemiah, Esdras +
the Sam reading Job, and the
Ladd's Look "With Marquis
It's in Korea." have you read it
yet. He is so foolish to the
point where to tell every thing
just straight.

Yesterday Morning Bill + Wilson
met with a family who had "Misty-
Point." This their first house. It
goes up - an hour and a half to time
down. The mountain is so big that
it will cover out as I stand at the
top. Three thousand feet high.

After we live in straight they would

are all well.




My Dear Sister:

conference, that is of all missions


in Korea begins tomorrow in Seoul. Sunday
