Dearest Alice:

Surely was glad to hear from you the very first time I left you at the station. Your letter from Gestures which ~~you~~ were enclosing, not a word from the girls. Esther's last letter was written Oct. 28; & Mary's Nov. 28." You can't understand such a long silence. Surely the letters must have been lost. I've been getting very little mail, still Christmas cards come strolling in, I have lots of letters to write & so much work I don't know which way to turn. Last week I had a sewing woman agree one to her she charges a yen a day & puts in about $7\frac{1}{2}$ hrs. I've made 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ suits for Buddie & Sydney a pair of bloomers. I've cut one woolen suit by mail & the bloomers to match the large dress. One suit is about half done. I have 2 dresses & bloomers cut out for Syd. The woman hasn't come back this morning & I don't know where she is coming or not. She has a baby & may be out here.

Mrs. Phillips is better. She is at home
now. I went in to see her yesterday.
She expects the baby in March.



My Dearest Gertrude;

Jan 12, 1927.

Your last letters of Dec. 19th and the one before that came with the same mail, and reached us yesterday. You wrote us just before Christmas, and we are now just aching to hear how you spent the holliday season. Mother and I spent Christmas at Ollies and had a pleasant time. One of the thrills we had was that arriving there after dark, on a way below zero night, the windows of the car being all frozen over so we could not see out at all, we told a college boy who happened to be with us and who lives at Syenchun that we would depend upon him to tell us when to get off. So one station this side of Syenchun he said here we are, and ran for the door and mother after him. I took the basket and went for the other door. Their door being locked they could not get off, but I got off and the train started on. Then they found that it was the wrong station and so did I, when it was too late to board the train. A seven miles walk in the coldest night of the winter. I had to walk but felt about 25 years old. When I had gotten about half way who should I meet but Mr. Shipp the Y.M.C.A. man and Olivett in the Auto coming out after me. It was so cold his car froze up and he barely got back, but we did get back, -the Old Henry always does get us back you know. And none the worse for the thrill.

Thank you for the pictures of "Keswick". It has put an idea into our mind that is one place I should love to go if possible. We are somewhat at sea as to where we are likely to be able to gather our little scattered brood together for at least a month if possible. Even the time is not easily to reckon on. The girls Esther and Mary will not be out of Moody B.I.I. until about the 7th or 10 may ^{Aug} be. And there is not much use to try to secure a cottage anywhere before that time. We are wondering how it would do to try and get a cottage or rooms at Vetcnor for say from Aug. 10 or 15 - one for a month or so and all gather together there. Wilbur could be with us there also easily and then may be we might be able to go to Keswick some of the time. Wilbur would have his car, and may be I can get one too. Even tho we are together a month we want to have some places to go to. We cannot just sit down and look at each other, as mother would say. We are getting our tickets from Seattle direct to New York City, with a stop over for a day or two in Chicago. So we will be reaching New York about May 1. We shall go direct to Wilburs if feasible, but ofcourse we cannot stay ther any length of time, and may have to room out while we are there. But we will likely go there first anyway, then take a few days to go to Stamford and possibly to Boston to see the sheibis. We shall ofcourse call to see our Dearest Gertrude, but just how much we may be able to see of you since you are so busy, we do not know. I hope then to get some glimpse at least of Harold too, as I have not met ^{him} yet.



Then we shall return to Ohio sometime the last of May or early in June. We will spend June and July most likely with our folks, partly together and partly separately, depending on circumstances. Then after the girls are through at Moody B.I. we will all come to where that gathering place may be, -at Ventnor or somewhere else. There is just the barest possibility that I may get a Ford to run about in Ohio and all of us come east in or according to the fashion of the day by auto. We would then have it to run around with wherever we shall be. Mother calls this "air castles" -well there may be some air about ^{it}, specially if I should get balloon tires. But I am bent on having the best time I can have consistently with the Lord

The letter of Mrs. Baird was also interesting. I note that she, like we, feels that it is most strange that Elmer should want to go to Union Sem. to prepare for the Lord's work. How strange that some people want to accept the fruits of real Christianity ~~as~~ but are quite willing to destroy the tree and roots that bore them. Modernism is subtle. It ought to be enough to open the eyes of an honest man. The point of the whole matter is just simply this; -^XTheir God is not our God; Their Christ is not our Christ; Their Saviour is not our Saviour; Their Scriptures is not our Scriptures; And their so called salvation is not our salvation. Their heaven is not our heaven; and their hell is not ~~our~~-hell. what our Scripture teach Hell to be. I believe many honest souls may be deceived, but God knows. And I am inclined to think that where the heart is actually honest and the mind is NOT stubborn, God will lead to the light. We should not look to men but to Christ and to His Word alone. A I have no doubt at all in my mind that Chicago University and Union Seminary are directed not from above but from beneath.

We are not getting many letters from the girls, especially Esther is very slow in her writing. She says very little. I guess they are kept quite busy now as they are ^{now} onward run of their Course. Mary told us that Woodbridge had been there once or twice. We dont know that that means anything so far as Esther is concerned. She is very reserved in such matters I notice from the Board letter, that Woodbridge was applying to come out Dr. but that Hopkirk who is now in America having resigned from the mission I think, saw Woodbridge and examined him and wrote the Board that he did not think he should be sent out. That what he has- I forget what it is called- will be apt to be aggravated more in Korea even than in America. He advised him to go on a ranch for a year, where he would get out door exercise.

But I must close. Please keep us informed of your whereabouts during August or whether you will be able to get off for any part of August or for what part of August. Our going to Vettner during August may depend largely on whether you can be with us. Your work may be such as that it may be difficult for us to see much of you.

Also at this stage of things we are unable to say just how long even Esther and Mry. can be with us. And our movements must be guided largely by that of the girls.

This will be our last furlough and I am glad that we can take it at this time even tho we may not be able to ^{see} as much of you as we would like.

Pyengyang Korea Jan. 8'27.

New Year Greetings from the Pyengyang Station. I have just today been informed that I am to write the December letter. Had I known it easier, I would have written in time to send Christmas Greetings also.

I shall have to hasten the, if I am to answer "yes" on Tuesday at the Station meeting, when Dr. Clark asks if the letters have been written to the Ladies. The Station Meeting is to be at the home of Miss Doriss, and the supper at the Foreign School Dormitory. The hostesses are Mrs. Ashe together with the Misses Doriss, Best and Hayes.

I think I shall go back to the beginning of December and give you just a little running account of the doings in the Station during the month. We had a surprise when zero weather suddenly came in one night and made us all shiver the next morning, especially we who had to get out to the country that morning. It was pathetic to see the poorly clad Koreans who were not prepared for such a sudden change in the weather. It was also hard on the Itinerator who that morning landed far out in the country without bedding or food, for the reason that the public auto failed to bring them along. They said it would be along tomorrow, but that "tomorrow" was just one week later. We are not supposed to say anything about the hardships the, only the pleasures things, so I shall not afflict you with any description of frosted walls, smoky floors, charcoal gas, cold churches &c.,

We soon forget the hardships, but we do not soon forget the eager upturned faces ready to catch any new thought or message we may have to give them. The four Itinerators Messrs Blair, Phillips, Hill and Swallen were out in the country most of the time during the fall until the Mens Bible institute opened Nov. 18. 115 men were enrolled and six were graduated Dec 23.

In Oct. we had one of the best Workers Classes that we have seen for a long time. The spirit of the women was most earnest and humble. They were responsive too about going out to teach classes in the country churhces. We were all happy to be able to arrange for so many country classes. There will be classes held in various places in the country until the last of Feb that is all through the first month of Korean New Year. The reports that come in from these classes are encouraging and show a splendid attendance.

The Pyengyang City Class for Women will begin Feb. 16, the Spring Calss for country women begins March 5, the Womens Bible Institute and the Mission Bible School will also be going on in March. Please notethese dates and remember us in prayer at that time.

A number of the ladies have had their share of country classes, + namely, Misses Blair, Bernheisel, Hill, Dorriss, Hayes, and Myself

have held from one to a half dozen Classes. All came home from these Classes well and happy except Miss Hayes and her Bible woman who returned from the last Class with bad colds and sore throats. To hear them talk no wonder their throats got sore. Her Bible woman happens to be Yi Kwan Sinie who for many years was my sewing woman.

By the way I must not forget to tell you about our Station Evangelistic Conference which brought some of us in from the country as well as a number from SyenChun and Chairyung Stations, to attend it. It was a really helpful conference on the subject, - "should there be a change in our Evangelistic Policy". It was discussed along three lines (1) As to the matter of self-support, introduced by Mrs. Bernheisel. (2) As to the method of reaching and saving souls, introduced by Mr. Phillips. (3) As to the development of the Church and the training of church workers, introduced by Dr. Blair. The papers were excellent and the subjects freely discussed by many of those present. The general opinion arising from the discussions was that the present condition demanded no change of policy, but rather deepened the conviction that we were on the right tract, and that what was needed was more faith, and prayer, and Bible study, and personal work, and to keep right at it and seek to lay this burden and conviction upon the whole church, from pastors down. Family prayers was emphasized and the need of more emphatic teaching in the home. It was made clear that the Bible teaching received in the day schools and the Sunday schools is insufficient to ground the children of our christians in Scripture truth.

Dr. Moffett was in China for two months in the fall with Drs. Speer & Kerr attending the Valuation conferences there. Dec. 17 at 4 P.M. was the hour set to hear his report. Members from SyenChun and Chairyung Stations were also present with us here to enjoy the treat he gave us in telling his experience and impressions both of the conferences held and of the conditions and work in China today. It was most interesting and instructive, and made us all feel doubly thankful that our work was among the beloved Koreans.

Only a few more days until Christmas and so many things going on and preparations for Christmas that one gets dizzy thinking about it all. The usual musical given by the children of the Foreign School and the children's enterainment given by the children before the Dormitory children left for thir homes were all so good. They just did fine. It made us all prouder than ever of our P. Y. School. These together with the College Musical Concert, the closing of the schools and the Seminary, and the Mission Bible school and the Mens Bible Institute Graduating Exercises were some of the events that marked the days just before Christmas.

Mr. Swallen and I slipped off to SyenChun Dec. 24 to spend Christmas with our daughter Olivette. This was the first Christmas we spent away from our home during all the years that we have been in Korea. That Station is so depleted we were glad to be able to join them at this time. It was quite charming and reminded us of our honey moon. We had a delightful Station dinner with a real roast turkey and all the good thingd that accompany the like. And then a delightful evening after supper. The Christmas exercises were a normal in the North Church and I guess in the

South church too. The children in their colors looked like so many butterflies and performed as if they knew how.

We had only to rush home too soon to arrange for my Sunday School teachers for the new year and to see that some of my teachers got off to their Bible Classes which began Dec. 28. We were all saddened to learn that Mrs. Phillips was suddenly taken sick the day after Christmas, and had to go to the hospital. She is still there the very much improved. We are thankful for our new nurse Miss Kiest, she is so genial.

New Years eve Mr. and Mrs Erdman gave a community gathering for a house warming and dedication. The house was dedicated to God for his service. This consisted of a beautiful service and was something new for P. I. After that they held a watch meeting and those who wished to do so remained to see the old year out and the New Year come in.

Jan 7, I had the pleasure of attending the camp fire girls ceremonial, which was held at Mr. Robert's home. It was a beautiful sight to see the twelve girls dressed in their camp fire suits led by Miss Jaquett, enter the room in the dim light of the candleless singing their camp fire song. Jean and Lucy received the honor of Torch Bearers, so they will have some responsibility the rest of the year letting their torches burn brightly before the other campfire girls. Grace Roberts and Anna Ashe prepared and served supper for twenty persons. It made me feel happy and young to be included in their happy gathering.

The Board has granted our furlough and we are expecting to sail from Kobi April 12, by the S. S. The president ~~Jackson~~ arriving in Seattle about the 24. We shall go direct to New York with a possible stop over for a day or two in Chicago. It doesn't make us feel so young when we realize that this is the last furlough we shall have before we are retired, if we ever do reach that eventful time.





There is no sick motion here in our cabin or tide today we have just one bit of smell. The decks are full all the time it's a relief to be here in the quiet. The ~~new~~ man is on the other side of the pier, loaded to with refugees on their way to San Francisco Mrs. Williams, her daughter & son are on that ship. The daughter was in Nanking in Y.W.C.A. work, she seems to be about 14 or 15: She & her son came over here on this boat this P.M. to see some friends & we shook hands with her. She is very



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² Harr. A lady told me this P.M. that after Dr. Williams was shot, the students went to work to help the missionaries & also helped to bury Dr. Williams. They had a funeral for him and buried him in the cemetery. Some one said today the students who have studied in America were right in with the soldiers while others deny it.

China, which is Bolshevism all in

that some high Chinemas said
that the spread of Bolshevism would
go all through China & Korea would be

not stop until it

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5. Spread through out the world.
Now is the time for the church to get
down on their knees before God & cry out
for mercy & wait for the removal
which must come or the evil one
will surely get the mastery.
Bolshevism is sure to come to Korea
and when once it begins to work
it will go fast. That the Japanese
may be able to keep it out & we
believe they will but how do we
know. Some think this in China
is only the beginning of greater
trouble. The churches should be in
earnest prayer & all stand against
it. I wish the Japanese would
make everyone of the long haired
fellows cut their hair & keep
tab on such fellows. How far we
see it already creeping in here







neighbors are. Its most interesting to go from house to house
some we have known for years yet did not even know
where they live. We are always welcome & go in & talk
with their husband & sons. This morning I met my teacher little
much & went preaching alone to the houses right next to
the church. I got into some most interesting places
some are so poor its pathetic & yet I am sure they are
not nearly as poor as they use to be. Economic conditions
are different. Their wallets are much worn & they spend
more. If we judge by the crowds traveling on the trains
there must be money to no one can travel with out it.

3. The trains are running night & day and they use the street cars a lot too. Lately the Koreans are dressing better & living better. Not quite common to see them eating apples these days. Those who have planted orchards and cared for them are rich. Kim Chong il's son never ate him nothing, he was our servant for years. He ships apples by the car load to Manchuria & Siberia. Is still a Christian tho' a Christian family.

Some time ago Old yi came here, from war house, father did not know him but one secretary did, when father found it was old yi, he ordered him a suit of clothes & told him to go to the poor house Mr. Missimaries are supporting get his meals & a warm place to sleep. He is a real old beggar, when he came for his clothes, I did not seem him at first, he has the same voice but looks different. I gave him some money & the clothes & he went away happy. down town the police took the clothes & money & told

him he had w^g a w^g & a statement
telling where he got his. So he
prolly wrote a note & the Cur^r notting
back. The Sec^r retains your letter &
statement & I give him ten days
extra to take a belt before he goes
on in clean clothes. I have seen
him since but I shall send word to
the Poor house tomorrow to see if he
is there. He is 70 years old & no one
to do anything for him.

The Poor house makes a warm place for
many & many poor helpless people to
sleep & get warm meals. It costs the
community about 600 per month from
Nov. first to the last of March. It's a
great relief to us all not to have to
figure to beggars at the door.

In fact suddenly about Dec. 8th
leaving cold weather & snow for
Lebania but now it is quite mild
again. So mild that I am taking a
trip to the Country. I went yesterday &
calling this morning & will go
some time after 2 P.M. We had scarcely gone.
There is trouble in a camp at ^{the} ~~the~~ S.M.
35 mi. or more, a pastor came up &
told us we must go back

immediately started up "Hans" and they off again
for home. We was in a hurry to get back into Mountain
so we took it + I had just got on him

& we are very well in business here for you mind


Dearest Gertrude




