My dearest Mary:

My Dearest Olive.

I wish I knew where to address you. But of course many will know if this reaches her before she leaves New York. I am so glad you decided to take another year in school. The Mission requested the Board to allow you to stay another year. I suppose that was not necessary but it was nice & thoughtful to do so. The other nice thing the Mission did shows in what esteem you are held in the Mission. Miss Snook resigned the principalship of the girls school and you were chosen to take the principalship of the P.Y. girls school when you return next year. That was and is settled so far as the Mission is concerned. But fortunately some one was thoughtful enough to call the Mission's attention to the fact that the Board of Directors of the School ought to first select or have the chance to nominate before the Mission acts, as there are Koreans on the Board of Directors. So the request was changed in wording to read, changed to work in the girls school, and the Syn Chem station members, allowed or consented to this change only upon the assurance that the intent is for the Principalship and changed only so as not to offend the Koreans on the Board. - We are mighty glad that it was so changed so as to give no chance to complain on the part of the Koreans. But you may know that it is the Mission's desire that you return with the principalship in view. Tho be sure you say nothing about it until after the Board acts and you are properly notified of the action. But it fine that in your year at school you can direct your studies with this in view. I hope we may soon hear of your new address so we can send you more money for no doubt you will soon require some. Let me know as to your needs. We want to help you through with ^{put} giving you anxiety.

Dearest Olive & Mary.

Your dear letters have come and so happy to get them & fear we have it been doing very well in writing this Spring. Mother has just been doing wonders teaching two hours in B.C. Life of Christ's Ids. hard subjects. Vand will be all the house cleaning and house repairing. Whole house painted outside & replastered. & Roof all gone over. and inside floors varnished & wood-work painted &c. She would have her evening prayers with the Servants before breakfast at 7 AM. and she had been having a congregation for she always got in the parlor & parlors & wood-works, every body, and so delight ever & would you believe it? Job for many prayers - how its the Prayers. I've been sort of good for not which this Spring. I guess I'll have to have my tonsils out, for a bad throat - I take cold so easily, well we had a real wedding here yesterday Thurs. 10th and was directing it. The bridegroom was of little Parks, who has been at Princeton & returned recently, now assistant in the 4th Ch. in City. The bride was graduated in China somewhere. They have been engaged for eight years. It was an ideal American Korean wedding all were dressed in foreign clothes & best men, & the dearest two little flower girls. The 4 bridesmaids were dressed in Korean of foreign style 1.9 from waist up Korean & down foreign. The bride had entire foreign dress & veil, a beautiful Chinese Silk dress. She looked very sweet. The Korean 15.7 87 married them in the College Chapel. and supper afterwards in Seance building. where the bride and select ladies sat on one side of a table, and the bridegroom & best men sat to the west of us. The men sat on one side of the room & tables and the brides at tables on other side of room. It was refreshing to see a Korean bride have her eyes open & be free to talk and enjoy the company. Well we have the McCasals with us, now under George & Aunt Albert's supervision. and Shuman, a table of six. It is interesting to see the Dr. meet the Koreans. From before breakfast, until eight people were coming & the strange thing about it is that he seems to know them all.

Well & must quit. We are all well. So glad to know you are thinking about Wheaton College. God bless you, and all the rest. Write when you can.

Dearest Charlotte:

After our short but most happy furlough in America with our children, we returned to Pyongyang Nov. 18. We had a very pleasant trip and were truly glad to be home again and have part in this great work for the Master. Although we have been back two months it seems but yesterday since we arrived. The time has gone so fast because we have been kept so busy meeting Korean friends, making trips to the country, directing the work, teaching and holding Bible classes.

Christmas came bringing with it the same songs of joy and thanksgiving for the great love of God to us in sending His Son our Savior and rejoicing our hearts with the blessed hope of His coming again. We had a specially happy Christmas in helping some of the very poorest in our church territory by giving eighty or more a warm breakfast on Saturday morning. Remembering what Christ said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these ye have done it unto Me". This has been a long cold winter, sometimes nineteen below zero, which has given many opportunities for charitable work.

Christmas was only past two days when the United Bible Class of the three Presbyteries began and lasted for one week. The attendance was about thirteen hundred. Four hundred of this number were from our western Presbytery. These men we entertained in our home four different afternoons which gave us a chance to meet them in this friendly way which means so much to them and to us. At least two thirds of them were young men who are coming forward, preparing to take the responsibility in the church.

Arrangements are being made for Bible classes and evangelistic meetings to be held in all the churches throughout the country for the first two weeks of the Korean New Year from Jan. 23 to Feb. 6. We have prepared over sixty thousand tracts for the sixty two churches in the western Presbytery to use in these evangelistic meetings. In February for one week we are to have a united Bible class for the women of the fourteen churches of Pyongyang City. Two years ago we had over five hundred attend this class and we hope for even a larger class this time. The united spring Bible class for the country women of the Presbyteries will be held from March 2-13. We hope to have at least one thousand women come in from the country churches to study the Bible for twelve days and regain more inspiration and a spiritual awakening.

March 22 the Woman's Bible Institute, and March 30 the Higher Bible School for women will begin, which means constant work until the middle of June. We have just closed one week of Bible teaching and evangelistic meetings in our Girls' Academy. We all feel it has meant much to the girls and teachers and we pray and trust the deepening of their spiritual life may just continue. I am sure you will be glad to continue to join with us in prayer for these classes and the work in Korea until a revival shall sweep over the entire land something like, but even greater than that of 1906.

The Pyongyang District Men's Bible Study Class held here as planned from Dec. 27th. to Jan. 3rd. was attended with such success and blessing that we wish to share our happiness with our friends in America and to thank those of you who knew of our hopes in connection with this class and who join with us in the petitions that God has so graciously answered.

In spite of zero weather over 1300 men came to Pyongyang from all parts of our province and studied in a great class for seven days which overflowed our class rooms and taxed our dormitory capacity to the limit. It being vacation time we were able to use most of the dormitory rooms at the Theological Seminary, the Boy's Academy and Woman's Bible Institute. 500 men were cared for in these dormitories. The balance of the 1300 men found places of entertainment in public inns or in Christian homes in the city.

The most remarkable feature of the class was the six o'clock morning prayer meetings at the West Gate Church. A thousand or more men came out each morning in the bitter cold in the dark to this meeting which was led by Mr. Hill. The earnestness of these men in seeking God's blessing was most remarkable and of course it was rewarded.

The night meetings connected with the class were all held except the Sunday meeting in the West Gate Church. Only men were permitted to attend; this being a men's class. If ever a building was filled to capacity, the West Gate Church was so filled. Each evening before the song leader arrived the big auditorium was so crowded that the audience was asked to rise and come forward to make a little more room at the rear for others. This can be done more easily here than in America because the Koreans sit on the floor and not on chairs or benches. This rising and coming forward process had to be done twice each evening. You may ask how it was possible for men crowded forward as closely as they could stand to sit down at the signal and all find space on the floor. The fact is it was not always possible and several times men had to be helped out over the heads of the crowd because they sat down or tried to sit down a little too slowly and were unable to find any place to squeeze into.

We wish you could have seen the earnest faces of these men, over 1800 of them at the night meetings. We wish you could have heard them pray. We wish especially that you might have been present at the Sunday night service at the Central Church when Dr. Moffett preached. It was the evening of the first day of the new year and Dr. Blair who led the after service each evening asked first of all those over 50 years old who wished to reconsecrate their remaining years to God and His service to stand while one of their number led in a consecration prayer. Next the middle-aged men went through the same dedicatory service and last of all the young men under 30 years of age were asked to

stand if they whole-heartedly desired to give themselves with all their young strength to God's service. Over two-thirds of that great audience were young men. It was a glorious sight to see them stand with shining faces and take the solemn vow of consecration upon them.

Each meeting was crowded like this clear to the end of the class and God's presence was manifest at every service and in all the class rooms. The men returned to their homes rejoicing in new found blessing; determined to do God's will more perfectly than before and to preach the gospel with renewed earnestness to unbelievers.

We have not had such a blessing in years and it came so simply and so quickly when we united our hearts in earnest prayer. We are ashamed that we have not more frequently and more earnestly sought God's blessing before and greatly encouraged to look to Him for continued blessing.

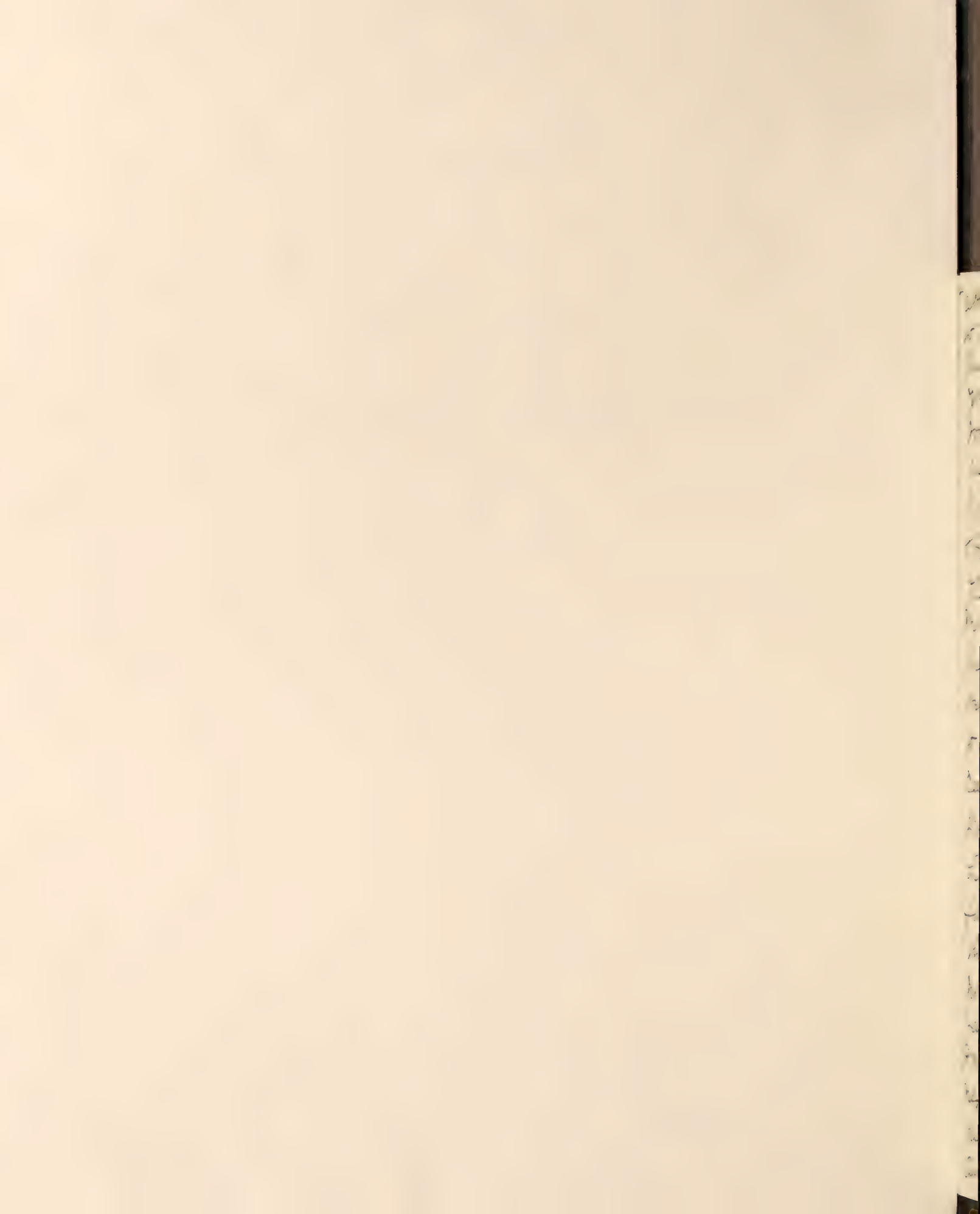

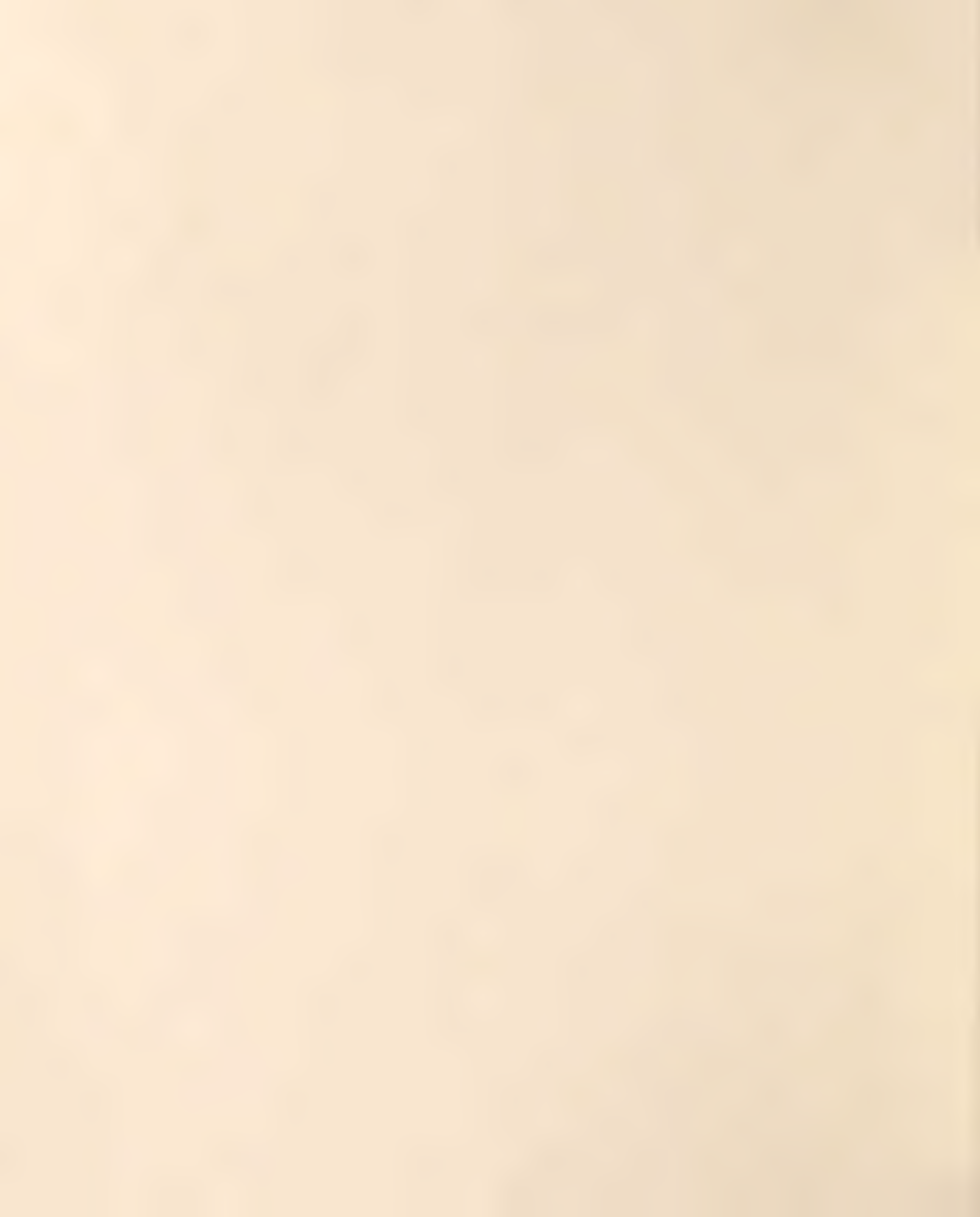

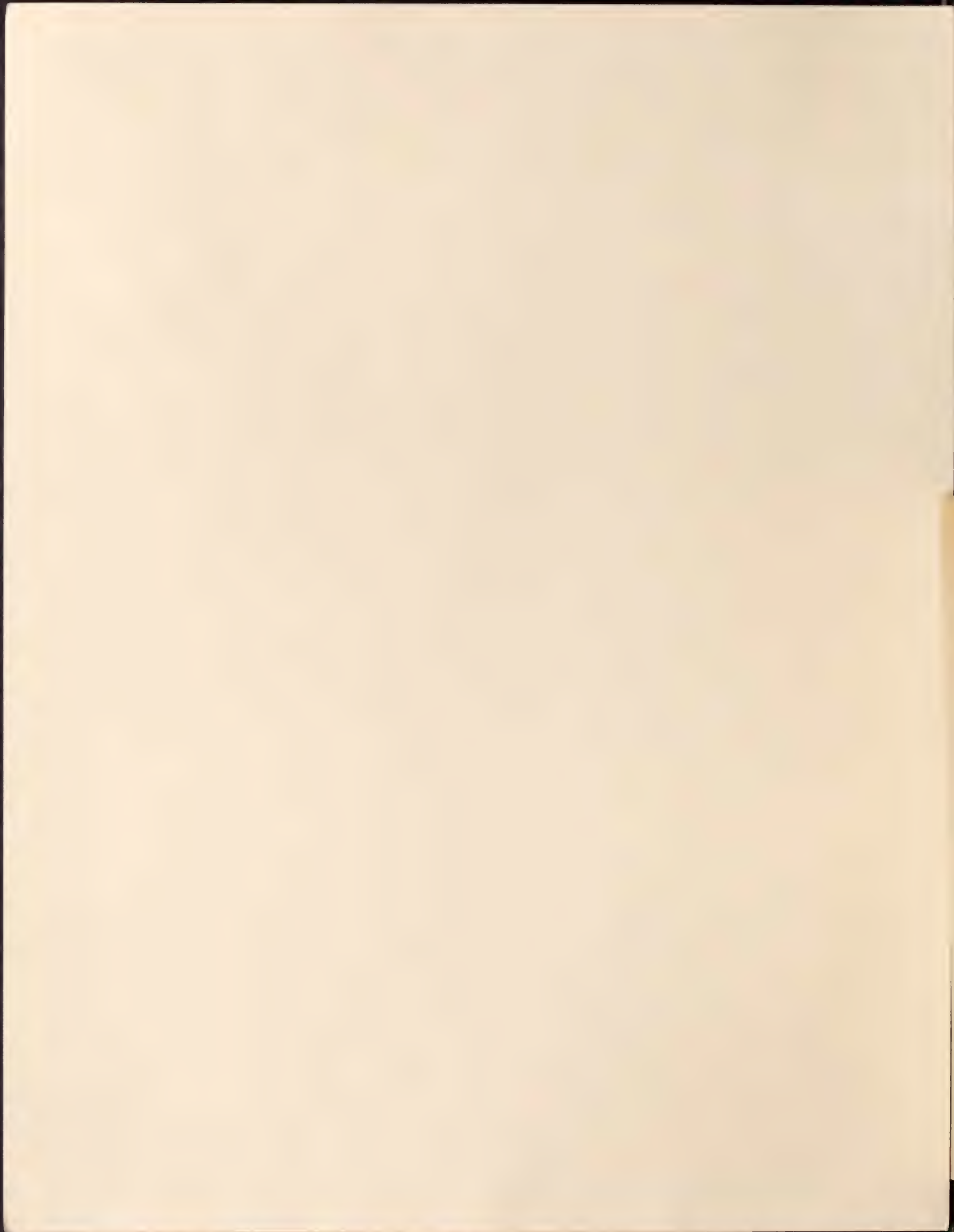

I got on all right - my beginning of this month when my throat began giving me trouble and has quite interfered with my work. I shall have to have my tonsils removed I guess. I've had a ten day run of the "flu" - am meat-
over what now do. Mother is having the time of her life in the City Class that is being held in the W.B.T. building. She Mrs. Beveridge is making a good team to run it. They are going to have charge of the big Country Club school which is next week. I was sorry to have to give up my two hours teaching in B.T. but I am determined to get rid of this if possible before I undertake anything else that requires speaking.

Your good long letter interested us greatly. I imagined you must have meant to try Harold's hill in driving in a snow storm - I am wondering what you could see anyway except snow. - perhaps that was it. the chief interest I think in idea of your taking a rest during that year, if that is possible a good one, for you will get little no doubt when you get out here on the field being able to speak the language. It would be fine & quite worth while I think, if you could put on some flesh as Olive has done. I think you've worn heavy responsibility long enough to take a well earned rest.

This is certainly a lightning age in which we live. People do not know how to go slow. Every hour & minute of the day just seems to be full, & it is almost as bad out here. ation mingled with faith led these mountaineer believers to come to the church to attend the meetings before sunrise and to those held after sunset, with perfect halos of frost around their faces as they went to and from the church. Over thirty made decisions to start on the Way of Life and the women organized a Missionary Society at the close of the class.

About the time of day that ball games, lectures and concerts were being heard from the broadcasting station at Schenectady, N. Y. through the radio apparatus in Dr. Byram's home, the students of the Women's Bible Institute assembled for work. Every member of the Station with a visiting teacher and Miss Aiseen Kim helped in making the Institute a success.

Eighteen students took the final examinations and displayed exceptional ability and understanding in dividing the Word of Truth.

A temperature of thirty or forty degrees below zero was more of an incentive than a drawback to the Bible Class of a hundred and fifty-three men, women and children held at Mooju, a town about thirty miles from Kangkei. Strong determination

Bible Institute for women is now in session; only city women have enrolled and there are seventeen. The country-side is restless, Bolshevick-Koreans are coming and going freely, threatening to destroy all Churches; "Big Sword Society" among Chinese has brot terror to Chinese and Koreans. I think we will have to get the Church folks more interested in Dr. Swallen's correspondence course, hoping they will not entirely grow ignorant of Biblical teachings. Many schools have disbanded on account of bad crops and the low purchasing power of Moukden's money. We are hoping morn of joy will come with spring, it seems the winter has been time of weeping.

SEOUL ITEMS.

Dr. K. S. Oh of Severance Hospital, gave an address on The Church and Society. It was an account of what the Korean church is doing for society. Among the activities mentioned were: a building association which furnishes homes to the desperately poor and homeless. The rent for these homes is about one dollar per month and is used in keeping the homes in repair and toward the building of new homes. A society for the aid of men just released from prison, giving them food and shelter till work is found, helping them to secure work, and giving them guidance to help them start on a right path. A home for old couples has been opened. Boys' clubs, a school for the blind and dumb, and the Orphanage of which Dr. Oh has charge were among other activities mentioned.

The station is especially rejoicing that the Chung Sin Womens' Academy and the John D. Wells School for Boys are closing this years without deficits the faculty of the Chung Sin Academy accepting reduced salaries that the school might prosper. This Academy also greatly rejoices in the receipt of a gift of \$1,150 toward the next fiscal year from the Korean friends of the school in America.

March 20th, a day full of Commencement celebrations, is also a Red letter day, being that on which the Unveilling Ceremony of the Statue of President Avison will take place. The inscription on the statue reads in part as follows:

Oliver R. Avison

The servant of all the Missions of the Christian church
President of Severance Union Medical College.

PYENG AN.

Twelve Korean women recently graduated from the Higher Bible School. To enter this school it is necessary to be a graduate of an academy or of one of our Mission Bible Institutes.

The Men's Bible Study Class was the largest and best class we have had in many years. Over 1,300 studied. Each evening during the class the big West Gate Church was crowded with men and hundreds were unable to enter. Fully a thousand men came out each morning to attend the "before daylight" prayer-meetings inspite of zero weather.

The Presbyterian Churches in Pyengyang City have decided to make the present year a year of special evangelistic effort. Plans are being made to erect a temporary tent covered structure in the center of the city to seat 5,000 people and to hold a union revival meeting next fall. An aggressive preparatory campaign of house to house visitation and special prayermeetings will be conducted for months in advance of the revival meeting. Twelve churches will have part in this campaign.

All Pyengyang City is rejoicing over the victory of our Presbyterian Boy's Academy in football this year. Our boys won the championship for Korea last fall and were splendidly victorious in the All Japan-Korea-Formosa football contest held in Kobe in January. The whole city gave the boys a royal welcome when they returned with their well earned trophies.

SYENCHUN.

The Men's Bible Institute enrolled 36 the first term and 18 the second. Six graduated. The Women's on a one term schedule, enrolled 49, including ten graduates.

In the first year class is a woman who had been demon possessed before conversion and because of her great faith and ardent zeal was admitted as a special. She spends all her spare time learning to write, really starting her education past the age of 50.

One of the students is a widow with no place to go after leaving the B. I. She has earned her food while here by being cook for a number of other women.

Mother Chung was 60 years old when she died a few days ago in the midst of her B. I. course. She is rich and her only son is a fine man who took the best of care of her, but for the sheer joy of studying God's Word, she walked the considerable distance from her home to the institute, the thermometer usually registering 0 or below, without breakfast to be in her place at 8:30. The Korean breakfast hour in winter is very late.

The Boys' and Girls' Schools have both graduated their usual classes, 18 boys and 10 girls. Many of these boys are preparing for the Christian ministry. Ten of them worked all or part of their way through school. One persevered for 13 years for his high school education. One of the girls is the only Christian in her own or her deceased husband's family. By the help of our Work Dept. and with a great deal of hardship she has made her way thus far. She has dedicated her life to the Lord and tried so hard to find some way to go to the Women's Higher Bible School in Pyengyang but could not overcome the big financial difficulties and was forced to give it up. She is looking now to nursing, but what a splendid Bible Woman she would have made. However God knows best and her life is in His Hands. These are just samples which could be repeated many times with variations. Pray for these people.

CHAIRYUNG.

One old lady who has spent her life in the care of her family now has her chance to study in the Bible Institute. But her inability to write makes it hard for her to get all she wants to from her study so in the writing class she has

worked so diligently that her old hand and body are weary but not daunted her spirit! "I never kept house with a pencil. But never you mind, lady, I'll write you a letter yet before I die!"

Our host and hostess in Anak were firm believers in the Living Word, so when their first four children were to be named they christened them Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John despite the fact that they were all girls. The "Four Gospels", as they are called by the whole town, are bearing daily testimony to the power of the Gospel.

The weakest church of Anak has had a revival with twenty four new believers. The helper also brought tidings of additions to two other churches so the total was brought up to forty-five. At the same time the missionary received a letter from a friend in America filled with good wishes and the assurance that the work he had charge of was being remembered daily at the throne, so we know friends are laboring with us for the Gospel's sake.

CHUNG JU.

At the Central Bible Class for the whole district two hundred women came to study this year, the largest attendance for many years. One woman walked about thirty miles to get here. For many of them it is not the actual teaching they receive and carry away with them, but the inspiration of being together with so many others, that counts the most. That is what they take back with them to the small country churches.

At the "Say So" meeting held the last day of the Class, many arose and told of spiritual blessings received, and new purposes formed, during the days of study. Many of them said their greatest desire before they died, was to see their unbelieving relatives saved. One old woman testified, "I am the only Christian in our village, and too old to learn anything or be of much use. Pray that some younger ones may come to know Christ, and be of use to Him."

The Women's Missionary Society of the local Korean church has assumed the whole salary of a Bible women for full time work. Hitherto only a portion of the salary had been undertaken.

On account of good crops our classes this year have been larger than usual, the margin of supplies is so narrow that some can bring their food only in the years of plenty.

Twenty six interested and interesting women are taking the two months course this Spring in the Bible Institute.

Miss Esteb and the Korean physician have kept up their trips by auto to an interior market town to hold their dispensary and preach to the crowd that gathers for treatments or to see the sights.
