## POOR SHOWING AT B. A. A.

#### Tech Wins Place in But One Event. Both Relay Teams Defeated.

The M. I. T. A. A. was not as prominent in the B. A. A. games at Mechanics Hall, Saturday evening, as was expected. In the individual events only two men appeared. E. P. Noyes, with a 9-ft. handicap, won the first trial heat of the 40-yard dash in 4 3-5 seconds, but did not make a place in semi-finals. R. D. Farrington showed excellent form and amid a field of excellent high jumpers, won second place with a handicap of four inches. His actual jump was 5 ft. 7½ in.

The 340-yard relay race between Tech and Bowdoin resulted in an exciting contest. Bowdoin took the lead and held it throughout the race. Thomas who ran first for Tech and Gibbons who ran second, both showed excellent running ability and kept well up to their opponents. Blackburn allowed considerable lead in the third relay, but this was made up by Williams who ran one of the prettiest races seen in some time. Twice he attempted to pass the Bowdoin man but was set back at the turns. Bowdoin finally won by 4 yards in 3 minutes 18 1-5 seconds.

Dartmouth had a comparatively easy race with Tech in the 780-yd. relay. Shipley took the lead and was passed by Howe. After running a lap, Shipley again took the lead and had opened up four yards when relieved. The next three relays opened up more and more space, until at the finish Dartmouth was twenty yards ahead. Time, 7 minutes, 28 3-5 seconds.

In the shot put Capt. Lindsly and Paquet were entered, but were soon outclassed by the stars in this event. Ralph Rose of the Chicago A. C. won the shot put by a put of 47 ft. 9 in.

In the 1000-yd run Howard, '06, Allen, '06, and Clapp '06, were entered, but were distanced by the excellent runners in this event.

The prizes for the Indoor Meet will be on exhibition today. Tickets for the Meet will be put on sale today. The number is limited to two hundred and fifty. Admission 25 cents.

## TECH WINS FROM AMHERST.

#### Game was Fast and Closely Contested Throughout.

In its first game for several weeks the Basket Ball Team won from Amherst by a score of 26 to 23. During the first half Tech played all around her opponents, running up a score which it was impossible for Amherst to overcome by her brilliant attempts in the second half.


this year will have not only a large list of entries, but also an enthusiastic attendance.
