Baldwin Bonanza XXIV Auction Party and Plant Sale

Silent and live auctions, a grand barbecue and plant sale assure that this year's Baldwin Bonanza XXIV Auction Party and Plant Sale will clearly live up to its theme, SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE.

Bonanza weekend events get under way Friday, April 29, with a Garden Auction and Barbecue beginning at 6:30 p.m. at Ayres Hall. Bob Dearmore will serve the Barbecue while guests participate in the Silent Auction.

Prior to the event, guests of the Garden Auction and Barbecue will have first opportunity to shop the plant sale at the Nursery from 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm.

Immediately after the serving of dessert, the Live Auction gets under way.

Foundation members exclusively will enjoy free access to the plant sale in the nursery Saturday from noon to 4 p.m. The plant sale is open to the public Sunday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. General Arboretum admission fees apply for the public sale.

Proceeds from the entire weekend of festivities directly support the Arboretum.

Hannah Bradley, president of the California Arboretum Foundation Board of Trustees, chairs the Plant Sale. Carol McVay is chair of the Barbecue and Auction.

Recounting some history, Bradley noted, "Arboretum grounds opened to the public on Jan. 8, 1955. For almost 40 years, the California Arboretum Foundation has played a central support role for the Garden.

"Baldwin Bonanza is our major fund-raising effort. We count on all our members and friends to bring their friends to enjoy events at the Arboretum, particularly the weekend of April 29. Their purchases jointly beautify their own lives and support the Garden."

Carol McVay pointed out that the Auction Party never fails to provide surprises for guests." This year, we are keeping many different types of people in mind as we select our Auction items," she reported.

"Our volunteers working in the

nursery on plant sale items are doing the same. That's why we can say that there is 'Something for Everyone' at Baldwin Bonanza."

Bradley said the Members Only Plant Sale day is in the grand tradition of Baldwin Bonanza. "Anyone not yet a member may call the Foundation office and become a member prior to Baldwin

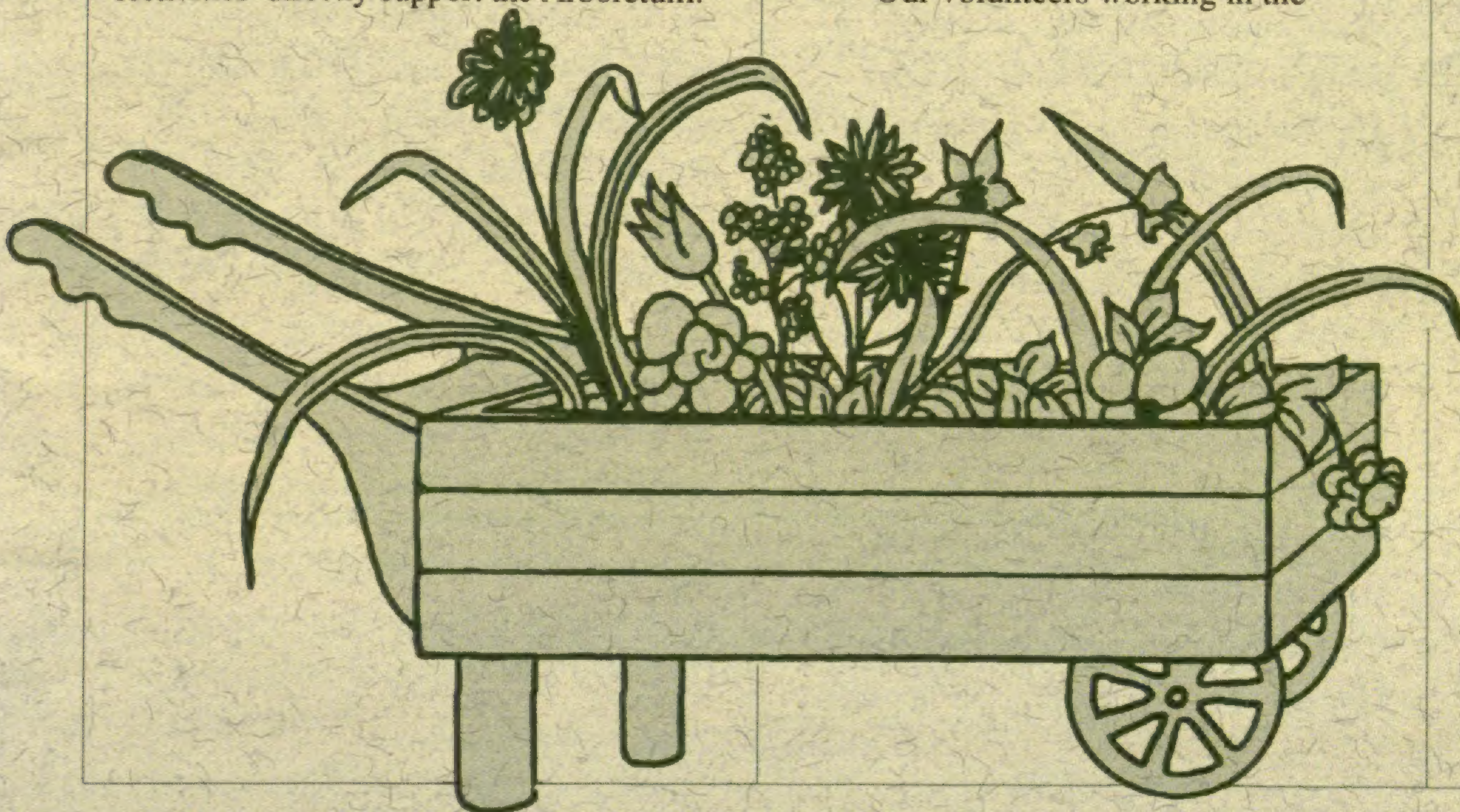

Among plant sale favorites certain to be offered are Arboretum introductions such as the Dr. Stewart Hibiscus, the Granite Honey Myrtle and the Orchid Vine, along with unusual perennials for "English Style" gardens. Many offerings were propagated from our own Kallam Garden.

Other offerings always popular at the Baldwin Bonanza Plant Sale include plants for native and drought-tolerant gardens and indoor plants and ferns.

To assure that nothing has been forgotten in providing something for everyone, offerings from specialty nurseries will be available all three days. Participating nurseries are Desert to Jungle Nursery of Montebello, Chia Nursery from Carpinteria, Judy's Perennials and Buena Creek Nursery, both from San Marcos, and Greenlee Nursery from Pomona. ❁

There are many enjoyable facets to my position as Superintendent. It gives me great pleasure when I can work with groups such as the Western Tree Management Symposium, Antelope Valley Resource Conservation District and the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) of Southern California as I recently did.

On January 21, the Arboretum held

the Street Tree Seminar and the I.S.A. Western Regional Meeting. As part of the seminar they were informed of the tremendous progress in the past year with the improvements on the grounds and the joint effort between the California Arboretum Foundation and the Department of Parks and Recreation. After the seminar, Randy Finch of Finch Tree Surgery offered to improve and help with the Arboretum with our tree trimming efforts. Mr. Finch has been a supporter of the Arboretum for many years.

On January 12, eight MWD landscape supervisors toured the Arboretum grounds. They were looking at water-conserving plants that might be used in new, well-managed, landscaped gardens they are installing throughout the district.

I also had the privilege to meet with members of The Antelope Valley

Resource Conservation District in Lancaster and tour their facility that focuses on plants that do well in the high desert. It is open to the public Tuesday through Saturday. There is a small demonstration garden showing a selection of the plants grown at this site. They would like to develop this into a small arboretum which they have asked us to help create.

Part of our mission as an arboretum is to be a resource for the community we serve. This includes providing information and assistance to various projects on an ongoing basis.

Working in partnership with as many related entities as possible provides benefits to us all. 🌱

WITH MARY FOOTE Plant Nursery Worker

On any given day in the Arboretum gardens, it isn't unusual to find Plant Nursery Worker Mary Foote surrounded by volunteers thoroughly engrossed in their current project.

Currently in charge of plant propagation and the propagation research and botanical collection greenhouse, Foote has seen many changes at the Arboretum over the years. Among these changes has been an increasing amount of interest shown by the volunteers.

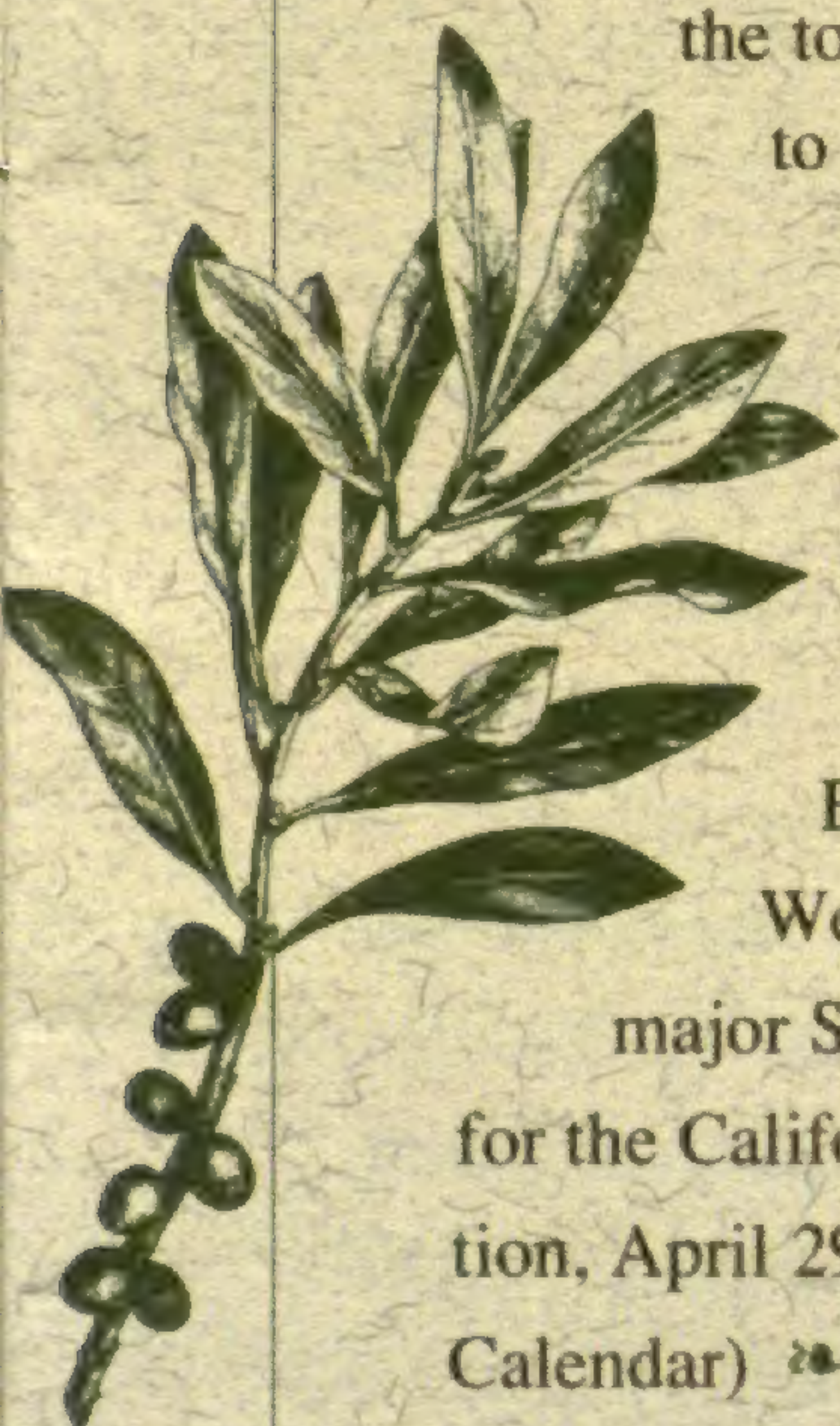
"Combined with the diversification each member of the staff and volunteers brings to the nursery and related projects, this expanded cooperative effort injects a surge of energy into all our work," Foote said.

Under Mary's direction, volunteers even work on maintenance of the Arboretum Greenhouses and plants. Routine maintenance of equipment, shifting of plants as they mature, fertilization, insect and fungus treatment, pruning and weeding all fall into this category.

"In the last five years, there has been a steady decline in the number of paid staff members and a decrease in useable equipment and tools," Foote explained. It's been a challenge, due to lack of county funding, to keep the existing greenhouses repaired and keep on hand the tools and supplies required to do the job," she added.

Along with other priorities, Mary and volunteers are actively involved in preparation for the 24th Annual Baldwin Bonanza Weekend Plant Sale, a

major Spring fundraising event for the California Arboretum Foundation, April 29, 30 and May 1. (See Calendar) ❁



WITH SANDY SNIDER - Associate Curator of History

Serving as Chair of Programs and Tours for the Conference of California Historical Societies, to be held in Arcadia in June of this year, will be a breeze for Sandy Snider.

Her chair duties will simply be an extension of her daily responsibilities as associate curator of history at the Arboretum.

At the Arboretum, she is responsible for overseeing maintenance of historical buildings and all photographic and written archives.

Snider is ably supported by dedicated volunteers whose talents range from clothing conservation to adobe repair.

"Volunteers are the backbone of our Arboretum Historical Section," Sandy declared. "Whether meeting and greeting

visitors at the Santa Anita Depot, leading school tours, dusting and preserving furniture or working special events, volunteers are an invaluable resource."

And Sandy noted, "They work hard and smile while doing it."

Bolstered by volunteers, Sandy takes advantage of every resource to replicate times in history.

Her attention to detail is clearly evident in the interior of the Queen Anne Cottage, a national landmark. It is open to the public only once a year. This year, the public open house is April 17.

Featuring treasures selected from the Arboretum's own collection and outside private collections, the tour will be an authentic walk down memory lane. (See

Calendar for more detail).

With the help of Snider and her volunteer group, the Cottage and Coach Barn will showcase toys, dolls and games of yesteryear.

Sandy Snider has a long association with the Arboretum and a continuing love affair with the San Gabriel Valley.

Born in Kentucky, she came to California at age 12 and brought her love of horses with her. She is an avid thoroughbred handicapper, which makes her a kindred spirit to our own "Lucky" Baldwin.

Snider joined the Arboretum as a student professional worker in 1971, just prior to graduation from California State University Los Angeles, with a degree in

history. She went on to earn teaching and library science credentials, and her Master's Degree, without skipping a beat in her continuing work at the Arboretum.

Sunflowers gladden the heart and eye. Their big cheerful blossoms seem to laugh and boast in the sun, and as cut flowers, they bring sunshine indoors whether you choose exuberant tall varieties or the newer dwarf bedding types. All are easy, carefree plants to grow even in hot and dry conditions, perfect choices to start children gardening. Breeders in the U.S. and abroad have developed a whole range of colors and sizes to suit every fancy. Here are some of our favorites at the Gift Shop to enjoy in celebrating summer. All are annual plants.

☛ **NEW: Deep-hued Evening Sun.**

We've chosen Evening Sun for everyone who loves sunflowers in deep, rich earthen tones. Imported from Holland, these tall sunflowers bloom with open multi-branching sprays of arching flowers in rich mahogany-red, rusty bronze, deep gold, burgundy and just about every bi-colored combination you can imagine, all with dark center disks. Six to eight feet tall.

☛ **NEW: Sunbeam - The "Van Gogh" Sunflower.**

These gorgeous new hybrids closely resemble the stunning colors of the famous Van Gogh sunflower portraits. Five to seven feet tall.

They bear striking four-inch flowers with long, buttercream colored petals surrounding deep, chocolaty-brown center disks. Five to eight feet tall.

These classic sunflowers are native to South America. Revered by the ancient Incas, golden carvings of them adorned the sacred Inca temples. Five to eight feet tall.

☛ **NEW: Silverleaf Sunflowers.**

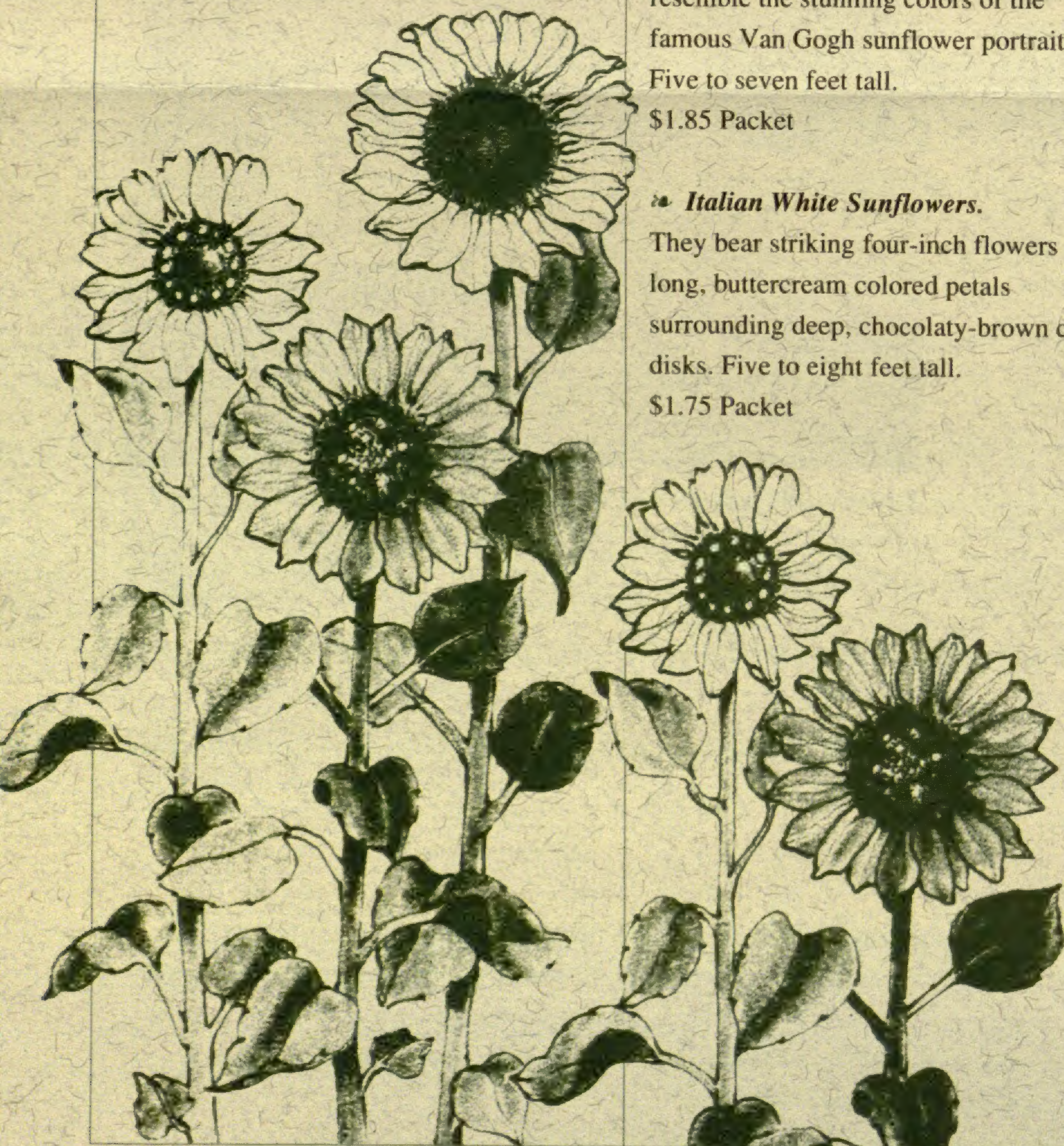

☛ **NEW: Sunrich Orange Sunflowers.**

Hybrid Sunrich Orange is a single-stemmed variety whose sturdy stalks are topped by beautifully colored, densely petaled flower heads with deep golden-colored petals (as close to orange color as we have seen in sunflowers) framing black centers. Three to five feet tall.

Insects are waking up. Our gardens are full of tender young foliage. Aphid and mite explosions are likely to occur. Now is the time to walk among your ornamentals with rose duster in hand.

Having said this, it sometimes seems that Spring means nothing but drudgery in our gardens. Some projects are routine. Others are not because we finally do things we haven't taken the time for up to now, such as planting that Holiday poinsettia, or taking another look at our iris and azaleas. None should be classified as drudgery. Gardening is a way to put Spring into our hearts.

If you really want to do this, take the poinsettias out at night. Set them in the darkest spot in your yard, away from street lights, security lights, porch lights, living room lights and bedroom windows. Come back the next day and determine if the spot is sunny. It must be sunny during the day for the plant to stay alive and dark during the night to flower. It is important to know that some varieties do not do well out of doors. "Annette Hegg" does. You may want to start from scratch with this variety rather than trying to prolong the Holiday spirit.

If you have your heart set on azaleas try "Red Wing," it is a true survivor and you should be able to avoid phytophthora root rot that so often plagues the azalea lover.

If your green leaves are disappearing and no tell-tale slime snail trails are apparent, look for green caterpillars. They will be the same green as the missing leaves. Spray with *Bacillus thuringiensis*, BT, and the problem should subside. 🌱

Rose Garden Victorian Style

The cutting edge of garden design walks side by side with nostalgia in the newly refurbished Arboretum Rose Garden.

Thanks to the Fanatic Gardeners and other devoted, hard working volunteers, home gardeners can look to the Arboretum Rose Garden as a place to visit and see what is new in roses, garden design and planting. This garden is a modern California re-creation of a Victorian Rose Garden. The Queen Anne Cottage and the existing structures in the garden suggested this design.

A memorial gift to the California Arboretum Foundation honoring Mrs. Miriam Albertson makes possible the complete renovation and painting of all wooden structures in the Rose Garden.

The Victorian idea that flowering perennials extend, augment and support the beauty of the rose is one that is back in favor in today's modern garden. The Arboretum garden will show a display of perennials that work with old roses here in Southern California. The garden is designed to show a creation of mixed planting, not just roses lined up row after noble row, but eye-catching perennials in combinations designed to provide the opportunity for close examination of what is new in color and texture.

Fanatic Gardener instructor Jan Zalba Smithen points out that Americans have had few opportunities to observe the "art" of gardening that provides inspiration to work with design, shading, color and shapes.

"Photographs simply are not the same as being among the actual plantings. You can't appreciate the evolving of the garden on just one perfect pristine day," said Zalba. "In the renovated Rose Garden we envision that there will be a daily opportunity for the kind of garden-

ing experiences to be found in some of the great gardens in England or on the East Coast where there is the luxury of a 'designer in residence,' so to speak."

This garden employs many of the latest gardening techniques. Water is conserved by deep but infrequent watering. Evaporation of soil moisture is minimized by the use of heavy layers of composted mulch. Watering is controlled by automation. Many of the roses in the Victorian era were grown on root stock. All of the roses in this garden are grown on their own roots and were originally propagated by cuttings.

Fanatic Gardener volunteers have worked hand in hand with Assistant Superintendent Tim Lindsay and members of his Arboretum staff. Much of the



plant material and hardware that went into the making of this garden was donated by friends of the Arboretum. Thanks are due to Hortus Nursery, of Pasadena, the Huntington Botanical Gardens of San Marino, Limberlost Roses of Van Nuys, Rose Acres of Crystal Springs, Judy's Perennials of San Marcos, and the Rainbird Corporation for their generous participation. 🌱

Roots and Shoots Intergenerational Garden

Freshly laid out garden plots, marked by crisp new header boards are filling with young, tender lettuces, arugula, and peas at the Arboretum.

27 third and fourth grade children from the Gooden School, along with five volunteer "grandparents," are participating in the Roots and Shoots - Intergenerational Garden program. The children with their "Gardening

Grandparents" are plotting the garden, choosing plants and seeds, and building compost to enrich the soil. Later in the spring they will enjoy the fruits of their labor as they harvest and eat the foods they have planted.

Coordinated by the California Arboretum Foundation (CAF), the Roots and Shoots Garden is off to an exciting start.

Roots and Shoots, which originated at the Elizabeth Gamble Garden in Palo Alto, brings two generations together working in the garden, and making use of it as an outdoor classroom.

There are many lessons to be learned. Transplanting, composting and mulching are taught along with studies on herbs and seed propagation.

A favorite subject is to solve the mystery about which insects, birds and animals are friends of the garden and which are not.

One of the many lessons learned is the resiliency of nature, and how the proper use of land and nature's resources adds to the quality of life in ways that cannot be underestimated. Preparation of the garden plot is an example of this, while the actual nurturing of the plants completes the larger picture for our Roots and Shoots participants.

Knowing that the ground is almost ready for planting brings smiles to young faces.

Roots and Shoots is supported by a generous financial gift. The Arboretum staff has spent many hours in preparation of the layout and irrigation system. Getting ready for the children to arrive in January, a barren piece of land was transformed into a workable garden plot. Dale Witt, senior gardener, laid out nine plots, made pathways and cleared brush. Cesar Ruvalcaba and his crew pruned back trees and shrubs. Bobby Ramirez and his workers dug the ditches and laid out the header boards, pipes and sprinklers.

We hope that all of you will visit the Roots and Shoots Garden on a regular basis. Third and fourth graders alternate weekly visits to the

garden. From 1 to 2:30 each Wednesday afternoon the garden is alive with children looking at seedlings with magnifying glasses, listening to stories, weeding their plots, building their compost piles and caring for their new plants. Leigh Talmo, an experienced gardener, and an active volunteer at the Gooden School, plans the curriculum and is the on site leader. We look forward to seeing you at the Roots and Shoots - Intergenerational Garden.

The property now known as La Casa Pacifica was the Hamilton H. Cotton Estate from the time of its construction in 1926 until its purchase by then President Richard Nixon in the summer of 1969. It was sold to the current owners in 1980. "Ham" Cotton was the head of a syndicate holding all of the land on which San Clemente is located from 1920 to 1925, when Ole Hanson and his partners came from Seattle, Washington to purchase the 2,000 acre site to build the city of San Clemente. Cotton, Hanson and the partners all built similar Spanish style homes on their ocean front estates. The current owners of La Casa Pacifica commissioned Lew Whitney of Roger's Gardens to redevelop the gardens which were informal by design with meandering paths leading through natural rather than formal garden areas. Today, the gardens continue to evolve, both with seasonal plantings and as experimental horticultural grounds for Roger's Gardens. Each year new bedding plants are tested and different bulbs from around the world are planted. The garden hits a peak in April just in time for our tour. Comfortable shoes are suggested for the two hour walk over primarily flat terrain. Lunch at the oceanfront Hotel Laguna will be especially prepared by Executive Chef Todd Clore with a concentration on herbs, many of which are grown at the Arboretum.

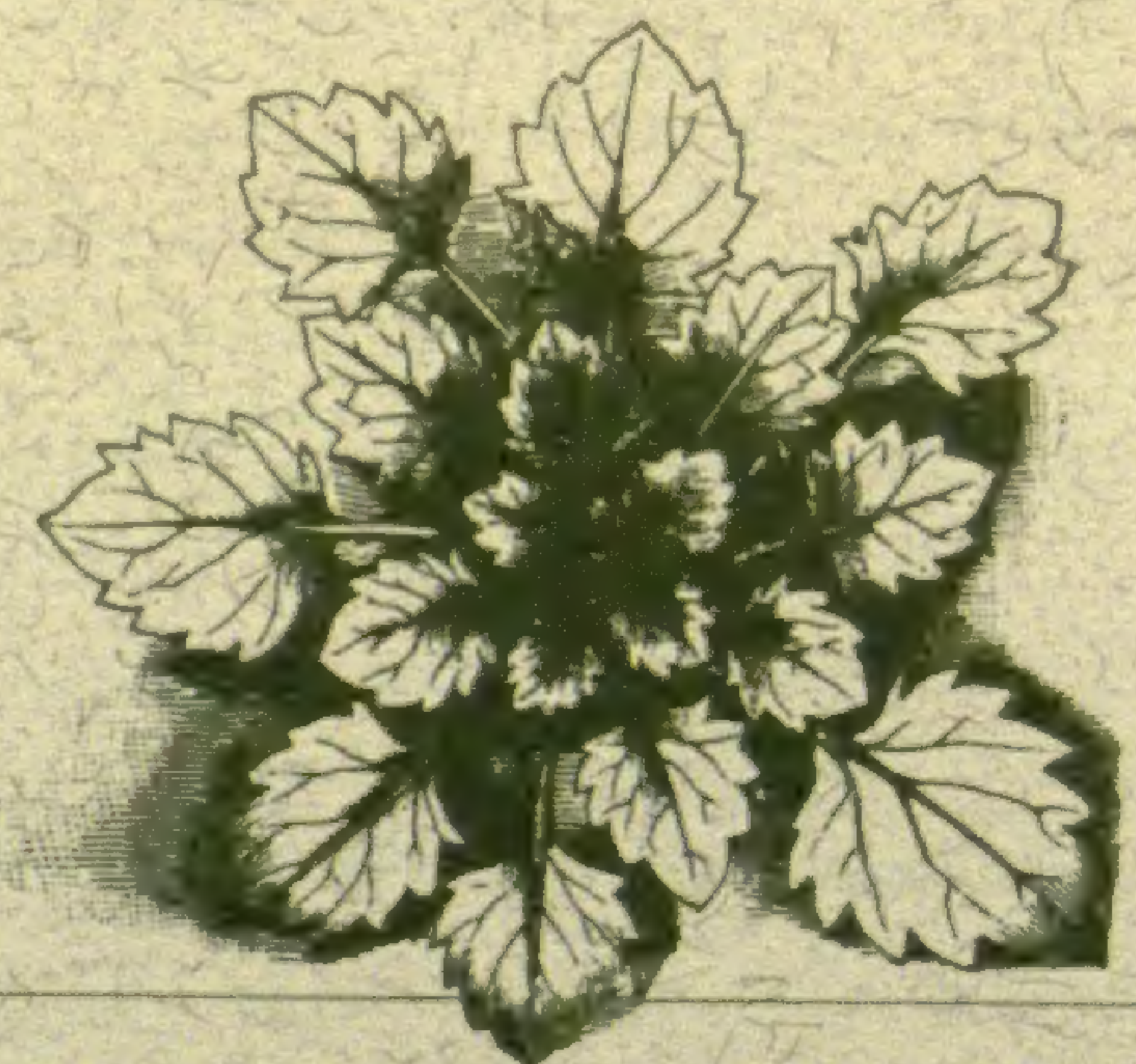

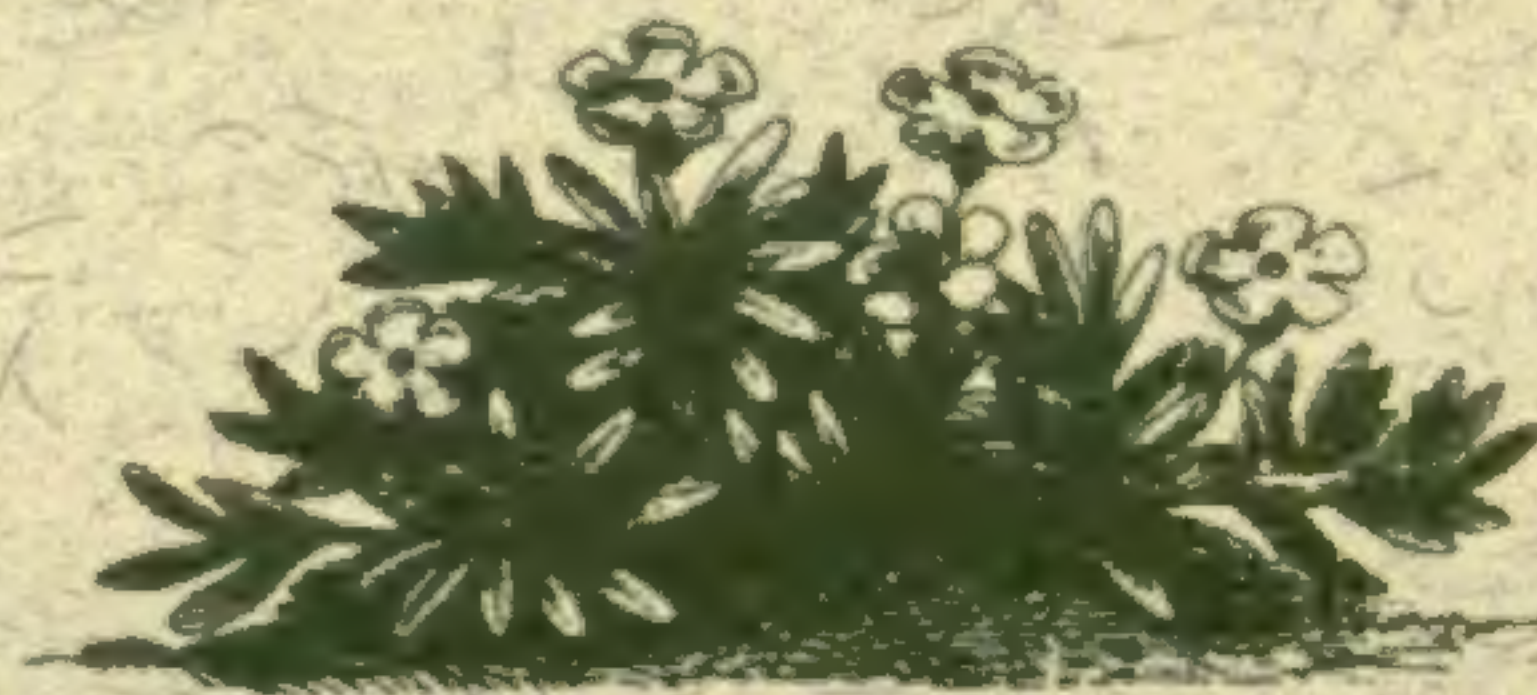

How many hours does it take to organize and dispatch 4500 pieces of mail?

This hardworking group assembles as needed, their various projects spread out in the work room of the Foundation office. After metering, the plump envelopes are zip code sorted before landing in a large official sack for delivery to the post office.

Bookkeeping is critical when working with postal authority bulk mailing requirements. Marie and Edith have spent many hours together doing research and keeping up with changing rules and regulations. Postage may differ from piece to piece. Each envelope must be accounted for, every penny recorded.
