Then he opened His mouth with words rich and sublime, Instructed them in righteousness that would endure for all time. He spoke of many things concerning what would be done, Of His mission here on earth and His Kingdom to come.

Having gone through these things in a most masterly way, He looked on those He had chosen and to them He did say: Now ye are the salt of the earth to be the savor of mankind, To preach God's Kingdom is nigh and all who seek it may find.

Ye are the lights of the world like a city set on a hill, Your light shall shine afar and the whole world it shall fill. So let your light shine before men, that my good work they may see,

And glorify your Heavenly Father, who now dwells in me.

Blessed are ye when men revile you, who preach the gospel in my name,

For so reviled they the prophets who before you once came. Blessed are ye who are persecuted for true righteousness' sake, With glad hearts then rejoice, for your reward shall be great.

Blessed are the poor in spirit who for seasons are sad, For in my day they shall rejoice and their hearts be made glad. Blessed are they that do mourn, for the comforter they shall find,

Giving them rest in their souls and sweet peace of mind.

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall mercy obtain, Never come into condemnation, nor know sorrow or pain. Blessed are all the meek, who shall inherit the earth, Clothed in garments white and spotless, for in Heaven they have birth. Blessed are they that do hunger after righteousness through love,

For they shall be filled with the bread of life from above. Blessed are they that do thirst in this dark world of strife, For I will give them to drink of the water of life.

Blessed are the pure in heart, for my God they shall see, Ever dwell in His presence and in His likeness shall be. Blessed are the peacemakers who have great things in store, Called God's children among men, whom angels adore.

Beware of Pharisees and scribes, who appear righteous unto men:

Being teachers of Moses' law, they will my doctrine condemn. Except your righteousness exceed theirs in faith and true love, Ye shall in no wise enter into my Father's Kingdom above.

Do not think I am come to destroy, but to fulfill Moses' law and the prophets, which abide in force still, For they testified of me, whom the Father has sent To give life everlasting unto all who repent.

These commandments were given to be observed and obeyed: Convince all men of sin who from God they have strayed. Whosoever, therefore, shall neglect to teach men the same Shall be called least of all who preach the Gospel in my name.

By this law of commandments came the knowledge of sin, So all who transgress them have condemnation within; For this law was not given to set guilty men free, But by repentance through faith may find a pardon in me.

You have heard it was said by teachers in times past That whosoever does kill another shall his judgment find at last, But I say to you in truth there are other men of sin Who have not taken human life, yet are murderers within.

For whosoever shall be angry with his brother without cause ls in danger of the judgment, which shall come and not pause. And whosoever shall say "Thou fool", to a brother in much ire ls condemned before God and is in danger of hell fire.

Then agree with thine adversary that thou mayest be forgiven, Lest he deliver thee to the judge and thou be cast into prison. Verily I say unto thee, thou shalt not come out thence. Till the last farthing is paid and thou make full recompense.

Again if any man shall sue thee and take away thy coat, If thou hast nothing to pay give him also thy cloak, And whosoever shall require thee to go a mile on his way, Then go with him twain and thou shalt ask him no pay.

Love your enemies as your friend, in the time of their distress; Pray for them that despitefully use you and when they curse you thou shalt bless;

Be the children of your Heavenly Father, who doeth good unto all.

Both the just and the unjust, the great and the small.

Give to him that shall ask thee and say not, Some other day, And from him that would borrow turn not thou away; For such are thy neighbors, who are in stress and sore need, Whom thou should love as thyself and show them kindness indeed.

Do these things and be perfect, like your Heavenly Father above.

Who showeth deeds of kindness, full of mercy and love. Be ye not overcome with evil, stand fast, watch and pray For the coming of God's Kingdom, which shall come in my day.

Take heed that ye do not your alms in sight of men, They will praise you for the gift, but God will condemn. Let not, therefore, your right hand know what the left hand shall do,

Then God who seeth in secret will openly reward you.

Be ye not like the hypocrites, who themselves do commend, Stand and pray in public places, yet within they are condemned;

But go ye pray in secret, where my Father may be found. He will hear thee and bless thee and cause thee to abound.

When ye pray thou shalt say, "Our Father who art in Heaven, Most hallowed is thy name to whom praise shall be given; Let thy kingdom come now and thy power be made known; Let thy will be done on earth, as in Heaven before thy throne;

Now each day give us our bread, as thou knowest we have need.

And forgive us our trespasses, who are thy children indeed, That we may forgive others, who through envy and hate Have trespassed against us, not knowing their state; Deliver us from all evil, lead us not in the way Where Satan may deceive us and we go far astray; For thine is the kingdom and in glory thou dost dwell, Having power and dominion over earth, Heaven and hell."

Now these words are acceptable from the lips of men that are clean.

Who in faith call upon God, whom they have not seen, For my Father is a spirit clothed immortal in the light, Who ever dwells in the secret place most glorious and bright.

All these sayings I have spoken, to show you the right way. Which shall be profitable for you when you are tempted to stray,

For whosoever heareth and doeth all the things I command Shall not be shaken or moved but like a rock he will stand.

King Solomon was young when he ascended the throne, Having a desire for peace and great love for his home, With his people at heart, over whom he should reign, He asked God for guidance and his hand to sustain.

In the works of creation, Solomon discovered a plan, A purpose and design, for the perfection of man, Whom God did foreknow, and in the beginning did find His own offspring and seed, His image, likeness and kind.

The Lord God did possess him in the beginning of his way, Coming into this body at a fixed or appointed day. Wisdom reveals the true purpose why we were made man In this body of earth in which our life's but a span; It is to perfect our spirit, which must fight against sin And have life everlasting, if the victory we win.

No spirit is made perfect that has not been tried, And only those ever shall be who in Christ are justified, For to mistrust our God and go out of his sight Is to lose the inheritance in His Kingdom of light.

All these things were written in King Solomon's roll, Also, that man is a spirit, having a body and a soul; The man in spirit that will sin, his soul it must die, For God has declared it and in his word is no lie.

He discovered the source from which wisdom came, Whose gift that she is and what is her name, The place of her dwelling, She, the mother spirit of love, The comforter of God's children, who came down from above

She is gentle and gracious, the Holy Ghost is her name, Who brought forth the child Jesus, God's son who once came, For she entered a virgin, prepared Christ a place, To take on him flesh, like the whole of man's race.

Now according to wisdom, it was a part of God's plan, Though Christ in spirit was Lord, that he also become man, Taking upon him our nature, as the prophets had said, Be crucified and buried, then arise from the dead.

Wisdom declares all the promises made to Israel of old And God's promise to David, which the prophet foretold, Has in Christ been fulfilled and unto us been made known, That Jesus was raised up and made King on his throne. For he appeared to his disciples after he came from the dead, Through the Holy Ghost gave commandments and these words to them said:

Now believe me that I and my Father are as one, That I came down from God and his work I have done.

I give you to understand that before time began I was with God in spirit, and so was all men, For in me God possessed them in the beginning of his way, And as I came in my time, so also came they.

But I was God's first begotten and heir to His throne, Always lived in His council and no evil have I known, Forasmuch as all men who from Adam commit sin, I was ordained to redeem them; for this cause was I slain.

There is healing by faith in power divine, A positive cure for all mankind. By faith you may prove this miraculous Power, Which is present to heal at this very hour.


The blind to see, the lame to walk, The deaf to hear, the dumb to talk, The infirm made strong, the sick made well, And souls delivered that were doomed to Hell.
