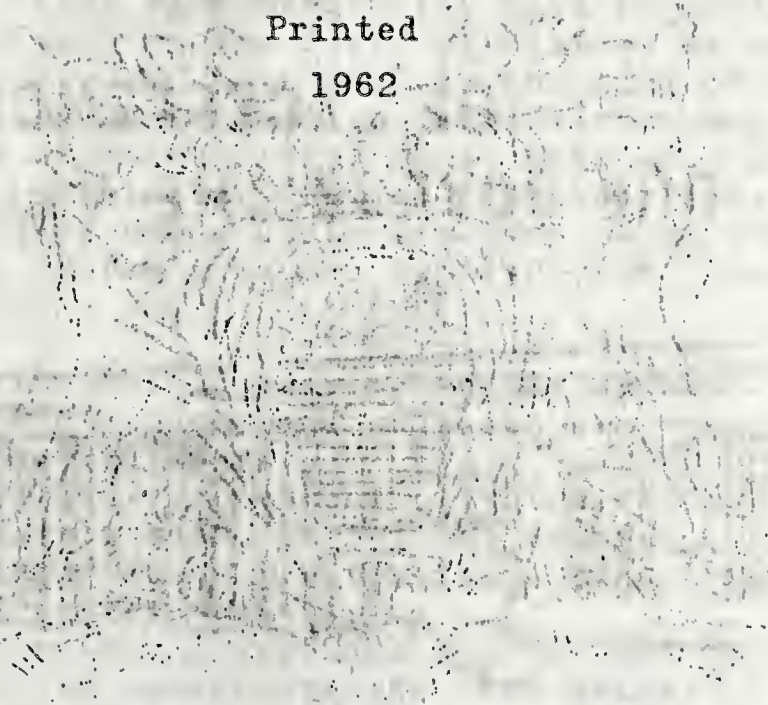

The Moore family has been prominent in the British Empire and the United States, it's members having played in important roles in war and peace. Family pride is a commendable trait and should be cultivated. All Moores have just cause to be proud of their family history and tradition.

The English surnames Moore and Moor and the Scottish Muir are from a Saxon word meaning healthy ground and were very early taken by those who resided at the boggy heath or moor.

Moor may also have been a contraction of O'Mora, Mordha's descendant. Mordha is derived from "mor", which means great or tall. The Anglo Saxon word "mar" - renowned, famous is probably also a source of the name. The medieval forms of Moore were Atte Mor or More, DeMora and Ad Morem. The old Norse form is Mor; the Dutch, Moor; Flemish, Morre; German, Mohr; Celtic, Morre or Atte-Moor.

The Moore Coat-of-arms, which is displayed on the front page of this book, is the one most widely used of all Moore Coat-of-arms. It has been used for generations by many branches of the Moore family here in America. Coat-of-Arms were originally used for purposes of identification and recognition on the field of battle, as well as in civic life. The one displayed in this book is the Arms of the Earl of Drogheda, greatest of the Moore families of Ireland, who are descendants of the Moores of Moore Place, Kent, England. Most of the Moores use this Arms, or similar design. The Moor's head in crest and shield, were always used. This has been taken from "Burke's General Armory", "Burke's Landed Gentry", and "Burke's Peerage and Barantage".

ARMS-	A blue shield bearing in the upper half a golden band on which are three red stars.
CREST-	A golden coronet out of which rises a Moor's head, in natural colors, wearing about the temples a blue and silver wreath.
SUPPORTERS-	Two silver greyhounds.
MOTTO-	"Fortis cadere, cedere, non potest" (Latin meaning "the brave may fall but cannot yield.")

In Domesday Book, 1086, there is mentioned More of Devon, Worcester, Hereford and Norfolk.

Nanie de la Mora came to England from Normandy with William the Conqueror. In 1213, Adam de la Mora was officially sent by King John of England to the King of Scotland, with a present of gyrfalcons. During the reign of Edward I, an Adam de la Mora lived in Ayrshire, and Moores descended from him live in Ayrshire and Lanarkshire today.

In 1391, Sir Adam More was a knight, of the Laird of Rowallan, Andrew Mure (1391) was a brother of Elizabeth More, of Rowallan,

Reginald de la More held an estate at Abercorn in Linlithgow. He was Chamberlain of Scotland (1329-1341). His son, Sir William More, lived at Abercorn. He had also a son, Gilchrist More.

Fraser's Chiefs of Grant, III, pp. 68-70, mentions Mores in Strathhamon and Stratdee in 1527. On page 274, William Moir, Chamberlain on the estate of Mulben, 1622, is mentioned. On pp. 149-150 is mentioned the name of John Moir.

In June 1612, John Moore left home near Glasgow, Scotland, and moved to Co. Antrim, North Ireland. He was encouraged to do so by King James I, of England, who hoped to quell the uprisings in Ireland by sending over staid English and Scottish subjects.

From two brothers, Sir Edward and Sir Thomas Moore, Knights, (younger descendants of the Moores of Moore Place, Co. Kent) who went over to Ireland, as soldiers of fortune, in the reign of Elizabeth, sprang the house of Drogheda, and the extinct house of Charleville.

There are Moores' in every state of the Union. The Moore population of the British Empire is probably equal to that of the United States. It is estimated that at least eighty-five percent of the Moores' in America, who are church members, are of the Protestant faith.

I. The first mention yet found of Andrew Moore, of Poquonock, Connecticut, was that of his marriage, which is as follows; "Andrew Moore and Sarah Phelps yt was daughter of Samuell Phelps, were married by Captain Newbury, February 15, 1671." Samuell Phelps was the son of William, the emigrant who came to Dorchester, Massachusetts in 1630. Samuell married Sarah (daughter of Edward) Griswold in Windsor, Conn., Nov. 10, 1650. The Phelps family dates back to earlier descendants migrating from Italy to England. Sarah Phelps Moore was born March 16, 1653-4.

Andrew was known as "the carpenter of Windsor". In 1675 he was paid £-1-175 on "the war account" -presumably when Simsbury, Connecticut was destroyed by the Indians. Andrew was a carpenter by trade and worked on town projects, including the first ferry boat built in 1674. He owned fifteen acres of land in Windsor, Conn., including a house, barn, two pieces of land in Simsbury. He owned carpenter's tools, a sword and belt, a library worth eight shillings. His land grant in Simsbury was dated as 1680. He choose to live in Windsor, where the birth of all his children is recorded, except that of his son, William. He died there Nov. 29, 1719, and the inventory of his estate was made on the 17th of Dec. following. The distribution of his property took place on the fifth of April, 1720. The estate was appraised at £-320. Each of his nine children took his share of the property. The widow, Sarah Moore, was appointed administer of the estate. To Andrew and Sarah the following children were born:

1. Sarah, born on Dec. 6, 1672, married Thomas Winchell, the grandson of Robert the emigrant. He died in August, 1697, and she was appointed administrator of the estate. She married second, Benjamin Winchell of Suffield, Conn., on July 18, 1700. Children by the first marriage, Samuel, born Jan. 5, 1690 and Hannah born May 18, 1693. Children by the second were Benjamin born Feb., 23, 1701; Thomas born in Windsor, Conn., Dec. 16, 1702; Samuel, born Nov. 20, 1704; Isaac, born Suffield, Conn., Dec. 22, 1706; Azariah, born Suffield, Conn., April 5, 1710; Jonah, born Suffield, Conn., March 12, 1713, and died at Suffield, May 20, 1713.

2. Andrew, born Feb. 15, 1674. Married, and was admitted freeman in Simsbury, Conn., Feb. 7, 1703. His will is dated May 7, 1752, and the inventory of the estate was taken Aug. 28, 1752. There were the following children born Lois, born 1704; Mary born Sept. 30, 1707, died Jan. 9, 1713;

Sanders, bantized Nov. 17, 1709; Sarah born ? (still unmarried in 1752); Mary the fourth daughter was born Nov. 20, 1713; Abiah the fifth daughter was born Aug. 5, 1717. (Mary and Abiah had probably died without issue, as they are not mentioned in their father's will of May 7, 1752.)

3. Deborah, born May 3, 1677. Married Samuel Forward, and died in Simsbury, Conn., Aug. 29, 1734. He was born July 23, 1671 and died May 3, 1738. They had six children. Samuel, born in Simsbury, Conn., Aug. 20, 1703, died July 29, 1762; Joseph (ensign), born Simsbury, Conn., Nov. 10, 1707, died May 22, 1766; Abel born Belchertown, Mass., Nov. 4, 1710 and died 1766; Deborah was born April 6, 1713, married Martin Winchell, died Aug. 2, 1730; Rachel was born April 3, 1715; John was born Aug. 29, 1717, and died April 24, 1738. Deborah's (1) great-grandson, Walter Forward, was Secretary of the Treasury in the Cabinet of President Tyler.

4. Jonathan was born Feb. 26, 1679-80. He married "the widow Hannah Large of Saybrook" in Simsbury, Jan. 9, 1705-6. He was one of the first to engage in mining ore at Copper Hill, Conn. He died in Salisbury, Conn. on Sept. 8, 1770. They had eight children. It is probable that all were born in Simsbury. Jonathan was born Nov. 11, 1706; Temperance was born July 19, 1708; Gideon; Simon; Roger; Jedejah was born June 21, 1716 (was called the fifth son); Ashbell was born July 14, 1718, died July 20, 1718; Mary, born Aug. 21, 1719 (called the second daughter - See Col. Rec. of Conn., Vol. XI, p. 147.)

5. Abigal was born Sept. 12, 1682. Married William Stratton. He died in the old French War, Oct. 1709. The widow, Abigail, was appointed administrator of the estate Dec. 5, 1709. They had two children. Serajah born March 7, 1706, married Eunice Case on Dec. 12, 1728, and William born Sept. 25, 1708.

6. William was born 1684 and died in East Granby, Conn. on May 9, 1780. His first wife was Elizabeth _____, who died in East Granby on Sept. 20, 1732 at the age of forty-nine years. He married (2) Damaris Phelps (daughter of Josiah) Jan. 20, 1740. He had ten children, born in Simsbury, Conn. William born July 19, 1712, died in "East Gersey", Jan. 27, 1739; David born Sept. 18, 1713; Timothy died Jan. 20, 1730-1; James born June 6, 1716; Shadrach born Sept. 19, 1717; Mercy of Mary born Nov. 24, 1719; Ebenezer born April 20, 1722; Andrew; and Isaac. By the second marriage was born Naomi or Ame.

7. Rachael was born Feb. 6, 1690-1. Married Lt. Timothy Phelps. In 1703 he lived in Pocuonock, Conn., in 1713 in Simsbury. They had six children. Rachel born Mar. 18, 1708; Mary born July 7, 1701, married Samuel Brown, June 15, 1730; Timothy was born about 1713 and died May 27, 1737; Charles was born about 1718, married Hannah Clark,

April 5, 1720.

8. Benjamin was born Dec. 5, 1693, married Ennice, daughter of Nathaniel Phelps of Westfield, Mass. She died Feb. 23, 1732, and is buried in the old cemetery at Poquonock, Conn. They had six children. Benjamin was born in Simsbury, Conn. July 2, 1717; Eunice was born in Simsbury on Dec. 3, 1718; Joseph was born in Simsbury, July 21, 1720; Tabitha was born in Simsbury, Aug. 16, 1722; Agnes was born ?; married Henry Gains, Windsor, Conn.; Simeon was born in Windsor, Conn. Jan. 6, 1732.

9. Amos was born Oct. 19, 1698. See II

*II. Amos was born Oct. 19, 1698. Married Martha, daughter of Obediah Owen, May 21, 1720. She was born Aug. 16, 1693 and died May 21, 1780. He died Feb. 20, 1735; and both are buried at East Granby, Conn. They had ten children, all born at Simsbury

1. Amos born Jan. 21, 1721

2. Martha born April 6, 1722, married Benoni Veits at Simsbury, June 20, 1745. They had two children. Martha in Simsbury Feb. 27, 1746 and Mary born in Simsbury, June 27, 1751.

3. Sibbel, second daughter, born Oct. 16, 1724, and died Dec. 23, 1725.

4. Obediah born Nov. 7, 1726 and died after Sept. 4, 1782. He married Abigail _____, who died in Southwick, Mass. on March 1, 1826, age 93 years. They had eight children, all born at Simsbury. Frelove, born May 7, 1752; Hiram born March 24, 1754; Naomi, born Jan. 30, 1756; Abigail, born Nov. 15, 1757; Electa, born Oct. 23, 1759, married George Case; Obediah born Jan. 4, 1765; Horace, born 1766.

5. Rachael born in Simsbury, Conn., 1731. Married David Clark in May 1750. They lived together 64 years and 5 months. She died Oct. 9, 1814, age 83 years. He died Oct. 26, 1819, age 94 years. Their descendants are 20 children, 117 grandchildren, 111 great grandchildren, and 12 great great grandchildren - 260 in all. (East Granby, Conn. records)

6. Jonah was born Mar. 25, 1735. See III.

7. Micah born Nov. 3, 1736, married widow Mary Philps, nee Clark, Sept. 22, 1768. He died at East Granby, May 12, 1812. She died Dec. 12, 1812, age 73. They had three children. Mary born Simsbury, July 22, 1770; Micah born Simsbury, June 22, 1771; Oliver born Simsbury, Sept. 21, 1773, died March 29, 1829.

8. Nahum born Nov. 19, 1738, died in East Granby Oct. 4, 1813. Married Catharine White, Feb. 22, 1764. She died Oct. 4, 1803, age 57 years. They had five children. Grace baptized East Granby, Jan. 15, 1765; Gloriana baptized East Granby April 12, 1767; Nahum baptized East Granby Sept. 26,

on Feb. 24, 1773; Polly baptized East Granby, July 16, 1775. Another record states that there were a son Elias born 1780, and married Elizabeth Pomeroy, and a son Benjamin born 1782 and died 1845.

9. Sibyl born Simsbury 1741 and married Zebulon Moses. They had four children. Reuben baptized in East Granby on May 30, 1764; Charles baptized in East Granby on April 12, 1767; Abiah baptized in East Granby on July 16, 1775; Sibyl baptized in East Granby on July 16, 1775.

10. Joel was born Sept. 25, 1744, married Martha Spring on Sept. 30, 1765. He moved to Montgomery, Mass. in 1794. He died July 1820. She was born Aug. 25, 1747, died June 30, 1838. They had nine children, all born in Simsbury. Joel was born May 25, 1767, married Sarah Gillett; Nathaniel born June 30, 1769, married (1) Irena Hoadley (2) Mary Hoadley; Orrin born Dec. 11, 1771, married Polly Wheeler; John born May 22, 1774, killed in accident in Lowville, N.Y., July 4, 1811; Pliny born Aug. 29, 1776, married Betsy Pettis (2) Julia Clap; Samuel born Dec. 5, 1779, married Thankful Wheeler, no issue; Martha born March 17, 1783; Elizabeth born Dec. 2, 1785, married Sylvester Wright; Flavius born Nov. 18, 1789, married Susan Avery (2) Harmony Searle.

* III. Jonah was born in Simsbury, Conn. on March 25, 1735. There are two references on his marriage. Both differing. One states that he married Mary Rideout (didout), another states that he married one Mary, daughter of William and Elizabeth Gibbs. He died Nov. 23, 1813. This occurred either in Simsbury or East Granby, Conn. Jonah served in The Revolutionary War, serving as Private in Capt. Uriah Seymore's Company and Maj. Elisha Sheldon's 2nd Light Horse Regiment. He marched Oct. 22, 1776, and died Dec. 1, 1807. The following children were born.

1. Elizabeth Gibbs born 1763 and died Sept. 15, 1826. She married Phineas Holcomb in 1781. (There is some doubt in the entry here of this daughter. The church records at St. Andrew's of Simsbury does not have her baptism recorded. Although, two women have joined the Daughters of The American Revolution through Elizabeth's father, Jonah. There are records on file in Washington, D.C. at the National Chapter office to this. I have in my possession a photostatic copy of each record.)

2. Jonah baptized May 20, 1764 (St. Andrew's Church, Simsbury, Conn., by Rev. Roger Viets). Married Marcia Paine (Pierce). Jonah came down into Oxford, N.Y. about 1793, settled on the farm joining his brother, Sylvanus' farm in the town of McDonough, on the east. This was later occupied by Peter Sharpe. He was mysteriously drowned in the Chenango River at Oxford, under circumstances which induced the belief that he was murdered by persons unknown. His marriage to Marcia Paine (Pierce) was contracted before coming down into New York State.

1790 and died 1790 in Oxford, N.Y., married Martha Cleveland (had children Stoughton, Oliver, Lyman, Chester); Stoughton born 1794 and died 1833, married Maria Dewey of Sherburne, N.Y., (had children William, Daniel, Lyman, Calvin); Sylvanus born 1796, married Nancy Pettibone, in the southern part of the U.S. (had children Oliver, Sylvanus, Henry); Barney born 1798 (had children William and James); Henry born 1799; Zalmon born 1801, married Hannah Wilcox, lived and died in the West; and Marcia, died in the West, unmarried.

3. Ridout, baptized May 25, 1766 (St. Andrew's Church, Town of Scotland, Conn., by Rev. R. Viets). Married (1) Rachel Easton (2) Vashti Holcomb. They had the following children; Wells (married Polly Warner); Pliny born 1778 (married Sally Davis).

4. Oliver baptized August 14, 1768 (St. Andrew's Church, Scotland, Conn., by Rev. R. Viets). Married Mary Hill. They had the following children: Oliver born 1783, died in 1858, married Statira Hatch; Abner born 1793 and died 1864, married Lora King.

5. Sylvanus born May 14, 1771 at Simsbury, Conn.
See IV.

6. William born June 26, 1774 and died April 1, 1801. Baptized on June 26, 1774 at Scotland, Conn. by Rev. R. Cossitt.

7. Mary (Molly) died November 15, 1817. Married Ebenezer Cook. She also came into Oxford and McDonough to live. Her baptism is not recorded in the church records with her brothers.

IV. Sylvanus was born in Simsbury, Conn. on May 14, 1771. He was baptized in the Old St. Andrew's Church, N. Bloomfield, Conn. by the Rev. Roger Viets. As recorded in the original church record book "Aug. 11, 1771 - Sylvanus - male child of Jonah Moore baptized - town of Scotland". Sylvanus emigrated to New York State by foot in the year 1795, arriving in Oxford, Chenango County, New York, with the intention of settling there. At the time there was only one frame house in Oxford, belonging to Benjamin Hovey. The stick, which Sylvanus carried over his back with his few belongings in, is now in the Oxford Library. This was given to the library by Sylvanus' son, Lysander's descendants. Also, given to the library by the same man is Lysander's family record book, two chairs, a clock and a table.

On arriving in Oxford, Sylvanus found it plagued with fever and ague along the river bottoms, and this induced him to change his plans. In Oxford he met Henry W. Ludlow, from New York City, who had come on for the purpose of promoting the settlement of a large tract of land owned by his father in the town. His father owned about all the town of Preston, which then included the town of McDonough. From overtures made by Mr. Ludlow, among them

acres, which he soon added another one hundred acres in the south-eastern part of the town (later McDonough). This farm was later occupied by Perry Tillotson. He resided on this farm until his death at the age of eighty-one, and was buried in the Moore Cemetery, located on the Moore farm.

Sylvanus Moore made the first settlement in the town of McDonough, N.Y. He was then a young, single man without a dollar to pay down on the purchase of his piece of land. His entire wealth consisted of his clothes, an axe and a few shillings of money. With the latter, he procured a few days rations in Oxford. He then started in the early Spring, with a staight heart, and a strong prupose and resolute will to wrestle the harsh conditions which surrounded his future home. His land was densely covered with beech, maple, black cherry, basswood and ash, which was the prevailing timber in this section. Hundreds of miles away from family and friends and far from any other, his first task, as was in all first settlements in this country, was to erect a rude cabin of logs and brush, until he had cleared the land. By hard work he cleared his land enough to plant crops for a small family.

This accomplished, he returned to Oxford late in the fall and taught school for the winter. The money he earned he invested in the building of a frame house on his land. During this process married on Dec. 20, 1797, Elizabeth, daughter of Solomon Curtis of Massachusetts, an early settler who lived one and one half miles east of Oxford. This farm was later owned by Andrew Morey. Elizabeth was born on Dec. 29, 1777, in Spencer, Mass., she died July 28, 1822. Their wedding tour consisted of the journey to their wilderness home. By what mode of conveyance the journey was made, we are not advised. This was the first marraige contracted in the town of McDonough.

The hardships of the early settlers were severe, and the reward for their labors light. James Talmage, Nathaniel Locke, and Joshua A. Burke moved in the same season. Thus, the first settlement near Ludlow Pond and that section started.

Mr. Moore soon succeeded to the agency of Mr. Thomas Ludlow's lands in this town, the son of that gentleman having become, by dissapated habits, incapacitated for that trust. After the completion of the State road to Ithaca, N.Y., he opened a public house (inn) to accomodate the tide of emigrants which passed over it in search of homes in the Genessee Country. The increasing travel and new accessions to the settlements soon necessatated an addition to his house. This was the first public house in the town, and was opened in 1799. Mr. Moore continued to dispense thes hospitalities for many years.

The first town meeting was held at Sylvanus Moore's home, on March 4, 1817. He was elected on the town board. He also held positions of Commissioner of Schools and Inspector of Common Schools. On July 1, 1817, he eas named to serve on the jury. Having pail for his farm, and raised sons large enough to undertak

devoted himself to its management. He soon rebuilt the mill and purchased an additional three hundred and eighty acres of land, mostly covered with pine timber, so that he was able to supply the demand of lumber. This sawmill was built by Henry W. Ludlow in 1798, on the outlet of Ludlow Pond, named from the builder of the mill. It was the first mill in the town and tended largely to promote the settlements of this locality. Mr. Moore still continued to invest in lands until he had acquired 1,100 acres free from debt.

He was early commissioned captain of a military company, then an office of no little distinction, and held his commission until his age was the oldest of his regiment. He represented the town as supervisor some eight or ten years, and was magistrate for a number of years.

The great abundance of game and fish in the forests and streams vastly mitigated the privations to which the early settlers were exposed; indeed without them the settlement and subjugation of this wilderness would have been well nigh impossible with the class of people who generally braved the trials and dangers incident thereto, as most of them were utterly destitute of means and depended largely upon these as a means of subsistence, especially during the earlier years of their settlement. Most of the early settlers therefore became more or less expert marksmen. The gun was as indispensable as the implements of husbandry, not as only an aid in furnishing the means of subsistence, but also as a means of protection against the beasts of prey which infested the forests and were a constant source of alarm for many years.

On one occasion, Mr. Moore was reminded during the early part of his settlement that the meat tub was getting low; so at the close of his day's labors he repaired to the woods with his gun and soon had the fortune to start a deer, which he speedily shot. He was quickly on the spot, and to his surprise he found that though he had seen but one, he had shot two, which lay within a rod of each other. His attention was attracted by a rustling in the bushes nearby, and he discovered a third deer, which was rising to its feet. He instantly grasped it, and with a tremendous effort succeeded in holding it till he cut its throat. Thus he had the satisfaction of carrying home three deer, which was sufficient to replenish his meat tub supply and furnish his neighbor's supply.

Mr. Moore's wife was truly a help-mate. She was a woman of great energy and perseverance, as well as amiability, and greatly assisted by her industry in paying off the indebtedness on the homestead; for in addition to her domestic duties, including the manufacture of cloth from flax, a very essential crop, from which the clothing for the family was made, she also found time to assist her husband in various ways with his work of clearing up the land, and to weave for her neighbors who did not have looms. One season, while she had to care for five children, she carded, spun and wove two hundred pounds of wool for Mr. Ludlow, thus

many years of service and was frequently called into requisition in critical and dangerous cases, so that for many years, when professional aid was not easily obtained, she supplied quite satisfactorily that deficiency. Her oldest daughter had in her possession an old account book on her Mother's records containing one hundred and forty-four births, which she attended professionally. This number does not include the many for which payment was made at the time, and of which no record was kept. She died in 1822, at the age of forty four years.

After the death of his first wife, Sylvanus married on Dec. 18 1824, Polly Coville, born in New Hartford, Conn., on Jan. 11, 1796. She died Nov. 22, 1882. Sylvanus was a stout, healthy man until he reached the age of seventy-six, when he was prostrated by a shock of palsy, and from which he never recovered. Both he and his wives are buried in the Moore Cemetery on the farm. Six children were born to him by his first wife.

1. Eliza T. was born March 20, 1799, she was the first white child born in the town. She married Daniel Smith, who died Sept. 25, 1877.
