## Sex Education Must Be Barred From Using the Air

WE ARE informed that a determined effort will be made soon to persuade broadcasters to present programs on sex education. Our parlors, in brief, may become open forums for talk about sexual irregularities. The plan's followers are sincere in their belief that bringing sex to the airwaves will solve all adolescent problems.

But they are as wrong about their method as a "Literary Digest" presidential poll. We agree that sex should be brought into the open and the hush-hush attitude abolished, but never, never on the kilocycles which ride into our homes.

Once upon a time sex education was a responsibility of the father or the mother. Frequently that responsibility was not properly discharged, but that does not alter the fact that the duty was rightfully placed. Others may believe differently, but we are still old-fashioned enough to maintain that sex education will always be a proper subject chiefly for the family circle.

That circle was first broken, remember, when educators suggested that schools could do a job at which families were failing. Let us talk about it openly, they said, and we will solve your problems. Some lazy mothers and ignorant fathers believed them and were relieved to be free of an embarrassing obligation. But has open discussion of sex problems in school solved the problem as promised? Authorities tell us conditions are as bad as ever. A typical New York high school, for instance, is said to be sending two girls each month to a home for expectant mothers.

Could a radio program, no matter how artfully contrived or how chocolate-coated, prevent that? We doubt it. We doubt that anything will prevent it except the shouldering of their proper duties by every father and every mother.

Sex education must begin at home. So far as broadcasting is concerned, it must stay there. We believe all broadcasters will join in barring such a crack-brained plan and its addle-minded advocates from the air.

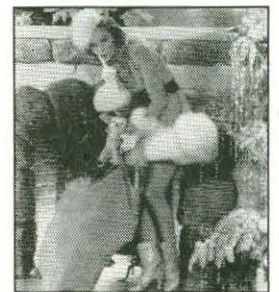

TO CHILDREN, Santa Claus is a real person. His twinkling nose, his elfin personality, his all-encompassing knowledge are as real to kids as Christmas shopping-bills are to grown-ups. To reflect the peace of mind, the assurance and happiness which are the heritage of only the very young, we have chosen Baby Sandy's letter to Santa Claus as a means of recalling to us all our happy childhood days. Baby Sandy is not quite three years old this Yuletide. She has still to meet the three R's, yet to learn the meaning of world fame, although she already has been starred in five successful motion pictures. A happy child, her two outstanding characteristics are her ready laughter and her quick "Why?" when she doesn't understand. Now that she has heard the story of Santa Claus, been shown a picture of him standing before a trimotored plane, and has been told how he is going to land on the roof of her home in a parachute, she's the most excited little girl in Hollywood. She tells everyone she meets about it. The idea of writing a letter to Santa intrigued her. She knew exactly what she wanted. She didn't question the fact that her mother was going to write the letter for her, but her blues eyes sparkled and grew as large as old-fashioned sauce-plates while she waited for her to get the pencil and paper. She thought hard for a few minutes, then dictated the letter. We reproduce it in the hope it will cause readers to think back, perhaps recapture the childhood sensation of the fitness of things that has been lost by too many people in too many lands. The wording—and the signature—are Baby Sandy's own.

ALTHOUGH Santa Claus is only a legend to grown-ups, the meaning of Christmas in its full and true sense is one which remains always. Asked what she'd like to have for Christmas, May Robson, the grand old lady of the screen, smiled softly. Her alert eyes twinkled. "Well," she chuckled, "what I'd really like is a blue hoop and a toy electric railroad with all the gadgets." Then she sat down and wrote a real letter to Santa, at MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE's request. Her letter is that of a wise and experienced woman who has worked out a philosophy of living which, in its own way, is just as simple and serene as is Baby Sandy's. But from the fullness of her seventy-seven years of kindly living and experience, Miss Robson also made concrete suggestions. THE INCREDIBLE Ratoff's face mirrors the emotional maelstroms through which he passes

# Ratoff is a

MAGINE and all those chores, and he's happiest when he's doing them all at once. Mr. Ratoff thrives on confusion and loves to have not the faintest idea where he's at. As though Gregory's endeavors weren't enough for any one family, Mrs. Ratoff works too. She is Eugenie Leontovich, whom you may have seen as the mother in "Four Sons," which part she won from among six other top-flight character actresses who were tested for it. Her performance has already been mentioned as a possibility for an Academy Award, and Mrs. Ratoff learned her art in the same hard school as her husband. She was widely celebrated in Europe before coming to the United States in "Grand Hotel" and "Tovarich," and she and Gregory were married in 1922, when they were in separate troupes playing different towns. They arranged the

ceremony in a third town, to which each came half-way, and after a week-end honeymoon they didn't see one another again for two months. "Of course the show had to go on," grimaced Mr. Ratoff as he related the incident. "What's a marriage?" Then, with the inimitable Ratoff shrug: "Just two people's lives!"

ONE of the choicest stories ever to come out of Hollywood—and that's taking in a lot of choice stories—gives you Gregory Ratoff in a nutshell. It happened soon after he went out to the cinema coast from New York, and at that time Mr. Ratoff was most unhappy. In New York he had become something of a Broadway big-shot and so was used to a lot of adulation, but in Hollywood nobody seemed ever to have heard of him and he was left largely to himself. Hell hath no torture

like leaving an actor to himself, and it wasn't long before Gregory picked up a phone and called Eugenie at their hotel. "Hollywood doesn't like us and we don't like Hollywood," he told her in his most melancholy voice, "so we are going back to New York right away. Pack all our things and I'll meet you in the lobby. We catch the five o'clock train." Eugenie, used to such sudden developments, obeyed instructions to the letter. At four-thirty, surrounded by piles of luggage, she was downstairs waiting. Came five o'clock, five-thirty, six o'clock and still no Gregory. At six-thirty his bulky figure came twirling blithely through the revolving door, and as he caught sight of Eugenie and the mountain of luggage he stopped short and threw his arms tragically asunder.

"So," he groaned sepulchraly in his best Hamlet style, "you're leaving me again!"

Such incidents are the rule rather than the exception with the mercurial Mr. Ratoff. His five years in Hollywood have been one emotional maelstrom after another, and not only for Mr. Ratoff but for Hollywood as well. Used as it is to temperament, Hollywood has never seen anything like Mr. Ratoff's swift changes from frolicsome gaiety to thundercloud wrath; he slithers from one to the other upon the slightest provocation like a pianist skidding from treble to bass. His favorite trick during the transition is to tear from his head the yachting cap which he inevitably wears while directing, throw it upon the stage floor and jump on it. Inasmuch as those natty caps cost ten dollars apiece a really bad day for Mr. Ratoff runs into money.

There was, for instance, the time when Mr. Ratoff was directing Lionel—not John—Barrymore in a recent picture. Lionel has put in his time on the speaking stage, too, and is conceded to be one of the best actors in Hollywood, but all that made no difference to Gregory; he always has to go through every scene for everybody, so he proceeded to show Lionel how. It was a very long scene and Mr. Ratoff made the most of it, speaking every line of dialog, acting out every gesture, giving every word and every motion all the *oomph* he has. When he had finished he peered down closely into Lionel's face, only to learn that the latter's eyes were closed in peaceful sleep.

That time Mr. Ratoff didn't explode.

He would give him a picture in which to do both and that would be the last of him.

Just the same, and notwithstanding all his spectacular idiosyncrasies, Gregory Ratoff is a troupier of the old tradition who yearns with all his being to make good motion pictures. He cries or he clowns, as the mood moves him, but always he is trying to give expression to the chaotic feelings that seethe in his Russian soul. It is true that he mutilates the English language second only to Sam Goldwyn, true that he's either riding a cloud or groveling in some deep abyss he's just dug for himself—because for Gregory there is no half-way point of sanity, and his volatile spirit leaps or plunges as things go right or wrong. All that is because with him creative agony is synonymous with artistic ecstasy, and he's always seeking something that is never there.

Ever since he can remember he has been trying to grasp that elusive something which remains just beyond reach. He doesn't know what it is nor why he wants it, but it has led him from the St. Petersburg Dramatic School, where he began his theatrical career in the days of the czars, half-way around the world to Hollywood.

Gregory was born in Samara, in the provinces, and went to dramatic school only after he had graduated with honors from the school of law at St. Petersburg University. Why he studied to be a lawyer he doesn't know either, since he always wanted to be an actor—although he says now that a lawyer is a man who has to act innocent when he knows his client is guilty—and when he got his first

stage part as the butler in Ostrovsky's "Mad Money" he knew that all those years spent with the law books had been in vain. However, it looked then as if his dramatic studies had been in vain, too, for at about that time Kaiser Wilhelm started the original *blitzkrieg* into Belgium and the first world war was on. Soon, instead of carrying a tray at the Maly Theater, Gregory found himself carrying a gun on the eastern front.

L ENIN and Trotzky got him out of that with the revolution, but Gregory, although grateful to be out of the army, wanted no part of the bolshevik program. Instead, after a hitch with a stock company as a juvenile leading man, he decided to go to Berlin and put on Russian plays in a sort of little-theater movement all of his own long before little theaters had

distinctly unmatinee-idol-like face and form in any convenient glass. "I must have fascinated her," he breathes wonderingly.

Gregory took out his American citizenship papers long ago, but no papers could deprive him of his accent. He clings to that over the bridge of years because, he says, it retains his individuality. So his "whys" are "vys" and his "vegetables" are "vegetables," and his pronunciations in general are so mixed up that a casting director, recently requisitioning twenty Russians for a Cossack scene, wrote instead, "twenty Ratoffs." Central Casting knew immediately exactly what was wanted.

Whether he's actor or director, not to mention when he's both, Gregory works himself into a sweat—literally. He perspires so much that he has to change his shirt at least every hour, and his laundry bill is staggering. Particularly was this true when he was working in "The Great Profile," in which, as he said later, every scene was a duel. He and Jack Barrymore crossed their Thespian swords every time they were before the camera together, and the clash of their witticisms could be heard clear to the front office.

"That was really an engagement," sighed Gregory when the film was finished, "you know, an engagement between lovers like Hitler and Churchill. We tossed each other bouquets that went off like bombs."

Not long ago Gregory bought Eugenie a grand piano. Eugenie, of course, was very pleased at her husband's thoughtfulness, but since she plays beautifully she was a bit hurt when Gregory proudly pressed a button and the piano began to play by itself.

"Why did you buy me an electrical piano, Gregory?" she asked. "You know I like to play."

"Well, m'dear, I'll tell you," Gregory mollified her, "I know you play lovely and nobody likes to listen to you play half as much as I do. But you see," he explained, "we're up in the money and in Hollywood none of the best people play their pianos by hand."

Being an artist Mr. Ratoff can scarcely be expected to shine as a businessman as well and he most emphatically doesn't. He makes lots of money, to be sure, but he spends it so fast that he's practically always broke. Accordingly when some time ago a friend recommended a business manager, Mr. Ratoff promptly hired him. The first thing that the business manager insisted upon was that Gregory should limit his personal expenditures to a moderate allowance. Gregory promised faithfully that he would.

Came the first of the month and Mr. Ratoff handed the business manager a sheaf of mail. The latter was amazed to open it and find a flock of bills.

"But I told you that you had to stay within your allowance," he said to Gregory indignantly. "What are all these bills for?"

"I did exactly as you told me," Gregory retorted, "I didn't spend any money. When I bought anything I just charged it."

Now the business manager, as well as Mr. Ratoff's business affairs, is in a chaotic condition.

Mr. Ratoff can no more help doing the things he does than the earth can help going around the sun. He's a man of parts, figuratively, literally and psychologically, and he never stops acting even when he's asleep. He's acting for himself as well as for Hollywood—so much so that not even Mr. Ratoff, much less his friends, knows where Gregory leaves off and the act begins or vice versa. Only Eugenie has him figured out completely.

"Gregory?" she smiled. "You've got to take him as he is—you just can't translate him from the Russian."

Weidler), and her uncle, "Pincher" Willie (Roland Young), are aware that she cherishes a secret torch for her first husband, but it takes much telling-off and a party at which she imbibes too much champagne in self-sympathy before she finally lets her hair down and admits that she has been wrong all along.

Miss Hepburn and Jimmy Stewart, in a scene in which he proves her "undoing" which eventually proves her regeneration, provide a love episode which has few superiors in screen history. It really is something. Likewise is the dialog, which is smart from beginning to end.

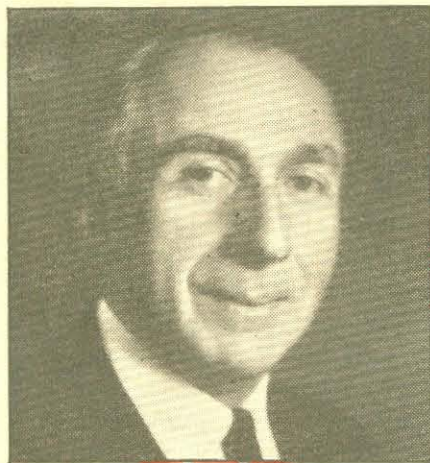

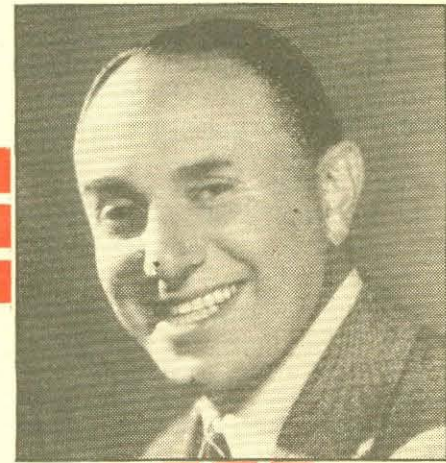

## Entertainment, Inc.: Meet the Brothers Warner

**A** COUPLE of years back, when Warner Bros. sent out into a world not yet fully awake to the incipient dangers of Naziism a film called "Confessions of a Nazi Spy," starring Edward G. Robinson as the Little Caesar of the G-men, many people called them alarmists. Particularly the far-flung membership of the German-American Bund called them alarmists, and Herr Hitler promptly and forthwith banned Warner pictures from the theaters of the Third Reich.

Subsequent events show that the Brothers Warner, who have seen the Third Reich grow until it encompasses most of Europe with the ban still unlifted, are alarmists in just the same sense that Paul Revere was an alarmist, and they followed that first warning, "The Nazis are coming," with a series of grand patriotic short subjects, all driving home to Americans the manifold advantages they enjoy under a flag Warners has been proud to wave.

The Brothers Warner are three in number—and widely diverse in their tastes and talents. Guiding light of getting headlines into film—Warners is noted for this business of making timely pictures—is Jack L. Warner, vice president in charge of production. Youngish, with a famous smile and a way of putting his finger on hidden troubles quickly and unerringly, Jack Warner knows the faces and most of the names of the 3,500 men and women who labor in his vineyards. No employe ever doubted that he was the real boss of the lot.

President of the outfit is Harry M. Warner, oldest of the brothers, whose principal interests are Americanization work and charity. As president of the company he is largely responsible for the making of the many patriotic short subjects. Third brother and financial wizard of the trio is Major Albert Warner, who seldom sees the studio but spends his time in New York or Florida as vice president and treasurer of the family institution.

Not a Warner, but associated with them for fifteen years in the making of films and money, is executive producer Hal Wallis, known as the hardest-working man in Hollywood, who, together with such associate producers as Mark Hellinger, Jesse Lasky, Henry Blanke, William Cagney, Robert Lord, Bryan Foy, Wolfgang Reinhardt, Harlan Thompson and others, turns out some fifty feature pictures

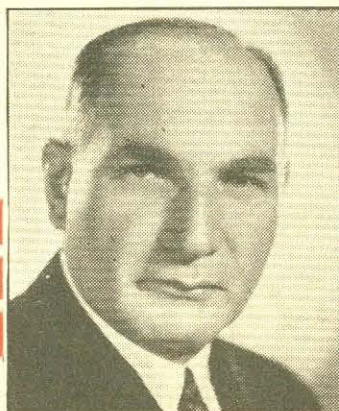
a year and a steady stream of short subjects at a cost estimated this season of \$35,000,000. This included the sensational Bette Davis film, "The Letter," James Cagney's "City for Conquest" and "Knut Rockne—All-American."

The one hundred ten acres which comprise the main Warner lot in Burbank was once an alfalfa patch. Today it is a magnificent and not too crowded group of buildings done in Spanish architecture, with twenty-two soundstages of the same architectural style and built of stucco, steel and concrete.

On the famous back lot at Warners stands a battery of dressing-rooms for the forty stars and more than fifty featured players who make Warners' films. On the doors may be seen such names as James Cagney, Bette Davis, Errol Flynn, Miriam Hopkins, George Raft, Edward G. Robinson, Ann Sheridan.

Warners also took the lead in turning out the monumental and deeply impressive biographical films, such masterpieces as Muni's "Zola," and "Pasteur"; Edward G. Robinson's "Dr. Ehrlich's Magic Bullet" and "The Man From Reuters." But even such an impressive line-up as this may have been lost in the Hollywood shuffle but for the vigorous breast-beating of S. Charles Einfeld, vice president of Warners in charge of publicity and advertising. Einfeld is rated one of the finest publicity executives in America, and together with Robert S. Taplinger, who handles publicity from the Hollywood end, was responsible for starting the junket premieres with "Dodge City," a star-studded affair held in Dodge City, Kansas.

Big films to be turned out during the year include "High Sierra," with Humphrey Bogart and Ida Lupino; "Fiesta in Manhattan" as yet uncast, and "The Fabulous '30's," also uncast to date, but to be made from a story by Mark Hellinger, who will also serve as associate producer; "Her Great Lie," with Bette Davis and George Brent; Edward G. Robinson, John Garfield and Ida Lupino in "The Sea Wolf"; "Strawberry Blonde," with James Cagney and Olivia de Havilland, and "The Wagons Roll At Night," with Humphrey Bogart.

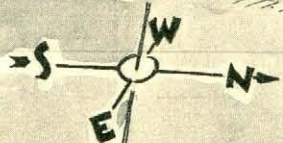


WHERE to go and what to see on the Warner lot is shown in map on the opposite page. L.: Maj. Albert Warner, vice pres.

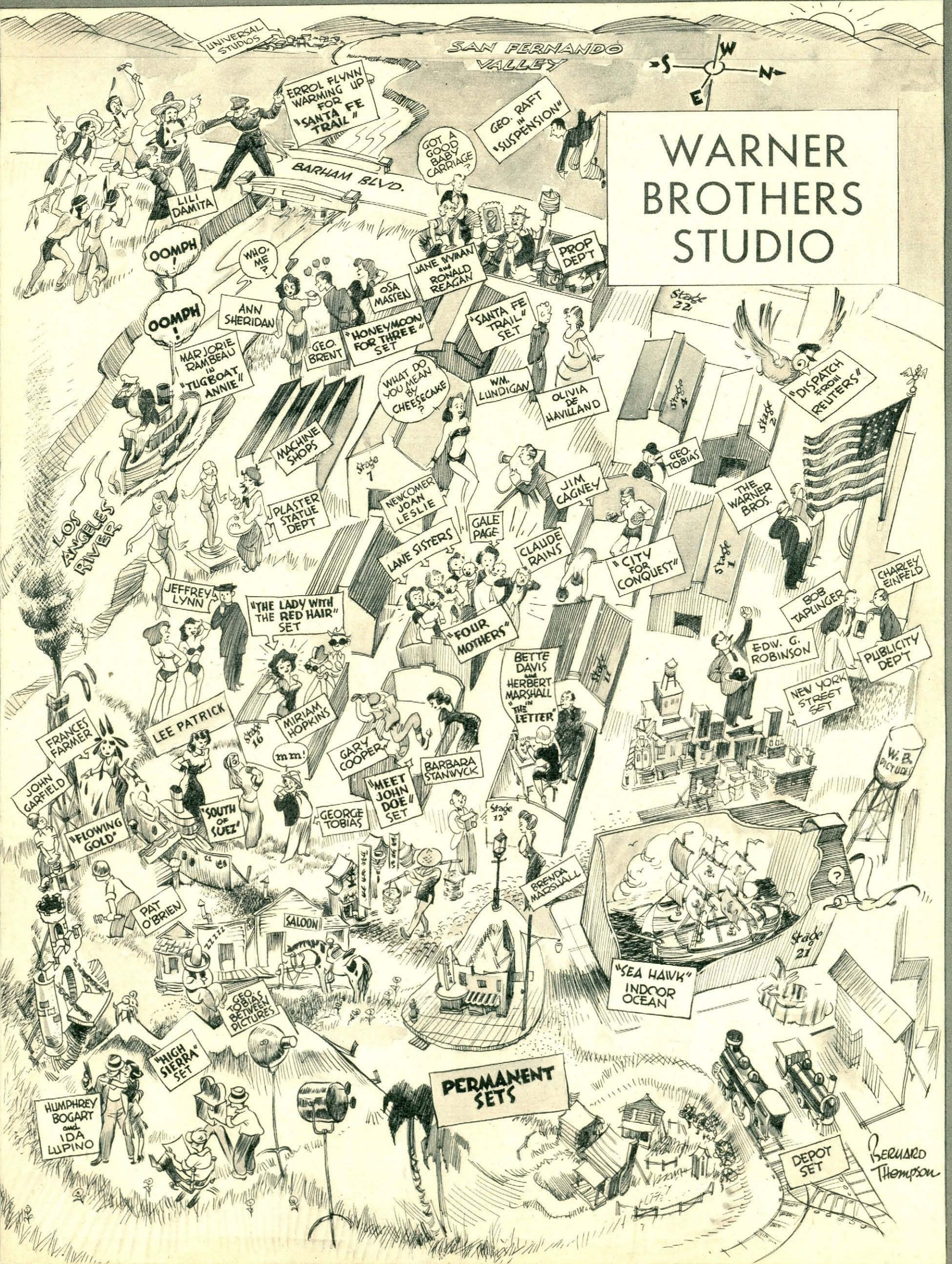

Cesar Romero is the "Cisco Kid" to millions of movie-goers, but those of us who know him well call him "Butch."

He is a good Joe in every sense of the word, and while some people (mostly writers) sometimes get annoyed with him because he won't talk about his private life or his dates with Hollywood glamour girls, he's respected for it. If you don't want to take my word on this, all you have to do is watch him fooling around with "Ty," his pup, his kitten, "Minnie," or "Satan," the big black horse he rides in the "Cisco Kid" pictures. These animals all think that "Butch" is just about it, and while a clever guy can usually fool another person, he don't get far handing the old malarkey to a dog or a horse.

four-poster bed without a canopy, a desk, two easy chairs and one lounge. He wears gray pajamas.

First thing he does upon getting up is take a shower. (His bathroom is unusual in that it has no tub in it.) Next thing he does is light a cigarette (Chesterfield).

He smokes while he shaves, using a safety razor, Billy Gaxton's "charvet" soap, and finishes with a dash of Kinze-Ten cologne.

By 11:20 he's downstairs for breakfast. He eats breakfast from dishes that were won by a former houseboy on a punch-board, and stows away sliced peaches (or some similar fruit), scrambled eggs and ham, toast with strawberry jam and coffee, which he drinks with cream and one lump of sugar.

After breakfast he looks over fan mail (and he gets plenty), then likely as not plays with his puppy "Ty." He named this pooch "Ty" after Tyrone Power, who gave it to him. The pup's mother is Tyrone's German shepherd, but the father is unknown. "Butch" is waiting for the pup to grow up to see if he can figure it out.

Next he reads the trade-papers; says he always looks through them to see if he can find anything about Romero—but claims he never does. Trade-papers disposed of, he carries the dailies into his den—and leaves them there. He never reads the morning papers until just before dinner.

After hanging around the house for about an hour and a half, his con-

science begins bothering him, so he slips on a robe and goes out into the patio to take some exercise. He has a bar-bell there (forty-two-and-one-half-pound weights on each end) and he starts out strongly. After he pushes the bar up from his chest about three times his conscience is salved and he considers himself exercised.

He then goes in, changes to sport clothes, and leaves the house about one o'clock. He'll take the dog to the vet, go to the bank, do any errands he has on his mind, or just go for a ride. He drives a 1941 maroon Buick convertible sedan with white-sidewall tires. Practically new, the car has about one thousand miles on it already.

"Butch" was one of the first actors in Hollywood to be asked to produce his conscription registration certificate. It happened when a cop stopped him—not to arrest him for speeding but to give him a friendly warning. The age on his card is thirty-three.

"Butch" draws a check in four figures for his week's work, and deposits it regularly. He's pretty good on money matters. He's an avid reader of magazines, subscribes to *Life*, *Look*, *Esquire*, *Saturday Evening Post*, *Reader's Digest* and *Town and Country*, buys the movie-fan magazines and *MOVIE-RADIO GUIDE* at the newsstand, which he checks almost daily for new issues when he isn't working.

He usually drifts over to the West Side tennis club about four in the afternoon, as likely as not plays gin rummy with some pals; about every so often he gets on a tennis-playing spree, then he plays so much and so hard his feet hurt him. When that happens, he goes easy on the tennis for a few days. His favorite drink at the club (and usually at the night-clubs) is a Coca-Cola with half a lime in it.

Cesar Romero is "Butch's" real name, although the movie-makers tried to get him to change it when he first came to Hollywood. He's a true Latin from Manhattan, since he was born in New York and is the son of an exporter and the Cuban opera singer, Maria Mantilla. That accounts for his continual gesturing with his hands when he talks, his habit of slouching in his chair when seated, and probably for his restlessness, which exhibits itself in the continual crossing and recrossing of his legs.

"Butch" seldom eats dinner at home, preferring to eat out, or at parties—and all you have to do is watch the gossip columns to know that he usually has charming company (feminine) with him. A typical evening for Ro-

Don Pasquale, a crusty old bachelor, has decided to marry, but forbids Ernesto, his nephew in love with Norina, to do so. Dr. Malatesta, a scheming family friend, sides with Ernesto and cooks up a plot to bring Don Pasquale around. He has Norina pass herself off as his sister and marries her to Don Pasquale in a mock ceremony. A sweet and shy girl until the marriage, Norina turns into a terrible shrew afterwards, running up bills, upsetting the household and making life generally miserable for the old Don. When he discovers the hoax, he is so relieved to be free of the whole mess that he lets Ernesto marry Norina with his blessing.

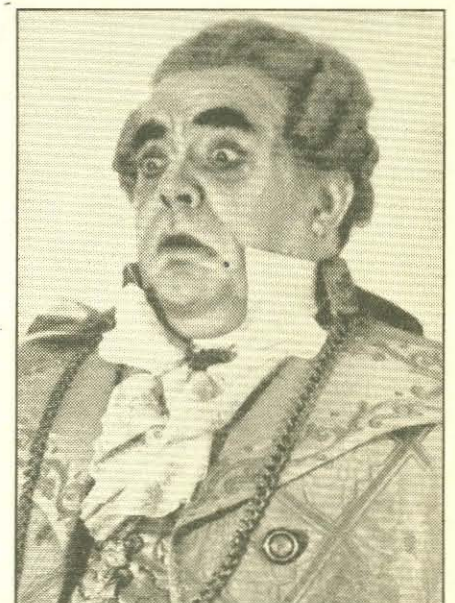

## Records and Books for Christmas

LAST week I mentioned a new life of Bach by Hendrik Willem van Loon and Grace Castagnetta, due to appear on December 16. Called "The Life and Times of Johann Sebastian Bach," it is published by Simon and Schuster, New York. Anyone familiar with the books of Van Loon and Castagnetta know how enchanting they are. With text and exquisite illustrations by Van Loon and musical selections carefully chosen and arranged by Miss Castagnetta, one of America's most gifted young pianists, these books, "Christmas Carols," "Folksongs From Many Lands," "The Songs America Loves to Sing" and "The Last of the Troubadours," make ideal Christmas presents. But unquestionably the best one they have produced is their latest. As usual, Van Loon wrote and illustrated the text. But in place of the printed musical numbers, Miss Castagnetta has made four ten-inch records of Bach music, which come with the book in a separate album. Together, book and album cost \$5.00. Apart from the book is \$2.50 and the album \$3.00. This is a completely new idea and may open endless possibilities to musical biographers. By all means, buy this for your most exigent musical friend, who will get endless enjoyment from it.

OTHER recent books to stuff in any music-lover's Christmas stocking will certainly include "A Treasury of American Song," by Elie Siegmeister, American composer, and Olin Downes, music critic of the *New York Times* (Howell Soskin, New York, \$5.00), a wealth of old song favorites arranged simply but expertly by Siegmeister with informative text by Downes; "Approach to Music," by Lawrence Abbott (Farrar and Reinhardt, New York), the very best book on music appreciation in recent years, by the man who has written all the continuity for Walter Damrosch's NBC "Music Appreciation" programs; and "Fantasia," by Deems Taylor (Simon and Schuster, New York, \$3.75), the story of the great Walt Disney film, with text by Taylor, wonderful colored illustrations by Disney and a foreword by Leopold Stokowski.

As a complementary gift with "Fantasia" you might give either Stravinsky's "Rites of Spring," conducted by Stravinsky himself (Columbia M-417), or Tschaikowsky's "Nutcracker" Suite, Chicago Symphony, Frederick Stock, conductor (Columbia M-395, \$3.50), both pieces that were used in the Disney picture.

Two other superb Tschaikowsky recordings, one a few months old, and one appearing in January, are musts for every record collection. The Tschaikowsky 5th Symphony, Chicago Symphony under Frederick Stock (Columbia), is outstanding, and advance reports of the new Stokowski-All American Youth Orchestra recording of the "Pathetique" (No. 6) (Columbia M-432) are sensational.

IF YOU know someone whose musical taste is violently modernistic, give him or her "Contrasts for Violin, Clarinet and Piano," by Bela Bartok (Columbia X-178, \$2.50), played by Bela Bartok, Joseph Szigeti and Benny Goodman. Nothing could be more modern than that!

A slightly more heartwarming and enduring gift would be Schubert's song cycle, "Der Winterreise" (The Winter Journey), as sung by Lotte Lehmann (Victor M-692, \$4.00). These songs are some of the most beautiful ever written. Mme. Lehmann, by the way, will sing the entire cycle on the air sometime in February with the New Friends of Music.

And last but not least, the most amusing and entertaining record present of the year is Ted Cott's album of the popular "So You Think You Know Music" radio program (Musicraft). This comes complete with three records (six sides) and score sheets. Any number of people can play the game. Cott asks the questions, allows a short space of time for you to jot down your answers. A gong sounds time, and he goes on to the next question. This would be an attractive feature for your Christmas party.

These are a few suggestions, and they may provide the spark of inspiration you need if presents for those music-loving friends are still worrying you. —V. L.

## Musician of the Week David Smith

First broadcast of a genius—this teen-age lad may make it Saturday

IF YOU listen to the program of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music on Saturday morning, December 21 (CBS), you may find that you have heard the first broadcast of a genius. At least, that's the opinion of three musical experts—but here's the story.

About a month ago three eminent New York musicians gathered at the home of one of them to pick a winner for the Edgar Stillman Kelley Junior Scholarship presented by the National Federation of Music Clubs to talented young music students up to the age of fifteen. Thirty-four contestants from nine states had taken part, and all but six finalists had been eliminated. These six had sent in recordings of their playing, from which the final decision was to be made. The judges were Adelaide Gescheidt, noted voice teacher and coach; Henry Holden Huss, pianist-composer; and Leonard Liebling, editor-in-chief of the *Musical Courier*, and formerly editor of this department.

The three judges listened to the records, forming their opinions. They arrived at the last batch, three sent by a contestant from Cincinnati, a pianist. The selections were Chopin's F minor Ballade, a Paganini-Liszt Caprice, Rimsky-Korsakoff's "The Bee," all of them difficult even for a virtuoso, much less a fifteen-year-old student. The first piece played was the Caprice. The judges listened in silence for a few minutes, the expression on their faces changing from studious attention to bewildered astonishment. Leonard Liebling jumped up.

"I don't believe it," he said. The other two judges also rose from their seats.

"Who did you say played this?" Liebling asked.

Mme. Gescheidt stopped the

record and they crowded around. The record read, "Played by David Smith." The judges looked up what information they had received on David Smith: "Fifteen years old, a pupil of Dr. Karol Lisz-niewski of Cincinnati."

"It's a fake," declared Liebling flatly. "It's simply incredible that a boy of fifteen could play like that and not be internationally famous. I have

heard some of the greatest pianists when they were fifteen and they didn't do any better than this young Smith. I can't believe that Eugene Goossens (conductor of the Cincinnati Symphony) wouldn't know about such a talent and have presented him publicly."

The other two judges reluctantly agreed with him, but even their reluctance faded when they heard the other pieces. They unanimously declared that either it was a colossal hoax, or an unknown genius was hidden in Cincinnati. They finally decided to award David Smith the scholarship if it could be proved that there was such a person, and that he had actually made the records.

A week later a letter from Dr. Lisz-niewski was received by the judges. It not only proved conclusively that there is a David Smith but also that he had made the records. Dr. Lisz-niewski added:

"The boy is a phenomenal talent whom nature has endowed in every respect. He lives at my house and goes to high school, where he is an outstanding student. David will play the Chopin E minor Concerto with the Cincinnati Conservatory Orchestra on one of our Saturday Columbia broadcasts shortly."

"Shortly" will be on December 21. Listen and see if you concur with the judges' amazing decision. —V. L.

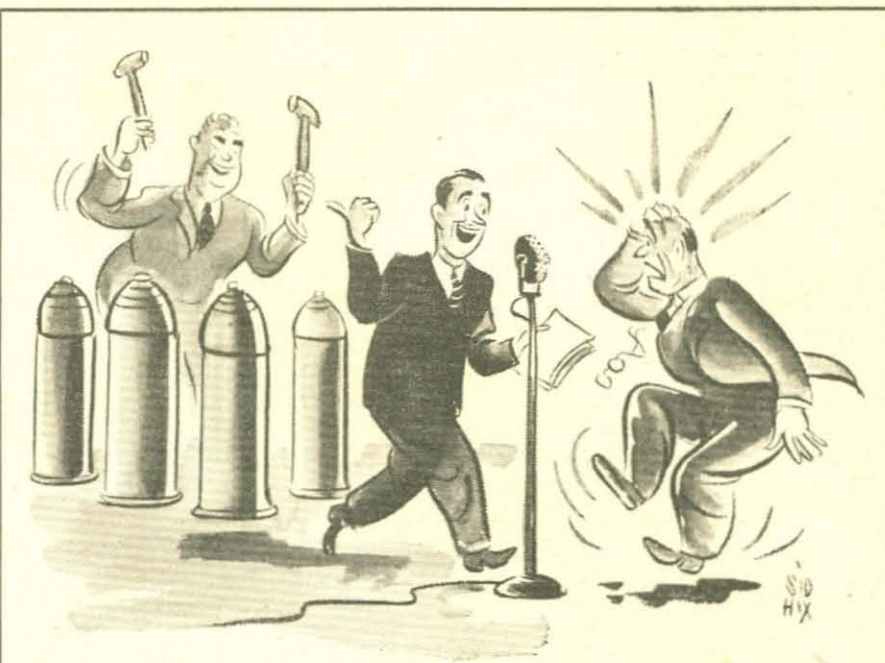

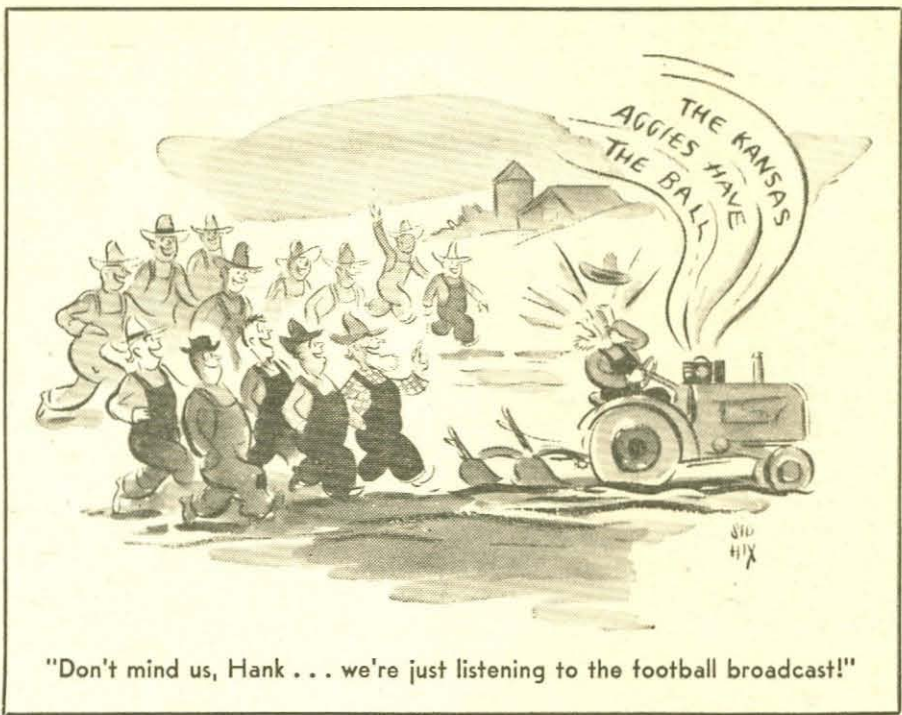

## "THOSE WE LOVE"

"THOSE WE LOVE" is the story of a family whose roots are deeply embedded in the small New England town of Westbridge, where traditions are treasured and life is lived graciously. The John Marshalls are a normal family, fun-loving and mistake-making, but exceedingly wary of anyone who smacks of being a stuffed shirt. Some people think Mr. Marshall (Oscar O'Shea) is stern, but Agnes Ridgeway, author of this CBS

(Monday) dramatic show, now in its third year on the air, says, "Really, it's just dignity, and dignity is not as bad as you might think. A lot of nice people have been dignified. George Washington was." Mr. Marshall's daughter, Kathy (Nan Grey), is the main character. Kathy is more than a little in love with Dr. Leslie Foster (Donald Woods) and seriously concerned with his well-being—but not quite sure of her own feelings. Her pal

is Aunt Emily (Alma Kruger), who's cared for the Marshall household, twins and all, since the death of Mrs. Marshall, and who is aided by Martha (Virginia Sale), the maid, who can cook for company either way—so they'll come again or so they'll stay away. Mrs. Emmett (Mary Gordon) is Dr. Leslie Foster's likable housekeeper, runs his home and cares for his little daughter Amy (Ann Todd). Elaine (Helen Wood), another "Those We Love"

character, operates an antique shop with Kathy, is interested in Kathy's twin brother Kit (Richard Cromwell). Not to be forgotten is Rags, the Marshall dog (played by old-time vaudeville trouper Lee Millar), who tags Martha's footsteps from morning until night. "Those We Love" is a serious story—but not too serious. It has comic moments and tragic ones, but through it all persists a fine, clean story of life in the little village of Westbridge.

HARDEST HIT in any all-out ASCAP-BMI war will be bandleaders, thinks Fred Waring, who urges peace



**A**FTER January 1, 1941, your radio listening won't be the same. Better or worse? That awaits your judgment. But, at least as far as music is concerned, you're in for a radical change in your musical status quo. The change will be the result of what is perhaps the most revolutionary step in radio entertainment since the birth of network broadcasting.

For over a decade you've heard "Amos 'n' Andy" ushered into your home by the strains of "The Perfect Song." Maybe you didn't know the title, but you certainly knew the tune. You'll have to get used to another theme.

Can you imagine Kay Kyser's band bowing onto the air without sliding in on the trombone's "Thinking of You" glissades; or Tommy Dorsey greeting you without his own trombone sighing "I'm Getting Sentimental Over You"; or Shep Fields blowing bubbles in a bowl of water without the music of "Rippling Rhythm" for a background; or—yes, even this—Rudy Vallee vocally pledging something besides "My Time Is Your Time"?

You won't hear on the air "Trees," "Stardust," "Oh Johnny, Oh Johnny, Oh!" "The Stars and Stripes Forever," Malotte's musical setting for the Lord's

total ASCAP income. The five-year contract between the broadcasters and ASCAP expires at the end of this year. In presenting its terms for the new contract, ASCAP raised the figures to such an extent that radio would pay in 1941 between eight and ten million dollars, about twice as much as in 1939 or 1940.

Radio, which has often kicked at ASCAP's terms, this time finally said a flat "No," through its official voice, the National Association of Broadcasters. The broadcasters proceeded last April 1 to form their own music-publishing organization, Broadcast Music, Inc., in direct competition with ASCAP and its member publishers. Then the music-war baby set out to prove it was no April Fool joke, to produce enough non-ASCAP music to take over the airwaves completely after January 1, 1941.

When we call this transitional move a revolution, we mean just that. It is an all-out battle for musical control of the air. The BMI rebels are rising to challenge the power of the ASCAP rulers. Both are powerful forces, make no mistake. Since its organization by Victor Herbert, John Philip Sousa and others in 1914, ASCAP has beaten back attack after attack, legal and otherwise, to entrench itself as one of

songs on NBC and CBS sustaining programs. For months you've heard such tunes as the high-ranking "Hit Parade" hit, "Practice Makes Perfect," the haunting "Here in the Velvet Night" and "We Could Make Such Beautiful Music," the lilting "There I Go" and "The Same Old Story," and the catchy "Madame Will Drop Her Shawl." Such are examples of the songs the high-g geared BMI music-mill, at 580 Fifth Ave., New York City, is grinding out at the rate of two a day.

In addition to the operating stock of new original music, BMI expects to have by the end of 1940 at least 1,000 non-ASCAP arrangements of well-known public domain songs, that is, songs free for public use through expiration of copyright or because they have not been copyrighted at all. These include such old favorites as "Home on the Range," "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms," "Home, Sweet Home," "Silver Threads Among the Gold," "Ciribiribin," Stephen Foster's songs, Strauss waltzes, the classics and light classics.

**M**OREOVER, BMI is licensing some 14,000 copyrights in catalogs bought up from four publishers. These include western and hillbilly folk ballads, religious selections, concert music and a large share of characteristic Latin and South American music.

Since BMI declared open house for song-writers it has been flooded with manuscripts, at the rate of more than a thousand a week, from both bona-fide and would-be composers, most of them publicly unknown. This come-one-come-all principle has, at least, already proved a stimulus to freshness of inspiration and creative vitality.

The roots of the struggle spring primarily, of course, from business factors. ASCAP wants more money, contending that radio is substantially dependent for its revenue on ASCAP music. Radio, through the NAB, says ASCAP music isn't worth the demanded price, that ASCAP is more dependent on radio than radio upon ASCAP.

Of course both rival camps carry crusade torches to shed a halo around their commercial causes. ASCAP accuses the broadcasters of being greedy monopolists trying to gain a still more dictatorial grip on musical entertainment; and the society maintains that it contributes to justice by protecting the rights of "qualified" composers against parasitical use of their music.

The broadcasters accuse ASCAP of being a self-perpetuating monopoly by a small, inner circle, seeking an exclusive and exorbitantly priced control of radio music. They maintain that the society is unjust within itself, because of its method of distributing proceeds according to considerations such as seniority, the number of hits written, and the nature of musical contribution, rather than on the sole basis of the income-value of each song, and because of its exclusive power to judge who is "qualified" for membership and who is not.

It is the righting of this last-mentioned alleged injustice and the opening of the doors of opportunity to a greater number of talented composers that furnishes the torch for BMI. The new organization promises judgment according to merit alone and payment according to extent of professional use.

Thus are the battle lines drawn for an intense and perhaps long struggle. There is at least partial truth in the accusations of both sides and at least partial justice in the separate positions. But both are determined and both well equipped. It looks now as if

## TIN PAN ALLEY GOES TO WAR

What M-Day in the coming BMI-ASCAP crisis may mean to you, the listener

Prayer, "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," or even "God Bless America."

Instead, you'll be treated to a teeming pageant of new music parading through the air, in company with a host of the old musical numbers rejuvenated.

Now, what is this all about? Here in a note-shell is the kernel of the musical revolution. The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers—more familiarly known as ASCAP—calls itself "a voluntary, unincorporated, non-profit association of qualified and recognized composers, authors and publishers of musical works." The organization's opponents have called it a racket and a musical parasite. Federal and state governments have demonstrated by frequent legal action that they consider it a monopoly in restraint of trade, or at least suspect it of being such.

Whatever its true or alleged nature, ASCAP controls the performance rights of several hundred thousand musical compositions, among which are the vast majority of all the popular songs heard on the air—the songs of Irving Berlin, Victor Herbert, Hoagy Carmichael, Jerome Kern, and most of the other well-known popular-music writers. For the right to use this great store of copyrighted music radio must pay. In 1923 the broadcasters paid \$9,750; in 1932, \$860,000; in 1939, over \$4,000,000, or about two-thirds of the

most dominant-in-its-field of collective bargaining agencies. But BMI, in spite of its youth, is no weakling. The broadcasters, led by the powerful networks—which themselves have been investigated as possible monopolies—have poured over a million dollars into the new enterprise and have lifted it completely out of the bluff stage. Both sides are strong enough, both stubborn enough for a knock-down-drag-out finish fight.

**T**HERE have been attempts at arbitration, instigated chiefly by dance-band leaders, particularly Fred Waring, because the orchestras, with their expensive ASCAP libraries, will be among the hardest hit victims of the revolution. But at this late date of writing there has been no real indication of compromise between the belligerents. There probably will be none before the deadline date.

The weapons in the battle of the music-makers are pens and pencils spattering barrages of black dots against reams of ruled paper. The outcome will have far-reaching effects in America's entertainment world—effects upon not only your listening but upon your work, if you're a musician, and perhaps upon your future, if you aspire to be a song-writer.

Perhaps you hadn't noticed a radical change, but already for some weeks you've been hearing only BMI



**T**HRILLS? Sure you can listen for them. Even when you are on the go almost constantly as I am. I'll not soon forget last week.

"This is station KOIL," the voice said. "Station KOIL, Omaha, calling. We have a message for John Smith of Beatrice, Nebraska. Can you hear us, Beatrice?"

I had been sound asleep in my berth aboard the Pacific Limited. It was the morning of November 11, 1940. Dimly at first and then the sentences rounded themselves out, and I began to catch their symphony.

Twice before such a thing had happened to me. On both occasions they spelled D-I-S-A-S-T-E-R. The first was the *Morro Castle* fire. The second the great Ohio River flood. On both of those previous occasions, as on this one, I had gone to sleep with the radio on. On all three of them I had come from under the pale shadow which obscures life from darkness into the realization that all was not well with the world.

I rang my bedside bell. The porter was reassuring.

"Nothin' done happened, Mister," he said. "'Cept we's caught in a snow-storm."

Snow-storm?

Why, when I went to bed in Cheyenne last night it was as warm as midsummer!

"Snow-storm," I said mechanically.

"How come?"

"I dunno, Mister. Et jest come."

"How late are we?"

"Well, Mister, right now we's about three hours late."

He was interrupted by my Zenith, which began a veritable rain of messages to persons all over Nebraska, evidently out of touch with loved ones. The Wavemagnet glued to my berth window was doing an excellent job.

"If Joe Zilch is listening in at Kearney, Nebraska, his brother would like him to know he is safe and sound at the Omaha Y. M. C. A.," it said.

"Please tell Mrs. John Doe in Albert Lea, Minnesota, that John has reached a farm-house on Route So-and-So," and the announcer added laughingly, "but there's no farmer's daughter there right now!"

And after a bit, out came the following: "Newspapers in the vicinity cut off by the blizzard will be permitted to reprint this exclusive United Press news whether they be members of the United Press or not."

And what do you think the news was? None other than the death of former Prime Minister Chamberlain, and almost simultaneously the news of the death of Key Pittman, chairman of the United States Senate Foreign Relations Committee!

**O**N AND on rambled the announcer at station KOIL, in Omaha, Nebraska. Town after town cut off from the outside world by telephone, telegraph, teletype became conscious of the fact that many sections of America knew exactly their plight.

Some of the radio stations in some of these towns responded. If their voices did not come in clear enough for the radio audience, the announcer at KOIL told of receipt of the message and oftentimes delivered a reply.

Along about 2 p.m. the Pacific Limited crept forward. Conductor George J. Elsner of Glendale, California, with whom I have made many transcontinental jaunts, was aboard. We had been stalled in the yards outside of Omaha, he said, and now we would make our way across the river to Council Bluffs.

We did so but it took us three hours

# Thrills

Our globe-trotter extraordinary braves a prairie blizzard with his portable!

MORE THAN ANY other American, Cornelius Vanderbilt has pioneered the pleasures of listening on land, sea and air via a portable radio

and ten minutes to cover twelve miles!

We reached Marshalltown, Iowa, seven hours late. The gale was blowing at fifty-five miles per hour, a ten-inch snow had swirled into three- and four-foot drifts in places.

E. F. Durkin, my man Friday, was waiting on the station platform, and my car was near by. We set off for

Ottumwa, Iowa, where I was to deliver an Armistice night address. As we began to move we switched on the radio.

Station WHO in Des Moines was talking. "All motorists are advised to keep off Iowa highways. All motorists are advised to keep off Iowa highways. This is station WHO, Des Moines, call-

ing. All motorists are advised to keep off Iowa highways."

We roared against the wind; we slipped and slid; once caught on a solid cake of ice we nearly jack-knifed.

"This is station WHO, Des Moines, calling. Highways 5, 65, 63, 71 (and so on, enumerating each one of them) are completely blocked (so many miles from Des Moines). Highways 44, 30, 50 are blocked. On highway such and such eighteen cars are stalled near such and such. Tow-cars are operating in the vicinity of ——. The regular price for being towed out of a drift is one dollar; most tow-cars are charging from five dollars up. Keep off the highways unless you have urgent business. Keep off the highways. This is station WHO, Des Moines, calling."

We slackened speed. Sheet-ice extended ahead. It was as warm as toast inside the Buick, and the defroster was working properly, but we had already done a couple of figure eights.

Said Durkin gravely: "I think, boss, we'd better call ourselves licked. It's going to be tough enough turning around as it is."

**I**T WAS. For half an hour the wheels spun. Then we put an old rug under them, and got traction again.

Back to Marshalltown's Tallcorn Hotel we crept. Its lobby was crowded to capacity. Durkin had retained two rooms. He too had been listening all day to the blizzard. The Boss will try it, he had said to himself, but he'll never make it. We were lucky we still had those rooms. We could have sold them a dozen times. People dozed in chairs, on stools in the drug store, even on the marble stairs. I remembered that it resembled the swimming-pool aboard a vessel evacuating tourists from Europe at the start of the war.

Up in my bedroom at the Tallcorn, the window was frozen solid. Icicles more than eighteen inches long hung in front of it. I attached my Zenith aerial to the window and in a few moments the whole wide world was coming in. Town after town in the path of the storm was reporting. Trees had been uprooted, houses unroofed, signs blown down, more than two hundred line-poles of a big midwestern utility company downed, telephones put out of commission.

Next evening the Great Western train I was to take from Marshalltown to Kansas City was still stuck in a snowdrift in Minnesota. Most snowplows were still wrapped in heavy grease, much of which had frozen during the sub-zero drop. And since the day previous had been a holiday in many states, hundreds of laborers were still off duty when the heaviest bit of the blizzard had struck. No one expected temperatures to drop fifty degrees in a few short hours, and transportation companies as well as communication concerns had been caught napping.

Through my radio came the highly entertaining information that Father Hubbard, the glacial priest from Alaska, was snowbound at Father Flanagan's Boys Town where he was showing his latest Alaskan movies.

We motored next evening to Des Moines to catch a train. The Cowles road from near Marshalltown to Des Moines had been repeatedly cleared of snow during the day but it drifted in again. All the way down we noticed cars stalled in drifts on both sides of the road—cars which evidently had not been radio-equipped. In places where the thermometer touched eight,

**BAND OF THE WEEK** is Lou Breese and his "Breezy Rhythm" outfit. Boston-born, Lou (in white coat) made his musical fortune conducting at the swank Kit Kat Club in London, was there snatched up by a theater

talent-scout, who brought him to America to conduct a band already formed for him. The smooth, danceable music of this, his present band, has brought him long engagements, a big network hearing. Line-up given below

**A** **BANDLEADER** who refused to heed Horace Greeley's admonition to "Go West, young man," is Lou Breese. Instead he went to London, where, while conducting an orchestra in the fashionable Kit Kat Club, he was discovered by a talent-scout for the Paramount-Publix theater chain. To put it correctly, Breese was rediscovered, for previous to his journey Londonwards he had been a featured soloist in the stage band at the Paramount in New York! Lou, incidentally, is a native of Boston, can play the banjo, trumpet, violin and clarinet. First job as an orchestra director was with his own band in the aforesaid Boston. His solos attracted so much attention that the Capitol Theater in New York offered him a job as a featured soloist in its pit orchestra. Breese accepted and remained for two years, after which he moved down Broadway to the Paramount. Then came an offer to head a band in London, which put him back in the ranks of the bandleaders. After his return to America to take over a band formed for him, Breese and company started going places. They've played long engagements at the Chez Paree in Chicago and the French Casino in New York, in addition to numerous NBC broadcasts. Band's current style is a rhythmic pattern that is easily recognizable—and danceable—the latter accounting for their consistent popularity as a dance band. Rhythm, incidentally, is six-eight tempo, as contrasted with the four-four of ordinary bands. In addition, the band makes effective use of counterpoint, highlights many arrangements with

the rhythm singing of "Skip" Morr, Lou's solo trumpet, and the "brass choir" of four trumpets and three trombones. **Nazi bombs hit CBS and NBC London headquarters December 8. Earlier in the day Fred Bate, head of NBC's London staff, suffered cuts and bruises from bombing. Shortly after Larry Lesueur left the CBS office it was wrecked; other employes, not in, escaped injury.**

THE song "God Bless America" has had two setbacks; is due for another. Kate Smith, on NBC December 2 to salute the 4-H Clubs, wanted to sing the song she made famous. NBC would have no part of it because it is controlled by the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP), with whom the networks are feuding. The same week from Los Angeles came the news that Alfred H. Aarons, eighty-year-old composer, is suing Irving Berlin, charging that "God Bless America" incorporates parts of a song Aarons wrote and copyrighted in 1918, "America, My Home So Fair." Also named as defendants are Kate Smith, who popularized the song; NBC and CBS, who have aired it, and ASCAP, which controls it. The third setback to come is that CBS has already given notice that no program on its network may use any ASCAP song after December 31, which means Kate must take "God Bless America" off her program despite the fact it has been her weekly feature for nearly three years.

### Pinza Surprises

Music circles took for granted Ezio Pinza, Metropolitan Opera bass, would marry Elisabeth Rethberg, Met soprano, as soon as his divorce became final. It therefore was a complete surprise when, on November 28, the forty-odd-year-old singer motored to Larchmont, N. Y., and married twenty-two-year-old Doris Neal Leak, a non-professional. Pinza's first wife is in Italy with their daughter. It is Miss Leak's first marriage.

### The Wallingtons Split

James Wallington, the Texaco announcer, and Mrs. Wallington, the

former Betty Jane Cooper, have separated. According to James, with whom we talked, it is all because Mrs. Wallington, one of the nation's top-notch tap-dancers, wanted to return to the stage while her husband wanted her to devote her full time to their two children, a three-year-old girl and a two-year-old boy. This is Wallington's second marriage. His first wife, also a dancer, died in 1935.

### Carol Bruce Contributes

Most persons give to charity because they wish. Carol Bruce, vocalist on the Ben Bernie program, does because she must. Carol, you may recall from a previous column, had signed a contract with Buddy DeSylva to appear exclusively in his Broadway production, "Louisiana Purchase." When she appeared on the radio, contrary to the contract's provisions and without Mr. DeSylva's permission, Equity (her union) fined her. DeSylva wanted her to continue in his show and her radio sponsor wanted her to continue on the Bernie program, and so this final settlement was made: Mr. DeSylva would permit her to continue on the radio provided she gave fifty percent of her radio salary to the Actors Fund. This Carol agreed to do, and so each week her check for \$212, which is fifty percent of her radio net earnings, helps to swell the actors' charity fund.

### Tibbett Takes a Chance

Lawrence Tibbett, away from the public for nearly a year because of a throat ailment, will gamble on his career by appearing on the "Ford Sunday Evening Hour" December 29. It's a gamble because his doctor thinks the throat may not yet be up to par

... Again a United Air Lines plane crashed. Again Boake Carter, United's radio commentator, reported it, illustrating great freedom of sponsor-artist cooperation . . . William L. Shirer, CBS Berlin correspondent, is en route to America for the Christmas holidays . . . Oscar Levant ("Information, Please") and Barry Wood ("Your Hit Parade") are brothers-in-law . . . Lily Pons became an American citizen December 6. She was French, though her heart belonged to America . . . Kay Kyser and Ben Grauer have been renewed by their cigarette sponsor, assuring that program's continuation throughout the winter regardless of the outcome of ASCAP versus radio-music fight . . . 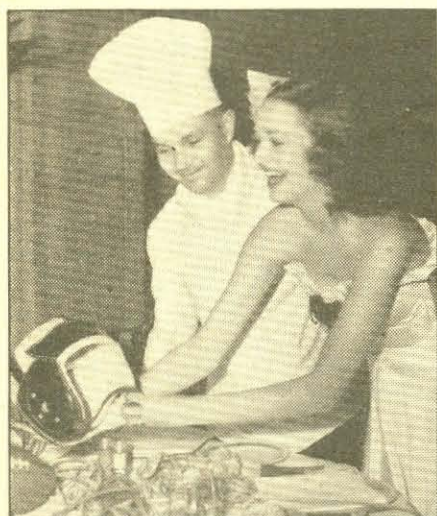

**PARING THE BUDGET** of "Maxwell House Coffee Time" with the new year will eliminate cinema actress-songstress Mary Martin from the cast. Dick Powell may possibly stay, and others, including Fanny "Snooks" Brice, definitely will remain after the pencil-sharpening.

WITH the break between ASCAP and radio near, theme songs already changed are those which introduce "One Man's Family," "Fibber McGee" and "Coffee Time." Rudy Vallee has a BMI (Broadcasters' Music, Inc., the broadcasters' rival music mill) tune ready to replace "My Time Is Your Time," which for ten years has been his air trade-mark but is ASCAP-controlled. While CBS has not changed any theme numbers yet, that network is using BMI music one hundred percent on its sustaining and eighty-five percent on its commercial programs—with no complaints from listeners! When the music battle begins January 1, CBS' "Amos 'n' Andy" will substitute an old Italian song, "La Serenata" (The Angels' Serenade), for "The Perfect Song," which for years has identified them. But—when "La Serenata" is played on the organ it is so much like "The Perfect Song" (which it probably inspired) that most people wouldn't be able to tell the difference!

#### Bergen and Bing Sign Again

Ventriloquist Edgar Bergen and Bing Crosby have been renewed by their current sponsors through the calendar year of 1941, which ends many rumors, especially about Bing. Crooner Crosby's next option pick-up date comes August 1, 1941, and, even if his contract were allowed then to lapse, he still would continue selling cheese through December 31. According to his new deal, Bing next year will have more freedom to make trips afar, such as to Gonzaga College or the Kentucky Derby, and to do his Kraft chorals from such remote points. Contractual clause terminology is as nothing, however, compared to the

## THE NATIONAL BROADCASTING STATION OF GUATEMALA

INTERNATIONAL station TGWA, "The Voice of Guatemala," is making an outstanding contribution in the fostering of friendly relations between the United States and Latin America. To fully appreciate its broadcasts one must understand something about colorful and picturesque Guatemala, the northernmost state of Central America.

Guatemala is a land of contrasts where the ancient and the modern meet. Here are jungles whose thick underbrush overgrows and almost conceals exquisite ruins of old Mayan habitations; whose trees abound with howling monkeys, green parrots, and the brilliantly plumaged Quetzal bird—Guatemalan national emblem and symbol of freedom, since it can not live in captivity. . . Here are beautiful, sparkling blue lakes, such as Atitlan, on whose shores rise gigantic volcanic mountains. . . Here are broad, fertile valleys with many plantations, where coffee, bananas and chicle gum are grown (thirty to forty percent of these plantations are owned by Germans who have gained a strong foothold in this country). . . Here are good roads, good hotels, excellent hunting and fishing, a mild climate, and twenty-four-hour plane service with New York. . . Here the population is seventy percent Indian. They are well educated, colorful and musical—Indians, whose marimba music has now become world famous.

TGWA is a 10,000-watt ultra-modern short-wave station at Guatemala City, the capital of Guatemala. The transmitter was installed by and is operated by United States radio engineers. By means of directive antennae, the station's programs are beamed on the United States, Europe or Latin America at will. All broadcasts to the United States and Canada are announced in English and Spanish; those to Europe in English, French, German, Italian and Spanish; those to Latin America in Spanish only.

**GENERAL NOTES:** According to Robert Skyten of East Brookfield, Mass., a new station, "Radio Algiers" (8.86), is broadcasting French and Arabic programs, daily from approximately 2 to 4 p.m. EST. The interval signal is one stroke on a gong. The announcer is a woman. . . "Radio Maroc" (11.94), Rabat, Morocco, is still being heard with fair regularity intermittently from 12 noon to 5:30 p.m. EST. Four strokes on a gong is the interval signal. . . Don't miss the colorful broadcast of Christmas Eve on Beacon Hill, to be aired over Boston station WRUL (11.73, 6.04), on Tuesday, December 24, starting at 9 p.m. EST. This quaint tradition of an old English Christmas with carols, bell-ringers and Yule cheer carries across the sea the reassurance that New England has not forgotten. . . This is all wrong. The Christmas season does not begin until the Festival of the Holy Nativity, which falls on December 25 (January 6 in the Eastern Church). It continues twelve days; that is, to the Eve of the Epiphany. This is the time, beginning with Christmas Day, when we should be hearing the most of our lovely Christmas music.

As it is now, we hear our Christmas music and hold our Christmas celebrations during Advent, which, after all, is only the preparatory season. Then when the great day finally arrives and the Yuletide has actually begun, the "Christmas spirit" suddenly collapses and expires, and we hear nothing but "Jingle Bells" and "Auld Lang Syne"! The Christmas season itself is for the most part disregarded.

I think a movement should be launched to restore the proper conception of the Christmastide.

ten and twelve below, great flocks of turkeys were frozen solid alongside roadside fences. At Griswold one thousand stood thus like statues near a barn; near Peterson seven thousand died, and at Paulina 2,200 more. Less than twenty-five percent of the total Iowa brood being fattened for the holiday market survived.

Then another station in the farm-belt told one that the Iowa hog market had strengthened greatly as a result of the blizzard. The price had risen ten cents; the week's receipts were fifty-two thousand head, the largest, with one exception, since last February.

In Des Moines, only one sleeper had turned up for the Kansas City run, and as all planes had been grounded, this one sleeper worked overtime. I was only able to secure an upper.

Again, I fixed my Wavemagnet to the side of the train and went to work, listening to the blizzard. Tragedy came with the laughs. Wives in little towns along the Mississippi were broadcasting to husbands who had gone duck-hunting a day or two before and hadn't been heard from since. They sounded not unlike British mothers talking to their loved ones in these United States from the United Kingdom; and I wondered as I listened to them if we could take it, if the Nazis were doing to us what they have been doing to them so ruthlessly.

A small resort town on the edge of Lake Michigan took advantage of the storm to tell about its many winter advantages. Rolla, Missouri, where that state's School of Mines is located, was telling the outside world of a new School for Army Skiers which it was reported would soon be stationed there. Up in Wisconsin manufacturers of choice cheese came on little stations to advertise the calories in their wares and to inform the public they could not go wrong if they were to purchase their holiday products from them. Charlie Chaplin's "Dictator" in Chicago was being advertised in a clever review of the picture.

All this meant just one thing. The big blow was over, but while millions were still listening, clever advertisers were getting their messages on the air.

In Kansas City next morning, a cheerful announcer reported rising temperatures. I patted my portable as I swung aboard an Oklahoma train. On the run, lecturing here one night and there the next, I nevertheless carried the world with me; a world of news, fun, good music and goose-pimple thrills.

Arriving home from the tennis club about six o'clock he first took a shower (whistling a tune which didn't have any tune to it), and by seven-fifteen was togged out in a dinner-jacket, and pretty darn handsome, too.

He picked "Pat" up at her house at 7:30 and they went to a charity affair known as "party of the month" at Alton (Steve) Brodie's house. These are private parties, sponsored by a group of prominent picture folk, with each member of the group throwing a shindig at his house when his turn comes. 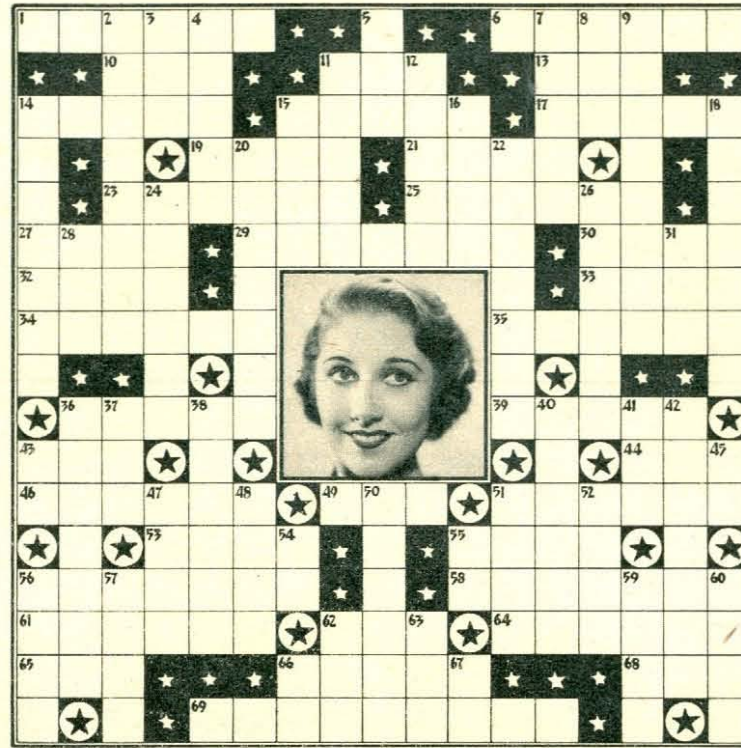
If that seems to be an awful lot for one guy to have, don't forget "Butch" is one guy who deserves only the best. That's my story and I'm sticking to it!

the new order is set to take over the first of the year. There is always the possibility, of course, that sometime a compromise might be effected whereby both ASCAP and BMI would make some concessions toward cooperation. This would seem to appeal to many people as the most logical and satisfactory solution in the long run. (In the words of a BMI song, they "could make such beautiful music together!")

Of course you still want to hear "St. Louis Blues" and "God Bless America" on your radio. But you probably believe also that there should be an opportunity for any other American who thinks he can write better blues than "St. Louis Blues" or a greater song of the nation than "God Bless America."
